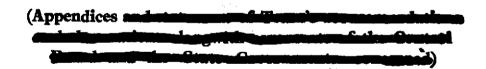

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CHAMBAL VALLEY DEVELOPMENT SALIENT FEATURES

APPENDIX - 2 A

Decision regarding site for Gandhi Sagar Dam

1. Old site and its subsequent abandeament after exervation for foundations had proceeded to some extent.

The papers that more mode available in this regard are:

In their Report (i) The Technical Committee recommended regional development to obtain the maximum benefit out of the Chambal Maturs.

Mr. A uden's inspection was to the particular reference to the construction of dam near Kotah across the river.

Dr.Baxter (iv) was engaged on the study from 26-1-47 till the end of August, 1947. Hr. Balu inspected the site in April, 1947 and made his Report. It is not clear from the Reports whether Dr.Baxter and Mr.Balu had met.

Dr. Baxter in his Report recommended a particular site, at could be inferred from his note "At site No.5

the length of the dan is to little that the disposal of the flash floods is made difficult. The depth of river for flow at such times is about 50 feet above shear surface level. This makes the position of the Power plant difficult. Because of those two difficulties it is recommended that a site upstream for the contemplated site No.5 be used for about one mile downstrand from Chaurasigarh Fort where the length of the dan will be 1200 ft. This site was visited with Nr.Roy and Mr. Joglekar and the advantage of the change of site discussed with them.

Mr. Balu's report (ii) was distinctively clear about the unsatisfactory geological features and he recommended the shifting of the site 12 miles lower down. He said "location at the present site would mean that the structure would stand on strata composed of glauconitic quartizites and flag stone whose principal strength and other load withstanding properties must be thoroughly investigated and said "One should not forget that there is no hard foundation below the flagstone zone except Suket shales and the shales however compact they may be have yet the property of being fissile". "Chances of siting the dam actually on the middle quartizites would mean the shifting of the site downstream about a mile and a half or more".

This expression of a definite opinion does not appear to have been taken note of.

On the proliminary Report of the Consultant Engineer in July 1948, the Holkar Government seems to have sanctioned the project. The work was actually started, colony built and excavation of foundations proceeded with.

At this stage the details of the dam were not evidently finalised as they were to be based upon the

results of investigations that were to be continued.

At the request of the authorities corrying out the work who were probably not quite satisfied with the nature of rock, Mr.Sahni inspected in December, 1950.

(vi) He said, "it is obvious that in the case of the present site not only will the dan have to be founded upon Suk. 6 shales but that about a 100 of abutment will have to be keyed with them". "From discussions with Shri Joglokar I understood that the dam is being designed after taking into consideration all the above factors".

Shri L.N.Khosla inspected the whole area including the site on which the Gandhisagar dam is now being built, on 8th, 9th and 10th May, 1951. After a study of all the relevant data available he said"Investigations on the whole are inadequate - No systematic geological investigations have been carried out. No alternative economic studies made. Investigations for the Canal system are in a preliminary stage." He recommended further work to be stopped pending further investigations.

Shri P.C. Hazra inspected the area and examined the site on which work had been started and the present site and recommended that the former work should be abandoned.

In January, 1952 the present site was decided on:

It is clear that the Holker State Government was
too anxious to make a start of having a Reservoir in
their own territory, the other two States Rotah and
Udaipur also having been in the field. This evidently
overlooked all considerations of technical correctness
economy, optimum benefits etc.

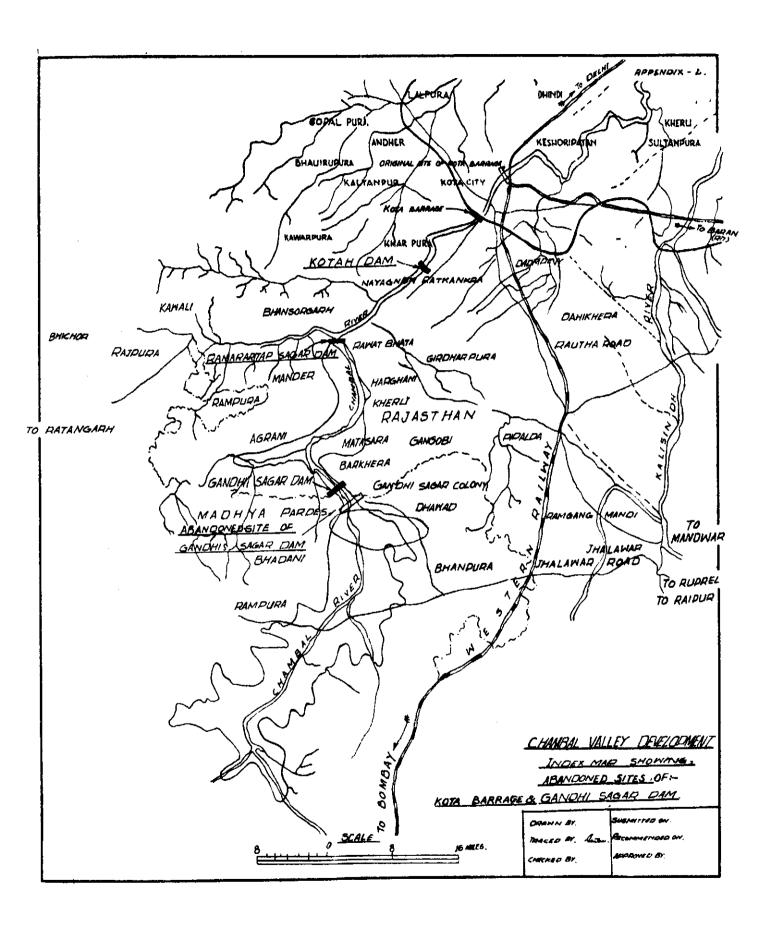
I am directed to refer to your letter No.PC(P)9/53 dated the 31st March, 1953, and to state that the following action has been taken by this government in regard to the points discussed in the Planning Commission on 2nd March 1953.

Selection of Site for Kotah Barrage.

- The original site for the barrage to divert for irrigation the waters of the Chambal stored at the proposed Gandhi Sagar and Rawathhatta dams was selected by Shri Y.A. Aiyer, Chief Development Engineer, Kotah, at a place about was 6 miles below Kotah town. The height of the barrage was to be about 65ft. and the full supply level of the pond above was kept at R.L.850. A higher level at this site was not possible as it would have involved raising of the railway bridge on the main Bombay Delhi line and would also have resulted in damage to Kotah city. Even with this level the Causeway of the Jaipur Kotah national highway would have been submerged and a high level rainforced concrete bridge would have been necessary. Most of the ghats of Kotah town would have been drowned and made unusable and some low lying houses would also have been affected. It would have also led to the permanent raising of water level in the vicinity of the city by about 60 feet or more, resulting in making the buildings and houses in the neighbourhood very damp. The general health of the city would have been adversely affected and interference might have been caused to local drainage also. The estimate of the Barrage allowed 12 lacs of difficulties mentioned above. These would have amounted to a considerable sum of money.
- 3. The canals taking off from this barrage would run at a very low level and large areas of Rajasthan situated at higher levels would have been unirrigable except by lift. The capital and running cost of pumping finstallation would have been high and cultivators irrigating by lift would have been recuired to pay Rs. 5/- per acre or more extra to meet the cost of lift irrigation. A considerable amount of electrical energy would also have been necessary for the pumping. All this direct and indirect extra expenditure would have amounted to no less than a couple of crores of rupees.
- 4. Shri M.D. Mithal, the then Chief Engineer, Irrigation, Rajasthan suggested another site for a barrage about 3 miles above Kotah at a place near the lower and of a long gorge. He tentatively proposed a pond level at R.L. 900 and canal full supply level at R.L. 870. These proposals were not acceptable to Shri Aiyer, who stated that it would cost Rs. 4 to 5 crores more, as it would involve very heavy pumping for the foundation and long and deep rock cutting for the canals. Shri Mithal's levels would have brought an additional area of about 2.5 lacs of acres in Rajasthan within the sphere of gravity irrigation.
- 5. After a detailed examination of both the proposals, it was found that almost all the conditions as regards reater area under flow irrigation could be secured and the cost greatly reduced by lowering the pond level to about R.L. 852 and the canal full supply level to about R.L. 850. It was also

found that a place about 1,000 feet below that suggested by Tital would be more convenient from the construction point of fiew. Necessary investigations have been carried out and it has been found that at this site there is a considerable amount of earth, sand and shingle filling above the bid rock varrying from 5' to 60 ft., and having a depth of later unto shout 20ft. almost in the entire width. A mascary dam is, therefore, not practicable, as it would cost a large amount and would take a long time to complete. It is however, possible to close the river portion with an earth deand to provide facilities for the escape of surplus water, on the left flank where good rock exists in an unlimited length. There is also and a quantity of good earth available on the left bank for the proposed earth dam. Necessary estimates for the barrage have been generally approved by Dr. K.L. Tao, Director (Designs), Central Water and Power Commission, who visited the area on the 30th and 31st May, 1953. Dr. F.L. Tay however, suggested that it might be advantageous to shift the site by another few hundred feet downstream, where the escaping facilities are better and width of the river pool less. The place pointed out by Dr. F.L. Rao is opposite to the Garh Palace belonging to his Highness the Maharao Sahib of Kotah, which is situated on the right bank of the river. It is hoped that his Highness the Maharao Sahib of the that the work does not interfere in any way with the approach to or with the privacy of the palace. Conditions at this site are expected to be even better and this alternative site are expected to be even better and this alternative site are under preparation.

The barrage at the site now selected would be definitely preferable, as it would command by flow an additional area of over 2 lacs of acres and would not interfere in any way with communications and other liver facilities at present enjoyed by the residents of hotah town. The additional cost is not likely to exceed the crores of rupees. A barrage at the upper site would however make a high level bridge at the present Chambal Causeway unnecessary. We compensation would have to be paid for houses and ghats which would be submerged by the Barrage at the lower site. There would be no interference with the drainage of Kotah Town and no other inconvenience would be caused to the inhabitants of the city. The large capital expenditure required for pumping installation, transmission lines, and channels to irrigate high areas would also be avoided. The resultant savings would probably exceed the additional expenditure involved in the construction of Barrage and canals at the Upper Site finally selected. The electrical energy required for avoidable pumping would become available for industrial and domestic purposes.

Dear Sir.

Please refer your letter wherein you had requested me to supply information to support 20% short fall in progress due to want of personnel.

The Project report for Chambal Project was revised in the year 1954 and targets for main items of work for Gandhi Sagar Dam, Power Station and Right Main Canal were fixed for achievement in the coming years for the successful completion of the Project. While formulating these targets it was taken into account that the supply position of key materials like steel and cement, construction machinery and other equipments required for the Project and adequate experienced technical staff all these will be upto the mark and as per schedule and that targets fixed can be achieved well in time. But contrary to this expectation there is shortage in all these items and this affected. the progress of works adversely. It is soon from the statements enclosed, that there is about 30% short fallin the progress of the Gandhi Sagar Dam and Power Station, whereas in the Canals, the short fall in the progress is more than 60%. The inadequate supply of steel and cement and delay in securing foreign exchange for importing machinery and equipments required for the project, no doubt did affect the progress to a certain extent. Besides this the important item that affected the progress of works, in my opinion, is the shortage in the technical personnel. It is also my opinion that this shortage in the personnel has contributed to about 20% short fall in the progress.

in the initial stages of the Project, the preliminaries such as surveys, preparation of designs, plans and ostimates which needed qualified technical personnel, could not be completed in time, for mant of this requirement. Thus the starting of execution of works was delayed. Even when the preliminaries were completed the works could not be started in several places for want of personnel for supervision and direction of works. In the case of Gandhi Sagar Dam and Power Station, where the work is concentrated in one place, this aspect might not have affected the progress much, although it has affected to a certain extent. But in the Canals where the works are spread over a vast area, shortage of personnel for supervision and direction of works does tell upon the progress of work. In a project like this where large number of construction and earth moving machineries and equipments, which are new to our country, are being employed, you appreciate the importance of adequate technically skilled operators and other categories of staff required to man efficiently these machineries. Even in the Electrical Circle, the required technical staff is still to be posted and this has evidently affected in the preliminary work of Surveys, designs and proparation of estimates and plans.

In view of the reasons stated above, I feel that I am correct in stating that 20% of short fall in progress. is due to want of technical personnel.

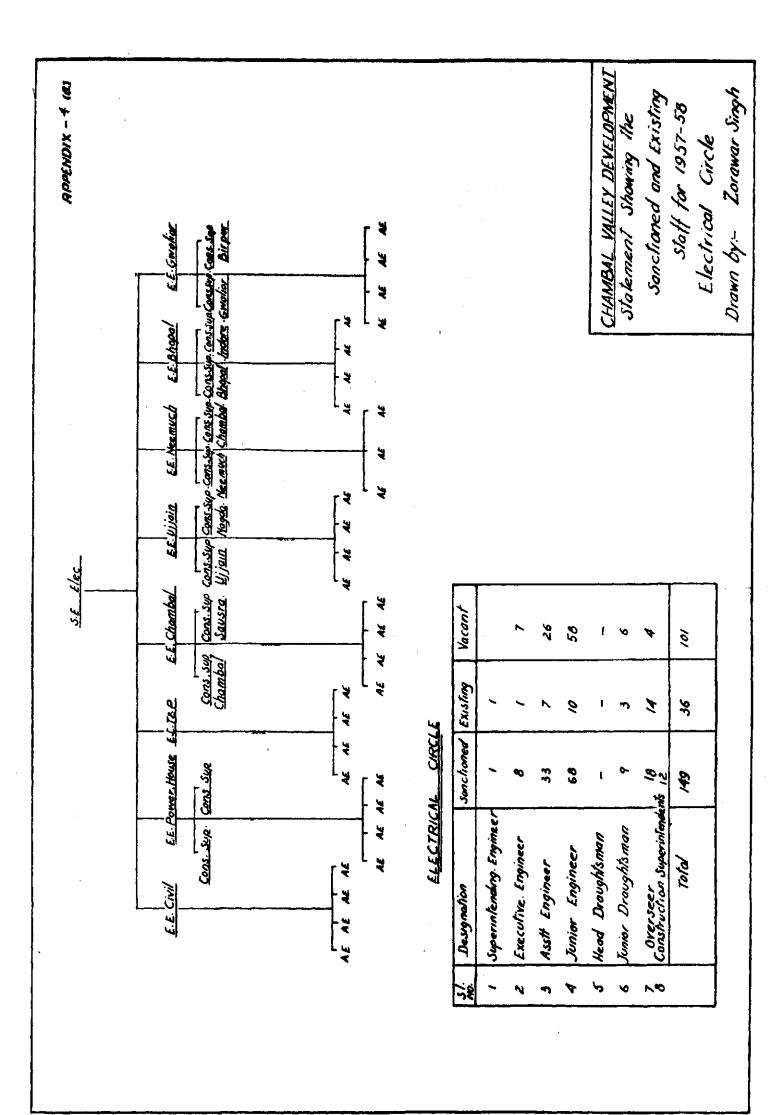

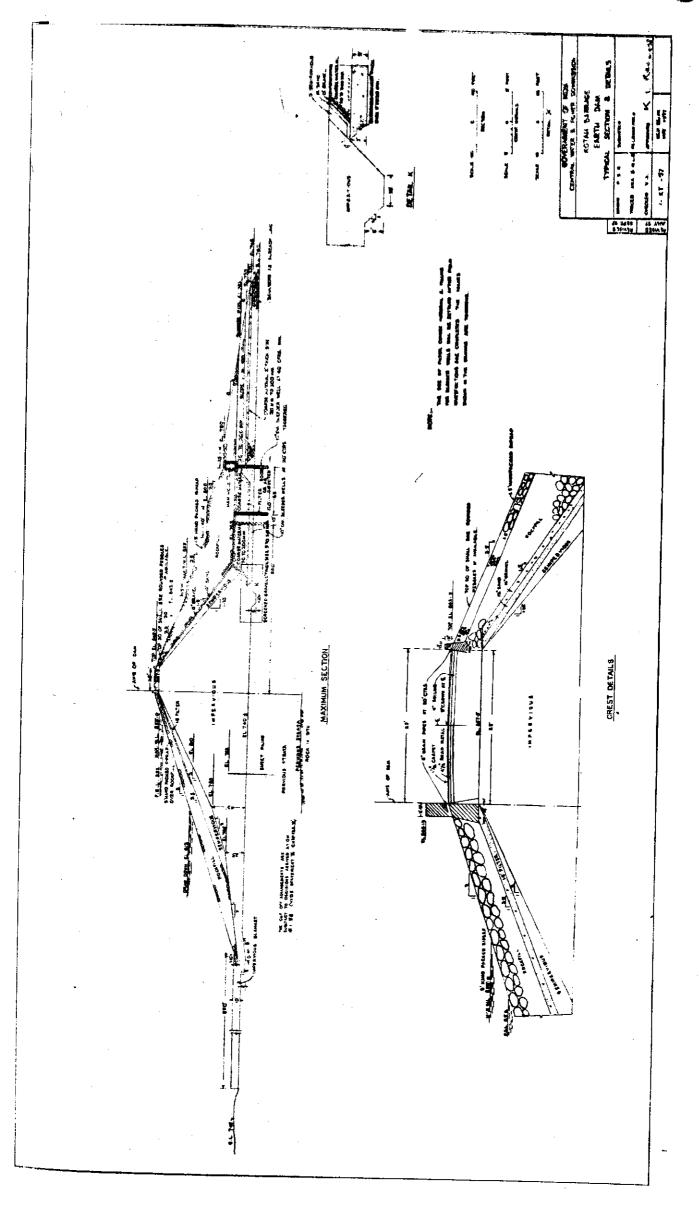

Possible economies in the item of lining in rock-cut reaches Right Bank Canal (Madhya Pradesh)

As a result of detailed studies and discussions with the Chief Engineer, Chambal Project, Madhya Pradesa, the following conclusions have been arrived at:-

- 1. There is no objection to delete the provision of plastering the sides of canal in rock-cut reaches. Pointing may prove enough.
 - 2. In some test sections, bed lining may be omitted.
- 3. Where possible the width between side walls may be increased to provide water-way without lining. The rugosity coefficient may be thus kept on the safe-side.
- 4. Alternatives of the above nature might be brought in during the course of construction in order to secure economy.

