PREFACE

The unorganised labour which constitutes about 80 per cent of the country's working force, has hitherto remained neglected mainly because of their inability to organise themselves to bargain for their rights under various labour enactments. This vast majority of our toiling population has long suffered at the hands of their employers who exploited them to gain maximum benefit from their hard labour. Due to scanty information about the problems of this sector of labour, various government agencies charged with the task of suggesting effective ways and means to ameliorate their conditions felt handicapped in their work. The National Commission on Labour (1969) had noted this situation when they observed that the unorganised labour, on account of numerous constraints had mostly been left out of the purview of labour laws and even where they applied to such labour, their enforcement had left much to be desired. The task of identification of unorganised labour was not an easy one. In fact, the National Commission on Labour had briefly observed, "The unorganised labour cannot be identified by a definition but would be described as those (workers) who have not been able to organise in pursuit of a common objective because of constraints such as:—

- (a) casual nature of employment,
- (b) ignorance and illiteracy,
- (c) small size of establishments with low capital investment per person employed,
- (d) scattered nature of establishments, and
- (e) superior strength of the employer, operating singly or in combination."

However, the Labour Bureau undertook the task of conducting surveys on working and living conditions of these labour, but the 15 surveys in the industries given below, conducted initially, were localised due to paucity of resources:—

- 1. Building construction Industry in Delhi.
- 2. Fire-works Industry in and around Sivakasi (TN).
- 3. Jari Industry at Surat (Gujarat).
- 4. Match Industry in and around Sivakasi (TN).
- 5. Hosiery Industry at Ludhiana (Punjab).
- 6. Metalware Industry in Moradabad (UP).
- 7. Metalware Industry in Jagadhari (Haryana).
- 8. Brick-kilns Industry in Haryana.
- 9. Brick-kilns Industry in Chandigath (UT).
- 10. Brick-kilns Industry in Punjab.
- 11. Rice-shelling Industry in Haryana.
- 12. Rice-shelling Industry in Punjab.
- 13. Cashewnut Processing Industry in Kerala.
- 14. Agarbathi Industry in Karnataka.
- 15. Indigenous Sugar Industry in Uttar Pradesh.

However, from the 16th Survey, i.e., in Woollen Carpet Manufacturing Industry, the coverage has been extended to the whole of India with a view to providing an integrated picture of the conditions of unorganised labour in different industries. The present survey of the working and living conditions of workers engaged in the Handloom industry in India, is the 2nd in the series of all India surveys. The sample size being, however, rather too small, the findings of the survey are indicative of only broad trends and need to be treated with caution.

I take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to the organisations of both employers & employees of the Handloom Industry for extending their whole hearted co-operation in the successful conduct of the field work. I would also like to place on record my appreciation for the hard work put in by the whole team of officials in the UOS Division of the Bureau. Their names appear at the end of the report. (Annexure I)

CHAPTER I

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND AND STRUCTURE OF HANDLOOM INDUSTRY

- 1.1 The handloom industry, by far the largest in the unorganised sector, ranks next only to agriculture in terms of size, income and employment potential. This industry provides employment to about 20 million people on 3.3 million handlooms In 1986, about 3466 million metres of cotton cloth was produced on handlooms which accounts for about 36 per cent of the total cotton cloth produced in the country. In the year 1986-87, exports of handloom goods were of the order of about Rs. 392 crores and the value of handloom cloth produced was Rs. 2602 crores. Besides sarees, bulk of the production on handlooms comprises dhoties, bedsheets, furnishings, dress materials and towels, There are 14,741 primary co-operative societies at village level, 88 societies at regional level, 24 state level, apex societies and one national level society in the co-operative sector. In addition, there are 21 state level Corporations to assist weavers outside the co-operative fold.
- 1.2 India's handloom industry has experienced several vicissitudes. Before the invention of spinning jenny and powerlooms in England, handloom cloth enjoyed monopoly throughout the country. But during the colonial rule, this industry suffered a great set-back. It was only the traditional skill and intrinsic sense of design of the Indian weaver that insulated him against the disadvantages of competition with mill cloth. Besides, the Government of India took various steps for the development of this industry. The attention of the Government was for the first time drawn to the problems of the industry in 1928 by the Royal Commission on Agriculture, which expressed the view that the development of this village industry on co-operative lines was essential to the survival of weavers in the face of increasing competition from the organised industry. In 1934, the Government of India decided to subsidise the State Governments by Rs. 5 lakhs every year for the improvement of their handloom industry. On the recommendations of the Handloom Conference held in 1940, a Fact Finding Committee was established in 1941, which inter alia, recommended the reservation of certain items exclusively for this industry. The All India Handloom Board was set up in 1945. In 1948 the Government subsidy was withdrawn and a Handloom Development Fund was created in 1949 with a capital of Rs. 10 lakhs. An additional excise duty on mill-made cloth was levied in February, 1953 for the purpose of developing the khadi and
- handloom industries. Later, a committee, known as the Textile Enquiry Committee, was appointed by the Government to look into various sectors of the cotton textile industry with a view to determining the place of each in the national economy. This committee submitted its report in 1954 and interalia, recommended phased programme of conversion of handlooms into powerlooms, thereby achieving the twin objectives of maintaining employment in the short-run and improving efficiency in the long run In 1958, the Government of India set up a Working Group for the handloom industry which drew up a plan for the development of this industry involving an outlay of Rs. 140 crores. Another important study team on the problems of handloom industry under the Chairmanship of Shri B. Shivaraman, recommended in its report in 1974, that co-operative coverage for this industry should be to the extent of 60 per cent.
- 1.3 A new era of progress in handloom industry commenced in July, 1975, when the Central Government included handloom development in its 20 Point Economic Programme. The All India Handloom Board was reconstituted in December, 1976 and a Development Commissioner for Handlooms was appointed. An All India Handlooms and Handicrafts Board was set up in July, 1981 under the Chairmanship of Minister of Textiles with Development Commissioner (Handicrafts) and Development Commissioner (Handlooms) as member-secretaries. The Board is an advisory body for the formulation of development programmes in the handlooms and handicrafts sectors. The National Handloom Development Corporation started its commercial operation in 1984 with a yarn supply of about Rs. 92 lakhs. The new Textile Policy enforced in June, 1985 has accorded a place of pride to the handloom sector. It seeks to preserve the unique role of handlooms and to enable them to realise their full potential as also to ensure higher earnings for the handloom weavers. "To provide for reservation of certain articles for exclusive production by handlooms and for matters connected therewith" Handloom (Reservation of Articles for Production) Act 1985, was passed by Parliament in April, 1985. Under this Act. Government issued an order on March 3, 1986 reserving 22 items for exclusive production in the handloom sector. In order to have effective implementation of this order, three regional offices have also been set up in Delhi, Pune and Coimbatore.

- 1.4 Organisation and structure—The handloom industry in our country comprises the following types of establishments:—
 - 1. Household looms run by independent weavers.
 - 2. Looms run by master weavers,
 - 3. Co-operative societies.

The independent weaver works on his own, without the assistance of any agency. He buys the raw materials required for weaving, weaves cloth on his own loom, either independently or with the assistance of his family members, and also sells his product himself. The master weaver is a person who is not actually weaving but controls other weavers either directly or through agents. Master weavers are also classified into three types, viz., (i) direct master weaver (ii) trader master weaver and (iii) financing master weaver. Direct master weavers instal Looms in their own houses or common sheds. engage weavers to work on their looms and pay them wages for weaving the fabrics. In this case, the master weaver himself may weave on one of the looms in the shed or he may not weave but just supervise and control the working of other weavers. The trader master weaver appoints agents in different production centres and through them he supplies the raw materials to the handloom weavers in their places and collects woven cloth through the agents after paying conversion charges, to the weavers. In this case, the trader master weaver does not have any direct link with the weavers but controls them only through his agents. Some of the trader master weavers directly supply the raw materials to the weavers and get back woven cloth after paying wages. The financing master weavers are only financing the handloom weavers for purchase of raw materials, etc.

1.5 The Directorate of Handlooms and Textiles in the States concerned assist the Co-operative Societies whereas the State Handloom Development Corporation help the weavers who are outside the co-operative fold. The co-operative societies are also of two types. Primary Co-operative Societies and Industrial Co-operative Societies. They get yarn and other raw material from the society, weave the cloth on their own looms, return back the woven cloth to the societies and get conversion charges. Weavers who do not own their looms are admitted as members in the Industrial Weavers Co-operative Societies. In these types of societies the looms are installed in a common shed and are owned by the society. The loomless weavers who are admitted as members of the society come to the common work shed. weave on the looms allotted to them, and get mostly piece-rate wages for their produce. In the Industrial

Weavers Co-operative Societies, preloom processes are also undertaken.

- 1.6 Manufacturing processes for handloom weaving: The raw material for the manufacture of handloom fabric is yarn. Yarn is produced from natural fibres like cotton, silk and wool and of late from man-made fibres like viscose, synthetic fibre like polyester or in any blend of these fibres. These yarns are manufactured in spinning mills and sold in the market in the form of cone yarn and hank yarn. Normally hank yarn is consumed by Handloom industry and cone yarn by powerloom industry. The different manufacturing processes involved in handloom weaving are briefly discussed below:—
 - (a) Boiling—The yarn is boiled to remove impurities and oily matters in the yarn and make it smooth for easy absorption of dyes.
 - (b) Bleaching—For production of coloured fabrics, the yarn after boiling, is subjected to the process of bleaching.
 - (c) Dyeing—After the yarn is bleached, it is dyed in different colours and shades according to requirement and varieties of fabrics to be manufactured. Yarn is dyed by using different types of dyes such as napthal colours, vat colours, direct colours, etc. For dyeing of certain dark colours, bleaching is not required the yarn is dyed directly after boiling. Different methods of dyeing are adopted for the dyeing of cotton yarn, silk yarn, synthetic yarn, blended yarn, etc.
 - (d) Designing—Designing is done particularly in the manufacturing of sarees, bed-sheets and towels. The designer develops designs of new patterns and colour combinations and reproduces rough designs on graph paper.
 - (e) Winding—Winding of yarn is done for two purposes. One for warp winding for the preparation of warp beams. The other is pern winding to be used for weft. Warp winding is the process by which the dyed yarn or boiled grey yarn, which will be in forms of hank yarn, will be weaved on small bobbins or drums. Pern winding is the process of winding the dyed yarn or boiled grey yarn on the piras to be used as weft yarn during the process of weaving.
 - (f) Warping—Warping is a process by which the required number of warp threads are wound on the warping machine simultaneously to get a lengthy warp.

