The reports from the Commissioner in Sind and the Commissioners of Divisions on the administration of local boards in the Bombay Presidency during the year 1915-16.

RESOLUTION.

Number of boards.—During the year under review the number of district and taluka local boards in the Bombay Presidency including Sind remained the same as in the preceding year, namely, 26 and 215, respectively.

2. *Area and population.*—Sind shows a nominal decrease of 9.41 square miles in the area administered by its local boards. Slight alterations are recorded in the areas of the Sukkur and Upper Sind Frontier districts. In the former there was a net decrease of 14.8 square miles due to erosion and accretion by the river Indus, while in the latter there was an increase of 5.39 square miles due mainly to (i) the addition of a village to the Jacobabad taluka local board area in consequence of the abolition of the cantonment and (ii) the alluvion of kucha lands in the Khandkote and Kashmir talukas. In the Southern Division the area and the population remained unchanged, except in respect of the Ankola and Sirsi talukas in the Kanara district, owing to the mutual transfer of certain villages from the one taluka to the other. The increase of 10,000 in the population of Sind is due to the fact that last year the population of Shikarpur was erroneously shown as 55,670 instead of 65,670. The total population according to the last census figures was 18,072,041.

3. *Constitution.*—In the Northern Division the elective franchise was granted to the district local board, Panch Mahals, with effect from the 14th April 1915. At the previous triennial elections for the Vagra taluka local board in the Broach district, the elective seat intended for the holders of the entire alienated villages within the taluka remained unfilled, and consequently one of the seats for nominated members was kept vacant. As at the fresh elections both these seats have been filled, there is an increase of two in the number of members of the board, which is only nominal. The number of nominated officials on the taluka local board of Broach was reduced by one, and the number of nominated non-officials was correspondingly increased. The number of Europeans on the various boards declined from 43 to 32. In Sind the elective franchise was extended to the taluka local boards of Umarkot, Khipro, Sanghar, Jamesabad and Pithoro in the Thar and Parkar district. This necessitated an increase in the number of members of these boards.

4. *Elections.*—In the Northern Division triennial elections were held in the Surat district. Competition was keen in the Chikhali and Bulsar talukas and in certain groups of Chorasi, Olpad and Jalalpur talukas; but in Pardi no interest was evinced. In the Southern Division triennial elections were held in all the boards of the Ratnagiri district. The Collector reports that in the elections in the Southern sub-division about 27 per cent. of the total number of electors voted and that, except in two circles in Malwan and two in Vengurla, where the percentage exceeded 45, the voters did not display much interest. The Dharwar taluka local board was reconstituted with a reduction of one in the number of official members and a corresponding increase in the number of non-official members. In the Kanara district elections were held in the Karwar and Kumta talukas, which alone enjoy the elective franchise. Three seats in Karwar and two in Kumta were contested, and competition was keen in respect of one seat in each of these talukas. The Yellapur taluka local board was reconstituted, and the number of non-official members was increased, as the non-official element in the old board was found inadequate to deal with the large area under control. In Sind the district local boards of Karachi,

Hyderabad, Sukkur, Nawabshah and Upper Sind Frontier and all the taluka local boards, except Johi in the Larkana district and Digri in the Thar and Parkar district, were reconstituted.

5. *Meetings.*—The total number of meetings held during the year rose from 1,288 to 1,465, of which 83 proved abortive for want of a quorum. The rule regarding the holding of half-yearly meetings was complied with by all the district boards. Five taluka boards in the Northern Division, nine in the Central Division and two in the Southern Division failed to hold the prescribed minimum number of meetings in the year. As regards the failure of the taluka boards in the Northern Division in this respect, no explanation is forthcoming, but it may be remarked that the number of the boards in default is much less than in the previous year, and that the taluka local boards of Godhra and Kalol, which formed the subject of adverse comment last year, are not among the offenders. The average percentage of members attending the meetings in the Northern, Central, Southern Divisions and in Sind was respectively 62·91, 48·39, 53·8 and 53·85 as against 59·0, 53·53, 56·1 and 52·59, respectively, in the previous year.

