





CHIEF & C<sup>a</sup>. FACTORS AT TELLICHERRY.

SIRS

We have before us your several advices of the 30<sup>th</sup>. March 6<sup>th</sup>. & 14<sup>th</sup>. of April, & 20<sup>th</sup>. of May last with your Diary Accounts, &c<sup>a</sup>. papers agreeable to the respective Packet Lists.

You did very right in sending us the part of your Diary referred to, as it furnished us with a clearer and more connected Information of your Transactions w<sup>th</sup>. the French than are attainable by Letter remarking withall that you use the Portuguese language in your papers with the French: We cannot but prefer it as a neutral tongue to writing in theirs, knowing how much those people are attach'd to National Punctilios, & provided you understand each other it is sufficient.

Your Letter of the 20<sup>th</sup>. May gives us very pleasing Accounts of the manner you have dealt with the French both in respect to the measures taken to draw the Pepper into your hands, w<sup>ch</sup>. in their false & fickle way they had acted so double a part in promising to fix the price in concert w<sup>th</sup>. you & immediately breaking thro' this Agreement, & in drawing off the Country Governments from their Interest: The cultivating their Friendship and Promoting a good Harmony w<sup>th</sup>. the Powers round you is a Plan of Conduct always enjoined by our Honourable Masters, who would owe the currency of their Trade and affairs as much as possible to the good Will & Confidence of the Natives, but at this Juncture espescially when a War w<sup>th</sup>. France is generally apprehended, it will be highly politick at all events to secure the Support and Concurrence of the Country Powers whom we observe with much satisfaction seem to be alarmed & jealous of French Encroachments, & we hope by your discreet Improvement of the occasion, to reap the Benefit of their unpopular suspicious Conduct.

We are sensible that these Oppositions & Counter Interests furnish the Mallabars an opportunity of making Advantages of both sides, & that some expence is necessary to attach & unite them to you; This we have already wrote you fully upon & given you all the Lattitudes in our Orders w<sup>ch</sup>. is necessary to save you from Blame. It is true our Honble Masters have expressly prohibited Loans of their money to the Country Governments having sufficiently smarted for it already, but We do not think they will be against such indispensable & occasionall advances of money where their Interest & Estimate are evidently to be benefited by it, & the Reasons are justly & clearly stated to them, And in regard to the Prince in particular (as noted in your Letter of the 30<sup>th</sup>. March) we say that you may launch out a moderate Sum on any Emergency for preventing his being subdued by any Power whatever, for should We once lose the Countenance he now affords us, it is to be apprehended worse consequences might ensue than the parting with any reasonable Sum.

We observe the Cannarees have at length concluded a Peace with you & we hope your Province will be now entirely Free from any apprehensions from that Quarter; we shall be glad that you use your best Endeavours to establish & fix a good Correspondence w<sup>th</sup>. that Government, as we think it may answer very good

purposes. It is Trade we seek & not War unless unavoidably engaged for the preservation of our Honble Masters Interest & Estate, and this is a maxim we must strongly inculcate a generall perswasion of in all our Dealings and Transactions.

We have thoroughly noted all the steps you advise to have taken for enlarging your stock of Pepper w<sup>ch</sup>. it is a reall satisfaction to observe, is so much larger than we expected, from a Review of the Quarrels, & Embroils you was involved in, w<sup>ch</sup>. must so greatly affect the Currency of your Business, as well as raise the Price of that Commodity.

We were in hopes of receiving from our Honble Masters explicite Directions this Season for fixing the rate of your Extra Purchases, but none yet arriving, we can only 'till their Orders come to hand continue ours on the present foot, & you are accordingly to contract for, & buy up, as much as procurable, for the account of our Honble Masters, & according to our last Regulation.

We are well satisfied w<sup>th</sup>. your sending Mr. Purnell to Onore, & the Contracts there made, & as you will return him thither as soon as the season will permitt, you are to direct him to increase the Quantity as much as he can, and as we shall send a Ship thither to take it in, w<sup>ch</sup>. will carry proper Scales & Weights, consigned to him for the use you mention, he may likewise attend, & see to the weighing & shipping off of three hundred Candys w<sup>h</sup>. lie ready there (as we advised) on a Contract made here for that Quantity; You should likewise give him in charge to advise us by all occasions of his Progress & Transactions, that we may give him orders as necessary.

We take notice of the leaving the Price open with regard to some of your Contracts, both for Pepper & Cardamoms, but we must say it is a very unmercantile & inconvenient Expedient, & w<sup>ch</sup>. nothing but the necessity of the times can justify, but as we are sensible it is the best means to prevent a greater evil, in the Diversion of those Articles into the hands of your Neighbours, we must acquiese in it, till the necessity is removed, which is one of the Inconveniencies the Competition of the French exposes the Market to; but from what we can Collect by your advices, they must soon be sick of their extravagant method of Dealing & its Consequences.

We approve for the reasons you give of the advancing money for securing the full & timely Performance of your Pepper Contracts (29<sup>th</sup>. & sequent Paragraph of the 20<sup>th</sup>. May last) & recommend to you strongly that all care be used, that our Honble Masters be no sufferers by any trust of this sort.

In regard to the providing the annual Quantity of Cardamoms, we can only say that you must use all possible care in getting the best procurable, & on the cheapest Terms, being very sensible they sometimes prove better than at other times, owing to the season.

We observe the Detail of your Private Purchases of Pepper on places of the Coast (27<sup>th</sup>. & sequent Paragraph) w<sup>th</sup>. the Dates, & Application, & find no room for Censure or Reflection, & do not doubt of your continueing the same punctual regard w<sup>ch</sup>. you express, not to let any private Interest interfere w<sup>th</sup>. your Duty to our Honourable Employers.

We have received your Plan & Calculate of the Factory at Callicutt, & as we are sensible of the Expediency of preserving a Footing there, We must repeat our Leave for setting about that work but we require that you see that the expence & Charges be as nearly comptrolled as possible, so as not to exceed your Calculate, Copy of which, w<sup>th</sup>. the Plan, we would have you likewise transmit our Honble Masters.

We must likewise repeat the Approval heretofore given for Casing the Warehouse, & is a work we shall be glad to hear is finished as soon as possible, w<sup>th</sup>. respect to the Inconveniencys before represented, & the Loss now actually arisen, as <sup>per</sup> your advice 44<sup>th</sup>. and sequent Paragraph.

We observe the arrival of Cap<sup>t</sup>. Jacobs w<sup>th</sup>. the Detachment in Succour of this Presidency from Bengal, & are compleatly satisfied w<sup>th</sup>. every part of your Management in regard to the Vessels & people. The men we would have you send up in

equal proportions on board the first two ships, belonging to our Honble Masters that shall touch at your place, in order to strengthen them in their passage up, or as their Condition may respectively require.

The Calcutta Grab we would have you dispatch up w<sup>th</sup>. the first safe occasion of Convoy, filling her up w<sup>th</sup>. w<sup>t</sup>. Cordage & Laccadivah Coir, she may be able to take in for this Place.

We are so much easier & cheaper supplied from another Quarter w<sup>th</sup>. Country Match that we shall for the present need no further provision of it at your place, & of that you have got, you may keep the necessary for the use of your Garrison, and send up the Remainder.

As we shall want the Poon Masts here, we would have you find means to send them up here, by the first proper Conveyances.

We shall comply w<sup>th</sup>. your Indents the first proper occasion: As to the Europe Gun Powder we must recommend to you to be as sparing of as possible, being ourselves but scant supplied w<sup>th</sup>. it, & very little able to afford such Draughts.

It is with great concern we note the falling short of your Cash, and the more so as it is expressly enjoined by our Honble Masters to keep you full supplied for commanding the Market: But we shall hope their Indulgence, when we assure them as we now do you, that on a Supputation [*sic*] of the probable Demands for your Factory, we judged the last two Lacks we sent, (not to mention other incidental Payments into your Cash) a large allowance for the service of the Current year; but the unexpected Increase of your purchases has it seems exceeded our Calculate, w<sup>ch</sup>. so far makes amends, & we shall by the first secure conveyances replenish your Cash sufficiently. Henceforward let it be a stand<sup>d</sup>. rule w<sup>th</sup>. you to furnish your own Calculate in w<sup>ch</sup>. include every probable Demand, and the utmost Sum respectively required for each, for our Directions in supplying you.

We observe the Dilatoriness of the Prince in the clearance of his Debt, but as we do not think this a proper time to press or dissoblige him, we leave it to your Discretion to time your solicitations; We are pleased however so far with his restitution of the Elephants in Question, as seems by yours to be a point y<sup>t</sup>. smoothed the way for the pacification you advise us is concluded between him and the Canarees.

We are pleased w<sup>th</sup>. what you have recovered from the Nombiers, & the expectancy you are in of the rest; All such Instances are highly agreeable to our Honourable Masters.

The Samorine we observe evades concluding the clearing of his Debt or sending his ministers for that purpose, & as a direct application thro' a Servant at Panany has been hitherto of use, we would have you in due season pitch upon one, and depute to the Samorine w<sup>th</sup>. proper Instructions.

We shall consider thoroughly of the Expediency & use of resettling at Onore; in the meantime your intimations agree exactly with what suggested to us here, as to the measures and proper applications for that purpose. The Present you have made to the King of Beddnure we esteem well seasoned, & approve of it accordingly.

