PREFACE

IN this book an attempt has been made to present the general public in this country with succinct biographies of most, if not all, living persons who have had a direct connection with India either as officials or non-officials. In the majority of cases these biographies are based on materials very kindly furnished by the persons themselves : the rest are compiled from authoritative sources of information. The main object kept in view has been to produce a comprehensive work useful to busy people. Few care to wade through pages of writing to pick out the main incidents of a notable's life. The British "Who's Who" which has supplied the model to the Japanese "Who's Who", and the American "Who's Who," is an invaluable work, and covers a field as wide as the world itself. Its utility as a book of reference is beyond praise, while its general accuracy has been a matter for wonder with most people who have had occasion to use it. It has many Indian and Anglo-Indian names included in it, but in the nature of things it cannot be expected that it can deal with all personages whom India knows or delights to honour. It is the purpose of the book to fill in this gap. In its main design it follows that excellent book of reference, and it will be apparent to those glancing through its pages that it covers a wide ground. The name of almost every man and woman who has worked or is working for the good of India, in the moral or material, religious or political spheres has been, it is thought, included in it. Every endeavour has been made to include the names of all title-holders in India, but it is possible that owing to non-receipt of replies or from the paucity of information available, there are occasional omissions. In the next edition of the Dictionary, it is hoped to make good this short-coming. A work like this depends very largely for its accuracy and comprehensiveness on the help that the general public render its Editor. It is hoped that many more will respond in the years to come to the appeals for information sent to them. In order to facilitate the work of giving accurate addresses, a desideratum, in a reference book of this kind, those sending back proofs will help the Editor very much, indeed, if they will add an address or check the one already inserted and supplement the same with the name of the club or clubs to which they may belong, so that correspondence may be easily directed to them.

PREFACE

Clubs in India are very numerous and there are few who do not belong to one or other of these. To facilitate their work a list of clubs is included in the appendices printed at the end of this volume to which reference is solicited.

In the preparation of this book, histories of gazetted officers issued by the Government of India and the various local Governments and Administrations, and the Feudatory States of India, the India Office List, Debrett's *Baronetage and Peerage, 1914*; Dodd's *Peerage, 1914*; *Who's Who, 1914*; Sir Roper Lethbridge's *The Golden Book of India*; Mr. Buckland's *Dictionary of Indian Biography*, Whittaker's Almanac, 1914, and many other official and non-official publications have been consulted and to publishers and authors of these the Editor would here express his great indebtedness.

It is inevitable that a work of this kind, passed through the press under difficulties and during intervals of time snatched from a busy working day, should contain some typographical errors. The *errata* issued will, it is hoped, tend to clear most of these. The Editor craves the indulgence of the public in this matter. Every practicable suggestion intended to improve the utility of the book will, the Editor wishes to add here, receive his best attention when the time comes to issue the next edition.

In conclusion the Editor would tender his thanks to the many gentlemen who have helped him in any way in bringing out the work. He would specially thank those who have readily responded to his call for information. Also, those who have very considerably tendered suggestions to increase the utility of the book. He would also express his thanks to Messrs. K. V. Raja Rao and T. Raja Rao who have assisted him in the preparation of the volume and to Mr. L. Swami Rao, B. A., in reading the proofs.

THE ROYAL FAMILY OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

THE SOVEREIGN.

His Most Excellent Majesty our Sovereign Lord George the fifth, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

HIS MAJESTY GEORGE FREDERICK ERNEST ALBERT, second and only surviving son of His *late* Majesty King Edward VII., and of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, born at Marlborough House, 3rd June, 1865; married at St. James's Palace, 6th July, 1893, H.S.H. Princess Victoria Mary ("May") Augusta Louisa Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes, now Her Majesty *QUEEN MARY* (born 26 May, 1867, Lady of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has Orders of the Victoria and Albert, and Crown of India, *MUS. DOC., LL.D.*), only daughter of H.H. the late Francis, Duke of Teck, and H.R.H. the late Princess Mary of Cambridge, Duchess of Teck; created *Duke of York, Earl of Inverness, and Baron Killarney*, in the peerage of the United Kingdom, 1892, *Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester*, also in the peerage of the United Kingdom, 9 Nov. 1901; ascended the throne on the death of his father 6 May, 1910; crowned at Westminster Abbey, 22 June, 1911; entered the Royal Navy, 1877; Midshipman, 1880; Sub-Lieut. 1884; Lieutenant, 1885; Commander, 1891; Captain, 1893; (Personal Naval A. D. C. to Queen Victoria, 1887-1901; to King Edward, 1901); Rear-Admiral 1 Jan. 1901; Vice-Admiral, 26th June, 1903; Admiral, 1 March, 1907; Admiral of the Fleet, 7th May, 1910; gazetted General in the Army 1902, Field-Marshal 7th May, 1910; Field-Marshal in the Prussian Army 16th May, 1911; Colonel in-Chief 1st and 2nd Life Guards, Royal Horse Guards, 10th (Prince of Wales's Own Royal Hussars, King Edward's Horse (The King's Oversea Dominions Regt.)), Duke of Lancaster's

