SIR,

I have the honour to submit through you, for the consideration of Government, proposals for the Original Survey Settlement of the six Government villages noted in the margin, situated in the Chándor Táluka of your Collectorate.

2. The villages were conferred as Saranjám Inám on the Vinchurkars and have lapsed to Government in the circumstances explained in Government Resolution No. 2629, dated 20th April 1892. They were respectively measured and classed in the years 1892-93 and 1894-95.

3. The recorded area under every head resulting from the measuring operations is as follows:—

4. The position of these six villages will be seen on the accompanying map. They are all in the eastern portion of the Chándor Táluka.

Manmád being an important market town with a Railway Station forming the junction of the G. I. P. Bombay to Jabalpur line with the Dhond and Manmád chord line has for these considerations been given a maximum dry crop rate of Rs. 1-8-0 instead of Rs. 1-6-0, the rate current in villages adjoining it. The remaining five villages have been rated in entire conformity with the settled villages in their immediate neighbourhood.

For Patasthal garden land the rate of Rs. 8 per acre has been adopted.

5. The circumstances of the above six villages are described in the marginally noted Government Selections, and it is sufficient for the present purposes to point out that all are well situated in the most cultivated side of the Táluka and that there can be no doubt that the opening of the chord line between Manmád and Dhond has improved their trade resources so as to put beyond question the justice of rating them in agreement with the settled villages in their neighbourhood.

7. The difference between the revenue formerly collected and that now proposed will be seen on reference to Appendix Q. to be Rs. 117, equivalent to only 1.6 per cent. This is not a very material difference considering the numerous and well recognised defects of the Vinchurkar's system. The percentage differences have been calculated on the revenue actually collected. The fact that remissions have been made need not I think be taken seriously, for one of the most objectionable elements in the Kamál system is the absence of any detailed classification, an omission which experience has shown leads to a very inequitable imposition of assessment, the better soils being let off easily and the poorer over-assessed. It has already been pointed out so frequently as hardly to need reiteration, that the old Kamál revenue figures are more or less imaginary.

The revision of rates of the entire Táluka will have to be considered in 1900-01, that is in a couple of years' time, and I have no hesitation in recommending that the present proposals should be sanctioned until then.