- (g) Sizing It is the process in which the yarn in the form of warp is applied with sizing mixture. It is required for single yarn and not for folded yarn. Sizing for handloom weaving is generally done in the streets.
- (h) Warp Joining—(Piecing)—Piecing is the process by which the new warp threads are joined to the old warp threads as per the required pattern.
- (i) Dressing and Beaming—The yarn after sizing and beaming are to be woven on a beam. For this purpose, the pieced warps are stretched in the streets to remove the broken threads, and the warp is woven on the warp beam which consists of a wooden roller with round discs on both edges. This process is called dressing and beaming.
- (j) Drafting and denting In the warp beam, there will be required number of ends according to the requirements of the width of the cloth. Each end (warp thread) is

- drawn through the healds as per the required designs. This process is called drafting. After drafting through the healds, the warp yarn threads are drawn through the reeds. This process is called denting.
- (k) Weaving—Weaving is the final operation in the manufacture of cloth. The weaving process consists of 3 functions, namely. (i) shedding (ii) picking and (iii) beating. Shedding is the operation in which the warp is divided into two layers for the passage of the shuttle carrying the weft yarn. Picking is the process by which the shuttle is moved from one side to the other side with the weft yarn wound on the pirm. After each picking the weft yarn thread is beaten to the fall of the cloth, by the process called beating.
- 1.7 Besides, there are post-loom processes like finishing and calendering. From these processes, there emerge various occupations like Dyer, Designer, Bobbin Winder, Pirn Winder, Warper and Weaver.

CHAPTER II

SCOPE AND DESIGN OF THE SURVEY

Scope and coverage of the present survey

2.1 The survey aimed at studying the working and living conditions of workers employed in handfrom manufacturing industry. The scope of the survey extended to all workers directly engaged in the production of handloom cloth. Other personnel such as watch, and ward staff, office staff, worker/ trainees engaged in the training centres, etc., were left out of the purview of this study. Data on most of the characteristics that throw light on the working and living condition of workers engaged in the industry have been collected to make it a comprehensive study. Table 2.1 shows the number of handlooms in important states in the country as on 30-6-1986. The survey was conducted in pockets/ centres having concentration of handloom manufacturing units in all those states where the total number of looms were 35,000 or more. In all, 15 states throughout the country satisfied this criterion and the geographical coverage of the survey was therefore restricted to these states.

Design of the survey

2.2 For conducting a sample survey with the objective, inter alia, of estimating some important characteristics with a pre-determined precision, the availability of an up-to-date list of units engaged in the handloom industry was essential. However, no such list of units engaged in the handloom industry was readily available. Preliminary investigations with the State Governments/Directorates of Handlooms Handloom Development Corporations/Registrars of Co-operative Societies and Regional Cooperative Societies revealed, that notwithstanding the stupendous task involved, authentic up-to-date lists of working units could not have been compiled from these sources within the limited time at our disposal. Under these circumstances, the list showing the number of looms in the states/centres of concentration, obtained from the office of the Commissioner of Handlooms, was made use of. Only those States/Union Territories with installed looms numbering 35,000 or more, were covered and the remaining ones were left out of the purview of this Survey. The number of units selected from each State/U.T. for coverage were more or less in proportion to the total number of looms in that State/ U.T. and keeping in view the overall importance of that State in the industry in the country as a whole.

The following states and district/Centre/Pocket of concentration within the state were included in the study:—

However, considering the practical aspects and for a fair appraisal of the nature of industry the minimum number of units to be surveyed. In each selected State/U.T. was kept at 10. Within the State/ U.T. the number of sampled units were apportioned according to the concentration of units at various centres/pockets in the State. Care, however, was taken to ensure that fair representation was given to all sectors (i.e. public, private and co-operative), and processes of manufacture. Two stage sampling procedure was adopted with manufacturing units and workers forming two successive stages of sampling. The first stage sample units, as mentioned above, were selected purposively to study the working conditions. The following factors were kept in mind: ---

- 1. Type of ownership.
- 2. Products manufactured.
- 3. Covered or not covered under one or the other labour legislation.

The second stage sampling units (workers) were selected at random from among those employed in the first stage sampling units in such a way that two and three workers were selected from each of the units employing more than 20 and more than 100 workers, respectively. Only one worker was selected from a sample unit employing less than 20 workers. Second stage sampling was done to study the living conditions of workers. Accordingly,

312 first stage and 637 second stage sampling units were covered in the survey. State-wise break-up of these units is given in Table 2.2 below:

- 2.3 In the ensuing paragraphs an analysis has been made of the number of units covered by various factors.
- (i) Type of ownership—Table 2.3 gives the distribution of selected handloom units by the type of ownership. Out of the total number of units surveyed about 67 per cent were working within the cooperative fold. 28 per cent belonged to the private sector and the rest 4 per cent were in public sector. The public sector units were run mainly by State Handloom Corporations. The number of such units was 3 in Assam, 2 each in J & K and Manipur and one each in Bihar, Maharashtra, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. Of the two public sector units in Manipur, one which was run by Manipur Handloom Development Corporation, had an employment of about 2,500 workers.
- (ii) Products manufactured—The Government of India through the "Reservation of Articles for Production Act, 1985" had reserved 22 articles exclusively for production in the handloom sector.

While selecting units for the survey, it was ensured that the coverage extended to the maximum number of articles carmarked for manufacture in the Handloom industry. During the survey it was found that a large number of units were engaged in the manufacture of bedsheets (34%), followed by cotton saree (33%), cotton dhoti (27%) and towel, handkerchief and napkins (22%). The percentage of units engaged in the manufacture of shirting cloth, silk sarees and furnishing cloth was 21, 20 and 18 respectively. Table 2.4 shows the percentage distribution of units engaged in the manufacture of different articles in each of the 15 States covered. These percentages are overlapping as most of the units were manufacturing a number of articles.

(iii) Manufacturing process—Table 2.5 gives the percentage distribution of units surveyed by process of manufacture. Of the 312 units surveyed, 60 percent were engaged in the weaving process only while nearly 40 percent were engaged in both weaving and allied processes. Only one unit was found to be carrying on only the allied processes.

(iv) Coverage under Labour Laws—The working conditions of industrial workers are mainly governed by the Factories Act 1948, or the Shops and Commercial Establishment Acts, enacted by the various State Governments. A vast majority of the workers engaged in the Handloom industry work in their own houses and as such their working conditions are not governed by the legislations mentioned above. Income consideration apart, there is virtually no difference in the working conditions and living conditions of this large section of the work force in the industry, in so far as health safety and welfare measures are concerned. Of the rest of the workers in the industry, who work in

sheds or common work places, a small percentage (about 5%), were covered under the Shops and Commercial Establishments Acts and a still smaller percentage (about 3%), came under the purview of the Factories Act. In this respect, the workers engaged in handloom industry may be linked to those engaged in the cottage industry sector though the employment in this industry is next only to that in the agricultural sector. Table 2.6 which follows gives the percentage distribution of handloom units of different employment sizes into those covered under the Factories Act, Shops and Commercial Establishment Act and those not covered under any Act.

(v) Number of looms installed and actually working—All the 312 units, except one, were engaged in either weaving or both weaving and allied processes. The sole exception was a unit in Orissa in which only allied processes were carried on. The total number of looms installed in the sheds and in the premises of the workers were found to be 5,687 and 50,339 respectively, on the dates of visit, falling between March to September, 1987. However, only 4,302 looms in the sheds and 36.514 in the premises of the workers were found to be working when these units were visited. Thus, it was observed that only 75.6 per cent of the installed capacity of the looms in the sheds, and 72.5 per cent in the premises of the workers, was

actually being utilised. Maximum capacity utilisation in both cases was reported from Assam, where almost all the looms installed were found working. Table 2.7 shows the number and percentage of looms installed and working in the sheds and workers' premises. While considering these figures, it may, however, be borne in mind that majority of the working looms were not operated full-time, especially in the States of Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. It was noticed that weavers, particularly those under master-weavers, had remained without work either for want of raw materials or due to difficulties in the marketing of finished products which had been piling up, thus blocking their meagre capital resources.

2.4 Questionnaires used

As stated earlier, the aim of the study was to ascertain the working and living conditions of workers engaged in the handloom industry. Accordingly, two schedules, namely, working condition schedule and living condition schedule, were specially designed (Annexure II). The working condition schedule was canvassed to collect data from the employers on aspects like employment, wages, leave and holidays, safety, welfare amenities and medical facilities at work site, social security, housing facilities etc., provided by the employer. Information on industrial relations and

trade unionism was also collected in this schedule. In the living condition schedule, data were collected from the selected workers, through interview at their place of living, on various aspects of their living and working viz., family characteristics, such as family size, literacy, economic status, family income and receipts, qualitative standard of living and their dietary habits, sickness and type of treatment, assets and indebtedness, housing conditions and migration, etc. Information on hours of work and earnings for the latest pay period before the date of visit were also collected in the living condition schedule in view of the fact that most of the workers in the handloom industry

worked at their residences and the data on these aspects could be collected more accurately from the worker himself. Schedules on working condition were filled up by consulting the records maintained by the employers and observing the facilities provided. In case of non-availability of records, the data were collected by holding discussions with the management and workers. It may be stated here that only a few units in this industry maintained records. In spite of the fact that missimum wages under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948, had been fixed by many State Governments in this industry, an overwhelming majority of the units surveyed had not maintained payment registers as required under the Act. Barring a few units which were keeping some sort of records, the information, by and large, had to be collected through discussions with the management and the workers.

2.5 Period of the survey

The survey in handloom industry was launched in March, 1987 and completed in September, the same year. The information presented in this report should, therefore, be treated to relate to this period, unless mentioned otherwise

2.6 Difficulties experienced

The handloom industry is in the decentralised sector and is spread over throughout the country. It has a rural or semi-urban base and has grown in a rather haphazard manner. No up-to-date list of units or the number of looms installed were available from any quarter and therefore to acquire a frame for drawing samples was in itself a formidable task. However, the list supplied by the office of Handloom Development Commissioner,

giving the State-wise break-up of the number of handlooms in the country, was made use of for this purpose and sample units were drawn as per the design of the survey. Apart from encountering this problem before launching the survey, the field staff, after starting their operation, had to face numerous hurdles. A majority of the units surveved were not maintaining any records and in the circumstances the field staff had to depend heavily on the version of the management and the workers, supplemented by their personal observations, regarding the facilities provided. In several cases, the managements were rejuctant to divulge information as they were not aware of the various provisions of the Acts of the Central and State Governments that were applicable to their units. While eliciting information on living conditions, the field staff had to be very tactful as the sample workers or others responsible members of the family did not come out freely in parting with the requisite details especially in respect of consumption of liquor and other intoxicants, extent of indebtedness, etc. Further, the workers being mostly illiterate, could not give reliable information on dietary habits and on cases and types of sickness in the family, (information about which was collected for one year preceding the date of visit) due to memory lapse and ignorance. Furthermore, due to unawareness about the purpose and the objectives of the survey, the workers had their own apprehensions despite best efforts made by the field staff to make them familiar with the aims and the objectives of the survey. These difficulties are, of course, inherent in making any efforts for collecting data from the unorganised workforce.

CHAPTER III EMPLOYMENT

Three hundred and twelve units comprising cooperatives, master-weavers and non-household units, and employing 43,754 persons, were covered during the course of the survey. The various characteristics of this workforce are briefly discussed in the ensuing paragraphs:—

3.1 Distribution of workers by occupation, caste and sex

Table 3.1 presents the detailed distribution of workers by occupation, caste, sex and age, in cooperatives, master-weavers' units and the non-household units. Details of workers working in the sheds and in their own premises have also been provided in the Table separately in each of these three types of units. It will be seen from this Table that 86 per cent of the workers were employed through the co-operative societies. About 11 per cent we e wisking under Master Weavers and the remaining 3 per cent were found to be engaged in non-household units.

