1. There have been no changes in population or boundaries during the year.

II. Comments on Tabular Statement No. 1.

2. The number of meetings of the General Body held during the year was 93 as against 69 in the preceding year, and 505 items were disposed of as against 286 disposed of in the year 1916-17. Out of these 93 meetings there were four ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January as required by the Municipal Act, 24 were special and 65 adjourned meetings. 91 meetings of the Managing Committee were called during the year, out of which, 34 were adjourned for want of quorum as will be seen from Appendices I-B & I-D.

3. There were some changes in the personnel of the Municipality owing to (1) the resignation of the Executive Engineer for Drainage and Water Supply District as the District was abolished, the deaths of two councillors (2) Mr. M. G. Fulambrikar and (3) Mr. R. V. Patwardhan.

Mr. P. Bunter was nominated in place of the Executive Engineer. Mr. S. G. Fulambrikar and Prof. K. R. Kanitkar were returned in place of Messrs. M. G. Fulambrikar and R. V. Patwardhan at the Bye-elections held on 15th September 1917 and 20th March 1918 respectively.

4. For information regarding the constitution of several executive and consultative Committees and the attendance of the members thereat, reference is invited to the statement No. I-D.

III. Changes in the system of taxation.

5. The system of taxation did not undergo any change in the course of the year.

IV. Comments on Tabular statement Form No. II.

6. The year opened with a cash balance of Rs. 15,602. The Municipal income amounted to Rs. 6,58,097 which includes Rs. 93,957 drawn from

the Reserve Fund of the Municipality. It may be pointed out here that it is exclusive of receipt of octroi which were refunded (*vide* Government Resolution No. 1147 dated 19th February 1907 G. D.)

As compared with the previous year the total income in the year excluding "Extraordinary and Debt" shows an increase of Rs. 113697 which is due to the increased revenue from all heads of income except "Miscellaneous."

- (a) *Octroi*—As a separate chapter is devoted to Octroi detailed description of its recoveries etc., will be given there.
- (b) *House, Bhangee and Wheel taxes.*—These brought in in the year, Rs. 51,160, Rs. 38,213 & Rs. 8,180 respectively making a total of Rs. 97,553, as against Rs. 86,998 brought in, in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 10,555. Out of the increased amount of Rs. 10,555, Rs. 4,603 represents increase in Wheel Tax and is due to arrears of last year received during the year from the District Police Superintendent. The expenditure on roads is far in excess of the receipts from Wheel Tax, The amount of arrears recovered during the year was Rs. 5,937 as against Rs. 1,758 in the year 1916-17. The arrears at the close of the year 1916-17 were Rs. 6,545 while those that remained to be recovered at the end of March last were Rs. 5,798.
- (c) *The tax on profession and trades.*—This brought in Rs. 653 as against Rs. 1,228 in the preceding year showing a decrease of Rs. 595. These receipts depend on the number of marriages etc., that take place in the course of the year and hence the amount varies from year to year.
- (d) *Water rate.*—This brought in Rs. 59,861 as against Rs. 52,667 in 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 7,194 which is due to larger number of house connections taken by house owners. The number of house connections on 31st March 1918 was 3250.
- (e) *Trade Registration Fee.*—This brought in Rs. 20,406 in the year as against Rs. 16,192 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 4,214 which is due to more vigorous prose

ention of trade. It may be noted that receipts from Jaggery, paper, stationery, machines, etc., were higher; and also that as the prices of articles have gone high, there is a proportionate increase in fee.

- (f) *Tax on Plague huts.*—This brought in Rs. 1,643 in the year under report as against Rs. 587 in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 1,056. The increase is due to realizations of arrears of last year and to prompt recovery of dues on account of occupation of huts in the year under report.
- (g) *Dog-tax.*—This brought in Rs. 315 as against Rs. 286 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 29.
- (h) *Realizations under Special Acts; Founds.*—The income from this source of revenue was Rs. 1,604 as against Rs. 1,278 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 326. The number of cattle impounded in 1917-18 was 6488, whereas in 1916-17 it was 4575.
- (i) *Rent of lands, houses, etc.*—The income under this head was Rs. 1,060 as against Rs. 1,353 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 293. The decrease is due to less amount realised as rent on account of temporary encroachments on roads for erecting mandaps & for dinners.
- (j) *Sale proceeds of lands and produce of lands.*—The income from this source was Rs. 1,649 as compared with Rs. 2,286 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 637 which was due to less amount realised from the auction sales of grass, fruits &c.
- (k) *Conservancy receipts*—The income under this head consisted of the sale proceeds of poudrette and City refuse amounting to Rs. 810 and Rs. 20,761 respectively as compared with the corresponding figures of Rs. 4,986 and Rs. 11,697 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 4,888. The decrease in income from poudrette viz., Rs. 4,176 is explained by the fact that all the night-soil was in the year 1917-18 admitted into the sewers and was thus lost for manure. In future no income will be derived from this source.

The receipts from refuse show an increase of Rs. 10,064 which is explained by the fact that whereas in the previous year the income did not represent actual price of the refuse for the whole year, in the year under report refuse of the twelve months was available for sale. Further that in the previous year a portion of the refuse went towards production of the poudrette whereas in the year 1917-18 the whole of this refuse was available for sale.

