#### 1. SEASON.

#### Northern Division.

The season of 1931-32 was on the whole satisfactory in the Gujarat districts of the division. The regular monsoon commenced later than usual, i.e., in the Kaira District it commenced in the fourth week of June while in other Gujarat districts the rains set in, in the beginning of July.

In Ahmedabad, the rainfall in the beginning of July gave a good start for sowing operations and was thereafter well distributed and sufficient except in a few villages of the Sanand Mahal and the Nalkantha villages of the Dholka Taluka where it was deficient for the rice crop.

In Kaira, the rainfall was quite sufficient in the beginning of the Beason.

The rain in August helped the transplantation of rice and tobacco. It was well distributed and sufficient for all crops which were in good and flourishing condition.

In the Panch Mahals the rainfall was more than normal throughout the district. Due to heavy rains in the last week of August, the early sown maize in the Dohad Tahıka and Jhalod Mahal was damaged but the August and September rains proved beneficial to the late sown kharif crops and improved the prospects of the rabi crops. With the exception of the early sown maize, the outturn of crops was very good.

In Broach the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed.

In Suret, the rainfall in all the talukas was above the average of the last five years. The heavy rains damaged to some extent the jowari, paddy and cotton crops, but the damage was not appreciable. On the whole the outturn of all the crops was good.

On account of the high floods in the river Tapti in the first fortnight of October 1931, the standing crops in the 12 villages of the Chorasi Taluka situated on the river bank, were damaged, and remissions of land revenue to the extent of Rs. 1,971 were given to agriculturists by way of relief.

In Thana the season was fairly satisfactory. Regular monsoon set in, in the last week of June. The rainfall in the beginning gave a good start for sowing operations and was sufficient and well distributed but the continuous downpour in the last week of July and the first week of August retarded the transplantation of rice. The short but frequent breaks from the second week of August improved the situation. The average yield of paddy was good and the outturn was estimated at 11 annas.

The average rainfall in each district of the division during the year under report as compared with that during the last five years was as shown below:—

The average outturn of kharif crops in Ahmedabad was 6 to 10 annas while in Kaira it ranged from 7 to 10 annas. In the Panch Mahala the estimated average outturn of crops was excellent while in Broach the outturn of cotton which is the main produce was estimated at 6.9 annas.

In Surat the average outturn of crops was 6 to 10 annas.

In Thana the outturn of paddy which is the principal crop was 11 annas.

Water supply.—The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was sufficient in all the districts of the division except in the Bahara tract of the Broach District and in the ghat junglepatti villages of the Thana District where scarcity of drinking water was as usual felt in the hot weather. Efforts are being made to cope with the situation there.

A grant of Rs. 40,000 was sanctioned by Government for the improvement of village water supply during the financial year 1931-32 and it was distributed as under:—

Small-pox appeared in the Ahmedabad and Thana districts and general precautions of vaccination and revaccination were taken.

Plague appeared in some villages of Anand and Borsad talukas of the Kaira District, in the Bulsar and Pardi talukas of the Surat District and in the Thana, Palghar, Bhiwandi and Shahpur talukas of the Thana District while cholers appeared in all the districts except Ahmedabad.

#### Central Division.

The monsoon commenced in the second fortnight of June and the rainfall was general and fairly sufficient for kharif sowings. The

fall in July was general and adequate for completing kharif sowings everywhere. In August the fall was sufficient and well distributed except in parts of Karmala, Sangola and Malainas talukas where the standing kharif crops suffered to some extent for want of sufficient rain. The September rains were heavy all over the division and were generally beneficial. They were, however, so heavy in West Khandesh that the kharif crops were severely damaged. The rains in October and November were very useful and beneficial to the standing crops except in parts of Ahmednagar and East Khandesh where heavy falls damaged the standing crops when ripe for harvesting. On the whole the season 1931–32 was fair in Ahmednagar, East Khandesh, West Khandesh and Sholapur and good in Nasik, Poona and Satara districts. The excess of rain in the months of September to November was the outstanding feature.

The agricultural situation in each of the districts in the division is given below.

Ahmednagar.—The rains had a good start and the fall in June was generally sufficient throughout the district for the sowing of kharif crops. In Shrigonda, Sangamner, Akola and Nagar talukas the monsoon commenced rather late with the result that the sowing operations were retarded in Shrigonda and Sangamner talukas while cotton sown failed in most places in the Nagar taluka. In July and August the rainfall though not heavy was more or less sufficient everywhere except in Shrigonda, Kopergaon, Karjat, Parner and Rahuri talukas. The kharif crops were damaged to some extent owing to insufficient rain in Karjat taluka and the crops in Rahuri and other talukas were stunted. The rain was particularly scanty in Shrigonda and Kopergaon talukas. About the middle of September fairly heavy rain fell in all talukas and the agricultural situation which had seemed rather gloomy owing to absence of sufficient rain for some weeks was to a certain extent re-established. The rabi sowings commenced in September almost everywhere except in some parts of Sangamner (where there is seldom much rabi) and Shrigonda talukas. The heavy rains in October greatly improved the situation of the rabi crops but damaged cotton and bajoi crops in all talakas whou they were ready for reaping or had just been reaped. In Karjat and Rahuri talukas rabi sowings were returded by excessive rain. In November there was a little rain in Karjat, Kopergaon and Newasa talukas. Late rabi crops in the Karjat taluka showed signs of withering but the rains in December improved the situation. On the whole the season was fair, the aunewari of kharif as well as of rabi crops ranging from 6 to 11 annas.

East Khandesh.—The monsoon set in the second week of June and the rainfall was sufficient for the sowing of kharif crops except in Erandol and Parola talukas and Edlabad Peta where it was below the average. In July the rainfall was adequate all over the district and the standing crops were in good condition. The rainfall in August was rather excessive and retarded weeding operations in most places. It also caused some damage to the standing crops. The break that followed in the first fortught of September did much good to the crops. In the second fortnight of September there was general rainfall all over the district. The rainfall

in October was more than sufficient with the result that all the kharif crops suffered to some extent and the sowing of rabi crops was hampered. The heavy fall in October damaged the standing crops to such an extent that the general annewari of the kharif crops was reduced to 6 or 7 annas all over the district. A plague of rats did much damage to cotton in several talukas near the Tapti. Sowing of rabi crops was commenced in the last week of October and in the first week of November and was almost completed by the end of the second week of November. As there was sufficient moisture the rabi crops had a good start and the prospects were hopeful but unfortunately in February when the rabi crop was ripe for harvesting, rats appeared in many parts and did damage especially to wheat crop. The season on the whole was fair, the annewari of kharif crops ranging from 5 to 8 annas and that of rabi crops from 6 to 9 annas.

West Khandesh.—The moneoon proper commenced towards the end of June. In July the mins were generally sufficient and well distributed all ever the district for the sowing and germination of kharif crops. In August the minfall was heavy and incessant all over the district except in parts of Sakri and Dhulia talukas with the result that in almost all talukas the growth of the crops was stunted. The much-needed break that followed helped the agriculturists to complete the weeding operations but in September the rainfall was heavy and abnormal and in some parts of the district kharif crops were severely damaged. The kharif crops in Dhulia and Sakri talukas were in good condition." In the first fortnight of October the rains though not heavy were continuous all over the district. From 20th October enwards there was complete break which had a beneficial effect on the kharif crops. The rabi sowings commenced in October and were completed in November. On the whole the season was fair, the annewari of kharif as well as of rabi crops being from 6 to 12 annea. Considerable damage was done here too by rate to cotton and wheat,

Name.—The regular mensoon commenced in the last week of June and the minifall in June and July was general and well-distributed throughout the district for the sowing of kharif. In August there was sufficient rainfall in Igatpuri, Dindori and Kalwan talukas but in other talukas it was inadequate and more rain was needed. In Yeels and Malegaon talukas the standing crops had begun to wither away for want of meisture: but the September rains which were general eased the situation. On the whole the season was good, the annewari of kharif and rabi crops ranging from 8 to 12 annas.

Poons.—The monsoon broke rather late in June and the rainfall in June and July was general and sufficient throughout the district for the sowing and germination of kharif crops except in some parts of the eastern talukas where it was inadequate. In August the rainfall was sufficient in the western division except in the eastern parts of the Haveli and Khad talukas, whereas it was defective in the whole of the eastern division except in the Indapur Taluka. The insufficiency of the early rains did not,

#### Southern Division.

In the Karnatak districts the season in its results was on the whole not unlike its predecessor, save in the Dharwar District where the heavy rainfall in November and December marred the paddy harvest and the adverse winds in December reduced the money value of the rabi crop.

In the Belgaum District rainfall in June and July was beneficial to the sown kharif and though August was dry, prospects were satisfactory. The September splashes improved the situation except in Gokak. The rains in October though below the average sustained the standing kharif; and the fall in November which was excessive was still opportune. The kharif annewari averaged 9 to 10 annas and for paddy the annewari was above 10 annas. Rabi sowings which were begun in September fared well; but the unexpected bad winds in December damaged the outturn.

In the Bijapur District the season opened out well. The ante-monsoon showers gave the soil the moisture necessary for the preparatory tillage and when the regular monsoon broke in June the kharif area was completely sown. The latter part of July and the whole of August were dry and the prospects which looked gloomy were only revived by the seasonable rainfall in September and a good harvest was assured. Rabi crops fared well till about December; the outturn, however, was much reduced by the unfavourable winds which set in in that month.

Though the rainfall at Dharwar totalled 36 inches and 83 cents as against 29 inches and 94 cents in the previous year, the season was not satisfactory, because the fall was on the whole unseasonable and ill-distributed. June and July were good months; but the long break in August and September withered the sown kharif, and then the fall in November and December was much too excessive. Kharif jowari and groundnut returned a fair yield and the paddy harvest, though damaged, cannot be considered unsatisfactory. Rabi crops were damaged by unfavourable winds. The average yield of kharif jowari was about 10 annas and that of rabi jowari about 7 annas. Paddy was somewhat below normal and the yields of wheat and cotton were poor.

In the coast districts the main characteristic of the season was heavy rainfall. In Kanara the average fall for the year was 135 inches against the average of 93 inches in the last year. In the Kolaba District the average was 130 inches against 114 inches in the previous year. In the Ratnagiri District also the fall was excessive. The rainfall though heavy and incessant did not materially affect the harvest. In some kharif villages in the Kolaba District paddy had to be resown and in some of the low lands in the Kanara District the outturn of paddy suffered. In the Ratnagiri District reaping operations were retarded on account of continued rainfall. The harvest was, however, completely garnered by the end of November. The season for all these districts was quite satisfactory.

In view of the continued slump in commodity prices only the current year's instalments were ordered to be collected by Government; and suspensions of the current year's instalments were ordered to the extent indicated in the paragraph under land revenue.

Water supply was generally adequate and the condition of cattle continued satisfactory. The periodical outbreaks of rinderpest and other diseases occurred this year also but nowhere were agricultural operations impeded on this account. The necessary relief was given by the Veterinary Department.

The supply of drinking water was generally sufficient except in parts of eastern Dharwar and of Bijapur. Plague, small-pox and cholera appeared as usual. The number of attacks and deaths are shown below:—

Inoculation and vaccination were pushed on and the epidemics were arrested.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The monsoon broke in the middle of June. The sowing of rice was undertaken in the third week of June. The work of transplantation was completed by the end of July. The rainfall in the beginning of August was heavy and a short break in the rains was then absolutely needed. It damaged the vegetable crop in the South Salsette Taluka to some extent. The reaping operations were retarded owing to heavy rains in the first fortnight of October. The rainfall in the first week of November damaged the crop which was ready for reaping and partly cutting. The total rainfall during the year amounted to 131 inches and 33 cents in the South Salsette Taluka and 155 inches and 80 cents in Ambernath Taluka. On the whole the yield was normal, the annewari in both the talukas being 12 annas.

however, much affect the agricultural situation as the whole of the eastern division, except the western portion of the Purandhar Taluka, is a rabi tract. The September rains were sufficient throughout the western division. As for the eastern division, there was very little rain in September up to 15th but the showers of 17th and 18th were very opportune for the sowing of rabi and retrieved the situation. On the whole the season was good and yielded a normal outturn with the exception of a few villages in the Sirur Petha. The annewari of the kharif and rabi crops ranged from 6 to 14 annas.

Satura.-The regular monsoon set in in the second week of June and the rainfall was general and sufficient for kharif sowings except in certain parts of the district where sowing of kharif could not be taken in hand for want of sufficient moisture. The rainfall in July and August was general and sufficient all over the district and the kharif crops thrived The break that ensued in the first week of September proved beneficial to the standing crops in the western and central parts of the district. In the eastern part, there was no September rain till the middle of that month and the crops were reported to be withering for want of moisture. Good rain, however, fell in the third week of September. Rabi sowings commenced in the first week of October all over the district. Continuous rains during the first fortnight of October proved beneficial to the kharif crops but retarded rabi sowings in rich lands in Walwa, Karad and Tasgaon talukas. From the 18th to the end of October there was a complete break. The rains in November were also general and well distributed and did good to both the kharif and rabi crops. On the whole, the outturn of the kharif crop was good throughout the district, the annewari ranging from 8 to 12 annas except in Khatav Taluka where it was 6 to 11 annas. The outturn of the rabi crops was also good in all parts of the district, the annewari ranging from 8 to 12 annas except in 2 villages in the Man Mahal where it was 4 to 5 annas only.

Sholapur.—The monsoon broke in the second fortnight of June and the rainfall was general and sufficient for the sowing and germination of the kharif crops all over the district except in the Sangola and Malsiras talukas. In July and August there was sufficient rain except in some parts of Karmala, Sangola and Malsiras talukas where the standing kharif crops threatened to prove a failure. The September rains which were sufficient and well distributed all over the district saved the situation and were also useful for the rabi sowings. The rainfall in October was good throughout the district except in some parts of Sangola Taluka. On the whole the kharif season was fair and the rabi better than usual. The annewari of kharif and rabi crops ranged from 8 to 12 annas.

Cattle and fodder.—The total number of deaths from the principal cattle diseases was 18,096 as against 7,243 for the last year. Most of the deaths were due to rinderpest which carried off a toll of 15,931 cattle. Some mortality was caused by black quarter or hæmorrhagic septicæmia. Foot and mouth disease also made its appearance but the total deaths numbered only 90 out of 27,589 attacks. The total number of attacks

The supply of fodder was sufficient everywhere in the division.

Water supply.—The supply of water for drinking was good and sufficient in all districts in the division except in a few villages in Igatpuri and Khed talukas and Peint, Mulshi and Ambegaon mahals where the people had to fetch water from a long distance in May and for a few days in June. The supply of water for irrigation was also adequate all over the division except in certain second class bandharas in the Nasik District.

Public health.—Public health was on the whole fair. Plague broke out in Satara, Patan, Walwa, Karad and Tasgaon talukas and in the Shirala Mahal and carried a toll of 959 as against 99 in the previous year. Prompt measures were taken to check the spread of the disease by inoculation. The total number of persons inoculated was 10,360.

Small-pox made its appearance in all the districts in the division except West Khandesh. The number of deaths caused by this disease was, however, comparatively small.

Cholera also broke out in all the districts in the division and the number of deaths caused by this disease was comparatively high. Steps were taken to check the spread of the disease by free distribution of cholera treatments and permanganate of potash in the affected villages and also by inoculation.

The total mortality under each of these three epidemics in each of the districts in the division was as under:—

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of eattle was on the whole very fair. There were stray cases of epizootic diseases at Khar, Ghatkoper and Jogeshwari but the disease did not spread in an epidemic form. The supply of fodder was adequate in the district.

Water Supply.—The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was adequate.

Public Health.—There were a few cases of cholera in 7 villages and of small-pox in 4 villages in South Salsette Taluka but prompt measures prevented the spreading of the diseases in an epidemic form. Public health was on the whole fair.

The increase in Ahmedabad was due to increased realizations from occupancy price on account of the sale of Government waste lands and from the lease of Government waste lands given out for cultivation. In Kaira it was due to more realizations from the sale of Government waste lands and the sale of grass and babuls and the lease of bhatha lands for cultivation than during the preceding year. The only districts which show a decrease are Belgaum and Kanara. In the former it was mainly due to fewer waste lands being given out for cultivation than in the preceding year. In the latter it was due to the fact that though the number of notices issued and the one-fourth fine inflicted were large, the amount of miscellaneous land revenue actually put down for collection before the end of the year under report was smaller than in the previous year.

The increase in Bijapur was due to sale of more building sites and that in Kolaba was due partly to larger receipts from sales of Government waste lands for cultivation and partly to larger realizations from non-agricultural uses.

As in the year 1930-31, all suspended arrears of past years were resuspended on account of the slump in prices, even though the annewari of crops was such as to justify recovery in part or in full.

#### Southern Division.

The amount of suspensions during the year was Rs. 19,22,707 as against Rs. 12,46,994 in the preceding year. This includes suspended arrears of the current year's land revenue amounting to Rs. 4,79,537 and re-suspensions of previous years to the extent of Rs. 11,35,552 granted under the ordinary suspension and remission rules and by Government as a special case in paragraph 1 of G.R., R.D., No. 5710/28, dated the 8th February 1932, according to which the recovery was limited to current year's assessment only. In addition to this a further concession by way of suspension was given by Government in paragraph 2 of the G.R. referred to in parts of the Konkan districts of Kolaba and Ratnagiri to the extent of three annas and two annas in the rupee, respectively, the amount thus suspended being Rs. 2,92,038. Government also sanctioned in G.R., R.D., No. 5710/28, dated the 20th February 1932, a suspension of four annas in the rupee in the 26 rice villages in the Sampgaon Taluka of the Belgaum District. There were also some villages in the precarious tracts of the Belgaum and Bijapur districts, which were considered to be entitled to some concession beyond the ordinary suspension and remission rules, in view of the prevailing low prices and of the settlements being fairly recent though some of such villages would ordinarily have got a suspension and others no suspensions at all. Government, therefore, on the recommendation of the Commissioner sanctioned as a special case in G.R., R.D., No. 5710/28, dated 12th April

1932, the grant of ½ suspension (instead of none) in 19 villages of the Bijapur District and in 19 villages of the Belgaum District and of full suspension (instead of half) in 13 villages of the latter district as detailed below:—

The amount thus suspended in the Bijapur District comes to Rs. 15,580. There is no information regarding Belgaum District. Thus the total amount (excluding that for Belgaum District) suspended under the special concessions under paragraph 2 of G.Rs., R.D., No. 5710/28, dated 8th February 1932 and 12th April 1932, comes to Rs. 3.07,618.

In several places in the Belgaum District on account of unsatisfactory condition of the monsoon and also on account of slump in prices further concession was granted by way of postponements of the normal dates of instalments by one to two months on the recommendation of the Collector, with a view to enable the rayats to adjust themselves in the matter of payment of their land revenue dues. #### Bombay Suburban District.

The amount of suspensions during the year was Rs. 57,235 as against Rs. 35,894 in the past year. It includes Rs. 13,000 and odd on account of suspension at annas three in the rupee granted by Government as a result of the slump in prices (vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5710/28, dated the 8th February 1932 and 15th February 1932). The remaining amount of suspension was due to the noncompletion of settlements in cases in which owing to non-observance or breaches of building regulations full rates had been charged and the occupants had been called on either to pay them up or to explain the default committed by them.

#### Northern Division.

The net consolidated demand (exclusive of remissions and suspensions during the year amounted to Rs. 1,18,26,307 as against Rs. 1,13,41,323 during the previous year. The increase was due to increased demand on account of miscellaneous land revenue and to the grant of less remissions and suspensions than during the previous year.

Central Division.

The total consolidated revenue for collection including local fund cess and excluding remissions and suspensions was Rs. 1,71,46,244 as against Ra. 1,75,09,770 in the preceding year.

### Southern Division.

The net consolidated demand for collection (excluding suspensions and remissions) during the year amounted to Rs. 1,03,79,735 as against Rs. 1,04,06,009 in the previous year.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The net consolidated demand (exclusive of remissions and suspensions) during the year amounted to Rs. 2,78,991 as against Rs. 3,05,114 during the previous year.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

Out of the net demand of Rs. 2,78,991, Rs. 2,24,180 were collected, the percentage of collection on net demand being 80 as against 83 per cent. of the previous year. This is unsatisfactory and arises, I believe, in part from insufficiency of staff due to retrenchment.

#### 11. BALANCES.

#### (Column 23 suspended and column 27 unauthorized of Appendix I.)

The balance outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 22,47,458 (Rs. 21,53,930 authorised and Rs. 93,528 unauthorized) as against Rs. 26,53,186 at the end of the previous year.

#### Central Division.

The outstanding balance at the close of the year was Rs. 12,74,773 (authorized arrears Rs. 12,13,364 and unauthorized Rs. 61,409) as against Rs. 11,33,915 in the preceding year. Of the unauthorized arrears of Rs. 61,409, Rs. 57,953 represent arrears on account of the demand for the year under report and Rs. 3,456 on account of previous years as against Rs. 52,241 and Rs. 321, respectively, outstanding on 31st July 1931.

#### Southern Division.

The balance outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 19,40,732 (authorised Rs. 19,22,707 plus unauthorised Rs. 18,025) as against Rs. 12,55,257 in the previous year.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The outstanding balance at the lose of the year was Rs. 1,12,046 (authorised Rs. 57,235 and unauthorised Rs. 54,811) as against Rs. 8,70,309 on 31st July 1931. Of the unauthorised arrears of Rs. 54,811, Rs. 29,982 represent arrears on account of demand for the year under report and Rs. 24,829 on account of the previous years as against Rs. 30,127 and Rs. 21,288 respectively outstanding on 31st July 1931.

