GENTLEMEN

Inclosed is duplicate of what we wrote you the Seventh Instant.

Commodore Barnett with his Majesties Ships Depford, Medway, Preston and Dolphin arrived at Fort St. Davids the twentyeth Instant from their Cruize off Ceylon where they have been since Joined by the Lively and Medways Prize from Batavia.

The Benjamin and Sumatra arrived here a few days past from the West Coast from whence we are informed, That the Orford called there in her way to Benjar and that the Porto Bello had proceeded from Batavia on her Voyage to that Port.

The Wager and Edgebaston arrived in Bengall the Sixth of June and by our last advices from thence we Learn a large Body of Morrattas had again entered that Province, and that the Gentlemen there were apprehensive the Companys investment would be greatly impeded.

We purpose to Dispatch the Benjamin for England by the Latter end of next Month or begining of September. As yet non [*sic*] of our Honourable Masters Ships are Arrived from Europe. We are.

SIRS

Your several Letters of the Sixth and twenty fifth April also that of the thirty first came to hand on the thirteenth of May and thirty first of July with the Several Papers conformable to the List of the Packets.

You did well in giving us as timely Notice of the Arrival of the Northampton as you could, and we approve of Your transactions in respect to that Ship, altho you needed not to have kept her so late in expectation of goods for her from hence as you might have been ashured we should have given you early notice if we had intended any, but by a Letter from to the President it appears she was not arrived with you so late as the fifteenth of March.

It was right in you to protest against the Commander for his deficiency of Gun Powder and a Gun, as it was to tender him those deficiencies.

We Judge as you do that little is to be expected from Ally Rajah as he makes so many frevolous excuses and even refuses to send to you a Proper person to adjust his Acc^{ts}. therefore we approve of your intentions for making publick Sale of what you took in his boats and doubt not but you will use the best means possible for

recovering his debt as opportunity may offer. At present we cannot possibly send you a Vessel according to your request for distressing him by Sea but as your Garrison is now strong you can do it with well armed Munchuas nor will you long be without Ships to Countenance your affairs.

We do not apprehend any ill consequence from the French will attend your taking all proper measures for the recovery of Boyanores Debt, therefore we would have you use your utmost solicitations for getting in his Ballance as well as that of the King of Cotiotes and if the Samorine Dies make early application to his Successour for his complying with the agreements formerly entered into, for the discharging those Debts, concerning all which the Necessary directions have been repeatedly given you from us. and we doubt not you will use your best endeavours for the Interest of Our Honourable Employers in that and all other occasions.

It is with Concern we find the distractions in Your Country Governments still continue and that the best methods you can take for preventing the present ill disposition of Prince Cuni Homo haveing bad effects on Our Honourable Employers Trade in his Dominions are to Mantain [*sic*] five hundred Nairs for supporting Baddencalencore against him for four Months and rewarding the Old King of Cotiote with two thousand Rup if he performs the service he promises. We doubt not but these are the most prudent steps you can take under your present Circumstances and readily approve of them.

We have already said we do not apprehend the French will be any ways troublesome to you by Land which may reasonably be supposed from the Great Losses they have lately met with, from our men of War both in respect to their private Trade and their Companys which you are acquainted [*sic*] with and as they were before very bare of Cash it may be Conjectured at Least, they will neither attempt assisting the Country Government against you or very considerably interfere in the Provision of Pepper, if you find these observations Just it may make you less Anxious about the squabbles in the Country and give you a good Opportunity of reducing the Price of Pepper in which you made so considerable a step last year.

At Present we cannot say when the Com^r. of the Elizabeth will sail who is now under dispatch and as we are every day in expectations of a Ship or Ships from England we have not yet come to a resolution when to send down to you the Fort St. George to compleat her Loading for great Britain however as they or any ship in time of war will require the quickest despatch that can be given, get your Pepper Grabled [*sic*] and all else in readiness for that purpose and let the Northhamptons Cargo and private trade be likewise ready to be sent off with Expedition.

What small Arms you are still in want of we expect to be able to supply you with on the arrival of the first Ship from England.