Own, Norfolk (The King's Own Royal Regt.), and Suffolk (Yeomanry). Royal Regiment of Artillery, The Honourable Artillery Company, and 5th London Brigade Royal Field Artillery (Territorial Force), Royal Malta Artillery, Corps of the Royal Engineers, Grenadier Guards, Coldstream Guards, Scots Guards, Irish Guards, The Royal Fusiliers (City of London Regt.), 3rd Batt. The Prince of Wales's Own (West Yorkshire Regt.), The Royal Welsh Fusiliers, The King's Royal Rifle Corps, The Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, Princess Victoria's (Royal Irish) Fusiliers, Officers Training Corps, 1st Duke of York's Own Lancers (Skinners' Horse), 6th King Edward's Own Cavalry, 11th King Edward's own Lancers (Probyn's Horse), 18th King George's Own Lancers 26th King George's Own Light Cavalry, 38th and 39th King George's Own Central India Horse, 1st King George's Own Sappers and Miners 14th King George's Own Ferozepore Sikhs, 61st King George's Own Pioneers, 102nd King Edward Own Grenadiers, 130th King George's Own Baluchis (Jacob's Rifles, 1st King George's Own Gurkha Rifles, The Malaun Regt.) 2nd King Edward's Own Gurkha Rifles (The Sirmoor Rifles), The Royal Marines, and 8th Isle of Wight Rifles, "Princess Beatrice's") Battu the Hampshire Regt.; Hon. Commander of the 1st Dragoon Guards (Germany); Hon. Colonel 8th (Zamora) Infantry Regt. Sovereign of the Orders of the Garter, the Thistle, St. Patrick, the Bath, the Order of Merit, the star of India St. Michael and St. George the India Empire, the Royal, Victorian, Distinguished Service, and Imperial Service; Sovereign and Patron of the Order of the Hospital of St. Jerusalem in England, and of the Order of Mercy; has received the Orders of the Black Eagle of Prussia, the Golden Fleece of Spain, St. Andrew of Russia, Grand Cordon of the Osmanieh, the Hanedani Ali Osman, and the Murassa Initias of Turkey, the Annunziata of Italy, the White Elephant of Denmark, the Seraphim of Sweden, the Legion of Honour, and many other Foreign Orders; an Elder Brother of the Corporation of Trinity House (formerly Master); President of many Societies, Colleges, etc. and Patron of many Institutions; installed Chancellor of the University of the Cape of Good Hope, 1901, and of the University of Wales 1902: Hon. D.C.L. Oxford, LL.D. Cambridge, and many other Universities, F.R.S.; was Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports 1905-7; Bencher of Lincoln's Inn 1892, Treasurer 1904; Trustee of the British Museum; High Steward of Reading and Plymouth; and Member of the Royal Commission on Food Supply in War-time 1903, etc. Visited India as Prince of Wales in 1906 and personally presided over the Durbar at Delhi in 1911, as King-Emperor.

His Majesty has had issue—

H. R. H. Prince Edward Albert Christian George Andrew Patrick David, K.G., created *Prince of Wales* and *Earl of Chester* by Letters Patent under the Great Seal, 23rd June 1901, HEIR APPARENT TO THE CROWN, *Duke of Cornwall* in the Peerage of England (1337), *Duke of Rothesay*, *Earl of Carrick*, *Baron of Renfrew*, *Lord of the Isles*, and *Great Steward of Scotland*, in the Peerage of Scotland (1469), *Duke of Saxony*, and *Prince of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha*; Born at White Lodge, Sheen, 23rd June, 1894; a Naval Cadet 1907-11, midshipman 1911-12; an undergraduate of Magdalen Coll., Oxford, 1912; has received the orders of the Golden Fleece and the Legion of Honour; proceeded to the Front in the great continental war and appointed A. D. C. to Genl. Sir John French, 1914.

Abrahams, Lionel, C.B. Every member of this community subscribes one-tenth of his income for maintaining his status and dignity; has adherents also in Central Asia and East Africa; headed the Moslem deputation to the Viceroy, for the discussion of the question of separate representation of Moslems on the Supreme Council, 1906; leading member in the movement for the establishment of a Mahomedan University, for which he made an extensive tour through India for the purpose of collecting funds; guest of the British nation at the Coronation of King-Emperor Edward VII, 1902. In memory of his revered father, has founded the Aga Khan Memorial European Scholarship Fund, for providing selected Mahomedan students with a post graduate course in Europe; personal title of His Highness conferred, 1886; K.C. I. Aitken, Colonel William, born, 1846; son of James Aitken of Falkirk, N. B. Educated at Edinburgh Academy and Heidelberg; entered

Amar Prakash Bahadur, Raja of Sirmoor; born, 1887; educated privately and married to the eldest daughter of the ex-Prime Minister of Nepal, Maharaja Dev Shamsber Jang Bahadur; succeeded to the gaddi, 1911; the relations of this State with the English began in a peculiar way. Karm Prakash II, at one time the ruler of the State, invoked the aid of the Gurkhas to suppress a revolt that had arisen in his State in 1803. In compliance with the demand, the Gurkhas entered his territory, expelled the ruler and became masters of the State themselves. But the ruler of Sirmoor, a lady of courage and resource, invoked British aid and her appeal fortunately coinciding with the time of the Nepal War, a force was sent to expel the Gurkhas

from Sirmoor; after the conclusion of the Nepal War, the British Government placed Fateh Prakash, the son of Karm Prakash, on the throne; during the first Afghan War the Raja of Sirmoor aided the British with a loan and in the first Sikh War, a small contingent of Sirmoor forces fought on the side of the English; the present Chief had administrative training during the time of his father; invested with full powers, 1911; the area of the state is 1108 square miles and its population is 135,689. It enjoys a revenue of Rs. 6,00,000. A military force of 203 Imperial Service Sappers, 235 infantry, 31 cavalry and 4 guns is maintained; entitled to a salute of 11 guns. *Recreation* : Hockey, Cricket, Tennis and shooting. *Address*: Sirmoor (Nahan), Punjab.

Amar Singh, Sardar; born, 1856; the Sardar's father, Deva Singh, was in the service of the Maharaja Ranjit Singh; he joined the British in the Sikh War and rendered them valuable assistance. When the Punjab Military Police was formed, Deva Singh was chosen to raise and command the 7th Police Battalion at Amritsar; was granted the Star of the Order of British India with the title of Sardar Bahadur and a personal allowance of Rs. 1,200 a year. After the re-organization of the Punjab Police, Deva Singh retired with a pension of Rs. 3,000 a year and a grant of 600 acres of land with perpetual proprietary right; present Sardar was once Secretary to the Local Board of Zira; is a Provincial Durbarrī, and zaildar of his *ilaka*. *Address:* Mansurwal, Ferozepur.

Ameer Ali, Rt. Hon'ble Sir Syed, M.A.B.L., C.I.E., Bar-at-law; P.C. Bhagat Chand, Rana; Born, 1888; succeeded to gaddi, 1910; educated at the Lahore Aitchison College. Puran Chand afterwards abdicated and the state was restored to his son Karam Chand in 1840. BHAGAT SINGH.

Bhagavatacharya Ram Shastri, Mahamahopadhyaya (1908), Sahityacharya Dharmasastracharya Yedantacharya, Sankyayogacharya : also-known as **Bhagavatacharyaswami**; Professor, Sanskrit College, Benares. Born, 1864; educated at the Government Sanskrit College, Benares. *Address* : Surjakund, Benares.

