UNIVERSITY OF MYSORE

Report on the Working of the University during the year 1926-27.

The year was one of growth and expansion, especially in connection with the starting of Intermediate Courses of Studies of the University under the Re-organisation Scheme.

A Regulation amending the Mysore University Regulation, V of 1916, providing for the establishment of Intermediate Colleges was passed in March 1927.

Government were pleased to sanction the arrangements from the 1st July 1927 for the starting of Intermediate Colleges in 4 centres, viz., Mysore, Bangalore, Tumkur and Shimoga. Provision has been made for men for both Arts and Science at Mysore and Bangalore and only Arts at Tumkur and Shimoga, and for women, for Arts at the Maharani's College, Mysore, and for both Arts and Science at the Vani Vilas Institute, Bangalore.

Accordingly, the Entrance classes in the Collegiate High schools have now been recognised as Junior Intermediate classes and arrangements made for imparting instruction according to the new syllabuses, preliminary to starting these Intermediate colleges separately from next year. These Colleges will replace the present Entrance classes in the Collegiate High schools and the First Year B.A. classes in the Arts colleges.

Government were pleased to sanction, during the year, one lakh and fifty thousand rupees to implement the Intermediate Scheme. Estimates for separate buildings for the Intermediate Colleges at Mysore and Shimoga amounting to Rs. 80,000 and Rs. 17.000 respectively have also been sanctioned and these buildings are under construction. Arrangements have also been made for the Government Collegiate High School at Bangalore being handed over to the University for the Intermediate College at Bangalore, the High school classes being shifted to separate buildings.

- 2. Vice-Chancellor: Sir Brajendranath Seal, Kt., M.A., Ph.D., D.Sc., continued as Vice-Chancellor. He proceeded on privilege leave for one month and twenty-two days from the 13th January 1927 and Mr. B. M. Srikantia, M.A., B.L., was in charge of the current duties of that office, during the period, in addition to his own.

The Council held 17 meetings as against 14 in the previous year.

- 4. Registrar: Mr. B. M. Srikantia, M.A., B.L., who was appointed as Offg. Registrar in place of Mr. V. Subrahmanya Iyer, B.A., who was granted combined leave for four months from 1st July 1926 preparatory to retirement, was confirmed in his appointment on 1st November 1926.
- 5. Senate: The Senate met 7 times (2 ordinary, 1 special, and 4 special convened at the request of the Fellows under Ordinance 6) including the preliminary meeting held in connection with the Convocation of 1926.

Steps were taken during the year for the reconstitution of the Senate as from 22nd July 1927.

The following are some of the most important recommendations made by the Senate:—

- (a) the undesirability of holding Second Examinations;
- (b) introduction of a scheme of Studies in Ancient History and Culture for the M.A. Degree Examination:
- (c) institution of a Chair of Kannada Culture in the Maharaja's College, Mysore;
- (d) institution of a degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D. honoris causa) in the University;
- (e) revision of the syllabus of Studies and Scheme of Examination for the B.E. Degree in Electrical Engineering;
- (f) adoption of the detailed Courses of Study and Schemes of Examination for the Intermediate in Arts and the Intermediate in Science;
- (g) adoption of Courses of Study and Schemes of Examination for the M.A. and M.Sc. degrees in Mathematics;
- (h) modification of Ordinance 62 (A) relating to the B.T. Degree examination, so as to provide for candidates who have passed in theory and failed in Practice in Teaching to appear for "III Practice in Teaching" only;
- (i) arrangements for suitable accommodation being set apart in Mysore and Bangalore to be named "The Mysore University Fellows" Consulting Room";
- (i) preparation of a complete census of the graduates of the Mysore University and the occupations which they are now filling:
- (k) recommendation to Government to give the Senate the privilege of electing from among its Fellows not less than 3 members to the University Council;
- (1) adoption of the scheme regarding the Corresponding Language or Languages for each Selected Language in the Intermediate in Arts.
- 6. Amendments of the Ordinances: Ordinances 7, 44, 45, 58, 61, 62 (a) III, 67, 78, 79, 83, 90 (B) 4 (b), and 98 were amended during the year. (Vide Appendix "A" for details.)
- 7. Faculties: The Faculty of Arts met twice by itself and twice with the Faculty of Science during the

year. The business transacted referred to the M.A., and M.Sc., courses in Mathematics, and the courses of studies in different subjects for the Intermediate Examinations in Arts and Science.

