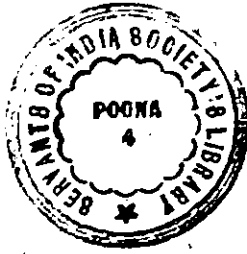

I. CHANGES IN POPULATION OR BOUNDARIES.

(a) There has been no change in population assumed for calculation during the year. The population as counted at the Census of 1911 is 1, 17, 256 and this figure is taken as the basis for all calculations.

(b) Changes in boundaries :—

The limits of the Poona City Municipality were extended by Government in the year under report, as per Government Resolution, General Department, No. 7414 dated 3rd September 1919. The boundaries of the Poona City Municipal District, as now altered with the sanction of Government stand as below :—

North :—The southern side of the Wellesley or Kirkee road from the Bolai quarry westwards to G. I. P. Railway overbridge; thence the line of the said Railway to the level crossing No. 65 in Bhamburda on Poona Ganeshkhind Road; thence along the southern side of the road up to the foot of the Chatarsingi Hills by the northern boundary of Survey No. 110 in the Village of Bhamburda.

East :—The western side of the road from the Bolai quarry towards the Synagogue Street up to the commencement of the approach to the City going by the south of Ghorpade's Takia and Babaji Manaji's Coach Factory; thence a straight line to the western end of the bridge on the Manik Nala near Sachapir Street; thence the Poona Military Cantonment boundary as far as the south-eastern corner of Survey No. 95 in the Village of Munjeri.

South :—Eastern and southern boundary of Survey No. 95 of Munjeri to the lane at the north-east corner of Survey No. 96. Eastern boundary of Survey No. 98, 97 crossing the canal in a straight line with the eastern boundary of Survey No. 139, eastern boundary of Survey Nos. 139, 137 southern boundary of Survey No. 137. Eastern boundary of Survey Nos. 136 and 146. Southern boundary of Survey Nos. 146, 147. Western boundary of

Survey No. 147. Southern boundary of Survey No. 131, and southern corner of Survey No. 130. Thence eastern side of the Odha running by the side of Survey Nos. 288, 287 and 286. Thence southern boundary of Survey No. 286 of the Village of Munjeri. Thence the eastern boundary of the Poona Bangalore Road north-wards to the Canal. Thence westwards along the north bank of the Canal to the south-west corner of Survey No. 11 of Parbatti.

West :—Western boundary of Survey No. 110 of Bhamburda, northern boundary of Survey No. 111, western boundary of Survey No. 111, to the north-east corner of Survey No. 86 crossing the old Aundh Road. Northern boundary of Survey Nos. 86, 87 and 89. Western boundary of Survey Nos. 89 and 90. Southern boundary of Survey No. 90. Western boundary of Survey No. 91, portion of southern boundary of Survey No. 91, western and south-western boundary of Survey No. 92, southern boundary of Survey No. 92-A. South-western boundary of Survey No. 83. Western boundary of Survey No. 82 and thence to join the corner of Survey No. 226 in a straight line with the north-east corner of Survey No. 80. Northern boundary of Survey Nos. 80, 79, 241, 78, 77; western boundary of Survey Nos. 77, 240 and 76 in the Village of Bhamburda; portion of northern boundary of Survey No. 54; western boundary of Survey Nos. 54, 65, 66, 72, 79 and 86; portion of southern boundary of Survey No. 87 in the village of Erandavna as far as the junction of the Canal with the Paud Road; Thence the western boundary of Survey No. 88 and the southern boundary of Survey Nos. 88, 89, 91 and 92 and thence south-west and south-east boundaries of Survey No. 100 in the village of Erandavna as far as the north east end of Survey No. 99; thence by the river Mutha up to Lakdi Pool and thence from Lakdi Pool to Ambil Odha; thence the Ambil Odha as far as the bridge on the road to Sinhagad near the village of Parbatti; thence from the Ambil Odha to cross the road and to join the south-west corner of Survey No. 11 of Parbatti;

II COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM NO. 1.

2. In the year under report, there were 74 meetings of the General Committee, as against 90 in the preceding year and 561 items of business were disposed of, as against 645 disposed of in the year 1918-19; out of these 74 meetings, 4 were ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January as required by the Municipal Act, and 22 were special and 48 adjourned meetings. 61 Meetings of the Managing Committee were called during the year under report, out of which 4 were adjourned for want of quorum; all these were well attended, as will be seen from appendices 1-B, 1-C and 1-D.

III. The constitution of the Municipality remained unchanged in the year under report; there was, however, a slight change in its personnel. The Hon'ble Khan Bahadur E. H. Jaffer resigned his seat and Mr. Abdul Haroon Jaffer was nominated in his stead. Subhedar Bahadur Posheti Muri, a nominated Councillor, died on 9th March 1920. Further, as regards the Officers of the Municipality, the Engineer's post was filled up by the appointment of Mr. S. B. Tabolkar, B. A. B. E. as the permanent incumbent. Mr. K. R. Bhide, B. E. resigned his post in the Municipality.

4. For information regarding the constitution of the several Executive and Consultative Committees and the attendance of the members thereat, reference is invited to the appendix No. 1-D.

III. CHANGES IN THE SYSTEM OF TAXATION.

5. A new tax called Drainage and Cesspool Tax was brought into force with the sanction of Government (vide G. R. No. 4577 dated 2nd June 1919 G. D.) from 1st October 1919. Certain alterations were effected in the rates of Conservancy-cess, Non-privy-cess etc.

IV. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM NO. II.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 53,107. The income amounted to Rs. 7,70,148 ; both these together made up a total of Rs. 8,32,255. It may be pointed out that the income shown here as well as in the following paras is the net income. It is exclusive of the Octroi duty collected but subsequently refunded (vide G. R. No. 1147 dated 19th February 1907 G. D.). The income for the year consisted of the following items :—

As compared with the previous year's total, the income (leaving aside " Extraordinary and Debt " which is only an adjustment account) shows an increase of Rs. 1,08,827 which is due to the increased revenue from all heads of income except " Realisation under Special Acts ".

(a) *Octroi* :—As a separate chapter is devoted to Octroi, a detailed description of its recoveries and working will be given there in.

(b) *House, Bhangee and Wheel Taxes* :—These brought in during the year Rs. 87,674, Rs. 42,866, Rs. 7,581 respectively making a total of Rs. 1,38,121 as against Rs. 59,667, Rs. 86,083 and Rs. 8,866 making a total of Rs. 1,04,616 in the year 1918-19. The collections made during the year under report show an increase of Rs. 33,505. The increase is due partly to the increased income from House-tax and partly to the increased rates of taxes such as Conservancy, Non-privy cess etc.

During the year under report, a new tax called the Drainage and Cesspool Tax was levied from 1st October 1919. This brought in Rs. 16,969, whereas no such tax was levied in the preceding year. The amount of arrears recovered

during the year was Rs. 10,096 as against Rs. 5,239 in the previous year. The arrears at the close of the year 1918-19 were Rs. 12,231 while those that remained to be recovered at the close of the year under report were Rs. 27,702.

