SOME of the Merchants being returned from the Southward and in waiting are asked the Quantity of Pepper purchased agreeable to the Contract made with them under the 1st. June last they say 150 Candies and have a prospect of securing about 300 Candies more to be delivered in all the [*sic*] of September or October next at furthest. The Board taking the above into consideration have immediate recourse to the General Letter last rec^d. from the Presidency in which our Superiors write the Price Pepper bears at present in the Country cannot answer either in Europe or India this with our having no hopes of securing Tonnage sufficient even for one ship induce the members to esteem relinquishing the Contract most Eligible as this step will be acting agreeable to the Sentiments of our superiors the Linguist (Pedro Rodriguez) is accordingly directed to use his best Endeavours with the Merchants to sell the 150 Candies (said to be already bought) on their own account and Risque positively ordering them to desist purchasing from this Day and as there is still other Merchants to the southward to advise them also immediately of our Resolution. The Linguist is advised likewise that in case the Merchants should refuse taking the Purchases already made upon themselves immediately to require an account thereof from each as no further quantity will be reced into the Hoñble Companys Warehouse their Contract being now made a Void.

RECEIVED a Letter from Fort St. David signed only by stringer Lawrence Esqr. dated the 17th. Ultimo he advises that by the Lynn the Honble Company were pleased to dismiss Mr. William Holt their service appointing The Honble Thomas Saunders Esqr. to be their President and Several of their Madrass servants of the Council he acknowledges receipt of our several Letters under the 10th. April 31st. May and 13th. June and promises duely to forward our several Packets to the Presidency. That the York and Prince Edward arrived the beginning of June both which have been dispatched Since to China. On the Grantham came out Benjamin Robins Esqr. as Enginier General to the Honble Company but that the Duke of Cumberland her Consort was unfortunately lost upon the Coast of Guinea near Cape Verd and no part of her Cargoe yet saved her Treasure indeed the Supra Cargoes had some hopes of having fettet out a sloop and Long Boat to fish upon the Wreck at the proper season.

WROTE Mr. Richard Secker at Callicut in answer to his severals under the 18th. and 24th. Ultimo, that as Captain Mostyn had made good the sixty four Rupees the sum he proposed Crediting this Factory was right. It was recommended to him to watch the several steps of Condoty Paqui's Nephew keeping us Constantly advised but that he must on no Account think of Purchasing the 30 Candies at the Price Pepper now bears. We forwarded to him six Quire of small Paper and he was acquainted that by the next Conveyance we should forward him an account of 18 Musquets and Bayonets.

RECEIVED an Ola from Ally Rajah in answer to that wrote him by the Chief under the 1st. Instant in respect to his ambergrease wherein he writes that so soon as the Month was expired he should send us his Opinion by two of his Writers.

QUILOTU CARIAOPERRANORE, Comparratu Nombier, and Quippadatu Nombier in an Ola to the Linguist, advise that notwithstanding they all entered into an agreement to adhere to the Prince against Boyanore yet one Currungutty Cariao Parrenour had been at the Boyanores annuversary [*sic*] the Youngest of whom as they hear intending to marry into his Family on the 19th. Instant to prevent which they esteem it necessary the Prince should be at Mennaporratu as on the 10th. oherwise others may be induced to follow the bad Examples set them by this Nombier and which may be attended with bad Consequences.

THE Chief wrote the Prince of Cherrika acquainting him with the substance of the Preceding Ola which he is desired to weigh well in order to put a stop to such a Proceeding as otherwise others may be induced to follow the Example of the Nombier, and that if he was sincerely bent to persue this wholesom advice, it was necessary his Highness should come to Tellicherry before the 10th. that proper means might be concerted.

IN answer to the prementioned Nombiers Ola to the Linguist the Chief advised them that he was sensibly pleased at what they Communicated with which the Prince had been acquainted and that so soon as he received his Highness Resolution they should be immediately advised.

AT the same time the Chief wrote to Quilotu Nombier in answer to his received the 1st. Instant offering his Mediation to settle the Differences between himself and Quippadatu Nombier.

THE Prince agreeable to his Ola, Came to the Fort accompanied by the second King of Nelleaseroon who for sometime past has been with his Highness solliciting assistance against Como and the 3^d. King of Neleaseroon. The Old subject of Boyanores taking upon himself the Title of King and the Dissafection of Coringoda

Nair was opened by the Prince who expatiated largely on the ill Consequences of the formers marrying with the latters Daughter which he was determined to prevent either by Fair or Foul means, and show Boyanore at the same time that he had no [sic] yet laid aside his Resentment for his late Rash Action, whom he should pursue till he might reduce him to his former Obedience for carrying a War and raising Men his Intentions were to make use of the Treasures in some of the Pagodas in Irreavanadaddu which he says will be sufficient His Highness advises that the Samorine

Prince of Cherricka accompany by the 2^d. King of Nellesaroon come to Tellicherry a conference with.

is at he hears at the Head of thirty thousand Men (30000) and intends Joining with him which if true and the King of Cotiote, Nombiers and other Powers Can be induced to furnish their several Quotas he does not in the le[a]st Doubt of soon obliging Boyanore to alter his Conduct, he intimated however being under some apprehension of the French whose alliance Boyanore is seeking and who has offered them his Grant for Limits to break off therefore this negotiation his Highness desired the Chief would have a Conference with the Gentlemen at Mahie on this subject and proposed making the same offer provided they would Join in Opposing Boyanores Measures. The Chief replied it was a thing very impracticable the having a Conference with the French as they had never shown the le[a]st Inclination and in Respect to what has Passed by Letters between the two settlements they had acted so contrary to their Professions that no Confidence Could be had in any agreements with them and insisted strenuously against his Highness giving them his Royal Grant for Limits which would be inverting them with a Just Title whereas any thing from the Boyanore was invalid and that there had been to many Instances of the French their infringing agreements so soon as their own Views were answered to think of Confiding in them on this or any other Occasion, the Prince therefore was desired not to Purchase so Precarious a Friendship at such a dear Rate as the strengthening those who when their Interest intervned would become Enemies and as we for our Good Offices in this affair did not desire any new Grants it was unreasonable in them to Expect any. His Highness was then advised rather to adjust the present Differences between the 2^d. and 3^d. Kings of Neleaseroon and Como than employ any of his Forces that way which would of Consequences weaken him and at a time when the whole of his Troops were wanted to keep the Enemies of his Pallace in a proper subjection which his Highness acquiesced with and the Chief then talked apart with the Second King of Nellesaroon who made Great Complaints against the other two but on being offered the Chief Mediation to reconcile their Differences he Consented and Gave many assurances that his Actions should show who was the most faithfull subject to the Prince, upon which Condition he was promised on all occasions to have reasonable favours shown him.

THE Chief reminded the Prince that the time was greatly Elapsed since satisfaction was promised on the Person who murdered a Nair in our Interest which his Highness said was true but that we should hear in a few days of Justice being duely Executed upon which he took his Leave and returned to the Pagoda.

THE Chief wrote the Nombiers acquainting them of the Princes arrival at Tellicherry, to settle therefore the affairs of Cartanaddu the necessity of their coming here immediately was hinted to them.

Instant they waited on the Chief this Morning in Company with two of the Princes Ministers, on talking over the present Posture of Affairs and how necess[ary] it was at this Juncture for all friends to the Palace of Cherrika to unite in opposing Enemies thereof they expressed their Readiness to assist with their Forces against those who were making

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Rich^d. Secker acknowledging ours under the 7th. Instant with the supply of Paper. He advises that Condoty Paquis Nephew has not hitherto purchased any Pepper should he hereafter we may be assured of being acquainted and that Captain Mostyns List of Musquets and Bayonets was agreeable to his Remains.

TUESDAY

In answer to the Ola wrote the King of Cotiote under the 11th. he promises to send two of his Ministers to Tellicherry and bids us be assured of his Friendly Offices in respect to the Present Posture of affairs.

IMPORTED the Severn Captain Richard Dorrill and Mamoodly Captain James Barton from Bombay bound for the Bay.

THIS Evening arrived two Rajahdores from the King of Cotiote, with whom the Chief discoursed on the present scituation of Affairs but finding from the answers they made which were only in General Terms of their not being impowered to Come to any Determinate agreement for the Good of the Common Cause they were dismissed with the following Letter to their Master from the Chief.

I HAVE Conferred fully with your Rajahdores but as meeting with your Majesty is I think necessary please to advise me if the same is agreeable to your sentiments and the place most Convenient. THE Chief also wrote an Ola to the King of Bednure Translate of which is as follows.

AGREEABLE to your Majestys Letter, I have used all good Offices with the Prince of Cherrika to get the three Elephants Conveyed through his Dominions the assistance and favours showed your People Custo Podiar will inform your Majesty.

WHEN the present General of Bombay (M^r. Wake) was Chief of Tellicherry he wrote your Majesty and Ministers that a Munchua belonging to our Linguist being pursued by Angria under Mattaly Guns, the Naique in Command instead of protecting plundered her Contrary to the Friendship between your Majesty and the Hon^{ble} Company the amount in ready money delivered by the people of the Munchua to the Naique by Name Modim Curicale was Rupees One thousand two hundred and Fifty two (R^s. 1252. —, —) Exclusive of the Vessells Tackling &c^a. as no answer has hitherto been rec^d. from your Majesty nor any satisfaction given (which is not quite agreeable to the articles of agreement between your Majesty and the Hon^{ble} Company) I am in doubt whether it has ever Come to your knowledge. Though I have it in my Power to take Redress yet I choose to pursue this means relying on your Majesty's Equity.

In the articles between your Majesty and the Hon^{ble} Company it was settled that they should have at the Port of Mangulore three hundred Corge of Rice free of Adlamy but the Governour of that Place for his own private Interest will only allow us two hundred Corge obliging us to take the Remainder at other Ports which being Prejudicial to us I request an order may be sent to the Governour of Mangulore to give us the three hundred Corge there, I am of Opinion these Complaints (through some designing Ministers) have been kept from your Majesty as I persuade myself here now they would have been remedied.

THE Seaman returned us by Captain Dorrill by Name William Nickoll is Called in and asked why he deserted from the Bombay Service? who answers that having Thoughts of being Baker to Cap^t. Dorrill induced him but adds that it was without his knowledge.

Seaman belonging to Capt. Dorrill called on to give his reasons for deserting the Bbay service. likewise

HE was asked likewise whether he had ever been Examined in respect to the Loss of the Restoration? who said he was not, therefore agreeable to the Resolution of Council this day, he was called on for his Deposition being first sworn by the Chief and at the same time fully acquainted with the Nature of an [sic] Path and Several times urged to him by the Chief to take care in what he did dipose [sic] to do it without favour and affection and without Prejudice Malice or fear.

whether had been Examined in respect to the Loss of the Restoration Grab.

THE FOLLOWING IS HIS DEPOSITION

THAT the Restoration Grab left this Place in Company with the Prince William (as he beleives but is not Certain in Respect to the ships Name) that in their Passage they called in at Goa from whence after taking in their Wood and Water they put out, the next day being about three Leagues to the Northw^d. it began to snuffle or blow a little but in his Opinion not of any Consequence however Captain Leeke thought proper to bear away before it and Run so low down as Pidgeon Island at which time the Gale abated Captain Leeke he thinks then haled the Europe Commander he does not Rembemer [sic] only that he bore away immediately. The hours for repairing his Rigging all which Captain Leeke said was greatly damaged he would proceed with him to Bombay but the answer made by the Europe Commander he does not Remember [sic] only that he bore away immediately. The Deponent says to the best of his Knowledge he does not Remember any other Damage than the snapping of a Pair of Fore-shrouds; after this that they made the best of their way for Goa and being arrived they took in Provisions of sorts laying there about three or four days That afterwards they weighed from the Alguada and they had not he thinks been forty eight hours before they put back; but Can't say what might induce Captain Leeke to this step as he does not Remember there was at that time any bad Weather. After puting back that Captain Leeke sent for a Pilot who Carried the Vessel to a Place Called Britoun where they lay till about the beginning [sic] of September without meeting with any thing material. That they then got Every thing in Readiness for sailing and accordingly got over the Barr and that about the 5th. of said Month (to the best of his Remembrance) they again weighed from the Alguarde and in a few days was abreast of the Vingorla Rocks and afterwards run the Length of Gheria they then had a small squall from the Land which carried away the Collar of the Mizen stay which was presently secured by Tackles however Captain Leeke called his Officers and said he thought it was proper to bear away for Goa Giving for Reason that his Topsails were not sufficient to bear the Weather at that time of the year The Deponent was asked whether they had not two suits of sails? who answered that they had, but that the best were then to the yards which were neither new nor Old but very Good sails accordingly they put about and Run before it to Goa where they went over the Barr that same Night and arrived at a Place called Ponjee. That some days after the Captain sent on board some Canvass with which a New Main and Fore Topsail was made that they laid there till the 4th. of Oct^r. in which time they took in a Large quantity of Elephants Teeth Marked I.L. and some T.I. with other Goods That the 6th. of October they weighed from the Alguarde and had a fine Easy Breeze till they Came the Length of Gheriah which was the 11th. following The Mates that day took an Observation and advised the Commander who said " Damn 'em they were fools and their Quadrants not worth a straw and that they might fling 'em over board for that he was Certain they were off of Dabull " upon which they stood in for the Land and the next day the 12th. in the morning they descryed

two Gallivats to Windward of them of which the Commander was advised who addressed himself to the People (then at Breakfast [*sic*]) saying "Come my Boys make haste I believe we shall have something Else to do day [*sic*]." That the Gallivats Came within Got shot and haled them and asked from whence they came when an Answer was given Bombay. They then bore away and fired two Guns which as he afterwards learnt was a signal for Angrias Fleet to Come out which they did and about two O Clock Came so near that they began the attack which held that day and Night, that during Angrias Fleet. Continued at some Distance the Commander this Deponent says behaved very well (like a Man) That about 8 O Clock at Night the people being at supper, the hand Granadoe chest in the Main Top took fire which did no damage few of them bursting, the Commander upon which ordered those in the Fore Top and Mizen Top to be handed down and struck down in the hold where they Remained the whole time of Engaging. That about One or two in the Morning they had a fresk Breeze attended with a Large swell but as the Log had not been flung he Cant say Certainly but thinks they went five Knots if not more the Commander being then asleep the 2^d. Officers Mr. Briton went Down and Gave Captain Leeke his Opinion that they had better Stand out to the Westward as Angrias Fleet (he imagined) would not follow on Account the swell when Captain Leeke Answered that he would stand his direct Course let what would happen. That the same morning between seven or eight O Clock it began to fall Calm Angrias Fleet being then greatly to Windward which afterwards got together in a Body and as they imagined to hold a Consultation It being still Calm that they could neither Veer nor Steer. That about Eleven they perceived Angrias Fleet bearing down to them and that between twelve and One Angria began to engage a second time which they continued about an hour and One quarter before they clapped them on board which they did by three Grabs on their Weather Quarter so soon as they were Clapped on board Captin Leeke called all hands aft upon the Quarter Deck notwithstanding there were still two Grabs ahead and the Gallivats all Round them. This Deponents Quarters being at the two Prow Guns the Commander ordered him from them as also some others upon the Fore Castle from whence they fired eight or ten Vallies [*sic*] of small shot but the main stay being Carried away almost Close to the Collar the Commander ordered it to be steadied again which was immediately done by a Tackle Fall which was no sooner done than the Commander ordered them from the Fore Castle aft with which this Deponent Complied with and Joined the soldiers with small Arms. That he then fired several times into the Grabs but says Could not see above two or three Men. That Captain Leeke fired several times two small Carbines into the same Vessell when he ordered his servant to reload them and who told him there was no more ammunition upon which he said Musquit bid^s. his servant lay them down, and then took a Broad sword in his hand and went off of the Quarter Deck on the Starboard side after which this Deponent did not see him till he with the other People went into the hold. That after the Commander left the Quarter Deck several of the People Cried out "strike the Colours and that one Peter Thomas being at the swivele Blunderbuss upon the Quarter Deck to the Right of this Deponent quitted it and ran to the Ensign Halleards directly beginning [*sic*] to hall them down the Deponent seeing which presented his Musquet at him and one John Midwinter a Soldier Clapped his hand between the Cock and Pom which prevented its Going off at the same time desiring this Deponent to be Easy that as the Captain was gone they could do nothing.

