## 1. CHANGES IN POPULATION OR BOUNDARIES.

( a ) The population, as counted at the census of 1921 , is $1,33,227$ and this figure is taken as the basis for all calculations during the year under report.
(b) The southern boundary of the city was amended during the year, as some lands were omitted in the previous notification of city limits. There has also been a slight change in the northern boundary, which now runs by the southern side of the new Railway Bridge, which has been constructed just to the north of the old Railway Bridge. These changes were sanctioned under G R. G. D. No. 5914 dated 12-9-1925.
.. 11. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO. 1.
2. The newly elected body assumed office on $8-4-25$ when its first meeting was held and the office bearers and Sub-Committees elected. In the year under report there were 51 meetings of the General Committee, as against 77 in the preceding year, and 579 items of business were disposed of as against 550 disposed of in the year 1924-25. Out of these 51 meetings, four were ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January as required by the Municipal Act; 16 were special and 31 adjourned meetings. 59 Meetings of the Managing Committee were called during the year under report. Out of these 2 were adjourned for want of quorum. The attendance at meetings will be seen from appendices I-B, I-C and I-D.
3. There were two changes in the personnel of the board during the year under report. Mr. Haiderail's election was set aside by the District Court and Mr. Gulam Dastagir was duly elected in his place. Mr. Umarsaheb died on 29-1-26 and in his place Mr. Chandbhoy Manekbhoy was elected by the Mahomedan ward. There were no changes in the officers.
4. For information regarding the constitution of the several executive and consulitative committees and the attendance of members thereat, reference is invited to the Appendix I-D.

5. The revised scale of taxation on Motor Vebicles came into operation from 1-7.25.

## (2) <br> IV COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO. II.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. $1,08,063$, the income amounted to Rs. $16,92,819$, and both these together made up a total of Rs. $18,00,882$. It may be pointed out that the income shown here, as well as in the following paras, is the net income. It is exclusive of the octroi duty, collected but subsequently refunded (vide G. R. G. D. No. 1174 dated 19th February 1907). The income for the year consisted of the following items:-

As compared with the previous year's total the income (leaving aside "Extraordinary and Debt") shows an increase of Rs. 2,23,931, which is due to increased revenue from Municipal rates and taxes.
(a) Octroi:- As a separate chapter is devoted to octroi, fuller description of its working will be given there.
(b) House Tax:-Rs. 1,19,462 ( 24-25 ); Rs. 1,58,844 ( $25-26$ ): Increase Rs. 39,382 . This is due to greater realisation of arrears than in 1924-25, as well as to the revision of bousetax which came into force from 1st April 1925.

The large amount of increase in the Drainage tax is due to the progress of the drainage work as well as the recovery of past arrears after settlement of the outstanding disputes. Out of the total collection of Rs. 60,689 on account of Privy tax Rs. 48,887 were collected on account of private latrines, the balance of Ks. 11,802 being on account of non-privy cess which is utilized for maintainingpublic latrines. The increase is due to the better recovery of past arrears.

The increase is mainly due to the new rates of tax on motor vebicles coming into operation from 1-7-25.

Details about the recovery of arrears of taxes are given in appendix IX of this report.

(o) Tax on professions and trades:-Rs. 12,269 (24-25), Rs. 11,295 (25-26). Decrease of Rs 974 is due to less income from the fees for playing musical bands in streets which showed a net decrease of Rs. 880 . Similarly income from tax on entertainments fell by Rs. 717, but the income from hotel tax rose by Rs. 850/-.
(d) Water rate:-Rs. 1,00,181 (24-25); Rs. 1,18,252 ( $25-26$ ). Increase of Rs. 18,071 is due to additional revenue from new connections given during the year as well as to the recovery of all the outstanding dues.
(e) Realisations under special Acts:-Rs. 4,727 (24-25). Rs. 5,579 (25-26). Increase of Rs. 852, is due to the greater receipts from the cattle pound on account of credit of unclaimed amounts from sale of cattle.
( $f$ ) Rent of lands and houses etc:-Rs. 1,950 ( 24-25 ). Rs, 2,795 (25-26 ) - Increase Rs. 845.
(g) Sale proceeds of lands and produce of lands:-Rs. 2412 (24-25). Rs. 1,960 (25-26). Decrease Rs. 452.
( $h$ ) Conservancy receipts:-Rs. 13,124 (24-25). Rs. 13,133 (25-26). Increase Rs. 9. The receipts are from the sale of manure that was on hand.
(i) Fees and Revenue from Educational Institutions:-Rs. 3,357 ( $24-25$ ), Rs. 3,545 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs. 188. The increase is due to better realisation of the Primary School fees.
(j) Fees and Revenue from Marliets and Slaughter houses::-Rs. 60,611 ( $24-25$ ), Rs. 63,876 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs, 3,265. This is due to better realisations from the auction sales of stalls in the Reay Market as well as to the increased revenue from the Bhamburda Cattle Market.

(b) Fines under the Municipal and Police Acts:-Rs, 3,396 (24-25). Rs. 5,958 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs. 2,562. There was a larger number of prosecutions for Building permission cases and encroachments on public Roads.
(m) Interest on investments:-Rs. 10,114 (24-25). Rs. 2997 ( 25-26 ). Decrease Rs. 7117. This is due to the smaller amount of investments bearing interest.

( $n$ ) : Grants and Contributions:-Rs. 2,31,482 (24-25). Rs. 3,52,934 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs. 1,21,452. Rs. 2,65,000 were received as grant-in-aid for the new Drainage Scheme instead of Rs, $1,30,000$ in the year 1924-25.
(0) Recoveries on account of services rendered to private indivi-duals:-Rs. 8,225 ( $24-25$ ). Rs. 5,407 ( 25-26 ). Decrease Rs. 2,818 is due to less work done.
( $p$ ) Other Items:-Rs. 3,301 (24-25). Rs. 7907 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs. 4606 due to Rs. 6156 and odd being adjusted on account of arears : outstanding for more than three years against Rs. 2756 adjusted in 1924-25.
(p-1) Receipits from Municipal Workishop, Press and Store Depart ment:-Rs. 36,973 against Rs. 38,938 of 1924-25. Decrease of Ris. 1965 is due to less work done.
(q) Under estrabaordinary receipts there appear the following items:Sale of land Rs. 76,923, against Rs. 5,316 realised in 1924-25. Details of the sale of land are given in appendix VII-B. Loan instalment of Rs. $1,30,000$ for Drainage works was also received during the year.
$\therefore(r)$ Other advances:-Rs. Nil (1924-25) : Rs. nil ( 1925-26 ).
( s) Deposits:-This shows a decrease of Rs, 24,846 which is due to ordinary fluctuations of business.

## Y. WORKING OF THE OCTROI SYSTEM.

The octroi cordon under the administration of this Municipality includes the Suburban Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona and the Kirkee Cantonment in addition to the City Municipal District. The Kirkee Cantonment has been added to this cordon from 1st Octoler 1911 as an experimental measure and the extension of this arrangement up to the 30th September 1926 was sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 8828 R. D. dated 5-2-26. A separate account of this body is kept and the net income from its imports is given to it every month. The Municipality levies Octroi, according to the sanctioned schedule, on articles imported into the Octroi cordon and after deducting from the gross income, the amount of duty refunded on account of the export of the same articles, as well as the establishment and other charges, distributes the net income among the three bodies in proportion to their population, as sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 4053 of 9 th November 1895. The figures given here, therefore, relate to the whole of the cordon, while those in Form IV and Appendix (II-A) relate to the City share only.

The gross income from octrol and octroi-refund rebate in the year 192526 was Rs. 7,38,617 (iucluding Rs. 10714 paid to the Cantonment Committee of Kirkee) as against Rs. 7,04,901 of the last year, showing an nucrease of Rs. 33,716 . There is no special reason for the iucrease beyond the development of trade.

Oat of the gross revenue of Rs. $7,38,617$, Rs. 95,269 were refionded on account of export, Rs. 61,013 were spent on estabishment, Rs. 7,924 on contingencies, including repairs to buildings etc., Rs. nil on account of new Naka buildings and Re. i, 388 on gratuity and provident fund. The amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment was Rs. 10,714 as against Rs. 9,138 in the previous year.

Thus the total expenditure amounted to R. $1,80,308$, as against Rs, $1,71,758$ of the previous year. Deducting this expenditure from the gross revenue, the remainder i. e. Rs. $5,58,309$. was devided among the three bodien. The share of the City Manicipality amounted to Rs. $4,11,898$, of the Poona Cantonment Committee to Rs. $1,01,179$ and of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 45,232.

The amount of Rs. 95,269 was, as mentioned above, refunded in the jear $1925-26$ on account of exports as against Rs. 86,524 of the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 8,745 , which is due to the fact that the gross collections. for 1924-25 and 1925-26 were high as campared with the previous years.

The figures quoted above show the result of the working of the whole octroi department. They show the gross income from and the gross expenditure chargeable to octroi. But the figures given in the statement Nos. II and III show only the share of the Poona City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. The octroi establishment has cost 8.3 per cent of the gross income in this year, as against 8.9 in 1924-25 and 7.8 in 1923-24.

The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of articles.


It will be seen from the above table that the average consumption is within the standard under all heads except sugar, oil and tobaco where it is bixed on weight, whils there is excess io all heads where it is fixed on ralug.

This is due to the getreral rise in prices. The standards for class IV (building materials ) and class IX ( miscellaneous ) are not fixed by Government; hence they are not shown in the above table.

The total expenditure for the year 1925-26, shows an increase of Rs: $2,59,243$, when compared with that for the previous year. The causes of increases and decreases are explained below in detail.

General adminsistration:-Rs. 46,462 (24-25 ). Rs. 37,301 (25-26).
Decrease of Rs. 9,161 is due to there being no payments made during the year for Audit charges which amounted to Rs. 6000 in 1924-25 and for increments with retrospective effect which amounted to more than Rs. 3000 in 1924-25.
(b) Collection of taxes:-Rs. 53,972 (24-25i) Rs. 56,412 (25-26 ). Increase Rs. 2,440 due to increase in the salaries, according to the new schedule and to the additional establishment employed for collection of octroi at Goods Yard Naka.
(c.) Refunds:-Rs. 376 ( 24-25). Rs. 122 (.25-26)، Decrease Rs. 254.
(d) Pensions and Gratuities:-Rs. 8,592 (24-25). Rs 10,711 (25-26). Increase Rs. 2,119.
(e) Public safety: fire:-Rs; 25,991 ( 24-25 ). Rs. 9,953 (25-26). Decredse Rs: 16,038. In 1924-25 an ampunt of Rs. 12,500 and odd was spent on the purchase of a new Motor Engine while there was no such expenditure in the year under report. Number of fires 16 against 16 of 1924-25. Estimated loss of property Rs. 9,304 against Rs. 29,900 of 1924-25. There was one serious fire on 6-12-25 at 46 Shukarwar Peth resulting in damage to the extent of Rs, 8,500 .

