I. Changes in Population or Boundaries.

### II. Comments on Tabular Statement-Form No. I.

2. In the year under report there were 25 meetings of the General Committee, as against 22 held in 1900-01; 136 items of business were disposed of as against 116 disposed of in 1900-01. The four quarterly meetings were held in April, July, October and January last. Besides these there were 12 special and 9 adjourned meetings, as will be seen from Appendices (I. a & b), and these meetings were well attended, as will be apparent from Appendix (I. c), which will give the necessary information regarding the attendance of the several Municipal Councillors.

3. For information regarding the constitution of the several Executive and Consultative Committees and the attendance of members thereat, reference is solicited to statement (I. d).

#### III. Changes in the System of Taxation.

4. No changes were made in the system of taxation in the course of the year under report.

IV. Comments on Tabular Statement-Form No. II.

5. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 39,550-11-8 and closed with an income of Rs. 3,30,867-2-5, both making a total of Rs. 3,70,417-14-1, which was available for expenditure in the year under report. This income of Rs. 3,30,867-2-5 was made up as follows.—

The Municipal income in the year under report was thus larger by Rs. 26,552-7-5 than that in the previous year, if "Extraordinary and debts" is taken into consideration. But if the income from that source is left out, this year's income shows an excess of Rs. 13,441-14-5 only over that of the previous year. This excess is confined to the first item only, the rest showing very small variations. Octroi and Registration fee alone brought in about Rs.11,500 more this year than last year. The other sources were as before.

6. The following will give more detailed information regarding the several sources of income.

- (a) Octroi.—Octroi shows an increase of Rs. 6,214-1-1, which was due to ordinary variations in trade.
- (b) House, Bhangi and Wheel Taxes.—These brought in Rs. 24,967-4-0, Rs. 32,690-7-4, and Rs. 4,951-0-5 respectively, making a total of Rs. 62,608-11-9 as against Rs. 63,243-7-3, collected in the year 1900-1901. The excess of that year's income over that of the year under report is slight and requires no remarks. The arrears at the end of the year under report on account of these sources were respectively Rs. 10,932-8-3, Rs. 18,257-9-5 and Rs. 562-12-0. The total of arrears due on the 31st March last was thus Rs. 29,752-13-8. Some portion of that amount has been recovered since the close of the year; and the remainder or most of it will be recovered before the current year closes, if the City happily enjoys immunity from Plague. The arrears were principally due to distress caused by Plague. Many houses remained vacant and privies unused. A large portion of the population had left the city and lived out till the end of February or middle of March last, which left no time for the establishment to recover arrears within the year.
- (c) Water-rate.—The income from this source was Rs. 1,873 more than that in the previous year, and the increase is due to more house connections having been taken in the year under report than in the previous year.
- (d) Trade Registration Fee.—This brought in Rs. 4,956-15-2 more than in the previous year, and the reason is that, there are certain articles in the Octroi Schedule, which having been subjected to customs duty, are exempted from Octroi. They had, therefore, to pay the trade registration fee. More articles have, therefore, recently come under the operation of the rules regulating the levy of the Trade Registration fee.
- (e) Sale of poudrette.—This yielded Rs. 3,267-12-0 more in the year under report than in the previous year, and the increase is due to there having been a rise in the prices of Jogree, and consequently in those of this manure, the price of which varies with that of "gool", most of the poudrette being applied to sugar-cane crops.
- (f) Grant for Schools.—This year's income shows an increase of Rs. 558-11-7, which was due to increase in expenditure on schools in the year under report, as the grant is regulated by the outlay the Municipality makes on schools every year. The expenditure on schools having been in 1890-1900 much below the minimum fixed for the purposes of the Contract Grant, the Government Grant for the schools was reduced in 1900-01; but the expenditure in 1900-01 having been larger than that in the previous year, the grant received in 1901-02 was larger, as compared with that received in the previous year.
- (g) Grant for the Technical School.—This shows a decrease and this apparent decrease is due to the fact that, the two years' grant, i.e., for 1899-1900 and

1900-01 was received in the year 1900-1901, while in the year under report, only one year's grant was received; hence the income under this head appears to be smaller this year than that in the previous year.

- (h) Local Funds.—The usual annual grant from the Local Funds for the year 1900-01 was paid to the Municipality by the Huzur Deputy Collector in the year under report. This will explain the increase against this item. The grant for the year under report has not yet been received.
- (i) Advances and Deposits.—There is an increase of Rs. 13,110-9-0. But this is only an adjustment account, which fluctuates according to circumstances and requires no explanation.

#### V. Working of the Octroi System.

7. The area under the administration of the City Municipality for Octroi purposes includes, in addition to the City Municipal District, those under the administrationof the Suburban Municipality and the Cantonment Committee. It levies Octroi duty on the articles mentioned in the schedule and imported into the said three areas; and after deducting the amount of daty refunded on account of the articles exported and the establishment and other charges from the gross revenue, it distributes the remainder amongst the three Bodies according to the population test, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 4653 dated the 9th November 1895.

