#### I. CHANGES IN POPULATION OR BOUNDARIES.

- (a) The population, as counted at the Census of 1921, is 1,33,227 and this figure is taken as the basis for all calculations during the year under report.
- (b) There has been a slight change in the boundaries on the Southern side of the City. A change in the boundary on the Northern side is also contemplated and the proposals are forwarded to Government for sanction.

#### II. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM NO. I.

- 2. In the year under report, there were 77 meetings of the General Committee, as against 55 in the preceding year, and 550 items of business were disposed of as against 400 disposed of in the year 1923-24. Out of these 77 meetings, four were ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October and January, as required by the Municipal Act, 14 were special and 59 adjourned meetings. 72 Meetings of the Managing Committee were called during the year under report, out of which 3 were adjourned for want of quorum. The attendance at the meetings will be seen from appendices I-B, I-C & I-D.
- 3. There were no changes in the personnel of the Board during the year under report. Mr. P. K. Naik resigned the office of the Vice-President and Mr. S. G. Lawate, B. A. was elected in his place. Mr. S. R. Bhagwat, the Chief Officer, was on leave for four months and Mr. S. B. Tambolkar acted in his place.
- 4. For information regarding the constitution of the several executive and consultative Committees and the attendance of members thereat, reference is invited to the appendix I-D.

#### III. CHANGES IN THE SYSTEM OF TAXATION.

5. There was no change in the system of taxation,

#### IV. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO. II.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 2,05,329/-, the income amounted to Rs. 12,98,565/-, both these together made up a total of Rs. 15,03,834/. It may be pointed out that the income shown here, as well as in the following paras, is the net income. It is exclusive of the Octroi duty, collected but subsequently relunded (vide G. R. No. 1174 dated 19th February 1907 G. D.) The income for the year consisted of the following items:—

As compared with the previous year's total, the income (leaving aside "Extraordinary & debt") shows an increase of Rs. 1,10,768, which is due to increased revenue from Municipal rates and taxes, and Government grants and contributions.

- (a) Octroi:—As a separate chapter is devoted to octroi, fuller description of its working will be given there.
- (b) House Tax:—Rs. 1,19,462 (24-25). Rs. 1,13,563 (23-24). Increase Rs. 5,899. This is due to greater realisation of arrears than in 1923-24.

The large amount of increase in the Drainage tax is due to the progress of the drainage works as well as the recovery of past arrears after settlement of the outstanding disputes. Out of the total collection of Rs. 58,162 on account of Privy Tax, Rs. 46,669 were collected on account of private latrines, the balance of Rs. 11,493 being on account of non-privy cess which is utilized for maintaining public latrines. The increase is due to the better recovery of past arrears.

The increase is mainly due to large recovery of tax on public conveyances. This is collected by the Police Department.

Details about the recovery of arrears of taxes are given in appendix IX of this report.

- (c) Tax on professions and trades—Rs. 12,269 (24-25).
  Rs. 10,741 (23-24). Increase of Rs. 1,528, is due to the increased recovery of Theatre and hotel taxes.
- (d) Water rate:—Rs. 1,00,181 (24-25). Rs. 98,696 (23-24): increase of Rs. 1,485 is due to additional revenue from new connections given during the year.
- (e) Realisations under special Acts:—Rs. 4,727 (24-25); Rs. 3,629 (23-24). Increase of Rs. 1,098 is due to the greater receipts from the Cattle pound.
- (f) Rent of lands and houses etc:—Rs. 1,950 (24-25), Rs. 807 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,143. This is due to the rent of newly built Budhwar Fire Station Building.
- (g) Sale proceeds of lands and produce of lands:—Rs. 2412 (24-25), Rs. 2,369 (23-24). Increase Rs. 42.
- (h) Conservancy receipts:—Rs. 13,124 (24-25), Rs. 20,774 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 7,650. The receipts are less as a large quantity of refuse was burnt at the Depot and Incinerators.
- (i) Fees and Revenue from Educational Institutions:—Rs. 3,357 (24-25), Rs. 3,179 (23-24). Increase Rs. 178. The increase is due to better realisation of the Primary School fees.
- (j) Fees and Revenue from Markets and Slaughter houses:—
  Rs. 60,611 (24-25), Rs. 63,024 (23-24). Decrease Rs.
  2,413. The revenue from Reay Market decreased by
  Rs. 3,986 there being very few auctions of Market
  stalls; while that from Bhamburda cattle market increased by Rs. 300 and that from the slaughterhouses
  and meat-market by Rs. 1,100.
- (k) Fees under the Municipal Act:-
  - (1) Copying and comparing fees Rs. 586 (24-25). Rs. 482 (23-24). Increase Rs. 104.
  - (2) Fees for temporary occupations of Municipal lands. Rs. 4049 (24-25). Rs. 2,728 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1321.
- (1) Fines under the Municipal Act:-Rs. 3,396 (24-25).
  Rs. 6,049 (23-24). Decrease Rs 2,653. Cases under the Police Act account for the decrease.
- (m) Interest on investments:—Rs. 10,114 (24-25). Rs. 3,826 (23-24). Increase Rs. 6,294. This is due to the School Building fund and other surplus being invested at good rates of interest.

- (n) Grants and Contributions:—Rs. 2,31,482 (24-25). Rs. 1,33,646 (23-24). Increase Rs. 97,836. Rs. 1,30,000 were received as grant-in-aid for the new Drainage Scheme.
- (c) Recoveries on account of services rendered to private individuals:—Rs. 8,225 (24-25). Rs. 10,700 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 2,445 is due to less work done.
- (p) Other Items:—Rs. 3,301 (24-25). Rs. 1,753 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1548 due to Rs. 2,756 and odd being adjusted on account of arrears outstanding for more than three years against Rs. 1,572 adjusted in 1923-24.
- (p-1) Receipts from Municipal Workshop, Press and Store Department:--Rs. 38,938 against Rs. 43,622 of 1923-24. Decrease of Rs. 4,684 is due to less work done.
- (q) Under extra-ordinary receipts there appear the following items:—Sale of land Rs. 5,316, against Rs. 94,739, realised in 1923-24; adjustment of Heavy repair fund account Rs. 925. Details of the sale of land are given in appendix VII-B.
- (r) Other advances:—Rs. nil (1924-25). Rs. nil (1923-24).
- (s) Deposits:—This shows a decrease of Rs. 10,307 which is due to ordinary fluctuations of business.

#### V. WORKING OF THE OCTROI SYSTEM.

The octroi cordon under the administration of this Municipality includes the Suburban Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona and the Kirkee Cantonment in addition to the City Municipal District. The Kirkee Cantonment has been added to this cordon from 1st October 1911 as an experimental measure and the last extension of this arrangement up to the 30th September 1925 was sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 8828 R. D. dated 4-5-1925. separate account of this body is kept and the net income from its imports is given to it every month. The Municipality levies Octroi, according to the sanctioned schedule, on articles imported into the Octroi cordon and after deducting from the gross income, the amount of duty refunded on account of the export of the same articles, as well as the establishment and other charges, distributes the net income among the three bodies in proportion to their population, as sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 4053 of 9th November 1895. The figures given here, therefore, relate to the whole of the cordon, while those in Form IV and Appendix (II-A) relate to the City share only.

The gross income from octroi and octroi-refund-rebate in the year 1924-25 was Rs. 7,04,901 (including Rs. 9,138 paid to the Cantonment Committee of Kirkee) as against Rs. 6,84,161 of the last year, showing an increase of Rs. 20,740. There is no special reason for the increase beyond the development of trade.

Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 7,04,901, Rs.86,524 were refunded on account of export, Rs. 62,965 were spent on establishment, Rs. 7,841 on contingencies, including repairs to buildings etc., Rs. 1,364 on account of new Naka buildings and Rs. 3,926 on gratuity and provident fund. The amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment was Rs. 9,138 as against Rs. 8,151 in the previous year.

Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,71,758, as against Rs. 1,40,927 of the previous year. Deducting this expenditure from the gross revenue, the remainder i. e. Rs. 5,33,143, was divided among the three bodies. The share of the City Municipality amounted to Rs. 3,93,332, of the Poona Cantonment Committee to Rs. 95,618 and of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 43,193.

The amount of Rs. 86,524 was, as mintioned above, refunded in the year 1924-25, on account of exports as against Rs. 68,122, of the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 18,402, which is due to the fact that the gross collections for 1923-24 and 1924-1925 were high as compared with the previous years.

The figures quoted above show the result of the working of the whole octroi department. They show the gross income from and gross expenditure chargeable to Octroi. But the figures given in the statement Nos. 2 and 3 show only the share of the Poona City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. The Octroi establishment has cost 8.9 per cent of the gross income in this year, as against 7.8 in 1923-24 and 8.0 in 1922-23.

It will be seen from the above table, that the average consumption is within the standard under all heads where it is fixed on weight, while there is excess in all heads where it is fixed on value. This is due

to the general rise in prices. The standards for class IV (building materials) and class IX (miscellaneous) are not fixed by Government; hence they are not shown in the above table.

Appendix (II-A) gives detailed information regarding Municipal income from each of the 9 classes of articles in the last three years.

The total expenditure for the year 1924-25, shows an increase of Rs- 2,45,873, when compared with that for the previous year. The causes of increases and decreases are explained below in detail.

