REFACE.

In the Act of Parliament constuting the Secretary of State and Council of India, it is provided that an account of the state of Indian finances shall be presented to Parliament within 14 tys, during which Parliament may be sitting, next after the 1st May; and the "such account shall be accompanied by a statement prepared from detaile reports from each Presidency and District in India, in such form as shall exibit the moral and material progress and condition of India in each such Predency."

From 1858 to 1865 the volumibus administration reports, prepared by the several Governments since 181, were presented to Parliament, in the form in which they arrived from India, without arrangement or condensation. It was found that this by of complying with the requirements of the Act failed to secure the olects contemplated by the framers of the clause, which were, that a root on the progress of India should be annually furnished in a conveniet and manageable form, supplying all necessary information, and adapted in future reference. It was, therefore, determined that, in future, statements hould be prepared at the India Office, based on the administration reports another information received from India, but in a conveniently condensed form.

The first statement of this kind was a the year 1864-65. The subject was treated under the different department heads of revenue, finance, public works, legislation, judic ture and policied education, emigration, agriculture, sanitary measures, municipalities, ecclessical establishments, native states, army, marine, and miscellaneous. The time arrangement was followed in the statements for 1865-69 and 1866-67, thugh the subjects were not treated exactly in the same order, and some additional headings were introduced. But in 1867-68 a different arrangement was adopted, and continued in the statements for 1868-69, 1869-70 and 1870-11. Instead of treating the subject under the several departmental heads, a general account was given of the proceedings of each local government, and various miscellaneous matters and events were recorded in an introductory section. In two out of the three last statements, outline maps have been given showing the political divisions and boundaries of each local government to fact the eight different headings.

The present statement has been arrange on a different plan. It has been thought that the most useful form that such a document can take, is one by which an inquirer may oltain, by the perust of one section, a general but correct knowledge of what his taken place during the year under review, in connection with any subject in which he may be interested. A knowledge is required, not so much of the glaural proceedings of the different local governments, as of the progress that has been male throughout British India in improving the condition of the people, and in providing for their moral and material wants. In commending a new series it has been found necessary, in treating of subjects such as land revenue, irrigation, and some others, to give a concise account of the previous history of administrative measures connected with them, so that, during the perusal of future statements similarly arranged, there may be ready means of reference to a fullir account of any measure or undertaking, the yearly progress of which may be recorded. The present plan provides a place for every subject or section of a subject, and so long as it is closely adhered to in future statements, the progress under any given head may be traced through the differen years without any trouble.

The whole subject of the moral and material progress and condition of India is arranged in 15 sections, each trating of a department of administration which is complete in itself, and uner one or other of these heads every measure and every event will naturally find its place. The full details of the arrangement will be seen from the accompaning Analytical Table of Contents, which has been inserted for facility of reference.

The statement itself is, to a certain degree based on the Administration Reports issued by the different provinces. In the case of financial statistics, the figures given in the Parliamentary Paper ntitled Finance and Revenue Accounts of the Government of India for the ear 1871-72, have been strictly adhered to; and in trade statistics the figres shown in the annual statements of trade and navigation, compiled i the different presidencies, have bcen adopted.

The same orthography of proper names habeen adopted as is now sanctioned by the Government of India. Those who adocate different systems of spelling will never agree, but no one can doubt the serious inconvenience of many different ways of spelling the same word. In the system of orthography is based upon that of Sir William Jones. The Supreme Government, in legislation, in maps by the sperintendent of the Great Trigonometrical Survey, in the Post Office Guidesin the Telegraph Department, in the almanacs, and by several newspapers, askell as by the Punjab and Bombay Governments. It is thus making its way to general use. It has always been the system in use by the Asiatic and oth/learned Societies. Its adoption for the new Gazetteers has received the section of the Secretary of State in It is, therefore, adhered to s closely as possible in the present Council. statement.*

An attempt has been made to illustrae some of the subjects by the use of a map of India of convenient size meated as often as may be required, according to the subject to be illustrated. A forest map shows the reserved and unreserved forests and the plantaons, as well as the localities where the principal timber trees grow. One may to illustrate the irrigation section, is tinted so as to show the amount of finfall over the various zones, and the irrigation works themselves are show on three maps on a larger scale. The map showing communications gives to lines of railway and electric telegraph, the different harbours and the lightbuses. Another map gives the political boundaries of native and border sites, and another shows the distribution of troops. Plans showing Karachi Hrbour, the Pambin Passage, and Calcutta and Bombay Harbour defences, are Iso given. The Trigonometrical and the Geological Surveys of India are alsoillustrated.
