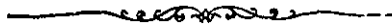

*Subject:—*Annual Administration Report of the Poona City Municipality.

I have the honour to enclose herewith the Annual Administration Report of the Poona City Municipality for the year 1928-29 for information and transmission to Government as usual.

**I. CHANGES IN POPULATION OR BOUNDARIES.**

1. (a) The population as counted at the census of 1921, is 1,33,227 and this figure is taken as the basis for all calculations during the year under report.

(b) There was no change in the boundaries of the Municipal District in the year under report.

**II COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT FORM NO. 1.**

2. In the year under report there were 64 meetings of the General Committee, as against 36 in the preceding year and 459 items of business were disposed of as against 400 disposed of in the year 1927-28. Out of these 64 meetings, four were ordinary quarterly meetings held in April, July, October 1928 and January 1929 as required by the Municipal Act; 17 were special and 43 adjourned meetings. 51 Meetings of the Standing Committee were called during the year under report. Out of these, 2 were adjourned for want of quorum. The attendance at these meetings will be found in appendices I-B, I-C and I-D.

3. *Changes in the personnel of the Board:—* The triennial elections of this municipality were held on 19th June 1928. The period of the

Board elected in March 1925 was extended by Government upto and including 30th June 1928 under G. R., G. D., No. 153 of 15th February 1928 as no fresh elections could be held before the end of March 1928 in accordance with the provisions of the Bombay City Municipalities Act of 1925, owing to some defects in the municipal electoral roll. The period was again extended for the same reason upto and including 15th August 1928 under G. R., G. D., No. 153 dated 8th March 1928. Out of the 43 old elected councillors, 22 were re-elected, 8 were defeated at the polls or withdraw from the contest and 13 did not seek re-election. There were 22 fresh councillors and one gentleman who was previously on the nominated list got entrance by election. The number of nominations was reduced from 7 to 5, as two seats were now reserved for the depressed classes. Three persons were re-nominated to the new body and two got nominated for the first time. A detailed survey of the triennial elections is given in Appendix-X. (C).

It is evident that the merchant class of this City is now taking its proper share in the administration of the civic affairs of Poona in the same way as it does in the cities of the West.

The term of office of the newly elected councillors commenced on 24th August 1928 on which day the first general meeting of the new body was held, [ Vide Sec. 25 ( 2 ) of the C. M. Act, 1925. ]

Mr. S. R. Bhagwat, L. C. E. the Chief Officer, who was on leave since 28th January 1927, rejoined his post on 28th July 1928, and Mr. S. B. Tambolkar, B. A. B. E. who was acting for him, reverted to his permanent post of the Municipal Engineer from the same date. Mr. M. D. Dalvi, B. A. A. M. I. E. who was working as the Municipal Engineer during Mr. Tambolkar's deputation, took up from 28th July 1928 the duties of the post of the Development Engineer, which comprise ( 1 ) the construction of the municipal share of the Drainage Improvement Scheme, ( 2 ) the supervision of Town Planning Work, ( 3 ) construction of new roads, and ( 4 ) other works of a like nature. The Municipal Accountant, Mr. C. S. Masurekar, went on four months' leave on 16th January 1929. His place has been temporarily filled up by Mr. K. M. Dole.

4. For information regarding the constitution of the several executive and consultative committees and the attendance of members thereat, reference is invited to Appendix I—D.

### III. CHANGES IN THE SYSTEM OF TAXATION.

5. There was no change in the system of taxation in 1928—29.

### IV. COMMENTS. ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM NO. II.

6. The year under report opened with a cash balance of Rs. 5,70,819; the income amounted to Rs. 19,05,420; both these together made up a total of Rs. 24,76,239. It may be pointed out that the income shown here, as well as in the following paras, is the net income including grants and loans from Government. It is exclusive of octroi duty collected but subsequently refunded ( Vide G. R. G. D., No. 1174 dated 19th February 1907 ). The income for the year consisted of the following items.

As compared with the previous year's total, the income ( leaving aside " Extraordinary and Debt " ) shows a decrease of Rs. 56,219 which is mainly due to smaller receipts from grants and contributions.

( a ) *Octroi*:—As a separate chapter is devoted to octroi, fuller description of its working will be given there.

( b ) *House tax*:—Rs. 1,58,609 ( 27-28 ), Rs. 1,71,486 ( 28-29 ); increase Rs. 12,877. The increase is due to the revision of assessment in Shukrawar Peth and better realisation of arrears.

Out of the total collection of Rs. 66,385 on account of privy tax, Rs. 55,864 were collected on account of private latrines and Rs. 10,521 on account of non-privy cess, which is used for maintaining public latrines.

The increase of Rs. 4,604 in the privy cess is due to the better recovery of past arrears.

The increase of Rs. 9,919 in the Drainage tax is due to the progress of Drainage works in Nana and Bhawani Peths and consequent increase in drainage connections, and also to better recovery of past arrears.

The decrease is due to reduction of the tax on public vehicles from Rs. 28,322 in 1927-28 to Rs. 14,992 in 1928-29. The recoveries are made by the Police Department.

( c ) *Tax on Professions and Trades*:—Rs. 13,594 (27-28), Rs. 13,108 (28-29). Decrease Rs. 486. Income from the fees for playing music in streets, showed a net increase of Rs. 82. Similarly, income from the tax on entertainments decreased by Rs. 615, income from license fee from mutton markets increased by Rs. 20 and income from hotels increased by Rs. 27.

( d ) *Water rate*:— Rs. 1,26,151 (27-28), Rs. 1,34,568 (28-29). Increase Rs. 8,417. The increase is due to the increased rate of water tax for 3/4" and 1" connections from 1-10-27 and increase in water pipe connections.

The details about the recovery of arrears of taxes are given in appendix IX. of this report.

( e ) *Realisations under Special Acts*:— Rs. 7,700 (27-28). Rs. 5,298 (28-29); decrease of Rs. 2,402, is due to smaller receipts from cattle pounds and also to the transfer of the Local Fund Cess receipts to the School Board.

( f ) *Rent of lands and houses etc*:— Rs. 6,431 (27-28). Rs. 6,497 (28-29). Increase Rs. 66.

( g ) *Sale proceeds of lands and of produce of lands*:— Rs. 890 (27-28), Rs. 950 (28-29). Increase Rs. 60.

( h ) *Conveyance receipts*:—Rs. 9229 (27-28). Rs. 14,432 (28-29). Increase of Rs. 5,203 is due to the larger sales of fresh refuse as well as manure than in 1927-28.

( i ) *Fees and Revenue from Educational Institutions*:— Rs. 3,936 (27-28); Rs. 4,185 (28-29). Increase Rs. 249. The increase is due to increase in the number of children in Primary Schools.

( j ) *Fees and Revenue from Markets and Slaughter houses*:— Rs. 63,501 (27-28); 67,979 (28-29). Increase Rs. 4,478. This is due to the fact that rent of market stalls was not paid by the stall-holders from January 1928 as the Municipality had resolved to increase the rent from 1-1-28. This rent was received in the year under report at the old rate and hence the increase.

( k ) *Fees under the Municipal Act*:—

( 1 ) Copying and comparing fees, Rs. 270 (27-28). Rs. 347 (28-29). Increase Rs. 77. A fluctuating item.



- ( 2 ) *Fees for temporary occupation of Municipal lands*:—Rs. 2,048 (27-28); Rs. 1,665 (28-29). The decrease is Rs. 388. This is a fluctuating item.
- ( l ) *Fines under the Municipal and Police Acts*:—Rs. 5,582 ( 27-28 ). Rs. 5,304 (28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 278. Fluctuating item.
- ( m ) *Interest on investments*:—Rs. 7,391 ( 27-28 ), Rs. 25,089 ( 28-29 ). Increase, Rs. 17,698. This is due to the large amount of investments bearing interest, made in 1928-29.
- ( n ) *Grants and Contributions*:—Rs. 4,64,538 ( 27-28 ), Rs. 3,10,630 (28-29 ). Decrease, Rs. 1,53,908. Rs. 1,33,472 were received as grant-in-aid for the new Drainage Scheme, against Rs. 2,03,674 received in the year 1927-28 and Rs. 1,61,163 were received as grant-in-aid for educational purposes as against Rs. 1,45,505 received in 1927-28. A sum of Rs. 5,188 was received in 1928-29 as 12½ p. c. grant-in-aid on drainage works done in 1927-28 against Rs. 69,918 received in the previous year.
- ( o ) *Recoveries on account of services rendered to private individuals*:— Rs. 5,437 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 10,071 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 4,634 due to more work done during the year.
- ( p ) *Other items*:— Rs. 12,667 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 3,226 ( 28-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 9,441 is due to a smaller amount of unclaimed sums having been credited to Municipal Funds.
- ( p-i ) *Receipts from the Municipal Workshop, Printing Press and Store Department*:—Rs. 47,361 ( 27-28 ), against Rs. 40,210 ( 28-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 7,151. The figure depends upon the turn-out of the work received for execution.
- ( q ) *Under extraordinary receipts there appear the following items*:—Sale of land Rs. 12,912 against Rs. 2,372 realised in 1927-28. ( Details of sales of land are given in appendix VII-B ). Loan instalment of Rs. 2,25,000 for Drainage Works was also received during the year.
- ( r ) *Other advances*:—Rs. nil ( 27-28 ). Rs. nil ( 28-29 ).
- ( s ) *Deposits*:— Rs. 78,689 ( 27-28 ), as against Rs. 1,19,291 ( 28-29 ). This shows an increase of Rs. 40,602 which is due to ordinary fluctuations of business.

### V. WORKING OF THE OCTROI SYSTEM.

The octroi cordon under the administration of this Municipality includes the Suburban Municipal District, the Cantonment of Poona and Kirkee Cantonment in addition to the City Municipal District. The Kirkee Cantonment has been added to this cordon from 1st October 1911 as an experimental measure and the extension of this arrangement upto the 31st March 1929, was sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 8,828 R. D. dated 10-10-28. A separate account of this body is kept and the net income from its imports is given to it every month. The Municipality levies Octroi according to the sanctioned schedule, on articles imported into the Octroi cordon and after deducting from the gross income the amount of duty refunded on account of the export of imported articles, as well as the establishment and other charges, distributes the net income among the three bodies in proportion to their population, as sanctioned by Government in their resolution No. 4653 of 9th November 1895. The figures given here therefore relate to the whole area of the cordon, while those in Form IV and Appendix II-A relate to the City only.

The gross income from octroi and 10 p. c. rebate on octroi refund in the year 1928-29 was Rs. 7,94,287 ( including Rs. 10,545 paid to the Cantonment Committee of Kirkee ) as against Rs. 7,28,199 of the last year, showing an increase of Rs. 66,088. The increase is due to greater imports and revival of trade to a certain extent.

Out of the gross revenue of Rs. 7,94,287, Rs. 72,542 were refunded on account of export, Rs. 64,543 were spent on establishment; Rs. 8,111 on contingencies, including repairs to buildings &c., Rs. 166 on dress, and Rs. 5,958 on gratuity and provident fund. The amount given to the Kirkee Cantonment was Rs. 10,545 as against Rs. 5,722 in the previous year.

Thus the total expenditure amounted to Rs. 1,61,865 as against Rs. 1,68,495 of the previous year. Deducting this expenditure from the gross revenue, the remainder i. e. Rs. 6,32,422 was divided among the three bodies. The share of the City Municipality amounted to Rs. 4,66,728/-, of the Poona Cantonment Board to Rs. 1,14,505/- and of the Suburban Municipality to Rs. 51,189/-.

An amount of Rs. 72,542 was, as mentioned above, refunded in the year 1928-29 on account of exports as against Rs. 84,218/- of the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 11,676/- which is due to stopping of payment of refund on the export of pots made from imported metal sheets from 1-10-27 ( Vide G. R. G. D. No. 884 dated 11-8-27 ).

The figures quoted above show the result of the working of the whole octroi department. They show the gross income from and the gross expenditure chargeable to octroi. But the figures given in the statement Nos. II and III show only the share of the Poona City Municipality in the total income and expenditure. The octroi establishment has cost 8.1 per cent of the gross income in this year, as against 9 in 1927-28 and 8.8 in 1926-27.

The following table gives information regarding the average consumption of articles.

It will be seen from the above table that the average consumption is within the standard fixed by Government under all heads ( except Sugar and Tobacco ) where it is fixed on weight and there is excess on all heads where it is fixed on value. This is due to the general rise in prices. The standards for class IV ( Building material, ) and class IX ( miscellaneous ) are not fixed by Government; hence they are not shown in the above table.

Appendix ( II-A ) gives detailed information regarding Municipal income from each of the 9 classes of articles in the last three years.

#### VI. COMMENTS ON TABULAR STATEMENT, FORM III.

Reference to form III will show that the total gross expenditure in the year under report amounted to Rs. 20,07,199/- the details being as under:—

The total expenditure for the year 1928-29 shows an increase of Rs. 2,21,959/- when compared with that for the previous year. The causes of increase and decrease are explained below in detail under each head.

- General administration*:— Rs. 46,108 ( 27-28 ). Rs. 44,680 ( 28-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 1,428 is due to a smaller staff having been engaged for the preparation of the voters' lists in 1928-29.
- ( b ) *Collection of taxes*:— Rs. 61,088 ( 27-28 ). Rs. 66,796 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 5,708 due to the extra establishment employed for the revision of assessment of 10 Peths which was due in the year 1928-29.
- ( c ) *Refunds*:— Rs. 695 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 526 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 169. This is a fluctuating item.
- ( d ) *Pensions and Gratuities*:—Rs. 12,777 ( 27-28 ), Rs. 15,472 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 2,695. This is a fluctuating item.
- ( e ) *Public Safety: fire*:—Rs. 12,033 ( 27-28 ). Rs. 11,660 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 373. Number of fires was 8 against 11 of 1927-28. Estimated loss of property was Rs. 38,309 against Rs. 18,846 of 1927-28. One fire in Bhawani Peth was of a serious nature. This caused a loss of Rs. 36,000 nearly.
- ( f ) *Lighting*:— Rs. 40,942 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 38,336 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 2,606. The decrease is due to the lower tender rate of Kerosine Oil in 1928-29. There were 1381 kerosine lamps against 1439 of the previous year. The electric lamps numbered 404 on 31st March 1929 as against 336 of the previous year.
- ( g ) *Police*:—No special expenditure was incurred on this account by the Municipality. The charges of nine constables taken on loan are debited to the Octroi, Assessment and Market Departments.
- ( h ) *Water Supply (Capital outlay)*:—Rs. 11,477-( 27-28 ). Rs. 4,265 ( 1928-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 7,212- due to less amount spent on new water mains in the year under report. New water mains of the length of .57 miles were laid in the year under report, while last year the length of water mains laid was 1.84 miles.
- ( i ) *Water Supply ( Maintenance and Repairs )*:—Rs. 1,07,298 ( 27-28 ), Rs. 100,665 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 6,633. Charges paid to the Irrigation Department amounted to Rs. 69,456 against Rs. 71,075 of last year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1619 and the amount spent on the water treatment was Rs. 14,362 as against Rs. 17,027 of the previous year. This decrease is due to the rates of crude oil and chemicals being lower and there being a smaller number of new public stand posts.

