



#### **MEMORANDUM**

OF THE SERVICES OF

CAPTAIN, NOW

#### MAJOR GEORGE BALFOUR,

MADRAS ARTILLERY,

&c. &c. &c.

I was appointed in April, 1840, Staff-Officer to the Madras Troops, which were ordered on service to China, under the general command of Colonel Montgomerie, C.B., who commanded the Artillery as well as the Detachment.

From that date, till June 1842, I performed all the general Staff duties of the Madras Detachment, as well as those of the whole Artillery of the Force in China.

From June, 1842, till the conclusion of the War, I was Brigade-Major to the Artillery of the Force.

I was present with the Force from the commencement of operations, till the Peace; and, during that period, only incapacitated by fever for a period of three days, from performing my military duties.

I was present at every action or affair in which the Head Quarters of the Force was engaged, and present with the small Detachment, which in March 1842, under the command of Colonel Montgomerie, C B., effectually repulsed the night attack made on Ningpo by a large and select Force of Chinese troops; their defeat had a marked effect in causing the Chinese Government to come to terms.

I was noticed by Lord (Sir Hugh) Gough, in his public Despatches and Orders, on the following occasions:—

On the RECAPTURE OF CHUSAN, vide Despatch, dated 3rd October 1841 published in the London Gazette; 12 February 1842.

On the Repulse of the Night Attack at Ningro, vide general orders by Sir Hugh Gough, dated 14th March 1842; also vide Despatches published in the London Gazette, 6th September 1842.

On the Assault of Teeke and the Fortified Heights of Segoan.—Vide Despatches published in the London Gazette, 6th September, 1842.


On the Storming of the City of Chinkeang.—Vide Despatches published in the London Gazette, 24th March 1843.

I received the thanks of Colonel Montgomerie C.B. commanding the Madras Troops and Artillery of the Force, on every occasion in which it was engaged with the enemy; I was particularly mentioned in his Report of the Repulse of the Night Attack made on Ningpo; and, finally, at the conclusion of the War on the return of the Troops to Madras, Colonel Montgomerie, C.B., in his Report of the 2nd February, 1843, to the Government, thus reports:

"I feel it especially incumbent on me to place on Record the "sentiments which I entertain of the services of Captain Balfour, Staff"Officer to the Artillery and Madras Detachments; it is not in my 
'power to give due expression to my sense of that Officer's merits and 
services, and of the invaluable assistance he rendered on all occasions 
of difficulty,—possessed of great energy and decision, and actuated by 
principles of honor of the highest tone, he must do credit to himself 
and to the service, in any situation he may be called on to fill."

THE MARQUIS OF TWEEDDALE, Commander-in-Chief, on the 8th March, 1843, through the Adjutant-General of the Army, writes as follows:—

"The Commander-in-Chief directs, that Lieutenant-Colonel Montgomerie be requested to intimate his Lordship's approbation to all who
served under the Lieutenant-Colonel's command, in the exercise of
the Military or Medical duty, and also to communicate to Lieutenant
and Brevet Captain Balfour, the Commander-in-Chief's full estimation



My first Commission, as Second Lieutenant, is dated 16th December 1825; I have thus been more than 22 years in the service.

I am a Captain of more than seven years standing, having obtained the Brevet of Captain, in December 1840, and my Regimental Rank as Captain, in March 1844; and, excepting for a period of six months, when I was on leave of absence, I have been constantly employed on duties of a varied and important nature and have received marks of approval from every officer under whom I have served.

I was Brigade-Major to the Artillery of the Force, which, in 1839, under General Wilson, C.B., assembled in the Ceded Districts; and I served with the Detachment from that Force, which under the command of Colonel Dyce, attacked and defeated the troops of the Nabob of Kurnool. Having acted as Staff-Officer to Colonel Dyce, I was specially noticed in the Despatches published in the Fort St. George Government Gazette, and Government General Orders, dated 22nd and 23rd October 1839 and also in a separate Despatch to the Adjutant-General of the Madras Army.

After the action, I was one of the Commission which examined and reported on the extensive and extraordinary collection of Ordnance and Stores made by that Nabob, found in the Fort of Kurnool.