Bhagwan Bakhsh Singh, Raja of Amethi; born, 1869. succeeded, 1891; Is the head of the Bhandhaigoti clan of Rajputs who claim to belong to Surajbansi stock and to have descended from Sudha Bai of Narwargarh, the old home of the Jaipur family, though other accounts assign to them a purely local origin. The senior branch of this family have retained position of the Raj over the whole pargana of Amethi. In 1810, Saadat Ali Khan resumed the grant, leaving the Raja only 48 villages rent-free; at the annexation, *i. e.*, after the Province came into British possession, Madho Singh, the then chief, having turned a rebel, his fort was taken by Lord Clyde. Madho Singh afterwards submitted and was allowed to have his whole ancestral estate. He had a son who pre-deceased him and he was succeeded by his adopted heir, Raja Bhagwan Bakhsh Singh. The title of Raja has been recognised as hereditary by the British Government. Granted K. I. H. medal in 1902. *Address* : Amethi, Sultanpur,

Bhagwan Bakhsh Singh, Raja of Pakhra Ansari; Born, 1872; succeeded to title, 1877. The founder of the estate was Rao Ram Singh. Fourth in descent from him was Kalyan Singh, whose elder son, Rao Balbhadar Singh, retained Pokhra Ansari, while the

servng as Magistrate and Revenue Officer in several sub-divisions of his State. He then undertook tours to England and the Continent. Between the years 1899-1902, the Raja has spent a sum of over nine lakhs in famine relief works. The Raja is invested with first class powers and is entitled to a salute of 11 guns. became a feudatory of the British in 1849. It was under the political control of the Collector of Satara till 1887 when it was transferred to Poona. After the overthrow of the Peshwas in 1818, the Chief became a feudatory of the British, and in recognition of his high character and loyalty, the East India Company presented with a sword of Honor in 1846. Having ceded lands of the annual value of 11 lakhs, the Chief does not now pay his contribution for military service. He is a first class Sardar and has power to try his subjects for capital offences. The area of his State is 1,112 square miles with a population of about 300,000, and an estimated

Disturbances arose soon after in Chitral, the result of which was that Shuja-ul-Mulk was confirmed as Mehtar. The first Raja under these conditions was Narendra Narayan Bhup Bahadur, who died in 1868 and was succeeded by the late Maharaja Sir Nripendra Narayan Bhup Bahadur who was married to Suniti Devi, C. I., elder daughter of the late Babu Keshe Chandra Sen (the famous Brahmo leader of Calcutta) and grand-

The founder of the city of Jodhpur was Rao Jodha, who is said to have had 14 sons and to have been succeeded by his eldest son, Satal, about the year 1488. The first chief who commenced negotiations with the British was Man Singh. A treaty was concluded in 1818 by which the State was taken under British protection. In 1839 the British Government found itself compelled to interfere with the State owing to the misgovernment and the consequent disaffection and insurrection in the State. Man Singh however, executed an agreement to ensure future good Government. After his death his widows and the nobles of the State chose Takht Singh, Chief of Ahmadnagar, as their Ruler and the selection was approved and confirmed by the British Government. Junagarh to one of the most picturesque towns in India, while in antiquity and historical interest, it is probably second to none in India. Its old citadel, known as the *Uparkot*, contains Buddhist caves, and the whole neighbourhood is honey-combed either with caves or their remains. Among the fine buildings of this city may be mentioned the Bahadur-din Arts College, the Reay Gate

with clock tower, the hospital and the High School buildings. Area of the State, 3,284 square miles: population, 400,000; revenue, 27 lakhs; has a small force of Imperial Service Troops; H. Kalahasti, Raja of; Raja Damara Kumara Timmanayanim Bahadur Garu; a. s. of late Raja Akkappa Nayanim Bahadur Garu; educ; privately. The estate, which is one of the ancient Zemindaries in the Presidency of Madras, lies scattered in the three districts of Nellore, Chittoor, and Chingleput; has an annual revenue of about 6 lakhs, but is greatly encumbered. It was for some time under the management of the Court of Wards. The town of Kalahasti which is the residence of the Raja, contains a temple dedicated to Siva known here as *Vayu Linga*. In point of sanctity, Kalahasti ranks next to Benares, and the annual festival in the temple commencing from Sivarathri is attended by hundreds from far and near. *Address:* Kalahasti Town, Chittoor District, Madras Presy, India.

Kalat, Wali of H. H. Beglar Begi Mir Sir Mohammad Khan G. C. I. E. the mutineers in 1857; after the suppression of the Mutiny the British Government in recognition of this courageous act of the Royal Lady, treated the Prince with special favor; after the death of the ex-king of Oudh, Lord Dufferin the then Viceroy of India, recognised the Prince as head of the Oudh family and sanctioned him a pension of Rs. 3000 (afterwards raised to Rs. 4000.) a month; at the Viceregal Durbar of Lucknow held some years ago, he was given honors due to a Royal Prince; he received a salute of twenty one guns and was given a seat of honour in the Durbar; the Prince is a man of gentle and generous disposition; his interest over the followers of his father is so great that he takes particular care to give no room to complaints of neglect on his part; owns extensive house and land property in Calcutta; married his cousin and has two sons and two daughters. *Address*: Lhusro Manzil., Calcutta, India.

Kaker, Chief of; Maharaja Dhiraj Kamal Deo; belongs to an old Rajput family whose ancestors, it is said, were enthroned by a vote of the people; under the Mahratta supremacy, the State had to provide a military contingent when called on to do so; in 1818 the British Government restored the Chief who had been deprived of his possession, on payment of an annual tribute of Rs. 500. To all to whom these presents shall come :

Whereas it hath been represented unto Us that it is advisable that the rank and precedence of persons holding appointments in the East Indies, as regulated by Our Royal Warrant, dated the 18th day of October 1876, should be altered. We do therefore hereby declare that it is Our Will and Pleasure, that in lieu of the table laid down in Our said recited Warrant, the following table be henceforth observed with respect to the rank and precedence of the persons hereinafter named, namely,—

The salutes which officials and others receive from H.M.'s ships are laid down in the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions.