That Mr. Johnson seeing the Colours down came upon the Quarter Deck from the Cabin and asked who it was that struck the Colours? when the prementioned Peter Thomas made answer the Captain upon which Mr. Johnson ordered them to be hoisted again which being hoisted about three parts staff the said Mr. Johnson Cried That since they were struck to all them down alledging that in Case they should have been hoisted again and Angria afterwards got the better that no Quarters might probably be granted Them, when Mr. Johnson went down to the Cabbin and fetched his hanger (the Captain not being there to deliver his sword) and that was some time after before any one Came into the Vessell when some of their own

People Called them in Mr. Johnson then presented his hanger but that Angrias People made a motion for him to Go off the Quarter Deck upon which he flung it down and went into the Hold as did also the Deponent and found the Captain setting at the Lazareto Door.

AN Ola was wrote to Ally Rajah desiring him to send us his Determinate Resolution in respect to his Ambergrease as soon as possible and that in case he should not chuse to sell it at the Price already advised then to send money for the Discharge of his debt to the Hoñble Company but that if he Complied with he must esteem himself [*sic*] the Author of Every ill Consequence which might hereafter happen.

RECEIVED an answer from Ally Rajah wherein he mentions that so soon as their Feast was over he should send two of his Writers to Tellicherry about the Ambergrease and Expressed a surprise at the stile of the Chiefs Ola.

A RAJAHDORÉ belonging to the 3^d. King of Nelleaseroon sent hither to negotiate the Differences between his Master and the 2^d. King took his leave of the Chief and intimated that upon a proper invitation the 3^d. King he judged would Come to Tellicherry as his Presence is absolutely necessary at this time the Chief accordingly wrote him a proper Ola on the Occasion sending a Munchua with a Serjeants Command to wait on him hither.

SATURDAY
25TH.

THE Elder and Young Prince of Cherrika accompanied by the Prince of Neleaseroon waited upon the Chief this Morning and the two latter being withdrawn into a separte apartment the Prince of Cotacuna represented how desirous he was to accommodate the Differences between his Pallace and Palliarem in respect to his Obligation to the Bednure Rajah which could only be done by the Hoñble Companys Intercession. To which he was answered that we were always ready to do any good offices for the service of his Highness but that there was a Piece of Justice promised us from time to time and which had not hitherto been put in Execution and of Consequence till it was we Could not with any Alacrity trouble ourselves about any Differences. The Prince then sent some of his Rajahdores to his Brother in the next room to acquaint him therewith who gave great assurances that we should have satisfaction on that Head in about twenty or thirty days.

THE Prince then reassumed the Discourse and advised the Chief that he had taken all suitable measures to induce the neighbouring Powers to oppose Boyanores ambitious Designs that he found the King of Cotiote and others very willing to Join with him and had reason to beleive the Samorine would likewise but the Cotiote demanded the Payment of all Charges he should be at on the occasion to which he had given for Answer that what got from the Boyanore should be equally divided, the Cotiote however objected that when his Highness obtained satisfaction for his own Injuries should he thereupon make up affairs that the half of what was got might not be nigh sufficient to indemnify his Charges, therefore as the Boyanore was in Possession of the Country [*Lacuna*] formerly belonging to the Kings of Cotiote it was but reasonable that the Boyanore should be obliged to the delivery of that Country and that afterwards an Equal Division be made of what Else might be Got from the Boyanore, which the Chief esteeming equitable the Prince consented there-to and Promised that so soon as he left the Fort he would send the 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon and some of his own Ministers to treat thereon and invite the King of Cotiote to a meeting with other Powers and the Chief. His Highness thereupon retired to the next apartment when the Young Prince with the 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon Came out to whom the above Conference was reiterated, the Former pleaded hard for an advance of Money to Carry on the Negotiation with Palliarem as well as to oppose Boyanore but was given to understand it must not be Expected and that if we were to be employed to bring the former to an accommodation it was necessary a sum of Money should be deposited that we might not make Promises and have them broke afterwards, and after many agreements the young Prince at last Promised to make over to the Honble Company a parcel of Batty Grounds the Produce to be Collected by us. The two Princes of Cherrika with the 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon then took their Leave the two former set out for Cherrika and Latter for Cottote.

A RAJAHDORE arrived this Morning from Ally Rajah and Came to the Fort he acquainted the Chief that Ally Rajah was not willing to let his Ambergrease go at the Rate advised from Bombay as he could find means of disposing of it here at much more advantage; to pay off the whole of his Debt was what Could not be Expected from him in his present Circumstances a Debt of so long standing and not contracted in his time but his Predecessors to lessen it gradually we might be assured of his but Endeavours. To which the Chief answered that when his Master began to Convince us his Intentions were real by paying such sums from time to time as his Circumstances might permit we should not be pressing and that as to the Ambergrease the Presidency should be advised Chaddea Mupa (the Rajahdore) being esteemed an honest Man and when employed many of the Companys affairs always acted uprightly the Chief desired he would prevail if possible with Ally Rajah (over whom its said he has an Influence) to discharge this Debt from time to time which the Rajahdore said all Endeavours in his Power should be used to induce his master to pay it off.

THE Collector acquainted the Chief that John Frazier had complained [*sic*] to him of having had several of his Pepper Vines Cut in the Night time by which he is like to be a Considerable suferer and as it's Judged or at least suspected this may be done by the soldiers to put a stop therefore to such an Evil the Chief ordered Captain Mostyn immediately to write Lieutenant Johnson for him to advise Each particular soldier that the Cutting of Trees Plants Vines &c^a. with an Intent to destroy is Guilty of Felony and that if any should hereafter be found Culpable of this Pernicious Crime will be prosecuted in the manner the Law directs in such Cases as also all such who screen any such Offenders.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo wherein they acknowledge our severals under the 9th. May and 24th. July with the Treasure and Packet from the Presidency. They advise that their Investments both of Cloth and Pepper exceeding all Expectation oblige them to apply to us for a supply of Rupees Fifty thousand (50000. —. —) which they earnestly desire may be remitted in the quickest manner either by sea or Land they preferr either Venetians or China Gold

to Rupees if the former is to be had from four hundred and thirty to four hundred and forty Rupees ^{of} One hundred (100) Venetians and shoe Gold of ninety two Touch at about four hundred and thirty Rupees P^r. shoe. They express an Uncertainty in respect to the quantity of Pepper they may be able to provide and which they assign as a Reason for ascertaining the sum which may be required from us in the whole but Judge 120000. — — will be suffict [sic] to serve them till the end of December and request us to remit that sum from time to time as opportunities offer. They acquaint us with the several alterations at Fort S^t. David and the arrival there of the shipping from England.

A RAJAHDORRE arrives from the King of Cotiote who acquaints the Chief that his Master is desirous of having a meeting with him tomorrow at Erenhole and would be greatly pleased if the 2 Princes of Cherrika and 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon, might be present at the Conference which was readily Consented to.

THE Storekeeper lays before the Board the store Books brought up and Closed to the 31st. Two of the Nombiers then strenuously argued for not entering into the Common Cause without the Prince would Engage to reimburse all Expences but being immediately told by the King of Cotiote that in Case they did not Act in Conjunction with him and the Powers then Present they would be looked as Enemies to the Publick Good they acquiesced: The King of Cotiote wanted much to draw the Hon^{ble} Company into Engagements inconsistent with our superiors Orders but due Care was taken to let him understand how far we Could go, he seemed very apprehensive lest the French should side with Boyanore when it was recommended to him to bind his thoughts towards the Samorine hand [sic] endeavour if possible to prevail with him to enter into the General alliance whose Forces Joined with those of the other allies would be sufficient to give a Check to any such Intentions of the French. At Parting his Majesty made many Professions of Friendship to the Hon^{ble} Company and promised to Oblige Cacart Tupy to Come to some Clearance of his Debt.

Stretham in Dec^r. 1748 from the Presidency mentioning a Chest of Locks which not having been rec^d. by us and the same Judged to have been sent to their Factory we requested they would make enquiry into it and advise us thereof. We thanked them for the news they Communicated to us from the other Coast and assured them of all due care being taken of each Packets they might transmit us for the Presidency.

IN Conformity to the Directions of last Council We have looked over the Island Durmapatam taking to our assistance Lieutenant John Johnson, John Frazier, Kellepo Nair and Mannaree Corouropa and find the Grounds thereon to be as follows.

THE Hoñble Company's Plantations in general are very ill looked after so much that those whom we took to our assistance esteemed Trees that have been planted six years to be only the growth of four years, and others that have been planted four years to be only the growth of two years and a half. The Coffrees have been suffered to sow Yams in the Hoñble Company's Plantations which is esteemed prejudicial to the Trees as being of a hot nature therefore We think this should not be permitted in future. The above mentioned people judge it will be eight years before any of the Hoñble Companys Plantations will yield Coconuts, excepting a few Trees that are near some of the Coffrees Houses which now give fruit and that every acre of Ground should have two People to look after it. They likewise are of opinion that Pepper would grow very well in most of the Grounds sett in the manner Johnsons and Frazers are that is between the Coconut Trees at Meylure there are several large Trees proper for Pepper Vines and as they esteem this a fit place for the same We beg leave to recommended [sic] it to your consideration.

THE Plantations of Christopher Bilderbeck, John Johnson, Edward Targett John Frazier, and Joseph Alves are in a flourishing condition and well cultivated but that of Leonard Lopez is in a very bad Condition it being not near half planted with Trees nor what is half taken care off.

SEVERAL People who have Grounds on benefit or Improvement have taken but little care to plant the same sufficiently with Trees therefore We think they should be called on, and that in future great care ought to be taken when Ground is given in this manner to see its well planted that is for every acre of Land to contain one hundred Coconut Trees as also that no more Ground be given to any one Person that what he has circumstances to improve or cultivate many of these People who have land on benefit have gathered fruit some for six years some for five years and so on and hitherto have paid nothing to the Hoñble Company therefore We think their several Grants or leases should be examined into that our Hoñble Masters may receive their proportion and the People obliged to perform what stipulated therein.

WE can't help begging leave to recommend to your favour Kiaca Manna and Ponnapa Conna Moupa their Grounds being both better cultivated and more care taken of than any We see who have Lands on benefit the formers Plantation now bears and ought to pay what stipulated by agreem^t. but the Collectors assistants informed us the late Chief the last Year as an encouragement allowed him three years longer.

WE are of opinion there ought to be kept in the Collectors office a Register Book of every Person that have Lands on the Island, specifying the quantity of Ground each Man has, the Condition, with the time he took it &^a. for want of which we were obliged to have recourse to his assistants.

Be please to advise me. [Lacuna.] I return your Worships my Obedient Thanks for the favours you been be pleased to advise me if any Body of those People which is to be Relieved what money they may owe me for Beef &c^a. to send the account of [sic] I must humbly advise your Worships that I sell nothing to no Body and have no manner Dillings [sic] with any soldier that they receive their Pay. and Buy their Provisions at the best Rate they can get it. as I done [sic] like to reenter my money amongst them and remain with Dutifull Respects.

THE Storekeeper reports his having enquired how the 3 Musquets and 3 Cartouch Boxes were lost as appears by his Receipts and Issues for last Month, and by what represented to him it seems they were lodged at Captain Mostyn house in the Limits from whence they were stole; This being duely Considered the Board observe that as there is a place in the Fort set aside for the Lodgement of all Arms where they Certainly ought to have been deposited and not in an Empty House It is therefore AGREED and the storekeeper accordingly directed to Recover their amount of Captain Mostyn.

THE Accomptant lays before the Board the General Books of this Factory for the last Year Ballanced and Closed which are Passed and accordingly Signed.

The Unjustness of their laying an Impediment on the Effects of Coyporratu Maylaporrin Unicoru Nombier was also set forth which they are requested to take off till they come to Tellicherry when every Thing may be properly settled.

RECEIVED an Ola from Young Prince of Cherrika in which he writes that there been only two Braminies with him who had no Orders whatever from Boyanore the Conference our Linguist Could well informs [sic] us of and Gave us Repeated Assurances that till Boyanore relinquished his assumed Title he should never Treat with him. His Highness Expresses himself perfectly ignorant of any War being designed between the 2^d. and 3^d. Kings of Nelleaseroon and desires his sending any People to the assistance of the former which he writes would be greatly inconsistent with the Friendship between himself and the Latter. The Satisfaction required he promises to Give us before coming to Tellicherry but in the Interim would send some of his Rajahdores to talk over the affairs of Rhandoterrah.

THE chief and council having thought Proper to make some Regulations in Respect to the Payment of the Military and their several stoppages for Cloathing &c^a. I am now to direct that you deliver into the Paymaster a Calculate of the Cost of Each Persons Coat from a serjeant to a Topass when the same will be considered of and proper Orders given the Paymaster.

As frequent Disputes have of late arose at the Pay Table you are therefore to be present when the PayM^r. pays manner [*sic*] of your Company that in Case any should happen in future they may be adjusted there you carrying your accounts with you for that Purpose.

IT being Inconsistent and unreasonable that the Pay of a soldier should revert to his Commander on his Death which the Chief and Council find has been practised even though Contrary to the 17th. Par^a. of the Regulations now in the Guard Room and the Deceased not indebted to prevent therefore such an Evil you are hereby ordered to deliver into the PayM^r. a true account of what sums you have Rec^d. from the Effects or Pay of deceased soldiers since the Publication of those Regulations and the Pay Master has orders to Collect any sum or sums which may have been assessed Contrary thereto which order you are to Comply with.

SOME negligences having Crept in since the Publishing of the Regulations it is Recommended to you forthwith to rectifie the same in every Particular and to weigh the consequences of Deviating therefrom.

RECEIVED the following Olla from the Palliarem Concerning the Debt due from the Prince of Cherrika to the Bednure Rajah Viz^t.

I REC^d. your Letter relating to the affair of Bednure Rajah and am to acquaint you that it was at first agreed between the late Prince of Cherrika and my Predecessour for the former to pay two hundred thousand Pagodas but at last fixed to one hundred and two thousand upon which Condition the two Forts were delivered up by the Cannarees, this not being as yet performed by the Prince and myself a Good deal Prest by the Bednures People I request the English Company will find out

some method to oblige the Prince (Exclusive of what has been already paid) to make good the sum of forty two thousand Pagodas in order to be quit of my Engagements on this affair.