It is expected that there will be a period of 5 to 6 years before the canal will run full supply. Thus for this period there will be no risk for inadequate capacity in the Canal.

The omission of the 1" thick nortar on the sides has been suggested because such thick nortar even if applied is likely to crack due to differential shrinkage and thus lose its objective.

In the bed, the heavily pitted section might be made up by ramming of spawls and ballast prepared to suitable consistency with line mortar thus saving coment which is a critically short material and also saving some cost.

The use of rubble masonry in the form of chip masonry as is practised on the Lakkavalli Project is recommended.

The provision of side walls in stone masonry is considered obligatory from the overall point of view of safety.

Wherever possible the bed width of the canal is recommended to be made 55 to 60 ft. rather than 45 ft. with lining. The actual economics will need to be taken into account for each section because the depth of cutting varies.

The data in respect of each reach where lining has to be done is not yet available. Under the circumstances, only the rought estimation of the probable savings can be made. This is given below:

- 1. Over the estimates of E. 35 lacs that are being sanctioned for lining, a saving of D. 12 lacs has been calculated if the bed lining and plaster are altogether altered and the side walls are done in rubble masonry.
- 2. If cement is substituted by Kankar line, then an economy of about Rs. 6 lacs is anticipated.

In both cases, side walls have been allowed for as their construction appear obligatory. Some small savings can be had under this by the adoption of chip masonry rather than rubble masonry.

The above savings of R. 12 lakhs and 6 lakhs have been computed with regard to the sanctioned estimate of R. 35 lacs. On the average if the two methods are combined according to the site conditions, it will be reasonable to assume a saving of about R. 9 lacs. If the same saving is applied pro-rata to the total expected cost of R. 75 lakhs, the total saving will be of the order of R. 20 lacs.

P.S. The total estimated cost of lining in rock out reaches is now figured at R. 1.08 crores (vide Chief Engineer's letter enclosed).

As desired by you in your D.O. letter No:COPP/I and \$\\\ 8/57\$ dated 17th September, 1957, I am enclosing herewith a statement of rocky reaches of Right Main Canal of M.P. portion, where lining is proposed to be done. The rocky reaches given in the statement are as pur the finel-alignment of the Main Canal on which the scare is now taken up. Column 7 in the statement gives the estimated cost of earth work and lock out in these reaches, and column 8 gives the cost of lining of these rocky reaches. The total cost of earth work, rock cut and lining of the Canal in these reaches is now estimated to be about - Rs. 1,61,45,000/- as against the provision of Rs.56,73,780/- for excavation in rock and Rs. 35,00,000/- for lining of the Canal or a total of Rs. 91,73,780/-.

I hope this information serves the purpose.

PROTABLE SCONDARDS IN ESTABLISHMENT CHARGES DUE TO PROPOSED ACCELERATION OF CONSTRUCTION OF CANALS.

The provision for Establishment is based as 11% so. 7% of the provision for canals in the original estimate respectively for Rajasthan and Madhya Pracesa.

RAJASTHAN - Right Main Canal

Provision - 52.21 lakhs.

The work is scheduled to be completed by 1901-62. It is now proposed to accelerate and complete it by 1960-61 i.e. one year ahead.

Work was started in 1953-54. Therefore number of years for completion was to be 8 years but now it will be 7 years.

Therefore economies on the same basis will be $1/8 \times 52-21 = 6.52$ say 6 lakhs.

Allowing for continuance of partial staff for settlement of claims etc. to the extent of 1 lakh Net savings will be Rs. 5 lakhs.

J-DAYA PA D SA - Right/Lain Canal

Provision is Rs. 84,51,853

Period of construction - 10 years starting from 1953-54, ending 1962-63.

It is now proposed to accelerate and complete it by 1900-01 i.e. two years ahead of the original target date. The work was started in January 1955 or 54-55 instead of in 1953-54. The number of years by which the work must be completed is therefore 7 years.

The reduced establishment charges will, according to this, be $84,51,853 \times 0.7 = 59,16,2971$.

Therefore savings will be 24,88,882.

Allowing for settlement of civils and belance of works Rs. 5 light, net savings will be approximately Rs. 20 laking.

The total sconomies on this sub head will be ks. 5 + 20 or 25 lakhs.

It is expected that as the works get completed and certain staff is to be reduced the technical personnel will either be absorbed in the service of the States or on other major projects.

APPENDIX-

Copy of D.O.No. 18764 dated 29-8-57 from the Chief Engineer, Hadhya Pradesh to Shri C.L. Hahda.

I thank you for your D.O.letter No.200/C/CE/PL dated 6-6-57. From your letter I understand that you would like to know chether storage could be effected in monseon of 1958 if additional bulkhead gates are obtained for the Penstock openings in the absence of Penstock gates. Since the visit of the team to Chambal early in March the following developments have taken place:

- On account of the delay in release of foreign exchange, suply of the gates for the dam proper is also being delayed by over six months.
 - 2. The Penstock gates will not be available before end of 1958 due to delay in placing orders.
 - 3. The Power House Crane will not be available for erection of these Generating units till middle of 1958.

Under the above circumstances it will not be possible either to store water in the dem or to have the units erected earlier than middle of 1959. Even in case the bulkhead gates are provided for all the 5 openings of Penstocks there is no possibility of regulating the water unless the Perstock gates are installed. Under the circumstances even effecting of initial storage in Gandhi Sagar Dan during 1958 is not possible. Even assuming that we can effect some initial storage in 1958 season no purpose will be served as neither the Power Station, nor the outdoor Swich gear nor the Transmission Lines nor the Sub-stations will be ready by end of 1958. In fact even the quotations for Sub-stations have not been received so far. Quotations for Sub-stations have not been received in September

next. On the irrigation side the Kotah barrage will not be ready by end of next year. There is therefore no possibility of utilising partial storage in 1958. On the other hand this will unnecessarily cause greater difficulties in construction and difficulties at the dam site and cause unnecessary hardship for people whose lands and housewere to be submerged a year earlier than the probable date when we could make use of such storage. All these aspects have been examined before the revised phased programme was approved by the Control Board.

ABSTRACT OF SUGGESTED ECONOMIES

As a result of studies and discussions with Chief Engineers, the following agreed conclusions have been reached.

1. Ranapratapsagar Dam

The machinery and equipment which will become available from the Gandhisagar Dam construction and Kotah barrage and other works, can certainly be utilized for Ranapratapsagar. The dovetailing of the work of Ranapratapsagar Dam with that of Gandhisagar Dam will unquestionably lead to economy in construction, besides greater efficiency.

Economies that will become possible by such implementation are:

i) Buildings Rs. 32 lakhs.

ii) Establishment Rs. 11 lakhs.

iii) Machinery and equipment. Rs. 11 lakhs. Total: Rs. 54 lakhs.

Note: Depending upon detailed construction plant layout, the economy under machinery and equipment is expected to be about Rs. 25 lacs. However, the figure of Rs. 11 lacs has been adopted to remain on the conservative side in case the job is not as much mechanized as Gandhisagar Dam.

2. Acceleration of Canal Construction

Chief Engineer, Chambal, Madhya Pradesh, is in full agreement that acceleration of this work is possible if the organization is strengthened. Already earthwork, has been in excess of the target both for machinery and manual labour. Other difficulties are not regarded insurmountable.

Availability of necessary funds is however essential.

Savings under this sub-head have been taken into account for establishment only. The amount estimated is Rs. 25 lacs.

3. Lining of Canals in rock cut reaches Ladhya Pradesh.

Chief Engineer, Madhya Pradesh has agreed to the suggestion made by the Team for simplification of the specifications of lining depending on the nature of the various reaches.

The modifications include omitting of plastering and of bed lining in certain reaches. Widening of the Canal has also been suggested where economically feasible. Side walls are to remain as per estimate. An economy of about Rs. 20 lacs is expected.

2. The excavation in Ranapratapsagar dam in ordinary soil (Mooram etc.) is just 5% that in the Gandhi Sagar Dam and in hard rock a little less than 25%.

Assuming about 200 working days in a season the daily progress to be secured would be 12,532 cft. A worker on an average can remove about 20 cft. per day in rock. A labour force of nearly 625 men is required.

Allowing 20% for incidentals like absentees, 800 men in all are needed for the excavation job. There is sufficient working space for 900 men. This number is not too large to be recruited. They are available at the site of Gandhisagar Dam and at Kotah.

3. Excavation, Drilling, grouting, concreting and foundation treatment can be completed in 200 working days although not necessarily in one season but spread over two seasons.

4. As regards stone masonry in the Dam, the total quantity of all kinds of masonry is 1,32,95,608 cft. Which is nearly 50% of that in Gandhi Sagar Dam. From experience gained in this Dam, it is seen that an average 25,000 cft. of masonry can be done per day. According to this the number of days required is 532 days. Allowing 10% for incidentials it is a work of 600 days or three seasons.

The other items of work like R.C.C., Erection of gates, fixing of penstocks etc. can go on side by side with masonry work as the particular stage for each work is reached.

- 5. It is thus possible to complete the Dam in 4 years. The pre-requisite for such a target is that the design and Layout of the Dam should be complete in all respects.
- 6. The staff that is immediately required for this work is a Superintending Engineer with two Executive Engineers (Two Divisions) and adequate subordinate staff. One Executive Engineer will be in charge of the Main Dam work and procurement of materials etc., the second one will be in charge of procurement of machinery etc. He will also be in charge of the Running and Maintenance of machinery.

Possible Economies.

(i) Under Buildings.

There is a provision of %. 4,23,500 for permanent buildings in the project estimate. The provision of %. 2,00,000/- for the construction of an additional Chief Engineer's office at Jaipur is not necessary. The provision for the remaining buildings may be reduced as indicated in the Statement attached.

There is a further provision of Rs. 20,60,000/- for buildings under transmission. No reduction in this is possible, if any has not been taken into account.

The total Economies will be 2.72 + 13 + 16.47 = 32.19 lakhs or 32 lakhs.

According to programme in the Project Report the work is to be done in seven years starting from 57-58 and completing by 63-64.

It has been suggested that the Civil works only need be taken up at present. The installation of power units as recommended by Shri N.N. Iengar, Member, Consultative Committee is to be taken up later. The dam and appartenant works can be completed in four seasons. The reduction in cost of Establishment cannot be in direct proportion. The amount that may be needed for the full establishment for 5 seasons can be taken for this purpose. The economy will then be 39.15.000 x 52

III. Plant and machinery

Plant and machinery required for the construction of Rana Pratap Sagar Dam is given in the appendix (appendix XIV of Report). This does not provide for i) Pumps required for water supply of colony and works, and dewatering of foundations II) Machinery for Earth work and compaction and iii) Equipment such as Diesel locos, Concrete buckets and tramlines for conveying concrete from batching plant or mixers to site of works. There is however a lump sum provision of Rs. 5 lacs under the head 'prevision for other machinery' which is not enough for the purchase of the above equipment.

From the list of equipment aveilable at Gandhi Sagar Dem (vide enclosure), it is seen that most of the machinery listed in the equipment required for Rana Pratap Sagar Dam is available. The Gandhisagar Dam work is in a fairly advanced stage.

By properly phasing the programmes of the two projects, it will be possible to release the machinery without dislocating the programme of Gandhi Sagar Dam. The machinery and equipment at Kotah obtained for Barrage and canal construction will also be available.

A statement showing equipment and machinery required for Rana Pratap Sagar to be obtained from either Gandhi Sagar Dam site or from Kotah is enclosed. The transfer value is based on the anticipated work that these would have been put into in those works.

According to this the total value comes to Rs. 24,87,000/-

The provision made in the project Report is 32,50,000 and including the cost of pumps ctc. referred to above this will come to Rs. 35,25,000/-

The resulting economy will be of the order of 5.10.88 lakhs.

Foreign evchange for the total value of equipment will be saved.

As a result of our study, it has been seen that the construction equipment of the value of Rs. one crore is employed at Gandhisagar Dam. This includes two cable ways of cost of about Rs. 11 lakhs and crushing and batching plants, prices of these two items Ps.14 lacs.

The extent to which the job of Ranabratabagar is mechanized will only be determined when a detailed construction plant layout is prepared. However, it is considered that for completion of the Ranapratapsagar work with optimum speed, it may be possible to utilize equipment to the extent of Rs. 50 lacs out of the total value of Rs. 1 crore. Under the circumstances allowing for full wear and tear which is rightly chargeable to Gandhisagar Dam, it is considered that the overall economies in the execution of the two jobs by proper devetailing may be of the order of Rs. 25 to 30 lacs.

However to remain on the conservative side, the Team has put forward a figure of only 11 lacs.

It is stated that the reason for the increase in the estimated demand by 1960-61 to be over 5 times the demand that existed in 1955-66 is due to the fact that although a good-potential market existed, cheap power was not available in the first Plan period. It is expected that a large number of existing industries generating their own power in small in-efficient power plants, will enough over to hydel power from Chambal. The conversion demands from existing steam, diesel and non-utility electric drive are estimated to be 5100 KW by 1960-61 and 21500 KW by 1965-66.

Out of this amount, Rs. 2.5 crores is for small scale industries, including the setting up of training centres to improve technical skill, demonstration centres, group industries schemes, assistance to industrial a cooperatives etc., Or the training schemes, the establishment of a central wood working Institute at a cost of about Rs. 20 lakes with a vood seasoning, wood preservation and a mechanised workshop is the most important. Under group industries scheme, it is proposed to set up the manufacture of umbrella ribs, cycles, pressed metal products, burricane lanterns, lead pencils, electrical consumer goods etc. It is also proposed to establish Industrial Estates in the vicinity of Indore and Gwalior.

The Rayon factory at Nagda has its own generating plant of 8000 KW capacity and it is proposed to add another set of 5000 KW capacity during the second Plan. The demand of the factory has been estimated at 7000 KW in 1960-61 and 8500 KW in 1965-66 and included in the above table. As the factory has its own generating plant, we may not take its demand on the Chambal Crid for the present. Hence the demand due to large and heavy industries may be 15000 KW in 1960-61 and 27000 KW in 1965-66.

It is stated that the erstwhile Government of Bhopal had allocated a sum of Rs. 159 lakhs for the construction of several barrages and for sinking of 2000 wells. The Government had also decided to issue taccavi loans recoverable in

in 25 years with 25% subsidy to framers for sinking wells. It is expected that by the end of 2nd Five Year Plan, at least 25% of the wells and 50% of the proposed tanks and barrages would use electric power for lift irrigation. The area commanded by the above schenes will be 21250 acres requiring 4250 h.p. or 3186 kW of connected load or a demand of 1911 kW.

It is assumed that industries at present using steam and diesel drives would be converted to electric drive by 1960-61. With regard to small industries, the estimated connected load in 1955 with steam and diesel drive was about 1000 kW, and with electric drive, it was 1200 kW. There is only one medium industry, an ice factory with a demand of 98 kW. Among the large industries, the existing ones are textiles, straw products and sugar. Their demand is estimated at 1320 kW by 1960. It is expected that new industries such as a spinning mill with 20,000 spindles, a hardboard factory & a flour mill, will be started resulting in an additional demand of 1050 kW by 1960.

The above demands have been estimated assuming that necessary financial and technical aid would be forthcoming for encouraging installation of small industrie lift irrigation and water supply schemes. The demand for power for small scale industries provides for conversio of existing steam and oil engine drives of industries processing agricultural products, woolen goods industries in Beawar and other cottage industries.

The large scale industries consist mainly of the Railway Workshops at Ajmer and the textile mills at Beawar. It is stated that there is not much scope for setting up new major industries in the state for want of adequate supply of water.

