## 1. SEASON.

### Northern Division.

The season of 1937-38 was, on the whole, satisfactory. The monsoon as usual commenced in the middle or third week of June. There was rather a long break in the greater part of Gujarat in August, which had slightly adverse effects on the crops; but the timely rains in September improved the situation.

In Ahmedabad district the monsoon made a good beginning in the last week of June. The rainfall was general, timely and almost evenly distributed throughout the district and promised a good harvest. In the month of July there was heavy rainfall which was somewhat injurious to the kharif crops. Thereafter there was a long break of about 35 days from 1st of August. Except that the break was a little longer than required, it proved very helpful in sowing operations of kharif crops like paddy, cotton, jowar, etc. It again began to rain from 8th September and this rain made the prospects of the season most encouraging. The rains were very favourable during the year and especially to rice. The rabi crop was, however, damaged by insects (*Masi*) with the result that the outturn of cotton was much less than expected.

Owing to the rise of the Sabarmati and Khari rivers, many villages were flooded and the crops in the riverside villages were damaged. The floods in the rivers Bhadar, Nilka and Gomal in Dhandhuka taluka did not cause any damage but on the contrary improved the prospects of the riverside villages, especially the villages of Bhal tract. The insects, however, greatly damaged wheat crop in a few villages of this taluka. In some villages the rabi crop was damaged by the late rains. There was also a slight attack of frost in some villages of North and South Daskroi talukas and relief was granted to the khatedars, where necessary.

In Kaira district the monsoon set in from the third week of June and continued up to the end of September with a break during the month of August. Although the season began somewhat late, the

rain was favourable. Rain, during June was sufficient for the sowing of kharif crops, while that in the last week of July helped the transplantation of paddy and ragi. There was a break for the whole month of August, except a few sporadic showers but this helped the agriculturists much in their weeding operations. The rains in the second week of September proved very useful to irrigated areas. All crops including rabi ones were good during the year, but the cold spell in December caused some damage to the cotton, pulse and tobacco crops throughout the district.

In Broach and Panch Mahals district the rainfall was timely and adequate. It rained heavily in the Broach sub-division during the month of July with the result that resowing of cotton was necessitated at some places. There was, however, a break during the month of August which adversely affected the cotton crop but the rainfall in September improved the situation of both the cotton and wheat crops. There was a slight attack of frost in the month of December which damaged cotton crops in certain areas.

In the Panch Mahals sub-division when the year opened the scarcity declared in the previous year existed in some parts but with the adequate and timely rain it was declared by Government at an end in the month of December.

In Surat district though the rainfall was considerably more than the average, the crops did not suffer thereby. Seeds of jowar and cotton either decayed or were washed away owing to continuous rain at some places in Bardoli taluka, but in all such cases resowing was done. The outturn of rice and cotton was somewhat affected in Mandvi taluka as the rainfall was not well distributed. The heavy rains in July retarded the sowing operations in Jalalpore taluka, but in the end crops proved satisfactory. The rainfall was very heavy in Chikhli taluka and so jowar and cotton were adversely affected but rice flourished, and the season was on the whole satisfactory.

In Thana district the rains set in a week or so late but the fall was evenly spread over the period of June to September, throughout the district. In July the rainfall was heavy and consequently the seedlings in Kalyan taluka and garden crop in Bassein taluka were damaged to some extent. The work of transplantation was also retarded slightly in some talukas. The subsequent rains in August and September were quite favourable and the outturn of crop remained unaffected. The season was on the whole fairly good.

In Bombay Suburban district the monsoon started in the middle of June and the transplantation work was complete and the standing crops were in good condition. After the first week of August the rainfall was comparatively small. The Halwa and Garwa crops were in good condition and the season was satisfactory.

The rainfall in each district of the division during the year under report as compared with that during the last five years was as shown below :—

The average outturn of kharif crops in Ahmedabad was 6 to 12 annas, while in Kaira district it ranged from 4 to 10 annas. In Broach and Panch Mahals district it ranged from 6 to 12 annas and in Surat from 6 to 13 annas, while in Thana it ranged from 10 to 11 annas.

*Water Supply.*—The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was adequate in all the districts of the division except in the coastal villages of the Bhal tract of Ahmedabad district and in the precarious tracts of belowghat and junglepatti villages in Thana district. To mitigate the scarcity in the villages in Ahmedabad district the question of excavating the tanks which become dry in summer is under consideration, while in Thana a sum of Rs. 5,752 was allotted for improvement of village water supply. An amount of Rs. 76,890 out of special grants for village water supply was sanctioned for water works during the year but the Board could not utilize it owing to want of time and special staff.

The following table shows the amounts allotted to the various districts in this division and the expenditure incurred in connection with water supply in precarious tracts :—

In addition a sum of Rs. 810 out of Rs. 28,250 (included in the figures of the above statement and allotted to this division under Government Resolution, General Department, No. P. 20 (c) (2) (3), dated 19th October 1937) was placed at the disposal of the Superintending Engineer, Central Circle, for repairs to certain bores in Viramgam taluka. Out of that amount a sum of Rs. 450 was spent. Over and above the ordinary grant of Rs. 28,250 referred to above, a special grant of Rs. 3,50,000 for improvement of the village water supply was sanctioned under Government Resolution, General Department, No. S. 92, dated 14th September 1937, but very little of this liberal grant could be spent by the Local Board as by the time the prescribed formalities were observed and the money distributed, there was little time left for the District Local Board within which to make effective use of the money. In addition to the grants mentioned above the Panch Mahals was given a special grant of Rs. 34,802 for expenditure on scarcity works and spent Rs. 21,612.

*Cattle and Fodder.*—The supply of fodder was sufficient in all the districts of the division except that in the beginning of the year shortage of fodder and food was felt in the scarcity area of Panch Mahals but the scarcity measures organized and extended up to November 1937 gave a certain amount of relief.

Rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicæmia, galsundho, etc., appeared more or less in all the districts of the division except the Bombay Suburban. The Veterinary Assistants gave timely help and advice. The number of attacks and the number of cattle inoculated during the year was as follows:—

In the Kaira district Gulsundo, foot and mouth disease and rinderpest took a heavy toll of 495 cattle and this is attributed chiefly to greater moisture during the year.

*Public Health.*—Public health was generally good except for the prevalence of epidemic diseases as shown in the following table:—

Cerebro-spinal fever (Meningitis) has now become endemic in Ahmedabad City. Its spread has, however, been effectively checked by proper measures. During the year there were 55 deaths out of 75 attacks as against 64 deaths out of 120 cases during the previous year.

### Central Division.

The regular monsoon set in in the second week of June, but the rainfall in that month was not sufficient for the sowing of crops in parts of Ahmednagar, Nasik and Sholapur districts. In July more rain was needed in parts of Ahmednagar, West Khandesh, Sholapur and the eastern part of Poona districts, while a break was needed in parts of Satara district. In Poona continuous rains caused some damage in the western part. In August the rainfall was generally sufficient in all the districts except certain parts of Poona. The standing kharif crops were in good condition except in parts of Poona and Sholapur where they withered for want of moisture. The September rains, however, improved their condition. The October and November rains were generally helpful for the rabi crops everywhere except in parts of East Khandesh, where they were heavy and caused some damage. On account of the absence of rain in November and December the rabi crops withered in parts of Sholapur district. The rabi crops in other districts did well. The season, on the whole, was fair. The situation in each District was as follows.

*Ahmednagar.*—The monsoon commenced in the third week of June everywhere except in 32 villages of Karjat mahal. In the first fortnight of July the rain was general and sufficient. There was practically no rain during August except in Akola and Jamkhed. The standing kharif crops began to wither for want of moisture. The situation was, however, improved by the copious rainfall in September which was general and sufficient for rabi sowings. The rabi crops germinated well and owing to the timely rains in October promised a good outturn, but as there was no rain in November and December the yield was only normal. The season on the whole was good.

*East Khandesh.*—The monsoon commenced in the second week of June. The fall in June and July was above the average. A break followed till the middle of August and improved the crops which were in places suffering from excessive rain. In September the rainfall was generally above normal. It continued to be heavy in October and it damaged the Jowar and Cotton crops. As there was no rain in November and December the rabi crops did well. The season on the whole was good.