APPENDIX III

Formal Modes of Addressing Communications To Persons of Rank and Title

AMBASSADOR.—The title 'Excellency' belongs specially to ambassadors, as well as to governors of colonies, and the Lord lieutenant of Ireland. Address letters 'His Excellency (with name or distinctive title following), His Britannic Majesty's Ambassador and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of—' Begin: 'Sir,' 'My Lord,' according as the ambassador possesses title or not. When personal reference is made, say 'Your Excellency.' An envoy extraordinary or charge d'affaires, though inferior to an ambassador strictly so called, also usually receives the title 'Excellency'; and the wives of ambassadors are generally addressed similarly during their husband's tenure of office and while residing abroad.

ARCHBISHOP.—Address: 'His Grace the Lord Archbishop of—.' Begin: 'My Lord Archbishop.' Refer to as 'Your Grace.' The most formal method of addressing the Archbishop of Canterbury is as follows: 'The Most Reverend Father in God, James (or whatever the Christian name is), by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan.' The Archbishop of York is addressed as 'The Most Reverend Father in God,—' by Divine Permission Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan.' All Metropolitans are styled 'Most Reverend:—' . . . 'The Most Reverend the Lord Bishop of Calcutta, Metropolitan of India.' An Archbishop may be addressed as 'The Right Honourable and Most Reverend the Archbishop of—' if he has a claim to be called 'Right Hon.' apart from his ecclesiastical position. The wife of an Archbishop has no special title in right of her husband's official rank but addressed as 'Mrs.' simply.

ARCHDEACON.—An Archdeacon is styled 'Venerable.' 'The Venerable the Archdeacon of—.' Begin: 'Venerable Sir,' or 'Reverend Sir,' or 'Mr. Archdeacon' (especially in speaking).

BARON.—Address: 'The Right Hon. Lord—;' less formally 'The Lord—.' Begin: 'My Lord.' Refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

BARON'S DAUGHTER.—Baron's daughters are all entitled to be

called 'Honourable.' Unmarried : they are addressed as 'The Hon. A—B—,' with Christian and surname. They retain the title 'Hon.' after marriage, the wife of a commoner being 'The Hon. Mrs.' with husband's surname, the wife of a knight or barone being 'The Hon. Lady, with husband's surname.' Begin 'Madam' refer to as 'Your Ladyship,' if so entitled by marriage. If higher rank is conferred by the husband, the title of course corresponds. **BARON'S SON.**—All the sons are 'Honourable with Christian name and surname. In Scotland, the eldest son is addressed as 'The Hon. the Master of' (peerage title), or 'The Hon. (John), Master of.' Begin : 'Sir.' The wife of a Baron's son is 'The Hon. Mrs.' with husband's surname or both Christian name and surname. Begin : 'Madam.' If the daughter of an earl, marquis, or duke, she must be addressed accordingly. **BARONESS.**—Address : 'The Right Hon. the Baroness—,' or 'The Right Hon. Lady—,' or 'The Lady —,' Begin 'Madam,' refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

BARONET.—Address : 'Sir A—B—,' Bart., giving Christian name and surname. The Christian name *must* be given ; it is quite wrong to speak, for instance, of 'Sir Vernon Harcourt' when 'Vernon' is merely one of the surnames. Begin : 'Sir.' A baronet's wife is addressed as 'Lady' with husband's surname (her Christian name would also be used if the daughter of a duke, marquis, or earl, and in this case she would also be 'Right Hon.'). Begin 'Madam,' refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

BISHOP OF THE CHURCHES OF ENGLAND OR IRELAND.—Address : 'The Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of—,' or 'The Right Rev. A—B—, Lord Bishop of—,' or simply 'The Lord Bishop of—.' Begin : 'My Lord Bishop;' refer to as 'Your Lordship.' In formal documents a bishop is styled 'The Right Reverend Father in God, John, By Divine Permission, Lord Bishop of—' The Bishop of Meath and the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church are styled 'Most Reverend'; The Bishop of Madras is 'The Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Madras but the Bishop of Calcutta being a Metropolitan is 'The Most Reverend A retired Bishop is still addressed as 'Right Reverend' and 'M. Lord.' In America, the form of address to a Bishop is generally 'The "Right Rev. A. B." Bishop's wives have no special title in right of their husband's office.

CANON.—Address : 'The Rev. Canon—.' Begin : 'Reverend Sir'

CARDINAL.—The special title is 'His Eminence.' Begin : 'Your Eminence.'

MODES OF ADDRESSING COMMUNICATIONS

CHARGÉ D'AFFAIRES.—See *Ambassador*.

CLERGY.—The general form of address is 'The Reverend A—B'. Begin: 'Rev. Sir', or simply 'Sir.'

CONSUL.—There is no special form of address to a person as such. 'A—B—, Esq., H.B.M.'s Consul-General,' or as the case may be. In the U.S.A., a Consul is styled 'Honourable.'

COUNTESS.—Address: 'The Right Honourable the Countess of—'. Begin: 'Madam'; refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

DEAN.—Address: 'The Very Reverend the Dean of—'. Begin: 'Very Rev. Sir'; more familiarly 'Mr. Dean' (used in oral communications).

DOCTOR.—The initials denoting the particular degree are placed after the usual form of address, whether D.D., LL.D., M.D., D.Sc., &c. 'The Rev. A—B—, D.D.'; 'A—B—, Esq., M.D.' Less formally: 'The Rev. Doctor B—'; 'Doctor A—B—.'

DOWAGER.—When the holder of a title marries, the widow of a previous holder of the same title becomes 'dowager,' this being often inserted in addressing her: 'The Right Hon. the Dowager Countess of—'; 'The Dowager Lady—'. Instead of 'Dowager', to which some ladies object, the Christian name may be used: 'The Right Hon. Mary Countess of—'. Begin: 'Madam'; refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

DUKE.—Address: 'His Grace the Duke of—'. Begin: 'My Lord Duke'; refer to as 'Your Grace.' Royal dukes are different. **DUCHESS.**—Address: 'Her Grace the Duchess of—'. Begin: 'Madam'; refer to as 'Your Grace.' The eldest son of a Duke takes his father's second title; all the other children of a Duke are styled 'Lord Edward,' 'Lady Caroline,' etc.—Their wives take corresponding title. Address as 'The Rt. Hon. Lord, or Lady'.—Begin: 'Sir,' or 'Madam'; refer to as 'Your Lordship,' or 'Your Ladyship.'