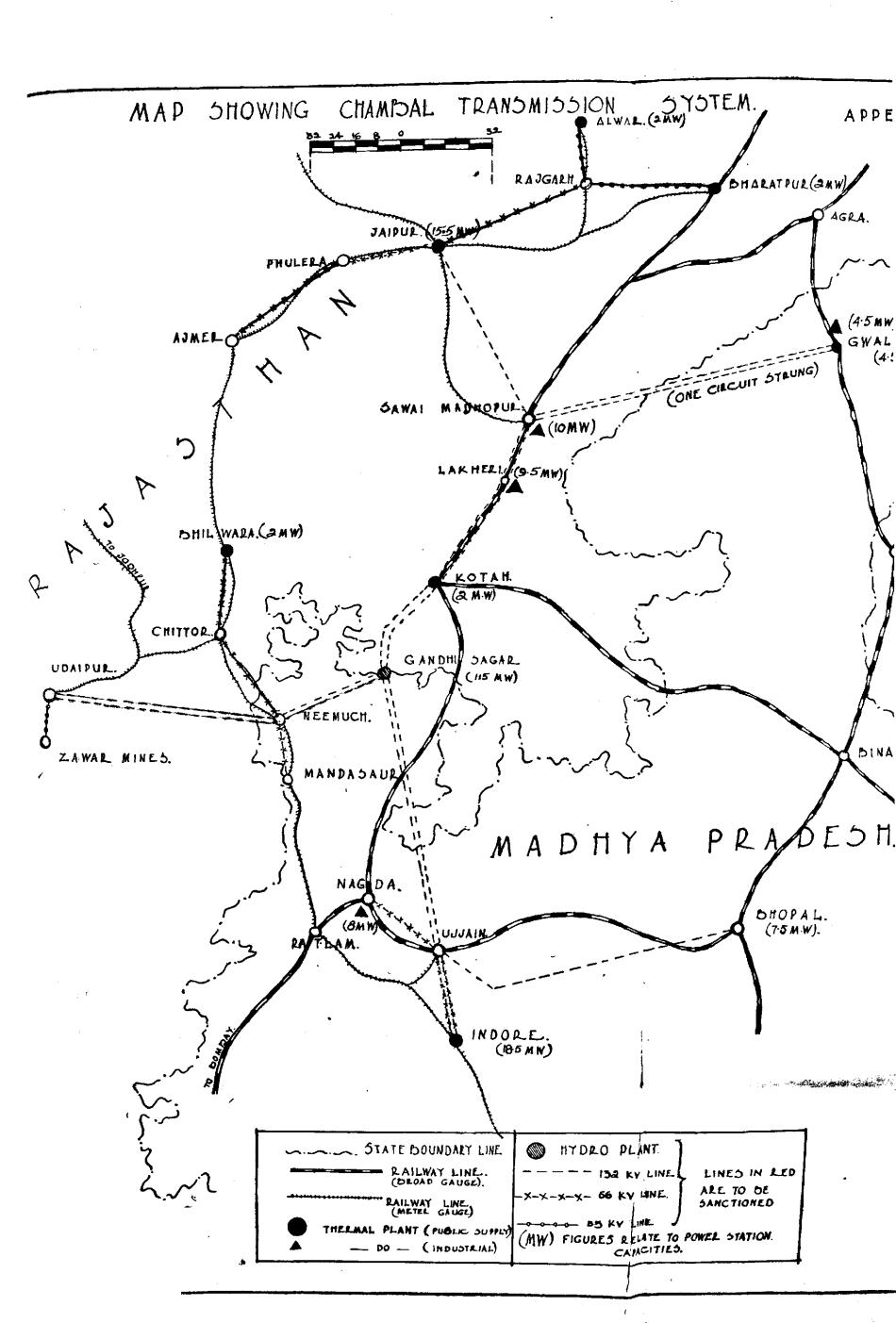

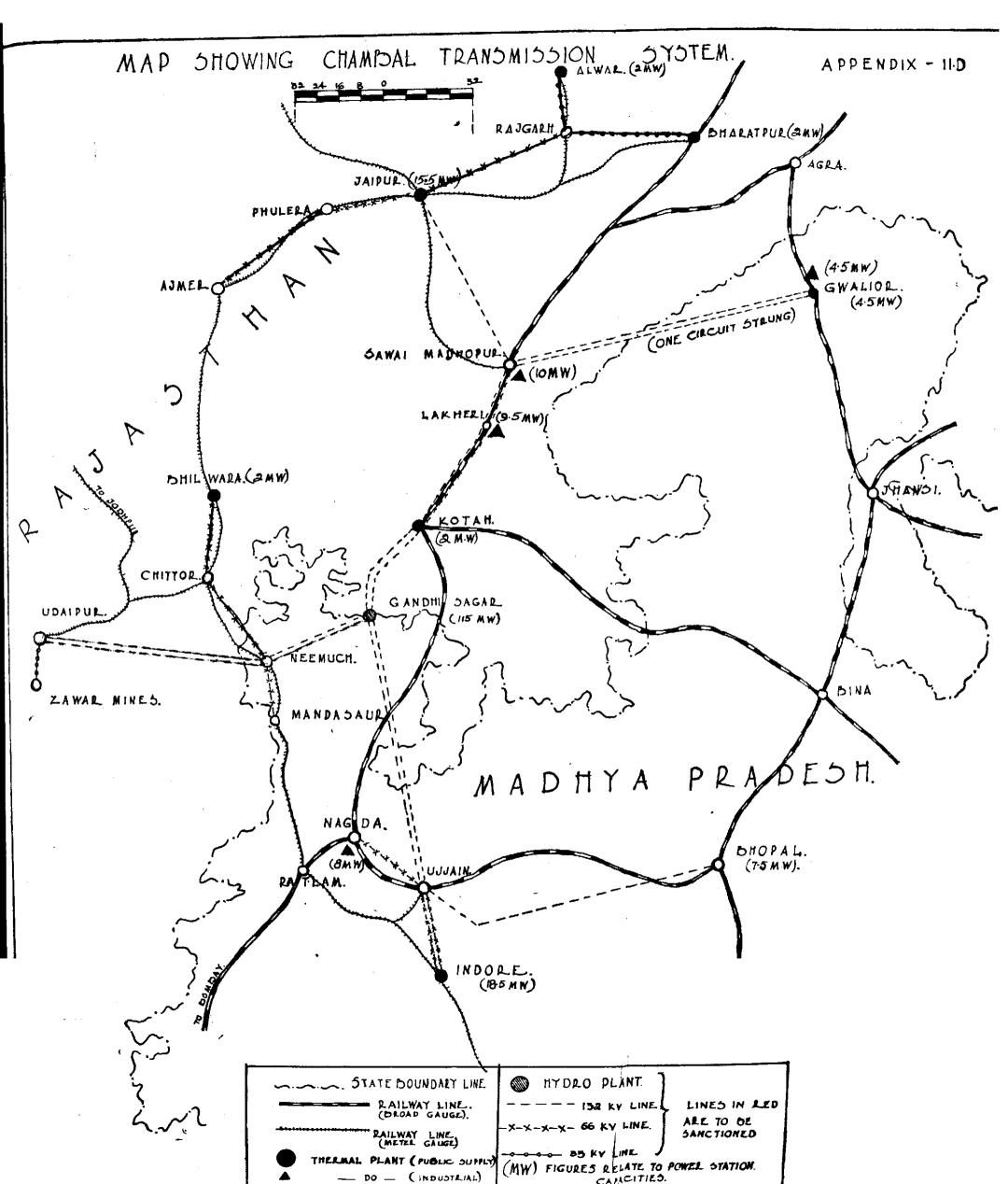

Report on agricultural aspect of Chambal Valley Project.

Fore pard

This is a brief summary of the preliminary draft report of about 80 typed pages. The report is divided in three parts - part I dealing with likely changes in the pattern of agriculture with the advent of canal irrigation and economic justification of this project; Part II with serious problems already existing, or which are likely to arise with canal irrigation which may militate against the success of the project or even render canal irrigation harmful in certain areas and Part III steps to be taken immediately by cultivators, the States and the Central Government to solve various problems and to derive maximum benefit from canal irrigation.

The proposals and recommendations made in the report are the outcome of mutual discussion with officers of Irrigation, Revenue and Agriculture Departments of the States concerned.

Part I. Pattern of Agriculture

1. Present pattern of agriculture is rather discouraging-people largely lazy and not inclined to work, fields terribly infested with <u>ber bushes</u>, even elementary principles of dry farming being ignored, farm-yard manure not much cared for; green manuring and composting little practised, standard of cultivation too low and accordingly crop yields also low-using 40-50 seers of wheat seed per acre and getting 4-5 mds. of yield per acre; very little of cash crops being grown, cows yielding only a few ounces of milk each, in the absence of any green fodder. All this is likely to undergo revolutionary change with the supply of canal water. Area under cash crops like cotton, sugarcane, fruits vagetables, potatoes & groundnuts is bound to increase immensely. Although there is difference of opinion between

Irrigation & Agriculture Officers about likely crop rotations in future and a conference of Irrigation & District Agricultural Officers is desirable to arrive at some conclusions, yet it is clear that future pattern of agriculture will largely depend to what extent the Agriculture Departments of two States are able to solve numerous problems facing the cultivators which will determine the relative profits from various crops.

The economic justification of the project lies not so much on the assumed increase in yield of cereals of a few maunds per acre, because of canal water (which may not accrue in case of Kharif cereals on account of abundant supply of summer rains) as on the immense scope for improvement in agricultural practices and introduction of cash crops. Because of low standard of cultivation, and accordingly low yield of crops, there can be immense increase in "per acre yield of crops" by wholesale adoption of even one or two agricultural practices out of many i.e. use of suitable varieties of crops, proper time of sowing, cultural, irrigational and manurial practices, green manuring, composting, eradication of pernicious ber bushes etc. or by greater production of cash crops. Horviculture and sugar incustries offer remarkable scope. In short the extent of economic success of the project or estimated economic return, will depend, not so much on mere supply of water, as on the extent to which the suggested agricultural improvements are brought about. This points to the need of closer co-ordination between Agriculture & Irrigation Departments and appreciation by the latter, of the agricultural problems. Agricultural Departments as they exist at present in these two States; have neither the staff $\hat{\alpha}$ nor the finances, to carry out the work on the desired scale.

Need for Agricultural Research: The advent of canal irrigation must bring about radical changes not only in the type of crops grown but in the very pattern of farming or agricultural practices which are going to have tremendous effect on the income of farmers or even on canal revenue. It is therefore urgent that experiments should be initiated at once to find answers to at least some of the elementary but fundamental questions that would be asked such as (a) varieties of crops best suited under irrigated conditions, time of sowing, seed-rate, irrigational, manurial and cultural requirements etc., which apparently looking trivial, have nevertheless tremendous effect on the yield as explained in detail in the report-variety alone may cause a difference of 100 per cent or 5 to 10 mds. per acre in wheat alone; likewise other factors can depress or increase yield by 10%. While other States (where Agricultural Departments have been in existence for long) are in a position to give advice. to the cultivators on every aspect of farming, position in these two States is different. Although, now the two biggest States in India, they are, nevertheless, an outcome of merger of a large number of princely States - many of them small ones, which could not have been expected to do much of research and development work for lack of funds and staff. No doubt two Agricultural Colleges in Rajasthan and four in Madhya Pradesh have been recently started and research stations are in the course of establishment but the agricultural officers in these two States will have to do immense amount of work and that also, in the shortest possible time, to catch up with other States.

So far as Chambal Valley Area is concerned, the Agricultural Departments are not in a position to give authentic advice on any agricultural matter. The best they

can do is, to make a guess on the basis of work done in other States, but authentic advice is possible only on the basis of actual experiments conducted. In consultation with agricultural experts of both Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh, and after visiting both Govt. Farms and private farms where experimentation work can be started, a list of experiments, the lines on which they are to be conducted, and also the rough cost involved, have been prepared and given in appendix. Experiments (requiring collection of detailed data) will be conducted on Govt. Farms while simple type experiments such as relative suitability of various varities of crop, time of sowing, seed rate Or irrigational practices etc. would also be conducted on private farms, partly to confirm the results obtained at Govt. Farms & partly for demonstration to the public.

4. G.C.A.& C.C.A. (Need for their verification)

Canal authorities for calculating figures of G.C.A.& C.C.A. have naturally depended upon revenue record and Survey of India Aeports. I observed however in some localities, enormous areas of undulating nature such as near Etawah and Pipalada etc. which (although now under so called crops and hence included in C.C.A.) would not be amenable to flow irrigation & deserves to be excluded from C.C.A.Re-cheaking is necessary to determine the magnitude of difference between the C.C.A. theoretically calculated and what actually exists on spot, in order to determine the amount of water likely to become surplus. This becomes all the more important, as water allowance on these canals, is already far in excess of that allowed in Bhakra Mangal Project (5 cusecs as against 2.5 cusecs) inspite of much lower rainfall and little danger of waterlogging in the latter. If, as a result of this enquiry, water is found to be surplus it can be profitably utilised in several other ways such as creating "Sugarcane Belts" where sugarcane

where sugarcane can be concentrated which would necessitate higher water allowance.

Secondly it may seem desirable to earmark area or fields in each locality which are to receive irrigation so that cultivators may know which of their fields come under the commanded area and they may proceed with preparation in advance.

Part II:

Some of the serious problems already existing or likely to arise with the advent of canal irrigation.

(1) Water logging and high salt contents.

Keeping in view (a) the sad experience of canal irrigation in Pubjab where several million acres of once fertile land have been ruined by water-logging and alkalinity largely, as a result of wacepage of water from canals, . distributaries, and minors, even though the sub-soil water level was very low to start with (in some cases 100') and further U.P.Delhi or even Harsi Dam Canal Area in Madhya Pradesh itself, have fared no better, the high water table in the wells and their salt contents in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh (as given in detail in the report) points to serious danger of water-logging, at least in areas like Digod Tehsil in Rajasthan and Gohad Tehsil in Madhya Pradesh. In the latter, water table in Monsoon already rises to ground surface; both Ph and f.S.S.are high in some places as much as 3000 to 6000 P.P.M; the land already sufferso from what is called "Soil Sickness"; crop yields even in the presence of seasonal canal water, have dwindled down to lower level than in the adjoining barani areas. The supply of more water in this area from the proposed perennial canal to the extent of 1.5 lakh acres, is fraught with serious danger which requires detailed discussion. If danger, atleast in some areas, is found to be real, then steps must

be immediately taken to prevent perennial canal irrigation proving a curse than a blessing. Various methods to deal with the situation are discussed in the report, such as (i) lining of canal in specified areas susceptible to water-logging. (ii) reducing water allowance for such areas or (iii) cutting out canal water but supplying instead, water from tubewells sunk in that very area (iv) drainage ditches (v) reclamation of salt infested lands or (vi) encouraging installation of pumping sets in the numerous percolation wells already existing there etc.

- (2) Kankar layers in numerous localities are met with & experiments are urgently required to be undertaken to determine their permeability to water and roots and also whether, with continuous canal irrigation, they will tend to disintegrate or become worse. Results of these experiments, will determine the irrigation practices to be followed in various localities.
- (3) <u>Hard pan</u>: Likewise hard pan exists in some places simple experiments should be carried out i.e. in two adjoining plots, hard pan being broken by implements in one case & left undisturbed in the other, to see the seriousness or otherwise of this problem and to the extent it is required to be tackled.
- (4) Consolidation of land holdings is desirable before canal water becomes available to facilitate most economical use of water and for establishing Waraband; States may be asked to what extent steps are being take in this direction.
- (5) Pernicious Ber Bushes: The Extent to which lands, both in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh, are infested with pernicious ber bushes, can only be appreciated in full by personal observations. In estation varies sything from 10% to 100%. Removal of this pest alone, in the opinion of the Deputy Director of Agriculture Madhya Pradesh, can bring an additional

yield of 3 to 4 mds. per acre on an average for the State as a whole, and in his opinion, the area physically occupied by ber bushes is about 50%. apart from waste of land, they rob the soil of its moisture & plant natrients which would otherwise go to crop. All the officers of Agriculture, Irrigation & Revenue Deptts. agree with me that steps should be taken at once to get this eradicated for which various suggestions have been offered i.e. (a) getting it uprooted by Govt. tractors or and (b) by privately owned tractors but through the agency of Govt. and ih both cases recovering the cost in 5 yearly instalments (c) the eradication charges being calculated not on acreage basis but on hourly basis for which the tractor is worked, so that cultivators are induced to utilise Govt. tractors only for severely infested areas (d) issuing notices to the land owners to have it eradicated before water becomes available, failing which, they will gat no water but will have to pay irrigation charges.

(6) Soil erosion: Although not directly concerned with the proposed canal project, yet it would be well for all to appreciate that soil erosion is causing greatest hovoc both in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh; in the former State, gullies and ravines alone, measuring about 1540 miles in length cover no less than 500 square miles besides large areas croded by small nallahs. about 30% of total area in Rajasthan has been already ruined by crosion. Erosion in all forms -- sheet, rill, gullies & ravines, is taking place all 'over; sheet erosion although imperceptible is nevertheless continuously washing away fertile soil and this is likely to be intensified by heavy flow of canal irrigation unless necessary precautions are taken. Erosion in some places have eroded all the soil cover from the rocks; and lands which were once producing good crops, are now described. Even kankar layers have appeared near the ground because of constant removal of good soil from top. Hundreds of villages, becoming

inacessible due to soil erosion on all sides, have been deserted. In Madhya Pradesh it is almost equally bad in Districts like Bhind and some places near Rajeshwar and Baroda in Morena Dist. In Bhind Dist. almost 30% of the total area is ruined by soil erosion. In fact soil erosion (producing big gullies for bad characters to hide) has contributed greatly to the dacoity problem which is costing the State so heavily. Remedies against soil erosion are well known and practised extensively all over the world which comprises, in the case of sheet and rill erosion-strip cropping, bunding, contour cultivation, terracing, levelling, proper crop rotation etc. and in case of gullies and ravines, prevention of grazing and felling of trees encouraging growth of hardy and drought resistant trees, and plugging gullies to prevent further on-slaught etc. etc. The problem is one that should be seriously tackled by the Central Govt. as it may be beyond the financial resources of the State Govts. which for want of finances, can only tinker with the problem. Even in the U.S.A. soil conservation is a Federal subject.

Part III : Task ahead :

- (1) In addition to the experiments already suggested in Part I para 3 "Need for agricultural Experiments" and verification of G.C.a. and C.C.a. and those in Part II relating to kankar, hard pan, ber sushes, water-logging etc. other problems requiring attention are summarized below.
- (2) Phased Programme: a s regards phased programme of Irrigation and development period, detailed information is given in the report about the localities and acreage expected to come under irrigation within 2,3 years. But the irrigation authorities consider that it will take 10 years before whole of the available water begins to be fully utilised by the cultivators who are said to be unprogressive and resourceless and not likely to make full use of water by levelling the land or contour cropping or removal of ber bushes etc. The matter should be discussed in a

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meeting as it will be pity not to make serious efforts to curtail this development period of 10 years and to allow the wastage of water for long, calling it as " natural course". Further it will be desirable to mark out exact area in each locality which are to receive irrigation.