6. *Income.*—The aggregate income of the boards fell from Rs. 82,11,000 to Rs. 77,20,000. The following statement compares the receipts under the principal heads of revenue with those of the preceding year:—

7. *Land revenue.*—The increase of Rs. 52,000 under this head is principally due to the enhanced receipts in Sind (Rs. 40,000), which occurred in Karachi, Hyderabad and Larkana owing to keen competition at the public auctions of the fishery farms. In the Northern Division the increase of Rs. 12,000 is due to larger realizations from quarrying fees in the Kaira and Surat districts, and to the recovery of arrears coupled with an increase in the proceeds of auction sales in the Thana district.

8. *Provincial rates.*—The very large decrease of Rs. 4,40,000 under this head is distributed as follows:—The Northern Division Rs. 3,00,000, the Central Division Rs. 1,80,000 and the Southern Division Rs. 30,000. Sind, on the other hand, showed an increase of Rs. 70,000. The decrease is chiefly due to (i) the suspension of land revenue on account of the unfavourable character of the season in the Northern Division, and (ii) the introduction of the new system of revenue accounts, by which the one anna cess is not recovered, as before, in a lump sum with the first instalment of land revenue, but is assigned every month to the local funds. In Sind all the districts, except Karachi, record increased revenue, which was mainly due to a better inundation and more extensive cultivation. In Thar and Parkar the greater part of the revenue collections for the previous year, which were postponed owing to the cotton crisis, was recovered during the year under review.

9. *Education.*—The decrease of Rs. 1,34,000 in the receipts under this head is common to all Divisions and is chiefly due to a reduction in Government grants. Thana records the largest decrease of Rs. 12,000, which is attributed also to a fall in the number of boys appearing at the middle school scholarship examination.

10. *Medical.*—The decrease of Rs. 20,000 under this head is shared by all the Divisions and Sind. In the Northern Division the decrease is apparent

rather than real, for, except Ahmedabad, where the last year's figures were inflated by a donation of Rs. 8,000, and Broach, where the difference is slight, all the districts in this Division show increases over the previous year's figures. The increase (Rs. 1,887) in Thana is due to the opening of a new dispensary at Dahanu, and in Surat to the additional grants from Government for sanitation and water supply and a grant from the Sachin State towards the cost of vaccination, which was not received in the previous year. In the Southern Division the decrease chiefly occurs in the Dharwar district, where the receipts of the preceding year included a building grant of Rs. 5,400 for the construction of a dispensary building at Mundargi. Similarly in Sind the receipts of the year 1914-15 included a grant of Rs. 5,000 from Government for the new Warah Dispensary in the Larkana district and the arrear grants to certain dispensaries in the Thar and Parkar district which were paid in a lump sum by Government.

11. The increase of Rs. 32,000 under the head "Police" is due to larger receipts under the Cattle Trespass Act. The increase under "Scientific and other minor departments" and the decrease under "Interest" are small and call for no remarks.

12. *Civil works*.—Under this head there was a decrease of Rs. 39,000 in the Northern and Southern Divisions and in Sind, counterbalanced by an increase of Rs. 34,000 in the Central Division. The main sources of income under this head are (i) tolls on roads and ferries, and (ii) Government and popular contributions. As regards (i), Government in 1914 instituted an inquiry as to whether the district local boards which levied tolls on roads (exclusive of tolls on bridges and ferries) would be prepared to abolish the tolls on their roads on the receipt of an annual payment to them by Government of a sum fixed in perpetuity, which would be calculated on the average of their receipts from this source for the five years ending 1913-14, the condition attaching to the payment of the contribution being that the whole of it should be spent exclusively on the construction and maintenance of roads. It was at the same time announced that Government would not be able, immediately on the receipt of the acceptance of the above offer, to carry out the scheme in its entirety, but would put it into execution gradually according as the state of their finances permitted them to do so. The district local boards of Ahmedabad, Poona, Ahmednagar, Nasik, Satara, West Khandesh, Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Kanara have accepted the offer made by Government. In view of the financial situation, however, Government in the year 1915-16 sanctioned to the following four of these boards grants of the amounts specified against their names as compensation for the abolition of tolls on their roads.

