READ—

The Annual Report on the Land Revenue Administration of the Punjab for the year ending the 30th September 1930.

REMARKS.—The year under review proved unfortunate for the Punjab zamindar, but for once the vagaries of the monsoon were not wholly responsible. The rainfall was excellent in July and August 1929, and the *kharij* sowings were good. The hopes of a bumper *kharij* crop were, however, dissipated by a comparatively dry September, October and November, and the crop on the whole was hardly up to normal. It is true that the outturns of cotton and rice were excellent, but those of sugarcane and the millets were disappointing. Although climatic conditions were not altogether favourable at the time of sowing the *rabi* crop, timely winter rains reduced the failed area to a minimum, and the total outturn of the wheat crop was 28 per cent. above the normal; as against this, however, the gram and oil-seeds crops were unsatisfactory, the outturn being 21 per cent. and 14 per cent. below normal. The conditions in Hissar and Gurgaon continued to be very unfavourable, and test works were open in both districts during the greater part of the year. Apart from suspensions, remissions and taccavi advances, the scarcity operations in the two districts cost Government Rs. 7½ lakhs.

If this had been the whole story, the year could have been looked back upon, if not with complacency, at least without despondency. Unfortunately it was not to be so. During the previous ten years the prices of agricultural produce had at times reached and, generally speaking, remained at unprecedented heights; the lower pitch of pre-war prices had almost been forgotten: and in consequence expectations and standards of living had been raised; but now for the first time in this decade the zamindar was to be reminded that prices are as fickle as the monsoon, and to be confronted with a situation, the full inwardness of which was to be un-

folded in the months which followed. The price of wheat which was Rs. 4-12-0 a maund at the start of the year fell to Rs. 2-4-0 a maund by the end of September 1930, and the harvest price was Rs. 3-2-0 as compared with Rs. 4-6-0 of the previous year. Cotton (desi) similarly fell by about Rs. 4 a maund during the year, and the harvest price was Rs. 6-15-0 a maund as compared with Rs. 10 a maund in the preceding year. The same was the case with all other crops except sugarcane and tobacco. These large decreases in the value of all agricultural produce were primarily due to world causes but were aggravated in the case of the Punjab by the excellent wheat and cotton crops, which resulted at any rate in the case of the former, in the accumulation of large surpluses which could neither be exported nor consumed in the country.

2. No calamity of any magnitude, other than the fall in prices, visited the province during the year. As already observed, though the *kharif* crop was indifferent the *rabi* crop was good, and no damage was, as in the previous year, caused to them by floods. Locusts, however, appeared in very large swarms, but their ravages were fortunately confined to a few districts, and to these relief was at once given by liberal advances of taccavi and by remissions and suspensions of land revenue. Fodder, except in some parts of the Ambala division, was sufficient up to the monsoon and abundant thereafter.

3. The total *kharif* and *rabi* areas sown were 13,220,000 and 17,730,000 acres, respectively, of which 8,693,000 and 15,602,400 acres matured. The total fixed land revenue demand showed a decline of Rs. 1.26 lakhs and stood at Rs. 239 17 lakhs of which Rs. 208.22 lakhs were collected.

As in the previous year, Gurgaon district was mainly responsible for the large suspensions which were made during the year, as out of Rs. 21.9 lakhs, this district was given the benefit of suspensions which amounted to Rs. 8.4 lakhs as compared with Rs. 9 lakhs of the year before. Agricultural conditions in the three neighbouring districts of Hissar, Rohtak and Karnal were likewise unfavourable, and altogether the

Ambala division was responsible for 96 per cent. of the total amount suspended. The total remissions for the year under fixed land revenue amounted to Rs. 5.59 lakhs ; but it is satisfactory to note that only Rs. 1.52 lakhs or .63 per cent. of the total demand was recoverable at its close.

4. The fluctuating land revenue demand remained almost constant at Rs. 237.37 lakhs, and district officers are to be congratulated, as in the case of the fixed land revenue demand, that only the very small percentage of .8 per cent. was outstanding at the end of the year. At the same time, it is difficult to understand why this amount, small though it may be, should exceed the corresponding figure for fixed land revenue.

5. Processes were issued for the recovery of Rs. 26.51 lakhs, which is a big increase over the figures for the preceding year, *i.e.*, Rs. 17.33 in 1928-29, Rs. 13.62 lakhs in 1927-28 and Rs. 13.87 lakhs in 1926-27. The Multan division, as is usual, was the biggest offender in this respect. It is interesting to note that the tendency of late years for processes against lambar-dars to decrease was reversed this year. The figures for the year 1928-29 and the year under review being —

It was perhaps inevitable that in a year of low prices more difficulty than is usually the case should have been experienced in collecting the revenue, but the very big jump in the number of processes against owners is disquieting, coming as it does on the top of similar increases during the last few years. It would appear that lambar-dars, especially in the Multan division, are apt to rely too much on these coercive processes, and too little on promptness and persistency in making a demand and their influence and powers of persuasion. It is disappointing to learn that the system of serving summonses and processes by post is becoming more unpopular, and that it is now used in

only five districts as compared with ten districts two years ago. The Governor-in-Council would be glad if the causes for this decline were investigated and also the reason why the issue of processes should be so much higher in the Multan division than elsewhere.

6. The Lower Bari Doab Colony was the only area in which regular settlement operations were in progress during the year. Owing to difficulties in finding sure ground for rates of prices, the issue of orders regarding the assessment of the three tahsils concerned has been postponed for the present. Killabandi operations continued in those parts of the Ferozepore and Lahore districts which are receiving perennial irrigation from the Sutlej Valley Project, but unfortunately progress was not so rapid as it was hoped at the start it would be with the result that the sanctioned period in the case of Ferozepore had to be extended. The orders of Government were passed on the final settlement reports of the Attock and Mianwali districts and the canal irrigated tract of the Gujrat district. Minor settlement operations were conducted in the Shahpur and Jhang districts in accordance with the provisions of the Land Revenue (Amendment) Act, III of 1928, with the result that the sanctioned demand in the case of Shahpur district was reduced by Rs. 1,84,012 and in that of Jhang by Rs. 2,45,610. The re-assessment of the Jhelum district, of which the original term expired in *rabi* 1931, was postponed for two years, and in the case of the Amritsar district the present settlement has been extended for five years until 1937-38.

7. No. 22 Party of the Survey of India worked in the area commanded by the Bhakra Dam irrigation project while No. 23 Party concerned itself with the areas commanded by the Haveli irrigation project and the Muzaffargarh Indus canals. No. 17 Party worked from Jhang to Sargodha and "A" Survey Company was employed on a riverain survey of over 1,463 square miles.

8. Financial reasons precluded, and are likely to preclude for some time to come, any additions to the record room accommodation in the many districts which require it. This makes the systematic destruction of files and regular inspections all the more necessary, and

the Governor in Council is glad to notice that the Financial Commissioner is attaching considerable importance to proper supervision of the work of the record room.

9. The struggle with waterlogging continued unabated and, generally speaking, progress in reclamation has been achieved, though in Lahore and Sheikhupura districts the alkaline areas have increased. It is satisfactory to note that the swamped area on the Chakanwali Farm has at last been completely reclaimed and that work has now been started on the alkaline area.

10. The Governor in Council is glad to notice that the Board of Economic Enquiry has started an enquiry into the marketing of wheat. With prices at their present level, it is of particular importance that all available information on this subject should be collected and more modern methods of marketing introduced where the necessity for them is most apparent. The work of this Board is growing in value and scope and the data which it is collecting on such diversified subjects as the marketing of gut, the supply of milk and the use of faulty weights and measures will be extremely valuable to business men and Government alike.

11. Heavy floods towards the end of the monsoon affected very adversely the area irrigated by the inundation canals in the Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan districts, the decrease amounting to considerably over a lakh of acres. The working of the canals under the control of Deputy Commissioners and the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board was satisfactory and supplies were adequate. The floods of July and August 1929 which caused considerable damage in Dera Ghazi Khan district at the time were beneficial in the long run by enabling, through the deposit of silt, a large area to be brought under cultivation. It is regrettable that much of the benefit of this extension of cultivation was destroyed by locust swarms.

12. The amount of loans under the Agriculturist Loans Act, which had jumped up from Rs. 8.4 lakhs and Rs. 15.9 lakhs in 1926-27 and 1927-28 to Rs. 41.4 lakhs in 1928-29, had a set back to Rs. 27.86 lakhs.

As has been the case in recent years, Hissar and Gurgaon required the biggest advances. Collections fell, as was only to be expected with the prevailing economic conditions, and the amount outstanding at the end of the year rose by Rs. 13 lakhs to Rs. 62·67 lakhs. The amount advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act was Rs. 17·84 lakhs as compared with Rs. 13·37 lakhs of the previous year. Here again Hissar and Gurgaon took a bigger share than other districts, their borrowings amounting to no less than Rs. 5·37 lakhs. It is clearly very desirable that the use to which these loans are put should be carefully checked, and the Governor in Council is glad that the Financial Commissioner is issuing orders to this effect.

13. The total income from Crown lands under the control of Deputy Commissioners rose from Rs. 63 lakhs to Rs. 67 lakhs. The Governor in Council is glad to learn that re-afforestation in the Gurgaon and Hoshiarpur districts is proceeding satisfactorily. The dangers which are to be apprehended from the denudation of the low hills are now coming prominently to the fore and the experience gained in Gurgaon and Hoshiarpur districts should be of considerable value to the Committee which has lately been appointed to consider the whole matter.

14. The cultivated area in the Province remained constant at 29·7 million acres of which the percentage under mortgage was 10·8. In a year of low prices it is curious to note that the average recorded sale price of cultivated land rose from Rs. 372 to Rs. 406 per acre.

Annual Report

1. (a) This report deals with the period from October 1st, 1929, to September 30th, 1930. But, as the condition of the crops in the beginning of October depends on the weather of the preceding months, it is necessary to review briefly the meteorological conditions during them.

In June 1929 rainfall was below normal in the whole province, save in the Lahore division, but on the whole conditions were not unfavourable for the sowing of autumn crops, except sugarcane and cotton. In July and August rain was plentiful: indeed the heavy rainfall in these months resulted in floods which did considerable damage to crops in the riverain tracts of a few districts. September was dry.

Turning now to the period under report, the season was not generally favourable for *rabi* sowings. October and November were practically rainless, the winter rains falling about the third week of December. In January 1930 there was light to moderate rain all over the province, while in February rainfall was below normal. Mianwali and the whole of the Multan division received no rain. During March light showers which fell in a few districts helped the standing crops. Locusts appeared in many parts of the province and did considerable damage in several districts. High winds and attacks of rust and smut also took their toll. Light to moderate rain fell in April, which, accompanied by hailstorms, caused some damage to harvested crops here and there. May was generally favourable for harvesting operations. In June rainfall was above normal in the south-eastern and sub-montane tracts and generally below normal elsewhere. The monsoon remained fairly active in July, but during August and September rainfall was generally below average.

The agricultural conditions in Hissar and Gurgaon have caused considerable anxiety during the past three years. In 1929, though the monsoon started later and ceased earlier than usual, it was on the whole satisfactory in the greater part of the province. Unfortunately this was not the case in the two districts mentioned; in them rainfall was seriously in defect, particularly in September. In that month rain is, of course, particularly necessary, as it serves not only to ripen the autumn crops, but also enables large areas to be put under winter crops. Much anxiety was caused by the depressed condition of the people owing to the failure of the *rabi* of 1929 in Gurgaon and the *kharif* in Hissar, which followed two very poor seasons. As might be expected the distress was most acute in unirrigated tracts. In Gurgaon in *kharif* 1928 62 per cent. of the area sown failed, in *rabi* 1929 70 per cent, and in *kharif* 1929 67 per cent. The area sown in *rabi* 1930 was less than half the normal, and even of this reduced area 30 per cent. failed. In Hissar more than 50 per cent. of the unirrigated sown area failed almost entirely in *kharif* 1928. In the following *rabi* only 40 per cent. of the sown area matured, and in *kharif* 1929 only 20 per cent. Test works were accordingly opened in Gurgaon in the early summer of 1929, and at the end of November 1929, in the Hissar district. These, however, failed to attract labour in large numbers and were soon closed. Conditions, however, rapidly deteriorated, and test works were reopened in November 1929 in Gurgaon and in January 1930 in Hissar. The rapid influx of labourers to them established the need for more organized operations in both districts, and they were, in April 1930, declared scarcity-stricken districts under paragraph 65 of the Punjab Famine Code. Dependants of labourers thus became entitled to relief at the rates prescribed in the Code, and gratuitous relief was given to the poor and infirm. Rainfall in the months of July and August 1930 was timely and sufficient, and the number of labourers began to decrease. The works were, therefore, closed in Hissar in August 1930. In Gurgaon the works were closed in September 1930, though work on three *bunds* continued until the beginning of November. The scarcity operations cost Government Rs. 5½ lakhs.

in Gurgaon and Rs. 2 lakhs in Hissar. Relief was also given in the shape of *taccavi* advances and suspensions and remissions of the land revenue demand on a liberal scale. A grant of Rs. 5,000 was sanctioned by the Indian People's Famine Trust: most of it was spent in distribution of cotton for spinning to *parda nashin* women in distressed circumstances.

(b) No district suffered from serious floods during the year: but crops in certain parts of Sialkot were slightly damaged by floods in the Chenab river.

(c) Climatic conditions being generally favourable for the sowing of autumn crops, the total area sown in the *kharif* was slightly more than in the preceding year, being 13.22 million acres against 12.02 million acres. The failed area was, however, 35 per cent. of the sown area as against 25 per cent. last year, and a normal figure of 20 per cent. The explanation is to be found in the deficient rainfall towards the close of the season. Percentages of crop failure were particularly high in Dera Ghazi Khan (97), Hissar (79), Rohtak (54), Gurgaon (50), Jhelum, Mianwali and Muzaffargarh (45), Shahpur (40) and Karnal and Attock (38).

(d) As already stated, sowing operations for the *rabi* were adversely affected by the scarcity of winter rains; the total sown area fell from 19.94 million acres in the previous year to 17.73 million acres. The area that failed was, however, only 12 per cent, as against 23 per cent. in the preceding year, and a normal figure of 14 per cent. owing to favourable climatic conditions.

(e) The total areas sown and matured in the year were 30.95 and 24.55 million acres, respectively, compared with 31.96 and 24.30 million acres in the preceding year. The total area sown was 3 per cent. less than in the year 1928-29, but 3 per cent. more than the last ten years' average.

(f) During the year the area placed under wheat was 4 per cent. above the normal, and this crop shows the highest increase in the total outturn, which was 28 per cent.

above the normal. Owing to scarcity of rain at sowing time and a fall in price, the area under cotton registered a decrease of 12 per cent. on the last year's figure. But the good rains of July and August were of much value to this crop, and the total outturn was 28 per cent. above the normal. Of sugarcane and great millet the total outturns were 42 per cent. and 29 per cent., respectively, below the normal, owing to unfavourable climatic conditions at the end of the season. Of the other more important crops the total outturns were above normal for rice (10 per cent.) and maize (6 per cent.), and below normal for gram (21 per cent.), spiked millet (19 per cent.), *rabi* oil-seeds (14 per cent.) and barley (4 per cent.).

(g) The harvest prices of the principal crops show a noticeable decrease over last year's figures, save in the case of raw sugar and tobacco.

Lack of export demand and the fall in the world prices of wheat are, in the main, responsible for this general decline in prices.

(h) The health of the agricultural population was generally good. There were the usual outbreaks of plague, cholera, smallpox, pneumonia, and malarial fever, but they did not interfere with agricultural operations to any appreciable extent. Locusts, hailstorms and heavy floods in the months immediately preceding the year under report caused considerable damage in some districts; relief was afforded by remissions and suspensions of land revenue, by liberal advances of taccavi, and by grants from relief funds. The general fall in prices was felt acutely by zamindars, especially in view of the high levels they had touched on and off since 1914.

(i) Fodder was sufficient in most places in the province. But there was a serious shortage of it in some districts in the Ambala division. In them, however, freight concessions for its import by rail were given; they were extremely useful and were much appreciated. After the monsoon fodder became abundant everywhere. The condition of agricultural stock was on the whole satisfactory during the year.

2. The total fixed land revenue demand of the year was Rs. 239·17 lakhs, 1·26 lakhs less than last year's figure of Rs. 240·4 lakhs. This slight variation calls for no remarks. Of the total demand a sum of Rs. 208·22 lakhs or 82·8 per cent. was collected, and a sum of Rs. 21·9 lakhs, or about 9·16 per cent. was suspended. As last year, the greater portion of the suspensions was in the Ambala division: in Gurgaon district suspensions exceeded Rs. 8·4 lakhs, and in Hissar and Rohtak Rs. 5·4 and 5·9 lakhs, respectively. Suspensions were also heavy in the Karnal district. All these suspensions were due to failure of crops, and the scarcity conditions which prevailed in these districts during the year. A sum of Rs. 7·51 lakhs out of the current year's

demand has been shown as irrecoverable. Of this total a sum of Rs. 1,92,000 (round) is accounted for by the abolition of fixed assessment in parts of Multan and Montgomery districts. The fluctuating assessment now introduced should, however, produce on the whole the same amount of revenue. Of the balance, over Rs. 4 lakhs were remitted in Dera Ghazi Khan, Jhelum, Shahpur, Gurgaon and Gurdaspur districts on account of damage done by hailstorms, locusts and floods. The corresponding irrecoverable figure for last year was Rs. 1.69 lakhs. The recoverable balance of land revenue not under suspension, Rs. 1.52 lakhs, represents only .63 per cent. of the total amount (Rs. 239.17 lakhs) due.

Of land revenue under suspension on account of the current and past years' demand, a sum of Rs. 2.63 lakhs was collected, and a sum of Rs. 1.60 lakhs was remitted during the year, generally under the three harvests rule. The total amount of land revenue remaining under suspension at the close of the year was Rs. 41.59 lakhs as against Rs. 22.89 lakhs last year, and Rs. 7.48 lakhs the year before. The districts showing the largest suspended balances are Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak. The balance in Gurgaon is Rs. 19.61 lakhs against Rs. 11.2 lakhs last year. The Hissar and Rohtak figures have also risen considerably, from Rs. 3.64 and Rs. 2.92 lakhs last year to Rs. 8.78 and Rs. 8.58 lakhs, respectively.

8. Twenty-six thousand five hundred and one acres of land were added by alluvion during the year, while 26,624 acres were lost by diluvion, resulting in a net loss of 123 acres, as compared with a net gain of 5,458 acres in the preceding year. The districts which suffered most from river action were Gujrat, Shahpur and Jhelum, all of which lost more than 1,000 acres each. The districts which gained most were Ferozepore, Lahore and Gurdaspur, the gain in each case being more than 1,000 acres.

The 26,501 acres added by alluvion were newly assessed at a sum of Rs. 27,561; while on the 26,624 acres washed away revenue amounting to Rs. 28,774

was remitted. Revenue was enhanced by Rs. 14,774 on 15,945 acres of land improved by alluvion, and reduced by Rs. 3,731 on 9,811 acres damaged by diluvion. The net *khalsa* gain to the fixed land revenue roll was Rs. 9,487, against a gain of Rs. 14,473 in the previous year.

4. Collections of fluctuating land revenue, permanently excluded from the fixed land revenue roll, show a decrease from Rs. 237.76 lakhs last year to Rs. 237.37 lakhs during the year under report.

Fluctuating Land Revenue—Statement No. VIII.

The decrease was most noticeable in the Shahpur, Jhang and Gujranwala districts. The heavy decrease in the Shahpur district was due, partly to the general remission of revenue on American cotton given in *kharif* 1929, and partly to the reduction made in land revenue with effect from *rabi* 1930, under the Land Revenue (Amendment) Act.

There is a marked increase in collections in Montgomery and Multan. In Montgomery district it was due to the development of the Sutlej Valley canals, and in Multan to the extension of irrigation in the Nili Bar colony.

The total demand assessed was collected, with the exception of Rs. 1,41,487 which, added to Rs. 44,529 outstanding on account of previous years, brings the total outstandings to Rs. 1,86,016. In Multan, Dera Ghazi Khan, Montgomery and Muzaffargarh the outstanding balances are comparatively heavy. The economic depression and no-tax campaign did not materially interfere with the recovery of revenue, though the former certainly did so to some extent.

5. The collections of 'other land revenue' during the year under report amounted to Rs. 9.69 lakhs, compared with Rs. 14.34 lakhs during the preceding year.

Other Land Revenue—Statement No. VIII.

The total uncollected balances of 'other land revenue' for the whole province at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 1.62 lakhs, as compared with Rs. 1.67

lakhs in the previous year. The districts which show the largest balances are—

Efforts are being made to recover the outstanding amounts.

6. In accordance with the scheme inaugurated in 1917 for the grant of special *jagirs*, eight new *jagirs* of Rs. 500 per annum each and four of Rs. 250 per annum each were granted during the year to non-officials and retired officials, in recognition of meritorious services rendered to the administration. The total number of such *jagirs* sanctioned since 1917 is 173, and the amount of land revenue assigned in respect thereof is at present Rs. 69,900.

The Government of India in the Army Department sanctioned two assignments of land revenue of Rs. 600 per annum each to two Indian Officers for services in the Military Department. These assignees were the last recipients of this form of reward, as the Government of India have decided that, with effect from the 1st of January, 1931, cash payments will be granted in place of *jagirs*. These payments will be known as "*Jagir allowances*", and will be paid by the Military Department direct to the grantee without any reference to Civil authorities. These orders do not, however, affect the status, form or the dignity attaching to the assignments made in the past.

The total amount of land revenue enjoyed by assignees in the province was Rs. 35,53,473, as against Rs. 35,88,563 in the preceding year. The decrease is due to lapses or resumptions of assignments in accordance with the terms of the original grants.

The *jagir* registers prepared in the recent settlements of Gujranwala, Sheikhpura, Gujrat, Attock, Mianwali and Jhang were scrutinised by the Financial Commissioner, and final orders were passed on them.

7. The number of processes issued during the year was 19,675 as compared with 15,028 last year. The more important figures are as follows :—

The total land revenue collections during the year amounted to Rs. 461.21 lakhs ; it was necessary to issue processes for the recovery of only Rs. 26.51 lakhs. Of this amount a sum of Rs. 22.36 lakhs was actually recovered after the issue of processes. As usual most of the processes issued were writs of demand and warrants of arrest, and the largest number was again issued in the Multan division. The number of warrants of arrest executed is a little more than one-third of the number issued. In most districts collections were made without friction, but in a few they were made with some little difficulty. The practice of issuing writs as a preliminary process in the collection of land revenue varies from district to district. In Dera Ghazi Khan, Montgomery and Multan a total of 2,896 writs was issued on the application of lambardars. This exceeds the number issued last year. On the other hand the number of writs issued in the Lahore, Gujranwala, Sialkot and Lyallpur districts, on the application of lambardars, is negligible, being only 18. The number of warrants of arrest issued in Multan and Dera Ghazi Khan at the instance of lambardars is still very high. In Multan 1,176 warrants of arrest were issued, and 951 executed ; in Dera Ghazi Khan 773 were issued, but only 13 were executed. Multan has always been a difficult district in this matter. Save in the Multan division, warrants of arrest are not largely resorted to, though the number issued in the Lahore and Sheikhupura districts during the year was not small.

8. In the year temporary establishment to serve
 Process-serving establish- coercive processes for the recovery of
 ment land revenue was employed for short
 periods in twelve districts at a total cost of Rs. 4,223.
 In all other districts processes were served by the
 ordinary tahsil establishment or through the post.

The system of serving summonses and processes by post has had a further set back during the year. It was made use of in only five districts against nine during the previous year. The officers of the few districts in which the system is well established continue to praise it, and are enthusiastic over the benefits resulting from it. It is, therefore, all the more difficult to understand why it is not universally adopted. It is admitted that the system works best in districts where communications are good and postal facilities adequate; but it has also been found helpful in backward districts. Its adoption is also welcomed by litigants as it saves them from the petty annoyances of the process-serving establishment, and even for their convenience alone its use should be encouraged and extended.

9. Settlement operations continued throughout the
 Progress in remeasure- year in the two Ravi tahsils (Mont-
 ment, revision of records, gomery and Okara) of the Mont-
 etc. gomery district and the Khanewal
 tahsil of the Multan district. Measurement operations were in progress in all three tahsils, and the maps of 187 villages were completed. The records of 451 villages were also completed and finally attested during the year. The assessment report of the Okara tahsil was received towards the close of the year, but orders thereon have been postponed for the present owing to the marked fall in prices of agricultural produce. For the same reason, the assessment reports of the other two tahsils have not been completed by the Settlement Officer.

The revision of the record of rights and remeasurement of six *tikas* in *kothis* Kohi and Sowar of Palampur tahsil, Kangra district, commenced in April 1930, was still in progress at the close of the year. It was necessitated by the fact that no regular measurements had been carried out in previous settlements.

The correction of the record of rights prepared for the Attock district during the last settlement was continued during the year, and is now nearing completion.

Killabandi operations were started in the Ferozepore and Lahore districts in the month of October 1928 and March 1929, respectively. A period of two years from the date of entertainment of the staff was sanctioned for the completion of the operations in each district. During the year under report the operations were in full swing, and the maps of 203 villages in the Ferozepore district and 110 villages in the Lahore district were completed. The records of 215 villages of the former district and 104 villages of the latter were also completed and finally attested. As field work in the Ferozepore district could not be finished within the allotted time, an extension of six months, i.e., upto the end of March 1931, was sanctioned. The Commissioner of Lahore inspected the work in his division and considered it generally satisfactory, though more expedition might well, he thought, have been shown in it.

10. The final settlement reports of the Jhang and Muzaaffargarh districts are still under consideration. The delay in their disposal is owing to some doubt as to exact limits of the proposed Haveli project, which would affect of course the periods for which the new settlement should be sanctioned. The orders of Government have been passed on the final settlement reports of the Attock and Mianwali districts and the canal-irrigated tract of the Gujrat district. The term of settlement has been fixed at 40 years for Attock, 20 years for the urban areas of Campbellpur town, 40 years for the two (Mianwali and Bhakkar) tahsils of the Mianwali district which have been reassessed, and 20 years for the canal-irrigated tract of Gujrat. For the Isakhel tahsil of the Mianwali district which has not been reassessed, the existing term has been extended by another 20 years. A number of unirrigated villages of the Gujrat district which were offered, and have accepted, fluctuating rates lower than the assessment imposed on them at their last settlement, have not, strictly speaking, been reassessed, as their original assessment does not expire till 1943-44; but in their case it has been decided to reassess them at the same time as

the canal-irrigated villages. The period of their assessment, therefore, as fixed at the last settlement and now modified with their consent, has been extended so as to run for 20 years in all from the date of the introduction of the modified assessment. All these terms have been fixed strictly in accordance with the provisions of the Land Revenue (Amendment) Act, 1928.

11. No regular settlement closed during the year.

Comparison of estimates and forecasts in regard to duration, cost and results of settlement operations—Statement No. XIV.

Of the minor reassessment operations conducted in certain districts last year to reduce assessment in accordance with the provisions of the Land Revenue (Amendment) Act, III of 1928, the orders of Government were passed on the two remaining districts, *viz.*, Shahpur and Jhang. The result is that the sanctioned demand in those districts has been reduced, in Shahpur by Rs. 1,84,012, and in Jhang by Rs. 2,45,610. In the case of Shahpur district Government has agreed, if necessary, to a further reduction in assessment to an estimated amount of Rs. 39,162 in waterlogged estates; on it a special report is awaited.

The Lower Bari Doab Colony was the only area in which regular settlement operations were in progress throughout the year.

12. Government has, for the present, deferred for two years, the reassessment of the Jhelum district, of which the original term expires in *rabi* 1931. Re-assessment of the old and new Pattoki mandis in the Chunian tahsil of the Lahore district, of which the settlement expired in *rabi* 1930, has been completed, and the assessment report is awaited. The report on the reassessment of the Lower Jhelum Colony towns in the Shahpur district, of which the term of settlement expired in *kharif* 1927, was considered by Government, and it was decided that the reassessment of the towns should be postponed till the term of the fluctuating assessment, sanctioned for the canal-irrigated portion of the district, expires in 1943-44. A forecast report of the Amritsar district, of which the current settlement will expire between *rabi* 1932 and

rabi 1933, was received during the year. Government decided that the reassessment of the district should be postponed for five years. Accordingly the present settlement will expire in the Tarn Taran tahsil in *rabi* 1937, in the Amritsar tahsil in *kharif* 1937 and in the Ajnala tahsil in *rabi* 1938. Forecast reports of the whole of the Lyallpur district and the Rakh branch colony portion of the Sheikhpura district, of which the term of settlement expires in *kharif* 1932, were also received during the year and are under consideration.