THE Chief rec^d. also an Ola from the 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon advising that he should instantly Come to Tellicherry in order to proceed to Callicut which he should sooner had he not been prevented, by the Differences between him and the 3^d. King. He writes also of a Report that the Cannarees are Certainly Coming this way with their whole Force which ought he thinks to be prevented if possible. King of Nelleaseroon Ola from.

THE Palliarem having sent two of his Rajahdores here for coming to some accommodation with the Prince the Chief therefore wrote his Highness to send some of his Ministers to treat about his Debt to the Bednure Rajah. SATURDAY 6TH.

THE Chief rec^d. an Ola from the Badencalamcur requesting some People might be sent thither to Celebrate the anniversary of his uncle, and as his Circumstances are very indifferent he desires also eight Maunds sugar. MONDAY 8TH.

RECEIVED also an Ola from the 3^d. King of Nelleaseroon advising the Chief that if agreeable he intended to have a meeting with the Prince of Cherrika at Tellicherry and in the Interim should send two of his Rajahdores to Treat with the Samorine in Conjunction with those from the 3^d. King. Nelleaseroon King of Ola from.

THE Prince arrived from Cherrika and Early this Morning waited upon the Chief, when it was agreed to write to the 3^d. King of Nelleaseroon to come here to be present to behold Relating to the affairs of the Country and accordingly an Ola was wrote as extracted hereafter, His Highness seemed determined to persevere in not permitting the Boyanore to hold the Title of King and in Case not he Effected by other means to Oppose it by force Giving assurances of doing Justice to the Hon^{ble} Company for the Insult showed them in the late Chiefs time. The Younger Prince not being here nothing further of Consequence Passed. TUESDAY 9TH. Prince of Cherricka conference with.

AGREEABLE to the Resolution of Council under the 5th. Inst^t. the sum of 4000. —. Rupees was this Evening transmitted to Mr. Richard Secker who is directed to send us by Return of the Munchua what Chunam he may have provided for this Settlement as also to hold in readiness the stores indented for the service of the Presidency. Money transmitted to Callicut.

IN answer to the Ola from the 3^d. King of Nelleaseroon the Chief wrote him that as the Prince of Cherrika was now here it was proper he should be present likewise to Consider the state of affairs.

AGREEABLE to the request of King Badencalumcur the Chief sent him six Maunds of sugar and assured his Majesty that he should keep up the same Correspondence as with his Uncle if his Conduct was such as merited the Hon^{ble} Company's Favour.

THE Weather having for these several days been very unsettled the 50000 Rupees was not sent till Early this Morning when we wrote a Letter to the Chief and Factors of Anjengo acknowledging Receipt of theirs under the 4th. Ultimo They were advised that all Endeavours had been used to procure the Gold they requested but to no Purpose and that this Remittance had reduced our Cash so low that we Cannot without taking up the sum at Interest send them the remaining Twenty thousand Rupees for which Purpose therefore desired their directions. As to our Investment of Pepper which still bears a high Price, we Could form no Judgment what we may be able to provide till the new Crop was Gathered but should advance Early in the season They are desired not to detain the Detachment longer than may be absolutely necessary to prevent any needless Expence. YOUR Letter of this date addressed to the Chief and Council having been Read to the Board it is their Opinion that it is not Consistent with the Respect due to your superiors as you ought to acquiesce with all Orders from them without calling their Opinions in question and which is more particularly faulty in you as being the Commanding Officer of this Garrison.

AS you seem to be unacquainted with the Negligences which have Crept in since the Regulations they are now pointed out to you Viz^t.

NEGLECT in regard to visiting the Hospital as set down in the Regulations.

THE not releiving out Posts or stations at stated Times.

THE permitting any Petty Officer or soldier to be at their House when sick and not sending them to the Hospital where a Proper care might be taken of such sick Persons without the previous Consent of the Chief. This has been fatally Experience shown in a Corporal lately whose Disorder Its Judged became Mortal from his not being timely sent to the Doctor.

THE PayM^r. declares he never had any Disputes with you but frequent Complaints having been made by your People in Respect to their accounts not being regularly settled the order which you have rec^d. is relating to them.

COMPLAINT has been made of the New Recruits you inlisted for Bombay the Greatest part being esteemed not Capable of Bearing Arms the enlisting of whom you solely was relied on as the most Proper Person to Judge whether they were able Bodied Men or not and what induced you to take such as abovementioned you best know as the Hon^{ble} President and Council of Bombay desire to know whether you advanced the said New Recruits One hundred R^s. (100. —. —.) besides the 100 Rupees delivered them by the PayM^r. I am directed to desire you will advise the Chief and Council thereof as also on what account.

THESE Particulars would have lain Dormant had not your Present Behaviour and of Consequence the Publick service Called on the Chief and Council for them.

THE Prince of Cotacuna being arrived from Cherrika Came to the Fort accompanied with his Brother, the Discourse turned upon his affairs with the Bednure Rajah and the Difficulty of raising such a Considerable sum the Chief represented to their Highness how necessary it was for them to Come to an immediate Resolution, what part thereof to pay down now and to fix some stated Times for Clearing the remainder without which it was impossible to become a Mediator, after some Debate they Joined in the Chiefs Opinion proposing to raise an immediate sum of one hundred and Thirty thousand Rupees on Condition that the Palliarem acquiesced to the Remainder its being discharged in five years more desiring our assistance in Collecting it out of his Revenues. I RETURN you thanks for advising me wherein I was Cu[I]pable in not sheking [sic] up to the Regulations.

As to visiting the Hospitall agreeable to the Regulations I gave orders to the officers to visit the same which was done by the officer that went off Guard and as for the time I was upon guard being 35 days their was no officer to do it Captain Bilderbeck being sick.

In Regard to the Differences at the pay Table the people themselves were the occasion of them they not Rembering [sic] how their accounts stood for which their accounts was Examined and they found themselves in the wrong to which every man signed his name to his account.

The aforementioned Lands being the Property of the Pagodas and not the Hoñble Companys but in September 1749 the two former were bought on the Hoñble Comp^{ys}. account and now their Value is Collected but the latter not being Bought continues to pay the same as formerly so that the Hoñble Company could not be such considerable Losers as is set forth, they not being then their property.

APPLICATION having been made to me by a Tivey who has had Five Verges in the District of Palliatta and has actually reaped no more therefrom than 1981 Dungoys of Nelly and pays the Hoñble Company 1265 Rent and the said Verges takes 500 Dungoes to saw them 1500 Dungoes the Charges and 400 Dungoes Interest which amounts to 3665 Dungoes wherefore he begs his case may be taken into consideration he being a great sufferer thereby and on Enquiry I find his representation to be truth. It is with no small Concern that I am obliged to Trouble you Gentlemen with any Controversies of Mine, but as my Character is Touched by Captain Mostyn in his last Paragraphs, to Clear myself therefore from such an Imputation I must beg leave to Offer the following and then submit to your Consideration esteeming myself much Obligated to you for given me the Opportunity.

— NOVEMBER 1750 —

In my account for the month of January you will please to observe there is only 100 Rupees Charged whereas the sum advanced by me to the new Recruits was 104 Rup^s. this arose that my account and the General Letter to the Presidency might agree but as Captain Mostyn absolutely denies ever receiving the same I shall endeavour to Convince you Gentlemen as far as the Thing will admit of a Conviction that the Money was Disbursed by me.

FOR this Purpose therefore I now lay before you the Pay Book with the adjustment of Januarys Disbursements in both which the 104 Rupees appear to have been paid. In his Letter you will please to observe he absolutely denies ever receiving a Cash from me on account the New Recruits, but in Council, among other things said he was ready to swear to the best of his knowledge he never was paid any thing This I think is showing a Diffidence whether he had or had not for was he Certain he surely would have offered to swear directly and not in such indirect Terms as above But to show further his Uncertainty I have a flagrant Instance to Inform you of sometime since he sent Chandu Nair to my head assistant to know if he had advanced him any money on account the new Recruits, now had he been certain of never Receiving any Money on that Head, why this Message a surely if he keeps any accounts from them he would have known and if he keeps none it is not probable nay possible that a Persons Memory Can be so good as to recollect for 8 Months all Receipts and Disbursements in that time and if this is the Case I leave the impartial to judge whether accounts regularly Carried on from Month to Month are not to be relied on before a Persons Memory. Captain Mostyn is a little mistaken in saying he spoke to me about the Recruits it was to Mr. Douglas to speak to the Chief who accordingly did and wrote me by the Chiefs order to make the advance for the Truth of which I appeal to that Gentlemen Now from hence a very natural question may be asked which is that in Case he Intended to advance the New Recruits out of his own money and at his own Risque why this application to the Chief but even to allow that he did speak to me and that I returned him the Answer he mentions, has he ever applied to me for being Reimbursed and I can affirm the first time I heard of Captain Mostyn having given the new Recruits money was from Reading the General Letter last rec^d. from the Presidency.

BEFORE I Conclude I must beg leave to point out to you a very Remarkable Instance of Captain Mostyn's bad Memory and show that he keeps no account In the time of the late Chief there was a Considerable Difference in the Rice that is from what unserted [*sic*] in the several Rolls and what rec^d. from the Warehouse when I acquainted Captain Mostyn of this he was as positive as now and not Relying on the account I had drawn out of the same applied himself to Mr. Byfeld who took the Trouble to settle it but strange when he was Called on for his Rice Book he had none to produce but only slips of Paper however my account being Examined and found just Captain Mostyn was ordered to make good the Dificiency and which you will please to observe appears in the Pay Book now before you.

I CANNOT likewise Pass over the Declaration made in Council by the Serjeant Major which agrees with the sum advanced by me Rupees 104 This with Cap^t. Mostyns Refusing to produce his Cash Book (which every Gentlemen thô not a Merchant for his own satisfaction I beleive keeps but what his Motive may be for Refusing such a Request I cant say) I beleive will not appear in his favour, however I submit the whole to your Judgement being with the Greatest Respect

Capt. Mostyn his Lre read. READ a Letter from Captain Thomas Mostyn as entered after this Consultation requesting to be relieved Copy of which is directed to be forwarded to the Presidency by the first safe Conveyance. The Chief acquaints the members that though ignorant of Captain Mostyns Intentions he intended to have desired his Relief and will deliver in his Reasons to be inserted in the Diary under this date, but there having lately been not only very Great Irregularities but Neglect in Duty, Captain Mostyn was directed to be Called in to Answer such Questions as might be asked him.

CAPTAIN MOSTYN being present the Chief addressed himself to Mr. Waters, and asked him if the Business relating to the Military was Carried on in that Regular manner as formerly. In answer to which Mr. Waters said, that from the frequent Complaints he had made to him by the soldiers in respect to their accounts from whence only he Could Judge It appeared to him a Great Dissatisfaction Reigned and which he cannot but Impute Either to neglect or want of Method in his Business.

Mr. DOUGLAS was then Called on who referred himself to Consultation the 28th. August which plainly demonstrates a Great Inattention in Captain Mostyn.

THESE having lately deserted four French Men One of whom on Guard Captain Mostyn was asked by the Chief why he knowing there was a Pardon offered to all such who would Return to Mahie permitted those four French soldiers to be together in Tellicherry that is three free Guard and one on Guard and how the latter Could desert without his knowledge. To all which Captain Mostyn answered that one of the said Frenchmen had been just Relieved from Maddacarra and that the latter was missing from the Guard about $\frac{1}{2}$ past nine but the Chief being Retired to sleep and Judging it would be to no Purpose to make the signall induced him not to make the Report till Morning observing that he as Officer of the Guard is not obliged to Call over every soldiers name. The Chief remarked that he was not retired to sleep but to allow his assertion Good his Constant Orders were to be Called upon all Occasions and at all Times which Captain Mostyn acknowledged so that his Plea for not making the Report is rendered Inexcusable. As to the Officer of the Guard Calling over every soldiers Name Cap^t. Mostyn is told was not Expected but Certainly it is the Duty of such Officer to see upon beating the Tattoo that none of his People are Missing which would have prevented this accident.

MR. WATERS acquainted the Board that in his Letter in respect to the disputed 104 Rupees he left the decision to their Consideration therefore requested that the Members would Give their several Opinions Whether from the accounts produced before them they Judge the Money was paid by him or not?

MR. HORNBY being first asked said he could give no Opinion Captain Mostyn being as Positive as Mr. Waters.

MR. DOUGLAS as the next Member said that as Mr. Waters had produced Regular accounts and Captain Mostyn only barely asserting the Contrary induces him to think the Money was actually disbursed by Mr. Waters as otherwise he must think the accounts fictitious which he Cannot but esteem as Just and true accounts.

THE Chief observes that from the Carefulness of Mr. Waters in his Post and the Irregularity of Captain Mostyn he cannot but think the money was paid though Judges at the same time Captain Mostyn his asserting the Contrary proceeds from his not keeping any accounts and want of Money and not from Fraud or any ill Intention.

Sept^r. and advise that Governour Wake had delivered over the charge of the Presidency to the Hoñble Richard Bouchier Esq^r. taking his Passage on the Boscawen which left them the 17th. Ultimo for Great Britain. The Cask of Lanthorns omitted to be sent us formerly they mention we be forwarded by the first proper Conveyance and direct us to Credit the Presidency Rupees 125. 3. 70 for the two Pieces of Mazarine blue and scarlet Cloths P^r. Stafford. Its recommended to us to omit no proper means for the Recovery of Baunibelty Cunhippy and Cacart Tupy their several depending accounts and think in respect to the latter that an application to the King of Cotiote might be effectually as he has taken shelter in is [sic] Country but relie entirely upon our discretion. The Deficiency of Pepper they esteem very Extraordinary but from Our Enquiry no fraud or Embezzlement appearing though no Cause is assigned for this Loss they acquiesce with our writing it off. They are surprised at our not taking notice in our advices under the 10th. of Sept^r. of the Hoñble Company's affairs as by that time we might have formed some Judgement of the Crop of Pepper the quantity procurable and Consequently what sum of Money was necessary which they intend sending us by the Commodore shortly. They enclose us a List of Investment to be provided this Year as also sundry Paragraphs of the Hoñble Company's several Commands relating to this settlement. We are advised the arrival of the Lord Anson Shaftsbury and Ilchester from England and directed to inform them the Tonnage we may be able to provide for their dispatch as also to translate the several Grants and Priviledges of this settlement. In case Pepper is at the Limited Price we are to Go on Purchasing but otherwise no more than for three ships Tonnage. A Provision is to be made by us of 200 Ca^s. of sandall Wood half the first sort and half the second for the Lord Anson China Woyage [sic] or as near those Proportions as possible holding it in readiness to ship off in all the Month of April.

Two of the Samorines Rajahdores arrive who brought an Ola to the Chief Translate of which is as follows.

I HAVE been thoroughly informed with the Contents of your Letter and by the Ministers from the Several Powers Concerned of the ambitious designs of Boyanore, to Consider the steps proper to be taken at this Critical Juncture I send two of my Rajahdores and desire you will have a meeting with the Prince of Cherrika advising me the Result.

