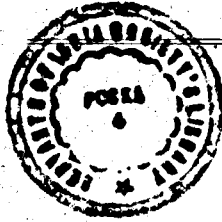

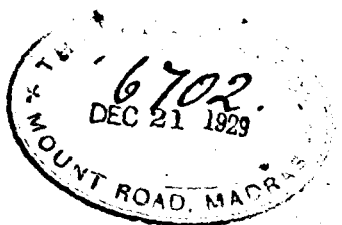

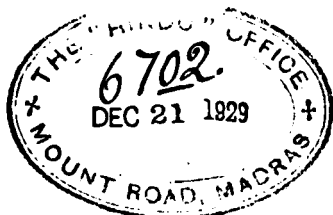
PREFATORY NOTE

& Buildings at Fort S^t. David and Cuddalore & humbly offer to your Hon^r. & c^a. the
following report of their condition.

The Fort itself remains still unfinished on the East and South sides & there is
only one room of the house left standing the rest having fallen down in the late
violent rains. The Lodgings in which the Comp^{as}. Servants reside are very bad and
the Terrass likely to fall in upon them. The walls are crack'd in severall places,
their powder magazine, Gunroom & Armoury (being all arch'd work) have very much
given way and are now proppd up to keep them from tumbling down, the Doctors
Lodgings very much crackd in severall places, the barracks for the soldiers and
prisons in a very bad condition, as are also all the Godowns and outhouses.

At Cuddalore the new Factory is so decayd that it is not habitable and the upper
lodgings of the old are at present proppd up, but must be pulld down to prevent their
falling thô the lower rooms may perhaps stand two or three year longer about fifty
foot of the wall of Cuddalore Town near the Braminy gate is tumbled down, being
but a brick and half thick, & wants to be new built for about the length of four
hundred yards.

William Martin & Richard Hunt undertook this affair a very little while before the Presidents arrivall and stated the Merch^{ts}. acco^t. by examination of the Generall and Warehouse books, or at least they pretended so, and afterwards when the four persons abovementiond were appointed to examine this affair they only revisd the said acco^t. and took care that it agreed with the Generall books, not having then time to go thro^u the Warehouse acco^{ts}., but the Merchants not allowing the charge of sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. thirty two fanams and four cash and the Conicoply offering his oath that Colloway Chitty had never paid for six chests of silver amounting to fourteen thousand two hundred and nine Pag^s. twenty fanams, and that the same was part of the sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. thirty two fanams & four cash aforesaid, it was agreed that the acco^t. should be stated in the manner they then reported it, which they did not offer as matter of fact but as a supposd acco^t. upon the best light they could then gett into the matter, and since it do's not appear so plain to the Board by placing one article under another, they now beg leave to state it by way of D^r. & C^r. as follows.

and this was then offerd to the Board for a further inspection as Ψ Consultⁿ. of the same date will appear.

They further add that the consternation Colloway Chitty seem'd to be in his varying and shifting in his answers and the Conicoplys offering his oath (who was not then known to be the villain he now appears) inducd them to believe the six chests of silver were unpaid for, till they since came to examine thoroly into the Warehouse acco^{ts}. which they hope is a sufficient excuse for their having sett their hands to a report so farr different from what lies now before the Board.

AGREED that all houses and other effects both at sea and ashoar belonging to Tonapa Conicoply be seizd and confiscated to the Hon^{ble}. Comp^{as}. use till their further pleasure be known concerning this affair, and that papers be affixd at all publick places enjoyning people to discover what mony or goods they know of belonging to him und^r. penalty of a thousand Pag^s. to be paid by such person on whom it shall be proved to have had a hand in concealing them.

Genall letter to the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors by the Howland para 37th. inclusive read and approvd.

ORDERED that Three Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Five Pag^s. sixteen fanams & sixty cash be paid Edward Bulkley Paymast^r. to defray Charges Garrison.

Pursuant to an order of Consultation dated the 13th. of Novemb^r. we have in presence of the Hon^{ble}. Govern^r. spent many days in endeavouring to find out whence the difference arises between the joynt stock Merch^{ts}. acco^t. Curr^t. as they state it, and as it stands now in our Generall Books, and tho^{we} we have [not] met with all the success we hopd for, we have discovered so much as to be able to lay before yo^r Hon^r & C^a. severall omissions and ill practices both in the Warehouse and Generall books, that will give you a tolerable good light into this troublesome affair, which should have been done much sooner had we not met with unexpected difficultys that took us up more time than we could have imagind.

First we must take notice that when Thomas Wright deliverd up the Warehouse to Mathew Empson which was in Augst. 1706, all accounts were adjusted between the joynt Stock Merchants & the Warehousekeep^r. and the ballance due from the Merchants being five thousand one hundred thirty five Pag^s. twenty nine fanams & three cash was paid into Consultation the 24th. of Oct. following, and consequently we have no occasion to look further back than to that time.

We have annexd a schedule hereto in which we have stated first the joynt stock Merch^{ts}. acco^t. Curr^t. as it stands in our Generall books from the time that Mathew Empson commencd Warehouskeep^r. in Aug^r. 1706 by which they appear to be indebted upon ballance Pag^s. eight thousand six hundred and twenty seven, twenty two fanams, secondly we have taken the joynt stock Merch^{ts} acco^t with Mathew Empson Warehouskeep^r. as stated and kept by themselves to which acco^t they own to be indebted upon ballance five thousand six hundred eighty nine Pag^s. twenty one fanams and one Cash, and thirdly we have taken their acco^t. Curr^t. with the Hon^{ble}. Comp^s. as they have stated and kept it all along, in which they allow Pag^s. five thousand six hundred eighty nine, twenty one fanams and one Cash due to the ballance of their acco^t. with Mathew Empson Warehouskeep^r. and accordingly bring the same to the Companys credit as the said acco^t will make appear the ballance whereof is Pag^s. one hundred & two and one fanam, which they own to be indebted to the Company and no more, so that the difference between their acco^t. as they state it, and their acco^t. as it stands in the Generall books is Pag^s. eight thousand five hundred and twenty five & twenty-one fanams.

The forementioned difference plainly appears to arise from an erroneous entry made by M^r. Richard Hunt then Accompt^t in the Generall books whereby he discharges Mathew Empson Warehouskeep^r. of Pag^s. sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three thirty two fanams & four cash, by debting the joynt stock Merchants upon an adjustment of the books, with no other authority than the Warehouse Conicoplys word that they were indebted so much, without enquiring into the particulars or acquainting the Merchants therewith, this charge they utterly deny and only admit of Pag^s. five thousand six hundred eighty nine, twenty one fanams and one cash, as beforementioned, which we shall have occasion to say more of in a following paragraph.