The advices you give us of the French management & Temper of the Country Powers (Paragraph 50<sup>th</sup>. and sequent) with the Commencement of some Overtures of a confederacy against them, altogether seem to form a fair and improveable Prospect, of which good use may be made in case of a War breaking out, & the assurances you subjoin of acting for the best as conjectures may offer are what we must depend upon and commit to your Discretion.

The precautions and Posture of Defence you put all the Forts into on the advice and appearances of an approaching War with France are very just and commendable, & as we have but too much reason to fear it's being actually declared already, the following Intimations can be of no Diservice [*sic*] to you at all Events.

Put yourselves the best you can upon your Guard, see that your Fortifications be in the most defensive Posture, they will admit of, Discipline your Garrison well, and in case of actual War none should go out of, or into the place, or within your Bounds, without being known & examined regularly as near as possible; Send Patrolls constantly to suspected places: let your Enemies see that you are not to be surprized; and tho' your Place is a very bad one, we hope it yet may be defended against any Troops they may raise, notwithstanding the Threats they have often given out of carrying it so easily (as the President informs us) in case of a War. Let the severest justice be immediately executed ag<sup>st</sup>. any you shall have just reason to deem spies; These precautions, & others relative to them, (which we leave to your discretion) will be sufficient to secure you against all surprize: and in the Case of an open War, we hope you will be so fortified by your Party in the Country, as to be at least a match for these neighbours, whose Conduct we observe has alarmed the Governments round them so much as to incline them greatly to your side; a Disposition You must not fail of cultivating.

You did extremely right in maintaining the Rights of your Rivers & Passes; and as to the Pretensions the French have set up to the River of Cotah they seem entirely groundless & timed against an approaching War, w<sup>ch</sup>. by many circumstances it is plain they expect will soon break out.

Enclosed you have Copys of the Paragraphs in our Hon<sup>ble</sup> Master's Orders receiv'd <sup>of</sup> Mountague, the punctual Compliance w<sup>th</sup>. which You will in Consequence attend to.

As We are not yet thoroughly apprized of Sambajees designs, we can in Generall recommend to you the Cautioning against any English Vessels coming up single, for we believe he will be out with all his Force at the opening of the Monsoon, and perhaps renew his attempt against Colabby, The Reduction of which he has much at heart.

Have in readiness to send home <sup>of</sup> Warwick, the original Bills of Lading of the Resolution from your place, or Authenticated Copys, for the satisfaction of our Honourable Masters.

We would have you procure and send up by the first proper conveyance Twelve Chests of Candles, for the Service of this Presidency.

We have just now receiv'd Advice from Anjengo, that they are in great want there of a person qualified to act as Gunner of the place; For the present we cannot supply them, and direct therefore that you send M<sup>r</sup>. Croes down by the first opportunity, to remain there, untill we make another provision, should there be occasion for it, and for you we will send a Gunners Mate by the Warwick.

By this Ship you will receive a Consignment of Eighty thousand Rupees, which is as much, as we thought convenient to risque on this Occasion, and shall supply you further by the first good Conveyance.

Enclosed you have Capt. Mackneale's Orders relating thereto, in case of his not being able to gain your Port.

COPY OF SUNDRY PARAGRAPHS OF THE HONBLE COMPANY'S LETTER (DATED 2<sup>D</sup>. AUGUST 1739) TO BOMBAY RECEIVED THE 17<sup>TH</sup>. JULY 1740 <sup>¶</sup> SHIP MOUNT-AGUE RELATING TO TELLICHEBBY FACTORY.

We dispatched the Ship Duke Capt. Thomas Hindman Commander to Ben- Paraph. 7.  
coolen the 23<sup>d</sup>. of May last, & she sailed the 25<sup>th</sup>. of that month w<sup>th</sup>. Orders to be sent from thence to Benjar for a loding of Pepper, & we have great reason to expect Success, our Supercargoes of Ship Prince of Wales having opened a Trade there.

However We have thought it necessary in case by any Turn of Affairs a 8  
Cargo is not procurable at Borneo, to direct our Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Malborough to consign the Ship Duke to our Chief & Council at Tellicherry in order to be dispatched home from thence, we having given the needfull Orders to Tellicherry for that purpose, as <sup>¶</sup> Copy of our Letter enclosed.

In the advices before Us an unwillingness is shewn to be concerned w<sup>th</sup>. us 10  
in such a Voyage, Viz. a China Voyage but the main reason arises from the Embargo that the Government has lain on all our ships upon the Differences arisen w<sup>th</sup>. Spain whereby the Wages of Seamen are very much raised, the Amount whereof would considerably Diminish the profits on a Country Voyage and therefore we now proceed to give directions in what manner the Royall Guardian is to be disposed of.

The Commander is ordered to touch first at Anjengo, also, at Tellicherry that 11  
he may take under his Convoy such Country ships as are ready to proceed up the Coast, as <sup>¶</sup> Copy of our Letter to that Settlement, & the Cap<sup>ts</sup>. instructions enclosed.

The Royall Guardian must be filled up with Sandall wood & Pepper at Telli- Part of the  
cherry. 13<sup>th</sup>

The Commanders or officers of our Ships shall not be permitted to bring out 23<sup>d</sup>  
Fire Arms as bad consequences may attend the same.

Under this head the Calculate of Quick Stock is said to be drawn in the most exact manner, & the Late President & Council say they are at a Loss to know in what respect it is faulty; and put us on pointing out the mistakes. In answer thereto we laid down a plain Rule in our Letter by the Resolution, & had it been but Carefully read, we cannot see what clearer Terms could have been made use of, in order to prevent errors, whereas to mention only one grand Omision tho' many might be recited, The Stores remaining at Bombay are surely part of our Estate, & although amounted to Rupees four hundred, fifty two thousand one hundred & Seventy six, twenty reas on the 31<sup>t</sup>. of July 1738, & the Nassau and Onslows were afterwards received, yet so materiall an Article is not inserted in the Calculate sent us by the Onslow.

But that we may have this important Affair set in a True light annually in future, We shall expliciteley lay before you in what manner it must be drawn out Viz<sup>t</sup>.

And as Tellicherry & Anjengo are at such a Distance, they must transmit directly to us by the Ships that call there, a Calculate of their Quick Stock drawn out in like manner; and the Accounts must be signed by the whole Council at each Settlement.

We are not acquainted what Pepper was in Warehouse or contracted for at Tellicherry on the President's Departure the 7<sup>th</sup>. March, which was five Weeks after the Nassau came from thence, & at a time when the New Crop was gathering, so material a Point should have been imparted, as your advices might reasonably be expected to reach us before our ships sailed, nor is one word said how the Market stood affected as to any Article of Goods whatever either Europe or Indian.

Should your touching at Callicutt prove likewise impracticable You will still be able to touch at Anjengo, where you are to deliver the Consignment aforesaid w<sup>th</sup>. the Packets directed both to Tellicherry & Anjengo.

The foregoing is Duplicate of our last, since which your Letter of the 28<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo we receiv'd the 15<sup>th</sup>. instant, with one from the Presidency of Fort St. George, Duplicate of which we rece'd here last May.

You will perceive by our former Letter we have already given your Settlement Credit for the Teak plank, as the Callicut Linguister sent us the am<sup>t</sup>. of its Cost & Charges; We will likewise comply in crediting you for the amount [*sic*] of Twenty Rupees, One Quarter, Twenty Raes, the Expence of the Balloon, & this Pattamar as you desire.

It is a great satisfaction to Us, to hear you have prevented the approaching designs of your Neighbours, on our Honble Master's priviledges and we heartily wish it was as much in our power to hinder those near us, but to our great mortification the King will not strike a stroke, & seems to resign all to his Enemies.

By private advices from Madrass the 7<sup>th</sup>. Instant we hear of the arrival of the Princess of Wales, who left England the 25<sup>th</sup>. Jan'ry in company w<sup>th</sup>. the Wilmington Winchester, Mountague & Bedford, and who brings news of a War's being declared with Spain, but the French as yet were Neuter.

I have received your Worship's and &c<sup>a</sup>. Gentlemen's Order for to proceed to the Assistance of Anjengo Factory by the first Conveyance; I should heartily comply w<sup>th</sup>. your Worships &c<sup>a</sup>. Gentlemen's Order if I was in health capable to proceed, & none would be more ready to obey, But as I am much afflicted with the sickness I formerly had upon me I cannot.

On the time of hot season at Anjengo, Months, February, March, & April my Distemper began to break out upon me; as I found that no body there to give me any relief, I desired his Worship Cha<sup>s</sup>. Whitehill Esq<sup>r</sup>. that I may proceed to Tellicherry; as I have met with a fatteagueing [*sic*] Voyage against Wind & Tide, in an open Boat, exposed to Sun & rain, it encreased ever more & more upon me, & put me into a great Fever.

When I found the sickness so much encreased, I sent for the Doctor who formerly had me in cure, & am under his Care these two months, which I find my self some what better—if I should now stir before I have well recovered my health, & be relapsed it may chance carry me to my Grave.

I do humbly beg that your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. Gentlemen will pity the condition I am under & likewise beg that I may stay to undergo the Course of Physick, w<sup>ch</sup>. I am now taking; If the Almighty God by his bountifull Goodness, will be pleased to recover me of this my sickness, none will be more ready to obey your Worship's & c<sup>a</sup>. Gentlemen's Order and Commands. I am

The Dutch wait for a superiour force to be sent them this Year to what they had last & design by all accounts to begin w<sup>th</sup>. Attinga early in the season, The consequence of w<sup>ch</sup>. will of course to our great concern make this Settlement of Little service to our Hoñble Masters.