The explanation for the unathorised arrears is that-

- (a) the whereabouts of some khatedars could not be traced during the year, and
- (b) the existing talati staff which is mainly responsible for the recovery work is not so efficient as it ought to be. The question of effecting improvement in this class of agency is under my consideration.

#### 12. TAKAVI.

#### Northern Division.

The amount advanced under both the Acts (XIX of 1883 and Act XII of 1884) during the year ending 30th September 1932 totalled Rs. 12,559 as against Rs. 41,601 during the preceding year. The decrease was due to financial stringency and less demand.

No takavi was advanced under the Non-agriculturists Loans Act, (Act III of 1928).

The year opened with an outsanding balance of Rs. 71,42,911 (principal Rs. 63,92,605 plus interest Rs. 7,50,306).

There were unauthorized arrears more or less in all talukas of the Ahmedahad District except Modasa Mahal. Steps are being taken to recover the arrears to as great an extent as possible.

In the Kaira District, Mehmedabad, Matar, Nadiad and Borsad talukas are responsible for the unauthorised arrears, while in Broach, Jambusar, Amod, Wagra and Ankleswar talukas are responsible for these arrears. These arrears are mainly due to the general economic condition. In the Kaira District they were partly due to contumacy. The arrears in other districts, viz., the Panch Mahals and Thana are small and call for no remarks.

Voluntary payments made during the year amounted to Rs. 21,747.

A special establishment of one takavi aval karkun (for 3 months only) and 20 clerks was entertained during the year under report.

#### Southern Division.

The enclosed statements vide appendix No. II show the takavi transactions during the year ending September 1932. The amount collected represents 12 40 per cent. of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year, as against 8 59 per cent. in the previous year.

As in the last year, Bijapur District represents the largest field for takavi operations in the year under report, as an advance of nearly a lakh was advanced in suitable cases. To see to the proper use of such a large amount year after year since 1928, a special takavi establishment consisting of five circle inspectors and five peons under them had been sanctioned for the Bijapur District for three years from 1st March 1929 but as a measure of retrenchment, that was curtailed to one of three circle inspectors and three peons under them and was sanctioned for a further period of one year with effect from 1st March 1932. This special takavi staff has been trained in the work entrusted to them and these three circle inspectors with the aid of four permanent special aval karkuns are looking to the tagai work.

The special features of takavi administration in the division during the year under review are:—

- (1) that the tractor ploughing started in 1931 by the Burmah Shell Oil Storage and Distributing Company with the approval of Government in the Dharwar District and referred to in the last year's report, did much useful work especially in II and III divisions of that district, where there were numerous applications for the same, thus attracting and arousing further general interests in the landholders regarding such tractor ploughing; and
- (2) that the whole of the Kanara District was declared as a "special tract" for the grant of takavi under the Agriculturists' Loans Act in view of the generally backward condition of the agriculturists all over the district in respect of indebtedness and poverty.

In Kanara, four applications for loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act, of which three relate to wire-fencing and one to other land improvements, and six more for loans under the Agriculturists' Loans Act are pending enquiry at the close of the year. The other Collectors have not given this information in their reports.

There were no works in progress in Ratnagiri District. The inspection of takavi works done by the Prant Officers in Bijapur District, although it satisfies the scale laid down in the last but one note under paragraph 13 on page 40 of the Takavi Manual, should have been somewhat more as takavi was advanced on a very large scale and the number of works went up to nearly a thousand. More extensive scrutiny by the Prant Officers would lead to better results in the proper application of the takavi advances. The Collector's attention will be invited to this aspect of the matter. With regard to the one work in progress in the Kolaba District, the Collector states that he has already directed the Prant Officer concerned and the Mamlatdar, Mahad, to inspect it immediately.

There were six cases of misapplication of loans in the Belgaum District and out of the amount of Rs. 4,542-11-0 involved therein, Rs. 2,042-11-0 were summarily recovered and steps are in progress for the recovery of the remaining amount of Rs. 2,500. There were no such cases in other districts.

Rs. 12,157-9-10 were summarily recovered in 85 cases, as the borrowers failed to execute the works in time in the Bijapur District, and Rs. 2,336-6-0 were summarily recovered in four cases in the Dharwar District for the same reason. The Collector of Kanara reports that in one case the advance made for the improvement of land was summarily recovered owing to the borrower's failure to complete the work in time, that in two other similar cases, time was extended, that in twenty cases coercive measures were adopted for the recovery of advances and interest, and that the amount remaining as "unauthorised" in the Siddapur

Taluka is partially due to the "no-tax" movement. No amount was ordered to be summarily recovered in other districts. The amounts written off or remitted are shown in column 6 of the accompanying takavi form No. IX—vide appendix No. II.

The large decrease in Ahmedabad was due to the correction of mistakes and the transfer of lands of the talukdari villages of Sanand Mahal and Dhandhuka Taluka to their proper head from column 10 to column 9 of appendix III. The increase in Kaira was mainly due to the grant of unoccupied land for cultivation and to the resumption of the leasehold village of Chandana. In the Panch Mahals and Thana the increase was due to the grant of unoccupied land for cultivation. In Broach the increase is too small to call for any remarks. In Surat the decrease was due to the forfeiture of occupied lands.

#### Central Division.

Grant of forest or assessed waste land for cultivation was one of the main causes responsible for increase in the Ahmednagar, Poona, Satara and Sholapur districts. The decrease shown against East and West Khandesh and Nasik was generally due to forfeiture of lands for failure

to pay land revenue or breach of conditions attached to grants made on the restricted tenure.

The increase in Belgaum and Bijapur was due to unoccupied lands having been taken up by people for cultivation from Government waste, while in Dharwar it is said to be due to errors in survey, an explanation which, considering the size of the figures, itself requires explanation. The increase in Kolaba was due to lands having been brought under cultivation and also to salt pans having been reverted to agricultural use.

The decrease in Kanala was mainly due to relinquishments, forfeitures etc. on account of civil disobedience movement, lack of prosperity and cancellation of leases for breach of conditions. The decrease in Ratnagui is too small to call for any remarks.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The net decrease of 285 acres under the occupied assessed land was due to survey corrections, acquisition and conversion of land to non-agricultural purposes.

### 14. HOLDINGS.

(Appendix V.)

#### Central Division.

The consolidation of holdings has been confined only to districts as was done on the last three occasions. As the return is prepared in a new form sanctioned by Government it calls for no comments.

#### Southern Division.

The return shows the number and the extent of Government and alienated holdings and the consolidation of the same has been confined only to surveyed Government rayatwari villages as in the last quinquennium (1926-27) as per instructions in paragraph 3 of the remarks on the district form No. V. on page 318, Revenue Accounts Manual, as to assembling of these holdings. The number of holdings has increased by 11,920° which is attributed to some khoti villages in the Ratnagiri District having lapsed to Government, as the khots failed to pass kabulayats within 12 years so that the villages became khalsa.

Out of 658 cases of distraint and sale of moveable property Kaira was responsible for 493.

Coercive processes in different forms had to be taken in the cases of contumacious defaulters. Contumacy on account of civil disobedience movement was confined to a few villages in the Jambusar Taluka of the Broach District and Borsad Taluka of the Kaira District.

Out of 7,665 notices of demand issued, East Khandesh and Poons were responsible for 2,289 and 2,514 respectively. There were 187 cases of distraint of moveable as against 404 in the preceding year.

In spite of a not very favourable season, many districts paid up their dues with less pressure than usual, there being a general desire to assist Government in its need.

The increase in the number of notices under section 152 was shared by Belgaum, Bijapur, Kanara and Kolaba, the highest number (1,183) being in Kanara; Dharwar and Ratnagiri showed a decrease.

The increase in the number of persons proceeded against under section 148, Land Revenue Code, was chiefly in Kanara, though Ratnagiri and Bijapur showed slight increases. There was an appreciable decrease in the cases of Belgaum, Dharwar and Kolaba.

In respect of distraint and sale of moveables, Belgaum, Kolaba and Ratnagiri showed slight decreases, while there were increases in Dharwar and Kanara. Bijapur showed no appreciable change.

Kanara was again responsible for the large increase in the number of cases under section 153, Land Revenue Code, where it rose from 107 to 808. All the other districts showed a decrease in this respect.

Action under section 155, Land Revenue Code, was taken in 10 cases in Kanara and 2 cases in Bijapur.

Kanara was by far the largest contributor to the increases and the increases there were due mainly to the civil disobedience movement.

#### 16. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

#### Northern Division.

There were 88 cotton spinning, weaving and other mills in Ahmedabad on 1st August 1931 and 5 new mills were added during the year. The number at the end of the year thus stood at 93. The working condition in the mills was good and in spite of general depression in trade, the

textile industry of Ahmedabad continued to prosper. Of the two mills at Nadiad in the Kaira District, one (the Manor Mill) remained closed throughout the year, as before, owing to financial difficulties, while the other (the New Shorrock Mill) continued to work and is in a flourishing condition. There are 33 ginning factories and presses in the Kaira District and most of them are situated in the Thasra and Anand talukas. Out of these three at Thasra, two at Dakor and one at Sevalia (Thasra Taluka) did not work during the year for want of sufficient cotton. The hand-spinning and hand-weaving industry carried on by the backward class of people and which is chiefly confined to the Borsad Taluka, is dying out. There is one milk dairy at Anand, while there are 86 creameries mostly in Anand, Borsad and Nadiad talukas. There are two match factories in the district, one at Umreth and the other at Anand.

In the Panch Mahals, the principal trade is in timber and grain. The ground-nut and flour mills continued to work well. The working of the factories and presses was moderate during the year. Dohad continued as usual to be the important grain market. The export of grain, timber and forest produce continued, but on account of depression in trade, the business was slack. The Shivrajpur and Bamankuwa Manganese Mines continued to work, but the business was slack owing to the general depression in trade.

In Broach, cotton is the chief product and constitutes the important trade of the district. There were 42 ginning factories and 12 presses during the year. Out of these 32 ginning factories and 11 presses worked for about three months and the rest remained closed. The mill-industry in Broach showed healthy activity. The river-borne trade of the ports of Kavi, Tankaria and Dehej, showed a noticeable increase in imports compared with the imports of the preceding year. The export from Tankaria and Dehej showed a decrease, while that from Kavi showed a little increase.

In Surat, cotton is the principal product and 2 cotton mills, 30 ginning factories and 13 presses worked during the year. The local silk and embroidery business is declining owing to the present agitation and general depression in trade. The chief exports of the district are grass, timber, bricks, firewood, molasses, mangoes, vegetables, rice and cotton. Grass and firewood were exported to Bombay from Chikhli, Bulsar and Pardi talukas as usual.

In Thana, rice (which is the principal product of the district) of the value of about Rs. 26 lacs was exported exclusive of paddy—which was exported to the extent of 7 lacs. Other articles of exports in the district were timber, charcoal, grass, salt, bricks, lime, fresh and dry fish, vegetables, plantains, betel-leaves, saries and woollen cloth. Plantains worth about 6 lacs of rupees and betel-leaves worth about 10 lacs of rupees were exported to Bombay and other places during the year, thus showing a remarkable increase in this trade as compared with their total export of 9 lacs during the preceding year. Grass of the value of Rs. 10 lacs was exported during the year. The iron workshop at Bhiwandi

which manufactures machinery and other accessories for rice mills and implements for labourers continued to work as usual and made a fairly good progress. The number of handlooms at Bhiwandi continued to be the same, viz., 2,000, but the number of workmen was reduced from 5,500 to 5,000. The industry received a set-back on account of the riots in Bombay and the general depression in trade. The Raymond Woollen Mill at Thana worked with some interruptions employing about 307 workmen during the year. The match factory at Thana continued to make a satisfactory progress and exported matches worth about 6 lacs of rupees. It provided work for poor women and children. The bone-mills at Kelwa and Thana remained closed during the year, but they exported old stock worth about Rs. 4,000 to Europe and Ceylon.

#### Central Division.

The general depression continued during the year and had an adverse effect on trade. The principal articles of trade in the division are grain, cotton and oil seeds the most important of the last being groundnut which grows in abundance in the Sholapur, East Khandesh and parts of the Satara District. The prices of food grains remained fairly constant during the year but were very low. Jaggery is the most important article of trade in the irrigated tracts of the Ahmednagar and Poons districts but owing to the low prices of this commodity prevailing throughout the year, cane growers were badly hit and in many cases could not operate at a profit. This has tended to reduce the area under sugarcane. Similarly, owing to a fall in prices and constant fluctuations in the cotton market, there has been a growing tendency to give up the cultivation of cotton and to grow groundnut instead as though the price of groundnut also was low, the fall was small as compared with that in the price of cotton. This will be apparent from the figures of area cropped in East Khandesh under these two crops in the last four years which are as follows:--

With the addition of one oil mill during the year the number of oil mills in East Khandesh rose to 31. All these mills are reported to have

carried on a fairly flourishing business. In Satara the outturn of groundnut crop was adversely affected by excessive rains.

There are 5 cotton spinning and weaving mills in East Khandesh (two at Jalgaon, two at Amalner and one at Chalisgaon) one each in Poona and Dhulia and 8 in the Sholapur District (7 at Sholapur and 1 at Barsi). There are besides two spinning mills at Barsi. Except the Bhagirth Mill at Jalgaon all the mills in East Khandesh did fair business during the year. The new Pratap Spinning and Weaving Mill at Dhulia is reported to be working well. This year it produced cloth weighing 2,205,891 lbs. as against 1,908,594 lbs. in the previous year. The Raja Bahadur Mills at Poona produced a good supply of cloth which had a ready local market.

In Sholapur City, there are 7 spinning and weaving mills one of which worked by electric power. In Barsi, there is one spinning and weaving mill and two spinning mills. All of these are in a fairly prosperous condition.

As regards the mill industry at Sholapur, the Collector remarks :-

"During the year under report there were considerable fluctuations in the cotton market, owing to which the selling of cloth became a difficult problem as merchants were not inclined to commit themselves to any but very safe transactions. Moreover, the extremely large and increasing imports of cheap Japanese cloth and yarn told adversely on the market; but with all these difficulties the Sholapur mill industry continued to be flourishing and it is hoped that the protection afforded by Government against Japanese competition will help the mill industry considerably and that the Sholapur mills will be able to show very good results."

The sugar factory at Belapur is flourishing and manufacturing sugar of a superior quality. As the company's produce is in demand in the market, the company is thinking of extending the area of plantation.

Owing to the new duties sugar-making is now a very paying proposition whereas the position as to jaggery is still bad.

Miscellaneous Industries.—The match factory at Chalisgaon constructed by Messrs. Alladinbhoy Somji during the year commenced its work. The workshop attached to the spinning and weaving mills at Chalisgaon and iron foundry at Pachora had a moderate business during the year. There are two ice factories in East Khandesh, one at Jalgaon and the other at Bhusawal. These work for four months in summer only. The Tannery at Bhusawal did well during the year. The Cooper Engineering Works near Satara Road railway station which manufacture agricultural implements are reported to have done well during the year. The textile branch of the Phadke Industrial Works at Karad was closed during the year for want of demand for the saris manufactured there. But articles of iron such as ploughs and cots continued to be made in these works as in the previous year. The Tikekar's Textile Factory and Metal Works at Tikekarwadi continue to show steady development.

#### Southern Division.

Control of the Control

graphic arrowally complete devices for The chief industry of the division is agriculture, and trade is mostly confined to the export of agricultural products. Among the few nonagricultural industries and allied trades may be mentioned the hand-loom industry, which is general in the division, the saw mills of Kanara, the brass and copper industry of Kolaba and Dharwar, the salt works at Sanikatta (Kanara) and Uran (Kolaba). Glass bangles and perfumery are manufactured on a small scale in the Belgaum District. In each of the districts of Belgaum, Kanara and Ratnagiri we have a tile factory. Rice hulling mills number 69 in Kolaba. In other districts they are not so numerous.

Though the agricultural season was one of average productiveness, trade as such continued to be depressed in consequence of the slump in prices. Local trade had a fairly peaceful year. Hartals and boycotts which did much to dislocate it last year were not in evidence this year.

Cotton trade which is par excellence the main remunerative crop for the agriculturist had a poor year. The prices did not record a satisfactory increase. The competitive rates offered by the Bail Hongal ginners in the Belgaum District, were responsible for the poor outturn of gins and presses at Saundatti in the same district. Bail Hongal ginned 20,500 bales of cotton as against 14,000 last year. For the spice trade of Kanara the year was not quite satisfactory. Hand-looms all over had a lean year as soon as the prop of political agitation which sustained them last year was removed. Hand-loom products could not keep up competition with cheap mill-made cloth. Ilkal, Guledgud, Amingad and Kerur in the Bijapur District which are famous for their fabrics had a poor turn-over not because of the competition of mill-made cloth but because of general trade depression. These centres manufacture silk saris and khans only.

Of the 5 saw mills in Kanara, three are worked by the Forest Department and two are run by private enterprise. Of the five aluminium factories in the Ratnagiri District four had a total turn-over of Rs. 9,000 as against Rs. 7,580 last year. The fifth factory remained closed throughout the year. The co-operative salt works at Sanikatta in the Kanara District sold 139,815 maunds of salt as against 130,542 during the last year. The Oriental Cannery Company at Ankola in the Kanara District had a lean year on account of the absence of demand for its products. The soap factories in Bijapur and Kolaba districts fared well. The Dhutpapeshwar Pharmacy at Panvel in the Kolaba District continued to do well. The cashew nuts roasted and shelled in Malvan and Vengurla in Ratnagiri District were valued at Rs. 4,20,467 and Rs. 1,95,000 respectively. Rice mills in Ratnagiri and Kolaba had a lean year and it is reported that export of rice from Kolaba to Bombay was fitful, mainly because of the low level of prices. The tile factory in the Belgaum District did not work satisfactorily. The one in the Ratnagiri District was mostly idle; but the factory in Kanara had a fairly good year.

Electric energy continued to be supplied to Bombay from the three Tata Power Houses at Bhivpuri, Campoli and Patnus in the Kolaba District.

The fishing industry of the Kolaba District remained unaffected.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The important factories in the district are:--

- (1) Match factories at Santa Cruz, Andheri, Kurla and Ambernath.
- (2) Dyeing factories at Chembur and Kurla.
- (3) Textile Mills at Kurla.
- (4) Litho-Printing Press at Ghatkoper.
- (5) Iron manufacturing concerns at Mulund started by Messrs. Braithwaite and Company.
- (6) Bangle factory at Kandivli.

All these had more or less a normal year.

The lime stone quarry business has considerably deteriorated owing to the competition of cement which is available at moderately low prices.

Sea fishing continues to be actively practised amongst the Kolis.

#### 17. PRICES.

#### Northern Division.

On account of the general depression in trade the prices of principal food grains in common use in all the districts of the division showed a downward tendency throughout the year.

In Broach, the price of cotton with seed ranged from Rs. 76 to 140 per bhar as against Rs. 105 to 113 per bhar in the preceding year.

In view of the fall in prices, Government in their Resolution, No. 5710/28, dated 8th February 1932, ordered that in no case should more than one year's assessment be levied during the year and all suspended arrears which were due for collection were, therefore, re-suspended.

#### Central Division.

The prices of the food grains continued to be generally low throughout the year as compared with those prevailing in 1930. Towards the beginning of July 1932, the prices of almost all food grains showed a tendency to rise. This improvement was, however, temporary and was due to seasonal conditions and particularly to the fact that owing to partial failure of grain crops in East Khandesh, stocks had fallen low and had to be replenished by imports of food grains from Ahmednagar and Sholapur districts.

A statement showing the prices of the principal staple food grains in the headquarter town of each district for five different periods is attached for facility of reference:—

#### Southern Division.

The low level of prices of the principal food stuffs recorded last year continued steady on the whole in the sense that there was no precipitous fall though the downward trend of prices does not appear to have yet received any effective set back. In the Bijapur District, jowari which sold at 21 seers 15 chataks, per rupee last year sold at 22 s. 6 ch. this year. In the Dharwar District this staple which sold at 22 s. 7 ch. per rupee last year, sold at 23 s. 12 ch. this year. In the Belgaum District the prices. however, showed some improvement. It is reported that a slightly upward tendency towards the end of the year was noticed. In the Chikodi Taluka of this district, for instance, jowari, which sold at 19 s. 15 ch. last year, sold at 21 seers at the beginning of this year but the market rate at the end of this year was 16 s. 5 ch. In the Gokak Taluka the market rate for jowari last year was 19 s. 8 ch. At the beginning of this year the prices fell to 20 seers per rupee, but improvement was noticed at the end of the year when the price was 16 seers per rupee. Similarly in the Athni Taluka the price of jowari last year was 25 s. 13 ch. At the beginning of this year it was 24 s. 5 ch. and at the end of the year the market rate was 19 s. 3 ch.