The occupational structure of Handloom Industry shows that weavers constituted 94 per cent of the total workers, followed by bebbin pern winder who were 3 per cent of the total. About 84 per cent of the weavers were found to be working in their own premises, while the remaining were working in the sheds. Women workers engaged directly in the weaving process accounted for 43 per cent and child workers were only 1 per cent, of the total number of weavers. In Tripura all the weavers were women while in Assam women constituted 93 per cent of the weavers. Child weavers were found only in three States, namely, Assam, Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh.

Of the total workers in the units covered, 8 per cent belonged to scheduled castes and 4 per cent to scheduled tribes. The remaining 88 per cent belonged to other communities. The highest percentage of scheduled caste workers was reported from Rajasthan (54 per cent), followed by Orissa (37 per cent). The proportion of scheduled tribe workers was negligible in all the States barring Assam, where they accounted for 18 per cent of the total workers.

3.2 Distribution of workers by "Covered" and "Not Covered" categories under different Acts

Table 3.2 shows the distribution of workers into 'covered' and 'not covered' categories under various Acts, viz., Factories Act, 1948, and Shops and Commercial Establishment Acts. Out of 43,754 workers employed in the 312 units surveyed, as

many as 96 per cent were not covered under any Act. While Haryana had 69 per cent of the hand-icom workers covered under Shops and Commercial Establishment Act, in Jammu & Kashmir and Kerala States 51 and 46 per cent of the workers respectively were reported to be covered under the Factories Act, 1948. In all other States the coverage of workers under these Acts was negligible.

3.3 Women and Child Labour

Table 3.3 shows the proportion of women and child labour employed in the handloom units covered during the survey. At All-India level out of 312 units surveyed, 224 (i.e. 72 per cent) were employing women and only 16 (5 per cent) units were employing children, 44 per cent of the workers were women and 0.7 per cent were children. Among the various States, the highest proportion of women workers were engaged in Manipur (100 per cent) and Assam (93 per cent). Other States where women workers comprised a significant proportion of all workers were Kerala (49 per cent), Bihar (44 per cent), Tamil Nadu and Tripura (38 per cent each). Maharashtra (29 per cent), Rajasthan (23 per cent), Haryana (22 per cent), West Bengal (18 per cent), Andhra Pradesh (16 per cent) and Karnataka (14 per cent). In States like Jammu & Kashmir, Orissa and Uttar Pradesh, the proportion of women workers to total workers was very small.

The incidence of child labour was reported only from the States of Assam, Haryana, Kerala, Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh, but the proportion of child workers to all workers was found to be negligible.

3.4 Distribution of workers by length of service

Table 3.4 shows the distribution of workers by their length of service. At All-India level about 25 per cent of the workers had put in a service of 15 years and above, while about 42 per cent had 10 to 15 years' of service to their credit.

It will also be seen from Table 3.4 that about one-third of the handloom workers had length of service ranging between 1 to 5 years whereas these with less than one year's service constituted about 6 per cent of the total.

Table 3.4 also reveals that the States having a high percentage of workers with 10 years and more of service were Karnataka (58 per cent), J.&K. (56 per cent), Manipur (55 per cent) and Tamil Nadu (54 per cent). This indicates that the work force in the handloom industry in these States was relatively more stable.

CHAPTER IV

EARNINGS

4.1 Time-rated and Piece-rated Workers

The survey has revealed that payment by results, or the piece-rate system of payment, is predominant in the Handleom Industry in our country. This is naturally so, for the vast majority of handloom workers work in their own premises and have no fixed working hours. Their earnings, therefore, depend on their output. Table 4.1 shows the percentage distribution of workers into time-rated and piece-rated categories. It was observed that at the All-India level almost 91 per cent of handloom workers were paid on piece-rate basis and the rest 9 per cent were time-rated. Most of the piece-rated workers belonged to the occupations weaver, winder and warper. In the States of Bihar, Maharashtra, Manipur and Tripura all the workers were working on piece-rate basis. On the other hand, in Jammu & Kashmir 67 per cent of the workers were time-rated, which was the highest percentage among all the States, followed by West Bengal (about 32 per cent). This was due to the fact that in these two States, a number of units were run by the Government and in such units the practice was to make payments according to time-rated.

4.2 Pay Period

Pay period is the interval of time after which wage-earners receive their wages and the Payment of Wages Act, 1936, lays down that the interval should in no case exceed a month. The percentage distribution of handloom workers according to their pay period is given in Table 4.2. It would be seen from this Table that at the All-India level, in the case of nearly 62 per cent of the workers the pay period was 'not fixed' which implied that it depended on the mutual arrangement between the employer and the worker, leaving scope for exploitation of the latter by the former. Another 16 per cent of the workers were having their pay period as 'month' whereas about 14 per cent received wages every week. Four per cent cach of the workers were paid wages on formightly and daily basis. In the States of Bihar, Tamil Nadu and U.P., more than 90 per cent of the workers had no fixed pay period. On the other hand the States like J&K and Kerala, the proportion of workers having variable pay period was only about 13.3 and 12.5 per cent, respectively.

4.3 Average daily wage rates and earnings

Table 4.3 shows the occupation-wise daily wage rates of time-rated workers and the average daily

earnings of piece-rated workers in each of the 15 States covered. For preparing this Table, the figures of minimum and maximum wage rates and earnings have been worked out from the data available for the sample workers only. In the case of time-rated workers, daily wage-rate has been worked out from the consolidated amount received by them during the pay period, immediately preceding the date of visit, divided by the number of days worked in the pay period. For piece-rated workers, the daily earnings have been derived from the total actual earnings and the number of days worked in the pay-period. The figures are presented by sex and occupations in Table 4.3.

Weavers, who constituted the main occupational category in the Handloom Industry, were reported to be time-rated only in J & K and Kerala States, due to the fact that some large sample units in these States were government factories where all the workers were paid on time-rate basis. The average daily minimum wage rate of time-rated men weavers was Rs. 6.73 (In Kerala) and the maximum rate was Rs. 45.15 (In J&K). There were no wemen or child weavers working on time-rate basis. The average daily earnings of piece-rated men weavers worked out to be Rs. 4.67 as the minimum (In Orissa) and Rs. 50.00 as the maximum in Karnataka and Uttar Pradesh. The second lowest average daily earnings for men weavers (Rs. 4.84) we're reported in Tamil Nadu. As regards piecerated women weavers, their daily earnings ranged between Rs. 4.29 in Tripura and Rs. 43.33 in Karnataka, A few child weavers were also reported fro n Assam and Kerala States. Their average daily earnings were Rs. 3.46 in Assam, as against Rs. 8.00 in Kerala.

The reasons for significant differences in the inter-State and intra-State earnings and wage rates of weavers were, apart from differences in their skill, experience and efficiency, differences in the type of cloth weaved (i.e. Cotton, Silk, Synthetic or Woollen) in various States, differences in the varieties of cloth produced and the number of counts in the warp and weft of the cloth being woven.

The time rated winders were reported in Assam, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh. In Assam, only children were employed as winders and they were all time-rated, earning a minimum of Rs. 5.00 and a maximum of Rs. 7.50 per day. The average daily wage rates were Rs. 8.19 (minimum)

for men winders in Uttar Pradesh and Rs. 24.81 (maximum) in Tamil Nadu. The time-rated women winders, who were reported only in Rajasthan, had the same minimum and maximum wage rate viz. Rs. 19.23 per day. The corresponding average daily carnings of piece-rated women winders were reported to be Rs. 1.68 as the minimum (In Tamil Nadu) and Rs. 20.89 as the maximum (In Kerala). As will be seen from Table 4.3, the earnings of piece-rated women winders were lower in all the States, except Kerala, in comparison to the wage rates of time-rated women winders who were reported in Rajasthan only. There were no men or Children among winders working on piece-rate basis.

Of the 15 States covered during the survey, the occupation 'Warper' was reported in only 7 States and children were not working as Warpers in any of these States. The job of warping was being dore by women in the States of Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu on piece-rate and in Assam on timerate of wages and the minimum and maximum of their earnings and wage rates were the same in all these States. Their average daily earnings in Tamil Nadu were higher (Rs. 14.52) as compared to Rs. 8.39 only in the adjacent State of Andhra Pradesh, However, in Assam the wage rate of women warpers was only Rs. 4.62 per day. As regards time-rated male warpers, their daily wage rate was the highest (Rs. 36.15) in Assam and the lowest (Rs 11.54) in Tamil Nadu. It will also be seen from Table 4.3 that in Haryana, there was a marked difference in the daily earnings of piece-rated men warpers as compared to the wage rates of their time-rated counterparts, the respective figures being Rs. 46.15 and Rs. 26.92.

The average daily wage rates for the time-rated men workers in the occupational category "Dyer/ Sizer/Designer" were Rs. 9.08 (Minimum) in Orissa and as high as Rs. 84.50 (Mamixum) in Assam. Only one women worker was reported to be employed in this category in Tamil Nadu and her timerate of wages was Rs. 13.30 per day, No children were employed on this job in any of the States Men workers on piece-rate basis were reported in this occupation in only Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu and their minimum average daily earnings were Rs. 9.68, the maximum being Rs. 19.23. It was observed that the earnings of piece-rated workers in this occupation were comparatively low as against the wage rates of their counterparts working on time-rate basis.

The survey has revealed that the job of Supervisor/Weaving Master was performed only on timerate basis and the wage rates ranged from Rs. 14.42 (in Tamil Nadu) to Rs. 75.96 (also in Tamil Nadu). Assam was the only State where some women workers were also working in this category. Their minimum wage rate was reported to be Rs. 32.15 per day and the maximum was Rs. 56.27.

Apart from the above-mentioned important occupations, workers in all other related occupations in the Handloom Industry were clubbed to form a common category and their wage rates are also shown in Table 4.3. There were no such workers working on piece-rate basis. The minimum wage of Rs. 3.80 per day in this group was reported for men workers in Uttar Pradesh and the maximum of Rs. 39.42 in Tamil Nadu. The women workers were reported to be getting an average daily wage rate of Rs. 4.62 at the minimum (in Assam) and Rs. 25.37 at the maximum level (in West Bengal).

While examining the figures given in Table 4.3, it may be borne in mind that the wide variations in the wage rates and earnings, even in the same occupations in various States, were attributable to diverse factors, such as, differences in skill, experience, quality of the product, variety of raw materials used, etc.

4.4 House Rent, City Compensatory and Shift Allowances

During the course of the survey, an attempt was made to collect information from the sample units on the payment of house rent allowance, city compensatory allowance and shift allowance to their workers. Among the 312 units covered, not even a single unit reported payment of any city compensatory allowance or shift allowance. However, 4 units reported payment of house rent allowance to their workers. Two of these were located in Assam and one each in Orissa and West Bengal. Of the 2 units in Assam, in one, H.R.A. was paid at flat rate to all workers and the amount paid varied from Rs. 46.00 to Rs. 50.00 per month. In the other unit, this allowance was paid to weaving masters and designers only, at the rate of 10 per cent of their wages/earnings. The unit in Orissa paid HRA to such of the Dyers who had completed 3 years' service and the rate of payment was 10 per cent of wages. In the single unit in West Bengal, house rent allowance was being paid to all categories of workers at the rate of 5 per cent of their wages.