I may be allowed to mention the following Officers, who have received Promotion, and the Honor of the Bath, for their services in China, as bearing on my own claims to similar reward and distinction.

Lieutenant-Colonel Malcolm C.B., served as extra aide-de-camp to Sir Hugh Gough at the storming of Chinkeang, and was mentioned in his Despatch, dated 25th July 1842, in exactly the same terms in which I was noticed. At the termination of operations, Colonel Malcolm obtained the Brevet of Lieutenant-Colonel, and Cross of the Bath.

Major Daubeney, C.B. 55th Regiment, joined the Forces in China about the beginning of 1842, and was appointed Brigade-Major to Colonel Schoedde's Brigade at the time I was named Brigade-Major to the Artillery of the Force under Colonel Montgomerie; Major Daubeney was twice noticed in Despatches, and on both occasions I also

was noticed. At the termination of operations he obtained the Brevet of Major and Cross of the Bath,—Major Daubeney is two and a half years junior to me in the Service.


Major Grant C.B. 9th Lancers, joined the Force in China in June 1842, and was present at the storming of Chinkeang, as Brigade-Major to Lord Saltoun's Brigade. At the termination of operations, though never mentioned by Sir Hugh Gough, he received the Cross of the Bath; his Regimental promotion to Major, had taken place a few months prior to the attack on Chinkeang,—Major Grant is junior to me in the Service.

Major The Honourable R. Spencer of the Royal Artillery, served, as a Subaltern in the Artillery during the whole of the operations in China, in which I served as Staff-Officer, Brigade-Major and Brevet-Captain. I was engaged in every military affair in which this officer was, and at others where he was not present. On attaining the rank of 2nd Captain in April 1846, in the Royal Regiment of Artillery, he received, in the following month, his Brevet Promotion to Major. Major Spencer is ten years junior to me in the Service.

Major Cuddy, 55th Regiment, joined the China expedition in 1841, and served as a Subaltern during all the subsequent operations. In 1845, he obtained his company in the 55th Regiment, and received in May 1846 the brevet of Major,—Major Cuddy is seven and a half years junior to me in the Service.

I may observe that so long as the war continued I declined employment which might interfere with my military advancement. In 1841, I was offered by Sir Hugh Gough, the appointment of Commissary of Ordnance to the Combined Forces, the allowances of which were very considerable; but I declined that office, expressly on the plea that its duty, being of a civil character, would not admit of those opportunities for military distinction which my military staff-appointment might and did afford.

In October 1841 I was elected one of the Public Agents for captured property, and acted until the whole accounts were settled in 1844. I was also appointed one of the Receivers of Public Monies, payable by the Chinese government under the treaty of Nanking; and, with the sanction of Sir Hugh Gough, performed all my military Staff duties during the whole period.

Having, since the peace with China, been fully occupied on duties connected with the new and important commercial and political relations with that Empire, I was precluded, on Promotion to Regimental Captain on 26th March 1844, from bringing forward my claims for military services; but, having returned to England, I hope the delay in now submitting my claim will not prejudice the favourable consideration of these military services as above stated. I now solicit the Brevet rank of Major from the date of my Promotion to my company on the 26th March 1844, and the Distinction of the Cross of the Bath, which I believe I should have received, at the conclusion of the war with China, if I had then held the rank of Regimental Captain, such reward and honor having been bestowed on Lieutenant Colonel Malcolm, C.B., and also on Majors Daubeney C.B., and Grant C.B., the two last having held the same Staff appointments as myself.

P.S.—Since the above Memorandum was submitted I have received the Brevet of Major, but the date of the Gazette is the 8th October 1847, being nearly four years later than the date which I solicit may be assigned to the rank, viz. 26th March 1844.


I am by that date placed below Majors Spencer and Cuddy, both

I am by that date placed below Majors Spencer and Cuddy, both of whom served in China as Subalterns, and only obtained the Rank of Captain three years subsequent to the termination of the War; after their return to England, but, from my having remained in China, as one of the Consuls, (my Civil Services in which Post have been approved, both by the Earl of Aberdeen and Viscount Palmerston), I was prevented from earlier submitting my claim for reward for military services.

