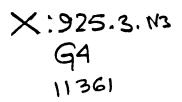

### SERIES FOREWORD

With this volume, Industrial Relations Counselors, Inc., begins a series of studies on the administrative aspect of public employment services and unemployment insurance in several countries. When the series was projected in 1932, it appeared probable that enabling legislation would soon be passed by Congress and that the federal and state departments of labor would confront the task of organizing a federal-state system of employment offices. Now that the United States Employment Service is being organized under the Wagner-Peyser Act, passed in 1933, it is hoped that the series will have practical value for the system's organisers and administrators, as well as for business executives, labor officials, and others concerned with its social significance.

At first the series was planned to deal almost entirely with the placing function of public employment services. However, with the growing interest in unemployment insurance in this country it seemed important, especially as this form of social insurance is administered in large part by placing organizations, that provision should be made for some treatment of its administrative phase. The Unemployment Advisory Committee of the Social Science Research Council was mainly responsible for this change in the original plan of work.

The authors of the volume appearing herewith speak with authority on their subject by reason of their experience and present positions in the British Ministry of Labour. Mr. Chegwidden entered the permanent civil service in 1919 in the Ministry of Labour. He has been private secretary to four successive Ministers of Labour and since February, 1928, has been Principal Officer in the Employment and Training Department responsible for the administration of the Labour Exchanges Act, 1909, in respect of adults. Mr. Myrddin-Evans entered the permanent civil service at the Treasury in 1920. In 1929 he transferred to the Ministry of Labour as Principal Officer in the Employment and Training Department responsible for general questions on employment and unemployment and decasualisation. The volume is being published in a separate edition in Great Britain, from pages set up in the United States, and there have been many compromises in the effort to make the text acceptable to readers in both countries.

Volume II, of which Dr. Oscar Weigert, formerly with the Reichsarbeitsministerium, is the author, will deal with the administration of the employment exchange and unemployment insurance system of Germany. It will follow in a few months.

### FOREWORD

As President of the Board of Trade, it was my duty in May, 1909, to introduce the Labour Exchanges Bill into the House of Commons and to secure its passage into law. The objects of the Bill, as I explained in a speech which I made in Parliament on the 19th May, were to secure the more efficient organisation of the labour market, to increase the mobility of labour and, in the words of the Royal Commission on the Poor Laws which presented its report in 1909, to mitigate "the misery of tramping after problematical work," and last, but not least, to constitute machinery indispensable to the proper administration of a system of unemployment insurance.

Twenty-two years have passed since the first Employment Exchanges (or Labour Exchanges as they were originally called) were established —years of stress and strain unimagined by those who devised the scheme.

At the time of their establishment few people could have anticipated the rapidity and extent of their development or the volume and complexity of the problems with which they would have to deal. Within a short time they were plunged into the maelstrom of Government activities consequent upon the European War and played a considerable part in the recruitment and selection of personnel for all branches of the national services, combatant and civilian. In 1919 they were called upon to take a large share in the administration of some of the most intricate problems of the demobilisation period; while only a year later the unemployment insurance scheme, which hitherto had applied to only a relatively small number of industries, was expanded so as to cover the great majority of the wage-earning population. The first steps had scarcely been taken to launch this expanded scheme of social insurance before the depression of 1921 was upon the country, and since that year the Exchanges have been involved in all the multifarious measures and activities to which Governments have had recourse in dealing with an unemployment problem represented by a live register which (except for two successive weeks in 1926) has never fallen below one million and which for more than three years now has been above two million.

How triumphantly the Exchange system survived the gruelling test to which it was so soon submitted, and how successfully it has achieved the objects for which it was designed, the following pages demonstrate in a manner which cannot fail to carry conviction.

### FOREWORD

Throughout the vicissitudes of the war and post-war years the Exchange system has adapted itself to the needs of the time; as its first duties have increased in volume and new duties have been added, the system has necessarily expanded and today covers the whole country and in some way or another touches the lives of the vast majority of the inhabitants of Great Britain.

The information which the authors give about the composition of the industrial population, the movement of labour and the re-orientation of industry during recent years could hardly have been collected in the absence of the Employment Exchange system; still less could the urgent problem of the redistribution of the surplus population of the areas which were left high and dry by the shifting tide of industry have been handled without them.

, But the future of the Exchange system does not depend upon its utility in times of emergency. It has a contribution of the first importance to make towards the more efficient organisation of industry and commerce by the opportunity which it gives for the substitution of rational and scientific methods of labour engagement for the haphazard and unregulated methods which, although still too prevalent, are happily dying out. That the value of the Service from this point of view is being more widely recognised is shewn by the rapid increase in recent years in the number of vacant situations filled, which in 1933 reached the high figure of over two million.