*West Khandesh.*—The monsoon began in the second half of June and was adequate except in Dhulia, Shirpur and Sindkheda talukas. The rainfall in July was sufficient and held the germination of the crops. During August not much rain fell. In September and October the fall was moderate. In November there were showers

which were useful both for the kharif crops which were beginning to wither and for the rabi cultivation. The season on the whole was very fair.

*Nasik.*—The monsoon commenced in the second fortnight of June. It was sufficient everywhere except in Yeola and Nandgaon talukas. The rainfall in July was sufficient for sowing to be done in these two talukas and also for the germination of the crops elsewhere. There was a break in August, but the September showers saved the situation. The October rains facilitated the sowing of the rabi crops. The absence of rains in November, however, retarded their growth, but the rain in December improved their condition. The season on the whole was a good one except in the extreme east of the district.

*Poona.*—The monsoon broke in the second week of June and was sufficient and well distributed. There was, however, an excess of rain in some villages in Mawal taluka and Mulshi peta. In the Eastern division it soon stopped, and a break ensued till the middle of July when rain steadily fell. From the last week of July to the middle of September there was practically no rain and in consequence most of the early sown kharif crops withered. The September rains, however, were very useful for the rabi crops. The heat in November and the absence of rain in December caused some slight damage. The season on the whole was fair.

*Satara.*—The monsoon set in in the third week of June. The rainfall in June and July was sufficient except in some villages in the eastern part of the district and the ex-Khandala villages in Koregaon taluka. The July rains were general and well distributed. There was a break in the middle of August, but heavy rain in September relieved the situation. There was again heavy rain in October. The outturn of both the kharif and rabi crops was satisfactory. On the whole, the season was good.

*Sholapur.*—The monsoon set in in the second fortnight of June. The rainfall in June and July was sufficient for kharif sowings, except in some parts of Sangola and Malsiras talukas. There were only light showers in August. There was no rain in the first half of September with the result that the kharif crops withered in places. Though the rains in the latter half of September improved their condition the outturn, on the whole, was not satisfactory. The October rains were general and sufficient for the rabi sowings. As there was no rain in November and the first week of December the rabi crops began to wither. They were partially revived by the rain in the middle of December. On the whole, the season was below normal.

*Cattle and Fodder.*—The condition of the cattle was fair in all the districts. Though diseases such as rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicæmia, black-quarter and anthrax were prevalent. They were, however, not so serious as to affect



agricultural operations. The total number of deaths from disease was 5,153 as against 7,104 in the previous year. The total number of attacks and deaths was as follows :—

The supply of fodder was sufficient. The concession of free grazing in the open forest, the pasture forest lands and the revenue waste lands was granted by Government during the year.

*Water Supply.*—The supply of water was generally sufficient for drinking and irrigational purposes except in Nasik district where the supply for irrigation was short and in Sholapur district where it was short for both purposes.

*Public Health.*—The public health was on the whole good. The following epidemics prevailed :—

The Cholera was nowhere of a severe type. Prompt measures such as anti-cholera inoculations and the free supply of cholera pills and permanganate of potash helped to check the spread of the epidemic. Small-pox also was prevalent, but the outbreak was mild as in the previous year. Plague broke out in three villages in the Shirala mahal of Satara district. Prompt measures were taken with the result that the epidemic soon abated.

## Southern Division.

In the belowghat districts the season was on the whole satisfactory though the rainfall was erratic—insufficient when most needed and excessive when moderation was longed for. This very caprice of the season affected the aboveghat districts to a considerable extent and in some materially marred the harvest.

*Belgaum.*—The pre-monsoon showers of April and May facilitated the preliminary agricultural operations all over the district. The monsoon opened as usual in June but it was not well distributed. It was inadequate in Athni, Paragasad, Gokak and Sampgaon talukas, with the result that the sowing of kharif crops there was retarded. July brought in good showers which helped the growth of kharif crops till after the middle of August; but the complete break thereafter up to the middle of September considerably damaged the standing kharif crops and the high-level paddy crops in Belgaum, Khanapur and Sampgaon talukas. In Paragasad taluka kharif crops failed almost completely and lands had to be re-sown with rabi crops. The showers received in September and October improved the condition of kharif crops to some extent and helped the sowing of rabi crops in Athni, Chikodi, Gokak, Hukeri, Paragasad and Sampgaon talukas. The abnormal rainfall in the month of October all over the district followed by a complete drought in November and unfavourable winds in December did considerable damage to the wheat and cotton crops in Gokak, Sampgaon and Paragasad talukas.

*Bijapur.*—As in the previous year there was practically no rainfall from June to August 1937, except for the stray showers. This resulted primarily in delaying the sowing of kharif crops and ultimately in affecting their outturn in some parts of the district. With the advent of rains in the months of September and October rabi sowings were taken up; but the continued drought thereafter brought about the total failure of the rabi crops throughout the district, barring a few villages. The agricultural outlook became gloomy and Government declared the existence of a state of scarcity in 912 villages out of 1,174.

*Dharwar.*—The ante-monsoon showers received in April and May all over the district facilitated the preliminary tillage. With the opening of monsoon in the last week of June and first week of July the sowing of paddy and other kharif crops, which was held up on account of absence of rain, recommenced in all the kharif villages of the district. However, the scanty rainfall in the month of July, followed by a long break till the last week of September, damaged heavily the paddy crops in Kod taluka and in some villages of Hangal taluka beyond recovery. It gave cause for anxiety also in other places where the crops withered. The season for sowing kharif *jowar* and cotton had almost passed and the result was that the area under these crops was smaller than that in the previous years. But with the heavy showers received in the last week of September and the beginning of October anxiety was relieved to some extent as it helped considerably the chillies, cotton

and *kharif jowar*, already sown, though the October showers slightly affected Ragi. There was no rain during the latter part of October and in November, and owing to insufficiency of moisture wheat did not thrive well. The unfavourable easterly winds which set in in the latter half of December and continued in January damaged to some extent the cotton crop, especially in the *rabi* tract. For the district as a whole the season was no better than the previous one.

*Kanara*.—The rainfall was on the whole seasonable, well distributed and sufficient all over the district.

The heavy rains in the latter part of June helped the recurrence of "Koleroga" to betelnut crop in the low-lying gardens of Ankola, Yellapur and Honavar talukas and Supa and Bhatkal pethas. Remission of land revenue to the extent of Rs. 8,075 was granted on this account.

Wild elephants appeared in some villages of Ankola, Yellapur, Sirsi, Honavar and Haliyal talukas and Supa and Mundgod pethas and were responsible for damage to crops to some extent. Accidental fires also accounted for such damage in some villages of Karwar, Sirsi, Siddapur, Yellapur and Haliyal talukas and Bhatkal petha. Remission of land revenue was therefore granted in deserving cases in these areas. The outturn of paddy and other crops except betelnuts was fair.

*Kolaba*.—The season opened with favourable rains in the second week of June throughout the district. The rainfall was seasonable and well distributed, except for the excessive rains in the month of July which caused some damage to crops in parts of the district. There was little change in the area under cultivation. The yield was normal, the average outturn of crops being 12 annas.

*Ratnagiri*.—Regular monsoon set in all over the district in the second week of June and the rains were well distributed. Ploughing and sowing operations were taken in hand with the advent of monsoon and were completed in time. The transplanting operations which could not be pushed on as vigorously as they could have been if there were some more rains after the third week of July were completed with the abundant rains received during the first fortnight of August. Inadequate rainfall at some places in the latter half of August and the first week of September gave cause for anxiety as the crops showed signs of withering; but conditions improved with the showers received in the second and the third week of September. Reaping of early crops was commenced at the end of September and completed by the end of October. There was some rain in the beginning of November but it did not cause damage to crops. In November the reaping of late crops was completed and sowing of summer crops commenced. The outturn of principal crops such as rice, *nagli*, *wari* and *harik* ranged between 10 and 11 annas.

