Malnutrition And The . Workers

family in B.G. may be considered for below the standard required to maintain physical fitness and bealth. The energy output involved in the daily work is far above the intake, causing a continuous overtaxing of the workers system and the running downing of the reserves of the body.

The real basic causes of malnutrition lies in the Poor wages that the workers earn. It would be of far greater benefit to the employer to have well fed and strong persons is work for them, as the amount of work performed would compensate, for the higher wages paid. It is beyond the imagination of any human mind to figure out how the average sugar estate worker's family can live on two fifty and three dollars per week; no wonder malnutrition, with its train of diseases, is so apparent among the entire section of the masses employed by the sugar estates.

We are of the opinion that a change of heart and spirit is required by the management of labour everywhere in B, G. especially the sugar estates. A wage simed at providing a proper balanced diet, and enough calories for the energy output should be conemployers of labour,

Repatriation Of Indians Right Of A Return Passago

"RIGHT TO A RETURN PASSAGE UNDER THE IMMIGRATION ORDINANCE CHAPTER 208.

We have the honour to submit the following report on the right of an Indian immigrant to a return passage under the Immigration Ordinance, Chapter 208.

Under Section 192 of the said Ordinance, every Indian Immigrant introduced into this colony is entitled to a return passage to India in accordance with the terms of his agreement entered into between him and the Agent General in India.

British, Guiana has not had an election for nine years for the Legislative Council. Children who were twelve at the last elections, are now twenty one, and can hardly remember the hustle and bustle in the colony as happens at election time.

We are satisfied that the majority of the elected members of the present Legislature have outlined their usefulness and have ceased to be the choice of the people. The Legislative Council has reached a moribund stage and it is time we have general elections in the colony.

We are of the opinion that if America can have elections for the presidency in war time, then there is no reason on earth why British Guiana should not also have elections for the Legislative Council, which is now overdue by four years.

We urge therefore that the change of Franchise be expedited and in our opinion this can be done in time to stantly kept before the minds of the have a general election in September 1945.

There were three types of agreez ment and shortly put are as follows

(1) All immigrants introduced into the Coluny, at the expense of the Government or of the Immigration Fund, previous to the 1st day of September, 1895, are entitled to be registered free of charge to a return passage if they have completed a continuous residence of ten years.

(2) All immigrants introduced in like manner from the 1st day of September, 1895 and the 30th day of September, 1898 and the 30th day of portion of the passage money namely, Males one quarter (1/4) and Females one-sixth (1/6) thereof.

(3] All immigrants introduced also in like manner from the 1st day of October, 1898, are required to pay the following proportion of the passage money—males one-half, and females one-third thereof.

Wakenaam Primary School Problem

SHAMEFUL NEGLECT BY GOVERNMENT

BY "BR. DEMOCRACY"

It has cost the poor peasants of Wakenaam more than one thousand dollars, within the last seven months: to maintain the primary school known as the "Mackay Memorial School" at "cod Success Wakenaam. This school came into being as a result of the disgusting and unsatisfactory state of affairs that existed at the Govt. sided Methodist School there. and the neglect of Government to set up and maintain a Govt. control school on the island-which would be free from impartiality and prejudices of any kind.

This new school is run by a governing body comprising of fifteen residents of the island. It costs nearly one hundred and fifty dollars per month to maintain, with Head-master W. H. Pollard (1st class T.T.C.) and a staff of five efficient teachers, has enrolled more than two hundred and seventy five pupils with an average daily attendance of over two

hundred.

Dr. Giglioli was favourably im-pressed with the condition of this school. The residents who send their children, contribute what could be afforded. But this cannot meet the demands of this evergrowing school. The governing body appointed by the people of Wakenaam is appealing to all Indians and the general public for contributions to assist them in their efforts to school their children advantageously -no amount is too small.

FLOUR, CYCLE TYRES & TUBES

I wonder what Mr. Macrie 'is doing with the distribution of flour in the Skeldon district?

I notice that from time, to time the situation is getting worse. I have seen big plans laid out for black marketing on flour and other items. Why are certain business men in the district who only started business just one or two years ago are allowed to get 12 to 14 helf bags of flour? Are they given this flour to wholesale or retail? Would it be fair to those business men or shop men who just started business to get 12 to 14 half bags of flour while some of them who have been carrying on business for over 12 to 20 years can only get two and three half bags which supply is insufficient? And when they make application for an increase they are told that there is a shortage of flour, and those who were getting three half bags were out-down to two; and then they were suddenly stopped altogether without any good reason while others with their 12-14 halfbage are getting just the same. I observe that there is no shortage or limit for the "big shots."

Flour is always sent in boats for the Upper Corentyne - River 'district and neither the Control Board nor any like department questions it or even cares to know where it is going, for what purpose, to whom it is to be sold—whether it be Dutch men or English-men. But the poor seller or baker with bis three half bags must be questioned and orucified and not

allowed to live.

Some of the shopowners' who are getting these elaborate amounts of flour are selling to the poor bakers and other shop men who have plenty customers but are not getting their full supply. They have to pay black market prices of \$4.00 and \$5.00 per half bag!

Now, there is a big shortage of bread in the district on account of the fact one of the largest bakeries is closed and the flour for some is allowed to be transferred to another district, and the Skeldon district is now entirely cut off from the use of that flour. Will the Control Board investigate why, and whether that district will consume that amount of flur, or it is sent there for black marketing?

Cycle tyres and tubes are being disposed of under the same condition. Most of the stores have tyres and are glad to get rid of them as they are getting dry rat on their hands, and workers who have the need for same cannot get from the C.B. and have to buy at black market price from , those who can get by greasing the wheel.