- (a) General Administration:—Rs. 46,462 (24-25). Rs. 37,714 (23-24). Increase Rs. 8,748 due to increased expenditure on establishment.
- (b) Collection of Taxes:—Rs. 53,972 (24-25). Rs. 48,998 (23-24). Increase Rs. 4,974 due to increase in the salaries, according to the new schedule and to the additional establishment employed for collection of Octroi at Goods Yard Naka.
- (c) Refunds —Rs. 376 (24-25). Rs. 348 (23-24). Increase Rs. 28.
- (d) Pensions and Gratuities--Re. 8,592 (24-25). Re. 6,911 (23-24).
- (e) Public safety-Fire:—Rs. 25 991 (24-25). Rs. 9,146(23-24) Increase Rs. 16,845 due to the expenditure incurred on the purchase of new Motor Fire Engine and Road watering lorry. Number of fires 16 against 15 of 1923-24. Estimated loss of property Rs. 29,900 against Rs. 4,261 of 1923-24. There were two serious fires-one on 14-5-24 at 1183-85 Raviwar resulting in damage to the extent of Rs. 23,000 and the second at 1,389 Raviwar on 1-12-24 which caused damage of Rs. 5,000.

- (f) Lighting:—Rs. 30,512 (24-25). Rs. 35,083 (23-24).

  Decrease Rs. 4,571. All the electric lights in the streets were stopped throughout the year and hence less expenditure. There were 1588 kerosine lamps lighted against 1536 of the previous year.
- (g) Police:—No special expenditure was incurred on this account by the Municipality. The charges of five constables taken on loan are debited to the Octroi, Assessment and Market Departments.
- (h) Water-supply (Capital outlay):—Rs. 29,181 (24-25). Rs. 26,407 (23-24). Increase Rs. 2,774 due to more amount spent on new water mains.
- (i) Watersupply (repairs):—Rs. 71,745 (24-25). Rs. 68,832 (23-24). Increase Rs. 2,913; charges paid to the Irrigation Department amount to Rs. 42,416 against Rs. 22,799 of last year while those for water-treatment amounted to Rs. 19,718 against 38,553.
- (j) Drainage (Capital outlay):—Rs. 1,75,697 (24-25).
  Rs. 37,464 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,38,233 due to more work done as regards connecting drains to the new system, relaying defective lines and removing defects in house connections and also to the payment of Rs. 1,30,000 to the Sanitary Engineer to Government for carrying out new works.
- (k) Drainage Establishment and repairs:—Rs. 69,237 (24-25).

#### Decrease Rs. 4,773 due to reasons given below: -

- (1) General Supervising Establishment:—Decrease Rs. 1129.

  This ought to be taken with the item (m) below to get a correct idea about establishment expenses.
- (2 & 3) Road cleaning and Bhangi Service:-The total under these two heads is Rs. 1,80,672 against Rs. 1,78,352 of 1923-24. Increase of Rs. 2,320 due to cost of constructing new stables for bullocks.
- (4) Nightsoil and Katchra Depot:—Decrease of Rs. 5,457.

  Two more incinerators were completed at a cost of Rs. 3,721; but there was no expenditure on subsidiary depots or on improvements of depot roads which amounted to Rs. 4,600 in 1923-24.
- (5) Latrines and Urinals—Increase of Rs. 3,642. More amount was spent on the construction of new latrines and urinals.
- (6) Road Watering:—Decrease of Rs. 2,557 due to economy effected by the use of the road watering larry.
- (7) Miscellaneous Decrease of Rs. 1,592, due to less amount spent on contingencies.
- (m) Charges on account of Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors: --Rs. 16,862 (24-25). Rs. 15,135 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,727 this is due to the scheduled increase in the salaries.
- (n) Hospitals and Dispensaries:--Rs. 23,590. (24-25). Rs. 19,143 (23-24). Increase of Rs. 4,447. All the five dispensaries were working throughout the year.
- (e) Plague:--Rs. 13,479 (24-25). Rs. 20,636 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 7,157. The city was free from plague.
- (p) Vaccination -- Rs. 2,290 (24-25). Rs. 1,923 (23-24). Increase Rs. 367 due to the increased cost of establishment.
- (q) Other Sanitary Requirements:—(Preventive measures against Cholera and Influenza and removal of prickly pear):—Rs. 1,447 (24-25). Rs. 518 (23-24). Increase Rs. 929 due to the cost of special work done in depressed classes localities. Rs. 435 were spent on removing prickly pear against Rs. 406 of 1923-24.
- (r) Market and Slaughter Houses:—Rs. 23,866 (24-25). Rs. 23,845 (23-24). Increase Rs. 21.
- (s) Founds:—Rs. 3,261 (24-25). Rs. 2,147 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,114 due to two pounds being open throughout the year and to the payment of last year's bills.

- (s-a) Burial and cremation grounds:—Rs. 5.517 (24-25) Rs. 4,757 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,760 due to more lamps being lighted at the burial grounds and to the improvements at the Omkareshwar cremation ghat.
- (t) Public Gardens:—R4. 910 (24-25). Rs. 1,072 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 162.
- (u) Veterinary Charges:-Nil.
- (v) Registration of births and deaths: -Rs. 2,885 (24-25).
  Rs. 3,022 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 137. Details of vital statistics can be had from the Health Officer's report.
  Births and deaths in 1924--5 were 1,792 and 5,553 against 2,286 and 5,148 of 1923-24. The death rate for 1924-25 was 41.68 against 38.67 of 1923-24 and the birth-rate 13-45 against 17.17 of the previous year.
- (w) Public works establishment:—Rs 21,196. (24-25). Rs 22,117 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 921, due to vacancies remaining unfilled during the year.
- (x) Buildings:—Rs. 5,273 (24-25). Rs. 3,748 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,525. The expenditure is for the adjustments made during the year for materials used from East West Road Buildings.

The wheel tax collected by this Municipality does not exceed Rs.20,000 a year at the most and the expenditure on roads generally approaches Rs. 50,000. No road toll is levied by this Municipality. The formation of a special fund for eventual expenditure on roads from the unexpended balance of the proceeds of wheel tax and road tolls is not, therefore, possible.

(\*) Stores:—Rs. 986 (24-25). Rs. 241 (23-24). Increase Rs. 745, due to more purchases.

- (a-a) Public Instruction:—Schools and Colleges:—The Administration report of the School Board will be found in appendix XI of this report, wherein is given a full account of the working of the schools. It is not therefore necessary to enter into details at this place. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure during the year under report amounts to Rs. 1,45,507, as against Rs. 1,45,136 showing an increase of Rs. 371.
- (a-b) Contributions:—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 28,838, in the year under report, as against Rs. 2,705, in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 26,133. Grants for 1923-24 were paid in the year 1924-25.
- (a-c) Libraries:—The Municipal Teacher's library cost Rs. 355, in the year under report as against Rs. 157 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 198 only.
- (a-d) Interest on loans:--Rs. 39,870 (24-25). Rs. 36,786 (23-24). Increase Rs. 3,084. For detailed information vide appendix No. III-B. The increase is due to the payment of interest on School Building loan.
- (a-e) Work done for private individuals:--Rs. 11,264 (24-25). Rs. 9,458 (23-24). Increase Rs. 1,806 due to more work carried out.
- (a-f) Address:—Rs. 86 were spent on presentation of addresses and other ceremonies.
- (a-g) Loss accounts:--Rs, nil.
- (a-h) Election -- Rs. 6,476 (24-:5). Rs. 112 (23-24). Increase Rs. 6,364 due to the expenses of the triennial elections.
- (a-i) Printing:--Rs. 12,833, (24-25). Rs. 10,369 (23-24); increase due to more printing done.
- (a-j) Repayment of loans:—Rs. 16,314 (24-25). Rs.24,439 (23-24). Decrease Rs. 8,125. There was no payment to be made on account of plague but loan.

#### ACQUISITION OF LAND.

14. Six pieces of land were purchased during the year under report at a cost of Rs. 49,074 for road widening, against 7 pieces of land for road-widening in the year 1923-24.

#### AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS.

15. The Municipal accounts for the year 1923-24, were audited by Mr. M. V. Shrotri and his assistant, of the Local Audit Department, in the months of May and June 1924. The audit note is under consideration.

#### PROGRESS OF MAHOMEDAN EDUCATION.

There are eleven day schools, six for boys and five for girls, out of which two new Urdu schools in Nana Peth, are opened on trial for eleven months. The number of boys on rolls on 31-3-1925 was 606 and of girls 247 as against 486 and 203 respectively of the previous The average attendance was 498.2 and 234.1 as against 403.7 and 184,9 in the last year. The School Board made it a policy to appoint female teachers in stead of male teachers in Urda Girls Schools as soon as they are available. The English Class attached to Urdu full primary School (No. 10) showed good progress during the year 1924-25. The expenditure on Urdu schools during the year under report amounted to Rs. 21,423/- as against Rs. 24,545/- in the previous year. The School Board, taking into consideration the increase in the number of pupils and teachers as well as the importance of Urdu Schools, specially created a post of Mahomedan Urdu Inspector to which the General Body accorded sauction and further arrangements are being made to secure the sanction of the Government for the said post. The head master of Urdu Boys' School No. 10 has been appointed to act as Urdu Inspector till the end of September 1925. The Superintendent hal a close watch on the work of the Urdu Inspector and tries his best to better the condition of Urdu Schools. These schools were examined this year by a committee of Urdu head masters including the Urdu Inspector under the direct supervision of the Superintendent.