- ( j ) *Drainage Capital outlay*:—Rs. 2,61,534 ( 27-28 ). Rs. 4,77,776 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 2,26,242 is due to the fact that more work was done by the Executive Engineer, Poona Drainage Construction, and by the Municipality during the year under report.
- ( k ) *Drainage Establishment and Repairs*:—Rs. 66,410 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 65,591 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 819.
- ( l ) *Conservancy*:—The total expenditure on conservancy was as follows:—

Decrease of Rs. 17,491 due to reasons given below:—

- ( 1 ) *General Supervising Establishment*:—Decrease of Rs. 3,463, due to the post of the Conservancy Superintendent remaining vacant in 1928-29.
- ( 2&3 ) *Road cleaning and Bhangi Service*:—The total under these two heads is Rs. 1,64,712 against Rs. 1,60,360 of 1927-28. Increase Rs. 4,352. The cost of privy Sweepers is Rs. 69,558 against Rs. 68,846 of the previous year showing an increase of Rs. 712. The cost of sweeping roads was Rs. 26,273 against Rs. 26,106 in 1927-28. Increase Rs. 166. The cost of refuse removal amounted to Rs. 54,831 against Rs. 36,818 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 17,513 owing to the high rate of bullock pairs which were taken on hire by contract and also to the system of paying madat ( remuneration for extra work ) by trips.
- ( 4 ) *Night soil and Kachra Depots*:—Decrease of Rs. 10,345. There was no capital expenditure incurred this year on this head.

- ( 5 ) *Latrines and Urinals*:—Decrease of Rs. 3,693. The number of seats converted into flushing latrines was small.
- ( 6 ) *Road-watering*:—Decrease of Rs. 4,987 due to there being no expenditure incurred on the purchase of new lorries.
- ( 7 ) *Miscellaneous*:—Increase of Rs. 645.
- ( m ) *Charges on account of the Health Officer and Sanitary Inspectors*:—Rs. 19,210 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 21,583 (28-29). Increase of Rs. 2,373 due to periodical increments in the salaries of the sanitary staff.
- ( n ) *Hospitals and Dispensaries*:—Rs. 30,657 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 36,678 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 6,021. The details of expenditure under this head are given below:—
1. Cost of establishment increased from Rs. 14,331 to Rs. 15,556 owing to periodical increments to the staff.
  2. Expenditure under contingency increased from Rs. 2,561 to Rs. 2,651.
  3. Cost of Medicines increased from Rs. 1,291 to Rs. 4,091. The increase is due to the purchase of a large stock of medicines in the year under report and to payments of bills received in the previous year.
  4. Rs. 3,180 were paid as charges for lunatics as against Rs. 2,510 in the last year. Increase is due to the increasing number of Insanes sent to the hospital from this City.

Grant of Rs. 1,800 for 3 years at Rs. 600 per year was paid to the Sasoon Hospital Nursing Fund in 1928-29. The grant to the Ayurvedic Hospital ( Rs. 2500 ) was paid in 1928-29. Contributions paid to the King Edward Hospital and the Leper Asylum remained unchanged at Rs. 5000 and 600 respectively and Rs. 100 were paid to Bombay Presidency Infant Welfare Association and Rs. 1,200 to Lady Dufferin Fund.

- ( o ) *Plague and other Infectious Diseases*:— Rs. 12,445 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 23,722 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 11,277. Measures for the prevention of plague and other infectious diseases cost Rs. 5,337 in 1928-29 against Rs. 2,221 in 1927-28. Rs. 18,385 were paid in 1928-29 as contribution to the Infectious Diseases Hospital against Rs. 10,223 paid in 1927-28. The City was free from plague though there was great danger of an outbreak at one time of the year due to imported cases. Contributions to the Infectious Diseases Hospital and expenditure on prevention of small pox and cholera are now debited to this head.

- ( p ) *Vaccination*:—Rs. 2,474 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 2,371 ( 28-29 ).  
Decrease Rs. 103.
- ( q ) *Other Sanitary Requirements*:— Rs. 4,356 ( 27-28 );  
Rs. 1,110 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 3,246. Rs. 372  
were spent on removing prickly pear against Rs. 337 of  
1927-28. No amount was spent on land acquisition  
for a Mang Colony as in the year 1927-28.
- ( r ) *Markets and Slaughter Houses*:— Rs. 30,024 ( 27-28 );  
Rs. 31,557 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 1,533 is due to  
the fact that Rs. 5000 were set aside for insurance invest-  
ment and Rs. 1,075 were spent on Conservancy. The  
expenditure on levelling the Weekly Bazar grounds was  
less by Rs. 1,000 and no expenditure was incurred for  
providing screens to mutton markets as in 1927-28.
- ( s ) *Pounds*:—Rs. 3,859 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 3,063 ( 28-29 ).  
Decrease Rs. 796 due to less expenditure on forage char-  
ges and on repairs to the pounds.
- ( s-a ) *Burial and Cremation Grounds*:—Rs. 9316 ( 27-28 );  
Rs. 4,502 ( 28-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 4,814 is due to  
the fact that no amount was paid for Land Acquisition  
as in 1927-28.
- ( t ) *Public Gardens*:—Rs. 1,386 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 1,056 ( 28-29 ).  
Decrease Rs. 330.
- ( u ) *Veterinary Charges*:—Rs. nil ( 27-28 ); Rs. 15,403  
( 28-29 ). This is due to the transfer of the Ramnarayan  
Hospital to the Municipality from 1-4-28. Out of the  
total cost, Rs. 11,266 is the capital expenditure paid to  
the District Local Board for the cost of the buildings.
- ( v ) *Registration of births and deaths*:—Rs. 1,688 ( 27-28 );  
Rs. 2,497 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 809 due to larger  
establishment and office expenses. Details of vital stati-  
stics can be seen in the Health Officer's report attached  
separately. Births and deaths in 1928-29 were 4468  
and 5264 against 3144 and 4971 in 1927-28. The  
death rate for 1928-29 was 39.51 against 37.31 in  
1927-28. The birth rate was 34.19 against 23.59 in  
the previous year.
- ( w ) *Public Works establishment*:— Rs. 21,243 ( 27-28 );  
Rs. 21,708 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 465.
- ( x ) *Buildings*:—Rs. 195 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 710 ( 28-29 ).  
Increase Rs. 515 due to more repairs.

The wheel tax collected by this Municipality rarely exceeds Rs. 30,000 a year at the most, while the expenditure on maintenance of roads is more than Rs. 50,000. No road toll is levied by this Municipality. The formation of a special fund for eventual expenditure on roads from the unexpended balance of the proceeds of wheel tax and road tolls is not therefore possible.

( z ) *Stores*:—Rs. 341 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 2,856 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 2,515 due to larger purchases of tools.

( a-a ) *Public Instruction*:—Schools and colleges:—The administration reports of the School Board and Technical School will be found in the appendices, wherein is given a full account of the working of the Primary and Technical Schools. It may suffice to state here that the total expenditure during the year under report amounts to Rs. 3,73,304 as against Rs. 2,80,268. The details are given in the report of the School Board which accompanies.

( a-b ) *Contributions*:—The expenditure on this head was Rs. 7,599 in the year under report as against Rs. 6,049 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,550.

( a-c ) *Libraries*:—The Municipal Teachers' library and the office library cost Rs. 381 in the year under report as against Rs. 289 during the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 92 only.

( a-d ) *Interest on loans*:—Rs. 78,078 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 91,191 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 13,013. For detailed information, vide appendix No. III-B.



- ( a-e ) *Work done for private individuals*:—Rs. 9,799 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 12,245 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 2,446 due to more work carried out in the year under report.
- ( a-f ) *Election*:—Rs. 2,859 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 6,708 ( 28-29 ); the increase of Rs. 3,849 is due the fact that more work regarding the general election was done during the year under report than in the previous year.
- ( a-g ) *Grant for Athletic Sports*:—100.
- ( a-h ) *Contribution to the Local-Self Government Institute*:— Rs. 250.
- ( a-i ) *Printing*:—Rs. 13,115 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 12,666 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 449 is due to less printing work done in the year under report. The expenditure on workshop and stores was Rs. 23,715, as against Rs. 26,909 showing a decrease of Rs. 3,196.
- ( a-j ) *Repayment of loans*:—Rs. 28,561 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 35,287 ( 28-29 ). Increase Rs. 4,726. Instalments of additional loans had to be paid this year.
- ( a-k ) *Deposits*:—Rs. 77,892 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 85,985 ( 28-29 ). Increase of Rs. 8,093. This is an adjustment account only and needs no explanation.
- ( a-l ) *Advances*:—Rs. 85,840 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 48,096 ( 28-29 ). Decrease of Rs. 35,744. This is an adjustment account only and needs no explanation.
- ( a-m ) *Balance*:— Rs. 5,70,819 ( 27-28 ); Rs. 4,69,040 ( 28-29 ). Decrease Rs. 1,01,779. The amount of Rs. 4,59,675 is held in deposits and Rs. 9,365 in cash.

#### ACQUISITION OF LAND.

(14.) Seven pieces of land were purchased during the year under report at a cost of Rs. 21,390 for road widening against 5 pieces for the same purpose in year 1927-28.

#### AUDIT.

(15.) The Government Auditors audited the accounts of this Municipality for the year 1926-27 and 1927-28.

#### NOTE ON THE PROGRESS ON MOHAMEDAN EDUCATION.

There are 12 Urdu day schools, 6 for boys and 6 for girls, besides 4 night schools. The number of boys on rolls in Municipal Urdu Schools on 31st March 1929, was 692 and that of Girls 326, as against 656 and 287 respectively of the previous year. The average attendance was 509.1 and 223.4 as against 480.5 and 210.9 in the last year. In the Night Schools, the average number on rolls was 68 and the average attendance was 30. The School

Board continued their policy of appointing women teachers instead of males in Urdu Girls Schools, and is trying its best to secure the services of two trained women teachers from Government by paying up the amount of their stipends. The English class attached to the Urdu full-Primary School ( No.10 ) showed satisfactory progress when judged by the fact that the teacher is not sufficiently qualified. The expenditure on Urdu Schools during the year under report stood at Rs. 26,000 approximately as against Rs 29,180 in the last year. Under G. R. E. D. No. S-78 (48) dated 27th December 1928, the post of a Supervisor for Urdu Schools has been sanctioned. The School Board, therefore, changed the designation of the post from " Urdu Inspector " to Supervisor for Urdu Schools. The Schools are at present supervised by Mr. Mirza Ahmed Beg, the Supervisor for Urdu Schools. He has passed his Matriculation Examination and is a third year trained teacher of considerable experience. These Schools were examined by a Committee of Senior Head Masters and Head Mistresses under the direct supervision of the Supervisor for Urdu Schools and Mr. Lal Mahamed Saheb Choudhari, a member of the School Board. The School Board has also decided to open two new Urdu Schools, one for Boys in Somwar Peth and the other in Bhawani Peth near Chudaman Talim. Government's sanction to the same is still awaited.

I shall now deal with the more important activities of this Municipality in 1928-29.

#### A. COMMUNICATIONS.

( 1 ) The East West ( Lakshmi ) Road :--The work of acquiring properties for the Dane Ali to Saraph Ali section of this road was vigorously pushed on during 1928-29. In all 16 properties worth Rs. 70,360, were acquired and paid for. With a view to allow the original owners of properties abutting on the road to retain possession of portions not required for the road, the municipality has effected compromises with various house owners, by which curtilages are given back to owners on their paying the cost of construction of the road so far as the portions adjoining their houses are concerned. It is expected that the portion from Dane Ali to Ganesh Peth will be fully opened by the end of March 1930. Sanction for raising a loan for this road was received in March 1929 and the loan will be floated in 1929-30.

( 2 ) *Tilak Road* :--The acquisition of land near the Lakdi Pool end of this road is still incomplete owing to the attitude of the Chief Saheb of Aundh who until very recently could not come to a settlement regarding his land required for the road. The construction of two sections of the road, viz. from Hirabag to Swar Gate and a piece near the Sir Parsharambhanu College has been taken up in 1929 and will be soon finished. The acquisition of properties on the Khajina well section was proceeded with in 1928-29.

( 3 ) The metalling of the outfall Sewer Road could not be done in 1928-29 but has been taken up in 1929-30.

*The Low Level Pumping Station Road in Kasba* :-- The bridge over the Nagzari Nala was completed in 1928-29 and this road is becoming a convenient outlet for the congested parts of Kasba.

( 5 ) *Purandare Wada Road* :--This road forms a part of the Town Planning Scheme, and its construction can be begun only after the Town Plan-

ning Scheme is finally sanctioned by Government and comes into operation some time in 1930.

( 6 ) *Lakdi Pool Extension*:— The footpaths on the extended bridge were tarred in 1928-29 and the land acquisition for completing the northern end of the bridge was proceeded with.

( 7 ) *Condition of City Roads*:— The condition of the city roads has been the cause of constant complaints; but owing to other urgent calls, Rs. 54,196 only could be spent on them in 1928-29. An experiment was made in 1928 in connection with tarring of roads. The road from the Reay Market to the Budhwar Chowk was covered with colass, a kind of tar. But owing to the setting in of the rains, the experiment could not be fully successful. The increasing traffic of motor vehicles is rendering the roads worse every month, and a provision of Rs. 75,000 has been made for repairs in 1929-30 in lieu of the usual provision of Rs. 50,000.

( 8 ) *Watering of Streets*:— The motor sprinklers are giving good results and are more economical than bullock carts. More motor sprinklers are required to allay the dust nuisance which is getting very serious.

( 9 ) *Lighting of streets*:—The Electric Company has laid 2 miles of wires in 1928-29 as required by their agreement and the number of electric street lamps has increased from 338 to 408 in 1928-29. It is hoped that the present heavy rate charged by the Company for street lights ( As. 8 per unit ) would be substantially reduced when the Tata Hydro Electric Company supplies energy to the Poona Electric Supply Co.,. The present cost of electric street lights is almost forbidding.

## II. MARKETS.

( 1 ) *The Reay Market*:—The extension of the Reay Market was not taken up in 1928-29, for want of funds. There was a very heated controversy in 1928-29 as regards the enhancement of the rents of stalls in the Reay Market and the passing of rent notes by the stall-holders. A compromise has been at last effected, by which rent-notes have been made optional and rents have been enhanced to a limited extent.

( 2 ) *The Fish Market*:—The properties notified for acquisition for this market have not been as yet handed over to the municipality by the special Land Acquisition Officer. It is expected that the Fish Market buildings would be started by the end of March 1930.