EARL.—Address: 'The Right Honourable the Earl of—', or 'The Earl of—'. Begin: 'My Lord'; refer to as 'Your Lordship.' The wife of an earl is a countess. **EARL'S CHILDREN.**—The eldest son takes a courtesy title from his father. The younger sons are all called Honourable. The daughters are all addressed as the daughters of a Duke.

ENVOY.—See *Ambassador*.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL, MEMBERS OF (in Indian and Colonial Governments). Generally addressed as 'The Honourable A—B—.'

MODES OF ADDRESSING COMMUNICATIONS

GOVERNOR.—Indian and Colonial Governors have the title of 'Excellency,' in virtue of their office. Address: 'His Excellency' A—B—, Esq. (Sir A—B—, The Right Honourable the Earl of, &c.). 'Governor of—.' Begin according to rank; refer to as 'Your Excellency.' A duke holding such a position would, however, be 'His Grace,' Your Grace.' A Governor's wife is by courtesy styled 'Her Excellency.' Lieutenant-Governors, as in India and the Dominion of Canada, are styled 'Honourable,' His Honour,' 'Your Honour.'

GOVERNOR OF STATE (U.S.A.). Usually addressed as 'His Excellency.' 'His Excellency A—B—, Governor of—,' or 'His Excellency the Governor of—.' A Lieutenant-Governor is called 'Honourable' or 'His Honour—.'

JUDGE.—In England and Ireland the Judges of the Supreme Courts are called Lords Justices and Justices; in Scotland the Judges are the Lords of Session. (See *Justice, Lord Justice, Lords of Session.*) In England, the County Court Judges, however, are regularly called 'Judge.' 'His Honour Judge—' (surname); on the bench referred to as 'Your Honour.' In the Punjab and Burma and in many British colonies, the members of the higher courts are called Judges and addressed as 'Honourable,' 'Your Honour.' In the U. S. A., the term 'Judge' is regularly applied to all such functionaries; and all are addressed in the same way.

JUSTICE.—Judges of the High Court of Justice in England, in the Chancery and other Divisions, and of the High Courts of Calcutta, Madras, Bombay and Allahabad in India, are called 'Justices.' Address: 'The Honourable Mr. Justice—,' or if a knight, 'The Hon. Sir A—B—.' Begin in both cases, 'Sir.' On the bench he is addressed as 'My Lord;' and referred to as 'Your Lordship.'

JUSTICE OF PEACE.—(J. P.) In England is formally addressed in documents as, 'The Worshipful,' and on the bench is referred to as 'Your Worship.'

KING.—To be addressed as 'THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.' Begin: 'Sire,' or 'May it please Your Majesty'; refer to as 'Your Majesty' or in the third person as the "Rt. Hon. Mr.—presents his duty to Your Majesty."

KING'S COUNSEL.—Ordinary address with the addition of 'K'

KNIGHT BACHELOR.—Treated as a baronet, but 'Kt.' is not usually appended to the name in addressing a letter. As in case of a baronet, carefully avoid using a surname instead of Christian name.

KNIGHT OF THE BATH, ST. MICHAEL AND ST. GEORGE, STAR OF INDIA, INDIAN EMPIRE, VICTORIAN ORDER, ETC.—Address: 'Sir A—B—, G.C.B.,' or K.C.B., K.C.M.G., or G.C.S.I., as the case may be. Begin: 'Sir.'

KNIGHT OF THE GARTER, THISTLE, ST. PATRICK.—As above, with the initials K.G., K.T., K.P., respectively following the name.

KNIGHT'S WIFE (of any class).—As baronet's wife.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, MEMBERS OF.—Those under the Indian and Colonial Governments are generally addressed as the 'Honourable A—B—.'

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.—See *Governor*.

LORD ADVOCATE OF SCOTLAND.—Address: 'The Right Honourable the Lord Advocate.' Begin: 'My Lord;' refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

LORD CHANCELLOR.—Address: 'The Right Hon. the Lord High Chancellor:' or 'The Right Hon. Earl—(or as the case may be), Lord High Chancellor.' Begin: 'My Lord,' etc.; refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

LORD CHIEF JUSTICE.—(England). Address: 'The Right Honourable the Lord Chief Justice,' or 'The Right Honourable Sir A—B—, Lord Chief Justice.' Begin: 'My Lord' or 'Sir,' as the case may be. In India, 'The Honourable the Chief Justice.'

LORD JUSTICE.—(English Supreme Court of Appeal). Address: 'The Right Honourable the Lord Justice—,' or 'The Right Honourable Sir A—B—.' Begin: 'Sir.' When on the bench they are addressed 'My Lord,' 'Your Lordship.'

LORD LIEUTENANT OF IRELAND.—Address: 'His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant,' or if a Duke, 'His Grace the Lord-Lieutenant.' How to begin and refer will also be determined by rank ('My Lord Duke,' 'My Lord Marquis').

LORD MAYOR.—Only London, York, and a few other cities have a Lord Mayor. Address: 'The Right Honourable the Lord Mayor of—,' or 'the Right Hon. A—B—, Lord Mayor of—,' Begin: 'My Lord;' refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

The Lord Mayor's wife is addressed: 'The Right Honourable the Lady Mayoress of—.' Begin: 'My Lady' refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

LORD PROVOST.—Address: 'The Right Hon. the Lord Provost of Edinburgh;' 'Hon. the Lord Provost of Glasgow;' 'The Lord Provost of Aberdeen.' 'Perth,' 'Dundee.' Begin: 'My

Lord,' or 'My Lord Provost'; refer to as 'Your Lordship.' The Lord Provost's wife has no share in the title.

LORDS OF APPEAL.—(*in Ordinary*). These are judicial members of the House of Lords, who rank as barons and are so addressed. Their wives are baronesses; their children are not specially distinguished.

LORDS OF SESSION.—These are the Judges of the Supreme Court of Scotland. Some of these Lords decide to retain their surname when elevated to the bench ('Lord Young'), others substitute the name of an estate. Address: 'The Honourable Lord—.' Begin: 'My Lord'; refer to as 'Your Lordship.' Their wives take no title.

MAID OF HONOUR.—Address: 'The Honourable Miss—.' Begin: 'Madam.'

