THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

BY THE

RIGHT HONOURABLE THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR INDIA.

1860-61.

I HAVE received and considered in Council your Financial letter dated SIE CHARLES WOODthe 16th October 1860, No. 207, and the estimates of the Revenues and No 205, dated 8th December 1860 Charges of India in 1860-61 therewith forwarded.

Military, general, including Local, military 662,788 618,775 17,711,665 £14,391,202

14,391,202 Less in 1860-61 ... £3,320,463

2. As stated in my Financial despatch dated the 27th ultimo, No. 189, it is gratifying to observe the improved result apparent in these statements, and that observation is especially applicable to the Military expenditure, the estimated reductions in which, as compared with your May estimates, amount to £885,118, making the total estimated Military reductions during the current year £3,320,463. This reduction affords

proof of the great exertions made by your Government, and by the Governments of Madras and Bombay, as well as by the subordinate officers of each Government, in effecting the reductions so imperatively called for.

3. The estimated decrease of £314,839 in the civil and political charges arises from a smaller amount being included on account of payments for compensation for losses during the mutiny, and affords no criterion of future expenditure.

4. The decrease in the Indian Navy and marine charges, estimated at £103,620, is temporary. I hope, however, that it will be practicable to effect considerable permanent reduction under this head.

5. Under buildings, roads, and other public works, there is an estimated reduction of charge of £503,064, but that can only be received as a postponement of expenditure.

6. Although, therefore, as regards the present year, the general result is to a certain extent satisfactory, no improvement is traceable in the more recent estimates in the permanent charges, except in the Military Department.

7. On the other hand, a serious increase is observable in the items embraced under the general head of charges of collection and other payments in realization of the revenues, including cost of salt and opium. Of the net increase shown in your most recent estimate, viz., £504,293, £70,000 is attributable to an augmentation of the cost of salt and opium, and £75,500 to the estimated charge of collecting the income tax. But deducting these sums, there remains an increase under the other items of £358,793.

8. I fear it must be anticipated that the last estimate is nearer the average annual expenditure than that of May; but I am desirous of knowing more particularly than it is stated in your letter, upon what grounds the increase has been assumed.

9. There is also an increase of £126,770 under "Judicial and Police Charges," which it appears arises mainly from the retention at Bombay of extra levies of police, which it was supposed would be disbanded.

10. These estimated increases abundantly prove that the most strenuous 8th December 1860. and continued efforts on the part of your Government are demanded in order

to keep down the civil expenditure.

11. You estimate that on the 30th April 1861, your cash balance will amount to £13,452,326; but you remark that great uncertainty exists as to the amount that may be actually realized from the income tax, that the demand on account of the China War may exceed the estimated sum, and that even if the present estimate be realized, yet, as the balances diminish after the 1st May in each year, you entertain some doubts as to your being able to remit the sum of £1,000,000, without the risk of inconvenience, and you desire to be informed whether, in the event of your being unable to make the remittance without the aid of a loan, such loan should be raised in India, or whether the amount required can be provided for out of the £3,000,000 which Parliament has granted power to borrow.

12. In regard to the uncertainty to which you refer as to the amount that may be realized from the income tax, I am unable to form an opinion; but I do not at present see any ground for apprehending that a larger amount than has been already estimated will be required to be disbursed by you on account of the China Expedition, and even if more should be required, the excess would be the same in effect as a remittance to this country of a similar amount. Of any such increase in the expenditure for the China

Expedition, you will immediately apprize me.

13. Assuming that your estimate of the proceeds of the income tax is realized, and that the expenditure on account of the China Expedition does not exceed the amount which I anticipate, I see nothing to disturb your

estimate of the cash balances, except the Railway expenditure.

14. In my Financial despatch dated the 10th July last, No. 110, I informed you that it was expedient that your disbursements on account of railways in the current year should be limited to £4,750,874. From the enclosures to your Financial letter dated the 6th September 1860, No. 184, it appeared that you

considered that the outlay on that account in 1860-61 would be £5,405,000.

15. You subsequently informed me, by your Railway letter of the 18th September, No. 79, that measures had been taken to limit those disbursements to £4,750,000; but my Railway despatch of the 17th November, No. 94, relieved you from positive restriction as to Railway expenditure in the current year, especially where it would be calculated to delay those sections of lines which are approaching completion, or which you may consider of primary importance.

16. It is not improbable, therefore, that your disbursements on this account may reach £5,405,000, and may possibly go beyond that amount. By whatever sum those disbursements exceed £4,750,000, you will be deprived to that extent of the power of remitting to England. The sum of £1,112,711, which I stated in my Financial despatch of the 10th July 1860, No. 110, that I calculated on your being able to remit, will consequently be diminished by the amount in which your expenditure on railroads shall exceed £4,750,000; and if, as is probable, the Railway Companies should be unable to pay a similar amount into the Home Treasury, I shall be prepared to borrow under the power obtained during the last session of Parliament.

17. It is essential that you transmit to me early intimation of any probable disbursements on this account in excess of the allotment of

£4,750,000 above referred to.

18. Under any circumstances, and with reference to my Financial despatch dated the 30th November 1860, No. 194, I must again strictly enjoin that no loan be opened in India without my previous sanction.

19. In the event of your finding that any change is likely to occur in the items comprised in your present estimate, you will not fail immediately to inform me.

1861-62.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Financial letter, dated the SIR CHARLES WOOD. No. 122, dated 2nd May 1861, No. 63, forwarding your budget estimates for the year 1861-62.

1 I have also received the printed proceedings of the Legislative Council

of India for April 1861, containing Mr. Laing's Financial statement (made on SIR CHARLES WOOD. the 27th April) for the year 1861-62.

3. In his observations on the charges of 1860-61 as compared with 1859-60, Mr. Laing stated: "There was not a reduction of £3,300,000 as supposed by Sir Charles Wood, or even of £1,700,000 as estimated by Mr. Wilson, but a positive increase of £213,000 in the total expenditure of 1860-61 over that of 1859-60;" and he further stated that the military charges in India for the same year were £17,750,000, which statement is also contained in your Financial letter under reply.

4. I had previously received the actual accounts for 1859-60, which were sent from Calcutta on the 20th of March last. Those accounts showed an estimated decrease of charge in 1860-61 of £4,407,687, instead of an increase of £213,000, and that the military charge in India for the same year was

£20,909,307.

5. The statements made by Mr. Laing and in your despatch were, therefore, perfectly inexplicable, and it was not until I had had the opportunity of personally communicating with Mr. Laing that 1 became aware that he had derived his information from an official statement prepared in the Financial Department in India, and published by your order in the Calcutta Gazette of the 20th February last.

6. That statement certainly showed an increase of expenditure in 1860-61 as compared with 1859-60 of £213,426, and that the military charges of 1859-60 were, as stated by Mr. Laing in the Legislative Council, £17,750,000.

7. I do not understand why Mr. Laing did not refer to the actual accounts of the expenditure of 1859-60, which had been transmitted to this country more than a month before he made his statement in the Legislative Council.

- 8. It is not, however, my purpose to comment on statements made in the Legislative Council, but to call your attention to the grave error in the preparation of the estimated account of the expenditure of 1859-60, which was published by the authority of your Government in the Calcutta Gazette of the 20th February last.
- 9. That account differed from the regular estimate by nearly £1,500,000, and from the actual account by upwards of £4,000,000; and as the actual accounts for 1859-60 were made up before the 20th March last and transmitted. to me on that day, it is difficult to imagine on what grounds the Financial Department of your Government could have prepared so fallacious a statement towards the end of February.
- 10. I need not observe how much giving to the world statements so erroneous tends to shake any confidence in the accuracy of Indian accounts, and how much it reflects on the conduct of the officers of the departments. I must beg that you will impress upon them the necessity of greater care in the preparation of estimates and accounts.

11. I cautioned you in my letter of the 24th April last, No. 67, against the publication of accounts which might tend to mislead, and certainly this last transaction shows that the caution was not unnecessary.

12. I must also call your attention to your omission to furnish any explanation of the differences exhibited in the actual accounts for 1859-60 as com-

pared with the estimate for that year.

13. Your Financial letter dated the 20th March last, No. 50, which forwarded those accounts for presentation to Parliament, stated that you did not on that occasion think it necessary to offer any remarks on the differences between the estimated and actual receipts and expenditure of 1859-60, or, to defer the transmission of the accounts, to enter into any comparison of the actual returns of 1859-60 with the estimated returns of 1860-61; but I did not doubt that, as in regard to the corresponding accounts of the former year, you transmitted in your Financial letter of the 4th April 1860, No. 80, a detailed explanation of the differences between the estimated and actual accounts, you would have furnished me before this time with some explanation of the remarkable differences between the estimates and accounts of 1859-60.

14. In my Financial despatch dated the 17th May last, No. 85, I called your attention to this subject. No further information has, however, yet reached me, and I must, therefore, request that your accounts and estimates may

2nd August 1861.

SIE CHARLES WOOD, henceforth be accompanied or speedily followed by explanations of the differences shown therein, as compared with your previous estimates and accounts.

15. I cannot enter into a detailed consideration of your budget estimates for 1861-62, as I am not in possession of the detailed appropriation estimates of the military charges which have not yet been received, but I proceed to com-

municate to you my view of the general result.

16. With regard to the income for next year, I can, of course, form no opinion except upon your representation. It is very satisfactory to find that the increase of the duty on salt has not acted unfavorably on the consumption, which I trust is owing to the generally improved condition of the people. The recent fall in the price of opium will necessarily diminish considerably the receipts from that source; but as the income from opium is at all times so fluctuating that it is impossible to calculate on it with any certainty, I can only hope that your estimate of receipt under this head is made with sufficient caution.

17. With regard to the charges, the proposed transfer of £500,000 to local budgets implies, as I understand it, the imposition of local taxation to that amount. I shall be very glad if that can be accomplished so as to relieve the general revenue within the year, but I am a little doubtful whether this can be done within that period. I do not understand whether you propose to diminish the expenditure on public works to this extent, if the transfer be not accomplished, so that at any rate the general revenue would be relieved.

from this amount of charge.

18. I am sorry to say that the reduction in the Home charges assumed by your Government has been made without sufficient foundation. The estimate transmitted by me in February was carefully considered, and I have no reason to suppose that they will be less. There is an arrear of charge on account of sums due to the Imperial Government which must be defrayed in this year, and which raises the amount above that which will, I trust, be the

19. For the present year, however, the Home charges will be £5,323,066 as stated in the estimate forwarded with my despatch dated the 2nd February

last, No. 22, and not £5,005,760 as calculated in your budget.

20. I do not understand the grounds on which the item which is called loss by exchange on railway transactions is omitted in this year's charges. The expenditure in India on railroads will probably be nearly the same as last year, and a similar charge should, therefore, be entered at the same amount as in 1860-61, viz., £473,324.

21. There is no doubt that there is a difference between both this charge and that of the guaranteed interest on railroad capital and all other charges on the revenues of India, as, in the event of the railroads making adequate returns, both of them may be recovered from surplus interest, but in the

meantime they are chargeable on Indian revenues.

22. To the expenditure, therefore, as estimated in your budget despatch, must be added £317,306, being the difference between £5,005,760, the sum assumed for charges in England in the budget, and £5,323,066 as stated in the estimate sent from here, and also £473,324 on account of the charge for loss of exchange. These sums, when added to £41,054,699, will raise the total of the charges for 1861-62 to £41,845,329, and if transfer is not made to local budgets, or the expenditure on public works diminished to the anticipated extent of £500,000, a further sum of that amount will have to be added.

23. As the estimated revenue is £41,294,595, there will be a deficit of £550,734, or £1,050,734 according to the figures derived from your statement corrected as above. I regret that the result at which I have arrived should be less favorable than that contained in your despatch, but it seems to me

to be more correct.

24. The estimated loss of revenue and increase of charge in the current year, owing to the famine in India, is, I observe, about £600,000. This, however, I trust, will not again occur. But it is obvious that further measures are necessary in order to attain an equilibrium of the revenues and charges of India. 25. Whether in the proposed modification of the income tax any

addition can be obtained to the estimated produce of that tax, I cannot say; but I should hope that, even whilst rendering it less oppressive in its character, it may be made, to some extent at least, more productive.

26. It is, however, as I have often impressed upon you, to reduction of Sir Crarks Wood, expense, rather than to increase of taxation, that your efforts must be mainly directed. Much as has been done in the reduction of the native army, I think that the numbers proposed by your Government are still higher than it is necessary or expedient to maintain, and I trust that you will be able to reduce this portion of the military force and charges still further.

27. I will not, however, attempt to point out where, in my opinion, reduction might be made. Your Government and those of the other Presidencies are better able than I can be to select the proper fields for effecting

a diminution of the public expenditure,

28. I am not unmindful of the exertions which have been made by the different authorities in India in this direction, but I am of opinion that there is still room for further measures of reduction, and I cannot too strongly impress upon you how indispensable it is to reduce every source of unproductive expenditure which is not absolutely necessary for the public service.

29. With regard to your estimate of cash balances, I am glad to observe that the balance at the end of 1860-61 is higher by about £1,400,000 than you had estimated in March last that it would be. This affords undeniable proof either of improved revenue, or of diminished expenditure, or of both, and is

most satisfactory.

30. You estimate a cash balance at the end of 1861-62 of £14,264,302, and I apprehend that this is exclusive of the million which I have remitted to you from hence.

31. As regards the state of the Treasury in England, I estimate that there will be a deficiency of nearly a million and a half, and to that amount, at

least, I expect you to remit before the end of the year.

32. I have obtained sanction for raising money by loan in the event of the Railway Companies not paying in sufficient funds to defray the Home payments, but it will be time enough to address you on this subject later in the year.

For presentation to Parliament. 1. The actual Accounts of the Revenues and Charges of India for the year 1860-61, and

2. The Regular* Estimate for 1861-62.

3. An authorized Report of the financial statement made by one of the members of your Government in Council, and a report of permission given to introduce Bills "to amend Act X. of 1860 (to amend "Act VII. of 1859, to alter the duties of customs on goods imported "or exported by sea)," and "to amend Act XXXII. of 1860 (for "imposing duties on profits arising from property; professions, "trades and offices)."

4. The Budget estimate of Revenue and Expenditure, and of Cash

Balances and Transactions for 1862-63.

2. I had before received your Financial letter dated the 24th February last, No. 28, announcing your intention of immediately repealing the License Tax.

3. Before I proceed to refer to the contents of these despatches, it seems to me necessary that I should advert shortly to the question how far your Government is responsible for the statements and views which are put forward

by one of its members who makes the financial statement.

4. It is, of course, impossible that your Government can be held responsible for all that falls from the member of your Council who is charged with this duty, but it must be remembered, nevertheless, that his statement must, in its main features, be the statement of the views of the Government on the financial state and prospects of India, and that the proposals which he makes must be such as the Governor General in Council has approved, and which he is prepared to carry into effect.

5. The measures to be adopted can only be brought forward with the concurrence and sanction of the Government, and it is impossible for the Government to exercise a sound discretion on the measures to be adopted unless it has previously satisfied itself of the accuracy of the statements and the suffi-

ciency of the grounds on which the proposals are based.

6. It is unnecessary to point out to you that no member of your Government would be justified in making statements (which are given to the public through the medium of the authorized reports of the proceedings of the Council of the Governor General, when it sits for purposes of legislation) which are not in their main features consistent with the statements on which the Government has proceeded; and, therefore, I must consider your Government responsible for the general accuracy of the statements and soundness of the proposals which are made on subjects of finance by the member of your Government, who, on such matters, acts and speaks as its organ.

7. In endeavouring to obtain from the statements forwarded by you a clear view of the finances of each year, and to satisfy myself as to the accuracy of the conclusions at which you have arrived, and the expediency of the measures which you have adopted, I have experienced much inconvenience from the changes which have been made in the general headings of the Statements

and Estimates of Revenues and Charges.

8. This is particularly the case in regard to a comparison of the Charges as shown in the Budget and Regular Estimates for 1861-62, of which the fol-

lowing is an example.

9. In the former there are two heads of charge "Civil and Political Establishments, including all Contingent Charges," and "Eastern Settlements," amounting together to 3,192,1711. These heads do not appear in the Regular Estimate, but there are several separate heads of "Salaries and Expenses of Public Departments," "Education, Science and Art," "Political Agencies and other Foreign Services," "Superannuation and Retired Allowances and Gratuities for charitable and other purposes," "Civil Contingencies," and "Miscellaneous," amounting together to the sum of 2,809,9111. I conclude that these latter heads comprise all that was included under the two heads quoted in the Budget Estimate, but I have no means of determining this accurately.

10. I do not object to changes being made which may simplify the form in which accounts and estimates are transmitted to me, but in all such cases, on the first occasion when the altered statement is sent, an account in the old form should accompany it, or such an explanation of the change as will make

clear what the altered headings do include.

11. I must also call your attention to the great want of care which is apparent in these statements. To such of those errors as can be attributed to your having taken an erroneous view of the nature of certain charges, I shall hereafter refer. But the statement forwarded with each of your Financial letters dated the 18th and 19th April last, Nos. 56 and 58, entitled "General" Abstract Statement of the Revenues and Charges of India for the year 1860-61, "and as estimated for the years 1861-62 and 1862-63," contains an error of another description:—

21. With reference to the increase in the Revenue, you state in your Financial letter of the 7th March last, that, under the old system, no means existed of making estimates with great accuracy; that in the estimates for 1860-61 sufficient allowance had not been made for the rapidly progressive increase consequent on the prosperity of the country after the suppression of the mutiny, and that the Revenue of India has been in reality more buoyant than, in the absence of accurate returns, your Government were fully aware of.

22. I am glad to find that your observations appear to be well warranted; and I trust that the expectations which you express of buoyancy of the Reve-

nue will be fulfilled.

23. The Charges in India, which were estimated at 39,610,885L, were actually 40,408,239l., showing an increase of 797,354l., of which, 451,001l. was in the Military Department, in regard to which you observe that it is not a larger difference than might have been anticipated in a year when heavy arrears from the mutiny were still not completely wound up, and great changes were in progress in almost every Department. Increases of 176,245l. also occurred in the Indian Navy and Marine Charges.

24. So far as relates to the Military and Marine Charges, the increases must, I apprehend, be regarded as the consequence of reductions which were ordered not having been effected so early as had been anticipated. pect to the other principal heads of charge, the small increases are not more than the difference which may be expected to occur between estimated and

actual expenditure.

25. Taking, however, the actual Revenues and Charges of the year 1860-61 together, the result must be regarded as very satisfactory, and I am much gratified by the active energy which has been shown by your Government, and by the Governments of Madras and Bombay, by the members of the Finance Department, and by the various other Departments under your Government and under those of the other Presidencies, in carrying into effect the very large reductions by which this satisfactory result has been attained.

26. I proceed now to the consideration of the Estimates for the year

1861-62.

27. I am glad to observe, by the Regular Estimate for that year, that the further experience and information acquired since last spring enables you to estimate the probable income for the year at a larger amount than was contemplated in the Budget Estimate of April 1861. You anticipate an increase in nearly all the principal heads of receipt, and the single exception, in the revenue from salt, is sufficiently accounted for by the diminution of duty-paid

salt in the warehouses, without there being any reason to suppose that the consumption has been affected. The estimated increase of in-

come above that of the Budget Estimate is 1,616,495l,

28. I am sorry, however, to observe that there is a corresponding augmen. tation in your estimate of expenditure, the increase being stated by you at 1,714,370l. Of that sum, 714,000l. is attributable to the increased rate paid to the cultivators of opium, and also to the increase of cultivation; and there is an augmented expenditure for Public Works. There is an increase under the head of Law and Justice; but, so far as relates to these items, the excess is not more than might reasonably be anticipated with reference to the changes

29. There are, however, items of expenditure omitted which I consider it is necessary to add, and the addition of which will, I am sorry to say, materially alter the financial result of the year, as shown in both the Budget and

Regular Estimates received from your Government.

30. It was stated in your Financial letter dated the 2nd May 1861, No. 63, that the item of what is called "Loss by Exchange" (and which, in the Regular Estimate of 1860-61 was 473,3241), had been omitted in the Budget Estimate of 1861-62. This item had been included for some years in the India Accounts, though entered under the general head of Miscellaneous Charges. In the years 1859-60 and 1860-61 it was, in accordance with direc-

tions from hence, shown separately. It seemed to me, therefore, not only SIR CHARLES WOOD, wrong in principle, but as changing the character of the accounts, and giving an erroneous view of the charges on the Indian Revenues, to exclude it; and, therefore, in my Financial despatch of the 2nd August 1861, No. 122, I directed that this item should be included. As the expected expenditure on railroads in 1861-62 would be about the same as in 1860-61, I desired that the sum should be stated at 473,324l. It now turns out, as I learn by Mr. Laing's Minute enclosed in your Financial letter dated the 18th December 1861, No. 219, that, contrary to your intentions, it had already been included, by mistake, in the Budget Estimate under the head "Miscellaneous—Part of Civil and Political Establishments." On a careful examination, however, of your Regular Estimate, it appears to be omitted. No sum is separately stated for it, as should have been done if you had intended to include it; and I see no head of charge, under the items of Miscellaneous Expenditure, stated in the Regular Estimate, which would admit of its being included therein. I cannot but conclude, therefore, that it has been omitted. It will be necessary to add this item to the charge shown in your Regular Estimate for 1861-62.

31. In the Budget Estimate, Mr. Laing had, without assigning any sufficient reason, taken off 317,3061. from the Estimate of Home Expenditure sent to you from this country in February 1861, and which I also apprised you, in

my despatch of the 2nd August 1861, ought to be included.

32. I observe, however, that, notwithstanding that direction, the total sum taken in the Regular Estimate for Home Expenditure is the same as that stated in the Budget Estimate, viz., 5,005,760l., and the only inference from

this is that the necessary correction has not been made.

33. In your Budget Estimate of April 1861 it was anticipated that a sum of 500,000l. might be obtained from local taxation towards the expense of public works, in diminution of the charge on the public revenue, and that sum was deducted from the total charge. This expectation has not been realized, and that sum has, consequently, not been deducted from the general charge under that head in the Regular Estimate.

34. There must, consequently, be added to the Budget and Regular Estimates of Charges for 1861-62, as received from your Government, the following sums:---

35. In your Budget Estimate of 1861-62, you showed a probable surplus of 239,896l,

36. Applying the corrections which then appeared to be necessary, of 317,306l., error in Home Charges, and 473,324l., "Loss by Exchange," I anticipated a deficit of upwards of half a million, if the sum of 500,000l. were transferred to local budgets, or of upwards of one million, if that sum were not so transferred.

37. Your Regular Estimate now received shows a surplus of 142,021l. There must be added, however, to the Charges stated therein, 317,306l., error in Home Charges, and also 473,324l., "Loss by Exchange," which, though unintentionally included by you in the Budget, has been omitted in your Regular Estimate.

38. If no alteration were required in the estimate sent to you in February 1861, these additions would convert your estimated surplus of 142,021*l*. into a deficit of 648,609*l*.

39. But since the estimate of February 1861 was forwarded to you, more

41. I now turn to the Budget Estimate, for the current year, in which, I am surry to say, errors of a similar description to those on which I have been

remarking appear to exist.

42. If no change were made in the Assessed Taxes and Customs Duty, you estimate that the Revenue of 1862-63 would amount to 43,796,200l. I do not at all question that estimate of probable receipts. Indeed, so far as I am enabled to form an opinion, it does not appear to be too sanguine, and, from the experience of former years, there seems to be ground for hope that the actual result may be more favourable than you estimate.

43. It is obvious that I must also adopt your estimate of expenditure in India.
44. I must observe, however, that so far as I can, make out from the figures, you have again omitted the item of what is called "Loss by Exchange." The probable expenditure on railroads in India for this year I assume at 5,500,0001, and this item will, therefore amount to 458,3331.

45. There is, however, a more serious error in your Budget Estimate. With my Financial Despatch dated the 18th February last, I forwarded to you an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements of the Home Treasury for the year 1862-63.

46. In that estimate the disbursements at home which are part of the annual charge on Indian Revenues were stated at 5,664,232l.

47. From this sum you have deducted 702,2461, and have stated the

difference, 4,961,986*l*, as the net home expenditure.

48. The sum of 702,246*l* is thus made up, as appears by the statement forwarded by you, viz.:—

49. I cannot understand the principle on which you have included, in SIE CHARLES WOOD, the income of the year 1862-63, the re-payment of advances made in India on account of the Imperial Government. They were properly included as receipts in the estimate of the receipts and disbursements of the Home Treasury as being part of the ways and means available for meeting Home disbursements. 50. The advances or payments in question formed no part of the annual charge of the year in which they were made, and the re-payment of them can form no part of the income of the year in which it occurs. It is contrary to the first principles of account to treat sums so repaid as part of the income of the year, and as such to deduct them from the charge on the revenues shown in the Home Estimate. 51. Allowing that the other two items in the above statement might be

54. The result of the year 1861-62 will be, there is too much reason to fear, a deficit of 595,5131, and the year 1862-63, if no change took place either in Revenue or Charge, a surplus of 440,9142.

55. I have now to refer to the course which your Government has pursued in these two years, acting on the erroneous views of the finances stated. by Mr. Laing. .

56. In the year 1861-62 you abandoned the License Tax, of which the

estimated produce was from 500,000l. to 600,000l.

57. In regard to 1862-63, you have introduced Bills which will sur-· render —

the result of the year would be a deficit of 810,539l.

58. I trust that, with the warning which this bare statement conveys, it is unnecessary to press upon you further the absolute necessity of the utmost care and accuracy in all financial matters. The first and most imperative duty in dealing with the finances of any country is to form as correct an estimate of the income and expenditure as is possible.

59. I am quite aware that circumstances which could not be foreseen may derange the best previous calculations. It is wise to make a fair allowance for such contingencies, both as to the future revenue and expenditure, and, in this respect, I am bound to say that I think the calculations in India have been well and judiciously made.

60. The errors have arisen, I am sorry to observe, from the misuse of materials about which no doubt existed.

61. In the statement of the past expenditure of 1859-60, made in April 1861, the error was caused by using an inaccurate estimate, when the actual account was available. This, however, inaccurate as it was, led to no consequences, as there was no action to be taken upon it.

62. The errors in the Budget Estimate as to the future expenditure of 1861-62, were pointed out by me in my despatch of the 2nd August 1861, No. 122. Nevertheless, they have been repeated in the Regular Estimate for that year, and the License Tax has been abandoned.

63. In this case you have apparently been led into creating a deficit by the mistaken view which you took of your finances.
64. The miscalculation of your expenditure for 1862-63 arises partly from repeating again the error as to the so-called "Loss by Exchange," and partly from the erroneous application of repayments by the Imperial Government as part of the income of the year.

65. Again, taxes have been reduced, and further expenditure promised, on the faith of this erroneous view.

66. It is useless to discuss now what might have been the proper course for you to have pursued, if you had taken a correct view of your financial position, either in the past or in the present year.

67. The License Tax was abandoned in the course of the winter, and the Acts for reducing the duties of customs, and the tax on the lower classes of incomes, will have come into operation before this despatch reaches you.

68. Nor, indeed, should I wish now to keep up the duties which you have abandoned and reduced. I entirely approve of the selection which was made of the duties to be dealt with, and I anticipate the best results from these measures.

69. As, however, it is neither possible nor desirable to continue these taxes, it is only to a further reduction of expenditure that you can look for attaining a real equilibrium of income and charge, which I had hoped to see established in the course of this year at latest.

70. I do not, indeed, consider it at all impossible that this result may still be attained, within the current year, by strenuous exertions for such further reductions as, I am inclined to think, may be made without detriment to the public service.

71. I regret that the increased appropriation of sums for education and for public works must be abandoned, but, even after this has been done, I

gather from Mr. Laing's statement that the Local Governments will still have SIE CHARLES WOOD, considerable funds at their disposal for the promotion of works of importance.

If the appropriation of 526,453l. for increased expenditure be not made, the estimated deficit of 1862-63 will be reduced to 284,086l.

72. It will then be necessary to effect further reductions to the extent of rather more than 280,000l., in order to attain an equilibrium.

73. I am glad to observe that you have appointed a Committee to inquire into the Commissariat, in which Department I am inclined to think that reductions may be effected, and I hope that some further reduction of Military charge is possible.

74. I need not impress upon you that, after creating a deficit, it is, more than ever, your imperative duty to enforce, in every Department, the strictest

economy, so as to repair the mistake which has been made.

75. I am in hopes, also, although it is not safe to calculate on it yet, that, looking to the buoyancy which the revenue has recently displayed, the income of the year may be somewhat larger than you have anticipated.

76. It has been a source of great satisfaction to watch the financial im-

provement in India for some time past.

