SIR,

I have the honour to forward herewith Colonel Ward's proposals for the Revised Settlement of 72 Government villages of the Karjat Taluka.

2. I consider that the rates proposed by Colonel Ward for each group are satisfactory. I am well acquainted with the Karjat Taluka, having had charge of it for four or five years as Assistant Collector over 20 years ago and having seen it annually on my tour during the last four seasons. The rainfall is as noted by Colonel Ward more irregular and unseasonable of late years than actually scanty in quantity, and I have been much struck with the general inferiority of the crops as compared with those in former years when the rainfall was certainly far more regular. This remark I would note refers not only to Karjat but to the whole district.

3. Notwithstanding this I consider that the increase of good communications throughout the taluka and the ready access to the line of rail are in themselves quite sufficient to justify the moderate increase in rates proposed. The rates now in force are certainly not by any means too high as is sufficiently exemplified by the ease with which the revenue was collected both last year and in the preceding year, both having been exceptionally poor seasons.

4. The grouping adopted varies somewhat from the old grouping, but the changes are the necessary consequence of the improved communications. This is specially noticeable in the case of Alsunde and other villages near it to the south of Karjat the rates in which have been raised from those for the 3rd to those of the 2nd group in consequence of their accessibility from Karjat and Rasin and from the Pomalwadi Railway Station.

5. I have a slight doubt as to whether the proposed maximum patasthal rate of Rs. 6 is not almost too low and almost think it might be raised to Rs. 7.

In forwarding herewith Colonel Ward's proposals for the revision settlement of the Karjat Taluka of the Ahmednagar Collectorate received with the

Collector's letter No. 596 of 30th ultimo, which does not seem to call for any particular remark, I have the honour to make the following observations and recommendations, regarding the revision settlement of a district which is described as the poorest in the Collectorate, for the orders of Government, to be issued as early as convenient, so as to enable us to introduce the revision rates in the taluka before the end of the current revenue year.

2. It is generally agreed by the Original Settlement Officer, Captain G. S. Anderson, and now by Colonel Ward that the district under report is one which on the whole is extremely poor and must be subjected to very low rates. Captain Anderson admits that his rates were as low as it was possible to make them and even expresses doubts as to the probability of the villagers prospering under the rates then adopted (para. 176, Original Settlement Report). Colonel Ward however points out (para. 29) that remissions which used to be allowed were almost entirely done away with since the introduction of the original survey settlement until the disastrous famine year of 1876-77, and that since then no remissions have been given and the full amount of revenue due to Government has been realized each year with great facility (para. 31). It may therefore be assumed that the rates of assessment introduced by Captain G. S. Anderson were extremely moderate and in no case pressed heavily on the cultivators said, at the time of the introduction of those rates, to be in an impoverished and demoralized condition (para. 163, Original Settlement Report).

3. With regard to the proposals now made by Colonel Ward respecting the new grouping and the revision settlement rates I cannot quite agree with the Superintendent of the Survey for the following reasons:—

1st.—Because the enhancements of the rates proposed by Colonel Ward are unequal and not in proportion to the general estimation of advantages acquired by the respective villages since the original survey settlement.

2nd.—That the advantages stated to have been gained by the respective parts of the district in the matter of roads and communications is faulty.

3rd.—That Colonel Ward has shown no good reason for altering the original grouping made by Captain Anderson on a consideration of climate, rainfall and markets.

4. To begin with the first of these objections to my recommending the adoption of the groups and rates of assessment fixed by Colonel Ward I must point out that by Colonel Ward's proposals the rates of assessment are unequally increased as exhibited in the following table which shows increases of rates proposed for the various original groups of villages:—

From the above it will be seen that the villages considered originally, and even now by Colonel Ward, the best in the taluka have their maximum rates increased only 6.25 per cent; that, of the second class villages, some have their rating increased 21.43 per cent., while others are increased only 7.14 per cent., and finally that the same anomaly occurs in the villages considered the poorest in the district, which culminates in some villages having their rates increased as much as 25 per cent.

