WROTE a Letter to the Linguist at Callicut, ordering him to provide as soon as possible Twenty six Planks of Twenty one Malabar Covits each in length, Fifteen Borell Broad & One & an half Borell thick for flooring the Hall as AGREED upon in Consultation of the 30th. Ultimo. ORDERED him likewise to send up his Accounts for the Year as soon as he can.

RECEIVED a Letter from Anjengo in answer to ours of the 15th. and 27th. June, advising that they had got a little Supply of Money at Interest, which would serve them till we sent them more by the Tyger Galevat, and they hoped it would be some time this Month. They should have been glad any Gold had been procurable, as Silver in general was very low, and Rupees at such a rate in Exchange for Fanams, as had not been known before.

At the same time received a Letter from the Callicut Linguist dated the 1st. Instant advising that he had at last finished with the Samorine's Ministers, and had got the New Olas viz^t. Eight for Fifty thousand Fanams each to be paid in Eight Years The first to be paid in April next, and in case of not being paid when due to run at Interest, and One for Fifty thousand Fanams out of the growing Customs without Interest, he has likewise taken Security from three Merchants and the Governour of Callicut for the payment of Fourteen thousand Four hundred Twenty nine Fanams One Vis & a half in November next with Interest from the 1st. of last Month, which Balances the Samorines Account, as settled with his Ministers by Mr. West in April 1742 and happily puts an end to this long depending Affair, as We are told there is now no reason to doubt the Samorines discharging these Olas as they become due. Enclosed he likewise sent his Account for July and Abstract of his Accounts for the whole Year, with an Account apart of Sundries supplied the Tyger Galevat at Beepore with Three Months Wages to her People, and advises that as through some impediments Inland, no Teak Trees, as he expected were come down, he had purchased Two hundred and Fifty Candys at Nineteen Fanams $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy, that the Sawyers might not be unemployed, but what more had been indented for, he should wait the purchasing till a Supply came out of the Country.

TRANSLATION OF ONE OF THE EIGHT OLAS GIVEN BY THE SAMORINE FOR
FIFTY THOUSAND FANAMS EACH VIZ^t.

I oblige myself to pay the Balance due of the mony I borrowed of Mr. Adams (having discounted what already paid) in Eight Payments; The first of which being for Fifty thousand Fanams I will pay in the Month of April 1744 and in case I do not pay it within the limited time, will then pay it with Interest at the rate of One $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent $\frac{1}{2}$ Month, and so I will pay the said Fifty thousand Fanams conformable to this Writing.

THE OLA FOR FIFTY THOUSAND FANAMS OUT OF THE CUSTOMS VIZ^t.

I have Ballanced the Account of the Mony I borrowed of Mr. ADAMS having discounted what paid, and have given Obligations to pay it in Eight Payments & the Fifty thousand Fanams over and above the Amount of the said Obligations shall be paid out of the Customs on the Imports and Exports commencing from next September this Year 1743 and the said Fifty thousand Fanams shall be paid without any Interest at all out of the Customs.

IN the Evening the Chief received a Letter from Mr. Richards Master of the Tyger Galevat at Beepore dated the 26th. Ultimo advising that she was thoroughly refitted, except paying her Bottom, the Charges of which were paid by the Callicut Linguist, as also Three Months pay to the people. He says that the Three Europeans belonging to her, run away the 1st. of June, which he had desired the Linguist at Callicut to acquaint us with but he never did.

WROTE a Line to the French Chief at Mihie desiring he would return a Topass Soldier deserted hence Two days ago, and took the same Opportunity of desiring him in case the Three Europeans deserted from the Tyger Galevat were there, or Should come to Mihie, that he would stop them and give us notice of it.

IN the Evening received an Answer from the French Chief complying with our request, and promising in case any of the Seamen came that way he would Stop them.

THE SAMORINE having according to his promise, given us the New Olas for the payment of his Debt. IT IS AGREED that We now Rebuild the Factory at Callicut according to the Plan approved of at Bombay, and that We write the Linguist to have every thing in readiness against Mr. West goes down which we propose he shall do as soon as the Season is open And as the Tyger Galevat has been thoroughly refitted at Beepore except paying her Bottom, which the Master waits our Orders for, AGREED that he be directed to do it out of hand & repair hither (the Weather permitting) after the Change of the Moon.

AND as the Samorine's New Olas will be safe here than at Callicut where Fires happen frequently, AGREED that the Linguist be ordered to keep only that relating to Fifty thousand Fanams to be paid out of the Customs, and the Ola for the first Payment of Fifty thousand Fanams in April next, and send up the other Seven hither by the Tyger Galevat. And as he was last Year allowed a Guard for fear of any Insults from the Moors upon Cota Marcar's Affair, which we judge he need no longer be apprehensive of. AGREED that he be directed in such case to discharge them.

RECEIVED an Answer to the Letter wrote Boyanore the 6th. in which he desires that a particular Account of what he had been supplied with, and their Cost may be sent him, with his receipts for the same, and that then deducting what part has been already made good, he will send the Balance.

THE Answer received yesterday from Boyanore, being a poor Excuse for delaying the payment of what he still owes, as he has already had a very particular Account of every thing supplied him in his Warrs with the French which occasioned this Debt The Chief this day wrote him again, that he had already had

the Account very particularly, and plainly expressing every thing supplied him, which Vaddaque Naddatea Nombier of his took from our Books; That as to sending a Person there, that we had never hitherto sent any body to him to ask or borrow anything, if we had we should think ourselves obliged in such case to send a Person to see the Accounts, and repay the Mony there That his Debt to the Honble Company at present amounted to Fanams Sixty two thousand Six hundred Sixty two & an half, which with the Interest due thereon, he ought to send and repay here, where it was borrowed, and if he still wants to be satisfied in any particular of the Account, he may send a Person here for that purpose. That we had often wrote to him about this Debt but hitherto he had taken no Care for the payment of it, but instead thereof send trifling and very out of the way excuses. Wherefore this Messenger is sent on purpose to desire that he will let us know whether he designs to pay the Mony or not without any more trivial or strange Excuses.

RECEIVED a Letter dated the 9th. Instant from the Linguist at Callicut, He says that although the Affair of Cota Marcar has been so long past, yet the Moors are so insolent, and so much to be suspected that he has only discharged Three Nairs, and One Soldier, and desires permission to keep Six Soldiers, besides the Two Nairs that have always been in Pay, some time longer, and shall observe the Contents of our last.