- (c) *Tax on Professions and Trades* :—This brought in Rs. 1,188 during the year as against Rs. 1,183 in the year 1918-19 showing an increase of Rs. 5. The increase needs no explanation.
- (d) *Water-rate* :—This brought in Rs. 79,249 during the year as against Rs. 66,493 in the year 1918-19 showing an increase of Rs. 12,756. The increase is chiefly due to the General Water-cess which was levied throughout the year as against 6 months during the previous year as well as to the rise in the number of house connections.
- (e) *Dog-tax* :—This brought in Rs. 185 as against Rs. 258 showing a decrease of Rs. 73.
- (f) *Tax on Plague huts* :—No tax was recovered during the year owing to the fact that there was no out-break of plague in the City and no one went out of the City to live in huts.
- (g) *Realisations under Special Acts. Cattle Pounds* :—The income from this source of revenue was Rs. 1,249 as against Rs. 1,765 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 516. The number of cattle impounded in the year 1919-20 was 4,728 whereas in the year of 1918-19 and 1917-18 it was 7,768 and 6,488 respectively.
- (h) *Rent of lands and houses etc.* :—The income under this head was Rs. 1,858, while it was Rs. 1,356 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 502. The increase is due to a larger amount realised as rent for temporary occupation of side-spaces on roads; a special man was entertained for collection of rents.
- (i) *Sale proceeds of lands and of produce of lands* :—The income from this source was Rs. 5,015 as compared with Rs. 1,882 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 3,133. The increase is due to the fact that the rent of the Manjri farm for the years 1918-19 and 1917-18 was recovered during the year under report. It is also due to larger amounts realised from the auction sale of Babul trees on the Fergusson College Road.
- (j) *Conservancy receipts* :—The income under this head was Rs. 21,551 as against Rs. 6,943 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 14,608. The increase is due to the fact that owing to the scarcity of water to irrigate the

fields, no demand was made for kachra during the year 1918-19. In the year under report, there was a great demand for kachra manure and so a larger amount was realised from the sale of kachra.

- (k) *Fees and Revenue from educational Institutions* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 2,274 as against Rs. 1,981 in the year 1918-19 showing an increase of Rs. 293 which was due to a larger amount realised from fees as the schools were open practically throughout the year.
- (l) *Fees and Revenue from Markets and Slaughter-houses* :—The income from this source was Rs. 54,050 during the year as compared with Rs. 51,193 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 2,846. It is due to larger amounts realised from rents for stalls in the open space of the Reay Market and also from the Juni Mandai near Shanwar Wada. Some of the increase is also accounted for by larger amount of duty levied on animals brought for sale in the Bhamburda Bazar.
- (m) *Other fees* :—The income from this source consists of notice, warrant and comparing fees. This amounts to Rs. 3,366 during the year under report as against Rs. 2,068 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,298. The increase is due partly to a larger amount having been recovered on account of comparing fees for extracts from documents asked for by the public and partly to the greater number of notices and warrants issued to recover Municipal Taxes.
- (n) *Fines under the Municipal Acts* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 2,052 as against Rs. 4,578 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,526. This shows that smaller fines were imposed during the year under report.
- (o) *Interest on Investments* :—The income under this head was Rs. 2,040 as against Rs. 4,926 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,886 which was due to the fact that a sum of Rs. 50,000 placed by the Municipality with the Bank of Bombay as Fixed Deposit with interest was withdrawn.
- (p) *Grants and Contributions* :—The income from this source amounted to Rs. 31,352 as against Rs. 29,380 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 1,972 which was due to the increase in Government grant for Municipal Primary Schools.
- (q) *Recoveries on account of service rendered to private individuals* :—Orders from Public Institutions, Government Offices and private persons are executed at the Municipal Work-shop.

The amount received on this account was Rs. 1,396 as against Rs. 1,627 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 231. It is due to a smaller number of orders having been received by the Work-shop during the year.

(r) *Other items* :—The income under this item amounted to Rs. 1,999 in the year while it was Rs. 955 in 1918-19 showing an increase of Rs. 1,044. It is due partly to the fact that a larger amount (viz., Rs. 552), that lapsed to the Municipal Fund, was credited in the year under report than the amount of the previous year and partly to the amount of Rs. 433 on account of feeding charges of animals impounded in the City Cattle Pound having been credited under this head. During the year under report the Managing Committee issued orders to credit the amount of feeding charges that are received from the owners of animals to the Municipal Funds and to supply daily requirements such as kadbi, grass etc., to the Cattle Pound Keeper from the Municipal Stables. Up to last year the work of receiving the amounts of feeding charges of animals impounded in the Cattle Pound and of purchasing kadba etc. was done by the Cattle Pound Keeper.

(s) *Loans from Government* :—A loan of Rs. 23,000 was received from Government for the purchase of sites for Municipal School Buildings.

(t) *Deposits* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 5,527, which is due to ordinary fluctuations of business.

V. WORKING OF THE OCTROI SYSTEM.

7. The area under the administration of the Poona City Municipality for Octroi purposes includes, in addition to the City Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona, the Suburban Municipal District and the Cantonment of Kirkee. The last had been added to the cordon as an experimental measure under certain conditions for three years from 1st of October 1911 as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 2004 of 19th April 1909 G. D.; but the period was extended by two years by Government in their Resolution No. 6841 dated 3rd January 1915. From the year 1917, the old arrangement still continues but definite orders from Government for its continuance are not yet received. The area, therefore, includes four different units. The Municipality levies Octroi according to the schedule on articles imported into the Octroi cordon and after deducting the amount of duty refunded on account of articles exported and the establishment and other charges from the gross revenue, distributes the remainder among the several Bodies except Kirkee according to the population of each District, as sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 4653 of the 9th November 1895. Kirkee gets the net income from Octroi on its imports excluding all charges which are deducted from the gross revenue as was agreed to by the City Municipality and the Kirkee Cantonment Committee. The figures of income and expenditure given in this chapter therefore relate to the whole of the Octroi Cordon consisting of the four districts and not for the city only, while the figures given in those parts of the report which relate to the City represent the income and the expenditure of the City only.

8. The gross income from Octroi in the year 1919-20 was Rs. 5,11,750 including Rs. 3,982 paid to the Cantonment of Kirkee as against Rs. 4,51,251 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 60,499. The increase is due to the fact that the Octroi rates on most articles were enhanced and brought into force from 1st January 1919. The rates were sanctioned by Government in their Resolution No. 6649 G. D. dated 25th September 1918. Several articles which were not previously subject to Octroi duty but were liable only to pay what was called the Trade Registration fee are given a separate 9th Class called the "Miscellaneous Class."

9. Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 5,11,750, Rs. 62,786 were refunded on account of exports, Rs. 38,210 were spent on establishment, Rs. 5,555 on contingencies, Rs. 266 on repairs to the Naka Buildings, Rs. 699 on Police Establishment and Rs. 184 on uniforms to peons; the amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment in the year 1919-20 was Rs. 3,982 as against Rs. 5,521 in the previous year. Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,11,682 as against Rs. 95,133 of the previous year. Deducting the amount of expenditure from the gross revenue, the remainder i. e. Rs. 4,00,068, was distributed amongst the three Bodies. The City Municipality's share (exclusive of expenses on establishment charges) amounted to Rs. 2,95,301; that of the Cantonment Committee to Rs. 81,150 and that of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 23,608.

10. An amount of Rs. 62,786 was, as mentioned above, refunded in the year 1919-1920 on account of exports as against Rs. 59,958 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 8,828. It is due to the fact that there was a great rise in the claims for refunds. Some articles that were until 1st January 1919 liable to Trade Registration fee, are now made liable to Octroi and are thus subject to refund.

11. The figures quoted above show the results of the working of the whole of the Octroi Department. They show the gross income from and the gross expenditure chargeable to Octroi. But the figures given in the statement Nos. 2 and 3 show only the share of the Poona City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. But it does not require special explanation as it has already been given in the preceding paras dealing with the whole of the Octroi System. The Octroi Establishment has cost 7.6 per cent of the gross income as against 6.8 in the last year. The increase in percentage is due to the fact that Rs. 5,847 were spent on War Allowance to the Octroi Establishment during the year under report.

12. The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of articles.

N. B.—All classes are not given below. Classes IV and IX, for example, are not required.

It will be seen from the above table that the average consumption is within the standard under first four heads in class I. There is an excess under other heads. It is due to the fact that prices of the articles are very high in the market; besides metals, which were charged under Trade Registration fee in the year 1918-19, come now under Octroi and are charged a higher rate than previously.

13. Appendix (II-A) gives detailed information regarding Municipal income from each of 9 classes of articles in the last three years.

VI. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO III.

