# REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXCISE DEPARTMENT IN THE BOMBAY PRESIDENCY, FOR THE YEAR 1928-29

#### CHAPTER I

#### ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES

The following changes were introduced in the Excise system and arrangements during the year 1928-29:—

- (1) The rationing system was continued, the rations for all Districts being fixed at the same figures as for 1927-28 (G. R., R. D., No. 9869 of 9th January 1928).
- (2) The still head duty on 60° U. P. country spirit supplied to the Att shop in the Jalalpore taluka of the Surat District was reduced from Rs. 3 to Rs. 2-4 per gallon, the rate applicable to all the other shops in the taluka (G. R., R. D., No. 77/28 dated 3rd February 1928).
- . (3) A new scheme for the maintenance by foreign liquor licensecs of correct sale statistics was introduced (G. R., R. D., No. 5629/24 of 7th February 1928).
- (4) The scale of fees for the privilege of vend of foreign liquor was revised (G. R., R. D., No. 5629/24 of 7th February 1928).
- (5) A special fee at the prescribed rates was levied on foreign liquor imported into the Presidency proper by private persons (G. R., R. D., No. 5629/24 of 7th February 1928).
- (6) The tree-tax rates in the Umbergaon Petha of the Thana District were raised from Rs. 2 and Rs. 5 for date and wild palm and cocoanut and brab respectively to Rs. 3 and Rs. 7-8 (G. R., R. D., No. 50/28 of 2nd April 1928).
- (7) The duty on ganja was increased from Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 per seer (G. R., R. D., No. 9869/24 of 9th January 1928).
- (8) Shops for the retail sale of opium in the Town and Island of Bombay were given out on fixed fees instead of being auctioned (G. R., R. D., No. 10287/24 of 16th February 1928).
- (9) Retail opium shops on the borders of Indian States which were hitherto given out on fixed fees, with maxima or fixed selling prices, were disposed of by open auction, with a restriction as to the maintenance of minima selling prices where fixed selling prices were previously in force (G. R., R. D., No. 8629/24 of 16th January 1928).
- (10) Collectors were authorised to dispose of Excise shops by calling for tenders in cases where on account of combination amongst bidders, no bids or inadequate bids were offered at the auctions (G. R., R. D., No. 1258/28 of 29th September 1928).
- 2. All statistics of revenue with the exception of those relating to "Gain on sale proceeds of Excise opium" and of consumption herein dealt with relate to British Districts only.

#### CHAPTER II

#### COUNTRY SPIRIT

3. Sale strengths.—The sale strengths prescribed for country spirit remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 30°, 40° and 60° U. P. The sale of 30° U. P. was however confined to those border shops where it was found necessary to maintain spirit of higher strength owing to the unwillingness of the adjoining States to reduce the strength of spirit

sold at their border shops.

The policy of discouraging the consumption of stronger spirit by restricting a certain number of shops in each District to the exclusive sale of weak spirit was continued in places where such a policy had proved successful. But in certain areas where it was found that such a restriction had only driven people to stronger spirit illicitly distilled or imported, it was found necessary to remove the restriction and allow the sale of stronger spirit at the shops.

4. Receipts from still head duty.—The revenue from still head duty amounted to Rs. 1,22,83,293 against Rs. 1,30,95,757 in the previous year (Imperial Return I—Column 2) showing a decrease of Rs. 8,12,464.

The decrease is due to a fall in the issues of country spirit.

5. Vend and License Fees.—The receipts from fees for the right of retail vend of country spirit at shops decreased from Rs. 87,04,364 to Rs. 84,93,878 (Imperial Return I—Column 4), due to absence of keen competition at the auctions in the majority of districts. In some districts there was competition at the auctions, but this was more than counterbalanced by the lack of competition in other districts, owing to the losses sustained by licensees in previous years on account of rash bidding. Of the total fees, Rs. 82,40,322 represent vend and Rs. 2,53,556 license fees.

6. Revenue and consumption under the outstill system.—The country spirit arrangements in the Akrani continued to be managed by the Forest Department. The sale proceeds of spirit in the area amounted to Rs. 59,896 against Rs. 35,376 in the previous year. The consumption which is of 60° U. P. amounted to 39,900 bulk gallons against 23,600 in the previous year. The increase is due to a good season and to marriages and festivals among the Bhils.

7. Working of the Contract Supply System.—The contract supply system continued only in the Sankheda Mewas in the Rewa Kantha

Agency and in the Mahi Kantha leased area.

The supplies of spirit were well maintained throughout the year under report.

The Nasik Distillery with its dependant warehouses continued to be

managed departmentally and was worked satisfactorily.

8. Working of the Mahura Flowers Act.—Cases of illicit possession of mahura flowers increased from 88 in 1927-28 to 119 in 1928-29 in the Kaira District and from 9 to 12 in the Kolaba District while in the Thana and Nasik Districts there was a decrease from 107 and 43 in 1927-28 to 68 and 21 respectively in 1928-29.

9. Country Spirit Shops.—The number of shops for the retail vend of country spirit fell from 1,589 in 1927-28 to 1,579 in the year under report. Eight shops were closed on the recommendation of the Excise Advisory

Committees concerned and two shops were closed as they were considered unnecessary in the localities in which they were situated.

- 10. Advisory Committees.—The various Excise Advisory Committees in the Presidency proper held 459 meetings at which 381 recommendations were made. Out of these 142 recommendations were wholly accepted and 8 partially accepted. Many recommendations—56—referred to alterations in the hours of sale and could not be accepted, this being a question of general application. The hours of sale were the same as in the previous year, viz., opening hour 10-30 a.m. and closing hour 8 p.m. except in the following cases:—(i) in Bombay, where it was 9 p.m., (ii) on the Railway lines up to Thana on G. I. P. Railway, and Virar (Bassein Taluka) on the B. B. & C. I. Railway where it was 8-30 p.m. and (iii) in Poona City and Cantonment and Kirkee Cantonment where it was 7-30 p.m. from 1st September to 28th February.
- Consumption.—Appendix A. Column II, shows in terms of proof gallons the sale of spirit at shops. There was a decrease of 38,721 proof gallons or about 3 per cent. There was a reduction in consumption in the Ahmedabad, Thana, Bombay Suburban, Kolaba, Ratnagiri, Dharwar, Belgaum and Poona Districts and the Town and Island of Bombay. In all the other Districts there was an increase in consumption. The noteworthy decreases occurred in the Town and Island of Bombay (56,201), Thana (12,169), Bombay Suburban District (5,406), Poona (3,933), Ahmedabad (3,571) and Kolaba (3,021). In Bombay the decrease was due to the prolonged mill strike, and the general trade depression and also partially to the taste for beer among the labourers in preference to In the other Districts the decrease was due to the country spirit. general trade depression and high selling price of country spirit. main increases in consumption were in West Khandesh (12,600), Surat (6,997), Broach (5,468), East Khandesh (4,586) and Kaira (3,109) and is attributed to a good agricultural season and lowering of the selling prices by licensees. In Surat District the increased consumption of country spirit was to some extent at the expense of toddy the sales of which were affected by the anti-drink movement. The following statement shows in respect of Bombay City and each district (1) the ration fixed for 1928-29, (2) the actual consumption in 1928-29 and 1927-28 and (3) the cases of illicit distillation, possession, sale and import detected in 1928-29 and 1927-28.

The rations fixed for 1928-29 were the same as those for 1927-28 except in the case of the West Khandesh, East Khandesh, Surat and Thana Districts. For the West Khandesh District, an extra ration of 15,000 proof gallons was sanctioned by Government to meet the increased demand for liquor due to a good agricultural season and to marriages and festivals amongst the drinking classes. The extra ration was made up by the transfer of 4,000, 5,500 and 5,500 proof gallons from the unexpended surplus ration of the East Khandesh, Surat and Thana Districts respectively. On the whole therefore there was no change in the total ration of the Presidency proper. Ih spite of a good season the total consumption fell below the allotted ration by 488,325 proof gallons. The general causes of the decrease are the poor economic condition of the people due to continued trade depression and the prolonged mill strike in Bombay, illicit distillation in tracts where there are facilities for it, illicit importation of liquor from Indian States or Foreign territories, the unpopular low strength of country spirit, high selling prices and a growing taste among the drinking classes for cheap foreign spirit and beer, wherever available. Where cheap foreign spirit or beer was not easily obtainable the ordinary consumer of country spirit had recourse to illicit supplies either distilled in the vicinity or imported from adjoining Indian States or Foreign territories where country spirit is comparatively very cheap. This accounts for an increase by 118 in the number of offences relating to illicit importation, possession, sale and distillation.

- 12. Temperance activities.—No temperance activities of note occurred in Bombay City. In the mofussil there were no temperance movements of any kind except in the Surat District where a vigorous anti-drink campaign was carried on.
- 13. Administration of Distilleries and Warehouses.—There were two distilleries and 37 bonded warehouses during the year under report.