8. The gross revenue from Octroi in the year 1901-1902 was Rs. 1,69,251-1-4 as against Rs. 1,63,382-0-4 in the previous year. The increase of Rs. 6,214-1-1 was due to ordinary fluctuations in trade, which was not in the year under report as slack as it was in the previous year, the Plague epidemic of this year having been less severe than its predecessor.

9. Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 1,69,251-1-4, Rs. 31,656-4-9 were refunded on account of exports; Rs. 12,789-5-5 were spent on establishment, Rs. 1,905-5-4 on contingencies, and Rs. 191-7-11 on repairs to Nakas. All these made up a total of Rs. 46,542-7-5. After deducting this amount from the gross revenue, the remainder, i. e., Rs. 1,22,708-9-11, was distributed amongst the three Bodies, each of which got its share in proportion to its population. Thus this Municipality got Rs. 90,487-7-6, the Cantonment Committee Rs. 26,628-7-11 and the Suburban Municipality Rs. 5,592-10-6.

10. The amount of Rs. 1,37,029-14-11, shown in column 5 (c) in statement—Form No. II accompanying this report, is made up of the net share of the City Municipality, i. e., Rs. 90,487-7-6 as mentioned above, and the establishment and other charges amounting to Rs. 46,542-7-5. In other words in arriving at the figure mentioned therein the shares of the Cantonment Committee and the Suburban Municipality are only deducted from the gross revenue from Octroi.

11. The amount of Rs. 31,656-4-9 was, as mentioned above, refunded on account of exports in 1901-1902 as against Rs. 24,881-2-0 in 1900-01. As compared with the previous year's expenditure on this item, this year's expenditure would appear to be much larger. But this increase is not due to any special circumstances. It is the result in the first place of a much smaller amount having been refunded last year and of a larger amount having remained in arrears at the end of the year 1900-01, in consequence of the want of funds in that year and also of certain i nquiries with regard to exports having not been completed before the year closed. All these arrears were paid in the year under report. The amount of refunds will alone show that the Municipality does not allow Octroi to degenerate into transit duty and hamper the inland trade of the country, and that the refund rules are worked in the same liberal spirit in which they were conceived, affording facilities to traders claiming refunds and generally removing all possible obstacles in their way.

12. The following table furnishes information regarding the average consumption of each of the 8 classes of articles and shows that the standard is not exceeded anywhere and that the levy of Octroj has been confined to articles locally consumed. It should be noted here, that the average consumption per head is calculated with reference to the total population of the City, the Surburban, and the Cantonment limits, the City Municipality being, as mentioned above, responsible for the collection of Octroi duties for the three Bodies combined :---

VI. Comments on Tabular Statement-Form No. III.

14. From statement—Form No. III it will be seen that the total expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 2,91,721-5-8, while that in the previous year was Rs. 3,13,403-3-4, showing this year a fall of Rs. 21,681-13-8. The total of Rs. 2,91,721-5-8 was made up as follows :—

It will be seen that "Public Health and Convenience" shows a fall of Rs. 32,868-10-11, while "General Administration" shows an increase of Rs. 12,725-8-11-The variations in the remaining items are slight. The reasons for the fall under C and the rise under A will be explained in the following paras. It may, however, be stated here that the principal reason for this fall is the want of funds, which was due to the prevalence of Plague and the consequent slackness in trade.—

- (a) Office establishment & c.—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 451-3-3 and this decrease is due to the fact that the Special Magistrate's Office was closed in the year under report, the Municipality having been empowered under the new Act to recover its dues by issuing warrants of distress and attaching and selling the property of defaulters. A few other minor items included in this head also show a decrease, but it is very small and requires no explanation.
- (b) Collection of Municipal taxes.—There is an increase of Rs. 5,332 in the year under report in the expenditure under this head, which is mainly due to the scale of salaries of the clerks and the peons in the Octroi Department having been revised and to a part of the cost of the establishment, which was hitherto charged to Conservancy, having been debited to this head, the Sanitary and the direct tax collection establishments having been amalgamated for the convenience of work, as a temporary measure, and charged to this head. All the other items included in this head do not show any change worth notice.
- (c) Pensions and Gratuities.—Gratuities amounting to Rs. 1,069-9-5 were given in the year ander report to super annuated Municipal servants on their retirement, while there was no expenditure under this head in 1900-1901.
- (d) Public Safety.—Fire.—This shows a slight decrease in expenditure, which is due to no new hoses having been purchased in the year under report. None of the other items shows any change worth notice. It may be added here that there were 11 fires in the year under report and the loss of property caused thereby amounted only to Rs. 3,575. This, it may be said, was mainly due to the promptness with which the Municipal fire engines were brought on the scene of fire and worked.
- (c) Lighting.—Expenditure under this head is much smaller in the year under report than in the previous year, which was due to a fall in the prices of oil, wicks, &c. There were at the end of the year under report 1084 street lights as against 1060, with which the year opened.
- (f) Repairs to Police Chowkies.—Repairs to Police Chowkies are always undertaken at the instance of the Police and the work is done according to the requirements of the Department. In the year under report, the repairs cost much less than they did in the previous year, as only ordinary repairs were suggested and carried out in the year 1901-1902.
- (g) Water Supply.—Capital outlay.—This shows a fall of Rs. 8,111-8-9; and most of it refers to the amount of water rates paid to Government in 1901-02. The water rate paid to Government was Rs. 9,166-10-8 in 1901-02 while in the previous year it amounted to Rs. 15,046-6-11. This unusually large sum was paid owing to a larger supply having been drawn from the Canal in that year, as the Katraj tank had entirely failed on account of the deficient rainfall. Another reason for the fall in expenditure under this head is that no new work was undertaken in this year, as was done in 1900-01. Repairs to Katraj tank also cost much less in this year than in the previous year