Rice which is the principal food grain in the coast districts records a slight decrease except in Kolaba where the wholesale price of paddy which ranged from 30 to 40 rupees a khandi last year is reported to have fluctuated this year between 30 and 43 rupees per khandi. In the Ratnagiri District a maund of rice which sold for Rs. 4-14-7 last year sold at Rs. 4-3-4 this year. In the Kanara District the average price of

rice fell by 21.6 per cent. when compared with the last year's average. Last year the average price of a maund of rice in this district was 4-14-2; while this year the average price was 3-13-2. The prices of garden products in this district, however, showed improvement. Prices of cardamom, pepper and betelnut recorded a sharp rise. From Rs. 80 a khandi last year, betelnut rose to Rs. 120 a khandi in Sirsi, while in Siddapur from Rs. 75 a khandi it rose to Rs. 93-11-0. Cardamom which sold at Rs. 480 a khandi last year in Sirsi was sold this year at Rs. 900 a khandi. In Siddapur the rate for this commodity rose from Rs. 523-10-0 to Rs. 658 per khandi this year. The Collector attributes this rice to less outturn of the harvest and to greater demand for the spices. Opinion in the talukas affected attributes the improvement to the duty levied on similar products imported into India from Straits Settlements.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

Rice is the staple food grain and the chief product of the Bombay Suburban District. The quantity of cleaned rice obtainable per rupee was 5 seers and 14 chataks from 1st August 1931 to 30th April 1932 and 6 seers and 8 chataks from 1st May 1932 to 31st July 1932 while last year it was 5 seers and 3 chataks from 1st August to 31st December 1930 and 5 seers and 14 chataks from 1st January to 31st July 1931. The fluctuation in the rates was due to general depression in the market.

#### 18. LABOUR AND WAGES.

#### Northern Division.

The wages, both of skilled and unskilled labour, showed no appreciable change in the year, in the Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach districts, while

in the Panch Mahals and Surat districts there was a slight fall, but it was not commensurate with the drop in the prices of food grains. There was some unemployment in the Panch Mahals and Surat districts on account of the general economic condition of the country.

In Thana, there was no appreciable fall or rise in the wages of ordinary labour. The wages of skilled labour declined slightly. The district being in close proximity to Bombay, the skilled and unskilled labourers found, as usual, employment in Bombay during the fair season. The rice mills in Kalyan, Bhiwandi, Shahpur and the match factories at Ambernath and Thana and the railway power house at Chola (taluka Kalyan) provide work for a number of labourers.

#### Central Division.

Compared with the rates of wages both for skilled and unskilled labour of the last year the rates obtaining during the year showed a slight tendency to fall. But they did not fall to the same proportion as the prices of agricultural produce.

The demand and supply generally balanced each other and no shortage or excess was noticeable except in Sholapur City, where a certain amount of unemployment was reported. There was no unusual emigration nor immigration.

The relations between the employers and the employees were on the whole satisfactory and there was no strike or any other trouble.

#### Southern Division.

Skilled and unskilled labour found employment throughout the year and there were no important variations either in the demand or supply.

The military works started at Belgaum provided labour for the neighbouring villages. The cotton gins and presses at Bail-Hongal and Saundatti in the Belgaum District absorbed much local labour from surrounding villages and no outside labour was imported. The tile works, rice mills, forest cuttings and railway works in the Khanapur Taluka of the Belgaum District provided sufficient labour for the wage earners there. The textile mills at Gokak and Hubli had no difficulty in obtaining their supply.

In rural areas the demand for field labour was met locally except in the above-ghat talukas of the Kanara District. Labour required for the spice gardens in this tract is generally met by the immigration of labour from the below-ghat talukas of the same district. This seasonal influx is reported this year to have been less than normal on account of the comparatively poor outturn of the harvest. There are no labour unions or kindred organisations in the division except the Railway Union at Hubli.

As regards wages, the position is that while wages for skilled labour except in the Ratnagiri District maintained generally the level reached by them last year, these for unskilled labour fell appreciably in the coastal districts but were unaffected in the Karnatak districts where

the previous year's level was not disturbed. The average wage for skilled labour in the Ratnagiri District was Re. 1-3-10 per diem a against Re. 1-4-11 in the previous year; but inter-district variation were noticeable. In the Bijapur District skilled labour was paid for at the rate of eight annas per day. In the Belgaum, Dharwar and Kanara districts the wage level was Re. 0-12-0 to 1-4-0 per day, while in the Kolaba District it ranged between Rs. 1-8-0 and 2-8-0 per day.

For the Kolaba District similar figures have not been reported but it is reported that in the Northern Division of the district the drop in the scale of wages of unskilled labour was about 20 per cent.

The fall in the Kanara District is attributed to the general economic depression and resultant inability of the people to employ much labour. In the Ratnagiri District the cheapness is attributed to the influx of mill-hands from Bombay who returned home on account of trade depression and communal riots in Bombay. It may therefore be said that while wages reacted to a certain extent to the drop in prices of staple food grains in the coast districts, they continued impervious to the drop in prices in the Karnatak.

Emigration and Immigration.—Except for the usual migration of labour from the Chandgad Mahal in the Belgaum District and from the Kolaba and Ratnagiri districts to Bombay and for the seasonal migration of field labour from the below-ghat talukas of the Kanara District to the above-ghat talukas of the same district, there was nothing worth noticing under this head.

A few Mussalmans from the Mangaon and Mahad talukas in the Kolaba District took their families with them to South Africa.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

Though there was depression in trade building activities in this district continued to an appreciable extent as the prices of the building materials were considerably reduced. There was, however, no great

change in wages as labour was available to the same extent as in the previous year.

#### 19. SPECIAL MATTERS.

#### Northern Division.

The civil disobedience movement which was strong in previous years had greatly subsided during the year. The promulgation of the ordinances has had the desired effect and the removal of the principal congress workers had made matters easier for the Revenue Officers. These measures also afforded the people an opportunity to settle down to their usual avocations. The trouble with regard to the collection of land revenue was confined to a few villages of the Borsad Taluka in the Kaira District and to some villages of the Jambusar Taluka in the Broach District which adjoin the Borsad Taluka and the Baroda State territory. There was no migration of people from the villages in the Jambusar Taluka as in Borsad.

Progress made in the maintenance and repairs of small irrigation tanks in charge of the Revenue Department.

A grant of Rs. 28,800 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department in this division during the year 1931-32 and it was distributed as shown below:—

In view of the need for rigid economy the usual programme was not adhered to and only urgent works were carried out during the year.

In Ahmedabad the works were carried out by the special agency, appointed for the purpose while in Kaira they were carried out through the Public Works Department.

In Surat the works were carried out partly departmentally and partly by special agency.

#### Central Division.

Retrenchment.—A 10 per cent, reduction was effected in the cost of the subordinate revenue establishment in each of the districts in the division and as a result posts of 121 clerks (including circle inspectors), 197 talatis and 148 menials were permanently abolished from April 1932. The result has been to throw a heavy strain on the remaining staff. A ten per cent. cut in the pay of all Government servants drawing Rs. 40 per mensem and above came into effect from 1st December 1931. In spite of this the whole of the revenue staff is reported to have worked loyally and cheerfully.

Land distribution work—West Khandesh.—This has been completed almost everywhere except in Nawapur and a few villages in Sakri Taluka. There are still some villages in the Nawapur Taluka in which the waste lands have not yet been cleared of tree-growth. Lands cleared of trees have been given out for eksali cultivation. Land given on eksali leases to persons selected by the Prant Officer or Collector cannot be disposed of permanently as the people are quite unable to pay any occupancy price for the lands at present.

The demand for land in the western part of the Sakri Taluka where there is still some land is very poor as the tract in which the lands are situated is malarious and suffers from lack of communications. Some of the Bhils to whom lands were given on eksali leases have given up the lands. The lands so given up measure 1,648 acres in the Sakri Taluka.

There is also a considerable area of forest land available for grant in Shahada Taluka.

Akrani settlement.—A survey settlement was introduced in 15 villages of the Akrani Mahal in accordance with the orders in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9383, dated 26th August 1929. A special establishment consisting of a talati and a surveyor was entertained during the year and 15 villages were settled in the season up to the end of May.

Additional establishment has been lately sanctioned by Government and it is hoped that the remaining villages will be completed and a survey settlement introduced in them in 1932-33.

Civil disobedience movement.—Some agitators in the Ahmednagar, East Khandesh and West Khandesh districts tried to create trouble by inducing people to hold meetings and pass resolutions against the anna valuation fixed by the local officers and also to send applications for the remission of land revenue on the ground that crops had failed and the anna valuation was pitched higher than was proper. All the applications were carefully enquired into by the district officers. The activities of the agitators were successfully checked by the issue of the ordinances and there was no serious trouble either in the collection season or later.

Village Improvement Committee, Sholapur.—In Sholapur a village improvement committee has been formed with the Collector as its President. The object of this committee is to improve the villagers in all directions, socially, morally, mentally and financially. The committee organised a very successful agricultural show, which was declared open by the Commissioner, at Mandrup—a village near Sholapur.

Southern Division.

Public feeling in the form of agitation for non-payment of land revenue was not a general feature of the division but appeared in the Ankola and Siddapur talukas of the Kanara District, where a section of the people misled by Congress emissaries withheld payments. The amount thus withheld at the end of the year was 2.31 per cent. of the total demand in Ankola and 5.4 per cent. of the total demand in Siddapur. Coercive measures to recover the arrears are in progress. An incipient attempt to stage a no-tax campaign at Kolche, a village in the Yellapur Taluka of the same district, was effectively scotched. Elsewhere in the division public feeling on the whole was loyal and law abiding and cheerfully responded to the efforts to counter the recrudescence of the ruinous Congress activities. The number of newspapers and periodicals published in the division is 40. The press on the whole kept itself within bounds.

Red Cross and Medical Relief.—Three successful baby week shows were held in the Dharwar District. Free distribution of quinine to the public was continued in malarious tracts and the relief thus afforded was supplemented by special medical officers who visited the Kanara and Kolaba districts in the malarial season. In addition, the travelling dispensaries of the Belgaum Red Cross Committee toured in the Kanara and Belgaum districts. The Belgaum Red Cross Committee continued to run an infant welfare centre in the Belgaum Cantonment.

Agriculture and Co-operation.—The Wilson Anti-famine Institute a Bijapur continued to do good work in popularising improved methods a agriculture and cattle-breeding. The sale of iron ploughs however was adversely affected by the prevailing general trade depression. As in last year the villagers of Galgali in the Bijapur District organised a successful cattle show. The district agricultural overseer of the Gadag and Ron talukas in the Dharwar District organised three agricultural shows where the use of improved agricultural methods was demonstrated. The taluka development associations of Roha and Mahad in the Kolaba District continued their useful propaganda work. The value of scientific manure was demonstrated and the agriculturists of Mahad were invited to witness practical gul-making on the farm of Mr. Isane at Kamble.

Notable Events.—A flag march in the Hukeri-Nipani area was successfully carried out by the 2/19 Hyderabad Regiment under Col. Hutchison. In the Uran-Panvel area a similar march was successfully carried out by the 4/8th Punjab Regiment under Captain Southern. In addition to these marches the Royal Armoured Tank Corps visited the Belgaum District and a flag march was conducted in the Sampgaon and Parasgad talukas. The Tanks also visited the Kanara and Dharwar districts.

The Honourable Sir Rustom Vakil, Minister for Local Self-Government, visited the Karnatak districts during the year.

A bye-election for the Bombay Legislative Council was held in the Kanara District to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. L. T. Karki; Mr. Gangoli was the successful candidate.

The Collector of Belgaum as in last year remarks that persons who have no lands come forward to take up lands on this tenure and that lands are granted to those who need them most. The Collector of Dharwar reports that, though this tenure has been imposed in the interest of the occupants, its importance does not seem to have been fully appreciated and that its value will be fully understood within the course of a few years.

The area given out on this tenure is more than that for the previous year, though there was a heavy slump in prices.

#### Bombay Suburban District.

The sub-division of the South Salsette and Ambernath talukas was abolished from 16th October 1931 but the post of the District Deputy Collector was again created from 1st June 1932 in view of the amalgamation of the Collectorate of Bombay and of the Bombay Suburban District, the duty of the District Deputy Collector being entrusted to the Deputy Collector of Bombay in addition to his own duties.

### 20. STATEMENT SHOWING DEMAND, COLLECTION AND ARREARS IN RESPECT OF DEVELOPMENT DEPART-MENT PROPERTIES FOR 1931-32.

The attached statement shows demand, collection and arrears in respect of Development Department properties for the year 1931-32.

The arrears are due to several large sums of money due on lands leased for commercial purposes the lessees of which have failed or are in financial difficulties and to the inability of a number of lessees of agricultural land to pay their rents in consequence of low prices. The arrears of the former roughly represent the amount carried off from last year and those of the latter the excess.

#### 21. RESIDENTIAL SUBURBAN SCHEMES.

Review of the progress of town planning and development schemes for the year ending 31st July 1932.

(a) Suburban Schemes.—The Land Manager, Bombay Suburban District, under the control of the Collector, Bombay Suburban District, is in charge of the disposal of land in suburban schemes Nos. I, II, III, VI, VII, VIII, XV, XVI-Shahar (Kole-Kalyan and Andheri sectors), XVII (Central Salsette Tramway Surplus Land), XVIII and Kurla Diversion Road (Schemes I and II).

During the year the disposals of plots in the suburban schemes are as follows:—

The above total realisation of Rs. 1,50,971-4-0 compared to the last year's realisation of Rs. 3,44,482-15-0 scems low but it may be taken as satisfactory in view of the unprecedented trade depression all over the world and due to the fact that the last year's realisation included land worth Rs. 67,159 sold to the G. I. P. Railway in Kirol which has now given up the idea to buy more land for their staff quarters due to financial stringency and Rs. 45,614 to the St. Anthony's Society for 16 acres of land in Chembur.

- (b) Town Planning Schemes.—Since the last report ending 31st July 1931, no town planning scheme has been completed in the Bombay Suburban District. Two schemes, Andheri Town Planning VI and Ghatkopar Town Planning II, as finally drawn by the Arbitrator, Bombay Suburban District, had been submitted to Government through the local authorities; but they have not yet been sanctioned. The latter scheme which has been drawn on a provisional basis is expected to be received back for completion in detail (i.e.) with provision for works.
- 2. The Schemes Bandra Nos. III and IV are still in the arbitration stage. The Santacruz Town Planning Scheme No. V, the proceedings of which had been ordered by Government to be stayed, will depend on Government orders whether to proceed with the entire draft scheme or to be modified.

(c) The State-aided Building Schemes.—The state-aided building scheme started by the Development Department in 1924 was transferred to the Collector, Bombay Suburban District, on the abolition of that Department in March 1930. Since the transfer of its control up to 31st July 1932 about 70 people have taken advantage, drawing a total amount of about Rs. 2,66,600 as land loans (representing 3th price of land) and Rs. 7,41,340 as building loans. The total number of plot holders since 1924 is 286.

The main feature of this scheme is that it enables middle class people to have a property of their own in 15 years. At the same time, Government land lying vacant in suburbs is capitalised by utilising it as plots for residential purposes. These plots are sold at reasonable prices by receiving 1th purchase price in advance, the balance, viz., 3th price being recoverable in monthly instalments during 15 years with interest. Building loans for erecting bungalows on the plots are also advanced up to half the cost of construction. Borrowers of loans are divided into three categories—private individuals, Government servants, and members of co-operative societies. In the case of Government servants. loans are granted up to joths of the price of land and of the valuation of the building, limiting the total amount according to the salary of the borrower. Up to the end of 1930 the rate of interest was 5 per cent. for Government servants, 54 per cent. for co-operative societies and 6 per cent. for private individuals. Since January 1931 the rate has been raised to 61 per cent. for all.

These loans are recovered in monthly instalments payable at the Collector's office; in the case of Government servants instalments are recovered through their pay bills by the Accountant General. The total monthly receipts amount to about Rs. 30,000 from private individuals, about Rs. 3,000 from Government servants and about Rs. 1,500 from co-operative societies. Due to the financial depression the work of effecting recoveries is not so smooth as it was before, and in some cases coercive steps have to be taken, while in some, concessions in payment such as extension of due date have to be granted.

The arrears although under 1 per cent. are high considering the nature of the business done. The percentage of arrears of good building societies in England (the objects of which correspond very closely with this scheme) is almost infinitesimal and sales of property of extreme rarity. It is significant that arrears are highest in suburban scheme No. VII involving even co-operative societies and the reasons for this will be enquired into.

Of late, the scheme has suffered in popularity due to financial depression, and this year the demand for plots and building loans is rather slack. Rise in local train fares and fall in rents in Bombay City have also discouraged Bombay people from going to suburbs. Moreover most of the plots at favourable sites have been sold out, particularly in suburban scheme No. VII-Khar, which has become a model suburb. During the year ending 31st July 1932 only 14 parties availed themselves of the benefits of this scheme drawing an aggregate amount of Rs. 47,311-11-0 as land loans and Rs. 1,52,942 as building loans. Total recoveries

during the year amounted to Rs. 3,40,549-4-3. These include recoveries out of loans previously granted. During the year 1931-32 (i.e. 1st August 1931 to 31st July 1932) the following loans were sanctioned by Government towards land and buildings in the suburban schemes:—

#### LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT.

#### B-SIND.

R. E. GIBSON, Esquire, C.I.E., I.C.S., Commissioner in Sind.

## I. SEASON.

The season under report was on the whole not satisfactory. The inundation was at first very low. The Bukkur gauge reached 10:5 feet for the first time on 23rd June 1931. Thereafter it began to rise but fell immediately and on 10th July it read 9.5 feet only. The fair irrigating level of 13 feet was first reached only on the 14th July 1931. Subsequently, however, the niver continued to be fairly steady and maintained a moderately good height till the middle of September. The result of the late rise of the river was that transplantation of rice was greatly impeded and other agricultural operations were retarded to a considerable degree and there was accordingly a shrinkage in cultivation. The level of 13 feet and over continued with fluctuations for 27 days as compared with 50 days in 1930, 49 days in 1929, 11 days in 1928 and 37 days the average of last three years. The fair irrigating level of 17 feet on the Kotri gauge was first reached on the 19th July 1931. This or a higher level lasted for a period of 63 days as against 73 days in 1930, 58 days in 1929, 85 days in 1928 and 72 days the average of last three years. The highest reading in the year was 13.9 feet on the 30th July 1931 at Bukkur and 19.3 feet on the 1st September 1931 at Kotri as compared with 16 9 feet on 24th July 1930 and 23 T feet on 30th July 1930 and the maximum levels of 17-9 and 24-1 feet ever previously recorded on these two gauges.

On account of the low in andation, deficiency of water was felt on some canals especially at the tails. The mouth of the Dad canal in the Nawabshah District silted up owing to erosion and in consequence failed to give full supply; the crops on this system suffered from drought resulting in heavy remissions. In Shikarpur Taluka of the Sukkur District, the kharif crop suffered on account of water-logging due to the floods of the last two years.

The rainfall as in the previous year was below the average. The few showers that fell were beneficial to crops but were not adequate for the growth of fodder or for cultivation in Barani tracts. In the Desert Division, the rainfall was quite inadequate in Mithi and Diplo talukas and ill-distributed in the other two talukas. The crops failed throughout the whole division. Mahal Kohistan, then in the Karachi District, was the worst affected owing to inadequate rainfall. The hilly tracts of Kotri Taluka dependent entirely on rain and hill torrents also suffered

from drought. The feasibility of a scheme for putting up a dam to control the Barani Nai water which is calculated to be highly beneficial to the people of Mahal Kohistan is being considered by the Public Works Department. Locusts appeared in some parts of the Hyderabad, Karachi, Nawabshah and Thar Parkar districts but the damage caused was insignificant. The slump in prices continued this year, and to afford some relief to zamindars, Government sanctioned special remissions ranging from 12½ to 25 per cent. for both kharif and rabi crops. The timely assistance rendered by Government was greatly appreciated by the land holders.

The kacha lands were insufficiently flooded on account of the low inundation, and with inadequate rainfall thereafter, the area of rabi cultivation was much reduced in consequence. In the Upper Sind Frontier District owing to a change in the set of the river a great part of the kachas of the Kashmore and Kandhkot talukas were left high and dry. In the Thar Parkar District, however, the rabi season was much better than usual, resulting in an increased area under cultivation.

The state of public health continued to be satisfactory during the year under report. Malaria prevailed as usual throughout the province, but in a mild form. The services of the touring medical officers tended to mitigate suffering to a great extent. Quinine was distributed freely as usual. Pneumonia appeared in the Thar Parkar District and was responsible for 777 deaths as against 736 during the previous year. Cholera also broke out in some parts of the Sukkur, Dadu and Larkana districts. Timely measures were, however, taken to prevent the spread of the disease. Small-pox appeared in all the districts in Sind and was severe in Nawabshah, Larkana and Thar Parkar districts—the number of casualties being 215, 205 and 187, respectively.

The condition of cattle was good except in Hyderabad and Thar Parkar districts where on account of inadequate rainfall there was not sufficient fodder to last for the year. Cattle in the Desert Division were taken to other tracts where fodder was available. Insufficient fodder seriously reduced the vitality of the cattle and made them susceptible to disease which caused heavy mortality in the Hyderabad District, but owing to good rains the condition of the cattle improved considerably.

The total mortality reported among the cattle from contagious diseases rose from 13,375 in the previous year to 29,347 during the year under report. The abnormal increase is exclusively due to rinderpest among cattle (there were 53,782 cases and 27,130 deaths as against 28,109 cases and 10,455 deaths last year) which though prevalent in all the districts of the province assumed the form of an epidemic in the three districts of Karachi, Hyderabad and Thar Parkar. The services of veterinary surgeons were secured. Besides this, hemorrhagic septicemia was responsible for 868 deaths as against 1,731 deaths and parasitic gastritis for 258 as against 259 deaths during the previous year. Preventive inoculations against rinderpest were carried out in the case of 212 out-breaks, the number of animals inoculated being 14,737 against 9,163 inoculated in 103 out-breaks during the previous year. The number of inoculations against hemorrhagic septicemia was 1,420 and of those against black quarter with black quarter serum and aggressin 267 and with black quarter aggressin 310.