Send home by the first Ship you dispatch anoether [*sic*] bond of Captⁿ. Backwells for fifeteen hundred Rupees Prin^l. lent at Respondentia for the Ships use.

As the seven Chests of Foreign silver by the Northampton sold so near what they would produce in our Mint we approve of your disposing of them as we do of your permitting Mr. Micajah Parker to go home for the reasons given.

Mr. John Lemon Brandling dying insolvent you may allow his Widow the indulgence the Honourable Company formerly granted her upon the like unhappy Occasion.

By the first Ship we shall send you a proper Companys Servant according to your request as also a Gunners Mate.

There being several Mistakes in your Invoices home and Accounts we now enclose a List of them that you may rectifie your Accounts by them and we expect your Accompt^s. to be more carefull in future.

The Bussorah Merchant imported here from thence on the eleventh instant by her we received such Europe advices as are contained in the enclosed abstract from the Amsterdam Gazetts.

This goes by a Small Vessel built for the Service at Fort St. George we hope the weather will permitt of her calling at your Port, but the Master has Orders not to stay after delivery of this Letter.

We send this purposely to acquaint you of the Arrival here of Our Honourable Masters Ship Dolphin Cap^t. Charles Pigot the seventeenth instant having left Plymouth the fourteenth of April in Company with several of our Honb^{le}. Masters ships bound to India under Convoy of the Harwick & Winchester Men of war.

This Ship left them the twenty sixth of that month off Madera so that we greatly apprehend all the Ships will be very Late this Year. a List of those taken up we send you now enclosed.

We cannot learn that the French are sending out to India any Ships this Season nor are any yet arrived from the Islands on this Coast.

AND MUCH ESTEEMED FRIENDS

We have enjoyed the Honour of receiveing your Honour & c^a. Amiably letter of the Ninth O.S. of this month and beheld with much discontentment the perverse actions, the unworthy Moor ALLY RAJAH is exercising under the reach of our Guns against your honour and also that our Gentlemen at Cannanore permitt that Mahometan to fire on your Honour & c^a. passing Vessels from his old Ship Lying in our Bay and to send his Vessels of Pillage with armed force out and into the Sea, to plunder the Merchants and carry them into the said Bay; and that the Mucquas must carry the Artillery agst. your Honour & c^a. and Lastly that the French at Mihie come to resort to the Moors Buzar and often times into our Jurisdiction to keep Conferences with Ignatio Teixeda.

Your Honour & c^a. may be assured that all such indecencies cause us very great displeasure and therefore we have already taken the Necessary measures to put a Stop to the unjust proceedings of ALLY RAJAH and to inform him to bear more respect to our fortress and Bay in the future; and our Gentlemen at Cannanore shall likewise take care and use precaution, that all Occasions to Ignatio shall be Cut of in the Sequel to hold any Correspondence with the French which Arrive there sometimes as friends, for their proper affairs.

Concerning the rest we are very glad that our Gentlemen have given your Honour & c^a. the satisfaction in giveing protection to a Toney of your Honour & c^a. comeing from Mangalore and sending your Honour & c^{as}. the Letters they brought as being intirely according to the affection and good friendship, we bare unto Your Honours and wherewith we have the Honour of being with great Veneration.

SIRS

We wrote you last under the twenty first of August, Duplicate of which is enclosed and are now to give you the Necessary directions relating to the Ships Fort St. George Elizabeth and Walpole who now proceed in Company with the Neptunes Prise to your Port.

By the Enclosed calculates of the Elizabeth and Fort St. George their Tonnage for England you will see how much Pepper is to be Ship't on board each by you to compleat their Charter Party Tonnage which being done you are to send on board them, as much more as the Comm^{rs}. will engage by Letter in behalf of their Owners, to carry at half freight and then give them their final Dispatches for Great Britain wherein you must positively order them to keep Company thither.

We have consigned you on these Ships twenty seven Chests of Treasure which with Sundry Stores for your Settlement and Anjengo Amounts to three hundred and seventeen thousand and Seventy four Rupees and Ninty one reas as per Invoice and Bills of lading, But as the Gentlemen at Anjengo are greatly in want of the several Articles sent for the use of that Factory let them be forwarded thither as soon as possible.

