CLOTHING REGULATIONS.

Section I.

THE following Regulations for the Clothing of the Armies of Bengal, Madras and Bombay, having been approved of by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, are to be strictly observed :—

1. The Clothing authorized under these Regulations is to be made up at the cost of the State by Army Clothing Agents, under the control of Superintendents of Army Clothing.

2. The Superintendent of Army Clothing, appointed at each Presidency, is to be responsible to Government, that these Regulations are implicitly observed, and that the Clothing is prepared in strict accordance with the sealed patterns authorized from time to time by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors : he is to control the expenditure of the Department, to audit the accounts of the Agencies, to offer any suggestions that may occur to him regarding the preparation, fit, &c. of the Clothing, to supervise the Officers and Establishments placed under him, and by personal inspection of the Agencies, to see that the accounts of the Agents are kept correctly, and up to date, that due care is taken of the Stores, and that the Clothing is made to fit properly, and that due economy is observed.

3. The Superintendent in Bengal will finally audit the Annual Clothing Accounts of the three Presidencies.

4. All Indents, Bills, and other demands, on account of Army Clothing, must be passed by the Superintendent, before they are complied with or discharged.

5. The Superintendent is to authorize all necessary advances to the Agents and others on account of Clothing.

6. The general Indent for Clothing Stores is to be prepared by the Superintendent at each Presidency and to be submitted to Government by the 1st day of August annually.

7. The Cloth, Materials, &c., required for European Troops, are to be entered distinct from that for Natives.

8. The Cloth for Overalls and Trowsers is to be entered separately, and distinct from that for Jackets and Coats.

9. The Indents are to be prepared according to the form laid down, and are to show clearly the established proportion calculated by the number of men for whom Clothing will be required.

Attached to the Indent is to be a Statement of the probable number of men to be clothed, and the quantity of each Article per man, indented for.

10. On receipt of the Stores from England, they are to be landed under the orders of the Superintendent, and at once made over or despatched to the Agencies for which they are intended.

11. A proportion of the bales of each description of Cloth is to be inspected immediately on landing, in order that the general condition in which the Cloth has arrived may be ascertained; but otherwise, the bales are not to be opened before they are required for use. Should any however have the outward appearance of being damaged, the contents are to be examined without delay.

12. When any of the Stores are objected to, a special Committee is to be assembled, and their Report submitted to Government. In the case of any of the woollens being pronounced unserviceable, when there can be no doubt of their having been sent from England in a damaged or defective state, they are to be re-packed for the purpose of being returned.

13. The Stores are to be despatched to Agencies in the most expeditious and safe manner, under arrangements to be made by the Superintendent.

14. When there may be more than one Agent, the Superintendent will arrange for the distribution of the Clothing Stores received from England, and the transfer, when necessary, of Stores from one Agency to another.

15. The invoice cost and charges of the Stores will, in the first instance, be debited to the Superintendent, who will become entitled to credit in the books of the Accountant, on producing the receipts of

the Agents for such portions of the Stores as may, from time to time, be made over to them.

16. The Annual Accounts of each Presidency are to be made up and transmitted to the Superintendent of Army Clothing, Fort William, for submission to the Government of India, within six months after the close of the relative year, or on or before the 1st July annually.

17. The above Rules, as regards the duties of Superintendent, are to be equally observed, when it may be deemed expedient to combine the offices of Superintendent and Agent in one person.

AGENTS.

18. The Army Clothing Agents are under the immediate order of the Superintendent of Army Clothing.

19. Each Agent is required to furnish security to the extent of Company's Rupees (50,000) Fifty thousand.

20. Each Agent is to submit to the Superintendent annually on the 1st of July an Indent for Stores required for the preparation of the Clothing of the Troops attached to his Division for one year.

21. The Agents, who are also Store-keepers, are to be held responsible for all Stores delivered over to their charge, and they will be required to make good any loss or damage caused by inattention or neglect.

22. Each Agent will be debited to his personal account with the invoice cost and charges of the Stores made over to him as received from England, and will only receive credit on expenditure by issue, transfer, &c., when supported by the necessary vouchers.

23. Immediately the Stores are received, they are to be compared with the invoice and classed, and those longest in store are invariably to be first used.

24. No Agent is to issue any Cloth or Store without the previous sanction of the Superintendent.

25. The Agents are to be answerable for Clothing Stores, &c., under despatch, being properly packed, and they are, under the sanction of the Superintendent, to arrange for their transport or shipment.

26. Their responsibility will cease from the time the Clothing or Stores are despatched, provided that no neglect attributable to them shall afterwards be proved with respect to the packing or arrangements for transit.

27. A separate Account is to be kept of the Clothing Stores Department of each Agency.

28. The cost of all Stores issued for the use of Corps or individuals entitled to Clothing is to be charged to the State, and where the issue of Cloth or other Stores for the use of Irregular Cavalry Corps, for the Great Coats or Overalls of Native Troops, or for other purposes, is authorized, the cost is likewise to be charged to the State, the Military Accountant in such cases recovering the amount from the Indenting Officer.