( 3 ) *The Beef Market*:—The site intended for this market also has not come into municipal possession as yet.

( 4 ) *The Bi-weekly Bazar*:—The grounds acquired for the bi-weekly Bazar in S. No. 51 on the northern side of the Lloyd Bridge have not been fully levelled as yet and were not occupied in 1928-29. The cattle bazar held at present in S. No. 196 of Bhamburda and the bi-weekly bazar held round about the Shanwar Wada will be shifted simultaneously to the new grounds in 1929-30.

### III WATER SUPPLY.

The Superintending Engineer, Public Health, has forwarded to this Municipality a rough outline of a scheme, for improving the distribution of water supply of the city. The scheme is estimated to cost Rs. 10,00,000 and will be considered in 1929-30. The daily consumption of water has increased from 50 lakhs of gallons in 1925 to 60 lakhs in 1928-29. Still the supply is unsatisfactory in many parts of the city. The construction of flushing privies is being made compulsory in the city and the consumption per head is bound to rise still further. The solution of the question of water supply in the Town Planning area is as distant as ever.

### IV PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

( 1 ) *Medical relief*:—The six free dispensaries were working as usual. The grants to other medical institutions were given as freely as before. The question of payment to Government of about Rs. 1,50,000 on account of the municipal share of the cost of buildings of the Infectious Diseases Hospital remains in an unsettled condition. The amount is a large one and the buildings were erected without the definite and explicit consent of the Municipality. Such large institutions must be maintained from provincial funds, as Municipal funds are not in the least capable of contributing to them on a large scale. Besides the city people are not prone to take advantage of the Hospital on any considerable scale.

( 2 ) *The Veterinary Hospital*:—This hospital was taken over from the District Local Board on 1st April 1928 and has been working satisfactorily under Municipal control.

*Infant Mortality*:—The registration of births has been made more reliable of late by means of a new expedient. Whenever intimation of the death of an infant is received, a subordinate of the Health Department visits the place and if he finds that the birth of the child that has now died, has not been previously registered, though it had taken place in this city, he reports the necessary details and the birth is then duly registered in the Birth Register of the Municipality. In this way, the ratio of infant deaths to infant births in this city, which was very high in previous years, has been brought down from 636 in 1927-28 to 451 per mille in 1928-29.

*Drainage*:—Works costing Rs. 3,85,296 were executed by the Executive Engineer, Poona Drainage Construction, in 1928-29 against Rs. 1,97,410 in 1927-28. The Municipality also spent Rs. 92,806 on new drainage works against Rs. 47,597 of the previous year. The Municipality has entrusted the drainage works to a Special Engineer from July 1928 and the laying of new drainage lines in the sewered area is progressing at a good pace. The gravitation sewer was to start working by 1st April 1929. But the arrangements are not complete as yet and the pumping at Daruwala Bridge and the pollution of the river by unpumped sewage is to continue for some months to come.

The municipality was until recently given no idea of the work it was to execute in connection with the Drainage Improvement Scheme. But all of a sudden, it has been informed that it has been in arrears in respect of works

costing 7 lakhs and odd and it must finish them as soon as practicable. This was not fair, it must be said. The municipality ought to have been informed every year what amount of work it was expected to do during each year. The municipality would have tried in that case to finish as much of the allotted work as possible.

The question of modifying the rate of the Drainage Tax is still under consideration. The grant of one free drainage connection to all houses, whether connected or not with the old drainage system, has not been sanctioned as yet by the municipality.

*Improvement of the Nagzari Nala:*—A further amount of Rs. 7,788 has been spent in 1928-29 on the canalisation of the Nagzari Nala. The work has progressed during the year from Dr. Parsonsing's house to the Daruwala Bridge and from the Jakat pool to the bridge near the Low Level Pumping Station. The total length of the work was 1,165 sq. ft.

*Disposal of street Rubbish:*—The system started in April 1927 is being worked satisfactorily. Rubbish was burnt at 3 incinerators during the 8 dry months of the year and was thrown into trenches in S. No. 136 near Parwati in the wet monsoon months. The cost of conveyance of rubbish was much heavier in 1928-29 than in the previous year, as pairs of bullocks had to be taken on hire at very high rates and as large amounts of extra payments were made to cart-drivers for extra trips of carts made by them. Both the causes of heavy expenditure are being remedied this year. Bullocks have been purchased by the Municipality for removal of rubbish and payment for extra trips of rubbish carts is being made with proper economy in 1929-30.

*The Town Planning Scheme:*—In 1928-29 final plots were allotted by the Arbitrator and betterment contributions were fixed in respect of each property holder in the area concerned. A tribunal of appeal consisting of the District Judge, the Arbitrator and R. B. G. K. Kale, retired District Judge, was appointed by Government to hear appeals against the orders of the Arbitrator. The final scheme as completed by the Arbitrator along with the decisions of the Tribunal of Appeal, has been recently received by the Municipality from the Arbitrator and forwarded to Government for sanction. It is expected that the Town Planning Scheme, which was started in 1916, would come into operation in April 1930.

*Burial Grounds:*—The selection and acquisition of lands for burial grounds are very difficult and dilatory processes. Acquisition of lands for the following burial grounds has been under consideration for several years past with varying results:—

- ( 1. ) For Mahomedans in Kasba Peth.
- ( 2. ) For Hindus near Lakdi Pool.
- ( 3. ) Burial ground for Hindus near the Sangam.
- ( 4. ) For pauper bodies from the Sasoon Hospital.
- ( 5. ) For Lingayats.
- ( 6. ) For Mahomedans of Bhamburda.

Only the second case is approaching final settlement, as the lands selected by the municipality in 1925, have been very recently notified for acquisition for the second time. Sites for the remaining burial or burning grounds are as yet to be selected and approved.

**Housing Scheme for Mangs at Bhamburda:**— The sanitary arrangements for the Mang Colony at Bhamburda have been partially provided in 1928-29 at municipal cost. Plinths are being constructed in 1929-30. The huts will be erected by the Mangs themselves.

**Addresses:**— ( 1 ) An address of congratulation was presented on 18th April 1928 to Prof. D. K. Karve, on his 71st. birth day. He is the greatest practical worker in the land in the field of female education and richly deserved the civic address given on the day.

( 2 ) Mr. Subhash Chandra Bose, M. L. C. of Calcutta was the recipient of another address on 2nd May 1928. As the former Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation of Calcutta, he was entitled to an address from this Municipality.

( 3 ) The third recipient of a civic address in the year under report was the venerable Dr. Annie Besant D. L., who has been working so indefatigably for the last 40 years for the political and moral uplift of India. The function took place on 7th of September 1928.

( 4 ) His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir Leslie Wilson, Governor of Bombay, kindly accepted a farewell address from this Municipality in the interior of the Shanwar Wada on 27th October 1928 on the eve of his final departure from Poona.

The expenditure on the address to Dr. Besant was incurred from Municipal funds with the concurrence of two-thirds of the total number of councillors. The cost of the remaining addresses was born by the councillors.

#### PRIMARY EDUCATION.

This matter will be dealt with in detail in a separate report appended to this general report.

The number of schools and pupils has increased from 48 and 8815 in 1927-28 to 49 and 8939 in 1928-29 respectively. The sanction of Government to the introduction of compulsory education in one ward of the city has been recently received in May 1929 and steps are being taken to adopt the measures required by the Primary Education Act. The Municipality resolved on 8th June 1928 that it should construct its own buildings without any grants from Government and should hire them out to the School Board on reasonable rental. This step was rendered necessary owing to the recent orders of Government laying down Rs. 20 per pupil-accomodation as the maximum building grant allowable to Municipalities. Two primary school buildings were constructed in the year under report and no Government grant will be claimed in respect of them.

The acquisition of a large school site in Kasba Peth has been in progress in 1928-29. The Gujrathi Primary School building, in Budhwar Peth ( for which a munificent gift of Rs. 30,001 was received from the Gujrathi community ) was opened by His Excellency Sir Leslie Wilson on 6th October 1928.

**TECHNICAL EDUCATION.**

The Victoria Jubilee Technical School has been doing its useful work as usual. But the school requires further development to meet modern needs. The year under report could not show any special advance for want of funds.

**PUBLIC EDUCATION.**

The Municipal Gazette has been doing useful work but requires more life to be infused into it. It is, therefore, proposed to publish it in an improved form from July 1929 and to distribute it free of cost to all houseowners in the city. The results are being awaited with interest.

*Bombay Municipal Servants Act (V of 1890)*:—In 1928-29, sweepers and other municipal servants coming under the Act, worked peacefully with the exception of an incident at the end of the year. Owing to the construction of about 2,000 flushing privies, fewer Bhangis are required for cleaning privies. 16 Bhangis were, therefore, discharged in March 1929. Looking on this step as only the thin end of the wedge, the Bhangis struck work in a body on 27th March 1929 and demanded the re-employment of 16 men that had been discharged. The councillors resolved that these 16 hands should be given some other suitable work, if they be not required for privy cleaning. They were taken up again, and the strike ended in 2 days. No steps under Act V of 1890 were necessary.

*Triennial Elections*:—Triennial elections were held on 19th June 1928. Out of 12 wards, no elections were held in ward nos. 6 and 10 and in the Depressed Classes ward, as therein the number of candidates was equal to the number of seats vacant. The total number of voters in the 12 wards was 56,672. The number of voters in the 9 wards in which elections were held was 44,201. Out of these 18,946 went to the polls. This gives a percentage of 42.9 of persons that exercised the right of voting. There were 70 valid nominations for 45 seats. There were in all 5 election applications filed in the District Court. The first required the recounting of votes. The second complained about the acceptance of invalid nomination papers. The remaining three alleged corrupt practices. The first 3 were dismissed and the last 2 were withdrawn.

**MUNICIPAL FINANCE.**

The receipts from taxes in 1928-29 have been satisfactory. Octroi has improved by Rs. 53,936. House Tax has brought in 12,877 more than last year. The water rate has improved by Rs. 8,417. Conservancy receipts and market fees have shown better results. Government grants for sanitary purposes have fallen by Rs. 1,39,565. But the grants for educational purposes have risen by Rs. 15,658. The Municipality has as yet to receive a large sum from Government on account of drainage work carried out by the Municipality. It amounts to about Rs. 2,69,188. The net profits from the effluent farm at Mundhva have not been as yet paid by Government to this body. The loan of Rs. 1,75,000 sanctioned to be raised for Lakshmi Road will be probably raised by the end of October 1929, and the large amount of Rs. 90,000 or so, that has been locked up in land acquisition for this road, will be then released and made available for general purposes.

*Administration:*—Nearly five months of the year ( April to August ) were filled with the operations preceding and succeeding the triennial elections, which were held on 19th June 1928. Strong efforts were made to reduce outstanding arrears of taxes by issuing warrants against defaulters. The removal of street refuse has been engaging the attention of the municipality. The question of obtaining rent notes from the market stall-holders engrossed the attention of the municipality for a considerable time. The conservancy department has had to be again separated from the Sanitary Department for the sake of efficiency. House-owners are being served with notices in large



numbers for conversion of privies into water closets, and loans are being granted to poor owners who require them for building flushing privies. The development department was formed this year ( from 28th July 1928 ) for dealing with the drainage and development works in the city. The department has been instrumental in executing a large amount of laying of drainage pipes in the city, which forms a part of the general Drainage Improvement Scheme.

I take this opportunity of thanking very heartily the members of the various sub-committees and other colleagues on the General Board for their advice and co-operation. The Chairman (Mr. V. A. Gadkari) and members of the Standing Committee deserve credit for the prompt and efficient disposal of the large amount of work that falls to their share.

It is a matter of great pleasure to me to state that Mr. Papamiya Karimsaheb, who was elected the Vice-President of this Municipality at the end of August 1928, has been of great help to me in carrying on the administration and especially in inspecting the Octroi Nakas and other offices of the Municipality.

Dr. R. K. Naidu, L. M. & S., was the President of this Municipality upto 15th August 1928 and I must record here the consensus of opinion on all sides about the untiring zeal and great capacity for work, which he brought to bear on the administration of the Municipality during the two years of his regime.

My thanks are also due to Mr. S. R. Bhagwat, ( Chief Officer ), Mr. S. B. Tambolkar ( the Engineer ), K. B.; Dr. K. D. Khambatta ( the Medical Officer of Health ), Mr. M. D. Dalvi ( the Development Engineer ), Mr. S. B. Jog ( the Personal Assistant to the Chief Officer ) and all other officers and servants of the Municipality for their willing co-operation in the administration of this corporation.

कै. ना. गोखले यांच्या विनंतीवरून सन १९११ साली आपण मुंबई सोडून वेथील फर्ग्युसन कॉलेज मध्ये अध्यापकाच्या कामास सुरवात केली. अशा प्रकारे सुरू झालेला या पुणे शहराशी आपला संबंध जवळ जवळ ३७ वर्षांपासूनचा आहे. गणित विषयाचे उत्तम प्रोफेसर म्हणून आपला लौकिक सर्वत्र विल्यात आहे. पुढे १९१३ सालापासून आपण पुनर्निर्वाहाचे विकट काम आपल्या शिरावर घेतले. सन १९१५ साली विधवा-विवाह-अनिबंधनिवारक मंडळ ही संस्था आपण स्थापन केली. कै. म्हा. साधवराव रामडे यांचीही या कार्या अर्धवट राहिलेला कामगिरी आपण परंपरेने पुढे चालविली. १९१६ च्या जून महिन्यांत आपण श्रीशिक्षण प्रसारासाठी अनाथ-बालिकाश्रमाची संस्था काढिली. थोड्या सर्वात उत्तम शिक्षण या आश्रमात सहज मिळू शकते, याचे सर्व श्रेय आपणांकडेच आहे. श्रीसमाज व त्याचे कैवरी आपले हे उपकार कधीही विसरणार नाहीत. १९२७ सालांत आपल्या 'महिला विद्यालयाला' सुरवात झाली. घ अक्षर या बाबतीतील पराकारेचा उत्कर्ष पुण्याजवळ असलेल्या एंडवणे या सेहेगावी सन १९१६ साली 'भारत महिला पीठाचा' जन्म होऊन झाला. महिला विद्यापीठासाठी मिळवावी लागलेली आर्थिक मदत सर्वस्वी आपल्यामुळेच मिळाली. या पीठाळा जोडलेली परगावची ११ ह्यस्कूलें असून दोन स्त्रियांची कॉलेजेहि आहेत. कॉलेजच्या विद्यार्थ्यांस मातृभाषेतून शिक्षण देणे बरे की वाईद, हा सरकारी युनिव्हर्सिटीच्या धिकट वाटलेला प्रश्न आपण आपल्या विद्यार्थ्यांत फार झुलमनेने सोडवून दाखविलेला आहे.

