## Founded by the late Mr. G. K. Gokhale, C. I. E., at Poona on 12th Jane 1905

Tor some time past, the conviction has EnO been forcing itself on many earnest and thoughtful minds that a stage has been reached in the work of nation-building in India, when, for further progress, the devoted labours of a specially trained ageney, applying itself to the task in a true missionary mpirit, are required. The work that has been acomplished so far has inleed been of the lighest value. The growiti during the last fifty years of a feoling of common nationality, based upon common traditions and tice, common lopes and aspirations, aust even common disabilitits. has been most. striking, The fact that we are Indians first and Himdus, Mabomedans, Parees or Christians ufterwards, is being realised in a steadily increas ing measure, and the iden of a united and renovated Indin, murching onwards to a place among the mations of the world, worthy of her great past, is notonger a mereidle dream of a few ima-

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ginative minds, but is the definitely accepted creed of those who form the brain of the com-munity-the ellucated classts of the comery. A creditable begimning has already been made in matters of education and of lowal self governmeat ; and all classes of the people are slowly but steadily coming under the inflnenee of likeral ideas. The claims of pubic lifeare +veryday receiving wider recugnition, and attachment to the land of onr bisth is growing into a strung and deeply cherished passion of the heart. The annual meetings of Congresses and Conferences, the work of public bodies and associations, the writings in the columns of the Imdan Press-mill bear witness to the new life that is coursing in the veins of the people. The result achiresed so far are undonbtedly most gratifying, but they only mean that the jungle has been clawed and the foundations laid. The great work of rearing the superstrncture has yet to be tuken in land and the situation demands on the part of workers devotion and sacrifices proportionate to the n."gnitnde of the task.

The Servants of India Society has been extablished to meet in sone mensure these require. ments of the situation. It nembers frankly accept the British connection as ordained, in the inscrotabie dispensation of Providence, for Indiu's good. Self-fovernment within the

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Empire for their comtry and a higler life generally for their countrymen is their goal. This gual, they recognise, cannot be attained without yeurs of earnest and patient cffort and sacrifices worthy of the cause. Much of the work must be directed toward building up in the country a higher type of character and capacity than is generally available at present and the advance can only be slow. Moreover, the path is leset with great difliculties; there will be constant temptations to turn back; bitter disappointments will repeatedly try the fuith of those who have put their hand to the work. But the weary toil can have but one end, if only the workers grow not faint-bearted on the way. One essential condition of success in this work is that a sufficient number of our countrymen must now come forward to devote themselves to the cuuse in the spirit in which religious work is undertaken. "Public life must be spiritualized. Love of country must so fill the heart that all else shall appear as of little monent by its side. A fervent patriotism which rejoices at every opportunity of sacrifice for the motherland, a dauntless heart which refuses to be turned back from its object by difficulty or danger, a decp faith in the purpose of Providence which nothing can shake-equipped with these, the worker must start on his mission and revereatly seek the
joy, which, comes. of spending oneself in the service of one's country.

The Seryants of Imin Socicty will train mea prepared to devote their lives to the cinte of the country ina religions spirit, and, will neek io promote, by all constitutional meane, the matiomal intercstis of the Indian people. Its members will direct their elforts principally towards (1) creat. ing among the people, by cxample and by precept, a deep and prasionate love of the mother: land, seeking its lughest fulhmont in service and sacrifice ; (2) organizing the work of puliti. cal education and agitation, bnsing it on a carcful atudy of pulitic questions, and strearthoning generally the public life of the country; (3) promoting relations of cortial good-will and cooperation among the different communition; (4) assisting educational movements, erpecialy those for the education of women, the edneation of backward clasess and industrinl and scientilic oducation'; (5) helping forward the industrial development of the country ; and (6) the elevation of the depressed classes. The head-quarters of the Society will be at Poona, where it will maintain a Home for its members, and, nttached to it, a Library for the study of subjects hearing on its work. The following constitution has beer adopted for the Society :-