We are sorry to acquaint yo^r. Hon^r. &c^s. that we cannot find by any acco^t. Curr^t book or loose papers that ever any acco^t. has been made up with these joynt stock Merchants from the beginning of Mathew Empsons coming into the Warehouse till we first went upon it since the Hon^{ble}. Presid^{ts}. arrivall, tho^o it ought always to have been done monthly by the Warehousekeep^r. and annually by the accomptant when the Generall books were ballanced, and this inexcusable omission in the Warehousekeep^r. & Accomptant together with the puzzling method in which Empsons Warehouse acco^{ts}. were kept by the Conicoply (for he did nothing himself) have made it impracticable to trace the said acco^{ts}. so as to discover exactly where or on whom to fix the difference between the Merch^{ts}. acco^t. as they state it and the Generall books, for as Mathew Empson Warehouskeep^r. all along debts himself for what goods and treasure deliverd the Merchants out of the Warehouse, as sold by him promiscuously with what he sold other people and never kept any acco^t. wth. the Merchants as we can find, it is very reasonable to inferr from thence that what ever the Merchants had from him was to be paid for in ready mony and more particularly the silver, yet we find by the Merchants Accounts as well as by the Warehouse books that they have often made payments in Callicoes.

now if a man debts himself for goods and silver sold as for ready mony at the same time do's not sell them for ready mony, but delivers them to the Merchants and takes Callicoes in return may be three or four months after he has debted himself, and keeps no acco^t. apart between him and the said Merchants, but leaves all to a Conicoply to manage just as he pleases, which way can it be possible for the best Accomptant in the world to unravell such misteries five or six years after an error has happend, and there is but too much reason to suspect that this unfair method was introduced the better to conceal those ill practices of the Conicoply that have lately been discoverd, of which more will be said hereafter.

M^r. Richard Hunt being examin'd by the President and others before his decease concerning the forementioned article of sixteen thousand four hundred & twenty three Pag^s thirty two fanams & four cash, how he came to charge the Merchants with it and what were the particulars, replyd that coming to ballance the

books Anno 1709 in some hurry because the ships were ready to sail, he enquired of Tonnapa the Conicoply who the persons were that ow'd Mathew Empsons ballance of nineteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. twenty eight fanams, to w^{ch}. he answer'd the joynt Stock Merchants were indebted sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. thirty two fanams & four cash upon which M^r. Hunt immediately chargd them with that sum without enquiring into the particulars.

Tonnapa the Conicoply being strictly examin'd soon after the Hon^{ble}. Govern^{rs}. arrivall about the particulars of this charge, for a long time pretended that he could not call them to mind, but was sure the Merchants owed it at that time at last with much ado he produced a fictitious acco^t. out of his own head, without any vouchers and no way to be comprehended, only there is one article in it worthy yo^r. Hon^r. & c^{as}. notice which is Pag^s. five thousand one hundred fifty four, & nine fan^s. for copper sold the Merchants, which he pretends is part of the sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. thirty two fanams & four cash, but it appears that they are debted for the same article before in the Generall books as you may please to observe in the annexd acco^t. Curr^t.

Another pretence of Tonapa was that six chests of silver sold Colloway Chitty one of the joynt stock Merch^{ts}. by Mathew Empson Augst. 1706 were unpaid for by the said Colloway Chitty to this time, as having been supposd to be for acco^t. of the joynt stock Merch^{ts}. and omitted to be chargd to them in the Generall books this seemed to us at first very plausible, and we had recourse to the Warehouse acco^t. in hopes to fix this sum upon a person well able to pay it, but found the matter of fact to stand as follows.

Mathew Empson commencing Warehouskeeper in Augst. 1705 sold a parcel of silver and debts himself for it to the amount of Pag^s. seventy one thousand four hundred fifty five and twenty four fanams in which parcel were the six chests sold to Colloway Chitty which amounted to fourteen thousand two hundred and nine Pag^s. twenty fanams, at the latter end of the month of May following the ball^o. due from the Warehouse was no more than Pag^s. seven thousand six hundred & five thirty three fanams & seventy four cash, which plainly makes appear that there could not be six chests of silver unpaid for, and to the best of our judgments that ballance is for goods sold out of the Warehouse between Augst. and May for w^{ch}. the Warehouskeep^r likewise debts himself, and 'tis very probable the Conicoply might receive the mony and never pay it in.

The remainder of Mathew Empsons ballance becomes due as follows to the best of our judgment.

In the months of June and July goods were sold out of the Warehouse and no mony paid in to the amo^t. of as much as raisd the ballance to Pag^s. ten thousand six hundred & twenty, one fanam & seventy nine cash.

In the month of August the Europe shipping being arrivd thirty seven chests of silver were sold amounting to Pag^s. eighty nine thousand three hundred forty seven, one fanam & ten Cash which were paid for in the mann^r. following.

which sum is pretty near the amount of the forementioned thirty seven chests of silver, in the months of Novemb^r. and Decemb^r. nothing was paid in, and in the

beginning of Jan^r. 1707/8 Mathew Empson died leaving a ballance due at the close of Decemb^r. month Viz^t. Pag^s. nineteen thousand four hundred twenty three & twenty eight fanams, which we remark to have become due as follows.

We must beg leave to remark further that the forementioned ballance of Empsons stood upon the Books without any enquiry or alteration from the 8th. Jan^r. 1707/8 the time of his death till the ballance of books Letter G ending in April 1709 but not closed till Decemb^r. following which was twenty three months, altho there is an order of Consultation dated the 8th. of Jan^r. 1707/8 for William Martin & Rob^t. Raworth to make up Empsons acco^{ts}. and report the ballance which we think should inferr reporting from whom that ballance was due, to our great surprize we do not find the affair so much as mentiond in any of the ensuing Consultⁿ.

We should tire your patience in enumerating all the omissions & negligences that we have met with in the Generall books and Warehouse acco^{ts}. since we have been upon this enquiry but we must say in generall that they have been kept in so loose a manner, as to give the Conicoply an opportunity of puzzling matters to cloak all the roguerys he has committed, beyond a possibility of proving the fact upon him.

This is a plain and impartial state of the case as it appears to us, Mathew Empsons acco^t. is dischargd under the hand of the Accomptant of the sum of Pag^s. sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three, thirty two fanams and four cash, the joynt stock Merchants are chargd with the same sum, by the same hand upon the Conicoplys word only without any particulars, and without being advisd thereof at the time it was done, the Conicoply that chargd them cannot even now make out the particulars, but has been found to vary and shift and charge them double as in the article of the copper, the Merchants own all they stand chargd with in the Warehouse acco^{ts}. and a great deal more, and we have no objections against any article they charge us with, and therefore we humbly offer it as our opinions.

That Tonapa having the sole power of the Warehouse and everything in it intrusted to him by Mathew Empson as well as the stating and keeping of all the acco^{ts}. did give in the charge of sixteen thousand four hundred twenty three Pag^s. thirty two fanams & four cash upon the Merchants at a venture to conceal what money then lay in his own hands, and has never been since paid in, and we are the more confirmd in this opinion by the vile practices of the same nature already provd upon him in the times of William Martin & Robert Raworth Warehousekeep^{rs}. to a much more considerable amount as well as by his impudently acknowledging that the residue of Empsons ballance being Two Thousand eight hundred forty six Pag^s. thirty five fanams & five cash is due from himself, but as we have said before this matter is not capable of being fully provd, all which is humbly submitted to your Hon^r. &c^{ss}. consideration. Having carefully examin'd all the standing orders as they have from time to time been given from this Board to the Officers of the Custom house for their guidance in stating and collecting that revenue ; in obedience to your commands I am now to lay before you the remarks I have made during the short time I have acted in that employ, such as I humbly conceive require some regulation more especially the method in which those acco^{ts}. have hitherto been kept.

When first I came into that Employ I found their Diary to be no more than a memorandum book, kept in no manner of order, not having an entry therein to inform one what the Customs on that entry amounted to, so that the Register had no retrospect to the Diary, which ought to be the voucher for every respective entry in the Register, but on the contrary I perceive it has been always the practice of the person who had the making up of the Register to take it intirely from the Conicoplys Cajans, which has given them a large feild to wrong the Comp^{as}. in that Revenue, there being no regular acco^t. kept to check them.

