## EXPLANATORY NOTE

### TO THE TRADE VOLUME OF THE PRESIDENCY OF BOMBAY.

**Nature of the Trade Recorded.**—The trade dealt with in these accounts is that of the Port of Bombay and of the subordinate ports of the Bombay Presidency.

The Foreign and the Coasting trade of ports in Native States of the Presidency is not recorded and is therefore not included in these accounts.

Indian ports are not transshipment centres for foreign countries to any considerable extent; the trade returns do not take such transshipments into account and they, therefore, do not figure in these tables.

The volume is divided into three parts:—

Part I—(Foreign Trade)—contains tables relating to trade of the Bombay Presidency with foreign countries.

Part II—(Coasting Trade)—contains tables relating to trade between the Bombay ports and other British Indian ports as well as with ports which, although Indian, are not British Indian.

Part III—(Shipping, Foreign and Coasting)—contains tables relating to shipping, both foreign and coasting.

### PART I (FOREIGN TRADE).

**Explanation of Imports and Exports.**—The accounts of both imports and exports are exclusive of foreign merchandise transhipped at ports within the Presidency of Bombay.

The import tables record the quantity and value of goods landed, whether they are intended for home consumption, bonding or re-exportation.

Re-exports of foreign merchandise as distinguished from exports of Indian merchandise are recorded separately.

Only so much of passengers' baggage as is dutiable is included.

Imports and exports from and to foreign countries by parcel post are included, but, with certain exceptions, the contents of foreign registered letters received are not included. Registered letters exported are also not included.

Imports and exports of gold and silver, coin and bullion, are recorded separately and are not included in the figures of merchandise.

Imports and exports of Government stores are also dealt with separately.

**Quantities and Values.**—The statements of both quantities and values are based on the declarations of importers and exporters in bills of entry and shipping bills as subsequently checked by the Customs officials. The quantity of goods imported and exported is recorded so far as it is possible to do so. In most cases the quantity is recorded by weight, though, in certain instances, the quantities are recorded by number or by gallons, or by yards. When weight is the prescribed denomination different units (tons, cwt., lb. and oz.) are specified according to the nature of the various articles and trade practice. The weight recorded is the net weight of the goods, *i. e.*, not including the weight of the covers or receptacles in which the goods are packed. According to the provisions of the Indian Sea Customs Act the values of goods imported or exported represent:—

(a) the wholesale cash price less trade discount for which goods of the like kind and quality are sold or are capable of being sold at the time and place of importation or exportation as the case may be without any abatement or deduction whatever except (in the case of goods imported) of the amount of the duties payable on the importation thereof; or

(b) where such price is not ascertainable the cost at which goods of the like kind and quality could be delivered at such place without any abatement or deduction except as aforesaid.

**Classification of the Trade by Countries.**—Imports are classified as received from the countries whence they were shipped direct to Bombay. This, when transshipment takes place, means the place of transshipment and not the original port of despatch except in the case of goods received on a through bill of lading which are ordinarily credited to the country containing the port at which the bill of lading was given. Through bills of lading, however, are by no means generally granted and in consequence a large proportion of the merchandise which has its origin or is purchased in one country and is shipped to India from a port belonging to another is credited neither to the country of production nor to the country of original consignment both of which differ from the country of direct shipment. Exports are ordinarily credited to the country containing the port of destination as declared by the exporters in the shipping bills, whether carried there direct or after transshipment. Since 1903-04 exporters have been required to give information as soon after shipment as it is obtainable as to the actual destination of goods consigned to Port Said to await orders for delivery in ports beyond the Suez Canal. The distribution of the exports among European countries is thus recorded with greater exactness, but it is still imperfect and much of the trade shown as to or from Holland or Belgium is in reality trade with Germany. The distribution of trade among Eastern countries is, however, far more imperfect; most of the large traffic shown as trade with Hongkong is in reality trade with China, though some of it is with Japan, the Philippines and America and a large portion of the trade assigned to the Straits Settlements is really trade with the Far East. Colombo (Ceylon) and Aden are also *entrepôts* of trade, and a considerable proportion of the goods despatched to or received from those ports represents trade in transit to other countries.

**Outline of Tables included and Arrangement of Articles.**—In this part there are 18 tables showing the trade of the Presidency, the Chief Port (Bombay) and the subordinate ports with foreign countries.

In all tables (tables 3, 4 and 14 to 18-3) where trade is shown according to countries, the countries included in the British Empire have been grouped separately from Foreign Countries. (A complete list of all the countries, the trade with which is separately recorded, is attached to this note.)

In tables 5 to 7-A and 16 to 18-3 articles of trade are grouped under the following main heads :—

- I.—Animals, living.
- II.—Articles of Food and Drink.
- III.—Metals and Manufactures of Metals.
- IV.—Chemicals, Drugs, Medicines and Narcotics and Dyeing and Tanning Materials.
- V.—Oils.
- VI.—Raw Materials and Unmanufactured Articles.
- VII.—Articles, Manufactured and partly Manufactured.