Section II.

PREPARATION OF CLOTHING.

29. No change of any description, whether in the material or form of any article of Clothing or Equipment, can be made without the sanction of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, obtained through the Supreme Government.

30. The Clothing is to be prepared in strict conformity to the sealed patterns supplied to the several Superintendents and Clothing Agents.

31. With each of these sealed patterns, a Statement will be furnished of the average quantity of the several descriptions of material required for making up the article, which quantities are never to be exceeded. A sealed pattern of each article of Clothing is to be lodged at the Staff Office at the Head Quarters of each Division, for the guidance of General Officers in the inspection of Corps.

32. The Clothing when completed is to be examined before despatch from the Agency by an Officer to be specially appointed for the purpose by the Commander-in-Chief, or by a Committee of Officers, who are to compare it with the sealed patterns, and if the same be found strictly conformable thereto, will grant a Certificate, in duplicate, to the following effect :—

I, or we, certify that _____ have inspected the Clothing of the _____ Regiment, and that it/ appears equal and in strict conformity to the sealed patterns, bearing the seal of _____ in respect both to material and make.

(Signed) _____

33. This Certificate is to be forwarded, one copy with the Clothing to the Head Quarters of the Regiment and the other to the Superintendent of Army Clothing.

34. The Clothing is to be packed and despatched to Corps in time, to allow of its being issued annually on the 1st January.

35. The Clothing is to be sent to Regiments ready made up, and not in material, unless by the special permission of Government. A portion, however, for the Native Commissioned Officers, and not exceeding Coats or Jackets for one Serjeant or Havildar, and five Rank and File per Troop or Company, may be supplied in material at the request of the Commanding Officer, to be made up at the Head Quarters of the Regiment.

36. When alterations are necessary for fitting the Coats and Jackets, the expense is to be charged in a contingent Bill, to be submitted to the Superintendent of Army Clothing, but the charge for such alteration is not to exceed Rupees (5) Five for every 100 men.

37. No charge is to be made to the Native Soldier for fitting his Clothing, and no European Soldier shall be called upon to pay more than four (4) annas for fitting each suit, in addition to the sum allowed above.

38. Whenever any loss or damage of Clothing or Stores occurs, a Court of Inquiry is to be assembled to investigate the cause of such loss or damage. A copy of the proceedings, in which the opinion of the Court is to be recorded, is to be sent to the Superintendent of Clothing, with the Indent to replace the articles.

39. Bills for the annual allowance for the provision of Light Clothing for European Troops, authorized in Section VIII., are to be submitted on the 1st of each January, to the Clothing Agent of the Division, who, after checking them by the number of men for whom Clothing is due, will advance the amount, remitting it either in separate Bills to Corps and heads of Departments, or in one Bill to the Division Paymasters, who will make the payments.

Section III.

ARTICLES OF CLOTHING TO BE PROVIDED.

40. THE articles of Clothing with which the Soldiers of each Corps are to be provided are as follows, and they are to be furnished in strict conformity to patterns deposited with the Superintendent of Clothing and Clothing Agents:—

And for the years in which the working suit is not issued, compensation will be allowed to provide according to the orders of the Commanding Officer at the Station, such Clothing as may be suited to the climate.

With an allowance of Rupees (9) Nine for each Serjeant, and Rupees (2-12) Two and twelve annas for each man of inferior rank, in the year in which Coats are not supplied, and in the year in which Coats are supplied, Rupees (4) Four for each Serjeant in lieu of a second pair of Boots, which sums are to be laid out by the Commanding Officer of each Regiment on such articles of Clothing for the men as he may deem best adapted to the climate. Certificates of the actual delivery of articles to the said amount are to be sent biennially to the Adjutant General.

57. Indents from Corps and Departments for Clothing according to form are to be prepared in duplicate and forwarded annually on the 1st January, one copy to the Superintendent, and the other to the Clothing Agent.

58. Indents from European Corps are to show the numbers actually present on the 1st January, separate Indents being submitted for each Detachment of Recruits which joins between that date and the following 1st January.

59. In Native Regiments, the established complement is to be indented for, whether the corps be complete or not, Commanding Officers filling up the columns of sizes according to the best of their judgment. Should there be any Supernumeraries, the Indents are to include them, remark being inserted accounting for the excess.

60. Indents for Non-Commissioned Officers attached to Departments, Garrisons, Offices, &c., are to be prepared by the Officers under whom they may be serving, and countersigned by the Head of the Department.

61. When Supernumeraries have been indented for, a return showing any alterations in the supernumerary ranks is to be sent to the Army Clothing Agent as early as possible to enable him to regulate the supply.

62. When Supernumeraries are posted to Corps after the annual Indents have been sent in, a supplementary Indent is to be submitted.