The issues to retailers in British Districts of duty paid spirits amounted to 1,234,882 proof gallons (exclusive of 16,203 proof gallons issued from the Dhadgaon distillery to the Akrani Outstill area) against 1,276,567 proof gallons in the previous year.

14. Retail sale in excess of prescribed limits.—Permits for the sale of country spirit in excess of the prescribed limits were granted in all Districts except Nasik, Ahmednagar, Satara, Sholapur, Bijapur, Dharwar and Ratnagiri. The total quantity sold under such permits was 269 gallons of 30° U. P., 1581 gallons of 40° U. P. and 22,267 gallons of 60° U. P. against 62 gallons of 30° U. P., 1,355 gallons of 40° U. P. and 24,563 gallons of 60° U. P. in the previous year. Similar permits were also granted for the sale of toddy under which 3,704; 20; 4,728; 25; 378 and 10 gallons were sold in the Thana, Bombay Suburban, West Khandesh, Poona, Sholapur and Belgaum Districts respectively.

#### CHAPTER III

#### TODDY

- 15. Revenue.—The revenue under this head is derived from (1) tree tax and (2) fees for the retail sale of toddy. It amounted to Rs. 45,72,878 in the year under report as compared with Rs. 47,62,154 in the previous year (Column 11 of Imperial Return I), a decrease of Rs. 1,89,276.
- 16. Tree Tax.—The receipts from tree tax amounted to Rs. 17,07,519 during the year under report as against Rs. 18,32,782 in the previous year (Column 8 of Imperial Return I). The decrease was due to a decrease in the total number of trees tapped.
- 17. Vend and License Fees.—The revenue from vend fee was Rs. 28,28,834 and from license fees Rs. 36,525 amounting in all to Rs. 28,65,359 as against Rs. 29,29,372 in the preceding year (Column 9 of Imperial Return I). The decrease was due to want of keen competition at the auctions.

18. Trees licensed for tapping.—The number of trees licensed for tapping for the sale of raw toddy during the year under report and in the previous year is given below (Appendix B).

There was a substantial decrease in the total number of trees tapped. The main decrease occurred in the town and island of Bombay and in the Surat, Thana and Sholapur Districts. The decrease in the number of cocoanut trees was largely in the town and island of Bombay where toddy is generally consumed by lower classes particularly millhands. On account of the exodus of millhands from the city due to the mill strike, less toddy was consumed and consequently fewer trees were tapped. In Surat there was a decrease of 19,636 in the number of date trees tapped during 1928-29. The decrease was mainly due to the anti-drink movement which was carried on in that district during the year under report as a result of which 19 toddy shops and 178 tree foot booths remained undisposed of. In the Thana District there was a decrease of 7,602 in the number of trees tapped. The decrease was wholly in the Umbergaon Petha and was due to the agitation carried on by the toddy licensees in the Petha as a protest against the increase in the tree tax from Rs. 2 to Rs. 3 per date tree. There was a decrease of 1,190 in the number of trees tapped during the year in the Sholapur District, but this decrease was accompanied by a rise in the consumption of toddy. The obvious conclusion for this is either that the trees yielded a larger quantity of toddy or that the licensees resorted to adulteration of toddy to a greater extent.

19. Toddy Licenses.—The Licenses of different descriptions granted during the year and in the previous year were:—

The decrease in the total number of domestic consumption licenses is mainly due to a decrease of 1,889 such licenses in the Surat District, though this decrease is partially counteracted by an increase in such licenses in the Panch Mahals District. The decrease in the domestic consumption licenses in Surat was as explained above, due to the anti-drink movement while the increase in such licenses in the Panch Mahals was due to the growing taste for toddy among the local people as being cheaper than country spirit. The increase of 38 in tree foot booths is due to the fact that 24 booths in the Thana District and 12 in the Nasik District which remained undisposed of were not included in the number of sanctioned booths shown in the report for 1927-28. Two new booths were opened in the year under report in the West Khandesh District. Two toddy shops in the Belgaum District and one in Ratnagiri District were closed during the year as against one new shop opened in the West

Khandesh District. The decrease in the number of hawking licenses was due to the non-renewal of 16 such licenses during the year in Bombay City in accordance with the policy of Government to abolish these licenses within five years.

- 20. Consumption.—The total sales show a decrease of 1,196,898 gallons which is mainly shared by the Surat and Thana Districts and was due to the anti-drink movement started in the Surat District and in the Umbergaon Petha of the Thana District as stated previously. There was also a decrease in the Town and Island of Bombay on account of the prolonged mill strike and the exodus of millhands to their villages.
- 21. Manufacture of Gul from Sweet Toddy.—In the Kanara District 6 persons were permitted to manufacture gul as against 4 in the previous year. The number of trees tapped free of duty for this industry during the year under report was 65 as against 49 in the previous year. No permission for the manufacture of gul from sweet toddy was granted in any other part of the Presidency.

#### CHAPTER IV

#### Foreign Liquor including those of Indian Manufacture

22. General—The New Foreign Liquor Scheme.—With effect from 1st April 1928, Government sanctioned the introduction of a new scheme for the maintenance by foreign liquor licensees of correct sale statistics and the revision of the scale of fees for the privilege of vend of foreign liquor. The main features of the new scheme are (i) restriction of the functions of the wholesale licensee to supplying the trade only; (ii) control by permits (a) of the transport of liquor from the wholesaler (or Ordinary Trade and Import Licensee as he is now called) to the retail dealer or from one retail dealer to another, (b) of the transfer of stocks from one godown to another to facilitate stock checking, and (c) of sales to parties outside the Presidency proper; and (iii) the stamping by the Excise Staff of all liquor bottles stocked in railway dining cars.

With the withdrawal of the privilege of sale to the public from whole-salers, such of the wholesalers who desired to continue selling to the public were granted special retail "Off," licenses whereunder sales were restricted to not less than one dozen quart bottles or two gallons at a time while the right of importing and selling to other licensees was restricted to Ordinary Trade and Import licensees. Hotels and Clubs which desired to import for their own needs were granted special import licenses.

Instead of a fixed license fee, as hitherto, all retail licenses were assessed on their actual sales according to a scale of fees sanctioned by Government. The fees for cheap foreign spirits was 50 per cent. in excess of the fee fixed for superior spirits. Besides the fees on actual sales, which were levied quarterly in arrears, licenses under which liquor was sold for consumption on the premises had to pay additional fees which were determined by auction in the case of retail "On" shops in Bombay while in the case of Hotels, Refreshment Rooms, Dak Bungalows, Traveller's Bungalows, Railway Refreshment Rooms, dining cars or permanent Refreshment

Stalls, the fees were fixed by the Collector subject to the Commissioner's sanction or according to the scale approved by Government.

With a view to discourage direct imports by private persons, private importers were required to pay a special fee at the prescribed rates in addition to vend fees. The object was to prevent the circumvention of payment of the new license fees by the public by importing direct.

Revenue.—The revenue under this head chiefly consists (1) duty on Indian made liquors, (2) license fees for the sale of such liquors as well as imported liquors, and (3) vend (pass) fees on foreign liquors (a) imported at the port of Bombay or (b) imported into the Bombay Presidency from other parts of British India and Indian States and foreign possessions, or (c) manufactured in the Bombay Presidency. During the year under report the revenue under (1) amounted to Rs. 6,96,943 against Rs. 7,78,883 in the previous year (columns 12, 15, 19 and 20 of Imperial Return I). The decrease is mainly due to the fall in imports of Indian made foreign liquor—spirits as well as beer. decrease in imports of Indian made foreign spirits was due to the prolonged millstrike in Bombay and the general trade depression while the decreased imports of Indian made beer are attributed to the increase in selling prices in consequence of the new scheme of assessing license fees on actual There was an increase in the receipts from duty on commercial spirits owing to the larger quantity of rectified spirits used for the manufacture of medicines, but this increase was wiped out by the large decrease in receipts from duty on Indian made foreign liquor. The revenue under (2) decreased from Rs. 14,95,931 in the previous year to Rs. 13,94,673 (columns 13, 16, 21 and 22 of Imperial Return I). The decrease is due to the fact that in the year under report, the bulk of license fees which accrued from the assessment on actual sales, was levied in arrears after the end of each quarter and so only nine months' fees were credited to the accounts of the year under report whereas formerly the whole year's fees used to be recovered in advance in March and credited to the accounts of the preceding year.

Vend (pass) fees have as usual been included in the column of license fees.