13. Settlement operations in the Lower Bari Doab colony area in the Montgomery and Multan districts continued during the year under report with the full staff sanctioned for the purpose. A small staff was engaged to reassess the old and new Pattoki mandis of the Lahore district and also for the revision of assessment of the Jhang and Attock districts with a view to conform to the standard laid down in the Punjab Land Revenue (Amendment) Act, III of 1928.

A small staff continued to be employed in Lyallpur district in connection with killabandi and colonization operations on the Pir Mahal, Burala and Khikha Extensions of the Lower Chenab Canal.

A kanungo, seven patwaris and a few chainmen were also employed during the year for the measurement of six *tikas* of *kothis* Kohi and Sowar in Kangra district.

14. The following operations were carried out by the Survey of India Department during the year :—

The "A" Survey Company carried out a riverain survey in 1,463 square miles, on the scale of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches and 1 inch to a mile in the Lahore, Ferozepore, Amritsar and Rawalpindi districts. Traversing for topographical survey was also carried out in 1,240 square miles in the Jhang, Multan, Lyallpur and Montgomery districts.

The No. 17 (Levelling) Party traversed a total length of 331 miles as follows :—

Seven thousand eight hundred and eighty-six square miles of traversing and demarcation of corners of 3,000-acre rectangles with permanent markstones, as well as 584 square miles of triangulation to control the traversing were completed by the No. 22 Party in the area commanded by the Bhakra dam irrigation project in Ferozepore, Hissar and Ludhiana districts, and Faridkot, Patiala and Kalsia States. The boundaries of six hamlets in the Kangra district were also surveyed.

The No. 23 Party completed the following programme of irrigation survey operations in the area commanded by the Muzaffargarh district Indus canals :—

- (a) 907 square miles of special topographical survey on the scale of 4 inches to a mile,
- (b) 783 square miles of rectangulation to 100 acres with markstones and to 45 acres with pegs, and
- (c) 1,476 square miles of tertiary levelling.

In addition permanent markstones were embedded at the corners of all 3,000-acre rectangles throughout the area commanded by the Haveli Irrigation project, and in that portion of the Muzaffargarh district Indus canals area which was topographically surveyed during the season.

15. The only alterations in district boundaries that took place during the year were the transfer of 3,403 acres of land from Lahore to the Ferozepore district, and 1,26,392

acres from Montgomery to the Lyallpur district. This area was trans-Ravi from Montgomery, and was difficult to administer thence.

16. No additions or alterations were made to record rooms during the year under report. More accommodation is required in Rohtak, Kangra, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Lahore, Amritsar, Gurdaspur and Dera Ghazi Khan, but nothing can be done at present.

The number of inspections of record rooms in each district during the year was generally less than four—the minimum prescribed in paragraph 4 of Standing Order No. 62. The Financial Commissioners are issuing instructions to ensure that detailed inspections are made once a quarter and that they are not neglected on any account; also that occasional visits should be paid by the officer-in-charge at least once a week. The number of files destroyed yearly appears to vary greatly from district to district. The Financial Commissioner hopes that regular inspections in future will ensure regular and systematic destruction of files.

Records were damaged by insects in the Ambala, Ludhiana, Gurdaspur and Jhelum districts. Detailed instructions for the prevention and remedy of damage by insects have been prescribed for the guidance of Deputy Commissioners after consulting the Entomologist to Government.

The system of supplying excerpts from revenue records continues to prove useful both to courts and litigants. The total income was Rs. 19,434, while the expenditure was Rs. 28,012.

The income of copying agencies for the year was Rs. 8,35,032 and the expenditure was Rs. 8,52,060, showing a deficit of Rs. 17,028 against Rs. 7,943 in 1928-29. The Financial Commissioners are issuing instructions that every effort should be made to curtail expenditure, and that the agencies should be, so far as possible, self-supporting.

17. The amount of land revenue and other Government dues paid by money order during the year was Rs. 23.50 lakhs in 28 districts, against Rs. 23.88

lakhs in the same number of districts last year. The system is distinctly popular with those who live at a distance from tahsil head-quarters and have small sums to remit.

A sum of Rs. 12.99 lakhs on account of land revenue was remitted in currency notes by insured post in 22 districts, against Rs. 13.76 lakhs in 24 districts last year. The system is still regarded as unsafe in a few districts, and has been discontinued in one district under the orders of the Deputy Commissioner. This is unfortunate, as in most districts it is gaining in popularity. It is most extensively used in the Attock district.

Two approved lambardars of the Lyallpur district paid Rs. 9,749 on account of land revenue by cheque through the Imperial Bank. Three large estates in Montgomery credit their dues into the Lahore treasury through the Imperial Bank, recoveries being adjusted on intimation of such credits by the Deputy Commissioner, Lahore. In Gurgaon land revenue amounting to Rs. 763 was paid through the Central Co-operative Bank.

(b) The instructions issued some years ago to prevent encroachments on Government properties by the co-ordination of Public Works Department plans and revenue maps, are reported to be working satisfactorily on the whole.

(c) The annual waterlogging conference, at which His Excellency the Governor presided, was held on August the 2nd, when the work done during the year was reviewed. The Waterlogging Board held three meetings in the year to consider various problems brought to its attention.

The scheme of periodical closures on the Lower Jhelum Canal was not put into force during the summer of 1930. Steps were taken to control the rise of the water-table along the newly opened Dipalpur Canal by means of open drains and pumping : in other areas similar measures have resulted in a reduction of the damage due to swamping. In, however, Sheikhpura and Lahore

districts there has been an increase in the alkali areas, owing to the rise of salts brought to the surface as a result of the high water-table. The other nine districts, where special surveys were undertaken to ascertain the extent of the damage due to waterlogging, showed a decrease in the areas of alkaline land. The total number of estates included in these surveys now amounts to 1,541.

Reclamation at Chakanwali farm has now been completed in the swamped area, and is being extended in the alkaline land. The reclaimed areas have been given out on lease. Scientific investigation into the problems connected with waterlogging continues in the Irrigation Research Laboratory; the gravity survey carried out to show the position of the underlying rock strata in the Chaj and Rechna doabs has been completed.

The preparation of plans to indicate the conditions of subsoil water-levels, and the changes which are taking place in them, was further developed. The recording of areas damaged by swamping, or by the rise of alkaline salts, has been extended to the Dipalpur area in Montgomery district, and to selected areas in districts south of the Ravi. Areas where alkaline land existed prior to the introduction of canal irrigation have been separately defined. The collection of information to show the results obtained from the working of tube-wells already installed in the province is also in hand, so that, if an extension of such pumping is found necessary to control the water-table, data may be on record to show the results obtained so far.

(d) During the year the Board of Economic Enquiry commenced in the Ferozepore district its seventeenth village survey, but, owing to the unfortunate death of the investigator, this inquiry had to be postponed. A short resurvey was started in a village in the Gurgaon district to supplement information given in the report of the previous investigation. The field work of the Attock village enquiry which commenced last year was concluded and the report has now to be checked and edited.

The inquiry into farm accounts was continued by Messrs. Stewart and Kartar Singh, and accounts for 1928-29 (the fifth year of issue) sent to the press. The authors have been requested to continue this interesting series of monographs. An inquiry into the marketing of wheat was launched in March. Owing to the absence of suitable investigators inquiries were held in only two of the four areas selected, *viz.*, Ferozepore and Lyallpur districts; the remaining areas will be taken up next year. A report incorporating the results of twelve investigations conducted in previous years into the use of faulty weights and measures in the Province is being drawn up, and will shortly be ready for submission to Government.

Last year it was decided to revise the Board's publication "The milk supply of Lahore in 1921" which was out of print. A comprehensive investigation was completed during the year and a report is being prepared. Another report of an independent inquiry conducted by Prof. Labh Singh into the milk supply of Lyallpur is in the press, and will shortly be published by the Board.

One of last year's investigations was into the "economic conditions of gut-makers in and around Sialkot." It has now been decided to examine the whole question of supply, manufacture and marketing of gut in the province, and to collect material about lac, with a view to publishing monographs of practical value to businessmen exploring avenues of outlet for their capital.

A new investigation has been launched into "marketing practices in the Punjab;" this enquiry, as that into weights and measures, should be of value in directing public policy.

The present programme of the Board is to start few fresh investigations but to speed up the arrears of publishing work. Two village surveys of Jullundur and Rohtak districts are now nearing publication, while those of four others, *viz.*, Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Lyallpur and Multan have been edited; surveys

of Hissar, Sialkot, Jhelum, Ambala and Montgomery districts are being prepared for the press.

During the year the Royal Commission on Labour asked for data regarding the standard of living of factory workers in the Punjab, who were getting Rs. 50 per month and less. A special inquiry was conducted by the Urban section, and the results of the investigation sent to the Commission.

It is interesting to see that the Board is beginning to fill the role of a bureau for the supply of economic data to Government and other bodies. Thus during the year it was able to tabulate data for Government regarding the alienation of land by the smaller owners among agricultural tribes to larger owners among similar tribes, and was also able to supply some material to the Tariff Board regarding *gur*. It also gave appreciable help to the Punjab Banking Inquiry Committee.

Mr. Calvert continued to act as the Chairman of the Board. Professor W. H. Myles resigned the post of Secretary as he is not returning to India. This is a great loss to the Board, to which he had rendered service of great value for several years. Mr. J. W. Thomas, Principal of the Hailey College of Commerce, has now taken over the duties of Secretary.

18. The number of suits for enhancement of cash rents of occupancy tenants decided in the whole province fell from 359 to 349 in the year. Of this number 245 were successful. The decrease in the number of successful suits in the Hoshiarpur district reported last year has been maintained during the year under report. Only three cases were brought for reduction of rent: all failed.

19. Twenty decrees for ejection under section 39 of the Tenancy Act were passed in the year, as against 24 last year. The total number of occupancy

tenants actually ejected was 93, compared with 168 last year.

The total number of decrees under sections 40 and 45 (6) of the Tenancy Act for ejection of tenants-at-will shows an increase of 322 over the figure for last year, *viz.*, 2,245 against 1,923. The figures for Hissar and Rohtak have risen considerably: the figure for Hoshiarpur, though high, is about the same as last year. The increase in the Hissar district over last year's figure is marked, and is due to the *kisan* trouble. The increase in Rohtak district is due to the dispute between the landlords and tenants of Chhuchak-was village which continued for some time. It has now been amicably settled.

The number of ejections ordered under section 45 (5) of the Tenancy Act fell from 5,073 to 4,933, actual ejections rose from 4,032 to 4,114. The number of suits to contest liability to ejection decided in favour of tenants was 353, against 472 last year.

20. No new *jagir* was notified under the Descent of Jagirs Act during the year. The total number of *jagirs* notified under the Act so far is 152.

21. The total area irrigated in the Province by canals under departmental management increased from 13,022,516 acres last year to 13,164,888 during the year under report. The area matured on them also increased from 11,974,053 to 12,113,932 acres.

The income derived from fixed canal-advantage rate by the Irrigation Department showed a slight decrease from Rs. 16,85,271 last year to Rs. 16,54,925 during the year; while that for fluctuating canal revenue showed a slight increase from Rs. 2,14,18,018 to Rs. 2,14,45,127. There was thus a net decrease of Rs. 3,237 only in the income from these two heads as compared with that of last year.

Perennial canals are fully dealt with in the Administration Report of the Irrigation Department. It will,

therefore, suffice to give here a brief description of the inundation canals under its management. The statement below gives the more important figures for such canals:—

The Sidhnai canal did well during the year. Abnormal floods in August and September 1929 in the Indus and Chenab did so much damage to the Muzaffargarh inundation canals that money which would otherwise have been spent on their improvement had to be spent on repairs. But the remodelling of the Kot Sultan-cum-Mohanwah canal and its branch, and of a part of the Sardarwah branch of the Magasson canal of the Indus series during the year, will, it is anticipated, remove to some extent long outstanding complaints of short supply of water in them. The Shahpur and Dera Ghazi Khan inundation canals and the Chenab series worked fairly well during the year, but the crops on them suffered considerably from the heavy floods in autumn 1929.

23. A few canals are under the control of Deputy Commissioners or the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board. The

No irrigation was possible from the Rangoi Canal in Hissar during the year: this canal has long been out of use. The Ghaggar canals ran badly. The removal of the Devigarh bunds in that stream during July 1930 by the Patiala Darbar under pressure from the Bikaner and British Governments was satisfactory: had this not been done much of the important rice crop lower down, in the Sirsa tahsil of Hissar and Bikaner territory, would undoubtedly have failed. Permanent arrangements as to the best method to divide the water of the Ghaggar between Patiala, Bikaner and ourselves are under examination. The problem is far from easy.

The supply in the Shah Nahr canal was adequate throughout the season. The working of the Grey canals was satisfactory. A notable feature was the construction of a new branch, Hearnwah, for which the zamindars concerned have agreed to pay an extra rate of Re. 1 per *ghamaon* to be levied on the new

canal commanded area, till the recovery of the cost incurred thereon. The percentage of *kharaba* allowed on these canals has always caused concern. It is satisfactory to note that the percentage allowed during the year under report was 1.2 per cent. less than the figure of the previous year : 24.8 per cent. against 26 per cent. The Namal canal in the Mianwali district did well in spite of poor rainfall.

The Gurgaon bunds and the Kangra *kuhls* stand in a different category. During the year the Bhond, Biloj, Bhatka, Kheri Lala and Dhina bunds were completed. The construction of four more bunds was undertaken as a measure of famine relief during the year, but only one (Ghairatpur Bas) was completed. The Assoti *nadi*, the floods in which often cause much damage in and about Rewari town, was dammed by the Dhina bund, which has proved a success in its first year of construction : it is hoped that this barren and sandy tract may soon grow flourishing crops. The construction of these bunds has increased the *sailaba* area by about 2,600 acres over the area irrigated by bunds in 1928-29. *Kuhls* in the Kangra district were generally well kept and properly managed. Two new *kuhls* were constructed in Nurpur tahsil by zamindars, and remission of land revenue to cover the cost of their construction was granted.

In Dera Ghazi Khan irrigation is chiefly done through hill torrents, the supply in which is not perennial. The Irrigation Department appointed an officer to suggest measures to improve the irrigation of the district. He has submitted his report, which is under the consideration of the Irrigation Department. In July and August 1929 there were heavy floods in these hill torrents, which resulted in loss of life and serious damage to crops and houses. The floods, however, deposited silt ; and thus enabled a large area to be brought under cultivation in the Pachad circle, which usually lies beyond the limit of irrigation. But locust visitations only a month later largely nullified, as the following figures show, the good effect of the floods.

A notification was issued under section 49 of the Punjab Minor Canals Act, III of 1905, to regulate the flow of water in the Leh river, which passes through Rawalpindi town. The object was to prevent pollution of the water, and thereby to improve the sanitation of the town.

23. The administration of the Land Acquisition Act during the year was satisfactory. For various public purposes 4,648·8615 acres of land were acquired at a cost of Rs. 15,61,163, as against 4,611·0625 acres for Rs. 15,33,903 in the preceding year.

The total average price per acre was Rs. 334, as against Rs. 312 in 1927-28 and Rs. 333 in 1928-29. The largest areas acquired were 848 acres in Montgomery, 730 in Lyallpur, 657 in Ferozepore, 489 in Multan, 537 in Lahore, 359 in Sialkot, and 174 in Muzaffargarh.

The area acquired in Lyallpur district was mainly for railway use.

The areas acquired in Montgomery, Ferozepore, Multan, Lahore, Sialkot and Muzaffargarh were mainly acquired for canals.

One hundred and twenty-nine acres were restored to the original owners.

24. Rupees 43·14 lakhs granted as loans for the improvement of land were outstanding at the commencement of the year under report: it had risen to Rs. 59·04 lakhs at its close. The amount advanced

during the year was Rs. 17.84 lakhs, compared with Rs. 13.37 lakhs in the previous year. The districts in which the demand for loans was keenest were Hissar (Rs. 2,89,410), Gurgaon (Rs. 2,48,220), Rohtak (Rs. 1,65,320), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 1,36,261), Attock (Rs. 83,650), Shahpur (Rs. 73,000), Jhelum (Rs. 72,175), Montgomery (Rs. 71,370), Ferozepore (Rs. 69,030), Hoshiarpur (Rs. 61,750), and Multan (Rs. 55,650).

Loans under Act, XIX of 1883, were largely taken for the construction of new wells, except in Dera Ghazi Khan, where advances were made chiefly for repairs to wells and the construction of bunds in *rodkoti* lands. Owing to the retrogression of the water level in Jullundur district advances of *taccavi* for well sinking in that district were stopped in 1927, but a large loan of Rs. 30,000 was made to Chaudhri Muhammad Abdul Rahman Khan, M.L.C., of Rahon, for the improvement of the watercourses on his land. It appears from certain district reports that loans were improperly utilised in some cases. In particular in the Sirsa tahsil of Hissar the Commissioner of Ambala was not satisfied with the inspections made by the revenue staff of wells for which *taccavi* loans had been granted. The Financial Commissioner fears that this defect is not uncommon in other districts. He has therefore drawn the attention of all Deputy Commissioners and Commissioners to the instructions contained in paragraph 25 of Standing Order No. 32 to the effect that no instalment of a loan subsequent to the first should be paid, until the officer sanctioning the loan is satisfied that the first instalment has been spent on the purpose for which it was granted.

In the province as a whole 4,516 new wells were sunk; of them 895 were sunk with the aid of *taccavi*, against 763 last year.

Remissions of land revenue were given for 345 wells which fell out of use, against 829 last year; while protective leases were granted for 1,136 wells against 1,453 in the previous year.

A sum of Rs. 3.87 lakhs on account of principal, including arrears, fell due during the year; of it Rs. 2.72 lakhs were collected, leaving a balance of Rs. 1,14,572.

Collections on account of interest amounted to Rs. 1·65 lakhs, leaving a sum of Rs. 69,621 in arrears.

25. The total amount advanced under the Agriculturists Loans Act during the year under report was Rs. 27·86 lakhs, against Rs. 41·42 lakhs last year.

Loans under Agriculturists Loans Act, XII of 1884—Statement No. XVII.

A large proportion of this was distributed in the Hissar and Gurgaon districts to help the cultivators of these scarcity-stricken tracts. Rs. 4,09,417 were advanced in Hissar, and Rs. 4,95,444 in Gurgaon. Other districts in which the demand was heavy were Muzaffargarh (Rs. 2,94,594), Jhelum (Rs. 1,87,740), Jhang (Rs. 1,97,490), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 1,84,897), Multan (Rs. 1,67,500), Shahpur (Rs. 1,40,500), Attock (Rs. 1,08,000), Gujrat (Rs. 70,000) and Mianwali (Rs. 70,000). Simla, Kangra, Jullundur and Lyallpur districts took no *ta'ccavi*.

Collections fell from Rs. 15·95 lakhs last year to Rs. 14·10 lakhs during the year under report. This is mainly due to the depressed agricultural situation. The balance of Rs. 49·79 lakhs outstanding at the end of the previous year rose to Rs. 62·67 lakhs at the end of the year. A sum of Rs. 88,491 was written off as irrecoverable, principally in Rohtak (Rs. 45,379), Gurgaon (Rs. 9,282), Ambala (Rs. 21,909) and Jhelum (Rs. 11,357). Collection of interest amounted to Rs. 88,088, leaving Rs. 57,673 in arrears.

26. The total income from unclassified forests and other Government waste lands under the control of Deputy Commissioners amounted to Rs. 67,98,769 as against Rs. 63,28,614 last year.

Unclassed forests and Government waste lands—Statement No. XXI.

Of this amount the rent payable to Government increased from Rs. 12,03,457 to Rs. 14,01,908, while there was a fall in other miscellaneous income, including *tirni* or grazing dues, from Rs. 9,18,387 to Rs. 9,14,746. The decrease of Rs. 3,641 in "other miscellaneous income" is due mainly to a fall in the income from sales of proprietary rights and undeveloped agricultural land. Of the total demand of Rs. 1,04,277 on account of *tirni*, Rs. 71,031 were collected and Rs. 1,890 remitted. No forest settlement took place during the year.

The management of the Shahpur Kandi forest in the Gurdaspur district continues to be satisfactory. The income from the forests during the year was Rs. 7,626 and expenditure Rs. 6,322, leaving a net profit of Rs. 1,304. As compared with the figures of last year, there is a decrease of Rs. 2,224 in income and of Rs. 439 in expenditure. The decrease in the former is due mainly to the fact that a sum of Rs. 2,145 remained outstanding for collection, while in the latter it is due to some posts having been left unfilled, and also to the absence on leave of the permanent forest girdawar for over six months. The Elliot Pahari Bank, which is financed from the forest fund, is flourishing, and its capital now stands at Rs. 25,240. Resin extraction continued to be profitable: 644 maunds and 36 seers of crude resin were collected at a cost of Rs. 3,371 and was sold for Rs. 5,159, resulting in a profit of Rs. 1,788.

In Shahpur district the income from land revenue on Government land decreased from Rs. 12,66,359 to Rs. 11,32,077. The decrease of Rs. 1,34,282 was due to a decrease in matured area in the Thal rakhs of Khushab tahsil.

The area of unclassed forests and Government waste lands under the control of the Deputy Commissioner, Montgomery, decreased from 8,30,107 acres to 6,84,514 acres, owing to new permanent allotments in colony areas.

The total receipts under this head in the Jhang district show an increase of Rs. 1,68,098, chiefly owing to sale of undeveloped agricultural land in the colony area.

In the Multan district, 86,133 acres were let out on temporary cultivation, of which 38,884 acres were cultivated, as against 28,154 acres in the previous year. Owing to allotments of waste land the area under cultivation by Government tenants in the district was 5,35,038 acres, as against 4,62,128 acres in the previous year.

There was a marked decrease, amounting to Rs. 1,96,214, in the revenue of the Dhundi and Bruceabad Estates in the Dera Ghazi Khan district, owing to high floods in the Indus and in the hill torrents, and also to the fall in prices.

Reafforestation in the Gurgaon district is progressing satisfactorily. The area under reafforestation at the close of last year was 7,637 acres. To it a plot of 38 acres was added during the year, making a total of 7,675 acres, spread over nineteen different villages. During the year, 1,855 acres of closed area were sown. The rains were favourable and seed germinated well. A beginning has been made with the propagation of the Mesquite plant in the district. The growth of grass in the areas under reafforestation operations was good.

27. Operations under the Land Preservation (*Chos*)¹ Act are confined to the two districts² of Hoshiarpur and Ambala.

Punjab Land Preservation (*Chos*) Act, 1900.

The scheme of reclamation and preservation by reafforestation in Hoshiarpur is slowly proving its value. The rapid spread of *kharkana*, *kai* and *nara* plantation in the lower reaches of the Mehngarwal *cho* bed has yielded satisfactory results. Little damage was done by the high floods caused by heavy rain. The deposits in these reaches are now less sandy than formerly, and the scheme is likely to be successful in the long run. A sum of Rs. 1,538-4-0 on account of initial bounties for planting *kharkana* was sanctioned for the year under report, of which Rs. 1,302-0-9 were disbursed, while payment of Rs. 236-3-3 was not accepted by the parties concerned. No fresh remission for voluntary closures was granted during the year. Difficulties are, however, being felt in the reclamation of the upper reaches of the *cho*, where the bed is very wide, and the chances for a lazy village to neutralise the work of its more industrious neighbours by making no real attempt to check the vagaries of the *cho* are many. The reclamation of these reaches is therefore a matter of many years, and demands great perseverance. Gradual improvement is taking place in the hill portion of the Katar Dhar area. The closures in the upper reaches, coupled with intelligent supervision below, have, it is hoped, ensured the district against further deterioration.

During the year 107 criminal cases were instituted, and all were disposed of. A sum of Rs. 670 was imposed in fines, as compared with Rs. 304 last year.

Ambala.—The existing five plantations were properly maintained, and many kikar and *shisham* trees were planted on the banks of *naddis*.

Thirteen cases under the *Chos* Act were decided during the year, as against twenty-five in the preceding year. Convictions were obtained in eleven cases. Fines imposed amounted to Rs. 370. There was an income of Rs. 54 from sale of trees during the year.

The provisional conclusions of the Forests (Siwaliks) Committee as to future action on the report of Mr. Holland, I.F.S., were investigated by local officers, and were generally found impracticable. The matter is, however, being investigated further.

28. The total area of land entered in the revenue records of the Province is 55·323 million acres, of which 29·699 million acres are cultivated. Common lands, village sites, and Government property account for 14·719 million acres, and of the rest 35·442 million acres are owned by agricultural tribes, and 5·161 million acres by "others". The area cultivated during the year under report was less by 29,974 acres than that of the previous year. Marked decreases occurred in the Montgomery, Hissar and Kangra districts, but in the Multan, Lyallpur and Gurgaon districts the cultivated areas increased. The cultivated area under mortgage in the year is 10·8 per cent. of the total cultivated area; the corresponding figure last year was 10·7 per cent.

The cultivated area sold (1,42,132 acres) represents only .0048 per cent. of the total cultivated area of the Province. There has been no marked increase in the area sold in any district. Sales are, however, heavy in Muzaffargarh, Dera Ghazi Khan, Ferozepore and Attock. Appreciable decreases in sales were noticed in Hissar, Shahpur, Multan and Mianwali. The decrease in Hissar is accounted for by the state of the money market, and the fact that zamindars of the district are said to be beginning to appreciate the value of their land. In Shahpur the decrease is in part attributed to the reluctance of zamindars to sell their lands : they prefer mortgages. The tendency to mortgage, rather than sell, is also noticeable in Multan. No particular reason is assigned for the decrease in sales in Mianwali.

The area mortgaged exceeded the area redeemed by 1,36,930 acres. The increase is mainly due to successive unfavourable harvests, and the tendency of zamindars to mortgage rather than sell their lands to meet their debts. The cultivated area under usufruc-

tuary mortgage increased from 3,178,843 acres to 3,21,820 acres during the year.

The area (ownership) transferred by gift decreased from 89,249 to 83,190 acres.

30. The average recorded sale price of cultivated land increased from Rs. 372 per acre last year to Rs. 406 per acre during the year. The increase is due to the increasing disinclination of zamindars not to sell their lands: they prefer, as has just been said, to meet their obligations and reduce their debts by mortgaging them. The sale price of land for the Province as a whole represents 261 years' purchase of the land revenue against 245 last year, and six at the commencement of British occupation. The mortgage value of land the ownership of which was mortgaged during the year was Rs. 532.39 lakhs against 553.54 lakhs last year, and represents 113.04 times the land revenue assessment of the land involved, a figure somewhat lower than that of last year. The average mortgage money per acre of the area mortgaged (ownership) was Rs. 168 against Rs. 174 last year.

31. No new tribes were notified as agricultural tribes under the Alienation of Land Act during the year. Statutory agricultural tribes gained by purchase a net area of 10,071 acres, against 14,138 acres last year, but lost by mortgage a net area of 35,864 acres and by redemption by "others" from agriculturists 28,724 acres, compared with losses of 35,175 and 26,147 acres respectively last year. Sales by agricultural tribes have decreased from 1,67,177 to 1,59,956 acres.

It is obviously difficult to prevent *benami* transactions altogether. But it is gratifying to note that they are now said to be insignificant, save in the Rohtak, Gurgaon, Ambala and Sialkot districts.

The ruling of the High Court that the land of a member of an agricultural tribe, who has been declared insolvent, vests in the Official Receiver, and that he is at liberty to sell it to another agriculturist, has been reversed by a Division Bench of the same Court. This

ruling was welcomed by the agricultural tribes, who regard the Land Alienation Act as their *magna charta*. Later in the year, however, the High Court gave another ruling to the effect that there is no distinct provision in the Punjab Alienation of Land Act prohibiting a Civil Court from granting a lease of the land of a member of an agricultural tribe for more than 20 years in execution of a decree. This ruling is, in law, unassailable, and points to a defect in the phraseology of the Act: one of its main objects was to restrict the period of temporary alienations to 20 years. Government is introducing a short Bill to remedy this defect, and to lay down, in unambiguous terms, that the period of temporary alienation of the land of a statutory agriculturist can exceed 20 years in no case.

32. Nineteen thousand nine hundred and two revenue cases were pending with Collectors or their Assistants at the commencement of the year under report. Fresh institutions during the year numbered 1,77,594, but disposals amounted to 1,76,090 cases only. Accordingly the number of pending cases at the close of the year was 21,406. Pending cases were most numerous in the districts of Multan, Amritsar, Lahore and Hoshiarpur. Commissioners decided 584 revenue judicial appeals: at the close of the year 115 were pending with them for more than three months. They also decided 1,970 revenue executive appeals during the year. The Financial Commissioners decided 77 appeals, and 329 applications for revision.

Proceedings of the Governor of the Punjab in Council in the Department (Revenue), No. 1875-R., dated 3rd August 1932.