THE two Princes of Cherrika being arrived Come to the Fort and in a Conference with the Chief Complain heavily of the distractions in the Country proposing that in Case Boyanore would quit his Pretensions to the Title of King in the Province of Erreavadanaddu and assume that of a King Porladari in the Samorines Dominions they would protect him in it, They were both asked by the Chief how that agreed with the faith already plighted to the King of Cotiote Samorine and other Powers not to enter into any terms without the mutual Consent of each and whether if we were Called on as Witnesses to what had passed we Could with honour do otherwise than Condemn them at which they dropt that subject and as usual declared they would persist in keeping their alliances against the Boyanore but it is to be observed the whenever this Comes on the Carpet the younger Prince raises fresh difficulties from whence it is Evident that the Recovery of his wife the Boyanores sister is his Utmost Wish though at the Ruin of the Colastria house the Ministers about him and most in his favour being such who have always Expoused the Boyanores Interest from whence it is to be feared from the Inactivity of the Elder Prince this Enquiry [sic] Genuis of his will one day be the destruction of his Country.

THE Princes however being seemingly determined to pursue Boyanore desired the Chief would write to the Teriums to raise money as well for the necessary Expences of a War as to pay off the Debt to Palliarem in the manner stipulated which was immediately Complied with.

AFTER the two Princes took their Leave the Samorines two Ministers were introduced to the Chief when nothing more than Compliments Passed on both sides.

By a Letter from the Serjeant in Command at Maddacarra to the Chief we learn that six Munchuas put into that River from a Report of Angrias being to the Southward of Dackla.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo wherein they acknowledge ours under the 20th. Ultimo, and Thank us for our advices in respect to the Ilchester. They had not as yet received any part of the Governments Pepper Contract but still hope there will be no disappointment of Tonnage Their Merchants had delivered since their last 1990 Pieces and are in Expectation of three thousand more by the middle of this Month but are uncertain as to the Exact quantity which may be in readiness. They enclose us a Packet for the Hon^{ble} President and Council of Bombay which they desire may be forwarded by the first Conveyance that offers.

THE Serjeant at Maddacarra writes the Chief that the Gallivats taken for Angrias belongs to the Sundah Rajah which anchored off Mattalye that five of the Lascars came ashore at Mount Dilly and were taken by Captain Lewis de Mendonza Being Examined their Errand was to deliver a Letter to the Prince of Colastria after which they were to have gone to Ally Rajah That as the former was at Tellicherry he sent them to the Chief under the Care of two Calliquilones.

THE Lascars sent by the Serjeant at Maddacarra being brought before the Chief and strictly Examined were found to be subjects to Ally Rajah and therefore dismissed.

UPON receipt of the above advices from the serjeant of Maddacarra in respect to the Gallivats belonging to the Sundah Rajah the Chief to prevent any accidents happening to the small Craft belonging to Mahie immediately Give notice thereof to Monsieur Louet To which he returned a Letter of Thanks.

THE Chief rec^d. an Ola from the Souravaos, wherein they write that they Cannot agree to Collect the sum demanded by the Prince alledging that in Time of the Cannarees invasion they then advanced one hundred and Twenty thousand which as yet has not been repaid. They add that in a few hands they shall meet at Caddam-bericallaticu to Consult on the scituation of affairs.

THE King of Cotiote having by an Ola this day advised the Chief that the two Princes of Cherrika the Samorines Ministers and other People of Distinction were to meet him at Erinhole to adjust several affairs of Consequence the Chief and Mr. Douglas went there this afternoon after the usual Compliments it was proposed that every Powers interested for suppr[essing] the Ambitious designs of the Boyanore should declare what assistance each would give to effect it. The King of Cotiote said it was first necessary each should Erect a Fort at the Confines of their respective countries which was agreed to by all except the Samorines Ministers who desired twenty five Days for their Sovereigns Determination which was allowed them The Powers then Present Consented that after Building these Forts in Case the Boyanore did not relinquish his Title of King each should invade his Dominions from the several Countries at a stated Time. The Prince having at the Head of his Ministry a Person greatly attached to the Boyanores Family, the Chief urged to his Highness in the strongest Terms that till he was dismissed his Service little or no Confidence Could be had on him which with much difficulty was acquiesced with the Chief likewise declared that though he was there as a Witness to such agreements they had entered into the Hon^{ble} Company would on no account be looked on as a Party Concerned. To sound the Intentions of the Samorine the 2^d. King of Nelleaseroon was proposed to be sent to Callicut which he agreed but desired his stay might not be long as he had Business of Consequence to settle in his Country.

CACART TUPY being settled in the Cotiote Country application was made to his Majesty for the Recovering of his large Debt to the Hon^{ble} Company his assistance was promised and his Rajahdores in the Presence of the Chief directed by him to take an Inventory of his Effects to be appropriated for this purpose.

THE Several Powers then took their Leave and the Chief with Mr. Douglas returned to the Fort.

THE two Princes being arrived from Cherrica paid a visit to the Chief In a Conference the Younger Prince represented the distracted scituation of their Country Giving his Opinion it would be imprudent forcibly to levy money from the several Pagodas as formerly agreed on or to persist in their undertaking against the Boyanore at this Critical Juncture which however if esteemed absolutely necessary he would willingly Cary [sic] on provided a proper Fund was raised for this purpose. His Brother being very Zealous against the Boyanore Gave assurances money should not be wanting, the Chief then declared that in Case they acted other wise than Consistent with the alliances entered into he should immediately advising every allie their unsteady conduct.

THE Samorines Ministers being in another apartment the Chief waited on them. They expressed a Jealousy of the Young Prince and seemed only to relie on the Regent to whom they particularly addressed themselves earnestly desiring he would immediately order the Boyanores Ministers from his Country the entertaining whom being Contrary to the late alliances if not the Hoñble Company would be at no Loss to find such Friends to stand by them and not sacrifice the Priviledges of the Country to the ambition of Boyanore The Princes well knowing that the Oden Quilote Family was hinted at readily promised to satisfy the several Powers upon their Return to Cherrica desiring some of the Companys Nairs to accompany them which was Complied with.

THE Corporal lately relived from Callicut Complaining to the Chief of his being forcibly sent up M^r. Richard Secker with [sic] allowing him Time to Collect his Necessaries, and in every other respect treated Extremely ill. In a Letter to him by which we acknowledged Receipt of his severals under the 23^d. and 26th. Ultimo he was directed to advise us the particulars of this affair. By this Conveyance we sent five Topasses to relieve the Like number of those now on Duty. He is ordered in Case the London from Bengall should touch at Callicut to advise the Commander that the True Briton is Wanting here for proceeding to Bombay in her Company whose speedy arrival is of the utmost Consequence to our Honble Masters. It was observed to him that though the last season he had a Standing Order to advise us the arrival of all our Hoñble Masters ships at Callicut yet he omitted It notwithstanding the True Briton stay there two days.

IT IS AGREED that he be immediately advised by Letter of our superiors appointment and directed to deliver over the Charge of Callicut Factory to the Linguists Manuel Leon and Manoel Netto To discharge the Ballance that may be due to him and carry on the necessary charges the sum of Four thousand Rupees is likewise AGREED to be remitted thither this Evening under the Care of a Corporal and four Men.

IMPORTED the Lord Anson and Bombay Grab from Bombay. By the former ^{Ships} they received a Letter from the Hoñble President and Council dated 24th. Ultimo wherein ^{Lord Anson & Bombay} they advise of their having laden in these Vessells thirty Chests of Treasure one ^{Grab} Chest of Gold and sundry stores for this settlement amounting to Rupees 385219. ^{Imported & advices from Bombay read.}

1. 93. They direct us to remit out of this sum one hundred thousand Rupees and half the Gold to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo and in Case they should be in want of a further supply to send either Gold or silver as may be most proper. By the Bombay Grab they sent us Ally Rajahs ambergrease the Produce of which we are to keep in our hands in part of his Debt omitting no means for the Recovery of the Remainder. They disapprove the reasons given for paying Interest on the Cardamum Contract last Year esteeming it very unreasonable the Hoñble Companys should suffer for the neglect of M^r. Rawdons administrator. The Import laid by us on all Boats entering our Rivers is approved provided the same in no wise affects any of the Country Powers. They permit of our employing John Frazier under the Collector and to reward him as he may be found deserving. To form a proper Judgement of the Ju[s]tness of the Renters of Durmapatam their Petition for a Renewal of their Leases we are ordered to advise them how long each Person has been in Possession of their Respective Plantations with the Terms on which they hold their Grounds. They acquiesce with our Rebuilding the small Warehouse and repairing the Fort Gate but to observe the utmost Frugality. The Deficiency of Musquets and hand Grenadoes we are ordered to recover from the Persons through whose Neglect the same arose. They observe that it was very irregular in M^r. Waters to advance Money to Captain Mostyn without taking his Receipt but more so in the Board for passing his account without such a Voucher. They appoint Mess^{rs}. Hornby and Secker to the assistance of Anjengo Factory in the Room of M^r. Robinson who is to return hither and that M^r. Thomas Satchwell now proceeds to this settlement on the Lord Anson who Commenced Writer the 9th. Dec^r. 1746 has received his salary to the 1st. July inclusive and Diet money to the end of this Month with the usual allowance for his Passage That Captains Gouin and Cameron are appointed by them to Command the two Companies of Military at this Place who have been paid to the last of November and Captain Mostyn is to return to the Presidency They advise us of their having desired the Hoñble President and Council of Fort St. David in Case the Warren should touch there or at Madrass in her Passage to the Bay to land her Cargoe and Treasure and Return her to Us, in which case we are directed immediately to lead her with all possibly Expedition for Great Britain but if in want of Tonnage to send her to Anjengo where they have Great Reason to hope there will be sufficient at least for one ship. The Fort of Nelleasaroon taken.

AMBU TAMBAN the Prince of Palli Quillote and Cuttormi Addiody Prince of Nelleasaroon went with two hundred Nairs in the Night and attacked the Fort of Nelleasaroon in which were thirty Cannarees fifteen of whom they killed on the spot and took Possession of the Fort with the ammunition and Provision. This Transaction gives the Prince great uneasiness from an apprehensions [sic] lest the Cannarees to take satisfaction for this Insult should Invade his Dominions at this particular Crisis of affairs not being prepared in any shape to receive so Powerfull an Enemy. The Prince Regent its said is extremely Jealous that his Brother has been at the Bottom of this Enterprise of the King of Nelleasaroons, in order to turn his thoughts from the Boyanore against whom his ministers assure the Chief he is Extremely irritated and that nothing will induce him to leave his allies. The Ministers then delivered an Ola from his Highness wherein he sets forth the Base Behaviour of his Brother who he writes daily entertains the Boyanores Rajahdores in Contempt to Oaths and the most solemn Protestations to the Contrary which is out of his Power to prevent at present from the strong attachment of the Nairs to his Brothers Person unless assisted by the Hoñble Companys. His Highness however gives the strongest assurances not to quit his allies and desires the Chief will enquire the motions of the Cannarees and if they should have formed any intentions against his Country to prevent them if possible by representing in a proper manner of his being no ways Concerned in the Treachery of the King of Nelleasaroon whom he should oblige to redeliver up the Fort.

THE Linguist Pedro Rodriguez was directed by the Chief immediately to write a proper Letter to his Correspondent at Mangulore for observing the Motions of the Cannarees as the Prince desires advising if any material steps are taken by them.

THIS Morning arrived an Express Boat from Bombay by which we received a Letter from the Hoñble President and Council enclosing us a Packet to the Hoñble Company to be forwarded by the Ilchester. They express themselves sorry to find our Pepper Investment is like to be so backward as they have no dependance on the Gentlemen of Anjengo for more Tonnage than their Cloth. Our advancing money to the Pepper Merchants is approved of provided we have got sufficient security.

SATURDAY 8TH.

By the return of a Toney dispatched by us the 27th. Ultimo received a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo wherein they write that not having received any orders from the Presidency they cannot therefore answer freighting up the Bales which they Judge will in no wise forward the dispatch of the Ilchester as from the N.W. winds small Craft must be a long time beating up. Their remains of Pepper are no more than 154 Ca^s. but that the Government had sent to Eddova 70. Oxen Loads which they Expect will shortly arrive them and judge by the 11th. Instant to have in readiness also two hundred and fifty Bales of Cloth.

UPON receipt of the above a Toney was immediately dispatched to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with a Letter advising them that the Ilchester We Judge would be dispatched to their Port by the 12th. at furthest for taking in their 250 Bales of Cloth and 154 Candies of Pepper which with what we should put on board would Compleat her Charter party Tonnage.

THE Merchants having delivered into warehouse forty nine Candies of Pepper more than they have received money for and desiring to be paid its amount Rupees (4528. —. —) IT IS AGREED the same be issued out of the Treasury with a further sum of forty thousand Rupees for providing the Quantity directed by our Superiors.

IT being now late in the season the Merchants were called on to open of this years crop which they refused alledging that the fluctuating of the Market from the French giving such extravagant Prices renders it impossible. They still complain that Candoty Paquis continues giving (107) Rupees the Candy in the Buzars of Erinhiolo which we have two great reason to believe notwithstanding the assertions made by the French to the contrary; till therefore the French have provided the Tonnage wanted for the ships expected from Callicut its judged proper to recommend to our Merch^{ts}. not to advance any Money till there is some prospect of Pepper's lowering when they withdrew.

THE Warehousekeeper Reports to the Board that the Sandall Wood hitherto received is much inferior to former years the Linguist Pedro Rodriguese is asked the reason who says that what remains in country of this article are only small sticks from the large parcells having been cut within this few years & as the French takes indifferently the good with the bad the Palliarem on the application of his merchants has declared that unless we take it as other Nations do he will not confine them to us only.

THE Pepper seized by us from the shopk^{rs}. from the reasons set forth in consultation under the 18th. Ultimo IT IS AGREED be paid for at the rate of Eighty Rupees the candy.

THE Chief lays before the Board translate of the preceeding Ola from the Boyanores Ministers to the Prince which being taken under consideration it is judged necessary that the Chief write the King of Cotiote & the several other Powers to prevent if possible their being induced to Espouse the Prince's inter[est] & as an interview has been desired by the King of Cotiote that the Chief accept of one when he will have an opportunity of conferring fully on this head. It is likewise agreed that a friendly corospond^{ce}. be carried on by us with the Oden Quilote Family which seemingly has courted our Friendship.

THE Chief agreeable to the resolution of Council Yesterday wrote the following Ola to the King of Cotiote Viz^t.

I have received your Royal writing desiring an Interview which being entirely agreeable to me I now send Amboo Namby to conferr with your Majesty on several things of Consequence & to know when it is most convenient for me to wait on you.

My desire is always to preserve the friendly corospondence subsisting between your Majesty & the H^o. Company & I doubt not but you have the same favourable sentiments.

THE Timbers sent us this Year from Callicut being found very indifferent & not proper for the use intended Manuel Netto & Manuel Leon were directed to provide twenty Trees of two feet Diamiter and to send them by the first opportunity Perimpaes & Somerheads we acknowledged receipt of their several accounts.

THE Chief wrote an Ola to the Bednure Rajah in answer to one from him under the 20th. Ultimo translate of which is as follows. Viz^t.

I have already wrote fully to the Gov^r. of Mangulore in respect to the taking of Nellesaroon Fort of which I doubt not your Majesty has been advised.

THE Mallabars at present carry themselves very high nor have Pacifick means to accomodate the differences between your Majesty and the King of Colastria been the least regarded Force therefore I am afraid must be the last remidy [*sic*] tho' I will still use all the good offices in my Power to prevent if possible such an Evil induced to it from the friendship subsisting between your Majesty & the H^o. Company which I shall constantly study to preserve & cultivate.