4.5 Production/Incentive Bonus and Attendance Bonus

The system of paying production/incentive bonus is not uncommon in the well-organised industries. But in the unorganised Handloom Industry, production/incentive bonus is of little relevance as most of the weavers are household workers and they normally work more to earn more. However, during the survey it was found that 4 units each in the States of Assam, J&K, Manipur and West Bengal were paying production/incentive bonus to their workers. The level of production beyond which production bonus was admissible could not be worked out in the case of different items due to lack of information available in this regard from the

employers. However, discussions revealed that the rate of payment varied from Rs. 1.16 to Rs. 3.75 per day and Rs. 20 to Rs. 60 per month.

As regards attendance bonus, this bonus was introduced as a measure to discourage absenteeism and thereby increase production. However, it was not being paid in any State, barring only one unit in Assam. The rate of payment of attendance bonus in this unit was Rs. 1.75 per day to casual workers and Rs. 50 per month to all regular workers.

4.6 Concessions in Kind

The survey revealed that the system of giving concessions in kind was not prevalent in any State.

4.7 Statutory Bonus and Ex-Gratia Payments

Table 4.4 shows the percentage distribution of Handloom Units which were under statutory obligation to pay bonus as per the Payment of Bonus Act. 1965, and of these, the units honouring their legal obligation. Based on the general Rule of 20 or more workers employed by employer/society, provided such unit had completed the infancy stage of 5 years. it was a statutory requirement for such units to pay annual bonus at the specified rate to all their eligible employees. The survey results showed that only 77 units, i.e., about one-fourth of the total, were under obligation to pay bonus to their workers. However, in fact, only about 34 per cent of these units were actually paying bonus to all or some of their employees. The rest 66 per cent were violating the law and depriving the workers of the benefit of bonus. The range of bonus payments varied from 8.33 per cent to 20 per cent of wages. However, it was also reported that 15 units, which comprised about 19 per cent of those under statutory obligation to pay borus, were making some ex-gratia payments in lieu of non-payment of bonus to all or some of

their employees. The amount of ex-gratia payment made was generally 4 per cent of wages, but onc unit in Rajasthan reported paying ex-gratia at the rate of Rs. 551.00 per year to all its workers. In some States, the rate of ex-gratia payment ranged from Rs. 15 to Rs. 200 per year. It was also observed during the survey that generally the cooperative societies were giving ex-gratia amounts to the employees out of their net produce. The remaining nearly 47 per cent of the units under statutory obligation to pay bonus, were neither paying bonus nor any ex-gratia amount to their employees.

4.8 Fines and Deductions

Information was also collected during the survey about the practice of imposing fines on workers and making deductions from their wages. Out of 312 units surveyed, 127 (41 per cent), reported that they were imposing fines and/or making deductions in all cases within the limits prescribed under the Payment of Wages Act, 1936. Among the different States, the proportion of units imposing fines/maling deductions was the highest in Tamil Nadu (87 per cent) followed, in order, by Tripura (80 per cent), Manipur (73 per cent), Karnataka (69 per cent) and Kerala (60 per cent).

Regarding the utilisation of the amount realised through fines, it was found that 100 out of 127 units (i.e. 79 per cent) were paying the money in the Employees' Society Fund, 25 units (20 per cent), were using it for themselves, and only 2 units (1 per cent), were actually spending the money towards the welfare of workers Discussions with the employers also revealed that the fine or penalty on the worker, was generally to ask him to return the raw materials in case the finished product brought by him was found to be defective. In such cases, the defective cloth was given back to the workers which he was free to sell in the open market.

CHAPTER V

WORKING CONDITIONS

5.1 Introductory

Working conditions in the manufacturing sector are largely governed by the Factories Act. 1948. The Shops and Commercial Establishments Acis of various states also contain provisions regarding hours of work, leave and holidays, payment of wages, etc. However, as stated in Chapter III, 96 per cent of the handloom workers covered during the present survey did not come under the purview of any of these Acts. It was also found during the survey that weavers comprised 94 per cent of the total workforce and about 84 per cent of the total weavers worked in their own premises. Now, the conditions of work have little relevance when the work is done in the premises of a weaver, working on his own, with or without the help of family members. Nevertheless, an attempt was made during the survey to collect data on the actual hours of work, spread-over and rest interval, leave and holidays, medical facilities etc., of the sample workers and the findings are discussed in the ensuing paragraphs.

52 Hours of Work, Rest Interval and Spread-over

As elsewhere stated, a sample of 637 workers was drawn from the total workers employed in 312 units covered during the survey. Wide variations were observed in the daily hours of work of these workers. The state-wise percentage distribution of the selected workers according to their daily hours of work is shown in Table 5.1. At the All-India level, nearly 32 per cent of the workers were working daily for 8 hours, while about 26 per cent were working for more than 8 and up to 10 hours a day. It can also be seen from statement 5.1 that about one-fifth of all the workers worked for less than 8 hours a day and nearly 3 per cent of them put in between 12 to 15 hours' labour every day. Weekly hours of work in the case of nearly 48 per cent workers in the whole industry were more than 48.

A: regards duration of the rest interval that the handloom workers were having, the data are presented in Table 5.2. In the industry as a whole, as many as 89 per cent of the workers reported that their rest interval was of more than one hour every day. This figure was made up of about 48 per cent and 41 per cent workers who were having rest interval of more than 2 hours and between 1 and 2 hours, respectively. This indicates that the workers are usde to a longer period of rest in this industry than is the case in most of the organised industries.

The reason for this may be the tiring nature of the job of operating a handloom and also the climatic conditions in certain parts of the country. For instance, 75 per cent of the workers in Manipur and 50 per cent in Assam took rest for only half an hour to less than one hour. Details about other States may be seen in Table 5.2.

Statistics relating to the spreadover of work are presented in Table 5.3. It will be seen from this Table that in the industry, as a whole, the daily spread over of work was for upto 10 hours in the case of about 45 per cent of the workers and more than 10 hours for about 55 per cent workers. For details at the State level Table 5.3 may be seen.

5.3 Leave and Holidays

Table 5.4 shows the percentage distribution of sample workers according to leave and holidays allowed to them with or without wages. Proportion of workers having a weekly day of rest, with or without wages, has also been given in this Table. At All-India level about 82 per cent of the sample workers reported that they were granted leaves and holidays, but without wages. Nearly 9 per cent of the sample workers enjoyed this facility with pay, whereas the remaining 9 per cent workers were not allowed any leave or holidays.

In Kerala, about 71 per cent workers were having leave and holidoys with wages. On the other hand, in Crissa, 68 per cent of the workers covered stated that they were not given any leave or holidays. In other States, almost all the workers reported getting leaves/holidays without wages.

As for the weekly rest day, the survey results show that about 37 per cent of the workers were deprived of it, whereas nearly 58 per cent workers had it, but without pay. A paid weekly-off was the privilege of a bare 5 per cent of the handloom workers in the country. The position obtaining in the different States in this regard may be seen from Table 5.4.

5.4 Welfare Facilities

5.4.1 Drinking Water

About 45.5 per cent of the sample workers were working in the sheds under cooperative societies or Master Weavers and about 94 per cent of them had

drinking water facility. The arrangements were adequate for 57 per cent of the workers but inadequate for the rest. Separate arrangements existed for men and women workers in about 15 per cent of the cases.

5.4.2 Conservancy Arrangements

Latrines had been provided for about 72 per cent and Urinals for nearly 71 per cent of the workers working in sheds. But these arrangements were inadequate for about 24 per cent of the workers. Latrines were common for men and women in the case of 42 per cent workers while urinals were common for 33 per cent workers.

5.4.3 Canteens, Rest Shelters and Creches and Washing and Transport Facilities

The survey results show that the obove facilities were conspicuous by their absence in the handloom units surveyed.

5.4.4 Accommodation to workers

The survey has revealed that only a negligible proportion of workers, i.e., about 4 per cent of the total, had been provided with residential accommodation by their employers or the cooperative society. Among the States, Haryana topped the list, wherein nearly 18 per cent of the workers were provided accommodation, followed by Karnataka and Tamil Nadu (8 per cent each). No unit in Bihar, J&K, Kerata, Maharashtra, Manipur, Orissa and West Bengal had provided residential accommodation to its workers. It was found that nearly 88 per cent of the workers having accommodation had been provided houses on hire purchase basis, by obtaining subsidy from the concerned State Housing Board. About 8 per cent workers had rent-free accommodation, whereas from the rest 4 per cent, rent was charged.

As regards the structure of the residential units, it was observed that most of the houses were built with bricks or stones, having roofs of straw or country made tiles, with provison for ventilation. All the houses provided had pucca floors except in Tribura where floors were reported to be plastered with mud. Water supply was available within the premises of most of the houses.

5.4.5 Medical Facilities at Work Site

Out of 312 units surveyed all over India, only 10 units were found to be registered under the Factories Act, 1948, and were under statutory obligation to provide medical facilities at the work premises in the form of first-aid boxes. In all, 11 units (about 3.5 per cent) were found to have kept first-aid boxes for the use of workers. However, in only 6 of the 11 units the contents of first-aid boxes were found to be complete. The remaining units were having deficient first-aid boxes.

5.5 Social Security

5.5.1. Employees Provident Fund/Thrift Fund and other schemes

The Employees Provident Fund Act, 1952, made at obligatory to institute Provident Fund for certain factories establishments, the Handloom Industry being one of them. All such units (i) which employ 20 or more workers but less than 50 and had completed 5 years of their existence, and (ji) more than 50 workers and had completed 3 years of existence. are required to institute Provident Funds for the benefit of their employees. The co-operative societies come within the purview of this Act only when their employment is 50 or more in each individual case. Due to the particular nature of Handloom Industry in which units have a very limited number of workers, only a few employees benefited from this social security measure. However, the institution of Thrift Fund Schemes and similar other social security schemes ensured that more workers benefited than through statutory Provident Funds. Table 5.5 shows the percentage distribution of handloom units having Employees Provident Fund/Thrift Fund and other social security schemes and the rate of contribution therein. Out of 43,754 workers engaged in 312 units surveyed all over India, only 3 per cent were entitled to become members of the Provident Fund Scheme and about 98 per cent of the entitled workers were actually members of Provident Fund Schemes. As regards Thrift Fund. 20.5 per cent of the workers were entitled to become its members and all had been enrolled as members. In addition, about 26 per cent of the workers were entitled to become members of similar other social security schemes and all had actually availed of this facility. The rate of contribution for Provident Fund varied from 6.25 per cent to 10 per cent by members and for thrift fund it varied from 3 per cent to 12 per cent. A matching contribution was made by the Employers/Society.

Amongst the States, in Kerala 50 per cent of the units had instituted Provident Fund Schemes, while in Andhra Pradesh about 86 per cent of the units were having Thrift Fund Schemes, followed by Karnataka (about 69 per cent) and Maharashtra (40 per cent). Other Social Security Schemes were found to be quite popular in Tamil Nadu, as nearly 67 per cent of the total workers had become members of such schemes.

5.5.2 Gratuity Schemes

Only 14 units (4 per cent) out of 312 surveyed, were found paying gratulty as per the provisions of the Payment of Gratuity Act. 1972. Four of these units were in Kerala, 3 in J&K, 2 each in Karmataka and Assam and one each in the States of Maharashtra, West Bengal and U.P.