24. Imports and consumption of Foreign Liquor.—The gross imports of foreign liquor into Bombay City by sea compared with those of the previous year are as follows:—

The increase in the consumption of fermented liquors, wines and potable spirits is due to the fact that during the year under report, the statistics of sale were correctly recorded in accordance with the new scheme introduced by Government, while in previous years the figures of sales were by no means reliable. Had the old system of accounts continued during the year under report, the figures of consumption would probably have been lower than the figures of 1927-28, as a matter of fact there was a considerable decline in the consumption of foreign liquor on account of the prolonged mill strike in Bombay, the general trade depression and the closure of the shops in Bombay during the communal riots in February. Besides the new system of maintenance of correct statistics on account of which there is an all round increase, the increase in the sales of fermented liquors is attributed to the growing taste for beer among the working classes, in preference to stronger beverages. Every 'Off' and 'On 'shop in Bombay has either a Frigidaire or large ice bag so that iced beer is obtained at any time of the day either for consumption on the premises where it is allowed or for removal. The price of beer varies from 8 to 10 annas a bottle and the beer sold is more palatable than the weak coun-Hence it is that the increased consumption of beer is at the expense of country spirit. There is an increase in the sales of denatured spirits in all Districts. The increase is mostly due to the use of denatured spirits for stoves and industrial purposes but in some districts the increase is attributed to the use of this spirit for potable purposes by the poorer classes owing to the high price of and other restrictions on country spirit. The question of checking the use of this spirit for potable purposes without hampering its legitimate uses is being dealt with by reducing the number of existing licenses and rejecting applications for licenses where a legitimate demand for this class of spirit does not exist. The imports of denatured spirit through the Port of Bombay amounted to 256,711 gallons as The major portion of the against 315,022 gallons in the previous year. imports, 247,464 gallons, were from Java while other imports were from the United Kingdom, the United States of America, the Netherlands and The decrease in imports is due to the large balances in hand with the importers at the end of 1927-28.

- 25. Canteen Tenant Licenses.—The number of Canteen Tenant licenses issued during the year under report was 35, the same as in the previous year. The total quantity of beer sold under these licenses was 158,755 gallons as against 183,544 gallons in 1927-28. Canteen tenant licenses were not affected by the new system of assessment of license fees on sales but continued to be granted on a nominal fee of Rs. 24 per annum for a regiment and Rs. 12 per annum for smaller units. The question of placing these licenses on the same footing as other foreign liquor retail licenses in regard to payment of fees is still under consideration.
- 26. Messrs. Kemp and Company, N. Powell and Company, Wright and Company and M. J. Gajjar of Bombay, Wingate and Company of Poona and the Gujerat Chemical Works of Ahmedabad continued to manufacture spirituous medicinal and toilet preparations in bond at the concession rate of duty of Rs. 5 per proof gallon. Medicinal and toilet preparations at the lower rate of duty were imported into Bombay from the following firms:—
  - (1) The Alembic Chemical Works Company, Ltd., Baroda;
  - (2) The Bengal Chemical and Pharmaceutical Works, Calcutta;
  - (3) The Ranaghat Chemical Works, Calcutta;
  - (4) Dr. Bose's Laboratory, Calcutta;
  - (5) Dr. Burman's Laboratory, Calcutta.

The sales of rectified spirit were 359 gallons as against 552 in the previous year (Col. 14 of Imperial Return IV). No accounts of medicated wines are required to be kept and so column 16 of Imperial Return IV is blank.

Indian made foreign spirit is manufactured at the Gujerat Chemical Works at Ahmedabad, the Alembic Chemical Works Company at Baroda and the Government Central Distillery at Nasik. The Gujerat Chemical Works supplied 21,849 gallons of duty free rectified spirit to the Government Medical Stores, Bombay, against 22,598 gallons in the preceding year. Two hundred and two gallons of denatured spirit were manufactured at the Gujerat Chemical Works as against 324 gallons in 1927-28.

27. Licenses.—The number of licenses for the sale of foreign liquor was 2,546 against 2,341 in the preceding year. The increase is mainly due to 116 extra licenses for the wholesale and retail sale of denatured spirit and 94 temporary refreshment stall licenses. There are slight increases and decreases under the other classes of licenses. Fifty licenses were issued for the manufacture of perfumed spirits and six licenses for the manufacture of flavouring essences.

#### CHAPTER V.

## Intoxicating Drugs other than Opium.

#### HEMP DRUGS.

28. Cultivation and outturn of Ganja.—Cultivation of ganja was not allowed during the year under report as there was in stock a large quantity of ganja out of the previous year's crop.

29. Issues from Warehouses.—The issues from the Warehouses during the year under report and the year 1927-28 are contrasted below:—

The decrease in the consumption of ganja was mainly in the Bombay City and the districts of Dharwar, East Khandesh, Satara, Nasik, Ahmedabad, Poona, Kanara and Ahmednagar. The decrease is attributed principally to the high selling prices at the shops due to the enhancement of duty. In the Bombay City the decrease was partly due to the prolonged mill strike. In the Sholapur district, however, there was an increase due partly to the cheap selling prices at the shops owing to competition and partly to the good harvest.

There was an increase in the total consumption of bhang mainly in the Poona district which is attributed to the better classes of the people taking to Bhang in the form of "Ghota." In the Nasik and the East Khandesh Districts, however, there was a decrease. In the former district the decrease is attributed to the fact that the old licensees having lost their shops had sold their stock at cheaper prices at the end of the previous year which had inflated the figures of consumption for that year and in the latter district, it is attributed to the high selling prices charged by the licensees on account of heavy license fees.

- 31. Revenue.—The revenue from intoxicating drugs is derived from (1) quantitative duties on (a) issues from warehouses and (b) imports from other provinces and (2) vend fees. The duty realised and the vend fees amounted to Rs. 12,90,314 and Rs. 7,48,682 respectively as compared with Rs. 14,00,089 and Rs. 7,61,360 respectively in the year 1927-28 (Imperial Return I, Columns 31, 35 and 36).
- 32. Vend Licenses.—The number of vend licenses in the year under report was 534 (Imperial Return III, Columns 10 to 12 and 32 to 34) as against 536 in the year 1927-28. Of these 20 were wholesale and 514

retail. There was a decrease in the number of shops by two due to (1) the closure of one shop in the East Khandesh district and (2) the transfer to the Palanpur State of the shop at Deesa, which was so far included in the shops in the Ahmedabad district.

#### COCAINE.

- 33. Vend Licenses.—The licenses for the sale of cocaine for bona fide medical purposes numbered 759 during the year under report against 754 in 1927-28 (Imperial Return III, Column 38).
- 34. Imports and Issues in the Presidency.—The quantity of cocaine and the allied drugs imported during the year amounted to 37 lbs. 2 ozs. 133 grains (avoirdupois standard weight) against 15 lbs. 12 ozs. 157 grains in the previous year. The quantity sold under licenses was 13 lbs. 3 ozs. 153 grains against 10 lbs. 14 ozs. 110 grains. The statistics of cocaine transactions called for in Government of India's letter No. 1324 dated the 8th March 1922; Department of Commerce, are given below in the form approved in Government Resolution No. 4495, Revenue Department, dated the 22nd August 1922:—

35. Cocaine cases.—Thirty-nine cases of illicit possession of cocaine were detected in the City of Bombay during the year under report against 59 during 1927-28. The reasons for the decrease have been given in paragraph 51 below. The largest seizure of cocaine by the Excise Department during the year was 42,000 grains.

#### CHAPTER VI.

#### OPIUM.

36. Realizations from opium issued from depôts.—Opium issued from the depôts realised Rs. 21,31,868 as shown in the District Treasury Accounts. Of this sum Rs. 8,62,653 represent the prime cost paid to the Government of the United Provinces exclusive of Rs. 697 as the cost paid to the Indian States for the confiscated opium received from them and the balance of Rs. 12,69,215 gain on sales as shown in columns 24 and 25 of Imperial Return I. From the latter figure the expenditure noted below has to be deducted:—

The net profit to Government thus amounts to Rs. 12,63,540 (inclusive of duty) against Rs. 12,39,474 in the previous year, an increase of Rs. 24,066 which is due partly to the decrease in the rate of cost price from Rs. 26 to Rs. 23-5-0 per seer and partly to the credit of the recovery in respect of the year 1927-28 during the year under report.