63. Commanding Officers are to submit all claims for Clothing due immediately they are preferred, and should they delay forwarding them to the Superintendent of Clothing, they will be held personally responsible.

64. When a Regiment changes its quarters, intimation is to be given without delay to the Clothing Agent.

65. The Clothing is to be surveyed immediately after its receipt with Corps and Departments, and it is to be issued on the 1st January, or as soon after as possible. On its being issued, Distribution Statements in duplicate, according to Form A., are to be sent, one copy to the Superintendent of Clothing and the other to the Army Clothing Agent, and a certificate to the following effect is to be inserted on the back of the next Monthly Return furnished to the Adjutant General:—

I certify that the Clothing for 18— of the Regiment was inspected by a Committee and approved of; that it appears to me equal in quality to the sealed patterns, and conformable in every respect to Regulations, (or otherwise) that it was delivered to the men for use on the — day of ——— and that it has been duly fitted.

Commanding Regiment.

66. When Clothing is condemned by a Regimental Committee, it is to be surveyed by a station Committee, composed of Officers entirely unconnected with the Regiment for which the Clothing is intended. Each article must be examined separately, and Committees are required to state clearly the precise reasons of rejection; and if condemned for not being in conformity with the prescribed patterns, it must be pointed out in what respect each article differs. In the event of there being no Officer at the station unconnected with the Regiment, a report is to be made to the Commander-in-Chief, who will nominate an Officer, whose decision shall be final, to report on the rejected articles.

67. All surplus and condemned Clothing is to be lodged in Regimental Store-rooms, until the orders of the Superintendent of Clothing regarding its disposal are received.

Section IV.

DELIVERY AND FITTING OF CLOTHING.

68. THE Clothing of all Corps is to be delivered to the men on, or about the 1st of January of each year.

69. By these Regulations, each Soldier is to be supplied on enlistment with part worn Clothing equal to that in use with his Regiment, and on each 1st of January, he is to receive new Clothing of the description issued to the Corps. His Clothing is therefore supplied in advance, and he can only claim it on discharge after it has been in use the regulated period.

70. General Officers Commanding Divisions and Stations are to afford their most ready and effectual assistance in enforcing these Regulations, and they are to consider it their particular province to make the most minute inspection of the Clothing as soon as it is fitted and issued;

and in case of their finding any article, either in make or *material*, not in conformity to the sealed patterns, which are always to be produced and referred to on these inspections, they are to make a special Report for the information of the Commander-in-Chief. *

71. The Clothing will be furnished in various sizes adapted to men of different stature. The scale of measurements for European Troops is given at pages 45 and 46. In the Native Army, the men of the three Presidencies differ so much in size and make, that it has been considered best to leave the scale of measurements for Natives to be determined at each Presidency.

72. If proper measurements of the men are taken, and the Indents prepared with care, it is expected that little, if any, alteration of the Clothing will be necessary for the purpose of making it fit neatly. The plea therefore of such a necessity will not be admitted as an excuse on the part of Commanding Officers for defacing, and curtailing the Clothing of the Soldiers, as established by the sealed patterns.

73. Reviewing Officers at the inspection of Corps are to compare the established sealed patterns of Clothing with the Clothing in wear by the several ranks in the Regiment, and to state in the Inspection Returns whether they exactly agree in all respects. If not, the differences are to be specified, and the Officer or Officers by whom they were made or sanctioned are to be named.

Section V.

CLAIMS OF SOLDIERS ON ACCOUNT OF CLOTHING.

74. EVERY Soldier, who may be effective in a Corps or Department, on the 1st January, shall, on that day, if possible, be furnished with the articles of Clothing authorized by these Regulations.

75. Native Recruits enlisted to fill up vacancies are not entitled to be supplied with any new Clothing during the year of their enlistment, but will receive part worn Clothing of discharged or deceased men, and they will be furnished on the 1st of January following, with the same article of new Clothing as is issued to their Corps.

76. Native Recruits raised for a new levy, or for an augmentation of existing Corps, will be supplied with their first new Clothing, either a Coat or Trowsers, immediately on enlistment, and the regular Clothing

of the year will be issued to them on the 1st of January following, and the same Rule is to apply to men transferred to newly raised Corps, the first Clothing of which is supplied on its formation.

77. Coats, Jackets, Caps, Helmets and other articles, which are required to last two or more years, and do not form part of the regular issue on the 1st of January following their arrival, will be furnished to European Recruits with their first Clothing, subject to the Rule laid down in Article 84.

78. The last issued Clothing, whether Jacket, Coat, Trowsers, Cap or other article, is to be considered Clothing in wear, and Soldiers who die or are discharged, desert or are taken prisoners of war, have no claim to it, until it has been in use for the full period for which it is intended to serve, calculating from the regular day of issue.

79. All such Clothing is to be considered the property of Government, and is to be appropriated for Recruits enlisted in the room of Casualties.