These annual grants amount to Rs. 19,800. In the current year Government have made an additional provision of Rs. 25,000 to enable them to make similar grants to some of the remaining boards, and the question as to how the amount should be distributed is under consideration.

During the year under report Ahmedabad, in the Northern Division, recorded, under the sub-head "tolls on roads and ferries", a decrease of Rs. 8,000, which is ascribed to the abolition of tolls. In the Central Division the receipts from this source showed a net increase of Rs. 17,000, due chiefly to the increased income from tolls, and, to a small extent, to high bids at toll auctions in the Ahmednagar district. Satara, on the other hand, shows a decrease of Rs. 2,127. In the Southern Division the income under this head rose in all the districts except Kanara, where the abolition of tolls on roads is reported to have resulted in a deficit.

Under the other sub-head "contributions from Government" there was in the Northern Division, on the whole, practically no variation. Surat received an additional Government grant of Rs. 11,000 for civil works. Under "other contributions" there was a net increase of Rs. 5,000, due to larger donations from private persons in the Ahmedabad and Surat districts, supplemented by

a contribution from the Wadia Bequest Fund towards the construction of the veterinary dispensary at Bardoli. In Sind the decrease of Rs. 12,000 under the head "civil works" is chiefly due to the fact that in 1914 the Thar and Parkar District received a special allotment of Rs. 10,000 for raising the road from Umarmkot to Dhoro Naro station.

13. *Expenditure.*—The total expenditure of the boards amounted to Rs. 85,35,691 as against Rs. 84,42,471 in the preceding year. The following statement shows the distribution of expenditure under the several heads as compared with that in the preceding year:—

The more important variations in the above figures are commented on below:—

14. *Education.*—The expenditure under this head fell off by Rs. 4,000 as compared with the preceding year's outlay of Rs. 3,60,000. There was a decrease of Rs. 59,000 in the Southern Division and Sind, counterbalanced by an increase of Rs. 55,000 in the Northern and Central Divisions. In the Northern Division all the districts except Kaira and the Panch Mahals contributed to an increase of Rs. 5,000 under this head. The apparent decrease of Rs. 10,000 in Kaira due to the payment of bonuses to teachers and other servants in the previous year was more than counterbalanced by increases in Surat and Thána. The increase in Surat from Rs. 2,13,912 to Rs. 2,20,938 is due to the entertainment from the 1st March 1915 of additional assistants in local board schools, while in Thána the rise from Rs. 1,27,864 to Rs. 1,32,491 is due to the full utilization of the amount available for primary education. In the Central Division all the districts, except Sátára and Násik, contributed to the increase of Rs. 49,000, which was owing to improved pay to teachers in primary schools and increased equipment charges. In the Southern Division the fall of Rs. 55,000 is shared by all the districts except Bijápur, where an increase was the result of a greater expenditure on the maintenance and management of primary schools and the grant of scholarships to pupils. Payment to teachers of the arrears of their salaries for the preceding year account for the decrease in Dhárwar and Kolába. In Kánara the falling off is attributed to the fact that the code pay promotions of last year were not given this year. In Ratnágiri the decrease is apparent rather than real, as the expenditure incurred last year included the refund of a building grant of Rs. 31,100. In Belgaum the decrease is due to the construction of new school buildings being held up during the year owing to the contraction of Government grants. As regards primary education, a school for the children of criminal tribes has been opened at the Gokak Falls in the Belgaum district, and attention seems to have been paid by the Belgaum, Dhárwar and Bijápur boards to the education of backward and depressed classes. Special treatment in the form of free supply of books, slates, clothes, etc. and grant of scholarships for regular attendance is also accorded to the children of these classes. In Sind the decrease occurred chiefly in the Sukkur, Lárkána and Thar and Parkar districts, being partly counterbalanced by an increase in the Karáchi district. The decrease was the result of reduction in expenditure on schools and libraries. The increase in Karáchi was due to promotions to teachers, the appointment of new trained hands and the opening of new schools.

