During the year there were changes in the personnel of the Committee as a result of non attendance to meetings and members inability to serve due to pressure of work etc. The Committed as presently constituted is as follows:

### The Lords Debate On India

Opening the debate in the House of Lords on July 25 on the political situation in India, LORD STRABOLGI said that the Labour Party wanted facts on this subject. They had been fierce censorship in India both military and political. There had been complaints that the military consorabin had been aimed primarily at preventing news reaching the British people which was already known to the enamy and not to prevent news reaching the enemy.

The political censorabip had been most rigid and it had been very difficult to obtain accurate information about what was going on in the political field,

#### CRIPPS OFFER

After remarking that it had been reiterated that the Cripps Offer still stood, Lord Strabolgi continued: 'We have no desire to dwell on the past, but desire to look forward to the future, and it is surely inconceivable that, now that the Japanese danger has passed and the war everywhere is going well, the policy of the Cripps Mission should be thrown overhoard Lord Strabolgi added, however, that he was not accusing the present Government of doing anything of the kind,

One important piece of news received from India early that month, despite censorship, was the remarkable interview given by Mr Gardhi to Mr. Stuart Gelder of the News Chronicle, After quoting from the interview and also from a subsequent interview given to the same journalist. Lord Strabolgi said that those who knew Mr. Gandhi would recognise that those statements constituted a remarkable change of front, Lord Strabolgi said he wanted to ask three questions on hanalf of the Labour Party Pears.

What information has, Government

about these matters?

Could they see in these davelopments the long-waited chance to break the present deadlook in India? What did Government intend to

advise the Viceroy to do?

In particular, were opportunities going to be provided for the imprisoned Congress leaders to consult with Mr.

Gandhi and each other?
"We are not dwelling on the past. I am not posing these questions to a hostile manner. We are looking for the future. We certainly see more than a ray of hope, "Lord Strabelgi concluded,

## Presidential Address

Delivered by the President Mr. Generalne Singh at the Annual General meeting in 11th February.

Friends and Comrades.

I face you today after a full year at the helm of the Association. During that time I have done my level best to lead our people according to the best dictates of my conscience.

The world as you know has continued to witness the Nations the great Nations at war and to see that as it progresses so also it carries with it enormous social reforms benefiting the masses and today after five and balf years of war we find the exploited Masses of the world facing their exploiters and are seeking equality and the shaking off of the shackles with which they were tied down for all These social rethese generation. forms and advancement, which is leading towards the hetterment of Man's lot on earth have not reached these parts as yet: but it is moving with such tremendous force that it is sweeping averything before it and sooner or later it is bound to reach us. These influence of the social reforms that took place just a quarter of a century ago in that Great Nation The Union of Socialist Soviet Republics seems to be taking root everywhere the world over.

There is no doubt to the fact that the British people have suffered immensely during this war and have undergone great privations in their bettle for survival; but amidst all of this struggle what has supprised and amazed the world to an outstanding degree is the callous and inhuman manner with which they have treated the colonial peoples especially the Indian who is being subjected to the

most barbarous form of exploitation under their rule. A common example of this can be found in any of the sugar estates of this colony.

This Association has had its ups and downs; but in spite of all the difficulties during its existence it has been able to survive; chiefly because of its ideals and principles for which it stands. It has taken a definite stand to obtain a square deal for the Indians in this colony in the entire political. Social and economic Machinery of British Guiana and the abolishing of the unwritten Charter of slavery that exists and dominate our people in the Sugar Estates.

between the section he represents and the rest of the community. Incidentally, he does not represent the African section of the community, but certain local vested interests and politicians.

The one thing that seems to be worrying the Indian Hating Editor of the Daily Argosy is the possibility of a block out of the section he represents—namely, the Portuguese and the mixed races.

Now, if I guess correctly, the organization that the editor of the Daily Argosy in his February 11th erticle is referring to is the Guiana Democratic National Party on which the East Indians and Africans have made common ground, much to the annoyance and headache of the section that the Argosy's editor is representing and championing.

A word of advice to the Editor of the Daily Argosy is well worth recording here. The kind of attack be makes on the Indian community tends to bind them more solidly and conscientiously than if he were to be haranguing them from a pulpit and therefore it is a good thing that he does to the Indian section of the community indirectly for which I thank him. At the same time he is enlightening his Indian readers of the power that lies within their hands.

The Daily Argosy's Editorial referred to above is directed towards creating distrust between the East Indians and Africans and to divide one section against the other, but I am afraid that that day is far gone. The editor of the Argosy will have to find another ruse to fool the Indians and Africans into distrust and disharmony between themselves.

I would like to ask the editor of the Argosy to answer me a single question in his own paper, did he write the article feeling the facts from his own conscience or was he instructed to do so by his masters who pay filthy lucre to him.

dealing with Universal Adult Suffrage was cabled to the Secretary of State for the Colonies at the request of the members who attended the Conference. The cost of the cable was over-subscribed at the meeting. The Local and Imperial Government have already replied? to the resolutions passed. The replies to most of our resolutions passed were same as in previous years which are far from satisfactory.

## (5) UNIVERSAL ADULT SUFFRAGE

When it became known that the B.G' Franchiss Commission had decided by a majority that British Guiana should be denied Universal Adult Suffrage and that the Report contained certain specific instances of biased feeling against East Indians; the Association took the matter up. All the organizations supporting Universal Adult Suffrage were invited and a common front was established. The Governor was interviewed and our grievance placed before him; a memorandum for the Secretary of State was delivered to His Excellency on his departure for England. We jointly planned a series of meetings the country districts; several resolutions were passed in favour of Universal Adult Suffrage and submitted to the Local Government for transmission by sir mail to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. In addition cables were despatched to the Secretary of State for the Colonier. The Fabian Colonial Bureau, the India League in London, Mr. Bajpai in America, the Mayor of Calcutta and the Governor of India. We were not wholely successful in our efforts in this matter eventually we referred the matter to the Prime Minister of England and received the same decision.

#### (6) LABOUR

The Association was again faced with problems of the labouring class of our people in the Sugar Estates but could not make much representation in this direction due to the existing laws governing trade Unions and labour. As a result it was observed that our labouring people was drifting from the Association. It will be recalled that this Association had represented labour almost throughout its existence. Under the circumstances it was suggested that the Association create a labour department of its own,

#### (7) DEPUTATIONS

Apart from the question of Universal Adult Suffrage, four deputations from the Association were received by the Government.

(a) Early in the year the Association challenged a scurrulous statement which appears in the 'Daily Argosk' alleging to be part of speech by the Hon. E.F. Mc David Col. Treasurer, at the Anglo American Carribean Conference held in Barbados. The Association immediately cabled the Chairman of the Conference refuting the allegation and discussed the matter with the Colonial Scoretary. We were given the assurance that Mr. Mc David was misquoted and we were satisfied with the facts as put to us. The statement was corrected.

(b) As a result of an appeal to His Excellency on behalf of the Farmers

of Ground Provisions. His Excellency instructed the Legislative Food Production Committee with, J.I. D'Aguiar as Chairman to go into the matter. The association met the committee on three occasions and came to an understanding.

(c) On the arrival of the Parliamentary Delegates from Great Britain the Association took the opportunity of putting their problems before them. A memorandum was drafted and presented to Capt. Gammons who was very frank and enlightening.

(d) As a result of a resolution passed at the Annual Conference "Re Rumshop" in rural areas a deputation met Mr. Pelham Bavley Social Welfare Officer in December last, the matter is still engaging the attention of the department.
