## INTRODUCTION

With the growth in fertiliser consciousness, it is inevitable that *Fertiliser Statistics* should be expected, in each successive issue, to provide more relevant data to cover different related aspects of the fertiliser industry. It is, therefore, becoming difficult for us in each successive year to reconcile the conflicting demands of additional information and yet retaining the compactness of this book. Updating of data has, therefore, had to be combined with modification of contents and layout.

The publication of data has been made possible by the cooperation of the Government and the Industry. Primary statistics of various types are to be found in the records of the Government, the Industry and the research institutions. Often, these are unpublished. Even the published information is scattered over a large number of publications and is not generally available in a form that it can be put to ready use. A lot of collection, tabulation and compilation becomes necessary to meet each individual's need. Quite a frustrating task. And fertiliser and its related fields are no exception. This book is, therefore, brought out every year in order to bring together all suitable data regarding fertilisers, both published and unpublished, with a view to presenting a comprehensive picture of the fertiliser situation. We hope that it will continue to meet the needs of all those who are interested in economic development through intensive agriculture in which fertiliser plays a key role.

As usual, the book has been presented in four parts. First part deals with Indian fertiliser statistics; part two with Indian agricultural and allied statistics; and part three with world fertiliser and agricultural statistics. Part four contains a brief write-up about our Active Member firms and a list of other Members.

In part I, chapters have been updated to cover itemwise data in respect of production, capacity, raw materials used, actual quantum of production, despatches, imports and consumption and prices. Each aspect covers separately all the three primary nutrients, i.e. N, P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> and K<sub>2</sub>O. Fertiliser projects under various stages of implementation have been incorporated to present all-India capacity of N and P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>.

Data on plant nutrients removed, soil-testing laboratories and railway freight rates for fertilisers have been included to facilitate a more comprehensive consideration of fertiliser use.

The production and despatch statistics of indigenous phosphate rock located at Udaipur (Rajasthan), Jhabua (M.P.) and Mussoorie (U.P.) have considerably been elaborated in the issue.

While making use of the distribution figures, following aspects should be kept in view:

- (i) Distribution data comprises despatches made to different states by the Central Fertiliser Pool, Indian Potash Ltd. and the domestic manufacturers.
- (ii) Pool distributes imported nitrogenous and complex fertilisers and manufacturers market the indigenous material. Movement of indigenous material is controlled under the Essential Commodities Act.

- (iii) The statewise consumption figures for the 3-year period 1977-78 to 1979-80 are derived from the deliberations of the Zonal Conferences held twice a year by the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Reconstruction, Department of Agriculture, New Delhi. The districtwise/seasonwise consumption figures have been taken from the respective states' Departments of Agriculture.

Part II dealing with Indian agricultural and allied statistics complements Part I. Besides land utilisation statistics, it contains production of crops, areas covered under special agricultural programmes like High Yielding Varieties, Multiple Cropping, Small Farmers Development Agency, etc. Basic statistics on population and agricultural economy will, we hope, make the section comprehensive.

Part III contains fertiliser and agricultural statistics on production and consumption in other countries to enable a comparable study with our Indian situation, e.g. fertiliser consumption per hectare, consumption ratio, prices, etc.

### **Presentation**

Data are presented for the latest available year and are mostly on April-March basis except in a few cases where statistics on July-June have also been provided. Consumption figures are on February-January basis as these are recorded from the Zonal Conferences. Owing to rounding off, the total of columns may not, in every case, tally with the sum of the constituent items.

For the purpose of this edition of *Fertiliser Statistics*, the country has been divided into the following five zones:

1. CENTRAL : Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and Delhi.
2. EAST : Assam, Bihar, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Orissa, West Bengal, Manipur, Tripura, Arunachal Pradesh and Andaman.
3. NORTH : Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Punjab and Chandigarh.
4. SOUTH : Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Pondicherry and Leccadive Islands.
5. WEST : Gujarat, Maharashtra, Goa, Daman & Diu and Dadra & Nagar Haveli.

The sources from which the data have been derived are indicated at the bottom of each Table. Where no source is given for a particular Table, the data may be assumed to have been collected and tabulated by the FAI.