We, the President and members of the Poona City Municipality, beg to present this address of welcome to you on your first visit to this historic and renowned city of ours, as the President of the sixth Maharashtra Provincial Conference now being held here.

We are proud to bring to your notice in this connection the fact that our Municipality has been the first in the field in initiating the practice of honouring the country's patriots by presentation of such civic addresses. Since the establishment of this practice in 1919, this municipality has had the privilege of bestowing the "Freedom of the City", as it were, on India's great leaders like Lokamanya Tilak, Mahatma Gandhi, Deshbandhu Das, Pandit Motilal Nehru, Hakim Ajmal Khan, N. C. Kelkar and the Rt. Hon. Mr. Shrinivas Shastri among many others.

To-day, Sir, this Municipality feels proud to pay its similar tribute of respect to you. Even at a very early stage of life, when the primrose path of Government service was temptingly open before you, inspired with an innate and glowing spirit of national public service & impelled by your natural love of self-sacrifice, you spurned it away and voluntarily consecrated your life to the glorious cause of emancipation of the Motherland under the distinguished and spirited guidance of the late Deshbandhu Das. We may be permitted to refer here very briefly to your interest in and sympathy with the administration of Local-self-governing institutions. Formerly as the Chief officer of the Corporation of Calcutta and now as a corporator of the same body, you have been devoting a large portion of your energies, otherwise more widely and intensely engaged in national work, to the service of Local Self Government. It is, indeed, highly worthy of you that you should have left the stamp of your genius on this civic work, as you have raised noble hopes in the minds of the Indian people by your magnanimous sacrifice and service in the cause of the Indian National Congress and for the attainment of the goal which that august body has placed before itself.

We, Sir, again accord you a hearty welcome and pray to Almighty to vouchsafe to you a long and healthful life and a splendid career.

May it please Your Excellency,

WE, the President, the Vice-President and the Councillors of the Poona City Municipality, respectfully beg leave to approach Your Excellency with this fare-well address, as an humble tribute of gratitude for the earnest solicitude which Your Excellency has always evinced in promoting the efficiency and successful working of Local Self-governing Institutions in general and of the Poona City Municipality, in particular.

BELIEVING as we do, that Local Self Government is the basis of national political life, we are convinced that no scheme devised on national lines can be complete without recognising the importance and providing for the development of Local Bodies, the primary units of popular Government. It is, therefore, a matter of sincere gratification to us to find the pace of Local Self Government steadily advancing throughout Your Excellency's regime. And this historic city of ours also has not lagged behind on the path of progress in that matter.

WE feel proud to state that our Municipality is the only one in this Presidency which enjoys the privilege of electing nine-tenths of the total number of its Councillors. We may, however, be permitted to state that it has very long been the ambition of the citizens of this Municipality to have the right of electing all their councillors. We are grateful to Your Excellency for recently reducing the number of nominated seats in our Council, but we confidently hope that the day will not be far distant when we shall obtain the utmost possible independence in the management of our civic affairs.

OUR Municipality was almost the first to undertake a Town-planning scheme for an extensive area of about a thousand acres. Our object was to induce people of moderate means to go and live in more open and healthy localities. But we regret that our efforts have not so far met with much success, because of the delay in the completion of the Scheme and also because of the policy of imposing heavy non-agricultural assessment and building fines. We trust that your Excellency's Government will seriously consider this matter soon from our point of view.

OUR City has a peculiar historic importance of its own, being the capital of the Deccan and the seat of the Government of Bombay during a considerable portion of the year. Poona, besides, is a great educational centre, one-sixth of the population of our City consisting of students receiving education in its various educational institutions. On the other hand, the resources of our City are limited as it is not an industrial centre. Our Municipality has been doing its very best to meet the demands of the citizens for improved sanitation, adequate water supply, efficient street lighting, improved means of communica-

tion by opening new roads, proper medical relief and the supply of educational facilities. But there are still many more things which are yet to be achieved and which can only be done with the sympathetic assistance of Your Excellency's Government and we earnestly pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to recommend special treatment to our Municipality in financial matters at least for some years.

We are deeply grateful to Your Excellency for the satisfactory solution of our Drainage problem, and we regret that Your Excellency will not be in our midst to witness the completion of this great scheme, which we hope, will turn the Mula-Mutha from the septic pool, which at present it is, into a clean and beautiful river.

We are sincerely thankful to Your Excellency for coming here to meet us to-day. It is a matter of much regret to us that Your Excellencies would soon be leaving this country, but at the same time we take this opportunity to assure Your Excellencies of the deep admiration and regard with which the citizens of this City will always remember the sincere efforts of Your Excellency and of Lady Wilson for the general social well-being of the people of this Presidency.

In conclusion, we wish your Excellency and Lady Wilson Godspeed, long life and the fullest measure of prosperity and happiness and we pray that Your Excellencies even after leaving this place, will maintain the kindly interest in the welfare of this City, which Your Excellencies have always shown.

२ वसुली:—सरकार ठराव नंबर पी. ५६ (४) तारीख २९/११/२७ (जनरल डिपॉजिट) ने म्युनिसिपालिटीस कराच्या मागील बाक्या वसूल करण्याबाबत जास्त नेटोचे प्रयत्न करावयास कळविले होते. सन १९२६-२७ सालीत एकंदर घरपट्टी, भंगीपट्टी, ड्रेनेजपट्टी, विंगर पायखानापट्टी वगैरे बांधणीतील येणे बाकती रुपये ८६,०४९ होती. सन १९२७-२८ सालीत वसूल न येतां बाकती असलेली रकम रुपये ९३,९३८ असून त्यात सन १९२६-२७ सालीतील ४०,५९२ आहे. बाकती वसुलीचे बाबतीत कडक उपाय योजले असे मे. अध्यक्ष यांनी लिहिले आहे. ते उपाय नसूदे केले असते तर त्यातील दोष काढून टाकण्यास उपाय-योजना सुचविता आली असती अथवा याचे ये-नावकून नोकरवर्ग कमी दर्जाचा असून त्यावरील देखरेख बरोबर नाही असे दिसते. म्युनिसिपालिटीने या बाबतीत नुसतानोकर वर्ग सुधारण्याबद्दलचा विचार करून चालणार नाही. शहर म्युनिसिपालिट्याच्या अकटाची १०४-१०५ कलमे या सालील अधिकारांचा तिनै पूर्ण अंमल केला पाहिजे.

दळण बळण:—दंडस्फोरोट व टिळकरोड या मध्ये विशेष प्रगती झाली नाही, १,७५,००० चे कर्ज मंजूर होतानाच म्युनिसिपालिटी चोळखणआळी-सराफ आळी हा भाग चालू करील अशी आशा आहे. टिळकरोडची काही प्रगती होईल अशी चिन्हे दिसत नाहीत. व्यापारातील सर्ष साधारण मंदी व पैशांची टंचाई यामुळे लोक इमारतीसाठी जमीन घेण्यास तयार नाहीत. आणि याच गोष्टीवर ही स्क्रिम अवलंबून आहे. म्युनिसिपालिटीने चालू साली एक फार महत्त्वाची अशी सुधारणा लकडीपूल खंद करून केली आहे. मांजुड्यांतील वाढत्या रस्त्यांमुळे पूल फारच अखंड वाटत असे. या सुधारणेमुळे एक मोठी अडचण दूर झाली. याशिवाय किरकोळ दोन सुधारणा करण्यात आल्या आहेत. त्या म्हणजे आकट्याल स्प्रुअर रस्ता व लो लेव्हल पॅपिंग स्थान रस्ता हा दोन. यामुळे बरीच गर्दीची जागा स्वच्छ झाली आहे. याशिवाय अखंड रस्ते खंद करणे आणि आधुनिक पद्धतीने रस्ते दुरूस्त करणे यांचा आरंभ झाला आहे. या प्रयोगासाठी रेमार्केट रस्ता ते स्टेशन रस्ता निवडला आहे.

४ नागझरीनाला:—या नाल्यास १,१२६ फूट गटार बांधण्यात आले आहे. हे काम पुणे करण्याचे प्रयत्न चालू आहेत. प्रेसिडेंट यांचे म्हणणे की, ज्या भागांतून नागझरी जाते तेथील आरोग्य या सुधारणेमुळे बरंचसे सुधारले आहे.

मांग वसाहता:—मांजुडा सर्फे नं. ५७ या वसाहतीतील येण्यात आला आहे. सोपड्यांची योजना तयार करण्यात आली असून टाऊन ड्रॉनिंग सायकलून ती मंजूर करण्यात आली आहे. सोपड्या बांधण्याचे कामास झुट्यात बाल करावयाचेपूर्वी आरोग्य विषयक कामे (म्हणजे पायखाने, मोठ्या, ड्रेनेज वगैरे) म्युनिसिपालिटीने आमलात आणण्यात.

६ मार्केट:—इच्छीचे मार्केट बांधण्या गरजांत आंजुरे असे वाटत असल्यामुळे म्युनिसिपालिटीने ते बांधविण्याचे ठरविले आहे. बोक आणि फिश मार्केटच्या बाबतीतही म्यु. चे प्रयत्न चालू आहेत.

७ जन्मसुत्रदुर्गादू:—रामनेदीचे बाबतात चकीची पडत चालू असल्यामुळे मृत्यूचे प्रमाण जास्त पडते. मृत्यूची नोंद अचूक होते. जन्मनोंद सुधारण्याचे बाबतांत म्यु. सुधारणा करीत आहे हे अभिमानंदनीय आहे.

८ शिक्षण:—शाळा व त्यांत शिक्षणारे विद्यार्थी यांची संख्या ४५ व ७७६१. ( ४७६१ विद्यार्थी व ३,००० विद्यार्थिनी ) सन १९१६-१७ सालांत होती. ती वाढून अनुक्रमे ४६ व ६,५२८ ( ५१८१ मुल्ले व ३३४० मुली ) वर गेली. ज्ञानंतवरील विद्यार्थ्यांचे आंकडे पुढीलप्रमाणे होत. मागून ३,७७६, इतर लिट्टे ४,२३९, महार आणि मांग ४०५, मुसलमान १०८०, ज्यू ६ आणि ख्रिश्चन २२; मुसलमानांच्या एकंदर ११ दिवसांच्या शाळांपैकी ६ मुलाकरिता व ५ मुलीकरिता अशा होत्या. त्यात मुलांची व मुलींची संख्या ६५६ व २०७ अशी होती. गेल्यासाली हीच संख्या ५९५१ व २९४ होती. सोमवार, मंगळवार, भाबुडा आणि गुलटेकडी येथील मुलांच्या शाळांखेरीज सर्व शाळा भाड्याच्या जागेत भरतात व या शाळांखेरीज क्रीडांगणे कोणत्याही शाळेत नाहींत. दोन नवीन इमारतींचे काम जवळ जवळ संपत आले आहे. आणि याशिवाय आंगणवाडी २ इमारती बांधण्याचा म्युनिसिपालिटीचा विचार आहे. म्युनिसिपालिटीचा क्रीडांगणे मिळविण्याचा प्रयत्न चालू आहे, हे नामद करण्यास आर्नंद वाटत आहे. गुजराथी केलवणी मंडळाकडून म्युनिसिपालिटीस रु. ३०,००१ ची देणगी मिळाली हे नामद करण्यास कमिशनर यास आर्नंद वाटत आहे. दुसरी एक रु. २०,००० ची देणगी काथक्केफुडाचे ट्रस्टनी धनगर जातीचे मुलांना संदर शाळेत मोफत शिक्षण मिळावे या अटीवर देऊं केली आहे. मे. प्रेसिडेंट यांच्या लिहिण्यावरून मागिल्ल्यालिपिसा या साली सभेचे कामकाज कालापव्यय न करिता व नेहमीप्रमाणे जातवारीचे तडे न करितां झाले असे दिसते. अहवालचे सालाचा म्युनिसिपालिटीचा एकंदर कारभार समाधानकारक झाला आणि याचे सर्व श्रेय डो. आर. के. नाथदू यांच्या कळकळीने व उत्साहाने केलेल्या कामामुळे त्यास देणे बांजवी आहे.

( ३ ) टिड्क-रोड (लकडीपूछ सेवशन):--भकणांचा अद्याप निकाल लागला नाहीं. मे. अध्यक्ष यांनी कांहीं सूचना केल्याअसून त्यास जनरल बोडीची मंजुरी मिळणेची आहे.

( ४ ) फिश मार्केट:-- जागा घेण्यासंबंधीचा जाहीरनामा सरकारी रेझिडन्सचे तारीख २५-५-१९२६ रोजी प्रसिद्ध झाला आहे.

( ५ ) भवानी पेठ ड्रेनेजसाठी जागा:--नेम ड्रेनेज स्युअरसाठी जागा घेण्याचे संबंधीचा टाच सन १९२६ मध्ये झाला. पूर्व चौकरी पुरी झाली असून जॉइंट मोजणीही पुरी झाली आहे. तारीख २७-९-१९२६ रोजी म्युनिसिपालिटीस कांहीं तफावती संबंधी विचारण्यांत आले होते. त्याचे उत्तर अलीकडे आले असून त्यासंबंधी पुढील तजवीज चालू आहे.

कार्यकारी ( Executive ) कमिटर्यांसंबंधी नियम:--हे नियम म्युनिसिपालिटीकडून आले होते. व ते मेहेरान कमिशनर यांचेकडे पाठविले होते. परंतु त्यांनी त्यांत कांहीं दुरुस्त्या सुचविण्यावरून नियम परत म्युनिसिपालिटीकडे पाठविले आहेत.

गेल्या सालापेक्षा या साली रुपये १०,००० वसूलचाकी वाढली आहे. करवसुली जास्त जोराने होणे जरूर आहे. हे अध्यक्षानेही नमूद केले आहे. शिवाय शहरातील रस्त्यांच्या वाईट स्थितिसंबंधी अध्यक्ष यांनी वर्णन केले आहे. सांसर्गिक रोग्यांचे हॉस्पिटल कमेटेचे अध्यक्ष या नात्याने या संस्थेचा एकंदर संकल्पित कार्यक्रम व कामाचे धोरण याबद्दल म्युनिसिपालिटीने प्रदर्शित केलेल्या शंका दूर करण्याचे प्रयत्न कलेक्टर करित आहेत. म्युनिसिपालिटीला आपल्यावर एकंदर सत्तांचा बोजा किती पडणार आहे हे कळवावे व पुणे शहराचे नागरिकांची सोय हॉस्पिटलमध्ये व्हावी असे म्युनिसिपालिटीला वाटणे स्वाभाविक आहे.

जन्मनोंदीचे काम चिन्तक करण्याचे प्रयत्न चालू आहेत.