80. The Clothing authorized in Article 77 for European Recruits is not to be issued to them until they join the Head Quarters of their Corps. With Artillery Recruits, the Commandant of Artillery must so arrange, that the men shall be provided with Clothing of the Arm, whether Horse or Foot, to which they may finally be posted on leaving the Depôt of Instruction. European Recruits will also be provided on the 1st of January following with regular Clothing of the same Description as is issued to the rest of their Corps.

81. Soldiers transferred from one Corps to another of the same branch, or from their Corps to any Department, or to the Invalid Establishment, are to take with them their Clothing, except in the cases of transfers from the Horse to the Foot Artillery, or *vice versa* in which case the transfers will be required to leave behind them their Clothing in wear, receiving with their new Troops or Companies part worn Clothing, as good as, and equal in value to, that in use with the rest of the Brigade or Battalion ; and in the case of transfers to newly-raised Corps, the first Clothing of which is supplied by Government, the men so transferred are also to leave behind them their Clothing in wear.

82. In cases where there may be no part worn Clothing available for issue to transfers, to Native Recruits enlisted to fill up vacancies, or to men entitled to be supplied with it by these Regulations, new Clothing will be furnished, subject to the Rule laid down in Article 84

but in all such cases satisfactory reasons must be given of the cause of their being no part worn Clothing in Store.

83. Soldiers who may have lost any articles of Clothing in wear, under the circumstances for which indemnification for losses is authorized by the Regulation in force at the time of such loss, shall be supplied with part worn Clothing as good as that in wear with the rest of the Corps, or should there be no part worn Clothing in Store, they will be provided with new Clothing under Article 84.

84. Clothing issued at other than the regular periods of delivery will be provided, subject to the following Rule.

If similar articles of Clothing in wear with the Corps have Three months and more to last when issued annually,

Six,	biennially,
Nine	triennially.
Twelve,	quadrennially,
Eighteen,	sexennially,

the new Clothing required will be provided and will be renewed at the next regular issue, but if similar articles in use with the Corps have less than the periods mentioned to last, the new Clothing required will be provided in advance of the next regular issue, and is to be worn until the end of the period for which it would have served had it not been issued until the regular time of delivery, the Soldier receiving in addition, compensation in money for the number of months such Clothing may have been in wear beyond the prescribed period.

85. If a Serjeant or Havildar be reduced to the ranks, his Clothing shall be taken for the use of his successor and he shall receive Private's Clothing as good as that in wear by the Privates, or articles equivalent to it.

86. Soldiers confined under sentence of a Civil or Military Court have no claim to Clothing while absent from duty, in consequence thereof. On release, they are to receive Clothing equal to that in wear by the rest of the Regiment.

87. All claims for Clothing are to be made within one year after they are actually due, and any claim not submitted within that time will be rejected.

88. The claims on account of Clothing of men, who may be struck off the strength of a Regiment or Department on discharge, are to be

adjusted without delay up to the preceding 1st of January. Men transferred to other Corps or Departments, and European Soldiers proceeding to the Presidency for the purpose of embarking for Europe, are to be furnished with Clothing Certificates of the Form B., duplicates of which are to be sent to the Officer Commanding the Corps or Department to which the man is transferred, or to the Town Major, as the case may be.

Section VI.

COMPENSATION IN LIEU OF CLOTHING.

89. If from any extraordinary circumstance, Clothing in kind cannot be supplied, whether to new levies or at the regular annual issue, compensation in money in lieu shall be paid to the men or be expended in necessaries for their benefit. The grounds upon which the substitution of money for Clothing is proposed must be fully stated to the Commander-in-Chief for the approval of Government.

90. It is to be distinctly understood, that compensation will in no case be allowed when the Clothing in kind is available in Store and can be supplied to Corps and individuals.

91. Non-Commissioned Officers of Departments may be specially allowed to receive compensation, when the Officers under whom they are serving may recommend it. In all such cases, a Certificate must be furnished, showing that the individual for whom the compensation is claimed is in possession of the proper Uniform of his Department.

92. In calculating claims of Soldiers who have been in confinement under sentence during a period for which compensation in lieu of Clothing is allowed to the Regiment in general, the aggregate number of days' absence from duty in consequence thereof is to be deducted, and compensation paid only for the number of entire months that remain after such deductions.

93. Compensation is not allowed for any broken period of a month.

94. Compensation in lieu of Clothing shall be issuable under the sanction of Government, notified through the Commander-in-Chief, and on Bills passed by the Superintendent of Clothing.

95. No claim for compensation beyond twelve months shall, on any account, be admitted against Government. Should any claim of longer date be established, the same will be admitted and charged

against the Officer through whose neglect Clothing had neither been supplied nor compensation in lieu thereof obtained.

96. All Bills for compensation are to be preferred by Commanding Officers or Heads of Departments, to which numerical returns, if the compensation be for Corps, or rolls if for individuals, are to be annexed.