THE Chief answered the Ola from the Palliarem advising him there was very little satisfaction to be expected from the Prince of Cherricka for the taking of Nellesaroon Fort or his finishing the depending accounts between him & the Bednure Rajah unless he is in a manner obliged to it. The Palliarem had the strongest assurances given him that the Friendship between him and the H^o. Company should always exist.

AN Ola was likewise wrote by the Chief to the Nombiers acquainting them with the Prince his having Broke the alliance against Boyanore & the measures he is taking at present, & that they might be sounded properly Anandoo Croop and Amboo Namby were sent, to whom the[y] referred himself for particulars.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince Regent wherein he advices the Chief that the Palliarem had sent sixty People with three Rajahdores who are dunning him for the Pagodas due to the Bednure Rajah insisting either on payment of the Money or the delivery of the two Forts & that the Canarees had likewise three hund. at Mottalye. In this pressing scituation he desires the Chiefs advise proposing as the best Expedient to deliver up the two Forts not being able in these circumstances of affairs to raise the Money or pretend to withstand the joint Forces of the Palliarem & Canarees, to this Letter his Highness seem to be impatient for an answer concluding with assurances that his dependance is entirely on the English Company.

THE Chief immediately answered the preceeding Ola from the Prince of Cherricka expressing a concern for his uneasiness but at the same time acquainting him his not following the wholesome advise so frequently him[sic] is the sole reason that for his part he had already done everything in his Power to pre[vent] this storm which now seems to threaten him that therefore his Highness must not expect any further assistance. The [Chief] hinted to him at the same time that even at the time [he] was mediating the differences between him & the Palliarem that he ought to reflect on the conduct of the Young Prince through whose means an impediment was laid on all [...] in the Misure Country which the Palliarem with some difficulty had been prevailed on to take off.

IMPORTED a Sweede ship from Surat bound to Chin[a], she is commanded by one Shereman & is in want of a Loading of sandall wood with which the French intends supplying her.

IMPORTED a small Vessell called the Happy snow from Malacca belonging to Bengall.

AMBOO NAMBY and Anandoo Croop returned from the Nombiers & delivered the following Ola to the Chief.

WE have been favoured with yours & informed by Anandoo Croop & Amboo Namby of every thing necessary, you may be assured of our continuing to act in every shape as may be most agreeable to you this is a Maxim we have & shall continue to observe for particulars we referr ourselves to Anandoo Croop and Amboo Namby who will advise that in a Conference with the Nombiers they expressed a perfect regard for the Friendship of the Ho. Company but at the same time were fearfull of coming to a particular explanation [sic] on the present Posture of affairs lest by such a step they might draw Boyanore upon their backs near whose Territories their country borders, in short they wait only to see who is the strongest the care of Mallabars in General.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Linguists Manuel Leon & Manuel Netto at Callicut advising that by Cap^t. Watson of the Happy snow they had sent us forty Perimpaes & Somerheads but as to the Timbers there were none procurable of two Feet Diamiter only those from 14 to 19 Pelongs Mallabar.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Prince Badencalamcur setting forth his uneasy Scituation of Life & that his Reliance is solely on the H^o. Company in ending, requests a Conference with the Chief & Money or what else may be judged proper to defray the charges of the ensuing Feast of Biou.

THE Bearer who brought the preceeding Ola delivered also the following one from the Prince Regent Viz^t.

— MARCH 1750-51 —

I have perused your Letter and am concerned to find you should imagine that I have deceived you in the business of Palliarem it was not possible for me to pay down so large a sum therefore you ought not to make such a harsh construction, in all my affairs my dependance is entirely placed on you & the English company so hope you may be able to think of some Method to clear myself of this troublesome Business, as to paying the Money I cannot at this time so that the only Remedy which occurs to me is deliv^g. up the two Forts, but referr it to yourself for your opinion.

THE CHIEF in answer to the Ola from Prince Badencalamcur assured him that the Friendship that subsisted between his Uncle & the H^o. Company should also be continued to him That if his Highness chose to come to Tellicherry after the feast of Biou he might then have an opportunity of a conference and in the Interim he would receive one hundred Fanams to bear his Charges.

THE Chief likewise replied to the Princes Ola setting forth his & his Brother [sic] Conduct for some time past & Instanced to his Highness his several Breaches of the most solemn promises which his Highness was told could be esteemed in no other Light than deceit, That as to the Palliarem he had already wrote his Sentiments & should concern himself no further, his Highness was also given to understand that hitherto the H^o. Company had not acted in any shape against his Inter^t. nor would they unless there priviledges were infringed in which case he might be assured of their seeking Redress. The Chief also added that as Anandoo Croop & Amboo Namby were fled to us for Protection any attempts upon their Persons would be outvert [sic] acts of Hostilities against the H^o. Company.

That we had wrote to our superiors in respect to their Request for two hundred Musquets. We acquainted them with the Kent sailing from hence & the Shaftesburys not being likely to proceed home this season and that though their Remains in warehouse are very Triffling yet we were in hopes ours would be sufficient Tonnage for one ship. We enclosed them a Copy [of] an account transmitted by Hornby desiring to know whether it was to be carried to the H^o. Compa^s. account the irregular manner in which it was sent leaving us in the Dark.

I have received your Royal writing by Bengadessarah Putterah who will advise your Majesty with the substance of our conference. Should you be content to have a meeting pray give me eight Days previous Notice that I may fix upon a Day but if a meeting at this time is in any shape inconvenient to your Majesty it may be deffered to some other time.

FROM the conduct of the King of Cotiote we have but two [*sic*] great reason to think the above Messenger was only sent by him to sound what we were willing to give for his alliance he is now playing the same part with the Prince of Cherricha who has already made him presents to some amount as such a Friendship would only be precarious nay dangerous when a Money could bias it either to one side or the other it was judged most prudent to decline such an alliance, especially as the Prince may get them better & upon proper Remonstrances alter his Behaviour & till pacifick means are tried it would be imprudent to irritate him by our openly making alliances against him by sides which the Behaviour of the King of Cotiote in all former times plainly shows he can't be relyed on.

This immediately affected the Hoñble Companys Trade, and may in all probability be the forerunner of worst consequences if timely prevented it was proposed by the Chief to have a personal conference with his Highness and try all pacifick means possible to bring him to a just way of thinking as a war cannot at this juncture but be of the worst consequence to the country in General the Canarees being now ready, watching only the first favourable opportunity to Invade the Princes Dominions for these reasons therefore the proposition was immediately AGREED to.

AGREEABLE to the Resolution of Council the Chief set out this Evening for Billapatam accompanied by M^r. Robinson.

THE Chief received the following Ola from the 1st. King of Nellesaroon in answer to that wrote him under the 1st Instant.

I Have received your Letter & observe what you write in respect to Caticolem Paqui & the Gousing of Attla Beraim their taking out of a Munchua some Bales of Rice. The said Caticolem Paqui is not my subject but lives in the canaree country & therefore out of my reach, however if the cousin of Attla Biraim has been concerned with him & should ever come this way he shall meet with a proper punishment and what I may be able to recover from him shall be sent you.

FRIDAY
19TH.

THE CHIEF upon his arrival at Billapatam, wrote immediately the following Ola to the Atchamars of Randoterra Viz^t.

APRIL THE 19TH. 1751.

NARRATIVE Of what passed on the Chief & M^r. Robinson's going to Billapatam agreeable to the resolution of Council the 18th. Inst. Viz^t.

ON the 18th. in our way to Billapatam we were met by Part of the achamars of Rhandoterra at Egar who importuned us very much on our meeting with the Prince of Cherricha to set forth to him the Evil consequences that might accrue from his inviting the French to his country whose entrance they much feared would be purchased with the produce of Rhandoterra; that as they had hitherto been under the Protection of the H^o. Company they doubted not the same would be continued to them particularly at this time when they were in so much want of it, they were particularly sorry to observe that the Younger Prince had got some Instruments about him who even had been remarkable for being Enemies both to the H^o. Company & them instancing in particular the King of Nelesaroon and Cristna Cutty Putterah, the first for having the French Interest at heart in order that by their getting a settlement at Nelesaroon they might be a barrier between him & the Canarees, the Achamars Expressing themselves well assured that he had prevailed with the Younger Prince to give his assent to their settling to the Northward and had promised them all the advantage in the Country which the English enjoyed with a Totall prohibition of their Trade in general & that he had brought the King of Cotiote over to his Interest by promising him a large sum of Money from the French and Boyanore They were desired to come to Billapatam where things would be considered on for the good of the Country.

ON our arrival at Billapatam the following Ola was wrote to the Achamars that those who were not with us Yesterday might be apprized of our good Intentions for the Publick benefit

— BILLAPATAM, APRIL 1751 —

To The Achamars of Randoterra Viz^t.

WHEN I arrived here some of your People acquainted me that they had some affairs to Communicate & myself having also Business of consequence to consider of I must desire upon Receipt of this come to Billapatam.

ABOUT an hour after our arrival the King of Colastria who inhabited Billapatam Fort desired to have a conference with the Chief which being assented to he immediately declared his having the greatest satisfaction to see the English arrive there as the affairs of his country were in General going to confusion from the inactivity of the Elder Prince & the bad designs of the Younger who was A Man of such a turbulent spirit that he was not fit to hold the Reins of Government, he plainly said that although the English had injured him in forcing the Island of Maddacarra from him which that Prince could not answer delivering up, as the Dominions of Colastria were not to be dismembered without his Royal Grant yet for the Fault of one Gentleman he ought not to project the Ruin of the English company he being well assured that reasons would have been hearkened to & for his part he would stick to his old Friends, He was asked what was the proper measures to prevent the growing Evils to which he replied our getting assurance from the Elder Prince that he would not consent to the French having any footing in the Colastria Dominions & that he would be the Governing Prince or appoint some other in the room of his Brother. We requested it might be one of the Branch of that Family to which he replied he would write to Prince Amboo Tamban & desired the Chief would do the same, he seemed very uneasy about the Intentions of the Prince to give the Northern Forts up to the French, he said they were an enterprizing nation & that from their present Behaviour on the other Coast they seemed determined to Extricate all other European Nations out of India, That it would be a much easier matter to let them into than to get them out of the Colastria Dominions That the consequence of their settling to the Northward must be attended with a Canaree War in which case none but the English could prevent their making a conquest of his country & if backed by the Boyanore which he much suspected he was very dubious whether they would not be able to do it as the Prince of Cherricha were really in Conjunction with the Boyanore and French to reduce his subjects the Nombiers & give them a footing in the Province of Irrcavanaddu begg we would take this into consideration and have a meeting with the Elder Prince who he said was a reasonable Man we assured him of our good offices to prevent the two apparent growing Evil & that we would endeavour by mediation to make up the differences with the Canaress, that the present time was not proper to talk about the affairs of Maddacarra or had we authority to do it the taking the Revenues there of having been approved by our superiors, that we would represent to them the grievance it appeared to the Prince & did not in the least doubt but they would satisfy him on that Head.

WROTE to Prince Amboo Tamban agreeable to the King of Colastria's request the following Ola.

TO PRINCE AMBOO TAMBAN.

I hope your Highness upon Receipt of this will repair to this Place to join the English Company and Protect the Country as also to consider of several affairs of consequence, If you accept this invitation you ought not to lose any time; for particulars I refer you to Anandoo Croop & Amboo Namby.

WROTE to Cutteri Quilotu Nombier and his Heirs as entered hereafter.

SATURDAY
20TH.

TO CUTTERI QUILOTU NOMBIER & HIS HEIRS VIZ^t.

I am arrived at Billapatam and have some affairs to consider and resolve on with you before the King of Colastria, therefore on Receipt of this please to set out for this Place and shall expect your arrival till to-morrow Evening (which is sunday) or next Day at furthest.

HAVING taken into consideration the discourse with the King of Colastria when we visited him and as the present impending Evil seems to be attended with all the ill consequences he represented; it was agreed to send Narranna Cutty Putterah to

— BILLAPATAM, APRIL 1751 —

the Elder Prince requesting that he would have a conference with us, that notwithstanding his Brother seemed so much disgusted with the English Company we doubted not but we could convince him they were his only stanch Friends and that it was our desire that the Friendship which had subsisted for so long a time might still continue we were not a little surprized that he should not only intend to deprive us of the Benefit of Trade in the Colastria Dominions but endeavour likewise to persuade the King of Cotiote & other Powers to prohibit the Exportation of any Commodity to Tellicherry that if he was aggrieved in any shape wherein we could give him satisfaction we desired he would set forth his complaint to us when we assured him all reasonable demands should be acquiesced to, but at the same time we expected that the Younger Prince would not sell the Priviledges of the H^o. Company to any European or Country Power that he might be assured if he did we should act in defence of them.

THIS Afternoon Prince Amboo Tamban arrived at Billapatam & after his having waited on the King of Colastria & been informd of his Majestys Intentions come to see the Chief assuring him he was ready to pay an Explicit Obedience to the orders of his Sovereign for the good of the Country adding that what he might want in Experience he would make up in sincerity as a part of which he delivered the following Ola wrote him by the Young Prince which he received in his way hither.

FROM THE Prince of Cherriha to Prince Amboo Tamban.

I am informed that by advice of severals you are arrived at Edicot and intend a meeting with the English; this resoulution [*sic*] is degrading us at this time; it is not proper therefore you should join with them for your future welfare (which I have only in view) induces me to write this, therefore in its Receipt I expect you will come to me, For particulars I referr you to Corem Nair.

THIS Young Prince appears to us a raw & uncultivated Youth who it seems has been kept in Ignorance from the jealousy [*sic*] of the two Brothers now in the Regency as they know him to be a great favou^t. of the King of Colastria; but we are strongly advised by our Head Linguist Pedro Rodriguese that he is very proper instrument to make use of at this time.

RECEIVED the following Ola from the Achamairs.

UPON Receipt of your Letter we immediately sent to the rest of the Achamars; when they assembled we will wait on you & hope you will permit of Amboo Marcar to bear us Company.

SUNDAY
21ST.

EARLY this morning Naranna Cutty Putterah returned from the E[1]der Prince advising the other was gone to the southward to implore the King of Cotiote & Boyanores assistance against the English which we are well assured they were ready to give him through the Instigation of the French & he brought with him the following Ola from the Prince of Cotacuna who he says seemed very much confused from being surrounded by the Young Prince's Evil councillors & did not seem to know what he signed to.

FROM THE Prince of Cotacuna Viz^t.

I have particularly observed what Naranna Cutty Putterah has said to me, & the Angry Manner which he delivered himself. I am not conscios of having done anything to cause you to be dissatisfyed, however if you are determined to act against me it is not in my Power to resist you. You lay particularly to my Charge my having taken Money from one of the Companys Merchants at Iracure by force please to send for Cooty Moosal & the Medeliar when you will be advised the Truth and should they judge me guilty I am ready to acquiese in every you may direct.

SINCE your arrival at Billapatam I have not paid you a visit for which reason I intend sending a Person to have a meeting with you tomorrow other particulars Naranna Cutty Puterah advise you.

THE Chief received the following Ola from Codoley Quelloo Nombier in answer to one wrote by the Linguist desiring he would come hither to consult on some affairs of consequence.

— BILLAPATAM, APRIL 1751 —

WE have received your Letter & observe its contents I am pleased with your Expecting on Monday next on that Day I'll wait on you.

