SIR,

I have the honour to forward, for submission to Government through the usual channels, with any remarks you may wish to offer, proposals for the Revision Settlement of 19 Government villages belonging to the Kopargaon and Sangamner Talukas of your Collectorate, in which the existing settlements were introduced in the years shown below. No separate sanction appears to have been considered necessary for these isolated settlements at the time, but the rates already sanctioned for surrounding villages seem to have been made applicable :—

It will be unnecessary therefore now in the case of these few villages not then dealt with to do more than give the usual

3. For reasons fully considered and approved at the time, entire re- measurement and reclassification was ordered to be carried out as a preliminary to the revised settlements

of the talukas of Sangamner and Kopargaon, and the same method has there- fore been followed in dealing with these few remaining villages. In the course of these operations in the 19 villages under report 2,964 old survey numbers and 64,632 acres have become 3,545 new survey numbers and pôt numbers and 63,166 acres.

4. The differences found in area in individual fields are tabulated below:—

It appears therefore that differences exceeding 5 per cent. were found in upwards of 10 per cent. of the old numbers thus remeasured.

6. The area recorded by the revision survey is contrasted below under all Area. heads with that of the existing settlement :—

The total difference therefore amounts to somewhat more than 2 per cent., and there is seen to have been the same absorption going on of unassessed into the assessed head which has been a feature of revision surveys in general.

7. The 19 villages under reference are scattered at considerable intervals over the two talukas to which they belong, and their position will be readily understood by a reference to the maps which accompany this report. In climate and physical features they are in no way peculiar but resemble the villages which adjoin them and which have already been brought under revision settlement.

8. The usual information regarding the relative proportions of the crops regularly grown will be found in Appendices A<sup>1</sup> and A<sup>2</sup>, and it will be seen that while in the six Kopergaon villages the early and late harvests cover about equal areas, in the Sangamner villages the kharif greatly predominates. In Kopergaon, wheat, gram and linseed together embrace nearly a third of the cultivable area, while in Sangamner bajri is the chief crop, 9 covering more than 70 per cent., and late jawari or shalu is the main staple of the late harvest.

9. The following précis of the appendices marginally noted shows the condition of the 19 villages under report at the time of original settlement contrasted with their condition as now ascertained by a special census taken by the Revenue Department :—

The great advance made in prosperity by these villages since the settlement is made very plain by these figures. The only item which invites comment is

the fact that working cattle show on the whole a small decrease, which a reference to the detailed appendix shows to have taken place entirely in the 13 Sangamner villages, while in the 6 Kopergaon there is an increase shown amounting to 34 per cent. In dealing with a few scattered and isolated villages it is not always possible to explain in detail differences of this kind which may often be due to the actual cultivators of the soil living with their cattle in adjoining villages: in the present case, however, it is sufficient to point out that

in the 13 villages where working cattle are shown to have decreased they are nevertheless now in the proportion of 1 pair of oxen to 20 acres of occupied land, which is amply sufficient for the circumstances of the country in question. In the 6 villages of Kopergaon, where the soil is richer and rabi crops prevail, the proportion is 1 pair to 15 acres, which is abnormally high.

10. Information in the usual form giving details of all sales, leases and mortgages registered in the last five years, in which land alone was concerned, will be found in the appendices marginally noted. The cases are too few in number to afford ground for useful inference.

11. Passing over without detailed comment the intermediate Appendices E<sup>1</sup>, E<sup>2</sup>, F<sup>1</sup>, F<sup>2</sup>, and G<sup>1</sup>, G<sup>2</sup> which give for these 19 villages the information usually furnished at revision settlement and indicate generally a prosperous condition, it may be observed that the figures contained in the Revenue History appendices marginally noted, confirm that indication in an important manner.

These appendices are made out as usual separately for each batch of villages settled in one year; but they all show a more or less rapid progress from the introduction of the settlement, continuing with slight fluctuations until the famine caused a check, which is followed by a reaction during the last five or six years. Remissions and outstandings may be said to have been unknown with the exception of a few sums written off in consequence of the famine, while the Mám-latdár reports that there has been but one case of resort to distraint during the last three years in order to realise the Government revenue.

12. The information given above in this report will, it is believed, serve to show that there can be no objection now to apply to the 19 villages under report the same rates of assessment as have been in force for eight and eleven years in the villages which adjoin them. A reference to the map will show what those rates are, and the following table gives the approximate result of the application of those rates in the villages coming under each maximum rate:—

13. The total increase, it will be seen, resulting from the rates shown is Rs. 6,668, which is equivalent to 43.8 per cent.; but as under the orders of Government quoted in the margin a remission\* has been granted during the cur-

rency of the revised lease in Sangamner and Kopargaon, it is possible that the villages now in question will be admitted to the same concession; in that case the actual increase in revenue realised will approximately amount to Rs. 5,060 or 33·2 per cent.