13. A reference to statement No. III, will show that the total expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 7,20,960, the details being as follows:—

The total expenditure amounted, as shown above, to Rs. 7,20,960 in the year under report as against Rs. 6,13,852 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,07,108. All the sub-heads show increases.

(a) *General Administration*:—This shows an increase of Rs. 910 as compared with the expenditure of the last year. It was due to establishment charges of Bench Magistrates

- having been paid in the year under report, while no such charges were paid in the previous year.
- (b) *Collection of Taxes*:—The expenditure under this head, viz. Rs. 28,607 consisted of the Octroi and the Assessment establishment charges amounting to Rs. 20,116 and Rs. 8,491 respectively, as against Rs. 20,246 and Rs. 5,793 (Total Rs. 26,039) of the last year. This shows an increase of Rs. 2,568. The increase is explained by the fact that the amounts of honorariums of the Special Officers who were appointed to complete the entire revision of the house assessment of the whole city during February and March 1919 and bills of expenses for printing forms etc. were paid during the year under report. This alone cost Rs. 2,888. There is also an increase of Rs. 2,161 in the cost of establishment charges of the Octroi and Collection Departments, while there is no expenditure under the head "Registration Fee establishment" which was Rs. 1193 in the previous year.
- (c) *Refunds*:—This head shows a decrease of Rs. 139. It is due to a smaller amount of water rate having been refunded during the year than in the previous year.
- (d) *Pensions and Gratuities*:—The expenditure under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 25 which is very small and requires no remarks.
- (e) *Fires*:—This head shows a decrease of Rs. 80 which is very small and requires no comment. There were 25 fires in the City during the year under report and the total loss of property as roughly estimated, amounted to Rs. 29,820.
- (f) *Lighting*:—This shows an increase of Rs. 9,430. It is due to greater expenditure incurred specially on the heads of "oil, new lamps, and repairs to old ones" during the year under report than in the previous year, as during 1918-19 there was no sufficient supply of kerosine oil to many street lamps and they had to be left unlighted.
- (g) *Police*:—No special expenditure was incurred on this account by this Municipality. The charges of five constables taken on loan are debited to the Octroi, Assessment and Market Departments.
- (h) *Water supply (Capital outlay)*:—This shows a decrease of Rs. 1664. This decrease is explained by the fact that in the year under report, an expenditure of only Rs. 475 was incurred on laying new lines whereas in the year 1918-19, a sum of Rs. 2131 had been spent on the same work.
- (i) *Water supply (Repairs)*:—This shows a decrease of Rs. 15,826 as compared with the expenditure in the previous year. As stated in the last Administration Report, the Municipality had submitted a representation to Government protesting against the enhanced rate charged for canal water and claiming a refund. Payment of water-rate bills for

about 7 months was kept pending till the decision of Government in the matter was received. A sum of Rs. 23,116 on account of water rate was paid to Government in the year under report where as Rs. 45,641 were paid during the previous year.

- (j) *Drainage-Capital outlay* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 4,900 as compared with the expenditure of the previous year. This is due to capital expenditure incurred by Government on new drainage works.
- (k) *Drainage Establishment and Repairs* :—This shows an expenditure of Rs. 1,00,120 as against Rs. 74,527 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 25,593. The increase is mainly due to a rise in the maintenance charges of drainage pumping stations including renewal of parts. There is a slight increase on cleaning of the Maniknala; on the other hand, there is a decrease of Rs. 3,393 on sub head 'cleaning gutters' as compared with the expenditure on the same head in the previous year.
- (l) *Conservancy* :—The total expenditure on Conservancy is as follows:—

Conservancy would thus appear to have cost in the year under report Rs. 24,970 more than in the previous year; most of the heads such as A. B. C. E. & F show an increase while D. & G. show a decrease; the reasons of increase and decrease are explained in the following paras :—

- (1) *General Supervising Establishment* :—This shows an increase of Rs. 2,612. It is due to salaries of Peth Inspectors and Mokadums having been revised during the year under report.
- (2) *Road cleaning* :—This includes the cost of the road sweeping establishment, new carts, dust-bins, and repairs to the same, removal of rubbish from the City and charges incidental to it. The total expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 26,926 in the year under report as against Rs. 21,678

in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 5,248. There is an increase on the sub heads " establishment, contingency, repairs to dust-bins, and kachra carts, new dust-bins, etc." which accounts for the total increase in the main head.

- (3) *Bhangee service* :—The expenditure under this head includes the pay of Bhangees, new night-soil carts, repairs to old ones, contingency and purchase and feeding of bullocks. The Bhangee establishment cost Rs. 34,164 in the year under report as against Rs. 33,068 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 1,046; the increase is due to some temporary establishment costing Rs. 949 entertained during the year under report. The new night-soil carts cost Rs. 4,037 as against Rs. 835 showing an increase of Rs. 3,202. The increase is due to new night-soil carts made in the year under report. The repairs to old carts cost Rs. 2,803 showing an increase of Rs. 931 which is due to more repairs to the night-soil carts made in the year under report than in the previous year. Contingency cost Rs. 2,345 as against Rs. 1,104 showing an increase of Rs. 1,241. Feeding of bullocks cost Rs. 74,002 as against Rs. 62,371 showing an increase of Rs. 11,631. All these heads show an increase. No expenditure was incurred in purchasing bullocks in the year under report, whereas a sum of Rs. 2,397 was spent on this account in the previous year.
- (4) *Night-soil and Kachra Depots* :—The expenditure under this head includes rent of Depots, repairs to Depots and Depot Establishment. The total cost of these was Rs. 3,630 in the year under report as against Rs. 4,504 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 874. The decrease was due to the fact that during the previous year, additional lands were taken up on rent for stacking kachra as there was no demand for kachra manure owing to the scarcity of water to irrigate the fields and for that purpose additional establishment was maintained, whereas this was unnecessary in the year under report.
- (5) *Latrines and Urinals* :—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 2,799 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,739 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,060. The increase is due to a larger number of latrines and urinals having been repaired this year.
- (6) *Road watering* :—Road watering cost Rs. 6,475 in the year under report as against Rs. 4,887 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,588. The increase is due to higher charges for bullocks and drivers in the year 1919-20 than in the year 1918-19. There is also a slight increase in the cost of water carts in the year under report than in the previous year.

- (l) *Miscellaneous* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 318 when compared with the expenditure during the previous year. Less expenditure was incurred in providing uniforms to servants and this accounts for the decrease.
- (m) *Charges on account of Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors* :—The charge is debited to this new head (vide G. R. No. 936 dated 7th February 1916). The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 4,653 as against Rs. 6,921 showing a decrease of Rs. 2,268. It is due to the fact that the post of the Health Officer was vacant throughout the year.
- (n) *Hospitals and Dispensaries* :—The Municipality maintains three dispensaries, at two of which English medicines are used and at one Indian drugs; the latter therefore goes by the name of "Deshi Dawakhana". There are other charitable institutions such as the Infirm Asylum, the Leper Asylum, the Lady Dufferin Fund, the David Sassoon Hospital Nursing Fund and the King Edward Memorial Hospital to which the Municipality pays grants-in-aid. The total expenditure on this account amounted to Rs. 9,554 in the year under report as against Rs. 10,976 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,422. The decrease is partly due to the amount of Rs. 796 having been paid by the Municipality during the previous year to the Committee of the Edward Memorial Hospital representing the balance to their credit out of the total amount of Rs. 12,000 deposited by that body with the Municipality in the year 1912-13 for acquisition of sites and partly to a smaller amount of expenditure incurred in the year under report in supplying medicines to the dispensaries than in the previous year.
- (o) *Plague* :—There was no outbreak of plague during the year under report. Still the Municipality had to incur expenditure on the usual precautionary measures, such as contribution of its share to the cost of the Infectious Diseases Hospital, the rat Campaign, and the upkeep of the Health Camps. The total cost on account of the same was Rs. 16,261 as against Rs. 10,735 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 5,526, which is due to the fact that a few Bills on account of share in the cost of expenditure of the Infectious Diseases Hospital for the year 1918-19 have been received and paid during the year under report. The Infectious Diseases Hospital has been under the management of a Committee with the Collector of Poona as its Chairman. The Municipality has no direct hand in its management. It is, however, represented on the Committee by two of its members. The Municipality has to pay 54 per cent. charges out of the total expenditure of this Hospital.

