FINANCIAL DATA ON ATLANTA HOUSING

Rents and the values of Atlanta, Georgia homes declined about a fifth from 1929 to 1933, while during the same period incomes declined almost a third, T. Murchison, Director, Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce, stated when making public today data obtained by the Financial Survey of Urban Housing, a C. W. A. project conducted under the auspices of the Bureau. The survey, made early in 1934, obtained reports on 5609 Atlanta residential projecties; and secured information on 4274 owner-occupied and 9543 rented dwelling units, or 15.6 percent of the total number of occupied dwelling units in the city. Approximately 81 percent of the owners reporting were white, and 17 percent negroes. Of tenants reporting, 56 percent were white, 42 percent negroes.

About half of all properties reporting on mortgage indebtedness, including land contracts, were encumbered. Nearly three-fifths of all owner-occupied and two-fifths of rented properties reported debt. The average debt outstanding amounted to 57 percent of average value for owner-occupied, and 70 percent for rented properties. (Table 2).

RENTS

The average 1933 rent bill as indicated by the survey was \$222 per dwelling unit. This amount was the entire yearly charge for the use of the property and all facilities provided by the landlord without separate charge. The value of concessions allowed the tenant in the form of free occupancy has been deducted. One-family dwellings constituted about two-fifths of the total number of dwelling units reported. Apartments made up about one-fifth, and units in two-family structures nearly one-third of the total. The average annual rent of one-family dwellings for 1933 was \$233. The average rent per dwelling unit for two-family structures was \$156, and for apartments \$326 per year. (Table 3). The monthly rental charge for one-family dwellings was \$19.40 per unit, \$4.10 per room, and \$4.10 per person. (Table 4).

Nearly two-thirds of all tenants reporting had rent bills for 1933 amounting to less than \$240, and more than a fourth had rent bills of less than \$120 for the year. (Table 5).

INCOME, COST OF HOUSING, AND DELINQUENCY

About three-fifths of all incomes reported by tenants for 1933 were below \$750, and fewer than one-fourth were above \$1500. The average was \$979. Sixty-three percent of the entire cash income was required for the payment of rent by families having incomes less than \$250 a year, and less than 20 percent by famili with incomes over \$1500. (Table 6). Thirty percent of all tenants reporting were delinquent in rent payments. Fore than two-fifths of those with rent bills under \$180 were in arrears. (Table 5).

Incomes of families owning the dwellings they occupied averaged \$1906 in 1933, or nearly twice the average tenant income. More than $2\frac{1}{2}$ years income at the 1933 rate would have been required to purchase the average home at its value on January 1, 1934 as estimated by the owner. (Table 7). More than half of the mortgaged owner-occupied properties valued under \$1500 were delinquent in payments, as compared with about a third of those valued over \$5000. (Table 10).

VALUE AND DEBT ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES

The average value of all bwner-occupied one-family dwellings for which size and material of construction were reported was \$4330. The average value for wooden structures was \$3087, and for brick \$7534. Structures of 6 or more rooms comprised about two-thirds of the total. (Table 8).

About three-fourths of all owner-occupied residential properties were valued between \$1500 and \$7500, and about two-fifths between \$2000 and \$4000. The percent mortgaged varied from 19 percent for the lowest value group, to 71 percent for properties valued over \$15,000. (Table 9).

Mortgaged properties were valued considerably higher, on the average, than those free of debt. Mortgaged properties valued below \$5000 were encumbered for a larger percentage of their average value than those above \$5000. (Table 10

About a third of all owner-occupied properties reporting both value and debt had outstanding debt amounting to less than 50 percent of value, and a sixth debt in excess of 85 percent. About a fifth of the rented properties reported were mortgaged for more than 85 percent of value. (Table 11).

The reduction in debt on identical owner-occupied properties between January 1, 1930 and January 1, 1934 was 18 percent. For rented properties the reduction was 11 percent. Most of these properties were still in the hands of their 1930 owners at the date of the survey. The decline in debt in the case of owner-occupied properties was about the same as the decline in property values. (Table 12).

FINANCING

Life insurance companies were the principal source of first mortgage credit on owner-occupied properties in Atlanta, supplying 44 percent of the total amount outstanding January 1, 1934. Mortgage companies held 26 percent, and individual lenders 14 percent of the total. The original amount of loan as reported averaged \$3165, as against \$2666 outstanding. The average contract interest rate on a loans reported was 6.66. Interest rates vary as between lenders according to size and character of loan, rish, and handling charges. (Table 13).

Of loans for which definite terms were reported, 12 percent of firs mortgages and 31 percent and second and third mortgages were originally made for term of one to four years. About 31 percent of first mortgages and 8 percent of second and third mortgages were made for terms of 10 years or more. (Table 14).

INFORTATION AVAILABLE FROM THE FINANCIAL SURVEY OF URBAN HOUSING

This is one of a series of releases for individual cities based upon the data of the Financial Survey of Urban Housing, a C. W. A. project conducted in 1934 by Mr. David L. Wickens under the auspices of the Bureau of Foreigh and Domestic Commerce. The survey secured information in 61 cities representing every state, and covering, on a sampling basis, all parts of each city and all types of dwelling. The data now being prepared for final publication provide information on urban residential values, mortgage debt, arrearages, family incomes, and other aspects of the housing problem.

Preliminary releases have been prepared, and are available for a number of other cities. Others will follow shortly.