77. In my Financial despatch of the 2nd February 1861, No. 22, I anticipated that, by the further increase of the revenue which your Financial letter of the 18th June 1860, No. 143, led me to hope for, and by a further reduction of charges, the measures for effecting which were already in progress, the income and expenditure of 1861-62 would be nearly equalized.

78. Your Financial letter of the 5th February 1861, No. 16, however, took a more desponding view of the financial prospects of India, but the result has fully justified the expectation which I at that time entertained, inasmuch as if the License Tax had been imposed, as was intended at that time and if the received the articipated produce of 600 0001, the received the received the articipated produce of 600 0001. time, and if it had realized the anticipated produce of 600,000l, the revenue of last year would have about equalled its expenditure.

79. In the present year I hope that an equilibrium may be obtained; but, at all events, that most desirable object ought to be accomplished in the

course of next year.

80. It is also a cause of great satisfaction that a very heavy item of expenditure, that on many of the public works is of what is ordinarily called a reproductive character, and tends to increase the revenue in future years,

81. Of this character also is the charge for guaranteed interest, and also that which has been termed "Loss by Exchange," which arises out of the rate at which the rupee is taken in the accounts with the Railway Companies. Both payments are indispensible under the existing contracts for the construction of the railroads in India, and I cannot doubt the advantage which will be derived from those great works in developing the resources and facilitating the administration of that country, as well as in affording a means of reducing hereafter the military expenditure.

82. In the course now of a very few years we may look for the completion of the great lines of railway, and the increasing traffic receipts, as the lines come into a working state, will, I trust diminish year by year the charge

for guaranteed interest.

83. The charge arising out of the arrangement for accounting for the rupee at 1s. 10d. will cease with the advances for the construction of railways under existing contracts, and, if the present rate of exchange should remain, an advantage corresponding to the present charge will accrue to the revenue

on the net receipts of the railways paid into the Indian Treasuries.

84. The sums paid on account of these two heads of charge may, therefore, perhaps be recovered in the course of several years to come, but this depends upon contingencies, some of which may not occur at all; others may not occur for many years, or to the extent which would repay the sums advanced, and I consider it, therefore, the proper course, as I pointed out to you in my Financial despatch dated the 2nd August last, No. 122, and in accordance with the practice up to this time, to continue them, as has hitherto

SIR CHARLES WOOD, been done, among the annual charges on the Indian revenues. The only alternative would be to borrow, year by year, the sum necessary to repay these charges, and add the amount to the Indian debt, but such a course would, in

my opinion, be most inexpedient.

85. Whilst, therefore, these items of charge swell the present expenditure, they must, in the course of years, be eventually diminished, and, on a full review of the state of India and of its resources, I cannot entertain any doubt, if the blessings of peace are preserved to us, of the gradual and steady improvement of the main sources of the revenue, as anticipated by Mr. Laing in his financial statement.

86. There is every appearance of the increasing welfare of the people; active exertions are being made to develop in every way the resources of the country, and I sincerely trust that, by a constant attention on the part of your Government to promote the well-being of the vast population under your rule, their political and social state may be rendered such as not only to ensure their happiness, but also, coupled with a prudent economy, to produce a state of financial prosperity beyond the example of any former years.

I have considered in Council your Financial letter dated the 23rd Sir Charles Wood. March last, No. 37, the Actual Accounts of the Revenues and Charges of No. 115 dated 16th India for 1861-62, the Regular Estimates for 1862-63, therewith forwarded, July 1863. the Financial Statement made on behalf of the Government of India by Sir Charles Trevelyan on the 30th April, the Abstracts of the Budget Estimate, and Estimate of Cash Balances for the year 1863-64, which were transmitted with your Financial letter dated the 5th May last, No. 58, and your Financial letter dated the 22nd May, No. 62, containing your observations on that Estimate, and I now proceed to make such observations upon them as seem to me to be required.

. 2. As regards the Revenues and Charges of the year 1861-62, the Regular Estimate transmitted with your Financial letter dated the 7th March 1862, No. 38, gave the following as the probable amounts:—

3. In my Financial despatch dated the 9th June 1862, No. 83, I point-

ed out to you, that, adopting generally your Estimate of Revenues and Charges, but adding to the latter the amount of the loss by exchange, and making certain necessary adjustments therein in regard to the items of

Home Charges and Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, the probable result would be a deficit of 595,5131.

4. The Actual Accounts which have now been received from you and

presented to Parliament, after the correction I was enabled to make as to Home expenditure, whilst they show an increase of expenditure, show a still larger increase of receipt, the effect of which, I am

happy to say, is to reduce the deficit on the year to only 50,628l.

5. The increase of charge in India was 309,123l., and that of guaran-

teed interest on Railway Capital 165,418l. These increases were counterbalanced to some extent by a decrease of Home Charge of 101,044l., while the net increase of revenue was 918,382l. If this extraordinary increase of revenue had not occurred, the final result would have

been a deficit of no less than 969,010l.

6. The most considerable improvement in the Revenue was under the head of Land, which exceeded the Estimate by 862,930*l*., of which the only explanation given in your letter is, that 427,900*l*. of the increase is attributable to an alteration in the mode of stating the accounts in the North-West

Provinces, "where instalments of revenue are often paid in anticipation of the days fixed for their receipt, and such payments have hitherto been placed in suspense until the commencement of the year to which they properly whereas, under the Budget Rules, all payments, whether due to the year or in anticipation, are at once credited as Revenue of the year in which they are made. It appears also, from Sir Charles Trevelyan's statement, that a much larger sum was obtained from the sale of Khas Mehals in 1861-62 than in 1862-63, and it is probable, therefore, that the large amount of Revenue in 1861-62 under the head of Land is in some measure attributable to those sales. Both sources of increase in that year must, therefore, apparently be regarded as exceptional, and not likely to recur.

7. The other principal increases beyond the Estimate were under the heads of Assessed Taxes, 111,706l.; Opium, 139,769l.; Stamps, 140,687l.; Mint, 127,815l.; and Public Works, 137,308l., the last being partly due to arrears of Canal Collections in the North-West Provinces, and partly to larger

receipts of tolls and fees, and sums transferred from local funds.

of which 547,4591. under Salt is described as the result of a much larger quantity of English salt, which had paid duty in previous years, having been taken out for consumption in 1861-62 and substituted for salt of Indian manufacture, which would have paid duty in that year.

9. Although the Charges in India under all heads exceeded the Estimate.

as already observed, by 309,1231., the increase under Army was 881,900%, which is stated by you to be due wholly to payments of arrears, not calculated on in the Regular Estimate, and to the omission from that Estimate of the cost of stores from

England. There is ground for hoping that in future years similar errors of estimate will not occur, but it is obvious that there is a tendency in the Military Charges to exceed the sums estimated, and the large excess of 881,900%. in them indicates the necessity for constant watchfulness, in regard to these Charges, on the part of your Government.

10. It is important to notice that the comparatively favourable result

of the year 1861-62 is in great measure attributable to increased receipt and diminished charge in the Opium Revenue, the receipts from which exceeded the Estimate by 139,769l., while the actual cost and charges of collection were 600,535/. below the Estimate.

11. I now turn to the Regular Estimate for 1862-63, which exhibits a marked improvement as compared with the Budget Estimate.

12. Your Budget Estimate for that year stated the revenues and charges as follows:-

13. But, as shown in my Financial Despatch of the 9th June 1862, the loss by exchange had been omitted, and the probable charges in England were under-stated in your Estimate; and, when the necessary adjustments had been made in regard to those items, the probable deficit, assuming that your Estimate of Revenues and Charges were in other respects realised, would have exceeded 800,000l.

A further improvement appears in the Regular Estimate of March last, according to which, with certain alterations made therein, as explained by Sir Charles Trevelyan, in regard to Charges in England, and Guaranteed Railway Interest, the result would have been a surplus on the year of 936,925*l*. I have, however, been enabled to make still further changes in regard to the Home Charges, and the Regular Estimate, as presented to Parliament, shows a probable surplus of 1,280,596*l*. The following is an Abstract of the probable Revenues and Charges for the year:—

16. It therefore appears that your last Estimate of the Revenue of 1862-63 exceeds the Budget Estimate by 2,134,500l. Of this increase 1,550,000l. is in the revenue from Opium, 282,800l. from Salt, and 304,000l. under the heads of Land, Sayer, and Abkaree. There are estimated increases from other sources of Revenue, but they are balanced by decreases under some of the heads.

17. The continuous advance in the revenue from Salt is especially satisfactory, as affording evidence of steady improvement in the condition of the people.

18. You now consider that the Charges in India will exceed the Budget

The principal increase of Charge is 266,000l. under Army, and is attributable to the non-realization of an expectation which prevailed when the Budget Estimate was framed, that India would be immediately relieved of 22 Troops of European Cavalry and one Regiment of European Infantry, as well as to the circumstance that the disbanding a Regiment of Native Cavalry, which your Government had decided on in April 1862, had not been effected.

19. The Home Charges have not amounted to the sum estimated in my Financial despatch of the 9th June 1862, No. 83, in consequence mainly of a considerable part of the estimated expenditure on account of the new India Office and Persian Telegraph Cable having been postponed until the present official year.

20. I should have been glad if the improvement apparent in the Revenue had been more general, and not so much dependent on the single source of Opium; but nevertheless; the prospect of a surplus on the year of 1;280,596l. is very gratifying.

It appears, from a comparison of receipts under the several heads, that the only material estimated decrease in 1863-64, as compared with the Regular Estimate for 1862-63, is under the head of Assessed Taxes, amounting to 198,600*l*., while the receipt from Opium is estimated at the sum of 8,000,000*l*., being 1,640,731*l*. above the actual Opium Revenue of 1861-62. The other principal increase is 161,8001. under Law and Justice, and Police, and is explained in Sir Trevelyan's Charles Statement as arising from the circumstance that large municipal contributions towards the expense of the Police, which were previously carried to Local Funds, have now been credited as Revenue.

26. The charges in India, which amounted in 1861-62 to 37,245,756l, and are stated in the Regular Estimate for 1862-63 at 37,228,9001. are estimated for 1863-64 at 37,525,300l., the difference under all heads for 1863-64 being an estimated increase of about 300,000l. But although the Charges in India differ by only that sum, the Charges under some of the heads vary considerably. The following increases of charge are shown in the Budge Estimate for 1863-64, as compared with the Regular Estimate for 1862-63.

28. As the increased charge of collecting the Land Revenue arises from additional establishments employed to revise assessments, preparatory to a permanent settlement of the Land Revenue, the increase may be regarded as temporary.

29. The increased estimate under Army is, however, of a more serious nature, the charge being estimated at 12,646,900l. In the Financial letter from the Government of India, dated the 2nd May 1861, No. 63, it was observed, that "the result of the detailed estimates of the Military "Finance Department, of the cost in India for a year of the establishment of European and Native Army now fixed, is 12,199,240l., to "which has been added 600,760l., which is the nearest estimate that can be formed of the additional amount that may be required this year to meet gratuities to Native troops disbanded, bounty to local Europeans on re-enlistment, and the extra pay and other expenses which will go on "until the reductions now ordered can be fully carried out.

"The first estimate of 12,199,240l. is based on positive data; the second, of 600,760l., is necessarily, to some extent, conjectural. This brings the total Military expenditure in India to 12,800,000l. in 1861-62, as against 15,279,005l. in 1860-61, showing a saving of 2,479,005l. It is right to observe, however, that for about 500,000l. or 600,000l. of this saving we are indebted to a suspension of the usual demand for stores, owing to the immense accumulations of former years, which are now being used up. This, however, will continue, to a considerable extent, for the next year or two, and in the course of that time, if the country continues tranquil, as we have every reason to hope, we trust that further economy may be found possible, so as to keep the Military expenditure in India at a figure little, if at all, exceeding 12,000,000l., which was the cost of the established Army before the mutiny."

30. I have already, at paragraph 9 of this despatch, remarked on the excess of Military expenditure in India in 1861-62, above the Estimate for that year referred to in the foregoing observations of the Government of India, and it is obvious that the continuous efforts of your Government will be required to bring down the Military Charges to the standard which was considered sufficient in that letter.

31. I approve of your having made an increased appropriation in 1863-64 for Public Works, and I should have cordially approved a still larger expenditure on that account if you had considered it possible to make it advantageously.

32. It must be unnecessary for me again to repeat what I have so often impressed upon your Government, as to the expediency of proceeding as rapidly as possible with public works of acknowledged utility. At the present time expenditure for these purposes is of the greatest importance for

meeting the demands for the extension of production in India, and with the SIR CHARLES WOOD. surplus which you anticipate, and the large Cash Balances, in reserve, Her Majesty's Government are desirous that your expenditure on works of irrigation, cotton roads, or other works calculated to aid the commercial industry of the country should only be limited by the necessity for taking care that full value for the outlay is obtained.

- 33. The improvement of the Judicial Establishments, and the consolidation of the Supreme and Sudder Courts into High Courts, account for the increased charge under Law and Justice, and the increase under Police is explained as the expense attending the extension of the new Police to Bengal Proper, and the abolition of the Police Battalions, and the old Thannadaree Police.
 - 34. I approve the increased grant for Education, Science and Art.
- 35. The decrease of Charge connected with the Salt Revenue, consequent on the closing of the salt pans, which has been rendered practicable by the increased consumption of Salt imported from England, arising from the prejudices of the Natives as to its use having given way, is satisfactory as being permanent in its nature. The other heads of Charge in which reductions are shown do not call for remark.
- 36. On a review of the probable income and expenditure of 1863-64, you considered it expedient to remit 1 per cent. of the Income Tax, by which a loss of Revenue is estimated to be sustained of 285,000l., and to make certain reductions in the Customs duties, causing a probable diminution in 1863-64 of 50,000l. I understand that these reductions have given great satisfaction, and I have only to express my approval of them, and especially of the reduction of the duty on iron, a raw material entering largely into numerous articles of manufacture.
 - 37. After making these remissions, you estimate that

- 38. It is impossible not to feel some degree of anxiety in regard to your Estimate of Revenue, when so large a receipt from Opium is calculated on as 8,000,000*l*., but it is, nevertheless, by no means improbable that your estimate may be realized, and even if some falling off should occur, your estimated surplus of 480,7751. seems to me to afford a reasonable margin.
- 39. I shall hereafter refer to the subject of your Cash Balances, and the arrangements to be made in reference thereto.

Comparing the principal heads of Actual Revenues and Charges in India with the Regular Estimate for 1862-63, the revenues show a net improvement of 38,052l. resulting from changes in the several heads. Of these, the most important increases are 140,147l. under Land, and 205,476l. in the receipts from Opium. The increase from Land is especially satisfactory, arising, as it does, from an extension of cultivation caused by the high price of agricultural produce. The increase under Opium was anticipated by your Government, and calls for no remark. The principal head in

which the actual receipts have been less than the estimate is Public Works, SIR CHARLER WOOD, and is attributable to the amount having been over-estimated to the extent 16th July, 1864, of 163,947l.

6. The actual expenditure for 1862-63 was within the estimate under most heads, the only important exceptions being increases of 298,325*l*. in Army, and 244,590*l*. in Indian Navy and Marine Charges. The increase of Army Charges appears to have been mainly attributable to the adjustment in 1862-63 of certain outstanding expenditure of former years. The excess of Indian Navy and Marine Charges is attributed by you to the measures for the reduction of the Indian Navy not having been sufficiently effective.

as compared with the Budget Estimate, arises from changes under the heads specified in the margin, and includes an estimated deficiency of no less than 1,150,000l. in the receiptsfrom Opium, which is attributed to the fact that, while in 1862-63 every available chest was sent to Bombay and paid the Pass Duty, in 1863-64 a large number of chests are held back, awaiting a better state of the money market.

The other decreases of revenue are attributed to exceptional causes, and do not call for remark. It is satisfactory to find that, in the important head of Land Revenue, the improvement is progressive, and is estimated to exceed by 572,100*l*. the amount stated in the Budget Estimate, arising altogether, as stated by Sir Charles Trevelyan, from increased cultivation. The increases under other heads of Revenue amount to 875,800*l*, but do not call for observation.

13. The increases in the Charges in India, shown in the Regular Estimate, amount to 615,156*l*. of which 150,309*l*. is in the Army Charges, arising mainly out of the Sitana Expedition, and 244,344*l*, in Marine Charges, the effect of the Marine Establishments at Bombay not having been reduced to the extent intended. A further increase of 163,475*l*, is shown in expenditure on Public, Works, but it appears to be doubtful whether this amount will be expended.

14. Comparing the Revenues and Charges shown in the Regular Estimate for 1863-64 with the Actual results of 1862-63, it appears that therevenues of 1863-64 are estimated at 390,252l. less, and the expenditure at 1,339,651*l*. more than the actual Revenues and Charges of 1862-63.

15. Under certain heads of Revenue there is an estimated increase of 1,871,244*l*., but the estimated decrease under other

SIE CHARLES WOOD heads amounts to 2,261,496%. The largest estimated increase in 1863-64 are 710,853l. from Land Revenue, 242,562l. from Stamps, and 242,158l. from Law and Justice and Police. On the other hand, the principal decreases are 487,2121. in the Assessed Taxes, attributable to reduction in the Income Tax, and 1,205,476l. from Opium, the causes of which have been adverted to in para. 12 of this Despatch.

16. Although, therefore, the total revenue of 'the year is estimated at 390,252l. below 1862-64, it is satisfactory to find that the deficiency is the consequence of a reduction of taxation, and that the large falling off in the receipts from Opium is estimated to be fully made up by increases under

the more permanent heads of revenue.

17. In Charges, the Regular Estimate for 1863-64 shows a net increase of 1,339,6511. That amount includes augmentations in the Charges of Collection of Land Revenue of 263,930l., and of Opium of 253,1221, The largest increase, however, is in the Publi**e** \mathbf{Works} expenditure, and amounts to 757,943*l*. Army Charges are estimated at nearly the same amount as that incurred in the previous year, and the Police Charges at an increase of 269,0311.

18. There also estimated augmentations of charge of 104,554l. for Law \mathbf{and} Justice, and of 101,939l. for Edu-Science, cation, and Art, with smaller increase under other heads.

20. The increase of 757,9431. under Public Works must be regarded as SIR CHARLES WOODS to some extent remunerative. This expenditure, therefore, as well as the 16th July 1864 increased charges for Law and Justice, Police Charges, and Education, . Science and Art, appear to be unobjectionable.

24. In the Budget Estimate for 1864-65 the Land Revenue shows a diminution of 16,000%, which you consider a low estimate, and there are increases both in the Forest and Abkaree receipts.

Confining the view to the average price obtained, to the limited quantity sent to China during the year 1863-64, and to the accumulated - Stock which has consequently been held over to the present year, your expecta-tion may not be

unreasonable, but I am not without apprehension that a diminution of the demand for Opium in China may possibly affect the estimate which you have made, and it is obviously important that in any estimate a considerable margin should be allowed in regard to so uncertain a branch of revenue as Opium.

26. In the receipts from Salt you estimate that there will be an increase of 164,2101., which you attribute to a general improvement in all parts of India.

27. The increase in Public Works receipts is exceptional, arising, as stated by you, from a sum of 250,000*l*. being estimated to be received from the sale of building allotments on the Esplanade at Bombay.

28. The only considerable decrease of revenue is from "Assessed Taxes,"

and is attributable to the reduction of the assessment of Income Tax to 3 per cent. taking full effect in 1864-65.

31. The other principal increases of charge are 144,761*l*. in cost and charges "Opium," wh of which you describe as "of the nature of "an investment to "be reproduced in "increased re-"ceipts,"200,155l. on Public Works, 175,611*l*. on Law and Justice, and 58,875l.on account

of Education, Science and Art.

32. The increased charge in 1864-65 on account of Public Works includes a special grant to Bombay of 200,000l., irrespective of 204,330l. estimated to be required for public buildings at that Presidency. It appears that the Government of Bombay consider that the grant assigned to that Presidency, viz., 620,000l., for works of public improvement, exclusive of the sums above specified, and a proportion of the estimated charge of 300,000l. for extraordinary military works, is insufficient; but while it is of great importance that public works of acknowledged utility should be proceeded with as rapidly as possible, you justly remark that the works should at the same time be kept within such limits as not to disturb violently the labour market; and the statement of the Government of Bombay, that the price of materials and labour has so increased that 60 lakhs of rupees will not now do more than 30 or 40 lakhs would have effected three years years ago, appears to indicate that the public works which you have authorized are as extensive as could be undertaken with a due regard to economical construction.

33. The increase of 175,611*l*., under Law and Justice, appears to be consequent on the appointment of additional Judges, and the increase of the salaries of the inferior Judges in Bengal.

34. The increased grant for Education, Science and Art. has my approval.

35. Notwithstanding the adoption of measures calculated to increase SIE CHARLES WOOD. the efficiency of the Army, and the increased expenditure arising from enhanced prices in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies, it is gratifying to observe that the Army and Police Charges show reductions of 112,092l. and 51,760l. respectively, as compared with the Regular Estimate for 1863-64.

36. The remaining heads of charge do not call for observation.

37. Considering that the Income Tax will expire on the 31st July 1865, and that the amount calculated must be provided for from some other source, it is satisfactory to me that you determined to refrain from adopting any measure calculated to reduce the estimated surplus of 823,2881.

38. The alterations which you have made in the import duties being counterbalanced by changes in the valuations, are not estimated by you to be productive of any increase or loss of revenue, and do not call for remarks.

39. From the estimate of Cash Balances it appears that, after providing for railway advances and other payments in India on account of the Home Treasury, and for my drafts on India during the year to the amount specified in my Financial despatch of the 30th January 1864, No. 13, you estimate that a Cash Balance will remain in the Indian Treasuries, on the 30th April 1865, of 13,819,697l.

40. That amount is in excess of what is required for the ordinary purposes of your Government, and as debentures are still outstanding, and will become payable in 1866, to the amount of 4,868,000*l*., it may possibly be expedient, during the current year, to increase the amount of my drafts, in order to be prepared to pay off the whole or a portion of those debentures on their arrival at maturity.

41. This will, however, in some degree depend on the rates obtainable for bills on India, and I shall give you timely notice of any change in the

amount of drafts for which you will have to provide.

Revenues and Receipts by 140,468l., there having been increased receipts under certain heads to the amount of 452,695*l*., and decreases under others amounting to 593,163*l*. The largest difference was a decrease of 242,604l. in the receipt from Salt, arising from the stagnation in Bengal of the trade in imported salt, consequent on the large stocks in the hands of merchants at the com-*mencement of the year. The variations in the other receipts were of smaller amount, and do not call for remark.

6. The total Charges in India were 52,684*l*. lower than the amount estimated. There were increases under certain heads to the amount 592,0941., \mathbf{of} which were more than counterbalance by decreases amounting to 644,778 $l. \cdot In$ Opium there was an increase of 197,093*l*., caused by additional advances for the cultivation of that drug. There were also increased charges for Public Works.

7. The actual Charges in England differed but little from the Estimate. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway, &c., Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, exceeded the Estimate by 96,8751.

8. The year 1862-63 had closed with a surplus of 1,827,345*l*. As, in the sie Charles Wood. following year, 1863-64, the surplus was only 78,347*l*, it is important to ascertain to what changes the less favourable result in the latter year is to be ascribed.

(Sayer Forest and Miscellaneous Revenue), Assessed Taxes, Customs, and Salt were also less in 1863-64; but, on the other hand, there were increased receipts from Land. Abkarree. Stamps, Post Office, and other important less items, whereby the net decrease was reduced to the amount stated above.

11. The increase in the total charges of 1863-64, as compared with 1862-63, results from considerable differences under the several heads. The cost and charges of Salt were less in 1863-64by196,346l There was a diminution of 177,035*l*. in the Marine Charges and reductions under some other heads, but in the charges of collect-

SIR CHARLES WOOD, ing the Land Revenue there was an increase of 307,4421.; in the cost and charges of Opium, of 450,2151.; and in the expenditure on Public Works, of 974,8911., besides increased charges in the salaries and expenses of Public Departments, in Law and Justice, Police, and Education, Science and Art.

12. As observed in my Financial despatch dated 16th July 1864, No. 170, a very large portion of the surplus of 1862-63 was derived from an unexpectedly favourable net receipt from Opium, "the most fluctuating source of Indian revenue." Taking the Opium Receipts and Charges to-

gether in the years 1862-63 and 1863-64, it will be seen that the falling off in the net receipt under this head amounts to 1,673,6921., and mainly accounts for the important change from a sur-

plus of 1,827,3451. in 1862-63 to that of 78,3471. in 1863-64. This fact proves that it must be always expedient to estimate the income from Opium with great caution.

13. The Regular Estimate of 1864-65 closes with a probable deficit of 263,377l., instead of a surplus of 823,288l., as an-Regular Estimate, 1864-65. ticipated in your budget estimate, a change for the worse wholly attributable to increased charges, as the Revenues and Receipts for that year, which were estimated in April 1864 at 46,163,8701., are now expected to reach 46,284,1061.

14. Considerable variations between the budget and regular estimates are, nevertheless, apparent in the several heads of Revenue, the largest of which is a diminution of 685,880l. in the estimated receipt from Opium. This falling off is attributed by you to a reduction in the price at the Calcutta sales, consequent on increased production, which had checked the export of Opium from Malwa and Guzerat. There is an anticipated decrease of 170,2001. in the Budget Estimate of Land Revenue, from the probable effects of definition of the probable effects of definition. ciency of rain in the North-West Provinces and Oude, the inundation in the Masulipatam District, and diminished receipts from the sale of Khas Mehals.

15. There are also estimated diminutions of 138,2201. in the Post Office

17. Among the increases in the charges, a sum of 453,6791. was for additional advances for the cultivation of Opium. The Army Charges are estimated to exceed by 674,571l. the sum stated in the budget. Of that amount 272,500*l*. is ascribed by you to the increased price of provisions, 160,000*l*. to the Bhootan War, and the remainder to the substitution of full for half batta, increased pay to Medical Officers, and other causes. The expenditure on Public Works is estimated to exceed the budget esit-mate by 327,0871., the principal items consisting of additional grants to Bombay, and expenditure for the repair of damages caused by the cyclone. The apparent increase of 165,966l. in the charge for Superannuation and Retired Allowances, and Gratuities for Charitable and other purposes, is

nominal, as in the Bombay Budget Estimate the donations to Service Funds had been omitted. The other variations were of comparatively small amount.

19. That estimate, however, shows decreases certain under heads, the causes of which, in the Land Kevenue, Customs, and Post Office Receipts, I have already referred to. The decrease in Assessed Taxes is consequent on the reduction of the rate from 4 to 3 per cent.

20. The Forest, Abkarree, Salt, and Stamp Revenues show a steady improvement, and an increase of 682,121*l*. is expected in the receipts from Opium. You also estimate an increase of 554,865l. in the receipts from Public Works, from the proceeds of the sale of building sites at Bombay.

21. The state of the revenue is, therefore, satisfactory. It is in respect of the charges. that the prospect is calculated to cause anxiety.

24. The charges more immediately relating to the Collection of the Revenue show an increase of 676,036l. Of that sum, 216,888l. occurs under Land Revenue, Forest and Abkaree, and 401,347l in the cost and charges of Opium.

25. It will be seen on reference to the statement in the margin, that, with the exception of Marine Charges and Miscellaneous, in which there are decreases of small amount, there is an increase under every head of Charge.

26. The most considerable is in the Army Charges, which, in 1864-65, are estimated to a mount to 13,327,760l, or 630,691l, in excess of the Army Charge of the previous year.

- 27. This large increase arises from several causes, but mainly from the expenditure sanctioned to meet the increased cost of provisions, from additional charges connected with the Bhootan War, and from the substitution of full for half batta. The whole of this expenditure may have been unavoidable, but there is a manifest tendency of the Military expenditure to increase.
- 28. The causes of the increase in the Charges for Public Works have been already referred to in para. 17.
- 29. The apparent increase in the Superannuation and Retired Allowances, and Gratuities for Charitable and other purposes, is to some extent nominal, the charge for Marine Pensions hitherto included among Marine Charges having been recently transferred to this head. The other increases do not call for observation.

The reduction of the duty on saltpetre from two rupees to one rupee per maund, and the depressed state of the import trade, fully account for the falling off in the estimated receipts from Customs, while the reduction in the Assessed Taxes results from the expiration of the Income Tax. are 376,2691. in excess of the Regular Estimate for 1864-65, the Charges in India exceeding that estimate by 137,2631. Although the total charges approximate so nearly to the Regular Estimate. there are considerable variations under several heads.