*Water Supply*.—In Belgaum district owing to the insufficient rainfall and resultant shortage of water supply in irrigation tanks, remissions of water-share assessment were granted in six villages of

Belgaum taluka, 21 in Khanapur taluka, and 14 in Sampgaon taluka. Scarcity of water for drinking purposes was also felt for some time in parts of Khanapur, Parasgad and Sampgaon talukas. In Dharwar district the drought which occurred from some time in July till the end of September depleted the supply in irrigation tanks giving rise to conditions worse than in the previous year. In Bijapur district, the supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was on the whole sufficient. In Bagalkot taluka and Bilgi petha where a state of chronic water scarcity exists, gunds and wells were sunk with the special grants received from Government. The supply of water for irrigation purposes in the Muchkundi tank was sufficient; but it was not so in the Parvati and Timmasagar tanks and consequently, a portion of the assessment representing the water rate on the lands irrigated by them had to be remitted.

In the coastal districts the supply was on the whole satisfactory throughout the year, except in the Kharapat villages of Kolaba district in the latter part of the hot season.

*Cattle and Fodder.*—Except in Bijapur district, the condition of cattle on the whole was fair. In Bijapur owing to scarcity conditions the agriculturists could maintain just the number sufficient for their agricultural operations. Demand for fodder was keen and fodder depôts had to be opened at important centres to relieve the situation. Takavi for the purchase of fodder was also granted on a liberal scale. Kadbi was sold at cost price, the incidental charges being met from the Government grant and the Sheriff's funds. In Belgaum district shortage of fodder was experienced in some villages of Hukeri, Athni and Parasgad talukas. In the last two talukas Rs. 7,000 was advanced as takavi for the purchase of fodder and the needs of Hukeri were met by imports of fodder from the adjoining villages in the canal tract of the Gokak taluka. In Dharwar district scarcity of fodder was felt in Navalgond taluka and Nargond and Mundargi pethas, where takavi to the extent of Rs. 18,000 was advanced for the purchase of fodder. In the coastal districts the usual supply of fodder was available.

*Public Health.*—The public health was generally good throughout the division. Though plague, cholera and small-pox appeared in certain parts of the division, their spread was checked by the timely preventive and curative measures adopted by the local bodies, the local officers and the special medical officers deputed for the purpose by the Public Health Department. Quinine was freely distributed through official and non-official agencies and in certain districts temporary special medical officers were detailed by the Director of Public Health for anti-malarial duty. It is gratifying to note that the virulence of the epidemics is on the decrease, which, perhaps is due to the rural population appreciating the value of the preventive measures such as vaccination, inoculation, etc.

Cattle disease appeared in all districts of the division. The Veterinary Department took the usual preventive and curative measures to check their spread.

## 2. LAND REVENUE.

## Northern Division.

The following statement gives an account of land revenue demand, collection, remissions, etc. :—

The increase in Ahmedabad and Bombay Suburban districts is mainly due to the levy of non-agricultural assessment on lands converted to non-agricultural purpose. In Kaira district it is due to the levy of himayat assessment in Matar taluka and income from the land given out for non-agricultural use. In Surat district the increase is on account of the levy of non-agricultural assessment at enhanced rates while in Thana it is due to the grant of unoccupied land for cultivation. The decrease in Broach and Panch Mahals is mainly due to the assessed land being turned into unassessed.

The increase in Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Ratnagiri is mainly due to the levy of altered assessment on lands used for non-agricultural purposes. The decrease in Kolaba district is mainly due to reduction in assessment of Sardar Bivalkar's inam villages which have been restored to him.

The increase in Kaira district is mainly due to the levy of himayat assessment and redemption of the Malek Nakri land. The decrease in Ahmedabad district was mainly due to the resumption of the chakariat inam lands. In Broach and Panch Mahals district it is owing to the disassignment and grant of the land and levy of the judi on it. In Surat it is owing to the decrease in miscellaneous land revenue in sharkati village and resumption of inam lands. The increase and decrease in Thana and Bombay Suburban districts are minor and due to survey corrections.

In Kaira it is partly due to levy of himayat assessment and partly due to the disposal of waste land for cultivation and non-agricultural uses. In Surat

it is owing to the levy of non-agricultural assessment at enhanced rates. In Thana it is due to increase in agricultural assessment on account of grant of unoccupied lands, while in the Bombay Suburban district it is due to the levy of non-agricultural assessment on the lands put to non-agricultural use. The decrease in the Broach and Panch Mahals is mainly due to assessed land being turned into unassessed.

The decrease in Ahmedabad district is mainly due to less realisation of miscellaneous land revenue in Dholka, Prantij, South Daskroi and Dhandhuka talukas. In Kaira it is owing to less realisation from babuls, fruit-bearing trees, bhatha lands and occupancy price of waste lands. In Broach and Panch Mahals it is mainly owing to smaller realisations from bhatha lands and grass birs. In Thana district it is owing to disposal of Government waste land permanently and also owing to less realisation from sale of grass. The decrease in Belgaum and Dharwar districts is due to few sales of Government waste lands; in Bijapur to grant of fewer Government waste lands and also to abolition of grazing fee in Government waste lands. In Kanara it is due to decrease in sales of Government waste lands and grants of Government waste lands on *Hangami lagan*, in Siddapur taluka on account of restoration to the original holders lands forfeited and kept as Government waste during Civil Disobedience Movement. In the Ratnagiri district it is due to the fact that recovery of non-agricultural assessment for past years on houses built prior to 1905 has been suspended until final orders from Government. The increase in Kolaba district is due to the occupancy price on waste lands and pearl fishing.

Under the ordinary suspension and remission rules, suspensions and resuspensions were granted in the districts of Belgaum, Bijapur and Dharwar owing to unfavourable monsoon conditions. Under special orders (Confidential D.O. No. 5710-B/28, dated 30th May 1938, addressed to the Collector of Kanara) from Government, an amount of Rs. 1,099 out of current year's land revenue in Siddapur taluka was suspended on account of inability of khatedars to pay. The suspensions and resuspensions in Ratnagiri district relate to japti expenses of attached khoti villages to be eventually recovered or remitted when the villages are restored to the khots or lapse to Government. The amounts of suspension and resuspension in Kolaba district being small, call for no remarks.

## 9. REVENUE FOR COLLECTION.

## Northern Division.

The net consolidated demand (exclusive of remissions and suspensions) during the year amounted to Rs. 1,14,90,027 as against Rs. 1,05,18,213, in the previous year.

### Central Division.

The net consolidated revenue for collection including local fund cess and excluding the remissions and suspensions of land revenue amounted to Rs. 1,70,12,616 as against Rs. 1,60,12,856 in the preceding year.

### Southern Division.

The net consolidated demand (excluding suspensions and remissions) amounted to Rs. 83,51,526 during the year under report as against Rs. 96,70,202 in the preceding year.

The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 13,93,292 (Rs. 12,32,574 authorised *plus* Rs. 1,60,718 unauthorised) as against Rs. 20,29,310 at the end of the previous year.

## Central Division.

The balance outstanding at the end of the year was Rs. 14,19,956 (Rs. 13,55,111 authorised and Rs. 64,845 unauthorised) as against Rs. 15,79,124. Out of the unauthorised arrears of Rs. 64,845, Rs. 62,804 are arrears of the current year's demand and Rs. 2,041 of previous year.

## Southern Division.

The balance outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 28,51,157 (authorised Rs. 28,16,548 *plus* unauthorised Rs. 34,609) as against Rs. 23,58,113 (authorised Rs. 23,19,302 *plus* unauthorised Rs. 38,811) at the end of the previous year.

## 12. TAKAVI.

## Northern Division.

The amount advanced under both the Acts (XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884) during the year ending 30th September 1938 totalled Rs. 19,981 as against Rs. 1,20,660 during the preceding year. No takavi was advanced under the Non-Agriculturists Loans Act (Act III of 1928). The year opened with an outstanding balance of Rs. 32,37,124 (Principal Rs. 26,35,564 *plus* Interest Rs. 6,01,560).

In Ahmedabad district the unauthorised arrears are mostly of talukdari villages of Virangam and Prantij talukas and Gogho mahal. In Broach and Panch Mahals the arrears largely pertain to the Wagra taluka due to the unsatisfactory economic condition of the agriculturists and on account of the low prices of cotton this year and partly on account of the orders of Government contained in Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. P. 32/12917-A, dated 30th May 1938, and Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33, dated 23rd July 1938. The arrears at Godhra and Dohad are due to inability to pay. In Thana the amount of arrears is very small. The arrears are generally due to poor economic conditions on account of the slump in prices of rice in Murbad, Kalyan and Bhiwandi talukas and Vada mahal.