There were three meetings of the Faculty of Science and two joint meetings of the Faculties of Science and Arts in the year. The Faculty considered the recommendations of the several Boards of Studies regarding courses of studies, scheme of examinations, text-books, etc., for the Intermediate in Arts and Science. The Faculty considered also the opinions of the Boards of Studies in Kannada and Tamil regarding the relative standards of Kannada and Tamil taken as Second Language and taken as Selected Subject for the Intermediate Examinations and also the M.A. and M.Sc. Course in Mathematics, time-table and scope of the single paper in English for the Intermediate in Science.

The Faculty of Engineering and Technology met once during the year. The business transacted was in regard to the amendment of Ordinance 89 A.

The Faculty of Medicine also met once during the year to consider the subject of allowing provisionally a student who has failed in one subject only in the III L.M.P. examination to continue his course in the higher class.

Action was taken during the latter part of the year for the reconstitution of the several Faculties as from the 1st July 1927.

- Dr. R. G. Sambasivan, L.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., who returned from England was appointed Professor of Pathology in place of Dr. P. Parthasarathy with effect from the 6th June 1927.

12. Original or Research work done by Professors;

CENTRAL COLLEGE

Professor C. R. Narayana Rao was entrusted by the University, with the difficult and responsible task of conducting a new literary venture, the Half-yearly Journal of Arts and Sciences which is being produced under the auspices of the University.

The Poor Students' Section of the Libraries at the Maharaja's and Central Colleges were found extremely useful and the students took full advantage of the facilities afforded thereby.

- 15. Courses of Study: Government in their order No. D. 236-7 Edn. 401-26, dated the 20th June 1927, sanctioned the courses of study and schemes of examination for the M.A. and M.Sc. Degrees in Mathematics as recommended by the Senate. Arrangements were accordingly made during the year for the starting of these courses as well as the Culture History course and the course for M.A. in Kannada with effect from the 1st July 1927 in the University. The third M.B.B.S. class was opened during the year in the Medical College.
- 16. Finances: According to provisional figures, the income of the University from all sources amounted to Rs. 11,13,245 and the expenditure to Rs. 10,20,788 against Rs. 9,33,203 and Rs. 9,87,296 respectively in the previous year. A statement of receipts and expenditure is appended.
- 17. Strength and Attendance in Colleges: The total number of students on the rolls of all the colleges including the Maharani's College was 1749 against 1623 in the previous year,

18. Excursions:

CENTRAL COLLEGE

Geology.—Students of the Second and Third Year B.Sc. classes and also the students of the Third Year B.A. class were taken by Professor Sampat Iyengar t_0 Rajahmundry, Vemavaram, etc., to study the fossiliferous deposits, during October.

Students of the Second Year B.A. class were taken by Mr. S. Lakshmana Rao to Holenarsipur, Kadakola and Mandagere during December.

Students of the Second Year B.Sc. class were taken for a tour for field work along with officers of the Geological Department of the State, in the districts of Mysore, Hassan and Chitaldrug. This was done during the Long Vacation of 1927.

Zoology.—Students of the Third Year B.Sc. class and the Second Year B.Sc. class were taken by Mr. Tirumalachar to Sagar, and the Baba Budan and the Tarikere area, during October, to study and collect specimens of Cryptic Fauna and to gather laboratory material.

Botany.—Students of the Second and Third Year B.Sc. classes visited Pamban, Rameswaram, Dhanushkod and Madras to study marine vegetation. Mr. L. Narayan Rao accompanied the party. The trip was made during the Christmas Vacation.

Chemistry.—Students of the Third Year B.Sc. class, accompanied by Messrs. C. Srikantia and M. Seshaiengar, visited chemical works at Ranipet and Madras during December. -

MAHARAJA'S COLLEGE

A large party of students accompanied by Professor S. V. Venkatesvara Ayyar visited Belur, Halebid, Basthihalli and Somanathapur in the months of March and April 1927.

Separate quarters for the steward of the Central College Hostel and sick-wards for the hostel are long-felt wants.

University Lodges:—The University Lodge at Mysore accommodated 33 boarders, and 16 other students had their meals there. This provision, upon a co-operative system, of cheap boarding and lodging for the poorer students is of inestimable value.

22. University Union at Mysore: The University Union, Mysore, exhibited great activity in all directions. There were 20 debates on important subjects. Lectures on various subjects were given. In November, Sir I'. C. Ray adressed the Union. In December 1926, the Baroda University Commissioners visited the Union and expressed their warm appreciation.