* In order to prevent such frauds to which this Revenue was subject by the loose method of their acco^{ts}: I have made the Diary to contain the whole Transactions of each day, placing every entry in due form with proper columns for the species of goods, their quantity or weight, the valuation, the amo^t. of such valuation, and then the Custom thereon carry'd into the innermost Column so that at the close of every month the person who draws out the Register may do it from the Diary without the assistance of a Conicoply, which Register and Diary must exactly agree in the summing up the Customs for each month, whereas on the contrary there has been no Coherence between these two books in the manner they have been lately kept, for some entrys in the Diary have not been brought into the Register till two or three years after their date, as has too often been instanced and 'tis very probable that many have been overlook'd.

From the Register book the Receiver of the Customs monthly draws out in a book apart, an abstracted acco^t. of every persons name that owes the Customs, which amounts to the foot of the Register for that month, and is a check both to the Diary and Register, which book is kept in such a method that at one view may be seen who has not paid their Customs, and how long they have been due, which three books contain the material buisness of that Office, and I now lay them before yo^r. Hon^r. & C^a. for such further regulations as you shall think fit.

And whereas it has hitherto been practic'd for the Receiver to deliver out no entry of Customs only to the Europeans, by which means the Conicoplys have had an opportunity in rating the black inhabitants at their pleasure, and for any check that has been upon them 'tis likely some have paid nothing at all ; your Hon^r. & C^a. were pleas'd to recommend it to me (which I presume you will make a standing order) that the Receiver shall draw his notes not only for the English but also for the black inhabitants and strangers frequenting this Port, and that whatever person shall pay

his Customs to any Conicoply or other black servant officiating at the Sea gate without such note, he shall be liable to pay the same again if not found to be entered in the Receivers books.

As I have already represented to this Board the inconveniencys of pressing the Merchants to a prompt payment for their Customs wⁿ. they meet with a dead market for their goods, you have been pleas'd to ease them in that point, provided they give their notes for the same and considering the few hands we have for dispatch when shipping come in quick upon us I humbly offer it to yo^r. Hon^r. & c^a. that for the better expedition, it may be a sufficient warrant for the Receiver if he takes a promissary note upon the back of his bill of Customs in these words or to the like purpose.

"I promise to pay the contents of the withinmentioned bill of Customs in one month after the date hereof."]

Had the standing orders from this Board been duely observd there had been no occasion for these remarks, among the many I shall instance one which I beleive has not been minded for these severall years past & is a very materiall one it is that the Receiver shall carefully compare the Register with the Day book before he draws his acco^t. from them and that he enters his declaration that he has so compared them in the Register at the end of every month, but then it must not be in the manner as I find some have done, purely for form sake and to impose upon the Board when it plainly appears they never look'd into the day book, these are the cheif remarks I have been able to make worth your notice, which I humbly offer to yo^r. Hon^r. & c^a. for further amendmen^t. being.

Likewise upon perusal of the stewards acco^t. of provisions diet and stores laid in, and a strict scrutiny into the particulars of the daily Expence, we find that notwithstanding all the pains we have taken at severall times to reform this Expence since the present Govern^{rs}. arrivall we have not been able to succeed, the present steward declaring that he is not able to do it at less charge, thô he has been upwards of two year in the Employ.

This put the Board upon considering that there is a person here who was steward under Govern^r. Pitt; at such time as there appears a very thrifty and frugall management upon the books, and there being no person among all the Factors and Writers by whom we can hope this buisness will be so well manag'd as by one that has had so much Experience thô many of them may be very fit for other Employes,

AGREED that Henry Spackman do take charge of the stewards Employ upon tryal, to be continued according to the proof he gives us of his good management by lessening the Expence and nothing should have put us upon this Extraord^{ry}. method but the impossibility of complying with the Hon^{ble}. Comp^{as}. orders for retrenching the Expences by any other way we can think of.

Generall letter from the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. and Council of Fort St. David dated the 28th. inst. read with their apology for the badness of their cloth, which we cannot but think very foreign to the purpose.

Cawne Bahawdir, which is the occasion of my writing you this to acquaint you that Elunbore &c^a. villages are made the Jaggeir of said Nabob Gusdeen Cawne, wherefore I would advise you to permit Yeavellapah Muddelaree to take quiet possession thereof, which (as we have a freindly correspondence together) I hope you will readily acquiesce to, without breaking our friendship and losing the good esteem of Nabob Gusdeen Cawne, what can I write more.

TO NABOB SADATULLA CAWNE.

Last night I was hon^d. with your Excellen^{cy}s. perwana and observe the contents, the favours I have receivd from your Excell^{cy}. since my arrivall to the Government of this place have lain me under so many obligations that I cannot express the joy I felt upon reading the welcome news of your Excell^{cy}s. being confirmd by the new Nabob Gusdeen Cawne in all those honours, preferments, and priviledges w^{ch}. you have formerly enjoyd. Your Excellen^{cy}s. consummate experience in the Government of these parts give you a just title to continue in it, and Gusdeen Cawnes great wisdom is very apparent in the prudent choice he has made, may the great God of Heaven heap still more blessings upon your head, and make you great in the favour of the new king Furrackseer.

I make no doubt but by the favour of yo^r. Excell^{cy}s. kind intercession, and the remembrance of our former services during the warr of Chingy, so largely sett forth in our Neshawn from Cawne Bux a person of Gusdeen Cawnes generous temper will permit us to remain in quiet possession of our three villages, which we have enjoy'd so many years without interruption, and which yo^r. Excell^{cy}. well knows were given us in consideration of the great supplys of ammunition &c^a. sent up to the Camp of Cawne Bux, as well as severall considerable presents made to a much greater amount than the three villages were worth.

If your Excell^{cy}. approves it I am ready to send away a proper Vackeel to congratulate Gusdeen Cawne as soon as he arrives in any part of his Government and as I said before if your Excell^{cy}. continues your friendship I shall not doubt of success from the great esteem he has of your judgment and merit, and in the meantime I hope you will let us remain in quiet possession of our former priviledges; Our present of a very considerable value is now ready in Bengall to sett out by way of Patna in order to be laid at the new kings feet, who is so renown'd for generosity and justice, and has express'd so many kindnesses to our Nation for the sums we advanced him at Patna when he was upon his march to Agra, that I dare hope he will both confirm and add to our old priviledges, in which I must greatly depend on yo^r. That your Petit^r. took up of Don Estevão Aquinha in Manilha the sum of three thousand Dollars at resp^{cia}. at thirty five $\frac{1}{4}$ Cent for this place and Manilha, but not returning himself at the departure of the Chindadre, he lent Owannes Avet Jehoiakim de Gregorio, & Surhaud, one thousand eight hundred and eighty Pag^s. at resp^{cia}. on the said bottom at thirty $\frac{1}{4}$ Cent payable to the aforesaid Don Estevão in Manilha to whom he at the same time wrote a letter of advice of it and inclosing one of the bonds signd by Owannes Avet & c^a. deliverd the same to Surhaud who proceeded on the ship & was to discharge it in Manilha, the other two being then present, your Petit^r. also wrote another letter of advice by the same ship, which he deliverd to another person who deliverd it safe to Don Estevão by vertue of which upon the arrivall of the ship Don Estevao made a demand of the aforementiond mony of the persons who receivd the effects of Surhaud who died in the Voyage, but they deny'd payment until the bond which had been deliverd to Surhaud should be produced, altho it was particularly enterd in Surhauds books, now M^r. Anthoy Barnewall having been bound for your Petit^r. due payment of this money at his making up his acco^t. with Don Estevão he deducted the said principall. & resp^{cia}. with eight hundred Dollars damage for not having rec^d. his mony in due time whereupon the said Barnewall protesting against the proceedings of these Executors of Surhaud, they paid him the principall and resp^{cia}. the night before his departure from Manilha, having detain'd the same near six months in their hands, but would not pay the said damage, wherefore as your Petit^r. has been obligd to allow the same to M^r. Barnewall he made a demand of it of Awannes Avet & Jehoiakim de Gregorio, who refusing to pay it he enterd his action against them in the Worsp^l. Mayors Court, who were pleas'd to give judgment in their favour.