READ—

The Annual Report on the Land Revenue Administration of the Punjab for the year ending the 30th September 1932.

REMARKS.—The year ending the 30th September 1931 is the second of the catastrophic fall in prices which began at the end of April 1930. On the 23rd of that month wheat sold at Lyallpur at Rs. 3-9-0 per maund. By the end of December 1930 it had fallen to Re. 1-11-0. After a brief recovery to Rs. 2-5-0 in January, it was down to Re. 1-9-0 in April 1931. It touched Re. 1-13-0 in August but was down to Re. 1-8-0 at the end of September. Other commodities fell likewise, for example, cotton which averaged Rs. 6-5-0 in 1929-30 was Rs. 4-2-0 during the year under report. The climatic conditions though not good, were, except in the south-east of the Province, not particularly bad. Twenty-one per cent. of the sown area failed in the kharif and 14 in the rabi. Under such conditions the collection of the Land Revenue continued to exercise the very close attention of Government, and it was felt that the fall in prices justified a substantial remission of revenue which took the form of special remissions in kharif 1930 in areas under rice and cotton in certain tracts, by which relief to the extent of rupees 11 lakhs in land revenue and rupees 20 lakhs in occupiers' rates was given. In rabi 1931 remissions of Rs. 84 lakhs in land revenue and rupees 29 lakhs in occupiers' rates were given by a uniform remission of five annas in the rupee of land revenue, and three annas in the rupee in occupiers' rate assessed on wheat only. The total special land revenue remissions in the year under report amounted to Rs. 95 lakhs in addition to which suspensions of Rs. 15·76 lakhs were given under the ordinary rules in addition to the remission of Rs. 13·86 lakhs previously suspended. Of the total fixed demand of Rs. 237·49 lakhs for the year only 76 per cent. (180·74 lakhs) was collected; Rs. 15·76 lakhs were suspended and Rs. 37·66 lakhs shown as irrecoverable chiefly on account of the remissions of the previous year which had not been formally struck off the rent roll by the end of the year. Of the recoverable demand 97 per cent. was collected. This is not of course the standard of collection to which the Punjab has been used in years of prosperity when it has been the exception for less than 99 per cent. of the fixed demand to be

collected. But the uncollected balance, Rs. 3.31 lakhs in all, cannot be regarded as excessive in the circumstances.

The fluctuating land revenue was decreased by remission of Rs. 46.16 lakhs. Rupees 179.5 lakhs were collected, and there was a balance due of Rs. 9½ lakhs. It is very unusual to have any portion of this demand in arrears, and it is worthy of special comment that even in the most unfavourable conditions the large fluctuating demands in Lyallpur and Gujrat were collected practically in their entirety. This is a result creditable to the Collectors, especially as they were able to bring it about without the actual execution of any coercive process. The great bulk of the balances was in four districts in the south-west of the Province.

In connection with the collection of land revenue the figures of processes issued to enforce it are illuminating. One reassuring fact is that even in the peculiar difficulties of the year over nine-tenths of the revenue was paid without process. Nevertheless it is unusual even for a tenth of the revenue to be brought in by this means and the increase in the number of processes is significant of a time of stress. Not too much importance need be paid to writs of demand—it is largely a matter of local practice whether this method is employed rather than verbal admonition, and it must also be remembered that warrants for arrest and sale in the majority of cases do not proceed to execution. Warrants actually executed show a marked difference as between district and district, the Multan division (except Lyallpur) again being the heaviest and Jullundur much the lightest.

The recovery of taccavi is another matter which has given serious cause for concern. Under the Land Improvement Loans Act the year ended with recoverable balances of Rs. 2.08 lakhs for principal and Rs. 3.78 for interest. Under the Agriculturists' Loans Act Rs. 8.12 lakhs were written off as irrecoverable and the outstanding balance was Rs. 51.40 lakhs. This includes balances under suspension, but the suspension of balances under this Act is itself abnormal. Reviewing the situation as a whole, the salient fact is that the revenue system of the Province, caught in the economic blizzard which has raged over the world, has weathered the storm, at any rate for the year under report, with as little damage of goods as might be expected and none of the ship. This result it owes partly to its elasticity. No prudent theory could tolerate remission of fixed land revenue

because of a fall in prices, or of fluctuating land revenue for any cause, but when these things became necessary it was found that the Punjab system admitted of them. And this elasticity extends down to the furthest ramifications of the system, through the Commissioner and the Collector to the Tahsildar, who in their respective sphere have to apply general principles to the actual human factors of the situation. There is a moral to be drawn here for the benefit of those who press ignorantly for the abolition of the post of Commissioner. Without the Commissioner as local adviser to Government on the one hand on matters of policy, and to the Collector on the other on the method of its administration, it would not have been possible that measures and methods could have been so successfully adapted to meet a wholly unprecedented calamity.

The Governor in Council agrees with the Financial Commissioner that the report which is considerably above the limit prescribed many years ago could not have been curtailed without loss. Besides the matters of vital moment which have been reviewed above, it contains an account of many activities of the department of which a record should be kept. The proceedings of the Waterlogging Board and the Board of Economic Enquiry are of particular interest.

The office of the Financial Commissioner (Revenue) was held during the year by Mr. C. A. H. Townsend, C.I.E., I.C.S., who retired from the service shortly after its close. In Mr. Townsend the Punjab Government loses an officer who has spent his whole service in the Revenue Department, or as Director of the allied Department of Agriculture; his wide and varied knowledge of revenue in all its branches was of great value to the administration and the Punjab Government takes this opportunity of placing on record its high appreciation of Mr. Townsend's work throughout his long career in the Province.

1. (a) For the Kharif crop of 1930 the rainfall in June was above normal in the south-eastern and montane tracts and generally below normal elsewhere. In July it was moderate to heavy but below normal in August and September. The season was not favourable for the sowing of the rabi crop. The winter rains, though not sufficient, proved beneficial to standing crops. Frost in December and January did considerable damage to the crops. Rust, smut and white-ant attacks did no less harm to the wheat crop in some districts, and dry winds and a sudden rise in temperature at the end of March and in the beginning of April caused some shrivelling of grain in the barani and late sown wheat. The weather during April and May was generally dry and favourable for harvesting operations.

(b) During the year under report Gurgaon was again unfortunate in receiving scanty rainfall. The Kharif harvest was consequently average in the most favoured areas and considerably below average elsewhere. The failure of rain in the following month frustrated all hopes of a successful rabi crop. Roli (rust) damaged the barley and wheat, and chepa (an insect) practically destroyed the sarsaf crop—the chief cash paying crop of the barani tract. On account of scanty rainfall in 1930-31 the Naili tract of the Karnal district was also adversely affected.

In the Gurgaon district four test works were re-opened, one in each tahsil Gurgaon, Rewari, Palwal and Ferozepore. The work at Masani tank in the Rewari tahsil was closed within two weeks of its opening as the people of that tahsil, as on previous occasions, did not come to the famine test works. Elsewhere in the second week of May attendance

began to increase. Further works had then to be opened bringing the total number to 14. During the period ending 18th July 1931, the attendance reached the maximum of 35,500 labourers. Most of the test works had to be closed by 12th August 1931. The scarcity works at Rehari and Righar bunds, however, remained open till the 15th August.

In the Karnal district test works were opened after the 27th July, 1931 at Guhla, Pehowa, Diwana and Siwan. The work at the first three places failed to attract a single labourer. At Siwan, on an average 362 persons belonging to the village turned up daily for labour, but no one from the adjoining villages. The work at Siwan was finally closed on 5th September 1931, as it appeared that the tract did not require relief.

The relief operations in Gurgaon cost Government a little over Rs. 1½ lakhs, while in the Karnal district, Rs. 1,748 only.

Apart from the direct relief afforded to the needy, suspensions and remissions of land revenue were sanctioned and *taccavi* advances were granted on a liberal scale.

(c) Climatic conditions not being favourable for sowing, the area sown fell from 13.22 million acres last year to 12.91 million acres. The failed area was 21 per cent. of the sown area as against 35 per cent. in the last year. The increase in matured area was due to timely rainfall which proved beneficial for the standing crops. Percentages of crop failure were high in the districts of Mianwali, Gurgaon, Dera Ghazi Khan, Hissar, Attock and Muzaffargarh.

(d) The total area under rabi sowings also fell from 17.73 million acres in the previous year to 17.35 million acres. The failed area rose from 12 per cent. in the preceding year to 14 per cent. during the year under report. This was due to insufficient rain and damage caused to the crops by frost, rust, smut and white-ants. Percentages of crop failure were high in the districts of Gurgaon, Dera Ghazi Khan and Hissar.

(e) The total area sown and matured was 30.26 and 25.12 million acres, respectively, as compared with 30.95 and 24.55 million acres in the preceding year. While the matured area has

actually risen, the total sown area fell by 2 per cent. as compared with the last year. The decrease in the sown area is due to unfavourable climatic conditions at the time of sowing of both the harvests and also due to the abnormal fall in prices and want of floods.

(f) Crops which showed the highest outturn above normal were cotton (20 per cent.) and bajra (32 per cent.). The area under cotton fell from 2.20 million acres to 2.16 million acres; i.e., a decrease of 2 per cent. over last year's figure. This decrease was due to the fall in the price of cotton, scarcity of rain and appearance of locusts at the time of sowing. Owing to the unfavourable season at the time of sowing, the area under wheat, though 4 per cent. above normal, fell from 9.95 million acres to 9.28 million acres in the year under report. In the case of other important crops the total outturns were above normal for rice (15 per cent.), maize (13 per cent.), and below normal for barley (89 per cent.), jowar (35 per cent.), rabi oil-seeds (16 per cent.), sugarcane (8 per cent.) and gram (5 per cent.).

(g) There was a further fall in the prices of all the principal crops in the year under report, attributable to the fall in export, and trade depression throughout the world.

(h) The year was healthy, but for sporadic cases of plague, small-pox, cholera, influenza, pneumonia and malaria which did not interfere with agricultural operations to an appreciable extent. In the Kulu tahsil of the Kangra district influenza caused much loss of life. The unprecedented fall in prices greatly affected the agriculturists' economic life and condition, and matters would have gone still worse with them but for the special remissions of land revenue and occupiers' rate amounting to a crore and 46 lakhs of rupees during the year under report.

(i) During the year under report the condition of cattle was on the whole satisfactory and fodder was sufficient except in parts of a few districts. Rinderpest and foot and mouth disease broke out in parts of some districts but there was not much mortality.

2. The total fixed land revenue demand of the year under report was Rs. 237.49 lakhs as against Rs. 239.17 lakhs during the preceding year, a decrease of Rs. 1.68 lakhs. This decrease is in the main due to the imposition of fluctuating assessment in place of fixed in the districts of Montgomery and Multan. Out of the total demand a sum of Rs. 180.74 lakhs, i. e., 76.1 per cent. were collected, thus leaving at the close of the year a balance of Rs. 56.74 lakhs of which Rs. 15.76 lakhs were under suspension; Rs. 3.31 lakhs were recoverable and 37.66 irrecoverable. The balance was Rs. 24 lakhs in the Ambala division, Rs. 11.17 lakhs in Jullundur, Rs. 11.70 lakhs in Lahore, Rs. 6.76 lakhs in Rawalpindi and Rs. 3.11 lakhs in Multan. Of the recoverable demand 97.09 per cent. was collected.

Out of the land revenue suspended during the year under report Rs. 13.58 lakhs were suspended in the Ambala division alone. In Gurgaon a sum of about 7 lakhs was suspended while in Rohtak and Hissar, Rs. 3.57 lakhs and Rs. 1.70 lakhs were suspended, respectively. These suspensions were due to the failure of crops.

The sum of Rs. 37.66 lakhs shown as irrecoverable mainly consists of special remissions granted on account of the phenomenal fall in the prices of agricultural produce. A further sum of Rs. 3,964 was remitted during the year under report in the districts of Lahore, Shahpur, Jhelum,

Rawalpindi, Attock and Muzaffargarh on account of damage to crops by hailstorm, drought, etc.

Out of the total land revenue under suspension on account of the current year and past years' demand a sum of Rs. 2·41 lakhs was collected and a sum of Rs. 13·86 lakhs was remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 41·50 lakhs under suspension at the close of the year. The largest balances under suspension were in the districts of Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak. The balance in Gurgaon was Rs. 16·98 lakhs as against Rs. 19·61 lakhs in the preceding year. In Hissar and Rohtak the balances were Rs. 8·85 lakhs and Rs. 9·50 lakhs, respectively. Out of the suspended land revenue, which was remitted during the year under report, Rs. 9·60 lakhs were remitted in Gurgaon alone and Rs. 2·65 lakhs in Rohtak.

3. During the year under report 21,288 acres of land were added by alluvion and 33,466 acres were lost by diluvion, thus resulting in a loss of 12,178 acres as compared with 128 acres in the previous year. The district, which suffered the most from river action was Jhelum. It lost on the whole 7,322 acres. Other districts which were considerably affected by river action, were Ferozepore, Gujrat and Shahpur, each of which lost more than 1,000 acres. Ambala was the only district which gained more than 1,000 acres.

Twenty-one thousand two hundred and eighty-eight acres of land added by alluvion were newly assessed at a sum of Rs. 23,272, while on 33,466 acres washed away by river action revenue amounting to Rs. 37,558 was remitted. Revenue was increased by Rs. 11,646 on 12,397 acres of land improved by alluvion and reduced by Rs. 3,751 on 6,722 acres damaged by diluvion. The net *khalsa* loss to the fixed land revenue roll was Rs. 7,322 as against a net gain of Rs. 9,487 in the preceding year.

4. Collections of fluctuating land revenue permanently excluded from the fixed land revenue roll show a decrease from Rs. 287·37 lakhs to Rs. 179·51 lakhs during the year under report of which 163·74 lakhs is on account of canal irrigated lands. The decrease is accounted for by remissions: 46·16 lakhs of fluctuating revenue were remitted in rabi 1931 in addition to a portion of the total remission of 11·19 lakhs on all accounts for kharif 1930. The decreases in collection are most marked in the Multan, Sheikhpura,

Montgomery, Jhang, Gujrat, Shahpur and Gujranwala districts. The heavy decrease in the Multan district is also partly due to early closure of inundation canals, scanty rainfall and lack of floods. The total demand assessed was collected with the exception of 3.51 lakhs which added to 0.56 lakhs outstanding on account of previous years brings the total amount outstanding to 4.07 lakhs. This is chiefly accounted for by Montgomery (0.83), Multan (1.19), Muzaffargarh (0.47), and Dera Ghazi Khan (0.50) which make up between them 2.99 lakhs. In Lyallpur, on the other hand, Rs. 2,000 only are outstanding out of the total fluctuating demand of nearly Rs. 57 lakhs. With the exception of Rs. 244 the entire fluctuating land revenue demand amounting to Rs. 8.27 lakhs has been collected in the Gujrat district. Gujranwala also shows a balance of only Rs. 217 out of entire fluctuating demand of 7.98 lakhs. On the whole, except in the districts of the Multan division above mentioned, fluctuating land revenue was collected if not with the completeness which this form of revenue demands yet with less difficulty than might have been expected in a time of acute economic crisis.

5. The collection of "other land revenue" during the year under report amounts to Re. 6.25 lakhs as compared with Rs. 9.69 lakhs during the preceding year.

Other land revenue—
Statement No. VIII.

The total uncollected balance of other land revenue for the whole province at the close of the year amounted to 1.56 lakhs as compared with 1.62 lakhs in the previous year.

Balances in Rawalpindi, Gujrat and Kangra are insignificant while Gujranwala shows no balance. Balances in Shahpur, Muzaffargarh, Sheikhpura, Montgomery, Dera Ghazi Khan and Mianwali are considerable.

6. In accordance with the scheme inaugurated in 1917 for the grant of special jagirs, twenty jagirs of Rs. 250 per annum each were granted during the year to non-officials and retired officials, in recognition of meritorious services. The total number of such jagirs sanctioned since 1917 is 193, and the amount of land revenue assigned in respect thereof is Rs. 74,900.

In addition to these jagirs, Government sanctioned thirty life *Muafis* of Rs. 100 per annum for valuable services rendered to the district administration.

In connection with famine relief operations in the Gujraon district some land-owners came forward to give their land for the extension of village tanks, free of cost. Some of the donors gave as much as two *bighas* or $1\frac{1}{4}$ acres of *chahi* land free for the purpose. These philanthropic services were recognised by Government by the grant of a remission of land revenue amounting to Rs. 21 per annum for the remaining term of settlement, and by the grant of seven *maafis* of the aggregate value of Rs. 120 per annum, for the lifetime of the recipients.

Consequent on the abolition of the *batai jagir* system in the Dera Ghazi Khan district, the question of *kasurs*, which was bound up with the collections in kind was considered. Orders converting the existing *kasurs* into cash *inams* were issued.

Owing to the fall in the prices of agricultural produce, special remissions of land revenue had to be granted on a generous scale. The effect of such remissions on cash jagirs, such as those granted under the scheme of 1917 or to Indian Officers of the Army, was considered. Since the association with land of a jagirdar is accepted with the full knowledge of the danger that at times his revenue will not be collected it was ruled by the Punjab Government, on the basis of a decision of the Government of India, that all cash jagirs should be reduced proportionately to the remission in the land revenue demand in any particular harvest.

Jagir registers of the Montgomery and Okara tahsils have been revised and orders passed on most of them.

7. The number of processes issued during the year was 26,095 as compared with 19,675 last year. The more important figures are as under:—

The total land revenue collections during the year amounted to Rs. 372.81 lakhs. It was necessary to issue processes for the recovery of Rs. 82.55 lakhs, as against Rs. 26.51 lakhs last year. These figures are significant of a period of serious difficulty.

The Multan division obviously stands by itself; but from this must be excepted Lyallpur. Lyallpur shows 1,601 processes all told but save for 225 writs it was not necessary to execute a single one—a remarkable achievement for a district paying so large a revenue. The Multan division figures are no doubt inflated by the practice which is much more common in that district than elsewhere of issuing writs, but the warrants of distress and sales executed are heavier here than in other parts of the province. Multan with 365 warrants executed against lambardars is prominent. In the Rawalpindi division there is a curious difference between the adjoining districts of Gujrat and Shahpur—processes all told were 38 in Gujrat and 846 in Shahpur: Gujrat had one process executed and Shahpur 542. The Financial Commissioner was told that the only part of Gujrat where there was the least difficulty was that adjoining the Shahpur border. Rawalpindi like Gujrat was in an enviable position with only 14 processes, and Attock and Mianwali though they issued more processes had no occasion to execute any. In the Jullundur division Ferozepore is the only district which gave serious trouble. In all 543 processes were issued in this district. Two hundred and seventeen warrants of arrest were issued of which 170 were executed. In the districts of Hoshiarpur and Jullundur warrants of arrest issued were 67 and 79 respectively, but with the exception of 3 in Hoshiarpur none was executed in the Jullundur district.

In the Lahore division 4,040 processes were issued. Out of these 1,888 processes were issued in the Lahore district

alone. Out of 889 warrants of arrest issued 721 were executed. The number of warrants of distress issued and executed in this district was 491 and 477 respectively. The number of warrants of arrest in the Amritsar district though not so heavy as in Lahore was by no means small. One hundred and ninety-four warrants of arrest were actually executed in this district. Distress warrants issued were considerable, though only 106 were executed. In the Sheikhpura district 317 warrants of arrest were executed out of 450 issued. In Gujranwala out of 234 distress warrants issued 165 were executed. In Gurdaspur 236 warrants of arrest were actually executed. It appears that with the exception of Sialkot almost all the other districts in the Lahore division gave considerable difficulty to the local authorities in the collection of land revenue.

Out of 3,707 warrants of all kinds issued in the Ambala division as many as 1,189 were issued in the Ambala district alone. The number of warrants of arrest was fairly large both in Rohtak and Ambala. Only 54 warrants of arrest were executed in Ambala as against 112 in Rohtak. In Karnal 192 warrants of arrest were executed. Out of 408 distress warrants issued in the division 132 were executed in this district. Out of 71 processes of sale for the whole division 40 were executed in Rohtak. The number of processes issued in Hissar and Gurgaon was also considerable.

8. During the year under report temporary establishment at a total cost of Rs. 3,906 was maintained for short periods in 11 districts as against 12 in the previous year for the purpose of serving processes for the recovery of land revenue. In the remaining districts of the province processes were served by the ordinary tahsil establishment or through post.

It is satisfactory to note that the system of serving processes by post was made use of in 11 districts during the year under report as against 5 districts during the previous year. In the Ambala district 226 processes were served by post as against 57 during the previous year, whereas in Ferozepore the number of processes went up from 155 to 526. The postal system works best in those districts where means of communication are good and the postal facilities adequate.

9. Settlement operations continued up to the end of March 1931 for a period of six months only during the year under report in the two Ravi tahsils (Montgomery and Okara) of the Montgomery district and Khanewal tahsil of the Multan district. The work of measurement, the preparation of maps and attestation of records of all these tahsils was completed. Besides the inspection of villages in the Montgomery and Khanewal tahsils, preparation of abstract village note books, revision of muafi registers, collection of assessment statistics and schemes for gradual reduction of lambardars' were carried out.

The revision of the record of rights and re-measurement of six tikas of the Palampur tahsil of the Kangra district were finished in November 1930. The correction of the record of rights prepared for the Attock district during the recent settlement was also completed during the year under report.

The rectangulation operations in the Ferozepore district were brought to a close on the 31st March 1931, when the post of the Rectangulation Officer was abolished and the pending files and records handed over to the district staff. In the course of these operations which lasted for a period of six months during the year under report, 377 villages were re-measured and their maps prepared.

10. Government did not pass orders on the final settlement report of the Muzaffargarh district, as it was apprehended that the fixed assessment in the Muzaffargarh tahsil had broken down. Government therefore decided to place Mr. J. D. Anderson, late Settlement Officer, on special duty to enquire and report on the desirability of substituting a fluctuating system of assessment as current in the Alipur and Kot Adu tahsils. The orders of Government were passed on the final settlement report of Jhang district. The term of settlement has been fixed, strictly in accordance with the provisions of the Land Revenue (Amendment) Act, 1928, at 40 years for the non-colony portions of the Thal tract in Jhang and Shorkot tahsils, 30 years for the whole of the Chiniot tahsil, colony portion and Chenab and Jhelum nahri circles of the non-colony portion of the Jhang tahsil, and 20 years for the rest of the Jhang and Shorkot tahsils.

11. The only settlement which came to an end during the year under report was that of the Lower Bari Doab Colony areas of the Multan and Montgomery districts. The announcement of the new assessment had to be postponed on account of the serious drop in the prices of agricultural produce. The settlement work in all respects has been completed and records kept ready for assessment orders in the future as soon as prices become stable. The settlement operations, which commenced in October 1927, closed on 31st March 1931 lasting for a period of 3½ years as was anticipated in the forecast report. The total cost of settlement operations was Rs. 4,90,000 as against an estimated cost of Rs. 5 lakhs.

12. The report on the reassessment of urban areas in the old and now Pattoki mandis in the Chunian tahsil of Lahore district, the term of settlement of which expired in rabi 1930, was received, but as it contained a number of errors and omissions it was not found possible to review it. The report was therefore returned to the local officers to be reprinted. The forecast reports of Lyallpur district (excluding urban areas), and the Rakh Branch colony area of the Sheikhpura district, the term of settlement of which is due to expire in kharif 1932, were received last year, but Government decided that in view of the adverse economic conditions prevailing in the country the question of revision of the assessment of the tract should be postponed. For the same reason the preparation of a forecast report for the Kasur tahsil of the Lahore district, the term of settlement of which is due to expire in kharif 1933, was deferred for consideration till early in 1932 and no orders were passed during the year under report on the revision of assessment of the Lower Bari Doab Colony areas in the Montgomery and Multan districts, the sanctioned period of settlement of which expired in rabi 1929.

13. Settlement staff continued to work in the Lower Bari Doab Colony area of the Montgomery and Multan districts during the first six months of the year under report, after which the operations were closed and the whole staff was disbanded and reverted to their respective districts. The Settlement Officer proceeded on ten months' leave out of India.

A kanungo, six patwaris and three chainmen were employed for a short period for the measurement of six *tikas* of *kothis* Kohi and Sowar in the Kangra district.

The staff employed in Lyallpur district in connection with killabandi and colonization operations on the Pir Mahal, Burala and Khikhi extensions of the Lower Chenab Canal remained at work throughout the year.

14. The following operations were carried out by the Survey of India Department during the year:—

The "A" Survey Company carried out a revision survey in 1,520 square miles on the scale of one inch to a mile in the Lahore, Amritsar, Gurdaspur, Sialkot, Gujranwala and Sheikhpura districts and a resurvey in 119 square miles on the scale of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch to a mile in the Murree hills, besides supplementary triangulation for $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch resurvey.

Verification of new topographical details communicated by other departments were carried out in the Sheikhpura, Gujranwala, Shahpur, Lyallpur, Montgomery and Lahore districts.

No. 14 Party (Pendulum) took observations for determining the force of gravity at Rewari (district Gurgaon), Hissar and Ambala.

No. 23 Party (Irrigation Surveys) continued its operations and surveyed 998 square miles on the 4 inch scale in the area commanded by the Mazaffargarh district Indus Canals Project and embedded permanent markstones at the corners of all 8,000 acre rectangles in the area surveyed. In addition 2,201 square miles of rectangulation to 25 acres and 1,006 square miles of tertiary levelling were completed in the area commanded by the Bhakra Dam Irrigation Project in the Ferozepore, Ludhiana and Hissar districts and in the Faridkot, Patiala and Kalsia States.

The work done by the Latitude and Magnetic Detachments was as follows:—

Latitude.—Astronomical latitudes were observed at 16 stations situated in the Gurdaspur, Amritsar, Ferozepore and Hissar districts.

Magnetic.—Magnetic observations were carried out at 4 repeat stations situated in the Lahore, Rawalpindi, Mianwali and Hissar districts.

15. An important alteration in district boundaries during the year under report was the transfer of 2 villages (6,872 acres) from Jhang, and 40 villages with Government waste (in all 98,220 acres) from Multan to the Lyallpur district, being the area to be irrigated by the Burala and Khikhi Extensions of the Lower Chenab Canal. Also an area of 45.44 acres was transferred from Ferozapore to the Hissar district being the area occupied by an extension of Dabwali Mandi in the latter district.

2. A boundary dispute of old standing between the villages Feroz and Machharala in the Sheikhpura district, and another between village Gaga and Chak Ganga Das of the Shahpur district and Kot Kacha village of the Jhelum district were decided during the year.

3. There were three alterations in tahsil boundaries during the year under report. Eight thousand nine-hundred and twenty-seven acres were transferred from Multan to Lodhran tahsil of the Multan district so as to keep the area of one irrigation system from overlapping the boundaries of several tahsils. Four hundred and thirty-four acres were transferred from Khanewal to Mailsi and 521 acres from Khanewal to Lodhran tahsil of the Multan district so as to adjust the boundaries along a marked natural feature.

16. Financial stringency permitted of no improvement being made in the record rooms during the year. The general and revenue record rooms were inspected adequately in all districts. Destruction work calls for no comments. Damage of records is reported from 4 districts. Steps were taken to prevent further damage. The Special Kanungos are reported to be doing good work generally. But the income from their services amounted to Rs. 18,711 while the expenditure was Rs. 22,385. During the year Copying Agencies came under close scrutiny with a view to effecting retrenchment, and considerable saving has been effected. Litigation was dull, and the income dropped from Rs. 8,35,032 last year to Rs. 6,58,306 this agricultural year. The expenditure this year was Rs. 6,91,886.

17. (a) The amount of land revenue and other Government dues paid by money order during the year was Rs. 22.60 lakhs in 28 districts as against Rs. 23.50 lakhs last year. This is in the neighbourhood of only 5 per cent. and the system it seems is only used by those who live at some distance from tahsil headquarters and have small sums to remit. For example, in the Lyallpur district, the revenue of which is nearly 75 lakhs, a sum of Rs. 6,280 only was remitted by money order.

A sum of Rs. 9.81 lakhs was remitted in currency notes by insured post in 23 districts as against Rs. 12.99 lakhs in 22 districts last year. This system, though extensively used in Gujrat, Sialkot and Shahpur districts, was not at all used in the districts of Rohtak, Ambala, Ludhiana, Jhang and Muzaffargarh. In the districts of Hoshiarpur, Jullundur and Lyallpur very small amounts were remitted in currency notes by insured post. The reason why these systems are not resorted to more freely for the payment of land revenue is that the amounts to be paid by individual lambardars are so large that remittance by money order or by insured post is considered too expensive.

Three approved lambardars of the Lyallpur district paid Rs. 6,814 on account of land revenue by cheque through the Imperial Bank. Three large estates in the Montgomery district credited their dues into the Lahore treasury through the Imperial Bank, recoveries being adjusted on intimation of such credits by the Deputy Commissioner, Lahore.