FROM the several certain advices we have received that the Young Prince is absolutely gone to raise succours to act offensively against us & finding we can't get the Elder Prince to have a meeting with us notwithstanding frequent Messages have been sent to him this Day & he has as frequently evaded the same I was agreed to conferr with him at Cotacuna before the Young Prince might with Forces from the southward but lest we should be two [sic] late for that to carry a sufficient Body to secure a retreat to Billapatam in case he should have any Evil intentions against us.

BEFORE we set out on the above design the King of Colastria desir'd to have a conference with our Head Linguist who was sent with Mr. Robinson to wait on his Majesty in whose presents he delivered a writing translate of which is entered hereafter to Prince Amboo Tanban.

THE ROYAL writing of the King of Colastria given to Prince Amboo Tanbam of the Pallace of Pally in the Presence of the English Chief Thomas Dorrill Esq^r. dated the 21st. April 1751.

SEEING from the ill Conduct of the two Princes of Cherricha my country may possibly be ruined by their assisting & joining Boyanore to make a conquest of the Nombeirs who are my subject & pay a yearly Tribute which should also the Province of Cartanaddu now in possession of Boyanore but belonging to the Kings of Colastria I therefore hereby constitu[t]e & appointment [sic] you Regent & Gov^r. of my Dominions, which Power is to be of Force no longer than your Management is agreeable to the Chief of Tellicherry being well convinced of the troubles & pains already taken by the English Company & their Chiefs to make this a flourishing country. Should you hereafter act otherwise than may be consistent with their Interest & advise. The power I hereby Invest you with is to become Null & void.

THE new Prince Regent Amboo Tamban waited on the Chief this afternoon & produced an Ola given him by the King of Colastria appointing him Regent of his kingdom as we were well assu[red] by our Linguist that the now governing Princes of Cherricha would pay a due obedience thereto or come to such reasonable Terms as might be for the good of the company we promised Prince Amboo Tamban our assistance in all Laudable designs on his giving us the under written Obligation which being drawn out the same was shown to the King of Colastria who approved the same it was delivered by Amboo Tamban to Mr. Robinson in Billapatam Fort in the presence of the King of Colastria our Linguist & several of the Kings Rajahdores.

TRANSLATE of an Obligation Given by Prince Amboo Tamban to the H^o. Company dated the 21st April 1751.

I PROMISE to maintain a firm & sincere friendship with the H^o. Company and act in every respect as may be for the good of their Trade & contracts Established in this Kingdom. **ARTICLE 1st.**

I PROMISE to admit no other Rajahdores in the administration of affairs but those who shall be approved by the Chief of Tellicherry. **2^d.**

I PROMISE not to molest or ill treat any Person under this Government but only receive such Revenues as may be agreeable to justice being first settled & agreed on by the Chief of Tellicherry. The Poor also shall meet with no oppression or Exactions but quietly enjoy their own. **3^d.**

ALL Those of my Pallace as of Mangalão I promise shall be protected and enjoy each their Priviledges. **4th.**

I PROMISE to accommodate and enter into an alliance of Friendship with Palliarrem and the King of Bednure agreeable to the Mediation of the Chief of Tellicherry. **5th.**

THE Charges the Hoñble Company may beat on this occasion I promise shall be made good out of the Revenues of the Country. **6th.**

— BILLAPATAM, APRIL 1751 —

7TH.

THE Charges of my Uncle the King of Colastria I promise likewise shall be repaid.

IN this form I have given a writing to the English Company which is delivered into the Hands of Thomas Dorrill Esqr. Chief of Tellicherry.

THE Achamars came to Billapatam this Evening & were acquainted With the preceeding [*sic*] of the King of Colastria & expressed a great satisfaction from the Hopes they had of seeing the country in a state of Tranquility from the present measures & Resolution of his Majesty to put a stop to the Arbitrary [*sic*] proceedings of the Younger Prince of Cherricha.

THE foregoing writing was an offer of Prince Amboo Tambans & as we imagine dictated by the King of Colastria, from Christna Cutty Putterah being with the Young Prince, we neither made any objection to receiving it or to the actions of the Governing Members being resolved to use all persuasive Means with the Prince of Cotac[una] to hearken to reason.

MONDAY
22^D.

EARLY this Morning the Chief set out for Cotacuna where on his arrival he desired a meeting with the Elder Prince who coming out of the Fort was acquainted with the injurious treatment we had on many occasions received from his Brother particularly of his design to introduce the Boyanore into the Province of Erreavada-naddu which step he must be sensible was absolutely destructive to the Hoñble Companys Trade as from the French being settled in the Boyanores Territories the whole produce of Pepper would in such case fall into their hands. That he was determined likewise to give up his Northern Fortifications to the French because we had injeniously [*sic*] declared to him we could not act offensively against the Canarees who hitherto had demanded no more than the just payment of their Debt or the evacuating three Places which by articles of agreement was to be rendered back in default of payment of the sum stipulated between them for which the Palliarem was Mediator, That his endeavouring to impeede our sandall wood Trade & being now actually raising succours from the Boyanore and Cotiote to act offensively against us instead of hearing our just complaints were injuries the Hoñble Company could not suffer any longer without coming to a clear Explanation what had induced him to act thus contrary to his own & their Interest, & as we could not procure a meeting with them at any Rate we had advised the King of Colastria their lawfull sovereign of their proceeding who being Sensibly concerned thereat for the good of the country and safety of the Hoñble Companys Priviledges had constituted Prince Amboo Tamban as Rengent unless we could prevail with their Highnesses to redress our Grievanc^s. which as we were in hopes of doing, we desired to have a meeting before the King at Billapatam, when upon having firm assurances that the Young Prince would alter his measures & continue firm to to the companys Interest we would prevail with his Highness to continue the Regency in his hands otherwise we must be obliged for the safety of our Hoñble Masters Priviledges to assist his Majesty & Prince Amboo Tamban against them in all Laudable designs.

THE Prince of Cotacuna in his return to the above, seemed to be convinced his Brother was acting an unjust part by us but pleaded all he could in his Behalf; allowed his Majesty had the authority of appointing whom he pleased Regent of the Kingdom & said he would only go into the Fort and consult his Rajahdores and then proceed with us to the King of Colastria who orders he would pay an Explicit Obedience to & doubted not but by our own friendly mediation with the King and good advise to himself and Brother all affairs would be amicably decided, instead of which when he had got into the Fort he prepared to fire upon us and on being sent to several times to know his determination he sent us word we might do our worst having just then heard as we did likewise that his Brother was returning with fifteen hundred Men from the Boyanore and Cotiote to attack us therefore seeing ourselves in Danger, to secure a return we were obliged to fire on the People within the Fort in order to cover our Men which was that Instant returned on us & not being prepared to act offensively against him we retired to Billapatam where we received a confirmation of the Young Princes having gathered a large Body of People to attack us.

RECEIVED two Letters from the King of Bednure & Gov^r. of Mangalore trans- TUESDAY
late of which are as follows Viz^t. 23^d.

FROM the King of Bednure.

THE Nairs of Colastria having taken the Fort of Nellesaroon, this is to desire you will not give them any assistance which I am persuaded you will comply with from your Letter now before me and the Friendly correspondence there is between us, I am now to request you will send your Munchuas to Mangalore having wrote the Gov^r. Vencapaya that they load with Rice & be dispatched to Maddy. You may be assured of all good offices on my Part and hope the same from the Company.

FROM the Governour of Mangalore Viz^t.

I have received your Letter & observe its contents; till now the Princes of Colastria always were in friendship with H^o. Company conducting their affairs by their advice, but as they have now left the H^o. Company & want to steele [*sic*] an alliance with the Morratts it is not necessary you should any longer be in Friendship with them. In a meeting the King of Nellesaroon promised to accommodate all differences giving an Obligation to deliver up Places to the Value of twelve hundred Pagodas to take possession of which a minister of the King of Bednure had been sent, but instead of performing his promise he traitorously took the Fort of Nellesaroon, upon his being asked why he acted in this disloyal manner, he returned for answer that it was the English Company & not him who took the Fort as this is so notoriously false he ought severely to be punished, whenever therefore the H^o. Company send any Vessells of war for this purpose upon being previously advised ours shall join them In this manner we are desirous to preserve a perpetual Friendship with the Company. To this Letter I shall impatiently wait an answer; to which I shall hereafter frame my conduct.

EARLY this morning the Detachment of men & necessaries wrote for from Telli- WEDNES-
cherry arrived us with advise of a large Body of Men having passed with the Prince DAY
from Boyanore and Cotiote which made it improper for us to return by Land as we 24TH.
are certain every thing was ripe for distressing the Company & cutting of our communication to Tellicherry by Land if we attempted it, therefore it was resolved to embark our necessaries in Boats and proceed to Maddacarra. The officers were directed to march their People to the point of Land opposite thereto, first advising the King of Cotiote and Prince Amboo Tamban of our designs both of whom with their Rajahdores desired to go to Tellch^y. being resolved to act in concert with the Chief for the good of the Country & companys Interest which was accordingly consented to & directions sent Mr. Waters to receive the King with the usual Compliments.

In the March to the Point the Princes People fired on ours & wounded two Men as they did one at Cotacuna taking an Elephant belonging to the Linguist which could not be made to swim over the River.

TELLICHERRY.

APRIL THE 24TH. 1751.

Prince Amboo Tamban they were saluted at their Landing & received with the usual Colastria

Anjengo Letter from. By a Toney received a Letter from the Chief & Factors at Anjengo dated the 17th. Instant, acknowledging ours to them under the 5th. They Express a concern for their accomptants Remarks being omitted but still wish the Books of that settlement had not been sent to the Presidency Uncorrected which they think cannot be of any service the Errors being of such a nature as could not be set right by any Body but Mr. Robinson or we should not have been troubled with them. That could it have suited our conveniency to have spared two hundred Musquet it would have been of great service to the H^o. Company's affairs but are obliged to us for mentioning their want to the Presidency. The account of what supplied our Toney being drawn out in the Name of our then Paymaster was a mistake of their Paymasters. Mr. William Hornby, They enclosed us an acco^t. of what given to this Toney and command being Rupees (9. 2, 67) & advise their Remains of Pepper in Warehouse is much the same but of Cloth they have in all about thirty Bales.

Nombier Ola from. THE Chief received an Ola from Cuttori Quilote Nombier in answer to that wrote him under the 21st. Instant acknowledging our severals of the 31st. January 1st. & 17th. February, they direct us to give the Lord Anson and True Briton the quickest dispatch putting on board the former (excluse of sandall wood) two hundred Candies and on the latter one hundred Candies of Pepper or as near those quantities we can so as to reserve sufficient for the Warren. The amount shipped on the Lord Anson by them they are pleased to advise us is two hundred & ten thousand four hundred seventy eight Rupees one quarter & eighty four reas (210478. 1. 84) which we are directed to make up two hundred and fifty thousand Rupees, That they have laden on the True Briton so far as one hundred and ten thousand three hundred forty two Rupees one quarter & sixty five reas (110342. 1. 65) & her stock is to be made up by us with Sandall wood & Pepper one hundred [sic] fifty two thousand five hundred & Eighty three Rupees one quarter & seventy seven reas (452583. 1. 77) but in case the two proceeding articles should not be sufficient to compleat their several Stocks to that amount we are then to do it with Pillar Mexico or any other sort of Dollars or species of Foreign silver procurable & if that is not to be had with new Rupees, by these ships, we received twenty Chests of Treasure and stores to the amo^t. of Rupees two hundred & one thousand forty nine, two quarters and sixty three reas (201249. 2. 63) [sic] of which came enclosed an Invoice & Bill of Lading. From a supposition that we have provided more Pepper than may be sufficient for the Dispatch of the Warren exclusive of the above for china. They direct us not to be in too great a hurry to contract for any more at so high a Rate as we gave for the last one thousand Candies, but endeavour whether we cannot bring it down to the H^o. Companys limmitted Price or at least much lower than ninety Rupees the Candy when in such case we may purchase till we may have sufficient Tonnage for the next Years shipping. As to the Renters of Durmapatam their Petition they observe by our advices of the 31st. January that their Leases were only Granted in the 1743 for the Term of twenty one years & consequently but little more than one third of the time expired, they therefore judge it time enough to renew them a Dozen Years hence when it will clearly appear they are losers or Gainers & who ought to be intituted to that indulgence by their care and diligence in cultivating & improving their Lands. FROM the Steps lately taken by the Prince of Cherricha to the Prejudice of the Hon^{ble} Company there has arose some differences between his Highness and them It is reported that your Majesty has sent a Body of Men with Powder & Ball to the assistance of the Prince of Cherricha, this I cannot give Credit to relying on the Friendship which subsists between your Majesty & the H^o. Company; however I must beg leave to request you will advise me what party you intend to act on this occasion that we may shape our conduct accordingly.

TO THE NOMBIERS VIZ^t.

AT Billiapatam I received your Ola & observe its contents I arrived here some days since in Company with the King of Colastria & entertain some hopes of seeing you but receiving advice that you are assembling a Body of Men in favour of the Prince of Cherricha (which I cannot entirely Credit) I am obliged to desire you will explain yourself as to this particular & advise me what part you intend taking that we may act accordingly. hearing also that Boyanore has marched a large Body to join the Prince; if you therefore have had any Notice of this pray acquaint me & what rout they took.

Translate of the ola is as follows.

TO THE BEDNURE RAJAH.

I have received your Majestys two Letters, and observe their contents. The Munchuas which you request, the Bad weather will not permitt not permit [sic] me to send, I am to advise your Majesty the People whom Palliarem has left in the Forts of Maddaly & Ramdilly are much less in number to those of the Prince of Cherricha, I have notice intends to take those Forts by Treacherry. To consider of many affairs of consequence it will be very acceptable if your Majesty will send hither one or two People of confidence; & I have only to assure your Majesty that I shall strenuously endeavour to preserve & Cultivate the antient & well Grounded friendship that subsists between you and the Hoñble Company.

THE Chief likewise wrote the following Letter to the Gov^r. of Mangulore in answer to that received from him under the 23^d. Instant.

TO VENCAPAYA GOV^R. OF MANGULORE.

I HAVE been favoured with your Letter & what you write in respect to the ungratefull Behaviour of the Prince of Cherricha is very true on which acco^t. the King of Colastria has retired to Tellicherry. I will watch all opportunities, by proper Methods to reconcile the differences between your Master & the Mallabars; and doubt not, from my former Letters that you are now well persuaded we had no part in the taking of Nellesaroon Fort you may be assured I have not hitherto nor shall I lend the least assistance to the Mallabars from the Rains being so nigh setting in it is impossible to send the Munchuas as deisred.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from the achamars of Randoterrah wherein they write, that they had since their meeting at Billiapatam, assembled the Five hundred Nairs in that District to consider on the Present situation of affairs, They express themselves greatly uneasy how to act the Prince threatning to destroy Rhandoterra & had actually sent Two Thousand Nairs into their District, which had obliged them to wait upon the Prince, who on this occasion insisted upon being paid the sum of One Hundred Thousand Fanams to be raised from the Revenues, notwithstanding they advised his Highness of the same having been already mortgaged to the English Company. In these circumstances they say that their Reliance is on the Honble company & hope therefore that they and their Country will be protected by him.

THIS Day the Monsoon set in, with very hard squalls of wind from the Southward and a high sea, which makes us under some Apprehension for the Danbury, as she was to call at Callicut for part of her Loading.