I can confidently recommend the study of this volume not only to the student of economic and social affairs, but also to the British business man who is not aware of the valuable services which are ready to his hand, without charge, if he will but make use of them.

In conclusion, we desire to acknowledge our indebtedness to the Controller of His Majesty's Stationery Office for his courtesy in permitting us to make use of and in some cases to reproduce material derived from official publications.

#### LABOUR EXCHANGES ACT, 1909<sup>1</sup>

An Act to provide for the establishment of Labour Exchanges and for other purposes incidental thereto. (20th September, 1909)

Be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

#### Power of Board of Trade to Establish Labour Exchanges and to Collect and Furnish Information

1. (1) The Board of Trade<sup>2</sup> may establish and maintain, in such places as they think fit, labour exchanges, and may assist any labour exchanges maintained by any other authorities or persons, and in the exercise of those powers may, if they think fit, co-operate with any other authorities or persons having powers for the purpose.

(2) The Board of Trade may also, by such other means as they think fit, collect and furnish information as to employers requiring workpeople and workpeople seeking engagement or employment.

(3) The Board of Trade may take over any labour exchange (whether established before or after the passing of this Act) by agreement with the Authority or person by whom the labour exchange is maintained, and any such authority or person shall have power to transfer it to the Board of Trade for the purposes of this Act.

(4) The powers of any central body or distress committee, and the powers of any council through a special committee, to establish or maintain, under the Unemployed Workmen Act, 1905, a labour exchange or employment register shall, after the expiration of one year from the commencement of this Act, not be exercised except with the sanction of, and subject to any conditions imposed by, the Local Government Board for England, Scotland, or Ireland, as the case may require, and that sanction shall not be given except after consultation with the Board of Trade.

#### REGULATIONS AND MANAGEMENT

2. (1) The Board of Trade may make general regulations with respect to the management of labour exchanges established or assisted under this Act, and otherwise with respect to the exercise of their powers under this Act, and such regulations may, subject to the approval of the Treasury, authorise advances to be made by way of loan towards meeting the expenses of workpeople travelling to places where employment has been found for them through a labour exchange.

(2) The regulations shall provide that no person shall suffer any disqualification or be otherwise prejudiced on account of refusing to accept employment found for him through a labour exchange where the ground of refusal is that a trade dispute which affects his trade exists, or that the wages offered are lower than those current in the trade in the district where the employment is found.

(3) Any general regulations made under this section shall have effect as if enacted in this Act, but shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament as soon as may be after they are made, and, if either House of Parliament within the next forty days during the session of Parliament after any regulations have been so laid before that House resolves that the regulations or any of them ought to be annulled, the regulations or those to which the resolution applies shall, after the date of such resolution, be of no effect, without prejudice to the validity of anything done in the meantime under the regulations or to the making of any new regulations.

(4) Subject to any such regulations, the powers of the Board of Trade under this Act shall be exercised in such manner as the Board of Trade may direct.

(5) The Board of Trade may, in such cases as they think fit, establish advisory committees for the purpose of giving the Board advice and assistance in connexion with the management of any labour exchange.

#### PENALTIES FOR MAKING FALSE STATEMENTS, ETC.

3. If any person knowingly makes any false statement or false representation to any officer of a labour exchange established under this Act, or to any person acting for or for the purposes of any such labour exchange, for the purpose of obtaining employment or procuring workpeople, that person shall be liable in respect of each offence on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

#### APPENDIX II

#### EXPENSES OF THE BOARD OF TRADE

4. The Board of Trade may appoint such officers and servants for the purposes of this Act as the Board may, with the sanction of the Treasury, determine, and there shall be paid out of moneys provided by Parliament to such officers and servants such salaries or remuneration as the Treasury may determine, and any expenses incurred by the Board of Trade in carrying this Act into effect, including the payment of travelling and other allowances to members of advisory committees and other expenses in connexion therewith, to such amount as may be sanctioned by the Treasury, shall be defrayed out of moneys provided by Parliament.

#### INTERPRETATION

5. In this Act the expression "labour exchange"<sup>3</sup> means any office or place used for the purpose of collecting and furnishing information, either by the keeping of registers or otherwise, respecting employers who desire to engage workpeople and workpeople who seek engagement or employment.

#### SHORT TITLE

6. This Act may be cited as the Labour Exchanges Act, 1909.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS

Dated January 28, 1910, made by the Board of Trade in pursuance of Section 2 of the Labour Exchanges Act, 1909, for Labour Exchanges managed by the Board of Trade (S.R.O. No. 800 of 1910).