MARQUIS.—Address: 'The Most Hon. the Marquis of—.' Begin: 'My Lord Marquis'; refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

MARCHIONESS.—Address: 'The Most Honourable the Marchioness of—.' Begin: 'Madam'; refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

MARQUIS'S CHILDREN.—All are 'Right Honourable' like those of a Duke. The eldest son takes a courtesy title like the eldest son of a Duke, and is similarly addressed. Younger sons and daughters are like those of a Duke.

MAYOR.—Address: 'The Mayor of—,' or in formal documents 'The Right Worshipful the Mayor of—.' Address: 'Sir'; refer to as 'Your Worship.' In the United States Mayors are usually styled 'Honourable'; 'The Hon. A—B—, Mayor of—.'

MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT.—Not specially recognized except by adding 'M. P.' to ordinary address: 'A—B—, Esq., M. P.:' 'Sir A—B—, Bart., M. P.'

MINISTER.—See *Ambassador, Clergy*.

MODERATOR OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY (Scotland).—'The Right Rev.'; the assembly itself is 'The Venerable.'

OFFICERS, MILITARY AND NAVAL.—Their professional rank is always prefixed to any other title they may independently possess: 'General' or 'Admiral the Right Hon. The Earl of—.' 'Colonel the Honourable A—B—.'

PREMIER.—No special title or address as such.

PRESIDENT (U.S.A.)—Address: 'His Excellency the President of the United States;' 'His Excellency A—B—, President of the United States.' The Vice-President and ex-Presidents are 'Hon.' 'The Hon. the Vice-President;' 'The Honourable A—B—.'

PRINCE.—Address: 'His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; 'His Royal Highness Prince A—(Christian name).' If a royal duke: 'His Royal Highness the Duke of—.' Begin in any case: 'Sir;' refer to as 'Your Royal Highness.'

PRINCESS.—Address: 'Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales;' 'Her Royal Highness the Princess A—(Christian name); or if a duchess: 'Her Royal Highness the Duchess of—.' Begin: 'Madam;' refer to as 'Your Royal Highness.'

PRIVY COUNCILLOR.—All members of the Privy Council are: entitled to be addressed as 'Right Honourable;' 'The Right Honourable A—B—, P.C.' (omit 'Esq.'). Otherwise according to rank.

QUEEN.—Address: 'The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.' Begin: 'Madam,' or 'May it please Your Majesty;' refer to as 'Your Majesty.'

RECORDER.—Addressed as 'The Worshipful;' in London 'The Right Worshipful.' Begin: 'Sir;' refer to as 'Your Worship.'

SENATORS (Canada and U. S.)—Addressed as 'The Honourable A—B—.'

SERJEANT-AT-LAW.—Address: 'Serjeant—,' or 'Mr. Serjeant—.' (Title is now extinct.)

SHERIFF.—Address as 'Mr. Sheriff.'

SHERIFF OF LONDON.—As Recorder of London.

VISCOUNT.—Address: 'The Right Hon. the Lord Viscount—,' or 'The Right Hon. Lord—' or 'The Lord Viscount—.' Begin: 'My Lord;' refer to as 'Your Lordship.'

VISCOUNTESS.—Address: 'The Right Honourable the Viscountess—,' or 'The Viscountess—;' 'The Right Hon. Lady—.' Begin: 'Madam;' refer to as 'Your Ladyship.'

VISCOUNT'S CHILDREN.—Are addressed in the same way as those of a Baron.

VICEROY AND GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA.—Address: 'His Excellency,' 'May it please your Excellency,' 'to His Excellency the Right Honourable,—Viceroy; and Governor-General of India.'

APPENDIX VII

Terms Relating to Ranks and Titles

THE following is a summary description, in alphabetical order, of the various ranks which confer titles upon individuals; together with a brief account of a few terms which frequently occur in the personal memoirs of each possessor of these dignities:—

ARCHBISHOPS.—The highest dignity in the Church is that of “metropolitan prelate” or archbishop. He exercises control over Bishops; and the limit of his archiepiscopal jurisdiction is called “a province.” But in addition to these functions, he has the actual care of a diocese, in which he performs all the duties of a suffragan prelate, owing obedience, however, only to the Crown and the Parliament. The Archbishop of Canterbury can issue licences for marriages to be solemnized at any time or place; and he has the power of granting degrees like those of a University.

BARON.—This though now the lowest rank in the peerage is the most ancient. It may be derived from a writ of summons or from letters patent. The *former*, if followed by an actual sitting in the House of Lords, constitutes a title heritable by heirs male and female of the body of the person summoned. The *latter* always prescribes the course of descent in express words. Both these kinds of Baronies are in existence; but formerly another class drew their honours from the possession of certain lands. These “Baronies by tenure” are obsolete, though many heirs of such titles exist, possessing baronies by writ or patent.

BARONETS.—This order of titled persons was founded in England by James I., 1611; in Ireland, to promote the plantation of Ulster, by the same King, 1619; and in Scotland, for the advancement of Nova Scotia, by Charles I., 1625. It owes its birth to the necessities of James, who sought to recruit his finances by the condition annexed to the title of paying into the exchequer about 1095*l.*, being ostensibly three years’ pay of thirty soldiers at 8*d.* a day per man. The institution of the order in Scotland was connected with a scheme for colonizing Nova Scotia, and down to 1638 the patents contained a grant of

ands in that colony, though it had before that date passed into the possession of the French. The dignity in modern times has always been created by patent, in which the course of its descent is prescribed—usually to the heir male of the body of the first grantee. Many patents, previous to 1827, contained a clause under which the eldest son of a Baronet may claim Knighthood on coming of age. The rank of Baronet is a "necessary" addition to the name in all cases, and has to be written in full in official signatures. The abbreviation "Bt." (not "bart.") is permissible in ordinary use.

BISHOP.—Every Bishop must have been in priest's orders must be at least thirty years of age, must be born in lawful wedlock, and must be recommended by the Crown to the dean and chapter by whom he is elected. Each new Bishop is "consecrated;" but when a prelate is removed from one see to another the process is called "translation." The majority of the Bishops have no seats in the House of Lords, being Prelates of Scotland or Ireland, or Colonial or Missionary Bishops. Of the English and Welsh Prelates, the two Archbishops, the Bishops of London, Durham, and Winchester, and 21 of the remaining 30 Bishops, sit as spiritual peers, the eight junior Bishops being excluded. The Bishop of Sodor and Man has a seat but no vote.