It not being certain that the Edgbaston will arrive at your Place within the time limited by our Hon^{ble}. Masters for her proceeding hither we have sent You on the Walpole One hundred and twenty eight Bales of Surrat Pice [*sic*] goods and thirty four Bales of Carmania Wool, to be Shipt on her in case she exceeds her time as part of her homeward bound Cargo you compleating her Charter Party Tonnage in Pepper and despatching her home as Ordered by the Company in their Commands of the 4th. of November 1743.

When the Walpole is unloaded you must return her to us in Company of the Grab with the Northampton's Cargo and what Standing Masts and Top Masts she can take in and if there are any Country Ships she is to take them under Convoy.

Enclosed are Sundry Paragraphs of Our Hon^{ble}. Masters Commands relating to your Settlement received p Ship Walpole to which you are to pay due regard.

If the Commanders of these Ships should want to pay any Money into your Cash you are to receive it and give them Certificates on the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors for the same.

To supply the Place of Mr. Darby your Gunners late Mate we now send James Hogg who is a sober Man and of good Experience in his business and paid to the end of last month.

We have appointed [*sic*] Mr. Charles Waters writer to the assistance of your Factory who now takes passage on the Elizabeth his salary has been paid to the first of July last inclusive and Diet money to the thirtyeth Ultimo.

Captain Acton haveing engaged to carry One hundred Tonnes of Salt Petre as surplus Tonnage at half freight, We have shipt on board the Fort St. George eighty Tonns here and the remainder must be compleated by you.

Let Mr. Rumbold come up hither on return of the Commodore.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRs

We are to Acknowledge the receipt of your Letter ^{of} Edgbaston under date the fourteenth of May and are much oblig'd for your advices in regard to Shipping.

We are much concerned to acquaint [*sic*] you that non [*sic*] of our Honb^{le}. Masters ships expected this Season are not yet imported therefore have Agree'd to detain the Edgbaston here till the thirtyeth instant to see whither any of them will arrive by that time which should they not we shall then consider if it will not be more for the Honour^{ble}. Companys interest to send her to Madrass or Europe rather than dispatch her to Bombay that the Gentlemen there may not be disapointed of the Salt Petre ordered exlusivè [*sic*] of this Ships Charter Party proportion We freight on our Country Ships two hundred and twenty Tonns Viz. on the Queen of Hungary five hundred Baggs and on the Prince Edward five hundred Bags for which we enclose Invoices and Bills of Lading to you and request you will forward the same to Bombay. The remainder two thousand three hundred Baggs we are preparing to despatch on the Essex, all these are consigned to you and you will please to Land such part thereof at your Place as you think Proper and our Honb^{le}. Masters Service may require.

Our Honb^{le}. Masters Ship the Dolphin which Arrived at Madrass in August last left Plimouth the forteenth of April and Parted Company with the Scarborough Linclor, [*sic*] Admiral Vernon and Kent and the Hardwick & Winchester Men of War off Madeira the twenty sixth of April on the twenty eight D^o with the London & Essex and by our Advices from Fort St^t. George neither the London or any other Ships bound to Coast and Bay were Arrived there so late as the first of October. We are

We have received your letter of the first of October and are Obliged to you for what you have communicated to us concerning the report of an Armament from the French Islands being on the Mallabar Coast to intercept the shipp^s. from Bombay. We shall Accordingly caution all ships bound that way to be on their Guard.

A few days past we were advised of the Ship Princess Augusta belonging to the Honourable Company having fallen in with Columbo in her Passage from the West coast the Commander of which Ship acquaints us that he should go for Anjengo the Middle of this Month to which place we have therefore wrote him and directed that he proceeds to Cochin and waits there till he receives Advices from you that it may be safe for the Ship to come up, when you will please to send her on to Bombay with the first Convoy. What Plank may be ready at Callicut you will Order on board and if she can be of any further Service to the Company in carrying up any goods for them you will make use of her as she is in her Ballast and has nothing for the Company in her of any kind, Captain Jacobs has directions to follow your Orders.

