- EDITORIAL

Education

We are convinced that a sound education is the surest foundation for Scoial progress. Basing our conclusions on this premise we propose to examine the methods that are being adopted by the Imperial Government and the local Government to educate the Masses in British Guiana.

For over a quarter of a Century this Association has been pleading with Government to extend the facilities of Primary education in this colony. While there has been some progress at a snail's pace the mass of the people remains unlettered. The majority of workers on sugar plantations are unable to read and write intelligently As a matter of fact 10 out of every 100 workers on sugar estates are unable to read and write en intelligent letter. The Franchise Commission reported in 1944 that 59.2% of East Indians are illiterate. We are convinced that the figures given in the Report of the Franchise Com-mission are correct. But while 59.2% of the East Indians, that is from 5 years and upwards are illiterate, the balance who may be called literate and residing on the sugar estates; form by far the greatest number thereon just know how to sign their names only.

This is the position as regards adults. What is the position with respect to the yourhs and children of today? There can be no doubt that four out of ten of the youths of today are unlettered and three out of ten children of school-going age are ctili out of schools. This state of affairs is well known to the government of this colony and to His Majesty's Advisers

It is estimated by a Competent Authority that out of a population of 365 000 in 1943 there are no less than 88.500 children between the ages of 5 to 16 years. Of this number, 59.800 children or 68% were in the primary schools in 1943 leaving 28,700 or 32% out of schools. The great majority of these children are East Indians.

The Governor who professes to have an interest in the welfare of the people ought to know this fact.

What has he done to begin to remedy this disgraceful state of affairs? Nothing:

The Public Works Department or those responsible allowed a school building at Plantation Enmore to go into such a state of disrepair that it had to be closed permanently and the majority of the children had no where to get primary education for over six months. The temporary building that has been eracted there is nothing short of a scandal and disgrace and we request Sir Gordon Lethem, who likes to travel around

the country, to do us the favour to have a look at it. It is a wonderful piece of work!

Since July 1942 Sir Frank Stock-dale recommended that \$183,000 should be spent annually for 5 years to recondition schools and build new ones, but up to this date no start whatever has been made. May we ask why?

It is clear to us that this century old problem is not considered urgent, but the raising of the status of British Guiana to a First Class Colony by paying incompetent officials increased salary as from January 1944 is a more urgent problem.

We have been asked by certain friends to bear in mind that while Education in the United Kingdom is "Greatest National Asset" in the Colonies the "Greatest National Asset" is to pay officials high salaries so that the bulk of it will find its way to the United Kingdom.

Curkha Recruit Wins B.E.M.

Plunging in, the recruit swam through the torrent and dragged Lieut. Green, by now in a semiconscious state, to the safety of a rock and subsequently to the river bank.

There are absolutely no real benefits to be derived from drinking alcoholic beverages. It is only a habit which when one, becomes an addict to it, is one of the greatest evils in life. It has been universally accepted by responsible men from all branches of the professions, and in other watks in life. that in the moral, mental, physical and economic realm, the effect of sloohol is nothing short of devastating and, if used in excess leads to poverty,

During the BPI "Farm Hour" on Sunday, December 3, 1944, Mr L. A. Sookoo delivered the following talk:—
Good afternoon friends, if an immediate end is not put to this insane method of brutality which will reduce our people to the worst state of life,

I would now turn my spot-light of interest to the country districts, and draw particular attention to the fact, that today more than ever as a result of inadequate recreational facilities. the rum shops are used as a reaction center for many; this is indeed very regrettable and unfortunate, and I want to impress upon you with all the vehemence of language that the Liquor Shops are an insufferable curse upon Society; and they should be regarded as prohibition centres rather than recreation centres. One should not even be enticed to have a single drink in a liquor shop for this is what happens . As the old saying goes:

First the man takes a drink Then the drink takes a drink. One drink calls for another, Then the drink takes the man.

When a man becomes drunk, it is difficult for him to control his emotions As a result, the best qualities are destroyed in him. There are also cases of disorderly behaviour and abusive language, so prevalent and due to drunkenness, that the Court, in some cases, commits the offenders to prison with a fine.

HAPPY HOME LIFE JEOPAR-DISED

In many poor Indian homes children starve and go to hed hungry, wives shed tears and suffer torture, mothers weep in silence because the breadwinner would prefer to spend the last shilling out of his slendour earnings to tickle the palate rather than provide a wholesome meal for his family. Many homes, once happy and peaceful, were reduced to ruin as a result of drunk-enness. We are told "that the strongest unt in civilisation is the home upon it we depend for all the happiness and virtues of life, it is the blood-stream of a healthy nation. When liquor enters a peaceful home, more often than not it is turned into a bell, peace and love go out sorrow, poverty and death come in.