WHEREFORE yo^r. Petit^r. has humbly made bold to appeal to yo^r. Hon^r. & c^a. humbly requesting that you would please to take this affair into consideration & he as in duty bound

shall ever pray & c^a.

The Mayor having deliverd his opinion as to the judgment pass'd in Court and the reasons that ruld them in the said judgment, the Defendants were called in and fully heard, and it appearing to us that the resp^{cia}. bond mentiond in the appeal (had it been produc'd in Manilha) was not due till two months and a half after the arrivall of ship Chindadre, which was some time after the Galleon saild, the Armenians can no way be accountable for any damages sustaind by the said mony not being paid in time to be made use of upon the Galleon, so that Cap^t. Bell is to seek redress in that particular from the person that wrongfully stop'd his mony for such notionall damages in Manilha.

But then as it appears by these Armenians the Defendants own confession, that they sent letters by the S^t. Juan repeating their orders to discharge the bond which letters did come safe to their Agents hands sometime in Septemb^r. 1712, and Mr. Anthony Barnewall declaring that both he and Don Estevão Aquinha to whom the bond was payable offerd to give athentick discharges for the mony thô the bond was not forthcoming, which the Armenians do not deny, and further there being all the reason in the world to beleive that the bond was concealed by the Armenians, because it appears that the letter in which it was inclosd fell into their hands and that they knew what the said letter contain'd.

1st. It is to be observ^d. that the foot of their Invoice from Europe is £ 46568 : 6 : 7 whereas in the acco^t. stock in the Journall page No. 1 it is enterd £ 46638 : 4 : 11 which exceeds Europe Invoice £ 69 : 18 : 4 and arises from

their making a he[ad] of Canary to the same amount, which is included in the charge of the Invoice without making deduction of the £ 69 : 18 : [4] and which error occasions another in their N.B. wherein they s[ay] their bullion costing with charges £ 45360 : 14 : 1 makes that value of a Tale to come out at 7 : 3 : [f.] $3\frac{1}{2}$ and something more herein they mistake the amo^t. of the bullion which is no more than £ 45290 : 15 : 9 they having chargd it with the £ 69 [18 : 4] too much so that the Tale comes out nearest 7 : $3\frac{1}{2}$.

2^{dly}. They bring their whole quantity of bullion to the head of cash, whereas in my opinion its much better that the severall species thereof had different heads, whereby the loss or gain might appear upon every one apart, and the cash to have consisted [of] no other than what was for house Expences and other petty disbursements, and when taken for those acco^{ts}. to have been [added] to the species it belong'd to, for by this method 'tis to be observd in buying their gold with Crusadoes they part with them at $93\frac{1}{2}$ which is loss (and that should have appeard upon th[at] head and not be thrown on the gold to make it dearer) and this leads me to remark to your Hon^r. &c^a. that our Hon^{ble}. Masters are considerable sufferers by sending Crusadoes to China, for the Dollars and Crusadoes cost them the same price whereas pillar Dollars pass curr^t. at 94, and it is with difficulty they part with the other at $39\frac{1}{2}$.

3^{dly}. In the Journall fol^o. 2 there is enterd acc^t. Exchange Tale 20593 : 5 : 1 for that sum in Crusadoes exchangd with the same Cargoes of the Herne for seven chests of Duccatons to purchase Gold with, I look upon this a needless head, because if their Cash had a just equivalent it Could be no acco^t. Exchange, thô I perceive the design to be to shew our Hon^{ble}. Masters that the Hernes silver was properer to buy gold than theirs, and therefore ought rather to have been put on board the Stretham.

4^{thly}. The ballance of the Cash Acco^t. is Ta. 11 : 5 : 67 which remains in the Supra Cargos hands.

AGREED that we can have now no pretence for proceeding in the method we were in last year when we compounded with Vincatrama, as expressd at large in our Consultation of the 28th. Novemb^r. last, obliging our selves that if hereafter we gave more to others, we should do the same to him in proportion.

The seventy seventh paragraph of the Generall letter by ship Heathcote Anno 1708 & the eighty second paragraph of d^o. ship Marlbrô Anno 1711 perus'd and debated, wherein we find it strictly recommended to deduct for all the false charges and ill practices found out by those who examin'd Iapa Chittys acco^{ts}. and to make an estimate of other acco^{ts}. in proportion to his.

The President offers to the Board upon the debate, that he has made the strictest enquiry imaginable ever since his arrivall, but could never find so much as a copy of the letter from Mr. Pitt and Mr. Raworth to the new Company touching this affair, nor any acco^t. in writing of what was transacted by them with Iapa Chitty to give us light into the abuses aforementioned.

He further reminds the Board that when Mr. Raworth was present in Council last year, he ask'd him where those letters & papers were relating to the new Companys debt, and what he knew particularly of ill practices and false charges in Iapa Chitty's acco^t. to which he answerd that he never had any of the papers in his custody, nor could he call to mind any ill practices or false charges by Iapa Chitty in his acco^{ts}. with the new Company.

Mr. Bernard Benyon offers up on this debate that he remembers very well Iapa Chitty was concernd in providing a parcel of Metchlepatam goods after the Union, which upon opening here were found to be farr inferior to the musters upon which he agreed accordingly a considerable abatement was made by Mr. Pitt, and he beleives it was inferrd from thence that the Merchants might have been guilty of the same ill practices in the new Company's affairs.

AGREED upon the debate that whereas the goods mentiond by Mr. Benyon to have been provided after the Union, were not sorted till they came here, it was but just to make an abatement for what they were inferior to muster, but that is not the case with the new Companys Merchants, whose goods were sorted and imbald by the said Companys Factors, and their acco^{ts}. adjusted before they receiv'd their bonds, so that unless we could prove that these Merchants were in some contrivance with the Companys servants to abuse them in the sortment, their debt appears to us to be just.

However the said Merchants being again calld in were acquainted, that the Hon^{ble}. Company have by these ships given orders to terminate this affair, but those orders are limited and not in the sense they seem to understand them, that the Comp^a. have found by experience at the candle that the goods sent them home on acco^t. of this debt were farr inferior to what they should be, and that both they and we are very well satisfied there have been ill practices between them and the Companys servants in providing and imbaling the said goods for which they must expect to make full satisfaction, and then the Board will proceed towards discharging them.

RESOLVED it is the opinion of this Board, that the President do treat with the aforesaid Merchants and endeavour to discover what sum will satisfie them before we come to any further agreement.