15. *Medical*.—Under this head there was an increase of Rs. 36,000 in the Northern and Southern Divisions and Sind, counterbalanced by a decrease of Rs. 5,000 in the Central Division. In the Northern Division the decrease in Ahmedabad, Broach and Surat was more than counterbalanced by an increase (Rs. 3,847) in the remaining three districts of Kaira, Panch Mahals and Thána. The increase is due to the opening of two new dispensaries—one at Navagam in Kaira and the other at Dahanu in Thána—and to the adjustment of accounts in the Panch Mahals. The decrease of Rs. 5,000 in the Central Division is small and calls for no remarks. In the Southern Division the increase in expenditure is shared by all the districts except Kánara. In Belgaum the establishment of new village sanitary committees, for which increased grants had to be made by the board, and the increased cost of drugs contributed to the rise in expenditure. In Bijápur the increase is ascribed to the revision of the pay of the peons attached to the dispensary and the vaccinators. In Dhárwár the excess is attributed to the refund to the Public Works Department of the building grant for the Mundargi dispensary, as the work was treated by the Public Works Department as a contribution work, and also to the fact that Rs. 2,000 granted by the Sanitary Board for street improvements at Shiggaon had to be refunded, as the work could not be started within the stipulated period. A monthly contribution of Rs. 150 and a non-recurring grant of Rs. 500 were made by the district local board, Dhárwár, to the women's dispensary established at Hubli by the Indian Women's Aid Society, while the Hubli taluka local board contributed a sum of Rs. 100 to the latter institution. In Ratnágiri the increase was chiefly due to larger expenditure on account of diet and clothing to the additional lepers who were sent there from Bombay. The district local boards of Belgaum and Bijápur spent Rs. 100 and Rs. 300, respectively, on the free distribution of quinine among school boys in malarial tracts. The Dhárwár board purchased 400,000 grains of quinine, of which they distributed 240,000, free of charge, throughout the district, and especially in malarial localities. In Sind the increase is shared by all the districts except Upper Sind Frontier. Additional grants and additional supply of furniture to dispensaries; free distribution of quinine and the increased cost of English medicines contributed towards the increase.

16. *Scientific and other minor departments*.—The expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 1,22,000 to Rs. 1,41,000. The increase was shared by all the Divisions as well as Sind. In the Northern Division the increase of Rs. 1,500 under this head was contributed by all the districts, but principally by Broach, where the "Veterinary charges" rose by Rs. 380 owing to the entertainment of a compounder at Ankleshwar and to the grant of travelling allowances to dispensary servants who had to tour owing to the prevalence of rinderpest in almost all the talukas. The excess in Surat is assigned to the purchase of veterinary books and furniture and a rise in the prices of medical stores. In Thána it is ascribed to the contribution of Rs. 300 towards the agricultural show held at Bassein, and Rs. 50 to the Jambul Mohili Agricultural School. In the Central Division the increase of Rs. 5,496 was mainly due (i) to the contributions made by the district boards of Ahmednagar and Poona towards the horse show at Ahmednagar, and by the district board of East Khándesh towards the agricultural exhibition at Pachora, and (ii) to a larger outlay on medical stores by the district boards of West Khándesh and Sátára. In the Southern Division the rise in expenditure under this head is shared by all the districts except Bijápur and Dhárwár. In Belgaum the increase is accounted for by the transfer of the management of the veterinary dispensary at Saundatti from the municipality to the district local board. In Bijápur the decrease is due to the fact that no cattle show was held during the year. In Sind the increase in Karáchi was due to the recovery during the year under report of the cost of medicines supplied to dispensaries in previous years and to the payment of a sum of Rs. 1,200 on account of the dispensary allowance to the veterinary assistants at Sujawal and Tatta for the years 1914-15 and 1915-16. The increase in the Sukkur district was due to expenditure on cattle and agricultural show held during the year. In Lárkána two Arab stallions were purchased for Rs. 2,117, Government contributing Rs. 1,000 towards the cost.