17. (b) As reported last year, the instructions issued in 1923 to prevent encroachment on Government property are being observed. No serious encroachment has been reported during the year under report. The question of dealing with the evil of encroachment on village roads which has been steadily increasing in the past years is under the consideration of Government.

17. (c) The annual waterlogging conference at which His Excellency the Governor presided was held on September 12th, 1931, when the work done to check waterlogging during the year was reviewed. The Waterlogging Board continued its quarterly meetings.

The progress of measures taken to control the rise of the water table, is in general viewed with satisfaction. It is felt, however, that much remains to be done, and it is unfortunate that the financial stringency has held up measures which would otherwise have been usefully undertaken. Girdawaris of areas damaged by swamping or rendered alkaline by salts brought to the surface as a result of the high water table were done during the year in the eleven districts as in previous years and also in the Ferozepore district. In the eleven districts 93,938 acres have gone out of cultivation on account of "thur" or alkalinity, and 15,997 acres have been rendered unculturable on account of "sem" or swamping. The figures for the eleven districts show (since last year) an increase under "thur" of 2,178 acres and a decrease under "sem" of 732 acres. The periodic closures of irrigation supplies on the Lower Jhelum and Upper Chenab Canals worked satisfactorily during the year without apparent inconvenience to the agriculturists. The lowering of the supply levels of the Upper Chenab and Upper Jhelum Canals together with the enlargement of the Mona, Pakhowal, Wan and Bhek Drains on the Lower Jhelum and the Rechna Drain on the Lower Chenab has had a good effect in drying out the areas concerned, thus making them fit for cultivation.

Reclamation work at Chakanwali has been continued during the year. Except for a portion of the land which has been leased for cultivation the area remains under the control of the Director of Research, Dr. Mackenzie Taylor, whose operations are largely concerned with the reclamation

of "sem" and "thur" land by leaching of the soil with water followed by rice cultivation and rotational cropping. This system is also under investigation under his direction in the Bhek area of the Lower Jhelum Canal. Results, even at this early stage, appear to be definitely favourable, and the introduction of this system of dealing with *kallar* soils seems likely to prove an important feature of the year's progress. Investigations also continue with regard to the effect of gypsum on *kallar* soils, and the formation of *kankar* below the surface. Scientific investigation of the problems connected with waterlogging continues in the Irrigation Research Laboratory. Important work has been done with reference to reclamation of *kallar* land and soil surveys. Soil classification and sub-soil water tests have been carried out in connection with irrigation projects. Methods of dealing with clogged tube well strainers and laboratory determination of the Hion concentration of soils are being investigated. Data resulting from torsion balance gravity surveys have been prepared for publication. Improved humidity and evaporation recorders have been installed. Experimental work has been done in connection with effects of crops on the sub-soil water table. The preparation of plans, indicating the conditions of the sub-soil water levels and the changes which are taking place in the water table, was further developed, and the examination extended to new areas. Collection of information giving the results obtained from the working of tube wells in the province has continued. The questions of supplies from tube wells in relation to the geological sub-soil strata and also the quality of sub-soil water have been examined.

17. (d) During the year under review the Board of Economic Inquiry has made steady progress in investigation and in the publication of results. In continuation of the policy of conducting one inquiry in each district of the Punjab the eighteenth survey was started in the Muzaffargarh district, and a short re-survey in the Gurgaon area was finished. The series on farm accounts was continued and accounts for 1929-30 published; accounts for the next year are now ready for the press. An inquiry into the marketing of wheat was completed in the Attock district, and the results of this as well as of the two conducted last year in Ferozepore and Lyallpur districts are being worked up into a composite report. The report on the milk supply

of Lahore was sent to the press and the section on "Books", of the catalogue of economic literature in Lahore libraries as well as the final draft of the report on marketing practices in the Punjab were completed. Appreciable progress has been made in the preparation for publication of some eighteen reports and, funds permitting, a steady output of these may now be expected.

Among new miscellaneous matters receiving the attention of the Board may be mentioned (a) Sub-divisions of land among heirs of deceased proprietors, (b) sugar and gur industry, and (c) cost of milk production at Lyallpur.

During the year the Board supplied the Government with a note on food prices for the decennium 1921-30, which is an extension of Professor Myles' "Sixty years of Punjab Food Prices, 1861-1920". Appreciable help was also given to Sir Arthur Salter during his visit with regard to the creation of an economic advisory organisation in India.

Mr. H. Calvert, B. Sc., C.I.E., I.C.S., continued to act as the Chairman of the Board, and Mr. J. W. Thomas, B. Sc., B. Com., Principal, continued as the Secretary.

18. The number of suits for enhancement of cash rents of occupancy tenants decided in the whole province fell from 949 to 225 in the year. Of this number 115 were successful. The large decrease is probably due to the abnormal fall in the prices of agricultural produce. The decrease in the number of successful suits in the Hoshiar-

pur district reported last year has not been maintained during the year under report. The number of such suits in the district has increased from 37 to 44. Seven cases were brought for reduction of rent : all failed.

19. Six decrees for ejectment under section 39 of the Tenancy Act were passed in the year, as against 20 last year. The total number of occupancy tenants actually ejected was 53, compared with 93 last year.

The total number of decrees under sections 40 and 45 (6) of the Tenancy Act for ejectment of tenants-at-will shows a decrease of 851 as compared with last year's figure of 2,245. The figures for Hissar and Hoshiarpur have fallen considerably but are still high. The decrease is not so noticeable in the Rohtak district where the figure is also high.

The number of ejectments ordered under section 45 (5) of the Tenancy Act fell from 4,933 to 3,690; actual ejectments fell from 4,114 to 3,498. The number of suits to contest liability to ejectment decided in favour of tenants was 284, against 353 last year.

20. No new jagir was notified under the Punjab Descent of Jagirs Act during the year. The total number of jagirs notified under the Act so far is 152.

21. The total area irrigated by canals under the management of the Irrigation Department decreased from 13,164,888 acres last year to 12,972,152 acres during the year under report. The area matured also decreased from 12,113,932 acres to 12,013,097 acres.

The income derived by the Irrigation Department from the fixed canal advantage rate fell from Rs. 16.54 lakhs to Rs. 15.92 lakhs. The income from fluctuating canal advantage rate was Rs. 166.22 lakhs as compared with Rs. 214.45 lakhs last year. The decrease in the income on account of fluctuating canal advantage rate alone was Rs. 48.22 lakhs. This is partly due to the contraction in the irrigated area and partly to the special remissions of land revenue in kharif 1930 and rabi 1931 on account of the fall in prices.

The following statement gives the more important figures for the inundation canals under the control of the Irrigation department :—

It will be observed from the foregoing table that while the area irrigated from the Shahpur inundation canals, Sidhnai canals and the Chenab series has decreased as compared with the figures of the last year, the area irrigated from the Dera Ghazi Khan inundation canals and Muzaffargarh inundation canals has increased to some extent. The decrease in the area irrigated from the Shahpur inundation canals, Sidhnai canals and the Chenab series is due to the fact that the canal flowed for a shorter period than usual on account of the decreased river supplies. The increase in the area irrigated from the Dera Ghazi Khan inundation canals is due to the fact that last year on account of heavy floods the banks of several canals were washed away and thus the area cultivated last year was less than during the year under report. The area irrigated from the Muzaffargarh inundation canals increased during the year under report on account of the improved water supply resulting from the completion of the remodelled channels of Kotsultan and Sardarwah. While the income from water rate has resulted in an increase in the Shahpur inundation canals, Dera Ghazi Khan inundation canals and Muzaffargarh inundation canals, the income has fallen in the case of Sidhnai canals and the Chenab series. The income from water rate on the Shahpur inundation canals is about $3\frac{1}{2}$ times the amount assessed last year. This increase is due to much smaller remissions given in the

year under report as compared with those given in 1929-30 when crops had suffered considerably from floods. The decrease in the water rate in the case of SidhnaI canals and Chenab series is partly due to the fact that less area was brought under irrigation and partly to the fact that large amounts of remissions were given during the year under report.

22. In addition to the canals enumerated in paragraph 21 there are other canals which are under the control of the Deputy Commissioners or the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board. The statement below gives the more important figures for these canals:—

The problem as regards the division of water of the Ghaggar river between the Punjab, Patiala and Bikaner territory is still under consideration. It will probably be necessary to convene a meeting of the representatives of all the parties concerned before any settlement can be arrived at.

Due to good rains the Sarusti canal worked satisfactorily during the year under report. The question of training certain hill torrents, including the Sarusti, the Markanda and the Tangri is under consideration. It is hoped that this

difficult problem would be solved if a regulator dam in the bed of the Tangri torrent is erected.

There was sufficient water supply throughout the season in the Shah Nahr canal which ran satisfactorily during the year under report. The Grey canals, on account of good water supply from the Sulej, ran well. The income from abiana on this canal fell by Rs. 6,060 on account of reduction in water rates from Rs. 1-12-0 to Re. 1-8-0, on inferior crops, and from Rs. 3-8-0 to Rs. 3, on superior crops. The percentage of kharaba remissions allowed in the sown area during the year under report was 21·6 as against 24·8 in 1929-30 and 26 in 1928-29. On account of scanty rainfall and consequent shortage of water supply in the catchment area the Namal Dam did not do so well. The rainfall during the year in the Mianwali district was two-thirds of the normal and two-fifths of the preceding year. The question of augmenting the water supply in the Namal reservoir by opening the Nara spring from the Uchhali lake was duly considered but the scheme had to be abandoned for the present, for lack of funds. The measures to improve the means of irrigation of the Dera Ghazi Khan district by hill torrents are still under the consideration of the Irrigation Department. The area irrigated by hill torrents in this district fell from 451,496 acres to 150,270 acres during the year under report. The decrease in the area irrigated is probably due to the fact that there has been less rain during the year under report.

The Gurgaon bunds are maintained by the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board. Their utility lies not so much in protecting cultivated areas from floods as in preventing sand from spreading on the fields and giving flow irrigation to several villages by the storage of water during the flood season. Four new bunds, namely, Righar, Pinangawan, Gharatpur Bas, and Gajoka were completed during the year under report. Many of the existing bunds were repaired, improved, and regulators were provided wherever necessary to ensure the safety of the bunds. There are many other suitable sites where bunds can be constructed with advantage. This question is under the consideration of local officers. The scheme of bund construction when completed would bring under sailab more than 20,000 acres of land. It must however be remembered when taking up new scheme for bunds that the alignment of a bund requires very technical skill and knowledge of the lie of the land.

The Financial Commissioner has had brought to his notice one bund which by reason of faulty alignment is said to have done more harm than good.

23. The Administration of the Land Acquisition Act during the year was satisfactory. For various public purposes 4,147·231 acres of land were acquired at a cost of Rs. 8,46,502 as against 4,648·861 acres for Rs. 15,61,163 in the preceding year.

The total average price per acre was Rs. 204 as against Rs. 333 in 1928-29 and Rs. 334 in 1929-30. The largest areas acquired were 1,080 acres in Multan, 537 in Montgomery, 449 in Ferozepore, 274 in Gujranwala, 242 in Lahore, 232 in Hissar and 162 in Dera Ghazi Khan districts.

The area acquired in Hissar district was mainly for railway use, and elsewhere mainly for canals. One hundred and twenty-seven acres were restored to the original owners.

24. The outstanding balance of loans advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act, XIX of 1883, at the commencement of the year was Rs. 58·52 lakhs while at the close of the year this figure had risen to Rs. 64·02 lakhs. The balance was over Rs. 10½ lakhs in Gurgaon, over Rs. 5 lakhs in Hissar and over Rs. 3 lakhs in each of the three districts of Ferozepur, Attock and Muzaffargarh. During the year under report the amount advanced under the Act was Rs. 7·58 lakhs as against Rs. 17·84 lakhs in the preceding year. The loans were largely taken for the purpose of sinking wells. During the year 3,538 new wells were sunk. Of these only 738 were constructed with the aid of taccavi as against 895 during the last year.

Remissions of land revenue were given on account of 307 wells which fell out of use as against 345 during the last year. Protective leases were granted for 1,056 wells as against 1,136 in the preceding year.

The demand recoverable for the year under report on account of principal, including arrears, was Rs. 5·23 lakhs out of which 3·15 lakhs were recovered, thus leaving a balance of Rs. 2·08 lakhs. Arrears of principal are heaviest in the districts of Ferozepur, Sheikhupura, Shahpur, Mianwali, Montgomery, Multan, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. Out of Rs. 3·78 lakhs outstanding on account of interest

Rs. 1.98 lakhs were recovered during the year under report.

25. The amount advanced under the Agriculturists Loans Act, XII of 1884, during the year under report was Rs. 5.24 lakhs as against the sum of Rs. 27.86 lakhs advanced during the preceding year. Out of this sum over Rs. 2 lakhs were distributed in the district of Gurgaon where the agricultural conditions were not satisfactory.

The total collections during the year under report amounted to Rs. 10.04 lakhs as against Rs. 14.09 lakhs in the preceding year. The fall in the amount collected is in the main due to adverse economic conditions and the unprecedented fall in the prices of agricultural produce. The sum of no less than Rs. 8.12 lakhs was written off as irrecoverable principally in the districts of Gurgaon (Rs. 5,62,209), Rohtak (Rs. 1,51,816), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 55,698) and Muzaffargarh (Rs. 41,648). The outstanding balance at the close of the year has fallen from Rs. 62.97 lakhs during the preceding year to Rs. 51.40 lakhs. The districts where the balances are heavy are Gurgaon (Rs. 11,26,935), Hissar (Rs. 9,65,015), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 4,80,039), Mianwali (Rs. 4,62,357), Rohtak (Rs. 2,38,035), Jhelum (Rs. 2,01,830), Multan (Rs. 2,51,118) and Muzaffargarh (Rs. 2,36,409). These arrears include balances under suspension.

Collection of interest amounted to Rs. 70,581 leaving a balance of Rs. 72,635 at the close of the year.

26. The total income from unclassed forests and other Government waste lands under the control of the Deputy Commissioner amounted to Rs. 60,09,087 as against Rs. 67,98,769. The rent payable to Government decreased from Rs. 14,01,908 to Rs. 13,18,852, while the other miscellaneous income including tirmi or grazing dues increased from Rs. 9,14,746 to Rs. 9,95,060. The decrease of Rs. 83,056 in the amount of rent is mainly due to the general remission of revenue granted by Government. Of the total demand of Rs. 92,440 on account of tirmi dues, Rs. 59,230 were collected during the year under report and Rs. 3,075 were remitted. Out of the sum of Rs. 80,135, which remained uncollected, Rs. 10,796 were outstanding in Muzaffargarh, Rs. 5,619 in Jhang and Rs. 5,044 in Dera Ghazi Khan. Balances in other districts are comparatively small.

Except for a slight increase of income under the head "Land Revenue" on unclassified forests and other Government lands in the Rohtak district and some increase in the Ferozepur district there has been decrease of income under this head in all other districts. The decrease is most marked in the districts of Lyallpur and Shahpur where the income under this head has gone down from Rs. 12,13,875 to Rs. 9,89,526 in the Lyallpur district and from Rs. 11,32,077 to Rs. 8,19,121 in the Shahpur district. The decrease is due to the general remission granted by Government.

The income from Shahpur Kandi Forests in the Gurdaspur district during the year was Rs. 5,717 and expenditure Rs. 6,619, thus resulting in a loss of Rs. 896. As compared with the figures of last year there is a decrease of Rs. 1,909 on the income side and an increase of Rs. 291 in expenditure. The decrease in income is partly due to the fact that a sum of Rs. 3,256 remained outstanding and partly to the fall in price of resin which adversely affected the income. The increase in expenditure is slight and calls for no remarks.

While the area of unclassified forests under the control of Deputy Commissioner has gone up from 24,66,076 acres to 26,38,215 acres, the area of waste land has considerably gone down. The decrease in the area of waste land is most marked in the districts of Lyallpur, Dera Ghazi Khan and Jhang. The decrease is due to permanent allotments in the colony areas. The total income derived from rents, sales of wood and unauthorised cultivation, etc., in the Montgomery district has fallen from Rs. 9,31,579 to Rs. 8,74,478. In the Jhang district the fall is even more marked. The income of this district under this head has fallen from Rs. 8,21,111 to Rs. 4,45,014. The decrease is partly due to the general remission allowed by Government and partly to the orders of Government directing the resumption of lands in the Lower Chenab Colony to the extent of the purchase price withheld by the vendees. In the Multan district 1,40,801 acres were let out on temporary cultivation, of which 44,798 acres were cultivated as against 38,884 in the previous year. The increase of 5,914 acres of land in the cultivated area is due to the fact that more land was allotted in the colonies for temporary cultivation. The area under cultivation of Government tenants was 5,12,063 acres as against 5,35,098 acres in the previous year. The decrease is partly due to the inadequate supply of canal water in the Nili Bar Colony.

Steady progress has been made in the work of re-afforestation in the Gurgaon district. The area under the re-afforestation at the close of the last year was 7,675 acres spread over 19 different villages. On account of financial stringency no new area was added to it during the year under report.

Different plants were sown in about 200 acres and Anjan grass was sown in 15 acres, but on account of failure of rain the seed did not germinate as well as was expected. Mesquite seed was sown in 3 different localities but for want of sufficient moisture it did not germinate. The mesquite plants grown in the previous years however are doing well.

27. Operations under the Land Preservation (Chos) Act are confined to the two districts of Hoshiarpur and Ambala.

The scheme of reclamation and preservation by re-afforestation in Hoshiarpur has had some success in encouraging the intelligent plantation of grasses along the banks of the Mehargarwal Cho. A sum of Rs. 13-8-0 was paid as initial bounties for new plantations and Rs. 417-2-0 as recurring bounties during the year under report, while Rs. 60-14-0 on account of initial and recurring bounties were refunded into the treasury, as the zamindars concerned refused to accept the money. This is attributed to a suspicion that the money is tendered in consideration of the surrender of rights, and the Commissioner considers that bounties are a mistake.

One thousand one hundred and ninety-five acres were sown with *kikar*, *shisham*, *phullah*, *beri* and *mullah* in 76 out of 126 villages in the Katardhar area, and about 2,500 acres sown with *sanatha* seed broadcast. The profit to villagers in the Katardhar from the sale of grass amounted to Rs. 17,809 this year as against Rs. 23,398 last year. The decrease is due to the fact that there was comparatively little demand for grass from the Katardhar area on account of abundant supply of fodder elsewhere. Even with a great fall in its price, Rs. 607 were realised from the sale of lac.

The Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board have in view a scheme for reclaiming the Dholbeha Cho by constructing small rockfill dams for the purpose of holding up storm water in the hills. Two experimental bunds have been erected at the mouths of two of the larger tributaries to the

Cho. The results are distinctly encouraging and the scheme appears to be well worth trying on a large scale.

During the year under report only 20 cases under the Chos Act, as against 107 of last year, were instituted and 15 were disposed of. A sum of Rs. 180 was recovered in fines, as compared with Rs. 670 last year. The decrease in the number of cases was due to a legal defect in the provisions of the Chos Act, which has been removed now. The total amount recovered by way of composition for illegal grazing during the year was Rs. 1,385.

Ambala.—The post of Naib-Tahsildar, Siwaliks, was abolished from 1st March 1931, and the district report is ominously silent as to protection in the Siwaliks generally. The existing five plantations, however, were properly maintained. *Kikar* and *shisham* trees planted on the banks of *naddis* are in fair condition.

Ten cases under the Chos Act were instituted during the year under report as against 13 in the preceding year. The accused were acquitted in six cases and convicted in the remaining 4 cases. Fines amounting to Rs. 23 were realized.

A committee was appointed to investigate the whole question of erosion, and had not concluded its labours at the end of the year.

28. The total area of land recorded in the revenue records of the province is 56·205 million acres out of which 30·090 million acres are cultivated. The total area owned by members of notified agricultural tribes is 35·744 million acres out of which 23·273 million acres are cultivated. The area owned by others is 5·282 million acres of which 3·546 million acres are cultivated. Common lands, village sites and Government properties account for 15·179 million acres. The area cultivated during the year under report has increased by 109,566 acres, as against an increase 257,482 acres during the previous year. The increase in the cultivated area was most marked in the districts of Kangra, Lahore, Sheikhpura, Shahpur, Mianwali, Lyallpur, Jhang, Multan and Dera Ghazi Khan. Cultivated area has gone down considerably in the districts of Montgomery and Muzaffargarh. The total area held under mortgage has gone up from 4·257 million acres during the previous year to 4·580 million acres during the year under report. The cultivated area under mortgage has also gone up by 254,944

acres. The percentage to total cultivated area of area held under mortgage is 11·5 as against 10·8 during the preceding year. The total area per owner is 12·3 acres and the cultivated area per owner 6·59 acres.

29. While the area transferred by gifts has increased from 87,260 acres to 101,007 acres, the area exchanged has gone down from 68,576 acres in the last year to 68,804 acres during the year under report. The total area sold during the year under report has fallen from 219,995 acres to 202,106 acres. The cultivated area sold (127,349 acres) which has also fallen during the year represents 0·42 per cent. of the total cultivated area of the province. The sale of superior ownership rights has increased by about 4,000 acres, that of rights of ownership has decreased by 17,000 acres and sale of occupancy rights by over 4,000 acres. Decrease in sales was noticeable in the districts of Karnal, Ferozepore, Jhelum, Attock, Montgomery, Muazffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. The decrease in sales in Montgomery and Muazffargarh is attributed to the slump in the money market while no particular reasons have been assigned for the decrease in sales in other districts. On the other hand the area sold in the districts of Hissar and Mianwali has increased. The area mortgaged during the year has decreased by 3,056 acres and the area redeemed has decreased by 26,457 acres. The area mortgaged exceeded the area redeemed by 160,331 acres as against 136,930 acres during the last year. The fall in the area redeemed during the year under report is mainly due to the slump in prices and the tightness of the money market.

30. The sale price per acre has risen, from Rs. 260 to Rs. 268; the average recorded sale price of the cultivated land has risen from Rs. 406 to Rs. 420 per acre during the year under report. The average sale price per acre for the quinquennium is Rs. 392. It is interesting to note that from the year 1926-27 onwards there has been a steady increase in the price of land with the exception of the year 1928-29 when there was a slight set back. The rise in the price of land in view of the general trade depression may be due to the fact that the depression limits the field of investment. The sale of land for the province as a whole represents 255 years purchase of the land revenue as against 261 last year and 6 at the commencement of the British occupation. The average mortgage money per acre of the area mortgaged (ownership) has fallen

from Rs. 168 to Rs. 163. The average mortgage money per acre of the cultivated area has also fallen from Rs. 198 to Rs. 192 per acre during the year.

31. During the year under report Dogars of the Montgomery district were notified as members of an agricultural tribe under the Punjab Alienation of Land Act. Statutory agricultural tribes lost by mortgage a net area of 39,453 acres, whereas non-agriculturists redeemed a net area of 31,295 acres from the members of agricultural tribes as compared with 35,864 acres and 28,724 acres, respectively, last year. Notwithstanding losses in areas mortgaged and redeemed, the statutory agricultural tribes gained by purchase a net area of 5,941 acres as against 10,071 acres in the preceding year. While the land mortgaged by agricultural tribes has decreased by 9,617 acres, the land sold by agricultural tribes has decreased by 21,895 acres.

Benami transactions have been reported from the districts of Gurgaon, Ambala, Amritsar and Sialkot. One hundred and fifty such cases are reported to have occurred in the district of Amritsar alone. *Benami* transactions assume various forms. Sometimes a non-agriculturist creditor gets the land of his agriculturist debtor mutated in favour of another agriculturist in his confidence and receives the rent or produce of the land from his agriculturist nominee. Another form of *benami* transactions is that a non-agriculturist gets the land of an agriculturist mutated in favour of another agriculturist in his confidence and gets himself entered in the revenue papers as the latter's tenant at will on a certain amount of rent but does not pay any such rent.

There is an increased tendency amongst non-agriculturists to get themselves included among agricultural tribes, especially among Mohammadan menials such as Lohars, Tarkhans, Ulmas and Fakirs. They contend that they are in fact agriculturists but have much against their wishes been called after their respective callings. Notices under section 80 of the Civil Procedure Code have been served by them against the Secretary of State in order to get themselves declared as members of agricultural tribes. Many of them have succeeded in their object by proving matrimonial alliances with members of agricultural tribes. It might be mentioned here that marriage is by no means a good proof for the purposes of such a classification, as a Mohammadan belonging to any caste can marry from out of his tribe.

A reference was made in the last year's report to a ruling of the High Court to the effect that there is no distinct provision in the Punjab Alienation of Land Act prohibiting a civil court from granting a lease of the land of an agriculturist to a non-agriculturist for more than 20 years in execution of a civil court's decree. A short amending bill was introduced to remedy the defect in the phraseology of the Act. The bill has since been enacted as the Punjab Act I of 1931 which came into force with effect from 1st July 1931. This restricts the period of a temporary alienation in execution of a civil court's decree to 20 years.

The important provisions of the Act are well understood, but a few cases have come to light in which civil courts ignored the mandatory provisions of the Act. In one case a sub-judge issued a warrant of permanent alienation of the land of a judgment debtor who was a member of an agricultural tribe in favour of a non-agriculturist decree-holder. In another case the whole of the land of minor judgment-debtors was alienated for a period of 12 years without reserving a portion of it for the maintenance of the minors. At the instance of the Deputy Commissioner the irregularities referred to above were rectified and the orders of the civil courts revised. In the Jhang district the Official Receiver agreed to the lease of the land belonging to a member of an agricultural tribe for a period of 60 years after the Amending Act I of 1931 had come into force. The only excuse that the Official Receiver gave was that he was not aware of the fact that Amending Act had come into force. Such instances illustrate the vigilance that is required on the part of the Deputy Commissioner to prevent the provisions of the Act being lost sight of.

32. Twenty-one thousand four hundred and six cases were pending with Collectors or their Assistants at the commencement of the year under report. Fresh institutions during the year numbered 1,58,281, disposals 1,57,881, and the number of pending cases at the close of the year rose to 21,806. Pending cases were most numerous in the districts of Amritsar, Multan, Hoshiarpur and Shahpur. Commissioners decided 391 revenue judicial appeals, Ambala 88, Jullundur 93, Lahore 96, Rawalpindi 54 and Multan 70. At the close of the year 100 cases were pending of which 36 were pending for more than three months. They also decided 1,909 revenue executive appeals during the

year (Ambala 176, Jullundur 362, Lahore 576, Rawalpindi 334 and Multan 361) leaving 356 pending. These figures indicate less difference in the amount of judicial work in the various divisions than has been supposed. The Financial Commissioners decided 6 judicial and 53 revenue appeals, and 323 applications for revision of which 76 were judicial leaving 39 appeals and 66 applications for revision pending. The business returns do not show the appellate work of Collectors. This work is of the greatest importance, especially in view of the facts that an appellate order of a Collector confirming that of an Assistant Collector is final, and that the Financial Commissioner, following the example of the High Court, has been enforcing with greater strictness than in the past the provisions of section 115 of the Civil Procedure Code which confines revision to matters of faulty jurisdiction or material irregularity. In view of the responsibility attaching to decisions in the Collector's Court the Financial Commissioners have been reluctant to recommend the grant of appellate powers to officers other than the Collector, and these powers are only held by the Colonization Officer, Nili Bar, the Sub-Divisional Officers in 8 sub-divisions and the Revenue Assistants in Hoshiarpur, Amritsar, Sialkot and Gujranwala.

Suits for establishing occupancy rights appear to be entering a new phase. Most of the cases in which rights could be established under sections 5 and 6 would appear to have been settled: but there is a growing class of claims under section 8 based on long possession coupled by an alleged implied promise not to eject. There is some danger of lack of uniformity in decreeing occupancy rights owing to the fact that the decision of the Collector (or if, he has disagreed with the trial court, of the Commissioner) being subject to no appeal, and not being open to revision on the ground of a mistake of law, becomes final.

38. The report after it was in type script was examined with the object of reducing it to the prescribed limit. Certain excisions were made of matter which might have been retained with advantage, and the Financial Commissioner does not think that further contraction is possible without impairing the value of the report. The proceedings in connection with waterlogging, the Board of Economic Enquiry and Erosion are matters which have come recently into prominence and by themselves account for a good deal of space which cannot be denied them.

READ :—

The Annual Report on the Land Revenue Administration for the
year ending 30th September 1932.