WROTE to the Linguist at Callicut, and permitted him to keep the Six Soldiers he desired leave for in his last, some time longer, & having this day Discharged the Carpenters we had from Callicut who desire to be paid there the remainder of what is due to them being One thousand Nine hundred Tellicherry Fanams, ORDERED the Linguist to pay it there being Three hundred & Eighty. LAST Night received a Letter dated the 12th. Instant from the Linguist at Callicut. To our Complaint that the Charges of refitting the Galevat at Beepore are very high, he says that he only advanced the money, the Master of her having overseen the refitting, and that She would proceed for this place as soon as she was ready; That the Exchange of Rupees at present was only Four Fanams and Four Vis, That he would send up the Seven New Olas of the Samorines, as we had ordered him, and that as to the Three European Seamen run away from the Galevat, he understood that they had returned to her again, for on their coming to Callicut, and pretending they were turned away, he detained them till a Servant of the Masters came thither with whom they went back to Beepore, and he finds since run away from thence. THE CHIEF acquaints the Board with his having wrote Two Letters to Boyanore and the purport of his Answers, taking which into Consideration, We are of Opinion that his insisting on our sending him an Account of the Particulars supplied him Chief informs

with in his Warrs with the French, is only an Evasion, one of his own people having already taken that Account here, and carried to him last Year, However that he may no longer make that an excuse for not discharging his Debt; It is AGREED that We send Amboo Namby to him (after the Feast of Ona) which is Two days hence with an Account of the particulars supplied him, and that the Chief write him at the same time, that Said Amboo Namby is fully instructed to satisfie him in every particular he may desire to have explained, and to request that he will without further delay, pay the mony with the Interest due thereon, or let us know whether he will or no?.

EKODA MOOSSA of Naddowry a Merchant who formerly supplied the Honble Company with some Cardamoms making the like offerr now, and desiring to be advanced Money, is asked if he will Contract to deliver them at a certain price, but refuses it, wherefore as we expect Cunhiseu in a few days to make a Contract, and have already advanced Mony to Tycandy Cunially, we are of Opinion that as advancing mony to others, will only encrease the Number of Buyers, and consequently enhance the price, We rejected it.

THE CHIEF acquaints the Board that Combem Alliby (to whom with Mucatum Paqui, we advanced mony on the 20th. of May for Fifty Candys of Pepper each) (at One hundred & four Rupees ₹ Candy) came to him sometime ago and offered to deliver Twenty five Candys of Pepper more at the same price if We would Advance him the Mony, which he (the Chief) then refused, but AGREED that on his first bringing the Pepper to take it at the same price he has Contracted for, which he now offering to deliver is accepted of, and as he has very near delivered in all he has this year Contracted for, desires to be advanced mony for Fifty Candys more but insisting on the same price viz^t. Rupees One hundred and Fourteen ₹ Candy, We refused his request, as we Judge that the continuing to give that high price any longer though for Old Pepper, may, now there is such a fair prospect of a very plentiful Crop next Season, be an hindrance to our Contracting for it at the reasonable rates we have reason to expect, accordingly We offered to advance him mony at the rate of One hundred Rupees ₹ Candy, which he refused, pretending he could not afford it for one Rupee less than the last as it still bears the same price inland; However as We are resolved to offer no more for Old Pepper, We hope, it will fall, and likewise to give the Merchants to understand that we expect to Contract for the New Pepper even at much less.

THE ACHAMARS of Randotarra (who since the Loan of Sixty thousand Fanams lent them in March 1740/1 look upon themselves as under the Company's Protection) having had severall disputes with the Pagodas in that District, & with the Prince about paying Taxes, to prevent them in future, have Agreed amongst themselves, that the Pagodas who pretended to be exempted, shall in future pay a share, and to give more validity to said Agreement, desire that the Ola for that purpose may be Lodged in the Company's hands which both Parties came to the Fort and delivered the Chief, declaring at the same time their free consent to it, which Ola is Ordered to be put in the Chest, and Entered after this Consultation. They likewise design to come to an Agreement with the Prince to Pay him a Sum certain Yearly, which by freeing them from his Arbitrary Impositions and Extortions of his Rajahdores, will be a means of that part of the Country flourishing as formerly, and supplying the Honble Company with a large Quantity of Pepper Yearly, from whence We have lately had much less than heretofore.

AGREEMENT MADE BETWEEN THE FOUR HEADS OF PAYANATU ACHAMARS
AND THE THREE PAGODAS OF RANDOTARRA VIZ^r.

THE DUTYS which shall be Levied in Randotarra shall be with the consent and order of the said Achamars and the said Pagodas, and after having Levied the Dutys, the Accounts of both Parties shall be settled. In this manner It is AGREED to with the Consent of the Prince of Pallicoilotu before the English Chief in the Fort of Tellicherry.

YESTERDAY Anchored at Mihie a French Ship called the St. Bennett from Mascarhen, which place they left a Month ago. They saw an English Ship two days past standing to the S^o.ward. MONDAY

THIS Evening sent Amboo Namby with another Letter to Boyanore to the purport mentioned in Consultation of the 18th. and gave him, with him, a particular Account of every thing supplied him during his Wars with the French. DITTO DID

THIS Evening the French Ship that arrived at Mihie from Mascarhen two days ago sailed for Pondicherry. TUESDAY
23^d.

THIS Morning came to the Fort Three Rajadores with a Message to the Chief from the First King of Cotiote, the purport of which was that he desires a Loan of Twenty five thousand Fanams, promising to repay it in Pepper next February, at the price it shall then bear. Ultimo, advising the receipt of our Letters dated April the 16th. & May 28th. via Goa; By this Conveyance they have sent us a Supply of Rupees Twenty thousand, And have Sent likewise a Supply for Anjengo; They permit us to keep the Tyger Galevat, but cannot Spare us another and order us now to carry the Tygers Expence to the Account of this Factory. They had received Advices that the Mountague from Great Brittain was arrived at Mocha, which Ship was to be Commodore on this Coast, and that Three others were designed for Bombay. Disapprove of purchasing Pepper at Callicut, if possible to be avoided as it has a bad influence on the price here, so that if a Sufficiency cannot be obtained here, had better be provided at Cochin and other distant Ports. They think it most adviseable to advance the Busar Merchants Money as usual as not doing it might affect their Credit, and a too hasty demanding what they are in Arrears may endanger the whole, & observe that they generally were in Arrears, and more so formerly than now; however leave us to Act (as We judge most consistent with our Employers Interest, They are pleased with the Success attended the Assistance given the Prince in March last and order us to decline in a complaisant manner his request for our fortifying the Mouth of Ramatilly River. Orders us to use our endeavours that Cunhiseu clears his account of what advanced him for Cardamoms by giving Pepper for it according to his Agreement. When a Conveyance offers will comply with our Indents. Permit us to deliver the Effects of Arthur Julep Deceased to his Executor. Order us to demand from the Master of the Bomb Ketch at Beepore their Packet to the Agent and Council of Persia, and to take out that designed Overland for the Court of Directors and forward it by the Brilliant to the President and Council of Madrass & the other for Gombroon to send thither by first Opportunity. On the arrival of the Europe Ships will send us directions about the Convoys that will be appointed on this Coast; At present they proposed One to be early at this Port in December, and another in February. Enclosed Indents for the use of their Marine which ORDERED to be complied with.