97. The numerical returns must correspond with the Monthly Return of the 1st January, the number of men not drawn for are to be deducted, and the names of such men, with the rank and the Companies to which they belong, must be stated on the back of the return, and the cause why compensation is not drawn is to be most particularly stated, in order that no difficulty may arise in adjusting subsequent claims.

98. Compensation is allowed for articles of Clothing provided under these Regulations, but not for articles coming under the head of Equipments and Appointments, which are issued for use to Soldiers, but remain the property of Government.

Section VII.

EQUIPMENTS AND APPOINTMENTS.

101. THE following articles, provided at the expense of Government, are not to be considered the property of individuals for whose use they are issued, but such individuals are to be held responsible for their due care and preservation.

102. These articles will be issued to Regiments in the same manner as other Military Equipments, and are on no occasion to be taken away by men quitting their Corps.

Cloaks for all ranks, not to be renewed under six years.

Spurs for Staff Serjeants, two years.

Native Foot Artillery and Native Infantry of the Line.

Sashes, Silk, for Staff Serjeants, Drum and 1st Bugle Majors.

Sashes, Worsted, for Havildars, Fife and 2nd Bugle Majors, not to be renewed under four years.

Sappers and Miners.

Sashes, Silk, for Staff Serjeants and Bugle Majors.

Sashes, Worsted, for Serjeants and Havildars, not to be renewed under four years.

Great Coats for all European Non-Commissioned Officers, and Soldiers, not to be renewed under six years.

103. The above articles are to be taken care of by the Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier in the same manner as his necessaries, and any loss or damage occasioned by his neglect is to be made good by stoppages from his pay, and the fact of such loss or damage is to be ascertained by frequent inspections.

104. No article will be renewed until it has served the period specified, and it is to be distinctly understood that these equipments will not be replaced as a matter of course on the termination of the periods mentioned, but at such time only when a Committee of Officers shall certify to their being unserviceable or irreparable.

105. Each article is to be marked with the month and year of issue.

106. The Regimental Great Coats of European Soldiers, on the occurrence of any casualties, are to be returned into Store, and kept for issue to Recruits, a special Report being made by the Officer Commanding the Regiment to the Superintendent of Clothing when the number in Store is likely to cause detriment or inconvenience to the Public Service;

107. When new Regimental Cloaks, or Great Coats are issued to Corps, an allowance at the rate of Rupees (2) two, for each hundred Coats, is to be drawn for stamping them with the Regimental marks.

108. The following are the sums to be paid by Soldiers who may lose or damage their Great Coats :—

109. Annual returns, according to Form C, are to be made to the Superintendent of Clothing on the 1st January of each year, by every Regiment, after a careful inspection of the Great Coats by the Commanding Officer and Quarter Master.

110. The Regimental Cloaks for Mounted Corps are to be made of dark blue Cloth, and the Regimental Great Coats for the Foot Artillery, Sappers and Infantry of blue grey Cloth.

111. On the arrival of a Regiment of Her Majesty's Infantry in this country, the Great Coats in use are to be forwarded to the Army Clothing Agency, in order to be replaced on the usual indents, by Regimental Great Coats of the prescribed pattern.

112. On the departure of a Regiment from India, the men will take with them the Great Coats they have in wear, all surplus Coats being forwarded to the Army Clothing Agent for re-issue.

113. Great Coats of a distinct pattern will be provided for the use of Recruits, Invalids and others, and will be supplied under the following Rules.

114. On the arrival of each Detachment of Recruits from England, the whole of the Great Coats in use with it will be sent to the Army Clothing Agent, who will cause them to be examined, and all that are serviceable and repairable are to be forthwith put into proper order.

115. All Great Coats received from Her Majesty's Regiments in India are likewise to be immediately examined and put into proper order for issue to Detachments.

116. When there may be no Army Clothing Agency at the port of landing, the duty of examining and repairing the Coats, as well as of

receiving charge of surplus Coats, will devolve on the Commissariat or other Officer at the Station, who may be named for the purpose, under the instructions of the Superintendent of Clothing.

117. Such of the Great Coats brought out by each Detachment, as are calculated, after the necessary repairs, to last during the march or progress of the party to the Head Quarters of the Regiment, will be re-issued to it in part of the Indent, which the Officer Commanding must furnish, as early as practicable, to the Clothing Agent or other local authority, and the number deficient is to be made up from the Detachment Great Coats in Store, these being issued at once without waiting for the repairs being completed to the Great Coats sent in by the Detachment.

118. The Great Coats on being issued for the first time, whether new or repaired, are to be numbered; and the number, year of issue, and the word "Detachment," are to be marked in an indelible manner on each Coat.

119. All Great Coats are to be carefully examined by the Agent or other Officer before being despatched, and the exact condition and value of each is to be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose.

120. A return of the Coats supplied, taken from the Register Book, is to be furnished to the Officer Commanding the Detachment, who is to examine them and see that they correspond with the description in the return.