3. Horticulture industry: Horticulture offering greatest scope, can bring about revolutionary change in the agricultural economy of these States. Unfortunately we, in India, have yet little conception of what "fruit farming" can mean to an individual or to the economy of the State. California, with a population of only a fraction of that in Rajasthan, has over two million acres under fruits bringing annual income of hundreds of crores of rupees. Even though area under fruits at present is insignificant in both the States yet the presence of a good number of fruit trees, flourishing here and there and laden with fruits of excellent quality. indicate remarkable scope. Bunches on some orang trees were seen carrying two dozen fruits each, and some kaghzi lime plants are said to yield even five mds. of fruits each, giving an income of even Rs. 100 a tree. Fruits are more badly needed in India than even the cereals, as they are something more than mere food; our present fruit production requires to be atleast doubled to meet even the basic need of the country. Many fruits "per unit area of Land" produce more food and give greater return to the grower, greater employment to labour and greater income to the Govt. than most other farm crops, nor is the price of fruit likely to be unremunerative within foreseeable future. There is scope for establishing a really first-class. Horticulture Industry; and Agriculture Department should resort to mass scale production of nursery plants for supply to public at

uno profit no loss basis" and even then the cost price will only be a fraction of that charged by private nursery men. In this connection, the gardens of erstwhile Rulers like that of His Highness Kotah, can play valuable role by supplying (at reasonable price) budwood from high quality fruit trees, growing in their gardens. Immediate survey should be taken in hand to locate trees of outstanding merit in private or Government gardens from which budwood could be taken for mass scale production of nursery plants of pedigree stock, thereby laying the foundation of fruit industry on most scientific lines.

4. Sugar Industry: Sugar industry, also like horticulture, offers greatest scope. In the presence of two biggest factors i.e. plentiful supply of water and fertilizer and the absence of severe frost, there is no limit to yield of cane; in fact cultivators in some places in India are already getting as much as 1500 mds. cane per acre as against and average of 300 mds for India. Hirachand Walchand Farm in Bombay State gave in one year highest yield in the world - almost 3000 mds per acre. In order to get required quantity of water, cultivators in Bombay Presidency do not mind pa ying as high as 100 to 120 rupees per acre for irrigation. Due to abundant supply of canal water and much greater "water allowance" in the proposed canal area than in other States, there is no danger of water shortage and nor of fertilizer, both artificial and organic, and there is also little fear of frost and all these factors must contribute to very high yield of cane.

Most desirable course will be to earmark certain area as "Cane Belts" where care cultivation may be concentrated, with due regard to soil, water conditions and other factors. Further, two biggest factors in "Recovery of sugar from cane" are (a) time-lag between cutting of cane in the fields and its crushing

in the mills i.e. shorter the parity, greater the recovery (b) correct regeness of came when cane is crushed, besides of course voingula varieting to good, motorable practices. In his wanter and hading a Pradesh we can aspire to create Cula and Hawaii which are so famous for their sugar industry. Area under cane at present is insignificant i.e. about 60,000 acres and 75000 acres in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh respectively as against about four lac Acres in Pubjab (which in size is hardly one third of Madhya Pradesh) and only a small area in the Districts coming under Chambal Valley Project i.e. about 800 acres in Rajastban and about 7,000 acres in Madhya Pradesh. Each of these States is going to be bigger in size than even U.P. which alone has got over 25 lakh acres under sugarcane and 68 sugar mills. Even half of this area under sugarcong in Rejasthan and Madhya Pradesh, with half the number of sugar mills, can bring about remarkable prosperity to the cultivative, the State Government and public at large especially when will thins for eanc cultivation are so favourable. This will enable India to export sugar in big lot and thereby earn much needed foreign exchange.

5. Farm-yard manure, composting and green manuring:

The practice of storing farm-yard manure in pits, green manuring in fields and compositing refuse in towns are mimost taknown; so much so, that even in a nown like-Kotah, all the city sweepings, animal dung, rubbish and human excreta, are all used in filling depressions in the city which is a criminal waste of valuable material. In order to popularise

- 6. Soil management: Lands in both the States, over large areas, are of undulating, sloping and uneven nature. Unless necessary precautions are taken, the heavy flow of canal water, on slopy land will wash away the fertile upper surface and hasten sheet erosion, which is already doing serious harm. In case of undulating land, the crops grown in depressions will suffer on account of excess moisture, and those at the top will die for lack of moisture. Soil management practices will have to be thought out immediately for rendering advice to the agriculturists, and for this purpose, the soil sections of two States should discuss the matter in all aspects and formulate definite
- 7. Price supports policity a Poople in those two States have experienced apported full in prices of cereals whenever there is bumper crop; so such so, that couple of years back, jower and maize were sold at Rs.4/-, E/- per md. If increased production through canal irrigation, does result in unduly depressing cereal prices, people may not feel enthused to pay irrigation charges, and much less, betterment fee. So Government will have to safeguard against abnormal fall in prices and announce "Price Support Policy" to remove any misapprehension on this account. It may also pender over its present policy of building hig reserves by heavy imports from abroad.

8. Special manuring experiment: Soils in these States being highly colorious (lime percentage in some places wing as high as 20 or even 30) application of phosphotic fortilizars seems desirable and experiments be ande to determine quantity, frequency and form of phosphotic fortilizar. This is of course in addition to the usual minurial experiments. Likewise the application of trace elements particularly iron, copper, zinc and manageness may be tried.

9. Village tanks and whoir future use:

A very large number of big village tanks, (which formerly prevented soil erosion and stored water for irrigation) are now going out of use and their utility in future may be thought out. With the advent of canal irrigation they can still be put to good rany uses like "Fish Tanks" to rear fish which has proved such a paying proposition in many states or for production of crops like Sangara or as insurance against periodic closure of canals for short period etc. Since with the advent of canals, there will be little danger for these big village tanks to dry up, a well thought out plan by the Fisheries Advisor to Government of India can augment fish resources immensely.

10. Now Villages: In canal irrigated areas, residential houses have got to be as near the fields as possible, otherwise canal irrigation has little meaning. Accordingly many new villages are bound to arise and this will also lead to high standard of cultivation. In new canal colonies of Punjab, plans for all new villages on model lines were worked out in advance and necessary guidance given to the people in construction of houses. This aspect may also receive consideration if haphazard growth of villages is to be avoided.

11. Towns. Some of the existing towns in proposed caral area, like Sheopur, look deserted and in ruins and offer dreary look. They are bound to grow rapidly with the advent of canal and their haphazard or un-controlled growth would prove a curse. If present Sheopur Town cannot be remodeled or its growth regulated then a new town, properly laid out, with wide roads near the canal, with ample supply of water for lawns, grassy plots, ornamental, shady or fruit trees, would be a place of envy. 12. Pucca Roads: With the on set of Monsoon, most of the roads in the proposed canal area, got out of order and villages remain completely out off during Monsoon, Punjab had happy experience of constructing pucca roads, almost simultaneously with canal irrigation, which immensely helped in opening up and developing the new areas, leading to the prosperity of the people. The matter deserves consideration at this stage. 13. Reaction of poople to canal water: There is strong feeling that in cortain areas (details given in my report) people may not be enthusiastic to take water and pay irrigation charges and botterment fee, unless sufficient propaganda is done before hand on the economic returns from crops under irrigated conditions and this is borne out by provious experience in places like Harsi Dam Canal Area in Madhya Prodesh itself, where it took long time for Government to induce people to take water even though no betterment fee was to be paid. In view of (a) people accustomed to dry farming and not remotely conversant with canal irrigation, unprogressive and resourceless and (b) lands unlike Punjab, being of undulating nature and (c) reckless or uncontrolled canal irrigation on such lands likely to do far more harm than good; either some sort of legislation or effective propaganda, accompanied by financial help, seems indispensable to compel or induce people to make lands fit for irrigation or adopt

contour cultivation, thereby preventing soil erosion and making best use of water and maintaining the fertility of soili At the religious a small amoration in Hampi Dam Caral Area (a foy a bridesh) on the part of cultive tora is, to take may govern of water, at any time, for any loweth of period, during the period a minor runs, with the result, that cultivators at the head get excess supply of water to the extent that lands get water-logged, while crops at the tail-end dry up for lack of irrigation, thereby embittering relations between cultivators themselves. Immediate steps should be taken to expularise this if chaos at the eleventh hour is to be avoided. 15. Main field channels. Although it is the responsibility of the village to construct and mintain main water channels, yet it would be better if construction (an' not maintenance) should also be the responsibility of carel authorities. This seems nocessary on account of lack of experience on the cart of the cultivators, and undulating and uneven nature of the land which adds to the difficulties. In fact even in regard to the alignment of water courses or field channels, some technical guidance will be necessary from Irrigation Department for which training should be arranged right now to avoid eleventh hour troubles.

- 16. Malarial problem: The existence of numerous depressions all over the places (where water is bound to stagnate and provide ample scope for mosquito breeding) would accentuate malarial problem and spleen percentage is said to be already very high.
- 17. Cooperative parden colonies and cooperative farming:
 There is good scope to establish cooperative garden

retired people from postiling in the cities and to enable them to lead a useful and productive life in rural areas but to lay the foundation of fruit industry on most scientific lines. The foundation of Fruit Industry in California, so famous all over who world, was laid largely by the people who had retired from active life and found horticulture not only a good hobby but a big paying proposition. Report gives details where this can be easily started.

- 18. If cooperative farming is at all to be a success in India, there is scope for starting an experiment in these two States as culturable waste land is available which can be given to the progressive farmers to farm on cooperative basis from the very beginning. This will help in determining to what extent, cooperative farming can be a success at least under favourable conditions. The other alternative is to lease out, on long term basis, sufficiently large area of culturable waste land to some progressive persons possessing necessary capital and technical 'know-how' who may reclaim the land, sot high standard of farming, roap benefits for a certain number of years and then either pay its price or handover the land back to the State to be run on cooperative farming or to be divided amongst peasants.
- 19. Likely delay: The Collector Morena wished me particularly to bring to the notice of authorities concerned that digging of canals in Morena and Bhind is likely to be greatly delayed as the area is predominantly populated by Brahmins and Rajputs who consider it below dignity to do any manual work, so that labour from outside will have to be imported. He also laid great emphasis on reviving of cotton cultivation in Morena and Bhind Districts where it was grown extensively before. But this work is already included in the list of experiments that

we have planned out.

Implementation: Some of the proposals in this report, if accepted in principle, will obviously require further looking into. For instance (a) if it is decided to create "Sugarcane Belts" (para 4 part III) then further probe will be necessary to soloct localities best suited for the purpose from every angle, extent of area coming under sugarcano in each locality, amount of water required and number of summr mills cooperative or private) needed and financial implications if any to the State otc. (b) In case of horticulture, if development is to take place on big scale, then weys and means to be adopted for "mas scale nursery production" on self supporting basis (c) if removal of ber bush is deemed essential then how it is to be implemented (d) likewise best way to tackle the problem of soil erosion (e) in case of cooperative garden colony scheme, the places most ideally suited, how allottees are to be selected, their obligations and how land is to be gaid for and so on with other proposals. A High Power Committee including amongst others, the Chief Ministers, the Agriculture Ministers, the Chief Engineers and the Directors of Agriculture of both the States, will be necessary to take final decision about the implementation of the schemes and financial implications involved. But obviously the first thing is to see to that extent the proposals can be accepted in principle.

AGRICULTURAL ASPECT OF CHAMBAL VALLEY PROJECT INTRODUCTION

- 1. As a result of preliminary survey of the area coming under the Project, Sardar Lal Singh submitted a report (appendix 12) which dealt with (a) <u>likely changes</u> in the existing pattern of agriculture as a result of canal irrigation (b) <u>some serious problems</u> already existing and those likely to arise with the advent of canal irrigation (c) <u>steps urgently required</u> to be taken if canal irrigation is to yield the best results and Chanbal Project is to be a financial success.
- This report was discussed first by Irrigation & Power Team and Consultative Committee, then by the State Agriculture Departments of both Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh at technical level and subsequently at Ministers' level, proceedings of various meetings are given in the appendices attached.
- 3. After the proposals, recommendations and observations made in the report, were generally approved of in principle, both the State Governments and Deputy Chairman, Planning Commission, desired the financial implications of the same to be worked out. This has been finalized in case of most schemes of Madhya Pradesh, both at technical level and at Ministers' level (Agriculture & Irrigation) and the work has reached the stage of implementation. But in regard to Rajasthan, the State Agriculture Department is still working

out the same in consultation with Sardar Lal Singh which is likely to be completed in the course of couple of weeks, so that this note deals with the schemes of Madhya Pradesh only.

- 4. Before summarizing the recommendations and proposals contained in the report, and indicating on which items, full agreement between all concerned has been reached, it would be well to refer to some salient points in the report.
 - The Agricultural aspect of the Project is justified on three 5. calculations or presumptions namely (a) increased yield of one third of a ton (over 9 mds.) of cereals per acre as a result of canal irrigation (b) cultivators paying Rs.8/- to Rs.25/- per acre as irrigation charges and (c) land owners paying land betterment fee of Rs.75/- per acre besides some other cesses. First calculation or expectation i.e. an overall increase of 9 mas. per acre for all the 14 lac acres, to use polite language, is the height of optimism at least so far as Kharif food crops are concerned which due to abundant rainfall (35-40 inches in Summer) require little artificial irrigation. As regards other two presumptions or calculations or expectations they would materialize only if cultivators find canal irrigation remunerative enough to justify payment of these dues; and there is reasonable apprehension of canal irrigation not proving remunerative, unless some agricultural problems, now facing the cultivators, are first attended to. In fact in certain areas like Gohad and Mehgaon Tchsils as referred to on page 105 of the report, canal irrigation may totally prove highly injurious, within a short period unless special precautions are taken before advent of canal irrigation.
 - 6. On the other hand, these expectations or calculations on which financial justification of the Project is based, can be realized or even exceeded if agricultural aspect of the Project is given due attention which unfortunately has not been the case so far. The State authorities fully agree with the observations made in the report vide proceedings of the meeting held at Bhopal at Minister's level, on July 23rd presided over by Leader, Irrigation & Power Team (appendix 15 para 3 & 4) which reads"there

was general agreement on all the recommendations made in Sardar Lal Singh's report. It was agreed unanimously that the economic success of Chambal Valley Project will depend upon the extent to which the agricultural problems referred to in the report, are solved. Unless precautions are taken to avoid the anticipated danger and experimental work is done to find answers to the questions that will arise with the advent of canal irrigation, the canal irrigation may not prove as beneficial a proposition as expected and may in fact even prove a curse in certain areas by bringing about water-logging or creating alkalinity problems or hastening soil erosion".

- The present pattern of agriculture or standard of farming 7. in most areas is highly disappointing (vide report page 100). The advent of canal irrigation must bring about radical changes not only in the types of crops grown but in the very pattern of farming and in agricultural practices which will have tremendous effect on the income of the farmer, and incidentally, on canal Certain specialized branches of agriculture like fruit farming and sugar industry for which ideal conditions prevail with the advent of canal irrigation, as also some of the serious problems, already existing or like to be hastened by canal water (like water-logging, alkalinity, soil erosion etc.) have been high lighted. For proper guidance of the cultivator, the State must be in a position (it is unable at present) to give answers to at least elementary but fundamental questions that will arise with the advent of canal such as the varieties of each important crop, seed-rate, time of sowing, cultural and manurial practices best suited under irrigated conditions in this particular area or water requirements of crops - all these looking trivial, have nevertheless tremendous effect upon yield of crops, and through increased yield, would enable the farmer to appreciate the value of canal irrigation.
- 8. In working out the financial implications of various schemes, utmost care has been taken to keep the expenditure at lowest level by utilizing the facilities of land, buildings, equipment, bullocks already existing on the Government farms and utilizing the Agriculture budgets and staff already provided for; and only additional expenditure required has been worked out. Further, expensive schemes like land development to make them fit for irrigation costing Rs.50 lacs in five years or mass production

commercial scale, are planned out on self supporting or "No profit No less basis"; with the result that not expanditure on all the schemes worked out so far, would be of the order of only 3-4 lacs a year, the rest will only be a loan recoverable from the land owners.

SUBJECTS FOR PRELIMINARY DISCUSSIONS OF THE CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE JULY 8TH TO 11TH

SUBJECT NO. 6 IRRIGATION DEVELOPMENT

A summary of a report on the agricultural aspect of the Chambal Valley Project is attached.

This report prepared by Sardar Lal Singh, Member Irrigation & Power Team, as a result of site visits and intensive study and consultation with State Officers of Agriculture, Irrigation and Revenue Departments, is presented by the Team as an item of utmost importance.

At present, no exact data is available to indicate what specific areas will be served with irrigation facilities year by year. In the context of Storage water being available for irrigation in 1959-60, it is imperative that preparatory work as indicated in the recommendations be undertaken.

An urgent issue is the provision of additional supplies for what has been termed in the report as "Sugar Cane Belts". Although the exact quantity of discharge needed to be reserved for the fullest development of "Sugar Cane Belts" cannot be determined at this stage, it may be substantial enough to require modifications of the capacities of some of the distributory channels. Details of this should be determined at the earliest.

In respect of the issue of water-logging and land deterioration due to salts, action is called for adjusting water allowances and also localizing areas for the specific treatment that would be necessary to prevent any serious harm by water-logging and salt accumulation,

A close co-ordination of the Irrigation, Agriculture and Revenue Departments of the two States is called for so that timely action is initiated and effective follow-up provided in order to have the benefits from irrigation mature without time-log.