Instant from Boyanore, being no more than a repetition of the same trifling Evasions for not discharging his Debt as he made before; From the Circumstances of the Debt We judge that the reason he refuses to discharge it is, that as it arose from Stores and Ammunition supplied him privately in his Wars with the French, he imagines we do not care to make any great Stir about it, least the French should be acquainted with our having assisted him, but as We make no manner of doubt but the French are already acquainted and fully satisfied that We did assist Boyanore, We are of Opinion that it cannot be attended with any bad Consequence, should We mention it to the French ourselves, as according to the Articles at present subsisting between them and us, it is requisite in case We should have any dispute with Boyanore that they should be first acquainted It is therefore AGREED that the Chief takes an Opportunity the first Visit We have from the French (which We expect in a few days) to let drop in conversation to their Chief our having a demand on Boyanore, which as we have often made and he refuses to satisfie We shall in case he continues to refuse Payment, be obliged to take other Measures, but shall previously acquaint them what Steps We design to take. As the French have daily opportunities We doubt not but they will mention this to some of Boyanore's Ministers. Soon after which We propose to send once more to Boyanore to Demand payment or a final answer whether he will or no, which when he finds that We make no Secret of his Debt, but have ourselves acquainted the French with it, from whom he at present imagines We would by all means have it concealed, he may perhaps be induced to pay it, if not, there is no other way left but to seize some Boats and Munchwas belonging to Burgorah, in Order to compell him to it, which cannot be done without first acquainting the French with it.

PRINCE CUNHI HOMO having Sent One of his Rajahdores to advise the Chief that he has finally adjusted all matters with the Canarees, and that they are on the 14th. of this Month Mallabar Style, answering to our 16th. to deliver over to him the Fort of Mattaly, which is the Key of his Country, he desires that We will send Chittill Conna with some of our people to be present at his taking possession of it. This Agreement for the Canarees to evacuate all their Acquisitions was

made between them and our Prince as ^{of} Consultation of September 14th. 1742 without our knowledge and it was then thought would not be punctually complied with, & consequently might be attended with Disputes, and perhaps application to us upon which the Chief then wrote to each of them that as they had entered into such an Engagement without our knowledge We would not be any ways Answerable for such Events as might proceed therefrom. But as very fortunately no such disputes have arose, And the Canarees are now willing to deliver up this Fortress, & the Prince has of his own accord acquainted us with his finally having settled all matters, with his Conditions, We are of Opinion it is very proper to send Chittely Conna, with One hundred of our Nairs and Tivees to be present when it is put into his hands, & the Linguist is Ordered accordingly to pick out such Nairs and Tivees as are most fit to send on this Occasion & dispatch them with Chittely Conna the day after to Morrow, which will be time enough to get there. The Conditions to be performed on the Prince's part are viz^t. He is to pay down, Two thousand Pagodas, return One Elephant, Two Horses and One large Gun taken in the Warrs from the Canarees, and is then to have the Fort delivered up to him. His first Agreement with the Canarees was to pay them One hundred thousand Pagodas of which he had before at times paid them Seventy thousand.

A TONEY belonging to Mihie in her way from Mangulore put ashore yesterday in the Afternoon at Agar, where the Serjeant stationed at Eddecaut sent a Corporal & Topass to examine her, which the Muckas refusing to let them do, & drawing a Knife on them, the Corporal broke the Marcars Head with his Musquet, upon which the Muquas wrested the Piece out of his hand, got into the Toney, & went away with it.

IN the Afternoon received a Letter from the french Chief (wrote before he had received the above Letter from hence) setting forth that a Toney belonging to Mihie in her return from Mangulore put ashore at Agar to dress Victuals were the Muquas were attacked & very ill treated by a White Soldier and a Topass belonging he supposes to our Garrison there, & this without the least provocation or cause given by the Muckas, who fell at the White Soldiers feet, but could not move him, which said Soldier presented his Piece three times against One of them, but by chance it did not go off. The Muquas seeing no other remedy and to save their Lives took a resolution to seize the Soldiers & bring them away with them, but a person belonging to Mihie happening to pass by, they let the Soldiers go, but brought away his Musquet which was broke by a Stroke on one of the Muquas heads. He says that they were pursued by Three Toney.

As he supposes the Chief is well informed of this Accident he desires that we will acquaint him whether the Muquas have told him the Truth, that in case they have imposed upon him, he may punish them as they deserve, though he cannot help being surprized, as it is very unusual for that Cast of People to insult an European. By the Bearer of this Letter he returned the Musquet belonging to the White Soldier, & a Stick that the Topass was Armed with, & concludes with a Compliment.

whose Names are Mundeodden Anaden, Teaterron Chendin, Viritalia Guellapen, and Bannaten Chundu, refused to come, which piece of Insolence, if passed over would not only expose us to contempt in the Eyes of these People but might likewise be attended with very mischievous Consequences; We this Morning sent the rest of the Nairs with Two Elephants to break down their Houses which is the usual Punishment in such Cases. Some of the Princes People went with our Nairs and a Braminee from the Pagoda, from whence We borrowed One of the Elephants, They immediately executed what they were set about without any resistance being made notwithstanding Naranport Nair and his Brother Compo Nair had threatened it.

THIS day the Linguist received an Ola from Chatill Conna, whom at the Princes request We Agreed on the 12th. to send with an hundred Men to see Mattalay evacuated by the Canarees, which he says they have not yet done though are treating about it, but seem afraid to trust the Prince, lest he should deceive them, as he has often done; He advises likewise that there is a Person in those parts of great distinction who has told him that he can easily bring it about that the Canarees shall deliver that Fort into the Prince's possession, but he is afraid that on being again Master of that part of his Country, that he will serve him as he does many others; that is Oppress and Fleece him, and desires to know if in such Case he can depend on any Security or Protection from the English Chief, whom he desired might be acquainted with this.

The Prince was so enraged at this disappointment, that he beat the Ola about the Messengers ears, and then hanging it about his Neck, sent him back again, and so for the present this matter rests, though it is the general Opinion that the Canarees will still deliver up this Fort and the remainder of their Conquests, as it is a very great Expence to them to keep it, and they have no Revenue to answer it, and would certainly have done it now as they really intended, had it not been for the Jealousy instilled into them of our Prince's having some treacherous designs in view; As the Canarees were afraid of him so our Prince is in his turn afraid of them, and has sent to desire We will spare him One Candy of Powder with Lead in proportion, as his Forts of Madday & Ava Conna, he says are in want of Ammunition, which he having sent Money for IT IS AGREED to let him have, and the Storekeeper is accordingly ORDERED to deliver it; He likewise desires that Chittley Conna, who on several occasions there had been very Serviceable to him might be sent back to him, which is likewise AGREED to, but with this restriction, that in case of any Rupture happening between the Canarees and our Prince on this occasion (which although not likely at present it is prudent to Guard against) he on no pretence whatever engage himself in it, but return immediately to us, but in case the Prince should insist on his staying there, that he stick close by the Prince, who We are persuaded will not go in person.

As Ten of the Madagascar Slaves are run away from Durmapatam, being Five men and Five Women with a child; A Guard of Twelve Caliquilone Moors is for the future ORDERED to keep watch over them in the Night; though on enquiry We do not find that any of those remaining have any such inclinations, and the Linguist acquaints us that he has already, as ORDERED early in the Morning sent men different ways to look after those who are run away.