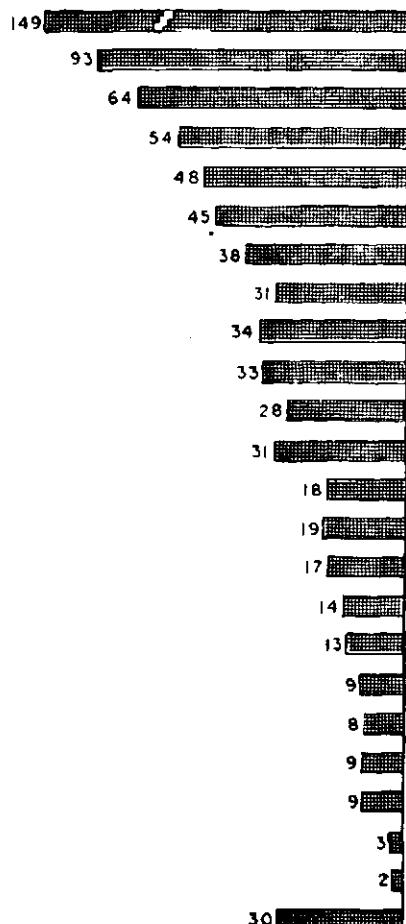

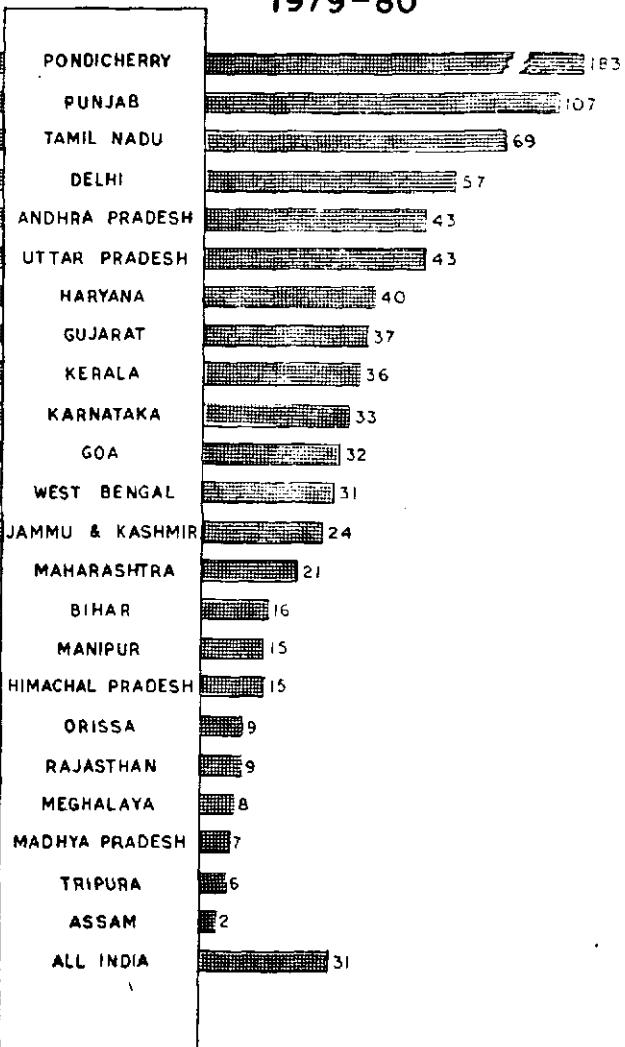

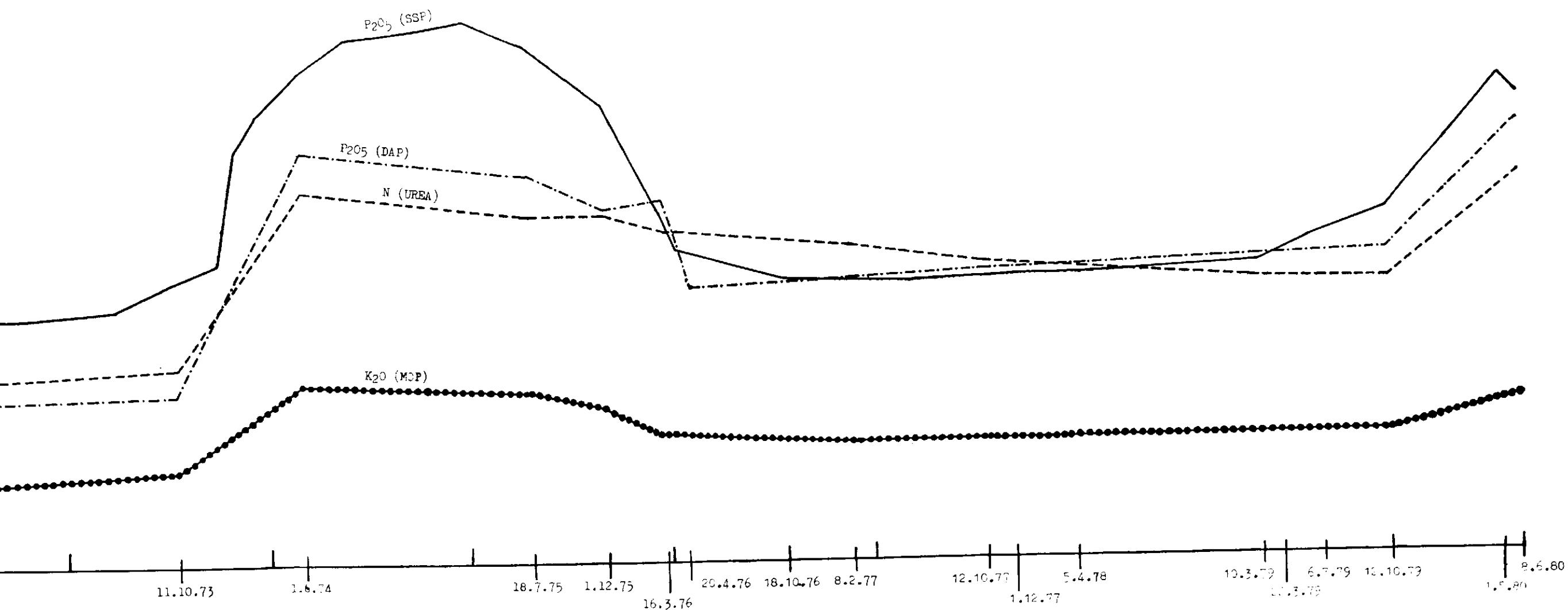

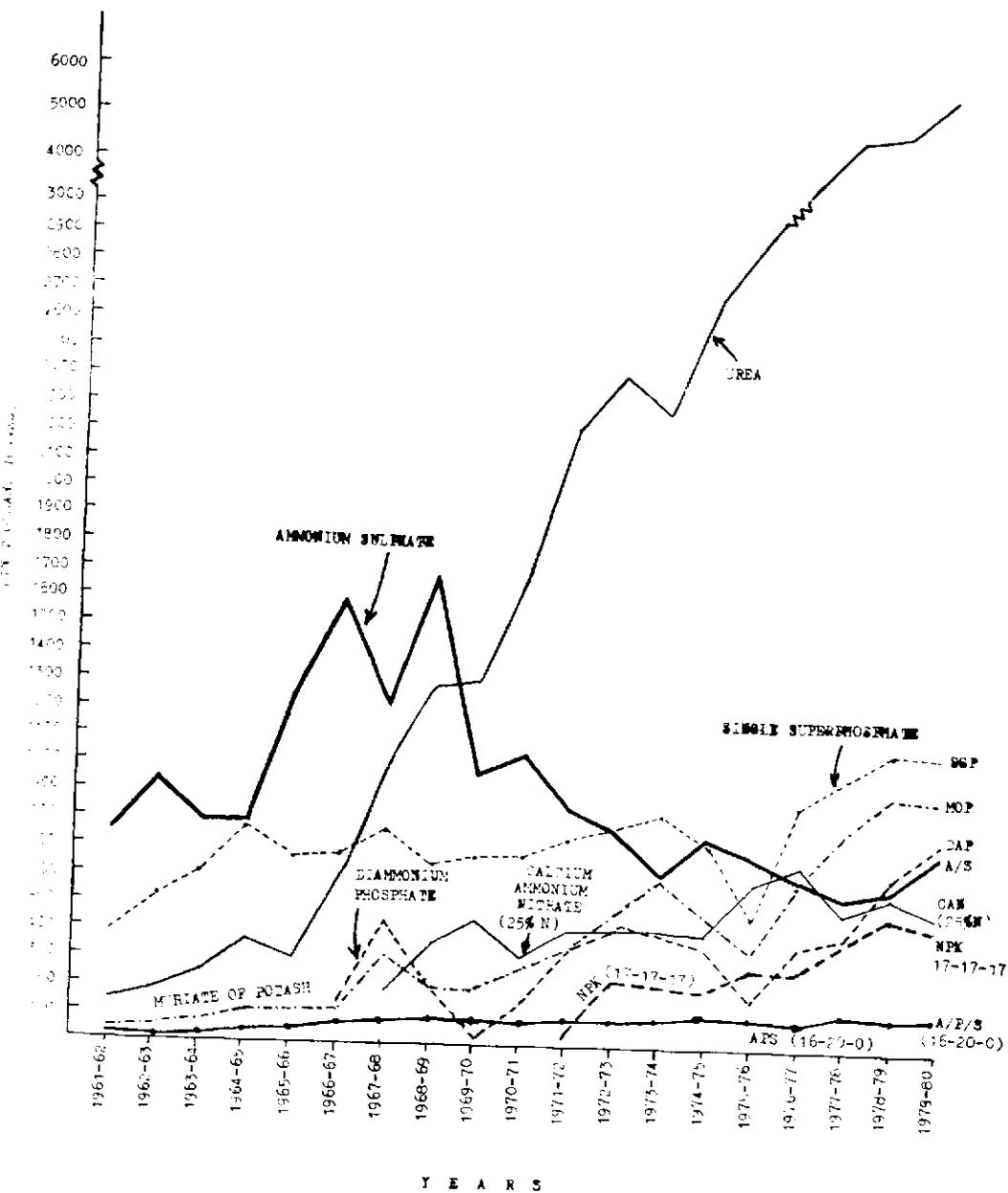

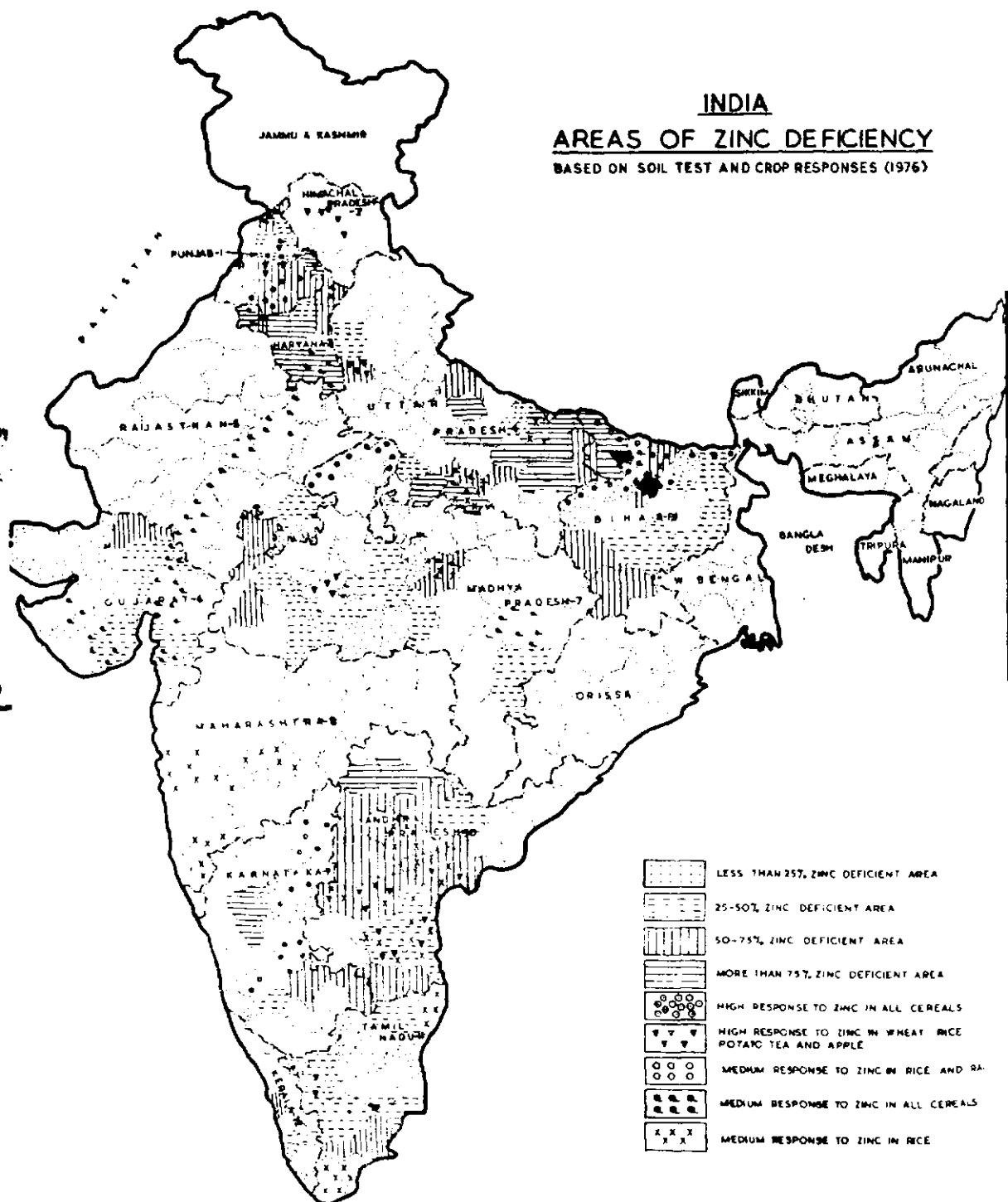

  2. Data of those districts where the experiments were conducted atleast for two years and with more than 25 experiments per variety were used to determine the yardstick.
  3. The doses\* at which the yardsticks of additional production were formulated are:  
 60 and 120 kg/ha of N,  
 30 and 60 kg/ha P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>,  
 and 60 kg/ha of K<sub>2</sub>O.

Responses to K<sub>2</sub>O were measured over a basal application of 120 kg/ha of N and 60 kg/ha of P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>.

\*One tonne of fertiliser nutrient can benefit an area of 83.33 hectares at 30 kg/ha of nutrient, at double this dose, the material can be applied over 16.66 hectares, and an area of 8.33 hectares can be covered at 120 kg/ha of the nutrient.

- Summary:**
1. In general, additional production of about 10 tonnes/tonne of nitrogen were obtained for rice in Kharif and wheat in Rabi under irrigated conditions to an application of 60 kg N/ha. On equal nutrient basis the yardstick of additional production from the use of phosphorus was about a tonne less for rice and three tonnes less for wheat per tonne of P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>. The yardsticks of additional production from the use of potassium at 60 kg K<sub>2</sub>O/ha were about 40 per cent of yardsticks of additional production from the use of nitrogen for these two crops. The yardsticks of additional production from the use of fertiliser for other cereals were much lower compared to rice and wheat.
  2. The data available on jowar, maize and bajra were too meagre to see the trend of the hybrids. However, it was observed that higher yardsticks of additional production per unit of fertiliser application for Ganga Safed-2 variety in comparison with Jaunpur was a possibility.