REMARKS.—The year ending the 30th September 1932 is the second after April 1930, when began the catastrophic fall in prices, which is still the dominating feature of the economic position in this province. The downward trend of prices, however, ceased during the year under report as regards almost all the staples. It was definitely reversed in the case of wheat, which had an appreciable rise, owing partly to the comparatively low yield of the crop combined with the movement in trade that followed the imposition of the import duty of Rs. 2 per hundredweight in March 1931. The temporary lowering of railway freights to Calcutta in the spring of 1931 and to Karachi in the summer of that year had also helped in the same direction by clearing some of the accumulated stocks before the new harvest came to the market. Thus the wholesale price of wheat which was Re. 1-8-6 per maund at Lyallpur at the end of May 1931 rose to Re. 1-9-6 at the end of September and to Rs. 2-9-0 at the end of December 1931. It then declined until it touched Rs. 2-3-0 at the end of May 1932, again rising to Rs. 2-15-0 at the end of September 1932. The price was, however, at its lowest when many agriculturists had to sell their crops.

The price of cotton on the other hand fluctuated during the year. The *desi* cotton market at Lyallpur opened on 11th October at Rs. 4-6-0 per maund, touching Rs. 5-8-0 on the 31st of the month; at the end of November it was Rs. 6-6-0 and at the end of December Rs. 7-13-0. Thereafter it gradually declined till it was last quoted on 17th May 1932 at Rs. 4-12-0. The course of the American cotton market was somewhat similar. It opened at Lyallpur on 28th October at Rs. 6-8-0, at the end of November it reached Rs. 7-8-0 and at the end of December Rs. 9. From the middle of

January the price gradually declined till it was last quoted on 17th May 1932 at Rs. 6 per maund.

2. The climatic conditions were, on the whole not unfavourable, and it may generally be said that apart from the economic depression, the year was free from any great calamity, the few local outbreaks of plague, malaria and influenza not being serious enough to interfere with the toil of the cultivator. The condition of the cattle also was on the whole good. The supply of fodder was adequate except in parts of the Jhelum, Hoshiarpur and Jullundur districts, where freight concessions had to be given.

3. In spite of all this, however, the people as a whole fared badly. It is true that the initial and most intense shocks had come in the preceding eighteen months, but the countryside continued to suffer from the cumulative effect of the depression during the year under report. The Governor in Council is pleased to take this opportunity of placing on record his admiration for the patient courage with which the people of the province have borne their trials. There has been no serious attempt to throw the blame for their troubles upon Government and no political agitation whatever arose from this cause. Indeed the reports show that the zamindar soon realized that his misfortunes were the result of world-causes and that in bearing up with them he had at his back a sympathetic Government watchful of his interests, and ready to strain every nerve to give him help.

Apart from what was done through other departments, this help consisted of large suspensions and remissions of land revenue, and liberal suspensions and even remissions of taccavi. Altogether Rs. 9.14 lakhs of the demand for land revenue was suspended and Rs. 57.77 lakhs remitted during the year. The figure for remissions includes Rs. 40.43 lakhs for special remissions of both fixed and fluctuating land revenue granted on account of the fall in the prices of agricultural produce. Under the head of taccavi Rs. 21.98 lakhs were suspended and Rs. 4.95 lakhs remitted. Of these amounts the Ambala Division alone had Rs. 7.96 lakhs on account of suspensions and Rs. 22.07 lakhs on account of remissions of the land revenue demand.

Rupees 21·88 lakhs were suspended in this division for taccavi and Rs. 4·46 lakhs remitted. The recovery of taccavi continues to give serious cause for concern. Under the ordinary rules remissions of agricultural loans are to be avoided and only the very exceptional circumstances of the year can be deemed to justify the action that has been taken in this regard.

4. The fixed land revenue demand of the province for the year amounted to Rs. 237·60 lakhs, of which Rs. 9·14 lakhs were suspended, Rs. 11·86 lakhs remitted—chiefly as a special concession on account of the fall in prices—and Rs. 214·58 lakhs were collected. The recoverable arrears of fixed land revenue from the preceding years amounted to over Rs. 45 lakhs and of this Rs. 16·44 lakhs were remitted and Rs. 5·64 lakhs only collected leaving a balance of about Rs. 23 lakhs to be carried forward.

5. The collections of fluctuating land revenue increased this year to Rs. 190·86 lakhs from Rs. 179·85 lakhs, and the demand was collected with the exception of Rs. 4·37 lakhs that remained outstanding. Of the outstandings Rs. 1·48 lakhs are accounted for by Montgomery and Rs. 1·77 lakhs by Multan. It is noteworthy that practically the whole of the 58 lakhs due under this head in Lyallpur was collected and the same can be said of the Rs. 18·97 lakhs due between them from the Gujrat and Gujranwala districts.

6. The increase in the number of coercive processes—30,000 against 26,000 of the preceding year—issued for the recovery of Rs. 39·34 lakhs of land revenue—is significant of a period of general depression, and is disquieting. The Multan Division alone was responsible for more than half the processes executed in the province. The report indicates that the lambardars in this division, as distinguished from those elsewhere, rely too much on coercive processes and too little on their own influence and powers of persuasion.

7. The Governor in Council is pleased to commend the notable advance in the use of the postal system in the Ludhiana district where 3,222 judicial processes were served by post during the year against 821 in the preceding year. This reform enabled the Deputy Commis-

sioner to retrench 4 posts of tahsil peons. Apart from this one instance, however, it is disappointing that seven districts only used the post for judicial processes against eight in the preceding year: also that postal facilities are by no means utilized as they should be for the payment of land revenue whether by money-order or otherwise. The attention of Collectors is invited to the facilities offered by the Post Office, for the service of processes in revenue cases.

8. The Governor in Council is pleased to note the care with which the depth of the water table is being watched in the water-logged areas of the province. It is observed that while there was a further slight fall in the Bist Doab, a slight rise is reported from the Pakpattan and Lower Bari Doab Canal areas. On the other hand it is satisfactory that there was no appreciable rise in the general level of the water table over the Chaj and Rechna Doabs.

9. The Governor in Council is also pleased to note that such diverse subjects as the marketing of wheat in the Punjab, the rates of food consumption by zamindars at Khanewal, the size of the family with relation to wealth, the cost of producing crops in the Punjab and sales of land between agricultural tribes are receiving the consideration of the Board of Economic Enquiry, which has continued to do very valuable work during the year.

1. (a) This report covers the period from October 1st, 1931, to September 30th, 1932, but a brief reference of the climatic conditions during the preceding eight months is necessary.
- General summary of the agricultural conditions.

In January, 1931, the rainfall was light in most districts, but in February and March it rained throughout the province. April was dry. In May and June there were light showers in some places. In July and August the rainfall was moderate to heavy while in September it was generally below normal except in the submontane and a few of the central and south-eastern districts.

As for the period under report, October had rainfall above the normal, but November and December remained dry. The season was therefore generally favourable for sowing the *rabi* crops. In January and February, 1932, most districts received light to moderate showers while in March rainfall was normal throughout the province. These rains, though useful for the standing crops were generally insufficient for bringing them to maturity, especially on unirrigated land. Standing crops were damaged by white ants, hailstorms and high winds in some districts while rats did no small damage to the crops in the Gurgaon district. Besides, slight rust and smut in wheat were reported from some places, and dry winds shrivelled up to some extent the gram in *barani* areas and late sown wheat generally.

Although April and May had some light rain the weather was on the whole dry and generally good for harvesting operations.

(b) It is satisfactory that the Gurgaon district has on the whole fared better this year than it did in 1930-31. Thanks chiefly to the good rain at sowing time, the cultivated area increased by 29 per cent. The matured area also rose by 4 per cent., viz., 59 per cent. in *kharif* and 74 per cent. in *rabi*. The rise in the *kharif* figures is, however, chiefly due to the abnormal fall of the preceding year when this crop was damaged by floods, particularly in the Rewari and Firozpur-Jhirka tabsils. The *rabi* figures also are somewhat illusory, for they do not show the damage caused by rats and adverse winds after the *girdawari*.

(c) Owing to the good rainfall in July and August 1931, the climatic conditions were favourable for the autumn sowings. The total area sown rose from 12·91 million acres last year to 12·99 million acres during the year under report. The failed area was 15 per cent. of the sown area as compared with 21 per cent. in the preceding year. The increase in the matured area was due to timely rainfall which proved beneficial for the standing crops. The percentages of crop failure were high in the Dera Ghazi Khan, Mianwali, Attock, Muzaffargarh, Hissar and Shahpur districts.

(d) The total area under *rabi* sowings also rose from 17·35 million acres to 19·01 million acres and the failed area from 14 per cent. to 7 per cent. as compared with the year before. The latter was due to insufficient rain, particularly in unirrigated areas and to the damage caused to the wheat crop by rust and smut. Percentages of crop failure were high in the Simla, Rohtak, Gurgaon, Hissar, Karnal, Ambala, Dera Ghazi Khan and Mianwali districts.

(e) The total area sown and matured was 32·00 and 26·73 million acres, respectively, as compared with 30·26 and 25·12 million acres in the preceding year. The percentage of failed on sown area was 16 against 17 last year, but was equal to the average of the last 10 years. The

increase of six per cent. in the sown area and of one per cent. in the matured area over last year's figures is due to favourable climatic conditions at the time of sowing of both the harvests. The total irrigated area decreased by 4 per cent. as compared with last year. This is because the cultivators have in some places reduced canal irrigation owing to the comparatively high incidence of the water rate under the present abnormal economic conditions.

During the last quinquennium (1927—32) the total cultivated area rose by over four lakhs of acres as compared with the previous quinquennium (1922—27), whereas the total fixed and fluctuating assessment on it fell by over Rs. 31 lakhs. The increase in the cultivated area is due to the extension of canal irrigation and also to the remarkable increase in the number of masonry wells by 10,000. The assessment appears to have decreased because, owing to the abnormal fall in the prices of agricultural produce, zamindars find it more profitable to sow the more lightly assessed crops.

(f) The crops that showed the highest outturn above normal were *bajra* (30 per cent.) and sugarcane (12 per cent.). The area under *bajra* was practically the same as last year. Since 1929 this crop is becoming more popular because it gives a higher yield with comparatively less labour. The area under sugarcane rose by 11 per cent. over last year's figures. This is owing partly to the good season and partly to the high prices of *gur*. The area under wheat fell from 9.28 million acres to 9.07 million acres in the year under report. This decrease is due to low prices and to the displacement of wheat by gram which fetched a higher price than the former during the years 1929-30 and 1930-31. The area under gram thus increased by 34 per cent. over the last year's figure. The outturn of wheat was 12 per cent. below normal while in the case of gram it was 7 per cent. above normal. The total area under cotton was practically the same as last year. The area under *desi* cotton rose from 13.27 lakhs of acres to 13.96 lakhs of acres while that under American cotton fell from 8.36 lakhs of acres to 7.63 lakhs of acres. This is because some cultivators find the present premium on American cotton insufficient.

to cover the risk of a shortage of canal water. An adequate and timely supply of water is essential for this crop as compared with the *desi* variety. Owing to unfavourable climatic conditions at the time of maturing barley was 44 per cent. below the normal. The total outturn of the other important crops was above normal for *rabi* oilseeds (5 per cent.) and maize (2 per cent.) and below normal for *jowar* (14 per cent.) and rice (3 per cent.).

(g) The following table shows that there was an appreciable rise in the average price of wheat and a slight one in the prices of cotton, barley and maize; the others were stationary or declining :—

(h) The health of the agricultural population was on the whole satisfactory. There were a few local outbreaks of plague and influenza but these were not sufficiently serious to interfere with agricultural operations.

(i) Fodder was sufficient except in parts of the Jhelum, Hoshiarpur and Jullundur districts where fodder freight concessions were found to be necessary. Cattle diseases were reported from different parts of the province but there was no unusual mortality.

2. The total fixed land revenue demand for the year under report was Rs. 237·60 lakhs against Rs. 237·49 lakhs during the preceding year. Out of the total demand of Rs. 237·60 lakhs, Rs. 9·14 lakhs were suspended and Rs. 11·86 lakhs were irrecoverable chiefly on account of the special remissions granted due to the fall in prices. The net recoverable demand amounted to Rs. 216·60 lakhs or 91·1 per cent. of the total demand of Rs. 237·60 lakhs against Rs. 184·07 lakhs or 77·5 per cent. of the total demand of Rs. 237·49 lakhs in the last year. Out of the net recoverable demand of Rs. 216·62 lakhs, Rs. 214·58 lakhs or 99 per cent. were collected leaving an outstanding balance of Rs. two lakhs.

Out of the 9·14 lakhs suspended during the year under report Rs. 7·96 lakhs were suspended in the Ambala division alone. Of this 7·96 lakhs, Rs. 3·02 lakhs were suspended in Gurgaon, Rs. 1·92 lakh in Rohtak and Rs. 1·55 lakh in Hissar. The suspensions were given on account of the failure of crops consequent on scanty or untimely rainfall.

The total amount under suspension on account of 1931-32 and previous years was Rs. 41·50 lakhs. Out of this sum, Rs. 2·56 lakhs were collected and Rs. 16·44 lakhs were remitted leaving a balance of Rs. 31·82 lakhs under suspension at the end of the year under report. The largest balances under suspension were in Gurgaon (10·01), Hissar (8·37), Rohtak (7·53) and Karnal (2·21). Out of the total sum of Rs. 16·44 lakhs remitted during the year under report, Rs. 15·32 lakhs were remitted in the Ambala division alone—the main items being Rs. 9·99 lakhs in Gurgaon and Rs. 3·88 lakhs in Rohtak.

3. During the year 26,586 acres of land were added by alluvion and 21,160 acres were lost by diluvion, thus resulting in a gain of 5,426 acres against a loss of

12,178 acres in the previous years. The district that suffered the most from river action was Dera Ghazi Khan which lost 1,905 acres. The only other districts that were considerably affected by river action were Attock, Jhelum and Gurgaon.

The 26,586 acres of land added by alluvion were newly assessed at Rs. 25,231, while on the 21,160 acres lost by diluvion revenue amounting to Rs. 24,914 was remitted. Revenue was increased by Rs. 11,015 on 13,096 acres of land improved by alluvion and reduced by Rs. 3,982 on 8,592 acres damaged by diluvion. The net *khalsa* gain to the fixed land revenue roll was Rs. 7,845 against a net loss of Rs. 7,322 in the preceding year.

4. The collections of fluctuating land revenue permanently excluded from the fixed land revenue roll showed an increase from Rs. 179.51 lakhs to Rs. 190.42 lakhs of which Rs. 170.18 lakhs were on account of canal irrigated land. The increase is mainly due to the fact that the special remissions sanctioned were on a smaller scale than in the preceding year. The increase was most marked in the Gujranwala, Sheikhpura, Gujrat, Shahpur, Mianwali, Montgomery, Jhang, Multan and Muzaffargarh districts. The increase in the Muzaffargarh district was due to increase in cultivation on account of a better supply of canal water. The total demand assessed was collected with the exception of Rs. 4.37 lakhs which added to Rs. 0.69 lakhs outstanding on account of previous years brings the total amount outstanding to Rs. 5.06 lakhs. These arrears are accounted for chiefly by the districts of Montgomery (1.48 lakh), Multan (1.77 lakh), Muzaffargarh (0.31 lakh) and Dera Ghazi Khan (0.38 lakh), which are responsible between them for Rs. 3.94 lakhs. In the Montgomery district the recoverable balance is mostly in the two Sutlej tahsils. The heavy balance in the Multan district is reported to be due to the progressive deterioration of the supply of the inundation canals which has intensified the agricultural depression. In Lahore Rs. 12,747 are outstanding on account of urban land revenue for the years previous to 1926-27. This is due to the unsatisfactory system under which urban land revenue is at

present collected in Lahore city. It is noteworthy that only Rs. 3,203 is outstanding out of the total demand of over 58 lakhs in the Lyallpur district. The balance in Gujranwala is also negligible—Rs. 782 out of Rs. 9.12 lakhs; while in Gujrat every rupee of the demand of Rs. 9.85 lakhs was collected. On the whole collections were satisfactory except in the districts—other than Lyallpur—of the Multan division.

In order to stimulate well sinking in the Naili circle of the Sirsa tahsil of the Hissar district Government ordered that pure *chahi* cultivation under fluctuating assessment should be assessed at *barani* rates with effect from *kharif* 1931. Although the wells only increased in number from 595 to 602, the *chahi* area rose from 3,268 to 3,690 acres which in the circumstances is not unsatisfactory.

5. The collection of "Other land revenue" amounted to Rs. 7.50 lakhs against Rs. 6.25 lakhs during the preceding year. The increase is, however, mainly due to the correct classification this year of the rent of lands leased for a single year or harvest in the Mianwali district which used to be wrongly shown under the head land revenue. The increase of Rs. 0.21 lakh in the Dera Ghazi Khan district is mainly due to the increase in the income of the Dhundi and Bruceabad estates.

The total uncollected balance at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 1.69 lakh as compared with Rs. 1.86 lakh in the preceding year. The districts of Sheikhpura, Shahpur, Mianwali, Montgomery, Lyallpur, Jhang, Multan and Muzaffargarh are chiefly responsible for the outstanding balance.

6. In accordance with the scheme inaugurated in 1917 twenty more special jagirs of Rs. 250 per annum each were granted during the year to non-officials and retired officials in recognition of meritorious services. The total amount of revenue thus assigned since the inception of the scheme in 1917 is Rs. 79,900 per annum.

The *jagir* of Nawab Ghulam Qutab-ud-Din Khan of Mamdot, who died without issue, lapsed to Government under the operation of the Punjab Descent of Jagirs Act. The whole of this *jagir* amounting to Rs. 1.31 lakh per annum together with arrears amounting to Rs. 3.87 lakhs accrued since the late Nawab's death was however granted with effect from 4th August, 1931, as a fresh gift from the British Government to Khan Shah Nawaz Khan, a near collateral of the late Nawab.

The assigned land revenue amounts to 7.6 per cent. of the total land revenue assessed and assessable in the province.

7. The number of processes issued was 30,014 against 26,095 issued last year. The more important figures are compared below :—

These figures show that while there was a decrease of writs there was an increase of other processes. The figures for writs are not, however, as informative as the others because the practice of issuing them as a preliminary process varies from district to district. The arrears of land revenue, for the realization of which these processes were issued, amounted to Rs. 39.34 lakhs and of this Rs. 28.65 lakhs were actually collected.

Ambala division.—Out of 1,969 warrants of arrest issued as many as 1,349 were executed. Of these 602 warrants of arrest were actually executed in the district of Rohtak alone. Out of 45 warrants of imprisonment under section 69 (3) of the Land Revenue Act, 44 were issued and 17 were executed in the district of Rohtak. This district also accounts for the largest number of distress warrants executed in this division.

Jullundur division.—In this division little difficulty was experienced in the collection of land revenue. The numbers of warrants of arrest executed were :—

Lahore division.—Of the 2,011 warrants of arrest issued in the Lahore division, 1,269 warrants were executed. Except in the Lahore district where, 617 warrants of arrest and 503 warrants of distress were executed; the land revenue was collected with comparative ease in this division.

Rawalpindi division.—With the exception of Shahpur no other district in the division gave much trouble in the collection of land revenue. Out of 1,039 warrants of arrest issued in the division 577 were executed and of these 454 were executed in the district of Shahpur alone. The number of distress warrants issued and executed in this district was also large.

Multan division.—As pointed out in the last year's report the Multan division was responsible for more than half the provincial figures. Fifteen hundred and seventy-one writs were issued in the Dera Ghazi Khan district out of the divisional total of 4,103. The largest numbers of warrants of arrest issued were in Montgomery (2,315), Lyallpur (1,222) and Multan (1,977). In Montgomery 711 of these warrants were executed and in Multan 1,396 executed. In Lyallpur 1,222 warrants of arrest were executed as against *nil* last year. This shows the increasing difficulties of the local authorities in the collection of land revenue in these districts.

8. During the year under report temporary establishment was entertained for short periods in ten districts against eleven in the preceding year for the serving of processes for the recovery of land revenue. The expenditure incurred on this establishment amounted to Rs. 3,738 against Rs. 3,906 last year. In the remaining districts processes were served by ordinary tahsil establishment or through the post.

The postal agency was employed only in seven districts for the service of court processes against eleven in the preceding year. It was most used in the Ludhiana district where 3,220 court processes were served through the post as compared with 821 in the preceding year. This enabled the Deputy Commissioner to retrench four posts of tahsil peons. While Ambala and Ferozepore show an increase, Mianwali shows a decrease which needs explanation.

9. No settlement operations were in progress during the year under report.

Progress in re-measurement, revision of records, etc.

The measurement and the preparation of the records of rights of two newly constituted estates in the Lower Chenab Colony, Jhang district, were completed during the year. In the Lower Chenab Colony, Lyallpur district, 14,631 acres were re-measured and maps of 149 villages completed. As stated in last year's report the post of the Rectangulation Officer in the Ferozepore, district was abolished with effect from 31st March, 1931, and the standing record of rights of 145 villages were completed during the year under report.

10. Government did not pass orders on the final settlement report of the Muzaffargarh district because the special report submitted by Mr. Anderson, late Settlement Officer, on the assessment of two circles of the Muzaffargarh tahsil remained under consideration and the decision of Government was not arrived at before the close of the year under report.

Comparison of estimates and forecasts in regard to duration, cost and results of settlement operations.—

11. No settlement operations were in progress during the year under report.

12. The report on the assessment of urban areas in the old and new Pattoki Mandi in the Chunian tahsil of the Lahore district remained under the consideration of Government and no orders were issued before the close of the year under report. The same was the case with the forecast reports of the Lyallpur district (excluding urban areas), and the Rakh Branch Colony portions of the Sheikhpura district. The question of a forecast report of the Lahore district was further postponed for consideration till 1933. In view of the adverse economic conditions orders in regard to the revision of the assessment of the Lower Bari Doab Colony areas in the Montgomery and Multan districts, as also the commencement of settlement operations in the Jhelum district together with the preparation of a revised forecast report were deferred for decision to a later date.

13. There was no settlement staff working in any district of the province during the year under report.

Settlement Staff.

The staff employed in the Lyallpur district in connection with the colonization operations on the Pir Mahal, Burala and Khikha extensions of the Lower Chenab Canal remained at work throughout the year.

14. The following operations were carried out by the Survey of India during the year :—

Surveys.

"A" Survey Company carried out 4,038 square miles of original survey on the scale of 1 inch to a mile in the Lahore, Ferozepore, Lyallpur, Montgomery, Multan and Jhang districts and a re-survey in 24 square miles on the scale of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch to a mile in the Murree hills. New topographical details communicated by other departments were verified in the Jhang, Shahpur and Ferozepore districts.

Topographical survey operations were continued by No. 1 party (G. B.) which deputed a detachment to work along the course of the Jumna river for a length of 87 miles, covering an area of about 57 square miles of revision survey on the 1 inch scale in the Gurgaon and Rohtak districts.

No. 23 party (Irrigation Surveys) continued the survey of the area commanded by the Bhakra Dam Irrigation Project and carried out 1,524 square miles of special topographical survey on the scale of 4 inches to a mile in the Ferozepore district and in the Faridkot and Kalsia States, 1,242 square miles of tertiary levelling in the Ferozepore, Hissar and Ludhiana districts and in the Faridkot and Kalsia States and 1,269 square miles of rectangulation to 25 acres in the Hissar and Rohtak districts and in the Jind and Loharu States.

Besides the above, 2,605 square miles of traversing and rectangulation to 3,000 acres in the Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak districts and in the Dujana, Jind and Pataudi States and 827 square miles of triangulation in the Hissar, Karnal and Rohtak districts and in the Dujana, Jind and Patiala States was also carried out by the Party.

15. A slight change in the boundary of the Ambala district took place during the year under report on account of the settlement of a boundary dispute between the village Basaur Khurd in the Ambala district and the village Rajpur in the Kalsia State.

16. Several record rooms in the province needed improvements but the financial stringency did not permit of any work being executed during the year under report. The inspection of both the revenue and the general record rooms was, on the whole, regular and destruction work was generally satisfactory. Damage to records during the year is reported from six against four districts last year. Adequate steps were taken to safeguard the records from being damaged further.

The income from the services of special kanungos amounted to Rs. 15,666 while the expenditure was Rs. 22,190. As a measure of economy the posts of special kanungos and their peons were abolished generally with effect from 1st September 1932, in all the districts excepting Hissar, Ambala, Ferozepore, Gurdaspur, Multan, Hoshiarpur and Jullundur and patwari mobarrirs at Rs. 35 per mensem were appointed instead. In Hoshiarpur and Jullundur, one out of the two posts of special kanungos was brought under reduction.

Copying Agency.—The value payable post system was abolished from 1st April, 1932, and a system of advance deposits for copies introduced in its stead is reported to be working satisfactorily.

The income and expenditure of the Copying Agency Department for 1931-32 was Rs. 6,44,169 and Rs. 6,32,772, respectively, as compared with Rs. 6,91,100 and Rs. 6,91,886 for 1930-31.

17 (a). The amount of land revenue and other Government dues paid by money order during the year was Rs. 21·98 lakhs in 28 districts against Rs. 22·60 lakhs last year. This is only 4·9 per cent. of the entire land revenue.

Other matters—Payment of revenue by post.

In addition to the sum remitted by money order Rs. 11·40 lakhs was sent in currency notes by insured post in 26 districts against 9·31 lakhs in 23 districts last year. This again is only 2·6 per cent. of the total land revenue. This system though extensively used in Attock, Shahpur, Gujrat and Sialkot was very little used in the districts of Lyallpur, Mianwali, Jullundur, Hoshiarpur and Rohtak and not at all in the districts of Muzaffargarh, Ambala and Simla.

The post, and in particular the money order system seem to be resorted to only by those who live at a distance from tahsil headquarters. Such persons send small sums by money order and large ones by halves of currency notes under insured cover. In many districts an efficient motor service exists and lambardars find it convenient to visit tahsil headquarters personally for the purpose of paying land revenue. One district complains that post offices are few, otherwise greater use would undoubtedly be made of the money order system.

Two approved lambardars of the Lyallpur district paid Rs. 5,403 on account of land revenue by cheque through the Imperial Bank. Three large estates in the Montgomery district credited their dues into the Lahore treasury through the Imperial Bank, recoveries being adjusted on intimation of such credits by the Deputy Commissioner, Lahore. Considerable sums were collected personally by Revenue Officers on tour in the Attock and Muzaffargarh districts. The lambardars in these districts are reported to be averse from coming to tahsil headquarters and await a visit from Revenue Officers who collect the amount from defaulters and others. This development has its disadvantages and should be checked by disciplinary action against the lambardars who fail to pay the revenue into the tahsil on the due date.

The "echelon" system of payment of land revenue is now in force throughout the province.

(b) The instructions issued in 1923 for the purpose of preventing encroachments on roads and other public properties by the co-ordination of Public Works Department land plans and revenue maps are reported to be working satisfactorily.

The question of dealing with the evil of encroachments on village roads, which has been steadily growing in past years, was considered by the Standing Committee of the Council of Land Revenue, which recommended a slight addition to rule 20 (vi) of the Land Revenue Rules. By this amendment it will be obligatory on the headmen of the village to report encroachments on village roads to the tahsildar, who can proceed against the trespassers under section 150 of the Land Revenue Act. Necessary action is being taken in the matter.

(c) The Waterlogging Board continued to hold quarterly meetings during the year at which regular surveys of the conditions as regards waterlogging in the affected districts of the Punjab were brought under examination.

At the quarterly meetings the Board reviewed the results and progress of remedial measures undertaken and scrutinized schemes proposed to be undertaken or extended with a view to improving the conditions as regards both the land and public health. The relative value of different means employed to cope with the threat of waterlogging came under enquiry and special attention was directed to the surface drainage system as a means for checking the rising spring levels by securing the flow of storm water in excess of the ordinary capacity of pumping stations situated on tube-wells and open drains.

Following on retrenchment measures taken early in the year by which the activities of the Rural Sanitary Board were curtailed, the Waterlogging Board brought under review the functions of the different bodies concerned as to their responsibility for operations connected with flooding due to natural causes. They submitted recommendations to Government towards the adjustment of these functions and to clear the way for a

more comprehensive policy in dealing with the water-logging problem as a whole. In the discharge of its function of scrutinizing new canal projects from the water-logging standpoint, the Board dealt with and offered suggestions regarding the Haveli Canal Project. The programme for scientific research drawn up by the Irrigation Agricultural Research Committee and the detailed quarterly progress reports of scientific research in the Punjab Irrigation Research Institute also came under review.

It is satisfactory that there was no appreciable rise in the general level of the water table over the Chaj and Rechna Doabs, while there has been a further slight fall in the Bist Doab. Records show that a slight rise took place in the Pakpattan and Lower Bari Doab Canal areas but this need not cause immediate anxiety. The depth of the water table in these areas will, however, continue to be closely observed.