AGATCULTURAL ACTION OF CHAMBAL VALLEY PROJECT

The Irrigation a Power Team have gone through the draft report of Bardar Lal Bingh, Member Irrigation and Power Team and ex Director of Agriculture Punjab. The report deals with (a) present pattern of agriculture and likely changes as a result of irrigation (b) the series problems already existing or likely to arise with the advent of canal and (c) measures to be taken immediately. We have had further discussion on the subject and we fully endorse his views and proposals viz:

- (1) The present pattern of farming, which is of the poorest type from every aspect, is capable of undergoing revolutionary changes for the better with the supply of canal water provided the Agricultural Departments of the two States can solve numerous problems facing the cultivators. In fact even the very economic success of the Project will depend, not so much on mere supply of water to land, as on the extent to which suggested agricultural improvements are carried out under irrigation farming.
- (2) Rejeathen and Madhya Pradesh, being the outcome of the marger of small princely States which had done little research in agriculture and their Agricultural Departments are still in process of formation, they would take time to be able to give nuthentic advice even on such fundamental questions as the varieties of crops best suited under inrigated conditions, seed-rate, time of sowing, irrigated conditions, seed-rate, time of sowing, irrigational, cultural and manufal requirements etc. which have transhous effect on the yields of crops. Any one of the many items of improvements suggested, can bring about as much as or veven preater increase in yield than that, contemplated as a result of irrigation alone. Hence immediate necessity to carry out certain Agricultural Experiments given in appendix.

- (3) Verification of C.C.A. the oracically calculated and what naturally exists on the spot, as added for, for resons and income in the note, as in the event of appreciable difference, it may involve substantial changes in plans.
 - (4) There is danger of <u>Mater-logging</u> and accumulation of salt as a result of canal irrigation as explained at length in the note. This matter deserves immediate consideration, to avoid canal irrigation proving harmful in certain areas of Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.
 - (5) The problem of kankar layers and hard pan, met with in certain localities, deserve immediate consideration to determine irrigation practices to be recommended.
 - (6) Removal of permicious ber bushes, so severely infesting the land and which immensely depress crop yields does require immediate consideration along lines suggested in the report.
 - (7) Soil erosion which has already ruined about 30 percent of land in Rajasthan and which is equally bad in the Chambal Valley Areas of Madhya Pradesh, requires to be tackled at the highest level.
 - (8) We agree that Sugar Industry can contribute immensely to the economic well-being of these two States and it is an excellent idea to concentrate sugarcane production in certain areas called "Cane Belts" in order to obtain the highest yield of cane per acre and highest recovery of sugar from cane. The details of this require to be worked out.
 - (9) Likewise to by foundation of horticultural industry on soundest lines which has remarkable scope in these two States, the Agricultural Department should undertake "mass scale nursery production" of reliable varieties by taking advantages of the existence of a large number of fruit trees.of outstanding merits existing here

and there both in the gardens of erstwhile State Princes and others. Co-operative garden colonies scheme given in the report has are t potentialities - both in developing this industry on scientific lines and enabling retired persons to be productive numbers of the Society in rural areas.

- (10) Measures for storage of farm-yard manure in pits by vill years, composting of refuse in towns by Committees and green manuring practices to be followed by cultivators as recommended in the report, can certainly contribute to the maintenance of fertility of the soil.
- (11) Soil Sections of the two States should discuss and formulate definite plans and recommendations for soil management on the advent of canal irrigation, as un-controlled irrigation on sloping, uneven and undulating lands may do more harm than good so far as yields of crop are concerned; besides that tening soil erosion (sheet and rill type) which is already washing away the upper fertile soil.
- (12) Cultivators in these two States require to be assured that increased production of cereals (as a result of canalwater) would not unduly depress the prices of crops which may discourage the cultivators paying irrigation charges and more so the betterment fee etc.
- (13) Village Tanks of big size, existing in large number, should certainly be maintained and used as "Fish Tanks" or for other purposes mentioned in the report.
- (44) Now villages which are bound to arise in certain areas must be planned in advance (as done in the new canal colonies in West Punjab) if haphazard growth of villages is to be avoided; likewise the existing towns in the Chembal Valley Area (such as Theopere) are bound to expand intensely and their unregulated and haphazard growth will prove a curse if the matter is not immediately tackled.
- (15) Since (a) the people are accustomed to dry farming and remotely conversant with canal irrigation and are

undulating and uneven and (c) reckless or un-controlled canal irrigation on such lands can do more harm than good and (d) people in certain areas are also not very enthusiastic about canal water, some sort of effective propaganda or even legislation to popularish certain agricultural practices, which will prevent soil erosion and make best use of water and maintain the fertility of soil, soer indispensable.

- 16. Warabandi of the type practised in Punjab, and the absence of which in Madhya Pradesh, has already caused immense harm, requires to be popularised if eleventh hour chaos in irrigation practice is to be avoided.
- 17. At present canal department has no responsibility for construction and maintenance of main field channels but it would seem desirable to make canal authorities responsible for their construction and not maintenance due to uneven nature of soil and in-experience of cultivators. Even for the alighment of ordinary field channels they will require guidance for which canal authorities should make necessary preparations.
- optimum use of irrigation water, construction of <u>pucca</u> roads to develop the canal area and making it accessible even in Monsson Season when villages remain cut off, malarial problem, or co-operative farming as discussed in the report, deserve due consideration, if, of course, finances permit for work like pucca roads
- 19. Innediate steps to be taken to earmark area which are to receive irrigation year by year, and farmers to be informed accordingly in the interest of a phased programme by all concerned.
- 20. For the purpose of final decisions and implementation of schemes, it does seen necessary to have a <u>High Power Committee</u> of the type recommended in the report or other suitable arrangements. It is also obvious that if the proposals outlined in the report are accepted in principle, further details in some of the items will have to be worked out as discussed in the report.

CHAP EAL VALLEY PROJECT - AGRICULTURAL ASPECT.

Proceedings of the Meeting held by Shri N.V. Gadgil,
Leader of Irrigation and Power Team of the Planning
Commission, at the Raj Bhawan Dispal on the 23rd July 1957.

The survey report on the agricultural aspect of the Chambal Valley Project propered by Sardar Lal Singh Ex-Director of Agricultura, Panjab and discussed at the afficence havel and also subsequently with the Minister for Agricultura (M.P) at his residence, where some M.L.As., of Madhya Pradosh mere also present.
- 3. There was general agreement on all the recommendations made in Sardar Lal singh's report. In particular, the aspects mantismed hareanness were aspectations.
- 4. It was agreed unanimously which the secondaric success of Chambal Valley Project will denote upon the extent to which the agricultural problems referred to in the report are solved. Unless procedure a are taken to avoid the anticipated dangers and experimental work is done to find answers to the questions that will arise with the advent of canal irrigation, the canal irrigation may not only be as beneficial a proposition as is expected, but may in fact even prove a curse in certain areas by bringing above maker-logging or creating alkalimity problems or inchesing will previous.

- 1 argely accustomed to dry farming which is entirely different from that of wet farming, in so far as the varieties of crops or the agricultural practices are concerned and people will be so to be trained in the proper use of canal mater.
- It was agreed that the urgent experiments to be conducted should include (a) variatal trials on all important crops particularly wheat, cotton, sugarcane and paddy in order to determine the variation best muited under imigated ecaditions (b) cultural experimental much as seed-rate, manures, rotation, spacing, green-manuring as all those have tremendous effect on the yields of crops. For the above experiments necessary area of land is already available on three Gowernment Farms of 100 acres such, which have been started recently with the same object at Sheopur (Baroda) Jora and Bhind. At all these places irrigation water by: I well irrigation is already avoitable. At Bhind the water level being very low, experimental work during the initial two or three days may have to be done at Chimka Agricultural School where some area is already available and more can be acquired. As soon as canal water becomes available, most of the experimental work can be shifted to Phind farm.
- will necessarily have to be conducted at the above government farms. The total amount of expenditure required will be of the order of %.25,000/- for each farm per year in addition to the provisions already made or a total of about Rs.75,000/- per year for three Chambal Farms. In addition to the experiments on Government forms a considerable amount of experimental-cum-demonstration work must be undertaken on cultivators' private farms, firstly to confirm the results, obtained at Government forms and also for its propaganda value,

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and for trial of such simple experiments as optimum seadrate varietal trials, use of green manuring or fertilizers, time of sowing, rotation and spacing. For this a subsidy of Rs. 200/- or so will be required for each farm so that if 20 farms are selected for each of the three areas, the total amount required will be of the order of Rs. 12,000/-. In addition to this, in order to create confidence, in the mind of the cultivator on whose farm demonstrations are done that recommendations made by the department will not result in financial loss to him, it is necessary to give assurance to indemnify the cultivator in case of less- although it must be said on the basis of experience in other states that there is hardly any possibility of any such losses. demonstration plots, to be selected should be near market places or along road-sides, in the interest of maximum publicity. It was particularly omphasised by the Minister that it is not so much the need of water as its proper use which requires special amphasis during demonstration. Further, demonstration must be on private farms of representative types in size of holding, level of fortility and financial resources of the owner etc.

- Apart from the agronomic experiments referred to above, the research staff in the Agricultural Chemistry Section will have to be strengthened to earry out experiments on kankar layers and hard pan referred to in the report, which will necessitate an expenditure of about Rs.10,000/-per year.
- Department has already got special section for the purpose with six soil conservation units working in Madhya Bharat region alone but they are fully engaged in normal work.

 Accordingly extra staff and facilities will be needed for giving concentrated attention in Chambal Project command area. We consider that two units comprising 15 Buldozers

Valley Project should be provided, for which the estimates would be prepared in the course of a few days. The possibility of private enterprise taking up this work may also be examined.

In addition to above, giving of large areas of undeveloped waste lands to individuals or groups for purpose of development, for a period of 25 years with certain conditions including exemption from "ceiling" will also be considered by the State Govt. in as much as, it will expedite the development of the area increase agricultural production and supplement the financial resources of the State.

- Betterment levy: Step should be taken for enactment by 1958-59 of a law for imposing betterment levy so that the Act should be ready by the time irrigation starts. It was considered that it should be possible to increase the period and number of instalments for recovering. betterment levy.
- 11. <u>Gohad Tehsil:</u>— It was fully agreed that water-logging and alkalinity problems will assume a serious shape particularly in Gohad area if canal irrigation water is supplied without taking necessary precautions as referred to in the report, as has already been the bad experience both in this State as well as in other places. It will be unwise to treat this matter lightly.
- 12. Sugarcane Belts: The meeting endorsed the recommendation for creating special 'sugarcane belts' where sugarcane cultivation may be concentrated and sugar mills situated in the centre of cane area. This opportunity if not availed of immediately, would be lost for ever; and we suggest that a small Committee with one representative from Agriculture, Revenue, Industry, Irrigation, Co-operative Departments may

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be immediately appointed to select the creas for the purpose to iccate such areas before canals, distributories and minore are dug so that they could be so planned as to provide accessary amount of water for such a reas. The other question whether the mills are to be run on co-operative basis or by private parties should also be immediately sattled. So for as Agriculture Department is concerned, (after such areas are selected) necessary preparation will have to be made immediately for introducing suitable varieties of cane in that area. Horticultural Industry: The meeting supported the idea of developing horticultural industry, cold storage, fruit and vegetable preservation which have got very big scope and which can greatly help in the economic amelioration of the agricultural community. In this connection the Minister for Agriculture, commended detailed study of the componentive garden colony scheme started in the Punjab and also to discuse at length the desirability of starting a big commercial garden of a few thousands acres within which fruit preservation factory, cold storage etc. etc. may be installed. The cost and its details' should be worked out by the department promptly. What is immediately required is the production of nursery plants from trees of outstanding merit. Although the schome if it is run efficiently will ultimately become selfsupporting and Govt. will not have to suffer any loss in the a long tur, necessary provision will have to be made to start nursery work at the three government farms. One Morticultural Development Officer with three Assistants would be needed for survey, propaganda and advisory work.

14. Ber Bushes: The meeting agreed with, the observations made in the report, both in regard to the serious nature of this menace and the desirability of exterminating it. The Agriculture Department will take immediate steps to work out the comparative sest of eradicating it by weedicide or

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tractorisation, before any recommendation is made to the agriculturists.

- of green Manuring:- In order to encourage the practice of green manuring to maintain fertility of soil, the irrigation charges be waived on green manuring crops as recommended in the report and as practised in the Punjab. Further since the yield of milch enimals in Madhya Pradesh Is low on account of shortage of green fodder and poor breed, it would seem desirable to remit 50% of the irrigation charges in case of fodder crops like Berseem, Senji, shoftel etc.
- 16. Special Staff:- For giving concentrated attention to the development of Chambel Project Area, additional staff is urgently required comprising of one Chambal Development Officer of the status of at aleast Divisional Officer drawn from Agricultural Department with one Assistant Director and three Assistants in each of the three tracts in the commanded area for intensive development of sugarcane horticulture, cotton etc. supply of seeds and fertilizers and necessary guidance in all agricultural matters.
- in the report such as (a) layout of model villages on the pattern of canal colonies of West Punjab or some other approved pattern (b) preventing haphazard growth of townships in the area (c) improvement of reads and plantation etc.
- 18. Since change over from dry farming to wet farming would involve considerable expenditure on the part of the cultivators necessary financial accommodation in the form of loan would be necessary for which financial arrangements wither from Co-operative Banks or from other sources will have to be made.
- having a High Power Committee which should have the representatives of Planning, Agriculture, Revenue, Trrigation, Finance,
 Industry Departments of the State and the Flanning Commission.

This Committee should have the final power both in regard to planning and execution of schemes and for issuing financial sanction in order to avoid unnecessary delay as time factor is the assence of the success of the project, and any avoidable delay may defeat the objectives in view.

- 3. The detailed costs of schemes and their justification are given in the following pages. These schenes are now to be considered on September 11th at Bhopal in the presence of Director Agriculture, Secretary Agriculture Minister for Agriculture when the officials of the State Irrigation Department are also to be present, besides Minister for Irrigation.
 - 4. The total cost as given in Statement 10, during the first year (inclusive of non-recurring expenditure) amounts to Rs. 38.98 lacs and in subsequent years, Rs. 6.88 lacs per year. Since, however, the total cost en account of levelling detailed in statement 5 and that on account of connercial production of nursery plants as detailed in statement 6(B) would be recoverable in full (in fact in nursery production the income may far exceed the expenditure incurred) the net expenditure exceed the expenditure incurred) the net expenditure involved would only be of the order of Rs. 3 lacs in the first year and Rs. 2.33 lacs in each of the subsequent years.

I. Varietal and cultural experiments

The advent of canal irrigation must bring about radical changes, not only in the type of crops grown, but in the very pattern of farming or agricultural practices which are going to have tremendous effect on the income of farmers or even on canal revenue. It is, therefore, urgent that experiments should be initiated at once to find answers to at least some of the elementary but fundamental questions that would be asked such as (a) varieties of crops best suited under irrigated conditions, time of sowing, seed-rate, irrigational, manurial and cultural requirements, etc., which apparently looking trivial, have nevertheless tremendous effect on the yield. For instance variety alone may cause a difference of 100 per cent, or 5 to 10 mds. per acre in wheat alone; likewise other factors can depress or increase yield by 100%. Although, now one of the biggest states in India, Madhya Pradesh is, nevertheless, an cutcome of merger of a large of princely states --- many of them small ones, which cruld not have been expected to do much of research and development work for lack of funde and staff.

each already exist in three different tracts namely,

II. EXPERIMENTAL-CUM-DEMONSTRATION WORK

The superior varieties and cultural practices already being recommended by the "tate Agriculture Department and those which may emerge from the experiments at the three Chambal Farms, cannot diffuse far and wide among the cultivators unless they are demonstrated on their own fields. In order to popularize them in the shortest time, it is proposed to select 50 private farms in each of the three Chambal zones to demonstrate the varieties of various crops best suited to the locality, best time of sowing, proper seed-rate or spacing, best doses of fertilizers and their time of application, irrigation and cultural practices etc. etc.

=4_

This roughly represents one demonstration for every 10 equare miles. In conducting these demonstrations, the cultivator will have to incur extra expenditure by way of cost of seed of new varieties, manuring, additional labour for separately harvesting and thrashing the produce of numerous experimental plats of different crops such as wheat, paddy, sugarcane and cotton. It has been estimated that for the several demonstrations at each of the 150 farms of the cultivators, the total cost will on an average amount to Rs. 200/- each as subsidy. The total cost for the 150 centres will be Rs. 30,000/- (Statement II).

III. KANKAR LAYER AND HARD PAN

Since this trouble is met with in both the States - Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh, this experiment need not be conducted in both the States but can be carried out in Rajasthan alone.

On the other hand, with very limited staff (comprising of two Assistants only, working under the direct control of Agricultural Chemist) and with a contingency of about Rs.1000/- a month, a preliminary soil survey has been conducted which has yielded most useful information. It was not possible to undertake more than 150 profiles involving 1580 samples. While this preliminary work has given good indication of the distribution of soil types in the Commanded area, it cannot be considered adequate enough. It is,

therefore, desirable to continue the present work more extensively which can be done by increasing the present staff of 2 Ascistants to 4 with a contingency of Re.2,000/per month, so that the work is completed more thoroughly and in shorter period. The total cost involved would be as in Statement III.

IV. STUDY IN IRRIGATION PRACTICES

Considering that dry farming has been the general rule in the area coming under the Chambal Valley Project, and irrigation farming is not much understood, and much less the frequency, intensity and the proper time of irrigation for various crops when irrigation can yield best results, it

is necessary to carry out experiments on the water requirements of various crops under Madhya Pradech conditions. These investigations are exceedingly important as they will have great bearing on the proper use of water and productivity of land. The experiments will be conducted on Jora farm.

Not only would the yields of crops be compared under different systems of irrigation but the moisture content of the soil upto various depth after each irrigation would be noted to determine the right dose of water necessary to encourage the root system in each crop.

For this purpose a small staff and only a small contingency as given in statement No.IV, will be needed as the existing farm and crops growing on the same will be utilised.