The Union also interested itself in various other actiies, e.g., Parliamentary Debate, study circle, elocutions matic activities, competitions and social gathering.

The Union Magazine has had a successful year and ceived a number of very interesting contributions.

The Union is arranging to publish a Memorial Volume criticism and appreciation in honour of the great Kannada bet, 'Ranna.' A Committee presided over by Mr. B. M. rikantia is in charge of the work.

The Union Day celebrations were held on February 1th and 12th, when there were races for non-student memers and Fancy Dress Competition. On February 12th there was prize distribution by Lady Todhunter.

Professor A. B. Mackintosh, M.A., was President during the year.

23. Athletics: Physical exercises received adequate attention in all the Colleges.

Though there was no perceptible improvement in the quality of sportsmen representing freshmen, a larger number than in previous year took an active part in outdoor games and gymnastics in the Maharaja's College. Besides taking part in various tournaments, the College players went to Madras during the Christmas Holidays to play against the Colleges and clubs of the City.

The total strength of the Rover Scout Troop of the Central College was over 60 including six members of the College Staff. About 30 members of the Troop attended a course of lectures in First Aid delivered by Dr. C. B. Rama Rao, B.A., M.D., and the certificates were awarded to the duly qualified candidates by St. John Ambulance Association Certificate Examination. A batch of about 30 Rovers underwent training in Musketry and camped at Hebbal for 22 days to complete their course of Musketry training with the kind help rendered by the Mysore Infentry, First Battalion Two interesting camps were held during the year one at Nandi and the other at Closepet, the latter being a joint camp with the Mysore Maharaja's College Rovers.

A special certificate was awarded to the Corps by the Boy Scout Head-quarters for valuable services rendered at the Big fire on the Exhibition grounds during Christmas of 1926.

The strength of the Rover Scout Troop of the Maharaja's College was about 100 including 6 members of the College Staff. 12 rovers were trained in Musketry. Two camps were held. Important services were rendered at the Chamundi Jatra, at Convocation and at the Railway Station during Dasara.

Messrs S.V. Rangana and G. Hanumantha Rao of the Maharaja's College Staff were deputed to attend Scouting Courses held at Colombo in April 1927. They were trained in various subjects (both compulsory and optional) and passed tests in them. The members were invested as "Rôvers" by the Camp Chief, Mr. J. De. Sarma, B.A.

- 24. Medical Inspection of Students: The first and the final year students of the University were inspected by the Medical Officers appointed for the purpose and their reports were under consideration at the end of the year.
- Mr. K. B. Madhava, Professor of Mathematical Economics and Statistics, Maharaja's College, has been entrusted with the work of preparing Statistical Analysis of the results of these Medical Inspections.

The work of the Bureau consists mainly in collecting information about courses of study in England and answering enquiries.

- 26. Registration of Graduates: There were 27 annual subscribers and 113 life members at the end of the year 1926-27.
- 27. Inspection of Collegiate Classes: The Entrance classes were inspected by the Professorial Staff of the University, as usual.
- 28. Convocation: The Ninth Convocation of the University to confer Degrees was held on the 27th Novem-

ber 1926 when His Highness the Chancellor presided. At this Convocation, the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters was conferred by His Highness the Chancellor on Munir-Ul-Talim Mr. H. J. Bhabha, C.I.E. Sir P. C. Ray, KT., C.I.E., D.SC., PH.D., F.C.S., addressed the Graduates.

Two special convocations of the University for conferring Degrees on the candidates were held in the months of September 1926 and April 1927.

29. Recognition of Degrees and Examinations: The Bombay University recognised the B.Sc. Degree Examination of this University as equivalent to the B.Sc. Examination of the Bombay University for the purposes of admission to the M.Sc. Examination.

The College of Engineering, Bangalore, was added to the list of Engineering Colleges and Technical Institutions recognised by Government under Rule 141 (b) of the Bombay Boiler Rules 1924, published in Government Notification No. 1325 dated the 5th July 1926.

30. Archaeology: The receipts and expenditure of the Department during the year under report are Rs. 18,104-5-0 (including the budget grant) and Rs. 16,097-10-0 respectively.

The number of monuments surveyed and photos taken of important views by the Archæological Department was 22 and 32 respectively.

About 172 records consisting of copper Plate grants, sannads and stone inscriptions relating to the dynasties of Gangas, Chalukyas, Rashtrakutas, Hoysalas, of Vijayanagar and of Mysore were collected and edited.