#### REQUIREMENTS OF THE CITY,

#### PUBLIC SAFETY:-

Fire Service:—The Motor Road-watering lorry with Fire Engine arrived in Poons in September last and is giving satisfactory work. If the machine is to be frequently used for roadwatering purposes for the sake of its economy and efficiency, it will be necessary to purchase another lorry of similar type as a safeguard against accidents.

#### PUBLIC SANITATION:-

Drainage:—The Drainage Scheme has received final sanction from Government and the construction is also begun in right earnest. It is hoped that the works contemplated in the scheme will be satisfactorily completed at an early date without any hitch and that there will be the much desired improvement in the public health of the town.

Water Supply:—The work of improvement of the water supply as regards distribution and quantity is in progress. 12000 Feet of new watermains were laid and 6000 feet of old mains were enlarged during the year.

The management of the Swar Gate Settling tanks was transferred to the Municipality by Government from 1st April 1924, with the result that while in the year 1923-24, the Municipality had to pay more than Rs. 40,000 for water-treatment and pumping, it had to spend less than Rs. 24,000 in the year 1924-25

Powerful pump and engine were set up in the year to meet the growing demand from the high level area. The pumping capacity is now increased to 60,000 gallons per hour in the place of 25 000 gallons that existed before. This has cost the Municipality in all Rs. 15,000.

The rate for canal water was increased to Rs. 2 per 10,000 oft, from September 1924 and the Municipality has now resolved to request Government to favourably consider the Katraj water supply scheme.

River-bed improvement:— The question will have to be seriously taken up during the current year.

Conservancy:—The problem of economical removal and disposal of city's refuse is nearing solution and a scheme involving the use of half-a-dozen masonry incinerators at convenient points just on the out-skirts of the city is likely to prove the best of all the alternatives. The design for public latrines of flushing type is being examined by the Sanitary Engineer and his decision is now a writed. The nuisance from the sweepers continues. Complaints about out-load pail depots are increasing and rightly too. The number of headload pail-depots must be increased without delay. As the construction of the new Drainage works has commenced, it is hoped that the problem will be solved very soon.

Fish Market:—The question is still pending and it cannot be said when it can be satisfactorily solved, as there is considerable difference of opinion about its location.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH :-

Hospitals and Dispensaries:—A fifth dispensary was opened during the year under report.

#### Public Conveniences:-

Reads and Communications:—The progress on Tilak Road was better than that in 1923-24. The deadlock about the East-West Road was removed and proposals are submitted to Government for notification. The possibility of having a new road joining the Shankarshet Road and the Bhavani Peth Road near Ramoshi Gate is being investigated by the special committee appointed by the General Body. The question of having a new North South Road from the Central Pumping Station to the Wellesley Road along the alignment of the proposed gravitation sewer is also receiving cosideration.

#### Town Planning:-

There was no progress; six years have already passed since the Scheme was submitted to Government. The situation has now grown intolerable.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

Bombay Municipal Servants Act. ( V of 1890 ):-

In the year under report, the Bhangees and other Municipal servants coming under the Act worked quietly.

Road-widening lines under Section 91 A:-

No work was done during the year under report. The state of things as regards the administration of Building Bylaws continues as before.

Bylaws about the Dangerous and Offensive trades -

There was no progress made during the year under report.

Municipal Finance:-

The year 1924-25 has proved to be the best year from the financial point of view. The figures of gross normal annual income and recurring expenditure according to Taleband for the year 1924-25 are as follows:—

If the Municipality is fortunate in maintaining its income at the level of 1924-25, it will be in a position to finance all the works of immediate urgency. It is hoped that the year 1925-26 will prove as prosperous as 1924-25, if not better.

I cannot conclude this report without making any reference to the good work done by the President Mr. N. C. Kelkar and by the Vice-President, Mr. Lawate who was officiating as President when Mr. Kelkar was called away from Poona to discharge other important duties in the cause of India. The various Sub-Committees and members of the General Body have contributed a good deal to make the administration as successful as it was possible for them. The Chief Officer, Mr. S. R. Bhagwat, Dr. Khambatta, the Health Officer, Mr. Tambolkar, the Engineer and Mr. Jog. Assistant Chief Officer, deserve special mention for the work they did.

The city has extended during the last few years considerably. Extension has specially taken towards Bhamburda, (the Deccan Gymkhana side). The Deccan Gymkhana Colony has its own sanitary arrangements, especially with regard to drainage. But unfortunately a large number of bungalows still further west and not included in the Deccan Gymkhana Colony remain unsewered. Consequently cesspools have increased in number and the task of removing sullage and waste water has become increasingly difficult, for the Health Department owing to the limited number of cesspool carts at its disposal.

The plots laid out at Tilak road, a newly developed area, are built upon recently with feverish heat and the same remarks as above stated, apply to these buildings with regard to sanitary arrangements. These arable lands, (some of them in the midst of inhabited areas) are malaria breeding places. These lands are always manured and are water logged. I am of opinion, therefore, that these lands as they are used for agricultural purposes, should be done away with if the city is to be got rid of malaria.

### REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

- (a). Registration of births is defective, and printed notices, issued to citizens to communicate to the Health Department the information with regard to birth, have met with no response. The staff engaged for collecting birth reports is done away with.
- (b). Registration of deaths is fairly accurate. The Health Officer issues passes before a body is buried or cremated and this is further checked by Rakhawaldars at the respective ghats, who do not permit a body to be buried or burnt unless such passes are produced.

### BIRTHS & STILL-BIRTHS.

Births registered during the year are 1792 as against 2286 of the previous year. Ratio per mille of population is 13.46 against 17.17 in the previous year. The decrease clearly shows that births are not properly reported and indicates the importance of maintaining a staff for collecting the information in the absence of which no accurate information is forthcoming.

#### STILL-BIRTHS.

The number of still-births registered during the year is 157 against 204 of the preceding year.

As long as the registration of births is incorrect the ratio derived per mile births will be defective, as many births escape registration. The large mortality amongst infants is probably due to the following reasons.

- 1. Aversion of people to early vaccination.
- 2. Drugging by opium of children of the labouring classes.
- 3. Poverty.
- 4. Insanitary surroundings amongst the poor locality.
- 5. Want of maternity aid during parturtion.

#### CHOLERA.

Cholera accounted for 19 deaths (most of them were imported) against 48 in the preceding year.

## SMALL-POX.

Small-pox:—346 against 335 cases of smallpox were registered during the year. The Health Officer verified nearly all cases and necessary steps were promptly adopted to prevent its further spread.

#### MEASLES.

Measles:—138 deaths from measles were registered during the year against 129 in the previous year.

### DIARRHOEA AND DYSENTRY.

Diarrhoea and Dysentry registered 305 and 16 deaths respectively as against 220 and 12 in the preceding year. The highest mortality from diarrhoea was recorded in the month of August.

#### PLAGUE.

Plague:—There were only three deaths from plague as compared with 130 in 1923-1924. Vigorous measures and rat-trapping have kept its further spread in check.

#### MALARIA.

Malaria:—Registered 234 deaths against 221 in the previous year.

#### MUNICIPAL CHARITABLE DISPENSARIES.

There are 4 allopathic and 1 Ayurvedic dispensaries. Ganj Peth dispensary was recently opened. Its utility has yet to be proved.

# GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

I continued to be the Health Officer of the city during the year under report.

The post of Assistant Health Otiicer was abolished. Mr. Godbole was appointed Chief Sanitary Inspector, and Mr. Nikam became the Conservancy Superintendent.

The post of a seventh Sanitary Inspector continued to be vacant. There was no change in the outdoor and office staff.

#### MUNICIPAL STABLES.

139 bullocks were in the municipal stables. The number was further reduced to 132 during the latter part of the year. Six died, (some due to old age) one was found quite aged and was sent to Panjarpole.

The Special Municipal Magistrates (Sirdar Natu and Mr. Ranade) have helped the Health Department a good deal in bringing home to some of perverse public who were dead opposed to the most primary duties towards preserving sanitation, by punishments in some cases exemplary; And this has created a kind of respect for the Health Officer and his subordinates in the discharge of their duties in preserving sanitation where opposition merely for the sake of opposition was the ground against which the Health Department has to fight. The undersigned, therefore, thanks the two municipal magistrates for their hearty co-operation in matters sanitary. The Health Officer has readily withdrawn prosecutions where the ends of public health are met with. For prosecution and not persecution is the aim followed.

### CATTLE POUND.

The number of animals impounded during the year was 6193 as against 6280 in the previous year. The total amount of fine recovered during the year was Rs. 1252-4-0 against Rs. 1095-10-0.

#### HOUSE-INSPECTIONS

The Divisional Sanitary Inspectors inspected 5860 houses during the year. Of which 644 houses were checked and the registers verified by the Health Officer.

#### MENIALS.

The road sweepers, bhangis, cart-drivers and other menial staff gave no trouble during the year.

#### BHANGIS.

A few of them who are performing double duties of removing cesspool water as well as removing nightsoil were instigated by one of them to strike work. The leader was at once dismissed by the undersigned with some others which had a wholesome effect on the rest of them. The undersigned has always been prompt to fine, suspend or dismiss for neglect of duty on the part of a Bhangi, but he can not help admitting that a good deal of caution and consideration are necessary. In these democratic days with increased cost in living, the problem of blangi service should receive at the hands of the corporation a definite line of action. Unless and until the privies and Moris and cesspool waters, are connected to the main drains by the property holderes, the Bhangi menace will remain. The danger of Bhangi strike with its consequent results is an item to be seriously thought of. The undersigned, therefore, has always handled the situation cautiously. They have been treated with kindness as far as circumstances permitted. For gross neglect of work they are punished heavily.