- (l) *Fees and revenue from Educational Institutions.*—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 1,835 as against Rs. 1,731 in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 104.
- (m) *Fees and revenue from Markets and Slaughter houses.*—The income from this source was Rs. 45,275 during the year as against Rs. 40,107 in the last year showing an increase of Rs. 5,168. It is due to more amount realised on account of increased rents of Market stalls.
- (n) *Other fees.*—The income from this source consisted of notice, warrant and comparing fees. This amounted to Rs. 2,011 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,274 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 737. This increase is nominal as in the previous year, receipts on account of fees for comparing documents were credited to the head "miscellaneous" whereas in the year under report these receipts are shown under this head.
- (o) *Fines under the Municipal Acts.*—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 3,750 as against Rs. 2,064 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 1,686. This shows that more fines were imposed during the year under report than those in the previous year.
- (p) *Interest on investments.*—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 4,088 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,912 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 2,176. The interest on the Fixed Deposits drawn during the preceding year was added to the amounts of Deposit receipts.
- (q) *Grants and Contributions.*—The income under this head was Rs. 60,909 in the year under report as against Rs. 29,127 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 31,781. It is due to a special grant of Rs. 37,500 from Government for sanitary purposes. On the other hand the grant on account of the Technical School was not received in time. Similarly the sanitary grant on account of the contribution towards the pay of the Health Officer and his Assistants was only for one year viz. the year under report whereas in the previous year, the grant was received for two years.
- (r) *Recoveries on account of services rendered to private individuals.*—Orders from Public Institutions, Government Officers and private persons are executed at the Municipal Workshop. The amount recovered on this account in the year was Rs. 1,487 as against Rs. 4,474 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,987. The decrease is due partly to a smaller number of orders having been received by the Workshop

during the year on account of high prices of materials prevalent in the Bazar and further in the previous year an amount of Rs. 1,331 representing money that lapsed was shown under this head whereas these receipts *viz.*, Rs. 861 are shown under 'other items'.

- (s) *Other items*—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 969 in the year under report while it was Rs. 664 in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 305. In the year 1916-17 the amount that lapsed to Municipal Fund *i. e.* Rs. 1,331 was not shown under this head. On the other hand the receipts of fees for comparing documents &c. amounting to Rs. 695 are shown this year under "other fees" *viz.* Rs. 695, which is the proper place for their inclusion.
- (t) *Loans from Government*.—No loan was received from Government during the year.
- (u) *Advances*—Nil.
- (v) *Deposits*.—These amounted to Rs. 13,966 as against Rs. 31,718 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 17,752 which is due to less amounts lying unpaid during the year under report. The amount under this head does not take account of the Reserve Fund of the Municipality to meet additional expenses.

V. Working of the Octroi System.

7. The area under the administration of the Poona City Municipality for Octroi purposes, includes, in addition to the City Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona, the Suburban Municipal District and the Cantonment of Kirkee. The last had, at first, been added to the cordon as an experimental measure under certain conditions for three years from 1st August 1911, as sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 2004 dated 19th April 1909. G. D. but the period was further extended by two years by Government in their resolution No. 6,841 dated 3rd January 1915. From the year 1917 the old arrangement still continues but definite orders from Government for its continuance are not yet received. The area, therefore, includes four different units, The Municipality levies Octroi according to the schedule on articles imported into the Octroi cordon and after deducting the amount of duty refunded on account of articles exported and the establishment and other charges from the gross revenue, distributes the remainder among the Bodies except Kirkee according to the population of each District, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 4653 dated the 9th November 1895. Kirkee gets the net income from Octroi on its imports excluding all charges which are deducted from the gross revenue as was agreed to by the bodies, the City Municipality, and the Kirkee Cantonment Committee. The figures of income and expenditure given in this chapter are, therefore, for the whole of the Octroi Cordon including the four Districts and not for the City only, while the figures given in those parts of the report which relate to the City represent the income and the expenditure of the City only.

8. The gross income from Octroi in the year 1917-18 was Rs 3,45,923 including (Rs. 11,913 paid to the Cantonment of Kirkee) as against Rs. 2,71,055 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs 74,873.

9. Out of the gross revenue of Rs 3,45,928, Rs. 31,148 were refunded on account of exports. Rs. 24,936 were spent on establishment (including Chief Officer's establishment), Rs. 5,199 on contingencies, Rs. 252 on repairs to the Naka buildings, Rs. 50 on repairs to weigh bridges and Rs 850 on new Naka buildings and Rs. 442 on Police establishment. The amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment in the year was Rs. 11,913 as against Rs. 2,244 in the previous year. Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 74,745 as against Rs. 61,549; deducting this amount from the gross revenue the remainder i. e. Rs. 2,71,184 was distributed amongst the three bodies. The City Municipality's share which is exclusive of expenses including establishment charges amounted to Rs 2,00,168, that of the Cantonment Committee to Rs. 55,013 and that of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 16,003.

10. The amount of Rs. 31,148 was, as mentioned above, refunded in 1917-18 on account of exports, as against Rs. 30,987 in the year 1916-17. The increase is slight and needs no explanation.

11. The figures quoted above show the result of the working of the whole of the Octroi Department. They show gross income from and gross expenditure chargeable to Octroi. But the figures given in the statements Nos. 2 and 3 only, show the share of the City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. But it does not require separate explanation as it has already been given in the preceding paras, dealing with the whole of the Octroi system. The Octroi establishment cost 7.2 per cent of the gross income as against 8.9 per cent in the previous year. The decrease in percentage is due to the fact that Rs. 74,873 were recovered above last year's figure without any extra establishment.

12. The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of each of the eight classes of articles:—

It will be seen from the above that the average consumption is within the standard fixed under all heads except sugar, oil and oil seeds, drugs, spices, tobacco and piece goods. The rise under some heads is due to the rise in prices, which have gone up all round in the course of the last few years especially the last three years of the present war.