This method I hope you will approve of as I had no Orders to deliver the money to any particular Person.

I have made inquiry in relation to purchasing the small Quantity of Pepper that is in this place, but as the Terms the Merchants insist upon are not so agreeable as I could wish for, I have not yet made any Agreement w<sup>th</sup>. them; They are now consulting about it, & if I can do any thing w<sup>th</sup>. them, I will advise you before I leave this Place w<sup>ch</sup>. shall be as soon as there is any appearance of good Weather.

Sirs

The Mary carried our last to you under the 14<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo and on the 29<sup>th</sup>. We received yours of the 25<sup>th</sup>. June.

Our Hoñble Masters Ship the Warwick being now under Dispatch for Great Brittain, we have thought it expedient to send the Rose Galley in her company to your Port, as well for the greater security of that Ship, as to carry the several Stores &c<sup>a</sup>. wanted for the Service of your Settlement, & that of Anjengo which the Warwick through being fully Loaded from hence was not able to take in.

The Galley after Landing the Consignment to you (in which We recommend all possible dispatch) is to proceed directly to Anjengo, and the Gentlemen will have Directions to use the utmost speed for expediting her return to you where we would have her detained untill the arrival of any of our Honourable Masters Ships designed hither. But should the Royall Guardian be the first that reaches you (as in all probability she will) any advices or Information you may receive, it is likely the Prince William or some other of their ships from the Bay will arrive early, on this Coast, in such case we leave it to your Discretion to Delay their Departure in Order for their proceeding up in Company with her, which would be the more pleasing to Us both in regard to their mutual safety, as that from the great Armament Sambajee Angria is preparing & the smallness of our present marine Force, we shall be but ill able to spare any Part for such frequent service of Convoy.

We have fully considered your last Advices and perused the several Letters that passed betwixt you and the French of Myhie, from all which together with the Presidents knowledge and information of that Part of the Country, we cannot but think their Hoisting their Colours so near your Limits, and on a spot to w<sup>ch</sup>. We have a title, a plain & Direct Insult, and therefore you acted right to remove them by Force, and it is but too evident, that the French Designs, & Procedure of Late have been entirely levelled at Depriving our Honourable Masters of their share in the Pepper Trade, We highly approve of your Vigilance & Care for frustrating the Attempts of those your encroach<sup>g</sup>. Neighbours.

It is greatly pleasing to Us, the good Terms you are on w<sup>th</sup>. the Neighbouring Powers, & that the King of Cotiote so readily assisted you in the late Dispute w<sup>th</sup>. the French, w<sup>ch</sup>. is a Disposition we must improve the inculcating w<sup>th</sup>. all round you, for tho' we have not hitherto any certain News of War between our Nation and France, yet from many concurring circumstances it seems unavoidable, & on such an Event, our Hoñble Masters Interest may be greatly advantaged by so general a Union, as indeed the French will by their Conduct, render it necessary, that they or we leave your Part of the Coast.

On the Mary we sent you Eighty thousand Rupees, and by this opportunity we consign a further Supply of one hundred and Fifty thousand equally Divided between the two Vessels, as  $\text{₹}$  their respective Invoices & Bills of Lading, w<sup>ch</sup>. we esteem a sufficiency for your Probable Demands.

The Stores you will receive by this occasion, are to the Extent our own necessities will admit, we being at present through the Non arrival of our ships from England of all kinds extremely bare. Your Indent for Gun Powder is complied with on the Warwick, but with a smaller Proportion of Europe & as this last is an Article difficult to procure in India, & of which we are not fully supplied from home, we must enjoin the greatest care in its use.

Whatever money the late President and Mr. Clealand may pay into your Cash, we permit you to grant them Bills on the Hoñble the Court of Directors for at the  
s d  
rate of Two Shilling & five pence (2. 5)  $\text{₹}$  Rupee, and to give the Commander Certificates for any Sum you may receive of him.

As keeping the Royall Guardian, for the other expected Ships, may be attended with Inconveniencies, by retarding her Dispatch to England, We would not therefore have the Vessels detained longer than the 1<sup>t</sup>. of December, & apprehend they will be of Sufficient Force to oppose the Enemy.

We have ordered the Chief Force of our Fleet to proceed w<sup>th</sup>. this Ship as low as Geereah, & should the Enemy's Vessels not be in Port, the Tryal sloop is to accompany her to your Port, for a further additional strength, but if he still remains in harbour our first design will be pursued, & the other Vessels return hither.

We now enclose an Indent for some Coir Rope w<sup>ch</sup>. we would have provided, & of w<sup>ch</sup>. we are much in want also one for Masts; & we now send down a Person who is esteem'd a Competent Judge, of their goodness, and therefore would have you permit him to survey any you may be about to purchase, & whatever Directions he may give for the Cutting the heel, or otherways bringing them into proper shape and size for our use, we would have you let be done, But if none are procureable, then return him hither by the first opportunity.

Should the Rose be capable of taking in any Top Masts, Lade such as she can conveniently Bring, & send on her exclusive of the Coir Rope, such a Quantity of Laccadiva Coir, as she can without incumberance carry.

Your Commands of the 14<sup>th</sup>. came to hand yesterday noon, & Agreeable there- to I have given Francisco Dias Directions to procure all the Laccadivia Coir he possibly can on the hoñble Companys Account also to enquire after, & secure the Pepper you have Notice is Brought to this place from Boyanores Country as also what Quantity is attainable to the Southward.

Also the Teak Plank for Bombay is reeady [*sic*] & Ten Beety (& the 15 wanting to compleat the Indent will be procured by return of the Rose Galley) Three hundred Lances, One hundred Twenty five sponge Staffs, fifeteen maunds of Candles, Fifty Candys Coir Cordage & Coir sufficient for thirty Candies more, which compleats the

first Indent; But the Linguist informs me he has not as yet been able to procure any Coir for beginning upon the Last tho' there is now in the place 25 Candies of coarse Lacadivia Coir, w<sup>h</sup>. I have ordered him to secure.

Cap<sup>t</sup>. Beck informs me he believes the Rose Galley & his Vessell will be able to carry up what may [*sic*] ready for Bombay; In order to w<sup>ch</sup>. he proposes taking on Board the major part of the Cordage, & as much plank &c. as she can carry, having regard to keeping his Vessel in a proper posture of Defence; The sea has run so high ever since I have been here that it is impossible to send any thing off.

I waited on the Samorine the 15<sup>th</sup>. & delivered him the Chiefs Letter w<sup>th</sup>. a Present consisting of two hundred Rupees, & two pieces of silk value 70 more; I excused in a proper manner the Chiefs not visiting him, & told him I was sent to recover the Companys Debt, and to treat with him about some affairs, w<sup>h</sup>. w<sup>d</sup>. be for the Benefit of his Country; relating to w<sup>h</sup>. he referred me to his ministers, & then I took my Leave, but as Mangett Achem the head minister w<sup>th</sup>.out whom nothing can be done, was not Present at y<sup>e</sup>. Palace, I was obliged to send the Linguister thither yesterday, for endeavou<sup>r</sup>s. to bring him & the other ministers to y<sup>e</sup>. Factory. The former excused himself as being out of order, & desired the Linguist might go to him this day, w<sup>h</sup>. he will do accordingly & I hope to morrow I shall be able to come to a thorough knowledge how far I may succeed in the points recommended to me.

Your favour of the 18<sup>th</sup>. came to hand this morn<sup>g</sup>. w<sup>th</sup>. the Generall Letter and a Packet for Madrass. The latter I delivered to the Linguist, & told him what you mention relating to the Pattamar.

Yesterday even<sup>g</sup>. one of the Samorine's chief ministers & Secretary of State &c<sup>a</sup>. came to the Factory to peruse the Accounts; The several payments since the adjustment in April 1728 agreeing, I proposed forewith [*sic*] to settle the Interest on the respective Olas, separately, accord<sup>g</sup>. to their Dates, and not on y<sup>e</sup>. whole amount, w<sup>h</sup>. method they owned to be reasonable, but declared they could not adjust the account in that manner, w<sup>th</sup>.out express Orders from the Samorine, who was gone to Tellicherry Ellidu's (2<sup>d</sup>. minister) house, about 2 Leag<sup>s</sup>. distant hence, & w<sup>d</sup>. return again this Even<sup>g</sup>. I expressed a great Deal of uneasiness at being detained here so long & nothing done; They promised to return tomorrow without Fail.

I presume Sir you will easily conceive the irksome situation I am in as I am obliged to continue here untill the business I am sent upon is brought into some sort of shape, & at y<sup>e</sup>. same time knowing how absolutely necessary my speed return to Tellicherry is.

This goes by the Calcutta Grab Cap<sup>t</sup>. John Beck, on w<sup>ch</sup>. agreeable to your Orders, I have Laden on Board as much of the hoñble Companys Goods as he informs me, he can conveniently receive having regard to keeping his Vessel in a proper Posture of Defence, whose Receipt for the same is enclosed, but their Cost I cannot transmit now, the Linguist being continually taken up w<sup>th</sup>. the Samorine's Ministers.