TAKING into consideration the Letter received yesterday from Mr. William West at Callicut, advising that the Masons sent from hence for rebuilding the Factory complain of their Allowance for Diet, considering the dearness of Rice there, being too small IT IS AGREED to leave that matter to him, in case their Complaint is reasonable, to encrease their Allowance a small matter as he shall judge reasonable, it being always Customary to allow Workmen sent from hence something more than others. AGREED likewise to write him to get ready the Indents from the Land and Marine Pay masters at Bombay as We shortly expect a ship, and the Linguist having wrote us that as to providing the Cordage indented for there is only at present about Ten or Twelve Candys of fine Coir procurable which the Merchants ask Thirty five Rupees ^{per} Candy for, that he enquires into it, & purchase it as cheap as possible.

As the time is at hand for purchasing of the New Crop of Pepper, I believe it is necessary that We join together in forbidding our Merchants exceeding such a price as We shall mutually fix upon; that We may get it as cheap as possible, and considering the great plenty of the New Crop, as also the price We were obliged to give last Year, I think that Eighty Rupees ₹ Candy will be a reasonable price for the ensuing Crop, which if you Sir, and your Council likewise approve of, We shall call our Merchants together and forbid them to exceed it, and hope that you will likewise call your Merchants together and lay the same Injunctions on them, waiting your Answer I am with the greatest Esteem

THIS Afternoon received a Letter dated the 22^d. from M^r. West by a Toney Express, advising that the Samorine's Ministers had that morning called for our Linguist, as also the French and Portuguese Linguists to acquaint them that from the first day of this present Month November, it was the Samorine's Orders that they must pay Customs, on Timber, Plank, Cables and Cordage, which they said the English Company did formerly, and was remitted only at the request of M^r. Adams, and that for what Necessaries only he wanted for the building of Tellicherry Fort, which being a long time ago finished they must pay it again as they had done before, for that the French & Portugueze taking advantage of the Indulgence granted to the English had likewise refused paying any Dutys on the abovementioned Particulars, which has proved a great Loss to the Samorine in his Customs.

To this, M^r. West desires our Answer as the Samorines Ministers wait for it, and says that if We easily give into this, the Samorine it is likely may soon also make us pay Customs on Chunam Firewood and Bamboos. The French Linguist has likewise sent an Express to Mihie for Orders how to proceed in this Affair.

He advises that he has put all the Pepper on Board the Munchua, as She had room for it being One hundred and Seventy seven Baggs of Heavy Pepper containing Nett Forty four Candys, Four Maunds Fifteen Pounds and One hundred & Five Baggs of Light Pepper containing Nett Fifteen Candys Twelve Maunds & Fifteen Pounds Amounting to Rupees Seven thousand Two hundred Ninety seven, Three Quarters and Five Reas exclusive of Freight and Bags; He has likewise sent on the Munchua Seventy Corge of small Bamboo Matts and Ten Maunds of Ghee Amounting to Rupees Sixty four Three Quarters & Twenty six Reas and the Freight of the Munchua is Fifty four Rupees, One Quarter and Six Reas.

ENCLOSED he sent an Indent of M^r. Croes wanting for the New Factory being One hundred and Twenty five turned Banisters and Two Pounds of Chalk for the Carpenters Lines. He has returned the Galevat in company with the Munchua.

TRANSLATE OF THE CHIEFS OLA TO THE SAMORINE.

AFTER your Majesty adjusted Accounts with the Hoñble Company and given your Olas for the payment of the Balance; I was in hopes that your Majesty would not have infringed any of their Ancient Priviledges, which were granted them by your Majesty's Predecessors for the eminent Services done them, but to my great concern I am advised from Mr. West that your Majestys Ministers intend an Innovation in the Customs at Callicut, demanding Dutvs on Timber, Plank, Cables and Cordage from the 1st. of this present Month. This is directly contrary to a Priviledge granted to the Hoñble Company, by your Majesty's Predecessors in the time of Mr. Adams, which was not only for the use of the Fort at Tellicherry, but general & unlimited, for those Articles are no part of the Hoñble Company's Commerce, but only for the use & Service of the Island of Bombay and their other Settlements. As this Priviledge was Granted to the Hoñble Company, as a Recompence for the many Services done by them to your Majesty there can be no reason why the French or Portugeze should pretend to the same Favour, neither is your Majesty under any obligation to grant it to them. I hope therefore when your Majesty considers, that this is a Grant from your Royal Predecessors, and which We look upon as coming from a King to be Sacred; that your Majesty

will forbid the demanding Customs from the Hoñble Company on the above particulars, especially as they have lately put so much Confidence in your Majesty as to set about Building a New Factory in your Dominions. May God preserve your Majesty's Life and Grant you a Happy Reign.

Ultimo from the Hoⁿble the President and Council, advising that they had put on Board her Four hundred Seventy six Bales of Surat Piece Goods, which as ₹ Calculate of Tonnage enclosed Amounted to One hundred Eleven Tonns Three hundred and Five Decimals; what is remaining to compleat Four hundred Ninety Eight Tonns according to her Charter Party they direct that We put on Board her here, or at Callicut, or Anjengo, as We judge most proper, giving her the Quickest dispatch possible to avoid Demorage, which commences the 17th. of this Month, and if the Commander requests it to give him Five Tonns Surplus Tonnage. They Order the Mountague not be detained longer than the 20th. Instant, unless We expect the speedy Arrival of any Ships from Bengall about that time had sent a Supply of Gold to Mr. Crommelin at Onore, and permitted him to take a Supply out of the Treasure designed for this place in case he wanted it, and sent Two hundred and Eighty Bales of Cotton on the Mountague in part of her Cargo to Bengall to be Landed here till She proceeds thither in April. Have ORDERED Mr. Ainsworth our Gunner to Bombay and sent us Mr. Garden in his Room, Enclosed is an Indent for Coir Cordage; Have sent us an Ensigns Commission for Mr. William Worrall Direct that in case We do not send the Warwick to Anjengo to Land the Treasure & Stores for that place, and send them by some other Conveyance, though if the Commander will promise to carry the Treasure without any demand from his Owners to send it by Him. Mr. Bouchier appointed Chief of Anjengo having desired the President's leave to go up to Bombay, they direct that in case he should have passed that place & come hither, to acquaint him that He must return to Anjengo, the Company not having given leave for his going to Bombay. Ultimo (the day after they left Bombay) fell in with Seven Grabs and Eight Galevats of Angrias, and fought them from Eight in the Evening untill Four the next Morning when they left for Two hours but then returned & engaged again till twelve at Noon when they stood in Shore. The Commanders thinks they must have done them a good deal of Damage, but of Five Shybars in their Company the Enemy carried off Three with their Galevats, as also a Portuguese Ketch, whom the Commodore the Night before had once cleared, the Enemy having boarded her; Cap^t. Misenor had one Man's Leg shot off. On the 1st. Instant they saw Three Grabs & Four Galevats off of Mangulore, whom they chased, but being little Wind they got away, These We believe are what appeared off of this Port the 29th. Ultimo.