(f), Lighting:-Rs. 30,512 ( 24-25 ). Rs. 33,709 ( $25-26$ ):Increase Rs. 3;197. The increase is due to larger number of lights provided. There were 1671 kerosine lamps lighted against 1588 of the previous year. Electric lights at street junctions were put on from January 1926. These numbered 92 on 31-3-26.
(g) Police:-No special expenditure was incurred on this account by the Municipality. The charges of five constables taken on loan are debited to the octroi, Assessment and Market Departments.
(h) Watersupply (Capital outlay):-Rs. 29,181 (24-25). Rs. 42,859 ( 25-26). Increase Rs. 13,678 due to more amount spent on new water mains.
(i) Water supply (Repairs):-Rs.71,745 (24-25). Rs. 91,553 (25-26). Increase Rs. 19,808; charges paid to the Irrigation Department amount to Rs. 57,351 against Rs. 42,416 of last year and the amount spent on water treatment was 14,441 against 19,718 of the previous year.
(j) Drainage (capital outlay ):-Rs. 1,75,697 (24-25). Rs. 4,17,007 ( $25-26$ ). Increase Rs. $2,41,310$ due to more work done by the Executive Engineer, Poona Drainage Construction.
(k). Drainage Establishment and repairs:-Rs. 69,237 (24-25). Rs. 67,145 ( $25-26$ ). Decrease Rs. 2,092 due to less amount spent on the improvement of the Nagzari Nala (Rs. 1,918 against Rs. 4402 ).

(1) General Supervising Estahlishment:- Increase Rs. 9,334. The increments according to the new schedule were paid to the staff with retrospective effect from June 1923 and this caused sudden increase in expenditure.

(2\&3) Road cleaning and Bhangi service:-The total under these two heads is Rs. 1,71, 793 against Rs. 1,80,672 of 1924-25. Decrease of Rs. 8879. The cost of sweepers increased from Rs. 60,709 to Rs. 68,943 on account of increased wages, while the cost of refuse removal was reduced from Rs. 64,299 to lis. 47,297 on account of the work of refuse removal being given by contract and as there was no expenditure incurred during the year on construction of the bullock stables.
(4) Night soil and Kachra Depot:-Decrease of Rs. 6000. There was no expenditure on the construction of new Incinerators.
(5) Latrines and Urinals:-Decrease of Rs. 2,137. Less amount was spent on the construction of new latrines and urinals.
(6: Road watering:-Decrease of Rs. 470 due to economy effected by the use of the roarl watering lorry.
(7) Miscellaneous:-Increase of lis. 465 due to more amount spent on contingencies such as stationery, dresses etc.
(m) Charges on account of Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors:Rs. 16,862 ( $24-25$ ). .Rs. 18,279 (25-26). Increase Rs• 1417; this is due to the schedule increase in the salaries.
(n) Hospitals and Dispensaries:-Rs. 23,590 (24-25). Rs. 27,625 (25-26). Increase of Rs. 4035. One new dispensary was opened during the year making the total number six.
(o) Plague:-Rs. 13,479 (24-25). Rs. 12,927 (25-26). Decrease Rs. 552. The city was free from plague. Contributions to the Infectious Diseases Hospital are debited to this head.
(p) Vaccination:-Rs. 2,290 (24-25). Rs. 2,199 (25-26). Decrease Rs. 91.
(q) Cther Sanitary Requirements:-(Preventive measures against Cholera and Iufluenza and removal of prickly pear):-Rs. 1,447 (24-25). Rs. 877 (20-26). Decrease Rs. 570. Rs. 484 were spent on removing prickly pear against Rs. 435 of 1925-26, while only Rs. $39 \pm$ were spent on improvement of the Depressed Classes locality against Rs. 929 of the last year.

(s) Pounds:-Rs. 3,261 (24-25). Rs. 2,560 (25-26). Decrease lis. 701 due to there being no payment of arrears.

The formation of a special fund for eventual expenditure on roads from the unexpended balance of the proceeds of wheel. tax and road tolls is not therefore possible.

(a.a) Public instriction:- Schools and Colleges:-The administration report of the School Board will be found in appendix XI of this report, wherein is given a full account of the working of the schools. It is not therefore necessary to enter into details at this place. The School Board formed under the new Primary Edacation Act took charge of the Municipal Primary Schools on 1-7-25. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure during the year under report amounts to Rs. $1,66,651$, as against Rs. 1,45;507 showing an increase of Rs. 21,144.
( $a \cdot b$ ) Contributions:-The expenditure on this bead was Rs. 3,792 in the year under report, as against Rs. 28,838 , in the previous year, showing a decrease of $1 \mathrm{~s}, 25,046$. No grants were paid to the aided primary schools in the city.
(a-c) Libraries:-The Minicipal Teacher's library cost Rs. 431 in the year under report as against Rs. 355 during the previous year, showing an increase of lls. 76 only.
(a-cl). Interest on loans:-Rs. 39,870 (24-25). Rs. 38,685 (25-26). Decrease Rs. 1185, For detailed information, vide appendix No. III-B. The decrease is due to the reduction of loan capital.

## PROGRESS OF MAHOMEDAN EDUCATION.

There are eleven day-schools, six for boys and five for girls, besides two night s:brols. The number of boys in Urdu Schools on rolls on 31st March 1926, was 548 and of girls 273 , as against 606 and 247 respectively of the previous year. The average attendence was 538 and $240^{\circ} 8$ as against 498 and $234 \cdot 1$ in the last year. The School Board continued their policy of appointing female teachers instead of male ones in 'Tirdu Girls' Schools and increased the element of trained hands iu Urdu Giris' Schools. The English Class attached to the Urdu full primary school ( No. 10) made good progress during the year 1920-26. The expenditure on Urdu Schools during the year under report amounted to Rs. 17,318 as against Rs 21,423 in the last year. The School Board is considering the question of filling up the permanent post of a special Mohamedan Inspector for Muricipal Urdu Schools which was created last year in view of the special importance of the supervision work of Urdu Schools. These schools are at present supervised by the Assistant Superintendent, and the acting Mohammedan Inspector for Urdu Schools (Headnaster Urdu Boys' Scbool No. 10) under the guidance of the Secretary, School Board. These Schools were examined this year by a committee of Urdu school'senior Head Masters under the direct supervision of the Assistant 'Superintendent, and the Acting Inspector for Urdu Schools.

GENGRAL REMARKS.

## Pubic Safety:-

Fire Servico:-The Motor road-sprinkler and fire 'Engine 'is' working :quite eatisfactorily. Purchase.of an additional Motor is under congideration.

Street Lighting:-The Electric lights that were discontinued in the year 1922-23 for financial reasons, were again put on daring the year and it is hoped all the main-roads of the City will have electric light .. mithin the next few years.

Pubic Sanitation:-
Drainage:-The work in connection with the Drainage Improvement Scheme is progressing rapidly, and out of the contemplated expenditure of 'Rs. 16, 22,835. Rs. 4,34,144, were spent upto the end of March 1926 , through the Exscutive Engineer, Poons Drainage Construction.

Water supply:-The work of improvement of the watersupply as regards distribution and quantity is in progress. 17,652 feet of new watermains were lid and 8162 feet of old mains were enlarged during the year against 12000 feet and 6000 feet lengths repectively of the last year. A second set, of powerful pump and engine similer to the one purchased in the year 1924-25 was ordered during the year under repurt and the plant is now under erection. When it is in working condition there will be no anxiety in connection mith the watersupply of the : Aigh Level Area,

Supplementary Storage Reservoirs in the High Level Area will be an, urgent necessity before long and the question requires serious consideration from now.

The Katraj watersupply Scheme appears to be practically shelvad at least for the present on the ground of the financial position of the Municipality.

Conservancy:-The contract system of refuse removal is under trial and the result will be known by the end of the monsoon of 1926-27. Public Latrines of flushing type are being constructed and the work of getting private privies converted into those of flushing type is also in progress. The question of pail-depots remained where it was before and there was no progress.

Fish-Market:-No progress.
Town-planning:-No progress.
Peblic Heaith-
Hospitals and Dispensaries:-A sixth dispensary was opened during the year under report in Ganj Peth.

Poblic Conveniences:-
Roads and Communications:-The progress on the Tilak Road was not great even though the expenditure appears large on account of the payment of the bill from the Land Acquisition Officer. The acquisition of properities for the East-West-Road is in progress,

## GENERAL REMARKS.

No work' ${ }^{\top}$ was done during the year under report. The state of things as regards the administration of Building Bylaws continues as before.

## Municipal Finance:-

The year 1925-26 has proved to be the best year from the financial point of view. The figures of gross normal annual income and recurring expenditure according to Taleband for the year 1925-26 are as follows:-

If the Manicipality is fortunate in maintaining its income at the level of $1925-26$, it will be in a position to finance all the works of immediate urgency. It is boped that the year 1926-27 will prove as prosperous as $1925-26$, if not better.

I cannot conclude this report without making a reference to the terrible fire, though not pertaioing to the year under report, which destroyed the Dnyan Prakash and Arybhnshan Presses and caused a tremendous loss to the public and specially to the Servants of India Society. I have to thank my officers, staff and collcagues who rendered invaluable assistance in getting under control the fire which otherwise would have gutted down an important square of the Bualhwar Peth. I must also thank the Police, citizens, Gorernment (fficials and the Suburkan Municipality for the kind and willing belp they gave on the occasion.

During the year under report a section of the Ircal Marathi press tried its level best to run down the Municipal administration by indulging in filthiest langrage; but I am glad to record that the whole campaign proved abortive. Some of my colleagues individually and collectively were made the target of a continuous attack which is for the present lying moribund. Similarly, an attempt was made to introduce the virus of Brahmin and Anti-Brahmin spirit in the edministration; but in this dircction too the attempt failed miserably, oring to the catholic spirit exinced by my colleagues.