## BYE-LAWS. <br> ~~~~~~

The following Bye-Laws have been made under rule 30 :-
(1) The Society shall, as circumstances permit, establish Branches for work in different parts of the country. At the head of each Branch there sball be a Senior Member whose appointment and removal shall vest in the First Member or President and Council: 'The affairs of each Branch shall be managed by a Board consisting of the Senior Member and the Ordinary Members belonging to it.
(2) (a) Every Member under training will be granted an allowacce of Rs. 30 a month for the first two years of his training and Rs. 35 for the next three.
(b) Every Ordinary Member will be grant. ed an allowance of Rs. 55 a month for the first five years, Rs. 60 for the next five years and Rs. 65 afterwards.
(c) All Members, whether under training or Ordinary, will be granted a personal allowance of Rs. 10 per month in addition to the allowances mentioned above.
(d) The Senior Member of a Branch will bo granted a special allownace of Re. 10 e month.
(e) A rent allowance, not exceeding Re. 15 a month in Bombay and Rs. 10 elnewhere, or the actual reat paid if less, will be grantod to Ordinary Mumbers, in case there are no quarters evail. able on the premises of the Socioty.
( $f$ ) The allowance of Junior Permanent Assistants will be Rs. 15 to 20 and that of Senior Permanent Assistants Rs. 20 to Re. 30 per month.
(3) (a) A Member under training is entitled to two monthe' leave overy year, which can be granted by the First Member or Preaident, and, if the applicant in attached to a Branch, the Secior Member of that Branch.
(b) Ordinary Mombera are entitued to a month's leave every year, which ean be granted by the Firat Member or Prosident, and, if the applicant is attached to a Branch, the Senior Member of that Branch.
(c) Ordinary Members of the Centrul Provinces and Berar are entitled to one month and ten days' priviloge leave if they go on leave on the lat of May

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(d) All members are entitis to twenty days' casual leave in a year.
(e) Both casual and privilege leave mens. tioned above will only be sanctioned if the work of the Society permits.
(4) (a) The life of every member will, on admission, be assured by the Society, in favour of the First Member or the President for the time being, for a sum of Rs. 3,000 payable at death. If no Insurance Company accepts the life of any member for assurance, the First Member or President and Council may make such other arrangement as they deem fit to secure, in the case of such member, the object of this Bye-Law.
(b) On the death of a member, whose life has been assured, the First Member or the President shall pay the amount recovered on the life-poliey of the deceased to such member or members of his family as the deceased member may, hy will or otherwise in writing, have directed. In the absence of such direction, the First Member or the President and Council shall have the power to determine whether the amount recovered may

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be paid to any member or members of the deceased's family, and if so, to whom.
(5) The First member or President und Council may grant, in special circumatunces, n ppecial allowance to a member, suited to the reyuirements of his conte.
(0) If a member secedes from the finciety he and his family shall forfeit all claim to the lepefit/scenred to him or them under these Bye-laws.

## ADDITIONAL BYE-LAWS.

( For the Information of Members only.)
(1) The Senior Members of Branches must stay on the Society s premises with Mombers under training who should, as far as possible, be given a room each. If accommodation is available in the Society's quarters, after the wants of the Senior Member and the Members under training are satisfied, it may be given to Ordinary Members according to their needs at the discretion of the Senior Members. But if no accommodation is available they should be given rent-allowance according to the scale fixed. Members under training living with families will make their own arrangements for residence.
(2) If members travel on Society's businees they will be given their out-of-pocket expenses. Senior Members alone may travel second class, others inter class.
(3) Members and Permanent Assistants living in India must be present at the Anniversary celebrations unless unavoidably detained. They must arrive at the Central Home by the midnight of the 10th of June. If they have to stay away they must obtain the previous permission of the First Member or Preaident.
(4) The Senior Member of a Branch cannot go out of his Province witiout the previons sanction of the First Member or President except when he goes to attend the Anniverstry or a session of the Congress, in which cuse he will report the mutter beforeland to Head quarters, Other members can leave their Proviace with the permirsion of the Senior Member for periuds shorter thas 8 days. The permiswion of the First Member or President is necens:ry if the period exceeds 8 days.
(5) No Member or Permment Assistant shall go to a Native State for Society's work without the previous anction of the First Member or President.
(G) Permanent Assistapts will Le qromoted from the Junior to the Senior class by the lirst Member or President and Conncil, on the recommendation of the Senior Member of the Branch to which they are attached, But promotions in the sane grade may begiven by the Senior Member, and the mater should be rep rted to Head-quarters.
(7) The Senior Member of a Branch and the Ordiaary Members attached to it will elect a Secretary from among themeclvea to carry on correspondence witb the Contral Home ant to
keep accounts. He will send a weekly letter, a monthly programme of work and a financial statement is the first week of every month. He will also report to the Secretary of the Central Home whenever any leave is granted to a member of the Bravch, If no Secretary is appointed, the Senior Member will be responsible for the work of the Secretary.
(8) Every Brauch shall prepare its annual budget und subnit a copy of it to the Council for sanction not later than the 1st of June every year. The financial year ahall hegin from the 1st of July.
(9) The First Member or President will appoint one of the nembers of the Society, as Secretary, whose duty it will be to look after the managernent of the Central Home. He shall go round to all the Branches every year to audit their accounts.
(16) In addition to the tbree members who form the Council as provided for in rule No.'t of the Constitution, such other Senior Members of Branches as are not on the Council will be ex-officio members thereof. Three members form a quorum.