COUNTESS.—The wife of an Earl, or the female possessor of a peerage of that rank in her own right by descent or by creation.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER.—This Order was instituted by royal warrant, dated 6th September, 1886, for the purpose of adequately rewarding the distinguished services of commissioned officers of the Naval and military services who have been honourably mentioned in despatches. It is to consist of the Sovereign and Companions.

DUKE.—This, the highest rank in the British peerage, dates its origin from the 11th of Edward III., in which year that King created his eldest son a Duke; previously the Kings of England had themselves been styled "Dukes" of Normandy, and were naturally restrained from conferring an equal titular designation upon any subject; but Edward III. claimed to be "King of France," and he was the first to create an English Duke. This order of nobility disappeared wholly in 1572 by the extinction of the heirs of all upon whom it had been conferred, or by the attainder of the remaining possessors of the title; the first peer subsequently raised to this rank was Ludovic Stuart, Duke of

Richmond, 17th May, 1623. There are at present only two dukedoms in Ireland, those of Leinster and Abercorn, besides the Royal Dukedom of Connaught.

EARL.—The title of Earl may be traced to the Saxon earldorman, or the Danish jarl; but its constitution as a dignity is, of course, subsequent in date to the Norman Conquest, when the designation comes, Count, or Earl, took a prominent place in the peerage. Till the reign of Henry III. this dignity, together with that of Baron, wholly constituted the nobility of the realm; and previous to that period earldoms seem in several instances to have been enjoyed, like baronies, as a consequence of the tenure of certain lands. Originally the title was derived from the name of a county, the government of which was attached to the honour; but in modern times the dignity and the duty have long been divided, and towns, villages, and country seats occasionally furnish the name of an Earl.

IMPERIAL SERVICE ORDER.—Instituted by King Edward on his Coronation, 1902, for members of the Civil Service of the Empire, to be conferred after Long and Meritorious Service.

KNIGHT BACHELOR.—This rank is far more ancient than any of the fraternities existing under the name of Orders. By the mere imposition of the Sovereign's sword on the shoulder, accompanied with the words "Arise, Sir—," its privileges are conferred; and even the members of the Orders of Knighthood must all now receive this accolade before they can assume the designation of "Sir." When residence abroad prevents the personal reception of this honour, it has of late become the practice to issue letters patent granting the "style, title, and dignity of a knight" to the favoured individual. The prefix of "Sir" is exclusively English as appertaining to Knighthood, and is not necessarily borne by any Foreign knight. In Ireland the Lord-Lieutenant can confer the honour of Knighthood. The origin of the designation Knight Bachelor is plausibly derived by some authors from the words *bas chevalier*, indicating the superiority of the class of Knights Banneret who were created under the royal standard displayed in open war.

KNIGHTS OF THE MOST HONOURABLE ORDER OF THE BATH.—The practice of creating Knights with various ceremonies, of which bathing was one, is undoubtedly a custom of considerable antiquity; but the institution which now bears the name cannot be traced as a State Order, regulated by statutes and ordinance

beyond the year 1725. The close of the war led to a re-modeling of its constitution in 1815, and the long continuance of peace produced an analogous result in 1847. The new statutes published in the latter year introduced the means of extensively rewarding civil services, and, by abolishing a mass of absurd or conflicting ordinances, reduced the whole to a consistent and rational institution. It contains three classes, viz. Knights Grand Cross, Knights Commander, and Companions. The latter are not entitled to the prefix of "Sir," but the two former always receive the accolade. These three classes are *each* subdivided into three minor divisions, viz. Military, Civil and Honorary. Services in the navy or army are rewarded by the first of these minor divisions; services in diplomacy, on the bench, in high official stations, &c., are acknowledged by the second; services rendered by foreign princes or officers are rewarded by the third.

LORDS SPIRITUAL.—The Bishops collectively in their legislative capacities are called Lords Spiritual, as the other members of the House of Peers are called Lords Temporal.

MARQUESS.—This title was unknown in England till Richard II. created a Marquess of Dublin. It is said to derive its origin from the word *Marchio*, Lord Marcher, whose duty it was to guard the Welsh and Scottish frontiers, which were called *Marches*. Till of late years it occurred very sparingly in the lists of Peers and even at present it furnishes the smallest number of any rank in the nobility.

MOST DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF ST. MICHAEL AND ST. GEORGE.—This Order was established by letters patent in 1818, and enlarged in 1832 and 1839 for the purpose of affording an appropriate medium by which marks of royal favour might be conferred upon the natives of Malta and the Ionian Islands, as well as upon British subjects whose services may be connected with these dependencies of the Crown. It consists of three classes—Knights Grand Cross, Knights Commander, and Companions (substituted for Cavalieri in 1851). In 1869 the Queen was pleased to sanction such a modification of the statutes of this order, and such an enlargement of its numbers as to render it available as a reward for distinguished merit or service *in any* of the colonial possessions of the Empire. In 1879 and 1887 this Order of Knighthood was still further enlarged and new statutes issued, and the number of members is now not to exceed 10 G.C.M.G., 300 K.C.M.G., and 600 C.M.G., inclusive of the

assignable for foreign services, and honorary members, consisting of foreign princes, &c.

MOST EMINENT ORDER OF THE INDIAN EMPIRE.—This Order was instituted by the Queen on the 1st of January, 1878, to commemorate the event of the proclamation of Her Majesty's style and title of Empress of India in the Indian Dominions and for the reward of important and useful services rendered to the Indian Empire. It was enlarged in 1886 again in 1887, on the occasion of the first Jubilee, and again in 1911, and now consists of the Sovereign, a Grand Master (Viceroy for the time being), Knights Grand Commanders (not exceeding 40), Knights Commanders (not exceeding 120), and Companions (nominations not to exceed 40 in any successive year); persons who by their services, official or other, to the Empire in India, and such distinguished representatives of Eastern Potentates as His Majesty may think fit and eligible for appointment. The Councillors for and in the Indian Empire are *ex-officio* and for life Companions of the Order.

MOST EXALTED ORDER OF THE STAR OF INDIA.—This Order was instituted by Queen Victoria in 1861, and enlarged in 1866, 1876, 1897, 1902 and 1911 for the express purpose of rendering high honour to conspicuous loyalty and merit in the princes, chiefs and people of her Indian Empire. The Order consists of the Sovereign, a Grand Master (the Viceroy of India), forty-four Knights Grand Commanders; one hundred Knights Commanders, and two hundred Companions, exclusive of extra and honorary members.