Yesterday in the Even<sup>g</sup>. came to the Factory Parambee Secretary of State & the Governour of this place, with some other of the Samorine's ministers in Order to settle Accounts; on perusal of w<sup>ch</sup>. tis found that the Sum of Five hundred Fifty nine thousand, three hundred Ninety nine Fanams five Tar, w<sup>ch</sup>. he has paid since the last Adjustment in the year 1728, near clears the three first Periods, amounting to Four hundred thousand fanams w<sup>th</sup>. Interest due thereon; The remaining two am<sup>s</sup>. to Two hundred sixty eight thousand one hundred Twenty two fanams, four Tar by what I can perceive they aim to pay no Interest on, but only the Principall and indeed hinted with some Warmth that if we insisted on making up the Account in the former manner it w<sup>d</sup>. be so great a Burthen to The Samorine that would hardly ever be able to Discharge the same.

I expressed a great Surprize at their pretending to Cavil, alledgeing that most of them assisted when the manner of Discharging this Debt was (was) agreed upon, & withall told them that I had not power to Deviate therefrom nor any reason to believe you would.

In fine Gentlemen after many Arguments on both sides, they Departed, promising to relate to the Samorine what passed, & communicate his answer this day but have failed therein, sending word that as Manget Achem did not come to the Palace, they were obliged to defer it untill tomorrow.

Touching the other Affair, I do not find the Samorine, averse to it, but with all seems to Insinuate it will prove very beneficial to the hoñble Company, & should he acquiesce, tis presumed he will expect something favourable will be granted him on making up the Accounts, of all w<sup>h</sup>. tomorrow I hope shall be able to inform you.

I Beg leave to assure you Gentlemen that my continuance here so long, & without being able to bring matters to any manner of Issue, has unavoidably been owing to sundry intervening circumstances, w<sup>ch</sup>. I shall on my return give you a full account of it & hasten it all in my power being w<sup>th</sup>. Respect

GENTLEMEN

I arrived here no sooner than the 10<sup>th</sup>. Inst. being obliged to proceed by Land from Bassalore by reason of Angria's & Sevajee's Vessels bring out upon (upon) the Cruize, & here has lain twelve Gallivats of the formers for several days off the mouth of this Bar, waiting for joining some Grabs that are shortly expected down.

The Passage from hence to Goa by Land is now become very Precarious from the Morattas having posted themselves in several parts of the Sundry Rajahs Country adjacent to that place, & all persons are examind if they carry Letters or any thing of Bulk about them, however I hope in a few days a Conveyance will offer to Bombay by a Shybar belonging to that place when I will Dispatch your pakett to the hoñble President & Council.

The report that has been spread abroad for some time past of there being arrived at Goa four of the hoñble Companys ships, & four from Portugal, I Believe is entirely false, & groundless, for yesterday arrived here a Christian fellow from Goa in Six days who assures me to the Contrary, & only says that they are in Expectation that three or four of their Ships will arrive there some time this Season.

Hur Comity has promised me that the two hundred Candies of Pepper shall be embarked immediately on the Arrival of any of the hoñble Company's Vessels from Bombay but from what I can learn elsewhere, I fear it will be some time before he can Deliver the three hundred Candies; However I hope for the Best, & shall duely obey any commands I may receive from Bombay in relation thereto.

I am inform'd that the King of Bedinure has sent Raganaut, & another head Officer w<sup>th</sup>. a considerable Force to repel that of Belchare Brama whose Country lies in the Mountains opposite to Bassalore, & by reason of its situation is extremely difficult to enter; It is said he has taken into his pay four thousand Morattas horse, & foot, & in a late Battle have made terrible slaughter of the King of Bidinures Forces, who is endeavouring to bring the Morattas over to his side, w<sup>h</sup>. if he can accomplish it is thought. he will be able to drive Belchare Brama out of his Country.

The above are all the Advices I know of at present, but when any thing further offers I shall Duely inform you & now beg Leave to subscribe myself.

OUR CHIEF AND COUNCIL  
AT TELlichERRY.

1. The Ship Wilmington arrived the 8<sup>th</sup>. Aprill & brought us the advices from your place dated the 15<sup>th</sup>. March 1737, & 9<sup>th</sup>. June 1738; The Ship Hallifax arrived two Days before.

2. By the Wilmington We received a Letter from the Supra Cargoes of our Ship Prince of Wales dated at Tattas the 19<sup>th</sup>. June 1738, wherein they acquaint us that a Trade was opened at Benjar, so that we have Consigned the Ship Duke, Burthen 490 Tons Cap<sup>t</sup>. Tho<sup>s</sup>. Hindman Commander, to our Deputy Govern<sup>r</sup>. & Council at Fort Marlborough ordering them to send her to Benjar for a Loading of Pepper, and we have no reason to doubt of their obtaining one, however if contrary to our Expectation it should so happen by any turn of Affairs, that they have no reasonable Prospect of procuring a full Loading at Benjar, they are directed to get what Pepper they can, and then to Dispatch the Duke in due time to you, with the remaining treasure and Lead that we have put on Board.

3. On their so doing We direct that you fill her up with Pepper and Dispatch her home to us without Loss of time.

4. We perceive with pleasure by the Advices before us that two thousand, six hundred, sixty four Candy of Pepper were in Warehouse the 1<sup>t</sup>. of June & that our late Chief and Council had a Prospect of making up their stock Three thousand two hundred & Ninety Candy by the September following; By the Ship Harrington we strenuously recommended it to you to secure all the pepper possible, so that we have reason to expect you will have a large Quantity on hand upon this Ships Arrival, & in case such measures can be concerted with the French, as will effectually prevent the Price rising upon us, & at the same time a due proportion be secured for our Account, we shall esteem it a Politick Step, provided due care is taken that you are not Deceived by them.

5. We have taken up the Ship Royall Guardian Burthen 490 Tons, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Henry Hoadly Commander, for the Mallabar Coast, Bombay & China, She is to be in the Downs the 12<sup>th</sup>. June, and will be dispatched about that time.

6. Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hindman has borrowed of us Three thousand Pounds at Respondentia, His Chief & Second Mate are bound with him for payment of the same, however in case of his Death, & the ships coming your way, You must see that his Effects are not embezelled, they being Assigned over to us as a security & if he offers to pay any part of the Produce of his Outward bound Adventure into your Cash, you must receive the sam [sic] & Grant Certificates for the Amount.

7. 1. Our last was Dated the 23<sup>d</sup>. May 1739 by the Ship Duke; Via Bencoolen, and she sailed out of the Downs the 25<sup>th</sup>. of that month; Copy of our said Letter is enclosed; The ships arrived us in safety since that time are inserted in the accompanying List.

2. By the King William and Onslow we received the Advices from your Place of the 30<sup>th</sup>. Sep<sup>r</sup>. and 23<sup>d</sup>. December last.

3. This comes by our ship Royall Guardian Cap<sup>t</sup>. Henry Hoadly Commander who is consigned to Bombay, but ordered first to touch at Tellicherry.

4. We have put on Board sundry Goods & Merchandize, an Account whereof you have in an Abstract of the Invoice enclosed; In case you stand in need of any particular, Demand them of the Cap<sup>tn</sup>. who is ordered to deliver them on your so doing, but be sure to give an Exact Account of the same to Bombay.

5. The Royall Guardian's stay at Tellicherry must not exceed three days & the Commander is Ordered to take under his Convoy such English Countrey Ships or Vessels as are ready to proceed up the Mallabar Coast, whereof you will do well in giving them previous notice that so they may reap the Benefit,

This Ship is to be sent from Bombay to Canton, and returned to us, directly from thence & Sandall Wood being a proper Article for the Canton Market, you must secure for us all that is possible against her return from Bombay to Telli-cherry in her way to China, & we propose that she be filled up with Pepper at your place, so that provision must be made accordingly giving an Account to Bombay of the quantity you have reason to think will be ready.

In case this ship should have a long Passage, and not arrive with you in time to go up to Bombay & return in time to save her Passage to Canton whereof you will be able to judge. We direct that you take on shore all her Europe Cargoe, and land the Military at your place & Load on board her a Cargoe of Pepper & sandall wood upon our Account, with so much Bullion as shall make her Cargoe amount to Two hundred and Forty thousand Rupees, and consign the same by Invoice and Bill of Lading to such Supra-Cargoes as We shall appoint to take charge thereof, by our Ships bound to Canton this ensuing season, and give the Commander Sailing Orders accordingly—

Whether France may intermedle in the present Quarrels is as yet not known, but greatly to be apprehended.

So that you must be on your Guard, & take all proper previous Measures for the Security of our Settlement, Estate & Shipping in case a War should break out between us & France, & our ships must be ordered to keep company homeward bound.

SIRS

We have not received to this time any other Letters from you than what mentioned in our Last ¶ Warwick And as it is of the highest importance to be early informed of the Situation of your Settlement. which from the involv'd state you were then in creates the more Anxiety. We therefore now Dispatch a Light Boat, as well to carry some directions w<sup>th</sup>. regard to the designed Ships to this Port, & to give you an opportunity of transmitting such Advices as you may have to communicate, & the Boat to be then instantly returned.