The sub-heads and items specified thereunder are in alphabetical order. (A complete list of all the items specified is attached to this note.)

The term "Indian Merchandise" comprises all goods which are the growth or manufacture of India. Indian merchandise is distinguished from British or foreign merchandise in the declarations of shippers made in the shipping bills from which the trade statistics are compiled.

Tables 1 and 1-A are abstracts of total values of merchandise and treasure imported and exported for the whole Presidency with the share of the Chief Port (Bombay) and that of the subordinate ports exhibited separately.

Table 2 gives abstract total values of Government stores and treasure imported and exported for the whole Presidency and its Chief Port (Bombay) separately.

Tables 3 and 4 show the value of the import and export trade respectively of the Presidency with each country, the share of the subordinate ports being shown separately under each country.

Tables 5, 6 and 7 are abstracts of trade of the Chief Port (Bombay), while tables 5-A, 6-A and 7-A show figures of the subordinate ports taken together for a period of five years. In these tables figures are shown under a major, subordinate or detailed head only in those cases in which the total value is not less than one l  kh of rupees.

Tables 8 to 11 deal with Customs Duty collections, Refunds and Drawbacks, the articles in tables 9 to 11 being arranged in accordance with the latest tariff schedules.

Table 12 shows the value of such dutiable articles in alphabetical order as have been passed free for specific institutions or individuals.

Table 13 gives the quantities of dutiable articles remaining in bond at the end of the year.

Tables 14 and 15 deal with the imports and exports of treasure, private and Government.

General tables 16 and 17 detail the particulars for a period of five years of imports and exports of private merchandise and Government stores from and to each foreign country for the Presidency as a whole, the trade with the different countries being detailed under each article. In these tables, where there are two or more countries with which the trade is unimportant, *i. e.*, with a value of less than Rs. 1,000 in each case, the countries have been grouped under the head "Other Countries." Also, when the value of the trade under any major, subordinate or detailed head "is less than Rs. 1,000," it has been merged in the case of major heads in the head "All other Articles," and in the case of subordinate or detailed heads, in the sub-head "Other Sorts," under the major or sub-head unless special reasons exist for specifying it separately.

The details of trade with each country are shown in table 18, which is divided into three parts, 18-1 showing imports from each foreign country, 18-2 exports of foreign merchandise, and 18-3 exports of Indian merchandise thereto, the articles being arranged according to the seven main heads. Only those countries are exhibited, the value of the trade with which is of a l  kh of rupees or more, and only those articles, the trade in which under each major head is not less than Rs. 10,000.

**Changes in the form of the Accounts.**—The form of the accounts has been revised since 1906-07 in accordance with the instructions issued by the Government of India acting upon the recommendations of the Committee appointed to revise the Indian Trade Statistics in 1905.

The following are the most important changes that have been made in Part I:—

I. In all tables where trade is shown according to countries, the countries included in the British Empire have been grouped separately from Foreign Countries.

II. In tables 5, 6 and 7, separate figures for the Chief Port, Bombay, have been substituted for the previous tables showing the transactions of the Presidency as a whole.

III. Tables, 5-A, 6-A and 7-A have been inserted showing the combined trade of the subordinate ports for five years.

IV. Tables 16 and 17 have been expanded so as to show the transactions with each country in each article for each of the past five years.

V. In table 18 articles have been arranged according to the seven main heads.

## PART II (COASTING TRADE).

**The Nature of the Trade Recorded.**—The trade dealt with in this part is the trade of the British ports within the Presidency of Bombay—the Chief Port and the subordinate ports) with one another and with other ports in India.

**Explanation of Imports and Exports.**—The accounts of both imports and exports are exclusive of merchandise transhipped at Customs ports in the Presidency, postal transactions and Government stores.

Only so much of the passengers' baggage as is dutiable is included.

Imports and exports of gold and silver, coin and bullion, are recorded separately and are not included in the figures of merchandise.

For both imports and exports "Foreign Merchandise" is distinguished from "Indian Merchandise." The latter term comprises all goods which are of the growth, produce or manufacture of India.

**Quantities and Values.**—Quantities and values are based on the definitions given in Part I except that in the Coasting trade Customs and Excise duties previously paid are for statistical purposes included in the value of the goods exported and imported.

**Outline of Tables included and Arrangement of Articles.**—There are 11 tables in this part in all of which the articles are arranged alphabetically.

Tables 1 and 1-A respectively give the abstract total value of the trade of the Presidency and of each of the subordinate ports.

Tables 2 and 2-A exhibit the total values of interchanges of trade within the Presidency and with other maritime provinces in India, the particulars being given in 2-A (trade of all the subordinate ports combined) for a period of five years with details for each subordinate port for one year.