THE First King of Nelleseram having been for some time past treating with the French at Mahie, to deliver up to them The Fort on Condition that they assist the Mallabars against Your Majesty, I am induced, from the Friendship subsisting between you & the Hoñble Company, to give this previous Notice that Your Majesty may immediately give orders to Your Army to surround the said fort, before the French get Possession of it, and I am also to advise Your Majesty that in my Opinion it's necessary a Further Reinforcement be sent to Your Army.

THE Letter to Surapaya Governour of Mangalore was of the same Tenour with the preceeding.

THE CHIEF received Answers from the two Kings of Nelleseram whereein they give the strongest assurances of assisting the new Prince Regent AMBU TAMBAN and adhering to his Iterest [*sic*] Coringoda Como expressed also the same Regard; and in the latter part of his Letter advised that the French Chief some days since had requested of the 1st. king of Nelleseram the Trade of his Country, and a Place for a settlement which is Judged will be complied with, this He desires the Chief will seriously consider of & send him his Opinion. By the preceeding Letter from Coringady Como it appears very evident that the King of Nelleseram is determined to permit the French to have a settlement in his country which situation will be of the utmost Prejudice to Our Hoñble Masters Trade in Sandal Wood & Cardamoms, The Chief Judged it prudent to write the following Ola to the Prince of Cherrika on this occasion and if possible to induce him to adjust the present Differences.

TO THE PRINCE OF CHERRIKA.

I have Notice that the King of Nelleseram has or intends delivering up to the French one his Fortifications which Your Highness ought to prevent. Prince of

By the bad Management of some RAJADORES about Your Person some Differences have arose between us, which (if Your Highness is inclinable to hearken to Reason may yet be easily adjusted; but if your Highness will not prevent the French coming into Your Country where the Hoñble Company have only a Right to Trade, We cannot in such case deem Your Highness no other than an Enemy to their Interest.

AS AMBU TAMBAN is now to the Northward and may with the Force he has collected, give the French a good deal of Trouble in their March if not prevent them from executing this scheme of a New Settlement the Chief wrote him the following Ola.

TO PRINCE AMBU TAMBAN.

I have received Your Ola & Observe it's contents. Your Highness may receive from Maddacarra the ammunition requested, but on Condition You in no shape act against the Canarees, of which you must give them assurances, otherwise this supply may sow a Jealousy in them that we are Joining their Enemies. Should the French get a Footing in Nellesarem it would be of Great Prejudice of the Country in General as well as the Hoñble Company, It behoves Your Highness to Prevent it, which if You Effect, will be esteemed by me as a Great Piece of service; Therefore be very Vigilant, and instantly keep a proper Look out. HAVING NOTICE that the 2^d. King of Nelleseram has not as yet given his Consent for the French their settling it his country the Chief therefore wrote him a proper Ola, urging him to prevent such a scheme's taking Place, as it cannot but be very detrimental in the End to his Majesty.

MANUEL NETTO DA CUNHA.

RECEIVED a Letter from Manuel Leon and Manuel Netto at Callicut wherein they advise the Loss of of the Danbury to the northward of Callicut, and that the Captain Supra Cargoe & Seamen were arrived at the Factory having received extreme ill usage from the Country People. The Money sent them by a Toney upon account of the Bad Weather was landed at Mamy Cuddy about six Leagues from Callicut, at which Place Our People took two Nairs Jungadoes, and were proceeding on their way over Land. At Elture they were met by the Kings writer who seized the Money alledging that it belonged to the Danbury, while the soldiers were assuring him to the Contrary, and Endeavouring to convince him it was sent from Tellicherry, the Jungadoes whom they sent, arrived, & notwithstanding their Joint Remonstrances He would not relinquish the Money, but immediately deposited it in a Banksall, upon recieving this notice they immediately sent Pedro Veigas with Nairs Jungadoes and themselves followed him to Elture, where they had a Meeting with the Prince of that country and other Rajahdore, to whom they represented the Unjustness of seizing the Goods saved from the Danbury, The ill Treatment of the Officers & People, and to convince, the Money they detained was actually sent from hence produced to them Our Letter. To this the Prince answered, that which they alledged he did not in the least doubt the Truth of, but till he received Orders from the Samorine, the Money must remain deposited where it was: That the 12th. Instant Two Ministers arrived from the Samorine who removed the Money to Callicut, putting it in a Warehouse where they also placed some of the Honble Companys People; To these two Rajahdore they made also the proper Remonstrances who returned the same answer, that they must Wait the Samorines Orders, to whom they wrote an Ola, and enclosed us a copy. They advise also the Loss of Mocow ship at Cota whose Cargoe has shared the same Fate with that of the Danbury.

TRANSLATE OF MANOEL LEON & MANOEL NETTO THEIR OLA TO THE SAMORINE.

THE 8th. Instant the Chief of Tellicherry sent by a Toney with four soldiers, Four Thousand Rupees, upon account of contrary Winds and bad Weather, they were obliged to Land at Mamy Cody where they stay'd that Day, and taking two Nairs Jungadoes proceeded on their way at Elture they were stopp'd by Cochy Theyamenos who seized the Money & deposited it in a Banksall, alledging that the same belonged to the Vessell that was shipwrecked, and notwithstanding Our assurances that the Money was sent from Tellicherry & ready to produce the Letter we received he still detained it. The Money has been since removed to Callicut by two of Your Majestys Ministers to whom likewise we made the same Remonstrances, but as they wait for Orders, We hope Your Majesty will take off this Impediment which We are induced to think you will comply with from the Friendship subsisting between Your Majesty and the Honble Company.

I OBSERVE from your Writing that there has been a Toney arrived at Elture, with Money from Tellicherry for Callicut Factory, which was seized & carried by my People to a Banksall belonging to Naquemdne if it is as you represent the Money shall be returned. I hav [sic] ordered the Governour of Callicut to take Charge of the Goods belonging to the ship which was drove ashore and upon my being advised of the whole He receives, and Your sending a Person hither I will explain myself on this Head.

In the time of former Chiefs of Tellicherry they never attempted to prevent Goods being carried thither, or in the least molested their Merchants, if therefore the Hoñble Company on this Occasion sit easy, their People will not be able to go any where to make their Contracts, as the Prince intends to put a stop to their trade. In other Times the Hoñble Companys affairs were conducted not so coldly, and if this Cold Behaviour is continued, it will only encourage their Enemies, but should You not be willing to Act Yourself its necessary that other Powers be prevailed upon to Chastize & humble him, this is my Opinion. I have notice that the Prince of Cherrika has given Orders to seize on the Goods lying at Iracure which ought to be prevented. If you had been sensible I was capable to do this, You would not have treated me in the manner you have done. The contract of the Hoñble Company have been carried on, in the same friendly manner, as in the time of my ancestors, and I had no Intentions of creating Differences, but some Evil designing People have induced you to illtreat me, wherefore till I receive satisfaction I shall do my utmost to prejudice the Hoñble Company.

HIS HIGHNESS waving the point of preventing the French from entering into his Dominions, and his publicly declaring his Intentions to act against the Hoñble Company, without pointing out any one Instance of a Greivance shews evidently his being determined not to listened [*sic*] to any Terms of Accomodation; and that he is Linked in with the French.

That Como Nair commands there for the King of Nelleseram, to whom, the French have promised large assistance, of ammunition & Gunners against the Canarees who lie encamped nigh Mottalye it's said with about Five Thousand Men.

Advice of Prince Amboo Tamban's taking the Fort of Nellesaroon proves also.

THE CHIEF received an Ola from Prince AMBU TAMBAN wherein he writes that the People in the country will side with that Party most of whom are already gone Over to the Prince of Cherrika who (as he is informed) intends to act against Codolar Tiriumbo with whom he himself intends staying till August, requesting Charges may be sent him for 300 men as also Annanda Croop, when He promises to do all in his Power.

The Prince has wrote us to meet him, and in case of Refusal intends to attack us. I hope you will give me Your Opinion as soon as possible on this crisis, as a Delay may Affect Chovelly Souravon who already seems inclinable to meet the Prince.

THE CHIEF wrote the following Answer to the preceeding Ola from Prince Amboo Tamban.

I received You Highness's Letter & observe its contents It is my Opinion your Highness ought not to be unactive but do something that may prejudice the Prince of Cherrika. I request however you will not Oppress or Molest the Poor, but only the Heads of the Prince's Faction, by which means you will raise money for Your Charges; for the present you will receive by Guenavady Putterah the sum of Five Hundred Fanams. Should the French Endeavour to pass by Land to Nelleseram, Do Your utmost to prevent them, as also to assist Codolar Tiriumbo & Chovelly Souravan. Whatever advices you may have to transmit hither, deliver them to the Captain of Maddacarra by whom they will be forwarded.

THE CHIEF also answered the Ola from Codolar Tiriumbo to Pedro Rodrigues as follows.

I HAVE perused your writing to Pedro Rodrigues and hope yourself as also those of Souravon have come to a fixed Determination to side with the Honble Company against the Prince of Cherrika. In the former they acknowledged Ours under the 24th. agreeable to which they had withdrawn Our People from the Banksall where the Money was deposited, assuring us they shall Observe our Directions by making no farther Remonstrances; they advise that about Eleven O Clock the 26th. in the Forenoon arrived a Minister by Name Namboory, from the Northward who entered the above Banksall and told the Corporal that as there was certain Advice the Money was sent from Tellicherry, the King would shortly order it to be delivered up. He then proceeded to the southward, In Case therefore the King should send any such Orders, they request Our Directions whether they are to accept the money or not; They returned the Corporal, soldiers and Mucquas who came Over Land on account of the Monsoon, accompanied by two Nairs Jungadoes; having given the Military Provisions to the 30th. Instant and the Mucquas to the 29th. In their Letter of Yesterday they advise of their having returned the Corporal and three soldiers as above mentioned. After they left Barraquel they met a Nair, and the Corporal being apprehensive that there might be others (without any Grounds for such an apprehension returned to Callicut without Eating himself or permitting others to Eat Leaving behind him, the two Nairs Jungadoes, that they arrived with them about nine O Clock in the Evening, and were to be dispatched again as this morning.

RECEIVED a Letter from Manuel Leon at Callicut enclosing his accounts for last Month, He advises that Just as He was dispatching these Pattamars, two Nairs arrived at Callicut who had told him that the Samorine had sent a Minister to Mamiccody to examine into the (4000 R^s.) who from the Mucquas of that Place, their assertion that the soldiers belonged to Tellicherry seemed very well satisfied, & was going to Tricolotu to make his Report thereof to the King.

THE CHIEF not having yet received any answer to the several Letters wrote the King of Bednure, dispatched a proper Person with the following.

IN my last Letter to Your Majesty under the 10th. May, I advised that the Princes of Cherrika had intentions to deliver up the Fort of Nelleseram to the French, who a few days since marched a Body of Men from Mahie, either to take Possession of that Fort, or to Erect another nigh it, either of which will be very detrimental to Your Majesty. The Design of the said Princes of Cherrika by this step, is (by their assistance) to prevent Your Majesty from taking satisfaction of them for their Debt, and that of the French, to be a Barrier between the Mallabars & Your Majesty, to give Peace or War as may best suit their Conveniency making Conquests in both countries as Opportunities offer. It has been a Year since, I have been endeavouring to prevail with the two Princes of Cherrika to pay their Just Debt to Your Majesty, and because I would not support them in a bad cause, they are now at War with the Honble Company. The present first King of Nelleseram, is the Chief author of those Troubles, and it has been by underhand Policy that the French have been introduced into Nelleseram whose views (it is currently reported) are to become Masters of the whole Coast, as high as Carwar; If then the country Powers would unite to prevent them your Majesty may, (if directly set about) drive them from, but should they once get settled, they will find a Method to force a Trade in Your Majesty's Dominions; I shall duely Observe to advise you from Time to Time of their Proceedings and hope Your Majesty will inform me of Your Resolution on this head; Though the Honble Company have hitherto been in Friendship with the King of Colastria, they never will countenance them in an unjust Action. When I was last at Billiapatam, The King of Colastria requested he might go to Tiriangatta Pagoda, to alleviate his Miseries, as he had not wherewithal to subsist, which I readily agreed to; He has never acknowledged Uniamen & Ramaru for Princes of Cherrika, who ought first to have had his Royal Grant, and therefore their Actions can only be esteemed Rebellion to their Sovereign, for which Reason his Majesty has appointed to the Regency AMBU TAMBAN, a Branch of the said Family.

To me it appears, that these Proceedings of the Prince & French will Oblige Your Majesty to come to Mangalore, if so I hope you will advise me of your arrival that I may pay my Respects to You personally.

THE above Letter was enclosed in one to the Governour of Mangalore, to whom the Chief wrote the substance of the preceeding advices to the King of Bednure, strenuously recommending the immediate sending a Body of Men to take Nelleseram, which if deferred till after the Rains will be rendered very difficult.

THE Chief acquaints the Board he called this Meeting from Certain Advice he had received, of the French Linguist, an Officer and a Body of Men having passed through the Cotiote's Country, into Our Princes Territories in order to settle at Nelleseram, which intention in them we have long dreaded, and have as frequently represented to the two Princes, that the Giving their Consent or want of Opposing

them would unavoidably occasion a War, as the Hoñble Company could not see their Priviledges invaded, derived to them from their ancestors who gave them an Exclusive Trade in the Colastria Dominions of all European Nations (except the Dutch of Cannanore) Therefore this being the Greatest Infringement they can make, it behoves us seriously to consider how to Oppose these Proceedings; Pacifick Means are agreed to be tried first, to avoid if possible the ill consequence of a War, the Chief therefore wrote a Letter of Remonstrance to the two Princes (as entered in the Diary) which it's hoped will bring them to a due sense of their ill conduct and convince our superiours no Gentle Methods were left untried, should we be obliged at last to have recourse to arms, to defend Our Hoñble Masters Right in this Country.

And here it is to be observed that proper means would have been taken to oppose the French, but the King of Cotiote having declared in favour of the Prince, both whom are plentifully supplied under hand by our Neighbours with Ammunition & money to act against us, oblige us to stand only on the Defensive for the present till a proper Alliance is formed or an opportunity Offers to act offensively with some certainty of success.

THE following is Translate of the Chiefs Remonstrance to the two Princes of Cherrika as mentioned in the preceeding Consultation.

My Last Letter to Your Highness was purposely designed to prevent, the Growing Evills I see creeping into Your Government, as I was at that time well advised of the alliance You were making with those who have never been Friends to the Palace of Pally Quilote, in Order as you vainly imagined to distress the Hoñble Company, and debar them of their Priviledges, derived from Your ancestors, as a Reward for having defended them & their country against their Enemies. Whether these Priviledges have not been purchased with a deal of Bloodshed & Money I leave Your Highness to Judge and Determine, Far would it be from the Hoñble Company to put you in mind of their services, did not they see ruin hanging Over Your Head. What can induce Your Highness to throw Yourself into the Arms of known Enemies to Your Family, purposely to give Trouble to Your Friends? Doubtless the Registers of Your Ancestors will point out, who have been your True Friends; Look what other Power than that of the Hoñble Company have not, (from a pretence of Espousing Your Cause) made a property of You without doing you the least service. If you can Please to acquaint me what the Hoñble Company have ever got by maintaining Your Right, their own they can always defend, nor should We have occasion for the Force we keep up, but for you; Did we think alliances worth purchasing (The Power you have now taken by the hand) would only baffle us out of the Company's Money as he now does you, and would not serve either of us but for his Own End.