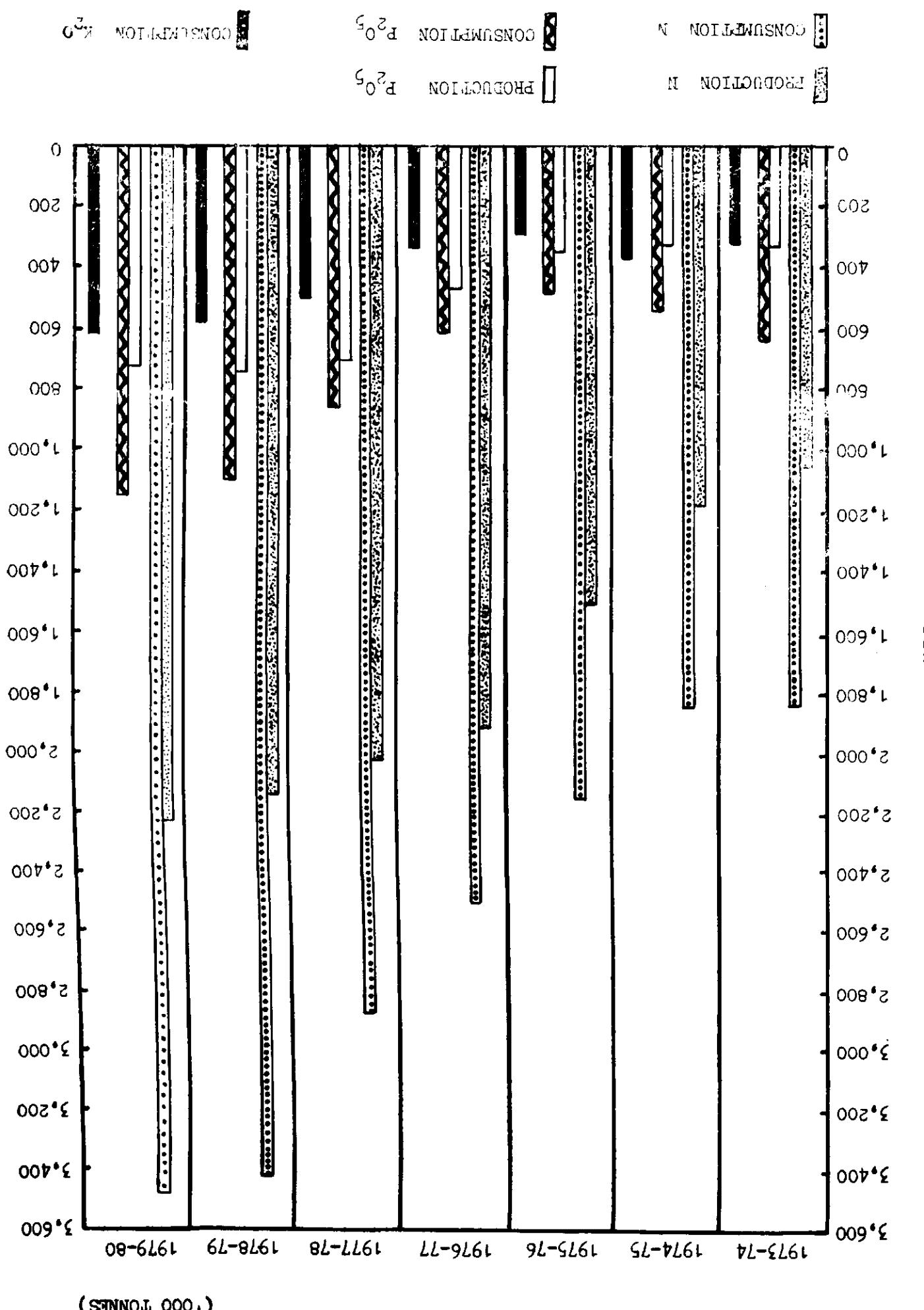

1973-74 to 1979-80**

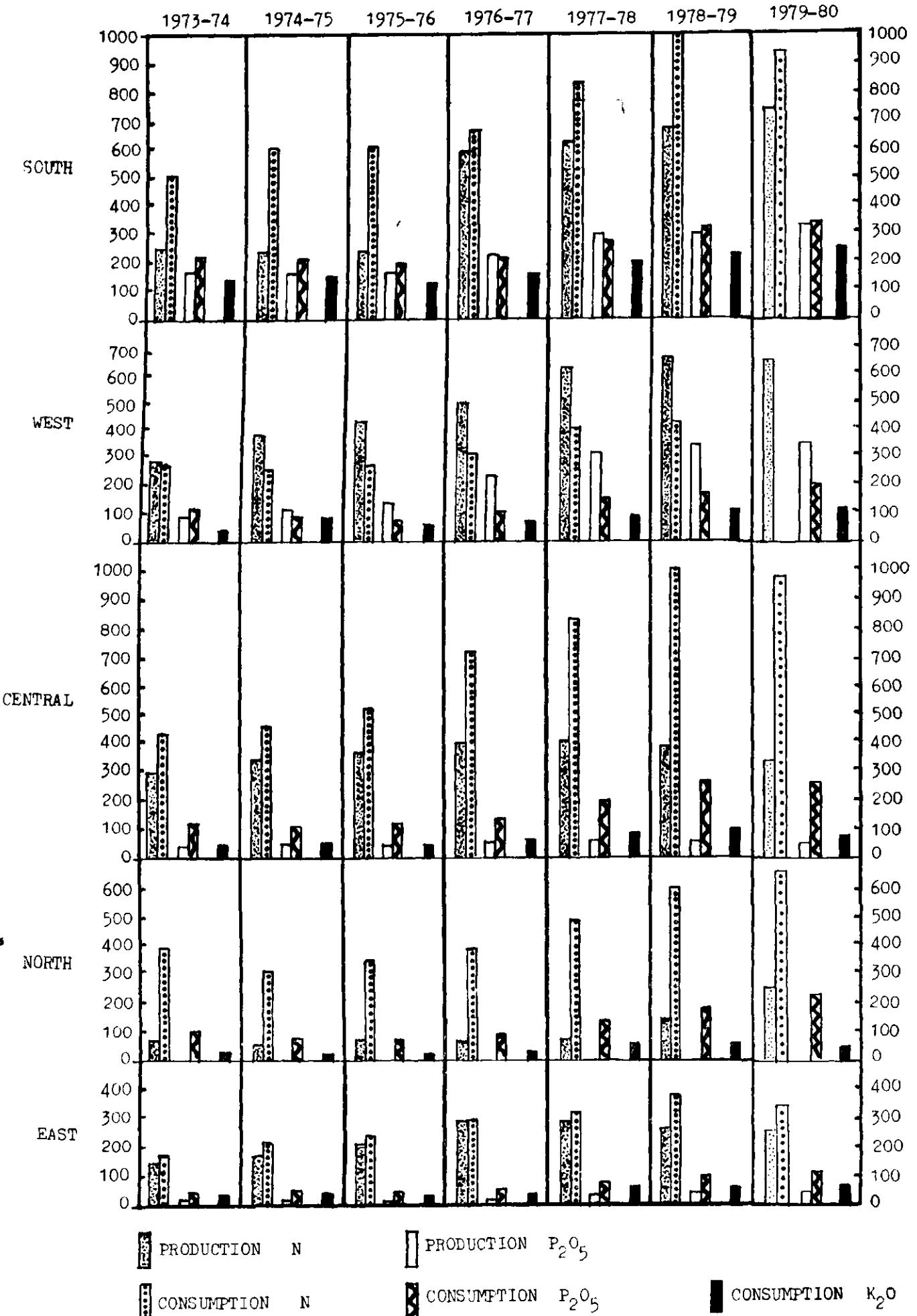

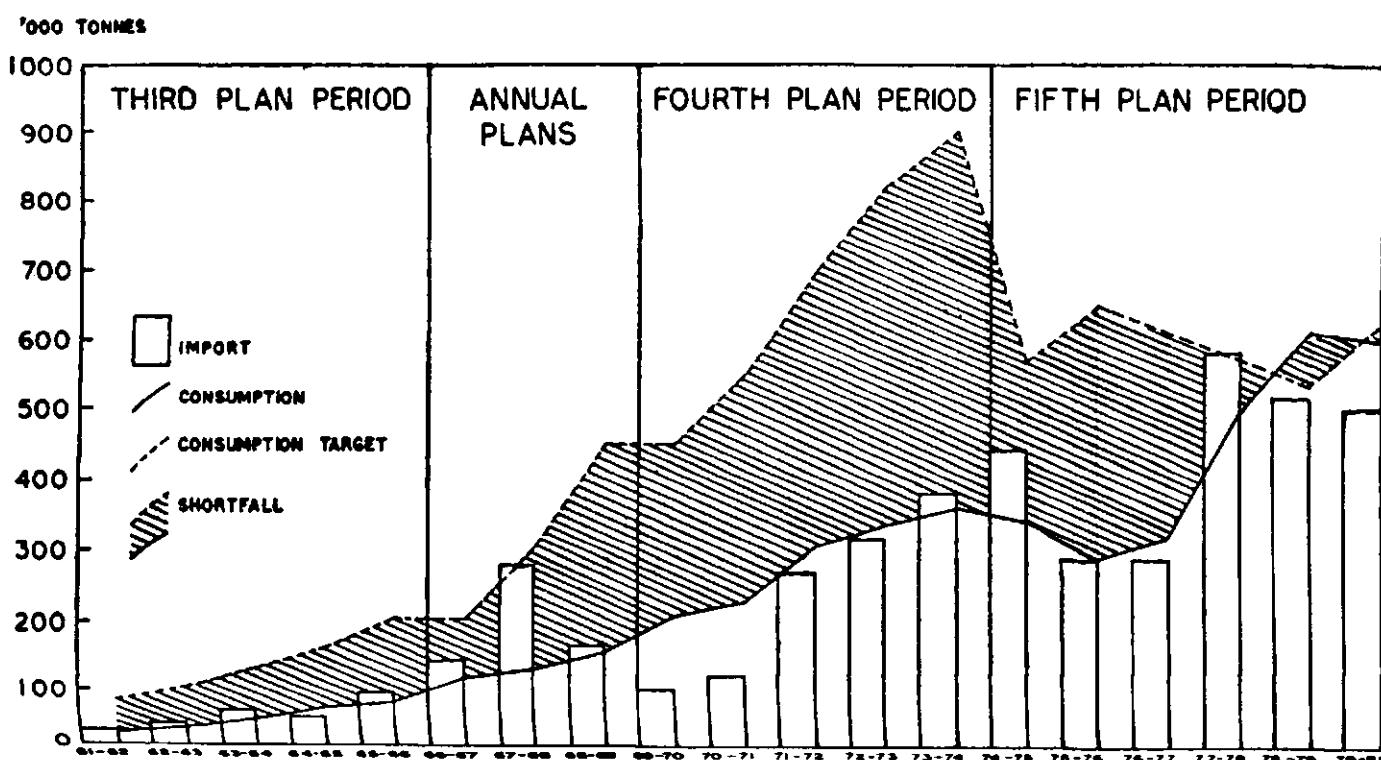

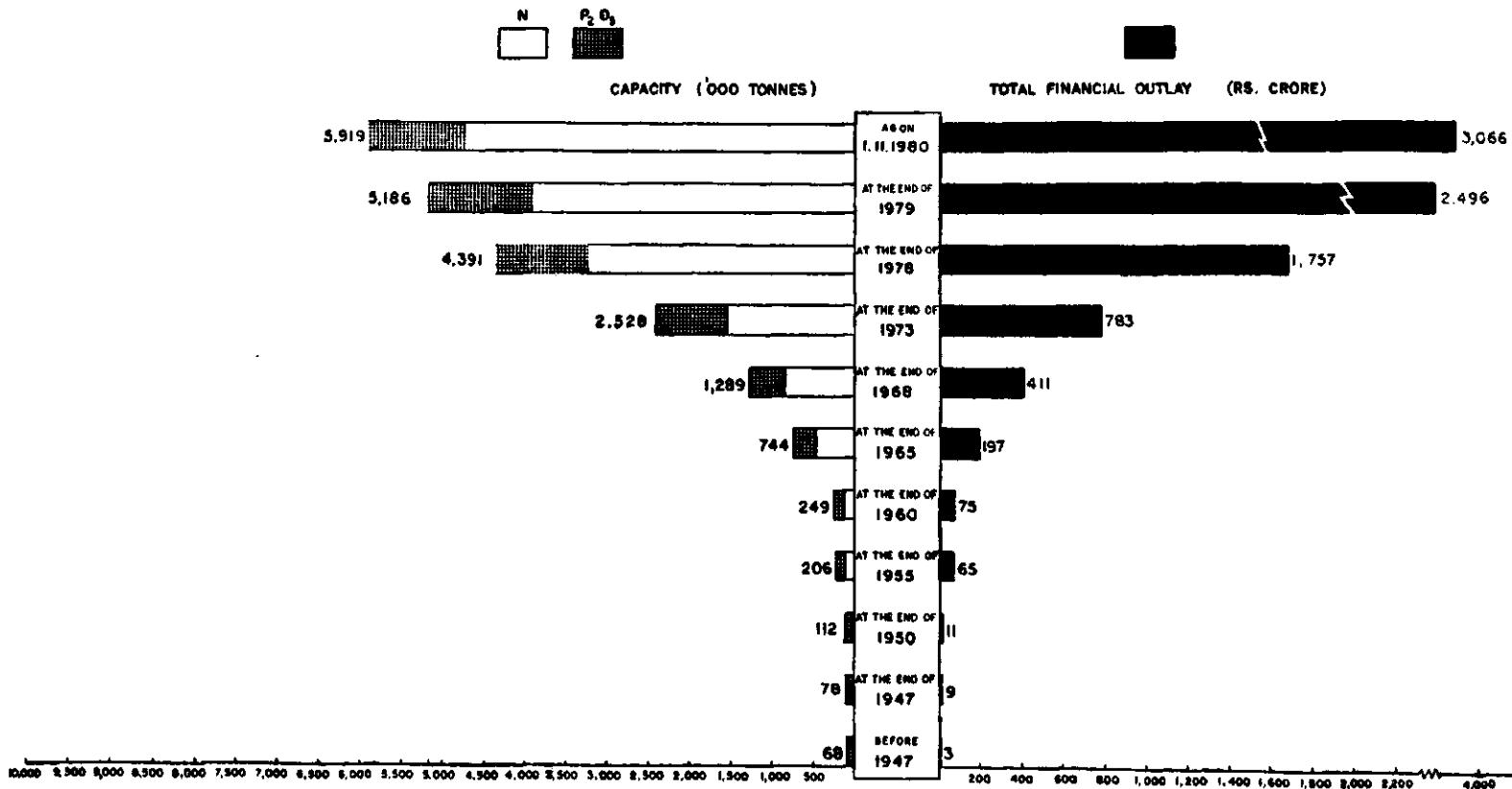

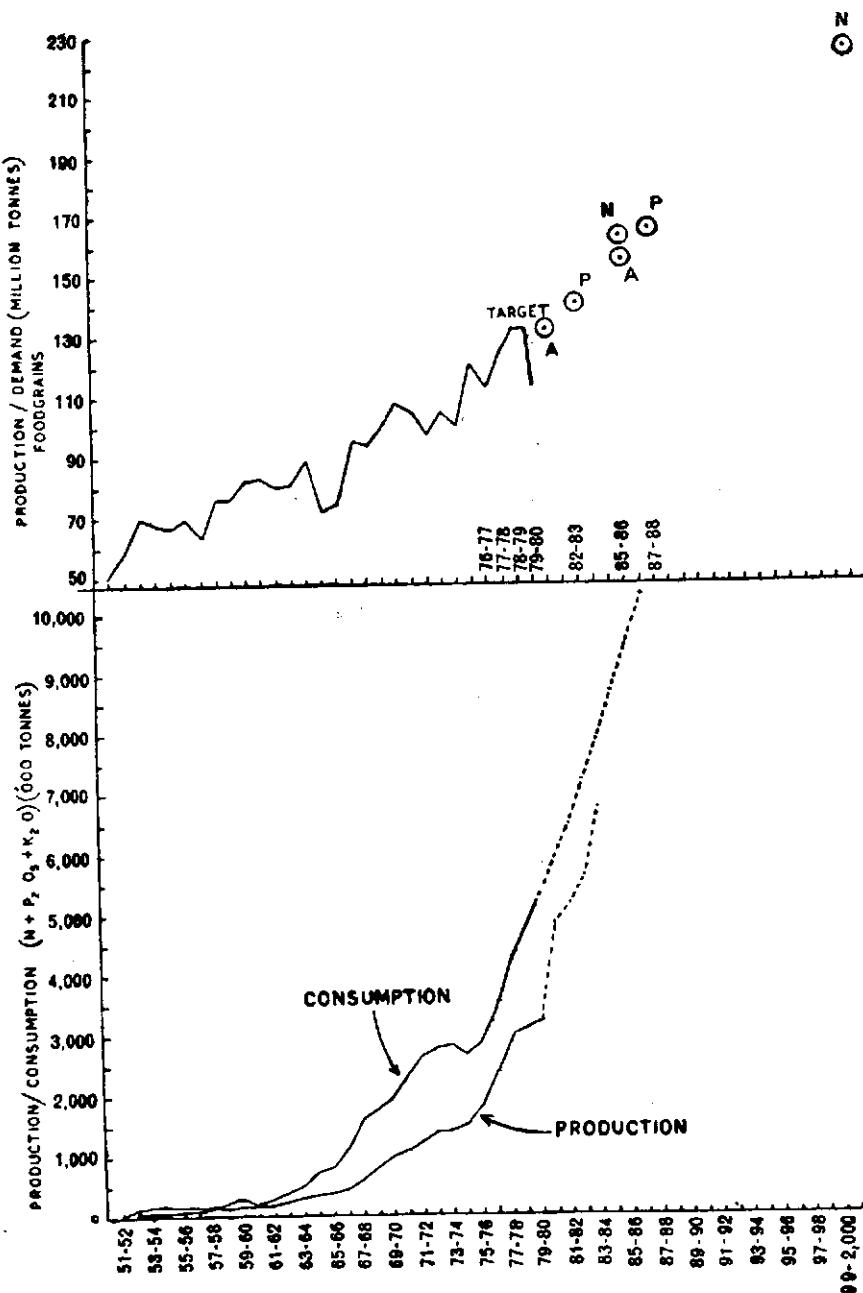

**DEFINITION OF LAND USE CLASSIFICATION**

**1. Geographical Area**

The latest figure of geographical area for the State/Union Territory/District as furnished by the Central Statistical Organisation based on the Surveyor General of India's data should only be used.

**2. Reporting Area for Land Utilisation Purposes**

The reporting area stands for the area for which data on land use classification of area are available. In areas where land utilisation figures are based on land records, reporting area is the area according to village papers i.e., the papers prepared by the village accountants. In some cases the village papers are not prepared for forest areas but the magnitude of such areas is known; also there are tracts in many States for which no village papers exist but for which ad-hoc estimates of classification of area etc. are framed to complete the coverage. In such cases, reporting area should give the summation of the area for which village papers actually exist and the area for which ad-hoc estimates are available.

**3. Forests**

Area under forests includes all lands classified as forests under any legal enactment dealing with forests or administered as forests, whether State-owned or private, and whether wooded or maintained as potential forest land.

The area of crops raised in the forest and grazing lands or areas open for grazing within the forests should remain included under the forest area.

**4. Area Not Available for Cultivation**

**Area under non-agricultural land uses**

This stands for all lands occupied by buildings, roads and railways or under water e.g., rivers and canals and other lands put to uses other than agricultural.

**Barren and uncultivable land**

This covers all barren and uncultivable land like mountains, deserts, etc. Land which cannot be brought under cultivation unless at a high cost shall be classed as uncultivable, whether such land is in isolated blocks or within cultivated holdings.