My colleagues in the General Body aud on various Sub-Committees discharged their fuuctions most satisfactorily and rendered every assistance to make the admuinistration as successful as they could do. For this they deserve my sincere thanks. The Chief Officer, Mr. S. R. Bhagwat, and his able assistant Mr. S. B. Jog, are a good asset to the credit of the Municipality and the same may be said of the Engineer, Mr. S. B. Tambolkar, and of the Health Officer, Dr. Khambatta.

1. Rs. 300 were contributed by Mr. K. C. Dhole, the interest of which amount is applicd to giving of prizes to girls in the Municipal Schools at Poona.
2. Rs. 500 were contributed by R. B. Abs Vishnu Puranik as an endowmont for two prizes to be annually awarded to students of the Poona Training College in Memory of his deceased daughter Bhima Aba Puranik.
3. Mr. Vinayak Vasudev submitted a list of subscribers who had subscribed Rs. 70 J torards the proposed Duke of Albany Memorial Fund and requested Government to found an annual prize in the name of His Koyal Highness to be ararded to meritorious pupils in the Female High School, Poona.
4. Mr. Narayan Govind Apte gave Government a sum of Rs.' 500 as an endowment for a prize to be awarded in Mr. Apte's name to a student in the Sanskrit Pathasbala in Poona.
5. Mr. Suleman Shet Ladha gave a sum of Rs. 500 as an endowment for scholarships to be awarded to deserving Mahomedan Boys in Urdu Schools under the control of the Municipalisy and also to Mahomedan Boys passing Vernacular standard and entering the Anglo Vernacular Sohools.
6. The Hon'ble Divan Bahadur Kashinath Ramchandra Godbole placed at the disposal of the Municipality, Bombay Improvment Trust Bonds for Re. 1,500 yielding an annual interest of Re. 60 for awarding a scholarship to the most successful Brabmin student from V.' J. Municipal Technical School, Poona, who after he completes his school course should work as an artificer or join a higher Tėchnical Institution for furthering his technical studies.

(b) Extension of the city toxards the West is. e. Tilak Road and Fergusson College:-It is carried out rapidly. Barren lands, which. were so . a fex years ago, are now replaced by handsome residentiat quarters, and within the last five years an open country is being rapidty converted into a garden town. Unfortunately drivinage and water are not yet laid in certain portions and the want of which is keenly felt. The roadsare not yet completed and many persons on that account are pervented from constructing residential places for themselives.

## REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

(a) Registration of births is yet defective. Many births are still escaping registration and hence the birth rate is very low. The Health Department is trying its best by issuing notices in local newspapers and by tomtoms to secure proper number of births and the increased number of births will show that the ${ }_{2}$ Department has met with some success this year.
(b) Registration of deaths is fairly accurate. The department is, however, unable to verify each death in order to fipd out the correct cause of death, owing to various difficulties.

## BIRTHSI\& STILL-BIRTHS.

Births registered during tie year are 2605 as against 1792 of the previous year and ratio per 1000 of population comes to 19.56 as against 13.46. Thus there is an appreciable rise in the number of births registered. The number of still-births registered during the year was 171 as against 157 of the last year.

Small-pox registered 29 cases as against 346 of the previous year. There was no epidemic. The infected houses were visited personally by me and the inmates and contacts were advised to get vaccinated and re-vaccinated.

These recorded 243 and 12 respectively as against 305 and 16 of the previous year.

The Special Magistrates' courts are rendering valuable help to the Health Department in respect to the disposal of prosecutions for which special Magistrates Sardar Natu and Mr. Ranade are working. They are a great help to
the Health Department. There are still a very large number of pzople who are deaf to all the entreaties of the Health Officer and his staff to minor sanitary observances and a few exemplary punishments amongst a few of them have set the matters going in some instances.

Cattle-pound:-The number of animals impounded during the year was 6716 as against 6193 and the income derived from fines was Rs 2799 against Rs. 1252-4-0 of the previous year.

House-inspections:-In the year 1925-26, 5103 houses were inspected by the Divisional Sanitary Inspectors, out of which 2901 were checked by the Health Officer.

Meniuls:-The Bhangis, road-siveepers and other coolies gave no troubles this year.

Drainage:-The eastern part of the town is being sewered and the work, it is hoped, will be finished by the middle of the next year.

Gully-traps:-There were 8665 gully-traps in the city by the end of the year and the number is increasing.

Gutters:-Kachha and pucca guttei's, are being slowly filled in by a resolution of General Body. Storm water gutters are a necessity and their importance cannot be ignored. There are plenty of low-lying areas in the town and the houses built thereon, and which are on a lower level; receive all rain water from the streets adjoining. The ground floors are, therefore, not habitable, when the monsoons are on. Pucca gutters in masonry and stone are a necessity for a large city like Poona,

Public latrians:-There are 426 seats of public latrines in the city out of which 22 are re-placed by flushing types.
$\sigma$
Public urinals:-There are 99 urinals out of which 71 are of the flushing pattern. The old tgpe gutter urinals are being gradually done away with.

Private privies:-There are 8971 private privy seats in the 'city out of which 8406 are of the basket system and 565 of the flushing type. My department is taking every opportunity to induce the house-owners to convert their privies into flushing type, but the progress of this conversion is very slow.

Cesspools:-As the eastern part of the town is being sewered, the total number of cesspools has gone down to 884. These will also disappear when the whole of that area js sewered and private drains are connected.

Kachara removal-Since 24-9-25 the removal of kachara is given by contract, and as anticipated by me, the work is not going on satisfactorily. However the real test of the work of the contractor will be during the monsoons and of which more hereafter in the next. annual report.

The water supply:- I have no additional remarks to make than what I have done in my report for 1923-24.

Medical inspection of schools:- A copy of my report made to the General.
Body on the subject is attached herewith.

- Needs of the city:-

I now come to the most important point of mentioning the various needs of the city in general and of my department in particular. I am tempted to

repeat here some of them in order that they may always be before the Municipality for their consideration when funds are casy.

The immediate needs are as under:-
(1) Public latrines and urinals of flushing pattern.
(2) Improvement and licensing of milk-shops and milk-supply.
(3) Removal of all stables from the midst of inhabited areas.
(4) Malaria brigade.
(5) A tuberculosis hospital.
(6) A permanent gang for rat extermination.

- (7) Paving of narrow lanes.
( 8 ) Construction of fish and beef markets.
(9) Removal of slaughter houses outside municipal limits.
(10) A washing ghat for the city dhobis.
(11) Bathing and washing places on the banks of Nagzari.
(12) Compulsion of flushing patteru privies in private houses.
(13) Removal of prostitutes from thickly populated areas, out side the town.
(14) Periodical medical examination of prostitutes carrying on their trade and their certification that they are firee from diseases and for which a lock hospital is necessary.

Remarks:- It will be seen from the above report that deathrate during the year was markedly low. It is also gratifying to note that no epidemics prevailed during the year. To combat epidemics is the principal work of the Health Department and their efforts in that direction have met with success. However many things not done yet, remain to be done. One notable feature during the last year and which commanded a good deal of attention from the public and criticisms both for and against, was the inauguration of the Arogya Saptaha, the first of its kind in the history of the City Municipality. Arogya Saptaha or the Health Propaganda was carried out successfully with the aid of the Arogya Mandal. Thanks to the co-operation of theArogya Mandal and its energetic secretary Mr. Bhat. The prpaganda work that was carried out throughout the sixteen wards of the town was done effectively. Posters, magic lantern, and public lectures, and personal talks on the most elementary principles of hygiene have done educative work amongst the illiterate masses. The Saptaha was not carried out amongst the well to do, but the propaganda was done in the poorest quarters of the town and in the slum areas. It was an eye-opener to ignorant masses and many of these people gratefully acknowledged the usefulness of our work and even in many instances they craved for jauch efforts and not once a year but every month in the year. By pictures, leaflets and demonstrations they were instructed how to avoid diseases and dirt though poor. By personal talks they were told how to protect themselves when epidemics threatened. Their difficulties were invited and solved much to their satisfaction. Their educative value, therefore, cannot be underestimated. Death to the fly means life to the child; Doctor goes where the Sun is not admitted; Cholera never enters a house where liquids are , boiled; Plague is prevented by killing rats; These were some of the maxims inculcated on the minds of the ignorant masses during the period of the Saptaha which lasted for about two weeks. Sympathy; guidance, and instruction by us during the
health week contributed much towards the general cleaning of houses of the poor, even while poverty continues. The Municipality is, therefore, requested to continue this propaganda work even twice a year, for no advance in hygiene can be looked for until the sanitary conscience of people is awakened and for this the education of the masses needs to be taken in hand.

A word more and I have done. Of late years the Health Officer notices with regret that factories and mills are fast growing in the heart of our city. It would be advisable to with hold such permissions and a certain portion on the outskirts of the town might be alloted to such noisy trades. The problems of over crowding, congestion and insanitary bousing are acute in our industrial and commercial town. The Municipality's efforts to deal with them have been partial and fragmentary for want of funcls, no less than for lack of a bold and clear-cut policy. The poor live in chawls and huts, where every inch of ground is utilised for building purposes. Vitiated air is generally characterised by rickets in children, and anaemia, dyspepsia and lassitude in grown-up people, while that great scourge phthisis appears in the poor houses. It is requested that the slum area should obtain precedence in any scheme of development.

In conclusion I beg to thank the authorities for their valuable assistance. Nessrs. Godbole and Nikam, two of my principal assistants, continued to give their loyal and useful assistance. The Arogya Mandal ( Citizens' Sanitary Association ) under their secretary Mr. Bhat continued their useful work.

PRIMARY EDUCATION
The total number of schools at the close of the year was 41, including 2 night schools. 4 new schools were opened.

The total number of pupils was 6918 against 3822 in the previous year. The number of teachers was 285 against 261.

The total expenditure amonnted to Rs. 161070-6-8 against 161790-7-0 in the previous year.

The chief point of interest during the year was the sanction given by Pcona City Municipal Local Authority for taking an educational census and preparing a scheme for introduction of Free and Compuisory Elementary Education for children of both the sexes in the whole of Poona City in five years.

The arrangements for the medical inspection of ciildren rere continued during the jear and suggestions for the improvement of the existing system hare been under consideration of the School Board.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the Administration of the School Board for the year 1925-26.
2. Constitution of the School Board:-The personnel of the School Board changed on 1st April 1925, along with that of the General Board after the triennial election of this Municipal body held in March 1925, and it was composed of the following seven members:-
(1) Prof. Laxman Genesh Lele (chairman)
(2) Prof Shankar Ramchandra Kanitkar, M. A.
(3) Mr. Haji Abdul Rahiman Haji Ahemed Saheb.
(4) Shet: Domodardas Bhukandas.