#### REGISTRATION OF APPLICANTS FOR EMPLOYMENT

I. (1) Applicants for employment through a labour exchange shall register and shall renew their registration there in person, if they reside within three miles of the exchange or within such other distance as the Board of Trade may direct from time to time, either generally or as regards any specified district or class of applicants.

(2) In the case of applicants not residing within the above limit of distance, the officer in charge of the labour exchange may accept registration or renewal of registration through the post.

(3) Applicants shall register upon a form containing the particulars set forth in the First Schedule hereto, subject to such modifications as may be made by the Board of Trade from time to time, either generally or as regards any specified district or trade or class of applicants.

(4) The above regulations shall not apply to juvenile applicants.

#### PERIOD OF REGISTRATION

II. Registration of applications for employment shall hold good for seven days from the date of registration or for such other period as the Board of Trade may from time to time direct either generally or as regards any specified district or trade or class of applicants, but may be renewed within that period for a like period and so on from time to time.

#### STRIKES AND LOCK-OUTS

III. (1) Any association of employers or workmen may file at a labour exchange a statement with regard to the existence of a strike or lock-out affecting their trade in the district. Any such statement shall be in the form set out in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall be signed by a person authorised by the association for the purpose. Such statement shall be confidential except as hereinafter provided, and shall only be in force for seven days from the date of filing, but may be renewed within that period for a like period and so on from time to time.

(2) If any employer who appears to be affected by a statement so filed notifies to a labour exchange a vacancy or vacancies for workmen

of the class affected, the officer in charge shall inform him of the statement that has been filed, and give him an opportunity of making a written statement thereon. The officer in charge in notifying any such vacancies to any applicant for employment shall also inform him of the statements that have been received.

#### WAGES AND CONDITIONS

IV. (1) The officer in charge of a labour exchange in notifying applications for employment and vacancies to employers and applicants respectively shall undertake no responsibility with regard to wages or other conditions, beyond supplying the employer or applicant as the case may be, with any information in his possession as to the rate of wages desired or offered.

(2) Copies or summaries of any agreements mutually arranged between associations of employers and workmen for the regulation of wages or other conditions of labour in any trade may, with the consent of the various parties to such agreements, be filed at a labour exchange, and any published rules made by public authorities with regard to like matters may also be filed. Documents so filed shall be open to inspection on application.

(3) No person shall suffer any disqualification or be otherwise prejudiced on account of refusing to accept employment found for him through a labour exchange where the ground of refusal is that a trade dispute which affects his trade exists or that the wages offered are lower than those current in the trade in the district where the employment is found.

#### Advance of Travelling Expenses

V. (1) Where an applicant for employment has been engaged through a labour exchange at which he is registered to take up employment at any place removed from the exchange or from his ordinary residence by more than five miles by the quickest route, or by such other distance as the Board of Trade may direct from time to time, either generally or as regards any specified district, the officer in charge may, at his discretion, make an advance to the applicant towards meeting the expenses of travelling to the place of employment.

(2) The advance may be made at the request either of the employer or of the applicant. The person at whose request the advance is made shall give such undertaking with respect to the repayment of the advance as the Board of Trade, with the consent of the Treasury, may from time to time prescribe either generally or as regards any specified district or class of applicants.

(3) No advance shall be made where the officer in charge has reason to believe that the employment falls within the terms of Regulation IV(3) hereof.

(4) In making advances care shall be taken to avoid unduly encouraging rural labourers to migrate from the country to the towns or between Great Britain and Ireland.

(5) The advance shall not exceed the amount required to defray the applicant's fare to the place of employment, and will be made by the provision of a ticket or pass, or, in exceptional circumstances, in cash.

#### EMPLOYMENT OUTSIDE THE BRITISH ISLES

VI. The officer in charge of a labour exchange shall consult the central office<sup>1</sup> in London before notifying to applicants for employment vacancies at any place outside the British Isles.

VII. (This Regulation is now repealed).

# GRANT OF ACCOMMODATION WITHIN THE PREMISES OF A LABOUR EXCHANGE

VIII. (1) (This Regulation is now repealed).

(2) In the case of labour exchanges which were in operation before the passing of the Labour Exchanges Act, 1909, existing arrangements with regard to accommodation may be allowed to continue except in so far as they may be modified or cancelled hereafter.