V. IRRIGATION AND LAND DEVELOPMENT

Without proper levelling of land, canal irrigation is likely to do more harm than good, in as much as the crop on high lands will die for lack of moisture, and that in the suffer depression/due to excessive moisture. This does not hold good to the same extent in case of rainfed areas where level of land is of comparatively less importance. The land in Madhya Pradesh coming in Chambal Valley Project, is in many places, uneven and of undulating nature and it is extremely desirable to level this land in a manner that would make canal irrigation most fruitful. It is estimated that the total area requiring levelling would be 15 to 20% of the total area coming under irrigation or about 1 to 12 lac of acres of land altogether.

- 2. The State has got about 200 Crawler tractors and 50 wheel tractors, including 75 tractors in Madhya Bharat region alone. These tractors are at present utilised for the purposes of bunding, levelling, drainage and also for ploughing, cultivating, harrowing and jungle clearance work. None of these tractors can be spared for Chambal Valley Area as they are fully occupied; and in fact, they have more work than they can cope with.
- 3. Further, the type of work required to be done in Chambal Valley Area will be of some what different nature.

In the rainfed area the work of levelling is not of such great importance, as that of bunding to prevent erosion and to conserve moisture. On the other hand in the irrigated area of Chambal Valley, levelling work will be of far greater importance than bunding, in as much as, the canals distributeries, minors, village and even field channels, will serve the purpose of bunding to a considerable extent, so that major portion of the work will consist of levelling the land, although bunding may have to be done here and there, as also digging drainage ditches to allow surplus rain water to escape.

- 4. On the basis of previous experience in the State, levelling and a clight amount of bunding work is likely to cost on an average about Rs.50/- per acre which means a total expenditure of about Rs.50/- to 75/- lacs for 1 to 1½ lacs of acres, which, as referred to above, will be required to be levelled or developed for the purpose of irrigation. It is obvious that the somer this work is completed the better, both for the cultivator and the Government.
- 5. The State Agriculture Engineer for Madhya Bharat region is of the opinion that 6 units, each comprising 8 crawler tractors with necessary equipment as given in Statement No.5 would be necessary to complete the work in the course of 5-7 years. This will involve a non-recurring expenditure of about 28.48 lacs, with a recurring expenditure, about six lacs per year or a total of 34.49 lacs in the first year and about Re.24 lacs in the subsequent 4 years.
- from the cultivators in the course of 5 years i.e. Rs.10/-or so per acre per year, ultimately there will be no financial loss to the State, and this will only be a sort of loan.
- 7. The importance of this work cannot be too strongly emphasized in as much as, proper levelling of land would increase its productivity and enable the cultivators to

pay gladly the irrigation charges as also betterment fee. In the absence of this levelling, the irrigation may not produce such good results and may not increase crop yield and this may discourage the farmers to pay even irrigation charges and more so the betterment fee. Further, in the absence of levelling, there will be immense wastage of canal water which will be a great national loss, leave along the devastation of land as a result of water logging or soil erosion.

- 8. The alternatives suggested are:-
 - (a) The State Agriculture Department may undertake this work on the same lines as is being done at present in other parts of the State.
 - (b) C.T.O.may be asked to undertake this work on the assumption that they can spare their existing tractors and equipment for this purpose.
 - (c) Private agency may also be induced to undertake this work which will mean that the State will not have to incur much capital expenditure in the beginning, but will only serve as an agency to get the work completed by private agency, on behalf of the cultivators, and the State will pay the charges to private agency and recover the same from the cultivators as in (a).

(d) Half of the work be got done through private agency and half through Governmental agency - both of them serving as counter check on the efficiency and economy of one another and at the same time initial expenditure could also be curtailed.

VI - HORTICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT

of Sardar Lal Singh As explained at length in the report & Madhya Pradern coffers remarkable scope for horticul ural development with the advent of canal irrigation and this should go a long way to impreve the economic position of the farmers. Fruit gardening can, however, be a big industry, only if it is started on the right lines i.e. if the gardens are laid-out proporly and they are stocked with trees of outstanding merit and subsequently maintained in good health and protected against insect pests and diseases. Gardens require far greater care in the beginning than other crops do, because while in the case of crops, (mistakes in the matter of planting or selection of varieties etc.) can be easily rectified in the course of a fruit wear or so, this is not so in the case of/gardens where mistakes once committed, whether in the layout of the gardens or in the selection of varieties of nursery trees or in planting the same, can not be rectified during the life time of the trees which may be anything from 5 to 25 years or more. So, in the establishment or development of horticultural industry, State has moral responsibility to ensure that trees to be planted by "he prospective growers, are of the best varieties and the gardene are laid out in a systematic manner. This means a sumply of nursery plants of pedigree stock to the people at reasonable price, supplemented by advisory and extension work in the matter of fruit plantation. So the horticultural scheme has to be divided into three

- parts namely:
 - (a) Nursery Production: By taking budwood from trees of outstanding merit already existing in the State, either in Govt. Gardens, private gardens or in the gardens of cretwhile rulers. This scheme can be easily made, at least, self-supporting if not actually a paying concern, even if the plants are supplied to the public at half the market rate so that the expenditure as given in the statement amounting to Rs.1,46,250/- in the first year and about Rs.88,000/- per year in subsequent years would be a working capital which would be easily recovered by the sale of plants.

- (b) Staff for advisory work: For giving guidance to prospective fruit growers in laying out the gardens on proper lines. The cost as given in the statement works to about Rs.34,000/- per year.
- (c) Demonstration-cum-experimental gardens on three Government farms. These gardens will be established by securing plants of leading varieties of important fruits from all over India or even abroad, so that, in due course of time the Department is able to recommend varieties best suited for the state.

Fortunately, trees of good varieties of fruits of various kinds, are already met with in some of the private gardens particularly belonging to the erstwhile Rulers and they will be readily utilised for the purpose of propagating nursery plants for supply to the public. But there is also scope for getting ctill better varieties. And this object will be served by the experimental gardens proposed to be planted. After a number of years when these gardent come to bearing and comparative merit of each variety is determined, the Department will be in a position to give to the farmers nursery plants of the varieties found to be the best. The total cost (non-recurring) as will be seen in the statements comes to Rs.10,000/- per garden of 15 acres with annual recurring expenditure of Re.4,500 per garden per year or a total cost of Rs.30,000 (for three gardens) in the first year and Re.13,500 per year subsequently. It may be noted that after 5 years these gardens also will definitely be a source of big income to the State so that this expenditure is bound to prove a profitable investment even for the Government. begides doing enormous good to the public.

3. It may be mentioned that the Assistant Horticulture
Development Officer although shown under extension staff
would also have an overall charge of the experimental Gardens
and Commercial production of nursery plants. No Horticultural
Assistant is separately provided for the Experimental Gardens
as the one Horticultural Assistant provided in the nursery
scheme at each centre (whose pay will be debited to the
nursery account) will look after the garden work also. The area,

in-between fruit trees in the gardens, upto the time the trees come to a bearing stage, will be utilised for production of nursery plants and vegetable seeds etc. for sale to the public.

4. It may be noted that it is only in the case of coursery production, that capital cost on residential parters of Malic is provided for. This is because the work of nursery production will be of a permanent and of a Revenue-earning nature; and the residence of Malic on the spot will improve the efficiency of work. Meither any expenditure on bullocks and bullock-carts and nor the finding charges of the bullocks have been provided for an the bullocks and the carts available on the farms will be utilised for the purpose and the cost of their hire will be debited to the nursery account.

VII.STRENGTHENING OF DISTRICT STAFF FOR EXTENSION WORK.

District Morera and Bhind come under the Chambal commanded area. There is one Assistant Director of Agriculture for District Morena, and an Assistant Director Agriculture is soon to be appointed for Bhind District. According to present practice, each Assistant Director of Agriculture in the above Districts has two Agriculture Assistants and five to six Demonstrature for the Agricultural Extension work. This small staff which was considered sufficient before the advent of canal irrigation, will prove inadequate with the coming of canal water and the introduction of development schemes. It is necessary to add two more Agriculture Assistants in each District and the cost will be as under:-

VIII. PUBLICLTY AND PROPAGANDA SECTION:

Some of the effective methods employed to educate the farmers are audo-visualcids. Demonstration and Propaganda, Cinema Shows, Exhibition etc. Publicity also plays an important roll in education and acquainting the farmers about the Development Schemes and programmes. At present in

the Gwalior Division, there is no such section which takes care of this important work. In order to educate the farmers and to make Agricultural Development successful in the Chambal Commanded Area, it is proposed that a section to meet the above demands be provided. The following staff and equipment would be necessary for this section.

IX. OVERALL SUPERVISION AND COORDINATION OF WORK.

Since the development schemes in Chambal Valley Area would involve big expenditure amounting to several millions of rupees and fairly big staff including about a dozen Gazetted Officers, it is necessary to supervise and coordinate the activities of all sections and to remove hurdles that would frequently arise in day to day working. For this purpose an ideal course will be to appoint one Agricultural Development Officer of sufficiently high rank to command respect from all quarters. If this be not acceptable, then work can be entrusted to the Deputy Director Agriculture incharge of this Circle, and his staff strengthened by the addition of one Assistant Director of Agriculture with two Agricultural Assistants and necessary clerical help as given in the statement below at a total cost of about Re.19,000/-

X. OTHER PROBLEMS

Some of the items referred to in Sardar Lal Singh's report but the financial implications of which have not been worked out by the State Agriculture Department are given below along with our remarks on the same:

- 1. Need for verification of C.C.A.& G.C.A. The State Agriculturel Chemist says, with which of her members of the Department agree, that in some areas there may not be any great difference between the C.C.A. as calculated by the Canal authorities on the basis of Revenue record and the C.J.A. as actually available on the spot fit for irrigation. But there is likelihood of considerable difference between these two figures in certain other areas, especially where soil erosion is of severe type as in places like Ater in Bhind District and Ambah and Worena in Morena District. In case the difference between the two figures comes out to more than 10% in any place, it would be a matter of condiderable importance in the distribution of water or water allowance for crops in that area. As the matter is of considerable economic importance, we feel that a small Committee representing three Departments, namely Agriculture, Revenue and Irrigation, may be constituted immediately to undertake this work in particular areas where the difference is likely to be appreciable. 2. Water logging and high salt contents: In certain areas like Gohad and Mehgaon, this is undoubtedly a serious problem which requires immediate attention. But as this work is not entirely the concern of Agriculture Department but has to be tackled jointly
- 3. Consoldiation of Holdings: Although highly desirable from the point of view of agricultural production, efficiency and it economy in water use/is nevertheless a matter which pertains to the Revenue Department, which may express its opinion.

both by Irrigation and Agriculture Departments, the matter has

been left out for discussion by the Joint Committee of the two

Departments.

- 4. Pernicious Ber Bushes: This is a matter of great economic importance if canal water is not to be wasted and lands are to give reasonable crops. Since however the relative costs of eradicating it by weedicide or tractorication have not been worked out, we are not in a position to work out the cost or prepare a definite cheme. Further if levelling of the land is to be undertaken, on the scale envisaged in our scheme, most of the area now infested with ber bushes would be automatically cleared in any case. 5. Phased Programme: Irrigation Authorities consider that it will take 10 years before whole of the available water begins to be fully utilised by the cultivator. We feel this period can be condiderable curtailed if dufficient propaganda is immediately started on the lines indicated in our schemes and the proposals made by us are immediately implemented. 6. Commercial Fruit Garden: The Minister for Agriculture in the last meeting wished the Agriculture Department to plan out a big commercial fruit garden of several thousand acres not only for growing fruits and vegetables but also for establishing processing plants for canning of fruits and vegetables or manufacture of byproducts, cold storages etc.etc. and starting other subsidiary industries. This scheme cannot be worked out unless it is definitely known whether the private land are to be acquired for the
- 7. Sugar Industry: As regards recommendations in the report to encourage sugarcane cultivation in concentrated areas, in the centre of which sugar mills may be installed, the decision in the last meeting held at Bhopal which was presided over by Shri N.V. Gadgil and when the Minister for Agriculture was also present, was as under:-

purpose or some Government waste lands can be made available.

"A small Committee with one representative from Agriculture, Revenue, Industry, Irrigation, Co-operative Departments may be immediately appointed to select the areas for the purpose before distributories and minors are dug so that they could be so planned as to provide necessary amount of water for such areas. The other question, whether the mills are to be run on co-operative basis or by private parties, should also be immediately settled. So far as Agriculture Department is concerned, (after such areas are selected) necessary

preparation will have to be made immediately for introducing suitable varieties of cane in that area."

The Government is requested to constitute this Committee immediately.

8. Green manuring, composting and farm yard manure:

Government is requested to issue orders to waive irrigation charges in case of green manure crops provided they are ploughed under before the specified period. Likewise the previous Committee had recommended remission of 50% of irrigation charges in case of fodder crops like besseem, senji, shaftal in the interest of dairy development. These recommendations are also required to be implemented. In regard to the composting of refuse in cities and towns in the Chambal Valley Area, Government instructions are required to be issued forthwith to the Municipalities or Town Committees about leans, trenching ground etc.

9. Village tanks, pucca roads, planning new villages and Mandis, remodelling old town like Sheopur:

The recommendations already made in the report in connection with above matter require to be implemented by other Departments as they are beyond the purview of Agriculture Department.

10. Co-operative Garden Colonies Scheme:

As regards recommendations made in the report about Co-operative Garden Colonies Scheme, the last meeting at Bhopal presided over by the Minister for Agriculture had approved of the scheme in general but it was decided to depute somebody from the Agriculture Department to study the working of this scheme in Punjab before it is launched in the State. Two steps required to be immediately taken in this connection are (a) to depute a Team of two or three Officers to see the actual working of the Scheme in Punjab and (b) to find out where Government lands are available, either in Chambal Area or in other parts of the State, where this scheme can be taken up.

11. As regards recommendations of warabandi, construction of main channels, malarial problem etc. they concern Departments other than Agriculture.

12. High Power Committee:

The recommendation made in the last meeting presided_ over by Shri N.V.Gadgil when Minister for Agriculture was also present is as follows:-

"The meeting strongly feels the necessity of having a High Power Committee which should have the representatives of Planning, Agriculture, Revenue, Irrigation, Finance, Industry Departments of the State and the Planning Commission. This Committee should be the Linal power both in regard to planning and execution of schemes and for issuing financial sanction in order to avoid unnecessary delay as time factor is the essence of the success of the project, and any avoidable delay may defeat the objectives in view".

The Rajacthan Agriculture Department has made any additional recommendation which is as under:-

Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan States in connection with Chambal Valley Project, are common, it would be desirable to create a common Board consisting of representatives of both the States to consider the same and take decisions under the guidance of Cardar Ial Singh".

Such a Committee consisting of representatives of the two States Agriculture Departments would be useful in coordinating the work and exchange of useful information and avoiding duplication and checking upf the results of experiments in two States. The preliminary meeting chould be immediately called. This is particularly important in view of the common problems and also the remedial measures for various ailments from which the two states are suffering such as soil erosion, Kankar layer, eradication of weeds, lack of suitable varieties etc.etc. For instance, climatic and soil conditions etc. in Sheopur Area in Madhya Pradesh and in the adjoining Kotah District in Rajasthan are, more or less, similar and it would be futile to duplicate experiments of that Sheopur Farm can carry out one set of experiment and Rajasthan Farm another set of experiment with advantage to both the States. Likewise this Joint Committee can frame recommendations on several common matters for both the States.

Proceedings of the meeting held on 11-9-57 at 3 p.m. in the Office Room of Shri Takhat Mel Jain, Minister for Agriculture and Industries at Bhopal.

The proceedings of the meeting held at Gwalior on 6th ta 8th September, 1957 at technical level to discuss the financial implications of schemes and proposals contained in the report of Sardar Lal Singh on agricultural Aspect of Chambal Valley Project, were discussed in the meeting. These proceedings had been circulated to the members beforehand. Other problems (Item No.X), relating to departments other than Agriculture were taken up first.

In regard to the need for verification of C.C.. and G.C. the Chief Engineer Chambal explained at length that the areas unsuited for irrigation had already been left out of calculation and no less than 3 lacs of acres coming under

ravines or otherwise unfit for irrigation had been excluded. He expressed the belief that there would not be any great difference between the C.C.1 calculated on the basis of revenue records and the C.C.1. actually existing on the spet.

2. WATER L GGING AND SALE CONTENTS:

The meeting agreed that the Chief Engineer (Irrigation) should examine the problems in Johad and Mehgaen area and submit a report within a menth stating the measures to be adopted. It was further suggested that the canal and drainage programme in the whole Chambal Project area should go hand in hand and the Chief Engineer (Chambal) will take necessary action.

3. CONSOLIDATION OF HOLDINGS.

It was explained that this was already included in the Second Five Year Plan although it was deemed proper that the work of consolidation might be started in the area which is to come first under the irrigation project, in order to gain experience and demonstrate its beneficial results.

4.BER BUILDE.

The meeting reaffirmed the stand* taken on this point at the meeting held on 23rd July, 1957.

5. PHASED PROCELEME

The Chief Engineer Chambal stated that if the period of 10 years estimated by the Canal Authorities for full utilisation of water by the cultivators, could be reduced, it would indeed be most welcome as it will greatly improve the financial success of the scheme; and the necessary propaganda as suggested in the report hould be conducted to make the cultivators irrigation-minded.

6. COMMERCIAL FRUIT GARDENS:

The meeting agreed with the suggestion of bringing an area of five thousand acres or so under fruit plantation. The Chief Engineer Chambal stated that it would be possible to spare necessary area out of Government waste lands. The Agriculture Department was to select the area and to send up the proposals with financial implications of the same.