- 37. Sales in British Districts.—The total sales in British districts amounted to 22,126 seers against 23,152 seers in the previous year (Column 17 of Imperial Return IV), a decrease of 1,026 seers or 4½ per cent. due to the fall in the consumption in all districts except Kaira, Panch Mahals, Thana, West Khandesh, Ahmednagar, Bijapur and Kolaba. The decrease in these areas is attributed to trade depression and the high selling prices charged by licensees as a result of heavy vend fees which they had to pay on account of keen competition. In Bombay it is also partly due to the mill strike and to illicit opium finding its way into Bombay and competing with licit opium as the former can be had at considerably cheaper price.
- 38. Vend Fees.—The fees for retail vend in British districts amounted to Rs. 11,20,646 against Rs. 9,83,687 in the previous year (Column 27 of Imperial Return I). The increase was due to keener competition at the auctions. Licensees believe that a change in the system of disposal of opium shops is inevitable and so hold on to them at any cost.
- 39. Retail shops and Medical Practitioners' Chemists' and Druggists' Licenses.—The total number of shops was 681 as against 682 in the previous year (Column 31 of Imperial Return III). The number of licenses held by medical practitioners, chemists and druggists for the possession and sale of opium and its preparations increased from 1,045 in the previous year to 1,081 (Column 35 of Imperial Return III).
- 40. Supplies to Indian States.—The total quantity of opium supplied to Indian States was 14,153 seers against 19,132 seers in the previous year (Appendix "D").
- 41. Manufacture and Issues in the Baroda State.—The area under poppy cultivation in the Baroda State was 404 acres, the same as in the previous year. The opium in hand at the beginning of the year was 56,543 seers and that manufactured during the year 2,292 seers. The total issues to licensed dealers increased from 5,945 seers in the previous year to 6,155 seers. The stock held at the end of the year was 51,852 seers exclusive of 828 seers on account of dryage.
- 42. Total Excise Opium Revenue.—The Excise opium revenue was Rs. 29,02,444 against Rs. 28,30,957 in the previous year, an increase of Rs. 71,487. This was due to an increase in the realization of vend fees.
- 43. Consumption of Opium for veterinary or quasi-veterinary use.— The quantity of opium used for veterinary or quasi-veterinary purpose during 1928-29 was 42 lbs. 3 ozs. 16 drams and 10 grains against 49 lbs. 2 ozs. 3 drams and 20 grains in the previous year.
- 44. Measures to check the administration of opium to children.—The Baby and Health Week Association, Bombay Presidency, continued their activities in warning mothers against the danger of drugging babies

with opium, with the help of magic lantern lectures, demonstration of cinema films, exhibition of models and posters and free distribution of leaflets in the vernaculars on Infant Welfare. These exhibitions took place in 66 towns and villages during the Baby Week Celebrations and were witnessesd by nearly 485,370 people. Forty-six centres were also supplied with popular literature on Public Health and Child Welfare. The Lady Inspector of Factories also took every opportunity to convince the factory and mill workers of the evil effects of administering opium to children. She gave about 20 lectures to different groups of women and persuaded them to refrain from drugging their children.

#### CHAPTER VII.

#### FINANCIAL RESULTS.

45. Revenue.—The total gross realizations for the year (Imperial Return I) are contrasted below with those of the previous year:—

<sup>46.</sup> Expenditure.—The expenditure for the year exclusive of (1) refunds (Rs. 1,79,585) and (2) compensation to (a) the Bombay Municipality for loss of revenue which it previously derived from shop licensee (Rs. 1,43,750) and (b) the District Local Boards in the Presidency in

- lieu of one anna cess on excise revenue which they were formerly allowed (Rs. 1,55,048) was Rs. 26,40,955 against Rs. 31,51,749 in the previous year. The gross total expenditure including the refunds shown at (1) and (2) above amounted to Rs. 31,19,338 against the previous years expenditure of Rs. 36,34,446. The net Excise revenue of the year thus decreased by Rs. 5,65,819, i.e., from Rs. 3,12,56,731 in the previous year to Rs. 3,06,90,912 in the year under report.
- 47. Recovery of Excise Revenue by Coercive processes.—Coercive processes were resorted to for the recovery of excise revenue in 13 out of the 21 districts of the Presidency proper, viz., Surat, Thana, Bombay Suburban, Kolaba, Ratnagiri, Kanara, Dharwar, Belgaum, Sholapur, Poona, Nasik and East and West Khandesh. In some cases moveable and immoveable property had to be attached before the arrears were recovered.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

#### OFFENCES AGAINST ABKARI AND OPIUM LAWS.

- 48. Offences against Abkari Law.—The total number of cases detected was 6,407 against 6,263 in the preceding year. Of these 5,749 related to liquor, 600 to hemp drugs, and 58 to cocaine as against 5,822, 370 and 71 respectively in the previous year. Full details will be found in Columns 8, 14 and 18 of Appendix "E".
- 49. Fluctuations in liquor cases.—The total number of liquor cases on the whole decreased during the year under report by 73. In spite of the decrease, cases under illicit distillation increased from 3,675 to 3,719, the districts which contributed most to the increase being those notorious for this kind of crime, viz., West Khandesh (354) and Thana (139). Cases under "illicit importation, exportation and transportation" increased from 269 to 319 and those under unlicensed sale from 78 to 125. Cases under illicit possession fell from 1,133 to 1,110 and those under miscellaneous offences from 667 to 476.
- 50. Fluctuations in Hemp Drugs Cases.—The number of cases relating to Hemp drugs increased from 370 to 600, the increase being chiefly noticeable in the town and island of Bombay (102) and the districts of East Khandesh (51), and Ahmedabad (48). The rise is due to large seizures of illicit possession of charas in the Bombay City and the detection of a large number of petty cases by the Railway Excise Staff at Bhusawal and Ahmedabad.
- 51. Fluctuations in Cocaine Cases.—Cases under cocaine decreased from 71 to 58. The cocaine traffic is mainly confined to Bombay and the fall in the number of cases detected was due as in the previous year, to the breaking up of the gambling dens by stern measures taken by the Bombay City Police, and the deportation of several notorious cocaine and opium smugglers under section 3 of the Foreigners Act III of 1864, and under section 27 of the Bombay City Police Act of 1902.
- 52. Offences against the Opium Law.—Opium cases declined from 433 to 323. Of these 295 were tried in British territory and 28 in the Indian States as against 342 and 91 respectively in the previous year

(Column 29 of Appendix "F"). Cases of illegal possession were 206 against 340 and those of illegal manufacture and illegal sale respectively 8 and 22 against 6 and 21. Cases of illegal import were 72 against 35. The contraband opium seized amounted to 187 seers of which 182 seers were seized in British Territory and 5 seers in Indian States. The most noticeable decrease in the number of cases of illegal possession of opium was in Bombay City. This was due to the prosecution of two gangs of opium smugglers for conspiracy under section 120-B of the Indian Penal Code read with section 9 of the Opium Act I of 1878. The prosecution and deportation of notorious smugglers have to a certain extent broken up these gangs and have had a deterrent effect on those who used to keep themselves in the background watching and regulating the manoeuvres of their hirelings and trying their utmost to checkmate the activities of the Excise Staff.

- 53. Fluctuations in cases of drunkenness.—Convictions for drunkenness were 3,128 against 3,455 in the previous year (Appendix "G" Columns 2 and 3). Of these 2,029 occurred in Bombay City. Cases on licensed premises rose from 25 to 34.
- 54. The Excise Intelligence Bureau.—The Excise Intelligence Bureau continued to compile and disseminate useful information regarding methods of smugglers and offences against the Excise and Opium Laws.

The Finger Print Branch of the Bureau received during the year 517 finger impression slips of excise offenders for search against 431 during the previous year. Previous convictions were traced in 127 instances compared with 102 in 1927-28. At the close of the year, the Branch had on record a collection of finger print slips of about 20,600 excise convicts.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

- 55. The net decrease in the excise revenue for the year under report is Rs. 10,80,927 exclusive of compensations and refunds.
  - 56. There is a decrease under almost every head except foreign liquor, commercial spirits, opium and recoveries from Government Commercial undertakings. The causes of the downward trend of the excise revenue have been exhaustively explained in the administration reports for the last three years and I have nothing further to add except to state that the same causes are at work—perhaps in a more aggravated form—in bringing down the revenue without helping the cause of temperance which is the prime concern of Government.
  - 57. The Foreign Liquor revenue shows a decrease owing to the system of recovering license fees in arrears. If the 4 instalments of recovery were shown in the figures for the year, there would have been a certain increase. The new system has undoubtedly secured the keeping of correct accounts as the figures of consumption contained in the body of the report show. The sale figures furnished in the year 1927-28 were clearly false and would have been lower in 1928-29 if the old system had prevailed. The fact that a higher consumption has been registered


inspite of riots, mill strikes and continued trade depression shows that the systematic submission of false returns by licensees has been checked.

58. The item which swelled the receipts under Commercial spirit was the duty on spirits used in the manufacture of medicines and rectified spirits and absolute alcohol used for medicinal purposes. The increase of Rs. 68,885 against Commercial spirits in Chapter VII is not real. Last year there was a wrong classification by which Rs. 55,391 recovered in Bombay under "Duty on Spirits used in manufacture of medicines and on rectified spirits and absolute alcohol used for medicinal purposes" (Col. 19 of Imperial Return I) were incorrectly credited to the head "Duty on wines and spirits manufactured in India and classed as foreign spirits" (Col. 15 of Imperial Return I). The correct total under Commercial Spirits" last year column 23 of Imperial Return I should have been Rs. 71,165. Similarly there should have been a reduction of Rs. 55,391 in the total of column 15—the correct figure being Rs. 6,93,001.