The Rat Campaign was continued throughout the year under the direct control of the Officer appointed by Government on that account. The Municipality had to pay half the cost.

- (p) *Vaccination* :—This cost Rs. 1,230 during the year under report as against Rs. 1,437 in 1918-19 showing a decrease of Rs. 207, which was due to smaller amount of expenditure incurred on contingency during the year under report than in the previous year. During the year under report 3144 children were vaccinated.
- (q) *Other Sanitary Requirements* :—This new item was introduced under G. R. No. 936 dated 7th February 1916 (G. D.). It includes the cost of preventive measures against Cholera, and Influenza and removal of prickly pear. The total expenditure on this head amounted to Rs. 1,965 in the year under report as against Rs. 9,583 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 7,618. In the year under report, Cholera and Influenza cost Rs. 112 and 1,823 respectively as against Rs. 182 and 9,300 in the previous year. During the previous year, Influenza of a virulent type was prevalent; and the Municipality had to take several measures to fight it. No expenditure was incurred during the year under report for the removal of prickly pear; whereas a sum of Rs. 101 was spent on that account in the previous year.
- (r) *Markets and Slaughter-houses* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 12,461 in the year under report as against Rs. 6,835 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 5,628. The increase is due to the following reasons:—
Repairs to the market building cost in the year under report Rs. 1,044 as against Rs. 494 in the previous year. Repairs to roads in the Market premises cost Rs. 1,660 during the year under report, whereas no expenditure on that account was incurred in the previous year. There is also an increase of Rs. 357 in the cost of establishment in the year under report. New carts of the type used in the Poona Cantonment for bringing beef etc., were made at a cost of Rs. 1,780 during the year under report, while no expenditure on this account was incurred during the previous year. A sum of Rs. 562 was paid during the year under report to the Vatandar Ramoshis at Bhamburda for giving help to the Municipal servants at the weekly bazar for sale of cattle at Bhamburda. A sum of Rs. 175 was paid to the servants in the Market Department as allowances for levying the duty on cattle brought for sale in Bhamburda Bazar.
- (s) *Pounds* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 647 in the year under report as against Rs. 576 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 71.

- (t) *Public Gardens* :—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 721 as against Rs. 691 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 30.
- (u) *Veterinary charges* :—This usually represents the annual contribution which the Municipality pays towards the Local Board Veterinary Dispensary. During the year under report no grant was paid.
- (v) *Registration of Births and Deaths* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 944 as against Rs. 957 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 13, which is slight and requires no explanation.
1. Road sweepers were paid rewards for reporting births at the rate of Anna one for each birth. It cost Rs. 123 in the year under report as against Rs. 115 in the previous year.
 2. The number of births reported and registered in the year was 2266 as against 2332 registered in the previous year. The total number of births registered in the year gives a ratio of 19.32 per mille as against 19.8 per mille in 1918-19.
 3. As regards deaths, the total number registered was 7113 as against 9722 in the preceding year. These are classified as under :—Plague 14, Cholera 124, small-pox 193, fevers (including influenza and other causes) 6782; the total mortality gives a death rate of 60.66 per mille in the year under report as against 82.9 per mille in the previous year. The infant mortality was 2676 in the year under report as against 3288 in the previous year.
- (w) *Public Works Establishment* :—This includes the cost of the Public Works Establishment, the Parwangi Establishment and contingency. The total expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 7,860 in the year under report as against Rs. 7,373 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 487. The increase is due to the fact that establishment of the Public Works Department cost Rs. 367 more in the year 1919-20 than in the year 1918-19. Uniforms cost Rs. 120 in the year under report whereas no expenditure on this account was incurred in the previous year.
- (x) *Building repairs* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 3,052 in the year under report as against Rs. 731 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 2,321. The increase is explained by the fact that the maintenance of the cremation ghats cost about Rs. 2,400 more than in the previous year. There was also a decrease of Rs. 54 in the cost of repairs to buildings in the year.
- (y) *Road repairs and road widening* :—The maintenance and improvement of the roads in the year under report cost Rs. 50,876 as against Rs. 45,165 in the year 1918-19

showing an increase of Rs. 5,711. Out of the total expenditure of Rs. 50,876, Rs. 43,897 were spent on road repairs and Rs. 6,524 on road widening, as against Rs. 39,923 and Rs. 5,942 spent on them during the previous year. As regards road repairs, it may be stated that they include re-metalling a certain length of roads, repairs to lanes and murum roads with gravel and murum, patching damaged portions of the roads, removal of mud during the monsoon, repairs to Steam Rollers, sundries such as painting boundary stones, and temporary establishment etc. The total length of metal roads repaired during the year was 4.53 miles with an average width of 20 feet and that of murum roads and lanes 0.60 miles with an average width of 16.50 feet. There was an increase of Rs. 4,674 in the expenditure on road repairs. As regards road widening, it may be stated that the total cost to the Municipality on this account was Rs. 6,524 showing an increase of Rs. 582 which is due to a larger number of claims for compensation for lands acquired having been paid in the year under report.

- (z) *Stores* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 321 in the year under report as against Rs. 30 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 291. The increase is due to tools and plant having cost more in the year under report than in the previous year.
- (a-a) *Town Planning* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 752 as against Rs. 3,221 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 2,469. The Bhamburda Town Planning Scheme received sanction from Government and the arbitration proceedings have already commenced.
- (a-b) *Public Instruction, Schools and Colleges* :—The Administration Report of the School Board will be found in Appendix XI of this Report, wherein is given the full account of the working of the schools. It is not therefore necessary to enter into details in this place. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure during the year under report amounted to Rs. 91,470 as against Rs. 59,700 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 31,770. The increase is due to greater expenditure incurred under the following sub-heads ; viz. Office contingency, pay of teachers, contingency, gymnasium, repairs to school houses, Technical School Establishment, purchase of scientific books and apparatus, weaving class etc. An additional expenditure, viz., Rs 15,939 on war-allowance to teachers was incurred during the year under report. There are some heads which cost less such as water tax, prizes to boys etc.

Progress of Mahomedan education :—There are 9 day Schools and one night-school for Mahomedans. The number on rolls was 439 boys and 182 girls as against the last year's

number of 463 and 128 respectively. The average attendance was 267 and 92. This year the working of Schools was going on smoothly, being undisturbed by any serious epidemics. The Educational Department was requested to supply trained Urdu teachers but was unable to meet the wishes of the Municipality for want of such teachers. The English Class attached to the Urdu full Primary School has been recommended by the School Board to the Educational Department for being made permanent. The expenditure on the Urdu Schools during the year under report amounted to Rs. 11,208 as against Rs. 9,311 during the previous year. Arrangements are being made for the acquisition of a site in Rawiwar Peth for the location of an Urdu School since November 1919. A senior third year trained master of long standing was allotted for two hours daily to the work of supervising Urdu schools with a view to effect improvement in the teaching work of the Urdu school teachers.