(6) Mr. Gangaram Govind Pashankar.
(7) Mr Shankar Nana Karpe.

This School Board continued to work as before during the first quarter of the year ending on 30th June 1925, when its function became restricted to education, other than primary, owiug to the newly constituted School Board being brought into existence on lst July. 1925 according to section 3 (1) of the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923.

The Poons City Municipality was declared as an Educational Local Authority by Government Notification No. 2272 of 29th May 1925, and the new School Board was constituted as prescribed in section 3 (1) of the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923 for the term coestennive with the term of this

Local Authority, which lasts till the end of March 1928, and will continue to function till the now. School"Board is elected. 'On' 1st , July 1925, the new School Board consisted of the following nine members elected by the Local Authority according to the conditions laid down in section 3 (1) of the Bombay Primary Education Act, 1923, and Government Rules thereunder:-
(Flected Members.)


The election of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman was held by the School Board on 29th June 1925 according to section 4 (5) of the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923 and Rules thereunder and Dr. R. K. Naidu, L. m. \& s. and Prof. S. R. Kanitkar, M. A. were elected unanimously as Chairman and Vice-Chairman respectively for the period co-extensive with the term of the School Board. This new School Board commenced from 1st July 1925 to exercise and perform such powers and duties as are enacted in or prescribed under this new Act of 1923.

## (Nominated Members.)

Principal N. M. Shah, M. A. of the New Poons College, Poons, and Miss Mac.Michael, m. A. Lady Superintendent of Mission Schools, Poona, were nominated on 20 th July 1925 by Government on the new School Board.
3. As the new School Board had to carry on functions relating to primary education only, as resolved by the Local Authority and as the old School Board now termed as " Schools Committee" attended to education other than primary, this report deals with the province of primary education only, leaving the rest for the report of the Chairman, Schools Committee.
4. School Board's Mestings:-During the year under review the School Board held in elll 30 meetings as against 28 of the last year, out of which 9 meetings were held by the old School Board during the period of first three months and 21 meetinge by the new School Board from the 1st July ${ }_{71} 1925131$ Meetings were convened in all as against 40 of the previous year, 19 of them by the old School Board and 22 by the :new School Board.: The 'total number of items of business disposed of at these meetings was 542 as "against 753 of the last year, 145 of them by the old School Board and 397 by the New School Board, while 6 items were disposed of by circular Resolutions as against 43 of the previous year, one of them by the old School board

"Schiol Board delegated certain powers to the chairman of the School FBbard, which : enabled him to dispose of cases of emergent nature and mere "riditine without delay", tnd this action of the School Board lessened the amount

The School Board inter alia, dealt with several questions of considerable importance such as Compulsory Education Schemes, schedules of different establishments under the School Board, new rules and regulations to be made by the School Board, according to the new Act of 1923, educational census of the whole City, preliminary to the introduction of compulsory elementary education, and reorganization of the present Monicipal Schools.

5. 'Sub-Committees :-In order that the work of the School Board 'may' be expedited after careful scrutinization of its details, the following perma. ment Sub-Committees were appointed by the School Board for considering the questions entrusted to them:-
(1) "Rules and Regulation" Committee.
(2) "School Buildings and Sites" Committee.
(3) "Spinning in Schools" Committee.
(4) "Educational Census" Committee.

These Sub-Committees held their meetings from time to time during the year under review. Of these Sub-Committees' Work, special mention deserves to be made of the questions referred to them as noted below:-
(1) Formulation of the new rules and regulations to be made as laid down in sections 27 ( 3 ) and others under the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923, \& new Schedules of the several establishments under the control of this Board. (vide appendix VIII for information of the proposed and the pre$\therefore . \quad . \quad$ sent schedules of salaries of teachers in the municipal primary schools.)
( 2 ) Accommodation of housing and playgrounds for old and new Schools.
(3) Experiment of imparting instruction in spinning in the. Municipal Schools.
(4) Transaction of business of the educational Census taken according to the Bombay Primary Educational Act of 1923 as a step preliminary to the introduction of Compulsory Elementary Education in Poona City and for obtaining figures of the number of children of age from 6 to 11 years with a view to prepare the scheme of compulsory Elementary Education.

Some special Sub-Committees were also appointed to consider the questions that came forth occasionally such as that of the instruction in gardening to be given in Municipal Boys School at Bhamburda and that of making arrangements to take control of the night schools conducted so long by Mr. S. M. Mate M. A. Secretary of the "Asprishyata Nivarak Mandal," Poona (Depressed Classes Association established for removing untouchability.) Certain questions such as the introduction of the Boy Scouts and the Girls Guides Movement and instruction in swimming in the Municipal Schools were also referred to the members of the School Board for inquiry and putting up proposals regarding the same before the Board.

Several members of the School Board paid visits to the Municipal Schools from time to time throughout the year with 2 view to inspect them. These inspections were of the nature of surprise visits, and have been found in various ways to have a satisfactory effect.
6. The Secretary:- Management of the Municipal School Board office and the Schools continued as before to be under the direct control of the Superintendent of the School Board, which post has been held since 1919 by Mr. V. L. Gatne, B. A: who was appointed to act from 1st July 1926 as the Secretary of the School Board for the time being, till the post was permanently filled, as per conditions laid down in the Bombay Primary Education Rules of 1924. Mr. Gatne was on leave from 1st April to 4th June 1925 during the year under review, when Mr. V. R. Gaikaiwari, the Assistant Superintendent, acted as Superintendent and Mr. Heramb Gajanan Deo, Headmaster of Municipal Boys' School No. 8 was appointed to act as Assistant Superintendent.

A new Consus office was opened from 15th February 1926, and Mr. M. B. Nimbalkar, Headmaster of the Municipal Boys' School No. 5, was appointed as Census officer, to be in charge of the Census Office and work under instructions of the "Census". Sub Committee and Secretary of the School Board: This Dffice establishment consisted of one Census Officer, 15 enumerators and one pron.. The work of taking census, preparing the registers
as required by the new Act of 1923 and formutating a schémer of Compulsory Elementary education for the first group is being done by this office.s

As stated in last year's report, Mr. Banemiya Bandemiya, Headmaster Municipal Urdu5Boys' School No. 10, continued to work part time as special Mabomedan. Inspector for Municipal Urdu Schools; The period of his temporary appointment was extended till this new" post was filled up hy a permanent appointment.

The new School Board is a statutory body having much wider and independent powers of control. The Primary Edrcation Act of 1993, under which the School Board has to discharge several new functions, has made it obligatory on the Board tis make adequate arrangements, inter-alia, for suchadditional functions as maintaining a separate School Fund and accounts, conducting annual examinations of primary schools, inspection of local private primary schools for assessing annual grants for thexn as laid down in Bombay. Primary Education Rules of 1924, which was formerly done by the Govern-: ment Inspecting Officers, making new rules and regulations as mentioned im the several sections of the new Act of 1923 and Government Rules thereunderis and preparation of the Compulsory Elementary Education Scheme.
: A new schedule of the Administrative; Inspecting, Supervising; clerical and menial staff for the whole School Board Establishiment is under consideration at present and adequate provision by appointiments of properly qualified and efficient additional hands will have to be made early to meet the new additional responsidijities. on the: School Board office due to the operation of the Act.and it must be stated that the present staff is not able to cope with-the increased work.
7. The Schools:-There were in all 39 primary Schools; out of which one new "Marathi Boys' School in Nana Peth; and three new Marathi Girls' Schools in Bhamani, Mangalwar and Ganesh peths. were opened during the year under review, Moreover, one more Urdu night school was opened Nana Peth in the building of new Urdu Boys' Day 'School as an experiment this jear in addition: to the one opened in Mominpura in the buildinig of Urdu ;Boys' School No. 18 last year, The . work of condacting these night schools was entrusted to the respective Head Masters of those schools where they were opened.

A careful, survey of the whole City was done this year with a view to ascertain the educational needs: of different localities. This work was also facilitated by the map which was specially prepared by Prof. S: R. Bhagwat, the Chief Officer of the Municipal Local Authority, showing the percentage of literacy in tlie popidation of differenit peths. The Scliool Board found that certain areas had schools which were congested and overcrowded being atter:ded by clildren coming from long distances as there were no schools in those areas, while certain parts of the City had no means of education at all; as congestion and overcrowding, was, detrimental to the physical and intellectual advancement of the children, -the School Board decided to open new schools. This will iot only avoid congestion and overorouding, but will afford facilitieas for the expansion of primary education on voluntary basis especially in areas zeducationally beckward. Notable success of this experiment will be foünd in


The School Board intended to open several such new schools in different localities during the year, but it was helpless, as it could not secure auitable school houses in those localities. The School Board, however, is trying its best to cope with this difficulty.

The School Board sanctioned as before distribution of Eweets, slates, books etc. throughout the year under review, which led to induce young children to attend Schools regularly. The Municipal primary schools are classified as under:-

N. B.:- An English class is specially attached to the Urdu Boys' Full Primary School ( No. 10 ) with a view to increase the strength and attendance of children in higher classes and thereby to facilitate the spread of higher education in the Mahomedan Community ( vide remarks about the class in a note about the progress of Mahomedan Educatian, Appendix V).

There are 23 Boys' Day Schools, out of which 13 are entirely free. These Schools are made up as follows:-
(1) Nine Marathi Boys' Schools including two mixed schools for boys and girls of the Depressed classes.
(2) Four Urdu schools for Mahomedan Boys. All the girils' Schools are entirely free.
8. Pupils :-The total number of students in Municipal primary schools increased from 5822 to 6918 during the year under review. The work of all the schools went on smoothly and regularly throughout the year. The general attendance of children in the schools was satisfactory, the increase of average daily attendance being from 2919-8 to 3221-6 in the case of Boys' Schools and $1450-9$ to $1847-3$ in the case of Girls' Schools out of the average number on rolls of $3632-4$ and 4073-7 in Boys' Schools and 2077-9 and 2473-2 in Girls' schools in the years 1924-25 and 1925-26 respectively.

Of the total number of 6918 pupils on rolls on 31st March 1926, there were 4047 Boys and 257 Girls, in Boys' Schools and 2610 Girls and 4 Boys, in Girls' Schools as against 3437 Boys and 213 Girls, in Boys' Schools and 2172 Girls in Girls Schools on 31st March 1925.