I am to acquaint you with the advices I now have, Your whole Country are in a consternation, as it is said that notwithstanding all the Grants to the English Company of a sole Trade in Your Dominions, You are going (by the advice of Your Good Friend the 1st. King of Nelleseram) to let in another European nation, already on their March for Nelleseram, or some other Part of your country This at present may seem of slight consequence to your Highnesses, none of the Mallabars however they may flatter you at present will approve of this hereafter, as Your giving away the Property of the Bednure Rajah will inevitably bring the Canarees into your Dominions, who are you to fly to then? When you know your new Friends as well as I, you will wish you had not forfeited your Old Ones. I must be ingenuous and tell you, that although the company have the Interest of the House of Pally Quilote at heart, yet when they find you have entirely thrown them off they will show you they can be the worst Enemies You ever had to deal with. This I send you by way of Friendly advice, and leave it in Your Power to determine the Differences either by Treaty or the Sword, and the not sending me an immediate answer to this, I shall look on as if you chuse the Latter, or the same if I receive an Evasive One.

THE CHIEF is advised by the Officer of Maddacarra that the two Princes have had some Differences on the subject of Money, the Elder absolutely refusing to advance any. The Young Prince is therefore obliged to rob & plunder the whole country to raise a Fund and two days since seized on some Pepper lying at Pudiangaddy, designed for Tellicherry. Orders have been issued out also that an account be taken of all such as are capable to bear arms, and a Number have been already raised to carry on the war. That Endeavours have been used to bring Ally Rajah Over to his Party who hitherto has evaded it, which greatly Chagrines his highness.

THE CHIEF judging from these Preparations of the Young Prince that his attempt may in all probability be against Maddacarra wrote a Letter to the Officer recommending to him to be extremely watchful, indenting in time for such stores as he may judge will be wanted for the Defence of that Garrison.

THE French Detachment of Men mentioned in Consultation the 7th. Instant it's said arrived Yesterday at Billiapatam consisting of two hundred Men Military & Militia.

THIS Morning passed another Body of Military & Militia belonging to the French through the Cotiote and Our Princes Territories the whole consisting of about One Hundred Men.

CHATTOO of Egar one of Our Northern Pepper Merchants this day fled hither the Prince having demanded Two hundred Thousand Fanams of him to bear part of the War Charges, which He giving the Prince hopes of Raising from the Effects lately left his Family by the Death of an Unkle, the Prince let him go on promise of return^g. but he made his Escape with his Family hither, leaving Possessions of Oarts & Verge Lands to the amount of One hundred & fifty thousand Fanams which He is greatly apprehensive will be made a seizure of.

UNICHY NAIR was sent to Boyanores Rajahdore to sound their masters sentiments, in regard to the Present unsettled state of the country, and to try if He was willing to pay off the whole or part of his Debt, and had a Lattitude given him to declare that if their Master was willing to discharge the same, a Method might be thought on to settle a good understanding between him & the Honble Comp^y.

THE Preceeding Letter was enclosed in One to the Gentlemen at Fort St. David acknowledging Receipt of their Favour under the 1st. Ultimo. We congratulated them on the arrival of their shipping from England and advised that it was not in Our Power to ease the Gentlemen at Bengal of their Tonnage till Orders arrive us from Our Superiours to make such a provision, We wrote them the Differences between the Prince and the Honble Company, The French their new settlement to the Northward and the little probability there was at present either of adjusting the former or removing the latter.

THE GENTLEMEN at Mahie having by their settlements to the Northward openly infringed Our Honble Companys Priviledges in this country who by Grants from the several Kings of Colastria, have an exclusive Right of Trade of all other European Nations, (except the Dutch of Cannanore). WE have hitherto been silent as not willing to credit Reports, raised as We then imagined to sow Jealousies between the two settlements; We could wish You had given us no greater Foundation, for Our complaining of Your Conduct lately, which is too publick not to be taken Notice of: Your having marched two Bodies of Men some days past, through the Cotiote Country, convincing Us of Your Intentions to force a settlement somewhere in the King of Colastrias Dominions, as proper Instruments were carried for such an undertaking. You cannot but be sensible that by Grants to the Honble United English East India Company from the Kings of Colastria, they have an undoubted Right of a sole Trade in their Dominions, exclusive of all other European Nations (except the Dutch of Cannanore) and these Grants have been confirmed to them by the several succeeding sovereigns of the country & now in Our Possession. We must therefore, as Agents for the said Honble United English East India Company, in their Behalf, Protest against You Mr. Louet Chief and the Council, as Factors for the Honble French East India Company, for all Damages, Losses in Trade or otherwise, that may arise to Our Honble Masters by your thus unwarrantably endeavouring to settle in the Dominions of the King of Colastria, as a Right of Trade in that Country is only in the said Honble English Company & Dutch, founded on the prementioned Grants which you Gentlemen certainly infringe by this intended settlement, and how consistent it is your injuring a Nation in so dear a Point as their Trade when our Respective sovereigns are in amity must be hereafter determined by those who will impartially canvass this Action. Given in Tellicherry this Ninth Day of July in the Year of Our Lord One thousand Seven Hundred fifty one, and twenty fourth of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord GEORGE the Second.

We have been just now honoured with your Letter of the 9th. Instant O.S. The settlement you mention and we forming by Orders of Our superiours is not in the Colastria Dominions; we received it immediately from the Prince to whom this spot belongs, who is not dependant or Tributary to any sovereign, and consequently has a Right to bestow it on those He thinks proper. It is true Our Troops passed thro' the Colastria Dominions, the only Rout they could take at this time of the Year, the sea not being as yet navigable, Moreover it is to be presumed, that neither Colastria, nor even the King of Cotiote, think that this Passage through their Country's is contrary, to the Right of whomsoever, since they gave their consent to it. THIS Morning four French Seepoys arrived here in their way to Mahie with Letters to M^r. Louet from Mangalore which were stopped & the Seepoys returned to the Canarees the Chief writing the following Letter to the Governour of Mangalore on the occasion Viz. THURSDAY 11TH - French Letters from Mangalore stopped.

THE 7th. Instant I wrote You by an Express Pattamar, advising of the French of Mahie having sent a Body of Men to take Possession of Nelleseram Fort. For this and many other Reasons I have stopp'd four Persons on their return to Mahie sent as I judge by the French at Mangalore to observe what is transacted there, and am also informed that the Bishop who came lately at Your Port is employ'd by them as their Agent. Therefore

it is necessary for the service of the King Your Master, that the said be ordered to a place of Retirement, and no Body permitted to speak to him, he being a Cunning and Artful Man & may otherwise convey Intelligence to the French of everything that is transacted. Upon Receipt of Your Answer I shall send You the four Persons I have detained, in this and Every thing else my Endeavours shall not be wanting for the Good of Your King and self. In a Postscript, the Chief also Cautions him to have a watchful eye on the Church.

THE CHIEF received the following answer to the Remonstrance sent to his Highness under the 7th. Instant as may be seen in the Preceeding Diary.

I have received Your Letter and Observe it's contents it has never been my Inclination to break with the Hoñble Company, nor have I hitherto attempted any thing to their Prejudice, and whenever You are willing to point out a Method to adjust these Differences, with Honour to myself I am ready to Unite again with the Honble Company.

The Chief immediately wrote the following answer to the preceeding Ola.

TO THE PRINCE OF CHERRIKA.

I have been this moment favoured with your Letter and well weighed its contents, as the Interest of Your Highness and that of the Hoñble Company are the same; its necessary it be well considered on, by both of us respectively, to prevent the continuance of a War which cannot but prove prejudicial, as well to your Highness as to the Hoñble Company.

BUT if you do not chuse to relinquish your new friends, what is it Your Old Ones can do? If Your Highness had therefore the least confidence in the English, you ought not to have embraced the Interest of any other European Nation, advise me your Resolution and consider the Power of the Honble Company of which You must be a Judge their arms having been frequently employed in Your Defence.

I dont write this to Biass Your Highness either way, as you are left to Your Own Choice, but this I can say with Truth that it gives me the greatest concern to see the Dominions of the Pallace of Pally going to Ruin from introducing the French into the Country.

I have at Times had several conferences with your Highness, and religiously Kept my Word, and now affirm, if You have the least Love for Your Country, & regard for it's Honour, that upon obtaining a conference, I will faithfully & clearly Examine into the Cause, and who is the author of these Differences, when I promise that Justice shall take Place. Don't imagine that I write this to beg a Friendship, being well provided with Men, Money & Ammunition should it happen otherwise. I am desirous of Peace though ready for war. Consider of the Interest We have with a Certain Northern Power and immediately return an answer, as the Proceedings of the French will not permit of the Least Delay.

You being fully acquainted with Our Reasons for having wrote the Dutch Captain & Council of Cannanore to join with us in suppressing the Incroachments the French Nation are making in the King of Colastria's Dominions, to the Prejudice of Our Respective Companies, who have the sole priviledge of Trade in his country, exclusive of every other European Nation, You are therefore to proceed tomorrow morning to Cannanore, and see if the Captain & his council will agree to Act jointly with us, in expelling them, by all justifiable measures (if the same hereafter may appear practicable) assuring him in the meantime, that We are resolved to act openly against the Princes of Cherrika for having permitted them to settle in the Colastria Dominions, as their schemes could not have been executed without their permission, and if you find He is resolved to Join his Endeavours with Ours, You may acquaint him of Our Design to take Cholasavaron, but if as We expect he should declare, He cannot act till He receives a Force and Orders from Cochin, represent in the strongest Terms the delaying of taking proper Measures to bring our Prince to a Just Way of thinking, may give the French time to fix themselves in a state of security, and render abortive any Plan, We may hereafter form for routing them out, whereas by distressing the Princes of Cherrika immediately, We may oblige them to act Jointly with us, to prevent the unforeseen prejudice that may happen to Our respective companies from their meeting no opposition, telling them, if they are averse to Joining us or have it not in their Power at present, We expect they will suffer Us to land such Force, under their Colours, as We may think proper, to proceed against the Prince Cherrika & their adherents, and as ALLY RAJAH in some Measure is actuated by the Dutch Councils, sound whether they would be willing to encourage him to Join Us, and be fully certified (if He should Join the Prince) whether they would oppose him in his Design or not, as if he does the Dutch ought not to take any thing amiss in regard to Our Proceedings against him both by Land and sea.

As You are sensible We want to form an alliance with Ally Rajah, and that making the first Overtures to him will occasion both a Backwardness and such Extravagant Dem^{ds}. as may not be attended to, Moneak our Second Linguist accompanies You purposely to contrive some means for Ally Rajah to desire (while you are at Cannanore) to have a conference with You, when You have a Lattitude to assure him, if he will Join us with his People against the Princes of Cherrika they shall receive their Diet, ammunitiion, & himself such Encouragement from the Hon^{ble} Company, as his good services may merit, with assurances, if Our Differences are hereafter adjusted, he shall be included in the articles of Peace, and be no sufferer for having proved a faithfull ally to Us. If there is any particular thing, He wants to attain at present in, possession of the Prince of Cherrika, Urge him to declare his Intentions in the beginning, and if reasonable they will be backed by Us.

If You are successfull in this Point, You will easily contrive Means to Visit Ally Rajah's Fortifications for which Purpose Captain Cameron now proceeds with You to make his Remarks, and you are to endeavour to persuade him to let some of Our Gunners be fixed in those that command the Plain as You go to Cherrika and particularly in that Fort called [*Lacuna*] which is near Colasavaron, the Place We have an intention to take, provided this Alliance can be formed so that, a free communication may be kept open between Cannanore & Tellicherry.

THIS serves purposely to let you know, the scituation that Our Honble Masters and Yours affairs are in at this Place and Cannanore, The Princes of Cherrica having come to a Rupture, with Our Masters are now espoused in carrying on a War against them, in order to put the French in possession of a Fortification to the Northward of Cannanore. as this is equally prejudicial to Our Masters, We thought proper to send Mr. John Robinson second of Our Council to represent the same to Mr. Godfridus Weyerman, & his Council but the conference that passed between them appearing very unsatisfactory, which backed by the strongest Proofs that Your Captain is supplying the Prince of Cherrika underhand with Rice, fully convinces us, He is taking all Unjustifiable means to detriment their Trade, but We now represent the same to You, in, behalf of Our Honble Employers, and hope that You will put a stop to his private Prejudices, being the Occasion of any Detriment to either Your Or Our Company, assuring you that till We receive Your Answers We shall put up with as many Injuries as We can answer to Our Employers.

The Canarees still lie encamped, but it's said have sent a Message to the French for the delivery of Nelleseram Fort, which the former are determined it seems to retake but the present Unsettled Weather prevents their entring into action.

THE CHIEF from the above advice wrote the Governour of Mangalore representing to him how necessary it was he should prevent the French from Fortifying themselves, and desired he might be acquainted of his masters Resolution. To prevent any Jealousies in them that we were accommodating our Differences with the Prince. he assured him to the contrary and that He was ready to enter into an alliance with the King his Master to take satisfaction for the Injuries each had received.

That fifty Moors and fifty Tiveys about Nelleseram have entered into their service & do Duty in their Camp, to whom they have issued arms, and that a few Days since died the Canaree General who commanded Mottalye in whose Room there is another Subadar expected with a Reinforcement to the Camp of two thousand foot besides Horse, which already consists it's said of nigh Twelve Thousand Men.

THE Following answer was wrote by the Chief to the preceeding Lre from the Canaree General, Canaree Genl. Letter to.

I have received Your much Esteemed Letter. In several addresses to the Subadar of Mottalye, the Governour of Mangulore & the Bednure Rajah I fully advised them of the French their marching and taking Possession of the two Forts of Ramdilly and Nelleseram at both which Places they have hoisted their Colours, but at present with a small Force, their Intentions are to prevent Your army passing the River to the southward. This proceeding of the French ought to be esteemed an Act of the Greatest prejudice to the King Your Master, and as a friend to his Majesty, do advise that Orders be immediately Given to the Army to drive them from their Holds before they fortify further. It is five Days since I have dispatched Bispooy from hence with a Letter to the Subedar of Mattalye and one to the Governour of Mangulore to Conferr on the state of Affairs.

THE Prince its said for Certain has Given Orders to his Nairs to cutt of [f] all Nairs and Tivees belonging to Maddacarra Island without asking any Questions. This makes it very evident he is no ways inclined to hearken to any Terms of an accommodation and any further Offers while he is so Powerfully supported by the French will only induce him to be more unreasonable in hi[s] Demands. **MONDAY 28TH.** Advice of the Prince having given orders to cut off all the Tiveys & Nairs belonging to Maddacarra.

THE OFFICER of Maddacarra also writes the Chief that the French have erected a very strong Battery at Ayconna and that their Toneyes are constantly Passing and repassing He advises of a skirmish between the Cannarees and five hundred Nairs in which the latter had thirteen Men killed.

As the Prince of Cherrika seems determined to presecute [sic] his Evil Intentions against the Hoñble Company withstanding the several Remonstrances made to him by the Chief on this Head, to care therefore in some measure the large Expence which we are but too apprehensive Our Hoñble Masters will be at to reduce his Highness to a reasonable way of thinking It is AGREED to appropriate the customs for this Purpose. As also to oblige the Pagodas of Andalure and Meylure on Durmapatam to pay the full Value of their Grounds on the same terms and conditions as Collected from other Renters. The customs to be appropriated to ease the large Expence of the present troube.