Poma, 1st August 1915.

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1. The Society shall be called "The Servants of India Society."
2. The objects of the Socicty are to train national missionaries for the service of Iudia and to promote, by all constitutional moans, the que interests of the tadian people.
3. The Socicty will consist of (a) a First Member or President, ( $b$ ) Ordinary Members, and (c) Members under training.
4. The First Member or President will be the Head of the Society.
5. Every member, on admission, shall undergo of special training for a period of five years. Daring this period, he will be known as a Memrber under training.' When a member has cout'pleted his tive years' discipline, he will be styled un 'Ordinary Member' of the Society.
6. Subject to rulos 12 and 13 , every member of the Society shall be a member for life.
7. The affairs of the Society will be manaty ed, in accordance with bye-laws framed for the purpose, by the First Member or President, assisted by a Council of three Ordinary Members, whe shall be elected by the Ordinary Members of the Sacietty. Every year one member of the Council, whose name shall be dirawn by lot, shall retire ; but he will be eligible for re-election.

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8. No persun will be minitted as a nember of the Sucioty; unless his alhuidion is recom. memled by the Comncil and the recommombation accepted by the First Meaber or President.
9. Every nember at the time of admimion shall take the fullowing seven vows :-
(i) That the country will always tee the firsh in lis thoughte and he will give to for sorvice the lost that is in him.
(ii) That in serving the country he will seek no personal advautage for himself,
(iii) That he will regrard all Inliams as brothers and will work for the milvancement of all, without distinction of caste or creed.
(iv) That he will he content with such provision for himself and his family, if he has any, as the Society may bu able to make. Ne will devote no part of his energies to earning money for himself.
(v) That he will lead a pure persohal life.
(si) That he will engage in no persuad quarrel with any one.
(vii) That he will always kecp in view the aims of the Society and watch over its interests with the utmost zeal, doing all he can to advance its work. He will never do anything which is inconsistent with the objects of the Suciety.

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10. Every member under training shall, during the time that he is under truining, place himself under the entire guidance and control of the First Member or President and shall do such work and devote himself to such studies as the First Member or President may direct.
11. An Ordinary Member may be sent by the First Member or President and Council to any part of [ndia on speciul duty or for general work in connection with the Society. He will be bound to do the work assigned to him under the general direction of the First Member or President and Council; and will obey all orders and instrnctions that may be received from them.
12. The Society may release a member from his vows and permit him to resign his memberslip on the ground of continued ill-health or for other sufficient canse on a recommendution to that effect being made by the Conncil, with the concurrence of not less than three-fourths of the members of the Society, and the recommendition being accepted by the First Member or President.
13. The Society may remove the name of any member from its roll of members on a recommendation to that effect being made by the Comeil, with the concursence of not less than three-fourthe of the members on the Suciety, and
the recommeniation being uccepted by the First Momber or President.
14. The First Member will hold ofice fur life.