5. With regard to roads and communications dealt with in para. 15 of Colonel Ward's report I beg to state that from personal enquiries, I

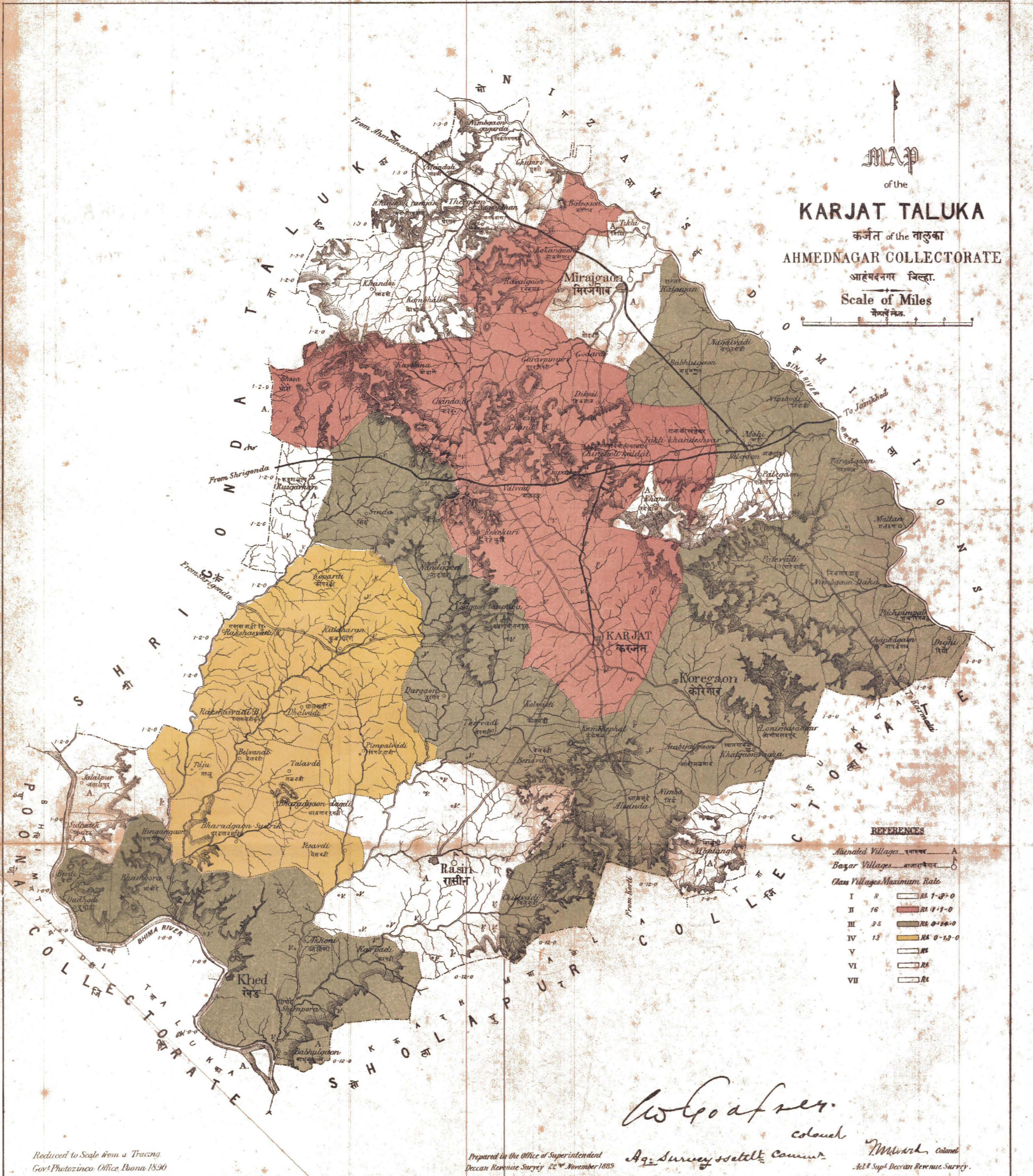
have made on a visit to the district reported on, it appears that the only made roads deserving such a name, are those marked by a thick black line by me on the accompanying map marked 1 and countersigned by me. The road from Shrigonda to Jankhed is good, as far as the river Sina bounding the Karjat district; the road branching off from the main road at Mahi and Jalgaon northwards through Mirajgaon to Ahmednagar is said to be good, as well as that branching off south from the main road, in the lands of village Chincholi Kaldat and going to Karjat; the road branching off south from the main road at Mahi, towards Karimāla, is said to be indifferent; and as for the other roads in the district, shown on the accompanying map with a double line, all that can be said is that those roads were lined out and had earth thrown on them and ditches made as famine work, but they have never been attended to since and are therefore no better than common cart tracks, which in an open undulating district like Karjat exist almost everywhere. The road from Karjat to Korti and Pomalvādi Station *viā* Alsunda is so bad that my kit and tent carts had difficulty in reaching Karjat; and the road shown on the map by a double line from Valvad to Karjat was so bad that I had to get out of a hired tonga and walk some distance for fear of the springs breaking. All these roads, with the exception of the one main road mentioned above and the branches therefrom which are said to be good, should not now be taken into consideration as communications which can justify an increase of assessment.