## 2. GROSS REVENUE.

## (Column 3 of Appendix I.)

The provincial total under this head shows a net increase of 4.03 lacs over the previous year's figures. This increase was contributed by Hyderabad, Nawabshah and Thar Parkar districts and was due to an increase in cultivation of crops paying rates of assessment higher than the average rate. Decrease in the Upper Sind Frontier, Larkana and Karachi districts is due to territorial changes.

## 3. ALIENATIONS.

## (Column 5 of Appendix I.)

Under this head, there is a net increase of Rs. 0.08 lac in the figures of the year under report as compared with the previous year. It is shared by Sukkur, Thar Parkar, Nawabshah and Hyderabad districts. The increase being small requires no explanation.

#### 4. NET GOVERNMENT REVENUE.

#### (Columns 8 to 11 of Appendix I.)

There is a net decrease of Rs. 11·26 lacs under this head over the figures of the previous year. It is shared by all the districts except Thar Parkar and Hyderabad. Taking the districts individually, Larkana shows the largest decrease, viz. Rs. 9·30 lacs due to territorial changes and decreased cultivation on account of deficiency of water supply and scanty rainfall. Next come the Karachi, Upper Sind Frontier, Sukkur and Nawabshah districts, showing a decrease of Rs. 2·06, 1·48, 4·93, and 2·26 lacs, respectively, decrease in the former two districts being due to the same causes as in Larkana District and in the remaining districts due to shrinkage of the area under cultivation. Thar Parkar and Hyderabad districts were responsible for an increase of Rs. 1·09 and 0·12 lacs on account of increased cultivation. No comparison can be made so far as the Dadu District is concerned.

#### 5. FLUCTUATING MISCELLANEOUS REVENUE.

#### (Column 12 of Appendix I.)

1. 14 S Sept 15

There is a net decrease of Rs. 0.55 lac over the last year's figures. It was shared by all districts except Upper Sind Frontier and Nawabahah which showed an increase of Rs. 0.015 lac each. The enhancement in both these districts was due mainly to increased realizations from the sale of building plots. The greatest decrease in any one district is that of Rs. 0.32 lac in the Hyderabad District, which was attributable to less receipts from remokal fines and malkano. The same reason accounted for the decrease of Rs. 23, Rs. 14 and Rs. 09 lac in the Thar Parkar, Larkana and Karachi districts, respectively.

## 6. REMISSIONS.

## (Column 24 of Appendix I.)

The total amount of land revenue remitted during the year excluding special remissions which were granted on account of continued abnormal fall in prices and which amounted to Rs. 10.37 lacs, was Rs. 9.24 lacs as against Rs. 16.41 lacs in the preceding year. The decrease of Rs. 7.17 lacs is shared by all districts excepting that of Karachi, where Rs. 24,000 had to be allowed as remission in view of scanty rainfall. The decrease is chiefly due to the fact that remission on account of locusts, floods, frost and adverse winds, which amounted respectively to Rs. 2.31, 5.89, 0.43, and 0.59 lacs during the previous year fell to Rs. 0.86, 0.29, .01 and 0.17 lacs in the year under report. Remissions on account of deficiency of water and kalar rose from Rs. 6.26 and 0.9 in the preceding year to Rs. 6.90 and .13 lacs in the year under report.

# 7. SUSPENSIONS. ... (Column 25 of Appendix I.)

The amount of land revenue for which postponement was sanctioned was Rs. 4 79 lacs as against Rs. 7 45 lacs in the previous year. Out of this amount, Rs. 2.21 lacs related to the year under report and Rs. 2.58 lacs to previous years. These figures are included in the balances outstanding at the close of the year and are dealt with in paragraph 10

#### 8. REVENUE FOR COLLECTION.

#### (Column 23 minus columns 24 and 25 of Appendix I.)

The net consolidated demand for collection (exclusive of suspensions and remissions) during the year under report amounted to Rs. 106.91 lacs as against Rs. 86.89 lacs in the previous year.

#### 9: COLLECTIONS.

#### (Column 26 of Appendix I.)

The total collections amounted to Rs. 98 80 lacs or 92 41 per cent. of the net demand as against 88 32 per cent. in the preceding year.

It will appear from the above percentage that the collections in all the districts excepting Hyderabad, and Thar Parkar were satisfactory. The percentage in the Hyderabad District has risen from 80.21 to 88.66 and in the Thar Parkar District from 61.93 to 79.07 as compared with the preceding year. The reasons for the low collections in these districts are the same as reported in the previous year's report, viz. succession of bad seasons on account of one or the other calamity and low prices.

## 10. BALANCES.

#### (Columns 25 and 28 of Appendix I.)

The total outstanding balance at the end of the year was Rs. 12.90 lacs as against Rs. 17.60 lacs in the previous year. Out of this amount, Rs. 0.11 lac has since been recovered leaving a net balance of Rs. 12.79 lacs, of which Rs. 8.56 lacs relate to former years and Rs. 4.23 lacs to the year under report. ## (Appendix II.)

Takavi loans advanced during the year under report amounted to Rs. 0.96 lac as against Rs. 6.95 lacs in the previous year. Of the former, Rs. 0.42 lac were advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act, Rs. 0.52 lac under the Agriculturists Loans Act and Rs. 0.02 lac under the Non-agriculturists Loans Act. The decrease of Rs. 5.99 lacs is shared by all the districts.

Out of the total amount of outstanding balances of Rs. 66.01 lacs (column 4) as against Rs. 67 · 28 lacs in the preceding year, Rs. 55 · 74 lacs were due for recovery during the year, of which Rs. 3.83 lacs or 6.87 per cent. were collected, leaving a balance of Rs. 51.91 lacs which is accounted for as under:

The unauthorized arrears this year as shown above, amounted t Rs. 40.79 lacs as against Rs. 27.18 lacs in the previous year. Th increase is shared by all the districts excepting Upper Sind Frontier, i which there was a decrease of Rs. 0.14 lac. The increase is the greater in the Thar Parkar District which alone was responsible for a little le than half the arrears of the whole province.

The increase in unauthorized arrears is due to the continued gener economic depression coupled with tightness of the money market an slump in prices of all agricultural produce, which made it difficult it the borrowers to repay their loans. The Thar Parkar District had, mor over, suffered from a succession of bad seasons. Recovery in the district is now being effected according to the scheme formulated by the Collector, vide the Commissioner's endorsement, No. 18924-B., date the 24th December 1932, and it is hoped that it will not now be difficu for the khatedars to pay up the arrears.

Suspensions decreased from Rs. 19-13 to Rs. 9-93 lacs, the decrea being shared by all the districts, excepting Sukkur and Upper Sir Frontier. The arrears due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates ar Court of Wards in Sind, increased from Rs. 0:69 lac to Rs. 1:19 lacs in the year under report.

The information required by paragraph 5 of the Government of India's Resolution, No. 2156/321-7, dated the 3rd October 1901, regarding the amount of the agricultural loan business is supplied in the accompanying statement A.

The inspection of takavi works by Mukhtiarkars was satisfactory except in Sukkur and Thar Parkar districts. The inspection of the improvement works by the sub-divisional officers was inadequate in the Nawabshah District. The attention of these officers has been drawn to the inadequacy of their inspection work. In all 9 cases came to notice in which the takavi loans were mis-applied and 27 cases in which the takavi works were not finished within the period prescribed. In six cases out of these, orders have been issued for the recovery of the loans from the defaulters and the question of remaining ones is under consideration.

#### 12. COERCIVE PROCESS.

#### (Appendix III.)

There was a decrease in the number of notices issued under section 152 of the Land Revenue Code in all the districts of the province excepting Nawabshah. The districts responsible for the greatest decrease are, Sukkur and Thar Parkar. The decrease was mainly due to the fact that the first rabi instalment was postponed by one month, as a result of which most of the khatedars paid the rabi instalment in time. The amount of notice fees recoverable during the year was Rs. 88,594 as against Rs. 1,04,822 during the previous year. No action under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code was taken except in Larkana, Dadu and Karachi districts and the number of persons proceeded against was 71. The amount of penalty levied from them was Rs. 124 only. There was an increase from 131 to 204 in the number of cases of distraint of moveable property under section 154, Land Revenue Code, and an increase from 97 to 324 in that of forfeitures under section 153 of the Land Revenue Code.

Action under section 155, Land Revenue Code, was taken only in the Thar Parkar District and the number of cases involved was 2 as against nil in the previous year. Action under section 157 was taken in 3 cases as against nil in the preceding year.

#### 13. AREA.

#### (Appendix IV.)

There is a net decrease of 4,180 acres in the total area of the province (column 3). The decrease is spread over all districts except Sukkur—the greatest decreases, viz. 2,012,294, 1,655,744, and 358,293 acres being recorded in Karachi, Larkana and Upper Sind Frontier districts owing to

territorial changes. An area amounting to 4,124,151 acres went to compose the new Dadu District from Karachi and Larkana districts. The districts of Nawabshah, Hyderabad and Thar Parker showed a decrease respectively of 3,301, 1,438 and 8 acres due to Bigotimeasurement. formation of alluvial lands and survey operations. Increase in the Sukkur District was, however, due to formation of alluvial lands. / Column 4 (unassessed cultivable land) shows a net decrease of 103,105 acres, which is shared by all the districts except Sukkur. Increase in the Sukkur District was due to less khas-mokal cultivation. The decrease of 525,388 in the Larkana District, 28,668 in the Karachi District and 10,212 acres in the Upper Sind Frontier District was due to territorial changes, an area of 607,245 acres being transferred to Dadu District, from the first two districts named., The decrease in the Hyderabad, Nawabshah and Thar Parkar districts amounted to 98,706, 33,864 and 17,345, respectively, that in Hyderabad was due to survey measurement, in the Nawabshah to rectangulation survey and in the Thar Parkar to transfer of lands to other heads and survey measurements.

Under the head "uncultivable land." (column 5), there is a decrease of 61,336 acres which is shared by all the districts except Sukkur where the increase is due to less khas-mokal cultivation and errors in measurements. Taking the districts individually, the largest decrease occurs in the Karachi, Larkana and Upper Sind Frontier districts, viz. 336,973, 1,792,758 and 132,585 acres due to territorial changes and the formation of the new district of Dadu. Next come Hyderabad; Nawabshall and Thar Parkar districts, which show a decrease of 32,279, 30,471, and 13,100 acres, respectively, due to survey measurement and transfer from one head to another. The sub-joined table shows the area taken up permanently and relinquished in each district during the year under report:—

The difference of 386 acres between the total area accounted for in this table and column 4 of the preceding table represents cancelled grants restored to original occupants on appeal and land granted in exchange.

The area of 363 acres shown in column 2 of the above statement was granted free of malkano to military pensioners in the districts of Nawabshah, Thar Parkar and Sukkur. The aggregate realisation from malkano and proceeds of auction amount to Rs. 15,22,677 and the average rate per acre was Rs. 31-12-0 as against Rs. 13-2-0 during the last year. The increase is due to the fact that a large area was disposed of by the Barrage authorities on higher prices.

## 14. HOLDINGS.

#### (Appendix V.)

The return of heldings (District Form V), compiled according to the classification laid down in Government Resolution, No. 9745, dated the 23rd September 1926, is appended. This is a quinquennial return and was due this year.

#### 15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

During the year under report the sea-borne trade of the province suffered a further decline from the already low level of the preceding year. The aggregate value of both the foreign and the coasting trade amounted to Rs. 49 14 crores as against 57 90 crores in the preceding year, a decrease of 8.76 crores or 15 per cent. Foreign trade was 63 per cent. of the total or 31.10 crores and coasting trade 37 per cent. or 18.04 crores.

Under foreign trade there was a decrease both in imports and exports due to the world-wide economic trade depression coupled with political unrest in India throughout the year, and the instability of certain foreign exchanges following the suspension of the gold standard by Great Britain. The total value of exports fell from 18.21 crores to 12.91 crores, i.e. by 29 per cent. and that of imports from Rs. 24.02 crores to 18.19 crores, i.e. by 24 per cent.

The fall in the export trade was mainly confined to cotton and wheat, which accounted for 94 per cent. of the decrease. Shipments of cotton fell from 180,996 tons valued at Rs. 9.55 crores to 128,476 tons valued at Rs. 6.35 crores. The fall was chiefly due to general trade depression in most consuming centres and to the unfavourable parities of Indian cotton to American cotton. The shipments of wheat also fell from 194,917 tons valued at Rs. 1.91 crores to 18,864 tons valued at Rs. 12 crore. Owing to large stocks in other wheat producing countries and the price of Indian wheat being above that of world prices, there was a complete absence of foreign demand for Indian wheat. Even the substantial reduction in the rates of railway freight failed to bring the prices down to export parity.

The decrease in the import trade was mainly confined to sugar, liquors, motor cars and lorries. Cotton piece-goods decreased somewhat in value but increased in quantity. The shipments of sugar fell from 227,809 tons valued at 2.62 crores to 112,219 tons valued at Rs. 1.23 crores. The heavy drop of over 50 per cent. in imports of sugar was due mainly to the greatly curtailed purchasing power and to the very high import duty, the latter acting as a protective measure favouring increased consumption of indigenous sugar. The imports of liquor fell from 1,186,739 gallons valued at Rs. 63 crores to 842,271 gallons valued at 38 crore. The high cost of liquor resulting from the increases in import duty led to diminished consumption. The imports of motor cars and lorries fell from 1,462 valued at Rs. 33 crore in the preceding year to 824 valued at Rs. 17 crore. The decrease is attributed to increase in customs duty coupled with the heavy excise duty on petrol and general trade depression.

The coasting trade showed improvement under both imports and exports. It rose from Rs. 15.67 crores to Rs. 18.04 crores showing an increase of Rs. 2.37 crores. The new salt industry of Karachi showed satisfactory progress, shipments to Calcutta having increased from 16,665 tons to 30,905 tons.

The west wharf was opened for traffic in April 1931. Of the four berths that were constructed last year two are in commission; the other two are not available for traffic. The two working berths are each equipped with a transit shed  $530' \times 160'$  and five electric cranes. The sheds are served both by road and rail and are fully equipped with electric light and fire protection apparatus.

Local trade showed no improvement on account of trade depression brought about by the slump in prices and the tightness of the money markets.

There was no appreciable change in the industrial life of the people except that 5 new rice husking factories were opened in the Karachi District. In the Hyderabad District, however, the number of cotton ginning and rice husking factories decreased by two. Two cotton ginning factories, one Government and the other private, in Thar Parkar District did not work apparently on account of low outturn of cotton. The wheat grinding and the oil pressing industry is in good condition. The number of oil-pressing machines increased by one in the Thar Parkar District. The two leather tanneries at Pano Akil are reported not to be paying owing to the general depression in trade. The brass and copper industries at Khairpur Dahirki are also languishing for want of improvement in the industry. The fish bone crushing factory at Malir is doing reasonably well, and the manure prepared therefrom is exported to the Deccan. The export trade of bones in the Thar Parkar District was brisk owing to mortality in cattle on account of rinder-pest.

The small indigenous cloth industry, however, received some stimulus, on account of the swadeshi and "Buy Indian" movements. The two silk cloth industries at Rohri are doing well.

The manufacture of woollen (farasis) (carpets) and similar articles in the rural area is reported to be declining owing to competition of machine-made and jail-made articles. The Century Flour mill at Shikarpur has been closed but a new big flour mill called the Dembla Mill has been opened at Sukkur. The silk factory on the Sind Canal road at Shikarpur has been restarted under different management. The factory of Seth Gangaram Khushaldas of Gharibabad continues to manufacture sulphuric acid by the Champer process.

The dyeing, lacquer work and other small industries such as those connected with earthen ware "pan" grass, metal work and soap were carried on as usual. The industry of weaving silk lungis and susis at Tatta is gradually declining for want of custom.

The new feeder lines (1) Nawabshah to Padidan and (2) Sakrand to Tando Adam were opened to public traffic during the year under report and are reported to be working well, people in general taking the fullest possible advantage of them. On account of the general depression in trade, the traffic on these lines is much below the mark, yet with the expected increase in the cultivated area on account of the opening of the Barrage canals, it should increase and the lines become sufficiently remunerative.

The electrical company installed at Larkana during the previous year is now well established and is doing good service to the town.

#### 16. PRICES.

The prices of all staple agricultural commodities except cotton which showed a slight increase continued to be low as in the previous year

apparently on account of the world-wide trade depression. The fall in prices though desirable from the point of consumers was harmful for the agricultural class whose condition is far from satisfactory. As in previous years, Government this year afforded relief to the khatedars in the shape of general remissions of land revenue ranging from 121 per cent. to 25 per cent. There was a fall in the price of imported cloth and sugar during the year under report. The price of ghee showed some rise due evidently to insufficient rainfall and consequent lesser production. Some tendency in rise in prices of food stuffs is noticeable but it cannot be said whether the rise is going to be stationary.

#### 17. LABOUR AND WAGES. ...

On account of trade depression and the fall in prices the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour continue to be low almost all over Sind. The fall in prices, the trade depression and the completion of the gigantic Barrage works are the main reasons for the fall in wages of labour. In Karachi, labour was as usual supplemented by immigrants from Kutch, Sind and other places especially the United Provinces.

There was no labour strike or other form of unrest in the province. The relations between the zamindar and the hari were cordial.

#### 18. SPECIAL MATTERS.

#### GRANT OF LAND ON IMPARTIBLE TENURE.

The condition of impartibility is being applied to all survey numbers granted since the issue of the orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 4702/24-III, dated the 6th October 1931, both in Barrage and non-Barrage areas.

The subjoined statement gives an account of the area given out on this tenure in each district:—

RESOLUTION.—In the Presidency (excluding Sind) the season of 1931-32 was on the whole satisfactory, the monsoon being generally mon Bk Ca 31-20

adequate and well distributed and crops normal. In Sind, however, the year was not a satisfactory one. The inundation was at first very low and the rise was late with the result that agricultural operations were considerably retarded. The rainfall also was below the normal and in fact so inadequate that crops failed throughout the Desert Division and in mahal Kohistan of the Karachi District.

2. The most noteworthy feature of the year was that prices of agnicultural commodities which were already abnormally low in 1930-31 showed no tendency to rise and in some cases declined still further. As a result, though crops were good, particularly in the Presidency (excluding Sind) cultivators who had to make cash payments were hard hit. As the causes for the slump were worldwide and no purely local remedy was feasible, all that Government could do was to give temporary relief to agriculturists in the matter of paying land revenue and tagavi. Government decided finally that, having regard both to the necessity of raising revenue when they themselves were in acute financial stringency and of giving relief to people in a period of abnormally low prices, all suspended arrears should be resuspended and only the current year's land revenue should be recovered. In addition Government granted in certain rice growing tracts a special suspension ranging from two to four amas in the rupee.

In Sind they sanctioned special remissions ranging from 12½ per cent. to 25 per cent. for both kharif and rabi crops. The suspensions and remissions granted during the year in the Presidency (excluding Sind) amounted to Rs. 53 47 lakhs and 8 04 lakhs against Rs. 46 34 and 11 05 lakhs, respectively, in the preceding year. In Sind the remissions amounted to Rs. 19 61 lakhs as against Rs. 38 73 lakhs in the previous year.

- 3. Of the net demand of 396 lakhs, only about 2½ lakhs remained as unauthorised arrears as against almost the same demand in 1930-31 and unauthorised arrears of Rs. 5 lakhs. Yet there was no notable increase in the number of coercive steps taken which, as usual, were confined to cases of real recalcitrancy.
- 4. Apart from the question of prices, the year was a good one. The supply of water for drinking and other domestic purposes was sufficient except in the Bahara tract of the Broach District, the junglepatti village of Thana and a few villages in Igatpuri, Khed, Peint, Mulshi and Ambe gaon. Government placed at the disposal of the Commissioner in Sinc and the Commissioners of Divisions the following amounts for making grants-in-aid to district local boards for improving village water supply:—

- 5. The supply of fodder was adequate throughout the Presidency except in parts of Hyderabad and Thar Parkar districts. Rinderpest, foot and mouth diseases and hæmorrhagic septicæmia appeared in most districts but nowhere did they impede agricultural operations. The Veterinary Department gave timely assistance both by preventive inoculation and by control of epidemics.
- 6. Public health was good. The mortality from plague, cholera and small-pox was negligible in the Northern Division. In the Central Division the deaths from these diseases numbered 8,400 as against 14,000 in 1930-31, and in the Southern Division 6,900 as against 8,600.
- 7. The quinquennial statements of holdings show a slight increase over the figures collected five years ago. Since 1924 the distinction between agriculturists and non-agriculturists has been discontinued and the information has now been compiled so as to show the lands cultivated by holders or occupants by themselves or with the help of labourers and the lands held by persons who merely receive rent without taking part in cultivation. The number of persons belonging to the latter class is nearly 20 per cent. of the total, and the area held by them is nearly 25 per cent. of the total occupied area. The figures of the different divisions vary considerably and are:—

The size of holdings varies considerably. In the Northern Division the area up to five acres is 16 per cent., in the Central Division 7 per cent., in the Southern Division 9 per cent., in the Bombay Suburban District and in Sind 3 per cent.

8. The past few years have been full of unusual difficulty in the administration of land revenue. There has been an unprecedented fall in prices accentuated for some time by acute political disturbance. The fact that these difficulties have been surmounted is largely due to the good sense and sympathy displayed by revenue officers. Government desire once again to record their appreciation of the work done by revenue officers of all ranks.

#### 1. SEASON.

# Northern Division.

The season of 1932-33 was on the whole satisfactory in the Gujarat districts of the division. The regular monsoon commenced later than usual, i.e., in the first week of July.