3 copper plate grants and a metallic processional image of Siva were added to the Museum and a plaster cast model of the famous Mathura Lion Capital was purchased therefor.

Some of the new facts gleaned during the year are:—

- (ii) the form of secret writing referred to in the Arthasastra;
- (iii) the Arthasastra is comparatively earlier than the Tantrakhyayika Version of the Panchatantra:
- (iv) determination of the Age of Kanada, Bhamaha and others:

- (v) verification of the occurrence of a Solar Eclipse on the Vaisakha New-Moon day of Gupta Sam. 257 corresponding to Monday the 18th of May A.D. 459 as stated in the Battakapatra grant of Dharasena II, presumably issued in that part of the empire where the eclipse was visible; and confirmation thereby of the Initial years of the Gupta Era in A.D. 200-201.

32. General:

- 1. During the year under Report, the University had the honour of a visit by His Highness the Maharaja of Navanagar and by Dr. Franklin Edgerton, Professor of Sanskrit and Comparative Philology of the Yale University, U.S.A.
- 2. Prof. A. G. Widgery and Dr. K. G. Naik, Members of the Baroda University Commission visited the University and the Institutions under it at Mysore and Bangalore.
- 3. A course of lectures was given by Mr. T. W. Dear to the students of the Engineering College, Bangalore, on "Machine Shop Practice" and "Modern methods of Production."

- 4. Government having in their Order No. E. 5303-5 Edn. 61-23-57, dated the 31st March 1927, approved of the differential qualifying minima for declaring eligibility of S.S.L.C. candidates for admission to College Courses of Study, the University Council, at the meeting held on the 16th April 1927, resolved that the differential minima as approved by Government be applied from the year under report. The eligibility list of candidates for the S.S.L.C. Examination of 1927 was accordingly published by the University.
- 5. The University has become a member of the National Institute of Industrial Psychology, London.

Degree examination of this University, came out successful at the Indian Civil Service competition and have each secured an appointment in the Indian Civil service during the year. These make 3 appointments in the Indian Civil Service within the last three years, to the credit of the Central College.
- 7. Mr. B. K. Tirunaraniengar, B.Sc., of the Mysore University was successful in gaining an appointment in the Indian Accounts Department (F.C.S.)
- 8. Government in their Order No. D. 5347-50 Geol. 135-25-40, dated the 12th January 1927, appointed Mr. P. Sampat Iyengar, M.A., Professor of Geology, Central College, as one of the members of the Committee in connection with the working of the Byrapur Chrome Block by Government Agency.
- 9. Mr. K. B. Madhava, M.A., Professer, Maharaja's College, Mysore, was, in Government Order No. D. 10313-19—Ec. 60-26-1, dated the 26th May 1927, appointed as Secretary to the Committee for organising financial assistance to industries.
- 10. With a view to co-ordinate the work of the Geological Department with that of the Geology Section in the Mysore University, Government in their order No. 2217-67—C.B. 152-26-6, dated the 5th February 1927, directed that the two posts of Director, Geological Department and Professor of Geology in the University be combined into one and that the Director of Geology be ex-officio Professor of Geology in the Central College.
- 1. Permission was given to Mr. M. Sultan Muhiyuddin, Professor of Education, Maharaja's College, to serve

on the Andhra University Commission to inspect and report on the Training College at Rajamandry.

2. Permission was given to Miss Lakshmi H. Channaiya, B.A., Assistant Mistress of the Maharani's High School, to work in the Chemical Laboratory of the Central College.

Annual Report of the Board of Audit to the Senate for 1926-27

(under Ordinance 27)

Meetings of the Board, etc.

- The Board was reconstituted at the Senate meeting dated 19-11-26 as follows:—
 - 1. Messrs. M. T. Naraniengar (Chairman)
 - M. A. Srinivasan
 - 3. N. Madhava Rao
- The *itest* meeting of the Board was arranged to be held at Mysore on Thursday the 27th January 1927 at 3 P.M. to audit the Accounts of the University for the period ending October 1926. Meanwhile Mr. N. Madhava Rao resigned his membership on the Board and the meeting had to be postponed.
- Mr. S. G. Sastry was appointed in place of Mr. Madhava Rao on 29-1-27 and the Board had its first meeting on 22-2-27 at Mysore and audited the accounts of the following institutions:—
 - (i) Mysore University Office (3 to 6 P.M. on 22-2-27)
 - (ii) University Library(iii) Oriental Library(iii) Oriental Library(iii) Oriental Library