34. In the SIE CHARLES WOOD Charges of collec-tion of the Revenues, there is decrease of 720,780l. The Political Agencies and other Foreign Services are less by 3,8201., the Superannuation and Retired Allowances and Gratuities for Charitable and other purposes (which are, nevertheless, in excess of former years) are also less by 150,7601., and the Miscellaneous by 96,920*l*., than the estimate for 1864-65, but under every other head there is an increase.

35. The Army Charges exceed the estimate for 1864-65 by 426,800l., there having been, as noticed in para. 26 of this despatch, an increase of 630,691*l*. in the Regular Estimate of 1864-65, as compared 1863-64.

36. You observe that the increase includes the expenses \mathbf{of} the Bhootan War, as

well as an increased estimate for "extraordinaries," and that, although since the beginning of last year there have been reductions of

"The East India Regiment,

" Four Regiments of Madras Native Infantry,

"Two Regiments of British Infantry transferred to the Home Establishment,

"Reductions of Artillery equal to seven European and three Native Bat-

" Five Troops of the Mahratta Horse,"

which reductions at any previous time would have made a sensible effect in decreasing the expenditure of the Army "such has been the increase of prices

"and wages, that the entire result has disappeared in the great increase "which has taken place in the cost of the remainder of the Force."

37. Taking into consideration these reductions, and the fact that there is, nevertheless, a considerable augmentation of the Army Charges generally, it is obvious that the Military expenditure demands your most serious attention. The Budget Estimate, as sent to this country, only shows the receipts 22nd June 1865.

SIR CHARLES WOOD, and expenditure under the principals heads, and the observations in your Financial letter do not furnish much additional information. It is, consequently, impracticable to make any comparison in detail of the Army Charges of different years; but I am not without apprehension that, in some departments of Military expenditure, augmentation may be occurring which it would be practicable to avoid.

38. The estimated Public Works expenditure for 1865-66 includes 500,000l. for works of Irrigation, and 1,000,000l. for new barracks, and ex-

ceeds the expenditure of 1864-65 by 202,823l.

39. The increase of 60,340l. in the salaries and expenses of Public Departments appears to arise from the creation of seven new Currency Circles, the revival of the office of Financial Commissioner in Oude, the appointment of a new Deputy Auditor and Accountant General for British Burmah, and additional cost attendant on the revision of the Secretariats in the Military and Public Works Departments.

40. An augmentation of 210,690l. in the Charge for Law and Justice is explained by you as arising "from the increased cost of clothing and provi-"sioning prisoners in jails, and the additions which have been made to the

"salaries of the establishments."

41. Of the increase of 95,350l. in the Police Charges, no explanation is furnished.

42. The result shown by your Budget Estimate for 1865-66 is, consequently, a deficit of 374,992i. Your proposition to levy export duties on certain articles, by which you expected to raise 330,0001., and to add to the income of the year the sum of 1,200,000l., to be raised in England on loan, thus showing a surplus, has been already replied to in my Financial despatch dated the 9th May last, No. 114.

43. In that despatch I informed you that I could not sanction the Bill for imposing export duties, and I requested that you would issue orders to prevent their being levied. Before that despatch reached you, it is probable that some duties may have been received, and steps must, therefore, be taken

by your Government for refunding the amount.

44. In regard to the expenditure, the increase of the Army Charges has been already noticed. The same tendency is observable in the salaries and expenses of Public Departments, the Charges for Law and Justice, for Police, Education, Science and Art, for Superannuation and Retired Allowances, and Gratuities for Charitable and other purposes. There can be no doubt that the administrative improvement of the last few years will account, in some degree, for the additional annual cost; but I must earnestly request your attention to the necessity that exists for effecting every practicable reduction in the expenditure of each Department of the Government.

45. The determination of the amount of annual expenditure imperative. ly required is an essential preliminary to the consideration of the question,

whether any, and, if any, what further taxation is called for.

46. It appears from your estimate of Cash Balances that, after providing for Railway advances and other payments in India on account of the Home Treasury, and the sum of 7,200,000l. for my drafts during the year 1865-66, you anticipated that the Cash Balances in the Indian Treasuries on the 30th April 1866 would amount to 10,860,430l. As, however, you had included in your estimate a sum of 330,000l. from additional export duties, which have been disallowed, your balances can only be estimated at 10,530,4301., but that sum appears to be adequate for the ordinary purposes of your Government.

47. In my Financial despatch dated the 16th January 1865, No. 4, I infomed you that it was necessary for you to provide the sum of 8,400,000l. to meet my drafts during the year 1865-66. But, under the representations which you have made of your inability to provide that amount, those drafts will be limited to 1,700,000*l.*, viz., 3,000,000*l.*, during the first six months of the year, and 4,200,000l. during the last six months.

48. Whatever amount may be requied to provide for the deficiency can probably be met from the existing resources in this country, without having

recourse to any new loan.

Para. 1. I have considered in Council your Financial letters dated the EABL DE GREY AND 7th and 27th March last, Nos. 61 and 79, the latter forwarding the Finance and Revenue Accounts for 1864-65, and the Regular Estimate for 1865-66, for No 142, dated the presentation to Parliament, together with your subsequent Financial letter dated the 29th March, No. 82, which transmitted the abstract of the Budget Estimate for the year 1866-67.

May 1865, the deficit was estimated at 263,377l. The deficit smaller shown in the Actual Accounts results from a net decrease in the Revenues and Receipts of 631,209l., and in the Charges of 701,065*l*.

4. Under some heads of Revenue and Receipt the Actual Accounts exhibit augmentations amounting to 269,0571., and under other heads decreases to the amount of 900,2661. These charges do not call for remark, the most considerable of them, which is a diminution of 427,977l. in the receipts of the Public Works Department, being explained by you as arising from the "actual realizations of the proceeds of the land sales at Bombay not having turned out so high as was anticipated."

5. The differences between the estimated and actual expenditure were more important, there having been increases under some heads to the amount

of 713,066L, and decreases under others of 1,495,498L

6. The principal increases of Charge are specified in the margin.

That estimate had, however, exceeded the Budget Estimate by no less than 674,5711., and provision was made in it for the charge occasioned by the Bhootan War, for increases on ac-

count of dearness of provisions, for the substitution of full for half batta, increased pay to medical officers, and for additional transport charges for EARL DE GREY AND sending to Europe extra regiments of Infantry and batteries of Artillery. Of the still further augmentation of Army Charges shown in the Actual

Accounts, some explanation should have been given. 25th June 1866.

7. The observation made by you, that "the increase under Superannua-"tion and Retired Allowances, &c., arises chiefly from annuities of the Civil "Fund of 1818 (17,8771.), and the deficiency on the 1st May 1864 in the "unappropriated branch of the Civil Service Annuity Fund from 1st May "1825 (59,5381.) having been charged in the accounts of 1864-65," does not explain whether the charges in question were omitted from the Regular Estimate, or whether they are in excess of the expenditure which was anticipated when that estimate was framed.

8. The increase under Interest is explained as arising from an omission in the Regular Estimate, and that under Guaranteed Interest from an overestimate on account of the traffic earnings. The increases under other heads

are unimportant.

9. The principal decreases of charge were under Opium, Electric Tele-

10. In the statement forwarded with your letter of the 29th March, Regular Estimate 1865-66, compared with the Budget Estimate for that

The Regular, as compared with the Budget Estimate for 1865-66, shows an improvement in the Revenues and Receipts of 492,7801... and an addition of 97,903*l*. to total Charges in India and England, the net improvement being 395,5771. Instead of the deficit anticipated in the Budget Estimate, of 374,9921., the Regular Estimate consequently shows a surplus of 20,5851.

12. But although the estimated final result differs only to the extent of EABL DE GREY, AND 395,5771., the differences between the Regular and Budget Estimates of 1865-66 RIPON.

13. In the Revenues and Receipts, the increases and decreases a mounted to 1,503,749l. and 1,010,969l., respectively.

14. Consequent on the increase in the price of Opium, the receipt from that source is estimated to exceed by no less than 915,200*l*. the sum included in the Budget Estimate, and an improvement of 193,420*l*. is also anticipated under the head of Customs. The other increases are unimportant.

15. Of the estimated decreases in the receipts, the most considerable is under Salt. It is accounted for by an over-estimate having been made in the Budget for Bengal, the Punjab, and Bombay, the only actual decrease, which was in the North-West Provinces, being attributable to a temporary decline in the Salt Trade in those Provinces. The decrease of 151,295*l* in the Land Revenue appears to have arisen from the proceeds of the sale of Khas Mehals in Bengal having been estimated too largely, from the re-settlement in the Kristna District, and an unfavourable season in Madras, and from the transfer of water-rents from canals, &c., at Bombay to the head of Public Works.

16. The decrease under Telegraph is the result of recent orders issued by you for including the receipts and charges of the Indo-European Telegraph Line under Supplies to and from London. The expediency of that proceeding appears to be doubtful, and I am desirous that an explanation of the reasons which induced you to adopt it may be furnished to me.

17. The other variations in the Revenues do not call for remark.

Charges in India, including Stores from England:—

19. The increase of 225,433l. in Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements was in a great degree nominal, and was caused by the transfer to that head of certain allowances at Bombay, hitherto shown under Allowances to District and Village Officers, in which there was a consequent decrease.

20. In the Army Charges, the Regular Estimate shows an increase of 162,203*l*., from augmented expenditure in connexion with the operations against Bhootan, and the increased price of grain.

21. The most considerable augmentation, however, is in the value of the Stores from England, and but for that item, the Expenditure in India would have been less in the Regular than in the Budget Estimate. In Sir Charles Wood's Financial despatch dated the 8th February 1866, No. 27, your attention was called to the increased demand for Stores in 1865-66, and measures were suggested for limiting as much as possible the demands from India on that account.
I conclude that those suggestions will have been promptly acted on by your Govern-ment.

22. The decreases in the Charges in India, apparent in the Regular Earl DE GERY AND Estimate, are unimportant, with the exception of the expenditure for Public RIPON.

23. The reduction in the Net Guaranteed Interest on Railway and other Capital is wholly attributable to a larger estimate of Net Traffic Receipts, and that in the Charges in England to the expenditure on account of ships for the transport of troops between England and India not being required within the year.

24. Comparing the Regular Estimate for 1865-66 with the Actual Accounts of 1864-65, there is apparent a net estimated with Actual Accounts of 1864-65.

25. The Revenues and Receipts are shown in the margin, and it is satisfactory to observe that, with the exception of the Land Revenue, Income Tax, Salt, and Post Office, there are increases under almost every head of Revenue and Receipt in the Estimate of 1865-66.

26. The estimated decrease in Land Revenue is unimportant; that under Income Tax is attributable to the expiration of the tax. The reduction of 127,384l. in the Receipts from Salt appears to be temporary, and the cause has been already referred to in paragraph 15 of this Despatch.

27. The prospect of the Revenue is, on the whole, satisfactory.

Note.—The "Actual" Receipts and Expenditure of 1864-65 are taken from the Statement transmitted with the letter from India, No. 82, in which the new arrangement was adopted. "Education" is a new item, and the receipts from Land Revenue, Law and Justice, and Police, and Civil Miscellaneous, differ somewhat from the Actual Accounts of 1864-65 presented to Parliament. The totals of both accounts are the same.

estimated increases in 1865-66, under some heads, amounted to 2,927,468l., while there was a diminution in other heads of 1,752,931l. the net increase being, therefore, no less than 1,174,537l.

29. There is an estimated increase in 1865-66 in al. most every branch of expenditure, the only exceptions, considerable amount, being in the cost and charges of opium, in the allowances to district and village officers, and in superannuation and retired allowances. The opium charges lower, owing to reductions in the quantity provided, and in the price paid to the ryots; the allowances to district and village officers were reduced by a transof certain charges to the head

of Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements, which were EABL DE GREY AND consequently augmented, and the difference in the Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate allowances is attributable to the charge on the same account in 1864-65 having included certain exceptional items.

RIPON.

30. The charges of collecting the Land, Forest, and Abkaree revenue have been progressively increasing since 1861-62, owing to the entertainment of temporary establishments for the Land Revenue Settlement, to increased allowances consequent on the rise of wages and prices, and to the organization of the Forest establishment.

- 31. The increase of 195,953l. in the charge of Law and Justice, is caused by augmented cost of clothing, and provisioning prisoners in jails, and by additions to salaries.
- 32. Of the causes of the increased Army charges, no very clear explanation can be obtained from the information furnished by your Government.
- 33. The sum expended on Public Works in 1865-66, although considerably within the budget estimate for that year, exceeded the sum expended in 1864-65 by 232,080l.
- 34. All the foregoing augmentations are independent of the cost of stores from England, which exceeded in 1865-66 by 638,2211. the amount expended in 1864-65, and which up to this time it has been the practice to include among the charges of the several departments.
 - 35. The net charges in England are estimated to exceed in 1865-66 the

charge for 1864-65 by 184,6081., and this is accounted for by the additional expenditure of 177,0211. in 1865-66 for the construction of vessels for the conveyance of troops to and from India.

36. The actual accounts of 1864-65 close with a deficit of 193,5211. The regular estimate for 1865-66 shows a surplus of 20,5551., notwithstanding the increased charge for public works. On the whole, a com-

and England are 25th June 1866. less by 195,355l. in the Budget Esti-mate for 1866-67 than in the Regu-lar Estimate for 1865-66. That apparent reduction is mainly attributable to diminished expenditure in England for Stores for India, and to a reduction in the charge for Guar-anteed Interest, less net traffic receipts. Deducting those items, the Charges in the Budget Estimate for 1866-67 exceed the Regular Esti-mate of 1865-66 by 648,211*l*.

40. The excess is more than accounted for by the provision made for expenditure Works, Public which is 1,042,030l. beyond the amount estimated 1865-66.

41. The creases under other heads of Charge do not call for remarks. They are either the consequence of measures adopted with a view to the improve-ment of the administration, or of augmented allowances rendered necessary by the high prices of provisions.

42. The decrease of charge for Opium is attributable to reduced cultivation, and that for the Army to reductions in its strength, and the cessation of expenditure on account of the operations in Bhootan.

- 43. Considering that, in your Budget Estimate for 1866-67 you have provided for the cessation of the Income Tax, and that you have increased by upwards of a million sterling the estimated expenditure of the previous year for public works, the result of that estimate, viz., a deficit of 72,800*l*, is not unsatisfactory.
- 44. There is, however, one item in that estimate which is more than any other calculated to cause anxiety, viz., the receipt of 8,500,000l. from Opium, which is within 138,800l. of the amount estimated for 1865-66, and upwards of a million in excess of the actual receipt of 1864-65. Your estimate is, no doubt, fully justified by the information furnished to you by the officers best capable of giving a sound opinion, but it is impossible to avoid some apprehension as to the out-turn of a branch of revenue liable, as Opium is, to unexpected changes, which might materially diminish the amount of revenue on which you have calculated.
- 45. The inconvenience that might attend an adverse change in that respect is of the greater importance when it is remembered that propositions are being constantly made for increased expenditure on account of salaries and establishments, tending to swell the amount of expenditure for which you have annually to provide.
- 46. Looking at the large amount of your estimated income from Opium, it would have been more satisfactory if, instead of a deficit, your Budget Estimate had shown a surplus of about half a million to a million sterling, but Her Majesty's Government nevertheless consider that, under all the circumstances, you were justified in postponing until another year the consideration of the question of the imposition of further taxation.
- 47. In regard to the Cash Balances, you estimate that the year 1866-67 will commence with a balance in India of 12,859,366l., and that, after providing 7,800,000l. to meet the bills to be drawn on your Government in aid of the Home Treasury, and 5,131,042l. for the construction of railways, the year will close with a balance in India of 10,506,659l.
- 48. The provision of 7,800,000*l*. to meet the bills drawn from this country is in accordance with the request contained in Sir Charles Wood's Financial Despatch of the 16th January last, No. 7, but the estimate of 5,131,042*l*., as the sum to be expended in India for the construction of railways, requires explanation.
- 49. In the enclosure to the Financial despatch above referred to, it was estimated that the payments into the Home Treasury by the several Railway, &c., Companies during the current year 1866-67—

50. That estimate was framed upon information furnished by the several Railway Companies in this country. It would consequently appear to be improbable that your estimate of expenditure in India on that account will be realized. I am desirous of being furnished with some information as to the data on which your estimate of 5,131,042l. was founded, and if it should appear to be probable that the expenditure on this account in India will exceed by more than two millions sterling the net sum estimated to be deposited in the Home Treasury by the Railway Companies, they will be required to adopt measures for increasing their payments.

8. The increase of 1,745,523l. under Miscellaneous Receipts, is explained in your letter as arising from "the credit taken under this head of 1,943,404l.

"(against which there is a debit of 915,215). under Miscellaneous Charges), "on account of the transfer debits and credits to the several loans, in order to "reconcile the long standing differences in the balances as shown in the general books of the Government of India, and in the registers of the respective loans kept in the late Loan Office, and now at the Bank of Bengal." "Under the "system of account which obtained before 1861-62, these transfers would have been simply written off on both sides of the Debt account, and no mention "made of them in the Profit and Loss or Budget Statement. The Budget system

"of 1861-62, and Mr. Foster's recommendations, alike require that all such "writes-off to profit or loss shall be shown as gain or loss on the transactions "of the year."

- 14. You state that there is a reduction of 565,835l. under Stores from England, owing to the amounts charged to the several service heads being less than the sum included in the Regular Estimate, but that was an Estimate of payments in this country, not of the value of Stores to be received in India, and the actual payment here, exclusive of copper, was 1,087,453l., or 15,883l. in excess of the Estimate. In Sir C. Wood's Financial despatch of the 8th February 1866, No. 27, p. 6, he stated that the correct principle was to show the payments in this country for Stores, not the value of those received in India.
- 15. The difference between the Regular Estimate and the Actual Charge on account of Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, is exceptional, arising from the payments "into the Government Treasury at "Bombay, of large amounts of Traffic Receipts, which had been before lodged "by the Railway authorities in private banks."
- 16. This objectionable practice has now been put a stop to; but it was never intended that our Officers of Account should be kept in ignorance of these deposits, or that they should be excluded from the Railway accounts.
- 17. Although, therefore, the Actual Accounts of 1865-66 show a more favourable result than the estimate by 2,745,483*l*., the difference was owing mainly to changes in the system of account, and to the charge for Stores having been reduced.

- 22. So far as regards Opium, it was observed in Lord Cranborne's Financial despatch 'dated the 25th June 1866, No. 142, that the Estimated Revenue of 8,500,000l. was upwards of a million in excess of the actual receipt of 1864-65, and that, liable as the revenue from Opium is to unexpected changes, it was impossible to avoid some apprehension in regard to that Estimate.
- 23. You have now reduced your estimate by nearly a million, which is still rather in excess of the average receipts of the five previous years.
- 24. The reduced Estimate of Mint Receipts is ascribed by you to a falling off in the coinage of silver and copper in the Mints of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay.
- 25. Of the reduction of 524,397*l*. in the estimated receipts from Public Works, 460,000*l*. is consequent on the failure of the Land Sales at Bombay, and the remainder on an erroneous estimate of receipts from Bombay.
- 26. The increases in the Charges under Allowances, Refunds, and Drawbacks, and Land Revenue, do not call for remark. The increase under Telegraph is solely attributable to the charge on account of the Indo-European Telegraph line having been included in the Regular, although excluded from the Budget Estimate.
- 27. The explanation given by you of the increase of 13,775*l*. for Stationery and Printing is, that it occurs chiefly "in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies, "the supply of Stationery in the former Presidency, for the several Public "Departments, being now made by the Superintendent of Stationery, instead "of each office supplying itself by purchases in the local market." If this increase of charge has arisen solely from the adoption of a new mode of obtaining supplies, the expediency of the change appears to be questionable.
- 28. The increase of 409,584l. in the charge for Guaranteed Interest is attributed to the exclusion from the Regular Estimate of the net traffic receipts for April, and the reduction of traffic earnings consequent on the interruption of Railway traffic in Bengal and Bombay during the rains.
- 29. The increase in the estimated expenditure in England arises from a probable larger payment on account of the construction of India troop

32. The principal increases in the Receipts are under the heads of Salt Telegraph. and The estimated receipt from Salt, for the 11 months, exceeds by 279,6211. the actual receipts in 1865-66, and if the probable collection of April were included, the esti- \mathbf{mated} improvement in the Salt Revenue would be less than 833,400*l*., arising both from larger importations, and sale proceeds of Government salt.

33. The improvement under Telegraph is consequent on larger receipts from the Indo-European line.

- 34. The large estimated decrease in the receipts from Land Revenue is owing to the omission of the April collections, and to the exceptional character of the anticipatory collections in 1865-66.
- 35. If allowance be made for the omission of the receipts in April, the estimated Abkaree Revenue will exceed the receipts in 1865-66, and the decreases in Customs and Stamps appear to be mainly attributable to the omission of the April collections.
- 36. Of the decrease of 1,642,564l. under Opium, 692,284l. arises from the omission of the April receipt; the remaining 950,280l. to a reduction in the quantity brought to sale in Bengal.

37. The decrease in the Mint Receipts is owing to an estimated reduction in the coinage; that under Miscellaneous, to the sum of 1,943-404l. having been included in the Accounts of 1865-66 on account of Loan Balan-14th June 1867. ces; and that in the Public Works Miscellaneous Receipts, mainly "to the "sale proceeds of Land Sales at Bombay being, under recent orders, credited "under Debt."

38. The differences between the actual expenditure of 1865-66 and the

39. Under some heads the expenditure \mathbf{for} 11 months is estimated to exceed that of the previous year.

40. The estimated increase in Interest on Service Funds, and on other accounts, includes 21,494l. interest on Railway Traffic earnings, and 12,000l. interest payable to the Bank of Bengal on account of the low state of the Government balances.

41. The increase under Forest is ascribed to extended operations, that under Salt to larger provisions at Madras for the purchase and storing of Salt, and that under Telegraph to larger provision for "Estab-"lishments, Indo-"European Line, "construction of "new lines, and re-"construction of existing lines."

42. The augmented charge for Works Public arises from larger expenditure for supervision and cost of land for Railways, and a greater loss by exchange on Railway transactions, the large

and exceptional receipts in 1865-66 having reduced the charge on that account.

- 43. The charge for Guaranteed Interest is also increased in 1866-67, in consequence of the large accumulation of Traffic Receipts brought to credit in 1865-66.
- 44. The estimated net expenditure in England in 1866-67 is increased by larger payments for India Troop Transports, passage of Officers and Troops, and to the Imperial Government for Capitation Rates, as already referred to.

- 46. Before making any comparison with the former year of the several heads of Revenue and Expenditure, it is necessary to advert to the deviations in your Budget Estimate from the mode in which expenditure on Public Works has hitherto been shown.
- 47. Up to the present time, the whole of the expenditure of each year, forming a charge against the Revenues, has been included in the accounts before any balance has been shown of surplus or deficit, and that course was adopted throughout the years in which the Military expenditure, consequent on the mutiny, and the increased charges for Public Works, and Guaranteed Interest on Railway, &c., Capital, produced a series of deficits which amounted in one year (1858-59) to no less than 14,187,6171.
- 48. In your Financial letter dated the 20th December last, No. 255, you represented the inexpediency of charging all expenditure for construction of great public works against the income of the year, as being calculated to create an erroneous impression that the revenue was insufficient to defray the ordinary charges, and you proposed that, while ordinary expenditure, including the charge for additions and improvements to existing buildings, as well as for the mass of not very expensive works, might "be fairly regarded as current expenditure;" the heavy outlay for special public works, such as extensive projects for military barracks, central and district jails, roads, and other communications, should be shown as extraordinary charges, and that sums applied to the construction of reproductive works should be treated as charges against capital, which from first to last would be excluded from the Annual Statements of Revenue and Charge, and be shown in the Statement of Cash Balances under Debt.
- 49. You were informed in the Financial despatch dated the 28th February last, No. 79, that Lord Cranborne approved so much of your proposition as related to making a distinction in the accounts between ordinary and extraordinary charges, but that he objected to expenditure for jails being treated as an extraordinary charge, and he requested that the sums expended in remunerative public works should be included as charges under the head of "Public Works Extraordinary."
- 50. That despatch, however, could not have reached you when your Budget Estimate was prepared. I shall, therefore, now make the necessary alterations in the Statement of Expenditure by including the charges for Jails among ordinary charges for Public Works, and the expenditure for reproductive and special fund works under the head of "Public Works Extraordinary."

51. When these changes are made, the Budget Estimate for 1867-68 will stand as follows:— $$\pounds$$

In former years it has been the practice to compare the Budget Estimate with the Regular Estimate of the previous year; but as the Regular Estimate for 1866-67 relates only to eleven months, a comparison with the Budget Estimate for 1866-67, which was prepared for a full year, will give a better view of the changes apparent in your Estimate for 1867-68.

53. The estimated ` Revenues and Receipts for 1867-68 exceed the Budget Estimate 1866-67 under. several heads-the mostimportant being Assessed Taxes, Salt, Stamps and Post Office.

54. The increase under Assessed Taxes is due to the imposition of the License Tax-that under Salt to increased consumption—the increased receipt from Stamps to the revised scale "of institution "Stamps." Of the increase in the Post Office Revenue no explanation is furnished.

55. But under numerous heads the estimated Revenues and Receipts for 1867-68 are lower than for 1866-67. So far as regards land, the decrease is wholly attributable to the exclusion of the Eastern Settlements and the Berars, there being otherwise an improvement, notwithstanding the grant of remissions in Orissa. The Abkaree estimate is reduced by 103,720*l*., but the only observation in your letters relating to that head is, that "in Madras there is an improve-"ment of 93,000*l*. in Abkaree receipts."

56. Your estimate of Customs revenue is, in consequence of the depression of trade, less by 56,970*l*. than that for 1866-67, but you consider that your revision of the Customs duties will tend to increase the receipts in future.

SIR STAFFORD NORTHCOTR. 14th June 1867. 57. Your estimate of revenue from Opium is 786,2501. below that for 1866-67, but is still quite as high as the prices recently obtained appear to warrant.

58. As you consider that the demand for copper coin has been fully supplied, your reduction of 96,560*l*. in the estimate of Mint Receipts appears to be judicious.

59. The reduction of 498,800/. in your Estimate of Receipts from Public Works is stated in your letter to be wholly attributable "the exclusion of "the accounts of " the Special Fund "at Bombay from " the Revenue "Accounts." \mathbf{It} is not clear from this explanation whether the reduction arises from your not again including a sum which was erroneously expected to be realized 1866-67, or whether an estimated receipt at Bombay in 1867-68 is excluded from the accounts.

60. The Budget Estimate of the Revenue for 1867-68 is therefore, on the whole, 30,310%. in excess of the Estimate for 1866-67, after including the proceeds of the License Tax.

61. The total estimated expenditure in India and England for 1867-68 exceeds, by 1,785,032l., the Budget Estimate for 1866-67.

62. In the Army Charges, the Estimate for 1867-68* is 523,290%. below that for the previous year, and there are reductions of

An increase which is by no means excessive when the works which you expect to execute are taken into consideration.

63. Excluding Public Works Expenditure, and that upon Stores from England, which exceeds the corresponding charge for 1866-67 by 348,876*l*. and the augmentation of 348,989*l*. for interest, the remaining increase of £357,320 must be regarded as the result of the efforts made to improve the general administration.

64. Consequent on the change in the mode of stating Public Works Ex-

penditure, it appears from the Budget Estimate that excluding Public Works Extraordinary, there is an estimated surplus in 1867-68 of 1,685,478*l.*, or, including Public Works Extraordinary, a deficit of 1,827,522*l.*; but that is an unduly favourable view of the fi-

'nancial result of the year, as the real increase in the Public Works Expenditure in 1867-68 is, as shown in paragraph 62, 709,847l.

- 65. It is obviously of great importance, specially when it is probable that money will have to be raised on loan, that great care should be taken that no expenditure of an ordinary character is included under Public Works Extraordinary, and I am not without apprehension that this has been done in your Budget Estimate.
- 66. It is difficult to specify precisely the works which should be regarded as "ordinary," and therefore properly chargeable on income, and what "exordinary;" but, as a general rule, all works should be treated as "ordinary,"

excepting those which may be expected to prove directly remunerative, that is to say, capable of yielding a profit beyond the interest on their cost, and great works, such as the construction of the new barracks which have been specially sanctioned as "extraordinary" by the Home Government. There are several works included in the Public Works Department account of the proposed expenditure of the special grant which do not appear to me to fulfil these conditions.

