The book is largely made up of Mr. Johnston's letters to his paper, and it covers the whole period of the Second Empire; interesting accounts being given of what happened, politically and socially, during this period. They are written in an intimate manner, for Mr. Johnston was mixed up, directly or indirectly, in most of the doings of the time, which, of course, included the Civil War of 1860, the Siege of Paris and the Commune. He also has a good deal to say on the Panama Canal Scheme. In order that the volumes may be easily read, Mr. Johnston's son, Mr. R. M. Johnston, has edited his father's correspondence, and added the necessary connecting links to make the narrative complete.