- (h) Water establishment.—This shows a decrease of Rs. 303-1-1 and it is due to the water establishment having been partially abolished and the work done by that establishment having been transferred to the Ward establishment.
- (i) Drainage.—Capital outlay.—This shows a fall of Rs. 4,395-5-0, and it is due to only Rs. 577-4-9 having been spent on the preparation of the Drainage Scheme in the year under report, while in the previous year the expenditure on that head amounted to Rs. 6,130-12-5. It may be noted here that the Municipality built new drains in Kumbhar Ali in Vetal Peth.
- (j) Establishment and Repairs to drains.--The smaller expenditure this year is due to the roadside gutters having been cleaned of silt to a limited extent.
- (k) Conservancy including Road-cleaning, Road-watering, Latrines &c.-Conservancy is a very comprehensive head and includes the following sub-heads.--

- The above table shows that during the year under report the Municipal outlay on Conservancy was Rs. 95,742-4-8, i. e., smaller than that in the previous year by Rs. 6,810-9-2 and that all the sub-heads except "Latrines," "Road-watering" and "Night-soil Depot" show a decrease. The following will explain the causes of the variations in expenditure under each of the minor heads included in "Conservancy."
- (1) General Supervising establishment.—The decrease is due to a part of the cost of the establishment, hitherto charged to this head, having been debited to "Collections" in the year 1901-2, as the same establishment collected taxes and looked after Sanitation. Another reason of the decrease is that the post of the Health Officer has not been as yet filled up.
- (m) Road-cleaning.—The decrease is due to the removal of kachra having cost the Municipality Rs. 5,000 in 1900-01, while in the year under report there was no expenditure on that account, and the reason is that the contractor did not send in his bill for the contract amount of Rs. 1200 in that year. There is, however, one item, which shows an increase and it is "new rubbish carts."
  15 new rubbish carts were made in the year under report at a cost of Rs. 1,420-0-7. The other items were almost the same as before.
- (n) Bhangi Service.—This shows a decrease of Rs. 387-3-10, which is due to ordinary fluctuations in business and requires no explanation.
- (o) The Night Soil Depot.—The increase is slight and does not call for any remarks.
- (p) Latrines and Urinals.—The increase is due to all the latrines having been dammered and whitewashed in the year under report, while in the year

1900-01 they were only whitewashed. No new latrines were built in the year under report.

- (q) Road-watering.—The increase is due to more roads having been watered in the year under report than in the previous year.
- (r) Hospitals and Dispensaries.—This shows an increase of Rs. 449-13-4, which was due to medicines having cost more money in the year under report, as a fresh supply was ordered in the year, while in the previous year no new medicines were purchased. In the year under report the Municipal Dispensaries treated 29,218 patients, the Deshi-Dawakhana having given relief to 10,257 patients and the Narayen Peth and the Nana's Peth Dispensaries to 18,961 patients. In the year under report, the Municipality gave grants of Rs. 900 and Rs. 180 to the Infirm Asylum and the Dufferin fund, which are included in the expenditure shown under this head.
- (s) Vaccination.—There is a decrease of Rs. 675-3-3 and it is due to no extra establishment having been engaged in the year under report as was done in the previous year, when small-pox epidemic had broken out. For the same reason, the cost of calves purchased for obtaining lymph had gone down to some extent. In other words the expenditure in the year under report was normal, but that for the year 1900-01 was rather unusual.
- (t) Markets and Slaughter-houses.—This shows a fall of Rs. 2,794-5-11, because in the year under report the new works and repairs done at the Reay Market cost Rs. 2,920-14-4 as against Rs. 5,748-9-0 spent on them in 1900-01. The Market Tower has been improved and in a manner made more useful for the Municipal Offices; and the works and repairs done for the purpose cost Rs. 8,669-7-4, which was spread over two years. All other items under this head show no change.
- (u) Pounds.-The variation in expenditure is slight and requires no explanation.
- (v) Arbericulture, Public gardens &c.—This too requires no comment.
- (w) Registration of Births and Deaths.—The expenditure on this head included hitherto the salary of the special clerk for registration of deaths and births and the rewards given to sweepers for information collected by them regarding these domestic occurrences. But in the year under report the post of the special clerk has been abolished, and the work is now done by a clerk in the Health Office.
- (x) Public Works Establishment.—The cost of this establishment is smaller this year, because the salaries of some of the subordinates have been debited to the Ward establishment, i. e., under "Collection of Taxes"; another reason is that the draftsman's post was vacant for a part of the year.
- (y) Buildings-Repairs.-The increase is very small and requires no explanation.
- (z) Road-Repairs fc.—The item shows a decrease of Rs. 8,417-14-6, and the reason is that for want of funds the Municipality could not undertake road-repairs on a larger scale. 4,58,962 square feet of roads or 4.16 miles of roads were repaired in this year, while in the previous year 802,099 square feet were repaired. Metal and murum also cost much less. The charges on account of road-widening, however, rose from Rs. 667-15-0 to Rs. 2260-10-10, which was principally due to old bills that had remained in arrears in consequence of the claimants having been absent having been paid in the year.
- (aa) Stores .- The increase is very small and need not be noticed.
- (ab) Public Instruction.—Schools and Colleges.—The total expenditure on schools and colleges was Rs. 20,582-15-5, while in the previous year it was Rs. 20,940-14-5, showing a decrease of Rs. 357-15-0. There are only two items,