17. *Civil works.*—The expenditure under this head fell off by Rs. 23,000 as compared with the preceding year's outlay of Rs. 37,69,000. The Central Division alone contributed Rs. 1,00,000 towards this decrease, which was counterbalanced by an increase of Rs. 77,000 in the Northern and Southern Divisions and Sind. The expenditure for the whole Presidency represents 43.9 per cent. of the entire expenditure of the boards against a corresponding proportion of 44.64 per cent. in the preceding year. The following statement compares the charges under the various sub-heads with those of the preceding year:—

18. *Communications.*—The major portion of the outlay on "Civil works" was, as usual, devoted to the construction and repairs of roads and bridges. In the Northern Division the increase of Rs. 24,000 under this head occurs in all the districts except the Panch Mahals and Thana. The increase from Rs. 88,000 to Rs. 1,04,000 in Kaira is due to the acquisition of land for the Anand-Napa road, the construction of which had to be postponed for want of funds. In Broach the expenditure incurred on repairs to the Broach Jambusar road and the Derol Wagra road accounts for the increase. In Surat the Dungri-Link road was partly constructed, and the construction of the Wapi Daman road was taken in hand. In the Central Division the expenditure on original works fell by Rs. 79,000, the reduction being marked in the East Khandesh district. The expenditure on repairs to roads increased in the West Khandesh, Poona and Sholapur districts. In the Southern Division the expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 4,83,000 to Rs. 4,98,000. The more important works were the improvement of the Indi Nala causeway in the Bijapur district and the construction of the Dabhol Dapoli road in the Ratnagiri district. In Belgaum the Bidi-Kittur road has been transferred to the Public Works Department. It is reported to be a rough track, and it is proposed to convert it gradually into a good metalled road. When completed, the road will permit of communication between Dharwar and Belgaum without the necessity of crossing the river at Mugutkhan-Hubli, where the want of a bridge on this main road to Bangalore has been felt for years. In Sind the expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 4,02,000 to Rs. 4,35,000. In this province expenditure was incurred on the construction of 8 dharamshalas and 12 musafir khanas.

19. *Water supply.*—The expenditure under this head showed a net decrease of Rs. 29,000 on the preceding year's outlay of Rs. 3,60,000. The Northern, Central and Southern Divisions contributed towards the decrease which was to some extent counterbalanced by an increase of Rs. 5,000 in Sind. In the Northern Division all the districts except Ahmedabad and Broach are responsible for the decrease of Rs. 12,000 under "Original water works." The falling off was most marked in Kaira, where the construction of new wells had to be postponed owing to a diminution of income from local rates. In Surat only 8 new wells and one cattle trough were constructed. An increase of Rs. 2,500 in Broach was necessitated by the unexpected charges for new

wells and tank excavation opened in the western portion of Jambusar taluka for the purpose of relieving the distress occasioned by insufficiency of rain. Under "Repairs" an increase of Rs. 4,975 is noticed, to which Ahmedabad, Kaira and Thana are the only contributors. The deepening, cleaning, repairing and boring of wells to supplement the scanty rainfall were the chief items on which Kaira had to incur an increased expenditure. In the Southern Division there has been a net decrease of Rs. 5,000 under this head. It is reported that the Musto boring plant belonging to the Belgaum board was used on a particular work, and that as difficulty was experienced in working it, the board proposed to train a man specially for the purpose and put him in charge of it. The Commissioner rightly remarks that this should have been done long ago. The cost of labour involved in dismembering the plant, transporting it piecemeal and re-setting it prevents the board from utilizing it more widely. This difficulty can be obviated by employing a trained man to direct removing and erecting operations. In Sind 35 new wells in all were sunk during the year.