Information regarding the ages, social conditions, professions of guardians and the number of married and unmarried students in the primary schools is fully given in appendices I (A. \& B. )

The comparative attendance of children in the schools during the years 1924-25 and $1925-26$ will be found is Appondix I ( $D$ :

9. Teachers:-The comparative statements shoring the strength of teachers in Municipal primary schools and their proportiouate distribution in Marathi and Urdu Schools will be found in Appendix II ( A ).

During the year under review the School Board tried their best to appoint women teachers instead of male teachers in Urdu Girls' Schools and the Inspectress of Urdu Girls' ${ }^{\text {Schools }}$ C. D. was specially requested through the Deputy Educational Inspector, Poona, to provide some female traiued teachers; but only one was provided this year.

Every attempt is being made by the School Board to enlhance the quality of the work of the teaching staff by the employment of trained teachers as far as possible. The number of trained teachers in the service of this Municipality during the year under review increased from 145 to 171 while the number of untrained teachers was 114 as against 116 of the previous year. The staff of trained teachers was distributed amongst several schools on the principle of giving to each school a certain minimum number of nained teachers, taking into consideration their needs and the locality in which they are situated.

10 Municipal Iraining School and Continuation Classes for primary teachers:- With a view to make every member of the staff of Municipal Primary school teachers trained in course of time, a scheme for starting a Municipal Training School for primary teachers was launched six years ago and as stated in the School Boards' Administration Report of the previous years the Municipality after receiving the necessary sanction of the Government Educational Department in this matter, started the classes for the. first years' training certificate Examination for Marathi primary school masters iin December 1920, and for Trdu School masters in 1922. This Training Class scheme bad mnde provision both for the theoretical and practical work of the pupil teachers admitted into the class. The results of these classes were satisfactory. This year 17 candidates were sent up from the Marathi Training class and 11 came out successful in the final examination of Government Certificate Examination of the Traiwing College; 3 candidates were sent up from the Municipal Urdu Training Class and all came out successful in the said examination. The School Board discontinued temporarily the work of the Marathi Trainiug Class for this year as the number of Marathi First yeai: trained teachers was found to be adequate and proportionate as laid dowi in the Bombay Primary Education Rules of 1924; but it continued the Crdu First year Training Class, Mohomedan trained teachers not being available.

The Municipal Training Scoool provides an additional number of trained hands every year to the Marathi and Urdu Municipal Primary :Schools, and the increase of trained teachers is sure to bring about the essential inprovements gradually there. It is desirable to entrust young children to the trained hands instead of the untrained from an educational point of vierw. The Mrumcipal teachers find it difficult to secure entrance in Govermment Training Colleges to attend the Training Courses and also to obtain Government Departmental permission to appear for the Government Training Examination, though they are prepared privately for the same. It is also quite necessary to maintain the Municipal Training School now in as much as this Municipality has decided to undertake the work of carrying out the Compulsory Primary Education Scheme during the next five years for which a number of additional traped hands will be requited. It does not appear probable that Gorernment

iwiliteratre to make provision of so mant trained hande for this Municipality. So anitimependent Traning. Sctiool of the Municipality itself will be a dite necessity in these circumstances. Correspondence in this respect with the Goverament Educational Department is still going on and further results are arvaited.
, Vernacillair Final Classes for tedchers:-A neiw vennacular Final Exdinination for girls is now being held by Government and as that examination is taken to be the minimum qualfication for considering a lady teacher as qualified; it became necessary to afford help to the Municipal unqualified school mistresses to qualify theniselves up to that new standard and for this purpose the School Board started for them: on 1st December: 1925 new V. F. classes both Marathi and Uirdu, for which the sanction of the Educational Inspector, Central Division was duly obtained (vide No: $\mathrm{S}-36$ (d)-p of, 3rd December 1925 ). These Marathi and Urdu V. F. Classes are held in the buildings of Municipal Marathi boys' School No. 1 and Municipal Urdu Girls' school: No. 12 . respectively. The 1 larathi class was attended by 21 women-teachers and the Urdiu class by 4 , during the year under review. The staff of teachers of these classes consisted of 3 third year triained, senior and rompetent:women teachers from the Muxicipal Giris' schools sand one third years treinied Headmasters Ifs is fioped that the classes in: question will show good progress and be begeificial to the unqualified mistresses in general.
11. Examinations and Results:-The date of the commencement of the new scholastic year is now changed from ist March to the day on which the schools, reopen after summer vacation and consequently the annual examioations of allischools that were held so long in the month of Febiruary were begun in the lagt week of March and the programme of this whole work was to be carried on till the end of the third week of April' 1926," and the results were to be declared in the last weely of April just before the summer pacation to, schools commenced. This year the school board had to arrange for the annual examinations of the schools managed by this Local Authority Independently as laid down in Rule No. 37 of the Bombay Primary Education Rules of 1924. These examinations were conducted by the Superintendents, :Special Utrdu Inspector and some tramed, experienced and sehior Headmasters of the schools.

Detailed information about the percentage etc. - at the annual examination of the several standards of every school separately "will be found in appendix II-B.
in: (a) Inspection of Municisial Primairy Schools by Government Inspecting: Officers:-This year'all the Marathi Municipal:Boys' and girls' .Schools were inspeated late by the Deputy Educational Inspector, P Poona, and his -Assistants in the month of February 1926 ; and hence their Annual Inspection Reports of, the: individual schools as well as the General report in this connection have Hot yet been received. All the Municipal Crdu Boys' and Gills' Schools : Were inspected by the: Duputy Educational. Inspectọ! of Urdu : Schools C. D. , and Inspectress of Urdu Girls' Schools C. D: in the months of November, and Angust 1925 Trapeectively, and the .suggestions; made in: their reports were attended to: as; far; asp possible.

(b) Scholarshbp:-Three boys from the Municipal Marathi Boys Schoors Nos. 1,5 , and 8 obtained success in the Governmant Xiddle School

Scholarship examination in the Poona District standing at the top of the succesful candidates. In order to give encouragement to stadents to go in for: these competition examinations, the School Board was pleased to give a reward of Rs, 24 to each of the above three pupils and a bonus of Rs. $60 /$-to each of the teachers who trained them specially for this examination.
(c) Three Fall Primary Schools are maintained by this Municipality riz.

1. for Marathi Speaking Boys.
2. " " Girls.
3. " Mahomedan Boys.

The results of the examinations were also quite satisfactory. In last April, 37 candidates from Marathi Full Primary Boys' School No. 8 and three candidates from Urdu Full Primary School (No.10) were sent up for the Government Vernacular Final Examination for boys held at the Poona Centre; out of them 31 and 3 came out sucessiul from Marathi Boy's School No. 8 and Urdu Boys' School No. 10 respectively.
j Girls: appeared from Municipal Giils' School No. 6 for Government Vernacular linal Examination for Girls held in the month of October 1925, and 3 of them passed.
12. Income:-Appendix III gives information regarding the funds at the disposal of the School Board during the year under review. On the whole there is a decrease of Rs 14863-9-0 over that of the last year, the causes of. increase and decrease under several heads being given in short below:-
(I) Fees in primary Schools:-The School Board made it their policy to give all sorts of facilities to the poor and deserving students by grant in free studentships in those boys' Schools, which are not still entirely fiee. this item shows an increase of Rs. 397-6-9 which is due to the increased municipal Boys' Schools.
( II ) Goverıment grant-in-aid for Primary Education:-There is an increase of Rs. 5388 on this item. The Government-grant received for the year under review is not one-half of the actual expenditure inctrred on Primary, Educatiou during the last year as before. It would be based according to the nerv rules of Government Grants under Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923 on the total estimated obligatory expenditure admitted for grant for 1925-26, but there is a difference found between the figures of total obligatory expenditure of the Educational Inspector C. D's Office and this office, and further correspondence in this respect is going on at present.
(III) Government grant-in-aid for attendance allowance as per $G$. R. No. 560 of $29 t h$. Marchl 1926 to the Head Master and First assistants! of the Primary Schools:-A grant of Rs. 3094 was received on 31st March 1926. The payment of this amount is to be made after the final orders from the Director of Public Instruction, are issued.
(IV) Government grant-in-aid for the purchase of sites for the new School-buildings and constructions:--No such grant was received during the year under review.
(V) Local Fund Cess on the lands within the Municipal Limits:--. This item shows an increase of Rs. 168-13-4; which is. due to the amount of the increased Local Fund Cess,
( VI.) Donations:-The Local Authority, was requested to draw the interest on Funds, - placed at its disposal by certain gentlemen for the distribution of prizes. The amount, however, has not jet been made available during the year under review,

The Pròmary Education Fund:-As laid down in the Bombay Primary Education Rule No. 141 of '1924, it is obligatory for the School Board of each local Authority to maintain this Fund independent of the Municipality's other General Funds. During the year under review arrangements in this regard could not be carried out owing to several unavoidable diffculties and it is expected that every thing would be set right early in the beginning of the next year.

The fund placed at the disposal of the school:Board this year were made. up as follows: -

N. B.:-The sanctioned Budget included this amount of Rs. 184000 for acquistion of School Building sites and provision for constructing new buildings over them.