The Fort S^t. David joynt stock Merchants sent for up hither at their request as mentiond in our Consultation of the last of July, being calld in, were ask'd the true reasons why they so earnestly desird to appear before this Board, to which they answerd that they were not longer able to bear the hardships put upon them by the Deputy Govern^r. and his Dubash Dossu who had confind them to the beating Godowns from the 4th. to y^e. 12th. of May, and again from the 24th. of May to y^e. 8th. of June without permitting them to go to their habitations, till at last they were forc'd to consent to the payment of three thousand Pag^a. down, and to give a note of their hand for five thousand more, to be deducted out of the next payment made them, that the pretence made use of for extorting this sum of money was, the great discredit they had brought upon the Deputy Govern^r. by the torn cloth discoverd in the last Contract, that they had willingly offerd to give good cloth in the room of the bad, thô the fault was in the washers and not in them, but the Deputy Govern^r. told them he would answer all the damage both in England and at Fort S^t. George.

the Ft. St. David Merch^{ts}. calld in & the reason of their desiring to be sent for up & demand^d. they complain of unjust imprisonments & extravag^t. extortions.

They were further askd why they did not compleat the old Contract sooner, and why they had brought in no goods upon their new agreement in March last, to which they reply'd, that they had brought in upon the old Contract as fast as goods could be provided, but the delay had been chiefly among the washers, and as for the new Contract the hardships they had sufferd had determind them to proceed no further in the Companys business till their greivances were redressd.

The President offers to the Board that the method establishd by the R^t. Hon^{ble}. Company for carrying on their Mercantile affairs and for the Government of their Garrisons and Factorys has been intirely neglected and despisd by the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. of Fort S^t. David, who has assumd to himself a liberty of acting as if he was independant to this Board, Consultations are neglected, Paymasters and Cash acco^{ts}. are fictitious and irregularly passd, our strictest orders have been contemnd, he has promoted and commissiond Officers of the Garrison unknown to this Board, he has considerably increasd the pay and allowances of severall persons, particularly in Diet mony to the Gentlemen of Council three Pag^s. p month each, and almost all other Expences in Generall, He has laid out considerable sums in building, and has lett out the Companys bounds to rent without our Knowledge or consent, He has us'd the Companys Merchants very barbarously whereby they have been necessitated to seek protection and redress from this Board, He returns no answers to such persons as have large and just demands upon him, with many other irregularitys, which this Board ought not to bear with any longer, least the Hon^{ble}. Companys affairs should be brought into irrecoverable confusion.

The President further offers to the Board severall paragraph[s] [in] their Generall letters dated 19th. & 21st. Augst., as also a copy of a pap[er] or protest signd by M^r. Raworth and Council dated 18th. Augst. which [is] read and considerd, and the Board came to the following resolution.

Presd^t. furth^r. offers to consideratⁿ. sev^{ll}. para^s. of y^e. Fort St. David Lett^{rs}. dat^d. 19th. & 21st. Augst.

That whereas in the 7th. paragraph of the Fort S^t. David letter dated 19th. Augst., the Deputy Govern^r. in his name declares our proceedings (in sending for the Companys Merchants up hither at their repeated request) to be highly prejudicial to the Companys interest and that of this place, we are obligd to justifie ourselves in as plain and publick a manner as possible to our R^t. Hon^{ble}. Employers, tho' we cannot but think it an unexcusable peice of presumption in M^r. Raworth, to send us such a charge in a Generall letter from a subordinate Factory, which is giving encouragement to those under [him] by his example to dispute and disobey our orders hereafter.

ARTICLES OF A CHARGE EXHIBITED BY THE HON^{ble}. EDWARD HARRISON Esq^r. PRES^{nt}. & GOVERNOR OF FORT S^t. GEORGE & C^a. COUNCILL againt ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. DEP^{ty}. GOVERN^r. OF FORT S^t. DAVID for breach of orders and other mismanagements in the Government of that Place.

ARTICLE THE 1st.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. did take upon him contrary to our orders to alter the Hon^{ble}. Companys List of Investment, w^{ch}. we deliverd him here to contract by at Fort S^t. David in Septemb^r. 1712, and did afterwards cavill and dispute with

us upon that Subject till at least a month and a half of fair weather was lost which was the true reason why they were afterwards in so much hu[rry] at Fort S^t. David to wash cloth for the dispatch of the Howland on the occasion of so many thousand peices being ill cured [and lying] in the washers hands besides what went upon the Howland. full proof of this article will appear in examining the letters that pass'd between us September and October 1712 and in March and April 1713.

ARTICLE THE 2^d.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. has assum'd an unprecedented power to give extravagant allowances and Military titles to severall persons without our knowledge or permission, an intolerable Expence has been permitted and allowd of in the Stable, and the ARTICLES OF DIET STORES LAID IN, and we observe an increase instead of a diminution in almost every article of the Pay masters acco^{ts}.

The foregoing ARTICLE is fully provd by the Paymasters acco^{ts}. and particularly that of the month of May last (since which none have been sent us) wherein Ensign Hobba is enterd Leiutenant and receives Leiutenants pay, also Serg^t. Hickman is enterd Ensign and receives pay as such without ever so much as asking our consent. In the Gunroom crew are eight Gunners mates at eight & a half, eight, seven, and six Pagodas ₹ month, whereas five Pagodas has always been the settled wages to that Employ both here and at Fort S^t. David, except only to one Cheif mate eight Pag^s. the number of Gunners mates is increased to double as well as the Gunroom crew The CHARGES GENERALL, CHARGES EXTRAORD^{ry}. WAGES & ALLOWANCES are most extravagant and must have some unfair articles concealed in them; the CHARGES OF CATTLE amounts to double our Expence here, thô we have twice the number of horses, the CHARGES OF DIET & STORES LAID IN is three hundred ninety two Pag^s. six fanams, which in proportion to what we spend here ought not to be two hundred. Our Letters will make appear that we have often complaind of these extravagancies in vain, and particularly in the 3^d. paragraph of ours dated the 3^d. of July last to which they answer in the 10th. paragraph of ours dated 26th. ditto very peremptorily that their Expences are as low as possibly they can be.

ARTICLE THE 3^d.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. has unwarrantably laid out the Hon^{ble}. Companys mony in buildings without our knowledge & permission, and when pursuant to their standing orders, we requird the mony so laid out to be repaid into their Cash he not only contemnd the said order but insultingly declar'd our proceedings illegal[&] chargd us with partiality, appealing to the Hon^{ble}. Company against their own orders, reserving to himself a right of appeal to an higher power than them, at the same time exposing this Board in a rude paper sent about to his Council to sett their hands to, and absolutely refusing to refund the money.

This ARTICLE is fully made out as follows. The Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. wrote us in a particular letter dated 26th. of Novemb^r. 1712 that he had begun to repair the garden house without our consent, for which he endeavours to excuse himself by the necessity of the thing, undertaking to compleat it for five hundred and fifty Pag^s. which sum he desires we would permit him to reimburse himself out of the Cash, In the 3^d. paragraph of ours dated the 4th. of Decemb^r. following we consented to his being reimbursd so farr as the five hundred and fifty Pag^s. but at the same time condemnd his manner of proceeding and forbad it to be made a precedent of hereafter when the Paymasters acco^{ts}. came up to the last of May there appeard to be twelve hundred twenty seven Pag^s. thirty three fanams & seventeen cash, chargd in the months of Novemb^r., Decemb^r., Jan^{ry}., Feb^{ry}., March, April and May to have been laid out on the garden house, over and above five hundred fifty seven Pag^s. reimbursd him in Novemb^r. Cash, and besides what has been laid out since of which we cannot be exactly informd, because they willfully neglect to send their Paymasters acco^{ts}. for June, July and August, thô we are assur'd there is a further sum expended

The remaining part of this ARTICLE is fully provd by a copy which the Dep^y. Govern^r. sent us of his protesting paper dated the 18th. of Aug^t. signd by himself and Council, and by their Generall Letters of the 19th. & 21st. of Aug^t. last, wherein he firmly adheres to his declaration in the said paper.