### ROAD-SWEEPERS.

(a). Drainage:—The eastern part of the town viz. Nana and Bhawani Peths are being laid with a main drain and it is hoped the whole city will be properly drained in the near furture. The old drainage is defective and levels are missed in many instances. Cesspools and gol gutters still exist. The unsewered areas which are used for building purposes round Tlak road and to the

- east of Deccan Gymkhana as also at Pulachiwadi have increased the number of cesspools. Gol gutters also are utilised in some instances for draining waste water where branch drains are not extended. The cesspools are emptied by carts. Gol gutters drain into the Nagzari.
  - (b). Gully traps:—All the new gully traps connecting houses with the main drains are supplied with lock and key. I am pleased that my suggestion is carried out. The Bhangis can not now easily remove the lids and empty their head loads into the gully traps. Their number has increased to 8178.
  - (c). Gutters (Katchha and gol):—Katchha gutters are either shallow or deep. The shallow katchha gutters are supposed to collect storm water, but these having no outlet are a source of great nuisance. The water stagnates and forms local places for breeding mosquitoes or the water percolates and damps the houses adjoining, renderioing them unhealthy. The deep gutters are utilised in a few instances by owners of houses adjoining them for draining away waste and mael water of their premises. Gol gutters are pacca built in stone and masonry. They are cleaned by the Health Department. They have a fall into the nagazari in most instances.
  - (d). Public latrines:—There are 429 seats of public latrines of which 26 have flushing arrangement.
  - (e). Public urinals:—Public urinals have increased rapidly. The new ones that are constructed or are in course of construction are provided with flushing arrangements. The old type of gutter urinals are gradually replaced by the new two seated type.
  - (f). Private privies:—Private privies may be classified into two types, those of the basket system and those of new types with flushing arrangement. The former have increased to 9588 and the latter to 426. Unfortunately the increase in the latrines of flushing pattern is not rapid. The Health Officer has always encouraged the house—owners to construct new latrines of flushing type or to convert their old latrines into flushing ones. Many houses are on a higher level and consequently no pressure could be brought on these owners to convert their old latrines into flushing ones. Add to this the difficulty of raising the water to a sufficient level when the canal water is at a low pressure during hot weather. Considering the demand for increase in wages by Bhangis the undersigned would welcome the conversion of the basket system into flushing arrangements but for the difficulty mentioned above. There are other difficulties also which cannot be easily solved. e. g.
  - 1. Division of properties which formerly belonged to one owner, having one single privy.
    - 2. Poverty in a family due to loss of its bread winer.
  - 3. Family litigations. The properties under dispute pending court's decisions.
    - 4. Mortgaged properties, their decision not yet arrived at.
    - 5. Many houses with court of wards pending coming to age of minors.
    - 6. Houses encumbered owing to heavy debts of the owners.

The above are a few instances where pressure or-persuation can have no effect on the property owners. The rich land lords and the well-to-do middle class should be compelled to convert the basket system into flushing ones, and

their arguments that unless their neighbours are compelled to do so they will-not do what they are told, should find no favour with the Municipality.

- (g). Cesspeels:—The easter part of the city will have its number of cesspools reduced, since the work of laying drains is progressing. But the western parts of the town where buildings are newly constructed have no drain line; consequently cesspools are turning up like mushrooms. With the limited number of carts at the disposal of the Health Department the work of removing water from cesspools has been increasingly difficult. The service of pipes which is given indiscriminately where waste water is emptied into cesspools, fill them no sooner they are emptied. Use of service of water taps both sarvajanic as well as private by people for all purposes viz. washing of clothes and bathing filling up chatties with drinking water and for domestic purposes, washing domestic animals etc., cause the cesspools to overflow at all hours of the day and requires a legislation to stop this nuisance.
- (h). Dustbins:—There are 587 dustbins, square as well as round, distributed throughout the town. I was against round dustbins when they were first introduced, as they were bottomless, very unsuitable and could easily be displaced. Happily the Municipality has seen the mistake and General Body ( ide its resolution recently passed ) has ordered all round dustbins to be replaced by square ones.
- (i). Pail depots:—A few additional pail depots are constructed, but more are wanted. The work of redistributing Bhangi service greatly depends on their construction. No sconer the depots are ready the redistribution of Bhangi service will commence.
- (j). Kachara removal:—Motor lorries for removing city refuse on contract system proved an immence failure. Unless the Municipality has motor lorries with a workshop of its own, work of contract system as it has proved itself to be, has been a total failure. Lately a system of removing kachara by agency of bullock carts to three places almost on the outskirts of the town, to burn it at the incinerators located at those spots, is on its trial. I may here enter my humble protest, as I have been hitherto doing, that the removal of kachara by contract system has always proved a failure.

## MARKETS AND SLAUGHTER-HOUSES.

The number of meat markets and slaughterhouses remains the same. The slaughter-houses are a great nuisance and are detrimental to the health of the town. Kondwa slaughter-house is an improvement in the right direction. But the improvement can not be complete until a beef market is also constructed. At present sale of beef is carried out on the verandahas of butcher's residences at kagdipura. Fish-Market:—The selection of sites for the sale of fish and storage of dry fish is being considered by a sub-committee.

### MILK SUPPLY,

This all important question remains status quo. Licensing of milk shops and of sellers of milk will to a certain extent check the adulteration which is openly carried out. The subcommittee has made no progress since I initiated the movement some three years ago.

### CITY WATER-SUPPLY.

The same remarks as stated in my previous report.

## MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

Medical inspection of school children was carried out during the year. My report to the school board is given below.

# NEEDS OF THE CITY.

I am tempted to repeat the several urgent needs already enumerated in my previous reports. Some of my demands have met with favour by the authorities. Public urinals of flushing pattern and public latrines have now increased as there was a great demand for them. The new gully traps are all supplied with lock and key as per my suggestion and I am pleased to say that within the last year much improvement is noticed; but a great deal remains yet to be done. My immediate sanitary wants on public health points are as under.

- 1. Permanent stoppage of the flow of sewerage from the pumping station into the river via. Nagazari.
- 2. Construction of gravitation rewerage for removing mails from the city limits.
  - 3. Providing old gully traps with lock and key arrangement.
- 4. Public latrines and public urinals of flushing pattern are still in demand. The conversion of gutter urinals of the old type into flushing ones of modern pattern, must be pushed forward.
  - 5. Abolition of all shallow kachha gutters having no outfall.
  - 6. Improvement and licensing of milk shops and milk-supply.
- 7. Removal of all stables of buffaloes, bullocks and cows from the midst of inhabited areas.
  - 8. Need of a malaria brigade.
  - 9. A tuberculosis dispensary.
  - 10. Permanent gang for destruction of rats.
  - 11. Paving of narrow lanes and bols.
  - 12. Construction of a fish and beef markets.
  - 13. Removal of slaughter houses outside municipal area.
  - 14. A washing ghat for the city dhobies.
  - 15. Bathing places on the bank of Nagazari.
  - 16. Levels of old drain should be corrected.
  - 17. All cesspools to be done away with.
  - 18. Compulsory water flushed latrines in private houses.
  - 19. Need of midwives.
  - 20. Removal of prostitutes from thickly populated areas.

### REMARKS.

A keen enthusiast and a sanitary observer living in Poona City will have observed that there has been a good deal of sanitary conscience awakened amongst masses living in Poona City, within the past few years. The hearty co-operation of the Health Department with the Arogya Mandal (Citizens' Sanitary Association) the only one of its kind in Poona City has spread a healthy atmosphere in places where dirt and filth prevailed. The Health Department is anxious to have more such associations as it will be admitted on all hands that no sanitary progress could be achieved unless the people freely and heartily cooperate with the Health Department; Unless all personal self-interest is kind aside no sanitary progress could be made. The Health Department cannot single handed put down diseases and lessen the death rate