- (a-c) *Contributions* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 525 in the year under report as against Rs. 85 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 440. The increase is due to a larger amount having been given as grant to the School for the deaf and dumb in the year under report than in the previous year; also a sum of Rs. 375 was given as a grant to the Depressed Classes Mission School at Bhokarwadi this year.
- (a-d) *Libraries and Museums* :—The Municipal Teachers' library cost Rs. 41 in the year under report as against Rs. 117 during the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 76 which is due to very few books having been purchased this year. The School Board has transferred the responsibility of maintaining the Museum to the shoulders of the trustees and hence there was no expenditure incurred on that account during the year under report as well as in the previous year.
- (a-e) *Interest on loans* :—The expenditure under this head is Rs. 37,642 which represents interest during the year under report on the loan of Rs. 10 lacs drawn by the Municipality from Government by four instalments since the year 1912. The amount has been shown as per figures received from the Accountant General, Bombay.
- (a-f) *Work done for private individuals* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 234 which is due to a smaller outturn of work for private individuals.
- (a-g) *Address* :—An address of welcome was presented to His Excellency Sir George Lloyd, Governor of Bombay, in June 1919. The expenditure incurred on that account was Rs. 249.

- (a-h) *Loss account* :—No expenditure was incurred on this account in the year under report.
- (a-i) *Election* :—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 291 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,030 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 739. The expenditure of Rs. 291 represents the cost of establishment in preparing the yearly election-roll as per election Rules of this Municipality.
- (a-j) *Printing* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 4,423 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,030 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 3,393. It is due to the fact that a new treadle machine was purchased for the use of the Municipality's Press at a cost of Rs. 2,928. Establishment charges cost Rs. 283 more than in the previous year, owing to a revision of establishment; also repairs to building cost Rs. 183 in the year; whereas no expenditure was incurred on this account during the previous year.
- (a-k) *Destroying stray dogs* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 60 as against Rs. 47, showing an increase of Rs. 13.
- (a-l) *Law charges* :—This shows a decrease of Rs. 177 as compared with the expenditure during the previous year. This is due to less remuneration paid for defending civil suits in the law courts on behalf of the Municipality in the year under report.
- (a-m) *Contribution to the Pasteur Institute at Coonoor* :—This represents the annual contribution of Rs. 60 which the Municipality pays to this institution. Formerly the Municipality used to pay the travelling charges of indigent patients who were residents of Poona City and proceeded to Coonoor for anti-rabic treatment; but they are now being borne by Government as per G. R. No. 5344 dated 5th August 1916.
- (a-n) *Maintenance charges of lunatics* :—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 858 in the year under report as against Rs. 1,269 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 411. The decrease is due to the fact that the Municipality has had to pay for fewer patients as per Government Order No. 1557 dated 7th April 1917 than in the previous year. The expenditure represents the charges for the maintenance of poor lunatics, who were residents or habitual visitors of the city before their admission into the asylums. The Municipality have to pay this cost since 18th March 1915 (vide G. R. No. 4091 of the same date).

- (a-o) *Refund of money lapsed to Municipal Fund after three years* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 50 as against nil in the previous year.
- (a-p) *War Allowance* :—The expenditure under this head was Rs. 21,297 in the year under report as against Rs. 12,300 during the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 8,997. It is due to the fact that the allowance was given to the Municipal servants for the whole of the year, whereas it was paid during the last year for about 9 months.
- (a-q) *Contributions to special wrestling tournament and women's sports and Games tournament* :— (a) Special wrestling tournaments were held at the Deccan Gymkhana on the 13th, 14th, and 15th November 1919 under the auspices of the H. E. the Governor of Bombay Sir George Lloyd. It was the biggest wrestling gathering ever held in Poona. The Municipality paid a contribution of Rs. 500 towards the expenses of this special tournament with the concurrence of the Collector under Section 56 (m) of the District Municipal Act.
- (b) —A tournament of women's sports was also held in Poona under the patronage of Her Excellency Lady Lloyd from 16th to 23rd January 1920 at the Deccan Gymkhana. The Municipality paid a contribution of Rs. 300 towards the expenses of this event.
- (a-r) *Peace celebrations* :— An expenditure of Rs. 1000 was incurred by the Municipality on this account. Two days—the 15th and 16th December 1919 were observed as festive days for rejoicings in India. A Children's Entertainment Committee was appointed at a meeting held in the Collector's Office for carrying out the programme of the Peace Celebrations and the President, Poona City Municipality, was appointed Chairman of that committee. Various kinds of sports were held on 15th and 16th of December 1919 at the extensive grounds of the Deccan Gymkhana and prizes were distributed to the successful boys at the hands of the Hon'ble Mr. Seddon, the Commissioner, Central Division. For this purpose, grants of Rs. 750 from Government, Rs. 300 from the Director of Public Instruction and Rs. 50 from the Secretary, Poona Schools Athletic Association were received. The Bazaar-Market building and other Government and private buildings were illuminated and dinners to the poor were provided.
- (a-s) *Repayment of Loans* :— The expenditure under this head represents a portion of the principal of Rs. 10 lacs to be repaid to Government. The Municipality paid Rs. 50,332 to Government as the 10th and 11th instalments of repayment of loan, which sum was adjusted by crediting

Rs.12,680 to principle and Rs: 37,642 to interest. This apportionment has been made as per figures given by the Accountant General, Bombay, in the statement received from him.

(a-t) Deposits:— The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 6,366 as against Rs. 7,282 during the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 915; this is only an adjustment account and as the rise and fall in the expenditure on this account does not affect the ordinary expenditure of the Municipality, this head does not require any explanation, as the variations are due to ordinary fluctuations in business.

(a-u) Advances:— The expenditure on this head was Rs. 8,945 which represents the advances given to the officers of the Municipality for emergent works.

VII. ACQUISITION OF LAND.

7 Pieces of land measuring in all 2384 Sqr. Ft. were purchased in the year under report for Rs. 5002 as against 8 pieces of land purchased in the previous year for Rs. 5,159-12-4.

VIII. AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS.

15. The Municipal accounts for the year 1918-19 were audited by Mr. A. C. Rebello and Mr. G. T. Deshmukh of the Local Audit Department. The audit was commenced on 15th October 1919 and lasted till 3rd January 1920.

IX. MUNICIPAL WANTS.

16. The most pressing wants of the Municipality are :—

- (a) Completing the work of joining every drain of every house to the new drainage system in order to get rid of laes of gallons of sewage at present soaking into the subsoil near the houses.
- (b) Paving of the Nagazari Nala is also immediately required.
- (c) Complete filtration system for its water supply.
- (d) Overhauling and improving the water supply distribution system which was laid about 45 years back.

The present water supply system of the City is threatened with a very grave danger by the formation and growth of shells in the Settling Tanks and the distributing mains and services. Items (c) and (d) mentioned above will effectively check this growth.

Any delay in carrying out the above works is sure to materially affect the welfare of the City

Other needs including Primary School buildings, buildings for Municipal Offices, opening the congested areas and preparing Town Planning Schemes for areas under development also deserve serious attention.

GENERAL REMARKS.

17. Government in their Resolution No. 5196 dated the 28th September 1904 extended the Bombay Municipal Servants Act (V of 1890) to the Poona City Municipality, so far as it relates to persons employed by or on behalf of the Municipality to perform any of the duties specified (i) in class I of the schedule of the said Act and (ii) in clauses (a) and (c) of Class II of the said schedule. In the year under report, the Bhangees and other Municipal servants worked quietly.

During the year under report, the most important event from the stand-point of Municipal administration was the abolition of all the Sub-Committees except the Managing Committee and the School Board. The multiplicity of Committees led to delays in the execution of work and payment of bills and thus my colleagues were anxious for getting rid of this blot of delays on the administration. The Councillors passed a resolution to the effect and the same in view of its salubrious effects commended itself to all the authorities concerned and Government was prompt enough to allow the Municipality to bring the resolution into action at once.

Water supply and Drainage have been the subjects of comment for a long time and the citizens believed that the defects in these works were responsible primarily for the prevalence of malaria in the City. The Settling Tanks that supply water were leaking to a large extent and the City was water-logged. Government was convinced of this and they were kind enough to promise a refund of about Rs. 50,000 which the Municipality had to pay for water that leaked off. I must mention here that Government are treating this Municipality very kindly in as much as they have promised to bear half the cost of chlorination for 3 years. A special concession rate by reduction of fifty per cent is allowed for canal water and I hope that in view of the straitened circumstances of this Municipality, so far as finances are concerned, the same indulgence will be shown to it in future.