- 67. If that distinction be made, the extraordinary expenditure will be the amount that may be properly provided for by loan, while all the other charges should be met from the incomes of the year, and I should not consider your financial condition to be satisfactory unless, in time of peace, you are able to show a surplus of at least a million sterling, of which a considerable portion might be regarded as necessary for the gradual repayment of the debt incurred for extraordinary expenditure on Public Works.
- 68. This provision is the more necessary with reference to the propositions which are being constantly made by your Government for increases of salaries and establishments, and it is indispensible that you should keep constantly in view the importance of limiting the expenditure to the lowest amount consistent with efficiency.
- 69. As the surplus shown in the Budget Estimate for 1867-68, of 1,685,478l., is due to the reduction of the ordinary charges by the transfer of a large sum to the head of Public Works Extraordinary, without which transfer your Estimate for 1867-68 must have shown a considerable deficit, it is obvious that you had no option but to consider what new mode of taxation it would be expedient to adopt.
- 70. When the Income Tax was imposed in the year 1860, the rate of four per cent. was assessed on incomes of Rs. 500. per annum and upwards, 2 per cent. only being chargeable on incomes below Rs 500, but exceeding Rs. 200 per annum. It was soon found, however, that any assessment on incomes of less amount than Rs. 500 per annum was inexpedient, and that portion of the tax was relinquished in 1862.
- 71. In now determining to impose a License Tax, you appear to have been influenced by a belief that such a tax would be less objectionable than an Income Tax. I entertain doubts of the soundness of that opinion. Whatever objection could be made to the Income Tax, and however defective the former assessment may have been, the principal was equitable, the rate of charge on all incomes above Rs. 500 being uniform. The License Tax imposes the same annual payment on an income of Rs. 200 per annum as on one of Rs. 499, and throughout the several classes similar inequalities exist, until the maximum of Rs. 500 is paid on incomes of Rs. 25,000, all incomes exceeding that sum being exempt so far as regards the excess. This exemption and the general inequality of the assessment are open to objection, and the amount which you expect to realize appears scarcely commensurate with the inconvenience which the imposition of a tax of that nature is calculated to occasion.
- 72. In questioning the expediency of the imposition of the License Tax, I do not desire to suggest any particular tax for your adoption, or to interfere with the duty, which must rests with your Government, of devising such measures as may be necessary for meeting your ordinary expenditure. I would only request that these remarks may receive your careful consideration.
- 73. In consequence of the failure in the Land Sales at Bombay, you raised in India, in December last, 600,000l. on debentures, repayable in January 1863, 1869, and 1870 respectively, and you contemplate raising in India, during the current year, the sum of 2,000,000l, It appears from the Notification forwarded with your Financial

letter, dated the 16th April, No. 113, that you had invited tenders for 1,500,000l., repayable as follow:—

Considering that the large expenditure for Public Works may render it necessary for you to obtain further loans during the next few years, I doubt whether it is expedient to borrow further sums on debentures, or for short terms of years, as it might be inconvenient to provide for those debentures or loans if they should be paid in to any considerable amount in satisfaction of demands for revenue, under the option given to holders, or should fall due at the same time that you have to raise money to meet the wants of the year.

74. You estimate that the year 1867-68 will commence with a balance in India of 11,132,1331., and close with a balance of 10,612,1681., after including payments on account of Railway and Irrigation Companies to the amount of 4,943,7661., a sum considerably exceeding the net amount estimated by those Companies to be paid into the Home Treasury.

75. In Lord Cranborne's Financial despatch dàted the 31st December last, No. 304, you were informed that it would be necessary that you should be prepared to meet bills from this country to the extent of 7,200,000%. That amount will be reduced by the sum of 1,000,000% to be borrowed in this country for barracks, and the drafts on India in the current year will consequently be limited to 6,200,000l.

4. But although the result differs so little from the Estimate, there were considerable deviations therefrom, both in the Revenue and Expenditure.

5. The actual receipts were in excess of the Estimate under the heads of Land Revenue REVENUES AND RECEIPTS, 1866.67.

of Land Revenue by 526,249*l*., Post Office Receipts by 140,859*l*., and Public Works by 126,969l. There were also unimportant • increases under Income Tax. Mint, Education, and Army. On the other hand, the actual receipts were less than the Estimate under all other heads, the most serious falling off being 275,860l. in the receipts from Salt.

6. The explanations furnished by you of these several increases or decreases show that they are, in great measure, at-

tributable to the fact that the Estimates and Accounts for the year 1866-67 related only to 11 months, and that the exclusion of the month of April rendered the preparation of an Estimate more than usually difficult.

7. The increase of 526,249l. in the Land Revenue arose from larger collections generally, but especially at Bombay, in the North-Western Provinces, and British Burmah. The increase of 169,302l. at Bombay is explained by you as being due to a sum corresponding to the Receipts in April 1.466 having been struck off the Estimate for 1867, and as the Receipts in that month included large arrears, the Revenue for 1866-67 was consequently under-estimated. The increase of 149,541l. in the North-Western Provinces was "owing to sale of proprietary rights in confiscated estates, to assessments and outstanding balances of former years realized in Goruckpore and Bustee, and to larger collections of rents in anticipation;" and that of 114,824l. in British Burmah to "collections of fluctuating Land Revenue in excess of the Estimate."

8. The increase of 140,859l. under Post Office was apparently nominal, and was caused by EXPENDITURE, 1866-67.

- 9. The actual expenditure exceeded the Estimate by 265,506*l*. as shown in the margin.
- 10. The largest increases were in the interest on Funded and Unfunded Debt, allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements, Miscellaneous, Army, and in the cost of Stores transmitted to India.
- 11. The increase under the first mentioned head, 282,110*l*., is explained by you as "due to an overestimate in the amount of interest expected to remain

unclaimed during the year," but I am unable to understand on what principle your estimate could have been framed to admit of so large a difference as 282,1101. on this account.

- 12. The increase of 144,221*l*. in Allowances and Assignments is stated by you to be "due principally to under-estimates in Bombay and Bengal."
- 13. Of the increased charge of 451,605l under Miscellaneous, 348,575l was on account of famine relief in Bengal, for which no provision had been made in the Estimate, the remainder arising from loss by exchange on transactions with this country.

- *14. The increase of 101,424l in Army Charges was consequent on larger expenditure "in Commissariat establishments, supplies, and services in Bengal and Bombay."
- 15. The expenditure on account of stores from England was under-estimated to the amount of 533,396l., which is attributed by you to the non-receipt of the revised Estimate from England for the eleven months from 1st May 1866 to 31st March 1867, at the time when your Regular Estimate was closed, the Estimate forwarded to you with the Financial despatch dated the 31st December 1866, No. 304, having been prepared as usual for twelve months.
- 16. The actual charges were less than the Estimate under numerous heads, those in which the changes were most considerable being Interest on Service Funds and other accounts, Opium, Telegraph, Superannuation, Retired and Compassionate, Allowances, and Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital less net Traffic Receipts.
- 17. The decrease under Interest on Service Funds, &c., was apparently nominal, and arose from the non-adjustment of the charge for interest on the Balance of the Bengal Civil Service Annuity Fund, and that under Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances was mainly due to the non-adjustment of the donation to the same Fund.
- 18. The decrease under Opium was attributable to the payments to cultivators of the drug in Bengal having been over-estimated. The Telegraph Charges were less than the estimate by 201,766l.; of which, 61,742l. was in the cost of Superintendence, 60,075l. Construction and Re-construction, 46,774l. Indo-European Telegraph Line, and 28,878l. Stores purchased in India. But, as regards both the charges of Opium and the Telegraph Charges, it appears from your Regular Estimate for 1867-68 and your Budget Estimate for 1868-69 that the decreases in 1866-67 were exceptional.
- 19. The payment on account of Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital was less by 297,7201, owing to the realization of increased earnings from traffic.
- 20. It appears, therefore, that although the differences shown in the actual accounts, as compared with the Regular Estimate, were, under some heads, of large amount, they do not indicate any general change of importance either in the Revenues or Charges.
- 21. Your Regular Estimate for 1867-68 shows considerable deviations from the Budget Estimate for that year. In the latter, after the necessary modifications had been made in this country,—

24. The most important changes in the estimated Revenue are increases of 158,000%. under the head of License Tax, of 188,070%, from Customs, and of 1,100,450%. from Opium.

25. The increase in the proceeds \mathbf{of} License Tax includes 36,600l. for the Pandree Tax the Central in Provinces, heretoexhibited fore under Land Revenue. The increase in the Customs is

explained by you as arising from "the Collections of Customs Duty in Bengal, Madras and Bombay," but the items in which the improvement is

27. The increase under Opium is due to the estimated payment of arrears of the past year, and additional advances to cultivators.

28. Of the increase of 164,005l. \mathbf{in} the Marine Charges, 126,034l. is attributed by you to expenditure in the purchase of and other \mathbf{coal} stores at Bombay, principally for the Abyssinian Expedition, which will, however, be recovered from the British Exchequer.

29. The increase of 231,980% in Army Charges is explained as arising from several causes, ma-

nifesting a tendency towards increase in the Military expenditure which calls for constant watchfulness.

- 30. There appears to be an increase in the charge for stores transmitted to India, but your Budget Estimate did not include the value of Copper and Public Works Stores. In the estimate presented to Parliament, the value of those stores is included.
- 31. The large estimated increase in the charge for Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital appears to arise mainly from the falling off in the net traffic earn-

Of the remaining increase, 100,620*l*. is in the payment to the Imperial Government for troops serving in India, consequent on the adjustment of certain outstanding claims, 28,573*l*. in the Furlough Allowances, 91,646*l*. in the charge for passages. of Officers and Troops, 44,735*l*. on account of the Overland Troop Transport Service, 29,410*l*. on account of construction of Victoria Hospital at Suez, 38,548*l*. in Retired Pay, including Compassionate Allowances and Lord Clive's Fund Pensions, and a charge of 23,079*l*. arises from a refund to the representatives of the late Lord Clive. An additional sum of 31,345*l*. is also included on account of Interest on Loans contracted in England.

33. Although, therefore, the view of the Income and Expenditure given in the Regular Estimate shows a reduction of 721,445*l*. in the deficit of the year as compared with the Budget Estimate, the improvement is entirely due to the increased receipt from Opium. The expenditure is expected to exceed by 753,945*l*. the Budget Estimate, notwithstanding the expenditure on Public Works Ordinary and Extraordinary is reduced to the amount of 629,477*l*.

34. As the accounts of the year 1866-67 relate only to the transactions of eleven months, it is not practicable to make any useful comparison between those accounts and the Regular Estimate of 1867-68.

for 1867-68, the total estimated Revenues and Receipts for 1868-69 show an improvement of 328,400*l*.

37. The principal increases are under the heads of Land Revenue, Law and Justice, and Miscellaneous. The augmented Land Revenue is attributed by you to "the realization the usual "revenue in Oris-"sa, and is partly a owing to the "new settlement "in Oude, re-set-"tlements in Goo-"jerat, proceeds of "grazing lands, "and increase in "settlement fees "in the Punjaub."

38. The increase in the receipts from Law and Justice appears to be nominal, being a transfer of the balances of Peons, Ameens, and Tullubanna Fee Funds, "which are appropriable to increasing the efficiency of judicial "establishments, for which provision has been, and will henceforth be, made "in the charges."

39. In regard to the Miscellaneous Receipts, you state that the Budget Estimate shows "an increase of 324,400%, in consequence of the credit taken "for the first time for the amount of subscription on account of Military Funds in Bengal, Madras and Bombay, and also for the amount of excess "of payments over receipts in England and India by a per contra debit "under the debt account." From this explanation I conclude that the receipts on accounts of these funds are entered as Miscellaneous Receipts, and the payments to a corresponding amount as charge, any excess of payments being debited to the balance of the funds deposited with the several Governments.

40. Under most other heads your Budget Estimate of Revenue for 1868-69 is below the Regular Estimate for 1867-68, but the only reduction of large amount is 428,400*l*. in the receipt from Opium, which is, however still estimated at 8,385,800*l*.

41. The expenditure in India and England, including Public Works Extraordinary, is estimated for 1868-69 at 49,613,394l., being 248,817l. in excess of the Regular Estimate for the previous year. Excluding Public Works Extraordinary, the expenditure is 82,073l. below the Regular Estimate of 1867-68.

42. In the estimated expenditure, the principal increases are in the charges of collection of the Land and of the Post Office revenue, the charges of Law and Justice, Police, Education, Science and Art, and in the expenditure on Public Works. On the other hand, the Budget Estimate is below the Regular Estimate for 1867-68 under Interest on Service Funds and other accounts, Allowances, Refunds and Drawbacks, Marine, Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements, Miscellaneous, and Expenditure in England.

43. The increase of 203,100% in the charge of the collection of the

Land Revenue, and 368,6801. under Law and Justice, appear to arise mainly from augmentations of salaries and establishments, and in some degree from including official postage as departmental charges, the increase of 96,8801. under Post Office, and 119,250*l*. under Police, to revisions' of establishments, and the increased charge of 419,560l. for Public Works to the larger provision for Irrigation and Special Fund Works. The increase \mathbf{under} Law and Justice is counterbalanced to a great extent by the increased receipts referred to in paragraph 38 of the Despatch.

44. The decrease of 255,470*l*. in the Interest on Service Funds is nominal, and is caused by excluding the interest payable to the Bengal, Madras and Bombay. Military Funds, it having apparently been determined

that the excess of payments over receipts on account of those Funds should be charged to the capital.

45. The decrease of 109,760l. in Allowances, Refunds and Drawbacks, is attributed by you to a change in the mode of exhibiting steam postage collections payable to the Imperial Exchequer, as noticed in paragraph 8 of your despatch dated the 14th March last, No. 66, which, however, gave reasons for an increase under this head. I am unable to understand how a change of system by which the refunds on this account are debited to the head of Allowances, Refunds and Drawbacks, can have reduced its total amount.

46. The decrease in the estimated Marine expenditure is owing to the Regular Estimate for 1867-68 having provided for stores bought to meet the Abyssinian Expedition; and the lower estimate for Allowances and Assignments under Treaties to the cost of the redemption of the annuity of Ramchunder Luxumunjee having been included in the Estimate for 1867-68.

England, including the cost of stores supplied to India, is mainly caused by a reduction in the Army Charges which were exceptionally heavy in 1867-68 on account of capitation rates payable to the Imperial Exchequer, furlough allowances, passage Officers of

troops, construction of India troop transports, and India overland troop transport service.

- 48. It appears, therefore, that while your Budget Estimate for 1868-69 shows an increase of revenue and diminution of charge under some heads, they are for the most part nominal, and there is a tendency towards increase in the expenditure, especially in the charges of collection of the Land Revenue, Post Office, for Law and Justice, and Police.
- 49. In considering the general state of the finances; as shown in your estimate, it is important to keep in view the fact, that a sum exceeding one-sixth of your total income is estimated to be obtained from Opium.

50. In the 10 years from 1856-57 to 1865-66, the income from that source averaged 6,771,3021. per annum, and a sum equal to your present estimate has only been obtained in one year, viz., 1865-66. I am, therefore, of opinion, that in framing your estimates it is inexpedient to include so large a sum as 8,385,000l. from Opium, and that in future years it would be well to limit the estimate to 6,000,000l., even when there may be, as at present, a prospect of obtaining a larger amount.

- 51. In discussing the financial measures which your Budget Estimate appeared to render necessary, exception was taken by several members of your Government to the imposition of a License tax, on the ground that it was uncalled for, and that if the expenditure on extraordinary and remunerative public works were provided for by loan, the estimate for the year would show a surplus.
- 52. I am fully aware that, when treating of the question of expenditure on important exceptional works, Lord Cranborne recognized the principle that in regard to the cost of works which had been duly considered and sanctioned, any sum which might be required in aid of the ordinary income should be raised by loan. This view I endorsed in my Financial despatch dated the 14th June 1867, No. 220, in which, however, I observed that, "as a general rule, all works should be treated as ordinary, except those which may be expected to prove directly remunerative; that is to say, capable of yielding a profit beyond the interest on their cost, and great works, such as the construction of the new barracks.'
- 53. The arrangement under which Extraordinary Public Works Expenditure is shown separately in the accounts was, however, obviously made, not for the purpose of excluding from the ordinary charges expenditure which had, in past years, been defrayed from the annual income, but to show clearly what additional outlay on public works of a remunerative character might properly be provided for from money to be raised on loan.

54. The statement below shows that, even during the years when the charge of military operations consequent on the mutiny still pressed heavily on the finances, the expenditure on Public Works was not very much below the sum now estimated to be incurred for Public Works Ordinary and Extraordinary, including Barracks, Communications, and Embankments, but exclusive of works of Irrigation and Special Fund Works. If the expenditure on Barracks be also excluded, the charge for Public Works Ordinary would be much less than that of 1859-60, when the Military charges amounted to 23,640,3011., whereas they are now estimated at 16,005,0881:—

- 55. It appears, moreover, from the minutes of the members of your Government, that the exclusion of the charge on account of Barracks, Communications, or Embankments from the ordinary charges of the year, is calculated to encourage erroneous views of the actual financial position of your Government, by unduly reducing the amount which should be provided for Public Works out of the income of each year.
- 56. In para 67 of my Financial despatch already referred to, I observed that your financial measures should be devised with a view to secure a surplus of income of a million over the expenditure of each year, exclusive of the charges for extraordinary works, and for a time of profound peace I consider that by on means too large a surplus. In the year 1866-67 (eleven months) in which no distinction was made between Ordinary and Extraordinary Public Works, the amount expended under the general head of Public Works amounted to 5,329,464l. In 1868-69, the charge for Public Works Ordinary is estimated at only 3,802,570l., being 1,526,894l. below that of 1866-67, and even if the sum estimated to be expended in 1868-69 for Barracks, Communications, and Embankments, viz., 1,822,090l, be included among the ordinary charges, they will only exceed by 295,196l. the expenditure of 1866-67.
- 57 So far, therefore, as regards the Budget Estimate for 1868-69, the general requirement that your financial measures should be devised to secure annually a million in excess of the expenditure would hardly be complied with, unless you adopted measures to obtain a surplus, exclusive of expenditure on Irrigation and Special Fund Works of about three-fourths of a million.

58. But until you had determined to impose the Income Tax, your

instead of a surplus of three quarters of a million, and under such circumstances, the necessity for the adoption of some new measure of taxation is fully

- apparent. Taking the proceeds of the License Tax into account, the estimated surplus only amounts to 243,506l.
- 59. In its present form the License Tax is in reality an Income Tax, and it might probably, by a different and more equitable assessment, produce a larger sum to the Government. I am satisfied that this important question will receive your anxious consideration.
- 60. For the reasons which I have now given, I am of opinion that, in future years, Irrigation Works and Special Fund Works are the only items that should be shown as Public Works Extraordinary.
- 61. In Lord Cranborne's Financial despatch dated the 31st December 1866, you were informed that the disbursements in this country in the year 1867-68 were estimated at 11,479,715*l.*, and that, as the net receipts from Railway, &c., Companies, and Miscellaneous Receipts would amount to 4,401,000*l.*, it would be necessary for you to be prepared to meet bills on the several Governments in India to the amount of 7,200,000*l.* You were subsequently informed that, in order to enable you to provide for the expenditure on barracks in India, one million sterling would be borrowed in this country, and the bills on India were accordingly reduced to that extent.
- 62. On the receipt of your telegram of the 27th August 1867, requesting that the drafts on India might be reduced to enable you to make advances on account of the Abyssinian Expedition, those drafts were further reduced during the following three months to the extent of one million.
- 63. In your Financial letter No. 71, you state that only 500,000l. had been borrowed in this country, and that, consequently, a reduction to that amount should be made in the drawings during 1868-69, that you have provided in your Estimate Cash Balances to the amount of 4,400,000l. for Secretary of State's bills on Calcutta and Madras, and 2,000,000l. on account of Abyssinia; and you suggest that, with reference to the sum of 500,000l. above referred to, the bills on Calcutta and Madras should be reduced during 1868-69 to 3,900,000l. It must, however, be apparent to you that as the bills on your. Government were reduced in 1867-68 to the extent of 1,000,000l., on account of the expenditure on Barracks, no further credit was due to India on that account, even if the whole amount had not been immediately borrowed in England. But the sum raised was actually 1,164,407l.
- 64. You will observe from the Regular Estimate of the Receipts and Disbursements of the Home Treasury for 1867-68, recently presented to Parliament, that the Home Disbursements including 855,824l., the cost of

65. The cash balance in the Home Treasury was consequently reduced from 4,098,779l. at the commencement to 2,833,009l. at the close of the year 1867-68.

66. In the Estimate of Receipts and Disbursements in England for 1868-69, forwarded to you with my Financial despatch dated the 23rd December 1867, No. 477, the total disbursements were stated at 12,236,944l.

- 67. In that letter I informed you that, including the sum of 1,000,000*l*. to be recovered from the Imperial Government on account of the Abyssinian Expedition, and a net deposit by the several Railway and other Companies of 3,341,000*l*., the total receipts were estimated at 4,535,500*l*., and, therefore, it would be necessary for you to be prepared to meet bills to the amount of 7,800,000*l*.
- 68. Since the date of that Estimate, further remittances of specie have been made to Abyssinia and to Egypt on account of the Abyssinian Expedition, whereby the estimated disbursements will be increased.
- 69. At present it is not practicable to determine what sum in excess of 1,000,000*l*. will be recoverable from the Imperial Exchequer on account of the Abyssinian Expedition, but as some credit will have to be given for stores taken to India from Abyssinia, it would be unsafe to calculate on a larger increase than about 1,500,000*l*.
- 70. In regard to the several Railway and Irrigation Companies, I observe that you estimate the payments in India during 1868-69 at 4,415,417*l*., whereas the net deposits in the Home Treasury are estimated by those Companies at only

nies will exceed their estimate, and the sum of 6,300,000l, still remains to be supplied by bills on India.

- 71. I request that you will inform me without delay, whether you will be prepared to meet bills to that amount, and at what date the drafts on Bombay may be renewed. Pending the receipt of your reply, the bills on India will be limited to Rs. 40,00,000 a month, according to the intimation conveyed to you by telegram on the 8th May 1868.
- 72. If you should continue of opinion that the disbursement for Railways in India will reach the sum estimated by you, the Railway Companies will be called upon to increase their deposits.
- 73. In closing this despatch, I feel it necessary to call your attention to the erroneous information conveyed to me by your telegram of the 14th March, in which it was stated; "Financial statement made to-day. Regular Estimate "surplus of the present year, 800,000%. Estimated surplus of 1868-69, "230,000%, after providing for charges, except Irrigation works."
- 74. It cannot be necessary for me to remind you that, in regard to telegraphic communications, it is essential that great care should be taken that the terms of the messages will not admit of misapprehension.
- 75. Your Regular Estimate for 1867-68, instead of a surplus of 800,000*l.*, shows a deficit of 1,060,500*l.*, but before I was in possession of more accurate and detailed information, I had, in reply to a question in the House of Commons, given the substance of the telegram as received from you.
- 76. I must request that measures may be taken to guard against any similar error in future.

I have considered in Council your Financial Letters dated the 8th, 9th. No. 252, dated 29th 15th and 16th March last, Nos. 56, 58, 63 and 65, the Finance and Revenue Accounts for 1867-68, and Regular Estimate for 1868-69, prepared for presentation to Parliament, the Budget Estimate for 1869-70, and the Financial Statement of Sir Richard Temple, which you also forwarded.

- .2. The Regular Estimate of the Revenues and Charges of India for the rear 1867-68, presented to Parliament in May 1868, gave a probable deficit of 1,106,0771. The Actual Accounts show that the deficit was 1,610,1571. eing 504,080l. in excess of the Estimate.
- 3. This less favourable result was consequent on an increased expenditure, the Revenues having exceeded the Estimate by 171,1441.
- 4. There were, however, variations of considerable amount under several heads of Revenue. The receipts from Opium exceeded the estimate by 109,3681., in consequence of the realization of a higher price for Bengal Opium, and of an increase in the quantity of Malwa Opium for which passes were granted. The Marine Receipts were 195,890% above

the Estimate, mainly owing to the sale of Vessels and Stores. principal increase was, however, 688,7511. in the Miscellaneous Receipts, and was caused by the transfer to Revenue of certain unclaimed deposits, and of the excess of the expenditure of the Military Funds, above the ordinary receipts, from the balances of those Funds.

5. On the other hand, the Land Revenue was 116,960l. below the Estimate, owing to the unfavourable season in various districts of the Madras Presidency. The receipts from Salt and

Stamps were respectively 298,2071. and 207,6311. less than the Estimate, but the sums realized under those heads were, nevertheless, much in excess of the receipts of any former year. Consequent on a diminished coinage of silver and copper, the Mint receipts were 117,0481. less than had been anticipated.

Of the increase of 229,392l. under Miscellaneous. 77,8261, was for Famine Relief in Bengal, and 60,000l. was the loss on Government shares in the old Bank of Bombay. The increase of 285,356L, under Superannuation, Retired. and Compassionate lowances, was caused by the addition of the pensions of the Military Funds, and the adjustment of arrears of donations to Service Funds. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital was 298,0351. above the Estimate, and is attributable to the Traffic earnings having been less than was anticipated.

7. The Expenditure was less than the Estimate under several heads, but the most important differences were 131,2831. under Telegraph, 189,4281. in the Allowances and Assignments, and

286,4331, in Army Charges. The Telegraph Charges were less in consequence of delay in the execution of the works. The Allowances and Assignments were lower mainly through the sum provided for the debts of Prince Azeem Jah having remained unappropriated during the year. The causes of the Army Charges having been less are not explained.

8. In the Regular Estimate for 1867-69, the expenditure for Barracks and Jails was shown under Public Works Extraordinary, but in the Actual Accounts they are properly included under Ordinary Charges, and on both accounts the actual expenditure was 72,3691. below the Estimate.

10. Although, therefore, the Accounts for 1867-68 give a less favourable result than the Regular Estimate for that year, the variations are not greater than must be anticipated, and do not indicate any important change in the prospects of Revenue or Charge.

11. The Accounts of 1866-67, through the change in the commencement of the financial year, related in a great degree to the transactions of only 11 months, and it is not, therefore, practicable to make any useful com-

parison of the Revenue and Charges of that year with those of 1867-68.

Regular Estimate 12. For the year 1868-69, the Budget Estimate, after including all for 1868-69, compared with the Budget expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary, showed a deficit of 1,026,494l. Estimate for that In the Regular Estimate the deficit is stated at 2,912,924l.

13. This more unfavourable view is wholly attributable to larger expenditure, amounting to 2,588,2301.; the Revenues showing a probable increase of 701,800l.

The increase of 122,830*l*. in Marine Charges, being for stores for the Abyssinian Expedition in promised the dition, is nominal, the value being credited under Receipts, and 145,300l. under Miscellaneous consists mainly of Loss by Exchange on Transactions with England.

The estimated increase of 193,770L in Superannuation and Retired Allowances is stated by you to consist of Military Fund transactions, as explained in paras. 11 and 21 of your letter, No. 63; but those explanations relate to the causes of increase in the income and expenditure regarding those Funds, apparent in the Actual Accounts of 1867-68 as compared with the Regular Estimate for that year, and give no informa-tion why your Regular Estimate exceeds the

Budget Estimate for 1868-69.

21. The increase of 521,043*l*. in the Guaran-

teed Interest on Railway Capital is owing to an expected smaller realization of net traffic earnings.

22. The increase in the net expenditure in England, including Stores (but exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary), is 856,232l. Of that increase, 47,831l. is due to the new Postal arrangement with the Lords of the Treasury, 141,140l. to the supply of a Submarine Cable for the Indo-European Telegraph, 46,758l. is for the construction of two Monitors for Bombay, Harbour, 125,602l. for Marine Stores consequent on increased demands, 86,557l. for stationery stores, owing to larger supplies and certain payments for 1867-68 having been brought to account in 1868-69; 70,072l. is for Civil and Military Furlough Allowances, 123,143l. for the passages of Officers and troops vid the Cape of Good Hope, 52,354l. for the Overland Troop Transport Service, and 51,193l. for the charges for Military Stores, owing to unforeseen expenditure for making breech-loading ammunition.

23. Your Regular Estimate of Expenditure is below the Budget Estimate under several heads, of which the principal are, 62,320*l*. under Land Revenue, 138,450*l*. in the Opium Charges, and 101,500*l*. under Army Charges; your explanation of the latter being that it is due to reduced provision for Pay and Allowances of Regiments both in the Bengal and Bombay Presidencies.

24. Of the large increase of expenditure, the payment to the Nizam of the accumulated surplus revenues of the Berars, the additional charges for

Marine Stores, the additional Public Works Expenditure, the charges in England for a Sub-marine Cable for the Indo-European Telegraph, and for Monitors for Bombay Harbour, amounting to about 1,427,863*l.*, may be regarded as exceptional; but independently of those in-

creases, there is still an estimated additional expenditure shown in the Regular Estimate of upwards of a million.