म्युनिसिपालिटीने अद्याप मांगांची वसाहत नवीन जागेत नेली नाही हे बरे नाही. काही वर्षांपूर्वी म्यु. ने ससून हॉस्पिटल नर्सिंग फंडास रु. ६०० दरसाल मदत देण्याचे कबूल केले होते. म्यु. ने गेल्यासाली मदत न दिल्याने ती रक्कम इतर देणे असलेल्या रकमेतून कापून घेतली, याबद्दल म्यु. स. रागू आला. देऊ केलेली मदत जर न मिळाली तर पगार देण्याचे बाबतीत फार घोटाळा होतो, हे म्यु. चे लक्षात येत नाही. ह्याच वेळी म्यु.ने आयुर्वेदीय रुग्णालयास रु. १६०० चे एवजी ४००० ची मदत दिली.

लकडीपूल रुंद करण्याचे काम फारच उपयोगी झाले असून उत्तम रीतीने करण्यांत आले आहे. मे. कलेक्टर यांनी कित्येक शाळांना भेट दिली. शाळा भाड्याच्या घरांत भरविण्यांत येतात. ही घरे शाळांना मुळीच योग्य नाहीत.

ही स्थिति सुधारण्याचा प्रयत्न म्युनिसिपालिटी करील अशी आशा आहे.

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Administration Report of the Health Department for the year 1928-1929.

**Area:**—The area of the City has remained the same.

**Boundaries:**—There is no change in the boundaries of the City.

**Population of the City:**—The population of the City according to the census of 1921 is 1,33,227 and of these 69,695 are males and 63,532 females. The estimated population however may rise upto 1,47,000.

**Vital statistics:**—

**Births:**—There is improvement in the registration of births. As stated in the last report, the Medical Officer of Health having tried all other methods to secure a correct registration of births, was after all compelled to resort to finding births from infant deaths. Each infant death was personally verified by the Sanitary Inspector in charge, and if the birth of the infant was found to have occurred within city limits and in the year under report and not reported, it was registered by the department. Thus the total number of births has swelled to an appreciable extent. The meeting of the medical practitioners called by the president for discussing the method of registration of births and deaths and the causes that tend to the rise in infant mortality particularly, gave no material help to the department and their only recommendation accepted by the General Body regarding giving of a prize of four annas to each birth reported, has yet to receive sanction of the Government.

The number of births during the year under report was 4,468, giving a birth rate of 33.65 per mille and showing an increase over that of the previous year, i. e.

3144 with a birth-rate of 23.62. 1,671 Births out of the above were detected from the infant mortality.

The total number of deaths registered during the year was 5264 as against 4971 in the previous year. The ratio calculated per thousand was 39·51 against 37·34 of the previous year. The death rate if calculated on the estimated population will come up to 35·80.

The rise of 293 deaths is solely due to the rise in child mortality which increased from 2523 to 2823.

*Infant mortality:--*

The infant mortality for the year was 2016 and the ratio of infant deaths per 1000 births was 45.20 and per 1000 population it was 15.13. These again compare fairly well with the figures of the previous year which were 1804, 636.55 and 13.55 respectively. This favourable ratio (as compared with the number of births) is due to the fact that the 1671 births detected from the infant mortality were added to the 2797 births already reported through the usual agencies.

I have given the reasons for the infant mortality in my previous reports and it is not necessary to repeat them here. I must however add that the registered causes are all based on the reports of the lay public and where medical service has scarcely reached the masses, no accurate data is available and hence no correct reasons than the one already given can safely be given. The municipality has by appointing the two nurses, brought "clean mid-wifery" within easy reach of many an expectant mother amongst poor classes.

Small-pox:—There were 64 cases only as against 241 in the previous year. The disease did not assume an epidemic form. Each case was personally verified by the Medical Officer of Health as usual and all precautions taken.

Plague:—There were 16 deaths from Plague in the year as against 1 in the previous year. All these cases were imported into the city in its various parts, from Satara District which was very severely affected. There being a direct motor connection between Poona and Satara, the city was threatened with an outbreak, but the timely precautions taken by the Health Department with the help of the Plague-Committee have saved the city from a threatened severe outbreak. The following were some of the measures adopted by the Health Department:—

Inoculation:—4340 doses of anti-plague vaccine were brought from the Parel Laboratory and supplied to the city medical practitioners free of charge. More than 1462 persons were inoculated during a short period of one month.

Rat-destruction:—5 Mokadams and 16 coolies were engaged in trapping the affected localities and their services were retained even after there remained no fear of an outbreak. 600 Traps were daily set and the number of houses trapped by these men is 35685 and 46924 rats were caught and destroyed. 36 dead rats were sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital for examination and were reported non-plague.

Segregation:—The Municipal Health Camp was kept ready, but none took advantage of it.

Leaflets notifying the precautions to be taken for the prevention of the disease were freely distributed all over the city.

My thanks are due to the members of the Plague Committee for the very hearty co-operation and help received from them.

Cholera:—There were 23 deaths from cholera as against 33 in the previous year. This year also the cases were mostly imported from Pandharpur; but the prompt precautions taken by the Health Department have checked its spread.

Measles:—This recorded 81 as against 91 deaths.

Phthisis:—There were 435 deaths from Phthisis as against 432 in the previous year.

My thanks are due to the two First Class Municipal Magistrates, Sardar Natu and Mr. Ranade. They are a great help to the Health Department in bringing to book some very trying and obstinate persons who are averse to elementary sanitary observances. Their justice is always tempered with mercy and often the latter quality predominates more in their decisions.

*Menials*:—The year under report had to see two strikes of the menials.

*Drainage*:—The works of providing drains for the eastern part of the town and that of replacing 4" drains by 6" are still in progress and the number of gully traps has risen from 9,571 to 9,970.

*Gutters*:—The katchha gutters are a nuisance and the rain water accumulates where they exist. Very bitter complaints from the house-owners are received where they are situated. I have already placed my views before the municipality with regard to these temporary make-shifts. Attempts are being made to reduce the number of Gol-gutters (open drains), which are also a source of insanitation all the year round.

*Public latrines*:—There are 424 seats of public latrines out of which 207 are of flushing type.

*Urinals*:—There are 114 flushing and 22 gutter urinals in the city.

*Private privies:*—There are 9,745 private privies out of which 2,106 are of the flushing pattern. The number of private flushing privies has thus risen from 1727 to 2106 but the progress is not hopeful. The same difficulties are experienced in inducing the house owners to get their privies converted and the situation will not improve unless the municipality takes some drastic measures in such cases where the house-owners are deliberately putting off the work of conversion on lame excuses. The reorganization of bhanggi service and the consequent reduction in their number chiefly depends upon this and the municipality will always have to remain at the mercy of the bhangis and the city will not be free from bhanggi menace unless and until a substantial number of basket privies are converted. The recent bhanggi strike has brought this fact most glaringly to the notice of the municipality and of the public.

*Cesspools:*—The number of cesspools has gone down to 595 as against 757 in the previous year. The cesspools in the city proper are slowly disappearing, but at Bhamburda they are fast increasing. The system of removing sullage by sullage-carts will have to go on until this part of the city is sewered.

*Kachara removal:*—This year also the removal of kachara from the city was almost wholly done by hiring the bullocks from a contractor and the same difficulties were experienced as in last year. The fault in this system was however duly noticed by the Standing Committee at the end of the year and they have decided to maintain bullocks for the departmental system of work. This resolution arrived at by the Standing Committee was chiefly due to the efforts of the Chief Officer. The following statement will show the income derived from the sale of kachara and its manure the last two years.

#### *Markets and Slaughter-houses.*

The number of markets and slaughter houses remained the same. The number of goats and sheep slaughtered at the municipal slaughter houses was 64,931 and the income from fees etc, was Rs. 9,263-15-0. The number of ani-

mals slaughtered at the Kondhwa slaughter house was 1946 and the income derived was Rs. 1056-0-0. A qualified Veterinary Graduate is appointed as Veterinary Superintendent from 25-1-29 who is in charge of the slaughter houses and mutton markets etc., of the City.

The question of providing beef and fish markets is still under consideration.

*Milk-Supply*:--The problem of milk-supply is still hanging fire.

*Disinfecting gang*:--This gang consisting of one mokadam and three coolies has disinfected 228 infected houses.

*Needs of the city* :-

I think it necessary to repeat in this and all subsequent reports the urgent needs of the city. It is necessary to keep these needs in the lime-light with a view to their being attended to by the corporators when time or finance at their disposal permits them to do so.

1. Paving of narrow lanes is necessary when funds permit.
2. Road repairs throughout the city are a crying need. From a sanitary point of view with a good even road, scavenging is not difficult. Besides especially during manson pools of water collect in the hollows in the length of a road. In this respect I may be permitted to state that in absence of roadside pucca storm water gutters the efficiency of roads can never be maintained. Besides which the rows of the houses adjoining a public street are lower than the level of the road and many a house in the town is rendered damp and unhealthy on that account.
3. Removal of slaughter houses outside municipal limits will improve sanitation.
4. A municipal dispensary for women and children under a lady doctor will certainly be a great help to the poor citizens ('Nagarics').
5. Segregation of prostitutes from inhabited areas and their periodical inspection by a lady doctor will save many a youth from ruinous disease.
6. Segregation of lepers is urgently required.
7. The milkmen (Gavalis) in the town should be licensed and the milk supply to the public should be pure and wholesome for which bye-laws are necessary and need to be framed.
8. Each of the sixteen Peths should have open space for play grounds. In crowded Peths this is not possible. But Peths where there are open grounds should never be given permission to build upon.
9. Storm water pucca gutters by the sides of public roads are a very great necessity.
10. Dhobi ghats and bathing platforms on the banks of Nagazari should be constructed. The use of public water taps and hounds for such purposes should be entirely forbidden.

*General remarks:-*

*Strikes:*—The year under report is marked by two important events. The two strikes which are referred to above are of importance from a sanitary point of view.

The Bhangi strike took place and was due to the reduction in their numbers owing to construction of flushing privies. Thanks to the President and the Chairman of the Standing Committee for their happy interference, the strike was brought to an end and the matter was amicably settled. The result would have been serious otherwise. The Bhangi trouble remains so long as there is not complete conversions of basket privies into flushing system and also as long as the newly developed areas are not sewerred.

*Wash privies:*—The make-shift arrangements of substituting these kind

*Flushing Privies:*—The Municipality is trying to devise a new kind of flushing privy, which can be constructed at a moderate cost and can at the same time be free from any objection from the sanitary point of view.

The kachara drivers' strike was not of so much importance and it was easily overcome after the wages of the drivers and the trips they were to make were settled. In previous years the old method of employing municipal agency for kachara removal was done away with and contract system was introduced. This system of removal of kachara from the town failed completely and was found very expensive as I had foretold and which I had always strenuously opposed. The Chief Officer soon after his return from leave rectified the error and the kachara is now removed as of yore by municipal bullocks. Four motor lorries are also placed at the disposal of the Health Department for the removal of kachara. Even these are found to be inadequate as the city is fast expanding especially towards the West and as it will be necessary in course of time to remove the dumping ground to a greater distance from the city than at present. Buildings are cropping up like mushrooms and as stated in my last report the Town Planning authorities have made a serious mistake in allowing buildings without providing a drainage line.

*Death rate:*—The number of deaths was less during the year although the population has increased approximately by 4,000 over the census taken some nine years ago. Infant mortality still continues to be heavy. The reasons for which have already been recorded in my previous reports. More maternity centres distributed over all the seventeen Peths may help to reduce the infant deaths, but there are other contributory causes which should not be lost sight of. Poverty and high cost of living are the primary causes. The low vitality of infants due to early marriages amidst insanitary and thickly populated areas are the pivots round which the high infant death-rate flourishes. On personal investigation I have noticed that the baby is born only to die. Life is sustained in the new born only for a few hours when its eyes are closed to day-light. Birth control amongst the poor and ignorant

masses seems to be the only remedy for combating this evil. The problem is indeed very difficult and it is not within the scope of the Health Department to control it. Social workers both men and women irrespective of colour or caste should join hands to enlighten masses, especially the poor classes, against procreating children when they have hardly sufficient means for keeping body and soul together.

*Stabling of milch cattle:—*

Stabling of milch cattle should be outside the thickly populated areas. It is high time now that the whole milch cattle stable question in the city of Poona deserves to be freely discussed by the corporators. The situation of the increasing nuisance from these stables specially during monsoons is growing apace each year. The city fathers should seriously consider the removal of these stables from the heart of the town to be located within easy reach of the many Peths in which they are situated and to be governed by equitable bye-laws for the proper distribution of wholesome and unadulterated milk supply to the public and this question should engage their serious attention.

*Leprosy and Dr. Santra:—*

My thanks are due to Dr. Santra, the Government Leprosy Expert. He at my invitation delivered a popular lecture on leprosy in the municipal hall and which was largely attended by the citizens (Nagarics.)

*Tuberculosis—*

Tuberculosis is mostly restricted to five of the Peths viz. Vetal, Raviwar, Shukrawar, Narayan and Budhwar. These areas are thickly populated. The people living in Raviwar Peth mostly observe purdah system. A tuberculosis dispensary will be useful provided there is a sanitarium attached to it. Segregation in an open and elevated area removed from the town could only bring success to a tuberculosis dispensary.

*Plague:—*

Plague made its unwelcome appearance in the beginning of the current year. Cases of plague were almost all imported and these gave rise to indigenous cases also. But the very prompt action taken in the beginning by the Health Department prevented its spread. Great credit is certainly due to my staff for the prompt action taken knowing as we all do that plague was raging in all villages and towns within a radius of some twenty miles from the city. My thanks are due to the Sub-committee which gave me a free hand to tackle its (plague) spread and to all of them I am thankful.

In conclusion my thanks are due to the President and the Chairman of the Standing Committee for their kindly help in all matters pertaining to sanitation. My Chief Sanitary Inspector and the staff have supported me loyally and have worked diligently.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the administration of the School Board for the year 1928-29.

*2. Constitution of the School Board:—.*

Under the new Primary Education Act of 1923, the term of the School Board is co-extensive with that of the Local Authority.

There was naturally a change in the personnel of the School Board during the year under review. The retiring Board continued to function from 1st April 1928 to 15th August 1928. The period of the Local Authority expired on 15th August 1928 and consequently the old Board ceased to function from 15th August 1928. From 15th August 1928 to 3rd January 1929, the retiring Chairman, Dr. R. K. Naidu, L. M. & S., and the Vice Chairman, Prof. S. R. Kanitkar, M. A., attended to the formal and routine administrative duties as required by G. R. F. D. No. 2,534 dated 12th April 1928.

As the work of framing rules under the Primary Education Act was completed during the year under report, only one Sub-Committee functioned and that was the Committee for securing suitable School Buildings and sites. There was no business before other committees.