5.5.3 Group Insurance Schemes

Out of 312 units surveyed all over India, only 8 units (3 per cent) reported having introduced Group Insurance Schemes for their employees. Three of these units were located in Tamil Nadu, 2 each in Karnataka and Assam and one in A.P.

5.6 Industrial Relations

5.6.1 Standing Orders

As per the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act. 1946, all units employing 100 or more workers are required to frame Standing Orders governing the service condtions of their workers. Due to the peculiar nature of work in this industry, most of the units surveyed had not framed any such Standing Orders, However, only 4 units, 2 in J&K and one each in U.P. and West Bengal, reported that the service conditions of their workers were governed by the Standing Orders framed by them. Two units in Assam also reported that the service conditions of employees were governed by orders circulated by the Design Centre of Handloom Board constituted by the State Government. In all, 98 per cent of the units covered reported not having any specific service conditions for their workers.

5.6.2 Trade Unions

The survey has revealed that trade unionism had not developed to any significant extent in the Handloom Industry as about 93 per cent of the units covered were not having any trade union and barely 4.5 per cent of the workers in the industry were members of trade unions. Table 5.6 shows the details regarding the extent of trade unionism in

Handloom Industry in the country. In all, only 7% of the units reported having trade unions. One unit each in Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal had more than one trade union. Most of the trade unions (about 83%) were affiliated to some or the other main trade union. About 65% of the trade unions were registered and recognised by their respective managements and about 17% were not recognised by managements even though registered. The unregistered trade unions which enjoyed recognition by the managements accounted for about 9 per cent. Table 5.6 also shows that out of a total of 43,754 workers in the 312 units covered, only 1.957 (constituting 4.5 per cent of the total), were members of trade unions. No union was reported to be existing in any of the units covered in Bihar, Haryana, Karnataka, Orissa and Tamil Nadu.

5.6.3 Grievance Procedure

An attempt was made during the survey to find out the number of units having some procedure for redressal of grievances of their workers. Since this industry is highly unorganised, a proper procedure to sort out the grievances of the workers was nonexistent in most of the cases. However, among the 312 units surveyed, only 13 units (i.e. about 4%) were knying a prescribed grievance procedure. Eight of these units were in Orissa, 2 in Kerala and of the remaining 3, one each was situated in the States of J&K, Tamily Nadu and West Bengal. Most of the complaints were received either by the Secretary of the Society or by the Manager of the unit and they were generally disposed of within a month. Normally, the grievances of the workers were redressed through mutual discussions with the employer/ manager/managing committee of the unit concerned, or with the Secretary of the cooperative society.

CHAPTER VI

LIVING CONDITIONS

6.1 The important socio-economic characteristics of the families of sampled workers are presented in this chapter. One of the purposes of the survey was to study the living conditions of handloom workers and to bring in focus the various social and economic aspects of the life of their families, such as, family size, income, literacy, assets, indebtedness, housing, etc. In total, families of 637 workers were covered in 15 States. The number of families surveyed varied between 139 in Tamil Nadu and 12 in Tripura, depending on the concentration of handloom workers in various States. A separate schedule, called the worker's schedule, was canvassed for this purpose. The findings are discussed in the following paragraphs.

6.2 General Family Characteristics

6.2.1 Distribution of Families by Castes/Community

Table 6.1 shows the percentage distribution of families surveyed according to caste/community. It will be seen from the table that a majority of the families surveyed belonged to communities other than scheduled castes and scheduled tribes and Muslims, and this category constituted about 73.3 per cent at the All-India level. All sampled families handloom workers in Manipur and Andhra Pradesh belonged to other castes/communities, followed by Tamil Nadu (95%) and Kerala (about 92%). The proportion of other communities was found to be lowest (13%) in U.P.

Families belonging to Muslim community was the next largest group having a share of 19.3 per cent at the All-India level. U.P. state represented the highest proportion (83%) of Muslim families working on handlooms, followed by J&K (80%) and Maharashtra (57%). J&K is the only state where this industry was found to be exclusively in the hands of Muslims and Scheduled Caste workers.

Scheduled caste families constituted 5.8 per cent of the total handlom workers' families surveyed in the country. In Orissa they represented 24 per cent which was the highest followed by 20 per cent in J&K, whereas in U.P. their proportion was 4 per cent only.

Among the sampled families, scheduled tribes comprised only 1.6 per cent of the total. They were reported only in Assam state (about 20%), Maharashtra (9.5%) and Bihar (5.6%)

6.2.2 Family Size and Composition

Table 6.2 shows the everage size of the family of a handtoom worker in each of the states covered, as also the composition of his family i.e. men, women and children. The average size of the total number of 637 families surveyed at the All-India level, worked out to be 5.08 members, comprising 1.72 adult males, 1.56 adult females and 1.80 children. The largest family size (6.20 members) was reported from Rajasthan, closely followed by 6.13 members in J&K. In Haryana, the average family size was the smallest, being only 4.09 members. Details appear in Table 6.2.

Distribution of families by family size-groups is shown in Table 6.3. In the industry, as a whole, the highest proportion of families, i.e. about 57 per cent, were having two to five members each, whereas about 36 per cent families comprised 6 to 9 members each. Nearly 4 per cent were single-member families and the rest 3 per cent had 10 or more members each. The average family size of a handloom worker's family worked out to 5.08 members. In Haryana, one-third of the total families covered had only a single member, while no single-member family was reported from the States of Bihar, J&K, Maharashtra, Orissa, Tripura and West Bengal.

6.2.3 Age, Sex and Marital Status

Table 6.4 gives the percentage distribution of members of the sampled families by age, sex and marital status. The survey revealed that at All-India level, there were about 913 females for every 1000 males among the total number of families surveyed. Males outnumbered females in all the age groups except in the age groups of 25 years to 34 years and 35 years to 44 years where the trend was opposite.

About 44 per cent of the members were reported to be married and about 4 per cent to be widows/widowers/divorcees/separatees at the time of the survey. The table further revealed an upward shift in the age of marriage of both boys and girls. The incidence of child marriage among the families surveyed was almost negligible. There was only single case of child marriage (less than 15 years) involving one girl, which was observed in Uttar Pradesh.

Unlike the All-India trend, in certain states like Assam, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Tripura females members were more than the male members,

6.2.4 Age, Sex and Level of Literacy

In Table 6.5 an attempt has been made to present the data collected on the level of literacy among the members of sampled families by sex and in the different age groups.

At the All-India level, 71 per cent of males and 50 per cent of females of the age of 5 years and above had achieved varying levels of literacy ranging from 'literate' to 'Graduate and above'. The overall literacy rate amongst the sampled families was 61 per cent. However, amongst the literate members, 74 per cent had attained only the minimum level of literacy i.e. 'up to Primary', whereas 15 per cent had attained 'Middle standard', 8 per cent had studied up to 'Secondary' level and only 2 per cent had reached up to 'Graduation and above, level.

This Table makes an interesting revelation of a sudden drop in the level of literacy from about 82 per cent in the age-group 10-14 to about 71 per cent in the age-group 15—19. It would also be seen that the literacy level dropped from 69 per cent in the age-group 20—24 to 47 per cent in the age-group 25 years and above. This shows that the drop out rate rises at various levels of education with the increase in age-group.

Amongst the States covered. Kerala had the highest level of literacy (87 per cent), followed by three eastern States of Assam (78"), Manipur (77%) and Tripura (73%).

The States where the literacy rates were the lowest were Jammu & Kashmir (40%), followed by Rajasthan (41%). As regards female literacy, Kerala (87%) occupied the first place, followed by Manipur (73%), Assam (73%), Tripura (64%), West Bengal (61%) and Tamil Nadu (61%).

The survey results show that at the All-India level, out of 1.537 family members belonging to age group 5--24 years, 53 per cent had not enrolled themselves at all for any formal education at school/college, 31 per cent of the members had enrolled themselves at primary level, 10 per cent at middle level, 5 per cent at secondary level and only 1 per cent at the graduation level. Only 2 persons, one each in Kerala and Tamil Nadu, had enrolled themselves in technical courses to learn some trade or craft.

In Haryana and Rajasthan, 77 per cent and 71 per cent of the family members, respectively, had not enrolled themselves in any school or college.

6.2.5 Age, Sex and Activity Status

The family members of handloom workers were classified into the following group according to their activity status:

Bonded Labour.

- 2. Employee (Regular/casual).
- 3. Apprentice.
- 4. Self-employed.
- 5. Family worker,
- Not working but seeking/available for work.
- 7. Attending educational institution.
- 8. Not in the labour force.

Percentage distribution of family members of both sexes and in different age groups, by their activity status is given in Table 6.6.

This Table reveals that out of a total of 3,238 family members of 637 workers covered, 43.5 per cent (39.3 per cent regular and 4.2 per cent casual) were employees, 1.5 per cent were self-employed, 4.3 per cent were family workers and 2.2 per cent of them were not working but seeking/available for work. Also, 25.9 per cent of the family memhers were not in labour force and 22.5 per cent were attending educational institutions. Thus, the net percentage of economically active population works out to be 49.3 (about 29 per cent males and 20 per cent females) which shows a significant participation of women workers in the handloom industry. No case of bonded labour was reported from any State. The dominant age group of economically active persons was 15-24 years, which formed 21 per cent of the total family members and within this age group, 60 per cent of the members were reported to be in the labour force.

In the 'below 15 years' age group, 52 per cent of the members were attending educational institutions and 41 per cent of them were not in the labour force. Thus, in this age group, only 7 per cent of the members were economically active.

The above pattern of activity status of the members of sampled families was observed to hold good in the case of most of the states.

6.2.6 Age, Sex and Economic Status

In Table 6.7 an effort has been made to correlate the economic status with the age group of the family members. As we know, economic status depends on the income. Accordingly, to collect data on economic status, persons were classified as 'Farners' and 'Non-Earners'. In a traditional industry like handloom most of the family members tend to follow the occupations of their fore-fathers.

It was observed that 45 per cent of the total members, at All-India level, were earners, whereas 55 per cent of them were non-earners. Male earners accounted for about 28 per cent, while female earners constituted 17 per cent. The survey also revealed that children (below 15 years) accounted for 3

per cent of the total earners. Amongst Non-earners, children (below 15 years) constituted about 62 per cent.

Among the States covered Rajasthan was having the maximum number of earning members (52%), whereas Uttar Pradesh had the minimum (30%). One interesting observation was that in the relatively backward states of Manipur and Tripura, no child was among the earners. Details are presented in Table 6.7.

6.3 Socio-Economic Conditions

6.3.1 Family Income

6.3.1 (i) Monthly income class and family size

The most significant indicator of the economic well-being of a family is the income of the family with reference to its size i.e. the number of family members. Table 6.8 depicted the distribution of selected workers families according to monthly income class and family size in all the 15 States and All-India. In the industry, as a whole, the highest percentage of families (27%) belonged to the monthly income class of Rs. 400—600 while in the case of about 21 per cent families the monthly income ranged from Rs. 600—800. Families whose income was Rs. 1,200 or more per month constituted about 17 per cent of the total at the All-India level. State-wise details may be seen in Table 6.8.