unless and until the people cooperate with the Health Department in their efforts to do so. The total number of deaths during the year 1924-25 was 5553 and the ratio per 1000 population is a little over 40. The loss of life amongst the civil population is obviously due to the failure to effectively check preventable diseases and deaths despite the efforts of the Health Department. The Health Department has no control over new constructions. health of a locality is closely connected with the nature of dwellings and their surroundings. Where sufficient accomodation can not be found or provided for to abate over-crowding; Death can not but be high. The Department of Health to some extent depends on the Engineer's for adequate and constant supply of pure water, for efficient drainage, and for the proper maintainence of roads, and therefore it cannot hold itself entirely responsible for the various ailments or diseases which may be the outcome of the improper conditions of the tripod of public health viz. water, drainage and roads. Now coming to the infant mortality the death rate for the year 1924-25 is 2079. The figure is decidedly high and the necessity for organising more infant welfare centres should be considered by the citizens to reduce the infant mortality rate. Infant and child mortality can not be reduced to any appreciable extent by measures directed solely to the mother and her child. Of what avail is the advice to the mother in the case of her baby if the father is a syphilitic, if the babes' ayah who looks after them sufferes from tuberculosis or if the mother lives in a place or community where infectious diseases prevail unnoticed? Of what avail is advice for child feeding if there is no provision for clean milk and where sanitary regulations are not fully enforced? Poverty is another great bar to sanitary progress. It is fuitile to tell a poverty stricken mother with a large family, to nurse her baby on a pure cow's milk. It is no use lecturing to a poor family on the importance of well ventilated dwellings with necessary house space and air space, impermeable flooring where household utensils are scarce, clothing is scanty and above all even one meal per day is only half meal insufficient in quantity and poor in quality. Under there circumstances to combat disease is no easy thing. The public health of a city means the health of its masses. Health is therefore largely a community matter. It should be well organised and efficiently worked with the help of a system of co-operative associations or other association which have for their special object the benefit of the child and the mother. We have amongst us one such society viz the Seva Sadan which requires the support of every public spirited citizen in main taining the same morally and financially. More such associations are needed in fact in every peth in the city, with a thorough backing up by the city fathers irrespective of caste or creed who form the corporate body when some amelioration in the appalling infantile mortality could be expected. In combat ing the social habits, religious beliefs, and superstious ideas the Department of Health looks to the education of masses. The establishment of model primary schools under the auspices of the corporate body is a step in the direction of securing educational influence on the students of today who are the citizens of to-morrow. Education in Hygiene should be made compulsory. The Health Officer, therefore, begs to urge the corporation the necessity of simple instructions on sanitation. These may be impared as a compulsory subject to these future citizens in addition to their usual lessons. A word more and I have done. As I have urged before the axe of retrenchment should not cut through the public health establishment as some corporators think it ought to. It should take precedence in the estimates of expenditure and there should be a continuity of policy in carrying out health works in preference to "other works,"

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I beg to thank the authorities for their valuable assistance, Messrs Godbole and Nikam two of my principal assistants, continued to give their loyal and useful assistance. The Arogya Mandal (citizen's Sanitary Association) under their indefatigable secretary Mr. Bhat continued their useful work. The latter gave me many useful hints and to him I am also thankful.

I have the honour to submit herewith a report of the number of municipal school children examined by the medical officers attached to the five municipal dispensaries of which one is ayurvedic.

556 boys were medically examined by the medical officer in charge Narayan Peth. 135 boys are reported suffering from caries of tooth. 44 boys suffer from the throat.

683 children were examined by the medical officer in charge Kasba Peth; majority of them were found suffering from caries of the teeth. A small percentage for enlarged spleen as is seen from the report.

The Medical Officer in charge ayurvedic dispensaries examined 540 children of whom a large percentage was already found suffering from caries teeth.

396 children were examined by the medical officer in charge Nana Peth and of these 80 children are found suffering from bad teeth.

Of the 562 children examined by Mr. Kadhe in charge Ganj Peth dispensary, he finds 70 % suffering from caries teeth.

Remarks:—From the above reports, it is clear that the early care of teeth in children is much neglected. It is surprising to note that malaria is not so very common as undersigned expected. Bad nurshment due to poor and unhealthy food may account for the general weakness amongst school children. Overfeeding where poverty is not the cause may also account for general debility amongst school children. Sore throat amongst a large number of children might be one of the causes of bad digestion leading to weakness due to imperfect mastication of food on account of bad teeth—a general complaint with all the medical officers. The school Board authorities might do well to instruct all the teachers not to admit children suffering from skin diseases i. c. scabies, dhobic itch etc.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the Administration of the School Board for the year 1924-25.

2. Constitution of the School Board:—The personnel of the Board changed on 1st April 1924, after the expiry of one year's period, for which the previous Board was constituted in March 1923 by the General Body. The New School Board was constituted for one year ending 31st March 1925 as follows:—

- 3. Meetings of the School Board:—During the year under review the School Board held 28 meetings as against 22 of the last year; 40 meetings were convened in all as against 32 of the previous year; 753 items of busi-

ness were disposed of at the meetings of the year under review as against 316 of the last year, while 43 items were disposed of by circular resolutions as against 59 of the previous year.

- 4. Members of the School Board carried out the work of inspection of the Municipal Schools assigned to them, some members visiting other schools also. These inspections are of the nature of surprise visits, and have been found in various ways to have a satisfactory effect.
- 5. Management of the School Board office and the schools continued as before to be under the direct control of the Superintendent of the School Board, which post has been held by Mr. V. L. Gatne, B. A. Mr. Gatne was on privilege leave for two months from 5th June to 5th August 1924 and on leave from the 5th of January 1925 till the end of March 1925. period of leave of Mr. Gatne, the Assistant Superintendent, Mr. V. R. Gaikaiwari, acted as Superintendent and Mr. Heramb Gajanan Deo, Head Master of the Boys School No. 8, was appointed to act as Assistant Superintendent. work of the whole School Board Office staff was carried on during the year under report under direct orders from the Chairman of the School Board and from the Chief Officer, who acts as Secretary of the School Board. The School Board expressed satisfaction about the general work of the School Board office staff in their resolution of 26-3-1925, which is given below: "The School Board feels much delighted to place on record the satisfactory work done and help given by Mr. Gatne, the Superintendent, Mr. Gaikaiwari the Assistant Superintendent and the Head Clerk, the bill clerk as well as other clerks in the School Board office during the year under report ".

Taking into consideration the increase in the number of children and Schools, the School Board created a new post of an Urdu Mahomedan Inspector for Urdu Schools and Mr. Banemiya Bandemiya. Head Master of the Municipal Urdu Boys' School No. 10, was entrusted with the work of that post till the end of march with an allowance of Re. 20/-p. m. He was asked to supervise Urdu Schools for two hours daily in addition to his usual work as Head master of his School. The General Body sanctioned the new post and the matter is submitted to Government for final sanction. In appreciation of the work of Mr. Banemiya Bandemiya, the School Board extended the period of this temporary appointment till the end of September 1925.

6. The Schools:—There were 35 primary schools (out of which one Urdu Boys' School and one Urdu Girls' School were started as an experiment in Nana's Peth for a year for the present), one training School for primary Marathi and Urdu untrained teachers and one Technical Institute under the management of the School Board.

One more night School was opened in Mominpura in the building of Urdu Boys' School No. 18 again at the request of the residents in that locality as an experiment. The work of conducting this school was entrusted to the Head Master of Urdu Boys School No. 18.

The Boys' School at Bhokarwadi for Depressed classes children, which was transferred to the Depressed classes missionSociety for management in August 1918, was given according to the settled conditions a grant of Rs. 250 this year also by the Municipality. Owing to the increase in the number of children in the primary School No. 12 for the Depressed Classes children in Mangalwar Peth, the School Board bired rooms in the temple in the vicinity of the school for eleven months for the present to meet the pressing want of the school. Attempts are being made for acquisition of a site to erect a new school building for that school in the same locality. As the Municipality made a special provision of Rs. 6,000 this year to open new primary schools for extension of primary education in such localities as are mostly inhabited by the poor and backward classes, the School Board opened on trial two Urdu schools in Nana peth, one for Boys and the other for girls, to meet the wants of the Mahomedan community, and arrangements are in progress to open two new Marathi Boys Schools one in Nana peth and the other in Bhangihatti Bhavani peth, and two Girls' Schools one in Bhavani Peth and the other in that part of Narayan Peth, which is mostly inhabited by people of the back-ward and Depressed classes. In order to increase the attendance of children of the poor and Backward communities in different Schools, the School Board sanctioned as before distribution of sweetmeats, slates, books, etc. throughout the year under report.

- N. B. An English class is specially attached to the Urdu Boys' full Primary School (No. 10) with a view to increase the strength and attendance of children in higher classes and thereby to facilitate the spread of higher education in the Mahomedan community (Vide remarks about the class in a note about the progress of Mahomedan Education, Appendix V. There are twenty—two (22) Boys' day schools, out of which 12 are entirely free. During the year under report, Urdu Boys' School in Ganesh Peth continued free as in the previous year. These schools are made up as follows:—
- (1) Eight Marathi Boys' Schools including two mixed schools for boys and girls of the Depressed classes.
- (2) Four Urdu Schools for Mahomeden Boys. All the girls' Schools are entirely free.
- 7. The number of students in primary schools:-The total number of students increased from 5158 to 5822 during the year under review. The work

of all the schools went on smoothly and regularly throughout the year under report. The general attendance of children in the schools was satisfactory; the increase of average daily attendance being from 2477.8 to 2925.3 in the case of Boys' schools and from 1311.8 to 1450.9 in the case of girls' School, out of the average number on rolls of 3328.6 and 3640.1 in Boys Schools and 1849.2 and 2077.9 in girls' schools in the years 1923-24 and 1924-25, respectively.

Of the total number of 5822 pupils on rolls on 31st March 1925, there were 3650 boys and 2072 girls in Boys' Schools and girls Schools, as against 3109 boys and 173 girls in Boys' Schools and 1876 girls in girls' Schools on 31st March 1924.

Information regarding the ages, social conditions, professions of guardians, the number of married and un-married students in the primary schools is fully given in appendices [ I ( A and B ) ].

The comparative attendance of children in the Schools during the years 1924-25 and 1923-24 will be found in appendix IV.