The duty on Commercial Spirits last year was really Rs. 60,986 as against Rs. 77,778 during the year under report, thus giving an increase of Rs. 16,792. This increase was due to the larger use of rectified spirits in the preparation of medicines and to the temporary stoppage of the duty free supply of rectified spirits and absolute alcohol to charitable and other institutions.

- 59. Opium has produced the windfall of the year as there has been a greater gain in the sale proceeds of opium and a rise in the auction fees. The sale proceeds (including duty) on opium were Rs. 12,63,540 during the year under report as against Rs. 12,39,474 in 1927-28—an increase of Rs. 24,066. The auction fees this year amounted to Rs. 11,20,646 against Rs. 9,83,687 in 1927-28—an increase of Rs. 1,36,959. The consumption of opium has, however, fallen by 1,026 seers due to smuggling and to high selling prices. It amounted to 22,126 seers as against 23,152 seers in 1927-28.
- 60. The situation as regards country spirit is as bad as it can be. There has been a decrease of Rs. 812,464 in still head duty and a decrease of Rs. 2,10,486 in vend fees. Added to this fall in revenue there is an increase in crime in general and especially in cases relating to illicit distillation, illicit importation and unlicensed sale. Illicit liquor is being consumed in large quantities all over the Presidency and the record of cases would have been much higher if Government had provided a more adequate staff to cope with the evil. Several serious assaults were committed on Excise raiding parties, and in some districts popular opposition to the detection of illicit stills is so great that Excise Officers hesitate to act on information until they can collect a large party of Excise and Police peons, which means loss of time and failure or An increase in the Exise staff has more than once abandonment of raids. been pressed on Government but has not been sanctioned for financial reasons; and it is now high time to make a start with the two crores' expenditure on prevention which is as essential a part of prohibition policy as rationing or other restrictive measures. The loss in revenue is greater than the expenditure on the staff would be.

- 61. Toddy revenue receipts have decreased by Rs. 1,89,276 due to the anti-toddy movement.
- 62. The intoxicating drugs revenue has also suffered to the extent of Rs. 1,22,235 by a decline both in duty receipts and vend fees.
- As the whole system of the disposal of Excise and Opium shops is at present engaging the attention of Government, I abstain in this review of the year's working from making any lengthy suggestions as to what should be done to check illicit practices and at the same time promote temperance. Consumption this year is nearly 5 lakhs below the allotted ration and the problem before the department is how to use this quota in order to replace illicit consumption. High prices prevail in almost every district and these must be brought under control as a first step towards the suppression of illicit distillation. Steps have been taken to make country spirit more palatable so as to compete with illicit liquor but so long as the high price of country liquor makes it impossible for a man to get a drink at a reasonable cost, so long will illicit distillation go on gathering force, inflicting an entirely unjustifiable loss in Government revenue without in the least helping the cause of temperance; in fact the opposite effect is produced, as illicit liquor is potent and costs practically nothing.
- 64. The passing of the Mahura Act will strengthen the hands of the Department to a certain extent but the long vacations allowed by the Act may in some measure defeat the object in view. Even with the passing of the Act, the necessity for increased staff is imperative.
- 65. The restoration of mileage and daily allowance to the officers has made them put more heart into their work but the menial staff decrees more generous treatment if they are to face the dangerous and fatiguing business of raids with courage and a good morale.
- ble circumstances. Of the Superintendents Mr. Gidney has done well in suppressing Excise crime in the Ahmedabad District and Mr. Vakharia in dealing with problems arising out of the boycott movement in the Surat District.
- 67. It is gratifying to note that Collectors are taking increased interest in Excise problems and Messrs. Collins and Macmillan have been particularly helpful.
- 68. Mr. S. D. Smith, C.I.E., Deputy Commissioner, has again rendered invaluable assistance in administering the department.
- 69. Mr. Brander was in charge of this Department during the whole year and after a visit to Sind submitted a lengthy memorandum to the Commissioner in Sind making suggestions for the better administration of Excise.





### MEMORANDUM.

The Commissioner in Sind has the honour to forward the report submitted by the Superintendent of Salt and Excise, Sind, on the administration of the Sind Excise Department for the year 1928-29.

- The consumption of country spirit rose from 1,14,000 to 1,19,000 proof gallons. The increase is shared Country spirit. by all districts excepting Hyderabad. the Karachi, Thar Parkar, Sukkur Larkana districts are  $\mathbf{and}$ responsible for an increase of 3,500, 1,000, 1,500 and 1,500 gallons respectively; it is attributed to the absence of combination for ten months among the licensees at Karachi, influx of labour from other places for the Barrage works in Sukkur and Thar Parkar districts and decrease in the sale of illicit liquor in the Larkana district owing to greater vigilance of the Excise Officers. The decrease in the Hyderabad district amounted to 3,500 gallons and was due to partly closure of 2 shops and partly poorer condition of people after the rains and floods of 1927.
- 3. There was an increase of 61,000 gallons in the imports by sea of fermented liquors, liqueurs and spirits—potable and non-potable—but a decrease of 2,000 gallons in wines. The increase took the form of larger imports of bulk beer from United Kingdom, bottled beer as well as brandy and whisky from Germany and rectified spirit from Java, the latter being denatured at the Karachi Customs House for export to other provinces.

Consumption in the province fell by 4,000 gallons in the case of potable spirits and rose by 12,000 gallons in the case of fermented liquors owing to larger demand for the cheaper and lighter continental beer and consequent decline in imported spirits. This seems to be a satisfactory feature of the situation.

4. The consumption of intoxicating drugs during the year under report and the previous two years is compared below:—

The decrease in the consumption of charas and ganja is attributed to high-retail selling prices and smuggling of the former drug by Pathans.

- 5. Consumption of toddy fell from 19,700 gallons in the previous year to 17,000 gallons during the year under report.

  The decrease is ascribed to lower selling price of country spirit as compared to last year's.
  - 6. Consumption of opium declined by seven seers only, the actual Opium. sales being 5,290 seers.
- 7. The gross revenue of the department collected in the province amounted to Rs. 46,12,000 as against Rs. 45,20,000 in the preceding year. The net revenue after deducting the total expenditure debitable to "6, Excise" amounted to Rs. 41,02,000 showing an increase of Rs. 62,000 due to (1) increased license fee, (2) larger collection of pass fee on imported liquor and (3) receipts from gain on sale-proceeds of bottled country spirit.
- 8. There has been a decline in number of crimes detected as will be apparent from the subjoined statement. It is believed that this is partly due to less smuggling of Kelat liquor and bhang on account of deterrent punishments awarded to a gang of smugglers.

The number of offences detected are fewer, but the importance of several is greater. Some very big seizures of bhang and country liquor were secured in the Upper Sind Frontier District where a special party of two officers operated. A good case of contraband charas was detected at Karachi in co-operation with the Excise Officer, Sibi, and 8 persons were convicted. The seizure amounted to about half a maund.

9. Mr. Kirkwood and Mr. Willmott superintended the working of the

Department efficiently throughout the year. When relieved of his very onerous duties in connection with the Maurypur Salt works, the Superintendent will have more time to devote to looking after the Excise establishment, many of whom require continual supervision.

Sir,

Introduction.—I have the honour to submit the annual report on the Administration of the Excise (Abkari and Opium) department for the Province of Sind for the financial year 1928-29.

- 2. Personnel of the Department.—The charge of the Department was held by the following officers during the year under report:—
  - (1) Mr. H. M. Kirkwood, from 1st April 1928 to 13th April 1928 and again from 24th October 1928 to 31st March 1929.
  - (2) Mr. N. R. Willmot from 14th April 1928 to 25th September 1928.
  - (3) Mr. G. R. G. Shipp from 26th September 1928 to 23rd October 1928.

The following reconstitution of charges were sanctioned by the Commissioner in Sind:—

(1) Rohri town and station were separated from the charge of the Abkari Inspector, Sukkur, and added to Rohri Circle and the head-quarters of Rohri Circle shifted from Pano Akil to Rohri.

(2) Kotri town and station were separated from the charge of the Akbari Inspector, Hyderabad, and added to Kotri Circle with a change

of headquarters from Manjhand to Kotri.

- 3. Changes introduced during the year.—The following were the principal administrative changes during the year:—
  - (a) Manufacturers of spirituous medicinal preparations in bond were exempted from payment of Excise duty on preparations supplied by them to Local Boards and Municipal Hospitals, Veterinary Hospitals and dispensaries and such private Medical Institutions in British territory as are conducted on charitable lines provided certain conditions are fulfilled (G. R., R. D., No. 9196/24, dated the 28th May 1928).

(b) The sale of Nips or half pints of ale to Clubs, Canteens and Messes was permitted (G. R., R. D., No. 380/28 of 3rd July 1928).