**GENERAL REMARKS.**

*Night Schools:—*

There were 15 night schools during the year under report; but no detailed and definite rules of policy as regards the studies, attendance etc. could

be framed till now. A Sub Committee of four Members was formed. The Sub-Committee met twice and framed certain rules which have been submitted to the Local Authority for its sanction. The Government want to turn all the night schools into "B" Class schools which necessitates a minimum attendance of 10 students. The attendance in the Night Schools is very poor and if the Government's suggestion is accepted, I fear almost all the Night Schools will have to be closed. The Night Schools under the management of the Municipal School Board will not be successful. They ought to be run by a philanthropic association which aims at spreading education among the adults. Some sacrificing individuals or bodies should come forward and take up the activity.

For the present the Night Schools are in the Mohamedan and Depressed Class locality. If the Local Authority is prepared to spend on adult education, it may start a scheme by which a man, who works to turn illiterate man into literate one, gets a certain amount per head.

( 2 ) *Compulsory Education:—*

The Primary Education Act was passed in 1923 with a view to provide for Universal Free and Compulsory Education in this Presidency. The retiring Board framed a programme of Compulsory Education within the Municipal area which covered a period of five years. The same Board as a preliminary measure also took a complete Census of the children of the whole City. On the approval of the Local Authority, the Scheme for the first year concerning the Petas Nana, Bhawani, Ganj, Ghorpade and Gultekadi was submitted to Government on the 31st December 1926. All these peths form educationally the most backward part of the City and hence the retiring School Board naturally and in the fitness of things, chose this area first for its operation. The period of that School Board expired on the 15th August 1928 and the School Board, that took the initiative in framing the Scheme and did all the preliminary measures that were essential for ensuring the success of the Scheme, was however denied the pleasure of receiving the Government sanction during its regime.

My Board however was lucky enough to receive that much delayed and expected sanction at the end of the year under report after a period of more than two years. It will for the present suffice to say that the conditions imposed are neither very encouraging nor favourable enough to ensure success of the Scheme. My Board however has decided to work the scheme in spite of all its limitation. In this matter our thanks are really due to the retiring Board for its strenuous efforts in carrying out all that was necessary for the introduction of Free and Compulsory Education.

*Rules unworkable:—*

I avail myself of the opportunity of criticising some of the rules of the Primary Education Act which are found unworkable after considerable experience.

Rule No. 57 of the Primary Education Act regarding the No. of pupils to be entrusted to the care of a teacher is unworkable in a city like Poona where there is so much difficulty of securing a suitable school building

of the practical difficulties, and cut down the number of teachers ruthlessly. For a school with 180 pupils and upwards on rolls, they would allow only 4 teachers and the school will have to wait for an additional hand till the figure comes to 200. Such a kind of harsh and unjust attitude results in swelling up the amount declared as inadmissible for Government grant.

On the other hand the Government tries the patience of the Local Authorities in sending replies. The schedule of Primary teachers for 300 posts was submitted to Government by this office No. 5 dated 7 th April 1926 to which no final sanction is yet received even after a period of 3 years. The expenditure therefore on all additional hands that had to be employed owing to increase in the number of pupils and additional classes is disallowed even when the same was admitted for the purpose of Government grant for the two years 1925-26 and 1926-27.

The same remark holds good concerning the rule No. 48 about the employment of inspecting and supervising staff. What kind of efficient supervision can be expected when one supervisor is put in charge of 9000 pupils and will have to wait for an additional supervisor till the total of pupils comes to twenty one thousand. For a budget of nearly three lakhs, we are spending only Rs. 300 p. m. on inspection and supervision of schools which number 101 with fourteen thousand pupils approximately. By rigidly forcing such rules on the Local Authority, the Local Authority does not get adequate return for the money it spends. In pre-control days the inspection charges were evidently much higher and were fully borne by Government.

Section 13 of the Act as it stands at present does in no way make it obligatory on Government to give grants-in-aid to the Local Authorities for the expansion of education on a voluntary basis. It would be equally obligatory on Government to bear the expenditure of Primary Education on voluntary basis as well as on compulsory basis.

It is also very necessary to put some check on the rule-making powers of Government. At present the rules are too many and they bind down tightly the hands of the School Board and of the Local Authority at every step, with the result that little progress can be made by the School Board and the Local Authority that stick fast to the rules. In fact, this has arrested the progress of Primary Education. The Act is likely to defeat the very purpose for which it came into existence. It is therefore hoped that Government will revise the rules and the Act without any further delay in the matter.

#### *School Houses:—*

It is very gratifying to note that the Local Authority accepted the policy as recommended by the retiring Board and decided to construct its own school-buildings. It recently appointed a building committee to solve this very complex problem. As per its recommendations, the Local Authority has decided to build at least one or two School buildings every year as the funds permit. To-day opens a new page in the history of Primary Education of this Local Authority as the first building, built by this Local Authority on a large scale at its own cost, will be soon opened at the hands of the Hon. Minister of Education. This building is built in Raviwar Peth to suit the requirements of the Urdu School and has cost the Local Authority Rs. 30,500 exclusive of the site. A hearty vote of thanks is due to Mr. Dattatraya

Vishwanath Nagarkar for making a free gift of a part of this beautiful site to this Local Authority in the name of his revered deceased father Mr. Vishwanathpant Nagarkar. The School Board is thankful to Govt. also for acquisition of the site for Urdu Schools.

The other building was built for the use of Marathi Girls School No. 4 near Shani Dar in Sadashiv Peth at the cost of Rs. 35,900. The site of this building has cost the Local Authority Rs. 33,980.

Both these buildings were built by the wellknown contractors, Messrs Vaidya and Wadekar Brothers. Our thanks are equally due to Messrs Tambolkar and Dalvi, the Municipal Engineers, who co-operated at every stage and gave willing assistance in the execution of these two school buildings. A building for a depressed class school at Bhangi-hatti is also nearing completion and will be soon made available to this School Board for occupation. It is understood that the Local Authority has decided to build immediately in the near future one school building in Kasaba Peth and it is anticipated that before the publication of the next Administration Report, the proposed building will be completed and ready for use.

If the Local Authority carries on vigorously the recommendations of the Building Committee, I feel sure that within the next few years, Poona City will see its young children being educated in hygienic buildings with better surroundings.

*Play Grounds:—*

The Building Committee has suggested to secure some open spaces in different parts of the city that would serve as common play-grounds to the schools in that locality. But in a congested City like Poona, this will take some more time to arrive at a practical solution of the difficulty. At present, there are only 4 play-grounds all for Boy's Schools.

*Progress and results of schools:—*

During the year under report there were four full-fledged Marathi Primary Schools teaching higher standards. I am glad to record here that the results of the V. F. Examination are very creditable. The School No. 1 presented 30 students for the V. F. Examination for boys, out of which 26 came out successful. Similarly, the same school carried 5 ( five ) Middle School Scholarships. Seven students were sent up by the school for the competitive examination of the Middle School Scholarship, one stood first and the remaining four carried different scholarships. Boys School No. 8 presented 40 out of which 33 passed the V. F. Examination. The Municipal Girls' School No. 6 sent 23 for the V. F. Examination for Girls out of which 15 passed; while from Urdu School No. 10 five Boys out of seven came out successful in the Urdu final.

All the three Middle Schools Scholarships reserved for the whole Poona District were carried respectively by our Urdu School No. 10, 22, and 23. It will be thus seen that the work that is being done by us deserves sympathy and encouragement at the hands of the public. Statement showing the results of the other annual examinations of the Primary Schools during the year under report is enclosed separately.

*Physical Education:—*

The importance of this subject is not ignored by my Board. A curriculum has been already framed by the previous Board and submitted to Govt. whose reply on the point is still awaited. To teach drill, formal gymnastics and team-games on proper and scientific lines, this School Board has already engaged three permanent drill masters. There is considerable dearth of qualified people who would ably handle the subject on purely scientific lines. It is also as necessary to make compulsory provision for physical training as for mental training. But the present policy of Govt. in disallowing expenditure not only on account of annual competitive sports, but on the salary of Drill teachers is far from satisfactory. In pre-control days, such expenditure was admissible for Government grants. The findings of the Physical Training Committee are also awaited.

In order to create a liking for this education, competitive sports and games ought to be held annually. But strange to say, the Government are not willing to admit a single pie of expenditure on this account as admissible for Govt. grant and hence the permission of the Local Authority for an annual expenditure irrespective of Govt. grant on the same is solicited and it is hoped that the Local Authority will accord the necessary sanction to the above expenditure.

*Boy-Scouts:—*

During the year under report the last batch of 30 teachers was trained as Scout-masters. I am glad this training has given our teachers a sense of esprit-de-corps and has created a liking for social service in them. Our thanks are due to Dr. Natu and to Mr. D. P. Joshi but for whose enthusiastic and sincere work the present progress could not have been possible. This healthy movement is also a part of Physical Training and expenditure on this in all fairness, should have been admissible for Government grant.

*Curriculum:—*

This Local Authority has already recommended to Govt. the curriculum as recommended to it by the School Boards Association, Bombay Presidency. The final sanction of Government to the same is still awaited.

*Visual Instruction:—*

In order to make Primary Education popular and attractive among the masses, the Local Authority sanctioned the post of a Visual Instructor on Rs. 75-5-100 in anticipation of Government sanction, but Government was pleased to declare this as " a luxury " and hence this post will soon be abolished. During the year under report, lantern lectures were occasionally given and films in history and health and on Namaskars were shown with the co-operation of the Manager of Aryan Cinema to whom we owe a vote of thanks for nominally charging half an anna for showing historical films to our pupils and for showing the film on Namaskars free of charge to all our pupils.

*Medical Inspection:—*

Budget provision up to two thousand rupees has been made inclusive of the pay of the two posts, one of Medical Inspector and the other of Medical Inspectress for Girls' Schools. These however could not be filled up as the Schedule was not sanctioned.

*Teachers:—*

This Local Authority has maintained a sufficient number of trained teachers. Out of 341 teachers, 198 were trained and 143 were untrained. This School Board also made permanent such of the teachers who were in the service of the Local Authority for more than three years and whose work was found satisfactory. The teachers who were in the employ of the Local Authority prior to 1st April 1926 continued to draw their salaries according to the scale sanctioned by this Local Authority while those employed after 1st April 1926 were paid during the year under report according to the provisional scale sanctioned by Govt. The Schedule and the pay-scale were submitted to Govt. for sanction in April 1926, to which no final sanction is received till now. It is hoped that Govt. would be good enough to sanction both the Schedule and the pay-scale at an early date. The School Board has further decided to send some of its select teachers for further training at their own cost. This will give to the School Board a sufficient number of trained teachers and no outsiders will have to be entertained.

*Scholarships:—*

As there was considerable dearth of trained women teachers for the depressed class schools and the Urdu Schools, the School Board decided to award two scholarships of Rs. 15 each to those women who would pass their Urdu final and two of equal value to those who would pass their Marathi V. F. for Girls on condition of serving this Local Authority after training. I regret to record here that not a single Mohamedan Girl came forward to avail herself of this opportunity. Applications were also invited by giving an advertisement in the Urdu papers but there was no response to the same. Under these circumstances it is proposed by this School Board to hand over the amount of scholarship for Urdu schools to Government and to take the loan of the services of two trained women teachers.

*Libraries and lectures:—*

Some useful and popular books were added to the Teachers' Library. A beginning is already made during the year under report to institute an independent Library for women teachers, as it was found that the central library for teachers was mainly availed of by male teachers. A system of circulating a set of 40/50 books from school to school was adopted and the experiment has been successful and popular.

Educational experts from the City were also invited to give lectures on topics of educational interest and on methods of teaching. The School Board takes this opportunity of thanking publicly Shrimant Balasaheb Pant Pratinidhi B. A. Chief of Aundh, for his very interesting lecture on Namaskars. The School Board is equally thankful to Principal S. R. Tavade, Mr. R. S. Dixit and others for having readily responded to our invitations.

*Inspection of Accounts:—*

The Govt. Auditors inspected the Accounts of the School Board in the months of April and May 1929. Most of the objections were based on the principle of want of Govt. sanction to the expenditure while other minor objections were removed by satisfactory explanations.



**Conclusion:—**

The period of the previous Board expired on 31st March 1928, but as the Local Authority's period was extended upto the 15th August 1928, the previous Board automatically functioned also till the end of that period. That was the first Board that came into existence under the Primary Education Act and as such had an arduous task of taking all preliminary measures that were necessary under the Act for framing rules, drafting the curriculum etc. Thus all the spade-work was done by the previous Board. My Board held its 1st meeting on the 10th January 1929. I should fail in my duty if I do not thank publicly the Local Authority for their help and co-operation in carrying through the proposals submitted to them by my Board for sanction. The relations between my Board and the Local Authority, I am proud to say, are happy.

The Primary Education Act has entailed a good deal of responsibility and heavy work on the office staff and I am glad to record my appreciation of the services which the Administrative Officer and his staff rendered to the School Board in the faithful discharge of their duties. The Administrative Officer and his staff deserve the thanks of the School Board.

## A NOTE ON THE EDUCATION OF MAHOMEDANS.

—:0:—

### *Schools:—*

During the year under report the number of the Urdu Schools for the children of the Mahomedans increased by one. At present there are 12 Urdu Schools including 6 schools for Boys and 6 schools for Girls. Out of the 6 schools for Boys, in 4 schools no tuition fees are charged. The rates of fees charged in the remaining two schools are much lower than those charged in Marathi Schools. All Girls Schools are entirely free. Formerly there were 5 Girls Schools, this year one more Girls' School was opened from the 1st April 1928 in Ganesh Peth and this new school is showing satisfactory progress.

### *Pupils:—*

On the 31st of March 1929 the number on rolls was 1,018 as against 942 of the last year. There is an increase by 76 pupils on rolls. The number of Boys and Girls in these Schools was respectively 692 and 326 as against 656 and 286. The annual average attendance in Boys' and Girls' Schools was respectively 509.1 and 224.4 as against 457.2 and 209. The increase in the number of pupils both in Boys and Girls' Schools this year is somewhat satisfactory as against last year. During the preceding year the increase was only 49 pupils. The progress is mainly due to the sincere and hard work on missionary lines of the three Mohamedan Members, Messrs Mohamadali Dost Mohmed Peer Mohamed, Lal Mahomad Manik Saheb Choudhari, and Mahamubhai Hashambhai. The School Board feels grateful to them for their sincere efforts.

### *Teachers:—*

Out of the 44 teachers working in these schools, 25 are trained. The School Board tried its best to secure some more trained women teachers but to no purpose. Two stipends for this purpose were also offered but not a single candidate came forward to avail herself of this opportunity. It is now proposed that the stipend money should be handed over to Government and the Government should in return be requested to give the loan of two trained women teachers to this Local Authority.

### *Libraries and Lectures:—*

Urdu Educational Magazines such as the Risala, Rahanumaye Talim etc. are subscribed for the use of teachers. Monthly meetings are also held in school No. 10 where educational lectures and model lessons are arranged under the guidance of the supervisor for Urdu Schools. He is a Matriculate ( S. L. C. ) and third year trained person of experience.

