## The Viceroy-Gandhi Correspondence

Continued from last issue LORD WAYELL'S REPLY

New Delhi, 15th August, 1944,

Dear Mr. Gandhi.
Thank you for your letter of 27th
July. your proposals are:

- (i) that you should undertake to advise the Working Committe (a) "that in view of changed conditions mass Civil Disobedience envisaged by the resolution of August, 1942, cannot be offered," and (b) "that full co-operation in the war effort should be given by Congress" provided
- (ii) that His Majesty's Government
  (a) declars immediate Indian Independence, and, (b) form a
  "National Government" responsible to the Central Assembly,
  "subject to the proviso that,
  during the pendency of the war
  the military operations should
  continue as at present but without involving any financial burden
  on India."
- 2. His Majesty's Government remain most anxious that a settlement of the Indian, problem should be reached But proposals such as those put forward by you are quite unacceptable to His Majesty's Government as a basis discussion, and you must realise this if you have read Mr. Amery's statement in the House of Commons on July 28th last. They are indeed very similar to the proposals made by Maulana Abul Kalam Azad to Sir Stafford Cripps in April 1942, and His Majesty's Govern-

ment's reasons for rejecting them are the same as they were then,

S. Without recapitulating all these reasons in detail I should remind you that His Majesty's Government at that time made it plear:

- (a) that their offer of unqualified freedom after the cessation of hostilities was made conditional upon the framing of a constitution agreed by the main element of India's national life and the negotiations of the necessary Treaty arrangements with His Mejesty's Government;
- (b) that it is impossible during the period of hostilities to bring about any change in the constitution, by which means alone a "National Tovernment," such as you suggest could be made responsible to the Central Assembly. The object of these conditions was to ensure the fulfillment of their duty to safeguard the interests of the racial and religious minorities and of the depressed classes, and their treaty obligations to the Indian States.
- A. It was upon the shove conditions that His. Majesty's Government invited Indian Leaders to take part in an interim Government which would opera sounder the existing constitution I must make it quite clear that until the war is over, responsibility for defence and military operations cannot be divided from the other responsibilities of Government, and that until hostilities cease and the new constitution is in operation, His Majesty's Government and the Gov-

ernor-General must retain their responsibility over the entire field. So far as the question of India's share of the cost of the war is concerned, this is essentially a matter for settlement between His Majesty's Government on the one hand and the Government of India on the other, and existing finencial arrangements can only be reopened at the instance of one or the other,

#### MINORITY PROBLEMS

5. It is clear in these diroumstances that no purpose would be served by discussion on the basis which you suggest. If however the leaders of the Hindus, the Muslims and the important minorities were willing to co-operate in a transitional government established and working within the present constitution, I believe good progress might be made. a transitional government to succeed there must before it is formed be agreement in principle between Bindus and Muslims and all important elements as to the method by which the new constitution should be framed. This agreement is a matter for Indians themselves. Until Indian leaders have come closer together than they are now I doubt if I myself can do anything to help. remind you too that minority problems are not easy. They are real and oan be solved only by mutual compre-They are real and mise and tolerance.

6. The period after the termination of hostilities for which the transitional government would last, would depend on the speed with which the new constitution could be framed. I see no reason why preliminary work on that constitution should not begin as soon as the Indian leaders are prepared to co-operate to that end. If they can arrive at a genuine agreement as to the method of framing the constitution no unnecessary time need be spent after the war in reaching final conclusions and in agreeing to Treaty arrangements with His Majesty's Covernment. There again the primary responsibility rests on the Indian leaders.

It is true that the Forkman will be out of a job for drilling as the machines are doing it better and cheaper which will tend to give better wages and cheaper sugar. Already, workers are being told on Sugar Estates. work for you try and go back from where you come ". These are the words that are being uttered daily to workers who have been living for a year or so in a Sugar Estate, so when Mr H.J.B. talks about shortage of Labour he is dishonest to himself or he does not know what be is saying, and further does not know existing conditions. It is the intention of the sugar kings to let Government see that more augar cannot be produced, because of shortage of labour;

above pre war price.

Government should think of encouraging people to rear cattle, and small farming and stocks, so that every farmer can own their own

markets.

## Abdication from Elba

London's Colonial Office stiffly ard nounced: His Royal Highness the Duke of Windsor has resigned, effective on April 30, as Governor and Commander in Chief of the Bahamas. resignation, said the Government, need occasion no surprise; the Governor's normal tenure" of five years is almost up The Bahamas have enjoyed a greater measure of prosperity since the Duke took office.

On Nassau's palm-fringed Government House a barrage of phone calls and cables descended. For half a day the Duke of Windsor was not at nome to any queries. Then he donned a dapner, grev check suit, pinned a red carnation in his lapel, and with his well-dressed Duchess at his side, gallantly went forth to meet the press and explain his second abdication.

There was not much to explain, really. On April, 30, when he had asked to be relieved, his normal five-years tenure would still have three months to run. (The newsmen had heard the rumour that the Duchess could not stand the heat of the Baham-But the Duke said ian summer. nothing about that,) Some distant day, said the Governor, he and the Duchess would like to return "I have a deep affaction for the Bahamas...

Even with the woman he loved, the onetime King-Emperor who had ruled over a domain on which the sun never sets could not be very happy ruling 29 islets, 661 days and 2,387 sandspits. In public, however, he was always correct. Only in private did he say "This Elba!" and she scho "This St. Helena!"

#### Australia's Basic Wage Rates

The basic wage rates in Australia quoted by Dr. Edith Summerskill. M. P., in her article "Australia's Fine Motherhood Homes," published in "Labour Press Service" on October 18 last, are those for unskilled workers of either sex.

This is made clear in a letter we have received from Mr. O. Schreiber, President of the Australian Trade Union Secretaries' Association. Dr. Summerskill gave the basic wage as

£4 '7s. for adult males.

Mr. Schreiber, pointing out that this is the rate for unskilled workers, says that there are an almost negligible number of workers without a margin Under the Australian Industries Arbitration system wages are ordinarily fixed by the Court to provide (a) an amount to cover the cost of maintaining s man, wife and one child [child endowment starts with the second child], and (h) an amount for skill and sometimes hazards of an occupation.

The rates of pay, continues Mr. Schreiber, vary from industry to industry, and are as follows in these

CAS66 : -

Shipwrighte, £7 8s. per week; carpenters, £7 9s.; aircraft, £6 15s; compositors, £6 14s; cabinet makers, £6 13s; engineers. £6 15s; piano-makers, £6 16s, French polishers, £6 13s; bekers, £7 9s, painters, £6 16s 6d. electricians, £7 is, in some cases. plus holiday pay, a week's sickness and annual leave.

These are minimum rates for 44

hours, day work.