During the year under review, *girdawaris* of the damaged areas were conducted in twelve districts, the addition to previous years being that of the Montgomery tahsil. No estates in the Montgomery tahsil were found to be affected by *thur* or *sem*. In the twelve districts surveyed, there was a nett decrease during the year of thirty-one estates affected by water-logging. The nett decrease in the area affected by *thur* during the year is 967 acres while the decrease in the *sem* area is 2,458 acres.

The programme of restricting supplies on the Lower Jhelum and Upper Chenab Canals continued with modifications as to dates of closures for meeting agricultural requirements. As the river was abnormally low early in the year, the total closure of the Upper Chenab Canal during one period was cancelled in favour of the requirements of water for the Lower Bari Doab Canal. While such closures on the Lower Jhelum Canal appear to do no harm to the crops, the Lower Bari Doab Canal appears to be adversely affected sometimes by the Upper Chenab Canal closures.

A further step was taken in May, 1932, towards lowering supply levels in the Main Line of the Upper Jhelum Canal by alterations in the works in the tail reach. These measures, as also similar ones already

undertaken on the Upper Chenab Canal, have resulted in lowering the bed level by scouring and are expected in course of time, as this process advances, to effect further improvement in the water-logged areas adjoining the canal.

The completion of new pumping stations on the Khadir Branch of the Lower Jhelum Canal and between the Jhang and Rakh Branches of the Lower Chenab Canal together with the increase in the capacity of existing pumping stations and the enlargement of the Rechna and Wan drains is having a good effect on the areas concerned. The pumping stations at R. D. 80,000 of the Jhang Branch together with the Marh Sadkhana Pumping Station between the Rakh and Jhang Branches on the Lower Chenab Canal, have, after completion, functioned for the first time during the last monsoon. Extensions of existing drainages for storm water and the opening out of some of the existing main drainages in each of the canal areas of the Northern Administration has been planned and work, commenced wherever funds were available.

Several important Drainage Projects are well advanced and will be put up for sanction as soon as the financial situation improves.

The operations on the Chak anwali Farm under the control of the Director, Irrigation Research, have continued with marked success, so much so, that the Director expects the normal yields of the province from the crops on these reclaimed lands. The construction of meter flumes on the farm has now made it possible to gauge, with considerable accuracy, the water supply used in the reclamation and thereafter in growing crops on the land.

The Water-logging Board also appointed a committee for investigating the problem of tube-wells in the province. Data in connection with tube-wells sunk so far has been collected, showing the type, costs, geological strata, and other particulars. The final report of the Committee is expected to be ready shortly.

Finally, the Board reviewed the progress of irrigation agricultural research during the year and framed

a programme for the research work to be done during the following year.

(d) During the year under report the Board of Economic Inquiry made steady progress in investigation and in the publication of results. A village survey in the Muzaffargarh district started last year was completed and another was initiated in the Ferozepore district; thus the Board has taken up village inquiries in 19 of the 29 districts of the province. The series concerning farm accounts was continued and the accounts for 1930-31 published and those for 1931-32, which will be the eighth successive year for which accounts have been kept, are being prepared for the press. An inquiry into the economics of the gut industry at Sialkot and another into the cattle problem in the Rohtak district were completed and the results of these will be published shortly.

Among miscellaneous matters that received the attention of the Board were the reports on the marketing practices in the Punjab, the marketing of wheat in the Punjab, the rates of food consumption by zamindars at Khanewal, and an inquiry into two *talukas* in the Kangra district. Some figures were collected regarding the sub-division of land and lines of inquiry were formulated for a study of the question of the size of the family with relation to wealth. A brochure entitled "Cost of production of crops in the Punjab" is also receiving consideration, and some further data is being collected regarding milk production at Lyallpur. Figures are also being collated regarding the sales of land between agricultural tribes in three districts of the Multan division.

During the year the Board also supplied Government with a note on the use of faulty weights and measures in the Punjab. This was a digest of the results of inquiries in twelve areas in the province.

Four other reports are in press of which one, "The milk supply of Lahore in 1930" will be published very shortly; and there are some ten more which are being prepared for publication as funds permit.

Mr. H. Calvert, B.Sc., C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., continued to act as the Chairman of the Board, and Mr. J. W. Thomas, B.Sc., B. Com., as the Secretary until his absence on leave out of India, when Mr. D. P. Johnston, I. A. S., and Dr. E. D. Lucas, M.A., D.D., Ph.D., acted in his place in turn.

18. Eighty-four suits for enhancement of cash rents of occupancy tenants were decided as compared with 225 during the preceding year. Out of the total 63 suits which were successful the Hoshiarpur district alone accounted for 50. Twenty-four cases for reduction of rent were decided as compared with 7 last year. Decrees were awarded in 19 cases.

19. Twenty-one decrees for the ejection of occupancy tenants, under section 39 of the Tenancy Act, were passed during the year under report as against 6 last year. The increase which mainly took place in the districts of Kangra and Jhelum is apparently due to the slump in the prices of agricultural produce.

Decrees for ejectment of tenants-at-will, under sections 40 and 45 (6) of the Tenancy Act fell from 1,394 to 882 as a whole, although slight increases are reported from the Karnal, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Sialkot, Jhelum and Rawalpindi districts. There was a considerable decrease in the districts of Hissar (343), Gurgaon (57), Amritsar (47) and Attock (46). The abnormal rise in the number of decrees for ejectment in the district of Hissar last year was due to agrarian trouble fanned by Congress agitators within and around the Skinner Estates. This trouble is now happily at an end.

The number of ejectments ordered under section 45 (5) of the Tenancy Act fell from 3,690 to 3,309, whereas the actual ejectments went down from 3,498 to 2,821. Similarly suits to contest liability to ejectment decided in favour of tenants went down from 284 to 244.

20. No new *jagir* was notified under the Punjab Descent of Jagirs Act during the year. The total number of *jagirs* notified under the Act so far is 152.

21. The total area irrigated by canals in the province under the management of the Irrigation department has further decreased from 12,972,152 acres to 12,353,716 acres during the year under report. The area matured also decreased from 12,013,097 acres to 11,377,069 acres.

The income derived by the Irrigation department from the fixed and fluctuating canal advantage rate during the year amounted to Rs. 16.11 lakhs and Rs. 174.97 lakhs against Rs. 15.92 lakhs and Rs. 166.23 lakhs last year, respectively, representing a net increase of Rs. 8.93 lakhs. This increase is mainly due to the special remissions sanctioned during the year being on a smaller scale than in the preceding year.

The working of the perennial canals is fully reported in the administration report of the Irrigation department. It will therefore be sufficient to give here a brief description of the inundation canals in

their charge. The statement below gives the salient figures in regard to them :—

Thanks to the abundant supply of water in the rivers all these canals ran well, particularly the Sidhnai and the Muzaffargarh inundation canals. The marked increase in the water rates is due partly to the increase in cultivation in the irrigated area and partly to smaller special remissions during the year. A contributory cause of the increase in the area irrigated and in the water rate assessed in the Muzaffargarh district is the opening in the *kharif* 1931 of the remodelled channels of the Lower Magasson branch and the tail reach of the Sardar branch of the Indus series.

22. In addition to the canals mentioned in the preceding paragraph there are other canals under the control of Deputy Commissioners or the Rural Sanitary

The question of the division of water of the Ghaggar river between the British Government and the Patiala and Bikaner States and that of the training of certain hill torrents, including the Sarusti, the Markanda and the Tangri *nallah* in the Karnal and Ambala districts are still under consideration.

Thanks to good summer rains the Sarsuti canal worked well and irrigated a larger area than last year. The Shah Nahr canal also ran well, but its income from *abiana* fell from Rs. 28,623 to Rs. 22,795. This is due to the decrease in the demand under (i) wastage of water, (ii) the *halla* penalty, and (iii) the recovery of costs of zamindars' works. The decrease under (i) and (ii) is due to better control of water, and under (iii) to the fact that the *bachh* papers:

of *zamindara* works could not be prepared in time. The income from the Grey canals fell from Rs. 1,38,462 to Rs. 1,16,138 during the year. The decrease which appears to be due to inefficient *girdawari* is under inquiry. The revised rules for the maintenance of the Grey canals accounts are also under scrutiny. It is interesting that the percentage of *kharaba* on these canals is falling every year. It was 20 per cent. during the year under report against 21.6 per cent. in 1930-31 and 24.8 per cent. in 1929-30.

As reported last year, the question of improving the water supply in the Namal reservoir by opening the Nara spring from the Uchhali lake was dropped for lack of funds. Rainfall during the previous year was very poor, and on the eve of *rabi* irrigation in 1932 the water in the reservoir had reached only R. L. 1,148.4 the lowest level recorded since the construction of the dam. After the rainy season, however, it went up to over R. L. 1,170.00 (which is the maximum storage level) and resulted in the flooding of the lake and some damage to the crops of the surrounding country. The question of the grant of compensation for the damage caused is under consideration. In the course of enquiries it was discovered that the basin of the reservoir had silted up and the capacity of the reservoir reduced by 58 million cubic feet. Although the income from water rates during the year is abnormally low because of the scanty rainfall during the monsoon period in 1931, the prospects of the next year are bright.

The hill torrents in the Dera Ghazi Khan district flowed more frequently and effected better irrigation than last year. The area irrigated rose from 150,287 acres last year to 203,996 acres during the year under report. The question of improving the supply from the hill torrent is still under the consideration of the Irrigation department.

The Gurgaon *bunds* and Kangra *kuhls* stand in a different category. The question of the re-transfer of the Gurgaon *bunds*, which were under the control of the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board since 1923, has been decided, but the orders have not yet been put into effect. The net income from the Gurgaon *bunds* was Rs. 1,506 against Rs. 4,726 last year, the decrease being

due to the fact that owing to scanty rains the water stored by the *bunds* was insufficient to irrigate a larger area.

There was scarcity of water for irrigation in the Kangra *kults* owing to drought. In April, May and June several disputes took place with regard to the distribution of water, but violence was averted by the timely intervention of the authorities.

It has been decided to transfer the entire control, including assessment work, of the Ghaggar canals from the Civil to the Irrigation department with effect from *khari* 1933. This, it is hoped, will conduce to the better distribution of the water supplies of these canals.

23. The administration of the Land Acquisition Act in the Punjab during the year under report cannot be regarded as satisfactory and several complaints have been received from departmental officers of dilatory proceedings and excessive awards. The subject is one that requires more attention from Collectors than it receives, and steps have been taken to secure that greater supervision is exercised over the proceedings of land acquisition officers. But faults are not confined to the latter, seeing that departmental officers themselves are also apt to neglect the rules of procedure. The practice of taking possession of land without waiting till it is properly handed over by the Collector is particularly dangerous because it may involve Government in serious financial liability.

For various public purposes 3,775,945 acres of land were acquired at a cost of Rs. 6,38,478, against 4,147,231 acres for Rs. 8,46,502 in the preceding year. The total average price per acre was Rs. 169 against Rs. 33½ in 1929-30, and Rs. 204 in 1930-31. Economic situation is mainly responsible for this marked fall in the price of land.

The largest areas acquired were 1,159 acres in the Multan, 676 in the Ferozepore, 580 in the Montgomery, 286 in the Hissar and 257 in the Lyallpur districts.

The area acquired in the Hissar district was only for roads and in the others mentioned chiefly for canals.

550-708 acres were restored to the original owners.

24. The outstanding balance of loans advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act at the commencement of the year was Rs. 63.51 lakhs which rose to Rs. 63.58 lakhs at the close of the year. The balance was over Rs. 10 lakhs in Gurgaon, over Rs. 5 lakhs in Hissar and over Rs. 3 lakhs in Montgomery, Multan and Muzaffargarh. The loans were largely advanced for the sinking of wells during the year under report. The total number of wells sunk during the year under report was 3,168 out of which 608 were constructed with the aid of *taccavi* against 738 last year.

Remission of land revenue was given on account of 305 wells which fell out of use against 307 during the preceding year. Protective leases were given for 1,097 wells against 1,056 last year.

The demand recoverable on account of principal, including arrears for the year under report was Rs. 7.13 lakhs out of which Rs. 4.30 lakhs were recovered leaving a balance of Rs. 2.83 lakhs. Arrears of principal are heavy in the districts of Dera Ghazi Khan, Muzaffargarh, Multan, Sheikhupura, Shahpur, Karnal, Jhelum, Montgomery, Attock and Hissar. Out of a sum of Rs. 4.85 lakhs outstanding on account of interest Rs. 2.64 lakhs were recovered during the year under report. Arrears on account of interest are heavy in the districts of Hissar, Dera Ghazi Khan, Muzaffargarh and Shahpur.

25. The outstanding balance of loans given under the Agriculturists' Loans Act at the commencement of the year was Rs. 50.92 lakhs. This balance was reduced to 43.42 lakhs at the close of the year. The amount advanced during the year under report was Rs. 3 lakhs against Rs. 5.24 lakhs during the preceding year. The total collections amounted to Rs. 6.44 lakhs against 10.04 lakhs in the preceding year. The fall in the collections is mainly due to the agricultural depression. The amount sus-

pended during the year was Rs. 21.30 lakhs out of which over Rs. 12 lakhs were suspended in Gurgaon, Rs. 7 lakhs in Hissar and one lakh in Rohtak. A sum of Rs. 4.93 lakhs was written off as irrecoverable. The remissions were heavy in the districts of Gurgaon (Rs. 3 lakhs) and Rohtak (Rs. 1½ lakhs). The outstanding balances of *taccavi* are heavy in the districts of Gurgaon, Hissar, Dera Ghazi Khan, Mianwali, Multan, Muzaffargarh, Montgomery, Jhang and Rohtak.

Out of the total demand of Rs. 2,58,100 due for collection on account of interest a sum of Rs. 49,460 was collected during the year under report, thus leaving a balance of Rs. 1,13,148 at the close of the year. A sum of over Rs. 19,000 was written off as irrecoverable and a sum of Rs. 81,000 was suspended during the year under report.

26. The total income from unclassified forests and other Government waste lands under the control of Deputy Commissioners amounted to Rs. 59,19,399 against Rs. 60,09,087 in the preceding year. The income from land revenue has gone down by Rs. 2,57,578 and that from *malikana* has risen by Rs. 4,47,511 during the year under report. The decrease in income from land revenue is partly due to the remissions given in *rabi* 1932 and partly to the acquisition of proprietary rights by zamindars and auction purchasers in the districts of Lyallpur and Jhang. The increase in *malikana* is in the main result of more lands being allotted on temporary cultivation in the districts of Multan, Montgomery and Gujrat. A part of the increase is due to the fact that last year remissions were given on *malikana* by mistake in the district of Lahore, but as soon as the mistake was realized, the amount of *malikana* remitted was collected during the year under report. The apparent decrease in the miscellaneous income is due to Rs. 2,30,625, the sale price of *nazul* land in Lahore, being wrongly added to last year's figures. Of the total amount of Rs. 92,453 on account of *tirni* dues a sum of Rs. 62,108 was collected during the year under report. Rs. 5,250 were remitted and Rs. 25,095 remained outstanding at the close of the year. The outstanding balance on account of *tirni* dues was large in the districts of Muzaf-

fargarh (Rs. 6,242), Lyallpur (Rs. 5,010), Jhang (Rs. 4,176), Mianwali (Rs. 4,066), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 2,964) and Multan (Rs. 1,895).

While there has been a slight increase in the area of unclassed forests, that of waste lands has gone up from 1,092,470 acres to 1,447,144 acres during the year. Though there is a decrease of 85,734 acres in the waste land area in Montgomery due to the allotment in the Lower Bari Doab colony and in the Nili Bar colony, there has been a considerable increase in the area of waste land in Sheikhpura and Lyallpur owing to the resumption of land from defaulting purchasers. A slight increase in the area of waste land in Amritsar is due to the disafforestation of *rakhs* Nagh and Bhoru.

The total income derived from rents, sales of wood, etc., has decreased from Rs. 60,09,087 to Rs. 59,19,329. The districts which are responsible for the decrease in income are Jhang, Lahore, Shahpur and Lyallpur. The decrease in the Jhang district is due to the fall in income from the sale of waste land which is Rs. 61,423 as compared with Rs. 2,15,664 during the preceding year. The decrease in the Lahore district is mainly due to the fact that last year's figures include a large item of Rs. 2,30,625 on account of sale of *nazul* property and on account of the sale of the proprietary rights to tenants.

The area of Government land held by Government tenants has slightly increased on account of the allotments made in the colony tracts of Montgomery and Multan. The total area of unclassed forest let out for cultivation by the Forest Department has gone up, while the area actually cultivated has decreased during the year. The decrease is mainly in the Multan district and is due to nearly 12,000 acres of land being left unirrigated on account of shortage of canal water.

In the Gurgaon district an experiment in afforestation is in progress since 1925 with the object of preventing further denudation of the soil by hill torrents. While financial considerations have made it impossible to increase the area under afforestation, the steady progress reported last year has continued. There was a good crop of grass during the past year, and cow grazing was allowed in a

larger area than last year. The mesquite plants are reported to be doing very well and some of them have grown as high as six feet.

27. Operations under the Land Preservation (Chos) Act are confined to the two districts of Hoshiarpur and Ambala :—

Land Preservation
(Chos) Act, 1900.

Hoshiarpur district.—Reclamation in the Hoshiarpur district continues to progress satisfactorily, and the condition of the Katardhar is reported to be gratifying. In the Mehargarwal *cho* an area of 15 acres was successfully planted with fresh *kharkana* during the year under report and the previous plantations in 468 acres were well preserved. A sum of Rs. 469-7-0 was distributed among the zamindars out of Rs. 45 and Rs. 468 sanctioned for initial and recurring bounties, respectively. The balance of Rs. 43-9-0 could not be distributed as the zamindars concerned refused to accept the money. This is attributed to the erroneous belief that the money is tendered in consideration of the surrender of rights, and the Commissioner considers it wise to discontinue these bounties. Nearly the whole length of the *cho* is overgrown with *kharkana kai* and seedlings of trees. An area of 424 acres was planted with *kharkana* by zamindars in other *chos*. About 1,900 acres were sown with *kikar*, etc., and *sanatha* was broadcast in 6,549 acres. Sowings took place in 78 out of 126 villages in the Katardhar area. The villagers realised a sum of Rs. 12,194 by the sale of grass as compared with Rs. 17,809 last year. The decrease in the income is attributed to the fall in the price of grass.

One of the two experimental *bunds* erected by the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board in connection with the scheme for reclaiming the Dholbaha *cho* by holding up storm water in the hills was damaged during the year under report and has not so far been repaired. The survey of other *bunds* in the Dholbaha catchment area has now been completed by the Board.

At the end of last year 5 cases were pending and twenty-seven cases were instituted during the year under report as against 20 last year. Fifteen cases were disposed of, out of which 3 ended in discharge.

and in 12 cases fines were imposed and realized. A sum of Rs. 2,001 was realised by way of composition of offences against Rs. 1,385 last year.

Ambala district.—The question of the abolition of the present establishment consisting of one forester and 6 guards has been deferred pending the report of the Committee on Erosion and Denudation. The district report is again silent in regard to the Ambala Siwaliks generally. The existing five plantations are being carefully looked after. *Kikar* and *shisham* trees planted on the banks of torrents do not show any sign of marked improvement.

Four cases under the Ops Act were instituted during the year under report as against 10 in the preceding year. One resulted in acquittal and two in conviction with fines amounting to Rs. 7 which were realised.

The Erosion and Denudation Enquiry Committee appointed last year has not so far submitted its report.

28. The total area of land entered in the revenue records of the province is 56·193 million acres of which 30·462 million acres are cultivated. The total area owned by members of agricultural tribes is 36·155 million acres out of which 24·199 million acres are cultivated. The area owned by others is 5·239 million acres out of which 3·498 million acres are cultivated. Common lands, village *abadis* and Government properties account for 14·799 million acres. The area cultivated during the year under report showed an increase of 372,168 acres over the area cultivated in the previous year. This increase has chiefly taken place in the districts of Mianwali, Montgomery, Lyallpur and Muzaffargarh. The total area held under mortgage has gone up from 4·581 million acres during the last year to 4·763 million acres during the year under report with a corresponding increase in the cultivated area from 3·481 million acres to 3·632 million acres. The percentage to total cultivated area of area held under mortgage is 11·9 as against 11·5 in the previous year. The total area per owner is 12·2 acres and the cultivated area per owner 6·6 acres, which is practically the same as last year.

29. The area that changed hands by gifts, exchanges and sales has decreased from 101,007, 63,804 and 202,106 acres in the last year, to 87,826, 48,283 and 198,251 acres, respectively, during the year under report. The decrease of 13,181 acres in gifts has mainly taken place in the districts of Attock and Muzaffargarh. The decrease of 15,521 acres in exchanges has chiefly occurred in the Multan district and is due mainly to the cessation of *killabandi* operations in the district. The decrease in the total sales is insignificant and calls for no remarks; though sales of right of superior ownership have fallen from 10,463 acres in the preceding year to 5,801 acres during the year under report. The cultivated area sold during the year was 119,038 acres against 127,349 acres in the preceding year and represents 0.39 per cent. of the total cultivated area of the province. The sales of right of superior ownership in cultivated land amounts to 1,327 acres against 2,911 acres during the preceding year. The decrease of 6,501 acres in the sales of rights of ownership has chiefly occurred in the districts of Hissar, Attock, Lyallpur and Muzaffargarh.

The total area redeemed also fell from 184,065 acres during the preceding year to 160,479 acres during the year under report. An area of 102,607 acres was redeemed by the agricultural tribes as compared with 118,506 acres redeemed during the preceding year. These decreases are due to the tightness of the money market and the slump in the prices of agricultural produce. For the same reason the area mortgaged increased from 844,396 to 375,275 acres. The total area mortgaged by members of agricultural tribes amounted to 315,052 acres against 288,066 acres last year and the area mortgaged to members of agricultural tribes rose from 248,613 to 253,637 during the year under report. The total area mortgaged exceeded the area redeemed by 214,796 acres against a similar excess of 160,331 acres in the preceding year.

30. The sale-price per acre has fallen from Rs 268 in the preceding year to Rs. 247 per acre during the year under report. There is also a slight fall from Rs. 420 to Rs. 412 per acre in the sale price of cultivated

land. The sale-price of land for the province as a whole represents 261 years' purchase of land revenue, against 255 in the last year, and six at the commencement of the British occupation. The fall in the price of land is more or less universal, and is due to the general fall in the prices of agricultural produce. The average mortgage money per acre mortgaged (ownership) has fallen from Rs. 163 to Rs. 141. The average mortgage money per acre of the cultivated area has also fallen from Rs. 192 to Rs. 166 per acre during the year.

31. No new tribes were notified under the Alienation of Land Act during the year. Land Alienation Act— Statutory agricultural tribes as a whole gained by purchase a net area of 872 acres against 5,941 acres in the preceding year, but lost by mortgage and redemption 61,415 and 25,621 acres against 39,453 and 31,295 acres, respectively, in the previous year. Sales and mortgages by members of agricultural tribes *inter se* for the year 1931-32 and the preceding year are shown below:—

The *benami* transactions, which are reported from some districts were in due course disallowed.

A new statement has been prescribed for submission by the Deputy Commissioners showing the extent to which civil courts accept the advice of the Collectors in cases of execution of decrees of civil courts against members of agricultural tribes whose land under section 16 of the Alienation of Land Act cannot be legally sold in execution of decrees. Out of the total number of 4,099 cases received from the civil courts 3,407 were returned with advice by the Collectors and 692 were still pending at the close of the year, 850 cases were pending in civil courts and 396 were filed in default, compounded or otherwise satisfied. The Collectors' advice was followed.

in 1876 cases and not followed in 252 or 11·6 per cent. cases.

32. The number of cases pending with Collectors or their assistants at the commencement of the year under report was 21,806. During the year 156,181 cases were instituted of which 155,785 were disposed of and 22,502 remained pending at the close of the year. The districts of Hissar, Rohtak, Ambala, Hoshiarpur, Amritsar, Jhang, Multan and Muzaffargarh showed a heavy pending file. Out of 2,080 revenue judicial appeals for disposal 1,629 were decided by Collectors and officers exercising the appellate powers of Collectors and 437 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the pending appeals 109 were over 3 months old. The number of pending cases was large in the districts of Hissar and Hoshiarpur. The number of revenue executive appeals for disposal during the year under report was 4,538. Out of this 3,695 were disposed of, 98 were transferred, leaving a balance of 745 at the close of the year. The number of pending appeals was high in the districts of Lahore, Hoshiarpur, Sialkot, Lyallpur and Jhang. The number of appeals pending over 3 months was 79 at the close of the year.

The Commissioners disposed of 318 revenue judicial appeals of which 103 were disposed of by the Commissioner, Lahore, 69 by the Commissioner, Jullundur, 55 by the Commissioner, Ambala, 52 by the Commissioner, Rawalpindi and 34 by the Commissioner, Multan. The number of appeals which remained pending at the close of the year was 208, the largest being in Multan (96). The number of appeals pending over 3 months was 42, out of which 33 were in Jullundur. The Commissioners also disposed of 1,744 revenue executive appeals leaving a balance of 607 out of which 154 were over 3 months' old. The number of such appeals pending was high in Multan (282) and Lahore (131).

The Financial Commissioners decided 11 revenue judicial and 90 revenue executive appeals leaving a balance of 11 at the close of the year. They also disposed of 434 applications for revision, leaving a balance of 41 at the close of the year.

**Proceedings of the Governor of the Punjab in Council
in the Department of Revenue, no. 2328-R.,
dated 15th June 1934.**

READ :—

The annual report on the Land Revenue Administration of the Punjab for the year ending the 30th September 1933.

REMARKS.—The catastrophic fall in prices which began at the end of April 1930, still dominates the economic situation in the province. It was observed in the last year's review that the downward trend of the prices of agricultural produce had practically ceased during 1931-32, and, indeed, during 1932-33, the year under report, all important staples, with the exception of rapeseed, raw sugar and tobacco reached still higher quotations. The wholesale price of wheat, for example, which was Rs. 2-15-0 per maund at Lyallpur at the end of September 1932, rose to Rs. 3-4-0 at the end of January 1933. But thereafter, it declined until it touched Rs. 2-12-0 in May and Rs. 2-5-0 at the end of August. At the close of September 1933, it stood at Rs. 2-7-0 per maund.

The price of *desi* cotton which was Rs. 6-14-0 on 15th November 1932, at Montgomery, declined to Rs. 6 by the end of December. The downward slope continued until it touched Rs. 5-8-0 at the end of May. Similarly American cotton which was Rs. 8 per maund on 31st October 1932, declined to Rs. 7 at the end of December. Thereafter it kept fluctuating between Rs. 5-2-0 and Rs. 6-12-0 till the close of the year under report.

The price of *toria*, which was Rs. 4 per maund on 15th December at Lyallpur, went down to Rs. 3-8-0 on 15th January and again rose to Rs. 3-14-0 during January and February. Then it gradually declined to Rs. 3, the price at which it stood till the end of the year.

2. The health of the agricultural population was on the whole satisfactory, and the stray cases of plague, small-pox, cholera, influenza and malaria which were reported from certain parts of the province, did not

interfere with agricultural operations to any appreciable extent. The condition of the cattle was also good on the whole. The supply of fodder was adequate except in parts of the Hissár, Hoshiárpur, Jullundur, Ludhiána, Amritsar, Gujrát, Jhelum, Ráwalpindi and Attock districts, where concessions for its import were given.

3. Ever since the economic débâcle of 1930 the Governor in Council has at every harvest given prompt and careful consideration to the ability of the zamindar to pay the Government demand, and he has been remitting year after year a considerable portion of the demand, apart from giving relief in other directions. This year was no exception. A sum of Rs. 9,19,000 was remitted in *rabi* 1933 on account of the fall in prices. Rupees 18,86,000 were suspended during the course of the year under review. Under the head of *taccavi* no less than Rs. 17,43,000 were suspended and Rs. 6,32,000 remitted.

The situation in the Hissar district in particular occupied the special attention of Government. The failure of the *rabi* of 1932 was followed by the failure of the *kharif*, the area of the failed crop being as much as 76 per cent. in the district. Test works, which were designed to give relief, were started at the end of December 1932, and besides these, relief was given by the suspension of Rs. 7.40 lakhs and the remission of over 5 lakhs of land revenue. *Taccavi* on a liberal scale was distributed and a sum of Rs. 39,000 was spent on relief works and an additional sum of Rs. 8,000 on charitable relief, including the provision of spinning to the women of the countryside.

Generally, however, it may be said that although the economic position of the Punjab agriculturist did not, during the year under report, become in any way worse than what it was in the preceding year, it continued, and still continues, to cause serious anxiety. The cumulative effect of the depression has practically exhausted his resources while his load of debt has increased and his credit is well nigh gone. The Governor in Council is particularly alarmed at the appearance in the Gurdáspur district of the *zamindar sahuakar* to

whom the checks and restraints of the Land Alienation Act do not apply. Developments in this connection should be carefully watched by the local officers in this and all other districts of the province.