Indians should avoid this degrading state of affairs and awake to a sense of self consciousness and self realisation so that, as individuals they can earn for themselves the respect of all, and as a race they can be proud of their noble heritage.

of the Air Com-The formation mand. South East Asia, under the Supreme Allied Commander has led to a change in the organisation of Air Headquarters, India Command, and a re-statement of the responsibili-

ties of the Air Officer Commanding.

The Air Officer Commanding will countinue to be responsible to the conntinue to be responsible to the Commander-in-Chief for the control and administration of the Air Forces allotted to the N.-W. Frontier but he will now have more specific responsibilities for the development, administration, terms of service, recruitment and selection of personnel of the Indian Air Force, in accordance with: the policy of the Gevernment of India. Air Headquarters, India Command, will similarly control the Indian Air Training Corps Units at Indian Universities.

The specific and primary responsibilities for the Indian Air Force now given to the A.O.C., India Command. mark a new and important stage in the development of the Indian Air Force. A considerable share of the appointments in the newly organised Air Headquarters, has been allotted to Indian Air Force officers.

The Air Officer Commanding act as the Inspector General of the Indian Air Force in respect of I.A.F. Units and personnel outside his com-mand, such as those now loaned to and serving with Air Command, South East Asia, for operations against the Japanese.

Now it is known to all that the huge profits which is declared year after year by the sugar estates is really due to the starvation wages which is being paid to the labouring classes on the sugar estates and the policy of the administration of maintaining a large section of the population unemployed and lar.dless.

There is on the West Coast of Demerara the Plns. Windsor Forest, Hague and La Jalousie which is Government owned and lessed to the people; of recent years there is an alarming increase in the expenditure on these plantations ranging from 100 per cent on the back lands to about four bundred per cent on the front lands. A very unsatisfactory state of affairs. Consequent on this alarming situation the inhabitants were worried not knowing where it will end sought some explanation but could find none whatsoever but mismanagement.

The people of these estates are thoroughly diseatisfied with Government's methods as regards to its policy and are wondering whether it is not King Sugar at the back of it The old game of creating more landless and unemployed so that wholesale exploitation of human blood, sweat and misery may continue.

Lest it be forgotten the people of Windsor Forest about three hundred and fifty came to Government House to see the Governor Sir Gordon Lethem to seek some satisfaction and now I wish to remind my readers that Sir Gordon Lethem is a public Servant and in the pay of the inhabitants of British Guiana. His duties are to serve the people, and what did he do, he refused to see them point blank. This is certainly a very serious matter when a public servant refuses to see the Public who pays him during working hours.

This is the example which the Chief Executive and King's representative in the pay of the inhabitants of British Guiana has shown to three hundred and fifty inhabitants of the to remedy such acts.

Princes On Strike

There would be no free tickets to the viceregal audience for India's princes in New Delbi this year, though all other preparations for it had been made. In the norendro Mandal [Chamber of Princes] the two high-backed plush thrones [for the Vicerov and his wife] had been dusted off. The rad velvet Victorian armchairs [for India's princes] were all in place. The heavy Mogul tapestries had been hung from the high marble walls. The thick red carpet had been duly awept. India's princely rulers, each entitled to his salute of guns, should soon stalk in, stiff with brocade and glittering with jewels for two days of genteel dehates. Afterwards they would be entertained at a formal party by the Vicercy and Lady Wavell.

But two princes the polop'sying Nawab of Bhopal [19 guns] and the tiger-hunting Maharaja of Nawanagar [15 guns] -had more pressing haviness. The day before the audience they drave up resolutely to the Vicercy's house. To affable Lord Wavell they handed the resignation of the nine princes who constitute the Chamber's Standing Committee. The signatures were impressive; the Nawab of Bhopti, the Gawab of Rampur, the Mahar ja of Indore, the Maharaja of Dungarpur the Maharaja of Patiala, the Maharaja of Jaipur, the Mahareja of Bikaner, the Reja of Bilaspur, I'his was a royal strike without precedent in Their Highnesses' relations with the Crown. Promptly the session was cancelled.

The cause of the well-bre ! Walk out was reportedly the Viveroy's inattention to modernize the administration of India's many petty states in line with "changing time." Sensing a slight to their sovereignty, the princes were indicating their alarm at the, "tendency to alter the Sates' re-lationship with the Crown." Some of the ruffled rulers even talked of "browbeating" Most sulked in their princely mahals (palaces).