### JUVENILE EMPLOYMENT

IX. Subject to these regulations, special rules may be made from time to time by the Board of Trade, after consulting the Board of Education so far as regards England and Wales and the Scottish Education Department so far as regards Scotland, and the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland so far as regards Ireland, with respect to the registration of juvenile applicants for employment; that is to say, applicants under the age of 17 or such other limit as the Board may fix,<sup>3</sup> either generally or as regards any specified district or trade or class of applicants.

The Board of Trade make these regulations by virtue of the power conferred upon them by section 2, sub-section 1, of the Labour Exchanges Act, 1909.

APPENDIX IV

## DESCRIPTION OF THE PRINCIPAL RETURNS AND REPORTS

The Employment Exchanges furnish to the Divisional Offices and Headquarters of the Ministry of Labour a large number of periodical statistical returns and narrative reports. Some of these are for the purpose of supplying the Government with information, for instance regarding employment and unemployment in different industries and occupations and in different parts of the country, while others form part of the Department's machinery for the performance of certain of its functions. Others, again, are control returns. The principal returns and reports are described below:

#### A. ANNUAL COUNT OF INSURED PERSONS

Unemployment books are current for a period of twelve months, that is, an insurance year, and are withdrawn in July of each year and exchanged through the Local Offices for books proper to the new insurance year. Returns are rendered shewing the numbers of books exchanged and subdivided into books held by men, young men (eighteen to twenty), women, young women (eighteen to twenty), boys and girls, and, according to industry code letters on the book, into 102 different industry groups according to the business of the holder's actual or last employer. Combining these returns from all Local Offices, it is possible, once a year, to obtain the total insured population of the country and its composition by sex, by adults and juveniles, and by industries.

## B. RETURNS OF NUMBER OF PERSONS UNEMPLOYED AND THEIR CLASSI-FICATION INTO VARIOUS CATEGORIES

#### 1. COUNT OF THE LIVE REGISTER

On a Monday toward the end of every month, each Local Office renders a return shewing the number of persons on its live register, that is, the number of unemployed persons registered at the Exchange for employment (including both claimants and non-claimants). Separate figures are given in respect of persons wholly unemployed, persons temporarily stopped (that is, working short time or suspended from work on the understanding that they were shortly to return to their former employment) and persons normally employed in casual employment.

This return and another, taken together, enable the register to be

divided also into claimants for unemployment benefit, with claims allowed, under consideration, or disallowed respectively, and persons not claiming benefit: separate figures are given for persons disqualified for the receipt of benefit owing to participation or interest in a trade dispute. In each category, separate figures are given for men and women, aged eighteen to twenty and twenty-one and over, and for boys and girls.

It should be noted that this count includes persons not insured under the Unemployment Insurance Acts as well as insured persons.

#### 2. INDUSTRIAL ANALYSIS OF INSURED PERSONS RECORDED AS UNEMPLOYED

On the same date as that on which the count of the live register is taken, a return is rendered shewing the number of insured persons in each of the industrial groups referred to under "A" above recorded as unemployed. The number for each industry is subdivided by men, young men (eighteen to twenty), women, young women (eighteen to twenty), boys and girls, and within these groups, into wholly unemployed, temporarily stopped and persons normally in casual employment. As a result, there is available, for one date in every month, the number of insured persons unemployed in Great Britain in 102 separate industry groups, subdivided into the categories mentioned above.

#### 3. ANALYSIS OF THE LIVE REGISTER SHEWING DURATION OF UNEMPLOYMENT

A monthly return is furnished analysing the wholly unemployed claimants on the live register at the date of the count in each month according to the date on which they last came on the register. From these returns, it is possible to ascertain, every month, the number of persons who have been continuously unemployed for varying periods, that is, less than one month, one to two months, two to three months, three to six months, nine to twelve months, and over twelve months.

#### 4. ANALYSIS OF THE LIVE REGISTER BY OCCUPATIONS

All Local Offices furnish quarterly an analysis by occupations—as distinct from the analysis by industries referred to in "2" above—of the wholly unemployed persons on the live register. In the case of certain industries a similar analysis, but including persons temporarily stopped as well as those wholly unemployed, is furnished monthly.

#### 5. SPECAL ANALYSES BY PLACE OF RESIDENCE

Special analyses of unemployed persons according to place of residence are furnished quarterly for use in connection with the allocation between Local Authorities of grant from the Exchequer in respect of certain services administered by them.