Instant I arrived at Cochin, and by the 15th. received Four hundred & Ten Candys of Pepper from Ezekiel Raby, which I paid him for at Ninety five Rupees p Candy as p his Account Current enclosed, & then endeavoured to prevail with him to enter into another Agreement conformable to your Instructions to me, but he gave me for answer that they were daily in expectation of a Ships Arrival from Batavia, which might occasion many Alterations, & probably prevent his complying with his Engagement should he enter into one with us. However he promised that if I would leave the Balance of Rupees One thousand & fifty in his hands, and you pay the Balance of an Account being 2431. 2. 40 between him and Domingos Rodrigues he will use his utmost Endeavours to deliver us Pepper for it, at the same time giving me his Assurances, that what further Quantity he was able to provide we might depend he would give us the refusal of and by all Conveyances advise the Chief both of the Price and Quantity.

I arrived at Beepore the 17th. Instant when Mr. Jenkinson tendered Twelve Sixty Gallon Casks of Arrack, which being approved of by myself Mr. West and Cap^t. Freeman, we shipped it on Board the Mountague, and enclosed is Bill of Lading for the same.

I left Callicut the 21st. having received from Mr. West what Plank, Masts &c^a. Cap^t. Freeman could take on Board without encumbering his Ship, a List of which I herewith deliver you, with a Bill of Lading for the Pepper. I am

THE CHIEF lays before the Board Translate of an Ola received from the Samorine in answer to what wrote him on the 8th. Instant, in which he only says that it was well done to acquaint the Governour of Bombay with his having demanded Customs on Timber Plank Masts and Cordage, and that on his having cleared his Old Accounts He hoped from the great Friendship between himself & the Hon^{ble} Company, which he should never infringe, that he might on any necessity depend on their Assistance.

Chief Acquaints the Board of the Contents of the Samorines Ola to him.

As We find the Samorine will not recall his Order for paying Customs on the above Particulars and that what has been shipped on the Mountagu has been done conditionally. AGREED that in our Letter to the Presidency by her, We fully represent this matter & desire their Orders concerning it.

To Transmitt this matter in full to the President & Council.

DOMINGOS RODRIGUES Our old Linguist who went to Billiapatam, as taken notice of the 15th. Instant, to meet the Prince, being returned acquaints us that his having been so earnest for his seeing him was that he had with the advice of his Two Brothers and Ministers come to a Resolution to fall upon the King of Nelesaron, who had underhand been tampering with the Cannarees not to evacuate Mattalay to Him, and he wanted to know in such case what assistance he might depend upon from the Hon^{ble} Company; But the Linguist having made him sensible of the unadviseableness of such an Undertaking, the Prince had called his Ministers to a second Consultation to acquaint them why he had laid it aside, which at first they were much displeas'd with, but at length the Prince persisting in his last Resolution they all submitted. And the Prince has now a design to Treat with the Canarees once more, assuring the Linguist that in case they will evacuate Mattalay to him, & quit his Country, that he will Bonafide pay down One hundred thousand Rupees, and that he can raise that Sum, though he has so often deceived them, that it is much doubted whether this New Treaty will end any better than his former ones.

Linguist returns from the Prince. Acquaints the Prince had a Design to fall on the King of Nelesaroon. which he dissuaded him from. & that he now designs to treat once more with the Canarees.

WHILST the Linguist was at Billiapatam, he had intelligence that Two or Three People employ'd by the French had been in those parts to buy Sandall Wood and Cardamoms, which if taken no notice of, might be attended with very bad Consequences, as they would next Attempt to purchase Pepper in those parts likewise; Upon applying to the Prince he immediately Ordered a Party of Eighty of his Nairs to watch the Roads, Passages and Buzars, and had Seized Two Candys & an half of Cardamoms purchased by an Agent of theirs, This he acquaints us will be attended with a small Expence, but is highly necessary to prevent the French from making any Purchases in those Parts, which they have only begun

Feilder Freeman for Bombay with the Prince Edward, Poultney Benyon & Sally Bengall Ships and the Futteramy a Moor Ship under his Convoy, a large Number of Munchuas & small Craft went up all the same time for Mangalore.

DITTO DIE Lre from the French Chief. RECEIVED a Letter from the French Chief signifying that as We had Agreed to act in concert together as to the price of Pepper & advancing mony he desires the Chief will acquaint him with the Measures he proposes to take with our Merchants that he may do the same, & that he shall always be ready to join in any thing for the Common Good of both Companys.

Answer thereto.

To this the Chief returned for Answer, that at present he did not know of any measures We could take more than We had already done by acquainting our Merchants that We were resolved not to give more than Eighty Rupees ₹ Candy for the New Pepper, which although it would be very plenty. would likewise come in somewhat at later than formerly, as the moderate Season which occasioned this abundance, would cause it to be later ripe, and should We now call upon our Merchants to take Mony it would induce them to insist upon an high price; He was therefore of Opinion that it was better to wait a few days, however if he could think of any other means, and would please to communicate them he should very readily concur with him.

FRIDAY 30th. French Chief Lre from RECEIVED another Letter from the French Chief wherein he says that their Merchants are in greater necessity for money than ours & that they had solicited for it very pressingly before he had taken the liberty to write about that Affair. He seems apprehensive We, by delaying to advance our Merchants Mony, that they will afterwards be obliged to buy in an hurry, & that the price of Pepper will rise inland, where already as he is informed it is sold from Eighty to Ninety Rupees the Candy; But nevertheless be their Merchants ever so pressing, he will not advance them any money before he advises us of it.

Having duly considered the Letter received last night from the French Chief It is AGREED that the Chief answer it to the following Purport.

Answer Agreed to send Him.

That he is still of Opinion that it is better to wait a little longer before We advance our Merchants any mony, that as to the price inland being at present from Eighty five to Ninety Rupees the Candy, by the best intelligence we can get, it is sold at under Eighty. Besides the price inland at present is of no Consequence to us very little hitherto being brought to Market, & the Crop being so plentiful, that

it is impossible for the Merchants in land to engross it, and fix a price as in a Year of great Scarcity they might do, so that if our occasions would permit us to wait we might in all probability get it at the price of Eighty Rupees, which at present We had Agreed not to exceed. That as to their Merchants being in greater necessity of Money than ours he assures him that ours are in the same Necessity with theirs, Nevertheless he has no Objection to his endeavouring to open the price, provided it be near the rate we had Agreed upon, and that it be for the whole Season.

THE Honble the President and Council having left it to us to indulge our Buzar Merchants with time or not, for paying what they are at present in Arrears & have been so for some Years, having duly considered the matter We are come to a Resolution to allow them time for the following reasons.

Merchts, who are in Arrears time to be allowed them for discharging what they owe.

1st. WE are assured that they have a great deal of Pepper owing them by the inland Merchants, which will take them up a good deal of time and trouble to recover.

2^d. CONTINUALLY dunning and sending people after them, they plead is a great vexation to them and affects their Credit.

reasons for so doing.

AND Lastly Whether We allow them time or not, We are fully satisfied of their Inability to discharge their Arrears any otherwise, and are therefore of Opinion, We had better make it a matter of Favour to them.