VI. Remarks on Tabular Statement No. II

13. Reference to statement No. III will show that the total expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 5,98,534. The details of the total expenditure are as follows:—

The total expenditure for the year 1917-18 shows an increase of Rs. 13,740 when compared to that for the previous year. All heads with the exception of B show an increase in expenditure. As the cases of increase and decrease will be explained in their proper places, it is unnecessary again to refer to them here in detail.

- (a) *General Administration.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 8,872, as compared with the expenditure of the last year. It is partly due to the high prices of stationery and partly to the amount of Rs. 4,827 on account of supervision charges in Octroi of the Chief Officer and Accountant Establishment not being brought last year to this head, but to the head "Collection of taxes".
- (b) *Collection of Taxes.*—The expenditure under this head viz., Rs. 23,805 consisted of the Octroi, and Assessment Establishment charges amounting to Rs. 19,406 and Rs. 4,399 respectively as against Rs. 22,577 and Rs. 4,411 (26988) of the last year. This is due to certain items such as supervision charges on account of collection having been debited last year to the Octroi Establishment.
- (c) *Refund.*—This shows a decrease of Rs. 129.

- (d) *Pensions and gratuities.*—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 66 which was due to less amount required to be spent on this account in the year under report.
- (e) *Fire.*—There is an increase of Rs. 433 as compared with the expenditure of the year 1916-17. The figures of expenditure show a regular increase in the sub-heads :—contingency, telephone establishment, rent of telephone etc ; the increase is due to the high prices of the materials on account of the present War. There were five fires in the City during the year under report and the total loss of property on that account, as roughly estimated, amounted to Rs. 925.
- (f) *Lighting.*—This shows a decrease of Rs. 532. It is due to less expenditure incurred under all sub-heads and especially on the head of purchasing new lamps and accessories.
- (g) *Police.*—No expenditure is incurred by the Municipality on this account.
- (h) *Water Supply—Capital Outlay.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 7,671. The reasons for this increase are that in the year under report an expenditure of Rs. 671 was incurred on Katraj Tank project and survey, and an expenditure of Rs. 2,056 and Rs. 3,223 was incurred on (1) provision of valves at the junction where the canal water and the Katraj duct water meet and (2) payment of Municipal share in re-buidling partition walls of the Settling Tanks respectively ; while in the previous year no such expenditure was incurred on this account.
- (i) *Water Supply repairs.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 14,619 as compared with the expenditure of the year 1916-17. It is due to some Bills for water drawn in the year 1916-17 having been paid during the year under report.
- (j) *Drainage—Capital Outlay.*—This shows a decrease of Rs. 42,263 as compared with the expenditure of the previous year. The Municipality had to pay smaller contributions as its share towards the capital cost of drainage works than in the last year. The new works are :—
- (1) Water connection to Pail Depot.
 - (2) New Pail Depot.
 - (3) Some works at Balancing Tank near Daruwalla Bridge.
 - (4) New House connections.
- (k) *Establishment and repairs.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 59,605 as compared with the expenditure of the previous year. The increase is due to the fact that a portion out of the last year's charges of maintenance of Drainage Works was paid off in the year under report.

Conservancy would thus appear to have cost in the year under report Rs. 2,438 more than in the previous year; some of the Sub-heads show increase while some show decrease; as the reasons of the increase and decrease are explained in the following paras, it is not necessary to enter into details at this place.

- (1) *General Supervising Establishment.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 220 which is slight.
- (2) *Road cleaning.*—This includes the cost of road sweeping establishment, new carts, dust-bins and repairs to the same, removal of rubbish from the City and charges incident to it. The total expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 20,984 in the year under report as against Rs. 33,191 in the year 1916-17. The main reason of the decrease in the expenditure is that in the year under report an expenditure of Rs. 2,240 was shown on the removal of kachra as compared with Rs. 15,818 in the preceding year. The expenditure of the maintenance of Municipal bullocks utilised for removal of kachra was not shown to this source but it was shown, as a whole, to the head "Bhangi Service." The increase on some heads—establishment, new dust-bins, new kachra carts and repairs to kachra carts has been compensated by the decrease on other heads—contingency, repairs to old carts, dust-bins and removal of roddas.
- (3) *Bhangi service.*—The expenditure under this head includes the pay of bhangees, new night-soil carts, repairs to old night-soil carts, contingency, purchase and feeding of bullocks. The Bhangee service cost Rs. 32,472, in the year under report as

against Rs. 31,005 showing an increase of Rs. 1,467. The new night-soil carts cost Rs. 1,023 as against Rs. 924 showing an increase of Rs. 99. The repairs to old carts cost Rs. 2,748 as against Rs. 1,540 showing an increase of Rs. 1,208; contingency cost Rs. 1,273 as against Rs. 885 showing an increase of Rs. 388 and the feeding of bullocks cost Rs. 44,604 as against Rs. 7,004 showing an increase of Rs. 34,600. All heads show an increase. In the year under report there was no expenditure under the heads carting away night-soil and sullage, purchase of bullocks, and sheds for bullocks, while in the previous year the expenditure under those heads was as follows.—

still the whole head shows an increase of Rs. 16,569 which is due to the expenditure of feeding bullocks for kachra removal being shown to this head.