20. *Arboriculture.*—There was an increase of Rs. 19,000 under this head, of which Rs. 11,000 were contributed by Sind. In the Northern Division the increase of Rs. 5,700 is shared by all the districts except Ahmedabad. In the Panch Mahals the board have handed over to the Public Works Department the work of planting road-side trees on important roads. During the year under report Surat spent Rs. 7,200 on arboriculture against Rs. 6,500 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 700. The operations of tree planting were in progress throughout this district, though the results in some parts are unsatisfactory owing to scanty rainfall and the unsuitability of the soil. In Thana the district local board spent Rs. 2,300 on the plantation of trees, and the taluka local boards of Salsette, Dahanu, Vada and Bhiwandi spent Rs. 849, Rs. 508, Rs. 336 and Rs. 287 respectively, while the taluka boards of Mahim, Shahapur, Murbad, Kalyan and Bassein incurred no expenditure at all. Working plans for most of the roads have been prepared, and it is expected that better results will be recorded next year. In the Southern Division all the boards except that of Bijapur have spent larger sums of money on arboricultural operations. In Sind satisfactory progress seems to have been made in this respect, the total length of roads newly planted with trees during the year under report being 199 miles.

21. *Closing balances.*—The table appended to this Resolution shows, with divisional totals, the opening and closing balances of the boards of the several districts of the Presidency. The aggregate of the closing balances of all the boards of the Presidency amounted to Rs. 23½ lakhs against Rs. 30 lakhs in the previous year. These closing balances are still considerably in excess of the prescribed minima. With the view of preventing the district local boards, on the one hand, from overdrawing on the Government treasury on account of the late receipt of the bulk of their income, and, on the other hand, from hoarding up unnecessarily large balances, Government, in 1896, fixed, by executive orders, the minimum working balances in the case of each district local board. The minimum working balances thus fixed were revised during the years 1909 and 1910 in the case of all district local boards, except those of Thana, Ratnagiri and Upper Sind Frontier, in which no change was called for. These balances have since undergone no revision. Government have, therefore, considered it desirable that the minimum working balances of district local boards should be revised every ten years, and orders have been issued for their revision commencing with the year 1919.

In the Northern Division, though the balance in every district is far in excess of the prescribed minimum, a decrease as compared with the previous year's figures is noticeable in each case. The falling off was the largest in Kaira, where the closing balance was reduced from Rs. 1,62,556 to Rs. 28,749 owing to the prevailing scarcity during the year, in consequence of which the full amount of the land revenue could not be collected but had to be partly suspended and partly remitted. Moreover, the operation of the system of consolidated revenue lately inaugurated, according to which the local fund cess had to be collected in strict proportion to the land revenue, resulted in the realization of less income from that source than in former years of scarcity

when local fund cess was collected except in cases of total suspensions. In these circumstances the Kaira board was allowed to reduce its minimum balance temporarily for the years 1915-16 and 1916-17 from Rs. 50,000 to Rs. 10,000. The Collector reports that it was with the strictest economy and practically by stopping all but recurring charges that an overdrawal, though sanctioned by Government, was avoided. In Broach the excess of Rs. 28,407 over the prescribed minimum of Rs. 50,000 is explained by the fact that a great portion (Rs. 20,000) of the excess belongs to the educational fund. The excess in Surat (Rs. 30,759) is attributed to (i) the surrender of Rs. 19,223 by the Public Works Department on account of several school and dispensary buildings, (ii) the non-utilization of a sum of Rs. 3,536 owing to certain works having remained incomplete at the close of the year and (iii) the reservation of a sum of Rs. 8,000 for payment to the Surat municipality on account of the district local board's share towards special repairs to the Hope bridge for the following year (1916-17). As regards Thana, the Collector reports that all amounts budgetted for were not fully spent, owing partly to the scarcity of labour, partly to the absence of zeal and initiative among overseers and sub-overseers, and partly to apathy and lack of motive power on the part of members. In the Central Division the unspent balances of the boards at the end of the year aggregated Rs. 7,87,620 as against Rs. 9,46,778 in the preceding year. In Ahmednagar, Satara and Sholapur the surplus balances include a large amount of unspent educational funds, while in East and West Khandesh the surplus is inflated by the credit to the local boards at the close of the year of a sum of Rs. 53,561 and Rs. 35,000, respectively, on account of the cost of tools and plant purchased by the Public Works Department from the funds of the boards. In Poona the excess balance is accounted for by the inability of the Board to carry out work owing to the difficulty of securing skilled labour. The discrepancies between the closing balances of the last year and the opening balances of the year under report in the Central and Southern Divisions are due to the subsequent adjustment of accounts. In the Southern Division the large balance of the Belgaum district local board was due to the fact that a greater part of the amount provided in the budget for new school buildings was not utilized, such of the new works as were of an urgent nature having been postponed in view of the announcement that the payment of Government grants towards the cost of their construction might have to be delayed on account of the financial situation. In Dharwar the balance still continues to be large, while in Kanara successful attempts appear to have been made to work up to the prescribed minimum. In Kolaba the board has to contend against the difficulty of securing labour, a condition of affairs which, the Commissioner remarks, is not likely to improve. In Ratnagiri the accumulation of a heavy balance is attributed to the mode of preparing work bills according to the rules of the Ratnagiri Local Board Code, and it is reported that steps are being taken to modify them. The Commissioner observes that the chief question is always one of labour, that where casual labour has to be depended on, anything that affects the labour market must seriously affect local board works, and that district local boards are not in a position to undertake the enlistment of permanent workmen. In Sind the balances show an increase of Rs. 10,558 over those of the previous year. There were large savings from the amount provided for works which could not be completed or taken up during the year under report. The closing balance is exceptionally large in the Hyderabad district, and it is reported that attempts are being made to utilize it so as to bring it down to the prescribed minimum.