The Benjamin sailed for England the twenty seventh of September and the Dolphin the eight of last Month, the Shawllum from Bombay and Robert Melch from Surat are we are Informed to the Northrd. the former at Vizagapat^m. and the other at Ingeram haveing lost their Passages to Bengall.

SIR AND SIRs

Your Letter of the Sixteenth Inst^t. came to hand this Moment and Captain Jacob in the Princess Augusta being sailed we Ordered your Toney to make all possible haste after her with yours and the Madrass Letters. As we did not apprehend any danger between this Port and yours and as his laying at Cochin for your further Orders might be the Occasion of detaining a Convoy we Ordered him to make the best of his way to Tellicherry as his Ship must be Seathed at Bombay, he has no time to loose.

By the Prince Edwrd. we sent you a Detachment of thirty Seven men with their Arms and wish we could send you a further supply of Arms, but we have spared so many to the King of Travencore which has put it out of Our Power.

The Ships you mention all touched here except the Triton Snow, As did the Elizabeth for Bombay and the Lorrain and Expedition both for Mozembeque. We are

SIR

On the [...] Instant I received an Ola from the Prince by a Messenger Express, Copy of the translate in Portuguese that was sent with it goes inclosed as does my Answer which can be only in a General way as I have heard nothing from you in relation to the Contents of the Ola. From what the Messenger relates I am apprehensive the Princes Evil Ministers have Obliged you to come to blows which I should be sory [*sic*] for as it will doubtless create great Confusion in the Country. I know one of the House of Colastria more especially will be solliciting your Assistance for takeing the Government from Prince Cuni Homo nor do I see how you can Avoid giving it him if the Prince has behaved in such Manner as to force you to have

recourse to Arms in Defence of the Honb^{le}. Companys dear bought Privledges from what I remember of his Disposition I believe your present disputes must have proceeded from his haveing unguardedly suffer'd his base Ministers to put him upon Measures contrary to his true Interest of which I hope you may be able to make his Highness senceible and Settle all Affairs upon a Faceable footing, if you are not you know what you are to do.

As this goes by Pattamar you will most probably hear from me by a Sea Conveyance before it can be received, therefore I shall only add that,

TO THE PRINCE OF COLASTRIA.

I received your Highnesses Ola with Translate of it in Portugese, but the Language is so bad as to render it scarce intelligible. However by it I perceive the good Harmony that has so long subsisted between the Honb^{le}. Company and your Highness has met with some Interruption which gives me much concern, well knowing that both interests are mutual. The Prodigious expences they have been at of late years to preserve your Dominions is a Certain demonstration of their extraordinary kind and Good intentions towards your Highness and for which they desire no other return than quiet and free Liberty of Trade in your Country agreeable to the Grants of your Ancestors and those of your Highness, paying the Merch^{ts}. duely for what they buy and your Highness your Customs, which tends greatly to the enriching your Country and the encrease of your revenues.

The Honb^{le}. Company do not desire to interfere in the Government of your Country, but if your Vassals are permitted to Murder our People impede our Trade by rendering it unsafe to pass in the Country and to give us continual insults, with impunity, under such Circumstances what other measure can be expected should be taken than such as are consistant with our safety; These great injuries obliged us last Year to take such satisfaction of Ally Rajah as we could then get as it could no otherwise be Otained, [sic] for notwithstanding the greatest Indignities have been given by that House, even to your own Royal Persson, [sic] I hear the Moors of Cannanore are greatly in your favour. The Modalier I know was your faithfull Subject but I wish you may find the Like in Pallicutti Mapla, I likewise am certain that Dom^{go}. What may have happened in about six Months past I know not for want of Advices from Tellicherry, but I daily expect to hear from thence when Proper directions shall be given thither for Accomodateing any difference that may have Arose which certainly can only have proceeded from evil Councillors, being fully Senceible of your Highnesses good Intentions towards the Honb^{le}. Company and theirs towards your Highness and who never will expect anything of you but what is consistent with their true interest and benefit of your Country. When this is received I request of your Highness to send such of your Ministers to Mr. Geekie as he can have Confidence in with my Letter to him which Accompanys this, giving them Authority to Accommodate all differences in a friendly manner towards which I am certain he will certainly Contribute and on which Ocasion I hope shortly to congratulate your highness for whose Royal Persson, [sic] I have for many years shewn so great a Deference and respect.