His Excellency Sir George Lloyd deserves thanks for the special care bestowed on this our city. He was kind enough to depute Mr. Watson, an expert, to examine the existing Drainage at Government cost. Mr. Watson's report is before us and with his advice as embodied in the report, the question is likely to be solved in the near future. Mr. S. K. Bhagwat, who is now the Chief Officer, was not in the service of the Municipality when Mr. Watson examined the construction of Drainage. I had to indent his services and he was kind enough to render them cheerfully for which I have to thank him.

The Municipality voted an address of welcome to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay on his arrival in Poona and as requested therein, Poona is receiving special attention from His Excellency. This could be easily perceived from the fact that he is very keen in preserving Shanwar Wada and putting the same in a nice condition, no matter what the cost is. Flinging a bridge over the river in front of Shanwar Wada is a matter of certainty and in a couple of years the city will be connected with Bhamburda by this bridge. His Excellency the Viceroy paid a visit to the Shanwar Wada and has kindly given a decent sum towards the improvement of the same.

I have to thank all my colleagues for the help and co-operation they evinced in carrying through the work of administration. The various Sub-Committees have done good work. I must record that the heads of various departments discharged their duties satisfactorily. Mr. K. F. Paranjpye and his Personal Assistant Mr. Jog deserve special mention. I am sorry to lose the services of Mr. K. F. Paranjpye, who resigned his Office; but the Municipality has taken up Mr. Bhagwat as a Chief Officer and with the knowledge that I have about Mr. Bhagwat's abilities, tact and energy, I must say that the Municipality has secured a right man in a right place.

Mr. D. W. Potdar B. A., the Superintendent of Nutan Marathi Vidyalaya, Marathi Branch, had been co-opted to serve on the School Board for a year commencing from October 1919.

I have to place on record with deep regret the sad and accidental death on 9-3-20 of one of my colleagues. Subheddar Poshati Muri, who always took great interest in his work and would have been a valuable addition regarding the question of diffusing primary education amongst children of the backward classes.

3. *Meetings of the Board:*— The School Board held 21 meetings in the year under review, as against 16 of the previous year. During the course of the year under report 47 meetings were called. In all 380 items of business were disposed of during the year under review as against 401 of the previous year.

5. The School Board Office and the Municipal Schools were under the direct control of the Superintendent of Schools during the year under report. The post of the Superintendent was held throughout the year by Mr. V. L. Gatne B. A, who had been appointed in February 1919 on probation for six months, and after the expiry of that period he was confirmed by the General Committee on the recommendation of the School Board.

6. *Schools* :—There were 35 primary schools and one Technical Institute under the management of the School Board in the year under report as in the previous year. The Boys' School at Bhokarwadi for low caste children, which was transferred to the Depressed Classes Mission Society, Poona, for management in August 1918 was given a grant of Rs. 250 this year. The Schools are classified as under :—

- 15 Marathi Day Schools for boys, including 2 for low castes.
- 5 Urdu Day Schools for boys;
- 1 Gujrathi day School.
- 1 Marathi night School.
- 1 Urdu night School.
- 8 Marathi day Schools for girls.
- 4 Urdu day Schools for girls.

35

There are 22 boys' schools, out of which 9 are entirely free. These nine free Schools are made up as under :—

- (i) 5 Marathi Boys' Schools, (which include two schools for boys and girls of the Depressed Classes)
- (ii) 4 Urdu Schools.

7. The number of students in the Schools increased in the year under review from 3683 to 3860.

During the year under review the school work was going on very smoothly without being disturbed by any of the usual epidemics such as plague and influenza. The general attendance of the children in the schools was satisfactory taking into consideration the constant effect of malaria, prevailing here and there in Poona in several parts. Out of the total number of 3860 on the rolls on the last day of the year under report, there were 2261 boys and 83 girls in Boys' day schools; 1477 girls in Girls' Schools and 39 boys in two Night Schools. Information regarding their caste, age, social condition and the profession of their guardians is given in Appendix 1 (A, B, & C.)

There were during the year under report 850 boys and 529 girls of ages ranging between 5 and 8 as against 818 boys and 553 girls of the previous year; 1150 boys and 910 girls of ages ranging between 8 and 12 as against 1005 boys and 808 girls of the previous year; 214 boys and 121 girls ranging between 12 and 15 as against 259 boys and 145 girls of the previous year and 88 boys and 14 girls above 15 years as against 89 boys and 15 girls of the previous year. Only 1.3 p. c. of boys and 1.6 of girls were married as against 1.6 p. c. and 2.1 respectively of the previous year.

8. *Attendance* :—The following table shows the comparative attendance in schools during the year 1919-20 and 1918-19.

The satisfactory increase in attendance is due to the absence of any epidemic during the year under review as well as to the careful supervision of the schools and the attention of the Heads of the Schools drawn to this by the Superintendent of schools at the time of his usual visits there. Appendix I-D will give detailed information regarding attendance in these schools.

9. *Teachers* :—There were, in the year ending 31st March 1920, 195 teachers serving in Municipal Primary Schools, as against 189 last year, showing an increase of 6 on the staff. Information regarding their distribution is given in Appendices II and II (2). There were 23 Head-masters and 10 Head-mistresses; out of these 29 were trained and 4 untrained. The number of Urdu trained teachers is proportionate to that of the Marathi teachers; still to secure a greater number of trained Urdu teachers, the School Board had made a provision of scholarships to be paid to qualified Mahomedan candidates, who desired to prosecute their studies in the Male Urdu Training College with an undertaking to serve the School Board for a period of three years, but no one came forward. Again next year, the School Board intends to make provision of 3 scholarships for teachers of the backward classes and Mahomedan community with a view that they may be induced to go in for training.

Every attempt is being made by the School Board to enhance the efficiency of the teachers' staff by increasing the number of trained teachers gradually. With a view to make every teacher on the staff trained in course of time, a scheme of the normal training class has been formulated and is awaiting sanction. It is also intended to start coaching classes attached to the Normal class in the interest of the unqualified Male and Female teachers to enable them to pass the Vernacular School Final Examination. This facility will be extended to the Male and Female Urdu teachers as well. The Board affords reasonable facilities to teachers under its control to

appear for Training College examinations so as to improve the quality of teaching. During the course of the year the number of trained teaching decreased by 5. There were 95 trained and 100 untrained teachers in the year under review. The corresponding figures for 1918-19 are 100 trained and 89 untrained. 1040 boys and 650 girls were under trained teachers; and 1260 boys and 910 girls under untrained, as against 927 boys and 790 girls under trained, and 1244 boys and 722 girls under untrained teachers in the previous year.

10. This year the Municipal Schools were examined from 11th February 1920 to 20th February 1920 by a Board of Examiners, selected from amongst the senior and trained teachers of the Municipal Primary Schools. The examinations of Classes IV, V and VI were partly written and partly oral, and those of other standards mainly oral. The Superintendent of Municipal Schools supervised all the examinations and the results were scrutinized and approved of by the Deputy Educational Inspector, Poona.

Appendix II (B) will give information regarding the results of the examinations. 2088 boys were presented for the examinations from I to VI Standards, of whom 1197 passed and 1089 girls were presented for the examination, of whom 786 passed.

Three full Primary Schools were maintained by the Municipality viz., (1) Marathi Boys', (1) Marathi Girls', and (1) Urdu Boys'.

The Municipal Schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector of the District and his Assistants this year in the month of July, but their remarks on the work of the schools are not yet to hand.

In last April, 23 candidates were sent from the Marathi full Primary School for boys (B-S. No. 8), out of whom 16 came out successful in the Vernacular Final Examination held at Poona; from Urdu Boy's School No 10, 2 appeared, out of whom 1 passed; from the Girls' School No. 6, 5 appeared and 3 passed in the same examination.