6. The reasons, if any, for upsetting and modifying the original settlement groups do not appear in Colonel Ward's report, and I think that unless there is some good reason for doing so, the original grouping of the villages should not be put aside. It is shown by paragraphs 162 to 164, and also more particularly by paragraph 179 of Captain Anderson's report, that the original grouping was done with great care in consideration of climate, rainfall and markets; the only factor, which we must consider now, and which could not be taken into consideration then, is the matter of roads and communications and proximity to railways, for there were then "no made roads in the taluka." Colonel Ward states in his paragraph 33 that "in the first settlement the grouping was carried out mainly with reference to climate and proximity to the Nagar market" and further that now "in the matter of communications there is not much difference in the way of advantage and disadvantage," and still without any strong grounds for doing so, as far as I can see, he has altered the old grouping which I can see no reason for and cannot therefore recommend.

7. I am of opinion that, as far as climate and rainfall is concerned, the old grouping was good. As regards markets, Colonel Ward admits in his paragraph 28 that "Karjat has no very large market within its limits," and I entirely concur from what I have seen myself of the "market day" in Karjat itself, therefore the original grouping was undoubtedly correctly made in consideration of the good and superior markets of Ahmednagar and Shrigonda. As regards roads and communications, I think I have shown that the only roads which ought to be taken into consideration as affecting the revision rates are those situated north and on the east, and therefore the villages mainly benefited by the new made roads are those originally placed in the 1st and 2nd groups.

8. The result of my very careful consideration of the proposals made by Colonel Ward is that, as far as possible, the original groups of villages should be maintained. Both Captain Anderson and Colonel Ward are agreed that the taluka is naturally well divided into two portions by a ridge of hills, which is plainly seen on the map, showing the division of drainage to the Bhima on the south and to the Sina on the east. They appear also to be agreed that, in the words of Captain Anderson "the climate towards the north and in the valley of the Sina is not quite so bad," and in the words of Colonel Ward that "on the whole the northern triangle seems to be a little better off in respect of climate than the other parts of the taluka," and similarly they seem to agree that "towards the Bhima the fall of rain is most uncertain." Therefore taking these different parts of the district as the best and worst and maintaining the old grouping I recommend the following rates for final adoption:—

1st.—The original group of first class villages, assessed formerly at a maximum of Re. 1, to remain as it was, with a maximum of Rs. 1-3-0 instead of Rs. 1-1-0 proposed by Colonel Ward.

2nd.—That the original group of 2nd class villages, assessed formerly at a maximum of Re. 0-14-0, should be confirmed in that group with a maximum of Rs. 1-1-0 instead of Rs. 1-1-0 for some villages and Re. 0-15-0 for some others as proposed by Colonel Ward.

3rd.—That the original 3rd group, consisting of villages having a maximum rate of Re. 0-12-0, should be sub-divided into two parts, those having exceptional advantages with a maximum of Re. 0-14-0 and the others a maximum rate of Re. 0-13-0 only.

9. It will be seen that the rates I propose for the better situated villages are somewhat higher than those proposed by Colonel Ward the explanation is as follows :—

1st.—The rainfall, which is said to be uncertain and precarious, averages 25·64 for the last 10 years and seems, from a statement obtained from the Agricultural Department, of which an extract for the same period is attached marked 2, to have generally been very fairly distributed, the averages for each month during which rainfall is required being :—

June.	July.	August.	September.	October.	November.

and therefore the district cannot be said to have much to complain of in that respect except in what occurs everywhere exceptional bad seasons.

2nd.—The first group villages all adjoin and are of the same kind as those of the Shrigonda Taluka which were assessed at revision at a maximum rate of Rs. 1-3-0, and had it not been for the mere accident that these 8 villages have been included in the Karjat Taluka instead of in the Shrigonda Taluka, they would undoubtedly have been assessed at the same rates.

3rd.—The second group villages lie between those of Shrigonda Taluka on the north-west boundary assessed on revision at a maximum of Rs. 1-2-0 and those of the Karmala Taluka on the south-east boundary assessed at a maximum of Re. 1, and therefore if the rating of those talukas is just and correct, these villages should bear the average rate between the two, which is Rs. 1-1-0.

4th.—As for the poorer villages, less well situated with fewer advantages, the justification of rates showing a smaller increase on the old rates will be found further on in paragraph 12.

