ADVERTISEMENT.

HE original Collection of the Statutes relating to the Trade of India, and the Government of the British Possessions there, was brought down to the Year 1786 inclusive. Since that period, many Acts have passed the Parliaments of England and Ireland, by which the Trade has been placed on a new footing, the powers of the several Governments in India have been materially enlarged, and the net profits arising from the Trade and Landed Revenues, have been put under specific appropriations. Thus the former Collection was rendered in a manner useless. The Compiler of it has therefore continued the Collection to the year 1793 inclusive, by adding, in the first place, such of the subsequent Acts as related only to the above. subjects, at full length, and by giving the titles and substance of others, which affected the affairs of trade with India only collaterally. He has likewise revised and corrected the several Indexes and Lists of Duties, to make them accord with the new Statutes; and as it is highly probable that further provisions may be hereafter found necessary to be made by Parliament in matters of judicature, both at home and abroad, a chasm is left in the General Index for the convenient infertion of any new heads of judicature under that title. The original Collection of the Statutes for India to 1786 being preserved, such persons as may chuse to have them persected, . may, by the method which has been adopted for introducing the new matter, be furnished with the means of doing it at a small expence. The derangement of order in the pages after 362, was unavoidable; but as the indexes were fortunately made to refer to chapters and fections, and not to the pages, little, if any, inconvenience will refult from that circumstance.

HE relation in which I stand to the Board of Commissioners

S•I R,

for the Affairs of India, having made it my indispensable duty to explore and to acquire the most perfect knowledge in my. power, of every branch of the Law, whereby the important concerns of the East India Company are conducted, I naturally directed my early and particular attention to that vast repository, The Statutes at Large. I found therein a multitude of Laws concerning India, scattered amidst a confused mass of extraneous matter, and buried, as it were, in that voluminous and still increasing collection. Some of these Laws are placed at a great distance from others most intimately and inseparably connected with them in sense and matter; many of those of a later date being either partial or total repeals, or explanations, qualifications, or enforcements of those of an earlier period. It was not a little tedious and difficult to discover and comprehend, in this state of separation and disorder, the whole of the Statute Law, wherein the Company, and their servants, their territories, and their commerce, were concerned; and I experienced a still greater degree of toil and perplexity under these circumstances, in my endeavour to make the necessary comparisons of some of these Laws with others, to select and abstract them, and even fometimes to comprehend their meaning. I may, perhaps, be suspected of giving rather too great force to this representation of difficulties; because it may be said, that the Statutes at Large are furnished with Marginal Notes and Indexes, to guide the reader in his various researches. I may venture however to maintain, without any idea of depreciating the labours of [A] those,

those, who collected and revised the several editions of the Statutes now extant, and compiled those Indexes, that, so far as they relate to the affairs of the East India Company, very sew, except professor of the Law, can make any use of them; and even they, by the means only of tedious application.

. Having struggled with these inconveniencies, until the urgency of occasions would no longer permit, I submitted at last to the trouble of making an Index after my own method, and for my own private use. When I was become engaged, or rather indeed had far advanced in the work, it occurred to me, that a Collection of the Statute Law upon the subject of India alone, was a desideratum in our forensic publications; and that fuch a book, especially if accompanied with a full and perspicuous Index, would be highly acceptable to the Members of the Legislature, to the Gentlemen of the Long Robe, and to the Directors and other Proprietors of the East India Company, as well as to all their dependants and connections, domestic, and oriental. Many parts of the Statutes alluded to contain instructions to the Servants of the Company, both at home and abroad; and with fuch therefore those Servants, as well as their Employers, ought to be well acquainted. Some of these Acts were made for the express purpose of preventing Piracy, a crime too common in Asia; and those should therefore be carefully read by all whom they concern, and more particularly by fuch Officers and Servants of the Company, as are named and authorised by his Majesty's Commissions to hold Courts of Admiralty in Asia, for the trial of offences of that description. Others, moreover, touch upon the fubjects of Custom and Excise. These indeed affect our commerce with India only collaterally; and therefore such parts of them only required notice as were immediately addressed to the India Company. From a defire however to avoid a large volume, I thought it right to bring within this Publication no more of these Statutes than appeared to relate to the peculiar object of it.

It might well occasion our furprize, that these various Acts, of so much importance to the Public in general, as well as to the nearest interests of that considerable class of the community more immediately concerned, should not already have been printed in some compact and commodious form. I am persuaded however that my endeavour to supply this desect will not be deemed injudicious or ill-timed.

But these, cogent as they seem, were not my only motives for attempting this Publication. I was influenced also by another, which peculiarly touched my feelings, and impelled me to proceed. I ventured to entertain an idea, that such a Collection would be of use, and very acceptable to the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India. Nor could I listen to more persuasive encouragement, feeling, as I do, the strongest sense of respect, attachment, and gratitude, to that Board. From a proper sense also of the duty, which on so many accounts I owe to them, I shall esteem it a singular felicity indeed, if, by any effort of extraordinary diligence, I shall have been enabled to furnish even the slenderest means of sessions their difficulties, and of saving their time, so highly valuable to the Public.

Suche Sir, were my motives for the present undertaking, which . I now wish to introduce to the Public with the recommendation of your name. You have always been considered as the acting Chief. of that Honourable Board; and my more frequent intercourse in the discharge of my official duty has been with You, to whom the strongest acknowledgements I can offer are certainly due, but cannot be adequately expressed. In truth, the kind and condescending manner in which You have always communicated to me your fentiments and instructions, at once engaged my attachment, and convinced and improved my mind.—But I will not fuffer even the effusion of gratitude to become importunate to You; and therefore I will take my leave, in the hope, that, if in your affiduity to investigate and promote the interests of the East India Company, You have found that such a publication as this was wanted and might be useful, the labour, which I have bestowed on it, may in some degree have rendered it worthy of your approbation.