### *School Buildings:—*

During the year under report, the Local Authority built a fine building at the cost of Rs. 30,500 exclusive of the site for the use of the Urdu School in Ganesh Peth. It is also proposed to perform the opening ceremony of this building at the hands of the Hon. Moulvi Raffiuddin Ahmed, Bar-at-law, Minister of Education. The site of the building has cost the Local Authority

Rs. 33,000. This is the first building of its kind which has been built on such a large scale at a considerable cost for the use of the Urdu School. Unless this Local Authority sticks fast to the programme of constructing its own-school houses year by year, this question of school-houses cannot be satisfactorily solved owing to various limitations over which the Board has little control.

Two play-grounds are already being used as play-grounds for the Urdu School Nos. 20, 22, and 10.

#### EXPENDITURE.

This Local Authority spent a sum of Rs. 26,000 approximately on the education of children attending these Urdu Schools as against the sum of Rs. 29,000.

##### *Supervision:—*

In order to enforce close Supervision on Urdu Schools and improve the general efficiency, the Supervisor for Urdu Schools Mr. Mirza Ahmed Beg paid more than 20 visits to each School. He is a Matriculate and third year trained teacher. He also made special efforts by organising lectures in mosques on Fridays to enlist the sympathies of the parents in the cause of the spread of education.

##### *Inspections and Annual Examinations:—*

All the Urdu Girls schools were inspected by the Inspectress of Urdu Girls schools and her remarks will be attended to in due course. All the Schools were this year inspected by Mr. G. B. Wable B. A., L. T. the Administrative Officer of the Board in the months of February and March 1929. The Annual Examinations were held this year in the middle of April. The Urdu School No. 10 presented 7 boys for the Urdu Final out of which 5 came out successful. All the three middle school scholarships reserved for the whole Poona District were carried respectively by our Urdu School Nos. 10, 22, and 23. It will thus be seen that the work that is being done, deserves sympathy and encouragement of the public.

##### *Conclusion:—*

The progress of the Urdu Schools cannot be said to be very rapid. Education among girls is spreading at snail's pace. The School Board is trying to meet the difficulties with the limited means at its disposal. It desires and prays for solid co-operation of all the Mohamedan leaders who mean to depend much on their own efforts. The Mohamedan Members of the School Board Messrs. Mohamadali Dost Mohamed Peer Mohamed, Lal Mahomad Manik Sahab Choudhari, and Mahamubhai Hashambhai are trying to rouse the consciousness of the Mahomedan community to the present educational needs and I wish them in all sincerity every success.

DETAILS OF THE ADMINISTRATION REPORT.

OF THE  
SCHOOL BOARD,  
FOR THE YEAR,  
1928-29.

*The School Board Office:—*

There were some changes in the personnel of the office.

*Administrative Officer:—*

Mr. G. B. Wable, B. A., L. T., continued to be the Administrative Officer of the Board.

*Supervisors:—*

The posts of the Superintendent, and Assistant Superintendent were converted into the posts of Supervisors. In all, three posts of Supervisors were created with the sanction of the General Board for the efficient supervision of all Marathi Municipal and Aided Schools. These three posts were held by Messrs. H. G. Deo, M. B. Nimbalkar and G. N. Bokil from 1st April 1928, Mr. H. G. Deo is a Matriculate third year trained teacher while Messrs Nimbalkar and Bokil are third year trained teachers of considerable experience. Mr. Nimbalkar knows English as well.

Mr. V. R. Gaikani was from the 1st April 1928 appointed as a Visual Instructor, his post as Assistant Superintendent having been abolished from the same date. Mr. Mirza Ahmed Beg who is a Matriculate and 3rd year trained teacher of experience continued to work as Inspector of Urdu Schools.

The Govt. in their G. R. No. S. 78 ( 48 ) dated 27th December 1928 sanctioned only two posts of Supervisors, one for Marathi Schools and the other for Urdu Schools. In the light of the G. R. School Board recommended the abolition of one post of Supervisor for Marathi schools and regarding the other post for Marathi Schools the School Board and the Local Authority are of opinion that two posts of Supervisors for Marathi Schools are quite essential from the point of maintaining necessary efficiency of work.

I regret to record here that rule No. 48 of the Primary Education Act concerning the employment of inspecting and Supervising staff is not satisfactory. The Local Authority, therefore, decided to make a representation to Govt. concerning the 2nd post of Supervisor for Marathi Schools and at present, the matter is under correspondence.

Mr. W. H. Deshpande G. D. A., was appointed from the 9th August 1928 as the School Board Accountant vice Mr. S. A. Gadgil who resigned due to ill-health. The Accounts of the School Board will now be separately maintained from the 1st April 1929 as required under rules.

**Municipal Schools:—**

During the year under report the number of Municipal Day Schools increased by one excluding the 15 Night Schools. The policy of further expansion of Primary Education on voluntary basis could not be carried on owing to Government's attitude of disallowing all expenditure on new schools opened on voluntary basis. At present there are 49 day-schools with 8,939 pupils on rolls. The School Board as before made a provision for free distribution of Slates, Books, Washing Soaps etc. in order to induce young children from the educationally backward communities.

With a view to increase the strength and attendance of girls in higher classes and maintain the same, English was introduced as an additional subject in School No. 6 in the upper classes.

There are 28 Boys' Day-Schools out of which 17 are entirely free. These schools are made up as below:—

12 Marathi Boys' Schools including two mixed schools for Boys and Girls of the Depressed Classes and five schools for the Mahomadan Boys. All Girls' Schools are entirely free. Further detailed information of Municipal Day Schools is made available in Appendix No. VI ( A and B ).

**Night Schools:—**

During the year under report, there were 15 Night Schools including those schools that were handed over to this Local Authority by the Local "Asprishyata Nivarak Mandal". They are being availed of by pupils, many of whom are grown up persons. Detailed information will be found in Appendix No. VIII. The attendance in these schools is far from satisfactory. I have already expressed my views on this elsewhere in this report.

**Courses:—**

With a view to give the knowledge of the three "R's" emphasis was naturally laid on the teaching of language and arithmetic. Lantern lectures were also given on personal hygiene. Subjects, as History and Geography, are not taught in these schools as the classes meet only for two hours.

Extract from the report of the Administrative Officer to the School Board on Aided Schools.

" In all 29 A Class Schools and 11 B Class Schools, were inspected by the Administrative Officer during the year under report. Surprise visits were also paid to these schools.

*Grants:—*

Grants to both the " A " Class and the " B " Class Schools were calculated strictly in accordance with the rules of the Primary Education Act. The total grants to the A Class and B Class Schools amounted to Rs. 48,006 as against 46,974-12-0 of the preceding year.

The increase of Rs. 1031-4-0 is mainly due to the award of a special grant by the Local Authority of Rs. 500 to the Primary Schools conducted by the Depressed Class Mission at Bhokarwadi. A grant of Rs. 502 was also paid this year to V. P. Mandali's Tulasibag Primary School. No grant was paid to this school last year as the necessary information was not supplied.

*Attendance:—*

Excepting the A Class Primary Schools conducted by the societies of established reputation such as the D. E. Society, The Shikshana Prasarak Mandal, the M. E. Society, the Shivajee Maratha Society, the Poona Seva Sadan and the Panch Howd Mission, the attendance is not in general satisfactory and was also found suspicious in some cases at the time of surprise visits. The Managers of the schools concerned have been warned to remove the defects. In the case of B Class Schools this defect seems prominent. Attendance in Urdu Schools also needs closer attention at the hands of the Managers.

*Method of instruction:—*

Last year's remarks still hold good. Power of self-expression in pupils is not developed up to the mark. This is due to the tendency of inexperienced teachers' attempt to do everything for the pupils.

*Staff:—*

There were 223 teachers working in aided schools, out of 100 were trained teachers and 56 were qualified and the remaining were unqualified, exclusive of 16 special teachers such as the Talim Masters, Drawing Masters, etc. The staff is also migratory. This is mainly due to the absence of regular annual increments, provision of Provident Fund etc.

*Physical Education:—*

This is receiving increasing attention, but the want of open space in the different parts of the City acts as a serious difficulty.

*Accommodation:—*

13 Schools have buildings of their own and have therefore observed all requirements from the point of light and ventilation. The remaining schools are located in rented buildings. Such schools are at a serious disadvantage owing to two clear facts, viz. ( 1 ) want of sufficient funds. ( 2 ) Location of schools in thickly populated areas.

*Schools claiming special attention:—*

The V. P. Mandali's Tulasibag School requires close attention. Last year's remarks still hold good.

*New Schools:—*

Mr. Pathak's "Vyapari Shala" applied for recognition this year. It is recommended to Government for recognition as "B" Class School.

*Old Schools:—*

(1) The Bene Israel Hebrew School (2) Pathak's Vyapari Shala (3) Salvation Army Schools in Ghorapaday and Somawar Peths are removed from the list of recognised schools excepting the 1st, the others are closed voluntarily by the Managers concerned. The Bene Israel Hebrew School is a special school and as such does not come under the Primary Education Rules. It will be therefore aided by Government directly.

*Pupils:—*

The total No. of pupils in all Aided Schools at the time of Inspection was 5267 on rolls and the average attendance was 4,138; out of this total 3847 were Boys and 1420 were girls.

*Pupils:—*

The total number of pupils in Municipal Primary Day-Schools was 8,939 as against 8,521 of the preceeding year. There was an increase only by 418 pupils. The general attendance of the children in these schools was satisfactory, the average daily attendance being 5,533.5 as against 5,820.6 of the last year. In girls' schools the average daily attendance was 2,448.3 as against 2,163.1 of the last year. The average number on rolls was 5,167.9 boys and 3,344 girls as against 4,925.6 boys and 3,206.9 girls.

Information concerning other details will be found in Appendices I (A to C).

The comparative attendance of children during the years 1927-28 and 1928-29 will be found in appendix I-D.

*Teachers:—*

The comparative statements showing the strength of teachers in Municipal Primary Day-Schools and their proportionate distribution in several schools will be found in Appendix II.

During the year under report special efforts were made to secure the services of Urdu School Mistresses. They did not meet with any appreciable success.

Out of a total number of 341 teachers, 192 are trained and the remaining 149 are untrained. Thus it will be seen that 57 p. c. teachers are trained. Under the Act, this is more than enough. These trained and experienced hands were distributed over almost all the schools on the principle of giving to each school the full benefit of their experience.

*Working of full primary schools:—*

There are four such schools maintained by this Local Authority. They are as below:—

- ( 1 ) Municipal School No. 8 for Marathi speaking boys.
- ( 2 ) Municipal School No 1 for Marathi speaking boys.
- ( 3 ) Municipal School No. 6 for Marathi speaking girls.
- ( 4 ) Municipal Urdu school No. 10 for Mahomedan Boys.

The results of the V. F. Examination are quite good this year also. The School No. 8 sent 40 pupils, out of which 33 came out successful. The school No. 1 presented 30 students for the examination, out of which 26 passed their examination.

The School No. 6 for girls sent 23 for the V. F. Examination for Girls, out of which 15 came out successful. The School No. 10 presented 7 boys for the Urdu Final Examination, out of which 5 were successful.

*Examinations and Results:—*

As usual the annual examination of Municipal Day-Schools passed off quite smoothly. Small committees of experienced head-masters and head-mistresses were formed to assist the Administrative Officer, and I am glad to record that these committees under the guidance of the Supervisors and the Administrative Officer discharged their duties to the satisfaction of all. Detailed information relating to this is made available in appendix No. II-B

As per rule No. 37 of the Primary Education Act, the Board also arranged for the examination in language and arithmetic of St. IV of such Aided Schools as had no High School Classes of their own with a view to maintain a uniform standard of efficiency. The representatives of Aided schools were also consulted regarding convenient date, time and centres of examination for Boys and Girls. The School Board is thankful to all these for their willing co-operation and help.

*Inspection of Schools:—*

During the year under report, the Administrative Officer held the Annual Inspections of all Municipal Schools beginning from January 1929. The Administrative Officer also inspected all the Aided Schools with the help of the Supervisors and Inspector for Urdu Schools, now designated as Supervisor for Urdu Schools. All the detailed information concerning the inspection of Aided Schools is made available elsewhere in Appendix No. VII A and B. The Administrative Officer also paid regular surprise visits to these schools and inspected them during the months of August, September, October, and November 1928.

The senior Deputy Educational Inspector inspected our school No. 21 for Boys and 4 for Girls. The Inspectress of Girls Schools inspected school No. 1 and 2 during the year under report. The Inspectress of Urdu Schools inspected all Urdu Girls' schools as usual.

*Scholarships:—*

Seven students were presented by Municipal School No. 1 for the competitive examination of the Middle school scholarship, one stood first and



the remaining four carried different scholarships. All the three Middle School Urdu scholarships reserved for the whole Poona District were carried respectively by Urdu School Nos. 10, 22, and 23.

*Income:—*

Appendix III gives full information regarding the funds that were made available to this School Board, both by the Local Authority and the Government. The total receipts stand at Rs. 2,64,319-6-3 as against Rs. 2,64,682-15-10. The causes of increase and decrease under several heads are given below:—

*Fee receipts:—*

The total income under this head stands at Rs. 4,137-14-3 as against 3,896-7-3. The increase of Rs. 241-7-0 is due to the increase in the number of pupils attending the schools for boys. All girls' schools are free as already stated before elsewhere.

*2 Government grant-in-aid for expenditure on scholarships to Mahomedan girls in Urdu Schools:—*

The special Government grant of Rs. 100 for Mahomedan girls in Urdu Schools on datum line was received this year also for prizes and scholarships.

*3 Government grant-in-aid for attendance allowance as per Government Resolution No. 560 of 29 th March 1926 to the head masters and 1st Assistants of Primary Schools:—*

No specific grant was received during the year under report.

*Building grant-in-aid:—*

No such grant was received by the School Board during the year under review.

*Endowments:—*

The amount of Rs. 45-8-0 for the distribution of prizes was made available out of the interest on endowments deposited with the Local Authority and was paid to several institutions according to the conditions laid down by the donors.

*Local Fund Cess on land within Municipal limits:—*

Under this head a sum of Rs. 754-11-8 was received as against Rs. 1,326-13-9. The reasons of decrease are not given by Government and the matter is still under correspondance.

*The Primary Education Fund:—*

As per Primary Education Rule No. 141 of 1926, the School Board has to maintain a separate fund; but during the year under review complete arrangements could not be made for the separation of Accounts owing to the

difficulties over which the School Board had very little control. Steps are, however, taken to separate accounts from the 1st April 1929 and the Primary Education Fund will be maintained separately and deposited in the Imperial Bank of India. The Local Authority arranged for regular monthly payments as usual according to the needs of the School Board.

