Scarcely less interest attaches to the careers of the clever and unscrupulous Olympe (Comtesse de Soissons), "a woman formed for great crimes, whose true place would have been in the Palace of the Cæsars or the Vatican of the Borgias"; of Marianne (Duchess de Bouillon), who, with Olympe, was implicated in the famous Poison Trials in 1680; and of the lovely Hortense (Duchesse de Mazarin), who fled from her jealous and bigoted husband to England, where she became one of the reigning beauties of Charles II.'s Court.
