That there has also been a little indecent ste in Government's anxiety to hustle this legislation ough is an impression that is difficult to avoid. Under h circumstances it is not surprising that what I regard some of the vital requirements have been sacrificed for ons of expediency. It is, however, my conviction that pes not believe us to condemn the scheme wholesale out making an effort to study and improve it.