In Ahmedabad the rainfall in the beginning of July gave a good start for sowing operations and was thereafter sufficient and well distributed except in a few villages of the South Daskroi and Dhandhuka talukas, Sanand Mahal and the Nalkantha villages of the Dholka where it was deficient for the rice crop.

In Kaira the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed and on the whole it was favourable to agriculture.

In the Panch Mahals the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed till 15th July. Due to heavy rains from 16th July to 15th August the maize crop was slightly damaged. Thereafter the rainfall was sufficient after a break.

In Broach the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed throughout the district and the outturn of crops was generally good.

In Surat also, the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed and on the whole, the outturn of crops was good.

In Thana the season was fairly satisfactory. Regular monsoon commenced on the 15th June. The rainfall gave a good start for sowing operations and was on the whole sufficient and well distributed. The coutturn of crops was almost as satisfactory as during the preceding year and the average yield of paddy was 10 to 11 annas. The average rainfall in each district of the division during the year under

The season 1932-33 was on the whole fairly satisfactory. The rains set in the third week of June and gave a start for kharif sowings. The fall in July and August was general and sufficient in all districts and in some places it was heavy and caused some damage to the standing crops. The break that followed, however, improved the situation and the damage caused was not appreciable. The rain in September and October was useful for rabi sowings and standing kharif crops.

. The situation in each of the districts is given below.

: Ahmednagar.—The rains were generally late but by July 10th there had been sufficient rain all over the district except in the southern portion of Shrigonda Taluka and the major part of Shevgaon Taluka where kharif sowings were retarded. Subsequent fall in July was general

and sufficient throughout the district except in the southern portion of Shrigonda Taluka and Shevgaon where it was unevenly distributed. By the middle of August the position in Shrigonda worsened owing to shortage of rain and the area under kharif was considerably reduced. In Newasa, Nagar and Jamkhed, the situation was on the whole good. In Pathardi, Parner and Jamkhed rain was excessive which retarded kharif sowings. During the first week of September there was general and sufficient rainfall which benefitted the standing kharif crops and facilitated rabi sowings all over the district except in Jamkhed Mahal, Shrigonda and Karjat talukas where they were retarded by excessive moisture. The cotton crop and bajri also suffered owing to continuous rain. In Pathardi the bajri and cotton crops turned yellowish and in Shevgaon the cotton crop became stunted. The rain in October was useful to the standing rabi crops but in some places it was too heavy and caused some damage to the jowari crop. On the whole the season was fair and the annewari of the majority of villages was 8 annas and above but below 11 annas. East Khandesh.—The monsoon set in towards the end of the second week of June 1932 but it was weak everywhere and particularly in Erandol, Parola and Bhusawal talukas and Edlabad Peta where in consequence sowing of kharif crops was retarded. During the first week of July rainfall was general throughout the district but insufficient in many parts. It strengthened as the month went on and during the last week it was general and sufficient everywhere for kharif sowings being completed. The rain in the second and third weeks of August was seasonable throughout the district except in some places where it was excessive and as a result the standing crops were washed away and had to be resown. In September the fall was general in the first half of the month but in the second half it was very little. In October half of the district had rainfall over an inch but in the other half it was very small.

The Collector observes that the general character of the monsoon did not suit the cotton crop as well as jowari, groundnut and bajri but the annewari of the latter three crops was better than that of cotton On the whole the season was fair and the annewari of crops ranged from 8 to 12 annas, except in a few villages where it was below 8 annas.

West Khandesh.—The monsoon commenced on the 27th June 1932 and the rainfall by August 15th was sufficient and well distributed all over the district except in Nawapur Mahal where it was excessive and the kharif sowings were on that account retarded. In the second fortnight of July and the first fortnight of August the fall was incessant and heavy with the result that the growth of crops was stunted and weeding operations were retarded. Then there was a break which was of considerable use to the standing kharif crops. In the first week of September there was opportune, well distributed and sufficient rainfal all over the district and it was very useful to all standing crops as well as for rabi sowings. In October the fall was general and sufficient

but it damaged rabi sowings to some extent in Nawapur Peta and Taloda Taluka. There was no rain thereafter excepting a few drizzles in Sakri, Nawapur, Shirpur and Sindkheda talukas which benefitted the standing rabi crops. Rat pest was reported in parts of Sindkheda, Shirpur, Nandurbar and Shahada talukas where the germinating seedlings were damaged by rats. A campaign of rat destruction was undertaken and vigorously carried on by the Mamlatdars concerned with the help of overseers of the Agricultural Department by using cyno gas which was found to be an effective remedy. The damage done by rats on the whole was not very great. On the whole the kharif and rabi season was good and the annewari of kharif and rabi crops ranged from 6 to 12 annas.

Wasik.—The rain commenced in the third week of June and the fall was good and well distributed in the Dangi parts of the district. Elsewhere it was not sufficient. The situation, however, improved in July and August in which months the fall was general and sufficient throughout the district. In Chandor Mahal and the Deshi parts of the Dindori Taluka the sowing of kharif crops was retarded owing to excessive rainfall and in some villages of Kalwan Taluka kharif crops had to be sown twice. In September there was a break in the rains for about a fortnight in the Nasik and Dindori talukas and Chandor Mahal followed by timely and well distributed rainfall which proved useful to rabi crops and also benefitted the standing kharif crops. On the whole the rainfall was good and the anna valuation of crops ranged from 8 to 12 annas.

Poona.—The monsoon broke in the third week of June throughout the district and the rainfall was above normal in the Eastern Division. Rabi rains were sufficient but were excessive in Haveli, Purandhar and Bhimthadi talukas and Sirur Peta. In the Western Division the rainfall was sufficient and well distributed. Owing to excessive rain some damage was done to the standing crops such as bajri, (kharif) jowar and potatoes but the damage was not appreciable. The rabi crops such as jowari and wheat suffered to some extent by unfavourable winds in the Haveli Taluka and by "khaira" and "tambhera" disease in Sirur Taluka and "mava" in Indapur Taluka. On the whole the outturn of kharif and rabi crops was above normal ranging from 8 to 10 annas and the season was favourable to the agriculturists.

Satara.—The monsoon did not begin until the 17th of June and then too it started feebly in the western part of the district where sowing of rice, nachani and sava was undertaken. In the eastern part, kharif sowings could not be made except in the light soils till after the 3rd of July. In deep black soils sowing was retarded till the third week of July by which time there was sufficient rain everywhere in the district. In Satara, Karad and Khanapur talukas the rain was continuous and heavy from 17th July to 8th August and hence sowing of kharif crops was retarded in these talukas. Thereafter there was a welcome break which helped completing kharif sowing and weeding operations in all parts of the district. In the last week of August and first week of

September there was again continuous and heavy rain which threatened the growth of kharif crops but the break from 8th September materially improved them. The rain in October was beneficial to groundnut and the germinated rabi crops but adversely affected to a small extent the bajri crop which was then in flower On the whole the rainfall during the year, though sometimes unseasonable, was well distributed and sufficient all over the district. The outturn of kharif and rabi crops was fairly good throughout the district, the anneweri of both the crops ranging from 5 to 42 annas.

Sholopor.—The rains in the month of June were not sufficient except in Madha, Karmala and Malsiras talukas and hence the kharif area in some talukas was less as compared with 1931-32. On the other hand excessive rain was responsible for the reduction of kharif area in the Karmala Taluka. In July the rainfall was good throughout the district except in Sangola Taluka where the same condition continued in August. The rainfall in September was deficient for rabi sowings but this proved, if anything, a relief to the standing kharif crops after the excessive rains in August. The rains in October were popious and general and facilitated sowing of rabi. In November the fall was sufficient and beneficial to the standing rabi crops in many places. The annewari of kharif and rabi crops ranged from 8 to 11 annas and over and on the whole the kharif as well as rabi seasons were good.

Cattle and fodder.—The condition of cattle was on the whole fair Cattle diseases such as rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, black quarter and hemorrhagic septicesmia prevailed in all districts but did not seriously affect agricultural operations as preventive measures such as inoculation, etc., were promptly taken. The number of deaths from all diseases was 17,562 as against 7,243 in 1931-32. The total number of attacks and deaths from all diseases, in each district were as under the such district were

Cholera appeared in almost all districts and was virulent particularly in Ahmednagar and Sholapur districts. Necessary anti-cholera inoculations were made in almost all districts to check spreading of the disease. The number of deaths from small pox which also prevailed in all districts except West Khandesh was not large. Plague prevailed in Pandharpur, Sangola and Barsi talukas of the Sholapur District and in all talukas of the Satara District except Koregaon Taluka and Mahablashwar Mahal. It was virulent in Tasgaon and Walwa talukas and took a toll of 3,001 lives. Measures to check the spread of the disease were taken by special medical officers. There were some cases of plague in the Poons District also.

### Southern Division

The season was on the whole satisfactory though the rainfall was capricious, insufficient when most needed, and excessive when moderate showers were required. These vagaries, beyond postponing the normal stages of agricultural operations, did not materially mar the harvest.

2. In the Belgaum District ante-monsoon showers of April and May helped preparatory tillage but the heavy fall in July and August retarded kharif sowing in some parts of the district, and prevented germination where the sowing had been completed. The rains in August and September helped the germination of the sown area but the heavy falls in October and November adversely affected the standing crops. Harvesting of paddy in consequence was delayed and standing paddy in Khanapur Taluka was slightly damaged. The kharif harvest was, however, fairly good, From November onwards conditions were more favourable and rabi crops flourished but unfavourable winds in March damaged the rabi outturn to a small extent. The average anna valuation of kharif crops ranged from 9 to 10 annas and that for rabi crops was about the same. In the Bijapur District ante-monsoon showers, necessary for successful preliminary agricultural operations, were punctual and the regular monsoon appeared late in June. The rainfall in June and July was adequate but the long break in August and September retarded the growth of the sown kharif. The aituation improved in

October and a fair harvest was reaped. The season for rabi crops was good, though unfavourable winds in January decreased the outturn. In the Dharwar District the season opened well and kharif crops flourished till about October when they were damaged by heavy rains. Owing to excessive moisture in the soil, weeds grew in abundance and retarded the growth of rabi crops and the untimely rains in March and April worsened the situation. The season, therefore, was unfavourable both to kharif and rabi crops. Though the outturn was below average, a six-anna kharif crop and a seven-anna rabi crop were reaped.

3. In the coastal districts the total rainfall was less than in the previous year. Rainfall though seasonable was marred by excessive downpours in July and August. In the Kanara District this excessive fall stimulated the koleroga pest but the break in August arrested the ravages of this fungus disease. The paddy crop, on the other hand, languished as the result of this break in the rains, but the prospect were revived by the rainfall in September. Harvesting operation were retarded by the unusual showers in October and November. This however, did not result in damage to the crops. In the Kolaba District, the monsoon appeared punctually at the end of May but the rains held off in August. The situation improved in September and finally a normal harvest was reaped. The season in the Ratnagiri District was similar to that in the Kolaba District except that in the first half of August this district had sufficient rain to nourish paddy seedlings. But as the latter part of August was dry, the standing kharif withered to some extent and the prospects were only revived by the timely showen in September. October rains delayed the harvest. The season on the whole was good and the rice annewari ranged from 11 to 12 annas.

Water supply was adequate and the condition of cattle continued to be satisfactory except in the Ratnagiri District where it is reported that cattle diseases were responsible for taking a toll of 859 animals as agains 35 in the previous year. The supply of drinking water was generally sufficient. Plague, small-pox and cholera appeared as usual, but the toll taken by plague was particularly heavy. #### Bombay Suburban District.

The monsoon broke in the first week of June. The rainfall was evenly distributed and sowing operations were-undertaken in the middle of June. Transplantation was completed by the end of July. Owing to absence of rain during the last two weeks of August, the growth of rice was stunted and the crop was on the point of withering but the fall in the beginning of September saved the situation. The heavy rainfall in the middle of October damaged the crops to some extent as the reaping operations were then in progress. The total rainfall during the year amounted to 78 inches and 35 cents in South Salsette Taluka and 107 inches and 24 cents in Ambernath Taluka. On the whole the yield was normal, the annewari in both talukas being 10 annas.

Cattle and fodder.—The condition of cattle was on the whole very fair and fodder supply was adequate. Green grass was also available in sufficient quantity. There were no epizootic diseases.

Water supply.—Supply of water for drinking was sufficient. There is no irrigation in this district.

Public health.—Small-pox was raging in several villages in the district. Prompt steps were taken for free vaccination which effectively checked the spread of the disease though there were a few deaths. There was no other epidemic during the year under report.

The increase in Belgaum and Dharwar was mainly attributable to the levy of non-agricultural assessment and the grant of unassessed land for cultivation while that in Bijapur was due to levy of non-agricultural assessment on alluvial lands.

The increase in Kanara was partly due to levy of assessment under section 117-B of the Land Revenue Code on forfeited lands entered as Government waste and partly to the fixing of assessment on disforested lands given out for cultivation and to non-agricultural assessment on lands granted for non-agricultural purposes.

The decrease in Kolaba and Ratnagiri was due to fall in the value of rents in kind recovered from lease-holders.

The decrease in Belgaum was mainly due to the exclusion of the saranjam village called Ganeshwadi held by the Chief of Kurundwad, which was wrongly accounted for in the village accounts of Kagwad in Athni Taluka and to the levy of full assessment on certain sanadi lands.

The decrease in Dharwar was due to some sanadi lands being made khalsa or forfeited, full assessment being then leviable.

The increase in Kolaba was mainly due to reduction in judi payable by the inamdar of Narangi in Alibag Taluka as decided in Civil Suit No. 182 of 1930.

RESOLUTION.—Though the rains in the season 1932-33 came rather late the monsoon was on the whole a good one and season in the Northern and Central Divisions of the Presidency proper proved fairly satisfactory. The season in the Southern Division also was fairly satisfactory, though excessive October rains spoilt to some extent a kharif harvest that had promised well in the Dharwar District, where also untimely rains in March and April did damage to the rabi crop.

In Sind the season was fair, and markedly better than in the previous year. The river was somewhat late in rising, while the sudden fall after September 9th, 'adversely affected the rice crop in lower Sind. The season was a particularly noteworthy one by reason of the opening of the Barrage canals, which, though expectations were not altogether fulfilled in certain areas, on the whole worked well. The Larkana District was an area in which the canals at the start did not convey the flow expected. Kharif supply was inadequate and there was a consequent shrinkage of cultivation. But this failure was to some extent offset by a good supply for rabi, and an increase in rabi cultivation throughout the District.

Rainfall in Sind was adequate, and the province was not attacked by locus, pests. There were floods, and villages were submerged (without loss of huban life or loss of cattle) in Sukkur and Shikarpur talukas, owing to breaches of the Sukkur Begari Bund. Kharif crops were lost but, as was natural, fabilities for rabi cultivation, and the rabi crops, were good.

The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was everywhere sufficient except in a few small areas where a hot-weather shortage occurs yearly.

Government granted in Sind 23,000 in Northern Division ... 24,650 and in Southern Division ... 24,350

for making grants-in-aid to district local boards for the improvement of village water supply.

Supply of fodder was everywhere sufficient in the Presidency proper, and the same was the case in Sind generally, save that in the Dadu District there was a shortage at the beginning of the year, owing to deficient rainfall. But in this District also timely rainfall later improved the situation.

In the Northern Division of the Presidency diseases of cattlerinderpest, foot and mouth disease and hæmorrhagic septicæmia made their appearance in all districts—but the veterinary assistants did much with their timely help and advice to keep mortality down. In all some 9,000 cattle were inoculated.

These diseases of cattle made their appearance fairly widely in the Central Division also, but preventive measures were promptly taken and agricultural operations were not seriously interfered with. In this division \$2,000 cattle were attacked by disease, and there were 17,500 deaths.

Disease of cattle in the Southern Division was not serious except for a heavy toll of 859 deaths in the Ratnagiri District.

In Sind total deaths from contagious diseases of cattle were 12,480 as compared with a mortality of 29,347 in the previous year. As the Local Boards have issued instructions to their establishment to co-operate with the subordinate revenue establishment in reporting out-breaks of cattle disease it is to be hoped that through timely steps being taken when out-breaks occur the future may see a still more marked improvement.

Public health was good in the Northern Division of the Presidency during the year under report. But in the Central Division, Ahmednagar and Sholapur suffered severely from cholera, as did East Khandesh to a lesser extent: while in Sholapur plague also took considerable toll. In Satara plague assumed serious proportions, 4,000 deaths occurring. Measures to check the spread of the disease were taken by special medical officers.

In the Southern Division too plague, cholera and small-pox accounted for 13,500 deaths in all—plague being particularly severe in the districts above Ghats while small-pox principally affected the Konkan.

In Sind the state of public health was on the whole satisfactory. Cholera of a less virulent type occurred in Hyderabad and Thar Parkar but the spread was checked before serious proportions were assumed. Small-pox appeared to some extent in all districts while in Thar Parkar there were 880 deaths from pneumonia.

Prices of agricultural produce though not going below those of the previous year showed little or no improvement the only improvement of any note being that in the price of wheat in Sind due to its export to the Punjab where the crop had suffered damage by certain crop-diseases. The year under report being the third of the slump, Government again found it necessary to give relief to the agriculturists on account of these flow prices. They decided that in no case should more than one year's assessment be levied in any district of the Northern Division, the Bombay Suburban District and the Kolaba and Ratnagiri Districts of the Southern Division. All suspended arrears which were due for collection were ordered to be resuspended. In addition Government granted in certain rice growing talukas a special suspension of 2 to 4 annas in the rupee. As regardy villages in the Central Division Government ordered that arrears up to one extra instalment (half a year's land revenue) only should be recovered even though

the annewaris might justify more. As regards Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Kanara, Government modified the annewari rules with the result that remissions and suspensions were granted on a more liberal scale than usual.

In Sind, Government drew a distinction between the Barrage and non-Barrage areas in view of the fact that the former had an assured supply of water and had been subjected to revision settlements based on the slump prices prevailing in 1932. A comparison of those prices with the prices ruling later in the year showed that the variation had been generally slightly favourable to the zamindars. Government therefore decided that any general rebate on assessment was not necessary in the Barrage area. In the non-Barrage area they sanctioned remissions in kharif ranging from 20 to 25 per cent. and in rabi from 12½ to 25 per cent. The total loss of revenue involved in the grant of remissions in Sind, amounted to Rs. 7.94 lakhs while the resuspensions and suspensions under the ordinary rules and under the special orders in the Presidency proper amounted to Rs. 44.49 lakhs. Apart from the question of loss of Government revenue on account of low prices it is satisfactory to note there was little recalcitrancy by ryots in respect of the payment of their dues, the better conditions of the previous year, due to an improved political atmosphere continuing. Percentage of collections on net revenue demands was good throughout the Presidency.

In the sphere of Industry and Commerce this Presidency continued to feel the effect of the world wide economic depression. But it is satisfactory to report that the very important textile industry of Ahmedabad continued to flourish in spite of the depression, six new mills being opened during the year, bringing the total number up to 99. In Sholapur some of the local mills were able to do good business in finer quality goods this improvement being due principally to the lessening of public antipathy to such articles.

In Sind both foreign and coasting trade showed a further decline the aggregate value of both amounting to Rs. 44.80 crores as against 49.14 crores in the preceding year. The decrease in export trade was mainly confined to wool and wheat; wool shipments falling from 10,417 tons to 8,951 tons. Shipments of wheat ceased practically altogether. The price in India remained well above export parity with the result that there was a total absence of demand for Indian wheat from Europe. One noteworthy feature of trade at Karachi was the drop of sugar imports by 21 per cent. This was attributable to the increased production of sugar in India. This production is developing rapidly under the protection afforded by the present rates of import duty and on account of the decreasing purchasing power of the consuming public. This Presidency has shared in the development of the sugar manufacturing industry as the successful working and expansion of the sugar factory at Belapur and the opening of sugar factories in the Ahmednagar and Poona districts show.

The land revenue administration in spite of the subsidence of activity directed to the encouragement of non-payment of dues had perforce to be carried on under difficult circumstances on account of the low prices. That collections should have been so good without any abnormal repourse to coercive measures redounds to the credit both of revenue officers of all ranks, and to the ryots, the great majority of whom showed themselves in the year under report to be facing adverse circumstances with determination.

The increases shown above were due to increase in the sums realized on account of occupancy price for land.

The decreases noted against East Khandesh and West Khandesh were due to less grants of lands for cultivation or for buildings. The decrease noted against Nasik was due to less receipts of revenue under section 55, Land Revenue Code. In Satara it is reported to be due to the fact that last year there was recovery of arrears of scale judi imposed on patils' and kulkarnis' lands from 1926-27 (i.e., the year in which second revision settlement was introduced).

The increase in Belgaum was partly due to levy of water rate under section 55, Land Revenue Code, and leasing out of Government waste lands for grazing.

The decrease in Bijapur was due to fewer building sites than in the preceding year being sold for non-agricultural purposes owing to lack of demand.

The vast decrease in Dharwar was due to smaller demand for Government lands and consequent smaller realization by way of occupancy price.

The increase in Kanara was due to the fact that the sale proceeds of crops raised on forfeited lands were credited to this head.

The increase in Kolaba was due to sale of more building sites, and to recovery of past years' assessment fixed by the Survey Department on lands given out for reclamation.

The large increase in Ratnagiri was mainly due to the recovery of arrears of non-agricultural assessment for the past five years in Malvan city survey area.

The net increase of Rs. 47,613 is due to the detection of temporary non-agricultural uses and issue of collection orders for such uses for the past years.