22. *Works committees.*—In the Central Division the works committees appointed in East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik and Satara have done fairly good work. In the Ahmednagar district the villages of Parner, Shrigonda and Nevasa have shown some interest in executing local village works entrusted to them. In the West Khandesh district it is reported that the system of giving small works on contract to village patels and village panchas does not find favour with the villagers. The Commissioner is asking the Collector to make a special enquiry into the matter and to report the result. The Collector and President, district local board, Poona, has initiated the practice of informing the members 3 or 4 weeks beforehand of the date fixed

for a meeting, and of furnishing them at the same time with the agenda paper together with copies of all important papers to enable them to take a more intelligent interest in the working of the board. The board have also resolved to appoint a budget committee of 8 members, of whom 3 are to be officials, with the president as its chairman. The function of this committee is to decide upon the items to be entered in the budgets prior to their being placed before the half-yearly meetings of the board. The Governor in Council considers the innovation to be a very useful one and recommends it for adoption by other boards. As regards the works committees in the Southern Division, it is gratifying to note that in Belgaum, Kanara, Dharwar and Kolaba certain non-official members have taken much interest in supervising works. In the Ratnagiri district, on the other hand, the non-official members with a few exceptions have shown little interest in local board works. In Kanara the system of electing village committees is being introduced in all the villages, which, it is hoped, will help towards dispelling the prevailing apathy of the villagers. In Sind the members of the committees in the Shikarpur and Rohri divisions and in some talukas of the Larkana district have shown a fair amount of interest. In Karachi laxity in supervising certain local fund works led to the perpetration of frauds and the dismissal of a local fund overseer. The Commissioner, N. D., should be requested to include information regarding works committees in his future annual reports on the administration of the local boards.

23. *General remarks.*—Although the year's work presents no feature of special importance, the general administration of the local boards was, on the whole, satisfactory. There was a notable decrease in the income of the boards, chiefly due to the introduction of the new system of revenue accounts, according to which the one anna cess was not received as before in a lump sum along with the first instalment of land revenue but was assigned every month to the local funds. In the Northern Division the badness of the season was reflected in the incomes of the boards. In spite of the contraction in Government grants under the heads of Education, Medical and Civil works owing to financial stringency, the expenditure was much the same as in the preceding years. The non-official members have taken a fair amount of interest in the working of their respective boards. In Sind the year was marked by the success which attended the various shows organised by several district local boards with the view of stimulating the interest of the zamindars in horse and cattle breeding and agriculture. The district local board of Karachi was responsible for the very successful cattle show which was held in that city in January 1916.