**5. Other Uncultivated Land Including Current Fallow**

**Permanent pastures and other grazing lands**

These cover all grazing lands, whether they are permanent pastures and meadows or not. Village common grazing land shall be included under this head.

**Miscellaneous tree-crops and groves not included in the net area sown**

Under this class is included all cultivable land which is not included under "net area sown" but is put to some agricultural use. Land under casuarina trees, thatching grass, bamboo bushes and other groves for fuel etc., which are not included under orchard shall be classed under this category.

**Culturable waste**

These include all lands available for cultivation whether or not taken up for cultivation once, but not cultivated during the current year and last five years or more in succession. Such lands may be either fallow or covered with shrubs and jungles which are not put to any use. (They may be assessed or unassessed and may be in isolated blocks or within

cultivated holdings.) Land once cultivated for five years in succession shall also be included in this category at the end of the five years.

**6. Fallow Lands**

**Fallow land other than current fallows**

This implies all lands which were taken up for cultivation but are temporarily out of cultivation for a period of not less than one year and not more than five years. The reasons for keeping a land fallow may be one of the following: (1) poverty of cultivators, (2) inadequate supply of water, (3) material climate, (4) silting of canals and rivers, and (5) unremunerative nature of farming.

**Current fallows**

This class comprises cropped areas which are kept fallow during the current year. For example, if any seeding area is not cropped again in the same year it may be treated as current fallow.

**7. Net Area Sown**

This represents the area sown with crops and orchards counting area sown more than once in the same year only once.

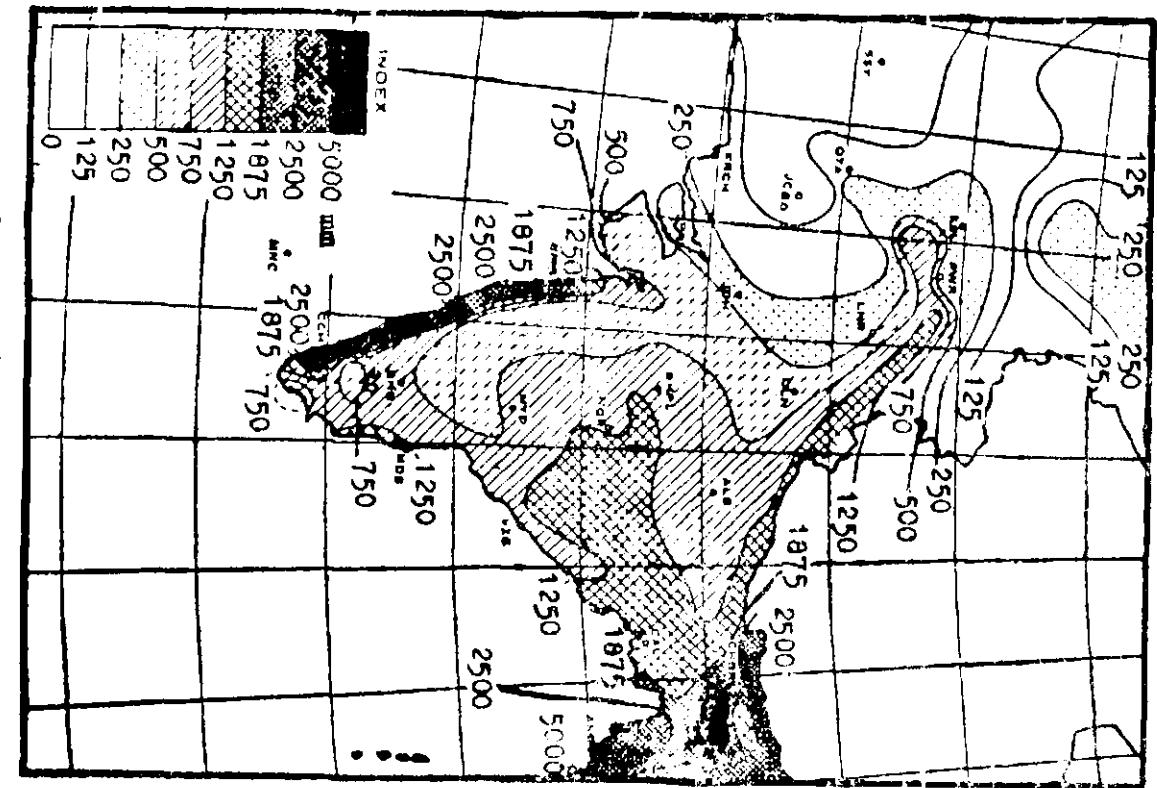

A. During the IV Plan, SFDA and MFAL programmes were launched. Though, most of the projects were sanctioned during 1970-71, they started functioning effectively only 1971-72. The project, continued upto the end of 1975-76, covering last three years of the Fourth Plan and the first two years of the Fifth Plan. The salient features of the project were:

(1) The programme of Small Farmers Development Agency (SFDA) is particularly production and institutional credit oriented. This scheme is proposed to be taken up in 46 selected areas; 50,000 potentially viable small farmers (with holdings generally between 2.5 and 7.5 acres) are to be assisted in each project area with subsidised irrigation support, land levelling, soil conservation, improved agricultural implements, custom service facilities, storage and marketing and in development of subsidiary occupations like dairy, poultry, fishery, piggery, etc. The average outlay on each project will be Rs. 1.50 crore during the Fourth Plan. The programme includes giving of assistance to rural artisans also. Farmer participants will be given a subsidy of 25 per cent from the agency and the balance as loans mainly from cooperative credit institutions. This scheme will benefit about 20 lakh families.

(2) Marginal Farmers and Agricultural Labourers (MFAL) Programme is oriented towards development of subsidiary occupation with the help of institutional credit. This scheme is proposed to be taken up in 41 selected areas; 15,000 marginal farmers (with holdings generally up to 2.5 acres) and about 5,000 agricultural labourers are to be assisted in each project area with subsidised credit support (up to 33½ per cent for inputs subject to a maximum of Rs. 100 for one season and Rs. 200 for two seasons in one year and two years) for agricultural and subsidiary occupations. Provision has also been made for giving direct wage employment in the off-season to agricultural labourers in rural works of a productive nature. The average outlay on each project will be Rs. one crore during the Fourth Plan. This scheme will benefit 8 to 9 lakh families.

(3) Rural Works Programme (RWP) is designed to generate employment opportunities for agricultural labourers in the chronically drought affected areas. This programme covers 54 districts in 13 States. Fourth Plan outlay in the Central non-Plan sector is Rs. 100 crore and each selected district is expected to get an allocation of nearly Rs. 2 crore. These schemes include irrigation, soil conservation and road building, etc.

B. In the Fifth Five-Year Plan, that is from 1974-75, based on the recommendations of the National Commission on Agriculture, the number of SFDA project has been increased to 160 including the existing ones and investment of Rs. 200 crore, the SFDA/MFAL agencies have been made composite to cover both small and marginal farmers and agricultural labourers and the Programme content has undergone the following readjustments:

The definitions of small farmers and marginal farmers have been revised to include farmers having land-holdings between 2.5 and 5 acres of dry land, and upto 2.5 acres of dry land, respectively.

The components of rural artisans and rural works programmes will continue upto the end of 1975-76 only and therefore, be renamed as *Drought Prone Areas Programme* (investment of Rs. 161.4 crore) with the following feature:

The Government have indentified 74 districts (Table 10b) wholly or partly in 13 States as chronically drought prone. It terms of population, the Programme covers about 600 lakh or 12 per cent of the population and in terms of area it covers 585,000 sq. km or nearly 19 per cent of the area.

The Programme lays special emphasis on the small and marginal farmers and other weaker sections of the community. Programme expects to cover 10,000 beneficiaries in a main DPAP district for this purpose. As a general principle, for every investment a small/marginal farmer makes on his farm, be it a construction of well, land development, soil conservation treatment, purchase of milch cattle, sheep, poultry, purchase of inputs like seeds, phosphatic fertiliser, pesticides, improved agricultural implements, composite crop demonstration, custom services, pumping sets both diesel and electric etc., subsidy of 25 per cent and 33.3 per cent respectively is given. For community works a subsidy of 50 per cent is given.

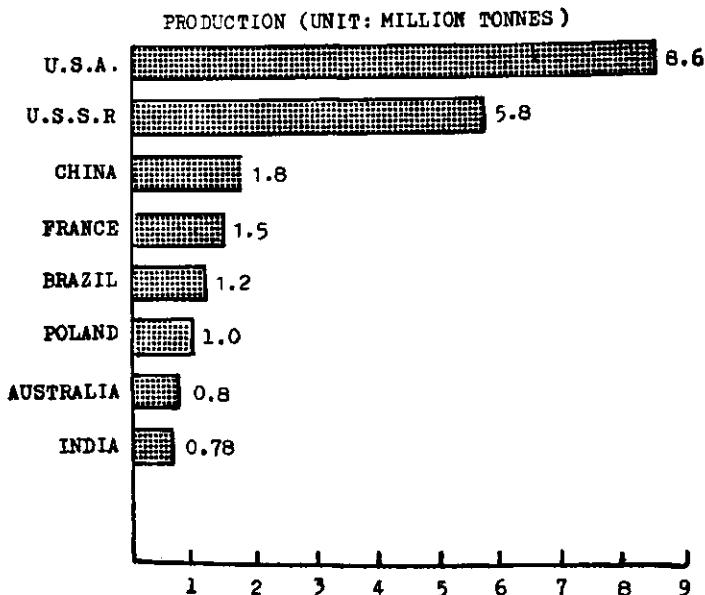

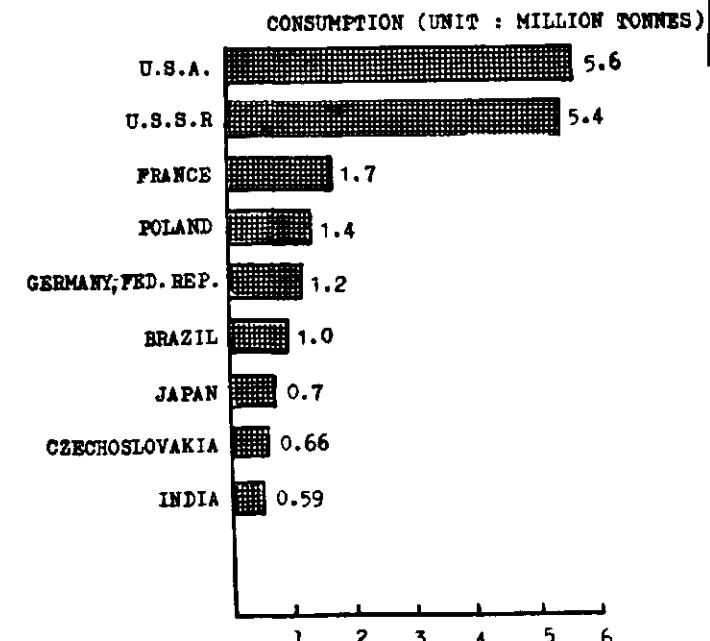

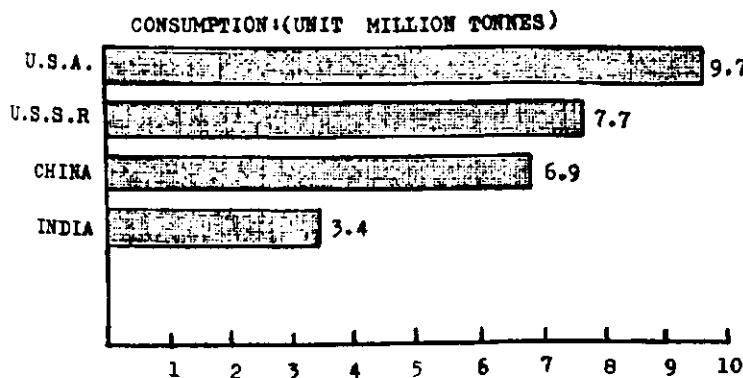

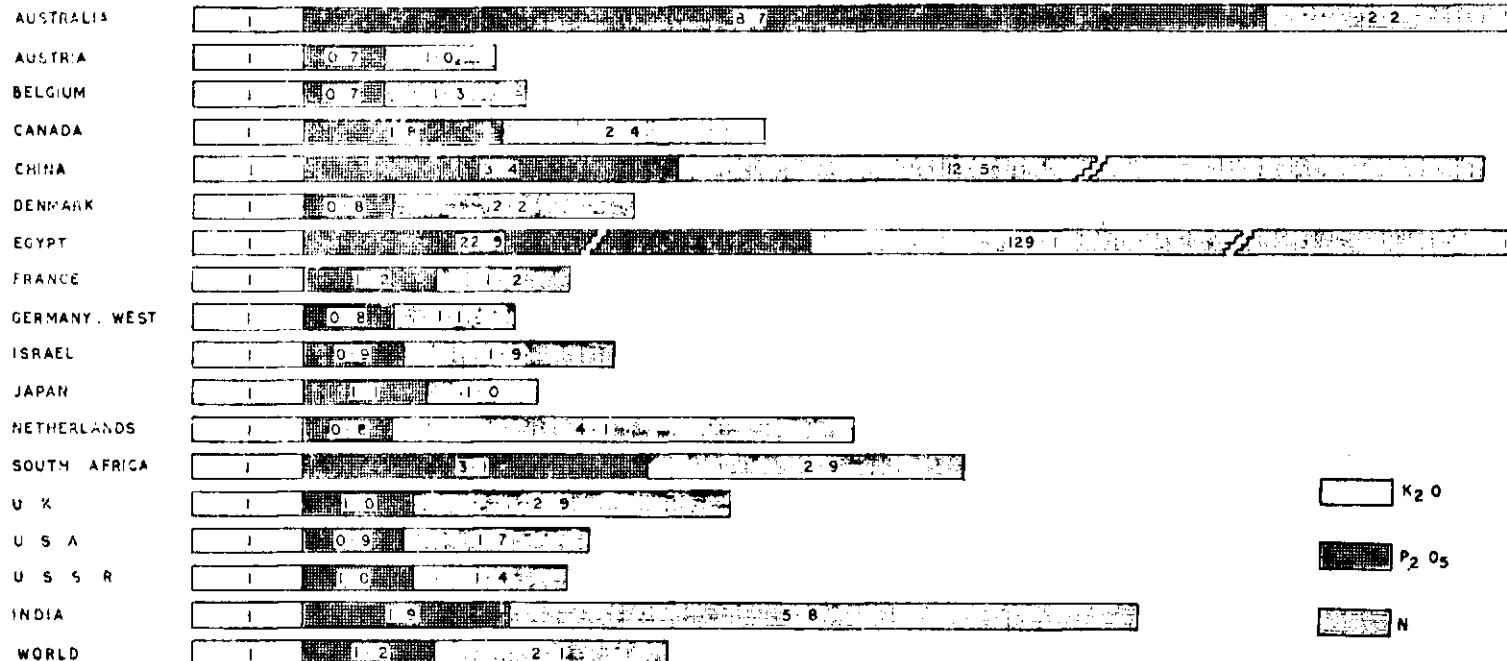

The company was established at Tanuku, West Godavari district, Andhra Pradesh in 1947 and a sugar factory with a crushing capacity of 600 tonnes cane per day went into production in 1951-52 season. During the past 30 years, there was continuous progress to 1,000 tonnes in 1957 and to 1,250 tonnes in 1962. During 1968-69 season, the crushing capacity was increased to 2,500 tonnes of cane per day with the installation of sugarcane diffusion plant. The capacity of the sugar plant was doubled further from 2,500 to 5,000 tonnes per day and commissioned during the crushing season 1978-79.