ARTICLE THE 4th.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH ESQ^a. to the unspeakable prejudice of the Companys affairs under his management, did keep their Merchants under confinement till they were obligd to purchase their liberty with a round sum of money, which has occasiond them to neglect bringing in goods upon their last Contract and to apply to this Board for the security of their lives and fortunes.

THIS ARTICLE of the CHARGE is fully made out by the paper hereunto annexd, containing the oaths of the said Merchants to the severall particulars of their complaints, taken in the most solemn manner according to the Gentue Custom.

These Merchants were not sent for up hither till after they had severall times petitiond the President for justice and protection, declaring that if refusd they must fly the Companys bounds, the pretence for confining them was that they should make satisfaction for the damagd cloth, accordingly the Dep^y. Govern^r. and Council wrote in y^e. 10th. parag of their letter dated the 30th. of April, that they ought to be obligd to forfeit all the bad cloth, and to give as much good in the room of it gratis or be handd, and in the next letter where this affair is mentiond dated the 20th. May, parag N^o. 3 we are told that if we should think fit to proceed with severity and fine them to amount of the damagd cloth only, we must think of procuring a new sett of Merchants, for these would never be able to proceed upon their Contract, this sudden alteration in opinion was very surprizing, because we never had so much as hinted any intentions of severity and only demanded them to take back the damagd and give us good cloth in the room.

These contradicting letters were wrote much about the same time that the Merchants were confined, and the contrivance is too plain to need any further explanation. It would have been too hard no doubt upon the poor men, if we had handled them with the same severity as the Dep^y. Govern^r. did upon that occasion.

ARTICLE THE 5th.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH ESQ^a. notwithstanding our repeated orders in the most pressing terms we could use, and particularly in the 2^d. paragraph of ours dated the 3^d. of July, to send up their acc^t. of Cash monthly as soon as passd in the first Consultation of the month, to show the little value he sets upon our orders has not sent the acc^t. of Cash for July to this very day, so that we are intirely in the dark and unable to carry on the Companys affairs.

ARTICLE THE 6th.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH ESQ^a. in further contempt of our orders declares in the 7th. paragraph of their Generall letter dated the 19th. of August, that one Annapa whom we wrote for is his imediate servant and shall not come at our command. This Annapas name was mistaken for Manāpa one of the Companys Merchants sent for up hither as the Dep^y. Govern^r. knew very well, thō he gladly laid hold of the opportunity to show his contempt of our orders.

ARTICLE THE 7th.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH ESQ^a. (thō it always has been the Custom to acquaint this Board and obtain our consent before they let out the Companys bounds at Fort S^c. David to rent, which he well knew and performd last year) has now thought fit

to assume an authority to let them out to the forementioned Annapa and others, without giving us any notice thereof to this day and in this article all the Councill are as guilty as himself.

ARTICLE THE 8TH.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. in further contempt of our authority has not to this day returned any answer to our particular letter wrote him on the 18th. of July last, wherein we demanded a parcell of Pearl, Amber, and other things wanting in the acco^t. of the present provided for the Mogull, which he as Warehousekeeper having under his custody is obligd to be answerable for, the whole amount of what [is] wanting is twelve hundred & fifteen Pagodas eighteen fanams. In the same letter we likewise wrote to press the payment of a bond of thirteen thousand eight hundred and four Pag^s. nineteen fanams & forty cash with interest due to M^r. Josiah Chitty in Bengall, which bond has been long recommended to us by the President and Council in the Bay, for recovering the mony to pay Chittys Creditors that are rich shroffs of Patna, and likely to embroil the Companys affairs if not satisfied.

ARTICLE THE 9TH.

The said ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. confesses himself that he did conceal the ballances due to the Hon^{ble}. Company from Mathew Weld as Paymaster and Store-keeper till we found them out, and since the said Mathew Weld has been suspended for nonpayment he declares that he paid seven hundred & fifteen Pag^s. of the debt to the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. upwards of a year & a half ago in order to be paid into Consultation, the said Weld being then lame and not able to attend, however this sum was not paid in in June last, nor can we learn whether it is done to this day.

ARTICLE THE 10TH.

The President likewise declares that he has just demands upon the Deputy Governour (which he is ready to prove) as Attorney to the Estate of John Dolben Esq^r. deceased to William Proby Esq^r. late Cheif of Surat, and to Mess^{rs}. John Russell Esq^r. & Abrahm Addams in Bengall amounting in all to five thousand Pag^s. or thereabouts, concerning which he has wrote severall letters but cannot obtain any manner of answer, likewise many complaints of the same kind have been made to him by other persons, that have demanded their just due in letters that they know he has receivd, but never could obtain any sort of answer whatsoever.

THE RECAPITULATION of the foregoing ARTICLES of this CHARGE is

That ROBERT RAWORTH Esq^r. DEP^{TY}. GOVERN^R. OF FORT S^T. DAVID has faild in his respect and duty to this Board his Superiors. That he has been guilty of contempt and breach of the Hon^{ble}. Companys and our orders. In not keeping to the list of Investment last year. In not repaying the mony laid out on the garden house without our consent. In not sending his acco^t. of Cash and Paymasters acco^{ts}. according to direction. In refusing to send a servant of his upon our summons. And in not answering our Letters of demand touching the present and M^r. Chittys bond. That he has lavishd the Companys mony by increasing the Expence farr beyond any of his Predecessors. That he has assumd an unwarrantable liberty without our knowledge or consent to encrease the Military officers & Gunners pay— to lay out a considerable sum in building and to let out the Companys bounds. That he has dealt disingenuously with the Company and with us, by confining the Joynt stock Merchants and extorting mony from them on acco^t. of the damagd cloth, at the same time excusing them to us as not guilty, and pleading that if we should be severe upon them they must be undone. That he has neither done justice to the Company nor Mathew Weld, by keeping his mony that should have been paid into Consultation so long ago. That he gives no manner of answers to persons that have just demands upon him for considerable sums of money at which they very loudly

complain. Lastly That he has insulted this Board in an unsufferable manner, by declaring our proceedings illegal, thō warranted by the letter of our Hon^{ble}. Masters orders, by accusing us of partiality in appealing to impartial judges, and sending it us by way of protest signd by his Council, whom we must likewise accuse as concernd in most of these disorders, by their tame compliance in setting their hands to whatever he indited, and suffering him to act so many irregularitys without one dissenting vote.

The foregoing charge being read was afterwards debated article by article, and to the 9th. article particularly Mathew Weld appeard and offerd his oath that he never desird M^r. Raworth not to pay in the seven hundred & fifteen Pag^s. till he could pay all as M^r. Raworth writes in his of the 19th. of Aug^r. but on the contrary paid it into his hands instead of paying it into Consultation, because he was lame and could not attend to do it himself.

the foregoing charge debated article by article.

AGREED unanimously that every article in the said charge is fully made good.

Agreed y^t. every article is fully made good.