14. Of bágáit land there were recorded in all by the original survey 586 acres, of which 555 acres were Government land assessed at Rs. 1,462. By revision settlement there are in all 1,006 acres, of which the Government portion is 957 acres assessed at Rs. 1,698. The detail of this area is given below :—

15. The orders of Government have been duly followed in assessing the well gardens and no additional assessment whatever on account of irrigation has been placed on lands watered by wells sunk during the lease, while lands watered from wells originally assessed are now charged a rate not exceeding that on most favourably situated dry-crop soil. The pátasthal lands have been assessed on the Rs. 8 maximum which has been usual in most Deccan revisions.

16. In the three villages named in the margin the rates now proposed give an increase exceeding the limit of 66 per cent. which has been prescribed by Government orders; but this is due to the large increase in the area now included under the cultivated head, as will be seen by a comparison of the figures in columns 3 and 15 of Appendix Q. The limit of 33 per cent. increase prescribed for groups of villages is not applicable to the case of the villages dealt with in this report, for they do not form whole groups but, as has been explained above, merely fall into their places in the groups which have already been sanctioned for the two tálukas to which they belong.

17. The results of the original and revision surveys in the 19 villages under report are contrasted below under every head :—

18. The average rate of assessment on Government occupied land of all descriptions was by the original settlement Re. 0-7-9; by the proposed rates it will be Re. 0-10-3 per acre.

19. In conclusion I have the honour to recommend that in the event of the rates above proposed meeting with the approval of Government, they may be guaranteed for a period to expire simultaneously with the rest of the tálukas to which the villages respectively belong. I have also to solicit orders as to whether the remissions already sanctioned and now in force in those tálukas are to be made applicable to these villages.

2. This correspondence has reference to 13 villages now included in the Sangamner Taluka of the Ahmednagar District and 6 villages belonging to the Kopargaon Taluka of the same district. These villages were originally settled between the years 1851-52 and 1856-57 on rates corresponding with those which had been shortly before applied to the surrounding villages. When the bulk of the villages of these talukas were resettled under the Government Resolutions

fusion the proposed rates of these villages if sanctioned will be guaranteed up to such date as will cause them to expire simultaneously with the rates for the rest of the villages of the taluka to which they belong. Thus the year of the expiry of the rates for all the Sangamner and Kopargaon villages will be 1904-5.

3. Mr. Fletcher has collected and commented upon the statistics usually quoted in a revision settlement report to illustrate the progress of the villages in wealth and resources during the expired settlement. Of course in the case of villages scattered over the face of two talukas, as these are, the degree of prosperity evidenced by the figures varies to some extent, but the results in general are satisfactory. Mr. Fletcher has remarked on the trivial falling off in the number of working cattle as the most unsatisfactory feature of the returns; but when we look at column 8 of Appendices K to O, and observe the rapid rate at which the means of providing grazing for cattle in arable assessed waste has decreased, we can scarcely wonder that the tendency has been to retain only those cattle which are necessary for tillage and to part with those which are superfluous. The loss of cattle in the famine of 1876-77 must have gone far to confirm this tendency. It is satisfactory, however, to know that notwithstanding the decrease the number of oxen now available in these villages is quite sufficient for the ordinary purposes of tillage.

4. The application of the maximum rates proposed by Mr. Fletcher in his paragraph 12 will place these villages on the same level as they would have occupied if they had been revised with the villages adjoining in the years 1875 to 1881. Although for seven or eight years subsequent to the famine the condition of the Kopargaon and Sangamner Talukas gave cause for grave anxiety, and special measures of relief had to be adopted, recent circumstances enable us

to apply to these isolated villages the same standard of rating as was applied to the taluka generally with considerably greater confidence.

5. It will be remembered that in 1880, in consideration of the distress which followed in the wake of the famine, a remission of part of the enhanced assessment in all revision settlements was ordered by the Secretary of State in his despatch No. 45, Revenue, of 11th November 1880. This remission was to last three years from 1880-81, and was arranged so as to bring down the enhancement caused by revision to about 20 per cent. advance on the old assessment. In pursuance of these orders the revised rates in these talukas were reduced, each holding in Kopargaon having a reduction of 1 anna 6 pies per rupee of assessment and in Sangamner 1 anna. At the expiration of three years a report was called for as to whether the revised rates should be reverted to in full or not; but in consideration of the extraordinary run of unfavourable seasons to which these tracts had been exposed, it was finally determined after a lengthy correspondence (*vide* Government Resolution No. 7603 of 19th September 1885) that the reduction which had been originally made in accordance with the Secretary of State's wishes should be continued until the expiration of the period for which the revised rates had been guaranteed. Thus the remissions originally intended to be temporary became a regular part of the revised settlement.