We observe a Deficiency of Rupees 16. in the Treasure Consigned you ^{to} Walpole, which we are at a loss to Account for, as the same was weighed and Packed in the Presence of One of Our Board, and the assistant to the Treasurers: Acquaint us therefore in which of the Chests it arose, and how the Package appeared. The Treasure now sent, the Pursers of the respective ships saw Counted.

As Cunisieu proved shuffling & Dilatory, We approve of Your Contracting for the Cardamoms with Ticandy Cunially, and Toy Cunially, but let no opportunity escape you of recovering what is Owing by Cunisieu.

An Adjutant has often been solicited for from your settlement, and as often Denied, and you must no longer Continue Ensign Forbes in that Employ, or appoint any other in his stead, but let the Officers take due care to Exercise the Men, as has always been Usual.

If no inconvenience shou'd Accrue from your letting out to one Person the sole Liberty of Retailing spirituous Liquors, it is to be Continued.

We have now fully supplied you with y^e. Stores You indented for, excepting the Salt Petre and Tin, the first of which Articles, you may take out of your own Warehouse, & the other being to be had Cheaper at Callicut than at this Place, must be provided there, —Let all your Old and useless Arms be sent hither by the return of the Commodore.

We approve of Your Contracting with Domingos Rodrigues to supply you with Rice for the service of your Garrison.

We are pleased to hear that you were so near coming to an Accommodation with the Country Governments, for Warrs, thô. ever so just and well Conducted, must have Considerably encreased Your Expences, thô how much we are no where informed.

We have now Consigned You the sum of 80,000 Rupees equally divided on the Walpole and Prince of Orange, which with your Ballance of Cash under the 7th. Instant, and what the supra Cargoes of the Essex will repay you, Amounts to Rupees three hundred, & six thousand & thirty nine, & fifty four Reas (R^s. 306,039. —. 54) which we judge fully sufficient to Answer your Demands for the Current Year, especially, as M^r. Geekie will pay in a sum, for which you must Grant him Bills on the Hon^{ble} Company as you may Certificates to any of the Commanders who want to pay in Money.

The Chief has our Permission to return to England on any ship he Chuses, thô we are sorry his Ill state of health makes such a step Necessary; On his leaving your Place, he must resign over this Charge to M^r. George Dudley, who being appointed his successor now takes Passage on the Prince of Orange.

Ensign Worrall has leave to return to his Native Country St^t. Hellena, and in his stead we have now sent you Ensign Poquin, who is paid to the end of last Month.

Remember as a standing Rule, to transmit us as often as you write an Account shewing your remains of Europe and, India Goods in Warehouse at the date of your Advices.

Of the Tar received ^{to} Walpole, there were three Barrells Deficient which Captain Lowe Objected to make Good. Alledging it was sent on board his ship in that manner: Let this therefore be clear'd up in your next Letter, and Adjusted with him accordingly.

M^r. Alexander Douglas Factor now takes Passage on the Prince of Orange for your settlement, his salary has been paid him to the 2nd. Ult^o. and Diet Money for last Month.

We are well Assured the Island of Durmapatam, by giving suitable Encouragement to Cultivate it, may be made very Productive and Beneficial therefore we doubt not of Your taking the most proper Methods for that end.

As our keeping the Prisoners You sent hither, wou'd Create an unnecessary expence to the Hon^{ble} Company we now return them on the Walpole & Prince of Orange, You may therefore on their Arrival release them, all, unless you judge, that detaining three or four of the Head ones may be of any service.

We approve of Your keeping the Walpole Detachment, whom we have struck out of Our Muster Roll, for December, and must be paid by you for that Month as ^{per} Abstract Enclosed; The pay of Captain Gowin has been made good to his Family, here, and as Batty has been delivered to some of the Peoples Family's you are to Deduct the same out of their respective Pay, as ^{per} Account Enclosed.

By the Walpole we have sent a Chest of stationary Ware for the service of Anjengo Factory which You are to forward thither by the first Opportunity, with the Enclosed Packet.