8. Teachers in the Primary Schools:—The comparative statements showing the strength of teachers in Primary Schools under the control of this Municipality and their proportionate distribution in Marathi and Urdu Schools will be found in appendix (II (A))

During the year under report, the School Board tried their best to appoint lady teachers instead of male teachers in Urdu Girls' Schools and the Inspectress of Urdu Girls Schools C. D. was specially requested through the Deputy Educational Inspector, Poona, to provide some female teachers; but only one was available for the post of an assistant mistress. Throughout the year under report, the Schools specially attended by children of the backward and depressed classes were paid more attention in every respect and as a consequence the teaching staff had to be increased owing to the increased number of children of those classes in different schools.

Every attempt is being made by the School Board to enhance the efficiency of the teaching staff by increasing the number of trained teachers gradually. The number of trained primary teachers in the service of this Municipality during the year under review increased from 126 to 145, while the number of untrained teachers was 116 as against 110 of the previous year. The staff of trained teachers was distributed amongst several schools on the principle of giving to each school a certain minimum number of trained teachers, taking into consideration their needs and locality in which they are situated; schools attended mainly by children of backward classes in different parts of the city are being provided with more trained hands as the Municipal Training School gives every year an additional number of First Year Trained Masters.

9. Municipal Training and Continuation Classes for primary teachers:—With a view to make every member of the staff trained in course of time, a scheme for starting a Municipal Training School for primary teachers was formulated four years ago, and as stated in the reports of the previous years, the Municipality after receiving the necessary sanction of the Government Educational Department in this matter, started the classes for the first year's Training Certificate Examination for Marathi primary school masters.

Scheme has made provision both for the theoretical and practical work of the pupil-teachers admitted to the class. The results of these classes are satisfactory as stated in the previous reports. These Training Classes were temporarily closed in the middle of December 1923 as the School Board desired to make certain improvements in the working of this Training School and a revised scheme for the same was under consideration. This year the School Board considered carefully all the pros and consideration. This year the School Board considered carefully all the pros and considered the matter. After much deliberation and inquiry of the whole question from all sides, the school Board came to the decision of opening the training classes again and accordingly they were re-opened in December 1924 and all necessary arrangements were made in due course concerning the conduct of these classes. This year, special concessions were given to teachers of Mahomedan community.

As it was found that it was no longer necessary to continue the continuation Classes for the unpassed Urdu Mahomedan masters and the unpassed unistresses in the Municipal Schools, as most of them got themselves qualified by passing the necessary examinations, these classes were closed.

- 10. Examinations of Prinary Schools:—This year the annual examinations of all the Municipal Prinary Schools were in the month of February 1925 by the Acting Superintendent with the help of the Assistant Superintendent (H. G. Deo, Head Master B. S. No. 8) and the Urdu Inspector for Municipal Urdu Prinary Schools-Mr Banemiya Bandemiya, Head Master B. S. No. 10 and some senior Head Masters and Head Mistresses selected by them. Detailed information regarding the percentage of passing etc. at the annual examination of the several standards of every school seperately will be found in appendix.
- (a) Inspection of Municipal Primary Schools by Government Inspecting Officers:—The Marathi Schools were inspected one by one by the Deputy Educational Inspector of the Poona District and his Assistant and Urdu boys' Schools by the Urdu Deputy Inspector. C. D., and Urdu Girls' Schools by the Inspectress of Urdu Girls Schools C. D. in the months of? during the year under review. From the copies of the Inspection Report for the year 1924–25 and the General Inspection Report for the year 1923–24 it will be seen that Government Inspection Officers have expressed their entire satisfaction about the general working and progress of almost all Municipal Schools and that they have also suggested some changes which were already given effect to by the School Board during the year under report.
- (b) Scholarships:—Last year boys from Marathi Boys' Schools No. 19 and boys from Boys' School No. 5 obtained Government middle School Scholarships standing at the top of the successful candidates that appeared for this Examination in the Poona District. In order to give encouragement to such students, the School Board gave a reward of Rs. 24 to each of these successful students and a bonus of Rs. 60 to each of the teachers who trained them specially for this Examination, During the year under review also one boy from B. S. No. 5 obtained the above scholarship.

- (c). Three full-primary Schools are maintained by the Municipality viz:—
  - 1. for Marathi Speaking Boys.
  - 1. for Marathi Speaking Girls.
  - 1. for Mohamedan Boys.

In last April, 28 candidates from Marathi full primary Boys School (No. 8) and one candidate form Urdu full Primary School (No. 10) were sent up for the Vernacular Final Examination held at the Poona centre; out of them 15 and 1 came out successful from each school respectively. Three Girls were sent up for the Government V. F. Examination specially held for Girls from the Municipal Girls' School (No. 6) this year and all of them came out successful to the credit of the Head Mistress and the class Mistress of the said-School. The School Board was highly pleased and gave a reward of Rs. 5 to each of these successful girls by way of encouragement.

- 11. (a) Technical School:—In the Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School, the number of students on the roll increased from 81 in March 1924 to 101 at the end of the year under review. The average attendance of students per month was 54.54. The number of students that learned Drawing course, Carpentry, Signboard Painting and Smithy was 101; out of these 91 were Brahmins and 10 Marathas.
- (b) There is in the Technical School a special class for Drawing for the benefit of such local students as cannot afford to become regular students of any other School. A fee of annas four is charged per head; but teachers and students from Municipal Schools, Local Aided Schools and training Colleges attending the class are exempted from paying fees. This class was attended by 12 students in the year under report.

The School sends up candidates for Elementary and Intermediate Drawing Examinations of the School of Art, Bombay. This year 26 candidats were sent up for the Elementary Examination and 18 for the Intermediate Examination and of these 10 and 3 passed respectively.

The Annual examination of the School was conducted according to the rules in force at present in the Victoria Jubillee Technical Institute of Bombay and arrangements were made to hold it under the direct supervision of the examiners deputed by the commttee of Direction for Technical Education in this presidency. The following table shows the results of the Examination of several classes:—

Annual grant of Rs. 954 was received for this Technical School from Government this year according to the recommendation of the Committee of Direction for Technical Education in this presidency. It was not as usual equal to half of the expenditure incurred by the municipality for the payment of the Teaching staff of the Technical School as per grant-in-aid code rules for Technical Schools. Inquiries are being made regarding this curtailment of Government Grant for this year, and the correspondance in this respect is still going on.

The School Board and Municipal Councillors paid surprise visits to this school from time to time during the year under review.

Government Inspecting Officers for Technical Education inspected this school in the month of January 1925 and conducted the annual examination of this school in the second week of March 1925. All of them expressed satisfaction about the work of this school in general.

The school was under the direct supervision of Mr. Sathe throughout the year under review. He is a Mechanical and Electrical Engineer and has undergone special training in the Normal class of the Engineering-College at Poona, He is qualified as a Technical School teacher and possesses experience of practical work. The Technical School is improving now and showing better results owing to the efforts of the Superintendent. Besides the Superintendent the Technical School staff consists of a carpentry teacher, a Drawing Master, a Painting Master, a Teacher of Smithy, a special teacher to teach Technical Arithmetic and English and a Maaistry Class Instructor Arrangements are being made to appoint special hands to teach turning, moulding and fitting in this school. As mentioned in the last years' report, the revised courses of instruction for this Technical School were followed during the year under review, the Municipality having approved of them and sanctioned the necessary amount of additional expenditure on that account as an experimental measure for the year. The new mistry class started last year was continued, and the courses laid down in the revised scheme were under. taken; at present the following subjects are being taught in this Institution.

Carpentry, Casting in various forms, Wood and Metal turning, Polishing, Wood-work and Signboard painting, Carpentry drawing, machine drawing, art drawing, smithy, press-work (composing, printing and book-binding) and English. No fees are charged for the instruction given in this school except for drawing as mentioned above.

Scholarships:—Two scholarships for each of the second, third and fourth year classes, each of Rs. 2, 3 and 4 per month respectively are given by the Municipality on the results of periodical School Examinations by open competition in order to encourage students to take up courses of technical education. There is also one more scholarship called Divan Bahadur K. R. Godbole Scholarship of Rs. 5 p. m. for a student who stands highest in the annual examination of the courses of this school.

The School is attached to the Workshop of this Municipality for practical and experimental purposes. Repairing and other work is carried out with the aid of machinery of modern patterns. The materials such as wood, metal etc, used by the students of manual training and the tools used by them are supplied free of charge by this school. The students have to deposit a sum of

Rs. 5 as security for the tools given in their charge. This amount is returned to them when they complete one years' full course. It is great advantage to the students of this school that they can actually see how the Municipal Work men work with the aid of the machinery of the workshop and how to carry on actual work on the steel and oil engines. Attempts are being made to start a new class in this school for Third Class Mechanical Engineer's Course. School Board is at present contemplating to give effect to the several suggestions made by Dr. R. K. Naidu L. M. & s. the then School Board Member regarding the present revised courses that are followed here when the number of scholarships will be further increased and further arrangement of additional and more qualified staff will be made; it is hoped to attract a still larger number of students for technical education in this school. It will be seen from this that several measures, such as revision of new courses and starting new useful classes adopted by the Municipality, have improved the condition of this school during the last two years and its progress continues as at present, this school will make satisfactory provision for technical education in the City of Poona.

