#### - EDITORIAL

#### Our Governor

We extend a hearty welcome to Sir Gordon Lethem on his return to British Guiana on Monday last after an official visit to London in the interests of the people of this Crown Calony.

Sir Gordon Lethem arrived in the culony on 7th November, 1941, a little over three years ago. There can be no doubt that he has taken a great deal of juterest in his work. He has travelled extensively; he has written extensively and he has spoken extensively. On his arrival on Monday afternoon, he spoke over Station ZFY and His Excellency promised to travel extensively again and not to write many papers.

We welcome His Excellency's timely statement not to write too much. May we suggest action instead of travelling too much.

Sir Gordon Lethem has been able to secure the good will of the large mejarity of the working people of this mis-zoverred colony. The people of British Guiana have always been generous, and particularly to high. ranking officials.

The time has now come for us to direct our attention to the material progress of the people of this colony. We are a practical people who have the will to live a full, free and practical life and while the majority of the proceeding.

people have been trying to live this full, free and practical life our administrators have never given them that full and free opportunity to live their ows lives.

We are told that His Excellency the Governor, the Secretary of State for the Colonies and others in authority have a lively interest in this Colony What is the meaning of this?

At present, seven out of ten adults of Indian descent cannot read and write any language, and three out of ten children of school going age, are not in the primary schools.

Malnutrition is everywhere and the average earnings or wages of ablebodie i adults are not sufficient to purchase food alone to sustain the bodily require ments of a worker. The majority of childreni n schools, as inspected by the diets below the safety line. With these facts before us are our Administrators really concerned about the social and muterial, welfare of our children and adults? If so, we call on all those responsible to take steps to adjust this very important matter without further delay.

This is not the time nor the place to point out the backwardness of the people of British Guiana, particularly the Indian people, after their introduction from India more than. 100 years ago. We have been endeavouring to point out certain material facts in our Editorial columns under the head of "REPATRIATION OF INDIANS" and we ask Dis Excellency to be good enough to peruse them.

#### an Open Letter to Mr. Charles Taussig

CO-CHAIRMAN, ANGLO-AMERICAN CARIBBEAN COMMISSION

Mr. Charles Taussig, Co-Chairman of the Anglo-American Caribbean . Commission in a recent declaration. termed the economy of the West Indies as lopsided and the conditions of life under which the people of the West Indies live as miserable and extremely poor.

It is indeed a correct observation on the part of Mr Taussig and it is hoped that, placed as he is, on the C)-chairmanship of the Caribbean Commission he will do all that lies within his power to better the economy of these parts and to raise School Medical Officer, are living on the standard of life and living of the people of the West Indies.

It must be, by now, clear to Mr. Taussig that the people of the West Indies are a subject people and as such have no right of self-determination and are thus denied the right of ini istive and enterprise. These conditions have now been going on for over a hundred years and the people have grown so accustomed to have things done as their Rulers want that any departure from that custom comes as a shock rather than a natural state of evolution.

The people of the West Indies are fully aware of the broad policy that the Americans follow with respect to territories under their flag as can be seen in the matter of the Franchise as far as Puerto-Rico and the Virgin Islands are concerned. These territories of the U.S.A. have for years now been enjoying Universal Adult Suffrage, whereas in British Guiana a franchise is now being introduced whereby more than sixty-five percent of the adult population would be denied the right to exercise the vote. We ask solemnly if this is fair to a down troiden people and we ask you as Co-Chairman what are you going to do about it. From all we hear Puerto Rico will be electing its own Governor will that be ever possible in the British West Indies? We shall address ourselves to you again,

On Monday the Indian Legislative Assembly recommended the recall of the Indian High Commissioner to South Africa as a reprisal for property laws affecting Indians in the Union. purchase the property.

During the debate Dr. N. B. Khare, Commonwealth Relations member, said he wished India was in a pasition to declare war on South Africa.

Moving a resolution recommending Jan Smuts, South African Premier rotection by agreement of Indians in has informed the leaders of the Nata Indians that he bannot receive a deputation to discuss the question of residential control there until the position olears.

# Public 'Reaction To' West Indian Conference

BACKGWARD CONDITIONS NOT UNKNOWN.