#### 6. NARRATIVE REPORTS ON THE EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

Managers of Employment Exchanges forward every month to their Divisional Offices and to the Headquarters of the Ministry narrative reports on the employment situation in the areas covered by their Exchanges, which include information as to the position and prospects in the principal local industries. The information contained in these reports, together with such other relevant facts as are within the knowledge of the Divisional Offices, forms the basis of appreciations of the industrial position within their several Divisions which Divisional Offices furnish to Headquarters monthly. These, in turn, are used in connection with a report on the general industrial position which is prepared at Headquarters every month.

#### C. RETURNS RELATING TO PLACING WORK

#### 1. GENERAL PLACING WORK

a. Returns of Vacancies Notified and Filled: Monthly, half-yearly and yearly returns, in the form shewn in Table 28 (pages 236-39) and Table 29 (pages 240-41), are rendered in respect of men, women, boys and girls respectively, giving the number of vacancies notified and filled in the period covered by the return and the number of vacancies cancelled by the employer who originally notified them.

b. Return of Vacancies Filled by Occupations: All Local Offices furnish monthly progress returns shewing, by broad occupational groups and for all occupations together, the number of vacancies notified and filled in the preceding month. Separate returns are furnished in respect of each of the different departments, that is, men, women and juveniles.

c. Analysis of Vacancy Clearing: In connection with the arrangements for clearing vacancies monthly analyses are furnished in the form shewn in Table 30 (pages 242-44).

d. Narrative Reports: Half-yearly and yearly narrative reports are furnished by Divisional Controllers on the progress of placing work within their Divisions.

Yearly narrative reports are furnished by Divisional Controllers on the progress of placing work in seasonal industries generally. In addition special narrative reports are rendered at the end of the season by the Divisional Controllers principally concerned, on the arrangements made for meeting the seasonal demand for labour for certain industries such as, fruit picking, sugar beet lifting or seasonal work at holiday resorts.

#### 2. REPORTS IN CONNECTION WITH JUVENILE WORK

In connection with the work of Juvenile Advisory Committee monthly statistical reports are prepared in the form shewn in Table 2 (pages 240-41); separate information is given with regard to childre leaving secondary schools. Information is also included as to the numbe of children invited to attend for advice on choice of employment or fo industrial supervision, and the results obtained. An analysis by occu pations of the vacancies filled during the month is also given. Monthly returns of a similar character are rendered by Juvenile Employmen Bureaux of local Education Authorities exercising choice of employmen powers.

All Exchanges prepare and bring up to date every half-year a survey, in narrative form, of the local occupations in which considerable numbers of juveniles are employed, together with information as to the chief features of and prospects in the several occupations. The surver is submitted to the Juvenile Advisory Committee and forms the basi of the information with regard to prospects of juvenile employmen in the various occupations on which, in turn, the advice of the Committee on choice of employment is largely based.

Chairmen of Juvenile Advisory Committees submit to the Head quarters of the Ministry an annual narrative report on the work o their Committees.

#### D. REPORTS IN CONNECTION WITH INDUSTRIAL TRANSFERENCE

Returns shewing the number and types of men becoming available for other employment on the termination of State-assisted relief scheme are forwarded by Local Offices to Divisional Offices as occasion arises a summary of these is prepared daily at Divisional Offices and forwarded to the Central Transfer Clearing House in order that efforts may be made to place these persons in employment on other schemes. Similar reports are rendered in respect of men transferred from depressed areas who have lost employment of a pick and shovel type (not on State assisted relief schemes) either within three months of their transfer or on termination of their first employment after transfer.

Local Offices in non-depressed areas furnish quarterly returns an alysing by Local Office of origin the persons from depressed areas place in employment in their areas. Divisional Offices render to the Centra Transfer Clearing House a weekly return of vacancies filled by men transferred from depressed areas, the men being analysed according to their origin (for example, whether they came direct from a depressed area or were available on termination of other employment) and to

the type of work on which they were placed (such as, heavy pick and shovel work or lighter labouring work, and whether on State-assisted schemes or otherwise).

## E. RETURNS OF NUMBERS OF MEN EMPLOYED ON CERTAIN TYPES OF WORKS

Local Offices in whose areas certain works receiving State financial assistance (such as Unemployment Grants Committee schemes and certain road and bridge schemes assisted by the Ministry of Transport) are being carried on obtain monthly from the authorities concerned information as to the number of men directly employed on the works and forward this to Headquarters. In cases where the employment of a number of men from depressed areas is a condition of grant, returns are secured to enable the Local Office to check the continued fulfilment of the conditions.