25. 26. Your Estimate of Revenues and Receipts is 52,140/. above the amount shown in the Regular Estimate for 1868-69, but this is after including the additional sum of 380,000l. from the Income Tax. There are also considerable variations under other heads.

27. It is satisfactory to find that you feel justified in anticipating an increase of 370,300l. in the Land Revenue, from new settlements in Oude and re-settlements in some of the Non-regulation Provinces of Bengal, and that, in consequence of the rains, your apprehensions of famine have been removed.

28. The expected increases of 60,0007, from Customs, owing to a general

increase of trade, and of 213,700*l*. from salt, are also satisfactory.
29. Of the increase of 216,100*l*. under Miscellaneous, 150,000*l*. arises from the transfer of the balance of the Police Superannuation Funds, under the arrangement which you have made for revising the pay of the men and granting pensions, so as to get rid of those Funds.

30. You estimate the receipt from Opium at 8,286,540l., being 599,860l.

below the amount included in the Regular Estimate of 1868-69, but your estimate exceeds the actual receipts of every year except 1865-66 and 1867-68, as, in consequence of a failure of the poppy crop in Behar, the quantity for sale will be reduced, you have assumed that a price of Rs. 1,330 per chest will be obtained, being Rs. 80 per chest above the Budget Estimate for last year. Although that estimate is based on the rates obtained in the last three years, I entertain serious doubts as to the expediency of your adopting so high a rate.

31. The decrease of 216,900*l*. under Law and Justice is consequent on an accumulated balance

of Process Service Funds having been brought to account in 1868-69, and the Marine Receipts are less by 330,100%, the Estimate for 1868-69 having included large receipts on account of the Expedition to Abyssinia.

652,3721. in excess of the Regular Estimate 1868-69, which, as already seen, was greatly above that of 1867-68, but nearly a million more than the whole amount of the estimated increase in 1869-70. arises from increased expenditure on Public Works. There are estimated increases under some other heads, but they are not of large amount, or of great importance, as indicating any permanent change.

33. On the other hand, the Estimated Expenditure under some heads is 1,616,0931. below the Regular Estimate for 1868-69. The reduction of 243,3701. in the Allowances, Refunds, and Drawbacks is owing to the Regular Estimate of the previous year having included the payment of the Berar surplus, the decrease of 208,2401. in the Marine Charges results mainly from the former years' expenditure having included the cost of Stores provided for the Abyssinian Expedition. and the net expenditure in England is less by 170,512l. mainly owing to the cost of a cable for the Indo-European Telegraph, and certain payments of an exceptional nature for Marine and Stationery Stores for India having augmented the Home charges of the previous year.

Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, is estimated at 196,243*l*. less than in 1868-69, owing to an expected improvement

in the net Traffic Receipts.

35. The estimated increase in Public Works Extraordinary, including expenditure in India and England, is 1,727,345l.

36. Excluding from the estimated receipt the sum which you expect to realize by the conversion of the Tax on Trades and Professions into an Income Tax of 1 per cent., your estimated income was 327,356l. below the expenditure, without taking into account the charge for Public Works Extraordinary. Assuming that your estimate of expenditure was framed after a careful scrutiny of the various items, and that you were unable at the time to make any reduction in the charges, you clearly had no alternative but to devise some plan for increasing the annual income.

37. Under these circumstances, as well as on other grounds, and especially with reference to the sanction given in my Financial despatch dated the 14th January last, No. 24, you were fully justified in considering that it was desirable to convert the tax on Trades and Professions into an Income Tax; but I am not satisfied that it was expedient to exclude from the direct operation of the tax the interest on the Government debt. The effect is obviously to relieve all holders of Government securities who reside out of India from payment of this tax, and to render it very doubtful whether it will be paid on any considerable portion held by residents in India.

38. In your Regular Estimate for 1868-69, the Cash Balances in the Indian Treasuries, on the 31st March 1869, are stated at 11,917,473*l.*, and in the Budget for 1869-70, after providing for disbursements of 8,400,000*l.*, to meet bills to be drawn from this country, and payments of 3,260,600*l.* to the Railway and Irrigation Companies, you anticipate that you will have a balance, on the 31st March 1870, of 11,627,310*l.*

39. In forwarding that Estimate, however, you refer to the fact that, in order to meet the estimated deficit of the year, occasioned by the expenditure on Extraordinary Public Works, and certain obligations falling due, as well as to strengthen your Cash Balances, it will be necessary to borrow during the year five millions, viz., three millions in India, and two millions in England, and you subsequently suggest that, instead of borrowing the whole of the three millions in India, another half million might be raised in England, thus reducing the sum to be borrowed in India to two and a half millions.

40. You then refer to the telegram of the 4th March last, in which, at your request, I had consented to suspend all drawings on your Government, and you observe,—"In view of the arrangements now made for raising "money in India, it would appear to be unnecessary to ask Your Grace to "reduce your drawings by more than 500,000l, making the amount for the year 7,900,000l, or, say, 65 lacs of rupees monthly. We cannot, however, "avoid observing that the relief which we anticipated from the cessation of your drawings has not been felt in so marked a degree as our estimates would "have led us to expect; and that, although our officers are unable to indicate "with any certainty the cause of the continued depression, it appears but too "probable, judging from the known state of the Cash Balances at the principal central Treasuries, that the accounts for the current year will close with a balance sensibly below that of the regular estimate, which is framed "for the most part on the actual transactions of eight months

"for the most part on the actual transactions of eight months.
"In these circumstances, that is, considering the absence of any reserve in
"our Treasuries, and the uncertainty unavoidably attaching to the most carefully framed estimates, we are disposed to recommend that Your Grace's bills "should, if this can be done without inconvenience, be discontinued through the "month of April, and resumed in May, at the rate of 60 lacs monthly."

Cash Balances.

- 41. The doubts entertained by your Government at the time of despatching the Accounts and Estimates (9th, 15th and 16th March), as to the Cash Balances at the close of the year 1868-69, lead me to apprehend that there must be some grave defect in regard to the preparation of your Financial Statements.
- 42. During the past year you repeatedly brought to my notice that, in consequence of your having to make advances on account of the Expedition to Abyssinia, your Cash Balances had been insufficient to meet the bills which you had been advised would be drawn on your Government, and, under those representations, all drawings in aid of the Home Treasury were suspended from the 22nd December 1868 to the end of April 1869.

43. In the Budget Estimates for 1867-68 and 1868-69, you estimated that

the "supplies to London" would be as follow-

In the Actual Account of 1867-68 and Regular Estimate for 1868-69, the supplies, including expenditure for the Abyssinian Expedition, are stated as follow—

being nearly one million less than you had estimated, notwithstanding large remittances of bullion were made from this country towards meeting the ex-

penditure on account of Abyssinia.

44. Judging from the accounts only, it would appear, therefore, that the inconvenience which you experienced could not have arisen from the amount of your supplies to this country, whether in the shape of advances for the Abyssinian Expedition, the amount of which would be recoverable from the Imperial Government, or in any other mode.

45: I observe also that in the Regular Estimate for 1867-68 and Budget Estimate for 1868-69, received from you in April 1868, the Abyssinian Ex-

penditure was stated as follows-

46. It would appear, therefore, that a considerable portion of the Abyssinian expenditure has been omitted from these accounts.

47. On a consideration of these circumstances, which indicated that certain items of expenditure must have been omitted from your Financial Statements, and of the observations of your Government which I have quoted, I

was not unprepared for the telegram from your Government of the 8th May, apprising me that your Cash Balances on the 31st March 1869 amounted to only 10,359,497l., being upwards of a million and a half less than the sum stated in your estimates

- 48. I must request that an explanation may be furnished to me of these apparent discrepancies, and that you will adopt measures for ensuring greater clearness in future statements.
- 49. According to the request contained in your telegram of the 2nd March last, the drafts on India were suspended during the month of April. In May, bills were drawn on Calcutta and Madras for 70 lacs. The drawings will be continued at the rate of 65 lacs a month from the present month

of June, and you will, therefore, have to provide during the year 1869-70 for 7,200,000*l*., being 1,200,000*l*. less than the sum included in the estimate forwarded to you in my Financial despatch dated the 7th January 1869, and

adopted in your Budget Estimate. If the net deposits of the Railway Companies should not exceed the estimate, it will be necessary that a further sum of 1,200,000l., making 3,200,000l., should be raised in this country by loan *during the vear.

50. I am not, however, without hope that when your balances shall have been strengthened by the loan of two millions on 4 per cent. promissory notes, the loan of 40 lacs from the Puttiala State, and the sum which you propose to raise on short time debentures, as explained in your Financial letter of the 23rd March last, No. 73, and my approval of which was conveyed to you by telegram on the 19th April, you may find it practicable to provide for increased drawings from this country.

51. I cannot close this despatch without requesting your earnest consideration of the present state of the finances as shown in these Accounts and Estimates.

52. In previous Financial despatches to your Government, it has been stated that your Estimates should be so framed as to show a probable surplus of from half a million to a million sterling. In that opinion I concur.

52,644

53. Considering that it has not been necessary to make any provision for military operations, consequent on war or internal disturbance, I cannot regard your Estimate for 1869-70, which, without taking into account the charges for Irrigation and other remunerative works, shews a probable surplus of only 52,644l. as being satisfactory.

54. I have already, in former despatches, called your attention to the Army Charges, and to the Expenditure for Stores, as demanding a searching inquiry with a view to reduction, and I shall hope to find that you have been able to effect reductions of expenditure also in some other branches of administration.

55. Unless this can be done, it is clear that it will be necessary to devise some means of increasing the annual income; as otherwise, a failure in the full estimated receipt from Opium, the loss of any portion of revenue from unfavourable seasons, or any extraordinary military charge, would certainly convert the estimated surplus into a large deficit,

56. For these reasons, I consider it altogether unsafe to base your financial arrangements for any year on a surplus in the Budget Estimate of so small. an amount as 52,644l.

57. I am desirous of being furnished with a statement showing the receipts and payments on account of the Bombay Special Fund Works, the quantity of land yet unappropriated and what further sums you expect to realize and disburse on this account.

I have considered in Council your Financial letters dated the 6th April 1870, Nos. 96 and 97, forwarding the Finance and Revenue Accounts for 1868-69, and Regular Estimate for 1869-70, for presentation to Parliament, the Budget Estimate for 1870-71, and the observations of your Government on those Statements.

5. The Marine Receipts exceeded the Estimate by 109,484*l*., but this included the value of labour and stores supplied for the Abyssinian Expedition. The Miscellaneous Receipts were 509,1921. above the Estimate, of which, 276,340l. was a credit for Government promissory notes belonging to rebels, which had been cancelled; 41,7191. is the amount of unclaimed deposits credited to Revenue, the remainder consist-ing of "larger credits "on account of sub-"scriptions and adjust-. "ments on account of "the Bengal, Madras, "and Bombay Military "Funds." In the Army

there was an increase of 272,1031., the cause of which is not explained.

6. The Land Revenue was 299,029l. below the Estimate, mainly owing Dury of Assertal to the unfavourable season in Madras and the North-West Provinces. The receipt from Opium was 433,0351. lower than the Estimate, wholly in consequence of a smaller demand for Opium Passes at Bombay. The Receipts from Law and Justice had been over-estimated, and the sum realized, although less than the estimate, exceeds the receipt of any previous year. The cause of the smaller receipt from Public Works is not explained. The other items do not call for remark.

7. The expenditure in India exceeded the estimate by 817,0791., of which, 186,346l. was in the Army Charges, and 460,177l., in the Public Works

Ordinary.

8. The increase in Army Charges was caused by increased Commissariat

have added 717,7341. on account of pensions " payable from the Military Funds of Bengal, Madras and Bombay."

10. Under the arrangement proposed in your Financial letter dated the 7th June 1867, No. 138, and approved in Sir Stafford Northcote's reply dated the 23rd August 1867, No. 311, the amount of pensions from those Funds was to be included among the charges in England, and a sum equal to the excess of the pension payments over subscriptions transferred annually to miscellaneous revenue from the balances of the Funds.

11. In your Finan cial letter dated the 15th March 1869, No. 63, which accompanied the actual accounts for 1867-68, you stated that the increase apparent

therein, as compared with the Regular Estimate for that year of 285,356L, under Superannuation, Retired and Compassionate Allowances, was caused "by the addition of the pensions appertaining to the Military Funds, as well as by the adjustment of arrears of former years in donations to Service Funds in Bengal, and that the increase in the miscellaneous receipts, to the amount of about 308,000L, consisted "of the ordinary subscriptions to the Military Funds, as well as the excess of expenditure in India and England over receipts trans ferred from deposits, to which head the balances of the Funds were credited.

Although, therefore, the Eund pensions were not then entered among the charges in England, there appeared to be no reason to doubt that, in other respects, the contemplated arrangement as to including the pensions as a charge, and crediting a corresponding sum to miscellaneous revenue, was carried into effect.

It now appears from your Financial letter No. 96 of 1870, from the statement of Sir Richard Temple on the 2nd April 1870, and from your telegram of the 27th May last, that of the Military and Medical Fund Pensions paid in England, and shown among the remittance transactions, the Madras Military Fund Pensions only were included in your accounts of 1867-68, and estimate for 1868-69, although the full amount of the excess of pensions over subscriptions had been duly credited. You have, therefore, added the sum of

717,734l. to the charges in England on that account
14. You were informed by my Financial despatch of the 24th March last, that from the 1st April following, all payments on account of the Fund pensions therein specified would be treated as charges on the revenues of India, and excluded from the account current, and the Finance and Revenue Accounts presented to Parliament have now been adjusted in accordance with the inform-

ation since received from you.

16. The deterioration in 1868-69 did not, however, arise from a falling off in the total revenue, which, on the contrary, exceeded that of 1867-68 by 655,6111.

17. There were larger receipts, as compared with the previous year, in the

The Allowances, Refunds and Drawbacks are more by 190,330*l*., the Budget Estimate having been too low. The Marine Charges are increased by 432,454l., the debts of the Port Canning and Calcutta Port Funds having been written off as irrecoverable. The Political Agencies and other Foreign Services are more by 146,290l. mainly from payments to, and charges for, the Ameer of Cabul. The increase in Miscella-neous Charges of 330,278l. is from the loss by exchange on billson India and freight of stores having been estimated too There is an estimated increase of 130,000l. in Army Charges, partly from the high prices of

26. Under several heads of Expenditure in India, the Regular Estimate is below the Budget, but, with the exception of Public Works Ordinary, the differences are not large. In the Superannuation,

Retired, and Compassionate Allowances there is a decrease of 98,3201, which results apparently from the transfer to the charges in England of the charge for the Military Fund Pensions. The reduction of 759,800*l*. in the expenditure on Public Works Ordinary is the effect of the measures adopted by you for stopping expenditure on that account.

27. The excess above the Budget Estimate of 914,446l in the expenditure in England was caused by an increased payment of 65,161l. in the Telegraph Charges, on account of the supply of the Sub-marine Cable for the Indo-European Telegraph, &c.; by including among charges in England the pensions from the Military and Medical Funds, hitherto an Indian charge; by increases of 58,918l. and 165,024l., respectively, arising from the operation of the new Civil and Military Furlough Rules; and by the payment of certain arrears of Lord Clive's Fund Pensions, which had been disbursed through the War Office.

DUKE OF ARGYLL. 21st July 1870.

28. It is apparent that, but for the measures adopted by you when you revised the Budget Estimate of 1869-70 in the autumn of last year, the deficit would have been very much larger. The increase of the income-tax and the salt duty at Madras and Bombay have not raised the Regular Estimate materially above the Budget Estimate of those heads, but it is obvious that a serious falling off must otherwise have occurred. The reduction in the expenditure on Public Works Ordinary of three quarters of a million is also attributable to the measures adopted by you at the same time, and the Regular Estimate, therefore, bears out the expectations which you then expressed that, if active measures were not adopted, the financial result of 1869-70 would probably be a deficit of one million and three quarters.

29. In your Budget Estimate for 1870-71 you have made some changes in the Abstract Account, to which I shall refer separately. But there are two

changes which it is necessary to notice here.

First.—It has hitherto been the practice to include among the charges in England the guaranteed interest which is paid by the Government, after deducting net traffic receipts. In your Budget Estimate for 1870-71 you have included the net traffic receipts as a part of the income of the year, and the gross payment for guaranteed interest as a part of the charge of the year, and you appear to have transferred from Public Works Ordinary to Railways the cost of land for, and supervision of, Railways, and Loss by Exchange on Railway Transactions. These changes are not only very inconvenient, but wrong in principle, for they show an apparent increase of about three millions per annum, which is altogether erroneous, as the net traffic receipts from railways are deposited in the Government treasuries, as required by the several deeds of contract, to be appropriated toward meeting the guaranteed interest, and like leposits on account of Service or Local Funds should, as hitherto, be treated only as a cash transaction. The cost of land for, and supervision of, railways is a charge which would not, under any circumstances; be reduced by the railway traffic receipts.

Secondly.—From the estimated charges in England, the particulars of which were furnished to you with my Financial despatch dated 20th January last, No. 14, you have excluded the value of stores for Ordinary and Extraordinary Public Works. In your Financial letter dated the 8th March last, you intimated that you had accepted the proposal of the Public Works Department to treat the value of those stores as a remittance to India, but in my reply of the 28th April I objected to that proposition, as being an inconvenient deviation from the course which was adopted after deliberate consideration in

regard to all supplies of stores.

30. I shall, therefore, as in former years, exclude the railway traffic receipts from the income, and shall include under Public Works Ordinary expenditure in India the charges incurred by Government for cost of land for, and supervision of, railways. I shall also continue to include the value of Public Works stores supplied from this country as a final charge in England,

reducing the charges in India by a corresponding amount.

31. I now forward a revised Estimate of the receipts and disbursements of the Home Treasury for the current year, which, as compared with the Estimate forwarded with my Financial despatch dated the 20th January last, No. 14, shows a net increase of expenditure in this country of 282,803l. Of that sum, 77,000l. is under Post Office, which includes some arrears of 1869-70, and also a sum of 51,992l., payable to the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company for additional subsidy for the years 1868-69 and 1869-70, which I had no reason to anticipate from the information furnished to me by the Postmaster General up to the time when the former Estimate was prepared. There is also, under Miscellaneous, a new charge of 12,230l. for the purchase of a Lunatic Asylum, which was rendered necessary by the unexpected and unavoidable termination of the arrangement under which lunatics, chargeable to India, have been hitherto placed at Pembroke House, Hackney. There are several increases under Army, of which, 47,400l. is the cost of the absorption of the Supernumerary Ensigncies in British regiments, and 38,000l. consisting of expenditure for arms, accoutrements, &c., not previously included, but which is met by a credit for similar articles under receipts. There is also 84,228l. for Military, Medical, and Indian Navy Fund Pensions, in addition to

the sums estimated by you, and 56,000l. for interest, in consequence of the DURE OF ARGYLL. incre ase of the four per cent. stock; there being, on the other hand, a credit of 77,000l. for subscriptions to the Military, Medical, and Indian Navy Funds, which had been omitted by you.

32. Adopting the alterations shown in the revised Estimate, your Budget Budget Estimate, 1870-71. Estimate for 1870-71 will stand as follows:—

of 1,128,400*l*. from the increased rates of Income Tax, as well as 335,0201. from Salt, arising from the in-creased rates of duty imposed thereon in Madras and Bombay in the autumn of last year. You have also included increases of 112,690l, in Forest, 39,300*l*. in Abkaree, and 36,513l. in Post Office Revenue, as well as small augmentations under Education and Interest. A large increase in the receipt from Law and Justice is nominal, being the amount of Judicial Stamps transferred from Stamp Revenue, which is reduced by nearly the same amount.

34. You estimate that, under other heads, the Revenues and Receipts will be 4,414,061*l*. below the Regular Es-

timate for 1869-70. The augmentation of nearly half a million in the Land Revenue, shown in the Regular Estimate for that year, was obtained partly by bringing to account the proceeds of the sale of Waste Lands, and partly from the collections in the Punjab and Madras having proved more favourable than

DUKE OF ARGYLL, was expected. The credit on account of the accumulated proceeds of sales of Waste Lands was exceptional, and your Estimate of Land Revenue for 1870-71: would have been much below the Regular Estimate of 1869-70 if you had not transferred from the head of Public Works to Land Revenue the water rent paid by the landholders for water obtained from the State Canals, amounting to about half a million per annum. Including these receipts, the Land Revenue is estimated by you at nearly the same amount as the Regular Estimate for 1869-70.

> 35. The apparent decrease of 1,604,6001. in the Stamp Revenue is nominal, being nearly equal to the amount transferred to Law and Justice, and the falling off of 803,930l. in Public Works Miscellaneous Revenue is partly nominal, as nearly 500,000l. is transferred, as already referred to, from that head to Land Reveune.

36. Your estimate of the receipt from Opium is 1,031,519l. below that of the Regular Estimate for 1869-70, a sum, however, fully as large as the present prospect appears to justify.

37. The Miscellaneous Receipts of 1869. 70 included the balance of the Police Superan-nuation Funds, and some other items of an exceptional nature, and your estimate for 1870-71 is therefore lower by 677,298*l*.

38. The other items which are below the estimate for 1869-70 do not call for remark.

39. The total expenditure in India is estimated for 1870-71 at 1,520,738l. below the Regular Estimate for 1869-70, notwithstanding there are increases amounting to 1,388,1351. under certain heads.

40. The principal estimated increases are, -172,200*l.*, interest on Funded and Unfunded Debt, a full year's in. terest being included on the Loans raised in 1869-70, and on the Debt created for the purchase of the Elphinstone Land Company's Estate, &c.; 117,6061. in Forest Charges for felling and sale of Tim-

ber for State Railways, the value of which is included in the Forest Revenue; 103,299l. for Manufacture of Salt, &c., 164,910l. in Opium, owing to increased cultivation and manufacture in the North-West Provinces; 178,6981. under Law and Justice, of which 55,2611. is on account of Commission on Sale of Court Fee Stamps, transferred from head Stamps, and 78,800%. for Service DURE OF ARGYLL of Processes. The increase of 117,2011. in the Superannuation, Retired and Compassionate Allowances is for gratuities and pensions to persons affected by the rule for compulsory retirement at the age of 55, and for Pensicns of the Police Superannuation Fund, which has been abolished.

41. The estimated decrease of 129,633*l*. in Interest on Service Funds and other accounts is caused by the abolition of the Police Superannuation Fund and by a smaller payment than last year for interest on deficiency in the Cash Balances. The reduction of 120,936*l*. in the Police Charges is attributable to reductions in the Force; that of 429,668*l*. in Marine is caused by the non-recurrerence of an exceptional charge in 1869-70 for writing off debts due from the Calcutta, Bassein and Moulmein, and Mutlah Port Funds. The lower estimate of 103,2051. for Political Agencies and other Foreign Services arises from the payments to the Ameer of Cabul having been included in the charges of the

42. The reduction of the Army Charges is estimated at 490,000L, and

that of the expenditure on Public Works Ordinary at 981,8371.

43. The guaranteed interest on Railway Capital, less net traffic receipts. is estituated at 280,071l. less, and the expenditure in England at 242,945l. more than the Estimate for 1869-70.

- 44. Your Budget Estimate for 1870-71, therefore, so far as regards Revenue, shows that from all principal sources, except Opium, you have no reason to anticipate a falling off. It is to the reduction in Opium and the lower estimate of Miscellaneous and Army Miscellaneous Receipts, which were exceptionally high in 1869-70, that the lower estimate of total Revenue is
- 45. The reductions apparent in your estimate of Expenditure for 1870-71, especially in the Army and Public Works Ordinary Charges, prove that you strenuously endeavoured to avoid the imposition of additional taxation; but you were, nevertheless, unable to bring about an equilibrium in 1870-71 without increasing the Income Tax to 31 per cent.
- 46. No effort will be wanting on my part to keep down the expenditure in this country, but an examination of the details of that expenditure for 1870-71, as contained in the Estimate now transmitted to you, will show that, for the most part, it does not admit of reduction.

48. Of the charges on the Revenues, the Contribution towards the expenses of Ships of the Royal Navy employed in the Indian Seas was agreed to after maturedeliberation; the Marine Pensions and Furlough Allowances ' are payable under established rules, and the Ironclad Monitors for Bombay were provided to meet an acknowledged necessity.

49. The 'payments on account of the Mission to Persia, and Her Majesty's establishments in China are made under engagements with the Imperial Government, and much correspondence has taken place with the Lords of the Treasury, in order, if possible, to obtain a reduction of the charge in respect of the establishments in China. The Estimate for 1870-71 includes a sum of 23,000l. on account of Her Majesty's establishments in China, which was not paid in 1869-70.

50. The Superannuation, Retired and Compassionate Allowances, the several Military Medical, and Indian Navy Fund Pensions, and the Civil

Furlough and Absentee Allowances, are payable under fixed rules.

51. The Army Charges for Furlough Allowances, Passage of Officers, Retired Pay, and Lord Clive's Fund Pensions, are all subject to fixed rules; the payments to the Imperial Government are now under reference to a Committee, whose first two Reports were forwarded to you with my Financial despatch dated 20th January 1870, No. 14, and the third Report accompanies this despatch; the Contracts for Transports and the general arrangements of the Indian Troop Transport Service were sanctioned after full consideration, and in communication with the Admiralty; the Charge for Purchase of Horses for the Stud in India, and Miscellanous Expenses attendant on the Education of Cadets and Medical Officers, are unavoidable; and charges for absorption of supernumerary Ensigncies in British Regiments and for the Gratuities, equal to the value of their Commissions, granted to Officers of British Regiments in India on their retirement, are consequent on the reductions made therein.

52. The Interest on Debt, Dividends to Proprietors of East India Stock, and Guaranteed Interest on Capital of Railway and other Companies, are charges

subject to fixed conditions.

53. The supplies of Stores from this country are, as you are aware, entirely dependent on the demands made from India, and are purchased here on the best terms obtainable, and as nearly as possible in accordance with your requisitions, except in cases in which the demand appears to be excessive.

54. It is obvious, therefore, that none of the foregoing charges, which are estimated for 1870-71 at 12,460,148*l*., admit of reduction from year to year. The Disbursements affecting the Remittance Account are, as you are aware, made on account of sums already deposited or repayable in India.

57. Your expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary (Irrigation and State Railways) is estimated for 1870-71 at 3,068,750l.

58. The observations of your Excellency in the Legislative Council, on the occasion of the introduction of the Budget for 1870-71, shew that the irrigation works included therein are very important and extend throughout 21st July 1870.

DURE OF ARGYLL the several Provinces; and the experience of past years, in which the actual expenditure has been generally much below the estimates, indicates that the works for which you have provided are fully as extensive as the supply of labour will enable you to execute with economy.

- 59. Upon a consideration generally of your Estimate of Income and Expenditure, I am satisfied that you have laboured earnestly to effect every reduction which can be carried into effect without impairing the efficiency of the several Departments of Government.
- 60. It was stated by Sir Richard Temple in the Legislative Council, on behalf of your Government, that it was with regret and reluctance that you felt compelled to raise the Income Tax from 1 to $3\frac{1}{8}$ per cent., but that a deficit could not otherwise be prevented; that as to the duration of the Income Tax you could not make any promise, but that you earnestly hoped that the tax at the present rate would not last beyond the current year, 1870-71.
- 61. You are obviously fully aware of the objections which exist to so high a rate of Income Tax, unless it be called for by an absolute necessity, and as you have deemed the increased rate indispensable for the current year, I shall not refuse to sanction it, but I trust that, in your arrangements connected with the Budget for 1871-72, you will be able to reduce the tax.
- 62. As to your Cash Balances, it appears that, commencing the year 1870-71 with a balance of 13,644,859l., you By your telegram of the 12th May, it appears that the Balance on the 31st March was 13,982,0991. will, after providing for bills of exchange to be drawn from this country to the amount of 10,000,000l, and a dishursement in India of 2,871,800l. to the Railway Companies, retain a Cash Balance on the 31st March 1871 of 10,569,443l.
- 63. It was part of the Financial arrangements for the year 1869-70 (Financial Despatch to India, 7th January 1869) that 2,000,0001. should be borrowed in England, and that 700,000l. a month should be obtained by bills on India.
- 64. You subsequently requested that the drawings might be reduced to 7,200,000l., and in agreeing to that proposition in my Financial despatch dated 29th July 1869, I stated that if the net deposits of the Railway Companies should not exceed the estimate, it would be necessary that a further sum of 1,200,000l. should be borrowed here during the year.
- 65. The sum obtained for bills on India was only 6,980,1221., and the net deposit by the Railway Companies during the year, estimated at 1,932,000l., was 1,886,276l.
- 66. In my Financial despatch dated 20th January 1870, No. 14, it was estimated that 2,683,000l. would be obtained by the sale of 4 per cent. stock during the year 1869-70, and that 2,000,000l, could be raised during 1870-71 without unfavourably depreciating the value of the stock.
- 67. Subsequently to the date of that despatch, the demand for 4 per cent. stock increased, and the amount raised during the year was, in consequence, 4,039,412l. being 800,000l. in excess of the amount contemplated in

my despatch of 29th July 1869, and 1,356,412*l*. in excess of the sum included DUKE OF ARGYLL. in the estimate of December 1869.