In the whole of the Belgaum District and in the talukas of Hungund, Badami and Bagalkot (including Bilgi Petha) of the Bijapur District the usual annewari limits of 4 and 6 annas were raised to 5 and 7 annas, respectively. As regards recovery of suspended arrears the usual annewari limits of 6 annas and under 8 annas were also raised to 8 annas and under 10 annas and in cases where the annewari was 10 annas and above the recovery of suspended arrears was limited to 1½ assessments, throughout both the districts. No special concessions were extended to Dharwar District except that not more than 1½ assessments were ordered to be collected even though the annewari was 11 annas and over. In Kolaba and Ratnagiri districts the recovery was limited to the current year's assessment only. In addition to this a further concession by way of suspension was given by Government as in last year to the extent of 3 annas and 2 annas respectively.

A general suspension of 4 annas in the rupee in case of 26 villages of Kittur tract in Sampgaon Taluka of the Belgaum District was also continued by Government. The Collector of Belgaum has, however, granted suspensions according to the special annewari limits for this tract also, where the suspensions admissible exceeded the 4 anna limit and has applied for ex-post facto sanction of Government. The matter is being considered.

In Ratnagiri the amount of Rs. 37,742 suspended in the year was on account of expenses of attached khoti villages, which will eventually be recovered or remitted as usual when the villages are restored to the khots or lapsed to Government in due course. In Kanara the recovery was

also limited to one year's assessment. The amount of Rs. 527 shown in column 3 of the table above was suspended as a special case under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5387/28, dated 25th August 1933, out of the current year's land revenue and out of the amount of Rs. 18,194 shown in column 5 of the table an amount of Rs. 640 which was included in the amount of unauthorised arrears last year was suspended subsequently. The balance of Rs. 17,554 represents the suspended arrears of 1930-31 which was resuspended under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5710/28, dated 16th February 1933. The amount of Rs. 640 was also resuspended under the Government Resolution of 16th February 1933.

# Bombay Suburban District.

The amount of suspensions during the year was Rs. 1,10,813 as against Rs. 57,235 in the past year. It includes Rs. 13,855 on account of suspension at annas three in the rupee granted by Government as a result of the slump in prices (vide Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5710/28, dated 27th February 1933). The remaining amount of suspension is due to the collection orders being held in abeyance pending further orders in disputed cases.

There were unauthorised arrears more or less in all talukas of the Ahmedabad District except Modasa Mahal. Steps are being taken to recover the arrears as much as possible.

In the Kaira District, Mehmedabad, Matar, Nadiad and Borsad talukas are responsible for the unauthorised arrears.

In the Panch Mahals, Godhrs, Dohad and Jhalod are responsible for these arrears. The arrears are mainly due to the generally poor economic condition due to slump in prices. The arrears in Thana are small and call for no remarks.

Voluntary payments made during the year under report amounted to Rs. 41,362.

### Southern Division. The Control of the Control

The enclosed statements (Appendix No. II) show the tagai transactions during the year ending 30th September 1933. The amount collected represents 15,86 per cent. of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year, as against 12.40 per cent. in the previous year. This shows an increase in percentage of collection in spite of the depression in economic conditions.

During the year under review, Dharwar District represents the largest field for tagai operations, as an advance of Rs. 36,768 nearly (larger than in any of the remaining five districts) has been granted under the

Land Improvement and Agriculturists' Loans Acts. Last year Bijapur District had occupied the top of the list in this matter.

In Bijapur District, the special tagai staff consisting of three circle inspectors and three peons under them sanctioned for one year from 1st March 1932 was disbanded from 1st January 1933, as much of the tagai allotment was surrendered, there being no demand for the same. Out of four posts of permanent special head karkuns, two were abolished from 1st September 1933 as a measure of retrenchment.

The special features of the tagai administration in the division during the year under review are-

- (i) that the Burmah Shell Company started tractor ploughing in Gadag Taluka and Mundargi Petha of the Dharwar District and a sum of Rs. 3,176 was advanced for that purpose. The area ploughed by the tractor was 196 acres and the number of borrowers was 18. The work has been completed by the company and it is reported that they are continuing their experiments;
- (ii) that in Kanara District, which was declared as a special tract for the grant of tagai under the Agriculturists' Loans Act a special allotment of Rs. 9,000 was made to enable betel-nut gardeners to purchase sprayers and chemicals to carry on operations against "Kole-Roga" Out of this amount Rs. 3,822 only have been advanced so far.

This year also the inspection of tagai works made by Prant Officers in the Bijapur District, though it satisfies the scale laid down in the last but one note under paragraph 13 of the Tagai Manual, is not in proportion to the large number of works that are in progress there. The number of works in progress is 541 and the number inspected is only 29. If inspection on a larger scale is made it will have salutary results.

There was one case of misapplication in Kanara District and the advance of Rs. 100 involved in it is being recovered. In the Belgaum District also there was one case of misapplication which involved an amount of Rs. 350 but the whole of the amount has been fully recovered. There were no such cases reported by the Collectors of other districts.

In Dharwar District Rs. 2,831 were summarily recovered in five cases and in Bijapur District Rs. 20,396 in 68 cases were summarily recovered as the borrowers failed to execute the works in time. The Collector of Kanara reports that in one case orders for summary recovery had been issued but that since the borrower has applied for some concessions the case is under consideration. Coercive measures were adopted in 8 cases in Kanara District.

In Belgaum District the Mamlatdar of Belgaum Taluka advanced Rs. 1,953 out of Rs. 2,000 allotted to his taluka, under the Agriculturists' Loans Act instead of under the Land Improvement Act. That advance is irregular as Belgaum Taluka is not declared a special tract and steps are in progress to get the advance regularised by obtaining Government sanction. Both the Collectors of Belgaum and Bijapur report that the heavy unauthorised arrears at the close of the year are due to the fact that the defaulters were unable to pay up the dues more on account of the economic depression and consequent fall in the prices of agricultural products than to the unsatisfactory season.

Grant of forest or assessed waste land for cultivation was one of the main causes responsible for increase in the Ahmednagar, Poona and Satara districts. Forfeiture of lands for failure to pay land revenue or breach of conditions attached to grants made on the restricted tenure was the principal reason for the decreases shown against East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik and Sholapur.

Out of 9,896 notices of demand issued, Ahmednagar and Poons were responsible for 3,018 and 2,985, respectively. There were 502 cases of distraint of moveable property as against 361 in the preceding year.

The increase in the number of notices under section 152 was shared by Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Ratnagiri; Kanara and Kolaba showed a decrease. The highest number of notices issued was 1,022 in Kanara as against 1,183 of the previous year.

There was a marked decrease in the number of persons proceeded against under section 148 in all the districts except Dharwar where the number showed considerable increase.

The striking fall in respect of distraint of moveables was mainly contributed by Kanara where the no-tax campaign was waning, though there was a slight decrease in Dharwar and increase in the remaining districts.

The decrease in the number of cases under section 153 was chiefly shared by Kanara and Ratnagiri, though there was a slight decrease in Bijapur also. The other districts showed an increase.

Action under section 155 was taken in only two cases in Kanara.

Majority of khatedars were reluctant to make payment on due dates and tended to evade payments on one or other pretext. This absence of voluntary payments on the part of the khatedars necessitated more coercive measures this year.

## 15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

### Northern Divisien.

There were 93 spinning, weaving and other mills in Ahmedabad on let August 1932 and six new mills were added during the year. The number at the end of the year thus stood at 99. The working condition in the mills was good and in spite of general depression in trade and foreign competition, the textile industry in Ahmedabad continued to prosper.

Of the two mills at Nadiad in the Kaira District one (the Manor Mill) remained closed throughout the year, as before, owing to financial difficulties, while the other (the New Shorrock Mill) continued to work and it is in a flourishing condition. There are 35 ginning factories and presses in the Kaira District and most of them are situated in the Thasra and Anand talukas. Out of these three at Thasra and two at Dakor did not work owing to depression in trade. The hand-spinning and hand-weaving industry carried on by the backward class of people and which is chiefly confined to the Borsad Taluka is dying out. There is one milk dairy at Anand while there are 86 creameries mostly in Anand, Borsad and Nadiad talukas. There is one match factory at Anand.

In the Panch Mahals, the principal trade is in timber and grain. The groundnut and flour mills continued to work well. The working of the factories and presses was moderate as during the preceding year. Dohad continued as usual to be the important grain market. The

export of grain, timber and forest produce continued. On account of depression in trade the lime business in Dohad was slack.

The Shivrajpur and Bamankuva manganese mines did not work as usual as the business was slack owing to the general depression in trade.

In Broach, cotton is the chief product and constitutes the important trade of the district. There were 32 ginning factories and 10 presses during the year. Out of these 25 ginning factories and 10 presses worked for about three months and the rest remained closed.

Out of three mills in Broach one did not work while the remaining two worked during the year. The river borne trade of the ports of Kavi, Tankaria and Dehej showed a noticeable increase in import compared with the import of the preceding year. The export from Kavi and Dehej showed a decrease while that from Tankaria showed a noticeable increase.

In Surat cotton is the principal produce and two cotton mills, 30 ginning factories and 13 cotton presses worked during the year. The local silk and embroidery business is in a bad way owing to the general depression in trade. The chief exports of the district are grass, timber, firewood, mangoes, molasses, vegetables, rice and cotton. Grass and firewood were exported to Bombay from Chikhli and Bulsar talukas as usual.

In Thana, rice (which is the principal product of the district) of the value of about Rs. 19 lacs was exported exclusive of paddy—which was exported to the extent of Rs. 7 lacs. Other articles of exports in the district were timber charcoal, grass, salt bricks, lime, fresh and dry fish, vegetables, plantains, betel leaves, saries and woollen cloth. Timber worth about Rs. 12½ lacs, charcoal worth about Rs. 9 lacs, plantains worth about Rs. 2 lacs, betel leaves worth about Rs. 12 lacs, grass worth about 8 lacs of rupees were exported to Bombay and other places during the year. The iron workshop at Bhiwandi which manufactures machinery and other accessories for rice mills etc. continued to work as usual. The number of hand looms and the number of workmen at Bhiwandi continued to remain at 2,000 and 5,000 respectively, as during the preceding year. In addition to this there are two factories with 38 power looms. The Raymond Woollen Mill at Thana worked with some interruptions and employed about 525 workmen during the year. One woollen carpet factory was newly opened at Shahpur. The match factory at Thana continued to make satisfactory progress and exported matches worth about 41 lacs of rupees. It provided work for poor women and children. The bone mill at Kelwa worked for a few months. REPORTED FRANCISCO TO LEWIS BOOK

### Central Division.

Trade in general has continued to be in a depressed condition. The principal articles of trade in the division are food grains, cotton and oil seeds. The prices of food grains remained low throughout the year. Jaggery is a money crop in the irrigated tracts of Poona and Ahmednagar.

districts but the low prices of this commodity have hit the cane-growers very hard. Owing to fall in prices of cotton the area under cotton is decreasing, notably in East Khandesh. The advance of groundnut from the poor to the good soil at the expense of cotton during the recent years has been most spectacular. On this point the Collector of East Khandesh observes as follows:—

"The (groundnut) crop increased greatly in acreage and the total area under this crop was not behind the area under cotton. Groundnut has generally been considered as suitable for poorer soils. But in the year under report the sowing was extended to deep soil lands also. Groundnut is a popular crop at present because it requires less rain than cotton, is not subject to many deteriorating causes which may affect cotton and so is more certain to give a satisfactory return, even in years of indifferent rainfall. It has a further cause for popularity in that it ripens early and can be sold in October and so brings in money much sooner than cotton."

The area under cotton and groundnut during the four years ending 1932-33 in East Khandesh was as follows:—

In the Satara district owing to the continued depression in trade agriculturists were not so anxious to grow groundnut as in normal years while the crop grown did not fetch good prices.

Manufacture of cloth and yarns.—There are five spinning and weaving mills in East Khandesh, one each in Poons and Dhulia and seven in Sholapur in addition to three spinning mills. All of these are in fairly prosperous condition.

As regards the mill industry at Sholapur, the Collector remarks:-

"During the year under report, there were again considerable fluctuations in cotton prices and the result was a continued lack of confidence on the part of dealers. The prices of cotton ruled higher than in the preceding year but there was no corresponding increase in the prices of manufactured articles. This was due to a very large excess in supply over demand and also to Japanese competition in spite of enhanced duties. However during the year under report, some of local mills were able to do good business in the finer quality goods, the public antipathy to which is gradually disappearing owing to the fading out of the congress movement."

Sugar factories.—The sugar factory at Belapur run by the Belapur Syndicate is doing well and is manufacturing sugar of superior quality. The company is extending the area of plantation by obtaining lands on

long term leases owing to the demand for Indian sugar. A few small sugar factories have been opened in the Ahmednagar District—one at Belwandi in the Shrigonda Taluka and three in the Rahuri Taluka. Two more sugar factories have been started, one at Kalamb in the Indapur Taluka of the Poona District by Messrs. Marsland Price and Company and the other at Akluj in the Malsiras Taluka of the Sholapur District by the Saswad Malis. Both these factories have secured by private arrangement on long term leases 1,800 and 1,500 acres respectively of land under command of the canal and planted some of it with cane.

Miscellaneous industries.—The match factory at Chalisgaon, iron foundries at Chalisgaon and Pachora, ice factories at Bhusawal and Jalgaon and the leather works of Bhusawal and Amalner were working well during the year. The Cooper Engineering Works, near the Satara Road station, where agricultural implements are manufactured, have done fairly well during the year. The Industrial Factory at Karad managed by Messrs. Phadke Bros. continued to manufacture ploughs, sugarcane crushers and other sundry articles such as iron cots, etc., as in previous year.

In the Poona District Dapodi Iron Works, the glass factory at Talegaon, The Ravi-Varma Fine Art Litho Press at Malavli and the carpet factory at Kune continued to work successfully. In Sholapur, the textile factory and metal works at Tikekarwadi continued to develop. Woollen carpets are manufactured at Kandal in Rahuri Taluka of the Ahmednagar District in a factory conducted by the Roman Catholic Mission. The products are chiefly exported.

In Nasik, viticulture is carried out on a considerable scale in Nasik and Niphad talukas and grapes are exported in large quantities. There are about 350 handlooms in Sinner which produce silk-bordered as well as ordinary saries. The Government weaving class under the supervision of the Director of Industries has been shifted to Sinnar recently and is making progress in the working of the improved fly-shuttle looms.

# Southern Division.

The vsual articles of production in and export from Karnatak districts are jawari, wheat, tur, chillies, tobacco, cotton, groundnut, betel and cardamom; of these cotton is by far the most important. In the Konkan districts the chief articles of export are mangoes, coir, baked cashew nuts, salted fish, myrabolams, hemp and salt. Owing to the worldwide depression and fall in prices trade was not in a flourishing condition. Rainfall was seasonable, the harvest normal and yet the money value of agricultural produce showed no improvement. Cotton trade continued to be depressed.

2. The ginning factories in the Belgaum District did not get sufficient work and some of them practically remained closed throughout the season. Bail-Hongal which is a large centre of cotton trade in the Belgaum District turned out 14,363 bales of cotton as against 20,510 bales in the previous year. Handlooms all over the division had a lean

year. Ilkal, Guledgud, Amingad and Kerur in Bijapur District which are famous for their fabrics had a poor turnover on account of the

general trade depression.

3. Of the five saw mills in Kanara, three were worked by the Forest Department and two were run by private enterprises. The sandal-wood trade in Kanara had a poor year, but salt and dried fish from that district were exported on a somewhat large scale to Bombay and to the Desh districts. The Co-operative salt works at Sanikatta in the Kanara District manufactured 1,26,703 maunds of salt as against 1,39,815 in the previous year. The cause for the reduced output is the early rains in May which prevented further manufacture of salt in the year. The Oriental Cannery Company at Ankola was removed from the list of registered factories in July 1932. The tiles factory at Manki in Kumta taluka worked fairly well.

- 4. In the Ratnagiri District the number of rice mills and flour mills was 31, but not all of them had sufficient work in the year. Those at Khed had full work but the others are reported to have had a poor year. Of the five aluminium factories in the district four continued to work and the fifth remained closed during the year. The total turnover of these four factories was worth Rs. 32,000 as against 9,000 in the previous year. The cashew nut shelling factories at Malvan and Vengurla had a fairly prosperous year though the total turnover was less than in the previous year. Cashew nuts which are imported from Gos and Africa are exported to America after being roasted and shelled at Malvan and Vengurla. The turnover of Malvan factories was worth Rs. 9,46,619 as against Rs. 11,17,580 in the previous year and for the Vengurla factories the turnover was worth Rs. 1,55,600 as against Rs. 1,95,000 in the previous year. The Shiroda salt works put on the market 31,600 maunds of salt as against 51,000 in the previous year. The export of mangoes from the Ratnagiri District to Bombay continued and for the first time in the history of mango trade in the Konkan Alfonso mangoes were placed on the London market.
- 5. In the Kolaba district the main trade is in paddy and rice but the prices for these commodities recorded a fall. The Bharat Tile Factory in the Uran Mahal had a fairly good year. The Dhutpapeshwar Pharmacy at Panvel continued to prosper. The small soap factory at Goregaon in the Mangaon Taluka did not do much work. Electric energy continued to be supplied to Bombay from the Tata Power Houses at Bhivpuri, Patnus and Campoli. The fishing industry continued to prosper.
- 6. In the desh districts, cotton trade, as already observed, was unremunerative, and the handloom industry languished. The bangle-making industry in the Hukeri and Sampgaon talukas in the Belgaum District is reported not to have fared well, but the perfumery industry in the Hukeri Taluka (Belgaum) is reported to have had a normal year. In the Dharwar District, the carpet industry and the copper and brass pot industry are reported to have had adequate business. The Collector of Bijapur reports that the cotton checking stations established in the district under the Cotton Transport Act worked well but in his opinion

the working of the Act did not produce appreciable effect on the quality of cotton. The quarrying of slates and grinding stones in that district is reported to have had a fair year. The new soap factory at Bijapur did a fair amount of business.

7. In general it may be said that the year for trade and industries was not dissimilar to its predecessor.

# Bombay Suburban District. "

The important factories in the district are :-

(1) Match factories at Santacruz, Andheri, Kurla and Ambernath.

(2) Textile mills at Kurla.

(3) Litho printing presses at Ghatkopar.(4) Dyeing factories at Chembur and Kurla.

(5) Iron manufacturing concerns at Mulund started by Messrs. Braithwaite and Co.

(6) Bangle factory at Kandivli.

(7) Kaka fireworks factory at Chakala.

(8) Tobacco factories at Andheri and Vileparle.

(9) Rubber shoe factory at Jogeshwari.

The factories at numbers (7) to (9) have been opened during the year under report. Owing to foreign competition the factory-owners in the district generally complain that they find it very difficult to carry on with their business. The textile mills at Kurla which were closed for sometime owing to a strike of the operatives are working but with reduced numbers. As building operations were in progress on a larger scale this year, employment of the labouring classes was generally satisfactory.

# 16. PRICES.

### Northern Division.

Prices continued to be very low. Food grains and money crops such as oil seeds, tobacco and fibres were all affected.

In Broach, the price of cotton with seed ranged from Rs. 70 to 100 per 'bhar' as against Rs. 76 to 140 in the preceding year.

In view of the slump in prices Government in their Resolution, No. 5710/28, dated 16th February 1933, ordered that in no case should more than one year's assessment be levied during the year and all suspended arrears which were due for collection were therefore resuspended. Besides this a suspension of three annas in the rupee was granted in Thana, Bhiwandi, Kalyan, Bassein and Murbad where second revision settlement had already been introduced.

### Central Division.

As in last year, the prices of food grains continued to be generally low throughout the year. There was a slight improvement in prices in in May and June.

2. A statement showing the prices of the principal staple food grains in the headquarter town of each district for seven different periods is attached for facility of reference.

### Southern Division.

The slump in the prices of the principal food grains continued throughout the year notwithstanding a slight improvement in the price of jowari. In the Belgaum District jowari which is the principal food grain continued to sell at the same rate as in the preceding year. In the Bijapur and Dharwar districts, however, prices of jowari appreciated to a small extent. Jowari which was sold in the Bijapur District last year at 22 seers 6 chataks per rupee was sold this year at 20 seers 6 chataks to a rupee. In the Dharwar District the price for this commodity was 18 seers 14 chataks per rupee as against 23 seers 12 chataks per rupee last Though jowari thus showed improvement in two districts, rice recorded a further fall. In the Bijapur District from 8 seers a rupee which was the rate last year, the price depreciated to 8 seers 10 chataks per rupee and in the Dharwar District the fall was heavier; as against 10 seers 9 chataks last year, the price this year was 11 seers 9 chataks per rupee. In the coastal districts where rice is the main food grain there was also a fall. In the Ratnagiri District the price for a maund of rice of 40 standard seers was Rs. 3-10-5 as against Rs. 4-3-4 in the preceding year. In the Kolaba District, which generally exports paddy, the wholesale price for a khandi ranged from Rs. 20 to Rs. 35 as against Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per khandi in the previous year. In Kanara also a slight fall in the prices of rice and paddy is noticeable. In the price of cocoanuts in Karwar, Honavar and Kumta talukas a pronounced fall was recorded. Betelnut which is the principal crop in the garden regions in the Kanara District, and is exported, recorded a fall in the Kumta Taluka and Bhatkal Petha but remained stationary in Sirsi Taluka. In the Siddapur Taluka the price for betelnut appreciated from Rs. 93-11-0 per khandi to Rs. 104 per khandi this year. Reasons for these local variations have not been stated by the Collector probably because he could not explain them.