Manufacture of sugar is done by double sulphitation process.

#### At Tanuku

An industrial alcohol distillery was set up in 1961 with a licenced capacity of 8 lakh gallons per annum. Later in 1976 permission to enhance the licenced capacity to 6,000 gallons per day (from 3,000 gallons per day capacity) is obtained and work is in progress.

#### **At Kovur**

Sulphuric acid plant with a licenced capacity of 50 tonnes per day (continuous process)

was set up in 1961. The capacity was later increased to 75 tonnes per day in 1977.

Superphosphate (fertiliser) factory with a licenced capacity of 100 tonnes per day on 2 shift basis was set up in 1961.

Caustic soda, chlorine and hydrochloric acid plant with annual licenced capacities of 9,900 tonnes, 6,330 tonnes and 2,600 tonnes respectively were set up in 1965, which were later increased to 33,000 tonnes, 20,830 tonnes and 5,100 tonnes, respectively in 1974. Permission obtained to increase the capacities further to 46,200, 29,730 and 7,100 tonnes respectively. This expansion is under implementation.

Chlorosulphuric acid plant with licenced capacity of 5,000 tonnes per annum is set up in July 1972. Letter of Intent was given for further expansion to 5,000 tonnes per annum.

A licence to manufacture 5,000 tonnes of potassium hydroxide per annum was also given and it is installed in 1978.

Shah, in the fertiliser field for over two decades. It was originally incorporated as a private limited company in 1954 and initially dealt in organic and inorganic straight fertilisers. From 1955-56, the company undertook the manufacture of NPK mixtures and was recognised as an established approved manufacturer by this State Govt. The company was converted into a public limited company during 1962 with an authorised share capital of Rs. 50,00,000 and the project for setting up

a most modern granulation plant near Bombay started taking shape.

Finally in 1965 the management established a most modern granulated compound fertiliser plant with an annual capacity of 44,000 tonnes at Bhandup near Bombay. The entire plant is on T.V.A. process evolved by a famous American fertiliser company.

The company manufactures different formulae of granulated compound fertilisers as approved by the State Government under the trade name of 'YASHODHAN'. Its 18:18:10 produce was produced at Government level for distribution in the hybrid

cereal and high yielding varieties projects. Its product has gained wide popularity as ensuring high quality control and is considered a hallmark of reliability. Its turnover during the last 5 years amounted to an average of about Rs. 2 crore.

The company has wide network of distribution arrangement having representatives and agents at taluks and district levels.

It has promoted jointly with Messrs. Albright & Wilson Ltd., of United Kingdom and Pandit interests, a company called Messrs. Albright, Morarji and Pandit Ltd., which is the first company of its kind in India for the manufacture of industrial Phosphates and phosphoric acid by the wet process.

The company is also vitally connected with borax/boric acid industry for the manufacture of which it has floated a separate limited company called Messrs. Borax Morarji Limited with the collaboration of Borax (Holdings) Ltd., now known as R.T.Z. Borax Limited of United Kingdom. The equity shareholdings of R.T.Z. Borax Limited has since been transferred to Indian Shareholders.

In collaboration with the Madhya Pradesh States Agro Industries Development Corporation Ltd., the company has floated a new company, in the joint sector, called M.P. Agro Morarji Fertilisers Ltd., for manufacture of 60,000 tonnes of granulated fertilisers in the Hoshangabad District of Madhya Pradesh.

The company has, jointly with Kerala State Industrial Development Corporation and Premier Enterprises of Kerala, set up a plant for the manufacture of 16,500 tonnes of alumina sulphate (ferric) in the State of

Kerala.

The know-how for the manufacture of the above products as well as the plant designs have been entirely developed by the company's own research, development and engineering staff. The company was the first to produce triple superphosphate in India.

The company's products are marketed through its own marketing organisation. The company has an upto-date soil testing labo-

ratory at its Kumhari factory and the company conducts demonstration trials based on soil test to promote balanced fertilisation techniques incorporating the effective use of single superphosphate.

Research experiments for trace elements and micro-nutrients are also undertaken for selected crop areas and micro-nutrients with a view to producing increased yields.

Thomas Parry who arrived in India in 1788 to seek his fortune was granted a licence to trade within limits as a free merchant by East India Company, which held monopoly of trade between India and the United Kingdom. So began Parry & Co. which remained a private partnership until 1928, when it was converted into a private limited company.

In 1948, Parry & Co. Ltd., was converted into a public limited company and in 1956 the whole of its ordinary share capital was acquired by the East India Distilleries and Sugar Factories Ltd. to form the E.I.D. Parry

Group which now consists of the holding company and its subsidiaries: Parry & Co. Ltd., Molussil Ware House and Trading Co. Ltd., Andhra Fertilisers Ltd., the Parry Murray & Co. Ltd.

E.I.D. Parry Ltd. was a company incorporated in the U.K. carrying on business in India. To facilitate the company's increasing participation in the national growth, and with the approval obtained of the High Courts of Madras and England, the scheme involving the transfer of the undertaking of E.I.D. Parry Ltd. to E.I.D. Parry (India) Ltd. without fur-

ther act or deed has become effective from the 18th June 1976.

The Group has on its pay-roll nearly 15,000 employees and its interests are wide and varied, including the manufacture and sale of insecticides, fungicides, fertiliser mixtures for field crops and plantations, superphosphate, ammonium phosphate, ammonium sulphate, NPK complex fertilisers, seeds, sprayers, animal feeds, sugar, carbonic acid gas, denatured and rectified spirit molasses and European liquors, acids (hydraulic nitric and sulphuric), chemicals and ceramic ware. The group also sells a variety of products manufactured by reputable Indian and foreign concerns including electric motors, starters, transformers, generating sets in the electrical line, machine tools, pumps, diesel engines, cranes in the mechanical line and other engineering stores such as tarpaulines, chipboards, aluminium sheets, and a wide range of consumer and pharmaceutical goods.

The E.I.D. Parry Group are pioneers in the fertiliser field having established a bone-meal factory at Ranipet in the early twentieth century. They were the first in India to start a superphosphate factory in 1906 at Ranipet where the preparation of various standard fertiliser mixtures, insecticides and fungicides was subsequently undertaken. A second factory at Tadepalli commenced production in November 1960 bringing the total production capacity of the group upto 100,000 tonnes of superphosphate per annum. Formulation of plant protection chemicals is also carried out at Tadepalli. The group has fertiliser mixing factories at Tadepalli, Panruti, Katpadi Mettupalayam, Thirumangalam, Trichy, Mysore, Hospet, Kottayam and Calicut and over the last 70 years has built up an extensive marketing organisation providing unrivalled distribution facilities.

The fertiliser factory of E.I.D. Parry (India) Ltd. at Ennore, near Madras, was the first in the private sector to produce compound fertilisers. The factory was installed to manufacture about 51,000 tonnes per year

of ammonium phosphate 16:20 now marketed by the company under the trade name of 'Paramfos'. The expansion of the factory was completed in January 1968 to manufacture an additional nitrogenous fertiliser, ammonium sulphate (20.6 per cent N) to the extent of 38,610 tonnes per year utilising the by-product gypsum obtained from the phosphoric acid plant which is one of the plants in the manufacturing process of ammonium phosphate.

E.I.D. Parry (India) Ltd. have the distinction of being the first to manufacture NPK complex fertiliser in India at their factory at Ennore from November 1968.

E.I.D. Parry (India) Ltd. were the promoters along with Chevron Chemical Corporation and International Minerals and Chemicals Corporation, both of the USA, of Coromandel Fertilisers Ltd. at Visakhapatnam which manufacture 14 : 35 : 14 and 28 : 0 complex fertiliser and urea, and continue to market these products on a principal-to-principal basis.

The company continues as one of the marketers of complex fertilisers and urea manufactured by Madras Fertilisers Ltd., Manali.

The company's marketing activity in hybrid seeds has been extended to the high-yielding varieties of paddy and three seed processing units have been set up at Pappampatti and Trichy in Tamil Nadu and Chickballapur in Karnataka.

The company has set up a factory at Ennore for the manufacture of cattle and poultry feeds which is in production since May 1970. A second unit at Tadepalligundam in Andhra Pradesh has gone into production since 1975 and a third unit at Mysore since December 1976.

The E.I.D. Parry groups, are founder members of the Fertiliser Association of India and Dr. Easo John, Chairman and Managing Director of the company is the present Chairman of the Fertiliser Association of India.

### **13. THE FERTILISERS AND CHEMICALS TRAVANCORE LIMITED**

#### **The beginning**

The Fertilisers And Chemicals Travancore Limited (FACT) was conceived at a time of great food shortage in the former State of

Travancore. Dr. C. P. Ramaswamy Aiyer, the then Dewan of Travancore, has the vision to recognise that only chemical fertilisers could solve the food problem of the State.

He, therefore, sponsored the establishment of FACT. M/s. Seshasayee Brothers Limited, an industrial management house of South India was invited by him to organise the venture.

Work started at what is now known as Udyogamandal in 1944, and the factory went into commercial production in 1947. The company began with a capacity of 50,000 tonnes of ammonium sulphate (10,000 tonnes of N). The process adopted was unique. As there was no coal or natural gas in the area ammonia production was based on gas generated out of firewood. Until then, firewood gasification was just a laboratory process. To FACT belongs the distinction of converting it into a commercial process and exploiting it for the first and perhaps the last time in the history of chemical industry. Ammonium sulphate was manufactured from ammonia produced out of firewood and gypsum mined from Tiruchirapalli in Tamil Nadu.

Next to be set up was a superphosphate plant with a capacity of 44,000 tonnes. It became, therefore, necessary for the company to install a sulphuric acid plant of 75 tonnes capacity a day. FACT was then the largest producer of fertilisers in India.