The President further offers to the Board that we have paid a bill of Exchange drawn in Jan^y. last by the Dep^y. Govern^r. and Council of five thousand Pag^s. which was not accounted for in their Cash the last of June that many other complaints have been made by particular persons w^{ch}. not having yet been fully provd were not incerted in the charge, thō there is but too much reason to beleive them, such as abusive language and severe threatnings to the Gentlemen of the Council, whereby they have been intimidated to sett their hands against their inclinations, for the proof of which he produces letters from Mess^{rs}. Woodward & Houghton two of the Council, and M^r. Richard Farmer lately sent for up hither by the Hon^{ble}. Companys orders declares, that the hard language he severall times receivd at the Board from the Dep^y. Govern^r. was the true reason for his absenting from the Board some time before he came away, but these and other such like complaints will be fully made good when people are at liberty to speak for themselves.

The Presd^t. acqu^s. y^e. Board of sevl^l. furth^r. parti^{cl}s. w^{ch}. thō not incerted in y^e. charge we have great reason to beleive true.

The case at present is that our affairs at Fort S^t. David are in the utmost confusion, that the Merchants now here (who are the best of the whole sett and have servd the Company at Conimeer and Fort S^t. David; upwards of thirty years, thō M^r. Raworth would make them insignificant fellows to invalidate their Evidence) are determind never to return to their habitations as things now stand; No Investment can goe forward and consequently we shall be disappointed of near a thousand bales for the Jan^y. shipping, the Merchants acco^t. of the last Investment is not settled, we know not how it stands, what there is due to them, nor what Cash there is to pay them, the Cash Acco^t. being purposely kept back, thō so often demanded on our part, our orders are of no validity if the Dep^y. Govern^r. dos not like them, if we reprimand them for any neglect we are sure to be insulted, if we write to demand either the Companys or private peoples mony no notice is taken of our letters.

the present condition of our affairs at Ft. St. David stated.

Wherefore it is unanimously AGREED that we are not able to carry on the Hon^{ble}. Companys affairs at Fort S^t. David according to their orders without removing Robert Raworth Esq^r. from thence.

the Comp^{ys}. affairs at Fort St. David not to be carryd on without remov^g. M^r. Raworth from thence.

Then the extract of all the Hon^{ble}. Companys orders was perusd, to find such articles as relate to the suspension & dismissal of those that are members of this Board, as likewise the old Companys printed orders signd by Sec^y. Blackborne, all which ord^s. have been confirmd and referd to since the Union in the 1st. paragraph of the Generall letter by ship Tankerville dated the 18th. Jan^y. 1705.

the Comp^{ys}. orders relating to suspension revisd.

What we find particularly relating to the affair now before us are as follow.

— FORT ST. GEORGE, OCTOBER 1713 —

In the old Companys letter to this Agency dated y^e. 9th. of Novemb^r. 1670, we find the following paragraph relating to disputing and breach of orders &c^a.

“ We have settled it fully in your orders by our last years shipping, unto which we require all persons to yeild obedience, not only those appointed by us to particular places, but where we have left it to you to supply such as shall be vacant according to our rules, and if there be any that shall not comply therewith we do authorize you to send them home for England, for we have found it prejudiciall to our affairs to have persons to dispute our orders, given immediately by our selves, or such as they shall by our power receive from you, and therefore are resolvd for the future, that thô we shall take a strict account of the proceedings of our Presid^t., Agents, Cheifs & Councils yet we shall not suffer any particular persons to oppose our or their orders, nor any Cheif or Factors to dispute ours and the orders of our Agent & Council^l., for that it is inconsistent with orderly Government, or the well carrying on our trade, and that this may be the better effected, and that no persons there may support themselves in such disturbance in expectation of any freinds they may have here, we have orderd that none from hence do write concerning our affairs but in the Generall letter, unless it be to give their freinds their good advice & counsel for the more faithfull discharge of their duty in their places.”

In a printed paper lately found by rummaging in the Sec^{ry}s. office signd Ro. Blackborne Sec^{ry}. dated at a Court of Committees for the Hon^{ble}. the East India Company holden the 31st. day of Octob^r. 1679, and containing orders and rules to be observd by a[ll] persons in the Companys service, we find the first, second, and fourth articles relating to the cause now before us and in conformity to them M^r. Raworth cannot be continued longer in the R^t. Hon^{ble}. Companys service.

The forementioned printed orders are particularly recomended to this Agency in y^e. 55th. paragraph of the old Companys letter dated the 3^d. of Decemb^r. 1679 in the following words.

“ Inclosd we send you some printed papers containing further orders and rules to be observd by you concerning our Factors and do require you to put the same in effectuall execution, that we may for the future prevent those inconveniencys that happen to us and our Trade, by our Factors and servants running into debt beyond what they are able to pay.

Since the union of the two Companys we find no orders renew'd for dismissing those of this Councill, but we think the following 107th. paragraph of the letter by the Dartmouth dated Jan^{ry}. y^e. 3^d. 1710, relating to Mess^{rs}. Faunce & Bridges is meant to extend to all persons in the Companys service, because none are therein excepted.

“ We have considered your account of the reasons for dismissing Mr. Bridges & Mr. Faunce, & perusd the Consultations relating thereto & on the whole approve thereof, because we can never consent to have the authority of the President & Council disputed, & notwithstanding severall fair cautions disobeyd, had they thought the resolution in favour of M^r. Berlu had been too hard, they should have submitted thereto for the present and awaited our finall dicision if they had thought fit to have sent us a state of their case and their request thereupon.”

And in the 33^d. paragraph of the Hon^{ble}. Companys letter by the Hallifax dated Feb^{ry}. y^e. 4th. Anno 1708 there are these following words.

“ We shall always lodge a power in our President and Council to suspend any of the Councill or other subordinates, when they have or think they have a just reason, and if it be of great crimes they are charg'd with that deserve confinement we shall approve it.”

All the foregoing premises and orders having been fully considerd and debated the following question was put.

Q. Whether this Board is not obligd upon the charge now read and other circumstances concurring to remove Robert Raworth Esq^r. from the Government of Fort St. David.

AGREED in the affirmative *nemine contradicente*.

Q. Whether he shall be suspended or dismissed.

AGREED unanimously that he be suspended, that his Commission be revoked and superceeded, the same to be signified in a Generall letter to him, with orders for him to repair hither, when his charge shall be delivered him.

Agreed y^t. Mr. Raworth be suspended & his Commission revokd.

In consideration that M^r. Thomas Frederick has the Hon^{ble}. Companys books now in hand to ballance, and that this affair requires a person to sett out with all expedition, M^r. Henry Davenport was desired to go down upon this occasion, who declared that his resolutions were fixed for England by the next ship, however he was willing to go upon this service, provided that when he had received the Government, and settled matters, which he supposed might be done in the term of twenty days, he might then be recall'd to prosecute his voyage for Europe.

in consideration that Mr. Frederick has the books on his hands to ballance.

AGREED & ORDERED that M^r. Henry Davenport be commissioned as Commissary & provis^l. Dep^y. Govern^r. of Fort S^t. David, to sett out this evening in order to receive the Government from M^r. Robert Raworth, and that he be particularly instructed to contract forthwith for all the Longcloth and Salampores he can procure for the Jan^y. shipping.

Mr. Davenport elected Commissary & provis^l. Dep^y. Govern^r.

ORDERED that M^r. Bernard Benyon do take care of the Warehouse during his absence.

Mr. Benyon to act in the Warehouse employ till Mr. Davenports return.