Takavi advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act amounted to Rs. 1,610. There was a special takavi establishment of 13 clerks for the division at the beginning of the year out of which one clerk was discontinued during the year in Kaira district. Two more clerks were appointed in Broach and Panch Mahals district and therefore the number at the end of the year stood at 14.

### Central Division.

The amount of takavi advanced under both the Acts (XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884) during the year was Rs. 2,97,557 as against Rs. 6,44,593 in the previous year. The decrease is mainly due to the fact that normal conditions prevailed in Ahmednagar, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur districts and therefore fewer advances of takavi were made to agriculturists. With effect from February 1st, 1938, the rate of interest for advances under both the Acts has been reduced to 5½ per cent.

The year opened with an outstanding balance of Rs. 14,25,708 (Principal Rs. 12,69,032 and Interest Rs. 1,56,676). The following table shows the demand, collections, etc., for the year:—

Under the orders contained in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33 of July 23rd, 1938, no attempts for the recovery of the takavi dues not recovered by August 1st, 1938, were to be made until the next land revenue collection season unless payment was found to have been contumaciously withheld.

In one case in Sholapur district a takavi loan was misapplied. It was recovered summarily.

#### Southern Division.

The statements printed in Appendix II show the transactions during the year ending 30th September 1938. The amount collected represents 2·84 per cent. of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year (together with the debits of the year) as against 7·76 per cent. in the previous year. This abnormal fall in the percentage of collection is due to the prevalence of scarcity conditions in Bijapur district, where the outstandings are very heavy and also to the following orders of Government :—

(i) Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7597/33 of 27th January 1938. Ordering that all coercive measures for the recovery of the arrears should be held in abeyance till the ensuing collection season.

(ii) Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33 of 23rd July 1938. Ordering that takavi dues not recovered till 31st August 1938 should be carried over to the next year's demand.

(iii) Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 0/20169-A of 12th July 1938. Ordering that coercive processes should not be taken against agriculturists of Siddapur taluka during the year.

During the year, Bijapur district was the chief field for takavi operations as advances to the extent of Rs. 5,40,065-8-0 were made under the Land Improvements Loans and Agriculturists' Loans Acts. This large amount had to be advanced owing to the scarcity conditions prevailing in almost the whole district during the year. Dharwar district comes next with Rs. 56,161-14-3 and Kanara third with Rs. 25,562-4-0.



An amount of Rs. 2,87,867-12-0 principal and of Rs. 1,25,628-4-0 interest was suspended in Bijapur district as against Rs. 1,13,938-14-0 and Rs. 36,682-14-0 respectively during the previous year. The amounts suspended in Dharwar and Kanara are also comparatively high being Rs. 48,719-6-9 as against Rs. 4,664-14-0 in the previous year in the former and Rs. 14,833-15-10 as against none in the previous year in the latter. In Belgaum also the suspensions are comparatively heavy being Rs. 10,138-4-3 as against Rs. 8,211-3-6 in the previous year. These heavy suspensions were due to the agricultural conditions in Bijapur district where scarcity was declared in 912 villages out of the 1,174 villages, and also to the orders of Government mentioned above. In the Dharwar district, suspensions of principal were granted in Navalgund, Gadag, Hangal, Bankapur, Kod and Dharwar talukas on account of the partial failure of crops. In Kanara district, an amount of Rs. 169-6-0 principal and Rs. 61-12-0 interest were suspended under Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. P. 32/12917 of 30th May 1938, and an amount of Rs. 14,664-9-10 principal and Rs. 1,615-13-8 interest was carried over to next year as per Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33 of 23rd July 1938.

2. In connection with the takavi administration for the year, the following were the special schemes of importance that were undertaken:—

(1) Scheme to relieve the scarcity stricken people in Bijapur district; and

(2) scheme to combat *Koleroga* in the whole of Kanara district.

*As to (1).*—As stated above scarcity was declared in 912 villages out of 1,174 in Bijapur district and suspensions to the extent of Rs. 4,13,496-0-0 were granted as a measure of relief to the debtors. Loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act for the construction of tals and embankments, deepening of wells, etc., were advanced with a view to provide labour to the agriculturists in their own villages. As there was a keen demand for fodder, fodder depôts were opened at the following centres:—

(1) Bijapur, (2) Indi, (3) Sindgi, (4) Telgi (Bagewadi taluka), (5) Almatli (Bagewadi taluka), (6) Talikot (Muddebihal taluka), (7) Badami, (8) Bagalkot, (9) Hungund and (10) Bilgi.

Kadbi was transported from the southern talukas of the district and stocked at the depôts. The freight charges were met from grants made out of the Sheriff's fund. Kadbi was sold to the agriculturists in the shape of takavi at cost price.

After the commencement of the rains, which was timely for the sowing of kharif and rabi crops, there was a keen demand for takavi for seeds throughout the district and in order to relieve the sufferers from the aftereffects of the drought, large amounts of takavi had again to be advanced for the purchase of seeds.

*As to (2).*—Government in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. P. 23 (a)/1442 of 18th May 1938, sanctioned a scheme for the acceleration of the "*Koleroga*" control programme

throughout the district instead of the one sanctioned in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9230/24-XIV of 22nd March 1934, restricting the experiment to 4,000 acres of betelnut garden in Siddapur taluka alone. The Commissioner allotted Rs. 30,000 for the purpose of spraying against *Koleroga*, but as the monsoon grew strong and continued without any break in the spraying season and as the scheme itself was new to many of the gardeners excepting those in Siddapur taluka, a major portion of the allotment could not be utilised for want of demand. In spite of such unfavourable conditions, spraying operations were carried on in the garden tracts of Sirsi, Siddapur, Yellapur and Honavar talukas and Bhatkal petha.

Besides the above two schemes, a scheme of tractor ploughing against hariyali in the Southern Division through the ploughing syndicate at Dharwar was proposed to be started in the Dharwar district, but as full enquiry could not be finished during the year, no takavi could be advanced for this purpose. However the final report of the Commissioner in the matter has been submitted to Government under No. T.A.G. 74 of 5th November 1938, and Government orders thereon are awaited. The Collector of Dharwar however advanced loans of Rs. 2,770 to 11 persons for the purpose of getting the lands ploughed by the tractor ploughs.

In Bijapur the unauthorised arrears at the end of the year amounted to Rs. 51,530-11-6 principal and Rs. 23,065-3-5 interest and the Collector reports that collection work was found difficult and could not show progress owing to the scarcity conditions. The Collector has, however, held up all coercive measures for the recovery of arrears till the ensuing collection season according to the orders of Government in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7597/33 of 27th January 1938.

In Dharwar also the amount of unauthorised arrears are heavy being Rs. 35,494-1-4 principal and Rs. 16,429-4-3 interest and the Collector reports that no recovery was made out of the unauthorised arrears of the last year also and the whole of the amount remaining uncollected by 31st August 1938 was carried over to the next year's demand under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33 of 23rd July 1938 and that the concession afforded much relief to the impoverished agriculturists.

In Belgaum the unauthorised arrears amount to Rs. 21,048-13-2 principal and Rs. 8,767-10-0 interest and the Collector reports that the unauthorised balance represents nearly 46 per cent. of the demand for the year, that the poor collections and the large balance of unauthorised arrears are partly due to the stoppage of coercive measures and partly to failure of crops in some of the talukas.

In Kanara the unauthorised arrears amount to Rs. 4,922-3-0 principal and Rs. 922-4-2 interest and the Collector reports that this amount has become irrecoverable and pertains to two khatas in the Mundgod petha. One case is that of Mr. S. J. Billimoria of Hubli in which a sum of Rs. 4,800 principal is involved and the other is that of the Hulihonda Fencing Society which involves an

amount of Rs. 122-3-0 principal. Both these arrears being irrecoverable, steps are being taken to write them off as such.

The inspection work done by the Circle Inspectors in the Belgaum, Bijapur, Dharwar and Kanara districts is unsatisfactory. It is one of the important duties of the Circle Inspectors to inspect all takavi works in order to prevent misapplication of funds. This is being brought to the notice of the Collectors concerned.