#### **Expansion and diversification**

With the advent of the First Five Year Plan and the setting up of a much larger fertiliser plant at Sindri, the whole concept of fertiliser production underwent a change. FACT just had to expand to survive. In the meantime the company had taken up on itself the responsibility of setting up a caustic soda unit. Later thinking was that caustic soda production could be profitably organised as a separate unit; so a new company called The Travancore Cochin Chemicals Limited was formed jointly by the then Government of Travancore-Cochin, FACT and the Mettur Chemical Industrial Corporation Limited.

The hydrogen chloride arising out of the production of caustic soda was utilised by FACT for producing a new product, ammonium chloride, technical grade. Till then, the country's requirements of the ammonium chloride were met by imports. After FACT's ammonium chloride came into the market, there was no need for importing it at all.

#### **First stage expansion**

In the late fifties, the company took up further expansion programmes. The first stage expansion programme involves an outlay of Rs. 30 million (\$6 million) aimed at doubling the nitrogen capacity and introducing, for the first time, a new complex fertiliser—ammonium phosphate. It was then anticipated that adequate hydro-electro power would be available in the State for sustain-

ing an electrolysis plant. The additional capacity for the synthesis gas required was found by setting up an electrolytic hydrogen plant. A phosphoric acid plant and a plant capable of producing ammonium phosphate (16:20) grade were established.

#### **Second stage expansion**

The first stage expansion programme was soon followed by the second stage, involving an investment of Rs. 20 million (\$4 million). As the firewood gasification plant was becoming uneconomic and as there was no scope for expanding it any further due to the limited availability of firewood, it was necessary to replace it with a modern process. New processes by then had been found since the installation of the firewood gasification plant. The latest available was the TEXACO oil gasification process using raw naphtha as feedstock. As a result of the installation of a plant based on this process, the capacity increased to 30,000 tonnes of nitrogen and 15,000 tonnes of P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub>.

#### **Third stage expansion**

Even before the second stage expansion programme was completed, a third stage expansion programme involving an outlay of Rs. 120 million (\$24 million) was taken up. This programme was intended to raise the nitrogen capacity to 70,000 tonnes and P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> capacity to 33,000 tonnes, the end-product capacities being 200,000 tonnes of ammonium sulphate, 125,000 tonnes of ammonium phosphate, 44,000 tonnes of superphosphate and 20,000 tonnes of ammonium chloride.

One of the most interesting features of the third stage expansion programme was the installation of a 300 tonnes a day ammonium sulphate plant based on the process know-how developed by FACT for the conversion of by-product gypsum.

#### **Fourth stage expansion**

While all these expansion programmes were in progress, the expectation of availability of power based on the original forecast given by the State Electricity Department (later the Electricity Board) were belied time and again. The electrolysis plant could seldom work to full capacity as enough power was not available. Powercuts had become much a 'hardy annual' and as a result production in several plants had to be curtailed drastically, even closed down for substantial periods. Dependence on such large quantities of power was causing huge losses to the company. And a way had to be found to reduce this dependence. Only by the elimination of the electrolytic hydrogen plant was this possible, but it meant making other suitable modifications to the plant.

A fourth stage expansion programme was, therefore, conceived on the basis of replacing the electrolytic cells and providing other ancillary facilities required to raise nitrogen capacity from 70,000 tonnes to 90,000 tonnes and  $P_2O_5$  from 33,000 tonnes to 45,000 tonnes. Work on this programme involving an outlay of Rs. 50 million (\$6.7 million) has been completed. A substantial portion of the electrolytic hydrogen plant has been dismantled and sold to the Fertilizer Corporation of India for its unit at Nangal which is exclusively based on electrolytic hydrogen. The new ammonia plant has been commissioned. An ammonium phosphate plant with a capacity of 150 tonnes per day of 20 : 20 grade completely designed and engineered by FEDO (about which organisation, more later) also went on stream. With the completion of the fourth stage expansion programme, the total investment in Udyogamandal has gone upto Rs. 270 million. The power requirement has been reduced to 36,000 KWY from 50,000 KWY required at the end of third stage expansion programme.

In order to improve the financial position of the company, the management had prepared and submitted a product diversification project to the Government of India, in which it was proposed to stop the production of products involving wasteful expenditure and to start production of new industrial chemicals in a profitable way.

#### **FACT Cochin Division**

The new fertiliser unit—Cochin Division—set up by FACT at Ambalamedu near the Cochin Refineries, is on stream. The project was set up in two stages—Phase I and Phase II.

#### **Cochin Division—Phase I**

Designed to produce 330,000 tonnes of urea a year, the plant utilises the latest technology. For the manufacture of synthesis gas, the ICI-Steam-Naphtha Reforming Process under pressure, followed by the high and low temperature CO conversion,  $CO_2$  removal by the Vetrocoke Process and final removal of carbon oxides by mathanation have been adopted. The section has been designed by FACT in collaboration with the Davy Power Gas International of England. The 600-tonne per day ammonia plant, based on the Fauser Montecatini Process is in single stream. The 1000 tonnes/day urea plant based on the Fauser, Montecatini total liquid recycle process is designed by the Planning and Development Division of the Fertilizer Corporation of India in collaboration with Montecatini Edison of Italy. The urea synthesis section is in two streams and the rest in single stream.

The process water requirements of the

project will be met from a water reservoir of five months storage capacity formed by building an earthen dam. The power requirement is about 22 MW. Fourteen MW will be generated in the project in a back pressure turbine connected to the process steam unit.

A modern township with amenities like a shopping centre, hostels, recreation facilities, etc., has also been set up.

An important feature of the Cochin Project Phase I is that it is one of the large sized fertiliser plants in India to be completely designed, engineered and erected by indigenous technical know-how developed and acquired by FACT Engineering & Design Organisation and P&D Division of the Fertilizer Corporation of India, now Fertiliser (Planning & Development) India Ltd.

#### **Cochin Division—Phase II**

Phase II expansion programme of Cochin Division has also gone on stream. This expansion project is designed to produce 485,000 tonnes of NPK granulated fertilisers in a year. This project includes a 1,000 tpd sulphuric acid plant, which incidentally is the biggest in the country, a 360 tpd phosphoric acid plant and a 1,600 tpd NPK granulation plant. The project is entirely designed and engineered by FEDO.

#### **Marketing**

In India, the task of a fertiliser manufacturer does not stop merely with production. It goes beyond that. The magical transformation that fertiliser use brings about in food production is not fully realised by a vast majority of farmers. The task of educating the farming community that increased use of fertiliser means higher profit is a responsibility of the producer. It is also the producer's responsibility to deliver the right type of fertiliser at the farmer's door-step at the right time and at the right price.

In translating this marketing philosophy into action, the company has launched various programmes of fertiliser promotion work.

One of the significant contributions that FACT has made in the field of fertiliser promotion is the concept of the fertiliser festivals. Fertiliser festivals have assumed a role that no other instrument has been capable of in the past in attempting to reach the heart of the farmer. The fertiliser festivals introduced by FACT have become well known in many parts of India and even the United Nations have been caught up by this new concept and have made a special study of it so that it could be introduced in other developing countries.

Another contribution made by FACT in the field of fertiliser promotion is the Village Adoption Scheme. The theme of the scheme is that any strategy of agricultural development should focus on village as basic growth points. The scheme has been recommended for adoption throughout the country.

Organisation of Agro-Service Centres in key places is another innovation introduced by FACT recently. FACT offers all kinds of agricultural services to farmers free of cost, through a team of well qualified and trained agronomists. Facilities have been provided, again free of cost, for testing samples of soil.

A new dimension to the concept of agricultural extension in the country has now been set up by FACT by developing the idea of starting Agricultural Study Centres—FACT Krishi Vigyan Kendras—an effective and sustainable new medium for educating farmers.

Every year, a large number of demonstration plots are being organised by FACT in the fields to prove the profitability of fertiliser application.

Marketing network of FACT is fairly widespread all over South, comprising the States of Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Tamil Nadu and Kerala. FACT is also supplying its products to the States of Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal.

### **FEDO**

Perhaps, FACT's most significant contribution to the fertiliser and chemical industry in India is its development of a separate organisation for the design and engineering of chemical and fertiliser plants and for evolving new processes for producing various chemicals, vital to industry. During the last 35 years of its growth, FACT has continuously been facing new challenges—challenges arising out of problems of technology, raw materials, processes, marketing and personnel. These challenges have been met by invention, innovation, improvisation and management action.

A new autonomous diversion under the name FACT Engineering & Design Organisation (FEDO) was, therefore formed to meet the challenges of the future.

### **Scope and capability of FEDO**

FEDO is equipped to take up (1) techno-economic feasibility studies, (2) market surveys, (3) process selection and evaluation, (4) process engineering, (5) detailed engineering, (6) architectural design and town planning, (7) plant procurement, inspection and shipping, (8) construction, (9) site management and supervision, (10)

off-site design, (11) start-up and commissioning, (12) turn-key contracts, (13) after sales services, (14) refinancing on deferred payment schemes, and (15) operation and maintenance personnel training.

FEDO has entered into collaboration agreement with process licencers of international repute such as Davy Power-Gas International, Societe De Prayon, etc. in the fields of ammonia, acids and fertilisers. FEDO has its own process for the manufacture of ammonium sulphate from by-product gypsum, sodium silico fluoride, calcium silicate and cryolite. Other processes are being continuously developed in the research laboratory and pilot plants of FEDO. It can also secure processes developed by other organisations of international repute.

Among others, the major projects undertaken by FEDO include: the synthesis gas plants in Cochin and Durgapur fertiliser projects; hydrogen plant at Rasayani for Hindustan Organic Chemical; 360 tpd phosphoric acid plant at Sindri for Fertilizer Corporation of India; 300 tpd sulphuric acid plant at Trivandrum for Travancore Titanium Products; 200,000 tpa triple superphosphate plant along with sulphuric acid and phosphoric acid plants at Khetri for Hindustan Copper Ltd.; formic acid plant for Periyar Chemicals; catalysts plant for Catalysts & Chemicals at Edayar; 500,000 tpa complex fertiliser plant at Balamedu for Cochin Division of FACT; conversion of the existing contact process sulphuric acid plant for Fertilizer Corporation of India (now Rashtriya Chemicals & Fertilisers) at Trombay to DCDA system increasing rated capacity from 200 tpd to 300 tpd and incorporating atmospheric pollution control measures; Ossein and dicalcium phosphate plants for Kerala Chemicals & Proteins Ltd. at Chalakudy; 65 tpd ammonium chloride plant for Kothari (Madras) Ltd. at Manali; atmospheric pollution control project and conversion of sulphuric acid plant to DCDA system for Hindustan Organic Chemicals Ltd. at Rasayani; penicillin plant for Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd., Pimpri; revamping of 100 tpd sulphuric acid plant for Hindustan Zinc Ltd. at Udaipur; 85 tpd phosphoric acid plant for Hindustan Lever Ltd. at Haldia, etc.