 - (iv) Maharani's College (3 to 5 P.M. on 23-2-27)
- 3. The Bangalore institutions were proposed to be inspected between the 18th and 23rd April 1927. In the interval Mr. S. G. Sastry resigned his place on the Board and Mr. M. Ramachandra Rao was appointed instead on 30-4-27. Mr. M. Ramachandra Rao having declined the appointment, Mr. B. K. Ramakrishnaiya was nominated on 7-6-27. On 16-6-27 Mr. M. A. Srinivasan resigned his place and his successor Dr. Kunhi Kannan was appointed on 23-7-27. Thus, the second meeting of the Board could not be held till the 12th September 1927 to audit the Accounts of the Bangalore Institutions.

The following programme was adopted at the second meeting:--

(i) Central College (3 to 6 P.M. on 12-9-27)

(ii) Central College Hostel) (8 to 12 Noon on

(iii) Engineering College Hostel | 13-9-27)
(iv) Engineering College (3 to 6 P.M. on 13-9-27)

(v) Medical College (8 to 11 A.M. on 14-9-27)

4. The third and last meeting of the Board was held at Mysore on the 23rd September 1927, when the following institutions were visited :—

> Maharaja's College Hostel (8 to 11 A.M. on 23-9-27). Archæological Office (2 to 3 P.M. on 23-9-27). Maharaja's College (3 to 6 P.M. on 23-9-27).

Detailed reports of inspection have been forwarded to the Registrar for the information of the University Council. The Board wishes to remark here that marked improvement was noticed in the system of keeping Accounts and Registers, as a result of the criticisms of the previous Audit Board.

2 Detailed running Audit

Regulation 19 contemplates a detailed audit of the University Accounts and the pubilication of the Accounts with the Auditor's report annually. We are not aware of any such Report having been published all these years.

The Comptroller's Auditor appears to have conducted the detailed audit of one or two institutions for parts of the year 1926-27, but his reports have not reached the University yet. We see no reason why the University should not insist on receiving the Auditor's Report punctually and publish the same.

Duties of the Board of Audit

The Board of Audit for 1925-26 raised the question of the functions of the Board being made analogus to those of "Public Accounts Committees." In view of the 'specific wording' of Ordinance 27 authorising the Board "to consider ways and means and the financial effects of any important measures in contemplation and make recommendations when necessary to the Council on all matters relating to the finances of the University," we are of opinion that the Board is a 'de facto' financial committee and that the University Council ought to make use of the Board more largely by taking the Board into confidence in all matters touching the finances of the University.

4 Audit of University Hostels Accounts

The Board understands that the University Hostels are not included among the institutions to which the detailed running Audit referred to in Ordinance 27 A applies. If that be so, this Board does not see any justification for asking it to conduct the 'Test Audit' of these Hostels. From what the Board has seen of the Accounts of these Hostels, detailed Audit is absolutely necessary periodically.

5 Important measures in contemplation

- (i) Intermediate Colleges:—The University has resolved that there shall be no 'affiliated' private Intermediate Colleges. This resolution does not seem to be financially sound in view of the limited resources of the University. All the funds at the disposal of the University will be required for developments of the Degree courses in the constituent colleges. At the Intermediate stage, private colleges should be allowed to compete with State Colleges under suitable rules of affiliation.
- (ii) Amalgamation of the Higher Grade of the School of Engineering with the Diploma course of the College of Engineering:—In the absence of details of the proposed amalgamation we cannot offer any useful remarks regarding the proposal.
- (iii) Transfer of Medical College to Mysore:—Financially, the transfer will mean heavy expenditure (both recurring and non-recurring) in the matter of teaching of Science subjects (such as: Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology) to Medical students. At present, these subjects are being taught by part-time professors of the Central College with the aid of the Laboratory Equipments of that institution.
- (iv) M.A. and M.Sc. Courses in Mathematics:—The only provision made so far for these courses is an additional Lecturer for the Maharaja's College and a Demonstrator for the Central College. The Value of the courses depends upon the efficiency of the staff chiefly. An Assistant Professor of ripe experience is the minimum addition one would expect in this connection.

6 Special features of the finances of the year 1926-27

(i) The Board noticed that 'temporary Establishments' in the University Colleges bear a disproportionate ments' in the University of Establishments, Proportionate relation to the 'permanent Establishments, This disproportion ought to be removed at the carliest opportunity.