24. Mr. J. R. Martin, I. C. S., has been specially deputed not only to deal with the various recommendations contained in the report of the committee appointed to consider the question of the extension of the principle of local self-government in regard to local boards, but also to examine the whole system of local self-government as it obtains at present in this Presidency, and to suggest possible reforms. The proposals of the committee involve an extensive revision of the Bombay Local Boards Act, 1884. Pending the enactment of legislation, Government have, under the existing provisions of the law, increased the proportion of elective members in sixteen out of the nineteen district local boards in the Presidency proper by reducing the number of nominated members to one half the number of members to be elected under the provisions. The sixteen boards which have thus obtained a two-thirds elective majority are named below:—

Northern Division.—Ahmedabad, Surat, Thana, Kaira;

Central Division.—Poona, Satara, Nasik, Sholapur, Ahmednagar, East Khandesh, West Khandesh;

Southern Division.—Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar, Kanara, Kolaba.

All these boards, with the exception of Kaira and Poona, have already been reconstituted on the above basis on the expiration of their respective terms of office. In Kaira and Poona the revised constitution will be introduced with effect from the 1st November 1917. The remaining three boards, namely, those of Broach, Panch Mahals and Ratnagiri, have not yet been reconstituted on the above principle as their triennial terms of office will expire in 1918.

In paragraph 20 of their Report the Local Self-Government Committee suggested that the change from a Collector—President to a non-official president should be made "with caution and by way of experiment in advanced districts" only. In view of this suggestion it was announced in Government Resolution no. 3481, dated the 16th May 1916, that Government proposed to appoint, as an experiment, non-officials as presidents of district local boards in some of the districts in the Presidency proper. Five district local boards have so far been selected for the trial of the experiment, namely, Broach in the Northern Division, Poona and Ahmednagar in the Central Division, and Belgaum and Dharwar in the Southern Division. The Honourable Diwan Bahadur K. R. Godbole and Khan Bahadur Adarji Mancherji Dalal have accordingly been appointed to be presidents of the district local boards of Poona and Broach, respectively, in place of the Collectors of those districts, who have resigned their seats on the boards. The selection of Rao Bahadur G. K. Chitale, Rao Bahadur R. C. Artal and Rao Bahadur S. K. Rodda to be presidents of the district local boards of Ahmednagar, Belgaum and Dharwar, respectively, in place of the Collectors of those districts has been approved.

Government consider that it will be of great advantage if the non-official presidents first gain experience of the work which now devolves on the official presidents before the sphere of duty of the boards is enlarged. Government have also held that where non-official presidents are appointed, the present arrangement under which the account and clerical work of the district boards is performed by the Collector's establishment cannot be allowed to continue, but that each board to which such an appointment is made should have a self-contained office under a competent head or chief officer, who should, for the present at any rate, be a purely executive officer and not an engineer. In order to assist each such board to maintain a separate establishment, Government have agreed to grant to it, on certain conditions, an annual subsidy equivalent to the chief officer's pay and allowances, which will vary with the size of the district and the importance of the board, and also an annual grant representing the cost of the present establishment entertained in the Collector's office for the transaction of the board's business. The conditions attaching to these subventions are (i) that the chief officer should be a Government servant selected by the Commissioner, being of the grade of a mamlatdar or qualified for appointment to a mamlat, and (ii) that the board should, in the first instance, take over as their accountant, clerks and peons, on pay not less than what they receive at present, any members of the Collector's staff now employed on local board work for whom the Collector cannot provide appointments of equal value on his own establishment, and should contribute for their pay and pension under the rules in the Civil Service Regulations. These conditions are calculated to secure for the non-official president the advantage of working with a well-trained establishment at the commencement of his tenure of office. The district local boards of Poona and Broach have already accepted the conditions, and the necessary grants have therefore been sanctioned to them.

The Governor in Council trusts that the non-official members of the boards to which an elective majority has been granted, as well as of those in which the non-official president has replaced the official president will take a greater interest in their administration.

25. Copies of this Resolution should be submitted to the Secretary of State and the Government of India and should be forwarded to all Commissioners and Collectors and to the other officers and the Departments concerned.