4. The fixed land revenue demand of the province for the year amounted to Rs. 236·86 lakhs, of which 18·86 lakhs were suspended and 1·82 lakhs remitted. The total amount collected was 214·78 lakhs representing 99·3 per cent. of the net recoverable demand, thus leaving a balance of 1·40 lakhs at the close of the year. This high proportion of collections to the amount designed for collection is a testimony to the care with which suspensions and remissions are given, as well as to the willingness of the *samindar* to pay within his power. The total amount under suspension on account of years prior to the year under report aggregated 32·10 lakhs, of which 2·81 lakhs were collected and 19·15 lakhs remitted, thus leaving a balance of 10·14 lakhs, which added to 18·86 lakhs suspended during the year, brings the balance under suspension to Rs. 29 lakhs at the close of the year.

5. Of the total fluctuating demand of Rs. 201·50 lakhs, as reduced by the general remissions referred to above, 97·7 per cent., i.e., 196·90 lakhs were recovered, leaving a balance of 4·60 lakhs. The closing balance of the arrears at the end of the preceding year was Rs. 5·06 lakhs of which Rs. 4·11 lakhs were collected during the year under report, thus leaving a total recoverable balance of Rs. 5·55 lakhs at the close of the year. The percentage of collection of the fluctuating demand is as usual not so high as that of the fixed demand. This may be partly due to local conditions.—2 lakhs of the balance are in a single district—but *prima facie* it does suggest that the system of a fixed demand combined with careful regard to the circumstances of each village produces a form of fluctuation more accurate than that based on the mere record of the area matured.

6. While there has been a gratifying decrease in the number of coercive processes in the Ambála, Jullundur, Lahore and Ráwalpindi divisions, the increase in the Multán division is disquieting and needs careful

investigation. It is satisfactory, however, that processes against *lambardars* have decreased to a marked extent in all divisions except Multán, and even in that division have increased by very little in comparison with those against owners.

7. The Governor in Council is glad to observe that the post has been well used for the service of processes in the districts of Karnál, Hissár, Rohtak, Ambála, Ludhiána, Ferozepore, Lahore and Muzaffargarh. He hopes that the Financial Commissioners' recent instructions will result in a notable advance in this direction.

8. The Governor in Council notes with regret that the holding up, in view of the financial stringency, of the schemes for the improvement of record rooms has resulted in serious damage to the revenue records in some of the districts. The preservation of land records, which are of supreme value both to the public and to the Government, is a matter of the first importance and the Governor in Council hopes that all possible measures will be adopted to protect these from damage.

9. Though the area affected by *thur* has increased by 6,138 acres, the Governor in Council is pleased to observe that the area under *sem* has decreased in almost all the districts, except Gujranwála. He builds his hopes on the five-year plan of drainage construction in the Chaj and Rechna *doabs* and on other similar schemes for fighting this menace to the prosperity of the countryside.

10. The judicial work performed by the revenue courts under the Tenancy Act involved 25,214 cases decided. It is a remarkable evidence of the general satisfaction with which decisions of the revenue courts are met that there were only 2,123 revenue judicial appeals for disposal in the courts of Collectors, 489 in the courts of Commissioners, and 4 in the court of the Financial Commissioners. This of course does not exhaust the work done by revenue officers in a *quasi-judicial* capacity under the Tenancy, Land Revenue and other Acts, the total number of revenue cases disposed of being over 164,000. It is a satisfactory indication of the expedition of the revenue justice in

the province that the total pending file of appeals and revisions in the court of the Financial Commissioners was no more than 81 cases.

11. During the year under review the urban and rural sections of the Board of Economic Enquiry were amalgamated and the members reduced from 25 to 20. Mr. H. Calvert, C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., who acted as chairman of the Board for several years past, was succeeded by Mr. D. J. Boyd, C.I.E., I.C.S. The Governor in Council takes this opportunity of placing on record his appreciation of Mr. Calvert's valuable services to the revenue administration and more particularly to the department of co-operation during his long and distinguished career in this province.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of these remarks be published in the *Punjab Gazette* and that a copy, with a copy of the report, be forwarded to the Government of India, in the Department of Education, Health and Lands.

Annual Report
ON THE
Land Revenue Administration

Year ending the 30th September, 1933.

1. (a) This report covers only the twelve months beginning with October 1st, 1932, and ending with September 30th, 1933, but it is necessary to make here a brief reference to the weather of the preceding nine months, *i.e.*, January to September, 1932.

In January and February, 1932, several districts received light to moderate showers while in March the rainfall was generally above normal throughout the province. From April to June, however, it was greatly in defect. In July it was moderate to heavy, while in August it was excessive in all the montane and submontane tracts and in a few of the central districts and generally light to moderate elsewhere. In September it was below normal except in the Ambala division, where it was usually in excess.

During October and November and the first three weeks of December, 1932, the weather remained dry and on the whole unfavourable for the *rabi* sowings, which were however refreshed by the moderate rainfall of the last week of December. In January and February, 1933, most districts received light showers, while in March, the rainfall was light to moderate. This rain was useful, although it was generally insufficient for maturing the crops, especially on un-irrigated lands. Standing crops were in places damaged by severe cold, high winds and hailstorms. Wheat suffered to some extent by a slight attack of smut. There was some rain accompanied by hailstorms in April and in the beginning of May, which did damage on the threshing floor.

In the month of September considerable damage was done by the floods consequent on excessive rains in the districts of Karnal, Rohtak and Gurgaon. This

will be noted in the report for the next year (1933-34).

(b) Thanks to the good rain that fell in July and August, 1932, the climatic conditions were generally favourable for autumn sowings. The total area sown rose from 12·99 million acres in the preceding year to 13·14 million acres during the year under report. The failed area was 30 per cent. of the sown area as compared with 15 per cent. in the preceding year. The decrease in matured area was due to the unsatisfactory weather at the time of the ripening of the crops. The percentage of crop failure was high in Hissar, Gurgaon, Rohtak, Mianwali, Attock and Dera Ghazi Khan.

On the other hand the total area sown in *rabi* shows a substantial decrease, i.e., from 19·01 million acres to 16·29 million acres, because of the dry weather during October, November and the first three weeks of December, 1932. The percentage of failure shows however an improvement, i.e., it was only 16 per cent. against 17 per cent. in the preceding year, thanks to the showers during the months of January to March, which refreshed the standing crops. The percentages of crop failure were high in the districts of Rotak, Gurgaon, Hissar, Mianwali, Attock and Dera Ghazi Khan.

Taking now both the *kharif* and *rabi* together, the total area sown and matured during the year as a whole the year under report amounted to 30·06 and 23·44 million acres respectively, as compared with 32·00 and 26·73 million acres in the preceding year. The percentage of failed on sown area was 22 this year as compared with 16 last year which is also the average percentage of the last 10 years. The decrease of 6 per cent. in the matured area over last year's figure is due to the unfavourable climatic conditions at the time of maturing.

Irrigated sowings increased from 45 per cent. of the total in the preceding year to 48 per cent. during the year under report. There was an increase of 11 per cent. in the area irrigated from wells and a decrease of 5 per cent. in the area irrigated from

Government canals. The increase in the area irrigated by wells is ascribed to the scarcity of rains at the time of *rabi* sowings and the shortage of canal water, whereas the decrease of irrigation from canals is mainly due to the shortage of water in the rivers.

(c) In the Hissar district anxiety was caused by the failure of the *rabi* of 1932 the situation becoming definitely bad on the failure of the *kharif* of 1932. The area of the failed crop was 75 per cent. in the district as a whole and 80 per cent. in the *barani* area. Test works, which were as a matter of fact meant to give relief, were started about the end of December, 1932, and were set up at altogether 21 centres between this date and 18th August, 1933, the maximum at any time being 11. The following statement shows the expenditure incurred on the relief of distress in the Hissar district :—

(d) The crop that showed the highest outturn above the normal during 1932-33 was sugarcane (32 per cent.), the area under it being also the record one of 558,152 acres against 474,655 acres during the preceding year. This was due partly to the fall in the price of cotton last year which made this a comparatively more paying crop. *Jowar* showed an outturn of 12 per cent. above the normal, the area under it showing a rise of 1.11 million acres from 1.01 million acres. The outturn of wheat on the other hand was 7 per cent. below normal, while the

acreage fell to 8.59 million against 9.07 million in the preceding year, because of the dry weather and insufficient canal water at sowing time. Bajra has been coming into favour since 1929 because it not only yields both green fodder and grain but gives a better return and thrives on comparatively poor soil without exhausting it too much. It rose to 3.40 million acres from 3.23 million. The acreage under gram which rose from 4.12 million in 1930-31 to 5.55 million in 1931-32, fell to 3.89 million during the year under report. This is attributed to the fall in its price. The cotton acreage has decreased by 13 per cent. as compared with the previous year and 7 per cent. as compared with the normal, that under *desi* falling from 1.40 million to 1.11 million acres, while that under American rose slightly, *i. e.*, by 13,250 acres. The deficiency of rainfall at the time of the sowing and the low prices of cotton last year are mainly responsible for this result. The area under barley also shows some decrease. The total outturn of the other important crops was above normal for rice (3 per cent.) and below normal for *rabi* oil-seeds (12 per cent.) and maize (6 per cent.)

As was pointed out in the report for 1931-32 the general downward trend of prices of almost all the staples had ceased during that year, it being definitely reversed as regards wheat, which had an appreciable rise on account of the comparatively low yield of the crop combined with the imposition of the import duty at Rs. 2 per hundredweight in March 1931. With the exception of rapeseed, raw sugar and tobacco the prices of the other important crops were also higher in 1931-32. It will be interesting now to observe the fluctuations in the prices of the principal crops, namely, wheat, cotton, *gur* and *toria* that have taken place during 1932-33, the year under report.

Wheat.—The rates prevailing during the year for wheat showed a distinct improvement. The wholesale quotation which was Rs. 2-2-0 per maund at Lyallpur at the end of May, 1932, improved to Rs. 2-15-0 at the end of September and Rs. 3-4-0 at the end of January, 1933. It then declined, until it touched Rs. 2-12-0 in May, again rising in July to Rs. 2-14-0 on account of the good monsoon, the price once again declined to Rs. 2-5-0 at the end of August. At the end of September, 1933, the rate in Lyallpur was Rs. 2-7-0 per maund.

Cotton.—The rates for both *desi* and American cotton started fairly high at the beginning of the cotton season but fell off steadily at the close of year. At Montgomery, the price of *desi* cotton was Rs. 6-14-0 on 15th November, 1932, and Rs. 6-4-0 at the end of the month. By the end of December it declined to Rs. 6, the downward slope continuing until it touched Rs. 5-8-0 at the end of May, 1933. This rate was constant till the close of the year under report. The price of American cotton moved on similar lines, coming down from Rs. 8 per maund on 31st October, 1932, to Rs. 7 at the end of December. Thereafter it fluctuated between Rs. 5-2-0 and Rs. 6-12-0 till the close of the year under report.

Gur.—During the months of December, January, February and March, the price of *gur* fluctuated between Rs. 3-12-0 and Rs. 3-4-0 per maund at Amritsar. The lowest price touched was Rs. 3 at the end of March after which there was a gradual recovery till it reached Rs. 4 at the end of May and Rs. 4-8-0 in the

middle of August. Thereafter it declined at first to Rs. 4 and then rose sharply to Rs. 5 in the middle of September, keeping at this level till the end of the year under report.

Toria.—*Toria* which was Rs. 4 per maund at Lyallpur on the 15th December fell to Rs. 3-8-0 on the 15th January. The price rose to Rs. 3-14-0 during the months of January and February after which there was a gradual decline till it touched Rs. 3 at the end of March. There was then a gradual recovery till the price reached Rs. 3-10-0 at the end of May, followed by a gradual slope downwards until Rs. 3-4-0 was reached on the 15th August. The price further declined to Rs. 3-1-0 at the close of August and there it practically remained till the close of the year under report.

(f) The condition of cattle was on the whole satisfactory during the year, and fodder was sufficient, except in parts of the Hissar, Hoshiarpur, Jullundur, Ludhiana, Amritsar, Gujrat, Jhelum, Rawalpindi and Attock districts where concessions for its import by rail were given.

(g) The health of the Agricultural population was generally good though stray cases of plague, small-pox, cholera, influenza, pneumonia and malaria were reported from certain parts of the province. These outbreaks did not interfere with the agricultural operations to any appreciable extent.

The fifth regular wage census was held in December 1932. The wages that prevailed during the year under report were much lower than those during the year 1927.

(h) On the whole it may be said that in spite of the cumulative effect of the general depression that commenced in the year 1930, the condition of the zamindars did not become worse than in the preceding year and in fact some districts report signs of improvement. This improvement is partly due to the slightly higher price of agricultural produce, particularly of wheat and partly also to the general cutting down of expenditure, especially at marriage and death ceremonies. The zamindars' economic position must, however, continue to caus

serious anxiety. His resources are practically exhausted while his load of debt has increased and his credit largely gone, not merely for wasteful, but also for productive expenditure. The Co-operative Credit Societies are doing much to help in this crisis, but their help cannot solve the whole problem. A specially alarming note is struck from Gurdaspur which reports the development of the zamindar *sahukar* about whom it is stated that he "greedily takes land both by purchase and as security for advances. In very few cases does he cultivate the land acquired himself, though his interest in it is of a closer nature than that of the old class of *sahukar*."

2. The total demand for fixed land revenue for the year was Rs. 236·86 lakhs as compared with Rs. 237·60 lakhs in the preceding year. The decrease in the demand is mainly due to the fact that the fixed assessment in the Thal and Sindh circles and some villages of the Pacca circle of the Muzaffargarh tahsil has now been replaced by a fluctuating assessment. Out of the total demand for the year under report a sum of Rs. 18·86 lakhs was suspended and Rs. 1·82 lakhs remitted chiefly on account of the fall in prices, thus leaving a net recoverable demand of Rs. 216·15 lakhs or 91·3 per cent. of the total demand as compared with Rs. 216·60 lakhs or 91·1 per cent. for the last year. A sum of Rs. 214·78 lakhs representing 99·3 per cent. of the net recoverable demand was collected, leaving a balance of Rs. 1·40 lakhs at the close of the year. The districts which are mainly responsible for the outstanding arrears are Lahore, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. The comparatively large balance in the district of Lahore is chiefly due from the Lahore urban area where the demand is collected with difficulty because of the confused state of records.

As in the preceding year it was in the Ambala division that the major portion of the land revenue was suspended. Suspensions chiefly on account of the failure of the crops weresanctioned to the extent of Rs. 2 lakhs in Rohtak district and Rs. 7 lakhs each in Gurgaon and Hissar. The total amount under suspension in the province, as a whole on account of the years preceding the one under

report aggregated Rs. 32.11 lakhs at the beginning of the year. Out of this Rs. 8.13 lakhs were under suspension for over three years chiefly in the districts of Hissar, Rohtak, Karnal and Ambala, and of this Rs. 7.79 lakhs were remitted and about Rs. 34,000 collected leaving a negligible balance. Out of the suspended balance of Rs. 14.72 lakhs of the year 1930-31, Rs. 1.31 lakhs were collected and Rs. 11.14 lakhs remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 2.27 lakhs at the close of the year. Out of the suspended balance of Rs. 9.25 lakhs of the year 1931-32, Rs. 1.16 lakhs were collected and Rs. 0.22 lakh remitted, leaving a balance of Rs. 7.87 lakhs. Thus the total amount under suspension at the close of the year was Rs. 29.0 lakhs in all.

A sum of Rs. 25,645 was remitted on account of calamities of the season. The remissions were given mainly on account of damage done by hailstorms and most of them were in Hoshiarpur and Amritsar.

3. During the year under report 37,536 acres of land were added by alluvion and 30,291 acres were lost by diluvion, thus resulting in a gain of 7,245 acres against 5,426 acres last year. The district which suffered most from river action was Karnal which lost 1,739 acres. The only other districts that were considerably affected by river action were Jullundur, Dera Ghazi Khan and Gurgaon. The districts that gained by river action more than 1,000 acres each were Ferozepore, Gurdaspur and Shahpur.

Thirty-seven thousand, five hundred and thirty-six acres of land added by alluvion were assessed at a sum of Rs. 29,754, while a sum of Rs. 28,218 was remitted on 30,291 acres of land washed away by river action. Additional revenue amounting to Rs. 15,482 was imposed on 21,345 acres of land improved by alluvion, whereas land revenue was reduced by Rs. 4,711 on 9,226 acres of land damaged by diluvion. The net *khalsa* gain to the fixed land revenue roll was Rs. 11,184 against a net gain of Rs. 7,845 in the previous year.

4. The total demand on account of fluctuating land revenue for the year under report was Rs. 201.50 lakhs against Rs. 195.23 lakhs last year. Rupees 196.90

lakhs or 97·7 per cent. of the total demand were recovered against Rs. 190·86 lakhs or 97·7 per cent. last year. The districts of Sheikhpura, Gujrat, Shahpur, Montgomery, Jhang and Muzaffargarh are mainly responsible for the increase in collections, which amount to Rs. 6·04 lakhs. The increase in Sheikhpura is due to the fact that the special remissions for *rabi* 1933 were adjusted in the accounts of the following harvest. Similarly the special remissions sanctioned for the Shahpur district could not be given effect to in *rabi* 1933. The increase in collections in the districts of Gujrat and Montgomery is due to the fact that no special remissions were this year given in these districts whereas they were given in the preceding year. In the district of Muzaffargarh the increase is partly attributed to the expansion in the cultivated area and partly to the substitution of the fluctuating assessment for fixed assessment in the Thal and Sindh circles and some villages of the Pucca circle of the Muzaffargarh tahsil. In the Lyallpur district there has been a decrease of Rs. 2·28 lakhs on account of the grant of special remissions as also the shrinkage in the cultivated area consequent on the shortage of canal water.

The closing balance of arrears at the end of the preceding year was Rs. 5·06 lakhs out of which Rs. 4·11 lakhs were collected during the year under report. Out of the current year's demand a sum of Rs. 4·60 lakhs remained uncollected at the end of the year. Thus the total recoverable balance at the end of the year under report was Rs. 5·51 lakhs. The districts which are mainly responsible for this balance are Lahore (Rs. 0·38 lakhs), Montgomery (Rs. 0·85 lakhs), Lyallpur (Rs. 0·55 lakhs), Multan (Rs. 2·06 lakhs) and Muzaffargarh (Rs. 0·52 lakhs). The arrears in the Lahore district include old arrears amounting to Rs. 12,555 in the urban areas, due again to the unsatisfactory state of the urban land records to which reference has already been made. It is satisfactory that the arrears in the Montgomery district are about half of what they were last year.

The system of fluctuating assessment is reported to be working satisfactorily and to be generally popular with the land owners.

In order to encourage well sinking in the Naili tract of the Hissar district *chahi* cultivation has since *kharif* 1931 been assessed at *barani* rates. So far the results of this concession are not very marked, because although the area irrigated by wells has increased from 3,690 acres to 4,303 acres during the year under report, no new wells are reported to have been sunk. Indeed *chahi* cultivation in the Sirsa portion of the Naili tract has actually been decreasing during the past few years mainly because the Ghaggar stream is flooding an expanding area and this obviates the necessity for more well irrigation.

5. The total demand for "other land revenue" was Rs. 10.14 lakhs as compared with Rs. 8.60 lakhs last year. Rupees 8.58 lakhs or 84.58 per cent. of the total demand was collected against Rs. 7.50 lakhs or 87.2 per cent. last year. The increase in collections has mainly taken place under the head "Other Items" which includes the Government share under the new scheme of fees for the inspection of patwaris' records and the grant of certified copies. There was also an increase in the *tirni* collections to the extent of Rs. 1,621.

Arrears at the commencement of the year were Rs. 1.69 lakhs out of which Rs. 0.93 lakhs was collected. Rs. 1.56 lakhs remaining uncollected out of the demand of the year under report.

The total balance at the close of the year was Rs. 2.16 lakhs, the districts mainly responsible for this being Ferozepore, Lahore, Shahpur, Mianwali, Lyallpur and Multan.

6. Assigned land revenue amounts altogether to 7.6 per cent. of the total land revenue assessed and assessable in the province

Land revenue assignments—Statements no. X.

Nineteen special *jagirs* of the aggregate value of Rs. 5,000 per annum were granted to non-officials and retired officials during the year under report, in recognition of meritorious services. The total amount of revenue assigned since the inception of the scheme in 1911 now amounts to Rs. 84,000 per annum.

7. The total number of processes, issued during the year under report was 33,314. Coercive processes— Statement no. XI. against 30,014 last-year. These were issued for the realization of Rs. 34.87 lakhs of arrears of land revenue of which Rs. 29.07 lakhs were actually recovered, leaving Rs. 5.80 lakhs in arrears.

Ambala division.—The total number of processes other than writs, has decreased from 3,332 last year to 2,770 during the year under report. Out of 954 such processes issued against lambardars over 300 were issued in Karnal and over 200 in Rohtak. The Deputy Commissioner, Hissar, reports that there is a general impression abroad that non-payment of land revenue results in suspensions followed by remission and this in his opinion, is mainly responsible for the large number of processes issued in this district. Out of a total of 1,751 warrants of arrest in this division 1,239 were executed. Of these 592 were executed in the district of Rohtak alone against 602 last year. Out of 663 warrants of distress, 200 were issued in the district of Hissar and 189 in Rohtak. Out of 266 warrants of sale 134 were executed, the largest number being in the district of Rohtak. Action under sections 71 and 72 of the Land Revenue Act was taken in 5 cases and sale of immovable property, under sections 75 and 77 for the recovery of arrears of land revenue, was sanctioned in 24 cases in all.

Jullundur division.—This division is fortunate in showing the smallest number of processes. The year under report has witnessed a further decline from 1,074 to 711. This decrease is most marked in the districts of Hoshiarpur, Jullundur and Ludhiana.

Lahore division.—It is satisfactory that the number of processes other than writs has gone down from 3,961 to 2,474. In the district of Amritsar the number declined from 1,216 to 334 and in Gujranwala from 322 to 75. While there has been some decline in the districts of Gurdaspur and Sheikhpura, the figures for Lahore are almost stationary. The number of warrants of imprisonment issued in the district of Lahore decreased from 92 to 5.

Rawalpindi division.—The number of processes other than writs issued in this division has declined from 1,814 last year to 1,293. Shahpur district alone shows a decline from 1,139 to 374. In this district out of 36 warrants for imprisonment issued 35 were executed, whereas last year only 17 such warrants were issued and executed.

Multan division.—This is the only division which has shown an increase in the total number of processes other than writs, the number having gone up from 13,479 last year to 20,697. The figures for the districts of Multan, Lyallpur and Dera Ghazi Khan have almost doubled. While the Deputy Commissioner, Lyallpur, has not commented on the increase in the number of processes, the Deputy Commissioner, Multan, attributes it to the prevailing economic depression and the fluctuating character of the population in the Nili Bar colony. The Deputy Commissioner, Dera Ghazi Khan, attributes the increase to the inefficiency of the collecting agency. As for warrants of arrest, there has been increase in the number of those executed in Lyallpur and Multan, while none was executed in Muzaffargarh. Warrants of imprisonment have risen from 12 in the preceding year to 55, out of which 21 were executed in Dera Ghazi Khan and 16 in Multan. The number of warrants of distress and sale of immovable property executed during the year under report was also large in Montgomery, Lyallpur and Multan. Out of 15 warrants issued in the whole division for the sale of land under sections 75 and 77 of the Land Revenue Act, 12 were executed.

8. Processes for the recovery of arrears of land revenue were, as usual, served through the agency of the tahsil peons, temporary additional staff being entertained for short periods in a few districts.

The post is reported to have been used for the service of revenue summonses and processes in the districts of Karnal, Hissar, Rohtak, Ambala, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Lahore and Muzaffargarh; Karnal heading the list with 6,702. The Ludhiana district which was commended in last year's report shows for some unexplained reason a decline from 3,220 last year to 1,598, whereas an improvement is reported from Ambala and Ferozepore.

It seems there has been misunderstanding in the past in some tahsil offices regarding the policy of Government in this connection. The orders recently

issued by the Financial Commissioners will, it is hoped, result in a general improvement next year.

9. Re-measurement is being done in five villages in the Pacca circle of the Isakhel tahsil of the Mianwali district, and half of this work has already been completed. The revision of records in 19 more villages of the same circle which has been in progress since 1927 is soon expected to be finished. Four villages have already been completed.

Progress in re-measurement, revision of records, etc.

The final attestation of the records of 9 villages in the Lower Chenab colony, Lyallpur, was also completed during the year. The revision of records of parts of the Shujabad, Lodhran and Mailsi tahsils of the Multan district, is being done according to *killabandi* measurements.

The re-assessment work of the Lower Bari Doab colony area in the Montgomery and Multan districts, which was suspended in 1931, was resumed by Mr. Bourne, Settlement Officer, in April, 1933, and completed by the close of the year under report.

10. The orders of Government on the final settlement report of the Muzaffargarh district were issued during the year. The term of settlement has been fixed at 40 years, subject to the proviso that for any area to be specified by the local Government in which weir controlled canal irrigation may be introduced, the settlement will end on the date of such introduction. Government also passed orders on Mr. Anderson's report of the special revision of the assessment of the Thal and a portion of the Pakka circle of the Muzaffargarh tahsil, and substituted there a fluctuating assessment by crop rates for the fixed assessment, with effect from *rabi* 1933.

Government also passed orders during the year, on the assessment report of the urban areas in the old and new mandis at Pattoki, tahsil Chunian, district Lahore. The settlement has, in this case been sanctioned up to *rabi* 1935, when the settlement of the rest of the district expires.

11. A sum of Rs. 12,436 was spent during the year over the completion of the re-assessment of the Lower Bari Doab colony areas of the Multan and Montgomery districts. The total cost of these operations amounts to Rs. 5,02,436 against the estimated cost of Rs. 5,16,577. The saving was in the main, due to the "cut" in salaries.

Comparison of estimates and forecasts in regard to duration, cost and results of settlement operations—Statement no. XIV.

12. The re-assessment work of the Lower Bari Doab colony area in the Montgomery and Multan districts, which was suspended in 1931, was resumed by Mr. Bourne, Settlement Officer, on the 26th April, 1933, and was completed by the close of the year under report. It was also decided during the year to start settlement operations in the Lyallpur district (excluding the urban areas) and the Rakh Branch colony portion of the Sheikhupura district with effect from 1st October 1933.

Proposed future settlement operations (Forecast reports.)

The term of settlement of certain estates transferred from the Sialkot and Lahore districts to the Sheikhupura district was extended so as to bring it into conformity with the term fixed for the respective tahsils of the Sheikhupura district. It was also decided to call for the forecast report of the Lahore district.

The forecast reports of the Jhelum and Rawalpindi districts were under the consideration of Government at the close of the year.

13. There was no regular settlement in progress during the year. A small staff was employed, from 1st May, 1933, to the end of the year, to assist Mr. Bourne, late Settlement Officer, who was placed on special duty to complete the re-assessment of the Lower Bari Doab colony area in the Montgomery and Multan districts.

The staff employed in the Lyallpur district in connection with the colonization operations on the Pir Mahal, Burala and Khikha extensions of the Lower Chenab canal remained at work throughout the year.

14. During the year under report, no. 23 Party (Irrigation Surveys) continued the survey of the area commanded by the Bhakra Dam irrigation project and carried out the work detailed below :—

- Surveys.
- (i) Special topographical survey on the scale of 4 inches to a mile of 1,403 square miles in the Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak districts and the Dujana, Jind and Loharu states.
 - (ii) Tertiary levelling of 1,198 square miles in the Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak districts and the Dujana, Jind and Loharu states.
 - (iii) Rectangulation to 25 acres of 1,739 square miles in the Gurgaon, Hissar and Rohtak districts and the Dujana and Jind states.
 - (iv) Traversing and rectangulation to 3,000 acres of 2,804 square miles in the Hissar, Karnal and Rohtak districts and the Jind and Patiala states.
 - (v) Triangulation of 577 square miles in the Karnal district and the Patiala state.

The "A" Survey Company carried out an original survey in 4,660 square miles in the Muzaffargarh, Multan and Montgomery districts and in the Bahawalpur state, a re-survey in 252 square miles in the Kangra district and a revision survey in 250 square miles in the Jhelum and Gujrat districts on the scale of one inch to a mile and also a revision survey in 82 square miles of Lahore guide map on the scale of 4 inches to a mile. In addition 31, 1-inch sheets of correction survey were completed in the Bhaun, Jhelum and Shahpur districts and in 381 square miles in the districts of Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan on the scale of one inch to two miles.