10. The result of the rates I beg to recommend is shown in the following table :—

Although the above figures show results which are not quite as satisfactory as I should wish, still the increase is more in proportion to the advantages enjoyed by each group being low for the worst group and higher in proportion for the best. On a reference to appendix marked 3 it will be seen that by the rates proposed by me for the first three groups the percentage of increase in the respective villages varies :—

For 1st group from 29 to 44,
Do. 2nd " 22 to 57,
Do. 3rd " 22 to 49,

and that there is no case of individual villages in which the increase is excessive. The one village (Ravalgaon) having an increase of 57 per cent is exceptionally well situated between the 1st class villages and the large market of Mirajgaon and close to the good made road to Ahmednagar. The total revenue produced by my proposals is Rs. 72,412 as compared with Rs. 69,480 obtained by Colonel Ward, and the percentage of increase for the whole taluka comes to 34.2 per cent. I must here point out that in the revision settlement of this taluka we are not bound down by any prescribed limits of enhancement, the taluka being in a district to which the orders of Government Resolution No. 5739, dated 29th October 1874, do not apply and to which, as the original settlement fell in 1881-82, the orders of March 1884 are equally inapplicable.

11. The increases of assessment shown by the above table which might perhaps be considered a little high for a poor district are, I think, justifiable in consideration of—

1st.—The original settlement rates being admittedly very low—made so purposely for specific reasons.

2nd.—The large increases since then in the value of agricultural produce reported on in paragraph 28 of Colonel Ward's report.

3rd.—The general increase in prosperity and the extraordinary recuperative power of the district so clearly demonstrated in Colonel Ward's paragraphs 18 to 21.

The district has recovered from its former state of poverty and depression, it has also overcome the evil effects of the famine years, and the time has, therefore, most decidedly come to raise it to its proper level and assess it in proportion to the surrounding districts.

12. It remains for me to explain why I have sub-divided the original 3rd group into two portions with different rates. There are some villages of this group which are decidedly better off in various ways than a small minority of them; for instance, the villages in the valley of the Sina have, as already stated, a somewhat better climate, those to the north near Mirajgaon have there a market described by Colonel Ward as "of the markets the most important," those to the south are not far from Karmála which outside the district is also a good market and the whole of them have a fair road, portion of which, viewed in the light of a made road, has been described above as indifferent. Then the villages near Alsunda have an advantage described by Captain Anderson as follows: "in some favoured localities (Alsoondeh for instance) water is found very near the surface" (paragraph 162) and besides they are all within easy reach of the two markets of Karjat and Rasin. Those villages of the 3rd group, which I have rated at a maximum of Re. 0-14-0 on the banks of the Bhima besides being near the market of Rasin are the nearest to the Railway Station of Diksal which is only five miles from the village Khed with a good road and with another market at Bhigwan, a mile beyond Diksal, and during the fair season the river is always fordable. For the above reasons I consider all those villages are better off and should be assessed somewhat higher than the out of the way small group of 13 villages due west of Karjat and Rasin which are far from everything, have no roads, only country cart tracks and a bad climate. I consider that justice demands that these should be assessed a little lower than the other 3rd class villages, and therefore I have confirmed for them a maximum rate of 13 annas only proposed by Colonel Ward.

13. The maximum rate of Rs. 6 per acre for the pátasthal garden lands, of which there are only 284 acres, proposed by Colonel Ward in his 35th paragraph, I consider sufficient and proper. I see no reason for raising it to Rs. 7 as suggested by the Collector. The rates for pátasthal garden lands in more favoured districts is Rs. 8 only.

14. I beg to recommend that the concessions relating to gradual levy of the assessments on khátas which have been largely increased which have been granted in recent Deccan Revision Settlements should be extended to this taluka also.

15. If sanction is received to these proposals at an early date, ákárbands will be prepared and the rates announced as soon as possible. As a special case the date for receiving resignations under Section 74 of the Land Revenue Code may be postponed for this year until the 5th June.

16. A fresh map showing the alterations recommended by me in the grouping proposed by the Superintendent, is appended to this report. I also annex a statement showing the result of my alterations in the case of each village.

17. In conclusion I beg to state that up to this date no petitions against the proposed revised rates have been received. The period for presenting such petitions extends to the 17th proximo and if any are received in the meanwhile they will be forwarded to Government in due course.

2. The tract of country, for which revised rates are proposed, is one of the poorest in the Dekkan: the soil is not rich, the rainfall is light and uncertain, in its physical aspect it is dry and barren, and there are few signs of any commercial or industrial activity. The assessments, imposed at the original survey settlement, are not, therefore, capable of any substantial enhancement, such increase as is proposed being solely based on the general prosperity of the country in which the táluka, in question, must necessarily have participated.