#### EXPENDITURE.

Details regarding the School Board Office establishment, Municipal Primary Schools and other items of expenditure are given in Appendix IV. The total expenditure on Primary Education stood at Rs. 2,64,319-6-3 as against 2,64,682-15-10 of the preceding year. This shows a net decrease of Rs. 368-9-7. The details of increase and decrease of sub-heads are given below:—

#### ( 1 ) *The School Board Office establishment and office contingency:—*

The total expenditure stood at Rs. 14,350-14-8 as against 10,421-15-8. The increase of Rs. 3,828-15-0 is mainly due to the filling up of the posts of the three supervisors and the Accountant during the year under report.

#### ( 2 ) *Salaries of teachers and peons with pension Fund:—*

Expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 1,46,681-1-0 against Rs. 1,46,241-4-0. There is an increase Rs. 440/.

#### ( 3 ) *Rent of School Buildings:—*

The School Board spent a sum of Rs. 24,217-9-0 as against Rs. 21,884-11-0 of the preceding year. The increase of Rs. 2,332-14-0 is due to increased rates per khana of buildings. Some of the schools were overcrowded and additional rooms had therefore to be hired owing to increase in the number of pupils.

#### ( 4 ) *Water tax:—*

The School Board paid a sum of Rs. 919-2-4 as against 808-12-10 of the previous year. There is an increase of Rs. 110-5-6.

#### *Furniture:—*

A sum of Rs. 3,491-2-9 was spent under this head as against Rs. 5,039-12-7, the decrease of Rs. 1,548-9-10 being due to economy and previous supply of furniture to schools.

#### *Contingency for Schools including sewing Material:—*

The School Board spent a sum of Rs. 3,766-0-3 during the year under report as against Rs. 4,934-14-2 of the previous year. The decrease of Rs. 1,168-13-11 is due to economy.

*New Books and Maps—*

A sum of Rs. 824-9-3 was spent during the year under report as against Rs. 1390-0-1 of previous year. The decrease of Rs. 565-7-9 is due to economy.

*New School Buildings—*

Two new School-buildings were built during the year under report and the possession of the same was given to the School Board by the Local Authority. Detailed information relating to the same will be made available in the report of the Local Authority.

*Repairs to School Buildings:—*

A sum of Rs. 4583-10-11 was spent during the year under review as against a sum of Rs. 4986-4-11 of the previous year. There is a decrease of Rs. 302-10-0.

Prizes paid from interest on endowments placed at the disposal of the Local Authority. A Sum of Rs. 45-8-0 was paid according to conditions of distribution.

*Scientific Apparatus:—*

The School Board spent a sum of Rs. 58-4-0 as against Rs. 386-1-0. The decrease of Rs. 321-13-0 is due to economy.

*Gymnasium:—*

The School Board spent a sum of Rs. 1378-10-2 as against Rs. 3,191-10-1. The decrease of Rs. 1,812-15-11 is partly due to economy and to previous supply of Gymnastic apparatus.

*Teacher's Library:—*

A sum of Rs. 364-15-11 was spent on this during the year under review as against a sum of Rs. 190-3-11. The increase of Rs. 174-12-0 is due to the policy of starting a small separate library for the use of Women teachers.

*Children's Library:—*

A sum of Rs. 141-5-0 was spent under this head as against a sum of Rs. 268-12-0. The decrease of Rs. 127-3-0 is due to economy.

*Teachers Training Classes:—*

These classes have been closed long since.

*Gratuity:—*

No money was spent under this head during the year under review.

*Hand work and spinning:—*

A sum of Rs. 1501-2-9 was spent against Rs. 2111-8-6 of the preceding year. The decrease of Rs. 610-5-9 is due to economy.

*New Primary Schools:—*

A sum of Rs. 10,468-1-3 was spent under this head during the year under report as against Rs. 10,432-0-8 of the previous year. There is an increase of Rs. 36-0-7. A sum of Rs. 566/- was spent on the Census Office establishment as against Rs. 1569-8-6. The decrease 1003-8-6 is due to abolition of this office.

*Night Schools:—*

The School Board spent a sum of Rs. 2,339-5-0 during the year under review as against Rs. 1755-11-9. The increase of Rs. 583-9-3 is mainly due to the constructing of a new cheap building in Mangwada, Sadashiva Peth, for the use of a Night School.

*Blind School:—*

During the year under report a School for the Blinds was started as an experiment by the Local Authority and the same was handed over to the School Board for management. A sum of Rs. 320-13-0 only was spent during this year.

*Grants to approved Schools:—*

A sum of Rs. 48,006-0-0 was spent by the Local Authority as against Rs. 46,974-12-0 of the preceding year. Detailed information concerning this is made available in Appendix No. VII A and B. The increase of Rs. 1031-4-0 is mainly due to award of a special grant by the Local Authority to the Depressed Class School at Bhokarwadi, conducted by the Depressed Class Mission.

*Grant to Bhokarwadi School:—*

According to the terms of agreement between this Local Authority and the Depressed Class Mission, the annual grant of Rs. 250 was also paid as usual during this year.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the administration of the Schools Committee for the year 1928-29.

*Constitution of the Schools Committee :—*

The personnel of the Schools Committee changed on the 1st September 1928 and the new Schools Committee was composed of the following five members :—

*Meetings of the Schools Committee :—*

The Schools Committee called 14 meetings from 1st April 1928 to 31st March 1929, while the total number of meetings held in 12 months was 12. 174 Items of business were disposed of in the year under review.

The Municipal Victoria Jubilee Technical School was under the direct management of the Schools Committee and its report is given below.

*Technical School :—*

In the Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School, the number of students on roll increased from 74 (64 full time and 10 half time) to 76 (72 full time and 4 half time) at the end of the year under review. The average attendance of students per month was 54.29. The number of students that learned the drawing course, carpentry, sign-board painting, smithy, fitting, turning and moulding was 72; and of these 56 were Brahmins, 14 Marathas, one Mahomedan and one Jew.

This Technical School contains a special class for Drawing for the benefit of such local students as cannot afford to become regular students of any other school. A fee of 4 as. is charged per head. However, teachers and students from Municipal Schools, local aided schools and training colleges attending this class are exempted from paying fees. This class was attended by 13 students on an average during the year under review.

The school sends up candidates for Elementary and Intermediate Drawing examinations of the School of Arts, Bombay. This year, 15 candidates were sent up for the Elementary examination and 11 for the Intermediate examination, and of these 5 and 7 passed in the examinations respectively.

The annual examination of the school was conducted according to the rules in force in the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute of Bombay and arrangements were made to hold it under the direct supervision of examiners deputed by the Committee of Direction for Technical Education in this Presidency. The following table shows the satisfactory results of the examinations of the several classes.

*Annual Grant :—*

A Grant of Rs. 1994 was received for this Technical School from Government this year according to the recommendations of the Committee of Direction for Technical Education in this Presidency.

The members of the Schools Committee and other Municipal Councillors paid surprise visits to this school from time to time during the year under review.

Government inspecting officers for Technical Education inspected this school in the month of June 1928 and conducted the annual examination of this School in the first week of April 1929. All of them expressed satisfaction about the work of this school in general.

The school was under the direct supervision of Mr. R. T. Sathe throughout the year under review. He is a Mechanical and Electrical Engineer and has undergone special training in the normal class of the Engineering College of Poona. He is qualified as a Technical School teacher and possesses experience of practical work. The Technical School is improving now and is showing better results owing to the efforts of the present Superintendent. Besides the Superintendent, the Technical School staff consists of a carpentry teacher, a drawing teacher, a painting teacher, a teacher of smithy, a teacher for English and Arithmetic, turning teacher, fitting teacher, a moulding teacher and a mistry class teacher.

*Wiremen's Class :—*

The school was equipped with the necessary plant for conducting the wiremen's class. The Electrical Engineer to the Government of Bombay visited this school and inspected the Machinery and recommended to the D. P. I. to recognise this class. The D. P. I. has granted recognition.

The following subjects, viz. carpentry, casting in various forms, wood and metal turning, polishing wood work, sign-board painting, carpentry drawing, machine drawing, art drawing, smithy, turning, fitting and moulding, Press-work (composing, printing and book-binding) and English are taught in this school. No fees are charged for the instruction.

*Scholarships:—*

Three scholarships for the second year and two scholarships for the third and fourth year classes each, of Rs. 2, 3 and 4 per month respectively are given by the Municipality on the results of periodical school examinations by open competition in order to encourage students to take up courses of Technical education. There is also one more scholarship called the Diwan Bahadur K. B. Godbole scholarship of Rs. 5 p. m. to be paid under certain conditions to a student who stands highest in the annual examination of the Final year class.

The school is attached to the work-shop of this Municipality for practical and experimental purposes. Repairing and other work is carried out with the aid of machinery of modern patterns. The material, such as wood, metal etc. used by the students for manual training and the tools used by them are supplied free of charge by this school. The students have to deposit a sum of Rs. 10 as security for the tools given in their charge. The amount is returned to them when they complete one year's full course. It is a great advantage

to the students of this school that they can actually see how the work-men work with the aid of the machinery of the work-shop and how to carry on actual work on the steam and oil engines. It will be seen from this that several measures such as revision of courses and starting new useful classes, adopted by the Municipality, have improved the condition of this school during the last 6 years. If its progress continues as at present, this school will make satisfactory provision for technical education in the City of Poona.

#### INCOME.

##### *Government Grant-in-aid for Victoria Jubilee Municipal Technical School, Poona :—*

This item shows an increase of Rs. 441 as the Committee of Direction for Technical Education in this Presidency sanctioned a higher grant for this year than that for the last year.

##### *Drawing grant :—*

There is an increase of Rs. 58 under this head. This year a total drawing grant of Rs. 186 was received. Out of this amount the result grant amounts to Rs. 86 and Rs. 100 is a special grant.

##### *Technical School fees :—*

This item shows a decrease of Rs. 1-12-0.

##### *Donations :—*

An amount of Rs. 60 only was received as interest on Bombay Improvement Trust Debentures during the year under review.

#### EXPENDITURE.

Details regarding expenditure on the Technical School and grants-in-aid to other special institutions, free reading-rooms etc. are given in Appendix II. Details of increase and decrease under each sub-head are given below :—

##### *Technical School Establishment :—*

This item shows an increase of Rs. 108-13-0 which is due to the promotion of teachers on the staff of this school for teaching additional subjects according to the revised curriculum of the school.

##### *Technical School Contingency :—*

This item shows a decrease of Rs. 8-3-5.

##### *Machinery :—*

Due to the purchase of the following machinery, viz. 2 lathes, one marble switch board, one Field Revostate, eight bench vises, one anvil and one surface plate, there is an increase of Rs. 1501-13-6.

##### *Engines and Machine Repairs :—*

This item shows an increase of Rs. 144-8-10.

##### *Municipal grant-in-aid to special Institutions and Free reading Rooms :—*

There is an increase of Rs. 1343-6-6.

## GENERAL REMARKS.

1. *Requirements of the Technical School* :—

One of the principal requirements of the Technical School is more accommodation in the form of a spacious yard to carry out the increased activities of the various departments. For this purpose the proposals to acquire the neighbouring house Nos. 624 and 625 have been sanctioned by the General Body in their resolution No. 287 of 20-12-27 and No. 367 of 27-3-28, but my committee regrets to find that no further steps have been taken to expedite the acquisitions that have already been sanctioned. My committee has to draw special attention to this much-needed but long-delayed acquisition which if completed immediately would give wide facilities to the activities of the Technical School.

I myself visited and inspected the following reading-rooms and libraries. In my inspection I found the 'Nagar Vachan Mandir', 'Marathi Grantha Sangrahalaya', 'Shree Shahu Chattrapati Mofat Vachanalaya', 'Depressed Class Mission Vachanalaya', 'Parvati Mophat Vachanalaya' and the 'Jewish Reading Rooms' as ideal institutions which deserve even better help at the hands of our Municipality. I have accordingly recommended additional grants to some of these institutions in the ensuing budget for the next year. With regard to other institutions and libraries all through I was convinced that they were rendering useful services to the residents of the respective localities in which they are situated. I was not satisfied with the general management and the state of the accounts of many of them. I should like to suggest that the Municipality should make it a condition before renewing the annual grant to these institutions that they should obtain a certificate from a qualified and certified auditor regarding the satisfactory condition of their accounts for the previous year. On the ground of general mismanagement and unsatisfactory state of accounts, I have discontinued the grant for the 'One Pice Vachanalaya' institution.

One of the branches under the heading of general education allotted to the administration of the Schools Committee is commerce. Formerly there was only one school recognised and aided by this committee, namely, the one known as the 'Deccan Institute of Commerce' conducted by Mr. Bhopatkar. I found during my inspection that there was another institution known as the 'Poona Institute of Commerce' conducted by Mr. Ketkar, and I found it was doing useful service in the direction of commercial education. I was able to help the institution by allotting a grant of Rs. 250 for the commercial reading-room out of the surplus found at the disposal of the committee out of the current year's grants. Mr. Bhopatkar's suggestion is that the School of Commerce should be affiliated to the Municipal Technical School, thus starting a new branch of Techno-Commercial education. This proposed affiliation should be seriously considered by the next committee. A student, instead of coming out with merely technical education, will certainly be better fitted to face the present struggle for existence if he is equipped with some knowledge of Commerce side by side with the technical knowledge.

Another important matter, to which my Committee desires to draw the attention of the Municipality is to the present unsatisfactory state of affairs of the School for the Blind and the School for the Dumb and the Deaf. I can

see that both the schools were rendering excellent humanitarian service to the helpless blind, dumb and deaf of the City. The principal disability under which both the Schools are labouring is want of 'proper accomodation for holding their classes. Both the schools meet at present in 'Khajgiwala's Wada' which is principally meant for municipal boys' school No. 1. To my mind it is a strange division of administration in as much as the school for the dumb and the deaf is controlled by the schools committee, while the school for the blind is under the administration of the School Board. I should like to suggest that both the schools be amalgamated into one institution and that the municipality should provide an independent building with accomodation for boarding and lodging together in the same building in which should be held their classes. It is highly inconvenient and dangerous for the blind and the deaf students to run through crowded thoroughfares in order to attend their classes daily.

The following resolution was recorded by the Schools Committee at the time of the ending of the official year:—'That the Schools Committee feels great pleasure to place on record their sense of appreciation of the satisfactory work done by Mr. R. T. Sathe, Superintendent, Technical School, and the Secretary, Schools Committee during the year.'

2. *Grant-in-aid to special Institutions and Free reading rooms:—*

The Schools Committee appointed a sub-committee to inspect the special Institutions and reading rooms whose managers had applied for municipal grant and to recommend the amounts of municipal grants to them. The recommendations of this sub-committee were sanctioned by the Schools Committee and municipal grants amounting to Rs. 7900-0-0 were paid to these Institutions during the year under review.

In conclusion, I cannot complete the report without expressing my heart-felt, thanks for the excellent help and co-operation rendered to me by my colleagues, especially Subedar Ghatge and Mr. Shinde.