AGREED that M^r. Philip Baker be restored to his former station in Council at Fort S^t. David, having cleared himself of the imputation cast upon him, and promised to behave himself with all due respect to his Superiors hereafter.

Mr. Philip Baker to be restored to station.

AGREED that M^r. Mathew Weld do accompany Henry Davenport Esq^r. to Fort S^t. David, in order to be restored if his debt is actually paid into the R^t. Hon^{ble}. Companys Cash, otherwise to wait till we are further informd of the truth of that affair.

Mr. Weld to accompany the Dep^y. Govern^r. & to be reinstated if he make a good his ballances.

ORDERED that Lieut^t. Gabriel Poirier, Gunn^r. Hugonin and twelve soldiers do accompany the new Dep^y. Govern^r. to Fort S^t. David for a guard.

Capt. Poirier, Gunn^r. Hugonin & 12 sold^rs, to be sent with the new Dep^y. Govern^r.

Draughts of a Commission for M^r. Davenport and a Letter to Mr. Raworth read and approved the latter is as Entered after this Consultation.

TO IN THE CHARGE ENTERED IN THE FOREGOING CONSULTATION.

FORT S^t. GEORGE 30TH. SEPTEMB^r. 1713.

WE the subscribers do upon our oaths declare that we were forcibly detain'd in the beating Godowns at Fort S^t. David by Dossuo the Dep^y. Govern^r. Dubash, and hinder'd from going to our houses at Cuddalore three & twenty days Viz^t. first eight days from the 4th. May to the 12th. ditto, and the second time from the 24th. May to the 8th. June.

That the said Dossuo declar'd it was by the Dep^y. Govern^r. orders we were confin'd, and oblig'd us to pay a large sum of money before we were releas'd for good and all, upon pretence that we had done his reputation great prejudice by the affair of the torn Long Cloth and Sallampores, and WE further declare that when we were forc'd to pay the mony to procure our liberty, the Dep^y. Govern^r. told us he would answer for the damag'd cloth both to England and Fort S^t. George.

We do still further depose that this cruel treatment was the true reason why we so often wrote to the Govern^r. to be sent for up hither, and why no goods were brought in upon the new Investment.

The President communicates to the Board a letter from Henry Davenport Esq^r. dated the 8th. should have been the 9th. ins^t., advising us that upon his arrivall at the edge of the bounds of Fort St. David he dispatchd Leicut^t. Poirier before with our letter to M^r. Raworth and a short one from himself, copys of which he inclose[d] to which M^r. Raworth in a short time returnd answer that he would not allow him any authority to rule there by whatever Commission he could receive from us, all the outworks were alarmd with the usual signals for enemys when M^r. Davenport enterd the[ir] bounds, and when he came to Tevenapatam gate he was denyd entrance by shutting it upon him, and the Officer's declaring he had an order not to lett him in, all the Council came in to M^r. Davenport except M^r. Richard Harrison, Ensign Hobbs being posted at the garden with a hundred men, M^r. Davenport sent to him for admittance there, but he sent word that he would obey no orders but Mr. Raworth's, and that if he offerd to come into the garden wth. any peons or soldiers he would fire upon him, upon which finding the whole Garrison debauchd

from their duty (except old Cap^t. Hugonin and some other of the Officers which were confind beforehand) he was forced to retire out of the bounds to a Choultry about five miles distance for the security of his life and the treasure he had with him, Mr. Raworth having given out severall unaccountable orders to some of the Officers, and publickly threatend to cutt off, the severall papers relating to this affair are Enterd after [this] Consultation, particularly M^r. Raworth's orders to Leicut^t. John[ston] the day before M^r. Davenport arrivd.

This affair being debated with the greatest concern to see the whole Garrison of five hundred men and upwards seduced by [such] false perswasions from their duty to our R^t. Hon^{ble}. Employer and commanded openly to resist our orders which may be [of] very ill consequence hereafter,

Davenport & Warre dated 14th. inst^t. read, which acquaints us since their last they were chiefly taken up in managing an intelligence within the Fort and Tevenapatam in order to get away as many men as possible, that Ensign Hobbs came in to the 10th. upon promise of keeping him in his post, and some Europeans and Topasses had followd his Example, that on the 12th. in the evening M^r. Theobald and some other Gentlemen who accompany'd the President hence riding to take the air near Tevenapatam were fired upon by Johnston and a party of men, th^o M^r. Raworth had given his word no guns should be fired, that this action occasiond them to endeavour the surprizall of Tevenapatam gate and a round battery on Patcharee hill, which commands the Town as well as the garden house they live in, that they were encouragd to this by their intelligence in y^e. Town and about nine at night they sent in three detachments of forty men each well officerd one of which commanded by Ensigns Hobbs & Basing surprizd the rounds, except the Sergeant who made his escape, and afterwards seizd the gate of Tevenapatam without any harm done, sending away all the guards prisoners.

Genl. Lettr. from y^e. Honble. Presdt. Messrs. Davenport & Warre datd. 14th. inst^t. read. advising y^e. Ensign Hobbs was come in. that Johnson & pty of men had fired upon some of y^e. Gent^l. y^t. attendd the President.

that they had seizd Tevenapatam gate.

That another party marchd directly to Patcharee hill where they surprizd the Centinell below, but the rest of the guard being alarmd by the Sergeant of the rounds that escapd, were all got on the top of the point, and th^o twice warmly attackd made so obstinate a defence that they thought it more advisable to leave them severall men being wounded and the two Officers Handlon & Gardiner that commanded the Party among the rest, that they calld out to those on the point to surrender to the Govern^r. before they advanced, offering pardon for all past, but they resolutely answerd they would neither take nor give quarter and begun the fire first whilst the attack lasted the Fort kept firing their great guns but they did no execution.

that they had made an attack on Patcharee hill but were repuls'd.

That the third party commanded by Leuit^t. Roach and Gunn^r. Hugonin lay in ambuscade near the Fort gate, in hopes Johnston would have sallied to releive the hill, which had he done in all probability they would have surprizd him & his men and peradventure the Fort, but they kept all close, the morning coming on they were obligd to draw off all their men, that had otherwise been exposd both to the hill and the Fort, but first they brought away one gun from the gate and dismounted another, that the prisoners they took and those that come over the 13th. at night were twenty seven in number.

that they had laid an ambuscade to have surprizd Johnston but y^t. he kept close within y^e. Fort.

That the Hon^{ble}. President the 13th. in the morning sent M^r. Raworth an order to command Johnston with a party of fifty men to the garden and likewise sent an order to Johnston at the same time to come upon his peril, and both these orders were deliverd but no answer returnd.

Raworths lodgings as they learn from deserters, that severall of the men sallied from the Fort but were so warmly receivd & two very dangerously wounded which made them return faster than they came out.

Raworth, for which took a bill dated 29th. August last for seven hundred eighty five Pagodas sixteen fanams, under his and the Councils hands to receive said money from the Hon^{ble}. President and Council of Fort St. George, on whom said bill was drawn, but tendering the same on my arrivall here I was advisd that said bills could not be paid by reason the Hon^{ble}. President & c^a. had sent orders in a Generall Letter to Fort St. David, not to draw any more bills of Exchange without their permission, to which I hereby affirm and declare that to the best of my knowledge I do not remember ever to have seen any such letter, the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. ma[kes] no scruple or objection to receive the money, nor did the Council ma[ke] any when they signd said bill of Exchange.