The survey has revealed that 1,458 of the total 3.238 family members (i.e. about 45%), were gainfully employed. The occupational pattern off the employed family members showed that about 85 per cent of them were employed on jobs connected with Handloom Industry, the predominant job being that of weaver. So far as the state-wise position was concerned, of the total earning members engaged in Handloom Industry the proportion of men was the highest in Uttar Pradesh (79%), proportion of women earners was the highest (42%) in Bihar and that of child earners was highest in Jammu & Kashmir (3%).

The major occupation which was pursued by the family members after handloom was agricultural activity in which about 5 per cent of the family earners were engaged. There was no other single occupation having significant employment of family members except that of Bidi roller in which about 2.4 per cent of the employed persons were reported to be engaged. About 1.8 per cent of the earners were in Government service and nearly 1.4 per cent were shopkeepers or salesmen.

6.3.1 (ii) Earning Strength and Family Income

In Table 6.9 an attempt has been made to establish linkage between total family income and the number of earners in the family. At All-India level, about 43 per cent of the families were having two

carners each, whereas 26.5 per cent were singlecarner families. About 41 per cent families had carnings of less than Rs. 600 per month. The monthly income of about 17 per cent families was Rs. 1,200 and above. It was noticed that with an increase in monthly family income, there was corresponding increase in the number of earners per family. About 14 per cent of the families had 4 to 6 earners each. This indicated that in the Handloom Industry active participation by the tamily members to supplement their family income was widely prevalent. In Rajasthan and Maharashtra, less than 10 per cent of the families were having single earners. Details may be seen in Table 6.9.

6.3.1 (iii) Average monthly family income by source, category of earners and income class

Table 6.10 shows the distribution of average monthly income per family by source, category of earners and income class in Handloom industry, as a whole. Statistics at State level are also available and can be furnished by the Bureau on request. At All-India level, the average monthly income per family for men from paid employment in selected occupations (i.e. occupations directly related to Handloom Industry) was Rs. 482.44, whereas average income per family from employment in non-selected occupations, (i.e. occupations other than those belonging to Handloom), was Rs. 107.34. The corresponding figures for women Rs. 161.90 and Rs. 14.69, respectively, whereas for children these were Rs. 4.88 and Rs. 3.01 respectively. The incidence of average monthly income per family from self-employment in selected and nonselected occupations was negligible at All-India level since it was reported in a few States only. Remittances from agricultural land etc., contributed Rs 19.46 to the total average monthly family income of Rs. 808.34.

6.3.1 (iv) Distribution of families by monthly per capita income and family size

Table 6.11 presents the percentage distribution of families by monthly per capita income classes and family size. Nearly 71 per cent of the families at All-India level were having a per capita income of less than Rs. 200 per month. Out of a total of 637 families surveyed, the maximum number of families viz 180 (i.e. about 28%), were in the per capita income group of Rs. 100 to less than Rs. 150.

In the States of West Bengal and Tripura 58 per cent and 42 per cent of the families respectively, were having their per capita income as less than Rs. 100 p.m. On the other hand were States like Haryana (54% families), Manipur (36%), Karnataka and Assam (28% each) having their per capita montily family income as more than Rs. 300.

6.3.1. (v) Per capita monthly income by family size and family income classes

Table 6.12 shows the per capita monthly income by family size and monthly family income classes. At the All-India level, the per capita income for 637 families of Handloom workers surveyed, was found to be Rs. 183.19. It was also observed that with the increase in income, per capita income was also found to be increasing, whereas with the increase in family size, per capita family income registered a fall. Among the States, Haryana was found to have the highest per capita income of about Rs. 390, followed by Assam (Rs. 271) and Manipur thearty Rs. 257). The lowest per capita income was recorded in West Bengal (Rs. 100). Further details may be seen in Table 6.12.

6.3.2 Family Assets and Receipts

6.3.2. (i) Possession of houses/house sites and agricultural land

The percentage distribution of families reporting possession of house/house sites and agricultural land by average area and value per reporting family is shown in Table 6.13. Of all the families covered, 79 per cent reported possession of house, 11 per cent reported owning of some agricultural land and 4 per cent of the families were having cattle sheds. Less than one per cent of the families teomprising two families from Assam and one each from Tamil Nadu and Manipur), were in possession of house sites. Only one family from Assam reported having a poultry shed.

The overall average area of agricultural land owned per family worked out to 3.54 acres, valued at about Rs. 31,000. Similarly, the average area per family for the house owned was 68 sq. mts., valued at little more than Rs. 23,000. The families owning houses belonged to the States of West Bengal, Manipur, J&K and Bihar.

The survey also revealed that almost all the families reported having acquired houses or land as ancestral property. Only 38 families (i.e. about 6%), 13 of which belonged to Tamil Nadu, 9 to A.P., 4 to Kerala, 3 each to Maharashtra and Rajasthan, 2 to Haryana and one each to Assam, Manipur. Orissa and Tripura reported having purchased the land and constructed the house from their own resources. Five families of Handloom workers in Tamil Nadu and 2 in Karnataka reported having acquired houses on hire-purchase basis.

6.3.2. (ii) Life Insurance and Provident Fund

In respect of the total number of 1,458 earners in the 637 families covered, information was collected as to whether these earners were holding any Life Insurance Policy or were members of any provident fund, such as, G.P.F./E.P.F., etc. The

percentage distribution of such workers and the value of LIC policies held are depicted in Table 6.14.

At the All-India level, out of 1,458 earners, only 159 (11%), were holding LIC policies in their names and the value of these LIC policies was mostly upto Rs. 10,000 only. Barely 3.1 per cent of the total carners in the country were members of Employees Provident Fund and about 0.3 per cent were members of General Provident Fund.

Quite interestingly, about 42 per cent of the total carners in Tamil Nadu were having LIC policies in their names, which reflects the sense of awareness of the workers in this State towards security for their future. Details about the other States may be seen in Table 6.14.

6.3 3 Indebtedness

Incidence of indebtedness has a direct bearing on income and the family size. Table 6.15 shows the incidence of indebtedness by average monthly income and size of the family. At the All-India level the incidence of indebtedness was reported to be around 26 per cent as 163 families out of the total of 637 families covered were under debt. A further look at this Table would reveal that up to a certain level of income, the incidence of indebtedness is increasing but at higher levels of income, the incidenceoe of indebtedness tended to go down A similar trend was also observed with regard to increase in the family size. The incidence of indebtedness was seen to be increasing with the increase in family size up to a certain level, after which it showed a tendency to decline,

Among the States, the highest level of indebtedness was reported from Kerala where about 54 per cent of the families were under debt, and the lowest (5%), from Maharashtra. In J&K, however, no family out of the total of 15 families surveyed, had contracted any loan.

In Table 6.16 is shown the percentage distribution of families under debt by loan-amount groups and family size. At All-India level, out of the total of 163 families which reported having contracted loans, the highest (i.e. 27%) fell in the loan-amount group of Rs. 2.001–-5.000. Similarly, the highest percentage (i.e. 39%), of the families under debt belonged to the family size group of 4-5. This Table also shows that 69 per cent of the indebted families fell in the two consecutive family size groups of 4-5 and 6-7 members.

Table 6.17 shows the average amount of debt per family and per indebted family, by family income class. As earlier stated out of the total of 637 families covered, 163 families had contracted loans. The basic idea behind preparing this Table was to study the movement in the average amount

of loan per indebted family, with reference to the income class of family. At the All-India level, the average original and outstanding amount of loan per family, whether indebted or not, was found to be Rs. 922 and Rs. 706 respectively, while the original and outstanding amount of loan per indebted family worked out to be Rs. 3.605 and Rs. 2,760 respectively. It was seen that the average amount of loan (both original and outstanding), per indebted family increased constantly as the income rose. It was also revealed that about 70 per cent of the total indebted families belonged to the income group of Rs. 200 to Rs. 800 per month.

Among the States, the highest average amount of loan, both original and outstanding, was reported from Manipur but the corresponding figures were the lowest in the nearby State of Tripura.

Table 6.18 presented the percentage distribution of loans by the nature of loan i.e. hereditary or otherwise and in cash or kind. Survey results show that at the All-India level, about 95 per cent of the loans were contracted by present family members whereas about 5 per cent of the loans were hereditary. Break-up of the loans taken by the present family members was about 94 per cent in cash and only 1 per cent in kind. It was found that in most of the States, all the loans were obtained in cash. Some loans in kind were reported only from Bihar and U.P. In West Bengal the percentage of inherited loans was the highest among all the States, being 25 per cent. Further details may be seen in Table 6.18.

Table 6.19 shows the average amounts of original and outstanding loans per indebted family by purpose of loan.

At the All-India level, three out of every four indebted families took loans on family account and about 29 per cent incurred debt on enterprise account. About 25 per cent families contracted loans for marriages and other ceremonies, followed by 21 per cent and 18 per cent for production purposes and sickness and child birth respectively. The percentages given in Col. 2 of Table 6.19 do not add up to 100 in all cases since some of the families and raised more than one loan for separate purposes.

The highest average original and outstanding loans of Rs. 8,643 and Rs. 7,293, respectively, were reported for the purpose of purchasing assets and the lowest of Rs. 600 and Rs. 575 for meeting legal expenses.

It was significant to note in the context of social obligations of our toiling unorganised work force, that of the total number of indebted families about 25 per cent were found to have contracted loans for marriages and other ceremonies with original average amount of loan as Rs. 3,711 and outstanding

loan amount of Rs. 3,161. As opposed to this, only about 4 per cent of the total indebted families had incurred debt for productive purposes, such as, purchase of assets like booth for running ration shop, with an average original amount of loan as Rs. 8,643. This revealed that larger amounts of loans were utilised on enterprise account by the indebted workers.

At the State level, the survey results indicate that in Assam and Maharashtra, all the indebted families took loans for marriage and other ceremonies only. In Tripura 75 per cent of the indebted families had to take loans for sickness and/or child birth. Of all the indebted families in Karnataka, about two-thirds contracted loans for construction of house, which was a healthy sign, and 62 per cent of the indebted families in West Bengal raised loans for production purposes. More details in this respect can be had from Table 6.19.

The distribution of loans raised from different sources according to the rate of interest charged is presented in Table 6.20. Data for all the States combined show that the average amount of the 181 loans contracted by indebted families Rs. 3,246. Out of the total number of loans, 36 (i.e. 20 per cent), with an average amount of Rs. 2.111, were taken at the exorbitant rate of 36 per cent or more. Loans taken at 20 per cent or more but less than 36 per cent rate of interest were 33 (i.e. about 18 per cent). Out of these 69 loans, 54 were taken from money lenders suggesting that among all the sources available for raising loans, high rates of interest were mostly charged by the money lenders.

Table 6.20 also shows that money lenders (59 loans), followed by "Bank, Govt. or LIC" (55 loans), were the two most common sources for getting loans on interest. Friends and relatives were the main source (18 loans) for receiving interest free loans, followed by Employers (15 loans).

During the course of the survey enquiries were also made from the indebted families about the nature of security given for loans raised from various sources. The available data reveal that at the All-India level, about 70 per cent of all the loans contracted from various sources were advanced without any security. All the loans from Employers, about 91 per cent of those from friends and relatives, 83 per cent of those from money lenders and nearly 59 per cent of the loans from cooperative societies were given without insisting on any security. In case of only 8 per cent of the loans security of land or house was given. For about 13 per cent loans either looms were mortgaged or a loan deed was executed by the needy workers.