- (4) *Night-soil Depots.*—The expenditure under this head includes rent of Depots, repairs to Depots and Depot establishment. The total cost of these was Rs. 3,522 in the year under report as against Rs. 5,727 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,205. The decrease is due to smaller establishment maintained at Depots for preparing manure heaps.
- (5) *Latrines and Urinals.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,392 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,751 in the year 1916-17 showing a decrease of Rs. 359. The decrease is due to new latrines and urinals not having been constructed and a smaller number of urinals having been repaired; on the other hand, more latrines were repaired and urinals were frequently washed.
- (6) *Road watering.*—Road watering cost Rs. 3,547 in the year under report as against Rs. 4,017 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 470. The decrease is due to reduction in the number of water carts.
- (7) *Miscellaneous.*—This shows an increase of Rs. 271. It was due to more expenditure incurred in providing uniforms to servants during the year under report.
- (m) *Charges on account of Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors.*—The charge is debited to this new head as per Govern-

ment Resolution No. 936 dated 7th February 1916 G. D. and the expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 6,715 as against Rs. 6,868 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 153 as the place of one of the Sanitary Inspectors who was on leave without pay remained vacant for about four months. This expenditure has been taken out from the main head "General Supervising Establishment".

- (n) *Hospital and Dispensaries.*—The Municipality maintains three Dispensaries, at two of which, English drugs are used and in one Native drugs; the latter therefore goes by the name of Deshi Dawakhana. There are other Charitable Institutions such Infirm Asylum, the Leper Asylum, Dufferin Fund, David Sassoon Hospital Nursing Fund and King Edward Memorial Hospital to which the Municipality pays grants in aid. The total expenditure on this account amounted to Rs. 10,447 in the year under report as against Rs. 7,571 in the preceding year showing an increase of Rs. 2,876. The reasons for the increase are as follows:—

The expenditure incurred in purchasing medicines for the Municipal Dispensaries was Rs. 2,091 in the year under report, whereas it was Rs. 901 in the previous year as the rates of medicines have gone very high. The contribution to Nursing Fund was Rs. 600 as against nil in the last year.

- (o) *Plague.*—It would suffice to remark here, that the usual precautionary measures were taken by the Municipality with a view to prevent an epidemic breaking out and to lesson its vigour when once broken out. The total cost on account of Plague and the necessary precautions taken on that account was Rs. 28,058 as against Rs. 30,203 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,145. The Infectious Diseases Hospital cost Rs. 8,835 in the year under report as against Rs. 16,415 spent in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 7,580 which was due to the mild type of the epidemic during the year under report. This Hospital has been under the management of the Committee with the Collector of Poona as its Chairman. The Municipality has no direct hand in its management; it is, however, represented on the Committee by two of its members. Plague broke out throughout the City during the year under report. It was of a mild type and lasted for more than six months. The Municipality has allowed the Military authorities to make use of the Health Camps. The huts at East Bhamburda have been removed as the land on which they stood was acquired by Government. So the Municipality retains control of only one set of huts at Erandayna

which were thoroughly repaired and people were accommodated in that Camp only during the epidemic; and comparatively decent sum was received on account of rent for the Health Camp. The Municipality kept in order the Erandavna Health Camp and maintained the establishment for it; but as the Bhamburda West Camps were not available, many people had to live in the City as they had no other shelter to go out. The rat campaign was continued throughout the year under the direct control of the Officer appointed by Government on that account. The Municipality paid a sum of Rs 7,337 on account of its share of the total cost of the rat campaign.

- (p) *Vaccination*.—This cost of Rs. 1,044 shows a decrease of Rs. 171 over the preceding year's expenditure of Rs. 1,215. This is due to less expenditure on the Vaccination Establishment; but there is an increase in contingency.
- (q) *Other Sanitary requirements*.—This new item is introduced under Government Resolution No. 936 dated 7th February 1916 G. D. It includes the cost of measures for the prevention of epidemic diseases such as small pox and cholera and of sanitary measures for the prevention of malaria such as destruction of rank vegetation etc. The expenditure on this head is Rs. 87 which represents the cost incurred on removing prickly pear. As there was no out-break of cholera in the year under report, no expenditure is incurred on that account whereas in the previous year the cost of preventive measures of Cholera was Rs. 25. In the year 1916-17 the expenditure on removing prickly pear was Rs. 99. Thus there is a decrease of Rs. 37 on this head.
- (r) *Markets and slaughter houses*—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 7,965 in the year under report as against Rs. 7,449 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 516. This is due partly to erection of a wall and a public cistern and to uniforms having been supplied to servants.
- (s) *Pounds*.—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 597 in the year as against Rs. 536 in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 61. This is due to the increase in the expenditure on contingency and repairs to building.
- (t) *Public Gardens*—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 724 as against Rs. 643 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 81. This is due mostly to the increased expenditure on planting trees and maintenance of Ambarkhana Garden.
- (u) *Veterinary charges*.—This usually represents the annual contribution of Rs. 300 which the Municipality pays towards the Local Veterinary Dispensary. The contribution in the year

under report as well as in the year 1916-17 is the same amount.

- (v) *Registration of Births and Deaths.*—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 504 as against nil in the previous year. This charge represents the pay of three clerks appointed to issue death passes and to prepare returns. It is shown under this head in the year while it was shown in previous years under the head "Plague establishment and contingency". The number of births reported and registered in the year under report was 1,140 as against 909 registered in the previous year. The total number of births registered in the year gives a ratio of 9·72 per mille as against 7·75 in the year 1916-17.

As regards the deaths, it may be stated that the total number registered in the year was 6,744 as against 8,153 in the preceding year. Those are classified as under:—Plague 1693, Cholera 31, Small-pox 182 and other causes 4,838. The total mortality gives a death ratio of 58·51 per mille in the year 1917-18.