On the whole, so far as agricultural incomes are concerned, the year was not unlike its predecessor.

# Bombay Suburban District.

Rice is the staple food grain and the chief product of the Bombay Suburban District. The rate of cleaned rice per rupes in the market during the year under report was as under:—

### 17. LABOUR AND WAGES.

# Northern Division.

The wages both of skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change in the year in the Ahmdabad and Surat districts while in the Kaira, Panch Mahals and Broach there was a slight fall compared with the wages during the preceding year, but it was not commensurate with the drop in the prices of food grains. There was some unemployment in the Panch Mahals and Surat districts on account of the general economic condition of the country.

In the Panch Mahals the Public Works Department, Local Boards, and the Dohad Municipality opened ordinary works to provide labour for Bhils and such persons in Dohad Taluka and Jhalod Mahal.

In Thana, the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour remained stationary and the general condition of skilled and unskilled labour was satisfactory. The district being in close proximity to Bombay the unskilled and skilled labourers found, as usual, employment in Bombay. The :ice mills in Kalyan, Bhiwandi, Shahpur and the Raymond woollen mills at Thana, the railway power house at Chela (taluka Kalyan) provided work for a number of labourers.

### Central Division.

Wages of skilled and unskilled labourers remained practically stationary throughout the year in spite of the continued fall in prices. The supply of labour has become mobile owing to the easy and quick means of conveyance with the result that the demand and supply keep level throughout the year. There is, however, a slight downward

tendency in the rates of wages in West Khandesh District in sympathy with diminished demand. In all other districts there was sufficient demand both for skilled and unskilled labour in railway workshops, spinning and weaving mills of East Khandesh and Sholapur districts, ammunition factory and Dapoli workshops in Poona District. A large number of agricultural labourers find employment in sugarcane crushing works in Haveli, Bhimthadi and Kopargaon talukas.

General condition of labourers as a class was almost good. A strike occurred at the Laxmi Narayan Mill at Chalisgaon on 25th April 1932 when the owners declared their intention of reducing the grain compensation allowance which the workers used to get for some years. The workers decided to return to work in the first week of June when the owners announced their intention of re-opening the mill without reduction of the allowance.

In Sholapur, the supply of labour throughout the year has been plentiful and labour has been quiet, taking very little interest in the effort of the various agitators to provoke labour trouble. Labour meetings have been largely confined to the surplus labour force and efforts have been largely directed towards the founding of an "Unemployed" Union.

### Southern Division.

The district and subdivisional reports do not indicate any general fall in wages, which maintained the standard reached by them last year, save in the Ratnagiri District and in a few talukas of the Kanara District where a slight fall is reported.

The supply of labour was throughout normal, but the above-ghat garden regions in the Kanara District had, as usual, to import labour from the below-ghat talukas where it was plentiful.

In the Ratnagiri District the Collector reports that as a result of depression in the textile industry in Bombay City many mill-hands returned home and as the supply of labour exceeded the demand wages fell. The extent of the fall is tabulated below:—

In the Karwar, Honavar and Sirsi talukas and in the pethas of Bhatkal and Supa in the Kanara District wages both for skilled and unskilled labour recorded a drop which is attributed by the Collector to the general reluctance of the people to spend money on skilled labour during the present depression and also to the fact that necessaries of life have considerably cheapened. The sub-joined table compares the wages for 1932-33 with those in 1931-32 for these areas:—

Elsewhere the level of prices of food stuffs did not appreciably react on wages and as the demand and supply were normal, the year for the wage-earner must be said to have been satisfactory.

Except for the strike of the railway employees at Hubli in November 1932 relations between labour and capital were harmonious. In the Ratnagiri District the labourers in one principal cashew nut roasting factory at Malvan endeavoured to call a strike to protest against a small reduction in their wages. It does not appear that the strikers met with any success. The reduction in wages amounted only to the cutting off of an increase given in that particular factory when it was unusually busy and had a glut of nuts on hand.

Emigration and immigration.—No organised or extensive emigration or immigration was noticed during the year. Except for the seasonal migration of field labour from less favoured tracts to more favoured tracts, there is nothing worth-noting under this head. The Collector of Kolaba reports that owing to the unsettled state of the textile industry in Bombay City exodus of mill-operatives from his district to Bombay was less than normal.

From the Mangaon Taluka of the Kolaba District 29 persons migrated to South Africa as against 24 in the previous year.

# Bombay Suburban District.

Building activities continued even to a larger extent than last year as the fall in prices of building material also continued to exist. There

was, however, a further decline in the wages as the prices of food stuffs went down, still lower than the previous year:

# Northern Division.

The year was marked by a return to normal conditions in the villages.

The depression in prices, however, prevented any marked recovery.

Progress made in the maintenance and repairs of small irrigation tanks in charge of the Revenue Department.—A grant of Rs. 4,790 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department in this division during the year 1932-33 and it was distributed as shown below:—

In view of the need for rigid economy only urgent works were carried out during the year.

In Kaira and Surat the works were carried out departmentally.

### Central Division.

Land distribution work in West Khandesh.—This has been completed in almost all the talukas except in Nawapur and a few villages in the western part of the Sakri taluka where cultivators are not forthcoming.

Assessed waste survey numbers measuring 6,104 acres were distributed among Bhils and other landless persons from backward classes in all the talukas of the eastern sub-division of West Khandesh District.

The Bhils are proverbially bad agriculturists and it is not easy to get them to settle quickly on the land and cultivate it to its full capacity. In many cases, they give up their plots with the result that 1,336 acres of land formerly granted on eksali leases had to be resumed in the Sakri Taluka.

As regards annual leases, the Collector of West Khandesh observes that owing to the low prices of agricultural commodities, small annual landholders are finding agriculture a somewhat precarious occupation and have left it preferring to do field or other work. Many of such grantees, having made a default in payment of land revenue assessment, were evicted.

Akrani settlement.—A temporary establishment consisting of two measurers and two talatis for a period of four months was engaged to complete the remaining survey settlement work in the Akrani Mahal. The temporary estalishment was engaged from 16th January 1933 and was disbanded on 30th April 1933 after the completion of the whole work.

Village Improvement Committee, Sholapur.—Under the auspices of the committee a big agricultural and cattle show was held at Pandharpur simultaneously with the Kartiki fair (November 1932). The show was opened by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay. It was mainly intended for agriculturists many of whom from the Sholapur District as well as from the neighbouring territory and States visited it and were impressed with what they saw.

The taluka development associations in West Khandesh District are reported to be functioning satisfactorily and are doing very useful propaganda for bringing the results of agricultural research to the notice of the actual cultivators of the soil.

Impartible tenure.—Land comprised in 46 survey numbers in four villages of Chalisgaon Taluka (area 346 acres and assessment Rs. 226) was sold on the new tenure with the condition of impartibility attached to it. The amount of occupancy price realised was Rs. 4,835, i.e.,

21 times the assessment. Similarly about 2,000 acres of waste land was disposed of in the Nasik District on the same tenure.

Construction of a bridge over the Tapti River in West Khandesh.—In the absence of a bridge across the Tapti, great inconvenience used to be felt. A new bridge was constructed and opened by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay on 13th February 1933. It not only supplied a long-felt local need, but has completed the last link in the long line of communications between northern India and this Presidency.

Sinhasta Fair in Nasik District.—The Sinhasta fair went off successfully but the attendance of pilgrims is reported to have been well below normal.

Agricultural and cattle show at Indapur.—An agricultural and cattle show was held at Indapur in the Poons District on the 5th and 6th February 1933 and was attended by agriculturists from the neighbouring talukas in large numbers and with enthusiasm.—Useful information was given to the visitors by the experts of the Agricultural Department.

### Southern Division.

A LANGE TO ALC: MATERIAL TO A SEC

Public feeling in the form of agitation for non-payment of land revenue was not a general feature of the division. It may be recalled that such agitation was staged in the Ankola and Siddapur talukas of the Kanara District last year but broke down under firm action. The Collector reports that the Nadore cultivators in the Ankola Taluka who played a prominent part in the no-tax campaign last year showed this year a strong revulsion of feeling against the congress. It is also reported that applications for grant of lands forfeited last year were numerous and that among the applicants were large numbers of Nadore cultivators. In the Siddapur Taluka also a complete change in the attitude of the villagers towards the congress was noticed and land revenue was collected without much effort.

All the Collectors report that public feeling in general was loyal and that the tone of the press was moderate.

(a) Medical relief.—Free distribution of quinine to the public was continued in the malarious tracts, and the relief thus afforded was supplemented by special medical officers on malaria duties in the Kanara District. The Red Cross travelling dispensaries continued to do good work in the Belgaum and Kanara districts. The Infant Welfare Centre in the Belgaum town which distributes free milk and gives medical relief to infants and their mothers was largely used by the slum population.

Five village-aid-scheme dispensaries in the Dharwar Taluka of that district did good work and are gaining in popularity.

(b) Cattle shows.—A small cattle show was organised at Galgali in the Bijapur District by the villagers and prizes were distributed for good stud-bulls.

Motor tractor ploughs of the Burmah Shell Company worked satisfactorily in the Mundargi Petha and Gadag Taluka of the Dharwar District.

New method of dealing with the prickly-pear nuisance: Destruction by means of an insect imported from Australia was successful in several villages of Dharwar District and is reported to save considerable expense and labour.

- (c) Notable events.—His Excellency the Governor and Lady Sykes honoured the Ratnagiri and Kanara districts by their visits and were warmly welcomed by the people. They were presented with the addresses by the District Local Board, Ratnagiri, the Ratnagiri Municipal Borough and by the Vengurla Municipality. In the Kanara District addresses were presented to them by the District Local Board and by the Karwar Municipality. Several minor communities also availed themselves of the visit to present addresses to their Excellencies. The Honourable the Revenue Member toured over a part of the Kolaba District at the request of local bodies and was warmly received. The Honourable Minister of Education paid a visit to the Bijapur District early in January 1933 and was accorded a warm reception at Bagalkot and Bijapur where the municipalities, local boards, school boards and other public institutions representing important communities presented him with addresses,
- (d) Grant of lands on impartible tenure.—The subjoined table gives an account of the grant of waste lands in each district:—

The Collector of Dharwar reports that people have not objected to the grant of land on this tenure and the Collector of Belgaum remarks that the public are neither averse to nor over enthusiastic about, taking land on this tenure and that, however, there are still some applications on file for grant of land from all sorts of people. He further remarks that the policy to be adopted in giving out waste lands will be settled later

when necessary information has been collected and local enquiry made at the time of jamabandi.

It is satisfactory to note that the area given out on this tenure is increasing, though the heavy fall in prices has continued.

# Bombay Suburban District.

With a view to meet the public convenience and also to minimise the chances of misappropriation of Government dues on the part of the talatis an arrangement has been made with effect from 1st August 1932 to receive Government revenue in the office of the Collector of Bombay from the public having business in Bombay without engaging any extra staff.

- (b) Town Planning Schemes.—No scheme was completed during the year. The two schemes, Andheri Town Planning Scheme No. VI and Ghatkopar Town Planning Scheme No. II, which were submitted to Government for sanction in 1932 and 1929 have not yet been sanctioned.
- 2. Two schemes, Bandra Nos. III and IV, are still in the arbitration stage. It is hoped that the award for the latter will be published shortly. Orders from Government whether to proceed with the entire draft scheme for Santa Cruz Town Planning Scheme No. V or to modify it are still awaited.
- (c) State-aided Building Scheme.—A short history of this scheme was given in last year's report. Statements showing loans granted, recoveries effected and arrears for the year are appended.

In spite of financial depression, the scheme continues to be popular. Land loans granted to private individuals amounted to Rs. 61,331-2-0, compared with Rs. 37,394-11-0 last year. No Government servant or co-operative housing society took advantage of the scheme during the year.

Recoveries during the year were very satisfactory. Certain plotholders paid off their loans in full presumably because the market rate for money had fallen below the rate for the scheme.

Arrears increased slightly owing to the bad times and possession has been taken of four properties on behalf of Government for persistent default.

#### LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT.

R. E. GIBSON, Esq., C.I.E., I.C.S., Commissioner in Sind. come and t

1. SEASON.

The season under report was on the whole better than the last one. The inundation was fairly satisfactory so far as upper Sind was concerned but not so good in lower Sind. The Bukkur gauge reached 10.8 feet on 1st June 1932. Thereafter it continued to rise steadily and attained a maximum height of 16.7 feet on the 11th August 1932. The fair irrigating level of 13 feet was first reached on the 22nd July 1932. This level of 13 feet and over continued till 2nd September, i.e., for 43 days, as compared with 27 days in 1931, 50 days in 1930, 49 days in 1929 and 42 days the average of last three years. The fair irrigating level of 17 feet on the Kotri gauge was first reached on 21st July 1932. This or a higher level lasted for a period of 51 days as against 63 days in 1931, 73 days in 1930, 58 days in 1929 and 64 days the average of last three years. On account of the late rise of the river and its sudden and abrupt fall after 9th September, lower Sind was greatly affected with the result that a large part of the rice crop either failed to reach maturity or was very poor. The highest reading in the year was 16.7 feet on 11th August 1932 at Bukkur, 21.6 feet on 1st September 1932 at Kotri as compared with 13.9 feet on 30th July 1931 at Bukkur and 19.3 feet on 1st September 1931 at Kotri and the maximum levels of 17.9 and 24.1 feet ever previously recorded on these two gauges.

The Lloyd Barrage canals were opened in 1932 and began to supply water for irrigational purposes for the kharif season of the year under review. This has revolutionized nearly the whole of irrigational system of the province, the greater portion of which was formerly dependent on inundation canals and somewhat uncertain rains. Central Sind is now getting an assured and perennial water supply from the Barrage canals. These, however, did not in all cases come up to expectations though some exceeded them. The working of the project was on the whole a great success. In the Hyderabad, Thar Parkar and Sukkur districts the kharif cultivation was extensive owing to good water supply from the Barrage canals. The rest of the districts did not fare so well. Water logging in Begari has become a serious evil. In the Dadu and Larkana districts the Northern Dadu canal; the Warah branch and the North Western canal did not work quite satisfactorily but on account of a good supply from the Rice Canal Division and sufficient rainfall, there was an increase in both kharif and rabi cultivation figures in the Dadu District. As regards the Larkana District the kharif supply was inadequate and there was consequently a shrinkage in cultivation in all its talukas except Warah and Shahdadkot where the Khirthar Head Canal worked most satisfactorily. In the rabi season on the other hand, there was good supply from the perennial canals which resulted in

a substantially increased area of cultivation, throughout that district. In the Nawabshah District drawbacks in the working of Rohri Canal were to a certain extent inevitable in view of the peculiar difficulties of the country served by it. The Jamrao Canal in the same district, however, worked successfully and the zamindars fared better on account of bumper crops of cotton and wheat raised on that canal.

Floods occurred in the year in Sukkur, Dadu, Nawabshah and Hyderabad districts. In August the Sukkur Begari bund was breached and in consequence several villages in the Sukkur and Shikarpur talukas were submerged and the kharif of the flooded areas destroyed. No loss of life or cattle, however, occurred. General postponements for payment of takavi dues were sanctioned and concessions in the grant of kharif remissions in the flooded tracts were made by the application of rule 41 of the remission rules. In Dadu District the hill torrents from Baluchistan became a source of anxiety and trouble. Owing to the incomplete state of the Nara Valley drain water accumulated in Senhri and Daun lakes as a result of which it overflooded and caused damage to kharif crop in Kakar Taluka. Minor breaches occurred in the Nawabshah and Hyderabad districts but they were soon brought under control.

The rainfall, unlike that in the previous years, was adequate. It was insufficient in the Desert Division of the Thar Parker District and harmful in the Karachi District as there it flooded some of the seed beds and further delayed transplantation. Everywhere else it proved beneficial to the standing crops, helped the growth of fodder and enabled the agriculturists to undertake barani cultivation. The province was entirely free from any visitation of locusts throughout the year under report. The slump in prices continued this year as well and with a view to affording some relief to zamindars, Government sanctioned special remission ranging from 121 per cent. to 25 per cent. for both kharif and rabi crops in the non-Barrage areas. No such relief was considered necessary in the Barrage areas since there had been no substantial fall in prices since the revised settlement had been introduced. In the flooded tracts of Sukkur and Shikarpur talukas, as was natural, the cultivation in the rabi season increased and the rabi crops were good.

The state of public health continued to be satisfactory in the year under review. Malaria prevailed as usual throughout the province but in a mild form. The services of the touring medical officers tended to mitigate suffering to a great extent. Quinine was distributed freely as usual. There was some pneumonia in the Thar Parkar District which was responsible for 881 deaths as against 777 during the previous year. There were outbreaks of cholera in some parts of the Thar Parkar and Hyderabad districts but in a less virulent type. Timely measures were however, taken for preventing the spread of the disease. Small-por appeared in all the districts of Sind and was severe in Sukkur, Larkans and Karachi districts, the number of casualties being 304, 162 and 126 respectively.

The condition of the cattle was good except in the Dadu District where on account of inadequate rainfall in the beginning of the year there was not sufficient fodder. The situation, however, improved later with some timely rains. Fodder was generally sufficient. It is gratifying to note that the total mortality from contagious diseases as compared with that of the preceding year diminished from 29.347 to 12,480. The decrease is mainly due to the decline in the number of cases of deaths from rinderpest, the number of outbreaks of which disease among bovine cattle and other animals declined from 1,205 and 33 to 490 and 9, respectively. The number of deaths from haemorrhagic septicaemia decreased from 868 in the previous year to 288 in the year under report. The services of veterinary surgeons were secured as usual. Preventive inoculations against rinderpest were carried out in the case of 133 outbreaks, the number of animals inoculated being 11,339 against 14,737 in 212 outbreaks in the previous year. The number of inoculations against haemorrhagic septicaemia was 436. The district local boards in Sind have issued instructions to their establishment to co-operate with the subordinate revenue establishment in reporting outbreaks of cattle disease as desired by Government in paragraph 13 of their Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 6567/24, dated the 13th October 1932. It is hoped that this step, together with that by which seridars will be more responsible for reporting outbreaks, will help to mitigate the long standing complaint of the Veterinary Department about delay in reporting outbreaks.

#### 2. GROSS REVENUE.

#### (Column 3 of Appendix I.)

The provincial total under the above head shows a net increase of Rs. 82.62 lacs over the previous year's figures. This increase was shared by all the districts except Karachi and was due to introduction of the revised rates of assessment and disposal of unoccupied lands on permanent and khas mokal tenure in the Barrage area. The decrease in Karachi is due to revised calculations of the revenue on fallow and unoccupied lands.

#### 3. ALIENATIONS.

### (Column 5 of Appendix I.)

Under this head there is a net increase of Rs. 32 lacs in the figures of the year under report as compared with the preceding year. Thar Parkar, Larkana and Dadu districts all contribute to this increase which is due to revised rates of assessment.

#### 4. NET GOVERNMENT REVENUE.

#### (Columns 8 to 11 of Appendix I.)

There is a net increase of Rs. 46 71 lacs under this head over the figures of the previous year. This is contributed to by all the districts. Taking the districts individually Thar Parkar shows the largest increase, viz.,

Rs. 13.94 lacs, due to increased cultivation owing to an adequate water supply from the Barrage canals and a more rapid disposal of Government lands. Next come Nawabshah, Larkana, Sukkur, Dadu, Hyderabad and Upper Sind Frontier districts showing an increase of Rs. 10.47 lacs, 6.91 lacs, 5.80 lacs, 4.44 lacs, 3.77 lacs and .82 lac, respectively, due to the same causes as in the Thar Parkar District. Karachi was responsible for an increase of Rs. .56 lac owing to increased cultivation in occupied land.

#### 5. FLUCTUATING MISCELLANEOUS LAND REVENUE.

#### (Column 12 of Appendix I.)

There is a net increase of Rs. 1.60 lac over the past year's figures. It was shared by all the districts except Sukkur where the decrease being small (.001 lac) calls for no remarks. The greatest enhancement in any one district is that of 0.46 lac in the Hyderabad District which was attributable to more receipts from remokal fines. This and increased income from malkano on building sites and arable lands accounted for an increase of Rs. 0.32 lac, 0.28 lac, 0.21 lac, 0.16 lac and 0.11 lac in the Nawabshah, Thar Parkar, Upper Sind Frontier, Larkana and Karachi districts, respectively.

# 6. REMISSIONS.

# (Column 24 of Appendix I.)

The total amount of land revenue remitted during the year excluding special remissions which were granted on account of continued abnormal fall in prices and which amounted to Rs. 7.94 lacs, was Rs. 18.70 lace as against Rs. 9.24 lacs in the preceding year. The increase of 9.46 lace is shared by all the districts. It is noticeable under all the headings of remission excepting fallow and nakashto assessment, the remission or account of which fell from Rs. .25 lac during the previous yar to Rs. .00 lac in the year under report. The increase is chiefly due to the fact that remissions on account of deficiency of water supply, floods, adverse winds, locusts or other insects and other causes rose from Rs. 6.90 .29, .16, .86 and .32 lacs in the preceding year to Rs. 10.96, 1.59 .28, 1.34 and 3.49 lacs, respectively, during the year under report, due to the early fall of the river and to unfavourable winds which were detrimental to the growth of crops.

The figures under (a) show a net increase of Rs. 3.85 lacs compared with the previous year's figures. The arrears due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates and Court of Wards in Sind, however, show a decrease from Rs. 0.64 lac to Rs. 0.57 lac. The unauthorized arrears under (c) amounted to Rs. 4.72 lacs compared with 7.72 lacs shown last year.