In Table 6.21 is shown the percentage distribution of loans by duration of loan and the average amount involved in the original as well as the outstanding loans. The position at the All-India level revealed that the highest percentage of loans (i.e. about 35 per cent), were contracted for a duration of one year to less than 2 years preceding the teference period specified for this purpose, viz. December, 1987. About 30 per cent of the total loans of 181 were taken for a period of less than one year, prior to the reference date. Only about 3 per cent loans were taken for more than 10 years' duration. Table 6.21 also reveals that the proportion of loans went on decreasing as the duration increased beyond two years.

As for the average amounts of loans, both original and outstanding, these were very high where the period was between 5 to less than 10 years.

Information collected on the mode of repayment of loans shows that almost all the loans contracted were supposed to be repaid in cash. In Haryana, however, 25 per cent of the loans taken, constituting less than 1 per cent in the country, were supposed to be repaid by putting in manual labour. All such loans were advanced by the employers.

6.3.4 Qualitative Standard of Living and Dietary Habits

During the course of the survey, attempts were also made to get an idea of the standard of living of the handloom workers in the country, their material possessions and their consumption and dictary habits. The information collected is discussed in the ensuing paragraphs.

(a) Source and Supply of Drinking Water

Information was collected on the source and supply of drinking water to the handloom workers' households and approximate distance of source of water from dwelling places. The findings are shown in Table 6.22. The most common source of drinking water among the families surveyed (at All-India level) was tap water 37 per cent, followed by hand pump 25 per cent and pucca well 23 per cent. However, about 4 per cent of the families, all from Tamil Nadu and Orissa, reported that the source of their water needs was the canal, river or lorry service, etc.

Regarding the location of the source of water, about 30 per cent of the families had independent water source inside their premises and 5 per cent families had water supply just outside their premises. Quite significantly, about 62 per cent of the families surveyed had shared/public water supply source outside their premises. Out of these 62 per cent families, having shared water supply source outside their premises, 75 per cent had the source of water within 0.25 km. from their living places.

(b) Possession of Durable Articles and Livestock

In Table 6.23 is shown the percentage of families reporting possession of different durable articles and livestock. It will be seen from the Table that at the All-India level, about 42 per cent families of handloom workers owned bicycles, 41 per cent radio or transistors and nearly 23 per cent had electric fans. Only 2.5 per cent families had T. V. receiver sets. About 68 per cent of the families surveyed possessed cot/bed-stead and 42 per cent had wrist watches. Cow/buffalo was kept in only about 7 per cent of all families covered. Stainless steel and aluminium utensils were the most commonly used utensils among the households surveyed. Details at state level may be seen in Table 6.23.

(c) Consumption Pattern and dietary Habits

Table 6.24 gives information on the average monthly consumption, per family and per capita, of milk and milk products, meat and meat products, fruits, intoxicants and of bidi, cigarettes and tobacco, among the handloom workers in the States covered.

At the All-India level, it was found that 4 out of every 5 families surveyed reported consumption of milk but the average monthly per capita consumption among the reporting families was only 2.42 litres and the corresponding figure for all families worked out to 1.95 litres. About 98 per cent families consumed oils and the average per capita consumption was 0.42 litres. The Table 6.24 also gives similar information about the consumption of meat and fish, fruits, intoxicants and bidi, cigarettes and tobacco.

6 3.5 Housing

(a) Distribution of Families by Type of Ownership of Dwelling

Table 6.25 presents the percentage distribution of families by type of ownership of dwelling. Out of the 637 families surveyed in the country, as a whole the survey revealed that 76 per cent of the families lived in self owned houses whereas only about 17 per cent of the families lived in privately rented houses. Significantly, only about 4 per cent of the families lived in houses provided by the employer, tonly 2 per cent of the families lived in Govt./Semi-Govt, accommodation most of which was on Hire purchase basis. All the families covered in the States of Bihar, Jammu and Kashmir, Manipur and West Bengal were living in self-owned accommodation.

(b) Distribution of Dwellings by Various Characteristics

Table 6.26 shows the percentage distribution of dwellings by various characteristics, viz., type of dwelling, approach, kind of structure, particulars

of accommodation and source of energy used for lighting and cooking purposes. The findings are briefly discussed below:—

(i) Lype of dwelling

Of the 637 families surveyed, 464 (73 per cent) were found in possession of independent houses, whereas 24 per cent were living in Chawl/Basti. In the States of Assam, Bihar, Jammu and Kashmir, Karnataka, Kerala, Manipur and West Bengal almost all the families were found possessing independent houses. In Tamil Nadu and Haryana, 9 per cent and 8 per cent of the families respectively were living in Flats.

(ii) Approach

The survey revealed that nearly 85 per cent of the families were having an independent approach to their dwelling, whereas the rest of the families did not have independent approach.

(iii) Kind of structure

Type of walls—Nearly 44 per cent of the families were living in houses having kutcha walls, whereas 35 per cent of the families were having pucca walls and the remaining 21 per cent families had Semi-Pucca walls in their houses. In West Bengal and Orissa more than 60 per cent of the families were having Kutcha walls in their dwellings.

Type of roof—Only 36 per cent of the families were having Pucca roof over their heads, whereas 40 per cent of families were having only Kutcha roof in their dwellings. In the rest of the cases the roofs were semi-pucca.

Type of flooring—About 53 per cent of the families surveyed were having Kutcha floor in their houses, whereas only 33 per cent of the families were having Pucca floors.

Height of structure—Only 8 per cent of the families surveyed were living in houses which were less than 7 feet in height. About 46 per cent of the families were living in houses having height of more than 9 feet and another 46 per cent families had houses with height of 7 to 9 feet.

(iv) Particulars of Accommodation

Store—Nearly 89 per cent of the families reported not having any store room in their houses. Only 11 per cent of the families were having this facility. In the states of Haryana, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Tripura and West Bengal none of the families surveyed had any store room in their houses.

Kitchen—Only 50 per cent of the families surveyed were having an independent Kitchen in their house. About 49 per cent of the families had no provision for a Kitchen.

Bathroom—Approximately 72 per cent of the families reported absence of a Bathroom in their dwellings. However, nearly 25 per cent of the families were having the facility of an independent Bathroom in their houses

Latrine Descention Facility—Almost 64 per cent of the handroom worker's families were not having proper defecation facility in their houses. About 23 per cent of families were having independent latrines in their houses and the rest 13 per cent had shared latrines

Drains Almost 60 per cent of the dwelling units were not having drains in their localities. Only 10 per cent of the households surveyed were having satisfactory drainage arrangements.

Ventitation: One healthy feature of the worker's dwellings was that nearly 72 per cent of them were having either proper ventilation or window, or both.

(v) Source of Energy

Lighting Majority of the families (65 per cent) were having electric lighting arrangements in their houses, whereas only 35 per cent of the families were using Kerosene lamps for lighting purpose.

Cooking—The survey revealed that nearly 87 per cent of the families were either using Coke/Coal, Firewood, Dung Cakes, Charcoal or a combination of them, as fuel for cooking purposes. Only about 10 per cent of the families were found using Kerosene oil for doing their cooking. Cooking gas (oil or gobar gas) was the fuel used for cooking by about 3 per cent of the families.

Thus the overall scenario regarding the type of dwelling and other particulars of the dwelling unit presented above reflected that the workers engaged in Handloom industry were having reasonably good dwellings as the following figures spoke for themselves:

- (a) 76 per cent of the families lived in selfowned houses.
- (b) 73 per cent of the families had independent houses
- (c) 85 per cent of the families had independent approach to their houses.
- (d) 50 per cent of the families had independent Kitchen.
- (e) 72 per cent of the dwelling units had proper ventilation.
- (f) 65 per cent of the families used electricity for lighting purposes.

Floor Area of Living Room Per Person and Per Family

A living room area for the purpose of this survey was defined as that which would exclude Kitchen, store, etc. if these are provided separately in the dwelling.

Table 6.27 gives per family and per person average floor area of living rooms by family size. At the All-India level, the average floor area per family and per person was 25.13 sq. mtrs. and 4.94 sq. mtrs., respectively. The minimum and maximum average floor area for different family sizes varied from 13.75 sq. mts. to 40.56 sq. mts. and for per person it varied from 3.47 sq. mts. to 13.75 sq. mts.

The average floor area (for all family sizes) per family was the highest in Manipur (58.57 sq. mts.) and lowest in Orissa (12.80 sq. mts.). State-wise details may be seen in Table 6.27.

6.3.6 Sickness and Occupational Disease

An attempt was made to find out the incidence of various types of sickness/ailments, duration of sickness and type of treatment, etc. among the

family members of the handloom workers surveycd. The reference period for this purpose was taken as the preceding three months from the date of survey. The data collected in this regard was however, found to be rather sketchy due to various reasons, such as, poor memory of the respondent/reporter, reluctance to disclose the nature of disease, ignorance about the names of various diseases, etc. However, an analysis of these data reveals that common cold and cough and fever accounted for 40 per cent of the total cases reported. Amongst the States, Tamil Nadu topped in reporting various types of sickness, accounting for about 30 per cent at the All-India level. Allopathic treatment was the most popular since 91 per cent of the cases were treated by this system of medicine.

As regards occupational diseases, no case was reported of any worker having contracted occupational disease among the 637 workers covered by the survey. Considering the non-hazardous nature of occupations in handloom industry, the incidence of occupational disease as enlisted under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, was not evident.

CHAPTER VII

SUMMARY OF THE FINDINGS

7.1 Background of the Industry

The handloom industry ranks next to agriculture in terms of size, income & employment potential. This Irdustry provides employment to about 20 million people on 3.3 million handlooms. In 1986, about 3466 million metres, 36 per cent of the total cotton cloth produced, was produced in this sector.

The handloom Industry which was once a thriving & vibrating industry, having place of pride in the international market subsequently fell in the face of large scale invasion by the British manufacturers of cotton goods industry. For generations the families of these deprived workers remained in poor working and living conditions as the only agricultural industry which they could fall on was far less remunerative

It was only when the Indian National Movement caught up momentum that the Govt. thought of these workers employed in the Industry. After independence the Govt, took several measures to review the industry to improve the lot of the workers. Ultimately, the All-India Handloom Board was reconstituted in December, 1976 and a Development Commissioner for Handlooms was appointed.

7.2 Organisation & Structure

The industry comprises of:--

(i) Household looms run by independent weavers. (ii) Looms run by master weavers. (iii) Cooperative societies. The independent weavers manage the work by himself or with the help of his family members and do not employ outside worker. The master weavers may either directly employ some workers and run as an industrial unit or may appoint agents to supply raw material and collect finished material from the weavers working in their households. The Directorate of Handlooms and Textiles in the States concerned assist the Co-operative societies whereas the state Handloom Development Corporations help the weavers who are outside the Co-operative fold. The Industrial Co-operative societies work in the shed and the looms are owned by the societies whereas the primary societies supply raw material to the weavers and collect finished material from them.

7.3 Location areas of Concentration

Handloom industry is a traditional industry and has all India character. However, the areas of concentration to which the present Survey was confined, are shown against each state:—

7.4 Scope, Coverage and Design of Survey

The Survey aims at studying the working and living conditions of workers working in the Handloom Industry. Watch and ward, office staff and sales staff were left out of the purview of this study.