- 13. Income:—Appendix III gives information regarding the funds at the disposal of the School Board, during the year under review. On the whole there is an increase of Rs. 23,813 over that of the last year. The causes of increase and decrease under several heads being given in short below.
- I. Fees in primary Schools:—The School Board made it their policy to give all sorts of facilities to the poor and deserving students by granting free Student-ships in those boys' Schools which are not still free, though the question of making primary education entirely free has not been yet decided by this Municipality. This item shows an increase of Rs. 146 which is due to the increased number of paying students throughout the year in the several Municipal Boys' Schools.
- II. Government Grant-in-aid for Primary Education:-There is a decrease of Rs. 5568 as the last year's grant included the grant on the arrears of increased salaries as per G. R. E. D. No 560 of 3-12-1923. The grant received is one half of the actual expenditure incurred on primary education during the year under report. The Budget estimates for the year under report were duly approved by the Educational authorities.
- III. Grant-in-aid for the purchase of sites for new school Building:

  An amount of Rs. 6531 was received as the site-grant during the year under report and as for other charges of acquisition, the question is still under consi-deration.
- IV. Grant-in-aid for Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School Poona:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 44-8-0 as the Committee of Direction for Technical Education in this Presidency sanctioned a higher grant for this year than that for the last year. However, the Municipality did not receive as before for this Technical School Government grant equal to half of the total expenditure actually incurred for the payment of the staff of teachers employed in the Technical School, for which a reference is made to the said Committee of Direction for Technical Education with a request to inform the Municipality the reasons for reducing the usual amount of grant as explained above and correspondence in this regard is still going on.

- V. Drawing Grants:—There is a decrease of Rs. 10 under this head. This year a special grant towards the cost of maintaining a Drawing teacher and equipment according to Grant-in-aid code; schedule I, section I. Rule 5, was received viz. Rs. 50.
- VI. Local Fund Cess on the lands within the Municipal Limits:

  This item shows only an increase of Rs. 40-8-0 which requires no explanation.
- VII. Technical School Fees:—This item shows an increase of ?
  Rs. 29 only in the year under report.
- VIII. Donations:—The funds placed by certain gentlemen was done nations at the disposal of the Municipality brought the full interest due for the period during the year under report.

The funds placed at the disposal of the School Board-were made up as follows:—

- (1) Sanctioned Budget for the year 1924-25. Rs. 3,59,740
- (2) Actual Expenditure for the year 1924-25: Rs. 1,66,920
- (3) Income of the School Board besides: Municipal Runds for 1924-25 Rs. 81,750
- (4) Municipal Funds for the school Board for the the year 1924-25 Rs. 85,170
- N. B. :-Sanctioned Budget included the amount of Rs. 1,84,000 and for acquisition of School Building sites and provision for constructing new buildings over them.
- 14. Expenditure:—Details regarding the expenditure on Primary Schools, the Technical School, School Board Office Establishment and Grant-in-aid to other local institutions and Free reading Rooms, are given in appendix IV. The total expenditure on Education amounted to Rs. 17,3,949 in the year under review, as against Rs. 1,48,339 in the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 862/- which is explained in short under each sub-head below:—
- (1) School Board Establishment:-This item shows an increase of Rs. 745 which is due to increments of salaries to the office staff and owing to Expenditure required for having a telephone connection in this office.
- (2) Office Contingencies:—There is a decrease of Rs. 29-14-8 which is due to the fact that the old stock of some of the printed forms was insuffici--ent and new forms were required.
- (3) Salaries of Masters, Mistresses and peons with pension fund:—This item shows an increase of Rs., 7802-6-3 which is mainly due to the following facts:—
  - I. Annual promotions due to primary teachers.
- II. Payment of the addition salaries with retrospective effect from 1st April 1923 in accordance with the provisions of the Govt. Press Note in this connection.
- III. The number of temporary teachers being increased in the course of the year owing to the increased number of students in several schools.

- IV. More pension contribution being paid into the Govt. Treasury according to revised rates sanctioned by the Government for payment of pension contribution on behalf of trained and untrained teachers.
- 4 Rent of School Buildings:-There is an increase of Rs. 1309-4-0 under the head as the rents of several school-houses were increased after taking additional rooms there to accommodate more classes owing to the increased number of children in these schools as stated in the Report of the previous years.
- 5 Water Tax:-There is an increase of Rs. 58-5-0 which is due to the supply of more water pipes to some of the Schools that were in great need of them.
- 6 New furniture:-There is a decrease of Rs. 1008-6-11 which is due to the fact that the bills of these articles could not be paid, as due sanction for these payments was obtained just at the end of the year.
- (7) Contingency for Schools including sewing materials etc:-There is an increase of Rs. 658-4-2 which is due to the increase in the contingency of schools where the number of children is increased and to the sanctioning of small sums to Schools in localities of backward classes for distributing sweetmeats amongst school children for inducing them to attend schools regularly.
- (8) New books and Maps:—There is a decrease of Rs.21-10-0 under this head as some of Urdu maps that were to be purchased were not available.
- (9) New School Buldings:—No sum was spent on this head during the year under review.
- (10) Purchase of sites for new School Buildings:—A sum of Rs. 1995-12-3 was spent for charges of the Special Land Acquisition Officer, and other minor purposes.
- (11) Repairs to School Buildings:—There is an increase of Rs. 195-1-7 under this head which is due to the new partitions that were put in certain class rooms and other changes effected in certain school-houses for adopting them as class-rooms.
- (12) Prizes paid from the interest accruing from the Donation Funds placed at the disposal of this Municipality by several gentlemen of the City:—There is a decrease of Rs. 184 which is due to the fact that last year interest for the previous years was realised.
- (13) Scientific Apparatus:—The increase of Rs. 151-14-0 is due to the fact that no such apparatus was purchased last year.
- (14) Gymnasium:—There is an increase of Rs. 453-15-5 under this head as more play-grounds for Municipal Boys' schools were hired and four weighing machines were purchased for the purpose of medical inspection of School Boys.
- (15). School Libraries:—The increase of Rs. 78-9-6 is due to the payment of bills this year for books that were purchased last year, but whose cost could not be paid up to the end of last year.
- (16) Experiment of a new curriculum for Girls Schools:—No special material was required by the Girls' Schools during the year under report.

- (17) Childrens' Libraries in Schools:—The increase of Rs. 135-10-5 is due to the payment of bills for books that were purchased last year, but whose cost could not be paid till the end of the year.
- (18) Teachers' Training School:—The decrease of Rs. 1,235-4-3 is due to the fact that these classes were temporarily closed and were resturted from the 1st December 1924. The expenditure on their account was only for four months of this year.
- (19) Temporary and Provisional allowance to primary school teachers:—These allowances were paid last year with retrospective effect and hence the decrease of Rs. 2244-6-1 this year.
- (20) Handieraft and Clay-modelling:—No expenditure was required for this item last year and hence the increase of Rs. 196-6-3.
- (21) Spinning Wheels:—There is a decrease of Rs. 138-14-3 as no cotton was purchased and only Rs. 48-6-5 were required for repairs of some of the old spinning wheels.
- (22) Technical school Establishment:—There is an increase of Rs. 518 as some more hands were appointed on the staff of the Technical School to teach additional subjects according to the revised curriculum for that School.
- (23) Technical School Contingency:—This item shows decrease of Rs. 608 as more Scholarships were given to the students of the Technical School and printing of the necessary forms and stationery for the School necessitated more expenditure during the last year.
- (24) Machinery:—The increase of Rs. 858 is due to the purchase of a new lathe.
- (25) Weaving Class:—There is a decrease of Rs. 162-15-1, the class remaining closed during the year.
- (26) Oil Engine and machine repairs:—This item shows a decrease of Rs. 311-11-3 as the machinery required no repairing.
- (27) Municipal Grant-in-aid to local non-municipal Primary schools and other institutions:—This item shows an increase of Rs. 25647-15-0 which is due to the fact that the Municipality sanctioned payments of these grants for the current year as well as for the last year.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

Free and Compulsory Elementary Edu ation in the Poona City Municipal District:—Information about this question is being given in this Report every year, noting down the important events and facts that occurred regarding the matter during the year under review; and accordingly as stated in the last years' report, when the conference of the representatives of the Local Bodies was convened by Government in February 1924, and the Rules and Regulations framed by Government under the Bombay Primary Education Act of 1923 were discussed there, Government published in October 1924 final Rules and Regulations in this regard. The President of this Municipality was then referred to by Government inquiring as to whether there was any objection in giving effect to the Bombay Primary Education Act 1923, from

the 1st of January 1925 if the control of primary education was transferred according to the said Act to the Poona City Municipality; to which the President replied that there was no objection in this regard. Government then declared in the Gazette the 1st of April 1925 as the date from which the control of primary education within the Municipal limits would be transferred to the Local Authority of this Municipality. But this transfer was postponed for some months more on account of the triennial elections of the Municipality in march 1925. It is expected that the School Board under the new Act would be constituted in May 1925 and would begin to exercise and perform the powers and duties enacted in or prescribed under the said Act from 1st July 1925. The question of introduction of elementary compulsory education in the Poona City Municipal limits would then be duly considered by the new School Board, specially constituted for this purpose under the Act referred to above,

- School-houses:—As will be found in the previous Report, nearly 30 houses have been already occupied by the Municipality for its Primary Schools, being taken on lease for long periods renting from 5 to 7 years. Several alterations and additions quite essential for adopting them as School Buildings were effected. During the year under review also some more houses and additional rooms in former School houses were taken on lease; some for a period of seven years and others for eleven months for schools in Shukrawar, Bhavani, Nana, Mangalwar and Kasba Peths in the City. question of housing properly B. S. No. 12 in Mangalwar Peth is still under consideration, though temporary arrangements were made by the School Board to meet the pressing need of additional rooms for that School. School Board made housing accommodation for all schools as satisfactory as they could do it during the year under review and experienced many difficulties in securing suitable houses, as the owners demanded high rates of rent. work of securing houses for new schools to be opened as an experiment in different peths of the City viz. Mangalwar, Kasba, Nana, Bhavani, Navi Peth, Narayan is going on.
- Sadashiv Peth and Raviwar peth for primary Municipal Schools are acquired and have for some years been in possession of the Municipality. The fourth site will be shortly acquired as the recommendation of the school Board regarding it is placed before the General Committee which has already resolved to erect four primary school buildings in different quarters of the City each costing about Rs. 26000 The work of preparing plans and estimates is at present in progress and they are expected to be placed shortly by the Municipal Engineer before the General Body for their approval and sanction. If four new primary School buildings are erected as proposed, the Municipality will receive an amount of Rs. 52000 as building grant from Govt. on that account and the remaining half of cost has been obtained as a loan of Rs. 52000 from the public for school Buildings with the consent of the Government.