This is Chiefly to forward a Packet which came to hand Yesterday by his Majestys ship the Winchester who left Bombay the 7th. of May which we doubt will Advise You of the Walpoles proceeding directly from thence to China.

The Princess Mary Arrived here the 10th. of last Month from Batavia, & parted Company with the Hardwicke & Northampton the 2nd. Febr̄y off Java Head, & the 14th. Current came in the London from St. Hellena & the Cape, to both which Places she had been Obliged to go to refitt after the Loss of her Masts she left the latter the 2nd. Febr̄y, & We hear by a Dutch ship that sailed from Holland the beginning of November, that all Our Hon^{ble} Masters ships that left the Cape & St. Hellena were safe Arrived in Europe that the Onslow bound for Benjarr & China had past the Cape, in January, & that the Dolphin & Benjamin were then homeward waiting for Orders.

The Augusta whose Commander Captain Townshend is dead, was to proceed from Batavia to China the beginning of this Month & the Porto Bello, had left Benjarr a full ship for Europe.

About the middle of last Month another French ship appeared on the Coast & Anchored in the Road of Caracal which was immediately set fire to, as soon as our Men of Warr were in sight of that Port; We have not been able to learn her Name, some say it was the Fame from Your Coast, & others the Diligence from Bengall. The ship we mention'd in Our last & which was destroyed at the Road of Tranquibar occasion'd by the French Captains beginning to fire first on the Kings ships, proved to be the Pondicherry from the Islands but had been at Calatchy, & sailed from thence Early in March.

On the 29th. of last Month Comm[o]dore Barnett departed this life at Fort St. Davids.

GENTLEMEN

Our last bore Date the 29th. of May as ¶ Duplicate Enclosed, since which we have not any from You to Acknowledge.

To what we then wrote you we have now to Add, that few days past we had Advice of the Arrival of Nine French ships at Pondicherry on the 26th. & 27th. Ult^o. with an Import of a Considerable Treasure Broad Cloth and Coral, its Reported that seven more Ships left the Islands with these, but whether it be really so, or whither they may be gone we can only Conjecture.

The Nine Arrived at Pondicherry according to the best intelligence we can get, are Nam'd the Achilles, Bourbon, St. Lewis, Duke of Orleans, Neptune, L'Heureux Parfait, Renomma, & Insulatair, All under the Command of Mons^r. L'Bourdinay, The Achilles is said to have been built for the South Sea Trade, t-

carry seventy Guns, & seven hundred Men, & to have come out with four more of the French Companys ships, abovemention'd each bringing from Europe between five hundred & twenty & thirty Men, the Bourbon, & Neptune, are said to have been stoped at the Islands homeward Bound in 1744-5 the other two are supposed to be Country ships. To their stated Compliments we have reason to believe, there were Added a Number of the European Planters & Coffrees, & that altogether they make no inconsiderable Force.

A day or two after we heard of their Arrival we were inform'd that they had fallen in with the English Squadron under Commodore Peyton on the 25th. June off Calimeer, to the S^o.ward of Negapatam & that a sharp Engagement ensued, which lasted from four in the Afternoon till seven when Night parted them. We believe it to have been very smart by the Reports we have of Mons^r. L'Bourdinay being Wounded in the Arm, One of the Captains being Kill'd in the Engagements another having his Arm shott off. Two more dying soon after their Landing at Pondicherry, that upwards of five hundred sick and Wounded had been put ashore there and that many of the ships (particularly the Achilles) have suffered considerable damage, We impatiently expect a more clear Account of the Affair, from Mr. Peyton of whom & the Squadron, we have not heard since the Engagement, except that they were met & spoke with not far from Negapatam by the Captain of a Danish Ship, that left Europe for Tranquibar in Decemb^r. last, but by which, we as yet have received no material News.

Just as we had Wrote the above came to hand yours of the 10th. Ult^o. with its Accompanying Packet for Bombay, which shall be forwarded in a day or two.

The season being late for the Walpole to touch at your Place, the Gentlemen of Bombay Writ us under the 6th. May that they had dispatch'd her directly from thence to Canton.