3. This participation is clearly proved by the statistics furnished by Colonel Ward. The number of houses has increased 23 per cent. and the number of carts has more than doubled. The population shows only a slight increase, while agricultural cattle have decreased by 84. These adverse results are, however, to be accounted for by the great famine of 1877 which devastated the country for miles and miles, but from which the people have recovered with wonderful facility. The tables, embodied in paragraph 19 of Colonel Ward's report, show how the famine has retarded the development of the agricultural resources and with what ease the people have regained their lost ground.

4. Prices have nearly doubled since the time of the original settlement; and, although, there have been fluctuations, due to extraordinary causes, such as the American War, and the famine, a steady and normal tendency to rise is noticeable.

5. In the matter of communications, there has, doubtless, been some improvement, as the táluka is traversed, from east to west and from north to south, by fairly good roads. But the somewhat rosy view taken by Colonel Ward is not concurred in by Colonel Godfrey; and the undersigned, having very recently visited the táluka, is in a position, from his personal experience, to agree with the latter officer.

6. The groups, into which the táluka was divided, at the time of the original survey settlement, have been rearranged by Colonel Ward with considerable modifications. But he has not assigned clear reasons for such a material deviation from the original grouping, as he has proposed. Colonel Godfrey does not approve of the rearrangement and, with one exception, adheres to the groups, as originally constituted. The Commissioner agrees with Colonel Godfrey and considers that the arrangement, proposed by him, is reasonable and proper.

7. The rates, proposed by the Acting Survey and Settlement Commissioner, for the 4 groups into which he has divided the táluka, are fair, and the undersigned recommends them for the approval and sanction of Government. The net result of the proposals made by the Survey and Settlement Commissioner, is an increase of Rs. 2,932 over those made by the Superintendent, which is very slight.

8. As regards the rate for "pátasthal lands," the Commissioner agrees with Colonel Godfrey that Rs. 6 per acre is a sufficiently high rate for Karjat, and there is no reason to raise it to Rs. 7 per acre as proposed by Mr. Waddington.

9. Sanction is also solicited to the proposals made in paragraphs 14 and 15 of Colonel Godfrey's letter.

RESOLUTION.—The revision settlement of 72 villages of the Karjat Táluka has been postponed for nine years in order to enable them to recover from the effects of the famine. The reports now before Government show that the recovery has been complete, that the táluka, though undoubtedly a very poor one, has shared in the general improvement of the district, and that prices have for many years past been nearly double those which prevailed before the original settlement, which is shown to have been very favourable to cultivators. In these circumstances the Governor in Council considers that the enhancement of assessment proposed by the Survey and Settlement Commissioner is justified. That officer is unable to accept in their entirety the proposals, as regards either groups or dry-crop rates, made by the Survey Superintendent and approved by the Collector; but, as remarked by the Commissioner, C. D., Colonel Ward has not assigned any clear reasons for altering the groups formed at the original settlement, and Government observe, moreover, that the modifications of the Survey Superintendent's proposed rates recommended by the Survey and Settlement Commissioner are only of material importance in the case of eighteen well situated villages, of which eight, forming the first group (with a maximum rate of Re. 1-3-0) adjoin villages to which the same rate has already been applied in the Shrigonda Táluka, and the remainder adjoin the first group and include the market town of Karjat.

2. In fixing rates the poverty of the táluka has been taken into account by both the Survey Superintendent and the Survey and Settlement Commissioner, and consequently the rates proposed by both are, with a few exceptions, materially lower than those which prevail in adjoining tálukas. The dry-crop rates proposed by Colonel Godfrey for each of the four groups into which he divides the táluka are compared with the existing rates in the marginal table. The maximum rate proposed for pátasthal garden land is only Rs. 6 as compared with Rs. 8 in the adjoining Shrigonda Táluka. The net result of the Survey and Settlement Commissioner's proposals is an increase from Rs. 53,952 to Rs. 72,412 or by 34.2 per cent. in the assessment of the táluka. This is slightly in excess of the limit of 33 per cent. prescribed for ordinary revision settlements, but it is explained that Government Resolution No. 2619, Revenue Department, dated 26th March 1884, does not apply to the Karjat Táluka.

3. The rates proposed by the Survey and Settlement Commissioner are sanctioned as are also the proposals made in paragraphs 14 and 15 of his

report and that in paragraph 43 of the report of the Survey Superintendent. This sanction, however, is subject to reconsideration on receipt of petitions of objections, if any are received, to the rates proposed by either Colonel Ward or the Survey and Settlement Commissioner. A notification embodying the latter rates should be published in the manner directed in Government Resolution No. 7447, dated 21st October 1886, in all villages for which the rates proposed by Colonel Godfrey are in excess of those proposed by Colonel Ward and embodied in the notification already published.