121. The Officer Commanding each Detachment will be personally responsible for the Great Coats, and he will be required to account for all made over to him.

122. He is further required to see that the Coats are only worn on

receiving charge of surplus Coats, will devolve on the Commissariat or other Officer at the Station, who may be named for the purpose, under the instructions of the Superintendent of Clothing.

117. Such of the Great Coats brought out by each Detachment, as are calculated, after the necessary repairs, to last during the march or progress of the party to the Head Quarters of the Regiment, will be re-issued to it in part of the Indent, which the Officer Commanding must furnish, as early as practicable, to the Clothing Agent or other local authority, and the number deficient is to be made up from the Detachment Great Coats in Store, these being issued at once without waiting for the repairs being completed to the Great Coats sent in by the Detachment.

118. The Great Coats on being issued for the first time whether

forwarded to the Superintendent of Clothing, when instructions will be issued for making the necessary repairs, for disposing of such as may be unserviceable, and for recovering the price of any that may be damaged or missing.

125. The Recruits, on delivering over the Detachment Great Coats, will be provided with Regimental Great Coats.

126. Every Soldier finally quitting his Corps, whether as an invalid, time-expired man, or otherwise proceeding to the Presidency, or other port for embarkation when entitled to a free passage, will be supplied with a Detachment Great Coat, his Regimental Coat being delivered into Store for issue to Recruits.

127. These men will be held responsible for their Great Coats, which they will take with them for use on board-ships, and no Great Coat so issued is on any account to be replaced without payment, unless lost or destroyed by circumstances over which the man had no control.

128. Men purchasing their discharge, and those finally discharged, with the intention of remaining in India, are not to be supplied with Detachment Great Coats, but they are to deliver over to the Quarter Master the Regimental Great Coats they have in wear.

129. Men transferred from one Corps to another, including Volunteers, are to make over their Regimental Great Coats, and will be supplied with Detachment Great Coats, which they will be held responsible for, and which they must deliver over to the Quarter Master on reaching their new Corps.

130. This Rule, however, does not apply to Soldiers transferred to Native Corps, or to the Ordnance or other Departments, men serving in those branches not being provided with Great Coats.

131. Instructions will be issued by the Superintendent of Clothing regarding the disposal annually of all surplus Detachment Great Coats, and Commanding Officers of Corps will be held responsible for the due care of the Great Coats deposited in Regimental Store, and that such Coats as are to be sent to the Presidency or elsewhere are properly packed and despatched.

Section VIII.

PROVISION OF NECESSARIES.

132. EVERY Soldier shall be bound to provide, and to keep up, at his own expense, the following articles of necessaries, and such others as may from time to time be directed by the Commander-in-Chief of the Presidency to which he belongs, with the approval of Government :—

133. A Sealed pattern of each article of necessaries, approved of by the Commander-in-Chief, will be lodged in the Staff Office at the Head-Quarters of Divisions, and no deviation from such pattern is, on any account, to be permitted.

134. No Soldier shall be put under Stoppages to pay for any articles of Clothing or necessaries not ordered to be provided at his expense, except in cases where the absolute necessity of replacing articles of Clothing provided by Government shall have been occasioned by gross negligence or wilful damage on the part of the Soldier, or by the article being worn out before the period for the next delivery of Clothing.

135. A list of articles of Soldiers' necessaries, required for Artillery, Sappers and Miners, Cavalry and Infantry, European and Native, Regular and Irregular, shall be published in General Orders, with the approval of Government, at each Presidency, and none others are permitted to be charged to the men of any Corps as articles of Regimental necessaries or equipment.

116. Any necessaries which may be damaged or lost through the neglect of the men, shall be repaired or replaced by stoppages from their pay. Men losing their necessaries, or becoming prisoners of war, shall

have no claim against the State on account thereof, if they remain prisoners upwards of four months, but on rejoining their Corps, they shall, if requisite, be supplied with fresh necessaries out of their arrears of pay whilst prisoners, if any be due to them under the Regulations in force at the time, and if not by stoppages from their accruing pay.

137. The pay of the European Soldier shall be liable to a stoppage of, five (5) Rupees per mensem in the Horse Artillery or Cavalry, and three (3) Rupees in other Corps, for providing and keeping up his necessaries, which rates are not to be exceeded except by sentence of a Court Martial. But the stoppages are not to be made in advance before the necessaries are required except by desire of the Soldier, or when any expensive article is likely to be soon required, in which case the regulated stoppage may be resorted to during the month prior to the delivery of the article.

MODE OF PROVIDING NECESSARIES FOR EUROPEAN TROOPS.

138. Officers Commanding Troops or Companies, with the sanction of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, shall be at liberty to procure on the spot, whenever it can be done with advantage, any articles required by their men, provided the same be strictly conformable to the established patterns; but whenever the Soldier is likely to be benefited by obtaining his necessaries through the medium of a Regimental Committee from tradesmen established in London or elsewhere in the United Kingdom, the Rules contained in the following Articles are to be followed.