We have had recourse to our Orders for detain'g the Royall Guardian (who we imagine will be the first that arrives, and Rose Galley until the 1<sup>t</sup>. December; But as from the present Conjunction of Affairs, & the absence of our Enemy Sambajee Angria, who is now gone up to the Sou Rajah, where it is likely he may stay some time, and that even should he return the Equipment of his Fleet will by that means be somewhat longer delay'd, We think the prenamed Vessels may be directed on receipt hereof to proceed immediately hither, but with this Precaution that they keep a good distance to Sea from any of the Enemy's Ports.

It then remains to provide for the security of our hoñible Master's Ship Prince William expected from the other Coast and here we must acquaint you that we have a report of the Arrival of Five ships at Madrass said to have left England in April (the certainty of which we cannot Vouch). In such case it is natural to conclude that the Embargo laid on shipping on Account of the Press for men having ceased, those designed for here will have sail'd at the same time, and thro' their Late Departure may be obliged to come the outward Passage, & in their way call at your Port. Should this be the Event her safety will be fully secured, but tho' this is uncertain, we yet think that she joined with the Bengall & Madrass private Ships, some of which may arrive in company with her will be sufficient to Cope with any Force that may attempt to oppose them; However as you undoubtedly from the Advices you may receive will be the best Judges in this matter we shall leave it entirely to your Discretion to give such Orders as you may judge proper both in regard to this Point, as well as the Rose, and Royall Guardian, not Doubting but you will Consult the most Cautious methods for prevention of any Accident.

In the Invoice by the Warwick, Sixty Four Barrels Country Gun Powder at sixteen Rupees and Fifty raes, each is said to amount to Rupees one hundred and Twenty nine, but should have been one thousand and thirty two; the Difference being nine hundred and three Rupees makes the Total one hundred Fifty six thousand three hundred, thirteen Rupees, Two quarters and one rae, which you are therefore to take notice of.

my body, occasion[ed] I believe by the long Fever I had which I am in hopes will mend every Day, whence according to I now return M<sup>r</sup>. Garden to you, as he may possibly be detained here for a long time in case any of the Enemy's Vessels, who are very numerous hereabouts, should arrive before he gets away.

My last was ☿ Pattamar on the 20<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, since which time I have not heard any thing from Bombay nor can I learn any thing further about the War the King of Beddinure is engaged in with Brama than that about fifteen days past there was a very severe Battle between them, when after a sharp Engagement for some hours the King of Beddinures Forces made those of Brama's retire, & about the same time catching some Spies in the Canarees Camp, they were ordered to be bound each of them to a Cannon & blown to pieces with powder. This I was told by a Person then at Beddinure, and is all I have to acquaint you with at present so beg leave to subscribe myself

Hur Comity is continually complaining to me of the inconveniency he suffers for want of the rest of the money for the Pepper he contracted with me for in April last, whence from his Sollicitations or rather begging, I have at last consented to let him have three thousand Rupees, which I hope you will approve of. The Pepper I know is ready to be embarked at any time, but I assure you he shall not have another Rupee till it be Delivered.

I have learned no further news in relation to the Warr mentioned in my last of the 15<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. save that the King of Beddinure has recalled Raganut from the Post he was lately advanced to tho' for what reasons I cannot tell. He has sent Embassadors this season with rich presents, to Angria, the Sevajees & c<sup>a</sup>. Pirates, and the Masts mentioned in the Postscript of my Letter to the Governour & Council have been long since carried away.

A few days passed by this place four large Ships to the Northward without any small Vessels with them, which according to Advices, I believe are four Dutch Ships bound to Surat & Persia.

As I have nothing further to trouble you with at present, shall only beg leave to subscribe myself

We return you thanks for your Advice of the several Ships importing on your Coast from these parts; Also your care of the Success Brigantine belonging to this place.

Our hoñble Masters ships imported here this Year from Europe are, the Princess of Wales, Princess Louisa, Hardwicke & Heathcoate, & we hear the Dorrington was forced to bear up for Madrass, thro' the Sickness of her people, & arrived there the 24<sup>th</sup>. Septem<sup>r</sup>. The Cæsar we have yet no news of.

The Wilmington was Dispatched from Madrass to Europe the 5<sup>th</sup>. Septem<sup>r</sup>. & the Gentlemen there hoped to send away the Colchester within that month.



I have several times made enquiry about purchasing Pepper in this place, but now a days here is no body who deals in that Commodity but, Hur Comity, who buys up all that is to be had as far as Batacoly southward, & as far as the Carnatick Governm<sup>t</sup>. extends to the Northward, nor is there a Man belonging to this place as I know of that has a Candy to dispose of besides himself, & as he rents the exportation of it of the King, he has lately, & can at any time impede a Grain being sold even in a retail manner.

I have lately heard that there is a Cessation of Arms, between the King of Beddinure & his present Adversary Brama but what they are consulting of I cannot

tell. Angria's &c<sup>a</sup>. Vessels are very numerous about this place, & have been so for some time past, which is all the news I have at present so shall only subscribe myself.

As we have not had any ships call here to give us an opportunity of sending our Books of Acc<sup>ts</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. up to the President & Council of Bombay, we now send them by Emelia Sloop, w<sup>th</sup>. our Packett, w<sup>ch</sup>. you'll please to forward by the first good conveyance bound up the Coast, & return the Emelia sloop to us again.

The Dutch having prevented our Shipping off our Hoñble Masters Goods at Coletche by giving their Fleet possitive orders to seize all Vessels bound to any Ports in Travencore, gives us a good deal of perplexity in getting the Investment up, & we are now obliged to try to bring them to Brinjohn, from whence there will be a risque in bringing them here. These unanswerable proceedings against our Nation is extream shocking for us to brook, but our Condition enables us to do nothing more than writë & protest against them for all the Losses, Damages & Insults we receive from them. They now openly declare against us & tell us our Grants & Priviledges are illegal as the Government here had had first given the Trade of their Country to their noble Company, & that nothing else than the totall abandoning our Trade will oblige them to be our Friends.

In a few days we are to expect the Commodore of Cochin & all their forces this way; He gives out he intends for Coletche, & to land there, but we believe Attinga will receive their first fury, when you may easily judge what short Limits we shall be reduced to. In short this Settlement will be wholly Depriv'd of its Priviledges, & made of no use to our Honble Masters, if they cannot redress themselves by Force as indeed we presume there is such an appearance that the Pepper Trade can by no other means be preserved any where.

lost Company within a Gale of Wind since she left the Cape; As this ship will stay a couple of Days here to fill a little Water, & likely may call at Cochin for some Provisions, an early Advice of her Arrival may be of some service, & should there fortunately be an opportunity of any Boat going up the Coast, we think it our Duty to send this as you can advise the Presidency, who no Doubt are truly uneasy at not hearing of the ships by this Time. SIRS,

The accompanying was intended to have been sent by these Ships the 29<sup>th</sup>. Ult<sup>o</sup>. when they were to have sailed, but from the intelligence then rec<sup>d</sup>. of our Enemy Sambajee Angria's preparations & Designs, we were induc'd to delay their Departure & order the Royall Guardian in consort with our Vessels to cruize a Certain limited time, from which they return'd the 7<sup>th</sup>. Inst, in company with the Princess Louisa, Hertford Prince Edward & Poultney.

We now Dispatch the Mountague & Royall Guardian with the Calcutta Grab, & Prince of Wales Galley, the Latter of whom you may Detain till a Competent force joins for consorting hither.

In our last tis said that we are Doubtfull whether the Quantity of Salt Petre Laden on the Royall Guardian was to be reckoned into her Charter Party Tonnage but the Commander having since by an Instrument sign'd on the part of his Owners declared the same shall be on the Terms of low Freight, and therefore to be esteemed, exclusive thereof, so much the more Pepper will be wanted for compleatly filling her up which we mention for your Notice.

We have Directed the Ships to call at Onore for the Delivery of the Treasure to M<sup>r</sup>. Purnell, and have Limited their stay not to exceed four Days & therefore have given Discretionary Orders for the whole or such part of the Pepper lying there to be put on board as can be sent off within that time, of all which you will receive from him the necessary Information.

Our Gentlemen at Anjengo have by their Advices Seven hundred & fifty three Candies of Pepper in Warehouse, & make no Doubt but 5000 Pieces of Cloth would also be ready by January; As we cannot certainly know how long these ships may be in their passage or what time they may be necessitated to remain at your port, we resolved to leave entirely to your Determination, whither to Order their Proceeding thither for taking on board those goods or to give them their Ultimate Dispatch directly from you, in which we recommend you principally consult the point of time and the certainty of their afterwards gaining their Passage, which we would by no means have risqued or endangered, as it would be preferable the Goods remain at Anjengo, than their calling should be attended with such a Consequence.

The reasons & motives Deduced in your consultation of 26. Novem<sup>r</sup>. for affording the Prince assistance of rice & money appear to us very Cogent, & it seems to be the only measure that could be pursued in the then situation of the neighbouring Princes for securing to our Honble Master's a proper share in their produce of Pepper, we have but this to add, that our Honble Masters frequently Express their Dislike of heavy expences, it must be your care to see a stop put to this Charge, when it can with prudence be Effectuated & in the Interim we hope it may be kept within the sum specify'd; Let Copy of your said Consultation be transmitted home on these ships & in your Advices be very full & Clear with regard to the necessity there was for that Resolution.

Our Hoñble Masters in their Last Commands advise us of their Intentions to send a ship for China this season, we would have you take the Proper time for purchasing three hundred Candies of Sandall wood; if that bought last season is not Disposed of what remains, may be taken as part of this intended provision.