Expenditure:-Details regarding the expenditure on the School Board office Establishment, Municipal Primary Schools and other items concerning primary education are given in Appendix IV. The total expenditnre on Primary education amounted to Rs. 161070-6-8 in the year under review, as against Rs. 161790-7-0 in the previous year, showing a net decrease of lss. 720-0-4. The details of increase and decrease are explained in short under. each subhead below:-

School Board officc Establishment and office contingency:-Tbis item shows an increase of Rs. 465-0-2 which is mainly due to annual increments of pay to the office staff, and additional printing charges for the new forms required for the office and schools.
(2) Salaries of Mistresses and peons with pension fund:-This item shows an increase of Rs. 7266-8-6 which is due to the following causes.
( 1) Annual promotions due to primary teachers. ( vide appendix VIII) (ii) The number of temporary teachers being increased in the course of the year owing to the increased number of students in several schools.
(ii) Pension contribation being paid into the Government Treasury acoording to the new revised rules sanctioned by Government for payment of pension contribution on behalf of trained and untrained primary.teachers.
(3) Rent of School Buildings:-There is an increase of Rs.3317-13-8; under this head as the rents of several old school houses were increased on account of hiring additional rooms there to accommodate more classes owing . to the increased number of children in these schools and taking new houses for opening new primary schools in different localities.
(4) Water Tax:-TThere is an increase of Re. 24-3-9 which is due to. the supply of new water pipes to:some of the schools that were in great need. of them.
(5) New Furniture:-There is an increase of Rs. 2346-7-10 which is due to the supply of new wooden furniture such as benches, chairs, blackboards, boxes, etc. for the additional_classes owing to the increased number of children in severel schools.
(6) Contigency for schools including sewing malerials etc:-There is an increase of Rs, 732-7-9 which is due to the increase in the amounts of contingency paid every month to the schools where the number of children increased and to the sanctioning of small sums to schools in localities of backward classes for distributing sweetmeats amongst school children with a: view. to : induce them to attend schools regularly.
( 7 ) New books and maps:-There is a decrease of Rso 13-7-9 only.
(8) New School Buildings:-No sum was spent under this head du-: ring the year under review.
(9) Purchase of sites for new School Buiddings:-No 'sum was spent on this head during the year onder report.
(10) Ropairs to school Buildings:--This item shows an increase of Rs 2322-1.5-11 as bills of repairs of last year were pending and were to be paid during the year under review in addition to the repairs charges for the current year.
(11) Prines paid from the interest acciuing from the Donation Funds placed at the disposal of this municipality by several gentlemen of. the city:-As previously stated the amount has not been made available from the Local Authority.
(12) Scientifio Apparatus:-There is an increase of Rs, 2i-10-0 only.
(13) Gyminasiumi--There is an increase of Rs. $1140-3-5$ which is mainly due to the increased rents of playgrounds and expenditure incurred on account of medical inspection of school children.
( 14 ) : School librasies:--There is an increase of Rs. $0-3-0$ only.
(15) Experiment of New curriculusm for Girls schools:-No expen:diture was incurred on this item during the year 1924-25 while this year new purchases were made for Girls' Schools from the amount provided for this item; hence, it shows an increase of Rs. 172 during the year under review.
(16) Children's Libraries in schools:-There is an increase of Rs. 76-5-6 under this ihead owing to the purchase of more books than in last year.
(17) Teacherst Training school and continuation classes:-The increase of Rs. 1525-8-10 is due to the fact that the expenditure on this head was incurred only for four months during the course of the last year, while
this year: expenditure on the Marathi Training class was incorred till 'the end of November 1025 and then on Marathi and Urdu Vernacular Final Classes for Mistresses from December 1925 to the end of the year in addition to the expenditure incurred on the Urdu Training class for the whole year.
(18) Gratuity:-There an increase of Rs 199-4-0; because Roshanbi, the retired call-woman of Municipal Urdu Girls school No. 8 and Shaik Gaffur the Headmaster of B. S. No. 21 who retired, were paid gratuity according to rules during the year under review.
(19) Temporary and Provisonal allowance to primary school teachers:There is a decrease of Rs. 1625-8-7 which is due to the fact that the payment of these allowances is suspended since December 1925 as informed by the Educational Inspector, C. D. in bis letter No S/64 (b)-Poona City-P of 9th . December 1925 until the matter is decided finally by Government.
(20) Handicraft and clay modelling:-There is a decrease of Rs. 45-8-3 only on this head.
(21) Manual Training:-( Instruction in spinning by the use of " Sp . indles. " ):-There is an increase of Rs. $139-15-4$ as instruction in spinning was reintroduced in Municipal Schools during the year under review and a special teacher was appointed on Rs. 40 p. m. for this purpose.
(22) Free and Voluntary Primary Education:--The increase of Rs. 4257-6-6 on this head was on account of the fact that four new day Schools and one night School were opened during the year under review.
(23) Preliminary arrangement for compulsory Elemenitary Education within the Poona Oity Limits:--This Municipal Local Authority sanctioned the sum of Rs. 5000 for preliminary arrangements for the compulsory Elementary Education Scheme to be introduced within the Municipal City limi- : ts; for this purpose a Ctnsus office was opened from the 15th February 1926 in order to take a Census of Children of School-going age according to the provisions made in the Bombay Primary Education act, 1923 within the Poona City Municipal limits and preparing Schemes for the same. Expenditure of Ils. $740-7-7$ was incurred on this account till 31st March 1926.
(24) Mruicipal Grant-in-aid to local Non-municipal Primany Schocls:--This item shows a decrease of Rs. 22708-8-0 as compared with the expenditure of the last year under this item, because no such grants were paid to these private Schools by the Municipality, during the year under review, owing to a communication from Government, regarding the payment of such grants by the Municipality. This question was referred to the Local Autho: rity for consideration and bas not been finally decided by that body.

## GliNERAL REMARKS.

Compulsory Elementary Education in the Poona Gity Mfunicipal District:-It has been the practice of.the School Board to note down the important events every year-in the Administration Report in connectiinn with compulsory Education. This year the Poona City Municipal Local Authority declared on 18th December 1925. its intention, as required by section 10 of Bombay

Prinary Education Act of 1923, to jutroduce Compulsory Elementary educatiou within the City Limits and sanctioned Rs. 5000 to enable the School Boarl to take an Educational ceusus of .children of School going age, and to prepare the necessary schemes of compulsory Elementary Education to be introduced in the whole City of Poona for children of both the, Sexes. The School Board soon after considered the Resolution and laid down a universal progranme of compulsory education within the Municipal area, which covered the period of the next five years, and commenced the work of taking a Census of children in different peths of the 'City from the 15th February 1926. A : special Census officer. was appointed for the purpose, and lie was providen with an adequate staff of enumerators and clerks. A detailed report of the Census Officer about the work of his office may be found in Appendix VI from which the five groups, into which the City is divided for the parpose of the Compulsory edncation scheme proposed to be carried out completely within the period, of five years, will be known. After obtaining the actual figures of children of, School-going age from the Census, the work of preparing a scheme of the first Group for the five years was undertaken in March 1926: The Scheme is being prepared as laid down in section 11 of the new Act and Government Kules thereuader:

School-louses:-6918 children are learning in 39 Muxicipal Schools during the year under review. All the school houses are hired excepting those belonging to Boys' - Schools in Somwar, Mangalwar and Bhamburda.

The school building in Somwar (B.S. No. 4 ) is a gift to the Munici-: pality by the late R. B. Hari Raoji Chiplunkar. This building has been.consi; derably improved by the addition of 3 more class rooms and two flushing privies and a flusbing-type Urinal for the use of children. The School building id Mangalwar peth (B. S. No. 12 ) belongs to the Municipality and is specially' intended for the use of the children of the Depressed classes. Uinfortunately, it is situated on the bauks of the Naczari Nala, a stremmet notorious for its insanitary and unlygeinic conditions. The School is growing in atteudance.' Every year efforts are being made by the School Board and the.Local Authrity to shift this school from the present unclean area to a convenient and healthy, place, but all attempts so far failed as it was not possible to get a building on hire auy where in that locality. The School Board, therefore, this year thought it desirable to acguire a plot of ground in that locality and actually recommended a site for acquisition to the local Authority. The School Duilding in Bhamburdal also belongs to the Municipality. This part of the town is growing in importance owing to development under the townplanning scheme. The School is also growing in attendance. The School Board, therefore selected a site ad joining the school and recommended to the Local Authority to acquire the same to. avoid future difficulties.

All the remaining schools are housed in hiured buildings.: Yarious: improvements from the hygienic points of view have been effected in: many school buildings and sanitary conveniences provided as far as possible. New houses were taken on lease for Girls' schools in Mangal-: war, Bhawani and Crauesh and for Boys' School in Bhawani; additional : rooms were hired for Boys' school -in , Mangalwar and Nana, and for: Girls' schools in Rasta and Sadashiv as the increase in attendance demianded. The work of securing houses for neev schools to be opened. at Gulteksdi, Blangihatti, Bhawani, Navi peth; Narayan and Kasba: peths, is going ou: Thie School Board however finds it very difficuit to secure: suitable houses for schools and consequtently the "programme of the Schiont"

Board to expand primary education in the backward areas on voluntary basis is being interfered with inspite of the great need for schools in these lccalities. Unless and until the Local Authority construct new buildings of its own for schools, this problem will not be solved satisfactorily. The School Board is giving their anxious consideration to this difficult question and hope to submit a building programme for the consideration of the Local Authority, alongr with the Compulsory Education Scheme.

New School Buildings:-The Local Authority has already decided to erect four new buildings for model schools in each quarter of the City; each costing Rs, 26000 . Plans and estimates of two buildings, the sites for which have already been acquired at Shanipar and Durjinsing puga, have been approved by the School Board and sent to the Local Authority for taking further action in the matter. It is to be remembered, the Municipality floated a loan of Rs. 52000 in the market at 6 pc . rate of interest in 1923, for the courstruction of 4 school buildings, the Government contributing av equad amount under the old arrangement. It is hoped the Local Authority will move the Government in the matter to accord their approval and sanction and expedite the construction of these buildings, so long delayed. Two more sites bave been selected by the School Board for School Buildings, one in Bhawani and the other in Kasaba Peth as recommended to the Local Authority for acquisition.

Play Grounds:-Every school house ought to possess some open space for the recreation of children; but in a congested place like Poona City, this is not to be. However, the School Board is trying to meet this difficulty, by the selection of an open space for a playground for a group of schools, situated nearly. Boys Schools in Somwar, Mangalwar and Rasta have a common playground in Rasta. Boys' Schools in Ganesh and Rawiwar, have a common playground in Rawiwar. Narayan peth Boys' Schools have a playground of their own. As in the case of houses, difficulty is also experienced in securing open spaces for playgrounds.

Ohildrens' and 'Teachers' Libraries in Schook:-This year also some useful books were added to the Central School libraries for children and to the Teachers' Library. School children made use of the books in these libraries specially started for their benefit and took interest in this matter. The Headmasters and other teachers also used to take much interest in reading books kept in the Teachers' Library and it is hoped these libraries would be made use of more and more in course of time.

Municipal Training Scheol and continuation classes for teachers:-As will be seen from the last year's Report, the Training Classes were re-opend in December 1924 after effecting certain important changes in the working of their schemes and continued their work smoothly till the end of Training College year i. e. up to December 1925. The main object of conducting these training classes is to eliminate gradually the untrained element in the teaching staff and thereby increase the efficiency of the Schools under the control of the Municipslity in every respect. A detailed account of these classes will be found in para 10 from which it will be seen that there is a gradual increase in the number of trained teachers and decrease in that of untrained ones. • During the year under review the Mohamedan teachers attending these classes were given special concessions and facilities. However the Marathi Training class was discoutiuued from December 1925 for some time, as the number of first
year Trained teachers was found adequate according to Government Rules under Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923. The Urdu Training class continued its work throughout the year under review.