139. When a supply is required, the Officers in Command of Troops or Companies shall form a Committee for the purpose of ascertaining the wants of each Troop or Company, and of preparing, under the direction and control of the Officer Commanding the Regiment, a general requisition, carefully avoiding any unnecessary accumulation of Stores.

140. This requisition is to be transmitted by the Commanding Officer to the tradesman, who will engage to furnish the articles of the established quality and pattern, and whenever he is sending out an extensive or general supply of necessaries to a Regiment, he shall produce a pattern of each article to be sealed by any one selected by the Commanding Officer for the purpose, to accompany the supply, such pat-

tern articles to form a part of the number demanded, and after serving the purpose of comparison to be issued to the men.

141. On the arrival of a supply at Head Quarters, a Regimental Committee, formed of the Field Officers and of the Officers in Command of Troops or Companies present, shall examine and compare the supply with the sealed patterns, and shall reject any articles found not conformable to the patterns; and the tradesman is to be bound by his agreement with the Commanding Officer, either to replace the rejected articles or to make good the loss on their being disposed of at a lower price than that charged. The freight, insurance to the Head Quarters of the Corps, shipping, and other expenses, are to be charged in the tradesman's bill, and to be added to the cost prices by the Committee, together with any incidental expenses on landing. And whenever, on a change of station, the store of Regimental necessaries is conveyed by sea or river route, an insurance is to be effected thereon, if practicable, to prevent loss to the Regiment.

142. The Regimental Committee shall be also empowered to make an additional charge of three per cent. on the prices charged by the tradesman for the purpose of forming a Contingent Fund, to be applicable solely to meet the losses unavoidably arising from deterioration by detention in Store, from insects, damp, or other causes; but it is to be distinctly understood, that no part of this fund is to be applied towards defraying any other charges whatever on account of the necessaries previously to the delivery thereof to the men.

143. An Annual Statement, showing the amount of the fund thus created, the mode in which it has been applied, and the balance thereof, is to be forwarded by the Commanding Officer, on the 31st of December in each year, to the Adjutant General, and to the Deputy Pay Master of the Circle in which the corps is serving.

144. By the aggregate amount of the tradesman's prices, and of all the attendant charges before-mentioned, the price to be paid by the Soldier shall be regulated, such price shall be published by the Commanding Officer, in Orders to the Regiment, and shall be specified in the Annual Statement above described.

145. The Commanding Officer shall, at the termination of each quarter, cause inspections to be made of the necessaries in Store, for the purpose of ascertaining that they are kept in proper order.

•

146. The accounts of the necessaries are to be compared monthly with the General Store Account of the Quarter Master, by such Officers as may be named by the Commanding Officer, and at the termination of each quarter, both accounts are to be examined by the Regimental Committee, who, after ascertaining that the same are correct, will report to that effect to the Commanding Officer, who will thereupon ascertain and certify that the proper amount of stoppages for the quarter has been appropriated by the Troop and Company's Officer, as directed in this Regulation.

147. Statements of sums to be deducted from Pay Abstracts of Troops and Companies, prepared by Officers Commanding, and certified by Commanding Officers of Regiments, are to be furnished to the Deputy Pay Masters monthly, and the Commanding Officer of the Regiment will furnish Pay Masters, on the 1st of the months of April, July, October and January, with rolls, in triplicate, of the sums intended to be included in the next quarterly remittances, through the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, for payment to the tradesman. A notification of all such remittances should be regularly sent by the Commanding Officer direct to the tradesmen concerned.

148. The Quarter Master is to take care of the necessaries and to issue them when required, but he is not to give any orders for necessaries, nor to deal therein with the Soldiers, nor to have any pecuniary transactions with the tradesmen or dealers in those articles, but is simply to be the Store-keeper thereof.

149. The Quarter Master shall keep the accounts of the necessaries under the orders of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, who will be held answerable for their correctness.

150. The stoppages for articles of necessaries issued to the men out of these supplies are to be deposited in the hands of District Pay Masters, who shall carry to a separate account, to be called the Contingent Fund, the charge of 3 per cent for losses, &c. and shall proceed with the amounts to be remitted to England quarterly in the same manner as is directed for Family Remittances.

151. When it may become necessary to draw on the Contingent Fund, the Commanding Officer must certify that the sum required is for the purposes directed in Article 142.

152. When a Regiment is transferred from one Circle of Payment to another, a transfer of the Contingent Fund and accounts is also to be made by the Deputy Pay Master.

153. Whenever a supply shall be procured under these Regulations, if the Commanding Officer, under whose direction it was ordered, should leave the Regiment before the articles had been issued and paid for, his successor shall be bound to see the whole of that supply issued before the issue of any fresh supply of articles of the same description is commenced upon.

