THE Chinese sage, Lao-Tze said : "To perceive things in the germ is intelligence." The "germ" around which the WORLD POWER CONFERENCE was conceived was very simple. A vision of the nations of the world after the great war revealed the need for a conference of practical men, scientists, engineers, manufacturers, financiers and politicians, to consider the <u>utilisation of the</u> forces of nature, in the light of a new internationalism, and to attempt to discover a means by which the nations of the world might be preserved from the constant actions and reactions of past history, and might all advance together. International organisations were already in existence, having specific objects and dealing with special aspects of technical development, but they did not provide the wide platform required for a study of all aspects of the programme under consideration. Above all, it seemed desirable that the engineers of the world should take counsel together, for

Many models of beauty built out of the soul of man through years of peace were ruthlessly crashed and broken. Empires built by human genius fell one after another. Boundary lines of nations were crossed and recrossed in a day.

Still man's heart pulsated with hope. His clenched fists must again become open palms to cover the continents. His latest achievements in science and engineering must profer a torch to light up the hitherto obscure chambers of his ascending pathway through nature. In every country men took their notebooks in hand and began to inquire what steps could be taken to prevent a repetition of such conditions. As the appearance of the earliest forms foretold the advent of the human form, so the knowledge of the forces of nature, used to satisfy primitive ins incts, seemed to foretell the advent of a new day when the marvellous resources of nature would be used for the creation of a new world order. Every advance in the lengthened chain of progress had been only a base from which the next step could be taken. Practical men of affairs, discussing the situation, acknowledged to each other that true human progress was founded, not on what was taken from others, but on what was contributed towards the development of humanity.

What programme could be outlined for the realisation of such an ideal! An international morality seemed necessary. The fact must be realised that it does not pay in the long run to deal unfairly with any nation, and that the ultimate position of the victor may be worse than that of the vanquished. In true human freedom, there is a refreshing sense of proportion and perspective, and no past models serve for the future.

It was in this spirit that the WORLD POWER CONFERENCE was called into being, and it was in this spirit that the participating countries responded to the invitation.

The work of organising the Conference was carried out on lines calculated to attract the interest of those in all countries connected with Power and Power Problems in any form, and a comprehensive programme was arranged in full knowledge of the difficulties attendant upon its execution, but in the assurance that only a wide programme would meet the needs of existing conditions. If, without making invidious distinctions, definite stages may be cited in the order of events, the following are perhaps by the nature of things entitled to positions of prominence. The first, when the Council of the British Electrical & Allied Manufacturers' Association made a wORLD FOWER CONFERENCE possible by ensuring the necessary financial support. The second, when a number of distinguished scientists, engineers, and leaders of industry

in Great Britain consented to associate their names with the work, and were closely followed by the great Departments of State, who nominated their official representatives, and by the representatives in London of the Dominions overseas. It was thus made possible, in the name of the British Empire, to invite the nations of the world to meet in London to survey the power resources of each participating country and the extent to which they had been utilized; to consider the technical problems involved and what steps, if any, could be taken to provide adequate opportunities for the co-operation of all nations in the development of power resources and the economic, political and educational issues involved. The third, when the United States, France, Italy, Japan and other great nations of the world gave the Conference their wholehearted co-operation and support, thereby ensuring its success. The last, and in many ways the most significant of all, in that it placed the WORLD POWER CONFERENCE in a unique position among post-war conferences, and afforded perhaps a vindication of its somewhat ambitious title, when the way became clear to invite Germany to participate, which she did in a manner calculated to seal the spirit of complete goodwill in which the Conference assembled.

On June 30, 1924, the FIRST WORLD POWER CONFERENCE was opened by H.R.H. THE PRINCE OF WALES, under the Chairmanship of the RT. HON. THE EARL OF DERBT, in the presence of about 2,000 delegates representing over forty countries.

Such success as was achieved was a measure of the support which the Conference received from all parts of the world, and the reader may judge of the value of that support from the words of MR. O. C. MERRILL (U.S.A.), the Chairman of the Closing Meeting: "What we have accomplished here I consider too great, both in its amount and in its value, to be encompassed within the terms of any resolution that we would be prepared to discuss to-day. We have brought together here the leading technical experts from all over the world, and we have brought together in the papers presented to this Conference the greatest contribution, in my judgment, on the subject of Power that has ever been brought together; a series of contributions that will serve as text-books for engineers for many years to come. Each country has brought its contributions and we have brought them in the open. Seldom before, so far as I am aware, has there been such freedom in presenting, from all sources, information about the topics with which this Conference has been concerned. . Above all, however, I count the greatest value of the Conference the fact that individuals from so many nations have met together and, irrespective of the position that was taken by any group in the years just behind us, we have been able to meet round a common council table in friendly co-operation. The more that we are able to do that in the future, the more we learn, as we have learned at this Conference, the views and the purposes of other peoples, the more we create these personal relations and acquaintanceships, the less likely will it be that other considerations will disrupt the peace between us in the future. This I count as the outstanding feature of this Conference."

The names of those from all parts of the world who supported and attended the Conference are given in the Appendix to Volume I, and the papers presented and the discussions thereon are set out without comment. These papers were contributed at the request of the National Committees in the various countries; and as these Committees were composed of men capable of securing the contributions of their greatest national experts, it is with confidence that the reader is left to form his own estimate of their value, and it only remains for me to offer my sincere thanks to those who made the compilation of these volumes possible.

PREFACE.

Whatever the future may hold for Australia, there is no question but that the country has the material prospects of a great development. A study of this report will show that ample natural resources are available for the production of the necessary energy for the development of her pastoral and mineral resources, which are well known and need no special reference here. Abundant supplies of black coal, the full extent of which it is at present impossible to estimate accurately; vast deposits of brown coal, of remarkable thickness and readily accessible by open-cut working; upwards of ten million horse power available from the streams and rivers within the Commonwealth, and an equal amount in the territories administered under mandate; the possibility of discovery of natural oil in commercial quantities, the prospects of which, from latest reports, are considered by some of the leading geologists of this country to be distinctly favourable : with such reserves it will be long before Australia is handicapped in the development of her industries for lack of natural sources of power.

Australia's isolation, ever-diminishing with the advancement of systems of communication is, however, still somewhat of an obstacle to her progress, and even in the preparation of this report has mi'itated against an adequate presentation of her potential and developed resources. The difficulty of keeping in touch with the progress of the organisation for the World Power Conference has made it inadvisable to deal with other than the general aspects of the subject. With a fuller understanding of the nature of the Conference, and with opportunities for more comprehensive investigations into the undetermined resources of portions of the country, a more detailed presentation for subsequent conferences will be possible.

The official records, and, in many cases, the control of the resources of the Commonwealth, are mainly in the hands of Federal and State Departments and special Commissions. The information for this report has been supplied almost entirely by such bodies, and may, therefore, be accepted as authoritative within the limits of the respective investigations; but in many instances these investigations are far from complete. The summary of power resources contained herein can only be taken, therefore, as a general statement of the country's partially investigated reserves of power. It will remain for further geological and hydraulic surveys to make a more complete summary possible.