The inspection work done by the Prant Officers especially in Belgaum and also in Bijapur is inadequate. According to the note on page 40 under rule 13 of the Rules under the Land Improvement Loans Act, the Prant Officer has to test either 10 per cent. of all the works in his charge or if they exceed 200, to test at least 20 of the works in the season. In Belgaum, no work has been inspected out of 38, but according to the scale at least four works should have been inspected by the Prant Officers. In Bijapur district, the number of works is abnormally high owing to scarcity conditions and though the inspection done by the Prant Officers (who were three in all) is according to the scale, it would have been more appropriate had they inspected more works as there was the chance of the loans being misapplied owing to the exhausted economic condition of the borrowers. These defects are being brought to the notice of the Collectors concerned.

No cases of misapplication of takavi advances were reported in any of the districts.

In Dharwar, an amount of Rs. 8,022-12-0 in seven cases was ordered to be recovered summarily during the year. But in view of the orders of Government in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230-B/33 of 23rd July 1938, all coercive processes were stopped. In no other districts summary recovery was ordered.

Takavi loans for eradication of Hariyali were advanced in Muddebihal taluka of Bijapur district to the extent of Rs. 950. In Dharwar district takavi for tractor ploughing the lands to eradicate Hariyali was granted in eleven cases extending to Rs. 2,770. In other districts no such advances were made. This information is supplied as per Government Memorandum, Revenue Department, No. 5658-A/33 of 29th April 1933.

### 13. AREA.

The increase in Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach and Panch Mahals, and Surat districts is mainly due to the grant of unoccupied land for cultivation while the decrease in Thana district is due to survey errors and relinquishment of the lands by their occupants. The decrease in Bombay Suburban district is mainly owing to conversion of the lands from agricultural to non-agricultural uses.

#### Central Division.

The total occupied area of agricultural land was 1,67,79,815 acres and showed a net increase of 32,648 acres. The increase or decrease in each district was as follows :—

The increase in Belgaum district is due to grant of gairan and Government unoccupied lands for cultivation and in Ratnagiri district to grant of khajan lands for cultivation. The decrease in Bijapur, Dharwar and Kanara districts is mainly due to forfeitures and relinquishments. The decrease in Kolaba is negligible and calls for no remarks.

Out of the 9,733 notices issued East Khandesh alone was responsible for 3,430. In Poona, West Khandesh, Nasik and Ahmednagar the numbers were 2,699, 1,476, 1,109 and 790, respectively.

There was a decrease in the total number of persons proceeded against under section 148, Land Revenue Code. In Sholapur there was not a single case while in West Khandesh and Ahmednagar only one and two persons respectively were proceeded against. There was an increase in the number of cases under section 154 in all the districts except East Khandesh, Poona and Sholapur. In Ahmednagar the increase was marked. There was a considerable increase in the number of cases under section 153, Land Revenue Code, particularly in East Khandesh and Nasik.

The increase in the number of notices of demand during the year under report was in Belgaum only. It was due to the fact that the rayats in some villages of Parasgad, Sampgaon, Athni and Gokak talukas withheld the payment of land revenue in the expectation of revision of annawaris. The increase in the number of forfeiture notices under section 153 was in Kanara and it was due to the tendency of the people there to withhold payment till coercive measures are adopted and was mainly confined to Siddapur and Honnavar talukas.

## 15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

## Northern Division.

There were 105 spinning and weaving mills in Ahmedabad on 1st August 1937. Out of these 6 were not working and the number at the end of the year stood at 99. Other small factories, etc., continued to work as usual with an increase in the total number by 105 concerns. Trade conditions in Ahmedabad were on the whole steady throughout the year.

There were 112 prosecutions under the Factories Act, 1934, which ended in convictions and the total amount of fine imposed on that account was Rs. 7,900.

The Mill-owners in the district have accepted practically all the recommendations made by the Textile Labour Enquiry Committee regarding increase in wages of workers. The workers however complain about the non-payment of wages, etc., frequently and the complaints are being disposed of by the Inspectors under the Payment of Wages Act, 1936.

As regards Kaira district the New Shorrock Mill at Nadiad continued to work quite satisfactorily.



There were 35 ginning and pressing factories and 90 flour mills during the year in the district. There were 591 hand-loom as against 538 during the previous year. The number of pumping plants during the year was 63 in Anand taluka and 182 in Borsad taluka as against 51 and 141, respectively, during the preceding year and they supplied water to agriculturists for irrigating crops. There was one milk dairy at Anand and 45 creameries mostly in Anand, Borsad and Nadiad talukas. There were 3 factories for making leather washers in Nadiad and two glass factories at Kapadwanj. A factory was started at Thasra for preparing oil for paints, soap and vegetable ghee. The three metal breaking factories at Sevalia continued to work during the year and supplied metal to the public and local bodies for road purposes. Other industries, viz., iron factories, soda factories, oil mills, etc., continued as usual.

In the Panch Mahals sub-division of Broach and Panch Mahals district, the principal trade was in timber and grain. Godhra is the chief marketing and exporting centre for timber, and Dohad is a market for grain. The Panch Mahals is also one of the markets for timru leaves in Gujarat but during the year under report there was a general depression in trade. The manganese industry at Shivrajpur and Bamankuva showed no sign of recovery owing to the continued depression in the manganese market. A glass factory was started at Sant-Road during the year. Other industries, viz., oil mills, flour mills, saw mills, ice and sugar factories, etc., continued to work as usual. In the Broach sub-division cotton is the chief product and forms the staple article of trade and industry. There were 32 ginning factories and 14 cotton presses in the sub-division out of which 27 ginning factories and 13 cotton presses worked during the year.

Out of the three cotton mills in Broach city, two, viz., Gopal mill and Fine Counts mill continued to work during the year and one remained closed as in the previous years. There were 71 hand-loom mainly conducted by the backward class people.

Bales of cotton were mostly exported to Bombay by sea from Kavi and Broach ports. Sugar, timber and ghee were imported and wheat and jowar were exported from Dehej. The sea-borne trade was not, however, appreciable.

Surat is not an industrial district. It depends mainly on agriculture and a few cottage industries for its livelihood. The principal produce in the district is cotton and 3 cotton mills, 33 ginning factories, and 15 pressing factories worked during the year. The silk and embroidery industry did not show any sign of recovery owing to the continued general depression in trade and changes in fashion.

The chief articles of export are grass, firewood, coal, timber, molasses, mangoes, rice, cotton, and cotton-seeds. Grass, firewood, coal, timber and rice were as usual exported to Bombay from Chikhli, Bulsar and Mandvi talukas. Bulsar has lost its importance as a port, as most of the timber which was exported from

this port is now exported from Billimora as the merchants find the latter more convenient. The cotton-seed oil mill at Vejalpur continued to work well during the year.

Other factories, viz., rice, flour and oil mills, grass and sugarcane presses, etc., continued to work as usual.

In Thana rice, which is the principal produce of the district, was as usual exported to Bombay and other countries. There were about 120 rice mills and several flour mills working in the district during the year. A rice plant manufacturing industry was opened at Bhiwandi and it produces all kinds of accessories for rice mill machinery. There was a similar workshop in Dahanu. Other articles of export in the district were timber, charcoal, grass, salt, bricks, lime, fresh and dry fish, vegetables, plantains, betel leaves, saries and woollen cloth. Bricks are manufactured on a large scale in Kalyan and Bhiwandi talukas and were as usual exported to Bombay and other places. There are about 8 power-loom factories and 1,000 hand-loom in Bhiwandi taluka, which are chiefly operated by Momins from upper India. The hand-loom industry is affected adversely owing to the increasing number of power-loom factories which can afford to supply the public at a cheaper rate. The export of cloth during the year was to the extent of Rs. 16,10,700 as against 11,34,740 of the preceding year.

Bassein is developing rapidly in its trade of vegetables, plantains, and betel leaves. Plantains worth Rs. 4,71,000 as against Rs. 4,64,139 during the preceding year and betel leaves worth Rs. 9 lakhs as against Rs. 7 lakhs during the previous year were exported from this taluka.