10. *Technical School* :—(a) There were in the Victoria Jubilee Technical School, Poona, 23 students on the 31st March 1920. All of them had to learn Drawing, which is compulsory; 20 were learning carpentry 2 smithy, 5 metal turning, and 15 sign board painting. 17 were Brahmins, 1 Jain, and 1 Lingayat, 4 belonging to other castes.

(b) There is in the Technical School a special class for Drawing for the benefit of students, who cannot afford to become regular students of other schools. A fee of Annas two is charged. But teachers and students from Municipal and Aided Schools, and the Local Training Colleges are exempted. This class was attended by 18 students in the year under review from Municipal and other schools.

(c) The school sends up candidates for Elementary and Intermediate Examination of Drawing of the School of Art, Bombay, every year.

This year 4 boys were sent up for the Elementary Examination, and 4 passed. 6 appeared for the Intermediate Examination, of whom 4 came out successful.

(d) During the year under report the school was examined by an Officer deputed by the Committee of Direction of Technical Education in the Presidency, and recommended the full grant of Rs. 1471 to the School.

(e) The School has been under the direct supervision of Mr. K. G. Kelkar, a Graduate of the Bombay Technical Institute. Mr. Kelkar has a considerable practical experience and the Municipality has in him a proper person as the head of the Institution.

(f) The School Board is considering the question of revising the courses that are taught here with a view to give impetus to this Technical branch of education. Provision will have to be made to carry out the new proposals and it is hoped, next year some addition would be made for the purpose.

11 *Income* :—Appendix III gives information regarding the funds at the disposal of the Board. In the year under review the general income shows an increase over the preceding year. The causes of increase and decrease are given below—

(i) *Fees in primary Schools* :— There is an increase of Rs. 261 under this head in the year under review owing to the increase in number of students.

(ii) *Government grant-in-aid* :— This item shows an increase of Rs. 3373 in the year under report. The amount of grant-in-aid (Rs. 29565) is half of the expenditure incurred by the Municipality on Primary Education last year.

(iii) *Grant-in-aid to the Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School* :—This item shows a decrease of Rs. 1,031; but it can be explained by the fact that the amount of Rs. 2,502 shown for last year is made up of grants for 2 years as the grant due for the previous year was not received before the end of the official year and so it had to be credited to the next year's accounts.

(iv) *Drawing-grant* :—There is an increase of Rs. 149 under this head. This year additional special grant of Rs. 150 was given for the work of the Drawing Class in the Technical School.

(v) *Local Fund Cess on land within Municipal limits* :—It shows a decrease of Rs. 536, as the amount for this year was not received before the end of the year.

(vi) *Technical School fees* :—The amount received under this head is Rs. 5 only, showing an increase of Rs. 1 over the last years' amount.

(vii) *Donations* :—The funds placed at the disposal of the Municipality brought in Rs. 87-8 as interest for the year under review.

13. *Expenditure* :—Details regarding the expenditure on Primary Schools, Technical School, Secretary's Office establishment and other institutions are given in Appendix IV and IV-A with its accompaniments. The

total expenditure on Education amounts to Rs. 92,178 in the year under report as against Rs. 62,387 in the year 1918-19, thus showing an increase of Rs. 29,791 which is explained in detail below under each Sub-head.

Secretary's Office Establishment :—This item shows an increase of Rs. 223. During the year under review the posts of the Superintendent and the office clerks were filled up throughout the year, and no saving was made on this item on account of vacancies as in the previous year.

Contingency and War-allowance to the Office Establishment :—This item shows an increase of Rs. 947 over the expenditure of the year 1917-18. This increase is mainly due to the amount of war-allowance paid with retrospective effect to the office establishment as per orders of the General Committee, and general rise in the costs of articles of stationery required for the office.

Salaries of Masters, Mistresses and peons with pension fund :—There is a very large increase of Rs. 11,960 under this head in the year under review, which is due to the fact that the Primary School Masters and Mistresses were required to be paid with retrospective effect from the time fixed as per Government Orders at enhanced rates of salaries according to the time-scale fixed by the Educational Department.

Rent of School Buildings :—This item shows a decrease of Rs. 249 in the year under report, which can be explained by the fact that several of the owners of school-houses have refused to accept rents unless higher rents are paid to them as demanded by them; the amounts are kept unpaid and the whole question is under serious consideration of the Board.

Contingency to Schools :—There is an increase of Rs. 203 under this head owing to the increase in prices of stationery, printing etc.

New furniture :—Increase of Rs. 71 on this item needs no explanation.

New books and maps :—No money was spent on this item.

Repairs to School Buildings :—Increase of Rs. 97 for this work is too small to need explanation.

New School Buildings :—No expenditure for building purposes was undertaken during the year under review. For detailed information of this, General Remarks may be referred to. The amount of Rs. 376, which was spent during this year was expenditure incurred for preparing plans and estimates of a School Building.

Prizes paid from interest on Donations :—This head shows a decrease of Rs. 52, as bills for scholarships from Schools were not received before the end of the official year, though called for, and hence the sums are left unpaid.

Scientific Apparatus :—This item shows an increase of Rs. 212, as the whole amount was spent this year in purchasing apparatus for science in full primary schools with the object of removing the long felt want in this respect.

Gymnasium :—The slight increase of Rs. 20 needs no explanation.

Municipal School Library :—This item shows a decrease of Rs. 76, as no books were purchased and periodicals subscribed during the year under report.

Experiment of the new curriculum for the Girls' Schools :—In two of the big girls' schools the experiment was being tried, and this expenditure was undertaken to meet the different wants to make it successful.

Technical School Establishment :—The expenditure under this head amounts to Rs. 3,212 in the year under review, thus showing an increase of Rs. 170 over that of the previous year. The causes of increase are given below :—

1. Pay of the Superintendent, Technical School, increased from Rs. 130 to 140.

2. Pay of the Drawing teacher increased from Rs. 50 to 55.

Contingency, War-allowance to the Establishment of the Technical School and Miscellaneous expenditure for it :—The expenditure under this head amounts to Rs. 1,138, showing thus an increase of Rs. 312 as compared with the previous year. The main causes are :—(1) War-allowance to the establishment of the Technical School, (2) increased prices of the stationery articles and (3) higher rates for materials, such as wood etc. required for the Technical School.

Weaving class :—Last year there was no weaving class conducted in any school, but the budgeted amount of Rs. 180 for this class was debited to this head, as the weaving master, who had to work in one of the primary schools on the discontinuance of the weaving class, was paid from this item. This anomaly was discontinued from April 1919, and the teacher's services were transferred from this weaving class to one of the Urdu Primary Schools, where he was useful. The weaving class was closed till the middle of the year under review, when it was re-opened at the request of certain citizens and young students, who applied to the President for making provision for such a class, there being several persons ready to take advantage of it. Formerly this weaving class had to be closed owing to want of students but when it was seen that candidates for this class would be coming up owing to the sincere efforts of Mr. Hari Ganesh Phatak, one of the public workers in the City, the President and the School Board re-opened the class in Sadashiv Peth with a view to direct the tendency of the public and create a taste for technical and industrial education. The class has been in existence for more than three months, and it is expected to do great benefit to the students, 15 of whom attend the class regularly and learn weaving and spinning.

Grants :—(1) To the Deaf and Dumb Institute of Poona, Budhawar Peth.

The Municipality have sanctioned a grant up to a maximum of Rs. 200 per year to this institute on condition that a grant of Rupees ten per boy on the average be paid. The amount spent under this head during the year under review was Rs. 150

(2) To the Bhokarwadi School under the management of the Depressed Class Mission, Poona.

The amount of Rs. 375 was paid as per resolution of the General Body to pay Rs. 250 annually. In the middle of the last year the school was transferred to the Depressed Class Mission for management and since then they had received no grants. The amount of Rs. 375 is made up of Rs. 125 for the preceding year and Rs. 250 for the year under report.

