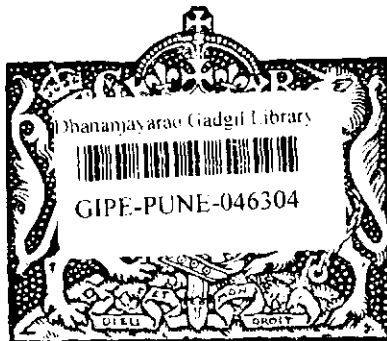

STATISTICAL ABSTRACT FOR BRITISH INDIA

FOREWORD

In this publication, the Statistics relating to Agricultural and Co-operative Societies generally relate to the year running from July to June. All the other tables relate either to the fiscal year ending 31st March or to the calendar year, and where the latter is the case the fact is clearly indicated in the tables. The alterations and additions made in the present issue of the Abstract are noticed below :—

(1) The following new tables have been introduced :—

No. 19.—Number of workers (in thousands) in British Provinces classified according to occupation (Census of 1931).

No. 101-A.—Statement showing the Capital and other Expenditure (outside the Revenue Account) in India and England, and the Principal Sources from which Funds were provided for that Expenditure.

No. 120.—T. T. Selling Rate of Exchange, Calcutta on Japan—Rupees per 100 yen, for each month.

(2) Certain additions and alterations have been made, the more important of which are stated below :—

Table No. 9.—This table now shows the territorial distribution of Christians by sect instead of according to race as formerly (Table No. 10 of the tenth issue).

Table No. 11.—Distribution of population according to religion, sex and civil condition.

Table No. 14.—Distribution of population according to religion and education.