#### 11. TAKAVI.

#### (Appendix II).

Takavi loans advanced during the year amounted to Rs. 0.79 lac as against Rs. 0.96 lac in the previous year. Of the former, Rs. 0.22 lac were advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act and Rs. 0.57 under the Agriculturists' Loans Act. The decrease of Rs. 0.17 lac was shared by Hyderabad, Thar Parkar, Nawabshah and Sukkur districts only. The increase in the remaining districts except Karachi is small and calls for no remarks. In the Karachi District the zamindars would have been unable to undertake cultivation without special financial help from Government. Loans for seed were granted as a special case.

Out of the total amount of outstanding balances of Rs. 63.00 lacs (column 4) as against Rs. 66.01 lacs in the preceding year, Rs. 55.31 were due for recovery during the year of which Rs. 4.55 lacs or 8.23 per cent. were collected leaving a balance of Rs. 50.76 lacs, which is accounted for as under:—.

The unauthorised arrears this year as shown above amounted to Rs. 38.54 lacs as against Rs. 40.79 lacs in the previous year. The decrease is shared by Thar Parkar, Dadu and Upper Sind Frontier districts. The increase in the remaining districts is appreciable in the Larkana and Sukkur districts only and is due to the continued economic depression which still maintains. Recoveries in the Thar Parkar and Hyderabad districts are being effected in accordance with the schemes formulated by the two Collectors. It remains to be seen how far these schemes will enable the khatedars to pay up the arrears.

Suspensions increased from Rs. 9.93 lacs to 11.14 lacs, the increase being shared by the Thar Parkar and Upper Sind Frontier districts only. The arrears due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates, and the Court of Wards in Sind decreased from Rs. 1.19 lac to Rs. 1.08 lac in the year under report.

The information required by paragraph 5 of the Government of India Resolution, No. 2156/321-7, dated the 3rd October 1901, about the amount of the agricultural loan business is supplied in statement "A".

The inspection of takavi works by Mukhtiyarkars was satisfactory except in the Nawabshah, Sukkur and Upper Sind Frontier districts. The inspection of improvement works by the Sub-divisional Officers was inadequate in the Thar Parkar District. The attention of these officers has been drawn to the inadequacy of their inspection work.

In all, two cases came to notice in which takavi loans were misapplied and were, therefore, recovered. In one case, work was not completed within the prescribed time.

The information in regard to item 8 in the form appended to Government Circular, Finance Department, No. 5762, dated the 1st October 1931, and referred to in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 10022/28, dated the 1st February 1933, is blank.

#### 12. COERCIVE PROCESSES.

#### (Appendix III.)

There was an increase in the number of notices issued under section 152 of the Land Revenue Code in all the districts of the province excepting Hyderabad and Upper Sind Frontier. The districts responsible for the greatest increase are Sukkur and Dadu. The increase is mainly due to the fact that the khatedars could not make payments on the due dates of instalments on account of slump in prices of food grains. The amount of notice fee recoverable during the year was Rs. 1,02,793 as against Rs. 88,594 in the previous year. No action under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code was taken except in the Karachi District and the number of persons proceeded against was 88. The amount of penalty levied from them was Rs. 122 only. There was an increase from 204 to 360 in the number of cases of distraint of moveable property under section 154, Land Revenue Code. Forfeitures under section 153, Land Revenue Code, were resorted to in 117 cases as against 324 in the preceding year.

"Action under section 155, Land Revenue Code, was taken only in one case pertaining to the Karachi District as against two cases in the previous year. Action under section 157 was taken in ten cases as against three in the preceding year.

#### 13. AREA.

#### (Appendix IV.)

There is a net increase of 11,232 acres in the total area of the province (column 3). The increase is spread over all districts except Larkana and Sukkur. The greatest increase, viz., 6,762 and 5,631 acres, being recorded in Nawabshah and Upper Sind Frontier districts due to bigoti measurement, formation of alluvial lands and transfer of land from Garhi Yasin to Garhi Khairo Taluka. Karachi, Dadu, Thar Parkar and Hyderabad districts showed an increase respectively of 1,653, 1,073, 944 and 158 acres owing to increase in land cultivated from kacho avulsion of a new kacho, survey and bigoti measurements. Decrease in the Sukkur and Larkana districts was, however, due to survey and bigoti measurements and the territorial change referred to above.

All districts without exception show a decrease in column 4 (unassessed cultivable land) the aggregate decrease being 1,79,102 acres. The decrease is most marked in the Thar Parkar, Nawabshah and Dadu districts (viz., 68,778, 33,227 and 28,701, respectively) and is partly due to new grants, survey measurement and partly due to the fact that, on account of Barrage, lands hitherto shown under the head "Unassessed cultivable land" have been transferred to the head "Cultivable assessed land" and other heads. The decrease in the remaining districts is due to survey and bigoti measurements, more cultivation on khas mokal tenures and as kabuli blocks in kacho.

Under the head "Uncultivatable land" (column 5) there is a net decrease of 1,20,131 acres which is shared by all the districts except Hyderabad, where the increase of 448 acres is due to survey measurement. Taking the districts individually, the largest decrease, viz., 46,083 acres, occurs in the Nawabshah District and is attributable to Barrage rectangulation, erosion by the river, more eksali cultivation and to unassessed land being brought into occupation and assessed. Next comes the Thar Parkar District which shows a decrease of 32,185 acres as a result of survey measurement, enhanced khan mokal and unauthorized cultivations in this class of land. The districts of Karachi, Dadu, Sukkur, Upper Sind Frontier and Larkana showed respectively a decrease of 11,373, 10,267, 9,260, 5,861 and 5,550 acres which is due to increase in khas mokal cultivation, survey measurement and formation of new kabuli land.

The aggregate realisation from malkano and proceeds of auction amount to Rs. 80,66,378 and the average rate per acre was Rs. 60-10-0 as against Rs. 31-12-0 during the last year. The increase is due to the fact that a large area was disposed of by the Barrage authorities on higher prices.

#### 14. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

- 1. General.—During the year under report the province of Sind continued to suffer from the effects of the general depression which still holds the world in its grip. The progressive decline in purchasing power reduced the demands for goods to the minimum and exchange restrictions and tariff barriers tended to curtail the volume of international trade.
- 2. Maritime trade.—Both the foreign and coasting trade of the province showed a further decline—the aggregate value of both amounting to Rs. 44.80 crores as against Rs. 49.14 crores in the preceding year showing a decrease of Rs. 4.34 crores or 9 per cent. Foreign trade was 67 per cent. of the total or 30.02 crores and coasting trade 33 per cent. or 14.78 crores.

Under foreign trade there was a decrease both in exports as well as imports. The total value of the exports fell from 12.91 to 12.14 crores, i.e., by 6 per cent., and that of imports from 18.19 crores to 17.87 crores, i.e., by 2 per cent.

The decrease in the export trade was mainly confined to wool and wheat. The shipments of wool fell from 10,417 tons valued at Rs. 1.79 crores to 8,951 tons valued at Rs. 0.75 crore. The fall was due to the tendency of purchasers in the United Kingdom and America to maintain their stocks at a minimum. The shipments of wheat practically ceased. They fell from 18,664 tons valued at Rs. 0.12 crore to 645 tons valued at Rs. 0.01 crore. Owing to the Indian wheat crop being small and only sufficient for local requirements, the price of wheat in India remained well above export parity, with the result that there was a total absence of demand for it from Europe. The small quantity shown above was exported mainly to Arabia and Ceylon. A redeeming feature, however, was the expansion in the shipments of rapeseed the value of which rose from Rs. 0.71 crore to Rs. 1.49 crore by 110 per cent.

The decline in the import trade was confined mainly to Government stores due to fewer arrivals of railway locomotive engines and tenders from the United Kingdom and Germany and Aeroplanes and parts from the United Kingdom. Shipments of sugar further fell from 112,219 tons valued at Rs. 1·23 crores to 89,105 tons valued at Rs. 0·93 crore. The drop of 21 per cent. in imports of sugar is attributable to the increased production thereof in India, which is developing rapidly under the protection afforded by the present rates of import duty and the decreasing purchasing power of the consuming public.

There was, however, a brisk business in cotton piece-goods and woollen manufacture which largely contributed to the recovery in trade.

An event of great importance was the empire trade agreement at Ottawa. The effect of the mutual preference enjoyed by certain empire goods from January 1933, as the result of this agreement, will no doubt begin to be felt during the course of the current year.

The coasting trade suffered a serious set back owing to fewer arrivals of Indian cotton piece-goods from Bombay and to fewer shipments of cotton to Bombay, Calcutta and Burma. It fell from Rs. 18.04 crores to Rs. 14.78 crores showing a decrease of Rs. 3.26 crores. The new salt industry of Karachi, however, showed further progress, shipments to Calcutta having increased from 30,905 tons to 33,505 tons.

Local trade suffered equally with foreign trade on account of the economic depression.

3. Trade of Sind elsewhere than Karachi.—The traders of Sind dealing with foreign countries are chiefly the Sind work merchants of Hyderabad, pearl merchants of Tatta in the Karachi District and the Shikarpuri merchants. The Sind work merchants of Hyderabad have concerns outside India all round the world dealing in Chinese silks, Japanese cloth, toys, curios and other articles of foreign manufacture. Dealing as they do mainly in luxury goods their trade has suffered, though the cheapness of the Japanese goods appeals to an indigent public. Some of the firms have closed down and others are merely carrying on. With the return of normal conditions, however, the revival of their trade on profitable lines may be anticipated, and the proprietors of the more famous houses like Pohumal Bros. do not appear to be unduly pessimistic.

The activities of the Tatta pearl merchants lead them far afield to Karachi, Bombay and Bahrein. The present tendency is for them to abandon their city of origin, Tatta, and settle permanently in Karachi and Bombay.

The trade of Shikarpuri merchants with Persis and Bokhara has almost seased on account of the obstructive policy of the government of the former country and the unsettled conditions now prevailing in Central Asia.

'4. Raw materials.—Burnt lime of good quality manufactured at Laki and Bholari stations and Fuller's earth excavated from the hills near Thano Bulakhan in Mahal Kohistan are exported in large quantities by rail to Karachi and other places in Sind.

5. Manufactures.—There was no remarkable change in the industrial life of people. The number of cotton ginning factories remained the same although one at Mirpurkhas and two at Dhoro Naro in the Thar Parkar District remained closed during the year. There are, however, indications of an expansion of the cotton ginning and pressing industry especially in the new cotton areas of the Lloyd Barrage areas. The Collector of Thar Parkar has several applications for factory sites under consideration. The output of the working factories in the Thar Parkar District was greater than in the preceding year as a result of extensive cultivation. The number of rice husking and flour grinding factories

rose from 130 to 144 in the Larkana District and from 11 to 19 in the Thar Parkar District. Some Karachi and Hyderabad capitalists have formed a project for a Sind sugar industry. They have already launched a prospectus. It is too early as yet to prognosticate the success or failure of their enterprise. The two leather tanneries at Pano Akil in the Sukkur District are working without profit owing to the general depression in trade. The brass and copper industries at Khairpur Dahirki are also dwindling.

The small indigenous cloth industry continued as usual. The two cloth industries at Rohri and the cloth factory at Shikarpur are doing well. Two new hosiery factories have been started—one at Sukkur and the other at Shikarpur. The factory of Seth Gangaram Khushaldas of Gharibabad Quarters at Sukkur continues to manufacture sulphuric acid by the Champer process. The weaving school started at Hala in the Hyderabad District continues to be popular.

Woollen carpets continue to be made at Nawabshah and at Bubak of the Dadu District, in Guni taluka of the Hyderabad District and in Nara Valley sub-division of the Thar Parkar District. They are generally disposed of locally. The business is not run on an organised system but is carried on as a handicraft.

The dyeing lacquer work and other small industries such as those connected with earthen ware "pan" grass, metal work and soap were carried on as usual.

- (i) Sea-fish are caught and cured at Shampir and Ibrahim Hyder near Karachi and exported to various parts of the world. Sea-fishing is also being developed round the mouths of the Indus near Sokhi in Shahbunder Taluka of the Karachi District. Besides the above places, the chief fishing grounds of the Karachi fishermen are off the coast of Lasbella State and along the coast of the Chorabari Taluka of the Karachi District. Less fishing than usual was done in the former locality owing to a dispute with the Lasbella State to exact a due of one-tenth of the fish caught. The fish-bone crushing factory at Malir did reasonably well but it is now to be removed as its situation has proved dangerous to the public health.
- (ii) Fishery in the river Indus is disposed of in auction by the district local boards concerned, in the canals by the Public Works Department and in lakes and natural water courses by the Revenue Department to local fishermen on payment of a reasonable rent.

In the Sukkur District, the right of fishing within a portion of the river Indus near Sukkur and above the Barrage is enjoyed as a monopoly by the Sukkur and Rohri pabas (fishermen) since time immemorial on payment of Rs. 20 and Rs. 38-2-0, respectively, per year. Since the

opening of the Barrage, however, the quantity of palla-fish in that district decreased very considerably because that fish migrate annually up-stream and on their reaching the Barrage gates are held up with the result that there is a great collection of palla-fish in the waters immediately below the Barrage. The aforesaid pabas have, therefore, suffered and the district local board have gained. The former have represented their case and the matter is under the consideration of the Collector.

In the Dadu District too, fishery revenues have suffered owing to the Barrage operations which have curtailed the supply of water from the river to the Talti and Chans lakes. Further owing to the Manchur Drainage scheme which prevents the usual quantities of water from accumulating in the Manchur basin, the revenue derived from the disposal of fishery in that lake has also dwindled. The local mirbahars who depend for their livelihood on this business have accordingly suffered; but in several cases have received grants of land from the Revenue Officer, Lloyd Barrage Scheme.

#### 15. PRICES.

There was a slight improvement in the prices of all staple agricultural commodities except cotton and rice. The low prices are due to the world wide trade depression. The rise in the price of wheat is attributable to its export to the Punjab where the wheat crop is said to have been damaged by certain crop diseases. As in previous years, Government again afforded relief to the khatedars in the shape of general remissions of land revenue ranging from 12½ per cent. to 25 per cent. though it was restricted to the non-Barrage areas only. There was a fall in the prices of imported cloth and sugar during the year under report. The price of ghee and karbi showed a decrease on account of abundant pasture due to rainfall.

#### 16. LABOUR AND WAGES.

There was a further drop in the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour almost all over Sind. The low prices, the trade depression and the completion of the gigantic Barrage works and Sind Left Bank Feeder Railways are the main causes for the fall in the wages of labour. In Karachi labour was as usual supplemented by immigrants from Kutch, Sind and other places, especially the United Provinces but the number decreased during the year for want of employment.

There was no labour strike or other form of unrest in the province. The relations between the zamindars and hari were normal.

#### 17. SPECIAL MATTERS.

### GRANT OF LAND ON IMPARTIBLE TENURE.

The condition of impartibility is being applied to all survey numbers since the issue of orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 4702/24-III, dated the 6th October 1931, within Barrage and Non-Barrage areas.

RESOLUTION.—Though the rains in the season 1932-33 came rather late the monsoon was on the whole a good one and season in the Northern and Central Divisions of the Presidency proper proved fairly satisfactory. The season in the Southern Division also was fairly satisfactory, though excessive October rains spoilt to some extent a kharif harvest that had promised well in the Dharwar District, where also untimely rains in March and April did damage to the rabi crop.

In Sind the season was fair, and markedly better than in the previous year. The river was somewhat late in rising, while the sudden fall after September 9th, adversely affected the rice crop in lower Sind. The season was a particularly noteworthy one by reason of the opening of the Barrage canals, which, though expectations were not altogether fulfilled in certain areas, on the whole worked well. The Larkana District was an area in which the canals at the start did not convey the flow expected. Kharif supply was inadequate and there was a consequent shrinkage of cultivation. But this failure was to some extent offset by a good supply for rabi, and an increase in rabi cultivation throughout the District.

Rainfall in Sind was adequate, and the province was not attacked by locust pests. There were floods, and villages were submerged (without loss of human life or loss of cattle) in Sukkur and Shikarpur talukas, owing to breaches of the Sukkur Begari Bund. Kharif crops were lost but, as was natural, facilities for rabi cultivation, and the rabi crops, were good.

The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was everywhere sufficient except in a few small areas where a hot-weather shortage occurs yearly.

for making grants-in-aid to district local boards for the improvement of village water supply.

Supply of fodder was everywhere sufficient in the Presidency proper, and the same was the case in Sind generally, save that in the Dadu District there was a shortage at the beginning of the year, owing to deficient rainfall. But in this District also timely rainfall later improved the situation.

In the Northern Division of the Presidency diseases of cattle rinderpest, foot and mouth disease and homorrhagic septicomia made their appearance in all districts—but the veterinary assistants did much with their timely help and advice to keep mortality down. In all some 9,000 cattle were inoculated.

These diseases of cattle made their appearance fairly widely in the Central Division also, but preventive measures were promptly taken and agricultural operations were not seriously interfered with. In this division 82,000 cattle were attacked by disease, and there were 17,500 deaths.

Disease of cattle in the Southern Division was not serious except for a heavy toll of 859 deaths in the Ratnagiri District.

In Sind total deaths from contagious diseases of cattle were 12,480 as compared with a mortality of 29,347 in the previous year. As the Local

Boards have issued instructions to their establishment to co-operate with the subordinate revenue establishment in reporting out-breaks of cattle disease it is to be hoped that through timely steps being taken when out-breaks occur the future may see a still more marked improvement.

Public health was good in the Northern Division of the Presidency during the year under report. But in the Central Division, Ahmednagar and Sholapur suffered severely from cholera, as did East Khandesh to a lesser extent: while in Sholapur plague also took considerable toll. In Satara plague assumed serious proportions, 4,000 deaths occurring. Measures to check the spread of the disease were taken by special medical officers.

In the Southern Division too plague, cholera and small-pox accounted for 13,500 deaths in all—plague being particularly severe in the districts above Ghats while small-pox principally affected the Konkan.

In Sind the state of public health was on the whole satisfactory. Cholers of a less virulent type occurred in Hyderabad and Thar Parkar but the spread was checked before serious proportions were assumed. Small-pox appeared to some extent in all districts while in Thar Parkar there were 880 deaths from pneumonia.

Prices of agricultural produce though not going below those of the previous year showed little or no improvement the only improvement of any note being that in the price of wheat in Sind due to its export to the Punjab where the crop had suffered damage by certain crop diseases. The year under report being the third of the slump, Government again found it necessary to give relief to the agriculturists on account of these They decided that in no case should more than one year's low prices. assessment be levied in any district of the Northern Division, the Bombay Suburban District and the Kolaba and Ratnagiri Districts of the Southern Division. All suspended arrears which were due for collection were ordered to be resuspended. In addition Government granted in certain rice growing talukas a special suspension of 2 to 4 annas in the rupee. As regards villages in the Central Division Government ordered that arrears up to one extra instalment (half a year's land revenue) only should be recovered even though the annewaris might justify more. As regards Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Kanara, Government modified the annewari rules with the result that remissions and suspensions were granted on a more liberal scale than usual,

In Sind, Government drew a distinction between the Barrage and non-Barrage areas in view of the fact that the former had an assured supply of water and had been subjected to revision settlements based on the slump prices prevailing in 1932. A comparison of those prices with the prices ruling later in the year showed that the variation had been generally slightly favourable to the zamindars. Government therefore decided that any general rebate on assessment was not necessary in the Barrage area. In the non-Barrage area they sanctioned remissions in kharif ranging from 20 to 25 per cent. and in rabi from 121 to 25 per cent. The total loss of revenue involved in the grant of remissions in Sind

amounted to Rs. 7.94 lakhs while the resuspensions and suspensions under the ordinary rules and under the special orders in the Presidency proper amounted to Rs. 44.49 lakhs. Apart from the question of loss of Government revenue on account of low prices it is satisfactory to note there was little recalcitrancy by ryots in respect of the payment of their dues, the better conditions of the previous year, due to an improved political atmosphere continuing. Percentage of collections on net revenue demands was good throughout the Presidency.

In the sphere of Industry and Commerce this Presidency continued to feel the effect of the world wide economic depression. But it is satisfactory to report that the very important textile industry of Ahmedabad continued to flourish in spite of the depression, six new mills being opened during the year, bringing the total number up to 99. In Sholapur some of the local mills were able to do good business in finer quality goods this improvement being due principally to the lessening of public antipathy to such articles.

In Sind both foreign and coasting trade showed a further decline the aggregate value of both amounting to Rs. 44.80 crores as against 49.14 crores in the preceding year. The decrease in export trade was mainly. confined to wool and wheat; wool shipments falling from 10,417 tons to 8,951 tons. Shipments of wheat ceased practically altogether. The price in India remained well above export parity with the result that there was a total absence of demand for Indian wheat from Europe. One noteworthy feature of trade at Karachi was the drop of sugar imports by 21 per cent. This was attributable to the increased production of sugar in India. This production is developing rapidly under the protection afforded by the present rates of import duty and on account of the decreasing purchasing power of the consuming public. This Presidency has shared in the development of the sugar manufacturing industry as the successful working and expansion of the sugar factory at Belapur and the opening of sugar factories in the Ahmednagar and Poona districts show.

The land revenue administration in spite of the subsidence of activity directed to the encouragement of non-payment of dues had perforce to be carried on under difficult circumstances on account of the low prices. That collections should have been so good without any abnormal recourse to coercive measures redounds to the credit both of revenue officers of all ranks, and to the ryots, the great majority of whom showed themselves in the year under report to be facing adverse circumstances with determination.