Tables 3 to 6, 3-A, B, C, D to 6-A, B, C, D and 3-E to 6-E show abstracts of imports and exports of country produce and foreign merchandise respectively for the Chief Port, for each of those subordinate ports (namely, Honavar, Trombay Uran and Broach) at which the average total value of the annual Coasting trade (imports and exports combined) is not less than Rs. 50 lakhs and for all other subordinate ports taken together where in each case the combined total value is less than Rs. 50 lakhs. In these tables articles having a trade of less than one lakh of rupees in value for each major, subordinate or detailed head are shown in lump.

Tables 7 to 10 detail the particulars of imports and exports of country produce and foreign merchandise of the Presidency with (1) British ports in other Presidencies, (2) British ports within the Presidency, and (3) Indian ports not British, specifying those provinces under each article, the trade in which amounts to Rs. 10,000, the detailed or sub-heads with a smaller value being merged in the subordinate or major head, as the case may be.

Table 11 shows imports and exports of treasure (private and Government) coastwise.

**Changes in the form of the Accounts.**—The following are the important changes that have been made in Part II since 1906-07.

Table 2.—Total values of interchanges of trade of the Chief Port, Bombay, with the subordinate ports of the Presidency and with other maritime provinces in India are shown separately for a period of five years.

Tables 3 to 6 show the trade of the Chief Port (Bombay) instead of the Presidency as in former volumes.

Tables 3-A to 6-E are inserted to show separately the trade of the subordinate ports for a period of five years.

Tables 7 to 10 are expanded to show transactions for each of the past five years.

### PART III (SHIPPING).

**The Nature of the Statistics Recorded.**—These statistics deal with the shipping which entered and cleared at Bombay and the subordinate ports of the Presidency during the year.

An explanation of the manner of registration of the vessels entered and cleared, and definitions of the several classes of ships, are given in the notes appended.

**Arrangement of the Tables.**—Tables 1 to 9 contain particulars of the tonnage of vessels engaged in the Foreign trade and tables 10 to 14 of vessels engaged in Coasting trade, *i. e.*, trade with Indian ports, British and non-British.

The total number and tonnage of vessels arriving from and clearing to foreign countries are given in table 1 while the shipping of the port of Bombay is shown separately in table 1-A. Tables 2 and 3 exhibit the amount of shipping which traded with the different countries and tables 4 and 5 give the nationalities of the vessels engaged, for a period of five years, while tables 6 to 9 show the tonnage of the vessels of each nationality engaged in trade with each country for one year.

The total tonnage of the shipping engaged in the Coasting trade is exhibited in table 10, while tables 11 and 12 show the tonnage of the coasting vessels (with cargoes) of each nationality engaged in the trade with each Presidency. Table 13 shows the number of vessels built at each port, and 14 the number of vessels first registered at each port under the English and Indian Merchant Shipping Acts.

In these tables separate figures are shown for steam and sailing vessels as well as for vessels which entered and cleared with cargo and in ballast.

## SHIPPING.

**Explanation of the manner of registration of the vessels entered and cleared.**—In the case of a vessel arriving from or clearing to more than one British Indian or foreign port (including foreign Indian ports), she is registered as follows:—

It should be mentioned that nearly all the vessels shown as having cleared for Egypt are vessels which merely call at Port Said "for orders" and are destined for various ports in Europe.

The tonnage recorded in these accounts is the "registered" tonnage of a vessel.

His Majesty's Ships of War, pleasure yachts, steam boats and launches are not included in the shipping tables.

**Definitions of the several classes of ships.**—Separate figures are given for the following classes of ships:—

**British.**—Steamers and square-rigged sailing vessels, flying the British flag and registered under the English Merchant Shipping Act of 1894, in any port in the United Kingdom or in a British Possession other than British India.

**British Indian.**—Steamers and square-rigged sailing vessels, flying the British flag and registered under the Indian Merchant Shipping Act, X of 1841, or other enactment\* for the time being in force for the registration of ships in British India.

\* Such as the English Merchant Shipping Act of 1894.

*Native Craft—*

- (i) *British*.—Sailing vessels not square-rigged, flying the British flag but not belonging to any ports in British India or in Native States.
- (ii) *British Indian*.—Sailing vessels not square-rigged belonging to ports in British India or in Native States.
- (iii) *Foreign*.—Sailing vessels not square-rigged, flying a flag other than the British flag or that of a Native State.

*Foreign*.—Steamers and square-rigged sailing vessels flying a flag other than the British flag.

The particular nationality of all steamers and square-rigged vessels falling under class "Foreign" is shown separately in the Foreign trade only. In the case of Native Craft falling under class (iii) *Foreign*, the figures for all nationalities are grouped together in the Foreign as well as the Coasting trade.