THE Merchants We mentioned to Bombay who requested time were only Three, Baunibelti Cunhipy, Nelearate Tupy and Batila Paqui, but there is another now Mucatum Paqui that desires the same Favour, who We then thought would not stand in need of it, but We being Credibly informed that if We should refuse it him, & exact the immediate discharge of what he is in Arrears, although he could one way or other effect it, yet as it must be by selling all he has & in a manner ruining him We think it would be very hard upon him to make this difference It is therefore AGREED that We grant him a reasonable time as well as the rest.

AND to do all in our power to prevent it's being sold dearer, AGREED that We forbid the Storekeepers in our District to give more than Twenty Fanams Maund for any small Quantities may be offered to Sale in their way, And that the Chief by Letter acquaint the French Chief with the issue of this Conference with our Merchants, and desire that he will give the like Orders at Mihie.

MR. WILLIAM WEST desiring a Sett of Bills for Twenty Pounds Sterling at Two Shillings and Five Pence Rupee and making Oath before the Chief that they are on his own Account they are Signed and given to him of this date payable to Gilbert West in London. AND being recovered from his Indisposition AGREED that he return to Callicut tomorrow to finish the New Factory.

THIS Morning about Seven o'Clock arrived Ensign Worrall with the Party of Men you were pleased to send to the Protection of the Hoñble Companys Factory here, & by him I received your Commands of yesterdays Date.

About Noon, as you will perceive by the accompanying Letter, I wrote to the Cap^t. of the Portuguese Frigat, some of the Samorines Ministers came to our Factory to desire that I would write to him to suspend his committing of Hostilities till to morrow Night, as by that time they believed they should hear from their King, & possibly in a favourable manner in regard to the Portuguese, but if not they of themselves would endeavour to pacifie them, I accordingly complied with their request, but before the Tony could get on Board, the Frigat, Grab and another small Vessel begun to fire on the Town; However so soon as the Captain of the Frigat received my Letter, he made a Signal to the other Vessels to leave off firing and sent me the enclosed Letter in answer to mine, which as soon as I had read, I advised the Samorines Ministers of the purport, and desired that they wou'd give Orders on their part that no body should fire from the Shore so that between four & five this Afternoon the Cessation began; That the Samorine's Ministers will prove ungratefull I make no doubt of, they having made Prisoners of the Tony People that carried my Letter at their request: They pretend that the French and English spur on the Portuguese, & perhaps by & by will espouse their part, and this notion they have and do continue to propagat wherever they go; To-morrow they are to meet again & give me their Answer, which I am to send to the Captain of the Frigat, which is all that I have at present to advise you of, excepting which, I had almost forgot to acquaint you, that a Ship came to an Anchor this Evening off of Beepore. I am.

THE foregoing I intended to have sent you the time that I wrote it, but the Government's People would not suffer any Tony to be put into the Water and it was with the greatest difficulty that leave was yesterday given for the Linguists Wife and Family to retire to Tellicherry.

LAST Night by my Appointment the Samorine's Ministers met me at the French Factory, but nothing could be done with them in behalf of the Portuguese, who I find they are determined shall pay or give Security for the Customs before they will grant it to be Shipped off; However We are to have another Meeting there this Morning, which I believe will be to as little Purpose as that of last Nights. The Portuguese the day before yesterday, by all their fireing from their Frigat and other Vessels having not done the least damage to the Town or Vessels in the Road, which has so much Animated the Country People, that they bid Defiance to all Europeans.

As We can get none of these Country Tonys for any use whatsoever, please to send Three or Four from Tellicherry to be ready upon all occasions. For should the Government continue to Molest the Company in their Affairs here, the withdrawing of their Servants, who having not power enough to Defend their Right, for the Present, may make the Samorine and his Ministry sensible of their ill Treatment of a Company that never gave him the least cause of Complaint, and invite it to resettle at Callicut upon a better and more secure footing than heretofore. I mean not that the English should steal away or fly from the place, no, a memorial should first be presented to the Samorine setting forth that they quit not their pretensions to the Factory but his undeservedly ill usage and denying of them now the free Exercise of their Commerce here oblige them to return to Tellicherry.

THE Ship that was at an Anchor off of Beepore the other Night is a Surat Moor Ship, but from whence she came I cannot tell. A French Ship is now a coming in, and to the S^o.ward of Beepore a large Ship has just now dropped her Anchor, the Wind being far to the N^o.ward and against her. I am

DAY 4TH. RECEIVED a Letter from the Callicut Linguist advising the receipt of the Two-thousand Rupees sent him the 31st. Ult^o. He says that of the Indent sent him last September for Ten Poon Masts for Bombay, he has hitherto not been able to procure any, but at present has an opportunity of buying Four or Five of them, The Large ones at Three hundred Seventy five Rupees each, and the small ones at Two hundred Twenty five Rupees each, and desires our Orders whether he shall purchase them, and it being now the proper Season, whether he shall Contract for the remainder to be delivered next November. In September last We likewise sent him an Indent for Bombay for One hundred and Twenty Coils of Coir Cordage of sundry sizes, and in October another Indent for One hundred Sixty three Coils more, making in all Two hundred Eighty three Coils. Of the first Indent Sixty four Coils were Shipped in December on the Mountagu, so that there remains Two hundred and Nineteen Coils to be provided, for which it is necessary to buy the Coir now, for in the opening of the Season after the Rains, Coir is not to be had, as was the case last Year he therefore desires our Orders concerning it.

WROTE a Letter to Mr. West at Callicut with Orders that the masts mentioned in the Linguist's Letter be purchased as cheap as possible, and the remainder, with what Coir is wanting to compleat the Bombay Indents for Cordage be likewise now Contracted for, that it may be ready after the Rains; And that as settling Accounts last Year with the Samorine—His first Ola for Fifty thousand Fanams is to be paid in this Month; ORDERED him to take a proper opportunity of demanding it.

She went from hence in Company with the Bombay Grab and the Ships under her Convoy the 18th. of February, but going very ill they were obliged to leave her; upon which She put off and proceeded to the N^o.ward, but being near Surat Bar, saw Angria's Fleet, upon which she put to Sea, and stood away again to the S^o.ward, and after taking in Provisions, designs to proceed to Pondicherry. He enclosed likewise an Ola from the Samorine in answer to a Letter wrote him the 2^d. by the Chief about the Insolencies of the Moors at Calicut, in which he says he takes due notice of some of his Vassals having one Night Assassinated a Christian & had sent Messengers to his Ministers to punish the Offenders, & to do justice so that the like may not happen again, & desires the Chief to do all he can on his part likewise to prevent it.