From this it may be seen that this serious problem of housing Municipal-Schools properly and adequately is being properly attended to by the Municipality.

- 3. Childrens' and Teachers' Libraries in Schools:—This year also some useful books were added to the Central School libraries for children and to the Teachers' Library. School children made use of the books in these libraries specially started for their benefit and took interest in this matter this year. The Head Masters and other teachers also used to take much interest in reading books kept in the Teachers' library and it is hoped these libraries would be made use of more and more in course of time.
- 4. Municipal Training Classes:—As will be seen from the last year's Report these classes were temporarily closed in December 1923 in order to effect certain important changes in the working of their schemes and the Schoool Board after considering this whole question again reopened these classes in December 1924 with certain changes in their usual working. The main object of these classes is to eliminate gradually the untrained element in the teaching staff and thereby to increase the efficiency of the Schools in every respect. A detailed account of these classes will be found in para 9 from which it will be seen that there is a gradual increase in the number of trained teachers and decease in that of untrained ones. During the year under Report, the Mohamedan teachers attending these classes were given special concessions and facilities.
- 5. Grant-in-aid to the Registered Non-Municipal Primary Schools and reading Rooms within the Municipal limits:—As stated in the last year's report, no grants could be given to these Schools till the end of last year, as the matter was not finally decided by the General Body till the end of March 1924. However the General Body accorded sanction to these grants for the last year as well as for the year under review. According to the usual practice in paying such grants in arrears for the last year viz. 1923–24 were paid of and a special committee of 3 members of the School Board was appointed to visit the Schools, the managers of which had applied for Municipal grants. The committee recommended the grants to be paid to each of these schools after visiting them and assessing personally their work in general. The same procedure was followed in paying Municipal grants to free Reading-Rooms, special Institutions and unregistered Schools whose managers had applied for grants.
- 6. Physical exercise in Schools:—As stated in the report of the last year, a third Drill-Master was appointed during the year under report and was entrusted with the work of Drill and games in some of the remaining Schools where no arrangements could be made till now, as there were only two Drill-Masters who were entrusted with the work of 8 big primary schools.

Two new play-grounds were hired by the School Board and attempts are being made to secure some more play-grounds for schools in different parts of the city. To encourage the spirit of manly games and sportsman-ship amongst the School-children, the School Board handed over the sum of Rs. 1000 sanctioned by the General Committee for holding competitions in games and sports of primary School Boys to the President of the Tournament Committee appointed by the Deccan Gymkhana to which its whole management was entrusted and these sports are expected to be held next year.

- 7. Inspection of School buildings from the sanitary point of view:—Suggestions made in the previous reports regarding the sanitation of Schools were brought to the notice of the School Board who introduced such changes and addition in school houses as were required for making them fit for teaching perposes. These changes were carried out as far as possible either by the house owner or by the Municipality according to the conditions laid down in the leases of the several School-houses.
- Scheme for Medical Inspection of School children in Municipal Schools:-As mentioned in the last year's report the School Board after much deliberation and consultation with the Municipal Health Officer formed a scheme of medical inspection of schoolboys in the interest of the general health of the young generation and accepted with thanks help in this respect from some local doctors and physicians who voluntarily did the work of examining madically children of Municipal Primary Schools. School Board passed resolution of thanks for the special work of Dr. Joshi Necessary materials were supplied to them for this purpose. and Dr. wangiker. The Municipal Health Officer also asked the medical Officers of Municipal medical dispensaries in different peths of the City to inspect children of the Primary Schools located in the vicinity of their dispensaries. In this way boys in all Municipal Schools were medically examined once during the year under report and the inspection remarks were communicated to their guardians for doing the needful in the matter.
- 9. Grant in-aid to special schools of Depressed Classes started by Mr Mate in Poona:—The Municipality sanctioned Rs. 200 p. m. as grant to these schools (14 in number at present) started by Mr. S. M. Mate M. A. for children of the Depressed classes in different parts of the City.
- 10. A separate note dealing with the progress of education of Mohamedan children attending Urdu Schools under the control of the Municipality is appended hereto (vide Appendix V) and so no remarks need be made here.

I cannot conclude this Report without specially alluding to the valuable help given cordially by all of my colleagues on the School Board and by all the Municipal Officers as well.

(A note on the progress of Mohamedan Education in Urdu Schools of this Municipality in the year 1924-25).

In the year under reviaw, there were eleven day schools for Mohamedan children out of which six were for boys and five for girls; two new schools, one for boys and the other for girls, were opened on trial for eleven months.

Three day Schools are entirely free and the rates of fees charged in Urdu schools are much lower than those charged in Marathi Schools.

All the Urdu Girls' Schools are free. There ware 853 students on the rolls on 31st March 1925 as against 689 students of the previous year. The number of boys and girls was 606 and 247 respectively as against 486 and 203 of the last year.

The monthly average attendance was 498, 2 and 234, 1 in Urdu Boys' and girls, Schools respectively. The attendance was satisfactory in all schools during the year under report. There were 43 teachers, out of whom 19 were trained. With the object of enhancing of effeciency of schools by employing still more trained teachers, The School Board requested Government to provide some more Urdu female trained teachers, but only one was available during the year under review. To get over the difficulty of securing more trained men than at-present the School Bord started an Urdu training Class which was formerly attached to the Municipal Marathi Primary Teacher's Training School, both of which were closed temporarily in December 1923 for effecting certain changes in the arrangment. The School Board after much careful consideration of the pros and cons of the question, reopened these classes in December 1924 and provided in the scheme of Urdu Training Class more concessions and facilities to the students of Mohamedan community, by way of encouragement.

The annual examination of all the Urdu Schools was held in the month of March 1925 by the Superintendent of Municipal Schools with the assistance of some senior Head Masters and Head Mistresses and of the Urdu Mohamedan Inspector whose post was specially created by the School Board with the object of giving careful guidance and effecting special improvements in the

Urdu Schools. The senior Head Master of B. S. No. 10 Mr. Banemiya, was temporarily appointed to the post in addition to his own duties as Head Master. During the year under report these Boys' Schools and Girls' Schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspecter of Urdu Schools C. D. and his assistants and by the Inspectress of Urdu Girls' Schools, C. D. respectively as usual. The number of students learning English in the full primary Urdu School No. 10 was 32. It is taught as an additional subject in higher standards viz. fifth and sixth out seventh of the School. 31 out of 32 appeared for the Alnual Examination and 15 passed. The remarks made by the Govt. Educational Inspecting Officers are most satisfactory and encouraging. The Municipality has made it a permanent fixture now specially for the benefit of the Children of the Mohamedan community as will be found from the previous Reports for the last five years.

#### EXPENDITURE.

The Municipality incurred an expenditure of Rs. 21,423 approximately for education of the Children in Urdu Schools during the year under report, as against Rs. 24545 of the last year.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

One of the three full primary schools maintained by the Municipality is specially reseved for Mohamedan children in the heart of the City and is placed under the management of the senior Third year Trained Head Master. This School sends candidates for the Urdu V. F. Examination. The post of an Urdu Inspector was created by the School Board owing to the increase in the number of pupils and the great demand of the members of this community to which the General Committee, also accorded their sanction and further sanction of the Government is shortly expected. The supervision work was going on right lines in all the Urdu schools under the close watch of the Assistant Superintendent who has been specially appointed for that purpose and thereby the attendence of teachers and students has been much improved.

House accommodation for Urdu Schools along with the Marathi Schools has been provided satisfactorily by the School Board and one of the four school buildings to be shortly erected is specially reserved for the childran of the Muslim Community in Raviwar Peth. From the opening of two new schools in Nana Peth, the increase of children in Urdu Schools and the satisfactory results of annual examinations of these schools, it will be seen that the School Board is giving due attention to the education of the Muslim Community and its trying its best to give close attention to these schools specially to better their condition. It is a matter of pleasure to note that the Mahomedan members Shet Haji Abdul Rahiman and Mr. Papamiya Karimsaheb, who were on the School Board during the year took great interest in bringing about improvements in Urdu Schools. The School Board made it their object and policy to see that all classes get proper education and it is prepared to give special concessions and facilities to the childran of backward classes and is also ready to spend proportionately larger sums on the education of these classes.