Vernacular Final continuation classes were started from December 1925 in order that the Municipal Marathi and Urdu school mistresses, who had not passed the new Government V. F. examination for girls, may take advantage of it and get throngh this V. F. examination for being qualified. A detailed account of these classes is given in para 10 of this report.

Grant-in aid to the Registered Non-Municipal grimary schools within the municipal limits:-No grants were paid to such institutions during the year under review as Government had intimated that the local Autborities should not pay grants to these privste schools this year, since government made arrangements to pay annual grants to them directly according to the grant-in-aid rules laid dewn under the Bombay Primary Elucation Act of 1923. This communication of Government is under consideration of the Local Authority.

It is to be remembered that Poona City Municipality was declared a Local Authority, as provided by the Act of 1923 and as such should have taken control of all the private non-Municipal primary schools in Poona City. The Local Authority will have to pay now grants to these non-Municipal private institutions according to Rules made under the Act. The School Board after carefully scrutinizing the position of the Local Authority not to take control of these institutions until Government placed at the disposal of the Local Authority all the amounts that they were paying as grants to these institutions in addition to the inspecting charges, as it was found that the Municipality under the new Rules had to incur more expenditure on account of grants while Government was actually sharing less than before this Mumicipality was declared a Local Authority.

This matter was referred to Government in July last and reply is still awaited.
6. Physical exercises in schools:-Three Dirll-masters : were entrusted with the work of Drill and games in all the Municipal' Boys' Schools. New courses of phrsical culture for each standard of a primary school are framed aud are being considered further, Attempts are being made to secure some more play-grounds for schools in different parts of the City. To encourage the spirit of many games and sportsmanship amongst the School children, the School Board had handed over the sum of Rs. 1000 sanctioned by the General: Committee for holding competitions in games and sports of primary School Boys to the President of the Tournament Committee appointed by the Decaan Cymblhana to which its whole management was entrusted, and these sports , were held in October 1925 on the Deccan Gymkhana grounds. Most of the Municipal Schools took part therein and boys from several Municipal Schools won the medals and prizes that were awarded at the time, showing satisfactory progress on the whole.

## 7. Inspection of school Buildings from the sanitary point of view:-

 Suggestions made in the previous reports regarding the sanitation of schools were brought to the notice of the School Board who introduced such changes and additions ir school houses as were required for making them suitable for,teaching purposes. These changes were carried out as far as possible cither hy the house-owuer or by the Muncipality according to the conditions laid down in the leases of the several School houses.
$\because$ 8: Bchene for Medical Inspection of school children in municinal schoals:-As mentioned in the last year's report, the School Board after much deliberation and consultation with the Municipal Health Officer badd framed a scheme of medical inspection of boys in Municipal Schools in the interest of the general health of the young generation. The Medical Officers of Municipal medical dispensaries, .in different peths of the City inspected the boys of the Primary Schools located in the vicinity of their dispensaries, under the kiu'd :supervision of the Health officer of the Municipality and in this way boys in all Municipal Schools were medically examined doring the yenr under revier and .the inspection remarks were communicated to their guardians for doing the needful in the matter. A. report of the Municipal Health officer in this regard will be found in Appendix VII.
9. Grant-in-aid to special night schools of Depressed classes chibliren stasted in Poona by Mr. S. M. Mate M. A. :Secretary of the Association for Removal of untoichability of Depressed class people:-The Municipality, sanctioned Rs. $200 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. as grant to these schools ( 13 in number at present) started by Mr. S. M. Mate M. A. for children of the Depressed classes in diffferent parts of the City. The School Board decided to take cöntrol of these night schools and conduct them as. Municipal Schools, for which arraugements are being made.

10 Annual Extibition:-This was to be held by the end of the year under review; but as the ancual examiuations were to commence just at that time according to the new arrangement of a school year, it- was deciled to postpone it till the middle of the next year. so that it may not disturb the. ordinary work of the Schools.
11. Inspection of Accounts:-The Government Auditors inspected very minutely all the accounts of the School- Board in the month of January and March 1926. Most of the objections raised at the time were removed by. satisfactory explanations. The audit report is not yet received.
12. A separate note dealing with the progress of education of Mohamedan cilildren attending. Urdu Schools under the control of the Muwicipality is appanded hereto (vide Appendix V ) and so no remarks need be made here.

I am extremely indebted to my colleagues on the Board, including Itrs. Kashibai Deodhar, Miss Mac-Michael, and Messers Kanitkar, Shah, Pashankar, Gokhale, "Hajee Abdul Rahaman, Karale, Shinde and Gunjal, for the keenness they have showin in the work and for their valuable co-operation in improving tlie administration of the School Board. Cases of insulordination hitive been punished, acts of indiscipline have been severely dealt with; reegular and punctual attendance both in the case of children and ceachers have been enforced, , Schools were thoroughly equipped, sapitary improvements have been effected in various buildings; Medical Inspection of Boys was conducted; : sports were encouraged in order to give an impetus to physical edueation; teachere were recommeited degent salaries. Thus the leelp froun my colleagues

was invaluable. As already stated, the present School Board office staff is unable to meet the additional and heavy responsibilities thrown on them under the operation of the Act. However, they have been ungrudging by trying their best to cope with the increased work. It is hoped the Local Authority would relieve the present situation by sanctioning the schedule of the post of the Administrative Officer, which appointment must be filled under the Act. The School Board is also thankful to the Local Authority and its President, Hao Bahadur L. J. Apte, for their co-operation, and it is boped these cordial relations would continue in future as before.

(A Note on the Progress of mohamedan Education in the munioival Urdu Schools )

In the year under review there were eleven day schools for Mohamedan children, out of which six were for boys and five for girls; two new schools, one for boys and the other for girls. were opened on trial last year and they have shown good progress during the course of this year.

Three day Schools are entirely free and the rates of fees charged in the other Urdu schools are much lower than those charged in Marathi Schools.: :

All the Urdu Girls' Schools are free. There were 821 students on the rolls on 31st March 1926 as against 853 students of the previous year. The number of boys and girls was 548 and 273 respectively as against 606 and 247 of the last year. The slight decline in the attendance of Boys in Urdu schools is due to the elimination of names of boys who were found to be continually absent for over two months. This rule has been strictly observed this year.

## EXPENDITURE.

The Municipality; incurred an expenditure of Rs. 18318 approximately for education of the children in Urdu Schools during the year under reprt, as against Rs. 21423 of the last year, the decrease being due to non-payment of grands to private and aided institations, owing to Goveriment letter as reported elsewhere.

## GENERAL REMARKS.

The monthly average attendance was 538 and 240 in Trdu Boys' and Giris' Schools respectively. There were 40 teachers, out of whom 23 were trained. In order to give impetus to the progress of primary education in the Urdu Schools, the School Board is trying its best to supply qualified and trained teachers to the Urdu schools.-both for boys' and girls'. With this view,: the Government was requested to supply trained teachers to the Municipal Schools. So far, the School Board conid secuire the services of
only pue, trained romen tencher, The Schwol Buard has also decided to appoint all "women teachers in Girls' Sclools. There are at ${ }^{4}$ yresent two male teachers-working in Girls' Schools and it is hoped, the Board will he able to replace these by woinen teachets; luring the course of the next year. The Board, however, finds it difficilt to obtain good qualified, trained teachers. To get over the difficulty of securing more trained men the School Board decided to continue the Urdu training class. for males started in December 1924, and gare more concessions and facilities to the student teachers of mohomedan community by way of encouragement The work of this class continued satisfactorily throughout the year and three candidates appeared for the Urdu First year training certificate examination of the Government Training college and all the three came out successful.
2. The School Board also opened Urdu Vernacular Final class (for women ) in December 1925, in order to.enable the unqualified women teachers in the Municipal Schools, to secure Vernacular Final Examination Certificate. It is hoped, these classes would serve the purpose for which they are intended: In' order to improve the general tone and standard of education in Urdu Schools, the School Board decided to fill up permanently the post of mohomedan Urdu Inspector which was created last year by the School Board and sanctioned by the Local Authority. The post was widely advertised in Urdu papers'; inviting'applications. The selection of a suitable candidate for the post is at present under consideration of the 'School Board:

Tha Headmaster of School No. 10, Mr. Banemia Bandemia, continued to act temporarily, part-time Urdu Inspector: in addition to dis duties as Headmaster:

Special eflorts-were made by the Board duriug the year. under review to interview the parents and guardians of Muslim children 'and to prevail upon them to send theie children to the schools for the adrancement of tlie interests of their community.

[^0]and his assistants aud by the Inqeectress of Lirdn Girls' Scbool C. D. respecively. The suggestions made by these officers were attended to as for as was possible. All the schools were also inspected by the Superintendent,Assistant Superintendent and Urdu Inspector. Surprise Visits were also paid by the members of the School Board.

Of the 3 full primary schools maintained by the Municipality, one is specially reserved for mohomedan children and is under the management of a senior third year trained Headmaster. This school sends candidates for the: Urdu Vernacular Final Examination. It is gratifying to note that the two new Schools opened in Nana peth are showing satisfactory progress.

School Buildings:-Housing accommodation for all the children of Trrlu Schools has been provided by the Nchool Board as satisfactorily as possible. The problem of providing with ventilated, good and :spacious School buildings for our children connot be solved unless the Municipality undertakes to construct new School buildings of its own. Of the sites that have been already acguired by the Municipality for school buildings, one is specially reserved for Mohomedan community in Rawiwar peth. The plans and estimates of this school bave been already forwarded to the Local Authority for obtaining approval and sanction of Govt. It is hoped the Local Authority will move to Govt. to expedite this urgent matter.

Existing. School Buildings:-All the school : buildings were examined from a sanitary point of view this year and improvements wherever possible. were effected; additions and alterations were made to suit ths sanitary and hygienic requirements. I aru indebted to Shet Hajee Abdul Rahaman, the elected Mobomeden representative on the School Board for his co-operation and various suggestions to further the progress of primary education in urdu schools. The School Board is trying its best to meet the needs of the Mohomodan Commuity by effecting improvements; in various ways.

Sir:
I have the honour to submit the following report about the medical inspection of Municipal School Childreu.