- (w) *Public Works Establishment.*—This includes the cost of the Public Works Establishment, Parwangi Establishment and uniforms. The total cost of expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 7,374 in the year under report as against Rs. 5,813 showing an increase of Rs. 1,861. The increase is due to the fact that in the year under report, the Parwangi Establishment costing Rs. 1,240 is included under this head while in the year 1916-17 the expenditure on the same was shown under road widening; uniforms were supplied to the servants in the year under report, Similarly Rs. 518 were spent in giving increments due to the servants of the Public Works Department.
- (x) *Building repairs.*—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 4,220 in the year as against Rs. 2,751 in the year 1916-17 showing an increase of Rs. 1,469. The increase is explained by the fact that an expenditure of Rs. 3,079 was incurred on acquisition of land for cremation. On the other hand an amount of Rs. 208 was spent on repairs to buildings in the year under report as against Rs. 395 in the preceding year. Similarly there is a decrease of Rs. 875 in the expenditure on new works and maintenance of cremation ghats.
- (y) *Road repairs and road widening.*—The maintenance and improvements of roads in the year under report cost Rs. 42,817 as against Rs. 36,525 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 6,292; out of the total expenditure of Rs. 42,817, Rs. 27,710 were spent on road repairs, and Rs. 15,107 on road widening as against Rs. 29,202 and Rs. 7,322 spent on them in

the previous year. As regards road repairs it may be stated that they include remetalling a certain length of road, repairs to lanes and murum roads with gravel and murum, patching damaged portions of roads, removal of mud during the monsoon, repairs to Steam Rollers and sundries such as painting the boundary stones and temporary Establishment, etc. Out of the expenditure of Rs. 27,710 on road repairs, Rs. 13,204 were spent on the Budhwar Chowk new road and the amount of Rs. 14,506 only was available for road repairs. The decrease in the expenditure on road repairs is due to less amount sanctioned in the Budget of the year. The total length of roads repaired during the year was 6.33 miles with an average width of 20 ft. As regards road widening, it may be stated that the total cost to the Municipality on this account was Rs. 15,107 showing an increase of Rs. 7,785 over the cost on this head during the previous year. The increase is due to a large number of claims for compensation of the lands acquired, having been paid in the year under report.

(z) *Stores.*—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 59 showing a decrease of Rs. 209 over the expenditure in the previous year. The decrease is due to no new tools and plants having been purchased in the year under report.

(a-a) *Town Planning.*—The Municipality declared its intention to make a Town Planning Scheme in respect of some portion of the area of the City limits under its resolution 174 dated 12th December 1916 as the Government approved extension of the T. P. Act to Bhamburda and Yerandavna under G. O. No. 6593 dated 25-8-1915 G. D. Its intention was notified to the public. After considering public objections and suggestions in the matter Government sanctioned the making of the Scheme *vide* their order No. 943 G. D. dated 10-2-1917. The Municipality engaged an establishment to prepare a scheme of the portion of the City for which the Government has given its sanction; the expenditure incurred on that account in the year under report was Rs. 2,806; this being a new item of expenditure.

(a-b) *Public Instructions:—Schools and Colleges.*—The Administration Report of the School Board will be found in Appendix XI of the Report wherein is given the full account of the working of the Schools. It is not therefore necessary to enter into details in this place. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure on Schools in the year under report amounted to Rs. 54,458 as against Rs. 50,821 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 3,637. The increase is to be explained by the fact that more expenditure was incurred on the following sub-heads *viz.*, pay of teachers, house-rent, new furni-

ture, scientific apparatus, gratuity, grain compensation &c. On the other hand no expenditure was incurred on new books while it was Rs. 200 in the previous year; there is also a decrease of expenditure on the sub-heads-repairs to School Houses, gymnasium &c.

(a-c) *Contribution.*—There is no expenditure under this head in the year under report as grants to private Schools were discontinued from the year 1916-17.

(a-d) *Libraries and Museums.*—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 283. The decrease is to be explained by the fact that no expenditure was incurred in the year on the Municipal Office Library while it was Rs. 34 in the previous year. The School Board has thrown the responsibility of maintaining the museum on the shoulders of the trustees. During the year no expenditure was incurred on maintaining the Museum and also very few books for the Teachers' Library were purchased in the year and hence there is a decrease of Rs. 38.

(a-e) *Interest on loans.*—The expenditure under this head is Rs. 38,634 which represents the interest during the year under report on the loan of Rs. 10 lacs drawn by the Municipality from Government by four instalments since the year 1912. In the previous year the information regarding the amounts debited to repayment of principal and interest being not available from the Accountant General till the last day of the completion of the report, the division could not be shown in the year; and hence the item shows an increase of Rs. 38,634.

(a-f) *Work done for private individuals.*—This shows a decrease of Rs. 1101 which is due to less out-turn of work for private individuals.

(a-g) *Address.*—No address of welcome was presented in the year under report.

(a-h) *Loss Account.*—There was an expenditure of Rs. 17 on this account in the year under report as against nil in the previous year.

(a-i) *Election.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 969 and was incurred in preparing a new Election roll for the year and for bye-elections held on 15th September 1917 and 20th March 1918 to fill up places caused by the deaths of Messrs M. G. Fulambrikar and R. V. Patwardhan. This shows an increase of Rs. 373 over the expenditure in the previous year.

(a-j) *Printing.*—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 836 showing an increase of Rs. 348 over the expenditure of the previous year. This increase is due to the fact that services of some addi-

tional compositors were engaged to meet the pressing demand of work in the Press.