It will be the duty of the First Member to recommend in writing to the Commil the names of three Orlinary Members, unt of whon the members of the Socicty shall elect a succusor to himas First Member on a vacadcy weenrring. If no such recommendation has leen received by the Comocil when the vacancy occurs, the members of the Society tmy elect any Ordinary Member, or, in the absence of a suitable Ordinary Member, any member to sueceed as First Member.

In case, however, it appars mokeirable th clect any member as First Monher, the mombers may dectione of their number to be President of the Socicty for a priod of hree years.
15. When at vachucy occurs in the First Nembership or Presidentship of the Socioty, the Council for the time being shall excreise all the powers vested by the rules in the First Member or President singly or the First Member or President and Conncil until such time as a new First Member or President is duly elected; and any act done by the Conncil, during such time shall ie deemed valid, provided that the Conneil takes stepin wion all redsunalide despatel to arrange for

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the election of a new First Member or President under rule 14.
10. In special circumstances, the First Member or President and Council may exempt, for reasons to be recorded in writing, any member uf the Society from the operation of any rule, suve rule No. 9.
17. An applicant for membership may be required to pass through a period of probation before admission as a member and may, in that case, be enrolled as a Probationer on such terms and for such period as the First Member or President and Council may determine.
18. The First Member or President and Council may remove the name of any Probationer from the list of Probationers before the expiry of the poriod of probation. The Society will not be bound to disclose the reasons for such removel.
19. The First Member or President and Courscil may admit any person, whoin their opinion is capable of being trained to assist efficiently members of the Society in their work and who is prepared to devote his life to such work, as a Permanent Assistant of the Society, on such terms as the First Member or President and Council may determine. Permanent Assistants will be divided into two classes-Senior and Junior-

according to their educationaland other qualifica. tipns.
20. A Permanent Assistant may, on grounds of special fitness and after a period of approved service of not less than three years, be admitted as a member of the Society.
21. The First Member or President and Council may remove the name of any Permaneat Absistant from the list of Permanent Assistants of the Society. . The Society will not be bound to disclose the reasons for such removal.
22. The First Member or President and Council may adnit any person, who is in full sfinpathy with the objects of the Society and is prepared to devote his life to such work as may be aseigned to him for the benefit of the Society, as an Attache of the Society on such termas and under such control as the First Member or President and Council may determine.
23. The First Member or President and Council may remove the name of any Attache from the list of Attaches of the Society. The Society will not be bound to disclose the reasone for sueh removal.
-24. The First Member or President and Council may earol any person, who is in full sympathy with its objects and who is prepared to de-

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vote a portion of his time and resources to the furtherance of its work, as an Associate of the Society.
25. Probationers, Permanent Assistants, Attachés and Associates will have no voice in the management of the affairs of the Society and no interest in the Society's property or funds.
26. All property of the Society shall belong to the Society in its corporate character, and no member, in his individual capacity, nor the heirs, executors or assignees of any member shall have any right to any portion of it.
27. The property of the Society shall be held by three Trustees, one of whom shall be the First Member or President for the time being and the other two, such Members as may be elected by the Members of the Society for the purpose.
28. All contracts, entered into for and on behalf of the Society, shall be in the name of the First Member or President. In all suits brought by or against the Society, the Society shall be represented by the First Member or President.
29. The Society shall not be dissolved by the death, secession or removal of any member.
30. The First member or President may, with
the concurrence of a majority of the Ordinary Members of the Society, make, alter or rescind, any bye-law or bye-laws for (1) the managemont of the affairs of the Society and the conduct of its business; (2) the chatorly, diepresal and control of the funds of the Society; (3) the provision to be made for members of the Society and their families and the grant of special allowances to them in special circumstances; (4) the grant of leave to members of the Society; (5) the grant of allowances to Permanent Assistans and Attaches of the Society; and (6) the carrying out in other ways of the objects of the Society.
31. The First Member or President and Council shall have the power to take whatever steps may be deemed necessary in the interest of the Society, provided that they are not inionsistent with the objects of the Society or with the provisions or spirit of any of the rules or bye-laws at the time in force.
32. No alteration shall be made in this coustitution, unless it is recommended by the Council with the concurrence of not less than threefourths of the members of the Society, and the recommendation accepted by the First Member or President.

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