6. The question now arises whether the 19 villages to be brought under settlement which did not come under the Secretary of State's remission scheme at all owing to their having not been revised in 1880, should have the remissions applied to them for the sake of uniformity when they are brought under revision. Mr. Fletcher and Mr. Waddington are in favour of extending the remissions to them also; and although, as they have had the benefit of the lighter original rates during a period when the country suffered much from failure of crops, they cannot claim the concession as of right, I am of opinion that it will be well to equalize the rates for the term of the guarantee over the whole talukas. In view of the next revision of rates it is important that there should be as little divergence as possible in the standards of rating existing in the villages of these talukas, while to have a few scattered villages under different terms of settlement would only prove embarrassing when we come to re-arrange the assessments at the expiration of the lease. I would not consider this of itself as a sufficient reason for extending the remissions; but the whole country comprised in these talukas has been unusually unfortunate in its experiences subsequent to the famine, and cultivation in the villages which are now proposed for revision has been attended with the same struggles and difficulties which have been common to those which have been revised from the outset.

7. The increase of revenue which will be realized by the application of these rates is Rs. 6,668, of which Rs. 1,939 will be added to the revenue demand of Kopargaon and Rs. 4,729 to that of Sangamner. With the remissions, however, forming part of the revision scheme the enhancement on these villages will be reduced to about Rs. 5,060 which would be a reasonable rate of enhancement even if the villages we are settling were comprised in a whole taluka. But we cannot treat this settlement as one of a taluka or group of villages even as, with the exception of 4, which happen to lie together, the villages are isolated and each has had its maximum rate already sanctioned for the villages adjoining. We must be content, I think, with the assurance that with the exception of 3 villages, the rates for which are owing to increased dry-crop cultivation unavoidably raised beyond the limit prescribed for single villages, the enhancements of assessment are fair and reasonable and will be still more reasonable when the prevailing scheme of remissions is applied to the assessments of holdings.

8. If these proposals meet with the approval of Government, the revised rates will be announced to the villagers during the current revenue year with guarantee up to 1904-5 in both talukas. The period for receiving resignations under Section 74 of the Land Revenue Code should be extended for this year as a special case until 15th July.

As these 19 villages, belonging to the Kopargaon and Sangamner Tálukas, resemble in climate and physical features the villages which adjoin them, and which have already been brought under the Revision Settlement, it seems only just and fair to apply to them now the rates which have been in force in the neighbouring villages for 8 and 11 years, and to give them the concession of a remission of part of the enhanced settlement which the other villages, already revised, in the above-mentioned tálukas are enjoying, and to guarantee the rates up to 1904-5, when the rates in all the villages of the Kopargaon and Sangamner Tálukas will expire simultaneously.

mitting the papers noted in the margin containing proposals for the revision settlement of 13 villages of the Sangamner Táluka and 6 of the Kopargaon Táluka of the Ahmednagar District.

RESOLUTION.—Proposals are submitted for the revision survey settlement of 19 scattered villages, of which 13 are situated in the Sangamner and 6 in the Kopargaon Táluka of the Ahmednagar District. In all cases the term of the original settlement has expired.

2. The circumstances of these tálukas were fully considered when revised settlements for the bulk of their villages were sanctioned in the Resolutions mentioned in the margin: and the arguments for increase of assessment apply equally to the villages now under consideration which, when those Resolutions were passed, were not ripe for revision. Statistics illustrating their progress under the expired settlement are furnished and there is no apparent reason why the same rates should not be applied to them as have already been introduced in the adjoining villages of their respective tálukas.

3. The 19 villages have been divided into 7 classes, for which maximum dry-crop rates varying from Re. 1-2 to Rs. 2 per acre are proposed. The orders of Government regarding the assessment of *Motasthal* garden land have been followed. *Pátasthal* land has been assessed on the usual Rs. 8 maximum rate.

4. The table appended to paragraph 12 of Mr. Fletcher's report shows that the result of these proposals will be an increase of Rs. 6,668 (from Rs. 15,241 to Rs. 21,909), or 43·8 per cent. in the assessment on Government occupied land. It is proposed, however, by the Honourable Mr. Stewart, who

has fully explained his reasons in paragraph 6 of his Memorandum No. 824 of 23rd April 1889, to reduce this enhancement to about Rs. 5,060 by the grant of remissions of the same nature as have been sanctioned for the other villages in these talukás. The proposal is sanctioned, and the rates may, subject to this condition, be introduced in the current year with a guarantee up to the year 1904-5 in both talukás. The period for receiving resignations under Section 74 of the Land Revenue Code may be extended for this year as a special case up to 15th July.

5. Only one petition of objection to the revised rates has been received and it discloses no cause for withholding sanction thereto.