MOST ILLUSTRIOUS ORDER OF ST. PATRICK.—This fraternity of Knights was instituted in 1783 as a national Order for Ireland, corresponding to the Thistle in Scotland and the Garter in England. The Lord Lieutenant, Lords Deputy, or Lord Justices were appointed *ex-officio* Grand Masters, and the Order consists of twenty-two Knights, in addition to which all persons who have held the office of Lord-Lieutenant are authorized to retain the insignia of the Order after they have retired from the Government of Ireland.

MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE GARTER.—The year 1348 is that usually assigned as the date of the institution of this fraternity. Popular tradition attributes its foundation to the accident of a lady's garter being picked up by Edward III. at a court festival, when he checked the mirth of bystanders by the exclamation "*Quoi soit qui mal y pense*, and permanently converted a trivial tra-

accident into a source of honour and distinction by founding a fraternity of Knights with that motto and the decoration of an embroidered garter. It consists of the Sovereign, the Prince of Wales, twenty-five Knights Companions, and such lineal descendants of George II. as may be elected extra Knights. .

ORDER OF THE CROWN OF INDIA was instituted on 1st January 1878 to commemorate the assumption by Queen Victoria of the title of Empress of India. To consist of the Sovereign, Princes of the Royal and Imperial House, the wives or other female relatives of Indian princes, and of other Indian ladies the Sovereign may think fit; and also of the wives or other female relatives of any of the persons who have held, now hold, or may hereafter hold the offices of Viceroy of India and Governor-General of India, Governor of Madras or Bombay, or of Principal Secretary of State for India. The decoration consists of a badge and the inscription V.R.I. on it.

ORDER OF THE GUELPHS OF HANOVER.—This, though no longer a British fraternity, enjoyed that distinction for nearly a quarter of a century, and Englishmen have more largely participated in its honours than the natives of Hanover. It was founded by George IV. in 1815, and consists of three classes—Knights Grand Cross, Knights Commander, Knights; the latter, however, in this country, have no other attribute of Knighthood than the name, and correspond exactly to the Cavalieri or Companions of other Orders; but in Hanover they enjoy several privileges.

THE ORDER OF THE HOSPITAL OF ST. JOHN OF JERUSALEM, incorporated by Royal Charter, 1888, under the title of the "Grand Priory of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England," is the English *Langue* or branch of the celebrated Order of the Knights of St. John, established at Jerusalem at the time of the 1st Crusade and was founded at Clerkenwell about 1100 A.D. It was suppressed by Elizabeth, and not revived until after the dispersal of the Order on the capture of Malta by Buonaparte. The head of the fraternity is the Sovereign, and the various grades are a Grand Prior, a Sub-Prior, a titular Bailiff of Eagle, Honorary Bailiffs, Commanders, Knights and Ladies of Justice, Knights and Ladies of Grace, Esquires, and Serving Brothers and Sisters. The Chancery of the Order is in the gateway of the original Priory in Clerkenwell, which is still standing.

ORDER OF MERIT.—Instituted by King Edward on his Coronation, 1902, and consisting of one class of members, subjects of the Crown, who have rendered exceptionally meritorious service in the Navy and Army or towards the advancement of Art, Literature and Science, the number not to exceed twenty-four.*

PRIVY COUNCILLOR.—The Privy Council includes the responsible ministers of the Crown, a few of the judges, some diplomatists, and many peers and commoners distinguished in the public service. In number it is unlimited. Under its authority many acts are done, but the measures which pass under its name chiefly proceed from its own sub-committees—the Cabinet, the Judicial Committee, the Board of Trade, &c. Privy Councillors enjoy the title of Right Honourable, and are *ex-officio* entitled to become magistrates in every county without being required to possess landed qualification. They also possess the privilege of the *entree* at drawing rooms, levees, state balls, &c.

ROYAL VICTORIAN ORDER.—This was created in 1896, for bestowal by the Sovereign upon those subjects whose personal services it might be desired to recognize, and any foreign princes and persons upon whom the Sovereign may think fit to confer it. It consists of five classes, Knights Grand Cross, Knights Commander, Commanders, and members of the fourth and fifth classes, who take precedence as indicated on pages 36 and 37. The Royal Victorian Chain is decoration founded by King Edward VII. in 1902, to be bestowed on special occasions.

VISCOUNT.—This is the most modern of all the ranks in the Peerage. It was introduced into England in 1440, and has always been conferred by letters patent. The word *vice-comes* had long been used to designate the sheriff of a county, and the French modification of that term, *viscount*, was adopted when a titular dignity was created, to which, however, no shadow of official trust was assigned. It has never been largely conferred, and as a chief title does not at present constitute one-twentieth of the English peerage; in Ireland, however, it bears a much larger proportion to the whole body, being about one-fifth.

INDIAN TITLES OF DISTINCTION AND HONOUR

Indian Titles of Distinction and Honour

The exact date of the institution of these titles is not known but in some cases they are hereditary, though they are purely personal. Since the Durbar of 1911, the holders of these distinctions are allowed in all public functions to wear a badge corresponding to the distinction conferred on them. The following is a list of Indian Titles now in general use : Maharaja ; Raja ; Sardar ; Sardar Bahadur ; Dewan Bahadur ; Rai Bahadur, Rao Bahadur ; Rai Sahib ; Rao Sahib ; Rani ; Jang ; Manne Sultan ; Mahamahopadhyaya ; Vaidyaratna ; Amir ; Sultan ; Nawab ; Shams-u-ulema ; Shaifa-ul-Mulk ; Khan-Bahadur ; Khan Sahib. These titles are conferred by H. E. the Governor-General of India on behalf of the Sovereign.

KAISAR-I-HIND MEDAL

The above medal was instituted by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Empress of India, on the 10th April, 1900, as a reward for important and useful services rendered in Her late Majesty's Indian Empire in the advancement of Public Interest.

The Medal consists of an oval-shaped badge or decoration—in gold for the first class, and in silver for the second class with the Royal cypher in the centre on one side, "and on the reverse Kaiser-I-Hind, for Public Service in India," and is suspended on the left breast by a dark blue ribbon.