In the Evening the Chief went to the Old Linguists where he met the Young Prince, who was sent by his Brother to desire We would send him a Party of Soldiers, with some Guns, Ammunition and Rice, and likewise to consult with the Chief about recovering Mattaly from the Canarees, as he said a Party of them had Joined his Rebellious Subjects. To this the Chief answered him that he could not on any Account assist his Highness against the Canarees, that he must very well remember the Treaty he had entered into with them during the late Chiefs time, without ever making him privy to it, although We were Mediators in the Peace before that, made between them, besides his Highness had Messengers even at present with Pallireon about finishing the Treaty he had entered into which would render such a step at this juncture very impolitick, and more than all this, that his Highness ought well to consider whether he was well prepared & had money by him sufficient to carry on a War, should he rashly involve himself in one; It was therefore his opinion that his Highness had better give over all thoughts of attempting to recover Matalay by Force, and return to his Palace leaving about Two hundred men in those parts which would be sufficient to Protect his Subjects against any Insults from the remainder of Ockoo's Rebellious Gang. The Young Prince had nothing to object against this Advice, & promised to acquaint his Brother with it, desiring at the same time that the Chief would likewise impart it to himself by Letter which he promised to do the next day, and took leave.

Instant he had Contracted for the Eight great Masts for Bombay at Three hundred and Fifty Rupees each and the Two small ones at Two hundred Rupees each amounting to Three thousand Two hundred & Twenty Rupees, Fourteen hundred Rupees of which he had paid now, Fourteen hundred Rupees he was to pay next July and the remaining Four hundred and Twenty Rupees in September, and the Masts to be delivered in November next. He says that the Merchant is a Man of Credit & Substance, his Name Maunacadem Cojagi, & that he has sent his People inland to provide them, but Three or Four of them he has by him, which he shall shortly examine and receive. As to the Coir Cordage he has bought One hundred Candys of the First and Second Sort, one with another at Thirty four Rupees & an half $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy. The Samorine has not Yet paid him any money, concerning which Mr. West had wrote to him by a Pattamar, as had also the Governour of Callicut, but no answer was yet come. He complains of the disorderly Behaviour & Insolencies of the Moors, which he says Mr. West can give us an Account of, as therefore the Rains are coming on, when he shall have no Refuge to fly to, and most of the Christians have left the place, he desires for his Protection & to Guard the Factory and Banksall a Serjeant and Twelve Men. He has supplied Mr. West for Rebuilding the Factory Rupees Nine thousand Four hundred Sixty seven, Thirty Six Raes & an half Viz.

ARRIVED our Hoñble Masters Ship Hardwicke Cap^t. John Hallet Commander and Mess^{rs}. Hyde, Hadley and Pinnel Supracargos designed for China, & the Mountague Cap^t. Feilder Freeman for Bengall with the Phazzesalam Cap^t. Irwin Commander and Mr. George Williamson Supracargo for Bengall likewise.

By this conveyance received a Letter from the Hoñble the President & Council dated the 20th. Instant acknowledging the receipt of our Letters dated the 28th. & 29th. of December, February the 4th. & March the 7th.

THE Mountagu & Poultney returned from Mangalore the 30th. Ultimo, but did not bring them above half the Quantity of Rice Ordered, as it was not procurable within the time limited for their stay. On the Mountagu they have laden such Stores in part of our Indents as could be spared, amounting with Treasure as ₹ Invoice to Rupees Three hundred Thirty two thousand Two hundred Seventy Nine, Three Quarters and Twenty three Raes. She had Orders to call at Onore & take in what Pepper Mr. Crommelin had provided, who with Mr. Cox had permission to proceed hither, but on closing the Letter the Commodore representing that it woud be unsafe to remain there a single Ship they ORDERED him to proceed with the Hardwicke directly hither.

They have Laden on the Mountagu Two hundred and Twenty Bales of Cotton, and Direct that in case We are assured of having an Overplus of Pepper, after Loading Six hundred Candys on the Hardwicke & reserving Three thousand

Candys for next Years Shipping to send it to the Bay, in lieu of the Two hundred and Eighty Bales of Cotton formerly lodged here, or such a Quantity as We can spare, reserving a proportional part of the Cotton, if it cannot be taken in, advising the President and Council of Fort William accordingly.

The Hardwicke arrived at Bombay from England the 31st. Ultimo and must proceed to China; They enclose us her Invoice amounting to Rupees Two hundred sixty thousand, two, & Thirty Raes, and order us to put on Board Six hundred Candys of Pepper. To pay for which they had put on Board in New Bombay Rupees, Fifty five thousand Eight hundred. And should any Sandal Wood be procurable and the Supracargos approve of it We are to Lade such a Quantity on Board as they desire, which must be paid for in Dollars, We and these Gentlemen agreeing for the Rate of them. They order us to dispatch her with the greatest Expedition to China, directing the Commander to follow his supracargos Orders, at whose request they had encreased the Stock to Two hundred and Sixty thousand Rupees, but in drawing out the Invoice say We need not confine ourselves exactly to that Sum as a few Rupees in or over will make but little difference: They enclose us a Packet from the Hoñble the Court of Directors for this Settlement by that Ship.

On settling the Mountagu's Account Short Delivery from this place, Capt. Freeman alledged that Three Quails of Coir Cordage were lost by the Tonys over-setting, which as We are the last Judges of the matter, they refer to us to settle with him.

They are glad We expect so considerable a Quantity of Pepper, and approve of our Proceedings relating thereto; with our mutually joining with the French in having fixed the price. Direct us to pay a due regard to the Hoñble Company's Orders in the Packet sent us for procuring all that is possible, and Order Us to advise the President and Council of Fort William what Quantity We expect to have the ensuing Season, after reserving Three thousand Candys above taken notice of.

They approve of our having Contracted with the Old Linguist for Rice for our Garrison, & Mr. Jenkinson having represented how great a Sufferer he must be, if obliged to perform his Contract for Arrack, at his request they are willing to relinquish it.

They should be unwilling to be the first European Nation, that submitted to pay Customs on Plank and Timber at Callicut, but the late Instance of the Portuguese shewing, that it is a Point the Government will not give up, and they having been obliged to comply, it is not to be expected that We alone should be exempted, however Order us to try what can be done by expostulation, and any Success We meet with, will be agreeable.

They allow of our giving the Collector for receiving the Revenues of Durmatam Twenty Rupees ₹ Month, in hopes that he will be diligent, and thereby our Hoñble Masters find an Encrease. They permit us to make such an Advance as We think reasonable to the Pay of Pedro Veigas at Tannore, but not to exceed Six Rupees ₹ Month.

They approve of our Keeping the Books of this Settlement in Rupees, Quarters & Raes, and will send us a Doctor after the Rains if a proper One can be met with.

They consign us by the Mountagu Three hundred thousand Rupees, being all could be got ready with Two Chests of Sevilian Dollars. They expected Fifty thousand Rupees more from Surat, part of it in Gold, but the Grab not appearing and being late in the Season, they do not choose to detain the Ships, but will forward it if possible, by one of the latter Ones. But before the Mountagu was clear of the Harbour, the Cruizer coming in with the Treasure they sent it us with a Line dated the 22^d. amounting to as ₹ Invoice Rupees Fifty thousand Three hundred Seventy three.

They recommend to us again the speedy Dispatch of the Hardwicke for China.

They advise us that Mr. Rawdon was on the Mountagu for Anjengo, but in case that Ship did not touch there; direct us to procure him a Conveyance, and in that case to Land the Treasure from the Mountagu designed for that Settlement, and to send it with him.