I also solicit the Honor of the Cross of the Bath, to place my Military Services on an equality with those of Lieut. Colonel Malcolm, C.B. and Majors Daubeney C.B. and Grant, C.B. especially as, after the lapse of five years, Lord Gough has, I am proud to find, recollected and reported my conduct as most praiseworthy.







#### MADRAS ARTILLERY ORDERS, 23rd February, 1834.

When quitting the Office of Acting Assistant Adjutant-General of Artillery, to enter upon the General Staff of the Army; Colonel Pearse, Commandant of Artillery, acknowledged his services as follows:—

Artillery Head Quarters, St. Thomas Mount, 22nd February, 1834.

"Lieutenant Balfour, Acting Assistant, Adjutant-General of "Artillery, having been appointed by His Excellency the Commander"in-Chief, to act as Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General of the Army, "Colonel Pearse cannot allow Lieutenant Balfour to cease his present "functions, without expressing in Public Orders, his sentiments as to "the very satisfactory manner in which the duties of Assistant-Adjutant "General of Artillery have been conducted by him, and a returning "his best thanks to Lieutenant Balfour, he sincerely congratulates him on his appointment to the General Staff of the Army."



Kurnool, 18th October, 1839.

I beg particularly to bring to the notice of superior Authority, the conspicuously Gallant Conduct of and of Captain Balfour, Brigade-Major of Artillery, who acted as my Staff throughout the Morning, and for whose exertions and assistance I feel much indebted.

Extract from a Despatch from Sir Hugh Gough, of date, 3rd Oct. 1841, published in London Gazette, 12th February, 1843.

During these operations, by the praiseworthy efforts of the Madras Artillery, under Captain Anstruther; the light Field Guns had been brought to the summit of the Heights, and opened their fire.

The enemy was now in full retreat through the North and East gates; although a few guns, Gingalls, and matchlocks, continued to be fired from the walls, and I directed the 55th to proceed to the escalade; while Captain Simpson, with the rifles, rapidly passed down a deepwooded ravine, to cut off the retreat of the north.

The scaling Ladders had been brought up, over most difficult and rugged heights, by the great exertions of the Madras Sappers, and were now gallantly planted under the directions of Captain Pears, who was the first to ascend,—and I had the satisfaction of seeing the colours of the 55th Regiment, wave on the walls of Tinghae; while those of the Royal Irish were planted on the Joss House Hill, above the suburb. Captain Anstruther reports, that Brevet-Captain Balfour, and Lieutenant Foulis, had the opportunity of distinguishing themselves in bringing up the guns and directing the fire.

Extract of a Despatch from Colonel Montgomerie, C. B.
To Sir Hugh Gough, published in the London Gazette of 6th September,
1842, with Sir Hugh Gough's Despatch.

Dated Ningpo, 11th March, 1842.

Being anxious to know how matters stood, I directed Captain Balfour, my Staff-Officer: to proceed with a small patrole round the ramparts, to the east gate, to bring me intelligence; shortly after, this officer sent me word that the South Gate had been attacked, both from inside the town and outside, and that it was in possession of the enemy, who were supposed to be in great force; I sent immediately intelligence of this to the Deputy Adjutant-General.

Captain Balfour, of the Madras Artillery, my Staff-Officer, afforded me every aid, and both he and Lieutenant Browne of the 49th Regiment, were conspicuous for their spirited conduct, when in close action, and in pursuit:



Extract of a Despatch from Sir Hugh Gough, to Lord Auckland, dated Ningpo, 19th March, 1842; published in London Gazette of 6th, September, 1842.

I must also mention, with much approbation, the conduct of Brevet Captain Balfour, of the Madras Artillery; I almost feel it invidious to name those Officers, when I am conscious that every individual zealously did his duty; but as their conduct came under my own eye, I consider it a duty to express my approval.

Extract of a Despatch from Sir Hugh Gough, dated 25th July, 1842; published in the London Gazette, of 24th November, 1842.