You must order half the Quantity of Cardamoms designed this year for England to be Laden on the Royall Guardian & the remainder to be hereafter sent on the Princess Louisa.

Having been dissappointed of sending Cotton on the Royall Guardian for to be sent Down to Bengall by the Calcutta Grab, you will receive the requisite Number of Bales on the Princess Louisa.

The Calcutta Grab has been supplied with Provisions for one Syrang one Tindal a Carpenter, five Topasses and Fourteen Lascars for Four months commenc<sup>s</sup>. from the 29<sup>th</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. the Master & Mate have been paid Diet money for the like time, the Former at Twenty nine Rupees & the Latter fifteen  $\text{₹}$  Month; the master has also received an Advance, of one months pay being Fifty four Rupees.

On board the Royall Guardian are Seven Six Pounder Guns for Anjengo, which should she not proceed thither must be rec<sup>d</sup>. by you, & if the Calcutta Grab can carry them, they must be putt on board her or otherwise sent by some future Conveyance.

We would have you by these Shipping Transmitt our Hoñble Masters your Diary & Books of Accounts for last year with all other requisite Papers.

Your several Advices under the 17<sup>th</sup>. & 18 Sep<sup>r</sup>. 9<sup>th</sup>. & 11<sup>th</sup>. November have been already acknowledged receipt of; We shall now proceed to give reply to such points as require our notice.

Our Hoñble Masters ships Royall Guardian and Mountague now in Company proceed from this place, the former is to call at Onore for taking in the Pepper lying there, and for her safety the other has Directions to remain with her while she stays at that Port, and afterwards make the best of her way.

The Gentlemen at Anjengo wanting a large Quantity of Gun Powder to enable them to comply with their Engagements to the King of Travencore, which the Commanders of the Europe ships thought too hazardous to convey in them, and the Calcutta Grab being unfit for this Service, we are indispensibly oblig<sup>d</sup> to return to Bengall, we have directed her sailing in Consort and that she take in the Gun Powder designed for Anjengo, and part of that to your place, as also some Bales of Cotton which goes consigned to you. After compleating her Delivery of what on board for your Factory, she is to go on to Anjengo in Company with the ships from whence she will be again returned, and you may employ her either in bringing rice from Mangulore, or in such other manner as you may think proper, 'till the season for Dispatching her to Bengall when you must reship the parcel of Cotton rec<sup>d</sup>. by her & the Royall Guardian transmitting an Invoice thereof to the President & Council giving the Comm<sup>dr</sup>. Orders for proceeding thither.

We have put on Board the Royall Guardian twenty six thousand Rupees for payment of the three hundred Candies contracted for from hence as also the necessary scales & weights, the whole amount whereof being Rup<sup>s</sup>. 26090 <sup>q<sup>r</sup>. raes</sup> 1 52. We have Debted your Factory for & have directed Mr. Purnell to transmitt the requisite Accounts, that you may include the same in the invoice sent by you, so that the whole of this concern, will by this means appear on your Books.

We particularly notice the whole of your advices on the head of Pepper, & are greatly pleased the Quantity to be in readiness will be so considerable, as well as the likelihood of the ensuing Crop being equal to the former & that should the War between the French & Boyanore not be ended in all Febr<sup>y</sup>, you might have an opportunity of procuring what produced in his Country, which are mentioned as inducements to our Supply of Cash; we have therefore resolved on a Sum of One hundred & Sixty thousand Rupees, but as there is not at present Equal to that Amount in the Treasury of new Rupees you now only receive in part thereof Rup<sup>s</sup>. 120000 & the rem<sup>dr</sup>. hereafter. We doubt not of your best Endeavours being exerted on every occasion tending to encrease your Stock of that Commodity, w<sup>ch</sup>. you may be assured nothing can be more agreeable to our Hoñble Employers.

The raising a small Work at Andola for the reasons alledged, and as you represent the same to be absolutely necessary we must therefore approve, but it must be your care to see that the Expence if possible does not exceed the Bounds Calculated.

We shall be glad to find the Person you intend to send to Penany may be able to adjust & obtain & a clearance of our depending Accounts with the Samorine, & w<sup>th</sup>. regard to procuring from him a Liberty for hoisting our Colours at Cota, & keeping a Topass Servant there; if it will be of any Service to secure the free Passage of that River or other Benefit may acruce therefrom & that it can be attained without any considerable Expence, you have our permission to put in Execution the Design.

The Chief having in his private Letter to the President requested Liberty to remitt home a Sum by Bill on the Hoñble Court of Directors, & the Attorneys of some other of the Gentlemen requesting a Like favour, we have agreed to give you a General License in future to draw on them at the rate of 2. 5. <sup>s. d.</sup> ʒ Rupee for such an amount as your Occasions may require Oath being made, that it is on your own proper Accounts.

By the Calculate enclosed you will perceive the Quantity of Tonnage now on Board the Royall Guardian to which is to be added the Pepper she may take in at Onore & as she has so large a proportion of Salt Petre as specified which we are uncertain whether our Hoñble Masters may reckon into Charter Tonnage, the Commander will probably be willing to have so much the more Pepper, & provided he in writing expressly declares the same shall be on the Terms of half Freight you are to let him have what he desires. The rem<sup>dr</sup>. of his Tonnage being designed to be compleated at Anjengo, whereby the last Advices seven hundred Fifty three Candies of Pepper actually was in Warehouse & by the time this Ship reaches 5000 Pieces of Cloth would be in readiness, you must in course transmit hither Copy of the said Calculate, specifying also the increase made at Onore, & as you have a parcel of Onore Pepper now lying by you, it will be proper to cause the same to be included in the Quantity put on board this ship as it may be Stowed with that of the same Growth taken in at Onore.

I never yet could persuade him to keep it in readiness, & instead of which he has sold to my knowledge at several times upwards of a 100 Candies & it has been w<sup>th</sup>. a great deal of trouble I have got the above quantity of him whence I have taken on shore only 4000 ca: M<sup>d</sup>. lb.

Rup<sup>s</sup>. to pay for the 40 : 12. 2. he has delivered more than the 200 Ca<sup>s</sup>. he was indebted as I do not think it the Companys Interest that he should be in their Debt, & more espescially as he has been for a long time & still remains in a very ill state of health. I offered to pay him immediately for the whole three hundred Candies & allow him the Customary freight to Deliver it at Tellicherry in a Month's time but he refus'd it which makes me suspect he has not the Pepper in readiness, or no mind to Deliver it.

I now return the Scales & Weights transmitted me from Bombay the List of which goes enclosed, & pleased to recive of Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hoadly the 160 Empty Bags charg'd in the Invoice.

In case Hur Camoty will not Agree to Deliver the rem<sup>r</sup>. of the Pepper on some terms or other, I shall in a few Days proceed to Mangalore as my staying at Onore any longer will be to no purpose.

The Nottingham brought us your Advices of the 5<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, she in company with the Prince of Wales importing the 23<sup>d</sup>. & we shall by another opportunity reply thereto.

The ship we are unloading with the necessary Expedition & intend to Lade on her about 130 Tons Salt Petre, 30 of Red Wood, Forty four of Bengall piece Goods & after adding 15 priviledge and five for St. Helena, We compute she will require about 900 Candies of Pepper to compleat her Tonnage w<sup>ch</sup>. Quantity we would have you hold in readiness to put on Board, & the Commander is then to be Directed to make the best of his way to Great Britain.

Should the Halifax have touch'd at your Port we Doubt not your Caution to see she came Consorted with a sufficient force to oppose the Enemy; We shall, should she arrive in time instantly dispatch her to Bengall, pursuant to our hoñble Master's Orders, & we must remind you that some Pepper will also be wanted for her.

From the uncertainty of the Godolphin's timely Arrival to save her Passage to China, & that her coming up hither will be a means of retarding her return we would have you on her reaching you fully consider the probability there is of her being able to effect it & afterwards proceed on her destined Voyage, & provided you think the same would be attended with any risque or Dissapointment, you must cause her to be unladed, & We shall hereafter send down such Goods as we have provided in part of her Cargo, & give the necessary Directions thereupon, but you must remember to forward us the quickest Notice of your resolutions in this matter.

We arrived here upon the Winchester the 15<sup>th</sup>. Aug<sup>t</sup>. w<sup>th</sup>. Orders from the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court of Directors to take charge of the Royall Guardian & Dispose of her Mallabar Cargo & set the Europe investment on foot immediately for that ship & the Duke of Dorset, We remained in Daily expectation of the Royall Guardian till the month of Sep<sup>r</sup>. was expired, the Season being the most favourable of any that has been known for ships coming upon the Coast of China but we have no news of her to this day except what a French ship the beginning of October that it was reported at Malacca she was detained at Bombay w<sup>ch</sup>. we cannot tell how to give credit to as your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. or the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry, would certainly have sent us advice if any Accident had happened to detain her, as several ships have arrived this year at Maccao from Surat & the Coast of Mallabar. We rather think by some accident she has been put by her Port.

