LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE,

SIR:

I transmit herewith the annual report of the Bureau of the Census showing the financial transactions of 247 cities for the fiscal year 1925, the assessed valuation of taxable property in those cities and the taxes levied thereon during that year, and their indebtedness and specified assets at the close of that year. The financial transactions of these cities have been analyzed and are so presented as to show, both for the whole city and for its important departments, the revenue collected, the cost of conducting municipal business, and the indebtedness incurred for meeting this cost. The form of this presentation has been approved by a census advisory committee chosen from the National Association of Comptrollers and Accounting Officers.

This report was prepared under the supervision of Starke M. Grogan, chief statistician for statistics of States and cities, and Lemuel A. Carruthers, expert chief of division. The text discussion was prepared by Miss Cora Higgins.