- (a-k) *Destroying stray dogs.*—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 38 showing an increase of Rs. 3 over the expenditure of the previous year which is slight.
- (a-l) *Law charges.*—There is an increase of Rs. 887 as compared with the expenditure during the previous year. This is due to more remuneration that had to be paid to defend civil suits in the law courts on behalf of the Municipality in the year under report.
- (a-m) *Contribution to Pasteur Institute at Coonoor.*—There is a decrease of Rs. 32 under this head over the expenditure of the last year. This is due to the fact that no charges were paid to patients who were residents of Poona City and proceeded to Coonoor for anti-rabic treatment as they were borne by Government as per G. R. No. 5344 dated 5th August 1916.
- (a-n) *Lunatic maintenance charges.*—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 1502 in the year under report as against Rs. 3,473 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,971. The decrease is due to the fact that the Municipality has had to pay less as per Government Order No. 1557 dated 7th April 1917 than in the previous year. This expenditure represents the charges of the maintenance of poor lunatics coming from the Poona City who were permanent residents of Poona City or habitual visitors. The Municipality have to pay this cost since 18th March 1915 (*vide* G. R. No. 4091 of the same date).
- (a-o) *Refund of money lapsed to Municipal Fund after three years.*—Nil.
- (a-p) *Grain compensation.*—As the prices of the daily articles of necessity have gone very high Municipal servants drawing salaries not exceeding Rs. 30 were allowed grain compensation. The expenditure on this account was Rs. 4,745 during the year under report.
- (a-q) *Investment.*—The amount of Rs. 2,558 for Heavy Repair Fund for the year 1915-16, 1916-17 and 1917-18 were invested in purchasing the Cash Certificates of the War Loan.
- (a-r) *Repayment of Loan.*—The expenditure under this head represents a portion of the principal of Rs. 10 lacs to be repaid to Government. The Municipality paid Rs. 50,322 to Government as 6th and 7th instalments of repayment of Loan which the Accountant General adjusted by showing Rs. 11,698 to principal and Rs. 38,634 to interest.

(a-s) *Deposits.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 13,902 as against Rs. 73,864 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 59,962; this decrease is explained mainly by the fact that in the previous year amounts of Rs. 39,238 and Rs. 2,578 were received from Government as its share of the cost of supplementary Drainage Works and the re-construction of the Baffle walks in the Settling Tanks.

(a-t) *Advances.*—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 3,679 which represents the advances given to the Chief Officer and the Health Officer for emergent works.

VII. Acquisition of Land.

14. 10 pieces of land were purchased in the year under report for Rs. 16,078-11-8 as against seven pieces of land measuring Sqr. Ft. (1696-8-7½) purchased in the previous year for Rs. 4,836.

VIII. Audit of Accounts.

15. The Municipal accounts for the year 1916-17 were audited by Mr. V. M. Sathe and Mr. V. J. Bapat of the Local Audit Department. The audit was commenced on 25th June 1917 and lasted till 24th August 1917.

IX. Municipal wants.

16. The question of carrying out supplementary works so as to make the Drainage Scheme a real blessing to the Municipality still remains unsolved. The Government experts are preparing estimates in regard to these works; but unless these works are put in hand, it cannot be said that the Drainage of the City is properly looked after. Similarly the two Peths Nana and Bhavani which adjoin the Cantonment area must be provided with an up-to-date Drainage system. Distribution of the Water Supply by providing suitable sized pipes through-out the City is another important question, which has to be solved by the Municipality. The draft scheme in connection with the Bhamburda Town Development is ready and will shortly be submitted to Government for sanction. This scheme as it stands at present is estimated to cost Rs. three lacs roughly. All these Schemes are in their own way very urgent ones, and the difficulty with the Municipality is how to finance them.

General remarks.

17. Government in their Resolution No. 5196 dated the 28th September 1904 extended the Bombay Municipal Servants Act (V of 1890) to the Poona City Municipality so far as it relates to persons employed by or on behalf of the Municipality to perform any of the duties specified (i) in class I of the schedule of the said Act, and (ii) in Classes (a) and (c) of Class II of the said Schedule. In the year under report, the Bhangees and other Municipal servants worked quietly.

18. Before concluding, I would place on record my sense of obligation to the various working Committees and special Committees for the interest they took in Municipal matters. I would also recognise the assistance given and work done by Mr. K. P. Paranjpye, the Chief Officer and by the other officers and their staff of the Poona City Municipality.

Mr. Suleman Shet Ladha gave a sum of Rs. 500/- as an endowment for Scholarships to be awarded to deserving Mahomedan boys in Urdu Schools under the control of the Municipality and also to Mahomedan boys passing from vernacular standard and also to mahomedan boys passing from Vernacular standard and entering the Anglo-Vernacular Schools.

6. I have the honour to submit the following report on the Administration of the Municipal Schools for the year 1917-18.

2. *Members* :—The School Board consisted in the year under report of (1) The Hon'ble Mr. R. P. Paranjpye, M. A. B. Sc. (2) Mr. L. B. Bhopatkar, M. A. LL. B. (3) The Hon'ble Mr. E. H. Jaffer (4) The Hon'ble Mr. B. S. Kamat, B. A. (5) Dr. K. G. Lohokare, B. A. (6) Rao Bahadur Ram Narayan Amarchand and (7) myself.

There were no changes effected in the personnel of the Board during the year under report.

3. *Meetings and visits to Schools* :—There were 18 meetings of the School Board in the year under report as against 31 of the previous year. Business was transacted at 11 meetings, the rest had to be adjourned for want of quorum. 123 items of business were disposed of at these meetings and 123 by circulation as against 228 and 101 respectively in the previous year.