The total number examined was 1806 .
Carious teeth are again reported to be the principal disease from which children are known to be suffering. The moutb and the odour therefrom were in almost all cases smelling foul, which clearly indicates that the toilet of the mouth is grossly neglected. The foul smell from their months indicates that their degestion to some extent is at fault, and needs correction. The principal defect that I noticed when inspecting same of the schools was that' many children had prominent abdomens, with their legs and arms like thin sticks. Want of fresh air, insanitary sehool buildings, and living in insanitary abodes in thickly crowded localities, are the concomitant causes for their weak constitution and pale faces. Tonsilitis, a very commou disease noted amongst school children also points to unwholesome food initating both the throat and the stomach. Clean clothes and surroundings were absent in many instances. Scabies is common amongst the children. The teachers were instructed personally to isolate such cases. They shuld be sent home till cured. Malaria spleens were prominant in some instances. I would suggest that eiementary hygiene sloould be a part of a students curriculum. The beginning should be made with the school teachers who also were found clad in dirty clothes. The plausible excuse that they are poor has no ground. I would suggest to the School Board to engage lady visitors to instruct and advice school children both male and female.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the administration of the Schools Committee for the year 1925-26.
2. Constitution of the Schools Conmittee:-The personnel of the School Board changed on ' 'st April $1925^{\prime}$ along with that of the Genergl Boaid difter the triennial election of this Mimicipal Body held in March 1925, and the new School Board was composed of the following seven members:-

This School Board continued to work as before dung the first quarter of the year ending 30th June 1920 , when its function became restricted accrording to the resolution of the. General Body to education other than primary owing to the newly constituted School Bcard having been brought into existence on 1st July 1925, according to section 3(1) (1) of the Primary Elucation Act of $192 \therefore$.

As the new School Board, constituted under the Primary Iducation Act of 1923 , had to perform furctions relating to primary education only, this School Board now transformed into the "Schools Committee "attended to education other than primary.

Meetings of the Schools Conmittee:-TMe SAcLools Committee held 6 meetings from 1st July 1925 to 31 March 1926, while the total number of meetings in 12 months convened was 9: 34 items of business were disposed of in meetings in the year under review, while 13 litems were disposed of by circular resolutions. $:$ : $:$ :

The Municipal Victoria Jubilee Technical School was under the directmanagement of the Schools Committee and its report is given below:-

Technical School:-In the Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School' the number of students on roll decreased from 103 ( 63 full time and 40 half time ) to 100 ( 60 full time and 40 half-time) at the end of the year under review. The average attendance of students per month was $49^{\circ} 5$. The nupuber of students that learned the Drawing? Course ${ }_{2}$ Carpentry, Sign-board Painting. and Smithy was 100 . Out of the 60 students, 51 wele Brahmins, 8 Marathas, and one Indian Christain.

This Technical School contains a special class for Drawing for the benifit cf such local students as cannot afford to become regular studenis of any other scbool. A fee of annas four is charged per head; however, teachers and students from Municipal Schools, Local Aided Schools and Training Colleges attending this special drawing class are exempted from paying fees. This class was attended by 19 students on an average during the year under review.

The School sends up candidates for Flementary and Intermediate Drawing IExaminations of the School of A1t, Bombay. This year 24 candidates were sent up for the Elementary lixamination, and 17 for the Intermediate Examination; out of those, 5 and 10 passed in these examinations respectively.
?!- The annual examination offthe school was conducted: according to the rules in force in the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute of Bombay, and arrangements were made to hold:it under the direct supervision of the examiners deputed by the Committee of direction for Technical Education in this presi-
dency. The following table shoms the satisfictory tesults of the exammation of teveral classes:-

An amnual grant of lis. 1287 was received for this Technical School from Governuent this year according to the recommendation of the committee of. Direction for Technical Education in this presidency. It is not equal to lalf the expenditure incurred by the Muncipality for the pasment of the salaries of the teaching staff of the Technical School as per grant in-aid code rules for Technical Schools. A Government Circular concerning this curtailment of Government grants was considered by the Schools Comwittee, and the suygestions made are under consideration.

The Menbers of the Schcols Committee and other Muiticipal Couriciliors paid turyrise vigits to this echool from time to time during the year under revier:-

Government Inspecting Officers for Techuical Education inspected this school in the month of November 1925 and conducted the annual examination of this school in the fourth week of March 1926. All of them expressed satisfaction about the work of this school in geneial.

The school was under the direct supervision of Mr. Sathe, throughont the year under review. He is a Méchanical and Electrical Engineer and bas undergone special training in the Normal Class of the Eigineering College of Poona. He is qualified as a Technical School Teacher and possesses experience of practical work, The Technical School is improving now, and is showing better results owing to the effortsiof the present Superintendent. Besids the Superin* tendent the Techuical School staff consists of a Carpentry teacher, a Drawing master, a Painting master, a teacher of Smithy, an Arithmetic and English teachier and a Meistry Class Instructor. A inw appointment of a Tunier has been recently made. As mentioned in the last years' report the revised courses of instruction for this Technical School were followed during the year under review, The Municipality, having approved of them, sanctioned the necessary amount of additional expenditure on that account as an experiment for the year. The new Mistry class, started two years ago was continued and the courses laid dorwu in the revised scheme were started. At present the following subjects are being taught in this Institution:-
. 1. Carpentry; casting in verious forms, wood atd metal tarning, polishing wood work and sign-board painting, carpentry drawing, Machine Drawing, Art drawing, Smithy, Press-work (composing, printing and book binding) and English. No fees are charged for the instruction given in this school except for drawing, as stated thbove.

Scholarshins:-Two scholarships for each of the Second, Third and Fouirth yedr Classes each of Rs. 2, 3, and 4 per month respectively, are given by the Municipality on the result of periodical School Examinations by open competition in order to: encourage students totake up courses of techuical education. There is also one more scholarship called Divan Bahadur K. 1. Gorlbole gcholarship of Rs. 5 p. m. to be paid under certain conditions to a student who stands highest in the amual examination of the courses of this school.

The school is attached to the workshop of this Municipality for practical and experimental purposes. Rejairing and other work is carriect out with the aid of machinery of modern patterus. The materials such as wood, metal .etc. used-by the students of maxuial-training and the tools tsed by .-them are --. supplied free of charge by this school. The students have to deposit a sum of Rs. ${ }^{\prime}$ a as security for the tools given in their charge. The amotint is returued, 'to' them'when they complete one year's full course. It is a great advantage to the strudents of this school 'that they' can actually see hooy the Municipal worminuu"work with the aid of the Machinery of the work-shop and how to carry ơn actual work on the steam aid oil bydines: Atteupts are being made to. start a new class in thit school for Thind 'Class. Mächauical Eingineers' coiurse. The mitter is under considerition and when it is decided incessary action will be taken. It will be seen from this that several measiures, such as revisiou' of courses and starting new paseful classes, adopted: by the, Murucipality : 'have improved the condition, of this school during the last three years; its progress: continues as at present, and this school will make satisfactory provision :For: technical education in the City of Poona.

Draving Grant:-There is a decrease of Rs. $28 \cdot 8-0$ under this head. This year a special grant of Ris. 50 towards the cost of maintaining a Draw ing teacher and equipment sccoiding to grant-in-aid code, schedule $I$, section I, ive 5 was received.
$\therefore$ Techinical School Feeb:-This item shows a decrease of Rs. $7 \cdot 8.0$. Denations:-The amount of Rs: 60 only was received as: interest- on Bombay Inprovement Trust Debentures during the yeal under review.

## EXPENDITURE.

Details regarding expenditure on Technical School, and Grants-in-aid to other special in: : :zations, Free Reading Rooms etec. are given in Appendix II. Details of increase and decrease under each sub-bead are given below:-

Technical Sclool Establishment:-This item shorss an increase of Rs. $106-6-8$, which is due to the appointment of one more hand on the staff of the Technical School to teach additional subjects according to the revised curriculam of that school.

Technical Scliool Contingency:-This item shows an increase of lis, 266-8-7 which is due to the additional printing work of the necessary forms and purchase of stationary for the school.

Machinery-There is a decrease of Rs. 230-8-0 which is due to the fact tlat though there was sanction for the purchase of two nerr machines, one only ( shaping machine ) could be bought before the end of the year under review.

Weaving Class:- There is a decrease of lis. $384 \cdot 3 \cdot 10$, as this class remained close during the year.

Oil engine and Machine repairs:-This item shows an increase of Rs. 1;9$2 \cdot 3$, which is due to repairs and paintiug of machines.

Municipal grant-in-aid to special Institutions and Free Reading Ruoms:-There is a decrease of Rs. 1732-10-0 as the amounts given in 1924-25 were for two years. ( viz, 1924-25 and 1923-24).

Prizes from donation fuuds:-This item shows a decrease of Rs. $56-8-0$ which is due to the fact that interest except that on Bombay Improvement Trust debentures could not be drawn during the year under revien owing to certain dfficulties as new arrangements are being made.

## GENERAL REMARKS.

(1) Requirements of the Municipal V. J. Technical School:-More accommodation is required for the school worl-shop. A full time overseer teacher to work in the teachnical School is a necessity now.
(2) Grants-in-aid to special institutions and free reading rooms:-The Schools Committee appointed a sub-committee to inspect the special institutions and reading rooms, whose managers had applied for Municipal Grant and to recommend the amounts of Municipal grants to them. The recommendations of this sub-committee were sanctioned by the Schools Committee and Muricipal grants amounting to Rs. 3792 were paid to these Institutions during the year under review.

The work of the Schools Committee was? carried on by the secretary of the School Board and his staff. The Schools Committee was pleased to place on record their opinion about the work of this staff by passing a resolution on 29th March 1926 that the Schools Conmittee feels much delighted to
place on record the satisfactory work done by Mr. Gatue, the Superintendent, and other people in the School Board Office.

I cannot conclude this Keport without specially alluding to the valuable belp civen cordially by all of my colleagues on the Schools Committee, and by all Municipal Officers as well.

These were conducted by the Assistarit Superintendent of the Municipal Schools with the assistance of some senior Headmasters, and Headmistresses of Trdu Schools. The reaults of annual exannination of Urdu Schools will he found in the Appendix. II. B:

    Special Subjects:-Englishi is being taught as a special subject in Boys School No. 10, in bigher primary standards, namely fifth, sixth, and seventh. The number of students learning English wias 42." 29 Boys appeared for the anpual examination, of whom 13 passed. The remarks nade by Goverument Educational Inspecting officers regarding this, class were satishactory and encouraging. The Municiplity has decided to keep the class as a jeennanent fixture pow specially for the benefit of the children of the Mahomedan communities as will be found from the reports of Jast: $\overline{4}$ years.