68. Considering, however, that the drawings on India during 1869-70 were 1,419,878*l*. less than the estimate, that the net deposits by the Railway Companies were 45,724*l*. below the estimate, and that the cash balance on the 31st March 1870, which was 2,892,483*l*., is not in excess of the sum required at the commencement of the year, I shall regard the 4,000,000*l*. raised in 1869-70 as applicable to the transactions of that year, and shall raise a further sum of 2,000,000*l*. during the current year.

Third Report of the Committee appointed by the Secretaries of State for War, and for India, to make arrangements for adjusting from 1st April 1870 the Home Charges for Effective Service of Her Majesty's Regiments in India on the principle of Artual Charges.

In compliance with the desire expressed by the Secretaries of State for War and for India, in a letter from Sir E. Lugard to the Under Secretary of State for India, dated the 4th January 1870, and the reply thereto, of the 5th January, the Committee have re-assembled for the further consideration of the subject of the payment by the Government of India of the Home Charges for Her Majesty's troops serving in India.

Since the date of the Committee's second Report, important changes have been proposed in the constitution of the Army in India, and propositions have also been made for recruiting the Army on a new principle which involves the breaking up of the Cavalry Depôt and Infantry Depôt Battalions, attaching in lieu of the former, a home troop of each regiment on service to a regiment of similar equipment at home; and of the latter two companies of each battalion abroad to a battalion at home, eight companies to be on foreign service, and 12 companies on home service.

A battalion of infantry in India would then consist of eight companies, each company having one captain and two subalterns: and there would be in respect of every battalion two companies at home, each with one captain and one subaltern, these two companies forming the depôt, and being attached to a home battalion of 10 companies.

The recruits annually required for each regiment of cavalry in India are estimated at 32; and for each battalion of infantry at 60. As under the proposed arrangement there would be nine regiments of cavalry and 50 battalions of infantry in India, the annual drafts required would be 288 cavalry and 30,000 infantry recruits.

The Committee have not before them at present any definite information DURB OF ABGYLL. as to the Artillery.

The propositions placed before the Committee are, that ten months is to be regarded as the average period of training of each Cavalry, and seven months of each Infantry, recruit, and that payment should be made from Indian revenues for recruits, at rates per man to be calculated with reference to those

periods.

It is proposed by the members appointed by the Secretary of State for War that a proportion of the Staff charges of each regiment or battalion should be included in the calculation; but this is objected to by the members appointed by the Secretary of State for India, on the ground that the Staff charges in question would not be increased in consequence of one troop or two companies being attached to each regiment or battalion, and that the object to be kept in view is the repayment to Imperial revenues of expenditure incurred for the purposes of the Indian Government, and not the relief of the Imperial Exchequer from charges which it would incur independently of any Indian requirements.

The Committee have, therefore, submitted two statements, one exclusive,

the other inclusive, of the regimental or battalion staff.

Proceeding to ascertain the charge of a Cavalry recruit under the arrangements above indicated, the Committee have taken into account the following items:—

In the above calculation no provision is made for deaths or desertions among the recruits, nor for those who are unable through ill-health to embark for India. Under the system hitherto existing, the charge on this account has heen very heavy, as shown in the accompanying memorandum; but, in future, as the recruits would form part of a Home regiment or battalion instead of a Depôt battalion, it may be anticipated that their association with a larger body of trained men would reduce materially the extent of desertion.

The Committee are of opinion that if to the expense of each recruit, as already shown, a sum equal to one-third thereof be added, adequate provision would be made for the charge consequent on deaths, desertions, or inability of recruits to proceed to India. The charge for each Cavalry recruit would thus be 136l. 13s. 11d., and for each Infantry recruit 63l. 8s. 5d., or 144l. 9s. 5d. and 66l. 19s. if the Regimental Staff charges are to be paid by India.

In regard to invalids or time-expired men awaiting their discharge, it appears to the Committee that the expenditure actually incurred on that account should not be included in the rate per recruit.

They understand that all invalids will in future be sent to the Invalid Hospital at Netley, or to a Consolidated Depôt near the port of disembarkation, and they consider that the maximum period of remaining there should be six months; that at the expiration of that time, at the latest, the soldiers should either be discharged or brought on the strength of their regiments at home, the time-expired men and those incapable of further service being discharged as soon as possible after arrival in this country.

A statement of the charge on this account should be annually furnished by the War Office, and, after examination by the officers of the Secretary of State for India in Council, should be paid independently of the charge for recruits.

The charge for difference of men on passage should remain as specified in the second Report of this Committee, an addition of 10l. 0s. 5d. per man being made on account of forage to the charge for each Cavalry soldier, which was inadvertently omitted in the calculation annexed to the second Report.

In addition to the above charges, India would have to pay directly the

Colonel's allowances and furlough pay.

In this Report the Committee have shown what would be the estimated cost of recruiting Cavalry and Infantry regiments in India under certain conditions placed before them. They have not entered upon the question how far those conditions are consistent with a due regard to economy. But they desire to express their concurrence in the view taken by the Committee presided over by Major-General Jameson, in their Report dated 5th August 1869, that, for the purpose of raising and training the number of recruits required for battalions of Infantry in India, it is not necessary to maintain more than one company with the Depôt in this country.

DURE OF ARGYML. 21st July 1870 In a subsequent report, the Committee, when supplied with information as to the Artillery, will be prepared to recapitulate their recommendations as to the mode of adjustment of the several claims.

We have agreed to the foregoing Report as showing the cost of Cavalry and Infantry recruits under certain prescribed conditions, which include the following charges:

For Cavalry Recruits.—The pay of two officers, seven non-commissioned officers, and 10 rank and file for each Cavalry regiment, as well as the levy money, free kit, pay, and all allowances of 43 men for ten months, in order to

provide 32 recruits for India.

For Infantry Recruits.—The pay of four officers, 12 non-commissioned officers, and six rank and file for two companies of Infantry, as well as the levy money, free kit, pay, and all allowances for 80 men for seven months, in

order to provide 60 recruits.

We consider that the mere enumeration of the strength in officers and men, with reference to the number of recruits to be provided, is sufficient to show that any scale of charge based thereon must be excessive, whereas among the advantages specified in the confidential "plan for carrying out certain reductions of expenditure upon the Army in India, and organizing a system for training recruits for battalions serving abroad, it is expressly stated that the plan affords a more economical mode than that now existing of training and supplying drafts."

How far the charge involved in the propositions before the Committee may be justified by other considerations than the best and cheapest mode of training recruits, it is not our province to consider. But we feel it to be our duty again to refer to the fact stated in the first report of the Committee, that the East India Company were able to send efficient Artillery and Infantry recruits to India at a cost of 26l. 7s. 5d. per man, instead of 136l. 13s. 11d.

for Cavalry and 631. 8s. 5d. for Infantry recruits, as now proposed.

We are fully aware that the changes made in the terms of enlistment, pay, clothing, &c., would have increased the charge as incurred by the East India Company, but the proposed establishments for, and the periods of, training. which have formed the basis of this third report of the Committee, appear to us to be enormously in excess of what can be possibly required for the purpose of properly recruiting the British Army in India.

The total Revenues and Receipts in India and England are estimated at 1,918,496% below the Regular Estimate for 1870-71, but that is after allowing 1,475,000%. for the reduction of Income Tax and 656,4001., the amount stated in Sir R. Temple's speech as the receipts which have been made over to the Local Government on account of Provincial Services. Independently of these reductions, the estimated Revenue of 1871-72 under other heads exceeds by about 212,904l.* that of 1870-71.

13. From the Land Revenue you anticipate an increase of 56,300*l*.,

which you appear to attribute mainly to the progress of the new settlements in the North-West Provinces and Oude, and you have estimated an improvement of 113,900l. in Forest, the receipts in 1870-71 having been unfavourable affected by the delay in the construction of Government Railways.

16. You also expect to receive 53,2000*l*. more from Stamps, 8,300*l*. from Mint, and 17,400*l*. from Telegraph.

17. The decreases in the Revenues do not call for observation.

18. The Expenditure in India and England is estimaby 'you at ted 49,005,4991., against49,933,8351. in the Regular Estimate for 1870-71, the apparent decrease 928,3361. being' But from that sum must be deducted 656,400l. alloted as receipts on account of Provincial Services, and the reduction then only 271,936k

19. So far as regards the several heads of charge of which portions have been transferred to Provincial

Services, it is hardly practicable to make any useful comparison.

20. The charge for printing for the Local Governments being now made a Provincial Service, I approve of your having abolished the head of Stationery and Printing, the cost of printing for the Government of India being transferred to Administration and Public Departments. But as at present informed, I do not concur in the propriety of your having added Stationery to Stamps. The charge under Stamps is the amount incurred in realising the Stamp Revenue, whereas the expenditure for Stationery is a charge of Administration.

21. The distinguishing features of your Budget Estimate for 1871-72 DURE OF ARCYLL. are, that you have thought it safe to estimate a sum of 8,038,5001. as the receipt from Opium; that you have reduced the Income Tax from six to two annas in the rupee, and raised the minimum of income for taxation to Rs. 750 per annum; and that you then anticipate a surplus, exclusive of Expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary, of 93,4011.

22. I do not doubt but that in regard to Opium the grounds on which you anticipated so large a receipt as 8,038,500l. appeared to you to be sufficient, but I am apprehensive that your estimate is larger that can safely be taken in framing a Budget Estimate.

23. In regard to the Income Tax, it is obvious that both in regard to the rate per cent. and the minimum of income liable to assessment, you have been influenced by a desire to retain it as a source of revenue capable of being made more available in times of difficulty, and at the same time to divest the tax as far as possible of any objectionable feature.

24. The surplus of 93,401l. is much lower than the amount which successive Secretaries of State have requested should be provided for in the Budget Estimate, and when the high estimate from Opium is taken into account, the prospect of the finances of the year cannot be regarded as altogether satisfactory.

25. I should have been glad to have received particulars of the sum of 3,236,500l. included in your Estimate on account of Public Works Extraordinary in India. So far as I can gather from the information obtainable from your letter in the Public Works Department, the Estimate must be,—

27. The Balance in England on the 1st April 1871 was 3,305,972l., and up to the present time I have borrowed only about 1,000,000*l*. on account of 1871-72. The state of the balances is therefore favourable for the adoption of such measures as may be deemed expedient during the ensuing year for reducing the interest of the 5 per cent. Loan of 1856-57, which may be paid off on or after the 16th January 1872.

28. With reference to the approach of the time for dealing with that Loan, I do not think it would be wise to refrain from raising the further sum of 1,500,000l. during the current year, if the money market should continue favourable, and I shall adopt that course unless any circumstances should occur to show that it would be inexpedient.

the Estimate under numerous heads, the principal being Customs, the increase in which was 52,789l.; Opium, 48,659l.; Marine, 61,0451,; Miscellaneous, 136,4291.; Army Miscellaneous, 89,6851. and Public Works Ordinary, 68,366l. The increase in Customs arose from a general improvement throughout India, the only exception being Bombay. The other increases indicate only that your Estimate had been cautiously framed. On the other hand, there were decreases under certain heads, the most marked being under Post Office, which is explained by you as chiefly due to an over estimate.

7. The Actual Charges in India and England, including Guaranteed Interest on Railway, &c., Capital, less net traffic receipts, were 3,139l. less than the Regular Estimate.

- 8. Under certain heads there were increases in India amounting to 319,285l., nearly counterbalanced, however, by decreases amounting to 292,050l. The increases or decreases are none of them important, except the decrease in the Army Charges, which were 133,4971. below the Regular Estimate, a reduction caused by a saving of Regimental Pay and Allowances, consequent on the Army being at a lower effective strength, the absorption of supernumerary Officers, reduced Commissariat Charges, and limited purchase of cattle.
- 9. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital was 24,602*l*. below the Regular Estimate, which arose from an improvement in the traffic earnings of the Railway Companies.
- 10. On comparing the Revenues and Expenditure of the year 1870-71 with those of 1869-70, a great improvement is apparent.

. 11. The Revenue and Receipts in India and England in 1870-71 amounted DUKE OF ARCYLL.

to 51,413,686l., being 29th August 1872. 512,605*l*. in excess of those of 1869-70. The Expenditure, including Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital less net traffic receipts, but exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, was 851,7161. less in 1870-71 than in 1869-70, the surplus in 1870-71 being consequently 1,482,990*l*., which exceeded by 1,364,321*l*. that of the previous year.

12. The principal increases of Revenue in 1870-71 were as follow,-120,810*l*. in Excise on Spirits and Drugs, the effect of a general increase of consumption; 961,8011. from Assessed Taxes, consequent on the raising of the rate of the Income Tax to $3\frac{1}{8}$ per cent.; 181,604*l*. in Customs, which had improved generally except at Bombay; 217,5731. from Salt, the Revenue in 1869-70 having been affected by the additional duty which checked sales. The difference in the receipt from Opium was only 92,361l., and was in favour of 1870-71. There was an improvement of 131,000l. in the receipt from Stamps, part of which arose from the transfer of fees for service of process from Law and Justice. An apparent increase of 93,5371. in Post Office receipts is partly nominal, and was caused by bringing official postage more fully to account.

13. The Revenue was less in 1870-71 than in 1869-70 under Land, to the amount of 465,196l., the accumulated proceeds

of Sales of Waste Lands (427,0731.) having been brought to account in 1869-70. The Mint receipts were lower by 123,8141., in consequence of a diminished demand for coinage, and Miscellaneous receipts were less by 362,153l., the balance of the Police Superannuation Fund (448,000l.) having been included in the receipts of 1869-70. Of the diminution of 116,738l. in Army receipts, no explanation is given in your letters, or of the falling off of 49,442l.

There were creases, however, under certain heads, the most considerable being 186,7161. for interest caused by the loans raised in 1869, and the 1,830,000l. 4 per cent. stock created for the purchase of the Elphinstone Land Company's estate. An apparent increase of 248,077*l*. in charges on Land Revenue was caused by the transfer to that head of the Allowances to District and Village Officers, which had previously been shown separately. A larger expenditure on Opium of 193,7421. resulted from increased cultivation and manufacture of the drug in Bengal and the North-West Provinces. The charges of 212,897l. and 200,000l., under the new heads of Minor Departments and Provincial Services, respectively, are counterbal.. anced by reductions under Education, Science and Art, Police, and Stationery and Printing, from which the expenditure has been transferred. An increase of 256,323l. under Miscellaneous is attributable to loss by exchange, caused by the unfavourable rates at which bills were drawn in London on India. The expenditure in England, exclusive of

Stores, exceeded the charge for 1869-70 by 313,0891., and included a payment Duke of Argula of an arrear due under the Postal arrangement, of charges for the Civil Engineering College and the India Lunatic Asylum, as well as a larger amount of interest on 4 per cent. stock. The charge for Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital was also larger in 1870-71 by 287,747l., caused by the increase of Capital, and a falling off in net traffic receipts.

- 16. On the other hand, the interest on Service Funds and other account was 96,776l. less, owing to the abolition of the Police Superannuation Fund, and to a smaller payment of interest on account of deficiency in the Government balances at the Presidency Banks.
- 17. The apparent reductions under Police, Education, Science and Art, and Stationery and Printing, have been already noticed in connexion with the new heads of Minor Departments and Provincial Services.
- 18. The Marine Charges were 458,442l. lower than in 1869-70, the charges of that year having been greatly increased by large irrecoverable advances being brought to account in respect of the Calcutta, Mutlah, and Bassein and Moulmein Port Funds:
- 19. The charge for Political Agencies and other Foreign Services was less by 93,4381., the charges of 1869-70 having included a payment of nearly that sum to the Ameer of Cabul.
 - 20. The payment for Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements was less by 106,6421., owing to lapses and commutations of pensions.
 - 21. The Army Charges were 279,447l. less than in 1869-70, consequent on reductions in the general staff in India and in the European Cavalry and Infantry, the absorption of supernumerary officers, the withdrawal of bounty money in certain cases, reductions in the Commissariat charges, and limited purchase of cattle.
 - 22. By far the greatest reduction was, however, in Public Works (Ordinary) Expenditure, which was 1,028,209*l*. below that of 1869-70, the reduction having been made to meet the financial exigency which became apparent in the autumn of 1869.
 - 23. It appears, therefore, that although the Revenue of 1869-70 was augmented to the amount of 875,073l. by £ extraordinary receipts from accumulated proceeds of Sales of Waste Lands, and by Proceeds of Sales of Waste Lands ... Balance of Police Superannuation Fund ... 427,073 448,000 the transfer to Revenue of the Balance £875,073 of the Police Superannuation Fund, there

was, nevertheless, an increase in the total receipts of 1870-71, as compared with the previous year, of 512,6054., being a general improvement of 1,387,6781., of which, 961,8011. was due to the increase in the Opium Revenue.

24. The Expenditure of 1870-71 was less than in the previous year by 851,7161., but that for 1869-70 included a large extraordinary charge of 408,9131. on account of irrecoverable advances to the Calcutta, Mutlah, and other Port Funds. The reduction in 1870-71 in the Public Works Charges, already referred to, was to some extent obtained by the postponement of useful works.

27. The more favourable view given in the Regular Estimate of Revenue is mainly attributable to increases 224,600l. in the Assessed Taxes, the arrears of previous years having been under-estimated in the Budget, and of no less than 1,214,900% in the Opium receipts, the failure of the last crop and the short supply having led to a great enhancement of prices. There were increases of comparatively small amount under other heads, but they do not require remark. In several branches of Revenue the Regular Estimate is below the Budget. The Land Revenue is less by 142,700*l*., from the injurious effect of floods in Bombay, reremissions on account of drought in the Southern Mahratta Country, and DURE OF ARGYLL. stoppage of sales of Government estates in Bengal. The Forest Revenue 29th August 1872. is less by 146,800l., owing to diminished supplies of timber for railways, a reduction counterbalanced to some extent by saving in expenditure. Salt is less by 193,8001., the Budget Estimate having apparently been too high.

below the Regular Estimate for 1871-72, but there are increases under numerous heads, amounting to 861,700l. Of these increases, 333,000l. is in the Land Revenue. 1871-72 a considerable al-Iowance had been made at Bombay on account of drought, and 77,000l. due in respect of 1871-72 is expected to be received in 1872-73. The remaining increase is mainly owing to the Settlements in Oude. Anincrease of 154,400l. appears in the Forest Receipts from an anticipated larger supply of timber for State Railways. Salt is expected to yield 106,800l. and Mint 69,400l. more than in 1871-72, You also estimate an increased receipt of 118,000l. for Interest, consequent on the augmented investment in Government Securities of the reserve of the Currency Department to nearly the amount of six millions. But these and some minor increases are much more than counterbalanced by estimated decreases amounting to 2,066,000%. of which the receipts from Excise, Assessed Taxes, and Opium only call for notice. The reduction in Excise of 125,700%. is explained by you as "being due to an arrangement made in order to avoid the DUKE OF ABGYLL. double credit of the cost price of Opium retailed for consumption in India." The Assessed Taxes are 254,600*l*. less, partly from large arrears of the tax for 1870-71 having been collected in 1871-72, and partly from the exemption from the tax in 1872-73 of incomes below Rs. 1,000 a year.

31. Your estimate of Opium Revenue is 1,553,400% below that for 1871-72. In making that estimate you were influenced by the consideration that the quantity of Opium for sale in 1872-73 was 5,520 chests less than that sold in 1871-72, and that you could not reckon on the continuance of so high a price as that which was obtained in that year.

32. The estimated Charges of 1872-73 exceed by 1,251,644l. the Regular

Estimate for 1871-72. The increase is very general, the only exceptions being a reduction of 161,300l. in the charge for Interest on Debt, owing to the transfer of the principal portion of the 5 per Cent. Loan of 1856-57 to the 4½ per Cent. Loan of 1872; small reductions under Stamps, Telegraph, and Marine, and 84,200l. in Miscellaneous Charges, arising from a transfer of certain expenditure to Post Office and Minor Departments; 50,300l. in Army Charges, caused by the transfer to Public Works of expenditure of the Barrack Department; 91,2001. in Public Works Ordinary, the cause of which is not explained; and 21,6351. under Guaranteed Railway Interest, an improvement being anticipated in the net traffic receipts.

33. The principal increases are, 110,000l. in Forest expenditure, which you estimate will be more than counterbalanced by increased receipts; 711,700% in Opium Charges, provision being made for the purchase of a full crop at an increased price; 118,2001. for Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances, the settlement of the question of the Pensions to Covenanted Civil Servants having caused additional retirements; 184,397*l*. in the Expenditure in England, which is

mainly attributable to increased payments on account of the Indian Troop Service, and to the payment in 1871-72, on account of Postal Communication with India having been unusually low, and 76,3821. for Stores for India.

DUKE OF ARGYLL. 29th August 1872 34. From this examination of your Budget Estimate for 1872-73, it appears that, although the Estimated Expenditure exceeds by more than one million and a quarter that of the previous year, nearly the whole of the increase occurs in Opium Charges, and the other expenditure connected with the collection of the revenue, and I see no reason to doubt that you have endeavoured to keep your Estimate at the lowest sum consistent with a due regard to the efficiency of the several branches of the administration.

35. Your Estimate of Revenue is about one million and a quarter below that of the Regular Estimate for the previous year. The difference is mainly in Opium, the Estimate for 1872-73 being 7,700,000*l*., which is 1,553,400*l*, below that for 1871-72. With reference to the uncertainty attending this

branch of income, it would be unsafe to estimate a larger receipt.

36. You have included in your Estimate of Income, 570,000l. under Assessed Taxes, which is 254,600l. below the estimate for 1871-72, the reduction being consequent on your determination to raise the minimum of income on which the tax is to be assessed to Rs. 1,000.

37. Taking the receipt from Assessed Taxes into account, the estimated income of 1872-73 will exceed the expenditure by only 237,000*l.*, which is a smaller surplus than that which should be provided for in a Budget Estimate. Under such circumstances you determined, with my sanction, on retaining the Income Tax for the current year.

38. The Cash Balance in India on the 1st April 1870 was 13,940,4511.

In the Notification published in the "Gazette of India" of the 4th May 1872, the Cash Balance in India on 31st March 1872 is stated to have been 22,162,3497.

In the Budget for 1871-72 the Balance on 1st April 1871 was estimated at 16,012,051l., and on 31st March 1872 at 15,121,2511., but it now appears that on

that date the estimated Balance was exceeded by fully seven millions.

39. This very large increase is mainly due to the following causes:

40. In your Regular Estimate there is entered among the receipts in India a sum of 1,486,800%. of Railway Capital which was not included in your Budget Estimate. In the absence of an explanation from you as to the nature of that receipt, I am unable to determine how far the further increase in

your Cash Balance may be attributable to that entry.

41. In my Financial Despatch dated the 1st August, No. 310, I informed you that, in consequence of the measures adopted for reducing the deposits of the Railway Companies, it is probable that the sum paid into the Home Treasury by them will be 1,500,000l. below the Estimate, and that it will be necessary for you to remit a larger amount than had been estimated during the remainder of the current year. But with that increase it is probable that the balance in the Home Treasury on the 31st March 1873 will only amount to about 1,500,000%, and even that is dependent on bills to the full amount of Rs. 1,30,00,000 per month being taken at an exchange of 1s. $10\frac{3}{4}d$. during the remainder of the current year, which may not be realized.

42. It is also important to bear in mind that in August 1873 Duke of Argyll. 4,995,000l. of Five per Cent. Debentures will become payable in England, and 29th August 1872. that in the following year the Capital Stock of the East Indian Company will have to be paid off, which will require, in addition to the application of the Guarantee Fund to that object, a further sum of about $4\frac{1}{2}$ millions.

43. The power of borrowing possessed by the Secretary of State in Council under the Act 32 & 33 Vict., cap. 106, expired at the end of the last Session of Parliament, and early next Session it will be necessary to obtain further powers to borrow, in order to be prepared for any occasion that may arise in this country requiring the provision of additional funds.

Para. 1.—I have considered in Council your Financial letters dated the DUKE OF ARGYLL. 31st January 1873, No. 58, which forwarded the Accounts of the Revenue and No. 336, dated 6th Expenditure for the year 1871-72, and the 4th April 1873, No. 160, which enclosed copy of your Resolution of the 28th March 1873, and of the Minute of Sir Richard Temple, of the 27th of that month.

- 2. I had previously received your Financial letter dated the 6th December 1872, No. 449A, with the Revised Estimate of Revenues and Charges for 1872-73, but that letter does not call for any observation, as the information which it contained was modified by the Regular Estimate.

12. The total decrease of Revenues and Receipts in India in 1871-72 amounted to 2,737,012l., or, excluding the sum of 650,0001. transferred to Provincial Services, to 2,087,0121., and arose mainly as follows.

· 13. A decrease in the Land Revenue of 102,486l. was consequent on the stoppage of the

sales of Government estates in Bengal, and the postponement of collections in Bombay on account of drought.

- 14. The Income Tax was less by 1,246,7841., the tax having been reduced from $3\frac{1}{8}$ th to 1 per cent. in 1871-72.
- 15. Salt yielded less by 139,685l., through lower collections in the Inland Customs Department, and at Bombay.
- 16. The Marine receipts of 1870-71 were augmented by Dockyard Services, &c., and there is consequently an apparent decrease in 1871-72 of 138,2201., which is, however, nearly balanced by reduced charges. In like manner, the Miscellaneous receipts of 1870-71 were augmented by the assets of the Ameens' Fund at Bombay (93,4971.), which had been long held in suspense, and by the transfer of arrears from the Military and Medical Funds, and the receipts of 1871-72 were, in consequence, 164,1281. below those of 1870-71. The decrease under other heads were of comparatively small amount.

17. The only considerable increase in 1871-72 was in the Opium receipts, Duke of Argyll.

which were 1,208,400*l*. above those of the former year. There was also an increase in the Mint receipts of 62,728l., consequent on the re-newal of bullion importation, and some other increases of small amount in India and England.

18. The Charges of 1871-72 were 2,944,658*l*. below those of 1870-71, and, after allowing for the reduction of \$50,000l., caused by the transfer of receipts under the head of Provincial Services, were less by 2,294,658l.

19. The principal reductions were as follow.

20. 158,130*l*. in the Excise on Spirits and Drugs, the cost of Opium for Home con-sumption being omitted from the Charges, a corresponding credit to Revenue being cancelled,—an arrangement which will be observed in future years.

21. The Opium Charges were less in 1871-72 by 418,731*l*., owing to about one-fourth of the crop having, been destroyed by

blight, thereby reducing the payment to cultivators.

22. The Charges for Law and Justice were greatly reduced by transfers to Provincial Services, to which cause also the disappearance of the Charges of Police, Education, and the Printing is attributable.

- 23. There was a reduction of 98,897*l* in the Marine Charges, owing to the intermission of work in the Bombay Dockyard, which has been already referred to in connexion with the Revenues and Receipts, of 348,679*l*. in the Medical Charges, which now show only the Salaries of Medical Officers in Civil Stations, the remainder having been transferred to Provincial Services, and of 277,357*l*. in Miscellaneous Charges, owing to an improvement in the rate of exchange on the Home Treasury.
- 24. The Army Charges were less in 1871-72 by 513,205l., in consequence of reductions in the cost of provisioning European Troops, and in the compensation to Native Troops for dearness of grain and forage, in the cost of feeding Army remounts and Commissariat cattle, purchase of rum, remounts, camp equipage, medical and other supplies, and in the Medical Branch, the Military Account Department, Commissariat Establishments, and in the charges for Sea and Land Transport.
- 25. The general Expenditure in England was less by 40,323l., and the charge for Stores for India by 176,110l., the payments for Telegraph, Stationery, and Public Works Stores having diminished.
- 26. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net traffic receipts, was 111,593l. below the charge for 1870-71, the traffic receipts having improved.
 - 27. Comparing the Charges for 1870-71 under heads which are now

- 28. The only considerable increases were 72,542l. under Interest caused by the payment of arrears of unclaimed interest on debt, 80,214l. under Salt, for expenditure incurred on works at the Sambhur Lake, and for replenishing the stock of salt at Madras, and 81,489l. under Administration, the principal part being a transfer to that head of the charge on account of the Printing Establishments of the Government of India from the head of Stationery and Printing, which head has been abolished. The new charge shown under the head of Provincial Services was more than counterbalanced by reductions under Law and Justice, Police, Education, Medical, Printing, and Public Works Ordinary.
- 29. On the whole, it appears that but for the reduction in the Income Tax, the total *Revenues and Receipts of 1871-72 would have been only 56,687*l*. less than in 1870-71, the reduction caused by the transfers to Provincial Services, and the diminution in the receipt under heads which were exceptionally high in 1870-71 having been more than counterbalanced by the increased receipt from Opium.
- 30. The great improvement which had the effect of leaving a surplus of Income over Expenditure in 1871-72 to the amount of no less than 3,124,177*l*. is, therefore, due to reductions of charge, and more especially in the Army Charges, in the Loss by Exchange or Remittances to Home Treasury, in the Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances, in the charge for Stores supplied to India, and in the Guaranteed Interest on Railway &c., Capital, less net Traffic Receipts.

