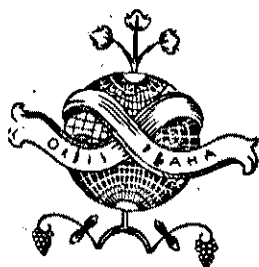

INTRODUCTORY.

This publication, which was written in view of the International Congress of Social Policy at Prague, is intended above all to provide the foreign members of the Congress with concise and general information concerning the previous course and the tendencies of Czechoslovak social policy. The booklet naturally pays attention to the programme of the Congress and concentrates its information mainly on questions which will be discussed at the meetings of the Congress. The subjects are: the eight hours' working day and its practical results for the mental and moral life of the workers, the democratisation of industry, the participation and responsibility of the workers in the administration of the works, i. e. the question of workers' councils and committees, and finally the question of unemployment and the emigration connected with it. It was found impossible to avoid mentioning, in addition to the above, other social and political questions which the legislation of the Czechoslovak Republic had to solve. In this way our small publication is a source of quite synthetic and concise information on the social policy of Czechoslovakia in general.