(c) Clause 5-A of the Railway Refreshment Room license was amended by extending the period for the sale of liquor before arrival after the departure of the train from 15 to 30 minutes (G. R.,

- (d) Rule 23 of the rules regulating the cultivation of hemp, the manufacture of hemp drugs, and the storage at and removal from Bonded Warehouses of hemp drugs in Sind was amended by extending the time-limit for the retention of old stock from 2 to 3 years (Commissioner in Sind's, Notification No. 698/IV-E dated the 26th September 1928).
- (e) Collectors were permitted to dispose of Excise shops by calling for tenders in certain cases (G. R., R. D., No. 1258/28, dated the 29th September 1928).
- (f) The manufacture, possession, import, export, transport and sale of "esters" of morphine were placed under Excise restrictions (G. R., R. D., No. 1055/28, dated the 8th October 1928).
- (g) The rationing system was continued and the ration for each district was fixed at 5 per cent. below the ration of 1927-28 (G. R., R. D., No. 9869/24 of 9th January 1928).
- (h) Condition 9 of the license for the sale of opium was amended so as to provide for the holder to hand over the minimum stock to incoming licensee (G. R., R. D., No. 1971/28 of 22nd January 1929).
- (i) The Central Board of Revenue was declared the competent authority to receive export authorizations in respect of dangerous drugs (G. R., R. D., No. 2048/28, dated the 22nd January 1929).
- (j) Salts of and preparations containing "Eucodal and Dicodide" were subjected to the provisions of Opium Act, 1878 (G. R., R. D., No. 485/28 of 4th February 1929).
- (k) A committee of enquiry was appointed for the town of Hyderabad to investigate the causes of excessive consumption of opium and to suggest measures for its reduction (G. R., R. D., No. 7702/24, dated the 7th February 1929).

### CONSUMPTION OF EXCISABLE ARTICLES.

4. Foreign Liquor (imports).—The following table gives the imports into Karachi of foreign Liquors during the last three years (including imports for the Punjab and other parts of India) as reported by the Collector of Customs in Sind:—

The increase under fermented liquors was mainly due to larger imports of bulk beer received from the United Kingdom and bottled beer from Germany due probably to more settled trade conditions. The decrease

under wines and increase under liqueurs are due to ordinary trade fluctuations. The rise in imports of potable spirits is ascribed to the larger quantities of brandy and whisky received from Germany in consequence of the demand for cheap brands. The increase under non-potable spirits is due to the fact that larger quantities of rectified spirits were imported from Java and denatured at the Karachi Custom House for export to other Provinces.

Foreign Liquor Consumption.—For sales at licensed shops see Imperial Return IV in which the figures for imported and locally manufactured liquor are classified separately. The bulk of the consumption was, as usual, in the towns of Karachi, Hyderabad, and Sukkur where the population is denser. Variations calling for remarks are furnished below in the subjoined table:—

The increase in the sales of imported beers is due to the larger demand for the cheaper and lighter continental brands. The cheapness and popularity of imported beer among all classes account for the decline in imported spirit. But the increase in the consumption of Indian made spirit is due solely to its cheapness.

5. Denatured Spirit.—There were no imports by sea of denatured spirit during the year. The sales at retail shops compare as follows with those of the two preceding years:—

The increase in consumption is due to the more extended use of denatured spirit for domestic use, industrial purposes, and during social functions when the use of incandescent lights are a feature of such occasions, to which may be added the quantities used by local public bodies.

In all districts except Hyderabad, consumption was on the increase. Among the districts where an increase is recorded, Karachi, Thar Parkar, Sukkur and Larkana are the only ones where the increase is deserving of note, viz., 3,642, 1,006, 1,645 and 1,436 gallons respectively. The increase in the Karachi District is explained by the absence of combination between the licensees at Karachi for about 10 months of the year. Liquor was sold at cheaper rates to push their sales. The increase in Thar Parkar and Sukkur is reported to be due to a favourable season and also to the influx of labourers from other places owing to the construction of Barrage Works, while the increase in Larkana is connected with the vigilance of the Excise Officers on the importation of illicit liquor. The decrease in Hyderabad can be attributed partly to the closure of two shops and partly to the extremely bad harvest of 1927-28, and the poor state of the people after the rain and the floods.

The net decrease of 2,571 gallons includes a decline in the consumption of 3,059 gallons in Karachi and rises of 332 and 156 gallons in Hyderabad and Sukkur respectively. The fall in the former case is to be attributed to the diversion of custom to country liquor which was sold at comparatively cheaper rates.

- 8. Opium.—(5,290) Five thousand two hundred and ninety seers of opium were sold as compared with 5,297 in the previous year and 5,776 in 1926-27. The slight decrease of 7 seers calls for no remark. Three coss. 2 drs. and 45 grs. of opium were used for veterinary or quasiveterinary purposes during the year under report.
- 9. Hemp Drugs—Ganja.—The sales of ganja amounted to 582 seers as against 828 in the previous year, a decrease of 246 seers. The general tendency to give up the use of ganja on account of its prohibitive price continues and accounts for the fall.

Bhang.—The sales of bhang during the year were 81,481 seers as against 80,281 seers in the previous year, an increase of 1,200 seers. The increase took place in all Districts except Karachi, Sukkur and Larkana. It is reported that owing to prolonged heat last year, the drug was largely consumed in the form of "ghota" as a cooling beverage, which explains the situation.

Charas.—The sales of charas amounted to 2,858 seers as against 3,053 in the previous year. The decrease of 195 seers during the year is due to the high prices charged by the licensees and probably to the smuggling which resulted therefrom. This year, i.e., 1929-30, with a reduction of duty on charas from Rs. 60 to 20 per seer and the fixation of a maximum selling price it is expected that there will be a heavy rise in the licit consumption of this drug.

10. Cocaine.—The licenses for the sale of cocaine for bona fide medical purposes numbered 65 during the year under report against 81 in 1927-28 (Imperial Return III, Column 38).

Imports and issues in the Province.—The quantity of cocaine imported during the year amounted to 4 lbs. 3 ozs. 74 grs. against 3 lbs. 9 ozs. and 167 grs. in the previous year. The quantity sold under license was

4 lbs. 10 ozs. 340 grs. against 6 lbs. 11 ozs. 196 grs. in 1927-28. The details of cocaine transactions are given below:—

11. Cocaine cases.—Two cases of illicit possession of cocaine were detected at Keamari and Karachi Town during the year against one in 1927-28. The quantity of cocaine seized was 73 grs.

- 13. Foreign Liquors.—The increase of Rs. 47,241 comprises:—
- (1) A decrease of Rs. 1,668 in the realizations from duty on Indian made spirits imported from other Provinces and an increase of Rs. 48,909 under fees due to (a) the higher fees the beer shops fetched at the auctions, (b) the increased license fee of 'Off' shops and (c) the larger collection of vend fee (pass fee) on imported liquor.
  - 14. Country Spirit.—The increase of Rs. 15,956 comprises:—
    (1) An increase of Rs. 61,614 in still head duty on account of larger issues of country liquor, and

- (2) A decrease of Rs. 45,658 under vend fees due to the closure of four country liquor shops.
- Toddy.—The increase of Rs. 1,085 is the result of higher bidding at the toddy auctions especially in Karachi.
  - Opium.—The increase of Rs. 7,970 comprises :—
  - (1) An increase of Rs. 6,595 under sale proceeds of excise opium owing to larger issues and
  - (2) Rs. 1,375 under vend fees owing to competition amongst the bidders at the auctions.

- Miscellaneous.—The increase of Rs. 52,028 is due mostly to larger receipts from the gain on sale proceeds of bottled country spirit.

- 20. The increase of Rs. 62,069 in the net revenue for the year under report is attributed to three causes, viz., increased license fee, larger collection of pass fee on imported liquor and receipts from gain on sale proceeds of bottled country liquor.
- 21. Recovery of Excise Revenue by coercive measures.—No coercive process was resorted to in any district during the year under report.

Four licenses for the manufacture of perfumes and 28 licenses for the sale of essences containing spirit were issued in Karachi Town during the year.

Nore—This information is supplied in accordance with Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 4042-C/24, dated the 8th May 1929.

23. Excise Crime (Appendix F).—The total number of cases detected was 477 against 602 in the preceding year. Of these, 123 related to liquor, 275 to hemp drugs and 2 to cocaine as against 139, 338, and 1 respectively in the previous year. Full details will be found in columns 8,14 and 18 of appendix F.

The number of offences relating to liquor fell by 16. The decrease occurred chiefly in cases of illicit possession, and was probably due to masala liquor gaining in popularity among the consumers and thus replacing the illicit article to some extent. In 32 cases of Kelat spirit detected during the year, the quantity seized was 63 gallons which includes 3 big seizures of 15, 9, and 4 gallons respectively in Shahdadkot There has been a falling off in the number of cases relating to Hemp Drugs by 63, the decrease being particularly in respect of cases of smuggling. The total quantity of Kelat bhang seized during the year was 7 maunds 26 seers which includes an important seizure of 2 maunds 30 seers made in Jacobabad. The deterrent punishment awarded to the gang of smugglers concerned appears to have had a good effect on its activities and this accounts for the reduced cases of smuggling. The number of hemp plants seized in 10 cases of bhang cultivation was 1,244. Cases of hawking duty paid charas were also detected, involving a scizure of 15 seers in the aggregate. This petty illicit traffic is prevalent even at places where there are charas shops. One important case of smuggling of charas involving about 1 maund of the drug was detected at Karachi in co-operation with the Excise Officer Sibi. A regular gang was discovered, 8 of whom were convicted. The Abkari Inspector, Karachi, was largely responsible for the detection.