In the issue of Indian Opinion of the 13th of May 1944 shortly after the conclusion of the Anglo-American Caribbean Conference held in Barbados the following was published.

rublic reaction to the publicity given to the decisions reached a the recent West Indian Conference held in Barbados is not altogether favourable.

All classes of the community are awaiting practical results.

It is now felt that the "needs" of the colony require no constant Repetition. The Anglo-American Caribbean Commission is fully informed about the backward conditions of the West Indies and British Guiana. The second meeting of the Conference will have practically no value if no practical benefits result from the first.

Today more than six months after the Conference was held absolutely nothing has been done from a practical standpoint as far as British Guiana is concerned to implement any of the decisions reached.

It is only fair to ask what is the use of these conferences when nothing somes out of them. The masses have no use whatseever for academic achievements, the sooner the local and Imperial Governments understand it the better it would be for the future of the British Empire.

The Challenge

· All Russia celebrated the anniversary of history's greatest social revolution this week. It was the most important of the 27 anniversaries that have been solemnized thus far, For the first time since Lenin opened the first session of the Supreme Soviet (and a new chapter in human history) with the casual words: "We shall now proceed with the organization of the accialist state," Russia had ceased We shall to be a defensive power. It had passed over to the offensive, In retrospect it was clear that the revolution was the most important fact of World War I. Russia's emergence as the No. 1 power in Europe and Asia might well be the most important fact of World War II.

In the old Russian fairy tale. For the heat in Ladies Dress Material Vasilisa the All Wise walks up to the little but that stands on hen's legs and says: 'Little but, little but, turn with your face to me and your back to the sea." And the voice of Baha Yaga, the witch, answers from within the hut: "Fee fo fum. I smell Russian blood. For today the Russian spirit is marching through the world, and it throws itself on your breast and it slaps you in the face ... '

Last week there was not a country in Europe or Asia, scaroely a country in the world, where Russia's influence was not on the march. The i fluence was due not merely to Russia new military might. The Russian Government, temporarily "respectable, permanently revolutionary. Its appeal, reaching far beyond its war fronts and frontiers, was, in theory, one of the noblest in history of human hopenothing less than the freeing f, mankind from want fear and suffering But to safeguard its purpose, and foces its engeries, it had organized one of the most resolute dictatorship the world bad ever known, serviced by one of the most complex and efficient systems of secret police. In carrying its ideals abroad, it had developed a new tactic in power politics—the appeal to the foreign masses to organize, conspire and ultimately revolt against the dominant classes in their respective countries. The promise was that when the socialist organization of abundance was complete, the to ulitirian state would dissolve of its own superfluousness in a new kind of classless damno-racy. To most Americans and western Europears this was the uncertain ideal. dictatorship, the inescapable fact.

Hardly had Prime Minister Winston Churchill zoomed back from Moscow to announce that the question of Poland and the Balkans would ver Angle-Russian relations no more, than those relations suffered a new wrench. This time it came in Irin -traditionally a prospective Russian LEBENSRAUM traditionally a very tender spot with Britons. For Iran lies like a massive wedge between British India and British-controlled Iraq. It is also the source of much of Britain's Near Eastern oil.

Oil was the immediate cause of the trouble. Iran's Premier Mohamed Said Maraghei was being briskly hoiled in oil last week, and even the U.S. had been spattered with a few hot drops. The fire was lit by Sergel Kavtaradze, Soviet Vice Commisser of Foreign Affairs, who presented Said with a Russian proposal for oil concessions in northern, Iran (Time, Oct 30), Said said no, but Kavtaradz+ would not take ino for an answer. From Teheran, where he lingered, he denounced the head of Iran's Cabinet. From afar the Russian press echoed his charges that Said was a Russophobe reactionary, Vice Commissar Kivtaradze was also suspected of attring up Iranians to denounce Sid.

Tongue in cheek, Moscow correspondent Paul Winterton cabled London's News Chronicie: "With that don's News Chronicie: spintaneity which is such a happy feature of the persians aut their best 20,000 people demonstrated in the streets of Teheran, called for the reseignation of the Said Government, There were other demonstration in the northern section of Iran, occupied by the Red Army since 1941.