7. SUGAR INDUSTRY:

The meeting endorsed the recommendations made in the report of Sardar Lai Singh and suggested the appointment of a Committee comprising (a) Superintending Engineer, Chambal Canal Circle, Sheopur (b) Deputy Director of Agriculture, Gwalior Division (c) Sugarcane Development Officer (Industries Department) and (d) Agricultural Chemist - the terms of reference of the Committee being survey of the area with a view to select suitable sites from the viewpoint of (i) suitability of soil for sugarcane (ii) nearness to Railway Station (iii) abundance of water supply. The Committee would select 7,8 sites out of which 5 may be finally selected as Chambal Valley Area could easily feed five sugar mills.

8. Green Manuring:

The meeting realflamed the stand taken on this point at the meeting held on 23rd July, 1957.

9. Construction of Pucca Foad, Planning of New Villages and Mandis, Towns etc.

The meeting suggested that a Committee be appointed by the Government to work out the details.

10. Co-operative Garden Schemes:

The meeting agreed that a policy decision as to the section Agriculture or Co-operation under which this work has to be placed be taken first.

11. Warabandi & Construction of main channels.

As regards Warabandi referred to in the report, the

Superintending Engineer, Mr. Mani is to proceed to Punjab in the third week of this month to study the system there.

As regards the <u>construction of main channels</u>, it was deemed proper that while the main channels will be constructed by the villagers, the necessary technical guidance be made available by the Irrigation Department, Chief Engineer Chambal was to take necessary steps for the same.

12. HIGH FOWER COMMITTEE:

Secretary Agriculture will put up a note regarding the composition and the specific functions of the Committee.

As regards Joint Committee of Agriculture Departments of Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh, the proposal was deemed workable. It was suggested that a Committee be formed immediately to start functioning, as the exchange of views between the two State Agriculture Departments would be advantageous to both the States, both in the matter of economy and efficiency of work and avoiding duplication of efforts. The Secretary Agriculture will take necessary action.

After the items referred to above coming under Para X were disposed of, the financial implications of various schemes as worked out by the Technical Committee and numbered I to IX were seen and it was felt that these amounts will be outside the State Plan and it was understood that the Central Government may come for full assistance on all the items.

No.I - Varietal and cultural experiments on three Government Farms involving an expenditure of Rs. 52,000/- per year.

No.II - Experimental-cum-Demonstration work. One private demonstration farm, within an area of every 10 square miles, aggregating in all, 150 farms in three Zon's were to cost Rs. 30,000/- per year.

No.III - Kankar Layer and hard pan

- (a) There was no need of duplication and that this work need not be started here when Rajasthan agriculture Department was proposing to do it.
- (b) It was felt that the present staff engaged in Soil Survey and analysis work needs to be strengthened. The total cost will be Rs.59,000/- per year.
- No.IV Study in Irrigation Practices to determine the water requirement for various crops was to cost Rs.16,000/-per year.
- No.V Irrigation and Land Development: It was felt that in order to make the best use of irrigation facilities, the land must be levelled otherwise canal irrigation is likely to do more harm than good, if water is applied to uneven lands. This involves a total expenditure of Rs.34.5 lacs including Rs. 28.5 lacs non-recurring on purchase of machinery in the first year and about Rs. 6.8 lacs per year in subsequent years. Cost of levelling the land could be recovered from the owners. In regard to 3 alternatives whether:-
 - (a) the work should be done by the State Agriculture Department on the same lines as bull-dozing work.
 - OR (b) the work should be done by private agency.
 - OR (c) both Government agency and private agency, it was suggested that the Secretary Agriculture will get it examined at expert level.

No: VI - Horticulture Devokspment :

- (a) Production of nursery plants for supply to public involves an expenditure of Rs. 1,46,000/- in the first year and about Rs. 85,000/- per year in subsequent years.
- (b) Staff for advisory work would cost Rs. 34,000/-per year.
- (c) Establishment of demonstration-cum-experimental gardens on three Government Farms will cost Rs. 30,000/- in the first year and Rs. 13,000/- per year in subsequent years.

The above items were deemed proper.

No: VII & IX - Strengthening of District Staff for extension work in A riculture: Overall supervision and coordination of work:

The technical Committee meeting at Gwlior suggested the appointment of a Development Officer of a high status, or to entrust this work to the present Deputy Director of Agriculture, Gwlior, and strengthen his staff. However, it was deemed proper to have a special staff for Chambal area alone if funds permitted.

No: VIII - Publicity and Propoganda Section: It will involve an expenditure of Rs. 50,000/- in the first year and Rs. 20,000/- per year in subsequent years.

Ber Bushes: The meeting agreed with, the observations made in the report, both in regard to the serious nature of this menace and the desirability of exterminating it. The Agriculture Department will take immediate steps to work out the comparative cost of eradicating it by weedicide or tractorisation, before any recommendation is made to the agriculturists.

Green Manuring: In order to encourage the practice of green manuring to maintain fertility of soil, the irrigation charges waived on green manuring crops as recommended in the report and as practised in the Punjab. Further since the yield of milch animals in Madhya Pradesh is low on account of shortage of green fodder and poor breed, it would seem desirable to remit 50% of the irrigation charges in case of fodder crops like Berseem, Senji, Shaftal etc.

My dear Shri. Lal Singh,

Many thanks for your letter No. COPP/I&P/III dated 19/20--11-57. I am sorry to learn that you have been down with heart attack. I hope that you will recover quickly and attain the normal state of health soon.

2. Shri. Char, Chief Engineer, Chambal and I accompained by the Superintending Engineers and Executive Engineers concerned inspected the commanded area of Bhind Canal System. In the Gohad and Mahgaon area Rabi crop is doing as well as anywhere else in the commanded area. A few patched of usar with white salts on top are there, as I had witnessed with a much higher intensity in Manipuri, Etawah and Cawmpur districts of the U.P. when I was Exective Engineer Canals at Etawah. There even, though the spring level during monsoons came up quite close to ground level but there was no water-logging problem and, crops did quite well except on those patches which were belived to be due to lack of underground drainage owing to underlying kankar layers. To my mind this appears to be a case of absolute lack of drainage facilities. Wherever irrigation is introduced and the country is a flat as this tract, it is absolutely essential to have a suitably laid out drainage system to dispose of rain water and the seepage water. Shri Char and I have agreed that ample provision will be made in the proposals for remodelling Bhind to provide and elaborate drainage system. Also I have issued instructions that a record of spring levels in the wells in this tract should be maintained. Both, depths of water levels from ground level and their reduced levels should be recorded twice. A year, once before the monsoon in May and again after the monsoon in October. Besides I am requisting Dr. Mehta, to study subsoil conditions upto 10 ft. depth in Gohad and Mahgaon areas with a view to a scertain the nature of the soil contents with particular reference to the presence of salts, and the perviousness as related to underground drainage. I understand from Dr. Mehta that provision for such studies has already been made as item No.III in the proposals framed under your advice, in the meeting of 6th to 8th December at Gwalior.

3. I am enclosing herewith a copy of Shri, R.J.Dhumal, Dy. Chief Engineer's inspection note of 28.9.57 in this connection.

- The Agriculture Department has prepared a statement of soil analysis for the area falling under the Chambal canal in this tract. The statement was studied and some spots were visited.
- 2. Bara Area: The village worstly affected by the stagnant water pends of rains and anal water were seen. It is possible to drain off this area after completing the contour survey. The country is so flat that the ground slope is one foot per mile. It is very difficult to trace natural drainage lines. Artificial drains can be constructed and the drainage would be discharged in the Baisly River which is situated at a distance of 5 to 10 miles from the canal system. Sub soil water level of wells after taking readings in this area which is mostly submerged in rainy season, was also nated. The sub-soil water level is from 4 ft. to 10 ft. below ground level in certain localities which are adjacent to the standing water either due to rains or wastage from the water courses.

3. Area near Khander and Nibrol villages on Gohad Mho road:

This area is not under the command of the existing Bhind canal, but it will come under the renodelled Bhind canal in connection with the Chambal Canal Scheme. There were stagnant pools of water due to recent rains and the water level in the wells was from 3 ft. to 5 ft. below ground level.

4. Pipandi, Kanipura and Tehra area:

The canal was running full for paddy crops and fields were full of water as the Irrigation was in progress. The water in the adjoining wells was 4 ft. below ground level.

The area around Mehgaon and Gohad is very flat. In heavy rains when the fields get flooded with water they are not drained off for days together. In many places natural drainages are not existing and the ground slope is also very flat and obstructed by the embankment of the road or the railway or the canal.

- by breaching cannals which is no doubt very objectionable especially in Chandokher, Sherpur and Br. distributory area. This is already a saline crea.
- 7. To minmise the effects of seepage from canal the present Bhind Canal needs lining in Usar (Saline) soil portions.
- The area could be improved by providing claborate drainage system. It is desirable that surveys should be taken up by the Chambal Scheme suth orities along with the remodelling of Bhind canal system. Only in places where seepage and stagnant water is excessive as stated in para 6, drainage of the area could be executed by the Executive Engineer, Bhind. Remaining areas will have to be carefully surveyed and efficient drainage system will have to be designed along with the remodelling of the Bhing canal by the Chambal Organisation. The Chief Engr. Irrigation, has already suggested to get the area surveyed through the Director, Surveys Deptt., Government of India.
- 9. In Usar area, tube wells should be tried and when these are successful, irrigation from canal water should be stopped.
- 10. Drainage culverts should to constructed where road railway and canal embankments obstruct the rain water flow and waste has to pass along the fields to a longer distance parallel to the obstructions, till they meet some drainage crossings.
- 11. The Chambal Organisation should be requested to survey the Bhind canal area alongwith the remodelling of the Bhind canal and to provide suitable measures for the drainage of this area.

At some points as mentioned in para 6 where drainage arrangements are to be provided by the department, first phase estimates of these schemes should be submitted, by the Superintending Engineer as early as possible.

In Gohad and Mehgaon tract the patches of saline soils were in existence long before the conal was constructed. Even salt was also being manufactured by villagers in old days from some of the saline spots in the area. Water level in the wells in most of the area is very low. Only in few places near stagnant pools of water the water level in the wells in high. Even in this area the out-turn of crop is still not affected at present it is likely to be affected in future. The area which may show signs of water logging is confined in some isolated patches near the pools of water. The drainage arrangement for such areas is necessary. The saline areas which were in existence long before the canal was constructed were not considered suitable for cultivation. Recently some paddy cultivation is started in the saline area by Punjabi cultivators. It will be better to have the area investigated by Chambal Organisation in connection with the surveys and projects of remodelling of Bhind Canal.

The report prepared by Sardar Ial Singh, Member Irrigation & Pewer Team, Planning Commission, on agricultural aspect of Chambal Valley Project was discussed at length both in the Forenoon and in the Afternoon. After each and every item was explained at length, the Members discussed and fully supported all the observations, recommendations and proposals contained in the report.
- 3. In connection with the phased programme, the Director of Agriculture felt, and all other Members agreed with him, that the period of 10 years estimated by the Canal Department for full utilization of canal water was too long and it could be curtailed by 4 years, if not mare, provided of course that necessary facilities and requirements of the schemes are made available to enable the Agriculture Department to implement them. The Director of Agriculture further suggested that since a number of agricultural problems facing both Madhya Excelect and majorthan States in connection with Chambal Valley Project, are common, it would be desirable to

to create a common Board consisting of representatives of both the States to consider the same and take decisions under the guidance of Sardar Lal Singh. This suggestion of the Director was supported by all Members.

Further the a riculture Department of Rajasthan fully agree with the views expressed in the report of S. Lal Singh that even the very financial success of the Chambal Valley Project would be in jeopardy unless the agricultural problems referred to in the report, are attended to - in fact the extent of success of the Project will depend upon the extent to which the suggestions given in the report are implemented.

It was further decided that the financial implication of each scheme may be worked out, after the report has been discussed with the Hon'ble Minister for Agriculture this Afternoon.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE MEETING

The report of the Technical Committee was placed before the Minister of Agriculture where the Agriculture Secretary, the Director of Agriculture and the Deputy Director of Agriculture were present. All the aspects of Chambal Valley Project were discussed which were explained in very great detail by Shri Lal Singh, Member Irrigation & Power Team, Planning Commission. The report of Shri Lal Singh is a very learned discourse on various aspecto of agricultural improvements that have to be brought about in the Cultural Commanded Area of the Chambal Project. All the proposals, recommendations and ebservations regarding agriculture that have been made in the report are generally approved of. Although it may be beyond the financial resources of the State Government to implement all the suggestions that have been given by Shri Ial Singh Ji yet it was strongly felt that unless those suggestions are implemented, Project may not prove a boon to the cultivators. The Minister of Agriculture, however, desired that financial implications of these schemes may be worked out by Agriculture Department in concultation with Shri Ial Singh Ji.

It was strongly felt that we must post the Publicity Section immediately in the Kotah Barrage in order to educate the cultivators and also make them canal conscious. Unless this is done the cultivators may not take full advantage of the irrigation facilities. This suggestion of Rajasthan Government was agreed to by Shri Ial Singh.

It will be appreciated if Shri Ial Singh Ji could pay more frequent visits to Rajasthan to advise us on various aspects of agriculture in Chambal.

COMMITTEE ON PLAN PROJECTS (Irrigation & Pover Team)

Minutes of the Meeting with Representatives of Rajasthan Government held at 9 A.M. on the 15th September 1957 in the Multi-storeyed Building, Queen Victoria Road, New Delhi.

Shri N.V. Gadgil, the Leader initiated the discussions by pointing out that the utilisation aspects of both power and water were not gone into sufficient detail and the later subject only was intended to be discussed at this neeting. He pointed out that Irrigation & Power Team's approach in the natter had been already discussed with Madhya Pradesh

Government and the same procedure was to be followed for Rejasthan for obtaining the State Government's approval, subject to any amendments that they might like to suggest in the course of discussions.

Shri Lal Singh made it clear that the proposals were 2. already finalised with the Madhya Pradesh Government in a meeting which was attended, besides the Minister for Agriculture and Industries and the Minister for Irrigation, by the Secretaries and Heads of Departments concerned. He further explained that so far as Rajasthan was concerned, gricultural problems had been discussed in a meeting attended by the Ministers, ecretaries and the officers of Irrigation and Agriculture Departments and they had approved of the recommendations and proposals contained in the report. The financial implications of the proposals were being worked out. The object of the present meeting as to secure the opinion and approval of the Chief Minister to the recommendations contained in the report. Shri Lal Singh explained briefly the salient points made out in the report. He exphasised that agriculturists in Kotah-Bundi area commanded by the Chambal Project, were accustomed to depend on rainfall and the rainfall being ample the Kharif crops were successfully grown without much artificial irrigation. He expressed the opinion that it would be too optimistic to assume that the cultivators would readily take to the use of canalwater for irrigating kharif crops and pay water rates. If they were expected to pay water rates and betterment fees, they need to be convinced about the better yields resulting from canal irrigation. This would require effective demonstration and propaganda based on the results of ctual experiments. He referred to the tremendous scope for developing horticulture in Rajasthan since the climatic conditions were very favourable, besides plentiful supply of canal water. He sug ested that production of nursery plants of reliable varieties could be undertaken on a self-supporting basis even if the plants were to be supplied to the farmers

at a price lower than that charged by private nurserymen.

- Shri Lal\Singh dwelt on the possibility of development of sugar industry - both cane production and sugar manufacture, which had enormous scope in Rajasthan due to good soil, suitable climate which is from from frost and ample supply of canal water. He proposed the creation of 'sugarcane belts' for intensive cultivation of sugarcane, after a careful study of soils availability of irrigation water, marketing facilities and railway communications etc. had been undertaken. Since sugarcane required much more water than most other crops 'sugarcane belts' will have to be provided a large quantity of irrigation water from the very beginning. This will, of course, bring greater return to Government on account of higher irrigation charges on the area under sugarcane crop which incidentally will help in the prosperity of the area. He also stressed the need for corrying out experiments like varietial traials to determine the varieties of crops best suited under irrigated conditions as also their irrigational and manurial requirements, seed rate etc. referred to the possible troubles due to the existence of kankar layer and hard pan at many places and the need for carrying out experiments.
- 4. When asked by Shri G dgil as to what the experience of Rajasthan Government was in this respect, the Chief Minister Rajasthan replied that experiments in this regard had not yet been completed. Shri Lal Singh further referred to the problem of water-logging and alkalinity in parts of Rajasthan even though this problem was more serious in certain areas of Madhya Pradesh. Shri Balwant Singh reported that these problems were not likely to be of a serious nature in the Chambal area. Shir Lal Singh said that examination of about 20% of the existing wells had indicated that there was likelihood of this trouble in some areas and he wanted that 30% of the wells may be brought under examination in order to get a better idea of the extent of these problems. This was greed to.

- 4. Shri G dgil expressed enxiety that all those experiments should be completed by the end of June 1959 so that results thereof could be aplied on the fields when water would be available for irrigation. He assumed that the Government of Rajasthan had agreed to the formation of sugarcane belts. He proposed that useful information regarding the 'amount of water required for sugarcane cultivation should be ascertained from the Bombay Government as cultivation of sugarcane was done, on a fairly large scale in that State. Shri Lal Singh was requested to supply to Rajasthan Government a list of detailed items to which the Madhya Pradesh Government had agreed to.
- 5. Shri Mohan Lal Sukhadia Chief Minister Rajasthan generally agreed with the suggestions and proposals made in the Report. He added that the Rejasthan Government will have to approach the Central Government for extra funds and necessary smetion for utting up sugar mills in the area.
- Shri N.V. Gadgil concluded that the Planning Commission will have to be approached for such extra grants after the financial implications of the schemes had been workedo out in some detail. He thought that normally there should be no difficulty in securing the necessary grants provided the schemes were not of large magnitudes.