The Hon<sup>ble</sup> Court of Directors were pleased to acquaint us that they had given Orders to Bombay and Tellicherry to take care that said ship was Dispatched so as to gett off the Mallabar Coast in all the month of April as they should reckon upon her return from hence Directly & take their measures accordingly, & in obedience to their Commands we did (upon the assurances we gave the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. that such a ship would be dispatched to us) secure a proper Cargo for her upon very good terms in the early season, & receiving no Advice that said ship was detain'd we could not answer releasing them from their Contracts, untill they lost the opportunity of disposing of their Goods otherways by w<sup>ch</sup>. the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. are severe Sufferers.

The Princess Emelia arrived here the 1<sup>t</sup>. Sep<sup>r</sup>. she came out of England w<sup>th</sup>. the Duke of Dorset, but parted w<sup>th</sup>. her near the Line, & since We have no news of her.

1. This comes by our Ship Godolphin Cap<sup>t</sup>. Francis Steward Commander who is consigned to Bombay but Ordered first to touch at Tellicherry.

2. We have put on board sundry Goods & Merchandize as <sup>of</sup> Abstract of the Invoice enclosed. In case you stand in need of any Articles the Commander is order'd to deliver them on your demanding the same; Upon so doing be sure to give an exact Account of the Particulars to Bombay.

3. The Godolphin's stay at Tellicherry must not exceed five days & the Commander is ordered to take under his Convoy such English Country Ships or Vessels as are ready to proceed up the Mallabar Coast, whereof you will do well to give them previous Notice that so they may reap the Benefit.

4. This ship is to be sent from Bombay to Canton & return'd to us directly from thence so that you must secure for us all the Sandall Wood that's procurable against her return from Bombay to Tellicherry in her way to China.

5. We propose that the Godolphin shall be fill'd up w<sup>th</sup>. pepper at your place, provision therefore must be made accordingly & also for our other ships by securing all you can without enhancing the Price.

6. We have Detected some Woolen and other Goods which were attempted to be ship'd clandestinely on this ship, however We have reason to suspect that several Illicit Goods are got on Board notwithstanding our utmost Endeavours to prevent the same & therefore on her Breaking Bulk at your place you must make the strictest Enquiry in order to discover them & all private Goods and Merchandize that are not inserted in the Enclosed Copy of her Manifest must be seized and forfeited to our use.

9. Our Yatcht sent in October last as an Advice Boat to St. Helena, Arrived from thence the 16<sup>th</sup>. July; She left the Island the 30<sup>th</sup>. April when the Nine following ships were at that place arriving there at the times undermentioned Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Your several Advices of the 12<sup>th</sup>. Febr̃y, Duplicates of those of the 12<sup>th</sup>. & 15<sup>th</sup>. March (the Express Boat w<sup>ch</sup>. had the Original of the first being taken by the Malivans, & the ship Mary by whom you sent the other is not yet arrived) and that of the 30<sup>th</sup>. are come to hand w<sup>th</sup>. the Packet from our ho<sup>n</sup>ble Masters rec<sup>d</sup>. by the Godolphin.

We are extremely pleased the discretional Orders given from hence w<sup>th</sup>. regard to that ships proceeding up the Coast were so agreeable to our ho<sup>n</sup>ble Masters Sentiments contain'd in their Commands & as the time of her Arrival was certainly too late to admitt of her coming hither w<sup>th</sup>. any probability that she could afterwards return & save her Passage, you acted entirely right in detaining her.

By the Nottingham and Hallifax who now proceed, the one under Dispatch for Great Brittain & the other to Bengall & Madrass we have Laden a parcell of Cotton & some Olibanum the Quantity Cost and Charges of w<sup>ch</sup>. will appear in the Invoices sent you designed to be sent on the Godolphin for the China Market w<sup>ch</sup>.  
ca<sup>s</sup>.

you are accordingly to tranship & put on Board her also the 300 Sandall Wood & more if procureable, but considering your advices & the uncertainty you are under of not being able to procure of the ensuing Crop of Pepper 2000 Candies w<sup>th</sup>. the quantity now remain<sup>g</sup>. & as we know not what ships we may have to provide for the next Season we therefore think you ought not to part w<sup>th</sup>. more to the Godolphin than 400 Can<sup>s</sup>. w<sup>ch</sup>. you're to Lade. After these several Articles are reced you are to add to the Amount in Bullion so much more as will make the ship's Stock 240000 Rupees consigning the same by Invoice & Bill of Lading to the Supra Cargoes in China, & the Commander in his sailing instructions must be ordered to proceed in the manner prescrib'd in our Ho<sup>n</sup>ble Masters Commands to your Settlement.

We some time since gave Directions to provide some Putchuck, Myrrh & Rose Malloes, but the two last were not procureable and it was but lately the Gentlemen at Surat could Contract for any Putchuck; What they may receive we have sent the Gentlemen Orders to consign to you by any ship bound down the Coast, and should it reach you in time, you must see it be put on Board the Godolphin; Our Computation of the Charge & Stock of that Ship we now enclose for your Notice.

The Nottingham has reced certain Goods here in part of her Cargoe, as you will perceive by the Calculate of her Tonnage herewith Transmitted, and what remains you are to make up with Pepper, after w<sup>ch</sup>. you are to give the Commander his final Dispatches for Great Brittain.

We have also sent on these ships 100 Bales of Cotton for the Cargo of the Calcutta Grab for Bengall which you must consign to the President & Council there & at the same time forward to them the Amount Charges of the Vessell while w<sup>th</sup>. you, as we have done of what incurred during her stay here.

We have taken into Consideration the reasons inducing you to consent to a Loan to the Achamars of Randotarra to be repay'd in five years together w<sup>th</sup>. the Ballance before due from them, for the punctual performance whereof they had Mortgag'd the Revenues of their Country, the Situation of w<sup>ch</sup>. being favourable for the Growth of Pepper & from whence large Quantities have been procured, & that a Compliance would Attach them to our Hoñble Masters as well as obedience to the Prince, who it is confessedly our Interest to support, & as the Sum request-ed is design'd to be appropriated for the Cultivation their Lands we may hope the Produce of Pepper will proportionably encrease so we cannot but approve of that Measure.

Our hoñble Masters by the Nottingham sent us a Diamond Ring, w<sup>ch</sup>. they direct should be presented in their Names to Domingo Rodriguez the late Linguister, which we now forward in this Packet & doubt not but this particular mark of their favour will excite his Warmost Zeal in their Service.

As you Represent the want of another assistant to carry on the business of your Factory we approve of your detaining M<sup>r</sup>. Ellis.

The two Prisoners send up for the murder of the Corporal will be proceeded against in due course of Law & their Trial is over the Serjeant & others who came up as Evidences shall according to your Desire be returned to you.

We have by these Conveyances complied as near as possible w<sup>th</sup>. your several Indents, but that referred to in your Letter of the 12<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo No. 5. from the miscarriage that has attended the Boat is not come to hand, & consequently we cannot Judge what you want, but as the referring to Former Indents is not so clear & only tends to Create mistakes, we would have you in future frame your Indents to contain the Quantities then actually wanting; The Pitch & Tar required in that of the 20<sup>th</sup>. of May you may supply yourselves out of what reced from the Godolphin.

And this Leads us to remark that by the Accident of the Boat's being seized we are depriv'd of your Books of Accounts for the last year; We Believe indeed the number of ships on Dispatch from your place lately has greatly increased your Business, & may be some reason why they were not sooner ready but as you are sensible how strict our Hoñble Masters Orders are in this<sup>e</sup> regard we must enjoin you to see they are constantly kept up in future & sent us by the earliest good Conveyance, & we cannot help saying the Transmission had better been deferred as some ships were expected than risked by so precarious an occasion, as thro' this failure we cannot adjust w<sup>th</sup>. your Factory.

For the reasons given in yours of the 12<sup>th</sup>. March for deviating from our Directions with regard to the purchases of Pepper, we must of course submit to, in order to prevent the ill Consequences otherwise to be expected.

We shall suspend our Judgements with regard to the French's Proceedings till we hear what measures those now appointed in the Direction pursue, which we hope will be more steady, & for the Benefit of both Nations.

The insult offer'd you at Mattamy point thro. the Prince's rebellious Subjects ought not to pass w<sup>th</sup>. impunity tho' we are pleased to find that our people behav'd w<sup>th</sup>. such resolution, & you must endeavour at obtaining from the Government, ample justice on the Offenders.

The Expence you have hitherto been obliged to afford the Prince we are glad has been within the Bounds propos'd & can only recommend the same care & Caution, as the sole End of our acquiescing thereto, was to preserve to our hoñble Masters the Benefit of their Trade & doubt not of your Circumspection to make the Charge as small as possible.

We enclose to you two Indents from our Superintendant of the Marine & Land Pay master w<sup>ch</sup>. we would have you comply with.

The Deficiency in the Stores rec<sup>d</sup>. by the Calcutta Grab, we called upon Cap<sup>t</sup>. Jacobs to render an Acc<sup>t</sup>. of; his Answer we now enclose you & as you write he had pass'd Receipts for the several Articles, we must leave the Adjustment to you on the spot, as he takes passage in one of these Ships for Bengall.

The Departure of these Ships having been unavoidably protracted thro' the Intelligence we had of Sambajee's w<sup>ch</sup>. the absence of our Fleet who were detain'd by the Vice Roy of Goa oblig'd us to employ on a Cruize here, and the Rem<sup>dr</sup>. of the Pepper contracted from hence still remaining at Onore. We have sent a Black Person from hence to see the same weigh'd and held in readiness for the Ships, the Amount whereof we have given in charge to Cap<sup>t</sup>. Brown of the Nottingham being Rup<sup>s</sup>. 23000 w<sup>ch</sup>. he is to pay for as he receives, and have Limited his stay there [*lucuna*] Days & of w<sup>ch</sup>. he is to render an Acc<sup>t</sup>. to you that you may Invoice the same & the whole appear on the Books of your Factory.