Secondary levelling operations for the Bhakra Dam project were carried out as under :—

15. An important alteration in the district boundaries during the year under report was the transfer of an area of 2,630 acres from the Toba Tek Singh tahsil of the Lyallpur district, to the Khanewal tahsil of the Multan district, and an area of 106 acres from the Toba Tek Singh tahsil of the Lyallpur district, to the Montgomery tahsil of the Montgomery district.

The demarcation of the boundary between Tika Deot, Kothi Kohar of the Palampur tahsil and the Mandi state was completed during the year under report.

16. Owing to the financial stringency a number of schemes for the improvement and expansion of record rooms have been held in abeyance. Six districts sent reports of damage, the worst being from Karnal where old records were badly damaged. The work of the destruction of records was done satisfactorily, but in a number of districts the inspection of record rooms fell short of the requirements of the rules.

The scheme under which special kanungos have been replaced by patwari moharrirs in several districts has proved to be satisfactory. The income derived from the services of special kanungos and patwari moharrirs altogether amounted to Rs. 15,033 against an expenditure of Rs. 14,110, whereas in the past the income, as a rule, was less than the expenditure.

Copying agency.—The income and expenditure of the Department for 1932-33 was Rs. 6,07,464 and Rs. 5,85,581, respectively, as compared with Rs. 6,44,169 and Rs. 6,32,772 for 1931-32.

17. (a) The post is utilized for the payment of land revenue chiefly by persons who live at a distance from tahsil headquarters or have only small amounts to send, and in this connection it must be remembered that lorries are now reducing distances everywhere. Rs. 21.43 lakhs were remitted by postal money order against Rs. 21.98 during the preceding year, and Rs. 11.47 lakhs in currency notes by insured post.

against Rs. 11.40. It appears that in two districts at least the idea is gaining ground that the latter method is not altogether safe.

In the Lyallpur district four lambardars remitted Rs. 18,436 altogether by cheque on the Imperial Bank of India. The Deputy Commissioner of Jhelum suggests that the payment of land revenue through the village Co-operative Bank should be encouraged. The experiment is certainly worth a trial.

(b) The instructions issued in 1923 for preventing encroachments on roads and other public properties by the co-ordination of Public Works Department land plans and revenue maps continue to work satisfactorily. These instructions have now been made applicable to the land plans of District Boards and of the Forest department.

On the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Land Revenue rule 20 (vi) of the Land Revenue rules has now been amended so as to make it the duty of the village headman to report to the tahsildar all encroachments on roads including village roads. Such a report in regard to a village road can be registered as an application under section 150 of the Land Revenue Act upon which the revenue officer is expected to eject the encroaching co-sharer from the land.

(c) As decided by Government, the Waterlogging Board met only twice during the year instead of quarterly as in the past. The change was effected because it was felt that a period of at least six months is ordinarily necessary for the prolonged study of the questions that come up before the Board.

It is satisfactory that as in the preceding year there was no appreciable rise in the general level of the water-table in the Chaj and Rechna *doabs*. Although there was a very slight rise in the Lower Jhelum and Lower Chenab canal areas, the water-table in the Upper Jhelum and Upper Chenab areas was practically the same as in the preceding year with a slight tendency towards falling. It seems, however, that the general tendency of the water-level over the larger areas is un

doubtedly to rise. In the *Bist doab* there was a slight rise of 0.17 foot as compared with the slight fall reported last year.

The Board reviewed the results of the *sem* and *thur* girdawari conducted all over the province and wherever necessary it made recommendations for the extensions of the enquiry. The area affected by *thur* during the year is shown to have increased by 6,138 acres, while the *sem* area decreased in all districts excepting Gujranwala, to the extent of 3,162 acres in all.

The restriction of the *kharif* supplies on the Lower Jhelum and Upper Chenab canals was not carried out as strictly as in the preceding year, partly because of the objections of the cultivators concerned, as also of the doubt that recent research has raised on the efficacy of short periodical closures as an anti-waterlogging measure. It is for consideration whether it would not be a better plan to convert some of the perennial channels into *kharif* ones and then postpone the date of opening until the last week in April or the first week in May. On the *kharif* channels on the Upper Chenab Canal the date of opening had to be put back by about three weeks as an experimental measure to allow sugarcane to receive canal water earlier and to permit the earlier preparation of fields for rice cultivation.

The most notable feature of the year was the drawing up of a five year plan of drainage construction in the Chaj and Rechna *doabs*. The scheme provides for a comprehensive net work of main and major tributary drains with the object of speedily removing accumulated rain water from areas where the water-table is either already high or dangerously on the increase. A beginning was made with the excavation of the Budhi *nallah* in the Upper Jhelum circle—an important drain which had been held up for several years on account of financial stringency. The Berka drain has been completed together with the lower 26 miles of the Bhiki drain into which the former flows. Most of the excavation of the Mona outfall channel was completed before the heavy rains of August, thus affording considerable relief to the area abutting on the Sulki branch where storm water accumulates whenever there is excessive rain in

the Shahpur district. Work has also been commenced towards the completion of the Maduana drain.

The experiments at Chakanwali under the control of the Director of Irrigation Research have now definitely established that *their* land can be reclaimed on *kharif* water. It now remains to ascertain whether these methods are within the reach of the ordinary cultivator with his limited means.

The final report of the Tube Well Investigation Committee was received and will be soon published.

Finally the Board reviewed the progress of the Irrigation Agricultural Research Committee at a meeting held on July 25th, 1933, and framed a programme of the research work to be done during the following year.

(d) During the year under report the Board of Economic Inquiry continued its investigations and the publication of reports. The survey of a selected village in the Ferozepore district was completed during the year. The series of farm accounts was continued; the report for 1931-32 was published and that for 1932-33 is in the press. An inquiry into the economic conditions of rickshaw men in Simla was conducted and another into the economics of *lac* cultivation is in progress; the reports on wheat finance, the economics of gut-making, and the cost of production of crops in the Punjab, have been sent to the press; and among those that are being prepared for publication are Marketing Practices in the Punjab and a Note on Food Prices, 1921-30. The preliminary work for an inquiry into the sub-division of land and a study of the size of families with relation to wealth is being done. A brochure entitled "Cost of Ginning and Pressing Cotton in the Punjab" is also receiving consideration and some further data are being collected regarding milk production at Lyallpur. Figures are also being collated regarding the sale of land between agricultural tribes in three districts of the Multan division. A detailed study of the published reports of the Board is now being attempted in order to make their contents more readily accessible and useful. An educational questionnaire is being prepared for incorporation in the general questionnaire.

Among new miscellaneous matters receiving the attention of the Board may be mentioned :—

- (a) Movement of *rabi* crops in 1933,
- (b) Movement of precious metals in the Punjab,
- (c) Oil pressing industry in the Punjab,
- (d) Industrial inquiries.

Five other reports are in the press and eight in various stages of preparation.

The year also saw an important change in the constitution of the Board: the urban and rural sections have been amalgamated and the number of members has been reduced from 25 to 20.

Mr. H. Calvert, B.Sc., C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., continued to act as the Chairman of the Board until March 1933 when he was succeeded by Mr. D. J. Boyd, C.I.E., I.C.S. Mr. Calvert's departure was a great loss to the Board with which he had been connected from its incep-

tion. Mr. J. W. Thomas, B.Sc., B.Com., continued to act as the Secretary during the year.

18. The number of suits under section 24 of the Punjab Tenancy Act for the enhancement of cash rents of occupancy tenants rose from 84 during the preceding year to 115 during the year under report. Of these 52 were successful, Jullundur alone accounting for no less than 32. In the Ferozepore district, however, all the 42 suits were dismissed. Five suits were instituted for the reduction of rents against 24 last year. Only one was decreed.

19. There were 17 decrees for the ejectment of occupancy tenants under section 39 of the Tenancy Act against 21 last year. The number of ejectments of occupancy tenants actually effected under the various sections of the Act rose from 30 last year to 103 during the year under report, the largest number being in the Ferozepore and Jhelum districts. The number of decrees under sections 40 and 45 (6) of the Tenancy Act for the ejectment of tenants-at-will was 899 against 882 last year, the figure being high in the districts of Hissar, Rohtak and Gurgaon. In Hoshiarpur, however, the number fell from 100 to 5 and in Ferozepore from 104 to nil. While the number of ejectments ordered under section 45 (5) of the Tenancy Act rose from 3,309 to 3,798, actual ejectments fell from 2,821 to 2,740.

20. Khan Sahib Captain Mohammad Akbar Khan, Jodhra Rajput of Pindigheb, in the Attock district, accepted the rule of primogeniture in respect of the assignment of land revenue enjoyed by him. The total number of jagirs notified under the Punjab Descent of Jagirs Act so far thus comes to 153.

21. The total area irrigated by all the canals in the province (excluding the Bahawalpur state, Sutlej Valley canals and the state channels of the Western Jumna, Sirhind and Ghaggar canals which are now under the control of the respective states) was

Last year the area irrigated and matured was 10,960,676 and 10,152,416 acres, respectively. The decrease in the irrigated area is due mainly to short supply and early fall in the rivers joined, with insufficient rainfall.

The income derived by the Irrigation Department from the fixed and fluctuating canal advantage rate during the year amounted to Rs. 16.41 lakhs and Rs. 190.69 lakhs against Rs. 16.11 lakhs and Rs. 174.97 lakhs, respectively last year, which means a net increase of Rs. 16.02 lakhs. This increase is mainly due to the fact that the special remissions sanctioned during the year were on a comparatively smaller scale.

The working of the perennial canals is reported in the administration report of the Irrigation Department and so it will suffice to refer briefly to the inundation canals in their charge. The statement below gives the most important figures for such canals.

It will be observed that while the area irrigated by the Shahpur, Muzaffargarh inundation canals and the Chenab series has increased as compared with the figures of the last year, that of

the Sidhnai canals and the Dera Ghazi Khan inundation canals has decreased. The increase in the area irrigated is due to an adequate supply in the Jhelum, Indus and Chenab rivers while the decrease in the area irrigated by the Dera Ghazi Khan and Sidhnai canals is due to the fact that the canals flowed for a shorter period than usual. The income from the water rate has resulted in an increase in the Shahpur and Muzaffargarh inundation canals but it has fallen for the other three canals. The marked increase in the income of the Muzaffargarh canals is mainly due to the remodelling operations which improved the water supply and thus placed a larger area under cultivation.

22. In addition to the canals mentioned in the preceding paragraph there are others under the control of Deputy Commissioners or the Superintending Engineer, Drainage Circle. The statement below gives under the more important figures for them:—

No final decision regarding the division of water of the Ghaggar river between the British Government and the Patiala and Bikaner states and of the training

of hill torrents including the Sarsuti, the Markanda and the Tangri nallah in the Karnal and Ambala districts, has yet been reached.

Due to good rains the Sarsuti canal worked well and irrigated a larger area than last year. The Grey canals also ran well, but their income from *abiana* fell by about Rs. 4,000, because of the inefficient *girdawari*. Unfortunately the additional staff for recording irrigation was sanctioned too late in the year to do much good, but better results are expected in the future. Owing to copious rainfall in August and September, 1932, the supply in the Namma reservoir which during the year 1931-32 had reached R. L. 1148.70 representing 81 million cubic feet, went up to R. L. 1168.70 representing 1266.5 million cubic feet, during the year with the result that the area irrigated increased ten-fold over that of 1931-32. As anticipated last year, the income from water rate on this canal rose from Rs. 5,024 to Rs. 67,696. Out of this income Rs. 4,425 must be deducted on account of compensation paid so far for damage done to the neighbouring villages by the overflowing of the lake. The area irrigated by the hill torrents in the Dera Ghazi Khan district during the year increased by 74,387 acres thanks to the more frequent flow of the torrents. The question of improving the supply of the torrents is still under consideration.

The management of the Gurgaon bunds was transferred from the Rural Sanitary and Improvement Board to the Deputy Commissioner, Gurgaon, on 1st November, 1932. No additions or improvements to the existing system were intended at the time of transfer, it being considered sufficient to maintain them with ordinary repairs. The monsoon this year was exceptionally heavy, 33 inches being registered against 20 last year. Before the first heavy fall of rain which came in June, all the bunds that needed attention were thoroughly repaired and although a number of them overflowed, they stood the strain well on the whole. The heavy rains of August, however, filled all the bunds to their utmost capacity and several of them overflowed and thus weakened, they were unable to withstand the un-

precedented rainfall in September and several of them were breached.

The income from the bunds and the area matured during the year under report was Rs. 2,301 and 2,434 acres against Rs. 1,563 and 1,400 acres, respectively, last year. The increase is due to the copious supply of the water held by the bunds.

Nearly all the bunds were emptied out rather earlier than in the preceding year in order that the lands under them could be prepared for the *rabi* sowings. The *sailaba* area is expected to be much larger this year than within living memory.

There was sufficient water in the Kangra *kahls* (water channels) for irrigation and no complaints of scarcity of water were received during the year under report.

23. The Land Acquisition Act was used to acquire 1,595·3 acres of land at a cost of Rs. 3,83,859, or an average of Rs. 240·9·0 per acre during the year under report, against 3,775·9 acres for Rs. 6,38,478 or an average of Rs. 169 per acre in the preceding year. The largest areas acquired were 295 acres in the Montgomery district, 263 acres in the Gujranwala district and 261 acres in the Multan district, mainly for canals. Altogether 180·82 acres were restored by Government.

In spite of instructions to the contrary, cases have again come to light, particularly in the Gurdaspur and Muzaffargarh districts, where premature possession of land was taken by certain departments. There have also been complaints again of delay and excessive awards in the working of the Land Acquisition Act. It is hoped, however, that the amendment of paragraph 22 of Standing Order no. 28, as supplemented by the circular orders issued during the year, will improve matters.

The registers of land acquisition cases are reported to be properly maintained in almost all the districts, and, on the whole, it may be said that the administration of the Act shows an improvement as compared with the preceding years.

24. The outstanding balance of loans advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act at the commencement of the year was Rs. 63.14 lakhs, which was reduced to Rs. 62.24 lakhs at the close of the year. The balance was over Rs. 10 lakhs in Gurgaon, over Rs. 5 lakhs in Hissar, and over Rs. 3 lakhs in the Attock and Muzaffargarh districts. The new loans were largely taken for the construction of new wells, the total number sunk during the year with the aid of *taocavi* being 446 against 608 last year.

Land revenue was remitted on account of 946 wells which fell out of use against 305 during the preceding year. Protective leases were given for 1,476 wells against 1,097 wells last year.

The demand recoverable on account of the principal' including the arrears of last year, was Rs. 8.25 lakhs, of which Rs. 4.67 lakhs were recovered leaving a balance of Rs. 3.58 lakhs. Arrears of the principal are heavy in the districts of Muzaffargarh, Dera Ghazi Khan, Sheikhpura, Montgomery, Shahpur and Hissar. Out of a sum of Rs. 5.27 lakhs outstanding on account of interest, Rs. 2.69 lakhs were recovered during the year under report. Arrears on account of interest are heavy in the districts of Hissar, Muzaffargarh, Dera Ghazi Khan, Montgomery, Shahpur, Sheikhpura, and Jhelum.

25. The outstanding balance of loans given under the Agriculturists' Loans Act which at the commencement of the year was Rs. 42.59 lakhs was reduced to Rs. 36.04 lakhs at the close of the year. The amount advanced during the year under report was Rs. 3.87 lakhs against Rs. 3 lakhs last year. The total collections amounted to Rs. 4.59 lakhs against Rs. 6.44 lakhs in the preceding year. The agricultural depression accounts for the fall in collections. The amount suspended during the year was Rs. 16.37 lakhs of which over Rs. 10 lakhs were suspended in Gurgaon alone, and Rs. 5 lakhs in Hissar. A sum of Rs. 6.28 lakhs was written off as irrecoverable. The remissions of loans under this Act were heavy in the districts of Gurgaon (Rs. 2.46 lakhs), Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 1.07 lakhs),

Muzaffargarh (Rs. 90,000) and Mianwali (Rs. 86,000). The outstanding balances of *taccavi* are heavy in the districts of Hissar, Gurgaon, Dera Ghazi Khan, Mianwali, Multan, Jhelum and Jhang.

Out of the total demand of Rs. 2,37,606 due on account of interest, Rs. 45,231 was collected during the year under report, thus leaving a balance of Rs. 1,01,966 at the close of the year. A sum of over Rs. 29,100 was written off as irrecoverable, and Rs. 64,536 was suspended during the year under report.

26. The total income from unclassified forests and other Government waste lands under the control of the Deputy Commissioners amounted to Rs. 62,56,068 in the year under report against Rs. 59,19,399 in 1931-32. While the income from land revenue has risen by Rs. 1,27,129, the income from *malikana* has gone down by Rs. 1,68,805. The districts mainly responsible for the increase in the income from land revenue are Montgomery, Multan, Dera Ghazi Khan, Gujrat and Shahpur. The increase in the first three districts is due to more land being leased out on temporary cultivation than was done last year, whereas the increase in the districts of Gujrat and Shahpur is due to the fact that no special remissions of land revenue were given there during the year under-report. The districts where most of the decrease in *malikana* has occurred are Lahore, Sheikhpura, Gujrat, Shahpur, Montgomery, Lyallpur, Jhang and Multan. The decrease in Sheikhpura, Montgomery, Lyallpur and Jhang is attributed to the acquisition of proprietary rights by tenants, while that in Lahore is on paper only and is due to the inflation of the preceding years' figure by the recovery of abnormal arrears. The decrease in the Shahpur district is partly due to the slight reduction in rents on the Lower Jhelum Canal colony and partly to the allotment of less area on temporary cultivation. In the Multan district the decrease is due to the reduction in the rate of *malikana* per matured acre on the perennial and non-perennial areas.

Of the Rs. 92,910 due on account of *tirni* Rs. 64,587 was collected, Rs. 5,335 remitted and Rs. 22,988 remained outstanding at the close of the year. The outstanding

balances on account of *tirni* were large in the districts of Mianwali (Rs. 3,606), Lyallpur (Rs. 2,605), Jhang (Rs. 3,346), Muzaffargarh (Rs. 7,453) and Dera Ghazi Khan (Rs. 4,484).

There has been a decrease in the area both under unclassified forests and waste lands. The Multan district is mainly responsible for the decrease under unclassified forests because of the permanent allotment of land in the colony areas.

As regards waste lands, while there is a decrease by Rs. 2,23,491 acres in Montgomery on account of allotment of lands in colonies, the district of Multan shows for some unexplained reason an increase of 29,730 acres.

The total income derived from rents, sale of wood, etc., has increased from Rs. 59,19,399 to Rs. 62,56,068. The districts responsible for this increase are:—Kangra, Sheikhpura, Gujrat, Multan, Montgomery and Lyallpur.

The increase in Lyallpur, Multan and Sheikhpura is due to more lands being given on temporary cultivation, while in Montgomery it is due to the enhanced rates of rents in respect of Crown lands leased out on temporary cultivation. In the Kangra district the cattle tax which had been realised in the past year was not shown in the figures reported last year. Hence the increase of Rs. 12,799 for this district. Lahore, Shahpur and Jhang show a decrease in the income under this head. The decrease in Lahore is due to the balance of Rs. 49,850 which is still recoverable on account of a plot of *nazul* land. The decrease in Shahpur is due to the slight reduction in the rates of rent in the Lower Jhelum canal colony and on account of less area being allotted on temporary cultivation.

The area of Government land held by Government tenants has slightly increased on account of allotments made in the colony tracts of the Montgomery district. The total area of unclassified forests let out for cultivation by the Forest Department has gone down by about four thousand acres while the area actually cultivated has increased by 7,000 acres during the year under report. The increase has occurred mainly in the Multan district and is ascribed to a good flow of canal water.

In the Gurgaon district an experiment is being made since 1925 for preventing further denudation by the hill torrents. **Reafforestation.** No area was added this year owing to the paucity of funds. The work has made fair progress and it is desirable that it should be continued. Thanks to an adequate rainfall the sowings were very successful.

27. Operations under the Land Preservation (Chos) Act are confined at present to the two districts of Hoshiarpur and Ambala. The report of the Punjab Erosion Committee which investigated the conditions in these districts as also in Kangra was submitted during the year under report and is now under the consideration of Government.

Land Preservation (Chos) Act, 1909.

Hoshiarpur district.—Sowings were confined to 73 out of the 126 villages to which the Act applies. Altogether 116 maunds of seed were used in sowing and broadcasting and 7,300 cuttings of *bait*, *banna* and *lella majnun* for planting.

In the Mehngarwal *cho*, the *kharkana* plantation which covers an area of 483 acres is in good condition. In fact the whole length of the *cho* is now well planted, about 1,643 acres being sown with *kikar*, *nim*, *phullah*, etc. and 9,169 acres broadcast with *sanatha*. In the Katardhar area, Rs. 19,326 were realized by the sale of grass, Rs. 1,624 by the sale of *harar*, *baherá* and *amla*.

Fifty-seven cases were instituted under the Act out of which 53 were disposed of; 38 resulted in conviction and 15 in discharge. Rs. 590 were realised on account of fines against Rs. 2,001 in the preceding year.

Ambala district.—The existing plantations are reported to have made no improvement, but *shisham* and *kikar* trees were planted on the banks of *naddis*.

Four cases under the Chos Act were instituted, all resulting in conviction. The fines realized amounted to Rs. 53.

28. The total area of the province as entered in the revenue records is 56·077 million acres, of which 30·460 million acres are cultivated. Common lands, village *abadis* and Government property account for 14·416

acres of the total and members of agricultural tribes own 36·193 million acres (24·161 million acres cultivated) out of the balance. The total area cultivated was practically the same during the year under report as in the preceding year. There was, however, a substantial falling of in the cultivated area in Montgomery (104,000) and Lyallpur (82,000). As against this, increases occurred in Hissar (22,000), Rohtak (10,000), Gurgaon (15,000), Karnal (22,000), Mianwali (36,000), Multan (32,000), Muzaffargarh (9,000) and Dera Ghazi Khan (32,000). The total area under mortgage was 4·696 million acres, or 11·3 per cent. of the total during the year under report, against 4·763 million acres or 11·4 per cent. of the total during the preceding year, with a corresponding decrease in the cultivated area to 3·548 million acres from 3·632 million acres. The total area per owner is 8·8 acres and the cultivated area per owner works out to 5·9 acres.

(Note.—In calculating the percentages of mortgages and individual ownership areas under *shamilat*, village *abadis* and Government property have been excluded).

29. The total area transferred by gift amounted to 103,248 acres as compared with 87,826 acres last year. The increase is mainly in gifts of rights of ownership. The districts responsible for the increase are Lahore, Gurdaspur, Attock, Lyallpur, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. Some of these gifts were for religious and charitable purposes, but in quite a considerable number of instances they are said to have been made with the object of helping candidates in *zaildari* and *lambardari* cases. The increase in the Dera Ghazi Khan district is attributed by the increasing tendency of females to transfer lands inherited by them under Islamic law to their male agnates.

The area transferred by exchange amounted to 52,287 acres against 48,283 acres during the last year. In the Multan district where *killabandi* operations were in progress, there was an increase of 4,817 acres over the figures of the preceding year. In other districts exchanges were generally in consequence of the consolidation of holdings. No obstacles are reported in the way of desirable exchanges.

The total area including the cultivated area sold during the year amounted to 209,060 acres against

198,251 acres last year. The cultivated area which has been transferred by sale amounts to 151,392 acres which is 0.49 per cent. of the cultivated area of the province. During the last year, 119,038 acres which is 0.39 per cent. of the total cultivated area of the province, was transferred. The sales of right of superior ownership in the cultivated area amount to 2,579 acres against 1,327 acres last year; the district of Mianwali being mainly responsible for this increase. The increase of 31,069 acres in the sales of rights of ownership is chiefly accounted for by the districts of Hissar, Ferozepore, Jhelum, Multan, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan.

The total area mortgaged during the year amounted to 420,545 acres against 375,275 acres last year, the area mortgaged being very much more than that redeemed. The cultivated area redeemed rose from 122,395 acres to 132,399 acres. The total cultivated area under usufructuary mortgage is 3,547,970 acres, *i.e.*, 11.6 per cent. of the total cultivated area of the province against 11.9 per cent. during the preceding year. The area redeemed by agricultural tribes rose from 102,607 acres during the preceding year to 110,557 acres during the year under report. The area mortgaged by them also rose from 315,052 acres to 357,743 acres. The area mortgaged to agricultural tribes rose from 253,637 to 273,008 acres during the year. An area aggregating 2,222 acres was redeemed during the year under the Redemption of Mortgages Act II of 1913 in 15 districts.

30. The average recorded sale price of land of all classes (culturable and unculturable) which is assessed to land revenue increased from Rs. 247 per acre in the preceding year to Rs. 271, which is the highest ever reached, excepting Rs. 285 per acre recorded in 1925-26. There is little doubt that this rise is largely due to the steady increase in the value of land in urbanized areas, a fair amount of which is assessed to land revenue, and thus enters into the statistics a conclusion confirmed by the fall in the price of cultivated land from Rs. 412 to Rs. 372 per acre. From the district reports it appears that there is a growing influx of non-agriculturists to the towns, where, for want of something better they invest their money in the purchase of sites on which

houses can be built more cheaply now than ever before.

The average mortgage value of land, the right of ownership of which was mortgaged during the year, works out to be Rs. 133 against Rs. 141 per acre last year. The average of the mortgage money on the cultivated area also shows a fall to Rs. 159 per acre from Rs. 166 last year.

The sale price of land assessed to land revenue for the province as a whole represents 255 years' purchase of land revenue against 261 last year and 6 at the commencement of British occupation.

31. Gujars in the Jhang district and Qureshis in the Hissar, Rohtak, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Amritsar and Gurdaspur districts were notified as statutory agricultural tribes under the Alienation of Land Act during the year.

Statutory agricultural tribes lost by mortgage a net area of 84,735 acres, whereas non-agriculturists redeemed a net area of 26,117 acres from the members of agricultural tribes as compared with 61,415, and 25,621 acres, respectively last year. Notwithstanding losses in areas mortgaged and redeemed, the statutory agricultural tribes gained by purchase a net area of 3,233 acres against 872 acres in the preceding year. A number of *benami* transactions have been reported from several districts. A new form of evasion is reported from the Khushab tahsil, where non-agriculturists collude with patwaris in order to show their adverse possession in the revenue records. A suit is then filed by the non-agriculturist for a declaration; a decree is obtained by compromise and on the basis of the civil decree a mutation is entered. The Deputy Commissioner, Shahpur, is taking suitable action under the Alienation of Land Act.

Out of the total number of 4,552 cases of execution of decrees of civil courts against members of agricultural tribes whose land under section 16 of the Act cannot legally be sold in execution of decrees, 3,786 were returned with advice by the Collectors and 766 were

still pending at the close of the year, 814 cases were pending in civil courts and 517 were filed in default, compounded or otherwise satisfied. The Collectors' advice was followed in 2,125 cases and not followed in 294 cases or 11.9 per cent. of the total. Out of 113 old cases received back from the civil courts, advice was given by Collectors in 104 cases. The Collectors' advice was followed in 51 cases and not followed in 35 cases or 40.2 per cent. Of the remaining cases 9 were pending with Collectors, 8 with the civil courts and 9 were filed in default, compounded or otherwise satisfied.

32. There were 187,577 cases for disposal during the year with the Collectors and their assistants out of which they decided 164,388, as compared with 155,785 in the year preceding. The pending file was heaviest at the end of the year in Rohtak (1,506), Lyallpur (1,162), Multan (1,737) and Muzaffargarh (2,974) but to Rohtak's credit it may be mentioned that the number of cases decided there (11,238) was the highest in the province. There were 2,123 revenue judicial appeals for disposal during the year with Collectors and officers exercising the appellate powers of Collectors. Of these 1,688 were decided and 373 left pending. Out of the last 83 were over three months old. The Hoshiarpur district has again the heaviest pending file (72). The number of revenue executive appeals for disposal was 4,942 out of which 4,293 were disposed of leaving a balance of 622 at the close of the year. The number of pending appeals was again high in Sialkot (48), Lyallpur (46) and Jhang (55). The number of appeals pending over three months in the province was 127 as compared with 79 at the close of the preceding year.

The total number of revenue judicial appeals for disposal before Commissioners was 489 out of which 340 were decided during the course of the year. Jullundur shows the largest number of institutions (127) and disposals (102). Out of the 146 appeals left pending at the close of the year 70 were over three months old of which 40 were in Jullundur alone. The number of revenue executive appeals decided by the Commissioners wa

1,976 against 1,744 last year, the Commissioners of Lahore and Multan deciding more than half of the provincial total. The total pending balance at the close of the year was 476 of which 176 were over three months old.

The Financial Commissioners decided four revenue judicial appeals and 76 revenue executive appeals leaving a balance of 10 at the close of the year. They also decided 324 applications for revision leaving a balance of 71 at the close of the year.