There is also an increase in the Land Revenue of 329,0001, of which a bout 100,0001 is due to the payments of arrears of 1871-72 at Bombay, the remainder being attributable to the favourable season in Bengal and British Burmah.

34 Of an increase of 82,000*l*, in Excise, about one half is owing to receipts on account of outstanding balances, the remainder to the general prosperity in Bengal and Burmah.

^{35.} The improvement of 61,000l. in Customs is wholly due to an increase of a much larger amount in Burmah, there having been decreases elsewhere, resulting from the unsatisfactory state of the import trade.

- 36. Stamps yielded more by 78,000l., the improvement being in Bengal, 6th August 1873. North-West Provinces, and Madras.
 - 37. There were other increases of small amount.
 - 38. On the other hand, there were decreases as compared with the Receipts estimated in the Budget of 106,000l in Mint receipts from the importation of bullion having fallen off, 213,000l. under Post Office, arising entirely from official postage, balanced by corresponding decreases in the heads of charge. But as the expenditure under some of those heads is now merged in Provincial Services, a loss results to Imperial Finance. Apart from official postage, there is an improvement in the Postal revenue. ,
 - 39. A decrease of 101,700l. under Receipts in aid of Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances is explained by you as owing to its having been ascertained that 90,0001. more than was necessary had been credited in past years from the capital of the Military and Medical Funds. Of this item I should have been glad of a further explanation.
 - 40. The decrease of 52,000l. under Irrigation you attribute to the favourable season having made artificial irrigation less necessary.

- 42. There were however, some considerable increases for charge, including 57,000*l*. described as owing to. the adjustment of certain sums advanced in past years by the Madras Civil Service Annuity Fund, in excess of the sums paid in England.
- addi-43. An tion of 278,000l. to the Grant for Provincial Services for Public Offices for Bengal, Bombay, and Burmah.
- 44. An increase of 227,900l. under Public Works Ordinary arises from certain. expenditure which had been originally inincluded under Extraordinary having. been found not properly debitable to Loan Funds, and transferred to this head,

- 45. An additional loss of 240,000l., by Exchange on Remittances to the Duke of Argull. Home Treasury, arises from the remittance of a larger sum, and at a less 6th August 1873. favourable rate of exchange, than had been anticipated in the Budget Estimate.
- 46. There is also an increase of 80,610*l*. in the expenditure in England, but that is much more than accounted for by the decree of the Privy Council, passed after the first Estimate was prepared, in favor of the heirs of Mr. Dyce Sombre, and an increase of 316,249*l*. in Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital resulted from the effect of floods, which caused additional expense to the railways, from decrease in the receipts on account of goods traffic, and from the debit against Revenue of a larger amount of charge for stores than belongs to an ordinary year.
- 47. The decreases were very numerous, and amounted to 1,391,482l., the principal being 505,300l. in the charges of Opium, consequent on a deficiency of the crop; 147,400l. in Law and Justice, partly arising from savings in official postage; 83,400l. under Miscellaneous, a nominal decrease, owing to the redistribution of items hitherto included under that head; 74,800l. in Army Charges, resulting from the postponement of camps of exercise at Madras and Bombay, the retirement of Artillery Officers, the abolition of the Poona Depôt, the lower prices of grain and forage, and other savings, which were to a great extent counterbalanced by increased charges for the Looshai Expedition, for camps of exercise at Delhi, and charges for two Madras regiments returned from China and the Straits Settlements; and 180,582l. in the charge for Military and Marine Stores.
- 48. The other decreases, although numerous, and collectively of large amount, were not severally important, the several changes apparent in the Regular Estimate tending to show that your Budget Estimate for 1872-73 had been carefully prepared.

49. In your letter No. 160, you refer to certain alterations which had been previously agreed to by me in correspondence with your Government.

50. You now inform me that the charge for Medical Services, previously shown under a separate head, will not appear in the accounts subsequent to 1872-73, as you have transferred the remaining Medical Services to the Provincial Governments "with needful additions to the provincial allotments," and you propose that the receipts in England, which are of insignificant amount, should be treated in the Home accounts as a remittance for adjustment in India. I do not see any sufficient reason for treating those receipts differently from other receipts in England on account of Revenue, and they have therefore been included again under Miscellaneous Receipts as Revenue.

55. A reduction of 100,000l. in Excise is partly nominal, the cost of Opium purchased in Malwa, for Home consumption, being now excluded from both sides of the account, and you expect a falling off in the receipts in Madras.

56. By the expiration of the Income Tax a loss is estimated 565,0001.

57. The Opium receipts are less by 1,177,000*l*. than in 1872-73, owing to the failure of the crop of Bengal Opium in 1872, and unfavourable reports of the crop in 1873. You estimate that 42,750 chests will be sold at Rs. 1,200 a chest, the price in 1872-73 having been Rs. 1,386-2-4 per chest, duty on Malwa Opium being estimated on 37,050 chests, against 43,580 in the previous year.

^{58.} The estimated receipts in England are 73,5151. below those of the previous year, in which the Interest on Investment of Cash Balances had been exceptionally high.

^{59.} The estimated receipts in 1873-74 are more favourable under Forest (35,000l,), Customs (18,000l), Stamps (51,000l.)—owing to the intended levy of process fees by means of stamps,—Post Office (146,0001.), the Receipts from

61. The principal items of decrease are in Interest on Permanent Floating Debt, 79,700l., partly owing to the conversion in January 1872 of the 5 per cent. Loan of 1856-57 into a new loan at 41 per cent. until January 1879, and subsequently at 4 per cent.; Medical Services, 174,600l., the expenditure on this being account transferred to Provincial Services; Army, 180,0001., partly owing to the charge for 1872-73. included having arrears and special payments, and partly from the Stud expenditure having been reduced; Public Works Ordinary,126,400l., an additional expenditure for pressing works having been incurred in the year 1872-73; Expenditure in England, 144,2101. the Regular Estimate of Charges of 1872-73 having included the payment to the representatives of Mr. Dyce Sombre, and

Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, 326,2491., the charge in 1872-73 having been in your opinion exceptionally large.

- 62. The principal increases are Opium, 297,300%, the crop having failed in 1872-73, and smaller advances having been consequently made in that year; Post Office, 120,000%, the charges of the Bullock Train and Military Van Dak Department being included in 1873-74, as explained under Receipts; Law and Justice, 86,000%, partly arising from the cost of service of processes in Madras being included, the increase being, to some extent, balanced by increased receipts under Stamps; Political Agencies, 72,200%, provision having been made for special subsidies to the Ameer of Cabul, and for the Yarkand and Zanzibar Missions; loss by Exchange on Remittances to Home Treasury, 110,000%, consequent on the increase of the amount to be remitted; and Expenditure in England for Stores for India, 178,982% a larger expenditure being required for Military and Marine Stores.
- 63. After thus comparing your Budget Estimate for 1873-74 with your Regular Estimate for 1872-73, and considering the reasons assigned for the several changes apparent in the Budget, there appears to me to be reason to anticipate that, unless some unforeseen expenditure should be called for, or some remission of revenue be rendered necessary, the result of 1873-74 will be as favourable as you have estimated.
- 64. The surplus is, however, greatly below that which, as a general rule, it is deemed necessary to obtain. You had consequently to consider whether, in order to increase that surplus you should renew the Income Tax, and your determination was in the negative.
- 65. A difference of opinion on the question existed among the members of your Government, which is explained in the minutes on the subject forwarded to me with your separate revenue letters dated the 10th April and 12t May last, Nos. 11 and 12.
- 66. After full consideration of the whole subject in Council, I do not see that any conclusive objection has been shown to the policy of an Income Tax in India, a subordinate element in a general system of finance. On the contrary, it appears to me that it is better calculated than any other tax which has yet been proposed to reach the wealthy mercantile and trading classes, and to counterbalance the much heavier pressure of some other taxes on the less wealthy portion of the community. I am aware that opinions have been confidently expressed as to the unsuitability of the tax to the people of India, and it is certainly possible that direct taxes which were in reality much more objectionable, but which were common under native systems, would even now from long familiarity be less disliked. These, however, we have wisely abolished. In substituting an amended form of direct taxation, we must be liable to encounter some not unnatural opposition. But too much account need not be taken of a feeling which would probably subside.
- 67. It is certain, however, that special opposition had arisen to the tax in connexion with the raising of its amount in the middle of the year 1869-70, and its further increase in 1870-71, and this opposition was encouraged by the fact that in each of the years 1870-71 and 1871-72 the result of the finances was a surplus of so considerable an amount as to suggest that the tax was not called for in order to produce a sufficient excess of income over expenditure. In such circumstances, the policy of an Income Tax, assessed in a manner as little objectionable as possible, and steadily maintained at a low fixed rate (except under extraordinary emergencies), could not, perhaps, be considered under favourable conditions.
- 68. I do not propose, therefore, now to reopen the discussion which has thus been concluded, and which has been conducted on both sides with great ability and with weighty and important arguments. I am content to accept the decision to which you have come, under the particular circumstances in which it was arrived at.
- 69. I have, on former occasions, conveyed to your Government my views on several important, branches of Indian Revenue.' I refer especially to my separate Revenue despatches of the 21st January 1869 on the Salt duties, and of the 10th March 1870 and 16th February 1871 on the Export duties.

70. I am glad, therefore, to perceive that your Government is fully alive Duke of Abeville to the importance of those questions, and that your attention is at present directed to a consideration of the Salt duties, and that, notwithstanding the abolition of the Income Tax, your Excellency holds out the hope that an improvement of the Customs tariff and the abolition of the Transit duties on Sugar in the North-West Provinces may be effected. I am, indeed, of opinion that nothing short of urgent financial exigencies could justify their longer continuance.

- 71. I am, however, unable to entertain the hope that, without the aid of the Income Tax, you will be able, with a due regard to the maintenance of an adequate surplus, to accomplish the important reforms in the fiscal system of India, unless you should succeed in effecting large and decisive reductions in expenditure, and you may therefore rely on my cordial co-operation in your efforts to secure greater economy in every department of your administration, and to resist the growth of new and indefinite charges.
- 72. The course which you have pursued of refraining from re-imposing the Income Tax, notwithstanding your surplus will probably be, in consequence, little more than nominal, has the great advantage of clearly indicating the decided purpose of your Government to bring about, if possible, a sound financial condition by retrenchment and economy, rather than by an increase of taxation, a determination which will, doubtless, be borne in mind if, contrary to the desire and hope of the Government, it should hereafter become necessary, through unforeseen calamity, or any other cause, to re-impose the Income Tax.
- 73. It is gratifying to me that your estimate of Army expenditure in India for 1873-74 is reduced to 11,844,900l., being 1,144,666l. below the charge of 1868-69, the year in which I called the attention of your Government to the necessity of effecting a reduction of about a million and a half in the cost of the Army. But when the increased expenditure in England, viz., 85,4791. for Military stores and 393,606l. for other charges, are taken into account, the reduction in the total Army expenditure in India and England is only 665,581.
- 74. It is not practicable at present to form any satisfactory estimate as to the Military charges in England in future years. The payments on account of effective and non-effective charges of British troops serving in India are altogether uncertain, and up to the present time I have been unable to obtain from the Secretary of State for War any definite information on the subject.
- 75. The Public Works expenditure demands, and will, I am satisfied, receive your careful consideration, in order that such works as are called for may be executed on a more economical system than has hitherto been observed.
- 76. In other Departments it would be unsafe to calculate on any great saving. The redemption of the dividend of the East India Company will afford relief to the amount of about 450,000% a year, and some further reduction may be anticipated in the interest on John Britannia. tion may be anticipated in the interest on debt. But against these must be set the increase which will certainly result from the revised Furlough rules for uncovenanted servants, and from the growth of Furlough and Retired allowances to Civil Engineers, Telegraphers, and Foresters, to whom these rules are applicable; and it must also be remembered that, as the capital of the several Military and Medical Funds becomes exhausted, the pensions will for many years form a heavier charge than at present on the revenues.
- 77. The financial results of 1870-71 and 1871-72 having been a large surplus of income over expenditure, and the outlay on Public Works Extraordinary having been greatly below the Estimate on which the arrangements for providing ways and means were based, your Cash balance on the 31st March 1872 amounted to 21,997,715*l*., and after providing for all expenditure of the year 1873-74, including that for Public Works Extraordinary, you estimate that on the 31st March 1784 it will amount to 14,800,000*l*.
- 78. If the actual expenditure on works of Irrigation and State Railways in 1872-73 and in the current year should correspond with your Estimate, the

which exceeds by nearly three-quarters of a million the total amount of the loans raised in this country on account of India since the last year 1860, viz., 12,853,700l.

- 79. The debt in India has been somewhat increased during the same period, but after taking into account the securities issued for the purchase of the Elphinstone property (1,859,2281.), sums exceeding the remainder of the money obtained in India on loan have been advanced by your Government to Municipalities.
- 80. In my Financial despatch dated the 23rd January last, No. 12, I informed you that, in order to meet the disbursements in this country during the year 1873-74, it was necessary that a sum of 13½ millions should be remitted by your Government, and that you must, therefore, be prepared to meet bills to the amount of Rs. 1,20,00,000 a month.
- 81. You were subsequently informed by my telegrams of the 7th February and 21st March, that the monthly drawings for the present would be increased to Rs. 1,40,00,000.
- 82. During the month of April and May bills were accordingly drawn at that rate, at exchanges varying from 1s. $10\frac{3}{8}d$., to 1s. $10\frac{7}{8}d$. On the 4th June the amount for which tenders were accepted was only Rs. 56,20,000, viz., 16 lacs at 1s $10\frac{3}{8}d$., and 40,20,000 at 1s. $0\frac{1}{4}d$. On the 18th June tenders were accepted for 70 lacs, of which 5 lacs were at 1s. $10\frac{3}{8}d$., and the remainder at 1s. $10\frac{1}{4}d$., but on the 2nd July the tenders accepted amounted to Rs. 36,90, 000, viz., Rs. 50,000 at 1s. $10\frac{3}{8}d$., and Rs. 36,40,000 at 1s. $10\frac{1}{4}d$, and on the 16th July to Rs. 6,11,000 at $s.10\frac{1}{4}d$.
- 83. Some uncertainty necessarily exists as to the future demand for bills, but I shall continue to draw at the rate of 140 lacs a month if tenders should be made for that amount at or above the rate of 1s. 10d.
- 84. An Act of Parliament has been passed authorizing the Secretary of State in Council to raise money in England for the service of India, and under it any sum not exceeding six millions sterling may be borrowed for the purpose of redeeming the dividend on the Capital Stock of the East India Company. It is not probable that the sum required for that purpose will amount to five millions, but, except for that special object, the power to borrow is restricted by the Act to temporary loans, not exceeding on the whole two millions.
- 85. During the passing of that Act through Parliament, a decided feeling was manifested adverse to empowering the Secretary of State in Council to increase the Home Indian Debt, even for Public Works Extraordinary, and, under these circumstances, whatever further loans may be found necessary must be obtained in India.

Para. 1. I have considered in Council your Financial letters dated the 19th December 1873, No. 558, and the 17th and 24th April and 8th May 1874, Nos. 141, 155, and 175, forwarding Abstracts of the Accounts of the Revenues No. 387, dated 23rd July 1874 and Charges and Receipts and Disbursements of the Government of India in the year 1872-73; of the Regular Estimate for 1873-74; and your Budget Estimate for 1874-75, with a Minute by Lord Napier of Magdala relating thereto.

2. Your Financial letter No. 535 of 1873, forwarded a Revised Estimate of the Revenues and Receipts and Charges in India for 1873-74, but as your subsequent letter No. 155 of 1874, transmitted the Regular Estimates for the same year, the-first mentioned letter does not call for any observation.

except "Public Works, Irrigation." The actual Irrigareceipts under that head were 16,4651. below the estimate. a portion of which was nominal, and the remainder was due to the receipts in the North-West **Provinces** Punjab being less than was expected.

7. The Land revenue exceeded the estimate by 119,669l., and was. greatly in excess of the receipts of any previous year. You remark that a large portion of the Madras Land revenue is dependent on the season. but that you are unable to give any more precise ex-planation as to the cause of the increase. The increases under other heads were of not large amount, or otherwise important.

8. The actual expenditure in India and England exceeded the estimate by 30,9401. There were increases under numerous heads, the principal being 42,8541. in Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements, of which '35,000l. was owing to too low a sum having been estimated for the Bombay Presidency; 20,9091. under Administration, consequent on the cost of the tour of.

9. The expenditure was less than the estimate by 45,573l. in Army Charges, mainly owing to reduced purchases of Commissariat Stores; by 34,264l. in Public. Works Ordinary, of which 16,7781. was con-sequent on land not being taken for Railways at Madras as estimated; and by 37,336L in Interest on Debt, certain sums having remained unclaimed.

10. It appears, therefore, on a comparison of the account with the Regular Estimate, that the differences were only such as must be looked for

when no special circumstances occur to disturb the arrangements contemplated in the Estimate.

11. The year 1871-72 had closed with a surplus of 3,124,1771., exclud-Accounts of 1872-73 compared with ing expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary, and of 1,495,703l, including that expenditure.

The financial result of 1872-73 was therefore less favourable than that of 1871-72 by 1,358,505l.

above those of the previous year, but the Expenditure exceeded that of 1871-72 by no less than 1,467,779l.

Although the total Revenues and Receipts of 1872-73 were but little above those of 1871-72. there were increases which amounted 1,509,439l., and decreases amounting to 1,400,165l. The Land Revenue exceeded by 828,3321. that of 1871-72, in which year the receipts were affected by floods, and remissions on account of drought in the Southern MahrattaCountry; whereasin 1872-73 the receipts included arrears of Revenue not collected in the previous year, and were augmented by the

favourable season in Bengal, Burmah, and Madras, at which Presidency the amount collected was 200,000l. in excess of any previous year. The Customs receipts also showed an increase of 77,900l., which occurred wholly in Burmah. The Salt Revenue was 199,035l. in excess of that of 1871-72. An improvement of 132,179l, also occurred in the Stamp Revenue, and 111,647l. more Interest was obtained in consequence of the augmented investments of the Currency Department.

14. These and some minor increases were nearly counterbalanced by decreases under other heads, the principal being 245,102l. in the receipt from Assessed Taxes, large arrears having been collected in 1871-72, whereas in 1872-73 income below Rs. 1,000 a year were exempted. The Opium receipts were 569,168l. lower than in the previous year; the Mint receipts were also 41,878l. less. There was an apparent falling off of 240,582l. in the Post Office receipts, which was, however, wholly due to reduction of Official Postage, and was balanced by corresponding decreases in several heads of Charge. An apparent reduction of 91,299l. in the receipts in aid of Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances was caused by an adjustment of an over credit of nearly equal amount in previous years.

15. The Charges of 1872-73 under certain heads exceeded those of the previous year by no less than 2,188,837l, but were less under other heads to the amount of 721,058l.

16. The principal increases were 218,282*l* in Expenditure on Opium, the deficiency of the crop in 1871-72 having led to a saving of expenditure in that year, while in the next year there was an advance of 10 per cent. on the

price paid to the cultivators. An apparent increase of 82,791% under Minor

Departments was nominal, and arose from transfers from "Miscellaneous," which was correspondingly reduced. The charge of Political Agencies was increased 77,2921. by payments to the Khan of Khelat and Shere Ali, the cost of the Seistan Arbitration, the expense of Durbars held by the Viceroy, and by the transfer to head from Provincial Services of the charge of the Bat-Mhairwarra talion. \mathbf{An} in₄ crease of 92,2021. in Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances arose from an unusually large number of annuities having • been taken in consequence of the recent settlement of the Pension question.

17. An increase of 369,1451 in Loss by Exchange on Transactions with London was owing to the unfavourable exchange prevailing in 1872-73. There was also an increase of 374,9857 in the Provincial Services,

consisting chiefly of grants for Public Offices for Bengal, Bombay, and Burmah. An increase of 117,641l in Public Works Ordinary was caused by the prosecution of several pressing works, and the transfer to this head of certain charges originally, but improperly, intended to be defrayed from Loan Funds.

18. The expenditure in England in 1872-73 exceeded that of 1871-72 by 261,011*l*., of which, 163,318*l*. was the amount of the award of the Privy Council to the representatives of the late D. O. Dyce Sombre, the remainder consisting of additional expenditure for the Civil Engineering College, payment of certain arrears for Maps and Charts, a grant of 20,000*l*. to the younger children of the late Earl of Mayo, and a larger payment for interest on Debt.

19. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, was larger by 387,283l. in 1872-73, owing to an exceptionally large debit

MARQUIS OF SALISBURY. 23rd July 1874. against Revenue for Stores, and to decreased goods traffic receipts, and expenses caused by the effects of floods.

- 20. There were increases of less amount under several other heads, but they do not call for notice.
- 21. Of the items of expenditure in which there was an apparent decrease, the largest was 258,514l. in Miscellaneous, which was, however, nominal, and arose from the re-distribution of items hitherto included under that head. There was also an apparent decrease in Army Charges, but that was also nominal, as it resulted from the transfer of certain Barrack Charges to the Public Works Department. A reduction of 197,908l in the charge for interest was to some extent due to the discharge, in January 1872, of the 5 per cent. Loan of 1856-57. There was also a diminution of 102,924l in the payment for Military and Marine Stores.
- 22. On the whole, the financial result of 1872-73 is not unsatisfactory. The Revenues and Receipts exceeded those of 1871-72, notwithstanding that an arrear of Income Tax was collected in that year, and that the receipt from Opium in 1872-78 was upwards of half a million below that of the previous year. The charges, it is true, were nearly a million and a half in excess of 1871-72, but the principal increases were, as already shewn, for the most part exceptional in their character.

28. The sum of 3,907,000*l*., is included in the Regular Estimate as Famine Expenditure.

On the other hand, the Regular Estimate of Expenditure is lower than the Budget under some heads to the amount of nearly a million, the most important items of decrease being 119,000*l*. in Opium Charges, owing to a probable shortness of the crop; 140,197*l*. expenditure in England, caused by the advances to the Imperial Government on account of Effective and Non-Effective Charge being less than was at first thought probable; 166,426*l*. in the Charge for Stores, owing to a diminished supply, and to the postponement of payment for some Army Stores till the year 1874-75. The Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, is 222,469*l*. below the Budget

Estimate, and is attributable to estimated increased earnings and decreased working expenses on the East Indian, and Sind, Punjab and Delhi Lines.

34. The Budget Estimate of Land Revenue exceeds by 364,500l. the Regular Estimate of 1873-74, 122,000l. of which you anticipate from the revision of the Settlements in the North-West Provinces, Punjab, and Bombay.

There are estimated increases under certain heads amounting to 1,007,723L, the principal being the following,119,000%. in the Opium Charges, consequent on the favourable prospects of the Opium crop of this year; 80,000l. in Political Agencies, which is, to a great ex-tent, caused by a transfer from Allowances and Assignments; 118,700l. in Public Works Ordinary, an additional grant of 100,000l. having been made for construction of agricultural works, and 25,0004 for repairs; 100,500%. under Interest, is the effect of contemplated loan operations;89,947l. in the Expenditure in England, is attributable to the Civil Service Annuitiespayable in England (223,000*l*.) being

and no longer as a remittance to India, in consequence of the passing of the Act for the transfer of the assets and liabilities of the Fund to Government.

The payment of those annuities will also absorb a large saving under the head of Interest; 244,5761. is consequent on increased expenditure for Mint Stores (copper for coinage), Stationery, Army Stores, and for river steamers for 23rd July 1874. Famine Relief.

- 38. The Estimated Expenditure for 1874-75 is less than the Regular Estimate of 1873-74 under certain heads to the amount of 2,167,1311, including a reduction of 1,385,0001. already referred to on account of Famine Relief.
- 39. The principal decreases, exclusive of Famine Relief, are 63,200% in Allowances and Assignments, which is more than counterbalanced by increases under Political Agencies; 43,000% under Administration is partly attributable to the Government of India remaining in Calcutta; 239,700l. in Loss by Exchange on transactions with London, arises from the remittances to this country having been reduced by the amount of the loan of five millions obtained in England, and a more favourable rate thereby rendered probable; 178,100%. for Interest on Service Funds and other accounts is owing to the transfer of the Civil Service Annuity Funds to Government, the annuities being now included as direct charges; and 173,5311. under Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts, arises from its being estimated that their receipts will increase and the working expenses decrease.
- 40. Of the introduction into the Estimates and Accounts of a head of Gain by Exchange on transactions with London, to include adjustments in regard to Railway Contracts, I approve, as well as of your proposition to state the expenditure on account of Famine Relief net, in order to avoid the disturbance of Revenue statistics by including as revenue recoveries from sale of grain.
- 41. The several modifications made by you in the Original Estimate of Receipts and Disbursements of the Home Treasury were rendered necessary by more recent information, and you have been informed by my Financial despatch dated the 25th June last, No. 341, that an Act has been passed, authorising the transfer of the assets of the Civil Service Annuity Funds to the Government.

42. The view of the Revenue and Expenditure shown in the Accounts and Estimates now before me is, on the whole, not unsatisfactory. The total

- 44. I have already expressed to you in the Revenue Department my approval of the measures which you adopted for mitigating the distress consequent on the drought, and which have been attended with such marked success, although the large outlay thereon has seriously affected the finances of 1873-74 and 1874-75.
- 45. Referring to the periodical failures of rain in some parts of India which must be anticipated, you are of opinion that it is necessary that, in addition to a fair surplus of income over ordinary expenditure, such further sum should be obtained as will constitute a reasonable provision for meeting expenditure on account of drought. You also advert to the important consideration as to the extent to which the disastrous effects arising from the want of rain may be obviated by the extension of irrigation works and railways, or other modes of communication, in reference to which a general review is now being made, under your instructions, of the position of the whole of India, on the receipt of which you will consider how far it may be desirable to accelerate the construction of reproductive works, and in what manner the necessary funds for those works shall be provided.
- 46. I quite agree with you that the periodical occurrence of famine should enter into your calculations when making provision for the wants of each successive financial year. This consideration may properly act as a motive for inducing you to provide such a surplus in each year as will make a sensible impression on the debt that has been incurred in a year of famine. But upon this subject, before you make any definitive arrangements, I should be glad to receive a more detailed statement of your Excellency's opinion.
- 47. I am fully sensible of the great importance of adopting effective measures for mitigating the effects of these calamitous visitations by works of irrigation and improved communication. It becomes, however, daily more apparent that great caution must be exercised in determining on the works to be undertaken, that much greater care than has hitherto been shewn should be used in framing the estimates, and that more efficient supervision should be given during the construction of the works.

48. Moreover, it appears to me to be necessary to re-consider the arrange-

- 49. The only ground on which that distinction can be justified is, that the works included under that head will prove to be remunerative, by yielding, in the shape of annual income, a sum equal to the interest on the money expended in their construction, including interest for the period subsequent to the commencement of each work during which no income is obtained.
- 50. It is, however, apparent that many of the State Railways will not yield such an income, and I am apprehensive that many of the Irrigation Works will be found to be also unremunerative in the same sense, and as the assumed ground, therefore, on which some of those works have been excluded from the Charges against Revenue does not really exist, the cost of them should be removed from the class of Public Works Extraordinary.
- 51. It is only by a strict observance of such a rule that the receipts from Irrigation Works and State Railways can be expected to increase proportionately with the charge for the Interest on the Debt incurred for their construction, and any neglect in this respect would have the effect, by exhibiting in the Accounts an erroneous view of the general finances, of increasing the Debt of India without an equivalent augmentation of income.

52. I do not, however, intend that, in regard to such works as shall be suggested, with a view to the prevention of famine, and which, may not come within the class of directly remunerative works, you are necessarily to refrain from proposing them, if you should be unable to meet the expenditure from ordinary income; for, in such a case, the works might properly be constructed from horrowed money, the expenditure being included among ordinary charges under a separate head.