As the attendance of the members at the meetings of the Board is shown in a different place (*vide* Appendix 1-D of the General Report) there is no necessity of repeating the same here.

Members of the School Board paid surprise visits to the Schools in their charge on several occasions. Besides, the President of the Municipality and other Municipal Councillors occasionally visited the schools.

The Superintendent of Municipal Schools is now a permanent fixture in the administration of the Board, and the presence of such an Officer is bringing about steady improvement in the administration. The post was given to Mr.

S. D. Dixit, a Graduate of the Bombay University who was taken up on probation. He joined in March 1918.

4. In the year under report the School Board had thirty seven Municipal Schools, as also the Technical School under its management. Of these, 16 were Boys' Day Schools, 8 Girls' Day Schools and 2 Night Schools, teaching Marathi, 1 Gujarathi School and 10 Urdu Schools, 5 for Boys, 4 for Girls and 1 Night School. Four Night Schools were closed during the year as it was found that the attendance was very poor. This course had also been recommended by the Educational Authorities. Of the Boys' Schools, 11 are entirely free Schools. All Night Schools and Girls' Schools are free. Out of the 11 Boys' Free Schools, 2 are for the Depressed Classes, 3 for Mahomedans and 6 for other castes.

5. *Pupils in Primary Schools*:—The number on the rolls decreased in the course of the year from 3774 to 3535. Owing to the prevalence of Plague in the City at an unusual season, the Schools had to be closed from 22nd December 1917 to 23rd February 1918. The epidemic was of a severe type and many pupils did not rejoin after till the end of March. Out of the total number of 3535 on the rolls, on the last day of the year, there were 2159 boys and 74 girls in the Boys' Day Schools, 1264 girls in Girls' Schools and 38 boys in the Night Schools. Information regarding their caste, age, social condition and the profession of their parents and guardians is given in Appendix I (A) & (B) and (C).

There were in the year under report 602 boys and 461 girls above 5 and under 8 years of age as against 643 boys and 449 girls of the previous year, 943 boys and 712 girls above 8 and under 12 years as against 1177 boys and 834 girls of the previous year, 308 boys and 184 girls above 12 and under 15 years as against 339 boys and 137 girls of the previous year and 74 boys and 6 girls above 15 years of age as against 123 boys and 60 girls of the previous year. Nearly 2.4 per cent of the boys and 1.5 per cent of the girls were married as against 1.8 and 3.3 respectively of the previous year.

6. *Attendance*.—The following table shows the comparative attendance in Schools during 1916-17 and 1917-18.

This shows a decrease in daily attendance which is due to the prevalence of the Plague in the City. Appendix (I-D) will give detailed information regarding attendance in these Schools.

7. *Teachers*:—There were on the 31st of March 1918, 189 teachers working in Primary Schools, as against 180 of the previous year; of these 128 were men and 61 women (*vide* Appendix II and II (2) for information regarding their distribution and qualifications.) There were 22 Head Masters and 12 Head Mistresses of whom 80 are trained and 4 untrained. In order to increase the number of trained teachers, the Board grants permission every year to a certain number of teachers to appear for Training College tests. Of the 189 teachers, 95 are trained and 94 untrained as against 88 and 92 respectively of the previous year. 863 boys and 646 girls were under trained teachers and 1064 boys and 717 girls were under untrained teachers.

8. *The Annual Examination of Schools*:—The Municipal Schools were examined by the Deputy Educational Inspector of the District and his Assistants from 5th June to 30th June 1917. Only the fourth standard of every Municipal School was examined by them. Appendix II (B) will give information regarding the result of the Examination. The Deputy Educational Inspector wrote as follows about the Schools:—

“ Due allowance being given to the dislocation caused by Plague, it may be said that all Municipal Schools have done their level best to show a fair year’s work and to make up for the lost ground. Generally speaking the Girls’ Schools have shown better sort of work than the Boys’ Schools. Drawing, needle work and singing are fairly well attended to in most of the Schools.”

1309 boys were presented for Examination from I to VII Standards of whom 855 passed, 693 boys from the infant classes were presented for the Examination of whom 334 passed.

It will be seen that the Schools show a fair amount of progress from the above remarks. Only 3 Full Primary Schools were maintained by the Municipality *viz.*, 1 Marathi for Boys, 1 Marathi for Girls and 1 for Urdu Boys.

9. *Technical School*:—(a) There were in the Victoria Jubilee Technical School proper 32 students on the 31st March 1918. All of them had to learn drawing which is compulsory, 29 were learning carpentry, 7 smithy, 3 metal turning and 25 sign-board painting. 27 were Brahmins, 1 low caste and 8 belonged to other castes.

- (b) There are in the Technical School special Classes for drawing for the benefit of students who cannot become regular students of the Schools. Students attending them are charged fees at the rate of 2 as p. m. Teachers and students from Municipal and aided Schools, and the Local Training College are exempt from the payment of fees. These Classes were attended during the year under report by 5 students from Municipal and other Schools.
- (c) The School has been under the supervision of Mr. K.G. Kelkar, a Graduate of the Bombay Technical Institute. Mr. Kelkar has considerable practical experience and conducts the School in an efficient manner.
- (d) During the year under report the School was examined by Mr. T. Dowson.
- (e) The School sends up students for the Elementary and Intermediate Examination in Drawing of the School of Art. 6 boys were sent up for the Elementary Examination, of whom 4 passed; 3 appeared for the Intermediate Examination, of whom 2 came out successful.
- (f) Four students out of a total of sixteen appeared for the First Year Examination of the Technical School; nine appeared for the Second Year and three for the third Year Examination of whom 9, 9, 3 respectively came out successful. Those boys who had completed the course, were given certificates. The results show the satisfactory progress the School is making. All the students on the rolls could not present themselves at the Examinations owing to the prevalence of Plague.