MODE OF PROVIDING NECESSARIES FOR NATIVE TROOPS.

154. Commanding Officers of Native Regiments are required to see that their men are provided with the requisite articles of Regimental necessaries, and it is a very important part of the duty of every Commanding Officer of a Regiment, and of every Captain or other Officer Commanding a Troop or Company, to take care that all articles are procured for the Soldier on the most advantageous terms and at ready money prices, and that they are delivered to the men at prime cost, with the addition only of any necessary charges for carriage, &c.

155. All articles of Regimental necessaries must be subjected to the inspection of a Committee composed of the Second in Command and the two Senior Captains or Officers Commanding Troops or Companies, previous to issue.

156. Each Recruit of Light Cavalry, of Regular, Irregular and Local Infantry, on joining from Drill, or earlier, if stoppages have been made to pay for the equipments, is to be provided with a Complete set of necessaries, the cost of which is to be deducted at the rate of Rupees (3) three per mensem, commencing with the issue of the second month's full pay after his enlistment.

157. Should a Native Soldier, after being once supplied with a set of necessaries, neglect to keep them complete, of good quality, and established pattern, he will be liable to be put under stoppages not exceeding Rupees (2) two per mensem, when stationary, or Rupee (1) one per mensem when marching, and will be provided with the requisite articles by the Quarter Master or the Officer Commanding his Troop or Company.

158. It is only in cases of negligence or disobedience in failing to provide the requisite articles, that a Native Soldier is to be put under stoppages, and all such cases are to be notified in Regimental Orders.

159. When Caps, Great Coats or Cloaks are required, application must be made to the Commander-in-Chief for authority to provide them. The cost of such articles in one year for each man is limited to Rupees (7) seven for Horse Artillery and Light Cavalry, and Rupees (5) five for all other Corps. Should the estimated expence of these articles exceed that sum, their provision must be delayed until the ensuing year.

160. The Great Coats and Cloaks of the Native Troops may be made either of Country cloth of the established pattern, or of Europe broad cloth, as may from time to time be ordered.

161. Ready-made Cloaks or Great Coats, or the cloth for their preparation, will be issued from the Clothing stores, under the following Rules.

162. Either the full price of the cloth, &c. will be charged to the Corps, or should it be preferred, no regular Clothing for the year will be issued, but the difference between the compensation rates of the year's Clothing and the cost of the cloth will be charged to the Regiment ; but under no circumstances will Cloaks or Great Coats provided under these arrangements be renewed under six years.

163. The cost of transport of the cloth or Coats from the Clothing Agency to the Head Quarters of the Corps will be also charged to the Regiment.

164. The Coats are not to be taken away by men leaving the Corps, but the heirs of deceased men, and all men discharged, transferred, or who may in any way become casualties, will be entitled to receive from the Recruits, who replace them, compensation on the principle laid down in Article 108, of these Regulations, according to the length of time the Coats may have been in wear and the original cost.

165. The Coats are the property of the Soldier and may be taken away in cases of reduction of the Army, when the places of discharged men are not filled up.

166. When the provision of extra cloth overalls is sanctioned for Mounted Corps, Indents for either the materials or for ready-made

Overalls are to be submitted to the Superintendent of Clothing. The actual cost of the articles, together with the transit charges, will, as laid down in Article 28, be charged to the Officer Commanding the Corps, who will recover the amount from the men in the usual manner.

167. The cost of each article provided for the use of the Soldier is to be notified in Regimental Orders, before it is issued.

168. Advances will be made on account of the provision of necessaries under the Rules laid down in the Pay and Audit Regulations, and all such advances are to be recovered by deductions from the pay of the men to the extent authorized in articles 157 and 159, commencing with the first issue of pay after the articles are issued.

169. A note of the sums so realized is to be made at the foot of the Pay Abstract, and deducted by the Pay Master in liquidation of the advance.

170. The Quarter Master is responsible for the due care and custody of surplus articles of Regimental necessaries remaining in Store, from the occurrence of intermediate casualties.

171. The provision of articles of necessaries being at the risk and expense of Government until served out, the arrears of men who may die, desert, or otherwise become casualties, before the amount has been realized, are to be held applicable to that purpose, and the articles are to be re-sold at a valuation to men of the same Corps, or to Recruits, in order to preserve uniformity.

172. Commanding Officers of Regiments are held responsible for the due appropriation of the advances for the provision of necessaries, and it is their duty to see that such advances are applied to the sole purpose for which they are authorized.

173. The Quarter Master of the Regiment is to keep the accounts of the necessaries, as well as of all advances for their provision, under the orders of the Commanding Officer.

174. Commanding Officers of Native Regiments are strictly prohibited making any alteration, however trivial, in the form or material of the Regimental necessaries of their men, without the previous sanction of the Commander-in-Chief, which is only to be sought in compliance with the general wish of the men. Inspecting Officers are required to report particularly on this point, and to bring to notice, without delay, any deviation from the order.