which show any variation and they are "salaries to masters and mistresses" and the "Technical School," on both of which the expenditure was smaller in the year under report. This decrease was due to the schools having been closed for 3 months on account of Plague and some of the vacancies not having been filled up on account of smaller attendance. All the other items remain as they were before.

- (ac) Libraries and Museums.—This shows an increase of Rs. 57-12-8. In this year contributions of Rs. 50 each were made to the Native General Library and the Raste's Peth Library and the Museum cost about Rs. 60 less than the previous year.
- (ad) Interest.—The Municipality has taken a loan of Rs. 25,000 from Govern... ment for Plague operations and interest was paid on the capital remaining unpaid. This shows a decrease of Rs. 234-3-6, which was due to the six monthly instalment having been paid before time, and the capital having been reduced, vide Appendix (III. b) for details regarding loans.
- (ae) Loss account.—The Municipal Act III of 1901 having thrown on the Municipality the duty of recovering Municipal dues, all cases filed in the Magistrate's Court and remaining undisposed of were returned to the Municipality by the Special Magistrate. The process fees paid by the Municipality in those cases had, therefore, to be written off and debited to this account.
- (af) Census.—The amount shown against this item is that paid by the Municipality to Government for the compilation work done for it by the Provincial Superintendent of Census, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 971 dated 18th February 1902.
- (ag) Elections.—The Triennial elections took place in February and March last and the amount of Rs. 452-5-10 represents the cost of printing and other charges in connection therewith.
- (ah) Deposits.—This is only an adjustment account and requires no explanation as the variation is due to ordinary causes.

VII. Acquisition and Alienation of Property.

15. No new piece of land was acquired in the year under report; 1976-4 square feet of land, that were acquired in the previous year, were only paid for in the year under report, which is entered in App. VII. A; and 6 square feet of land were sold for Rs. 18 to Mr. Sheshaya R. Naidoo in Raste's Peth for the improvement of a platform, vide App. VII. B.

#### VIII. Audit of Accounts.

16. The Municipal accounts were audited by Messrs R. B. Konkar and K. R. Tarabadkar, whose remarks on the accounts (Vide App. VIII) will give information regarding the work they did and the condition they found the Municipal accounts in. They follow the preaudit system, under which every bill is examined in the first instance by the Municipal Accountant, the Chief Officer, and then by the Auditors, and when found correct in every respect, it is submitted for further scrutiny to a member of the Managing Committee. No payment is made until a bill is so examined, sanctioned by the Managing Committee, and countersigned by its Chairman. All bills paid in the month are again sent to the Auditors at the end of the month for examination along with the monthly accounts of receipts and expenditure.

The annual and the quarterly accounts were published in a Local Newspaper, and in addition copies thereof were distributed amongst rate-payers for their information.

#### Municipal wants.

17. Good potable water and efficient drains are the principal wants of the City. An increased and well-filtered supply of water is a great desideratum and the old drains require to be reconstructed. These two questions have engaged the attention of the Municipality long since and have made some progress. What the progress was up to the end of the year 1900-1901 would be seen from paras 143 and 144 of the last Administration Report of this Municipality and the following will show what progress they made in the course of the year under report.

(a) As regards Drainage it would be seen that, before the year 1900-1901 closed, the Municipality had submitted the Scheme, prepared by Mr. J. C. Pott inger, with its remarks thereon to the Local Government, and the latter had forwarded it to the Government of India, requesting their sanction to the grant of a loan required for the purpose of carrying out the Scheme. The Government of India disposed of the question in the year under report and their orders are embodied in Government Resolution No. 3904 (General Department) dated 9th July 1901, wherein the Government of India makes the following observations.