Since the Chief Minister Rajasthan and Leader,
Irrigation & Fower Team had to love the meeting to attend to
some other urgent work, they asked the remaining Members to
continue discussion on technical aspect of the report, also
to work out the financial implications of the schemes and to
secure as far as possible, unanimity of opinion between the
Irrigation & Agriculture Departments of Rajasthan on various
matters referred to in the report. Accordingly the matters
pertaining to both Irrigation and Agriculture Departments
were taken up first:

1. Water-logging and high salt contents. It had already been agreed to, previously in the meeting, that since the examination of 20% of the existing percolation wells had disclosed high salt content in sub-soil water and high ground water level in certain areas, which were of disquieting

nature, it was desirable to intensify this work, so as to include examination of about 50% of the existing wells to secure more reliable and authentic information and this matter be teken up immediately.

- 2. Need for verification of C.C... in Kotah Area: Although Chief Engineer (Shri Foti Ram) felt that there was not likely to be very great difference in the C.C.A. as (a) theoretically calculated by Irrigation Department on the basis of figures from revenue record and (b) what actually exists on the spet, yet there was no harm in investigating this matter further; and for this purpose a Committee of two persons namely Agricultural Chemist Rajasthan and a Representative of Irrigation Department (to be nominated by Shri Moti Ram) may go into this matter. They may compare the figures, as obtained from revenue record, with these compiled by the Agricultural Chemist as a result of his survey about the irrigability of various lands. The work is to be undertaken immediately so that if there is found to be any appreciable difference between the two figures, needful could be done before the construction of distributories and mirors in certain specified acreas.
- 3. Hard Pan and Kankar Layers: Both Irrigation and Agriculture Departments agreed on the need of carrying out the experiments as referred to in the report.
- 4. <u>Soil Ercsion</u>: It was unanimously agreed that this problem was of a most serious nature and requires to be given top-most priority. But since this is a problem not entirely concerned with Chambal Project, the matter may be taken up separately.
- 5. Ber Bushes: Both Departments agreed that removal of this pernicious bush which is a serious pest, will certainly help in better utilisation of canal water.
- 6. Phased Programme: The Canal authorities consider that it would take 10 years before available water begins to be fully utilised by the cultivators. If this period can be curtailed by means of necessary propaganda or publicity as suggested in the

report, the Irrigation Department would naturally welcome every such proposal as this will still further improve the financial aspect of Chambal Project.

- 7. Horticulture Industry and Sugarcane Belts: Irrigation authorities agreed with Agricultural Department about the scope of development of horticulture and sugar industry referred to in the report, and with the proposal of ear-marking suitable areas as "sugarcane helts" where intensive cultivation of sugarcane may be resorted to, with sugar-mills installed in the centre of cane areas. The Chief Engineer stated that if such areas are immediately ear-marked, his Department will have no difficulty in arranging enhanced supply of water for such areas, if necessary by suitable modification in the capacities of the minors or distributories concerned. Likewise for fruit gardening also which requires greater supply of water than usual field crops do, the Canal Department will have no difficulty in arranging necessary supply.of water.
- 8. Green manuring: Irrigation Department agreed with the Agriculture Department to the recommendations made in the report to remit Irrigation charges in full in the case of green manure crops to maintain fertility of soil and to charge only 50% irrigation rates in case of fodder crops like senji, berseem and shaftal in the interest of Dairy Industry and animal husbandry.
- The Canal Department agreed with the Agriculture
 Department on the need for developing the lands by levelling,
 contour bunding etc. so as to make them fit for flow

Development of land to make it fit for irrigation:

irrigation. All Members agreed that if any scheme on the lines planned out in Madhya Pradesh whereby lands could be developed and cost recovered from the land owners through easy instalments, could be started in Rajazthan also, it

should immensely help in utilising canal water most profitably, to the advantage of both the cultivator and the Government.

- 10. In regard to construction of main field channels; it was agreed that while this work cannot be undertaken by the Irrigation Department and it must remain the responsibility of the villagers themselves, yet technical guidance must be provided by the Irrigation Department so that the channels are aligned and laid out properly.
- 11. Financial implications of schemes: After the matters pertaining to both Agriculture and Irrigation Departments were gone over, the financial implications of various schemes which had already been submitted by the Director of Agriculture were considered. After some discussion, it was decided that Rajasthan Agricultural Department be supplied with copies of schemes alongwib their financial implications, as alreadly finalised in case of Madhya Pradesh. After these were studied by the Agriculture Department, fresh schemes alongwith their financial implications would then be put up by the Rajasthan Agriculture Department for consideration. Sadar Lal Singh agreed to supply copies within a course of two, three days.

Plant Protection Work.

Seven lac acres coming under Chambal Valley Project, grow at present ordinary kharif crops like bajra, jowar, maize and rabi crops like also and wheat which, due to inadequate supply of moisture in the soil, give at present very poor yields. With the advent of canal irrigation not only would the yields of the present crops go up, and there will be more intensive cultivation but new cash crops like sugarcane, cotton, vegetables, potatoes, chillies etc. would also be introduced and extensively grown.

The unfortunate experience in most places has so far been that the introduction or nultiplication of better varieties also bring, in their trail, new insect pests and diseases, or such pests as already exist, greatly multiply on account of favourable atmosphere under irrigation farming. This is best illustrated by an example of one sugarcane borer alone known as Gurdaspur borer. It was once confined to a small area in Punjab but, with the introduction of some sugarcane varieties, it also got introduced in areas like Jagadhri where it did not exist previously and it has become the greatest menace not only in Punjab but even in U.P. area adjoining Punjab and is already doing damage to the extent of crores of rupees a year. Likewise red rot disease of cane which at one time could be easily controlled, is causing heavy damage over lacs of acres, and we are paying heavily for our neglect. Likewise there are many other diseases of fruits and vegetables that can nultiply greatly with the extension. In fact according to the Plant Protection Officer Rajasthan this area has already got some serious pests and dieeases to deal with such as grass hopper, field rats, some sugarcane pest's, pink bott worn in cotton and cut work in potatoes, canker on citrus trees, fruit rot in chillies, grain smut in jowar etc. etc.

Since prevention is always better than cure, and timely action can nip the mischief in the bud, it would be desirable not only to prevent the introduction of new pests and diseases when new crops are introduced; but also prevent those already existing, from multiplying under favourable conditions. It would therefore appear desirable to have a Special Plant Protection Staff in this area for this purpose i.e. not only to ensure that the seeds, plants and cuttings, particularly new sugarcane seed for sowing as also fruit plants imported from other States, are free from insect pests and diseases but whenever any serious pests appears in anylocality, immediate steps be taken to control the same. amount of expenditure on this work is bound to repay hundred folds and save heavy damages later on. It may induce the growers in due course of time, to resort to spraying or dusting against various pests and dieases at their own expense. The total cost on plant, protection work will be of the order of Rs. 12 lacs during first year (inclusive of Rs. 50,000/- as non-recurring) and about a lac of rupees per year subsequently (per statement attached herewith).

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SCIL EROSION & LAND DEVELOPMENT FOR IRRIGATION

Soil erosion is a problem of intense magnitude and of great urgency - in fact more serious than perhaps all other problems put together, and requires herculean efforts. In Rajasthan State, gullies and revines alone measure 1540 miles, covering 500 square miles besides large areas croded by nallahs, and this devastation is increasing day by day and it will be suicidal for the State to ignore it. Methods of controlling it, although well known, are expensive and beyond the resources of the State and Central assistance is urgently called for.

Need for levelling lands:-

Since however soil erosion is not confined to area coming under Chambal project only (although carfal water will haston surface erosion in case of uneven lands) this matter is proposed to be taken up separately as it concerns the State as a whole. Accordingly, in our schemes, we have incouded expenditure only on such items which are directly concerned with canal project and are urgently required to be undertaken in order to make lands fit for irrigation. For instance unless levelling is done in certain areas, canal irrigation may prove, not only useless but, actually harmful. By levelling land the utility of canal water will be greatly enhanced.

Area requiring levelling.

According to the survey carried out by Agricultural Chemist, out of 7 lacs of acres coming under Chambal Project in Rajasthan, about 6 lacs of acres have a slope of 1 per cent (i.e. less than 1' slope per 100 feet.). This estimate is based on the soil conservation survey where the slope percentage has been determined by hand already levell. Any slope greater than this, is considered harmful both from the view point of soil erosion and proper utilisation of canal water. The total area with slope of 1 to 3% is of the order of 80,000 acres and area with slope of 3 to 7 per cent is about 14,000 acres or a total of about 94,000 acres or roughly 1 lac of acres.

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At present under rain-fed conditions, both in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh, bunding is considered of the greates importance but under changed conditions of canal irrigation, bunding will become of secondary importance in as much as, canals, distributories, minors, village and field channels will, to a certain extent, se we the purpose of bunding so although bunding may still be required in certain areas after the advent of canal system, yet levelling of land or terracing will assume greatest importance.

Levelling of land by cultivators or by Government.

The next question discussed was whether this work of levelling lands to make them fit for canal or flow irrigation, could be left to the sweet will of cultivators alone (the Agriculture Department only supplying necessary technical guidance) or the work be done by Governmental Agency and cost recovered from the land owners as in being done at present on extensive scale by Bombay and Madhya Pradesh Agriculture Departments in regard to bunding. After a through discussion. it was felt that although there should be every encouragement to a land owner to level his own land if he so desires. yet the State must step in, to ensure the completion of this The best interests of the State demands that this work should be done by the State Agriculture Department and cost recovered from the land owners - Option of course being left to the cultivators so that there should not be any element of compulsion.

Levelling by buildozers or bullock implements.

The next question discussed was whether this work should be done with the help of bull-dozers or by manual labour i.e. scrapers and scoopers drawn by bullocks. Both these systems have got certain advantages and disadvantages. Levelling by bull-dozers is likely to be more economical and also more expedient or quicker than scooping by bullocks. Further, scooping by bullocks can only be carried out, at the most for 3 to 4 months in a years, as the soil in the absence of ganal water would be hard and would not prove workable.

Whereas bull-dozing can be done throughout the year except in rainy season. There would also be the question of training a large number of villagers in the art of scraping and a large number of scrapers and scoopers will also have to be purchased. On the other hand, bull-dozing has the disadvantage in that, foreign exchange to buy equipments in a serious problem. After a great deal of discussion, it was decided that both the methods should be tried as complimentary to one another. Wherever scooping by bullocks is possible, this may be done, and wherever it is absolutely necessary, bull-dozers may be used. Wherever scraping by bullocks is carried out, the cultivator would have the option to supply his own bullocks and the Department would be charging the remaining cost of operation, i.e. wages of trained men and supervision In the case of 14,000 acres, where slope is of the order of 5-7 ft. work will have largely to be done by bulldozers. In otherwords, bull-dozers will be used largely in the area where fall is very steep but they will al ? be used in other areas in conjunction with bullock drawn scrappers.

Cost of Levelling to be recovered from land owners. may be mentioned that the Agriculture Department. Rajasthan, has already got three bull dozers which at present are used to level the land on behalf of the cultivators and to recover the cost in advance; so the Department has already got a certain amount of experience both in handling bull dozers and scrappers. Accordingly this new work should not present any unsurmountable difficulty, either in regard to the actual running of the scheme or in the realisation of the dues from the cultiva-These bull-dozers cannot however be spared for Chambal area as they have already more work than they can cope with. Meed for subsidy. It must, however, be made clear that although every effort will be made by the Agriculture Department to make the scheme self supporting yet both the Central and the State Governments must be ready to incur certain amount of loss which may not exceed 25% of the total cost.

IT will be north while for the Governments to incur this in view of the fact that land will produce more foodgrains than would otherwise be the case if land is left as such and secondly the Government will get irrigation charges which may otherwise be lost and the cultivators would be enabled to have full use of the water and get greater income. This scheme deserves as much concession on subsidy as is allowed by Government in numberous other schemes like subsidy on percolation wells, small irrigation tanks etc. etc.

Total Cost.

Whether the work is to be done by bull dozing as to scapers or by both the mothods, financial implications of this work remain more or less the same, i.e. the total expenditure of Rs. 30 labbs would be needed-to level I labb of acres. As to what proportion of this expenditure should be on account of bull dozingor by scapers, can be left for some time as we gain experience. For the present, it is suggested that only three bull dozers may be purchased which would in any case be the minimum number even if the work is to be done by both the systems, and the numberoof scoopers will also be got prepared, and required number of men trained for the purpose. The work will be started simultaneously by both mathads, the comparative cost worked out and work expended in one direction or the other, as experience is gained. The statement attached herewith shows the cost of three bull-dozers with necessary attachment which amounts to Rs. 5,67,000/- non-recurring and Rs. 1,50,000 crecurring per year or total of Rs. 9,67,000 in three years (say Rs. 10 lacs in four years).

The remaining amount of Ps. 20,00,000/- will remain at the disposal of the Agriculture Department to be utilised for purchase of bulldozers or the bullock drawn scrapers as the case may be.

scrapers as the case may be. Details of recurring and nonrecurring can only be worked out after the decesion is taken on
the experience of one years working of both methods of Soil

(1) Intensive work in general agriculture, particularly sugarcane development.

Apart from purely experimental work on various orcps, referred to previously, to find answers to many questions that will be asked by farmers on the advent of canal irrigation, it is necessary to carry out intensive work in general agriculture and particularly in the development of certain cash crops like sugarcane and cotton and to popularise certain agricultural practices. The present District Staff require to be strengthened by the appointment of one Assistant Director of Agriculture with usual subordinate staff at a cost of Rs.65,000/- (including Rs.18,750/- on nonrecurring) in the first year and about Rs.46000/- subsequently per year as given in the statement attached herewith. This very staff would look-after "Sugarcane Bolts" to be croated and to do intensive propaganda for cultivation on right lines.

Demonstration trials on cultivators' fields.

ments and collection of detailed date, would be largely carried out on five experimental farms but simple type experimental-cum-demonstration work would also be carried on private farmers' fields partly to confirm results obtained on experimental farms and partly to demonstrate the benefits of certain agricultural practices. Such demonstrations on private farms have been found very impressive and fruitful in every State. On the basis of fifty private demonstration farms for each Agriculture Assistant and an average expenditure of Rs.100/- on each farm, total expenditure would amount to Rs.20,000/- per year.

Investigation of marketing conditions in the Chambal commanded Area.

With the development of irrigation in the Chambal Area, the production potentials will increase immensely. will the yields of crops already grown, increase greatly but new crops, (grown scarcely hitherto like sugarcane, cotton, vegetables, fruits etc.) Will also be grown extensively. I This will necessitate the establishment of Mandis or Markets. According to our experience in Punjab new caral colonies. markets or mandis of enormous sizes handling farm produce worth crores of rupees, had come into existence in places where none existed before the advent of canal irrigation. In order to avoid haphazard location and growth of mandis or markets, it is necessary to plan out everything before hand; and for this purpose it will be desirable to appoint couple of men to undertake thorough survey of the whole area and estimate roughly the total produce of each commodity lively to be available, best places for markets, with due regard to transport facilities both by rail and road and convenience of the cultivating community etc. After the necessary information is collected in the course of six months or at the most one year, further steps will be taken to ensure that madis are located in suitable localities and growth of madis is also regulated and warehouses for storage of agricultural produce are constructed properly and at right places and marketing of agricultural produce started on co-operative basis from the very beginning. As already mentioned, for the present, a provision for only couple of investigations with necessary clerical halp and travelling allowance, has been made as per statement attached - the total cost being about Rs. 9,000/- or so for the year as under:-

Senior Officer in over all charge:

In view of the fact that the officer in over all incharge of the work in Chambal Area, would have work of very great responsibility, both in regard to finences involved and research and development work to be undertaken, and he will have to coordinate the activities of half a dozen officers besides looking after the research work of all the five experiemental farms, a senior officer of the Department conversant with research and development will have to be put incharge of this. It would seem desirable to give him an allowance of Rs. 200/- P.M. for this purpose, over and above the salary drawn by him at present.

In regard to recurring expenditure, as already explained in the Memorandum, full expenditure under item 3a (production of nursery plants) and under item 5 (on Land Devalopment) is expected to be recovered; as also a sum of Rs.50,000/- per year from the crop sale of experimental farms under item 2, so that net annual recurring expenditure will be of the order of about Rs.4.8 lakh or for 3 years about Rs. 15 lakh about Rs. 15 lakh.

In regard to the non-recurring expenditure, a sum of Rs. 5.67 lakh is provided under Land Development for purchase of bull-dozers etc. and Rs.19.83 lakh as reserve for expenditure on levelling land and Rs.60,000/- under nursery plants and all these expenditures are expected to be recovered as the work in both cases is to be done on 'no profit on loss basis'. Besides, an expenditure of about Rs. 97,000/-provided under items 4,6 & 8, there is also a provision of Rs.9.64 lakh for establishing 4 Reasearch and Experimental Farms, including cost of building, machinery and prince of land if Government land be not available.

My dear Indarjit Singh,

Will you kindly refer to my D.O.Letter No. 42/VR-52. dated the 2nd January, 1953, forwarding Dr. Kalantar's comments on the note entitled "Agricultural Aspects of Chambal Valley Project"? As has been mentioned by Dr. Kalamtar, assistance from the Indian Council of Agricultural Research can be availed of in the implementation of the following schemes:-

- 1. Strangthening of research concerning variental and cultural experiments;
- 2. Water requirements of various crops (under the scheme of Model Agror comic Experiments);
- 3. Horticultural Development; and
- 4. Publicity and Propaganda.

If schemes on the above subjects are submitted by the State Government, the Indian Council of Agricultural Research would be prepared to consider subsidising them in accordance with the approved pattern of financial assistance. However, the State Government has since finalised their 1950-59 Plan and if they are unable to accommodate the above schemes, the requisite funds should be made available by the Planning Commission from within the Chambal Valley Project estimates. This is to ensure that these important schemes are not held up for want of funds during 1950-59.