I was now equally distant from the West and South Gates, but perceiving that the suburbs would give me cover, I decided on forcing the former; we now reached this point, and covering parties were pushed on close to the banks of the canal. Major Malcolm, of the 3rd Dragoons, who acted throughout the day as my extra aide-de-camp, and Brevet Captain Balfour, Brigade-Major of Artillery, were very active in discovering the approaches to the gate.

Extract of a Report from Colonel Montgomerie, C. B.

Dated Fort St. George, 2nd February, 1843.

On relinquishing the Command of the Artillery employed in the expedition to China, I consider it my duty to address you on the occasion.

I feel it especially incumbent on me to place on record the sentiments which I entertain of the Services of Captain Balfour, Staff-Officer to the Artillery, and Madras Détachment. It is not in my power to give due expression to my sense of that Officer's Merits and Services, and of the invaluable Assistance he rendered me on all occasions of difficulty; possessed of great energy and decision of character, and actuated by principles of honour of the highest tone, he must do credit to himself, and to the Service, in any situation he may be called on to fill.

Extract of a Despatch from The Marquis of Tweeddale, Commanderin-Chief of the Madras Army, through the Adjutant-General of the Army.

Dated Fort St. George, 8th March, 1843. I have the honor to acknowledge your Letter of the 7th ult., (No. 157), with its enclosure from Lieut. Colonel P. Montgomerie, lately in Command of the Artillery in China.

His Lordship is happy to receive this additional testimony to the Honourable Conduct of the distinguished Regiment under your command, and directs me to request that you will convey to Lieut. Colonel Montgomerie, C.B., his high approbation of the manner in which he has discharged the important responsibility for which he was selected.

The Commander-in-Chief directs that Lieut. Colonel Montgomerie may be requested to intimate his Lordship's approbation to all who served under the Lieut. Colonel's Command in the exercise of Military or Medical duty, and also communicate to Lieutenant Brevet Captain Balfour, the Commander-in-Chief's full estimation of the Professional ability, and Meritorious Zeal with which he has so Honourably done credit to himself, and to the Service to which he belongs.

From Colonel Montgomerie, C.B., Madras Artillery, Aide-de-Camp to Her Majesty.

To E. G. Balfour, Esq.

Dated Oriental Club, 23rd April, 1845.

"In reply to your note of yesterday, I beg to say that there are in "my opinion, few Officers, of any rank, more deserving of distinction for "services in China, than your brother George.

"I was for some time sanguine of his success in obtaining his Brevet "Majority, on his attaining the rank of Regimental Captain; but I confess, "that experience in my own case, since I returned home, has rendered me "less so; but I most assuredly think, that not only is there no impro"priety, but that it is a duty on those connected with him here, to bring "your brother's claims to the notice of those, high in authority, whether "of Her Majesty's Government, or of the India House."


"Independant of your brother's forwardness and alacrity; on every occasion of actual service in China, and for which he was repeatedly thanked; his services to me, in his own department, were invaluable.

"We had a most complicated and irksome task in keeping straight all 'matters connected with the Madras Troops in China, including the Pay, "Commissariat, and Ordnance Departments, the responsibility of which "was thrown on me, and but for your brother's able assistance, I could not well have got through the work, and I will add, that it was mainly owing to him, that duties of a most onerous description, with an Establishment altogether inadequate, were conducted successfully,—so far as the immediate Service, all were engaged in was concerned; and "the Government protected from loss."

"When on this subject, I would refer to the two notes, (enclosed) from General Waugh, Military Auditor General, Madras. I refer to these notes, as conveying General Waugh's opinion on a matter he could judge of, and he was a man who did not lightly give an opinion on subjects connected with disbursements of public money, for he was a most vigilant guardian of the public purse. This is a duty not brilliant in its nature, and one which, perhaps few but those who have performed them, long remember, but I have reason to recollect, and it would be injustice to your brother, did I not bear testimony to the zeal and ability with which he on every occasion rendered me his aid."

You might with propriety say, that you appeal with confidence to the result of the audits of the public charges, for the entire period that Captain Balfour aided you in discharging the pay duties, in proof of the value of his Services, and the substantial protection afforded by his system, to the treasure of the State, on the sole security of his public character.