And here we must acquaint you that on reconsidering the Lateness of the Season, that probably the Hallifax's calling at Anjengo for receiving 600 Can<sup>s</sup>. of Pepper may be attended w<sup>th</sup>. some hazard in her getting afterwards of the Coast we have esteem'd it most eligible to leave to you the filling her up directly or Ordering her thither as the Chief from his knowledge & Experience of that Port must be the best Judge of the practicableness thereof, & tho we should be glad the Pepper were conveyed from thence yet we think it had better remain than subject the ship to apparent Risque, & in case of the Hallifax's being Dispatched from your Port you may as you propose let the Pepper be taken from Callicutt & you must forward Copy of Invoice & Bill of Lading to Madrass as well as Bengall that the President &c<sup>a</sup>. at the former place may if they see proper take ashore any part of the Cargo.

The supply of small Copper Coin you request is not in our power to Comply with as we have none of that Metall being ourselves Destitute of sufficient for the Currency of our own Island.

Mr. George Jenkinson who some time ago proceeded to Byapore for Trying the Experriment of distilling Arrack there, & having produced Samples w<sup>ch</sup>. seem of a good spirit & Flavour, we entered into the enclosed Contract w<sup>th</sup>. him, the performance of which by the Tenour of the Agreement will principally rest upon you on the part of our hoñble Masters w<sup>ch</sup>. you must see duely executed & the Arrack kept up to the Standard of what sent now under Seal, & the Amount of what he Delivers must be paid by you.

The Cardamoms you have rec<sup>d</sup>. may be put on Board the Nottingham & w<sup>th</sup>. regard to the price of that Article as we have no directions from our hoñble Masters, but as to Quantity, we can only recommend your purchasing on the best Terms possible till we receive their further Orders.

Our hoñble Masters having sent us a List of Certain of their Servants who have not executed Covenants & given security since they were writers, among whom are Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Jeynson & West, We send you Covenants enclosed w<sup>ch</sup>. must be executed & return'd the Company & their Friends must give security in England.

After the Nottingham has rec<sup>d</sup> her Tonnage you must put on Board as much more Pepper as the Commander shall Desire he requesting for it in writing & declaring the Freight to be according to the Terms prescribed by our hoñble Masters w<sup>ch</sup>. is half Freight.

The Commander of the Hallifax being willing to leave a large Quantity of Gun Powder as not knowing what may happen on the Coast, we have put on Board ten Barrells w<sup>ch</sup>. are in the Invoice and must be rec<sup>d</sup> by you

Since closure of our Letter under this Date we have considered the lateness of the Season & the unavoidable delay that must attend the ships calling at Onore & therefore we have altered that Design & the [sic] come directly to your Port; The money we had put Board to pay for the Pepper will be delivered you & if you can secure the same from Hur Camoty we would have you do so & Discharge the Am<sup>t</sup>. w<sup>ch</sup>. will save our Hoñble Masters the charge of Interest for tho' we have given a License for its resale, we know not whether it may be Effected.

In our Computation of the Godolphin's stock you will perceive we have reckond the Bullion bought on her at the rate it would produce in our Mint, w<sup>ch</sup>. after adding the Goods now sent makes the Amount something above 240000 but as the Surplus is so small, we don't think it necessary to open the Chests for taking any part out & therefore let the whole of the Treasure be consign'd on her to China.

Reconsidering on the small quantity of Pepper you have hopes of procuring from the present Crop w<sup>th</sup>. the Dissapointment of what we expected at Onore thro' the ships not being in time to proceed there, we direct that you encrease your Purchases either at Callicutt, Mangalore or else where all you possibly can, nor do we think proper to ascertain the price knowing you will perform all that may be in your power for preventing the want of Tonnage next Season, We are not indeed expressly advisd the number of ships to come, but have reason to believe there may be severall. I acknowledge the receipt of your Protest & think it incumbent on me to give  
my reasons here, that in case of mortality this may appear in behalf of myself &  
Owners of the Hallifax.

The Orders I reced from the Gov<sup>r</sup>. & Council of Bbay was to take in so much Cotton as I possibly could reserving room for 600 Candy of Pepper. I was prevailed upon to take in 50 Bales more than I intended imagining I could make some shift to comply w<sup>th</sup>. their Orders, & was desirous to carry all that I possibly could on Acc<sup>t</sup>. of the hoñble Company.

Having no Kentlige Goods I was oblig'd to Ballast w<sup>th</sup>. Bbay Stones, w<sup>ch</sup>. reduc'd the ships Hold to 9 Feet, by w<sup>ch</sup>. I lost a whole Teer of Bales; after I had reced those Orders at Bbay & complied w<sup>th</sup>. them I was order'd to receive Forty six Men, Forty five of w<sup>ch</sup>. were for Anjengo & one for Bengall, w<sup>ch</sup>. oblig'd me to take in an Additional Quantity of Water & Provision to the Am<sup>t</sup>. of 10 Tun & upwards besides Chests & other Baggage.

With the above I did also receive by Order at Bbay a Quantity of Stones &c<sup>a</sup>. the Tonnage of w<sup>ch</sup>. I cannot very well tell as I have no Account of them here ashore, but that they take up a great deal of room & of course is also some detriment to my receiving my Quantity of Pepper.

I dispatched a Shybar to you, that I had Freightd to carry the Pepper remaining here w<sup>ch</sup>. is about 80 Candies, but from the badness of the Weather she could not pass mount Dilly, & w<sup>th</sup>. several other Munchuas return'd hither on the 10<sup>th</sup>. Inst; The Bales were much wetted with rain but have dried them in the best manner I can & am shooting them loose into a Godown w<sup>ch</sup>. I have hired for that purpose, as it is now too late in the season to risque anything in these Country Vessels.

Your not having the Pepper sent in due time was occasioned by not being able to get Vessels, the Government having laid an Embargo on them for not carrying rice to their Camp as Customary.

On the 8<sup>th</sup>. Inst. I recēd your Letter of the 4<sup>th</sup>. with three Chests of Treasure containing 23000 Rup<sup>s</sup>. to be advanced Hur Camoty on account of his Contract with the Honble President & Council upon his giving security for it in case of his Mortality; He is now at Biddinure, & from his refusing that sum when I offered it to him at Merjee & not sending any answer to what I wrote him of the 5 ⌘ Cent risque for delivering the Pepper here, makes me suspect that he has laid the Contract aside. He is the sole mannager of the Pepper Business & the money may be very safe in his hands; But whether or no he can give sufficient security for the performance of his Contract in case of his Mortality I cannot pretend to say, whence I shall Dispatch Ventura D'Souza as soon as possible w<sup>th</sup>. the Chiefs open Letter to him, whose answer you shall be advised of before the money be paid him if it is not conformable to Y<sup>e</sup>. Tenor of your Letter.

As I have now no hopes of sending the Pepper before the rains I do not imagine my staying any Longer here will be of any Service whence I shall deliver the money to the Factor in whose hands I Believe it will be very safe & as soon as the Weather permitts shall come down w<sup>th</sup>. the Toneyes.

As we have no register here of the Grants & Priviledges obtain'd for the Security of our hoñble Masters Commerce & Settlements in these parts we would therefore have you transmitt as soon as they can be prepared by some good Conveyance, Translates in English of all such as relate to your Settlement, to w<sup>ch</sup>. it would be proper to subjoin your Remarks & Opinion of their Benefit & how far they are observed & regard by the respective Governments.

AN ABSTRACT OF A LETTER TO THE JESUITS AT SPAHAUN.

The most material news from Europe is the Election of a new Pope, his name is Lambertini, Arch Bishop of Bologne created Cardinal by Bennit XIII, He was nominated to the Papacy the 14<sup>th</sup>. Aug<sup>t</sup>. 1740 and has taken the name of Bennit.

The Empress of Russia died the 28<sup>th</sup>. of last October, she had Declared before her Death, the Son of her Sister's Daughter, Czar a young Prince of 7 Months old, & At the time of her Death she nominated the Duke of Coverland Regent till the Czar should be 17 Years old.

Eight days after the Death of the Czarina died the Emperour of Germany; he had nominated his Eldest Daughter married to the Great Duke of Tuscany, heiress to the Austrian Dominion but the States have declared her only regent to the hereditary Demesnes.

Before the Emperours Death the Turkish Ambassador began to talk in so haughty a manner at Vienna that the Austrian Council thought proper to desire the interposition of the French Ambassador to accommodate Affairs.

The French w<sup>th</sup>. 28 men of War have made themselves Masters of the Port of Leghorn, w<sup>th</sup>. what view is not yet known.

The Turks make great Preparations for War w<sup>th</sup>. the Persians; Provisions, Ammunition &c<sup>a</sup>. are continually going to Bagdat, Mosoul &c<sup>a</sup>. & tis said the Grand Seignor intends to head his Army himself; Shawen Shaw makes the like preparation; he has forc'd all the Workmen he can find to make Guns, Arrows &c<sup>a</sup>. implements of war without number.