"8. The Governor-General in Council has regretfully come to the conclusion that "so large a loan cannot, in justice to the general tax-payer, be granted on the security offer-"ed. While giving due weight to the views of the experts, who have pronounced in "favour of the scheme and to the opinion of His Excellency the Governor in Council, it "must be admitted that the success of a sewage farm is dependent on so many hypothetical "elements, that no weight of expert opinion can make it other than a speculation. It "needs be demonstrated that granted the possibility of securing suitable land at the price "e stimated and granted the continuous efficiency of the sewage effluent as a fertilizer, the "profits, made by small cultivators, can be maintained at the same rate in a large under-"taking, and it further needs demonstration that an agricultural undertaking, which might "be successfully carried out by private enterprize, will meet with equal success under the "management of G overnment or of a Local Body. A great number of the questions involv-"ed can only be decided by actual experiment and the only safe method is to start such "experiments on a small scale, which can gradually be enlarged if they prove successful.

"9. The Government of India would be glad to see a small experimental sewage "farm started at Poona, under conditions closely approximating to those under which the "larger scheme has now been proposed, but such an experimental farm cannot be accepted "as an asset to be set against liabilities to be incurred on schemes for Drainage and Water "supply with which it is not necessarily connected.

"10. In conclusion, I am to say that the Governor-General in Council trusts that "the rejection of the present project will not cause the Municipal Committee of Poona to "relax their efforts to improve the sanitation of the City. If the Municipality will pre-"pare a less ambitious scheme, the expenditure on which can eventually be met from the "regular sources of Municipal revenue, His Excellency would be prepared to assist them "should funds be available, with a moderate loan on easy terms."

As recommended by the Government of India, the Bombay Government asked Mr. Pottinger to report whether the Scheme was susceptible of any modifications, such as would reduce its cost and bring it within the means of the Municipality. Mr. Pottinger thereupon proposed certain modifications, which reduced the cost of the Scheme to Rs. 10,77,100 and the annual charge to Rs. 61,015. This revised Scheme has been referred by the Municipality to a special Committee for consideration. The Committee has concluded its deliberations and will soon submit its report. (b) As regards Water supply it may be stated that the Water scheme formed part of the big Scheme of 43 lakhs referred to in para ( $\alpha$ ). But the Government of India having declined to sanction the loan applied for, the Water Works Scheme has been practically held in abeyance for the present.

(c) An Extramural slaughter-house is another of the wants of the Municipality. Plans and estimates have been prepared and a site has been acquired for it in consultation with the Sanitary Commissioner. But for want of funds the work has not yet been undertaken.

(d) A spacious and commodious Municipal Office is another of the wants of the Municipality. But that too has to stand over, like other wants, till the Municipal finances are more prosperous.

#### General Remarks.

18. (a) It is with feelings of profound sorrow that the Municipality has to record the death of its esteemed President, Sardar Khan Bahadur Dorabjee Pudumjee, which melancholy event took place on the 11th of July 1902 at his residence in Poona. This melancholy event, though not belonging to the year under report, has occurred previous to the submission of this report and is, therefore, referred to here. In the late Sardar the Municipality has lost a most capable leader, a sympathetic adviser and a distinguished citizen.

(b) The Municipality places on record its appreciation of the work done by the Managing Committee, the School Board and the Market, the Sanitary and the Public Works Committees, whose labours helped to lighten the work of the General Committee.

(c) In conclusion, the Municipality desires to express its satisfaction at the manner, in which officers on its staff have discharged their duties during the year under report. The Chief Officer, Rao Bahadur M. K. Kumthekar, deserves special mention. His long connection with the Municipality and the general knowledge of Municipal matters, acquired during the time, are of much value to the Municipality. He possesses abilities of a high order and to these he joins patience and great tact in dealing with menqualities without which no man can successfully hold a difficult post like that of Chief Officer of the Poona Municipality. Since the creation of the new post of Assistant Secretary, the Chief Officer has been relieved, to a certain extent, of his office work and this has enabled him to devote more time, to outdoor work and exercise greater supervision over the various departments under him. The General Committee and the several Executive and Consultative Committees have also received valuable assistance from him in their deliberations. Mr. D. N. Shidhaye, the Municipal Engineer, is an intelligent and hard working officer and efficiently manages the large establishment under him. The Assistant Secretary, Mr. L. J. Kamat, has also done good work since his appointment.

Patwardhan paid 32 visits to the primary schools and many more to the Technical School, Mr. Munshi Shaikh Sardar paid 21 visits, Mr. Dhole 12, Mr. Kaluram Bhau 7, Mr. Ganpatgir Bholagir 18 and Mr. H. N. Apte 3. Each Member would thus appear to have well supervised the working of the schools in his charge.

5. During the year under report, the number of schools, including the Technical School, was 27 as against 26 in the last year. This year Urdu Boys' School No. 13, which was amalgamated with the Urdu Boys' school No. 18 on the 1st April 1898 was re-opened in Raviwar Peth on the 1st August 1901. 13 boys' day-schools and 6 girls' day-schools, teaching Marathi standards ; 1 Guzerathi day-school ; 5 Hindustani day-schools (2 for boys and 3 for girls); and 1 Night School. Out of the above mentioned schools, six were entirely free; two of these were attended by Mahars and Mangs, one by Mahomedans at Macca Masjid and three by all classes.