The manufacture of bangles at Tarapur in Palghar taluka was a sort of home industry. Owing to foreign competition this industry has considerably suffered. The Director of Industries is taking interest in reviving this industry. Some businessmen were sent to the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute at Bombay to receive instructions in up-to-date machinery and new methods of preparing glass of different colours and varieties.

The salt works at Bhayandar, the match factory at Ambernath, the woollen and bone mills in Thana, the basket industry in Dahanu, etc., continued as usual during the year.

In Bombay Suburban district there was no appreciable change in the condition of the trade owing to the general depression in the market. No new factory was started. The labourers of the Bombay Match Work remained on strike from 9th February 1933 to 28th March 1933.

The building and quarrying trades continued to do brisk business and the fishing industry continued during the year as usual.

#### Central Division.

The chief industry of the division is agriculture. Trade is mainly confined to the export of raw materials. The principal articles exported are grain, cotton and oil seeds.

Jaggery is the most important article of trade in the irrigated tracts of Ahmednagar, Nasik and Poona districts. The trade was brisk particularly in Ahmednagar where the prices rose from Rs. 9 to Rs. 10 per palla to Rs. 20 to Rs. 21. Cotton and groundnut continued to be the chief products of trade in the Khandesh districts. Their outturn was normal but prices were low. Owing to the fall in its price cotton is losing its popularity and is being replaced by groundnut and grain crops. Groundnut seed, turmeric and jaggery are exported on a large scale from Satara district to Bombay and other industrial centres. Onions, betel leaves and eggs are also exported in large quantities.

*Manufacture of cloth and yarn.*—There are five cotton spinning weaving mills in East Khandesh, one each in Poona and West Khandesh districts and five spinning and weaving and two spinning mills in Sholapur district. There were no labour troubles during the year. There is a large number of ginning and pressing factories all over the division except in Satara district. In East Khandesh some of the factories remained closed. The factories of this district work on the joint system and the profits are distributed among all of them. Hand loom weaving is carried on in all the districts. This industry is however unable to stand the competition of the mills in respect either to the quality or quantity of the produce, and it is therefore in a precarious condition.

*Sugar Factories.*—There are three sugar factories in Ahmednagar district, at Belapur, Ranjankhol, and Belwandi. The first two are in a flourishing condition, while the third worked only for six weeks. The sugar factory at Ravalgaon in Nasik district is making progress. Out of the two sugar factories in Sholapur district the Saswad Mali Sugar Factory is working well. The factory at Borgaon is not yet fully developed.

*Miscellaneous Industries.*—There is one tannery at Bhusawal conducted by a Madras firm. 118,746 hides were sent to Rajmahendri during the year. There are two tanneries at Ahmednagar and they worked well. The bidi factories at Nasik and Sinnar supplied bidis locally and as far as the Central Province and Berar. The Reay Paper Mill at Mundwa, the Rawiverma Fine Art Litho Press at Malavli, the Kirloskar Iron Factory, the Hindustan Engineering Works at Satara Road, the Industrial Factory at Karad and the Ogale Glass Works at Ogalewadi all had a good year.

### Southern Division.

There was no appreciable change in the condition of trade in any of the districts of the Southern Division.

The principal products exported from the Karnatak districts were jowar, wheat, cotton, jaggery, chillies, groundnut, betelnut, betel leaves, spices and timber and those from the Konkan districts rice, salted fish, mangoes, fish, finished cashewnuts and cocoanuts.

Owing to the poor yield of cotton in Bijapur district some of the ginning and pressing factories there remained idle throughout the year, while the others worked only for short periods. In Belgaum district also out of the 19 ginning factories only 14 worked during the year. The spinning and weaving mills at Gokak in Belgaum district and at Hubli and Gadag in Dharwar district, however, fared well during the year.

There was hardly any improvement in the working of the hand loom industry in the districts of the Southern Division as it could not stand competition with mill made cloth. The weavers of Bijapur were again hard hit this year owing to the continuance of scarcity conditions. Arrangements were therefore made to supply them with yarn and to purchase their finished products on payment of daily wages. This relieved the situation to some extent. The programme of initiating the weavers in improved methods of weaving started in Ratnagiri district with the help of Rs. 1,900 sanctioned from the Village Uplift Fund has been carried out at 5 centres out of the 9 selected for the purpose.

The copper and brass industry in Dharwar and Kolaba districts could not make any headway owing to the general trade depression. The aluminium industry in the Ratnagiri district is on the wane. Only 3 factories are now manufacturing aluminium buttons.

The output of the soap factory at Goregaon was the same as that of last year, *viz.*, Rs. 6,000. The factory of wooden toys at Pen continued to do its limited business and that of cutlery is progressing well. The Dhutpapashwar Ayurvedic Pharmacy at Panvel did its normal amount of business.

Salt was manufactured at the salt works at Sanikatta in Kanara district and Shiroda in Ratnagiri district. The outturn at the latter works recorded a discernible increase this year due mainly to the existence of conditions favourable to the manufacture.

The Bharat Tile Factory at Mora in Uran mahal is in a flourishing condition. The output this year approximated to Rs. 2,56,000 as against Rs. 1,60,000 during the previous year. But the two tile factories at Khanapur in Belgaum District are showing no signs of progress.

Though the mango crop in Ratnagiri district was not as good as in the previous year the prices realized for the exports were better. The trade in green mangoes fared well. The volume of business done by the cashewnut shelling factories at Malvan and Vengurla was less than that in the previous year, the imports of raw cashewnuts from Africa and exports of finished nuts to Bombay and America being respectively worth Rs. 3,94,205 and Rs. 9,28,000 as against Rs. 6,83,750 and Rs. 13,91,750 in the previous year.

The mango juice canning factory at Kelshi and the pine apple canning factory at Dapoli opened last year did limited business. The Central Canning Company at Karwar continued its mango pulp industry during the year and exported its product to places in India and abroad.

Sandalwood, ebony and ivory carving was carried on as usual in Kumta and Sadashivgad in Karwar taluka. But owing to lack of demand the industry is not in a flourishing condition.

The Tata Power Company's power houses at Bhivpuri, Campoli and Patnus continued to supply energy as usual.

The cart-wheel manufacturing industry at Panvel is in a flourishing condition as these wheels find a ready market in upghat districts.

There are 43 rice and flour mills in Ratnagiri, 81 in Kolaba and 37 in Kanara including the one opened this year. But the mills in Kanara and Ratnagiri did not get sufficient work. A business newly set up at Karjat worthy of note is the export of parched rice at the rate of 100 bags per day to Nasik and West Khandesh and other upghat districts.

## 16, PRICES.

### Northern Division.

Prices of food grains in Ahmedabad and Kaira districts showed an upward trend partly owing to lower yield of the grain crops and partly owing to world conditions. In Broach sub-division of Broach and Panch Mahals district and in Surat district there was a fall in the price of cotton. The recession in the price of cotton was caused to a large extent by a bumper American cotton crop and was aggravated by curtailment by Japan of cotton imports due to exchange difficulties. Prices of food grains were generally steady.

In Thana district rice and Nagli are the staple food grains. On the whole, there was a slight increase in the prices of these crops, but this led to no substantial improvement in the conditions of agriculturists in junglepatti villages.

In Bombay Suburban district there was a slight increase in rice crop. The price of rice during the monsoon was 8 seers and 6 chhataks while from January 1938 it was 8 seers per rupee as against 8 seers and 8 chhataks during the preceding year.

Owing to the slump in prices, rebate in assessment was granted by way of relief to the agriculturists in the talukas, where it was considered necessary.

### Central Division.

The prices in Ahmednagar returned to normal after the scarcity conditions of the last two years. The prices of groundnut and cotton which are the chief money crops in East Khandesh district were steady throughout the year. In Nasik and Satara districts the prices of wheat, bajri and rice were slightly below the average. The general trend of the prices in Poona and Sholapur districts was steady.

A comparative statement showing the prices of the principal foodstuffs in the district headquarter towns during the year under report and in the previous years is given below :—

## Southern Division.

The price of staple food grains and other commodities did not show any marked improvement. Though there was a poor yield, the price of cotton which is the main money crop of the black-soil tracts, fell owing to the general economic depression and over-production in other countries.