#### F. REPORTS IN CONNECTION WITH TRAINING SCHEMES

In connection with Government Training and Instructional Centres weekly reports on the progress of recruitment are forwarded by Local Offices in recruiting areas; similar reports are obtained in connection with recruitment for Women's Training Centres. Managers of centres furnish weekly records of men admitted to and leaving the centres, the latter being analysed to shew the reason for termination of training (for example, whether the man withdrew from the course, and if so, on what grounds, whether he was placed in employment or had found work on his own account). Cases of men placed in employment or who have found work are also analysed in another weekly return rendered by Government Training Centres to shew, in the case of each course of instruction given, the class of work obtained (such as, labourer or semiskilled and in what occupation) and in what district. A quarterly return is also furnished by Government Training Centres, analysing the terminations in each course during the preceding quarter according to the age of the trainee, the length of his course of instruction and the wage obtained.

Managers of Instructional Centres furnish a monthly narrative report on the work of their centres.

## G. TRANSFER OF AND INSTRUCTIONAL CENTRES FOR JUVENILES

Divisional Offices render monthly a return giving particulars regarding juveniles transferred into their Divisions from depressed areas.

In connection with instructional courses for juveniles, local Edu cation Authorities who have organised juvenile instructional centres ( classes furnish weekly returns giving particulars of the number ( hours instruction available during the preceding week and the numbe of juveniles in attendance and for how many hours. Similar returns a rendered monthly by the local Education Authorities or Local Offic concerned in respect of individual unemployed juveniles attending oth instructional courses.

A report is furnished by Divisional Offices to Headquarters qua terly on the prospects of instituting instructional courses in area where they do not, at the time of the report, exist.

H. REPORTS REGARDING WELFARE WORK FOR THE UNEMPLOYED

Local Offices furnish to Divisional Offices and to Headquarters even month a report on such welfare schemes as are in operation in the areas, giving particulars in the case of each separate scheme, of the number of men and women enrolled under the scheme and the average number of each attending daily. These form the basis of narrative r ports on voluntary schemes for the provision of occupation or recreation for the unemployed forwarded by Divisional Offices to Headquarte monthly.

## I. RETURNS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNED PLOYMENT INSURANCE AND TRANSITIONAL PAYMENTS SCHEMES

A large number of reports are rendered in connection with unen ployment insurance, of which the following are among the most in portant:

1. A weekly return shewing the number of fresh and renewal claim to benefit made during the week.

2. A monthly return shewing the number of claims to benefit i vestigated and the results obtained.

3. A monthly report on local work of adjudication on claims, she ing the number of doubtful cases referred to the Local Insurance Offic for decision, the number of cases referred to the Court of Referee the number of sittings of the Court held and the results of the cas considered.

4. A monthly report on the number of claimants interviewed wiregard to title to benefit under various statutory conditions and the number of doubtful cases referred to the Local Insurance Officer f decision.

5. A monthly return shewing action with regard to eligibility f

benefit taken in the case of persons who have left or been dismissed from Government Training Centres.

6. A monthly analysis of applications for transitional payments referred to the local Public Assistance Committee and of the determinations received.

7. A quarterly return of current claims to benefit upon which payment is authorised in respect to adult dependants and children dependants.

In addition to these returns, Local Officers render to the Headquarters of the Finance Department of the Ministry weekly accounts of payments of unemployment benefit and transitional payments. Regular accounts of other receipts and disbursements of official moneys are, of course, also rendered to the Headquarters of the Finance Department.

#### J. STAFF AND ESTABLISHMENT RETURNS

All Local Officers render regular returns to shew their staffing position in relation to the work to be performed, and with regard to a number of other establishment matters. Among these are the following:

1. A weekly return from all Exchanges shewing the volume of each of a number of specified items of work performed at the Local Office in the preceding week, the staff in post and the amount of overtime (if any) worked. Details are given of the staff expected to be in post during the current and next succeeding weeks (that is, allowing for sick and annual leave, etc.) and of any expected variations in the volume of work, and the Manager is expected to state whether he wishes to have sanction for the engagement of additional staff or the dismissal of existing staff working on a temporary basis.

2. Returns shewing the volume of work performed are also furnished by Branch Employment Offices through their parent Exchanges.

3. Regular returns are rendered of overtime worked, sick or special leave taken and of staff becoming due for salary changes.

4. Divisional Offices render to Headquarters monthly reports on the position in their Divisions with regard to buildings.

In addition to these returns, there are a number of periodic returns regarding use of motor transport by Exchange officers, safes and strong rooms, stocks of stationery, typewriters and office equipment, etc.