6. The number of pupils receiving education at the 26 primary schools has in the year under report gone down from 1576 to 1349. The small attendance was due to plague, which having again broken out in September 1901, the number of pupils decreased day by day, and also the Municipal Schools had to be closed for about three months from the 5th of December 1901 to the 2nd of March 1902. The schools were very meagrely attended at the re-opening in March last. The number, however, went on increasing and in the same month on the 31st March it was 1349.

For details regarding the distribution of students amongst trained and untrained teachers vide Appendix A. The above table will show that out of a total of 18 Head Masters and 8 Head Mistresses, 21 are trained and 5 untrained; and out of 47 male and 8 female assistants, 11 are trained and 44 untrained. Out of these untrained 5 Head Masters and 44 assistants, 1 and 22 respectively have passed the Public Service Examination. Out of the remaining 26 unpassed teachers 14 are of over ten years service, 6 female teachers of over five years service, 4 Urdu male teachers and 2 Hindu old teachers. Passed Urdu teachers are not available, and the Board has, therefore, in its service 4 teachers, who have not passed any examination. This year two Mahomedan teachers from Municipal Urdu schools passed the Public Service Examination and joined the Poona Training College. One Mahomedan teacher obtained a first year certificate and 2 Brahmin teachers obtained third year certificates by passing the examination. The Board has improved the establishment by taking over two more third year certificated teachers from the Local Board Schools. While the schools were re-opened after the mitigation of the epidemic and the number of students was far below the usual number, the services of a few teachers were utilized in the Municipal Record work for three months and this work they did with industry and care.

13. The following table will show the number of teachers and pupils, who died of plague since it first broke out in the city in 1896-97:—

About 54 teachers were on plague duty in 1899-1900. Ten (10) of these died of plague and their heirs were recommended for pension. This was granted in nine cases, for which the Board and the families of the deceased tender their most respectful thanks to Government. Only one application for granting pension to the wife of the deceased teacher was rejected by Government as it was not proved as a plague case.

14. As the schools were closed on account of plague, they had not sufficient time to prepare the pupils for the annual examination. A representation was, therefore, made to the Educational Inspector, C. D. pointing out the necessity of the annual examination being dispensed with as a special case in 1901. He complied with the request of the Board, and accordingly the schools were only inspected by his Deputies in July 1901.

15. Only one boys' school, *i. e.*, school No. 1, teaches VI standards and sends up students for the Public Service Examination. In the year under report, 7 boys were sent up for the 3rd grade Public Service Examination, of whom 6 passed.

16. With regard to the Jubilee Technical School, it is to be noted that there were on the roll 77 students on the 31st March 1902 learning drawing (which is compulsory for all students ), carpentry, smithy, painting, turning, and machine-drawing in addition to primary education. The number on the roll in each of those subjects was as shown below in the last four years :---

It is to be noted that in point of number on the rolls, this school like others has also suffered a good deal from plague. Now, regarding the students, it may be further remarked that out of the 77 pupils attending this school, 35 were Brahmins, 30 other Hindus, 3 Mahomedans, 3 Jews and 6 native Christians. The average number on the roll and the average daily attendance during the year under report was 61.5 and 32.9, as against 56 and 32.7 in 1900-01 respectively, showing that in this school there was no fall but on the other hand an increase in attendance in the year under report.

17. There is a special class for Drawing and Carpentry attached to the school for the benefit of persons, who are not regular students of the Technical School. Persons attending this class are charged a fee of annas 4 per mensem. Only the teachers and students from the Municipal schools and the local Training College and grant-in-aid schools are exempted from paying fee.

18. During the year the school was under the immediate supervision of Mr. Rajgopal S. Naidu, a Graduate of the Bombay Technical Institute. Mr. Naidu was first appointed in November 1898 on probation on a salary of Rs. 50 rising to Rs. 75. He was confirmed in the post and was given the first increment of Rs. 5 in November 1899 and now draws Rs. 65, having passed the 2nd Grade Art and the Manual Training Examinations this year. Separate teachers have been provided under him for each of the different branches of professions taught in the institution. There is a competent Drawing Master, who has passed the 3rd Grade School-of-Art-Examination, a professional carpenter, smith and painter to teach their respective profession, and also two teachers for the Primary Marathi classes attached to the school to teach some of the select subjects of standards 3 to 5. All the regular students of the school are required to attend the Drawing and Carpentry classes and as for other professions it is left to the individual student to select one of the professions taught in the school. Qualifications for admission into the school are that a candidate's age must not be less than 10 years and that he must have passed the 2nd vernacular standard at least.

- "This school is recovering from the effects of plague. 58 pupils were on the roll "last year, whereas now there are 76; of these, 39 take the full course and "37 take a special course in Drawing only."
- "The school course includes Vernacular (Marathi) as far as standard V and "Drawing and Carpentry for all pupils of each of the 3 years of the course "and some work in smithy, turning in wood and metals and sign-painting "in the 3rd year."
- "Many of the pupils have already passed Vernacular Standard V before joining "the school and are, therefore, not required to attend the Vernacular class-"es. For these pupils, a two years' course should be arranged to include "Arithmetic and Mensuration and English about two hours a day, with "the rest of the time devoted to Drawing and Workshop practice; and the "school certificate should be given to pupils who successfully pass through "this course, the standard of work being the same as for the other pupils "who take the three years' course."
- "An effort should be made to enroll a number of new pupils now at the beginning "of the school year; especially pupils belonging to the working class."
- "The school is doing good work."