*Belgaum.*—There were slight variations in the prices of the main products; but no special reasons can be ascribed for the variations. There were slight fluctuations in the level of prices of rice, bajri, jowari and wheat—a slight rise in the earlier part of the year followed by a slight fall late in the year. There was however a small general rise in the price of turdal.

*Bijapur.*—There was no appreciable change in the prices of principal food grains and other necessaries of life. Cotton which is the chief money crop in the district recorded a fall in price owing to the increased imports from foreign countries. The prices of groundnut also showed no improvement during the year. Kadbi however showed a rise owing to shortage of fodder and lack of green grass.

*Dharwar.*—In this district also, no appreciable variations in the prices of staple agricultural commodities were recorded except wheat which alone showed an improvement on account of its lesser output. The yield of jowari was normal and its price remained stationary. Though the yield of rice was below the normal there was no rise in its price as it was imported in large quantities, from Bezwaḍa, Hospet and other places. Despite its unsatisfactory yield, cotton fetched less owing to the increased imports from foreign countries. Groundnut also failed to fetch satisfactory prices during the year.

*Kanara.*—This district also recorded no appreciable variations in the prices of staple food grains. There was a general drop in the prices of cocoanuts.

*Kolaba.*—There was no material change in the prices of paddy, the main crop of the district. Coarse paddy was sold at rates varying from Rs. 30 to Rs. 37 per khandi and Kolamba from Rs. 33 to Rs. 45 per khandi throughout the district except at Karjat where the rates for Kolamba ranged from Rs. 45 to Rs. 50 per standard khandi. The demand from outside for paddy continued to be what it was in the previous year. The price of straw varied between Re. 1 to Rs. 1-8-0 per 100 bundles throughout the district except at Roha and Panwel where it varied between Rs. 2 and Rs. 2-8-0 per 100 bundles. There was no change in the prices of other commodities.

*Ratnagiri.*—There was no appreciable change in the principal foodstuffs and other necessaries of life in this district.

## 17, LABOUR AND WAGES.

## Northern Division.

In Ahmedabad, Kaira, Surat and Bombay Suburban districts the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change. In the eastern part of Panch Mahals sub-division, the rates of wages were much lower than those in the other parts of that division. Thana district being in close proximity to Bombay skilled and unskilled labourers especially from Thana, Kalyan and Bassein as usual found employment in Bombay at higher wages than they could get locally. Rice mills in the district as also the match factory at Ambernath and Thana and the salt works at Bhayandar, Rai and Belapur, etc., provided sufficient work for both the skilled and unskilled labourers. There was as usual no sign of unemployment in the district during the year but on the contrary local labour could not cope with the demand in the transplantation season and it had to be supplemented by importing upcountry labourers. Similarly many skilled labourers had to be imported from Gujarat for brick manufacturing work.

## Central Division.

The supply of labour was plentiful throughout the year, and the rates of wages both for skilled and unskilled labourers remained practically steady in all the districts. The condition of the labourers was on the whole good. The Railway workshops at Bhusawal, Lonavla and Dhond, the Spinning and Weaving mills at Jalgaon, Amalner, Chalisgaon, Dhulia, Poona, Barsi and Sholapur, the sugar factories in the Ahmednagar, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur districts, the several ginning and pressing factories in every district except Satara, the Ammunition Factory and the Arsenal at Kirkee, the Government Workshop at Dapuri, the Reay Paper Mill at Mundwa and the Tata Works in Poona district continued to absorb a large number of labourers from the countryside.

## Southern Division.

The demand both for skilled and unskilled labour was, on the whole, sufficient throughout the division, except in the Bijapur district, where owing to the prevalence of scarcity conditions and consequent general depression it was less. There was, however, no appreciable fall in the wages in that district as scarcity works were started in the affected areas. The continued slump in prices has not forced down the rates of wages *pari passu* with the fall in the prices. The fluctuations in the rates of wages were slight and call for no comments. Barring the hitch between the employers and employees in the Gokak Mills in the Belgaum district, which continued this year also, the relations between capital and labour were generally smooth.



*Belgaum.*—The labouring classes had sufficient employment and hence the rates for both skilled and unskilled labour were mostly stationary throughout the district except in Sampgaon and Parasgad talukas, where a slight fall was noticed.

*Bijapur.*—As in the rest of the districts in this division, the bulk of population in this district consists of field labourers. There was no keen demand for such labour due to scarcity conditions. Due to the general trade depression there was also no appreciable demand for skilled labour. The cotton ginning and pressing factories employed a limited number of coolies due to the poor outturn of cotton. Tagai was liberally granted to finance the construction of wells and embankments. The average daily rates of wages remained stationary. Field and ordinary labour was available for three to four annas per day and skilled labour for ten to twelve annas.

*Dharwar.*—Both ordinary and skilled labour was available throughout the year to meet the demand. In the latter part of the year, however, the demand for it fell in the Navalgund taluka and Nargund petha owing to indifferent season. The daily wages of skilled labourers varied from annas ten to rupee one while those for unskilled labourers varied from three to six annas.

*Kanara.*—As the demand for skilled and unskilled labour was steady the wages also remained stationary throughout the district except in Haliyal taluka and Mundgod petha where there was slight variation in the rates for skilled labour. There was the usual immigration of labourers in the aboveghat talukas, where supply of indigenous labour is scanty, from Goa, South Kanara and the neighbouring districts of Dharwar and Belgaum.

*Kolaba.*—As the supply of labour both skilled and unskilled was equal to the demand there was no change in the wages throughout the year. The wages for skilled labour ranged from rupee one to rupees two while those for unskilled labour varied from four to six annas throughout the district, except at Uran where owing to its proximity to Bombay the rate for unskilled labour varied from six to eight annas. Unskilled labour is mostly utilised in agricultural operations.

*Ratnagiri.*—The rates of wages for skilled and unskilled labour remained steady owing to the fact that the supply was commensurate with the demand. This is a district which supplies the Bombay mills with workers. Every year after the monsoon large contingents migrate in search of employment and return before the advent of the next monsoon for engaging themselves in agriculture. The cashewnut factories at Malvan and Vengurla provided employment to a large number of workers near their homes.

## 18, SPECIAL MATTERS.

### Northern Division.

The Tenancy Bill led to friction between landlords and tenants which resulted in a large increase of rent suits in Dhandhuka taluka.]

The new grain shops opened in Panch Mahals have succeeded in paying expenses though they had to begin with purchases at most unfavourable term. The prospect of their success over a long period is therefore good.

(The terms on which impartible tenure land is held are becoming more familiar and land is more readily accepted on that tenure in Ahmedabad and Kaira districts.)

Progress made in the maintenance and repairs of small irrigation tanks in charge of the Revenue Department :—A grant of Rs. 11,000 was sanctioned by Government for repairs to minor irrigation works in charge of the Revenue Department in this division during the year 1937-38 and it was distributed as under :—

Out of the amount of Rs. 4,750 placed at the disposal of the Collector of Ahmedabad an amount of Rs. 370 was spent for repairing a bandh at Dhanwada, Vehla at Gangwada, and tanks at Saljda and Sindhraj in the Dholka taluka. The remaining grant could not be utilised by the Collector before the close of the financial year as the tanks remained full of water owing to heavy rains during the year. The Collector of Broach and Panch Mahals has practically utilised the whole amount placed at his disposal. In Surat district 24 tanks were repaired during the year.

#### Central Division.

The general elections of the Local Boards under their revised constitutions passed off smoothly. As in the case of the elections of the Bombay Legislative Council and Assembly the rural population evinced keen interest in them.

The recovery of all Government and private dues from the agriculturist was held in abeyance from August 1937 to the date of the collection season of the year. Though these orders affected the recovery of Government revenue to some extent, considerable relief was afforded to the agriculturists.

*Grant of waste land on the impartible tenure.*—Waste land was given out for cultivation on the impartible tenure as detailed below :—

*Scarcity.*—Scarcity conditions in the non-irrigated tracts of Ahmednagar district continued till October 31st, 1937, except in few villages in Newasa taluka where they continued till December 31st, 1937. In Poona district the scarcity declared in Sirur peta and in 27 villages of Indapur taluka continued till December 31st, 1937 and January 31st, 1938, respectively. The scarcity works in the Pandharpur and Madha talukas in Sholapur district and the gratuitous relief in the latter taluka were stopped on August 31st, 1937, while relief operations in the Sangola and Karmala talukas were stopped on November 30th and December 31st, 1937, respectively. Thus by January 1st, 1938, normal conditions prevailed in all districts.