The decrease in the detection of opium cases during the year occurred chiefly in the Thar Parkar District and is due to the vigilance of the Excise staff stationed there. The contraband opium seized during the year under report amounted to 9 seers and 30 tolas.

Two cases of illicit possession of cocaine were detected at Karachi; one by the Excise Staff and the other by Customs Officers. The quantity seized was 73 grs.

No case of opium smoking was brought to light during the year.

24. Hemp Drugs cultivation and Warehouse transactions (appendix C).—The cultivation of bhang was permitted in Deh Bubak of the Sehwan Taluka, Larkana District, as usual. No necessity for hiring private godowns arouse as the accommodation available in the Hemp Drugs Warehouse, Bubak, was sufficient for the storage of the entire stock. The figures shown in column 5 of the appendix represent the area sown during the year, the crop from which will be brought to account in the return 1929-30. The outturn during the year cannot

A force of 7 chowkidars was employed to guard the fields under Bhang cultivation at Bubak.

Charas and Ganja were imported in bond from the Punjab and Ahmednagar respectively for consumption in Sind. The details of imports of hemp drugs are given in Appendix C.

25. Supply of Country Spirit.—The supply of country spirit was obtained from the Government Distillery at Kotri. The Distillery worked for 6 months and 25 days. It was closed for the overhauling of the plant and repairs, for 5 months and 5 days. The coffey patent still continued to work satisfactorily. The outturn per maund of molasses which was the only base used was 3.9 gallons L.P. as compared to 3.7 gallons L.P. last year. The outturn though slightly increased is below the average and is reported to be due to the inferior quality of molasses received from Batavia.

Extra Superior Flavoured Spirit (Masala Liquor) was manufactured in the steam heated pot still and issued in sealed bottles. It is of three descriptions, viz., Cardamum, Orange and Rose. The total quantity of spirit manufactured during the year ending 31st March 1929 was:—

The spirit is distributed to retail shops through the Warehouses at Kotri, Karachi and Sukkur. The first Warehouse receives its requirements by transfer either from the Distillery spirit store or direct from the Receiver; the other two are supplied with spirit in bond. The stock of spirit at the Distillery and the Warehouses at the end of the year amounted to 49,948 gallons (L.P.) equal to about 4 months' demand.

Of the total quantity of 1,644 proof gallons of rectified spirit issued during the year, 890 gallons were issued at the concession rate of duty (Rs. 5 per proof gallon) to 4 local chemists for the manufacture of spirituous and toilet preparations and 117 gallons at the full rate of duty. Rs. 330 were realized as fees for excise supervision over the manufacture of these preparations.

- 26. Toddy supply arrangements.—The trees are obtained on lease by the licensees from private owners. The fall in the sales during the year is reported to be due to consumers taking to country liquor in preference to toddy, as the former was comparatively cheaper.
- 27. Drunkenness.—The number of convictions for drunkenness increased from 15 in 1927-28 to 25 during the year under report (appendix G, column 3).
- 28. Hours of sales at Liquor Shops.—No change took place in the hours of sale at liquor shops in Sind except at Mirpurkhas where they were fixed from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and again 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. (Commissioner in Sind's No. 3916-V-E, dated the 28th November 1927).
- 29. Management of Licensed Shops.—69 cases of various breaches of license conditions were reported during the year as compared with 60 last year. In 41 cases the licensees were dealt with under Section 55-A of the Abkari Act, and in 6 cases they were black-listed. One licensee was prosecuted and convicted. 21 opium licensees were fined by Collectors for breach of their license conditions.
- 30. Excise Advisory Committees.—The number of Excise Advisory Committees existing in all District Headquarters, Municipal towns and talukas in Sind is 39. The activities of advisory committees were mostly confined to suggestions as to the reduction in the number of shops for the sale of excisable articles, their location and the restriction of the hours of sale. The action taken on the recommendations is summarised below:—
  - (1) The Excise Advisory Committee, Karachi Town.

    The Committee recommended that the existing sale hours in the case of:—
    - (1) Cinema Bars,

(2) Foreign Liquor retail 'Off' shops,

(3) Country Liquor shops, should be altered but their recommendations were not accepted as they advanced no serious reasons in support.

(2) The Excise Advisory Committee. Keti Bunder.

The Committee's proposal to reduce the strength of country liquor from 25 to 30 U.P. was not accepted in view of paragraph 7 of the G.R., R. D., No. 9869/24, dated the 9th January 1928.

(3) The Excise Advisory Committee, Hyderabad.

As recommended by the Committee the country liquor shop, Miri Lane (Hyderabad), the Opium shops in Chodki Lane (Hyderabad) and Gidu Bunder and the Opium and Intoxicating Drugs Shop at Husri were closed from the 1st April 1928. The other recommendations of the Committee for the closure of the Foreign Liquor 'Off' shops were not accepted.

- (4) The Excise Advisory Committee, Badin.
- (1) The Country Liquor Shop, Talhar, was closed from 1st April 1928 on the recommendation of the Committee.
- (5) The Excise Advisory Committee, Mirpurkhas.
- (1) The recommendation of the Committee that the hours of sale at Mirpurkhas be fixed from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and again from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. was accepted from 1st April 1928.
- (2) The Committee's second proposal for raising the strength of country liquor from 25 U.P. to 15 U.T. was not accepted.
- (6) The Excise Advisory Committee, Mehar.

On the recommendation of the Committee, the country liquor shop at Radhan was closed from 1st April 1928.

- (7) The Excise Advisory Committee, Sukkur.
- (1) The Country Liquor Shop, Sheikh Shinh Road, was closed as recommended by the Committee from 1st April 1928.
- (2) The Committee's other recommendations for the closure of one of the three Foreign Liquor 'Off' shops in the town of Sukkur were rejected as the number was not considered excessive in a growing town like Sukkur.
- (8) The Excise Advisory Committee, Shikarpur.

On the Committee's recommendation, the Country Liquor Shop, Khanpur, was closed from 1st April 1928.

(9) The Excise Advisory Committee, Jacobabad.

Effect was given to the following recommendations of the Committee from the 1st April 1928, viz.—

(a) The closure of the Intoxicating Drugs Shop at Dangar Bazar (Jacobabad Town) and the Opium shop at Gouspur.

- (b) The closure of Mubarakpur (Taluka Thul) Hemp Drugs Shops and the opening of a new shop at Miranpur (Taluka, Jacobabad) instead, for the sale of bhang only.
- (c) The restriction of the Hemp Drugs Shop at Gari Khairo to the sale of bhang only.

There is nothing of special interest worth mentioning as regards other Excise Advisory Committees.

31. Temperance movements.—The Collector of Hyderabad reports that the temperance societies existing in the Hyderabad Town have ceased to work on account of the constitution of Advisory Committees. Temperance bodies exist in most of the other big towns of the Province, but were quiescent during the year. School masters continue to impress on the minds of their pupils the evils of the drink habit.

- 32. Sind Excise Intelligence Bureau.—The Sind Intelligence Bureau continued to work under the supervision of the Deputy Superintendent of Salt and Excise, Karachi Sub-Division. There were 34 issues of the Excise Supplement to the Sind Police Gazette during the year as against 38 in the previous year. The Bureau did useful work in collecting and supplying the Police and Excise Departments with information likely to be helpful to them in Excise detective work.
- 33. Administration of Opium to Children.—(Government Memorandum No. 2665-C/24, dated the 11th November 1926). As reported last year, the practice of administering opium to children is not common in Sind. Villagers and panchayats were informed by Excise Officers, as opportunities offered, of the evil effects of the habit and were advised to abstain from it.
- 34. Work of the Excise Staff.—Among the Excise Officers, Messrs. Hajee Muhammad Ismail Muhammad Ali Khan Kakezai, Abkari Inspector, Karachi; Nadir Hussain Shah, Assistant Excise Inspector, Jacobabad; Abdul Razak, Assistant Excise Inspector, Kambar Circle, and J. N. Nagrani, Assistant Excise Inspector, Shahdadkot, deserve special mention for their good detective work during the year. The work of the rest of the staff has been generally satisfactory.
- 35. General Remarks.—While on tour last year, I made local enquiries and was told that a good deal of the smuggling of Kelat Liquor and Bhang is being carried on in the Upper Sind Districts. The traffic in illicit spirit is controlled by well organized gangs particularly the Baluchis of Upper Sind who are believed to import large quantities of Kelat Spirit. These stocks are stored at certain favourable points and disposed of as demand arises. The present staff is inadequate to cope with the situation. With a view therefore to verify the existence of this illicit trade, the Commissioner in Sind agreed to the appointment of special party of two Assistant Excise Inspectors from the existing staff, exclusively for detective work in any part of the Upper Sind Districts as an experimental measure for about 3 months. Of the two Assistant Inspectors, one commenced work on the 16th March 1929 and the other on the 24th April 1929. Within a short period the special party was directly and indirectly instrumental in detecting 20 cases involving a total seizure of over 5 maunds of Bhang and 37 gallons of Liquor. experiment is being continued for a year.