These remarks were communicated to the last Board in November last by the Educational Inspector C. D. It may, however, be *en passant* noted here that at the recommendation of the School Board two boys, who completed their course of 3 years, have been given regular employment at the workshop by the Municipal Public Works Committee. The plague prevented larger employment of certificated men but in future years it is contemplated to carry out Dr. Thomson's recommendation.

20. The First and Second Grade Art Examination of Sir J. J. School for the Poona centre was held in April 1902 in the New English School under the supervision of the Superintendent of the latter School. The Technical School sent up 21 students for the First Grade and 5 for the Second Grade Art Examination, as against 22 and 5 sent up in the previous year. Of the 21 students sent up, 8 came out successful: their names are R. R. Bhambure, B. M. Bhise, D. B. Gokhale, C. G. Joshi, N. V. Kelkar, V. B. Patole, V. P. Sathe and G. B. Sawat. All these students got First Grade certificates; L. P. Gurao got the 2nd Grade certificate. Besides these three students passed in the Manual Training Examination this year and their names are Benjamin S. Kurulkar, Shankar K. Katari and R. S. Naidu (the Superintendent).

21. Of late Free-hand-drawing is taught to boys and girls in higher Standards in some of the Municipal schools. Two Drawing Masters are employed for the purpose under the general supervision of Mr. Yadav, the Drawing Master of the Technical School At present 13 boys' and 6 girls' schools are taking advantage of it, there being in all 98 boys and 62 girls attending these classes.

22. Boys learning Drawing in Primary Schools were not examined in that subject in 1901-02, as these classes having been closed for plague, they had made very little progress.

23. The following table gives information for the last two years about the funds placed at the disposal of the Board :---

24. There was a small increase in school fees notwithstunding the fact that the schools were closed from the 5th December 1901 to 2nd March 1902 on account of plague during the year. The increase was also due to the more satisfactory daily attendance of students in 1901-02 than in the previous year.

25. The Grant-in-aid under, what may be called, the expenditure ratio system, received from Government for primary schools during the year under report, amounted to Rs. 5468 being  $\frac{1}{3}$ rd of the actual expenditure incurred by the Board in the preceding year on schools included in the contract at the last preceding revision of the grant. The grant originally fixed by Government, for 15 schools under the 1st five years' contract by G. R. No. 3595 dated 2nd December 1884, was Rs. 3611 and was to be revised every succeeding five years so as to extend the benefit of the grant to all the new schools that might be opened by the Board in the quinquennial period, thus giving an incentive to open new schools from time to time. The suburban village of Bhamburda came to be included within the city municipal limits and its local school was transferred to the charge of the Board in the year 1889 carrying with it a yearly grant of Rs. 43. The grant was not, however, revised in 1889, although till then the Board had opened about 18 new schools. At the revision on the 1st April 1893, the amount of the yearly proportion or ratio grant

came to be increased to Rs. 6540 under G. R. No. 153 dated the 24th January 1894. The revision was due in 1898 but has not been made. The grant received in the year under report was smaller by Rs. 1072, and the reason was that the total expenditure in the preceding year on contract-schools fell short of the figure, Rs. 19620 fixed at the last revision by Rs. 3216. The grant-in-aid under the other, or *miscellaneous system* of result &c., of Rs. 143-8-0 was for the three Urdu schools, *viz.*, 1 day, 1 night, and 1 girls' school in Mominpura. The Urdu girls' school for the Mahomedan girls was established in Mominpura in 1895, and after a period of 5 years it was registered for grant-in-aid by the Educational Department in 1900 and a miscellaneous grant was given accordingly. The decrease of Rupees 1072 in the amount of the extra grant for Primary schools for the year 1901-02 reduces the quinquennial revision practically to an annual one.

26. A mixed grant of Rs. 1074-6-11 was received in 1901-02 for the Technical School for the year 1901-02 as against 1989-12-10 which was received in the 2 preceding years. A grant of Rs. 15 was received for the Model Engine purchased by the Municipality tor the use of the Technical School.

27. Revenue from land.—The rent of the piece of land, Survey No. 7 in Nana's Peth, transferred to the Municipality by Government, is utilized in supporting the free school for Mahars and Mangs located in the land. The increase in the revenue from this land is due to the present tenant having paid the revenue for 2 years in the previous year, Rs. 400 were received from the present tenant for the two years 1900-01 and 1901-02.

28. The income from fees from boys in the Technical school shows an increase in the year under report.

29. The funds at the disposal of the Board were made up as under :----

31. The decrease and increase in most of the items being ordinary do not call for any special notice. A few important items may, however, be noticed here.