10. *Drawing Classes*:—These Classes were discontinued from the last year as they considered to be not very useful. Mr. Gondhalekar Drawing Teacher has now been working in the Technical School.

11. *Income*:—Appendix III gives information regarding the funds at the disposal of the Board. In the year 1917/18 the general income shows a decrease over that of the preceding year. The causes of increase and decrease are as follows:—

- (1) *Fees in Primary Schools*:—There is an increase of Rs. 103 in School fees over the income of the previous year.
- (2) *Government grant-in-aid*:—(a) The grant for contract Schools for the year under report is the same as that of the previous year.
- (b) *Government grant-in-aid to Technical School*:—(1) The grant received from Government this year is Rs. 883 as against Rs. 1213 of the previous year. Here the amount shows a decrease of Rs. 330.

(II) *Miscellaneous grants on the 1st and 2nd Grade Art Examination*:—No grant received for this year. Last year it was Rs. 149-8-0. This adds to the decrease.

(3) *Income from the land attached to the free School in Nana's Peth*:—There is a piece of land attached to the free School in Nana's Peth. The income received from this piece was Rs. 14 as against Rs. 9 of the previous year. Besides half the ground is rented on lease to the Depressed Classes Mission Society.

(4) *Local Fund Cess on lands within Municipal limits*:—No cess was received during the year under report. Last year it amounted to Rs. 192-2-0. So there is a decrease of Rs. 192-2-0.

(5) *Technical School Fees*:—The total amount received as fees is Rs. 8 as against Rs. 11-13-0 of the previous year.

(6) *Donations*:—The funds that have been placed at the disposal of the Municipality brought in Rs. 177-8-0 as against Rs. 198-8-0 of the previous year. But the amount was received after the end of the year under report, and so could not be shown as part of the income during the year.

12. *The funds at the disposal of the Board were made up as follows* :—

13. *Expenditure*:—Details regarding the expenditure incurred on Primary Schools, the V. J. Technical School and other Institutions are given in Appendices IV and IV-A with its accompaniments. It will be seen that the total expenditure incurred on public instruction by this Municipality amounted to Rs. 54,627 thus showing an increase of Rs. 3,414 over that of the previous year. The following remarks on the several heads will explain the difference :—

(1) *Establishment of the School Board Office*:—The total expenditure on this item is Rs. 1,313. There is a decrease of Rs. 33.

(a) *Contingency including printing of forms etc*:—The total amount under this head is Rs. 445 as against Rs. 420 of the previous year. The increase is Rs. 25.

(2) *Salaries of Masters and Mistresses and peons with Pension Fund*:—This year the increase of Rs. 420 on this item is due to revision of the Establishment Schedule.

- (3) *Rent of School buildings*:—The increase of this item is due to higher rates of rent.
- (4-8) *Contingencies including sewing materials, sweetmeats &c*:—There is a decrease of Rs. 23 which is slight and needs no explanation.
- (9) *Repairs to School buildings*.—Rs. 508 were spent on repairs to School buildings in the course of the year. Repairs to all Schools were carried out, but bills could not be paid before the end of the year as they were received late.
- (12) *Scientific Apparatus*:—In all Rs. 375 were spent during the year under report, in the purchase of Scientific Apparatus.
- (13) *Gymnasium*:—This includes the pay of two Talim Masters. In all Rs. 262 were spent on this head as against Rs. 384 of the previous year.
- (18) *Technical School Establishment*:—The expenses incurred on this item were Rs. 2,665 as against Rs. 2,619 of the previous year. Thus there is an increase of Rs. 46.
- (19) *Contingency and Scholarship to the Technical School*:—The sum spent for this item was Rs. 296 as against Rs. 262 of the previous year, thus causing an increase of Rs. 34.
- (20) *Grain Compensation*:—Rs. 3,063 were spent on this item owing to the high prices of various necessaries of life.

In the report for last year I had drawn the attention of the Municipality to the very unsatisfactory condition of many of the school houses and the necessity of seriously taking up the question for solution. I had also referred to the representation made by the School Board to Government for a free grant of Rs. 50,000 for sites and buildings. It is satisfactory to note that Government have favourably considered the case and sanctioned a grant of Rs. 50,000 provided the Municipality on its part undertakes to spend an equal amount during 5 years. Although the request made by the School Board for a free grant has not been granted, the School Board feels grateful to Government for sanctioning this large amount on a half loan half grant system even in these hard times. The School Board has been generously treated in this matter in two ways first by having the whole amount of the grant paid to it in advance practically and the School Board looks forward to housing its schools, at no distant date, in buildings owned by the Municipality, and secondly in permitting the School Board to spread its expenditure of an equal amount over a number of years. The Government order is at present before the Municipality for consideration and the School Board hopes that the liberal conditions laid down by Government will be accepted. When this is done a substantial beginning will have been made in the direction of solving the problem.

Mr. S. D. Dixit the Superintendent of Municipal Schools performed the duties of his office only for about a fortnight during the year under report. Mr. Dixit is an energetic young man and I hope he will give satisfaction by his work.

I cannot conclude this report without referring to the valuable help rendered by the Secretary Mr. K. P. Paranjpye in the administration of the affairs of the large number of schools managed by the School Board.