Subject: Excise Administration Report for the year 1928-29.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Administration Report of the Excise Department under me for the year 1928-29.

#### I.—Establishment.

The sanctioned strength of the department has remained unaltered since 1902, with the exception of the addition of one clerk in 1920. At Perim the departmental affairs were administered by the Assistant Resident, Perim, during the year under review. The work of the department has steadily increased year by year, so much so that the staff are inadequate for the amount of work with which the department now has to deal. A scheme for reorganization of this department was submitted to Government in August 1928. Final orders of Government have not been passed yet.

## II.—Financial Results of the year.

The principal sources of Excise Revenue are detailed in the appended statement—Appendix I—in which the receipts of the year under report are contrasted with those of 1927-28.

The gross receipts amounted to Rs. 2,26,638 against Rs. 2,29,960 in the preceding year showing a decrease of Rs. 3,322. Though the decrease is noticeable in the total Revenue earned under "6-Excise" during the year under review, an inspection will show that the Revenue from Foreign Liquor and Miscellaneous have increased by Rs. 4,061. This increase, due to the new system of watches and checks introduced, is more than counterbalanced by the fall in the receipts from Country Liquor, Hemp Drugs and Opium attributable

to the removal of the Indian Troops from Aden. The removal of the British Infantry from Aden during the latter part of the year under review has also had some effect on the sale of Foreign Liquor.

In the table below is contrasted the expenditure on account of establishment and contingent charges for the years 1927-28 and 1928-29:—

Read Reports on the administration of the Excise Department in the Bombay Presidency, including Sind and Aden, for the year 1928-29 submitted by the Commissioner of Excise, the Commissioner in Sind and the Resident and Commander-in-Chief, Aden.

RESOLUTION.—In the Presidency (excluding Sind) the consumption of country spirit continued to decrease and was 38,721 proof gallons less than in the preceding year. The decrease occurred in the districts of Ahmedabad, Thana, Bombay Suburban, Kolaba, Ratnagiri, Dharwar, Belgaum and Poona and the Town and Island of Bombay, and was caused by the poor economic condition of the people due to trade depression and in Bombay also to the prolonged mill-strike, illicit distillation in tracts where there are facilities for it, illicit importation of liquor from Indian States or foreign territories, the unpopular low strength of country spirit, high selling prices and a growing taste among the drinking classes for cheap foreign spirit and beer. The rations fixed for 1928-29 were the same as those for 1927-28 except in the case of the West Khandesh, East Khandesh, Surat and Thana districts. For the West Khandesh District, Government sanctioned an extra ration of 15,000 proof gallons to meet the increased demand for liquor caused by the good agricultural season and the consequent increase in the number of marriages. In Sind the consumption of country spirit increased from 1,13,761 proof gallons in 1927-28 to 1,18,881 proof gallons The increase was shared by all the districts except in 1928-29. Hyderabad, where the consumption was 3,52L proof gallons less than in the previous year. The increase in the district of Karachi was due to keen competition among the local licenses, while that in the districts of Sukkur and Thar Parkar was the result of a favourable season and the influx of labourers from other places for work on the Barrage and the new canals.

- 2. In the Presidency (excluding Sind) the number of shops for the retail vend of country spirit fell from 1,589 in 1927-28 to 1,579 in the year under report. Eight shops were closed on the recommendations of the advisory committee and two shops were closed by Government on their own initiative.
- 3. The revenue from country spirit (i.e., still-head duty, license and vend fees) in the Presidency (excluding Sind) decreased from

- Rs. 2,18,00,121 to Rs. 2,07,77,171, while in Sind it increased from Rs. 23,30,481 to Rs. 23,46,437. For the whole Presidency therefore there was a decrease of Rs. 10,07,000.
- The consumption of toddy in the Presidency (excluding Sind) decreased by 1,196,898 gallons and in Sind by 2,571 gallons. The number of trees tapped decreased by 33,586 and the number of licenses by 1.455. These decreases mainly occurred in the Town and Island of Bombay and in the Surat and Thana districts. Owing to the prolonged mill-strike and the consequent exodus of the milhands from Bombay less toddy was consumed and fewer trees were tapped. The notable decrease of 19,636 in the number of trees tapped in the Surat District is to be chiefly attributed to the anti-drink campaign which was carried on in that district during the year. Further 19 toddy shops and 178 tree foot booths remained undisposed of as a result of this campaign. In the Umbergaon Petha of the Thana District there was a decrease of 7,602 in the number of trees tapped, due to the agitation conducted by the toddy licensees as a protest against the increase in the tax from Rs. 2 to Rs. 3 per date tree. In Sind the decrease was caused by the diversion of customers to country liquor which was sold at comparatively cheaper rates. The total revenue from toddy decreased from Rs. 47,67,000 to Rs. 45,79,000.
- 5. The new foreign liquor scheme for the maintenance by foreign liquor licensees, of correct sale statistics and the revision of the scale of fees for the privilege of vend of foreign liquor came into force in the Presidency (excluding Sind) with effect from 1st April 1928. It has worked with a complete absence of friction, and has fully justified the expectation that a greater measure of control would be in the interests alike of the trade and of Government. It has been decided to extend the system to Sind with effect from 1st April 1930.
- 6. The consumption of ganja decreased from 38,587 seers to 32,881 seers in the Presidency (excluding Sind) and from 828 seers to 582 seers in Sind. The decrease is attributed to the enhancement in duty. The consumption of bhang, however, increased from 7,936 seers to 8,043 seers in the Presidency (excluding Sind) and from 80,281 seers to 81,481 seers in Sind. The total revenue derived from the sale of hemp drugs throughout the Presidency was Rs. 27,23,917 as against Rs. 28,78,636 in the previous year.
- 7. The sales of opium decreased from 23,152 seers to 22,126 seers in the Presidency other than Sind and from 5,297 seers to 5,290 seers in Sind. The large decrease in the Presidency proper was due to trade depression and high selling prices. The revenue derived from opium increased from Rs. 28,30,957 to Rs. 29,02,444 in the Presidency other than Sind and from Rs. 5,40,002 to Rs. 5,47,972 in Sind. The increase was due to the higher vend fees received during the year under report. Government have appointed local committees of enquiry for the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Panch Mahals, Broach, Poona, Sholapur and Ahmedabad, Kaira, report upon the

causes of the excessive consumption of opium and to suggest, if possible, measures for its reduction. These are shortly to be considered at a conference between the Government of India and the local Governments.

- 8. The gross total expenditure on administration, exclusive of (1) refunds (Rs. 1,79,585) and (2) compensations to (a) the Bombay Municipality for the loss of revenue which it previously derived from shop licenses (Rs. 1,43,750) and (b) the District Local Boards in the Presidency (excluding Sind) in lieu of the one anna cess on excise revenue which they were formerly allowed (Rs. 1,30,128), was in the Presidency (excluding Sind) Rs. 26,40,955 as against Rs. 31,51,749 in the previous year, and in Sind Rs. 3,49,839 as against Rs. 3,58,035. The net excise revenue decreased from Rs. 3,12,56,731 to Rs. 3,06,90,912 in the Presidency other than Sind. In Sind there was a small increase from Rs. 40,40,266 to Rs. 41,02,335.
- Rationing as part of the general policy of prohibition by gradual and progressive stages has been in operation since 1st April The financial and other results of the working of the arrangement have been detailed at great length by the Government in their reviews of the Excise Administration Reports of the past six The experience of this period shows that the consumption of licit liquor has been considerably reduced without an appreciable improvement in the habits of temperance and that the illicit distillation and importation of liquor has increased pari passu. This increase in the manufacture and consumption of illicit liquor is an unfortunate feature of the situation not only from the point of view of prohibition but also from that of the welfare of the community, since apart from the loss of a source of revenue the flouting of the law is a danger to the body politic. Government accordingly feel that the time has now come when they should review the position as it stands as a result of eight years' working of the experiment of rationing, and they have instituted enquiries to this end. The aim which they have set before themselves is to determine how without losing sight of the avowed goal of prohibition they can ensure that, so long as the liquor traffic is permitted by law, they derive a legitimate revenue from it, and at the same time deprive the people of the fatal incentive to the manufacture and consumption of illicit liquor, which at present prevails over a wide area of the Presidency.