32. The expenditure on salaries &c., would appear to have increased by Rs. 662-6-11. The reason of this is that the salaries of teachers who were either promoted or newly engaged during the latter part of the previous year were paid for the full year during the year under report. One Urdu school was re-opened from the 1st of August 1901 in Rawiwar Peth and the salaries of the Head Master and the school peon were paid during the year. One teacher holding a 3rd year's certificate of the Poona Training College was engaged on a salary of Rs. 15 and the salaries of 5 teachers holding Public Service certificates were increased by rupee one each and the salary of the peon at Bhamburda School was also increased by rupee one. The decrease in items 1 (a), 2 (a), and 13 (a) is due to the grain compensation being not required to be paid to teachers and peons in Municipal schools during the year under report.

#### NOTES ON INCREASES IN EXPENDITURE.

- 1.— The increase in the establishment of the Head Office was due to the salary of the School Board clerk being increased by Rs. 5 during the year under report on account of inspection duty being devolved on him.
- 1.-- (b) The increase in contingencies was due to the printed forms in loose sheets and bound books being supplied to the Municipal Schools from the Government Central Press Bombay.
- 5-6— The increase in these two items was due to more furniture, books and maps being supplied to Municipal Schools. In the year under report, books were supplied gratis to the students in the Mahar Mang School No. 12 with a view to encourage the backward classes.
- 8.— The increase in this item was due to the special repairs of Bholâgir School No. 4 being completed and the usual repairs of other school houses being made in this year.
- 9.— This year, their Excellencies the Governor and Lady Northcote were pleased to pay visits to the Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School and the girls' school No. 4 in July and November 1901 respectively and the amount of Rs. 12-2 shown in this item was expended in purchasing flower garlands and making necessary arrangements.
- 11.— Yearly subscriptions of two monthly magazines were paid during the year under report.
- 12.— Pension contribution on the salary of one Drawing Master was paid into the Government Treasury.
- 14.— Special repairs of the Technical School roof and other petty repairs of the school house were made in the year under report.
- 17-18.—This year the Native General and Raste Peth Libraries were given grants-in-aid of Rs. 50 each.

33. House-rent.—The apparent increase in house-rent is small and does not call for explanation. The decrease in items 4, 7, & 10 is due to the schools having been closed on account of plague.

35. In the year under report the Board changed three school houses. The old ones were given up, and new ones, which are much more airy and spacious, were engaged. This arrangement was made with a small increase in rent.

36. The Technical School house is furnished with all the necessary articles of machinery and other appliances, such as, school desks, carpenter's benches, tables, shaftings and beltings. This year one Model Engine costing Rs. 30 and a grindstone valued Rs. 23-8 plus other charges Rs. 2-15-0 were purchased for the use of the school. Rs. 15 were received as Government grant for the Model Engine, a grant for the grindstone being declined by Government on the ground of its being a minor item.

37. It will not be out of place here to give the following table showing what the Municipality has been spending on education since the schools were transferred to it in 1884 :-

Technical Workshop (9) Rs. 297-10-6. About half of each of these sums was subsequently contributed by Government.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

1. With reference to the visit of His Excellency Lord Northcote, Dr. A. W. Thomson who takes unflagging interest in the Technical Institution conveyed the following remark indicating His Excellency's satisfaction with the work in that school.

"The work done by the pupils and shown to His Excellency was of high class and reflects credit in the Technical School staff."

The Board notes with pleasure a gift of some books and tools for the use of the Technical School made by Mr. Mahadeo Bapaji Sant.

There were some unpassed teachers who were advised in the previous year to pass the Public Service Examination or to join the Training College with reference to the Educational Inspector C. D.'s circular No. 299 dated 21st January 1901. Two have accordingly passed the Public Service Examination last year and one has appeared for that examination this year. The rest have been given further time of one year.

During the year under report Marathi Copy books prepared by Messrs. Longman Green & Co. Pombay, have been introduced in all the schools under circular letter No. 10046 dated 16th March 1901 of the Educational Inspector C. D. and it is hoped these books will be of greater use than the former loose kittas.

The visit of Her Excellency Lady Northcote to the girls' school No. 4 gave great pleasure and encouragement to the girls to whom sweets were bountifully distributed by Her Excellency who appeared to appreciate their songs. Thanks of the Municipality are due to Her Excellency Lady Northcote.

The visits by the Educational Inspector C.D., Col. Grant, Sir M.M. Bhao nagree M.P. and other respectable gentlemen and ladies are noticed in a statement (Appendix B.)

A regular written examination of all the Municipal schools was taken by Dr. V. R. Patwardhan, Messrs. Munshi Shaik Sardar, and H. N. Apte in the month of September 1901.

In conclusion the Board notes with pleasure the hearty co-operation of the several Members of the last Board and the substantial and intelligent help given by the Secretary of the Board R. B. M. K. Kumthekar. The Board acknowledges with pleasure the hard and intelligent work done by the clerk Mr. K. S. Mokashi who in addition to his official work inspected during the year under report, all the schools from time to time giving particular attention to the accuracy of the record and books in each school. The frequent inspection by and visits of Honorary Inspector Mr. W. P. Paranjpe must also be acknowledged and thanks of the Municipality should be conveyed to him for the interest he takes in the educational institutions of the City Municipality.