#### K. MISCELLANEOUS RETURNS AND REPORTS

#### 1. RETAIL PRICES OF FOOD

Local Offices obtain from selected retailers, and furnish to Headquarters monthly, particulars regarding the general retail prices within

their areas of certain specified articles of food of a kind usually bough by the working classes. These reports are used in connection wit the compilation of the Ministry of Labour's index-number of the coof living, which is of considerable importance and enters into a larg number of wage agreements, covering not less than 1,250,000 work people.

#### 2. MOVEMENT OF LABOUR BETWEEN THE COAL MINING AND OTHER INDU TRIES AND RESTRICTION ON THE RECRUITMENT OF COLLIERY LABOU

During the period of the exchange of unemployment books, monthl returns are rendered to Headquarters shewing the number of person found to have transferred from the coal mining industry to other in dustries and vice versa. In the case of the latter, the transfers and analysed according to the eligibility or ineligibility of the workme to take up scheduled colliery employment; where the workpeople as ineligible, information is forwarded to Divisional Offices to shew the results of action taken to secure their dismissal. Summaries of the reports are prepared at Divisional Offices and forwarded to Head quarters.

Local Offices forward to Divisional Offices, and Divisional Offic to Headquarters, monthly summaries of the returns of engagements new entrants and eligible persons rendered by colliery companies with their areas in accordance with the terms of the undertaking.

#### 3. PORT REGISTRATION SCHEMES

Local Offices in whose areas port registration schemes are in opertion furnish monthly reports on the progress of the schemes and the work of the local Port Registration Committee.

4. THE KING'S ROLL SCHEME FOR THE EMPLOYMENT OF DISABLED E: SERVICE MEN

Divisional Offices render to Headquarters monthly particulars enrolment on or removal from the Roll, within their Division, of firm holding the Royal Warrant. Employment Exchanges render quarter a list of firms on the Roll in their areas.

#### 5. RECOVERY OF ADVANCES TO WORKPEOPLE

Exchanges render to Divisional Offices and Divisional Offices Headquarters, monthly progress returns on the recovery of travellin fares advanced to applicants in order to enable them to take up en ployment at a distance from their homes. APPENDIX V

#### TRANSITIONAL PAYMENTS SCHEME

Reference has already been made<sup>1</sup> to the statutory criteria for determining whether a claimant is qualified to claim insurance benefit or to apply for transitional payments, and the procedure for referring applications for such payments to the Public Assistance Authorities for the assessment of need has been described.<sup>2</sup>

The duty of examining applications for transitional payments, conducting such enquiries as may be necessary to ascertain the applicant's resources and assess his need and determining the amount which should be paid to him, devolves by statute upon the Public Assistance Committees of County Councils or County Borough Councils, or Sub-Committees of those Committees. In assessing need, the Committees are directed to consider each case as if it were an application for outdoor relief, under the Poor Law, to be paid in money. No attempt has been made to lay down scales of payment, but the amount which may be determined must not exceed what would otherwise have been payable to the applicant by way of insurance benefit (including dependant's benefit) if he were entitled to it. On the other hand, in the assessment of need, Committees are required by statute:

1. To disregard one-half of any amount payable to an applicant by way of war wounds or disability pension or workmen's compensation;

2. To disregard money and investments treated as capital assets which do not in the aggregate exceed £25, but to regard all such money and investments exceeding that amount, up to £300, as equivalent to a weekly income of one shilling for each complete £25;

3. To take into account the value to the applicant of any interest in the house in which he lives, but to disregard any amount which he might obtain by selling that interest or borrowing upon it as security.

The Minister of Labour has power to supersede any Committee which is not carrying out its duties under the scheme satisfactorily and to arrange for those duties to be performed by persons appointed by him; but he has no power to interfere in the case of any individual applicant by way of altering or referring back any determination made by a Committee (unless it be in excess of the benefit limitation mentioned above).

In order to maintain the distinction between applicants for transitional payments and applicants for poor relief proper, it is laid down

that the former may not be dealt with upon the premises of any Poor Law Institution without the Minister's express sanction. The Public Assistance Authorities may apply to the Minister for reimbursement of all reasonable expenses incurred by them in carrying out their share in the administration of the scheme. These expenses, together with the cost of the transitional payments themselves, and the salaries of any persons appointed by the Minister to carry out the duties of Committees, are charged to the Unemployment Fund, in a separate account, into which the Exchequer pays an equivalent contribution.

The general oversight of the work of the Authorities in connection with the scheme is entrusted to the General Inspectors of the Ministry of Health, and the accounts of their expenditure for the same purpose are likewise subject to audit by the Ministry of Health auditors.