Due to the resource constraints, the Survey was confined only to the centres/pockets having concentration. However, the results were shown as if the entire state was included in the survey. While interpreting or analysing the data this factor may be kept in mind.

The number of units allotted to each State/U.T. were in proportion to the number of workers engaged in the industry in that state. The same criteria was applied while allotting the units to the centres/pockets. It was, however, kept in mind that from the selected states at least 10 units would be surveyed. From each unit one employer schedule was canvassed, if the employment was less than 20, two if employment was more than 20 but less than 100, and three if the employment was 100 or more. Accordingly 312 employer schedules and 637 workers schedules were canvassed.

7.5 Distribution of covered units according to various characteristics

(i) Type of Ownership—Out of the total number of units surveyed about 68 per cent were working within the Co-operative fold, 20 per cent belonged to the private sector and the rest i.e. 4 per cent were in the public sector.

(ii) Product Manufactured—34 per cent units were engaged in the manufacture of bed sheets followed by cotton saree (33 per cent), cotton dhoti (27 per cent) and towel, handkerchief and napkins (22 per cent). The percentage of units engaged in the manufacture of shirting cloth, silk sarees and finishing cloth was 21, 20 & 18 respectively.

(iii) Manufacturing Process—Of the 312 units 60 per cent were engaged in the weaving process of which 40 per cent were engaged in weaving as well as allied process.

(iv) Coverage under Labour Laws

A vast majority of the workers engaged in the Industry work in their own houses and as such

their working conditions are not governed by any of the legislations. However, 5 per cent workers were found to be covered under Shops & Establishments Act and 3 per cent under Factories Act.

(v) Number of Looms Installed and Actually Working

During the period of survey the number of looms installed in the shed and in the premises of the workers were reported to be 5.687 and 50,339 respectively. Whereas only 4,302 looms in the sheds and 36.514 in the premises of the workers were found to be working when these units were visited.

7.6 Period of Survey

The Survey in handloom industry was launched in March, 1987 and completed in September same year.

7.7 Difficulties experienced

The handloom industry is spread over through out the country in haphazard manner and no upto-date list of units or number of looms installed were available from any quarters and to acquire the frame for drawing sample proved to be a formidable task. The majority of the units were not maintaining any record and in quite good number of cases, management was reluctant to divulge information. The illitracy, undue apprehensions despite best efforts to remove them made the task of collecting information quite difficult.

7.8 Employment

Eighty six per cent workers were employed through the co-operative societies, 11 per cent by master weavers and the remaining 3 per cent were working in the non-household units.

94 per cent workers were weavers and 3 per cent were bobbins winders. 84 per cent weavers were working in their own premises and the remaining in the sheds. Women weavers were 43 per cent and Child workers were only I per cent. 96 per cent workers were not covered under any Act. Also 72 per cent of the surveyed units were employing women workers and 5 per cent were employing children. Of the total labour force in 312 surveyed units, women workers constituted 44 per cent.

7.9 Earnings

Ninety-one per cent of Handloom workers were paid on piece rate basis and the rest on time rated basis. Most of the piece rated workers were weavers. Pay period in respect of 62 per cent of the workers was not fixed. Pay period of 16 per cent workers was one month and 14 per cent workers was a week. 4 per cent each of the workers were either paid daily or fortnightly.

Income of time rated workers (daily wage rates) ranged between Rs. 6.73 to Rs. 45.15. Average daily earnings of piece rated men weavers ranged between Rs. 4.67 to Rs. 50.00, Rs. 4.29 to Rs. 43.33 for women weavers and Rs. 3.46 to Rs. 8.00 for child workers.

7.10 Statutory Bonus and Ex-Gratia Payments

Thirty-four per cent of the units under obligation to pay bonus/paid bonus. The range of payment varied from 8.33 per cent to 20 per cent of the wages, 19 per cent of the units under obligation were, however, m king ex-gratic payme to

7.11 Fines and Deductions

Forty one per cent of the units were imposing tines and making deductions. 79 per cent of the reporting units were paying the money in the Employees' Society Fund.

7.12 Working Conditions

Thirty-two per cent of the workers were reported working for 8 hours, 26 per cent for 8 to 10 hours and 3 per cent for 12 to 15 hours. About 20 per cent were four d to be working for less than 8 hours. 48 per cent workers in the Industry were working for more than 48 hours in a week. As regards rest interval it was found that 89 per cent of the workers were given rest interval more than one hour.

About 82 per cent of the sampled workers reported that they were granted leave and holidays without wages. 9 per cent of the werkers were getting leave & holiday with wages and other 9 per cent were not allowed leave. 37 per cent workers were deprived of the weekly rest day where as 58 per cent had it without wages.

(Para 5.3)

7.14 Welfare Facilities

Ninety-four per cent of the workers working under the sheds were enjoying the facility of drinking water. Lattines had been provided for about 72 per cent and urinals for nearly 71 per cent of the workers working under the sheds.

(Paras 5.4.1, 5.4.2)

(ii) No facility as regards to canteens, Rest shelters and creches, washing and transport was reported from any of the units surveyed.

(Para 5.4.3)

7.15 Accommodation to the Workers

Four per cent of the workers had been provided residential accommodation by the employers or the Ce-operative societies. 88 per cent of the reported workers were provided homes on hire purchase basis.

(Para 5.4.4)

7.16 Medical Facilities at Work Sites

Only 10 per cent units were found to have kept first aid boxes for the use of the workers and the contents in case of 5 units were found deficient.

(Para 5.4.5)

7.17 Social Security

Only 3 per cent of the workers were entitled to become members of the P.F. scheme and 98 per cent of the entitled workers were actually paying towards. P.F. contribution. 20.5 per cent of the workers were entitled to become the members of the Thrift Fund and all have been enrolled as members. About twenty six per cest of the workers were entitled to become members of the similar other social security schemes and all were found to av. if this facility. The rate of contribution for P.F. & Thrift Fund schemes were from 6.25 per cest to 10 per cent and 3 per cent to 12 per cent respectively. The matching contribution was made by the Employers/Society.

(ii) Only 4 per cent of the units surveyed were found paying gratuity as per the provisions.

(Para 5.5.2)

(iii) The Survey revealed that trade unionism had not developed to any significant extent in the Handloom industry as about 93 per cent of the units covered were not having any trade union and barely 4 per cent of the workers in the industry were members of the trade unions.

(Para 5.6.2)

(iv) Since this industry is highly unorganised, a proper procedure to sort out the grievances of the workers was non-existent in most of the cases.

(Para 5.6.3)

7.18 Living Condition

About seventy-three per cent of the families surveyed belonged to other communities, than S.C., S.T. and Muslims. 19.3 per cent of surveyed families belonged to Muslim community. 5.8 to the Scheduled Caste and 1.6 per cent to Scheduled Tribe.

(Para 6.2.1)

7.19 Family Size and Composition

The average size of the number of surveyed families (637) worked out to be 5.08 members comprising 1.72 adult male, 1.56 adult female and 1.80 children.

(Para 6.2.2)

(ii) The Survey revealed that at All-India level there were about 913 females for every 1000 males among the total number of families surveyed. 44 per cent of the members were reported to be married and about 4 per cent to be widow/widowers/divorcees/separatees.

(Para 6.2.3)

7.20 Age, Sex and Level of Literacy

At All-India level, 71 per cent of males and 50 per cent of females of the age of 5 years and above had achieved varying levels of literacy ranging from 'literacy' to 'Graduate and above'. The overall literacy rate amongst the sampled families was 61 per cent.

(Para 6.2.4)

7.21 Age. Sex and Activity Status

Out of the total of 3,238 family members 43.5 per cent were employees, 1.5 per cent were self employed, 4.3 per cent were family workers and 2.2 per cent were seeking/available for work, 25.9 per cent of the family members were not in labour force and 22.5 per cent were attending educational institutions. The net percentage of economically active population works out to be 49.3 per cent. The most economically active age group was 15 to 24 years which formed 21 per cent of the total family members and 60 per cent of the members within this age group.

1.22 Age, Sex and Economic Status

Forty-five per cent of the total family members, at All-India level, were earners, whereas 55 per cent of them were non-carners. Male earners accounted for about 28 per cent, while female earners constituted 17 per cent. The Survey revealed that children accounted for 3 per cent of the total earners. Among non-earners, children constituted about 6 per cent.

7.23 Family Income

Twenty-seven per cent of the families belonged to monthly income class Rs. 400—600 followed by 21 per cent in the monthly income class Rs. 600 to 800. Families with income Rs. 1200 or more constituted about 17 per cent of the total families at All-India level.

The major occupation which was pursued by the family members was in the Handloom Industry itself. Only 5 per cent of the members were engaged in the agricultural activity.

(ii) About 43 per cent of the families were having two earners each, whereas 26.5 per cent families were single earner families.

[Para 6.3.1 (ii)]

(iii) At All-India level, the average monthly income per family for men from paid employment in selected occupation was 482.44 and non-selected occupation Rs. 107.34. The corresponding figure for women and Children workers were Rs. 161.90, 14.69 and 4.88, 3.01 respectively.

(iv) Nearly 71 per cent of the families at All-In ia level were having a per capita income of less than Rs. 200 per month. The maximum number of families i.e. 28 per cent were in the per capita income group of Rs. 100 to less than Rs. 150.

7.24 Family Assets and Receipts

(i) 79 per cent of the families surveyed reported possession of house, 11 per cent reported possession of Agricultural land and 4 per cent reported having cattle shed.

(ii) Out of 1458 earners, only 159 (11 per cent) were holding LIC policies in their names and the value of these LIC policies was mostly up to Rs. 10.000 only. Barely 3.1 per cent of the total corners were members of the Employees provident fund.

1.25 Indebtedness

Twenty-six per cent (163) families out of the total of 637 covered were reported under debt. It has been revealed by the analysis that the family income and size of the family has a direct bearing on the incidence of indebtedness. The original and outstanding loan per family surveyed and per indebted family was reported to be Rs. 932, Rs. 706. Rs. 3605 and Rs. 2760 respectively.

At All-India level 3 out of every four indebted families took loans on family account and about 29 per cent incurred debt on enterprise account.

(Para 6.3.3)

7.26 Qualitative Standard of Living and Dietary

Thirty-seven per cent of the families surveyed used top water, followed by hand pump 25 per cent, and pucca well 23 per cent.

Forty-two per cent families owned bicycles, 41 per cent radio/transistors and nearly 23 per cent electric fans. Only 2.5 per cent were having T.V. Sets. Cow/buffalo was kept by only 7 per cent families covered. Stainless steel and aluminium utensils were mostly used by the households surveyed.

Four out of every 5 families covered reported consumption of milk though the average was only 2.42 litres per month. About 98 per cent of the families covered consumed oils and the average per capita consumption was 0.42 litres.

7.27 Housing

Seventy-six per cent of the total families surveyed lived in self owned houses, whereas 17 per cent of the families lived in privately rented houses. Only 4 per cent of the families lived in houses provided by the employer. 2 per cent families were living in accommodation provided on hire/purchase basis.

(Para 6.3.5)

7.28 Sickness and Occupational Disease

No case was reported regarding occupations diseases, as the nature of occupation was non-hazardous. The members were found suffering from common diseases i.e. cold and fever, and allopathic treatment was found to be popular amongst the surveyed families.