- 53. The consideration of the mode in which the money which will henceforth be required for the construction of works properly designated Extraordinary, is to be raised, is not less important.
- 54. The advantages, political and economical, of raising in India whatever loans may be required by the Government are obvious, and for some time past the rate of interest on which loans could be obtained there has been nearly as low as on loans raised in England.
- 55. The sum which it is necessary to remit annually from India to England to meet the Home Expenditure is a very important element in the consideration of this subject. The total disbursements in this country are now about 15,000,000% per annum, of which Interest on Debt and Guaranteed Interest amount to no less than $6\frac{1}{2}$ millions. You are aware of the uncertainty, inconvenience and loss with which that sum is annually remitted, and it will henceforward be increased by the cessation of deposits on account of the Guaranteed Railway Companies.
- 56. Every addition to the Home Debt of India necessarily augments the amount to be remitted, and it would therefore obviously be inexpedient to increase that amount if it can be avoided. Extraordinary circumstances, such as the present Famine expenditure, may at times render it necessary to borrow in this country, but the necessity of reserving that power for such emergencies shows that it should not be resorted to on ordinary occasions.
- 57. I request, therefore, that you will, when considering the question; what public works should be undertaken, and how the funds required for them. should be obtained, regard it as indispensable that only works which will repay the interest on the money expended on them are to be excluded, from Charges against Income, that the utmost care be observed in the undertaking and prosecution of such works, and that the necessary funds for Public Works Extraordinary be obtained in India.
- 58. In my Financial despatch dated 22nd January last, No. 59, I informed you that, in order to meet the expenditure in this country during 1874-75, and to provide for the retention of a Cash Balance of about 2,000,000%. at the end of that year, it would be necessary that 15,000,000*l*. should be obtained by means of Bills on India. The sum of 5,000,000*l*. has since been raised here as requested by you, and the amount to be remitted is consequently reduced to 10,000,000*l*. Of that sum, 1,518,613*l*. has been already received for Bills on India, and about 8,500,000l. remains to be obtained.
- 59. In accordance with the telegrams to and from your Lordship of the 19th and 20th June 1874, copies of which are annexed, Tenders will be invited for Bills to the amount of Rs. 80,00,000 in July, and subsequently to the amount of one erore a month for the remainder of the official year, with the exception of three months, during which, if the average rate of exchange should not be more favourable than 1s. 10d. the rupee, it will probably be necessary that the drawings should be increased to Rs. 1,10,00,000 à month.
- 60. If any important change should occur in the rate of exchange tendered for Bills on India, it may be necessary to modify this arrangement, but of any such modification you will be apprised by telegram.

 - 2. The information contained in the Revised Estimate for 1874-75, forwarded with your Financial letter dated the 18th December 1874, No. 522, has been modified in your Regular Estimate for that year, and does not call for any remark.
 - In para. 3 of your Financial letter No. 107, you state that in incorporating in your Estimate the transactions of the Home Treasury, you have increased the estimate for Telegraph Stores in 1875-76 to 89,000l. and have reduced the provision for Public Works Extraordinary (Stores) to 699,8001. On these alterations I have no observation to offer.
 - 4. You also inform me that you have shown under Refunds (and Drawbacks) the amount of fines returned to contractors in England in 1873-74 and 1874-75,—that you have transferred to the head of Superannuation Allowances the Marine Pensions in those years and in 1875-76, and have transferred from Miscellaneous to Medical in the Estimates for 1874-75 and 1875-76 the sum provided for the Royal India Lunatic Asylum at Ealing.
 - 5. Of those alterations I do not approve.
 - 6. The fines imposed on Contractors are credited in the Home Accounts as Miscellaneous Receipts, and any remission of a portion of those fines should be debited to Miscellaneous Charges.
 - 7. The Marine Pensions and Retired Allowances should, I consider, be shown as Marine Charges, in like manner as Military Pensions are included under Army Charges, and you will observe that the alterations made in India in the Accounts and Estimates of Home Expenditure last year were not adopted.
 - 8. I also consider that the charge on account of the Lunatic Asylum at Ealing should continue to be shown under the head of Miscellaneous, as it is not similar to the "Consolidated Salaries of Medical Officers and Allowances of Regimental Medical Officers in charge of Civil Stations" in India, of which the charge for "Medical Services" is composed.
 - 9. Any such changes in the Accounts as those proposed would interfere very much with the comparisons of the expenditure of different years, and the charges in question will therefore be shown as they have heretofore been.

eral heads. An apparent decrease of 14,4971. under Land Revenue was due to the transfer to the head of Allowances and Assignments above referred to. Under Forest the expenditure was 20,1601. below the Estimate, the expenditure in the Punjab having been over estimated. The expenditure on Public Works Ordinary was 47,534l. below the Estimate, of which 13,500l. was in Military Works, and 22,5621. was in cost of land for railways.

17. The expenditure for famine relief proved to be 55,5771. below the estimate.

18. The charge for Guaranteed Interest on Railway, &c., Capital was 130, 791. below the Estimate, and was mainly attributable to the famine traffic receipts having exceeded the estimate by 80,0001., the remainder arising from an improvement which was general over all the lines.

19. The expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary was 38,0231. below the estimate, and a portion of that sum is explained by you as a transfer to the ordinary head of State Railways of a debit for the hitherto unvalued stock of the Calcutta and South-Eastern Railway.

20. The financial result of the year 1872-73 was a surplus of 1,765,6721., exclusive of expenditure on Public Works Extra-Comparison of the actual accounts of 1873-74 and 1872-73. ordinary, which amounted to 2,184,5691. The year 1873-74, as already shown, closed with a deficit of 1,807,668l., exclusive of 3,553,307l. expended on Public Works Extraordinary.

was larger in 1873-74 by 52,794l., from an increased quantity of sleepers and fuel having been supplied to the Guaranteed and State Railways.

The revenue from Stamps in 1873-74 was 91,4241, in excess of that of the previous year, which was to some extent owing to increased receipts in Bengal, and to the levy of process fees in Madras by means of stamps, the receipts from Law and Justice being consequently reduced.

25. The Mint receipts were larger than those of 1872-73 by 12,2831, the effect of an increased importation of silver bullion, which commenced in

December 1873 and continued to the close of the year.

The increase of 107,886l under Post Office was consequent on the receipts from the Bullock Train and Military Vân Dâk Departments being for the first time included under this head,

The Marine receipts of 1873-74 were larger by 27,380L, having been augmented by the sale of steamers of the Punjab Flotilla, by receipts in Bengal, and at the Bombay Dockyard for work done for the Royal Navy, and by adjustments of charge against other departments.

The increase of 110,7751. in 1873-74 of receipts in aid of Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances was due to larger credits

from the Military and Medical Funds.

29. The Gain by Exchange was 93,7321. above that of the previous year, consequent on increased railway receipts and the adjustment of credits belonging to former years.

30. The Miscellaneous receipts were larger in 1873-74 by 46,934l., owing to the lapse of certain unclaimed deposits and Savings Bank balances, and to

unexpected adjustments.

31. The increase of 104,229l. in Army receipts was due partly to credits for tents and other stores supplied for famine relief operations already noticed,

and partly to some adjustments at Madras.

32. The receipts from Irrigation were larger by 63,040l. consequent on the expansion of irrigation from the canals of Northern India, and general improvement in other provinces. On the other hand, the Land Revenue of 1873-74 was 310,757*l*. below the amount received in 1872-73, which was attributable to several causes. The receipts were exceptionally large in 1872-73, and included arrears to the amount of 150,000l. on account of 1871-72. The failure of rain in Upper India in 1873-74 caused a postponement of the payment of revenue to the amount of about 72,000l. in Bengal, and 30,000l. in the North-Western Provinces. It was found necessary to reduce temporarily the assessment

in Oude, and in Madras there was a decrease in the Southern Districts. There were, however, increases in Bombay, the Central Provinces, and Burmah.

33. The Excise Revenue of 1873-74 was 37,151l. below that of the previous year, but it was partly nominal, the cost price of opium purchased in Malwa for home consumption in Bombay having been excluded from both sides of the account.

34. The abolition of the Income Tax accounts for the falling off in the

assessed taxes.

35. The receipt from Customs were 25,395% below those of 1872-73, as the large shipments of rice from Burmah to Bengal, instead of to other countries, in 1873-74, led to a considerable loss of export duty. There was a decrease in Bengal resulting from the scarcity, but it was more than covered by increased receipts in Madras and Bombay.

36. The receipts from Salt were below those of 1872-73 by 14,968l., the stock in Calcutta being low, and there was a diversion of capital and carriage in North-Western India from the salt to the grain trade, in consequence of the famine.

37. The Opium receipts were less in 1873-74 by 359,812l., owing to a.

smaller number of chests having been sold.

38. A decrease of 32,540% under Law and Justice was consequent on the transfer to the head of Stamps of certain receipts at Madras, which were brought to account in 1872-73 under this head, as already noticed.

39. The decrease of 55,327l. under Interest was due to the operation of the new Port Trust Act in Bombay, under which payment of Interest on the

capital of the Trust was postponed till 1st April 1874.

44. There was an increase of 106,810l in the Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements, owing to the transfer to this head from Land Revenue in Bombay of certain charges, and to the adjustment in 1873-74 of payments made since the year 1868 to the family of Maharajah Dhuleep Singh.

- 45. Under Law and Justice there was an increase of 43,961*l*., the payments to process-servers in Madras having been first brought on the books in 1873-74.
- 46. The Loss by Exchange on Transactions with London exceeded that of 1872-73 by 221,421*l*., owing to the unfavorable rate of exchange prevailing in 1873-74.

47. The Civil Furlough and Absentee Allowances were larger in 1873-74 by 102,405*l*., the Allowances to Military Officers in Civil employ having in that year been transferred to this head from "Army."

48: An increase of 50,820*l*. under-State Railways was due to the transfer from the head of Public Works Extraordinary of a debit for "the hitherto unvalued stock of the Calcutta and South-Eastern Railway" referred to in paragraph 19 of this despatch.

49. The expenditure on account of Famine Relief amounted to 3,852,4231.

- 51. There were decreases of 47,882l under Refunds and Drawbacks; of 360,988l in Excise on Spirits and Drugs, partly due to the exclusion from both sides of the account of the cost price of opium consumed at Bombay; of 35,476l under Minor Departments, the charge in 1872-73 having included payments for the Census and for several Exhibitions, as well as arrears due to the India Office Geographer; of 53,284l under Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances, the charge for the year 1872-73, having included the grant of 20,000l to the younger children of the late Earl of Mayo; of 166,029l in Miscellaneous Charges, the sum of 163,318l paid in England to the representatives of the late D. O. Dyce Sombre having been included in 1872-73; 153,218l under Provincial Services, the charge in 1872-73 having included a large grant for Public Offices, &c. for Bengal, Bombay and Burmah, and a large charge consequent on the adjustment of the cost of Medical and Ordnance Stores supplied to the Medical and Public Departments in the Punjab.
- 52. The Army Charges were less in 1873-74 by 316,081*l*, the charge for 1872-73 having included arrears for pay to two regiments of Madras Native Infantry returned from China and the Straits Settlements, arrear charges of the Order of British India, and extraordinary charges for the Looshai Expedition. In 1873-74 the charges in England for Furlough Allowances of Military Officers employed in the Civil and Public Works Departments were transferred to Civil Furlough and Absentee Allowances, as already referred to, and to Public Works Ordinary, and a smaller sum was paid to the Imperial Government for Effective charges of Troops serving in India.

 53. Under Public Works Ordinary there was a decrease of 149,278*l*.,
- 53. Under Public Works Ordinary there was a decrease of 149,278l., notwithstanding an increased charge of 68,034l in England for additions to the Royal Indian Engineering College, and for Furlough Allowances of Military Officers in the Public Works Department, previously included among Army Charges.

54. Interest on Debt was less by 52,849*l.*, consequent on the conversion in India in 1872 of the 5 per cent. Loan of 1856-57 into 4½ and 4 per cent. Debt, and the reduction in England from 5 to 4 per cent. of interest on Debentures.

55. The most important decrease was, however, that of 673,149*l*. in Guaranteed Interest on Railway Capital, less net Traffic Receipts. The charge in 1872-73 had been exceptionally large, owing to a debit against Revenue of a larger sum than usual for Stores, to a decrease in the receipts from Goods Traffic, and to repairs rendered necessary by the effects of floods. In 1873-74, the gross Traffic Receipts exceeded those of 1872-73 by 751,761*l*., of which, 400,000*l*. were received by the East Indian Railway for Famine Traffic, and the receipts on the Eastern Bengal, Great Indian Peninsula, Sind, Punjab and Delhi, and Oudh and Rohilcund Railways were also increased to a great extent from the same cause.

57. It appears, therefore, from this comparison that the apparent falling off in the Revenue in 1873-74 of 621,236l., as compared with 1872-73, was mainly due to the cessation of the Income Tax, and that but for that cause, and reductions in the Land Revenue receipts, which were, however, exceptional, and in the receipt from Opium, the Revenue of 1873-74 would have con-

siderably exceeded the Revenue of 1872-73.

58. It is also apparent that the excess in the Ordinary charges in 1873-74, over those of the previous year, was caused by the expenditure incurred on account of famine relief, and that independent of that contingency, the charges

would have been less by about 900,000l.

was a falling off in Bengal from the prevalence of scarcity and high prices; 109,000*l*. in Salt, notwithstanding the abolition of the Preventive line from the Taptee to the Muhanuddee and the small line between Madras and Bengal.

It appears from the statement of Sir W. Muir, that the net loss caused by that measure will probably not exceed 40,000*l*., and that the loss has been more than made good by progress in the general Salt Revenue of Bengal, the North-West Provinces, and the Punjab; 71,000*l*. under Stamps (after allowing 12,000*l*. for a reduction under Law and Justice) is mainly due to Bengal, but is more or less general; 81,554*l*. in Marine receipts, consequent on the sale, by the Secretary of State, of stock received some years since from the Scind Railway in payment for steamers, barges and stores forming the old Indus Flotilla; 75,512*l*. under Interest, mainly in England, which includes 10,690*l*., the amount of unclaimed dividends received from the late East India Company, the remainder being interest obtained from the investment of portions of the Cash Balance; 48,000*l*. in Gain by Exchange is, for the most part, attributable to the scarcity in Bengal having caused an excess in traffic receipts on the Guaranteed Railways; and 45,337*l*: under Army is explained by Sir W. Muir as being due "partly to a change in the mode of accounting for Commissariat supplies, and also to unexpected receipts for stores supplied for the famine districts, &c."

64. On the other hand, the Regular Estimate of Land Revenue is 320,700%. below the Budget, of which the larger portion is attributable to the temporary suspension of payments in Bengal and the North-Western Provinces in consequence of the famine, the remainder being due to the unusual floods

which devastated parts of Madras and Bombay.

65. The receipts from Customs are estimated at 96,000% below the Budget, and the reduction is attributed to the rice exports from Burmah being in the present season very late.

66. The other decreases are comparatively unimportant.
67. The total Ordinary Expenditure shown in the Regular Estimate

Muir's Minute, of "an extra grant of 27,000l., (of which 17,000l. will be permanent) for public improvements in the new 'administration of Assam, a like grant of 25,000l. for Burmali, and (a less hopeful item) 24,000l. in adjustment of expenses incurred during the last three years "for the destruction of snakes in the Madras Presidency;" 177,000l. under State Railways, due to expenditure on the Tirhoot State Railway in excess of the amount charged to famine relief; and the expenditure in England for stores transmitted to India is increased by 193,321l., there being an increase in Army stores to the amount of 146,688l.

69. The Regular Estimate of Expenditure is lower than the Budget under numerous heads, the principal being—75,9361 in charges of Political Agencies owing to non-payment of certain subsidies; 60,6671 in Civil Furlough Allowances paid in England, as the numbers of those who avail themselves of the new Furlough Rules are now declining; 83,1851 in Army Charges, which is almost wholly in England, and is in consequence of smaller payments for Effective Charges, Furlough Allowances, and India Troop Transport Service, which more than counterbalanced the increase of 147,0401 for capitalized value of annuities granted to Military Officers under the new retirement scheme; 38,8631 in Public Works Ordinary, owing to diminished operations, and "deduction of cost of land for Guaranteed Railways paid for in former years." 60,9531 in Interest on Permanent and Floating Debt, attributable to a full year's interest not having been demanded;" 146,0211 in Famine Relief; and 261,6451 in Guaranteed Interest on Railway, &c., Capital, consequent on the increased traffic receipts due to the carriage of grain to famine districts.

70. The Regular Estimate of expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary is 530,947*l*. below the Budget Estimate, the explanation of which, given by Sir W. Muir, is that 185,000*l*. is due to the "removal from this head to the ordinary account of the expenditure upon the Tirhoot State Railway, and 50,000*l*. to a like transfer of estimated outlay on the irrigation canals from the River Gunduck."

71. In a recapitulation of the cost of the famine in Bengal, Sir W. Muir states that the gross expenditure was \$,824,500*l*., that the recoveries will amount to 2,624,000*l*., and that it was thought better to enter in the estimates of Revenue and Expenditure only the net charge, and not to encumber the estimates of 1875-76 with recoveries which would have largely raised the apparent surplus of that year. ways, and for larger purchases of Stores; 69,4251., under Administration, partly caused by expenditure in India consequent on the transfer of Government during the summer to Simla, and on the appointment of a new member of the Governor General's Council, and partly in England by certain additions to the India Store Department. Your Budget Estimate shows a decrease under this head, but that is consequent on the charge for Stores (the estimate for which in 1874-75 greatly exceeds the estimate for 1875-76) being included therein, whereas the charge for Stores is shown under a separate head in this despatch. Of 57,415*l*. in Law and Justice, above 20,000*l*. is for improved judicial machinery which has just been introduced in the Punjab, 20,000l. is for reorganizing the process-serving establishment in the Bombay Presidency, and provision is also made for the constitution of a new district in Burmah; 521,000*l*. in Loss by Exchange is consequent on the necessity for remitting to England the sum of 14,300,000*l*., which it is estimated will be effected at an average exchange of 1s. $9\frac{7}{8}d$. the rupee; 338,286l. in Army charges, of which 60,100l. is in India and 278,185l. in England, mainly for Retired Pay, and for payments to the Imperial Government for Effective Services. It is observed in Sir W. Muir's Minute that provision is made for the continuance of the Colonels' Retirement Scheme to the same extent as in 1873-74, also that 20,000l. is for increased pay to Majors of Royal Artillery and Engineers, and that within two or three years, " a large permanent addition has been made in military expenditure to improve the condition, equipment and organization of the Army. Among such improvements

may be named the revised scale of pay for British troops, new establishment for Garrison instruction and Musketry inspection, additional hutting money for Indian troops, and increase of Subalterns in British and Indian regiments; 150,863l. in Public Works Ordinary, including supervision and cost of land for Guaranteed Railways, is mainly owing to an extraordinary grant of 100,000l. for Military works to admit of the more vigorous construction of barracks throughout the country, and to provision being made for special repairs in the Kidderpore Dockyard; 141,953l. in the charge for Interest on Permanent and Floating Debt is owing to the recent increase to the debt; 450,645l, in Guaranteed Interest, although the additional interest paid on the capital will be only 31,000l., but as the traffic receipts of 1874-75 were greatly increased by the famine, the Budget Estimate for 1875-76 under this head compares unfavorably with the Estimate for the former year.

84. The Budget Estimate of expenditure under some heads is lower than the Regular Estimate of 1874-75. The Miscellaneous charges are 81,3831 less, owing to the non-recurrence of the special expenditure in that year for Government shares in the Bank of Bombay. Provincial Services are less by

64,900l., the estimated special grants being lower.

85. The charge on account of State Railways is less by 101,000l., as in the Regular Estimate for 1874-75, 185,000l. is included on account of the Tirhoot

State Railway.

86 The expenditure in England for Stores for India is estimated at 275,021*l*. below that of 1874-75, when large payments were required for Stores and Freight for Famine Relief, Stationery, Public Works Stores, Snider Arms, Gun Carriages, Ammunition, &c.

87. The Budget Estimate of Expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary is 4,300,000l., being 261,897l. in excess of the Regular Estimate for 1874-75, and you inform me that the instructions in relation to such works contained in my Financial despatch dated 23rd July last, No. 387, have been followed.

88. On a review of the Finances of the year 1873-74, and of the Regular Estimate for 1874-75, and the Budget for 1875-76, the particulars of which are shown in the statement annexed to this despatch, the following facts are apparent.

89. That the Income, including receipts from Irrigation and State Rail-

although there is a reduction in the charge for Interest on Permanent and Floating Debt of 40,8201., consequent on the redemption of the Dividend of the East India Company, the relief from which has now to a great extent been neutralized by the subsequent increase to the debt.

91. I am aware that the Army receipts of 1873-74 had been augmented by credits on account of supplies for famine relief, and that the charge in the year for Guaranteed Interest, less net Traffic Receipts, was reduced by the exceptional traffic on the railways consequent on famine relief operations; also that the estimated receipts from Opium for 1875-76 are 274,879% below the actual receipts in 1873-74, while the charge on that account is increased; but, after allowing due weight to these considerations, I cannot regard the financial position with satisfaction.

92. An estimated increase in the expenditure in two years of upwards of a million and three quarters cannot be disregarded. That increase occurs mainly under the following heads:-

93. In regard to the Opium charges, it would, with reference to the receipts from that head of revenue, be unsafe to anticipate a smaller expenditure.

94. The charge for Superannuation, Retired, and Compassionate Allowances was increased in 1874-75 by the Civil Service Annuities being treated. in that year for the first time as a direct charge, the addition being to some extent counterbalanced by a smaller charge of account of Interest, but the expenditure under this head will probably increase for some years to come.

95. The loss by Exchange may possibly be less than the amount included in the Budget, but at present there are no sufficient data on which to form a more favorable estimate, especially in view of the policy which it appears to be the present disposition of several European countries to pursue

of adopting a single standard of gold.

96. In the Army expenditure, the large additional permanent charge recently incurred to improve the condition of the troops has been already re-The future payments to the Imperial Government for effective services will in a great measure depend on the report of Mr. Bouverie's Committee, but there is no reason to hope for any relief to the revenues of India as the result of the deliberations of that Committee.

97. Of the probability which exists of a future increase in the Public Works expenditure, an illustration is afforded by the Minute of the Commander-in-Chief, dated the 11th March 1875, forwarded with your letter

No. 107.

98. I observe that the surplus to which you look forward is of a

The smallness of the margin between your revenue and expenditure might not be a serious evil, if there were any branch of expenditure in respect to which material reductions could, in case of need, be counted on, or if your surplus were not almost entirely due to the increased productiveness which you attribute this year to Opium. It must not be forgotten that, although the yield of this source of revenue has been recently steady, it has been in times past liable to great fluctuation.

100. The absence of any considerable surplus presents an obstacle to the accomplishment of reforms which are urgently required in more than one department of your fiscal system. I refer especially to the Salt duties, and to the import duties upon cotton goods and manufactures. These measures can hardly be undertaken without a temporary sacrifice of revenue, and therefore cannot prudently be adopted without a larger surplus.

101. The first of these reforms, towards which your Excellency has already taken considerable steps, is of importance, as concerning a tax upon an article of the first necessity which is neither so productive nor so equitable in its incidence as it may become under a sounder system. The continued existence of an internal Customs line, with which the present form of this tax is intimately connected, furnishes a cogent reason for dealing with it at the earliest opportunity.

102. I have, in my separate Revenue despatch of this day's date, No. 6, called your Excellency's attention to the importance which I attach to the gradual withdrawal of the duties now levied upon cotton goods, before the lapse of time shall have created greater obstacles than those which already exist, to a change which is desirable both with a view of placing the industry on a solid foundation, and also of removing a growing cause of conflict between the manufacturing interests of England and of India, which may before long become a political difficulty. I regret that you have been compelled to postpone a revision of the tariff directed to this end.

103. In reviewing your loan transactions since 1869-70, your Excellency

states that during that period net only have three quarters of a million been appropriated out of ordinary revenue to reproductive works, but that the whole cost of the famine in Bengal, amounting to 6,000,090*l*., has been defrayed from surpluses on ordinary account. Indeed, during that period, excluding expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary, but including that on account of the Famine, the surpluses in the years 1869-70 to 1872-73, and as estimated for 1873-74 and as estimated for 1873-74 and as estimated for 1874-75, by no less than

4,695,3511.

104. The Cash Balances in the Indian Treasuries on the 31st March 1875 are estimated at 15,700,042*l*., and in the Home Treasury at, 2,793,293*l*., together 18,493,335*l*.

105. During 1875-76, you estimate that you will expend on reproductive works 4,300,000*l*., and that 633,700*l*. will be withdrawn on account of Railway Capital, making together 4,933,700*l*. Assuming that the estimated surplus of 506,000*l*. will be realized, and that the receipts will exceed the disbursements on the general Cash Account by 316,000*l*., a sum of 4,111,700*l*. is wanting to

defray the estimated expenditure of the year.

106. If this expenditure were to be met from your Cash Balance, it would, you state, be reduced at the end of the year to 12,107,612l., or, including the balance in England, to about 14½ millions. You consider that amount too small, and that "it will be necessary so to arrange that the balances (India and England) shall not fall below 17 millions." As the Maharajahs Scindia and Holkar are under engagements to contribute 160,000l., you propose to raise by loan in India 2,500,000l., and you then estimate that the Cash Balance in India and England will, on the 31st March 1876, amount to 17,006,598l. A balance of about 2,000,000l. at the commencement of the official year is sufficient for the Home Treasury, and 15,000,000l. is therefore the amount which you require for India.

107. The grounds on which you consider it necessary to hold so large a sum are not stated. In a Resolution of your Government, forwarded to me with your Financial letter dated the 24th April 1874, No. 142, it was observed that, apart from those directly under the Government of India, the balances need not on the 30th November exceed the sum of 8,000,000*l.*, and that, as the balances on the 30th November 1873 amounted to 14,516,625*l.*, they should be reduced by the sum of 3,810,000*l.*, viz., to 10,706,625*l* After the month of November the balances generally increase, and in the Budget Estimates for the years from 1866-67 to 1869-70, the following balances were considered sufficient:—

Marquis of 15th July 1875. year, half a million was required to strengthen in some measure the balances which, owing to recurring deficits, had for some time past been inconveniently low, but that additional sum was included in the estimated balance of 11,627,310%.

108. It appears from the above figures that a balance of about 11 millions was during several years adequate for the service of the State. Since the first of those years no great alteration has taken place in the conditions under which payments in various parts of the country have to be made. The increased facility of communication, which is the only material change, has tended to lessen, not increase, the necessity for heavy balances. I should have doubted the expediency of keeping them up, even if the money had been in your Treasury, but the policy of raising a special loan in order to maintain them appears to me to serve no useful purpose, but only to impose a needless burden on the Indian finances.

109. I observe in the Resolution before referred to, the following

"For some time past the balances in the Government Treasuries throughout the country have been so large, that it has been unnecessary to take any particular measures for their economical distribution. But the balances are now being rapidly reduced, and the resources of the State must be concentrated,

so that they may be available for early use when required."

110. The Resolution then proceeds to show in detail that it is not necessary that the balances of all the transactions taken together should in the month of November exceed the sum of 8,000,000L, and it requires that a surplus of nearly 4,000,000l. should be forthwith collected from them for the public service, in addition to a sum of 2,500,000l. which was at the time under the control of the Government of India.

If this economical distribution has since been effected, there would appear to be still less reason for the unusually high estimate which you have now made of your future requirements in this respect.

112, In my Financial despatch dated the 28th January last, No. 23, I informed you that, in order to meet the expenditure of 1875-76, and to retain a Cash Balance of 2,000,000l. at the end of the year, it would be necessary, if the rate of exchange obtained for bills on India be only 1s. 10d. the rupee, to draw throughout the year bills to the amount of Rs. 1,30,00,000

Acting upon the information received from you in reply to my telegram of the 2nd January last, bills were drawn up to the end of May to the amount of Rs. 1,40,00,000 a month, at rates varying from 1s. 9½d. to 1s. $10\frac{1}{16}d$. The drawings in June amounted to Rs. 1,30,00,000 at rates varying from 1s. $9\frac{1}{8}d$, to 1s. $9\frac{1}{16}d$. (exclusive of Rs. 2,00,000, for which bills were granted to the Agents for Crown Colonies), and tenders will be invited for Rs. 1,20,00,000 during July. For the remaining months of the year 1875-76 it will be necessary to draw at the rate of Rs. 1,40,00,000 a month.