Gratuity :—No amount was spent under this head.

War-allowance to the Primary School Teachers :—This item shows a considerable increase of Rs. 15,378 during the year under review in comparison with the expenditure incurred on this account in the previous year. The General Committee resolved to give effect to the Government Order for paying War-allowance to the Primary School teachers at rates identical with those of the Government and Local Board Primary School teachers. The payment was to be made with retrospective effect from the date assigned in the Government Order and hence this heavy increase.

These detailed explanations of the increased expenditure on several items will go to show that the abnormal increase of Rs. 29,791 in expenditure over that of the previous year is chiefly due to the sudden payment of enhanced salaries and War-allowances to the primary school teachers according to Government Orders. The School Board submitted a representation to Government to give a full additional grant on account of the cost of this heavy and unanticipated expenditure, but till now no reply is to hand.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Free and Compulsory Education in the Poona City Municipal District :—As stated in the Report for the year 1918-19, the General Body, with a view to strengthen its hands as regards the correctness of the financial proposals submitted by the School Board, referred this question to a small Sub-committee on the 17th February 1919; but as no business was done by this Sub-committee, the President brought this question again before the General Committee for further consideration, who resolved on 22-4-19 to send back this item of compulsory education of boys to the School Board for reconsideration of the details of expenditure necessary for the introduction of free and compulsory education, and for suggesting the means of raising the amount. The School Board prepared a complete scheme, taking into consideration the increased rates of salaries of primary trained teachers and the expenditure that would have to be incurred for erecting new school-buildings with a view to make sufficient accommodation for housing the schools. A detailed report of the School Board with the estimated figures of the scheme was again put before the General Committee, which considered the question on 12th August 1919, when the original resolution to make primary education compulsory for boys was lost as it secured only 11 Votes out of 20 that are necessary for a resolution on this point to be passed.

Then on the 12th October 1919 the President convened a meeting of all the Municipal Councillors, some learned citizens and those that devoted their lives to the cause of education and take deep interest in its development. Then it was resolved to appoint a Sub-committee (called काउन्सिलर कमिटी) of several prominent councillors and citizens to consider the question of suggesting means to make provision of funds to apply Patel's Act of free and compulsory education to all children that come under it within the Municipal limits of Poona City. This Committee held several meetings and printed a report giving its suggestions on the work for which it was appointed. The President put this question again before the General Committee in the month of February 1920 to arrive at a decision on this long pending problem, but none of the propositions bearing on the subject brought by the several councillors could pass for want of sufficient number of votes required according to the provisions of the Act.

In this way this question was left where it was before. The School Board has been now considering whether it is feasible to make all primary education free in the first place as a first step in that direction in the Municipal Schools.

School Buildings :—The present housing accommodation for schools being far from satisfactory, this important question of erecting new school buildings owned by the Municipality has been seriously engaging the attention of the School Board. Government sanctioned a grant of Rs. 25,000, and a loan of equal amount for acquiring four sites for building purposes.

The School Board proposed four sites in different parts of the City for acquisition last year, and the matter was sent to Government for approval; after some months it was informed that the site proposed in Budhwar Peth in Dhamadhere's lane was included in the East-West Road Scheme of the City and was not available for School-building purposes, on which the School Board proposed another site in Kasba Peth in lieu of the one lost. Recently approval has been granted by Government to all the sites, and after the formal business of carrying out agreements, the work of actual acquisition will be undertaken and a beginning will be made to erect buildings. The promised loan on which the interest is to be paid has been received by the Municipality in the month of March from Government. The grant to be received on this account could not be provided for by the Educational Department according to their budget estimates and it is informed that provision for this will be made as soon as possible. Negotiations are going on in these respects, and it is expected that the Municipality will have these three sites in their possession shortly. It is proposed to earmark Rs. 10,000 per year for the purpose of School Buildings, and then it is hoped to have every year at least one School Building of our own in future. The plans and estimates of a new school building have been prepared and forwarded to Government for approval. Last year the School-Board had made a representation to Government for a free building grant of Rs. 1,00,000, but till now no reply has been received; however, it is strongly hoped that this request of the Board will be accepted by Government so that this housing problem would be found easier by the Municipality to cope with.

During the year under review the School Board was considerably troubled by the owners of the School-houses, who demanded higher rates of rent all at once. To meet with this emergency the School Board has appointed a man on special duty to recommend rates of rents of the School-houses and for new houses when the old ones are not available at reasonable rent. It is expected that this will spare much trouble of the Board in future, as lease deeds for certain periods will be taken from the house owners. This will show how it is absolutely necessary to have all school buildings owned by the Municipality itself.

The Educational Inspector C. D. requested the School Board to make an experiment of the new courses and curriculum for girls in two of the big Girls' Schools here. It is being tried in Girls' Schools No. 1 and 4. The School Board adopted several measures with the object of making the course successful.

A separate note, dealing with the progress of education of Mahomedan children attending Urdu Schools under the control of this Municipality, is appended hereto (Vide Appendix VI).

In conclusion I have to refer to the valuable help, rendered by my colleagues on the Board and the Secretary of the School Board.

APPENDIX VI.

TO

THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

(A note on the progress of Mahomedan education in Urdu Schools of this Municipality in the year 1919-20 under review.)

In the year under report there were nine Urdu Day Schools and one Night School; of these, five were for boys and four for girls. Two Day Schools are entirely free. The rates of fees charged in Urdu Schools are much lower than those charged in Marathi Schools as will be seen from the following table.

All the Girls' Schools are free.

There were in the year under report 621 students on the rolls. The number of boys and girls was 439 and 182 respectively as against 463 and 128 of last year.

The monthly average attendance was 267 and 92.

There were 32 teachers out of whom, 3 were trained. With the object of enhancing efficiency of schools, by employing still more trained teachers in the Urdu Schools, the School Board requested Government to provide the Municipality with some trained teachers. The Board finds it very difficult to secure the services of even Vernacular School Final passed men knowing Urdu and for this very reason unqualified people had to be employed in some places. The School Board had also made a provision of scholarships to be awarded to Mahomedan candidates for undergoing a training course in Poona Training College for Men, but no candidate availed of this opportunity. The School Board is going to open coaching classes for such teachers as have not passed even the Vernacular Final Examination with the object that they may be qualified. In the scheme of the Normal Training Class to be opened by the Municipality, provision has been made to admit Mahomedan teachers every year.

The Annual Examination of the Urdu Schools was held by the Board of Examiners, selected from amongst the Urdu senior trained teachers from the 11th of February 1920 to the 20th February 1920. The Superintendent of Municipal Schools supervised all the examinations, and the Deputy Educational Inspector accorded approval to the results. The Urdu

Schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector of Urdu Schools C. D. with the help of his assistants and the Girls' Schools by the Inspectress of Urdu Girls' Schools, C. D. in the month of July 1919. The remarks are not still to hand. The number of students learning English is 50 and there are 3 standards. The remarks about the English class attached to boys' school No. 10 are most encouraging. The Deputy Educational Inspector has been requested to make this class permanent.

EXPENDITURE.

The Municipality incurred an expenditure of Rs. 11,208 for the education of the children of Urdu Schools during the year under review as against Rs. 9,311 of the previous year.

GENERAL REMARKS.

One of the three full Primary Schools maintained by this Municipality is specially reserved for the Mohamedan children in the heart of the City, and it is placed under the management of the senior third year Trained Head Master. This School sends candidates for the Vernacular Final Examination every year.

The School Board is making provision for housing accommodation for the Urdu Schools along with the Marathi Schools and one of the four sites to be acquired for the new school buildings is reserved for one Urdu School.

It will be seen from this that the School Board is giving due attention to the education of Mohamedan children and the Urdu Schools. It is hoped that steady improvement will be marked from year to year. The object of the Board is to see that all classes get proper education, and it is prepared even to spend proportionately larger sums over the education of backward classes.