They send down on the Poultney Felix Castell Serjeant and on the Mountagu Samuel Palmer Corporal, Zachariah Silvester, & Joaikim Figurado Topasses, who are all paid to the last of this month.

They enclosed us an Indent of the Land Paymasters which they Order us to comply with.

The Letter from the Honble Court of Directors is Dated the 8th. of June by Ship Hardwicke Cap^t. John Hallett Commander who was Ordered to call first at this place to Land Twenty five Chests of Treasure to avoid the Risque up the Coast and Fifty Bales of Long Ells to prevent the Moth getting into them. In case She had come hither, and could not reach Bombay and the Supracargos had judged proper to Land any of the Cargo designed for this place, We were ORDERED to take charge of it, and in that case to have opened the Packet for Bombay in the Supracargos Presence for our mutual guidance but afterwards to forward it to Bombay by first proper Opportunity. In said case We are likewise ORDERED to put on Board the Hardwicke what Pepper could be spared after reserving sufficient for the Loading of their other Ships, and if there was no Country Ship from Bombay to China, some Sandal Wood, if any was on hand with any other Article proper for the China Market and to have Consigned her upon their Accounts to the Supracargos.

They are informed that some Foreign Ships are coming out with a design to procure a Loading of Pepper on this Coast, and doubt not of our buying all the Pepper procurable at their Settlements, but recommended to us to purchase what We can on all other parts of the Coast, either for them or our own Country Trade, so that they may be discouraged from attempting that Trade in future.

SATURDAY 14TH. THE CHIEF answer'd the Princes letter and acquainted him that the Nairs he had desired were on their march to him.

MONDAY 16. YESTERDAY about four in the Afternoon the French Brigantine having been first unloaded run ashore a little to the Southward of Mahie where Boyanores people immediately seized her, and a Guard that the French had sent to take care of her retired, Boyanores people telling them that had she even run ashore at Mahie they would have seized her.

TUESDAY 17 RECEIVED a letter dated the 14th. Instant from the Callicut Linguist advising that he had reced ours of the 5th. and had sent by two Jungadas the Chiefs Letter to the Samorine, and that on the 10th. he had received twelve Thousand fanams more of Parra Madamby on Account of the 1st. Ola.

THURSDAY 19TH. We have for this month past had incessant rains and hard weather: and this morning the Ensign at Maddacarra advises that the weather had been so violent, that he was afraid [that] the Batary [sic] at Mattamoy point was in Danger.

SATURDAY 21 THE Nairs we sent on the 14th. Instant to the Princes Assistance have had a Battle with Ockoos Gang whom they attacked and drove out of Putture before the Princes people came up and are now preparing to attack a Pagoda in which they have refortified themselves in, Two of our people were killed and nine wounded, The rebells left fifteen dead behind them; but how many of them were killed or wounded is not known. The Prince desiring a reinforcement, we have order'd fifty more Nairs and Tivees to be ready to go with those who brought the wounded men here, and will return to the prince in a day or two, as there is good hopes at present of entirely destroying Ockoos Gang.
Our Nairs Attack and Drive the Rebels.

TUESDAY 24. THE Princes people on the arrival of the reinforcement sent them as mentioned on the 21st. Attacked the Pagoda in which the Rebells had fortified themselves and took it a brother of Ockoo who is at the head of them narrowly escaping, they left five dead bodies behind them.

By private advices from Madrass of the 19th. Ultimo, we hear that our Honible Masters Ship the York arrived there the 3^d. and Sailed the 16th. for China, She left the Downs the 24th. of Jañry but brought no fresh news.

THE Pattamar we dispatched with our Advices to Bombay by the way of Goa, on the 15th. Ultimo returned this Evening. The Padre to whom our Packet was recommended advises that he reced it on the 4th. of this month and forwarded it on the 11th. Instant.

WE are informed that the French Company have given very Strict orders to reduce the Expences at Mahie; and in Order thereto have not only lessened the number of Companys Servants and Military but have likewise reduced their pay.

of this outstanding Ballance three hundred twenty seven Rupees two quarters and Eighty reas is due from several persons who have rented Land at four Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Acre, but being in poor circumstances and having expended what little matter they have in cultivating their Ground are unable to pay their rent, before they have cut their Batty, which will be next month if the weather is favourable, otherwise not till October. It is therefore AGREED to allow them till that time to pay their rent; The remaining Eleven hundred Sixty three Rupees one quarter and eighty reas consist in five thousand Eight hundred seventeen parah, four measures of Salt, valued at one Fanam $\frac{3}{4}$ parah which this season bearing but a low price has not been disposed of as in all probability it will by and by rise.

THE Collector reports that he finds several Persons who have rented land do not make the Just improvements they ought to do and this we understand is Chiefly owing to their Indigency and want of means to bear the expence of planting, taking which into consideration and finding a great backwardness in the Inhabitants for renting any more land at four Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Acre, we come to the following resolution, To take ten good Tivees into pay at three Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ month to work along with the Madagascar Slaves, and to appoint Francisco de Soaz Muccadom over them, at eight Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ month, (who is a person skilled in planting and husbandry) to direct them, by this means we shall be able soon to plant and improve what land remains, and then there will never be wanting people to farm it; and as amongst

the several persons who have rented Land nobody (but Ensign Johnson and Serjeant Frasur) have made the improvements they ought, It is AGREED that in case this year they are guilty of the same neglect that the land be taken from them. And the Collector further reporting that since the last valuation of the Trees which was seven or eight years ago there are several grown up which now bear fruit, and do not pay their full value, he is Ordered to take the vereadores & as soon as the weather will permit to new value all the Trees on the Island.

MANOEL RODREGUES who Collects the Rents and Revenues of Tellicherry and Moylan delivers in his Annual Account and pays the Ballance being Rup^a. one thousand four hundred fifty three one quarter and Sixty raes into the Treasury. The Amount on the Duty on Goa Arrack retailed in our limits for last Year Amount to Rupees seventy five and is paid in by Antonio Paes.

ORDERD that the forementioned Accounts be entered after this Consultation.

OUR Pepper Merchants representing to us that since their last Contract with us for two thousand Candys of Pepper at eighty five Rupees ₹ Candy, Pepper is rose inland to ninety five Rupees ₹ Candy, and that they are very much disappointed in the quantity they imagined procurable, request that in case they find it absolutely impossible to comply with their last Contract We will permit them to return what money they shall not be able to invest which they are in such case contented to do with Interest.

TAKING this into consideration; as insisting on their giving us Pepper if it is not to be had under ninety five Rupees ₹ Candy (and of that perhaps a small quantity) would not only ruin them but have a bad Effect on the price of the next Crop; It is AGREED to receive back what money they are not able to invest, on their paying Interest on it, however not to Cancell the Contract at present, but to wait and see what effect their publishing the report of our having recalled our money will have; as it is not unlikely, but the Indiscretion of our merchants in hurrying so soon to Market after their last Contract and the Expectation of a French Ship this month, may have induced the Merchants inland to make a Secret of the real quantity they have as well as demand so high a price as ninety five Rupees ₹ Candy for it.