## APPENDIX VI

#### SPECIAL SCHEMES

As is well known, certain industries and occupations—agriculture and private domestic service are the most important—are specifically excluded from the scope of the State unemployment insurance scheme. In addition, the original conception of the scheme allowed for the possibility of other industries, that would otherwise be included, being excepted from the general scheme and permitted to operate schemes of their own, if it appeared that in this way the industry in question could be more satisfactorily provided with insurance against unemployment than under the general scheme. Accordingly, Section 18 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, gave the Minister of Labour power to approve or make a scheme for any industry in regard to which he was satisfied that the condition just mentioned was fulfilled.

This power to approve or make special schemes was suspended in 1921 and again in 1924, and was finally abolished by the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1927; schemes in being at the commencement of the latter Act were, however, permitted to continue in operation. It was originally provided that a contribution should be made from the Exchequer in aid of any special scheme, but this provision was abolished in 1924.

Only two schemes have been approved under these provisions—those for the banking industry (confined to England and Wales) and for the insurance industry respectively. Broadly speaking, the schemes cover all persons within the industries named who would otherwise be insurable under the general scheme. They are administered in each case by a Board consisting of representatives of employers and insured persons within the industry; members of the Board are elected by electoral bodies which are established in accordance with regulations approved by the Minister of Labour. Provisions as to contributions (in each case contributions are payable only by employers) and conditions for the receipt of benefit, which are very similar to those obtaining under the general scheme, are included in the schemes approved by the Minister.

The method of determining claims to benefit is adapted, with unimportant modifications, from the method laid down for claims under the general scheme. Under the Banking Industry Scheme a claim can only be disallowed by a Claims Committee and under the Insurance Industry Scheme by an Appeal Committee, both of which are representative of

the workers and the employers. Where however the trade dispute disqualification applies the Insurance Industry Scheme permits an officer of the Board to disallow a claim subject to an unrestricted right of appeal to the Committee. The decisions of the Insurance Scheme's Committee are given after the claim has been reported on by local Referees representing both sides, and the decisions of the Banking Scheme's Committee are subject to appeal to a local Court of Referees similarly constituted.

The decisions of the Appeal Committee in the case of the Insurance Industry Scheme and the Court of Referees in the case of the Banking Industry Scheme are in general final, but an appeal may be made to the Umpire appointed under the Unemployment Insurance Act (1) by the Board; (2) by the Minister of Labour, in cases in which, in his opinion, a point of general importance is involved, or where some special circumstances exist; (3) by a claimant to whom the Appeal Committee (or in the case of the Banking Industry the Court of Referees) has given leave to appeal, or in any case in which the decision of the Committee or Court is not unanimous; (4) by an association of employed workers of which the claimant is a member. The decision of the Umpire is final.

The day-to-day administration of the schemes, including for example the arrangements for the payment of benefit, is entirely in the hands of the respective Boards, but the Minister of Labour is charged with general responsibility and, by virtue of his power to approve amendments of the schemes, is enabled to exercise strict control over the general provisions of the schemes which, as already indicated, include the conditions for the receipt, and the rates of benefit, the constitution of the Boards, and other matters.

Before approving the schemes, the Minister had to satisfy himself that they provided for benefits not less favourable on the whole than those provided under the general unemployment insurance scheme. The schemes have been amended from time to time, in order to bring them into accord with subsequent unemployment insurance legislation in so far as the latter has improved the position of the insured worker. In practice, the schemes have closely followed the provisions of the various Unemployment Insurance Acts and in some respects have been more favourable than the latter—for example, their rates of benefit have been, in most cases, higher than under the general scheme, and the Banking Industry has not adopted a needs test for transitional payments.

The Minister of Labour has further powers of control; the Boards must give effect to any general direction which he may give after consultation with them; all rules made by the Boards must be approved

by him; questions relating to the scope of the schemes are to be decided by the Minister, subject to appeal to the High Court as provided by Section 10 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920; the Minister may at any time terminate the schemes.

In addition, the Minister exercises a general oversight over the financial aspects of the schemes. He has at all times access to the accounts of the Boards. These accounts must be audited by an auditor approved by the Minister and presented to him by the Boards, and the latter must comply with any directions which the Minister issues regarding the publication of the accounts and the auditor's reports. If he thinks it necessary, the Minister may issue directions, which must be carried out by the Boards, for certain specified steps to be taken to secure the solvency of the insurance funds. He has power to determine the amount which may be applied to the working expenses of the schemes. The Boards may only borrow with his consent and subject to such conditions as he may impose.

One final condition attaching to the schemes should be mentioned. In each case the Board is under obligation to maintain an organisation for placing in employment workpeople insured under the scheme and persons formerly employed in or connected with the industry.