No case of corruption among the revenue subordinates was reported during the year except in Satara district where an Aval Karkun was dismissed from Government service for corrupt practices. In the Bombay Civil Service (Lower Division) a mamlatdar was dismissed for corrupt practices.

### Southern Division.

*Village Improvement.*—Village improvement work continued to receive the attention, which it deserved, during the year. Improvements were noticeable in the sphere of village communications, public health, agriculture, sanitation and education. The village improvement committees wherever they have been working in earnest rendered useful services in initiating improvement in the standard of rural life.

New roads and wells were constructed and the existing ones repaired. Construction of manure pits outside gaathan areas in a number of villages in Belgaum and Dharwar districts and of bore-hole latrines in some villages in the former district was undertaken during the year. Drinking water sources were freely treated with permanganate of potash. Quinine was distributed gratis in the malarial tracts of the division. Fifty-five medicine chests which were supplied to villages selected for improvement in Dharwar district were replenished and 3,000 patients were treated during the year. A special committee has been organised in this district for anti-guinea worm and anti-malarial work. The Collectors of Belgaum and Dharwar report that prompt measures were taken in the villages to combat epidemic diseases wherever they appeared.

Improved strains of paddy were supplied in all the districts of the division. The cultivation of mango and other fruits, such as pine apples, Spanish peas and lemons was also encouraged in the districts of Belgaum and Dharwar. J.213 variety sugarcane sets were distributed on a large scale in Dharwar district. Improved furnaces of Poona type for the manufacture of jaggery were set up in the sugar tracts and 20 embankments were erected under the technical advice and guidance of the Bunding officer in Belgaum district. A Divisional Agricultural Show, which was organised on a scale unparalleled in the agricultural history of the Karnatak, was held

in Belgaum in January last. It was opened by His-Excellency the Governor of Bombay on the 17th of January 1938. The Honourable the Revenue Minister and Princes and representatives of the Deccan States attended the inaugural ceremony. It has been estimated that nearly a lakh of agriculturists from all over the Karnatak visited the show.

A cattle show was held at Budihal S. Galgali in Bijapur district. The Wilson Anti-Famine Institute and the Village Improvement and other Social Welfare organisations arranged for propaganda work and dissemination of matters calculated to make for improved village life.

Two shepherd boys from Belgaum district were trained at Government cost in the school of the Bombay Industries Department. A new poultry farm was opened at Hulikatti in Paragad taluka. The glass bangle industry in Hukeri taluka which was on the verge of decadence received a fresh lease of life by the introduction of improved furnaces. In Dharwar district a new industrial school at Hulikoti was started under aegis of an educational society. The Malsamudra village improvement committee encouraged the villagers to take to hand-spinning by supplying hand-spinning wheels. The poultry farm maintained by the Agricultural Department in Kolaba district supplied at concessional rates improved varieties of poultry to the villagers.

Four primary schools and one night school were opened in Belgaum district and 17 primary schools in Dharwar district.

*Destruction of wild animals.*—Five elephants were killed in Kanara district by the Government spikaris and other licensees. Besides, 870 wild pigs, 6 tigers, 8 panthers, one wild dog and one bear were killed. A total sum of Rs. 804 was paid as rewards.

*Visits by high officials.*—Their Excellencies Sir Roger and Lady Lumley honoured Belgaum in January last with a visit to open the Agricultural Show and returned to Bombay via Sholapur visiting *en route* Dharwar and the famine works in Bijapur district. The Honourable the Revenue Minister toured over all the districts in this division. In Kolaba he inquired into the relations between the Khots and tenants and settled the tenants' strike at Chari in Alibag taluka. In Kanara he enquired into the forest grievances and reviewed the forest policy at a conference specially convened for the purpose at Supa. In Ratnagiri he acquainted himself with the agrarian problems peculiar to that district. Other members of the Cabinet also toured in some districts of the Division.

*Public feeling and press.*—The public feeling in general was loyal and the tone of the press generally moderate. Appreciation of the various measures adopted by Government for the improvement of the villages and a general awakening in the rural areas were discernible. [Except for the propaganda carried on by the Independent Labour Party in Kolaba and Ratnagiri districts, which resulted in embittering the feeling between the *khots* and the *tenants*, there were no unwelcome activities during the

year. The relations of the *landlords* and the *tenants* were generally harmonious in Kolaba district except at village Bhendkhol in the Uran mahal and Shenvai in the Roha taluka. In the former the dispute is about rent and in the latter it is about permanent tenancy. In Bijapur district the year under report was the second year of scarcity. The people appreciated with gratitude the suspensions and remissions of land revenue sanctioned by Government and the liberal scale of relief measures organised for them.

*Other miscellaneous matters.*—The Collector of Belgaum reports that circular orders of Government against corruption were communicated to all Revenue subordinate and village officers. In addition a circular was issued by him warning them against accepting free supplies or “sarbarais”. Two cases of corruption detected in that district during the year are still under enquiry. In Kolaba district one talati who took illegal gratification was dismissed from service.

Tree planting has been undertaken in 16 villages of Navalgund taluka of Dharwar district and efforts are being made to push it on in other “yerinad” tracts of the district. The Sir Frederick Sykes Village Improvement Challenge Shield was awarded to Uppin-Betgeri Village in Dharwar taluka for the best work done in the division.

In Kanara forest strips were granted on usual conditions in deserving cases. The cultivators freely availed themselves of the concession of cutting bamboos and stakes for fencing.

An “Arbour day” was observed in some villages of Badami and Bagalkot talukas of Bijapur district when 137,000 trees were planted. The scarcity conditions continued in the major part of the district and extensive measures were organised for relieving the distress. The total number of units on dole and on relief works from August 1937 to July 1938 was 78,48,506. Free kitchens were financed at seven taluka centres with the munificent donations received from the Honourable Mr. Shantidas Askuran and Mr. Veerchand Meghaji of Bombay.

*Grant of land on impartible tenure.*—The following table gives the area of waste land granted on impartible tenure in each district:—

*Emigration and Immigration.*—Except for the seasonal immigration of field labour from less favoured to more favoured tracts there was nothing worth noting under this head so far as the districts of Belgaun, Dharwar and Kanara are concerned. Emigration of agriculturists and wage earners from Ratnagiri and Kolaba districts to Bombay in the fair season continued as usual. The salt works at Uran (Kolaba) continued to attract a number of immigrant labourers from Gujarat during the season.

Fifty-seven muhammadans from Mangaon and Mahad talukas in Kolaba district and 92 from the northern part of Ratnagiri district migrated to Africa; 55 persons returned to their homes in Ratnagiri district during the year.

Owing to the existence of scarcity conditions in Bijapur district a number of labourers temporarily migrated to Sholapur, Hubli, Goa, Davangeri and the adjoining tracts of His Exalted Highness the Nizam's Dominions as in the previous year. But majority of them returned to their homes to engage themselves in the relief works after the harvesting was over. There were also a few cases of immigration from His Exalted Highness the Nizam's adjoining territories into Hungund taluka in search of work.

The offer of one plot in Suburban Scheme VII—Khar was cancelled and the deposit was forfeited as the owner did not want to purchase the plot.

*Town Planning Schemes.*—The varied Town Planning Scheme No. II—Ghatkopar was sanctioned by Government to take effect from 15th May 1938. The Tribunal of Arbitration appointed in the Bandra Town Planning Scheme No. III having decided all matters, the Arbitrator drew up the final scheme and submitted it to Government through the Bandra Municipality. The scheme has since been received from the Municipality and it will be submitted to Government shortly. The Bandra Town Planning Scheme No. IV was finally sanctioned by Government to have effect from 1st December 1937. The Santa Cruz Town Planning Scheme No. V was with the Consulting Surveyor to Government. The Draft Town Planning Scheme No. VI—Bandra was with the Consulting Surveyor to Government for arbitration purposes.