FEDO has now ventured into new fields like pesticides and pharmaceuticals and drugs, and had captured several prestigious orders. Other projects now under execution by FEDO include 1,800 tpa Malathion project for Hindustan Insecticides Ltd. at Rasayani; 4.5 tpd formic acid plant for Kerala Acids and Chemicals Ltd. at Edayar; 5000 tpd DDT project for Hindustan Insecticides Ltd. at Rasayani; 1600 tpa Endosulfan project off-sites for Hindustan Insecticides Ltd. at Udyogamandal; Water gas purification plant

for Hindustan Lever Ltd. at Sewri; 26000 tpa ammonium chloride plant for Bihar Caustics and Chemicals Ltd. at Bihar; streptomycin, ampicillin projects for Hindustan Antibiotics Ltd. at Pimpri; high gamma BHC plant for Southern Pesticides at Kovur; zinc recovery and silver extraction plant for Hindustan Zinc Ltd. Udaipur; Soda ash and ammonium chloride plants (200 tpd each) for Tuticorin Alkali Chemicals and Fertilisers Ltd, Tuticorin; sulphuric acid and nitric acid plants for Ordnance Factory, Itarsi; three mini cement projects in Gujarat, etc.

### **Research & Development**

FACT has the strong backing of not only experienced engineers and designers, but also of a full-fledged Research and Development Division. The Research Division is engaged in evolving new processes for the utilisation of by-product wastes, effluents, etc. arising in fertiliser manufacture. Some of the noteworthy achievements of FACT's industrial research programme are: By-product gypsum utilisation; manufacture of sodium silico fluoride; manufacture of calcium silicate; manufacture of synthetic cryolite and manufacture of urea phosphate.

Work is also done by the Research Division towards developing new processes for other companies.

### **FACT Engineering Works**

FACT Engineering Works (FEW) another division of FACT, caters to the specialised needs of chemical and fertiliser industry in the fields of fabrication of plant and equipment as well as structural and erection works.

FEW is capable of fabricating specialised items like gas holders and tanks, primary and secondary cells, heat exchangers, kettle plates and pressure vessels, mixers, impellers and agitators. It also undertakes structural work and erection at site including that of columns, beams, casings, platforms, gratings, etc. and fabrication and laying of pipes for various requirements. Recently FEW diversified its activities to take up design, fabrication and erection of hydraulic gates, underground cross country pipelines etc.

Well-equipped with modern facilities for fabrication, machining, material handling, transportation and quality control, FEW is also well manned by experienced engineers and shopmen.

### **Personnel**

Healthy industrial relations and a happy work force are the surest foundations for the efficient operation of the company. As a major industry in the State, FACT has the additional responsibility of setting standard for others in the field. An enlightened personnel policy is, therefore, pursued. The company has an employee strength of more than 7,000 inclusive of FEDO, FEW, Cochin Division and Marketing Division. The company has accepted in principle the linking of dearness allowances to the cost of living index and the worker automatically gets an increase in the wages with every increase in the cost of living index.

Following the principle that all disputes between workers and management should be settled through negotiation, long term agreements have been signed by the company with its employees.

Amenities provided to workers include a liberally subsidised canteen, a subsidised sports association and a medical benefit scheme for employees and their families. The company is attempting to provide maximum accommodation to the employees based on a phased programme. Family quarters as well as bachelor accommodation are provided with all modern amenities, free water and power. High schools and primary schools are also run by the company for the benefit of the children. There is also a fine arts wing. Subsidised transport facilities are provided to employees coming from far away places, in a limited way. The company has organised a welfare fund to provide financial assistance to employees in deserving cases.

### **Outlook for future**

Fertiliser technology is developing very fast. Before a plant based on the most modern process is set up and commissioned, the process becomes obsolescent sometimes even obsolete. Fertiliser producers, therefore, have to be on the alert all the time to keep themselves abreast of the most modern developments in technology. With a growing research and development department and a competent design and engineering organisation, it should be possible for FACT to meet this challenge and help the country towards self-reliance in this field of activity.

#### **Introduction**

The Fertilizer Corporation of India Ltd., a Government of India undertaking was formed on January 1, 1961. It has ushered in a new area from April 1, 1978 after reorganisation.

After reorganisation, the Fertilizer Corporation of India Ltd., have two operating units at Sindri and Gorakhpur. FCI has three of the world's largest coal based projects, two of which at Talcher (Orissa) and Ramagundam (Andhra Pradesh) are complete and only awaiting commissioning. The third project at Korba (Madhya Pradesh) shall be taken up after successful commissioning of these two projects.

#### **Capital Employed**

The corporation is a public sector undertaking fully owned by the Government of India. It has an authorised capital of Rs. 800 crore. The total issued and subscribed capital as on March 31, 1979 is Rs. 374.13 crore.

#### **Capacity and Growth**

When all the projects in hand (except Korba) are commissioned the rated capacity of FCI plants would be 8,05,000 tonnes in terms of nitrogen and 1,50,000 tonnes in terms of P.O.:

Amongst the existing units, complex, ANP fertiliser is being produced at Gorakhpur.

#### **Sindri Is Re-born**

The old Sindri plant which was commissioned in 1951 continued to work profitably upto 1967, after which due to ageing the plant started suffering losses due to gradual reduction in production capacities and additional expenditure on maintenance cost. This resulted in the drawing up of a scheme for having a Rationalisation Project and a second Modernisation Project at Sindri which together would lead to the emergence of a new and bigger complex in place of the old Sindri plant which has been gradually scrapped except for the ammonium sulphate plant. The two projects were commissioned in October, 1979.

#### **Sindri Rationalisation**

The Rs. 60 crore Rationalisation Project involves the creation of a capacity of 3,26,000 tonnes of triple super phosphate (TSP) equivalent to 1,50,000 tonnes of P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> almost half of the domestic production of phosphatic fertilisers. A novel feature of this project is the availability locally of the by-product gypsum to replace the natural gypsum hitherto hauled all the way from Rajasthan made possible by reacting sulphuric acid with rock phosphate to give phosphoric acid and by-product gypsum. While this by-product gypsum will be used in the existing ammonium sulphate plant, the phosphoric acid will be treated with rock phosphate to produce triple superphosphate.

The Rationalisation Project comprises a 880 tonnes/day sulphuric acid plant in terms of P.O. and a 1,100 tonnes/day TSP plant.

The Rationalisation Project will require annually 2,50,000 tonnes of pyrites, 30,000 tonnes of sulphur and 5,00,000 tonnes of rock phosphate to produce 3,26,000 tonnes of TSP, 5,00,000 tonnes of by-product gypsum and 2,70,000 of pyrites cinder, a waste product. The project has gone into commercial production from October 1979.

#### **Sindri Modernisation**

Construction work on Modernisation Project began in 1975. This World Bank-aided project has been built at a cost of Rs. 179 crores. \$91 million (Rs. 82 crores) has been provided in the form of an IDA credit. It has a fuel-oil based ammonia plant of 900 tonnes per day. The remaining ammonia is converted into ammonium sulphate for which the existing plant in the old Sindri complex has been renovated. About 66 per cent of the equipment used is indigenous. The project went into commercial production in October, 1979.

#### **Coal Based Plants**

A new era dawned for the Indian fertiliser industry with the Government of India decision in 1969 to establish 3 coal based plants in the country—Talcher, Ramagundam and Korba.

The annual installed capacity of each of these projects is about 3 lakh tonnes of nitrogen with the end-product—5 lakh tonnes of urea per annum. In addition one million cubic metres of argon gas would also be produced in each plant.

### Talcher Project

The Rs. 214 crore Talcher Project is designed to produce 2,28,000 tonnes of nitrogen annually by using about 1 million tonnes of coal to be obtained from the nearby South Balanda and Nandira collieries. The total requirement of 55 MW of power would be met by Orissa power grid while the water requirement would be met from the river Brahimini.

BARC is also setting up a heavy water plant within Talcher complex for the production of 62 tonnes of heavy water per year.

Talcher fertiliser plant produced urea from its own ammonia in January 1980 for the first time during trial runs.

When this plant will produce at its designed capacity of 4,95,000 tonnes of urea per annum, it would help boost production of food grain in the country by nearly two and half million tonnes per year.

### Ramagundam Project

Ramagundam Project in the Telengana region of the Andhra Pradesh is identical to the plant coming up at Talcher. Its daily requirement of about one million tonnes of coal would be met from Singareni Colliery. The project's power requirement of 55 MW will be met by the Andhra Pradesh State Electricity Board which 15 million gallons of water per day would be drawn from the river Godavari.

Ammonia and urea were produced in Ramagundam Fertilizer project also in first week of January 1980.

### Marketing Promotion and Extension Services

The corporation has developed a multi-channel distribution system for timely and efficient distribution of fertiliser produced by its own units, sister companies and imported fertilisers. At present the corporation's intensive marketing activities are confined to the State of Uttar Pradesh only. In other States, fertilisers produced by the units of the corporation which have been created with effect from April 1, 1978 consequent upon the re-organisation of FCI/NFL.

However, in recent past nucleus marketing offices have been set up for States of Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa and Andhra Pradesh. There is a scheme to conduct marketing in these States through these offices.

Dealership structure of the corporation consists of dealers belonging to various categories like private trade engaged in small

business, unemployed graduates to generate self employment, ex-servicemen to rehabilitate and provide reasonable livelihood, multi-purpose distribution centres to provide essential agricultural inputs through public sector oil company outlets, scheduled castes/Scheduled tribes to help them for their economic betterment, in addition to cooperative societies/service centres of cooperatives and agro-industries.

Closely associated with the marketing of fertilisers, FCI has developed wide ranging facilities for advising and educating farmers in the rational use of fertilisers and efficient farm management. It is equipped with modern soil testing and research laboratories in addition to mobile soil testing units for on-the-spot free analysis of soil samples.

Thus, FCI is not only engaged in the business of selling fertilisers, but it is genuinely interested in improving the lot of the farmers by providing the services as a social obligation.

### Industrial Chemicals

Besides fertiliser products, FCI produce anhydrous ammonia, dilute nitric acid, prilled ammonium nitrate, ammonium bicarbonate, ammonium sulphate (TG), sodium hexameta phosphate and argon gas at its operating units at Sindri and Gorakhpur.

When the two-coal based projects at Talcher and Ramagundam are commissioned more argon gas and some coal-tar distillation product would also be produced.

### Gypsum Organisation

FCI is operating 21 gypsum mines located in five districts of western Rajasthan, viz., Barmer, Jaisalmer, Nagaur, Bikaner and Sriganganagar. The corporation has a capacity to mine about seven lakh tonnes of gypsum per year.

With the implementation of Sindri Rationalisation Scheme, the use of natural gypsum at Sindri would be completely eliminated. As a result of this, markets in other areas for gypsum are being explored.

The use of gypsum in reclamation of alkalii soils has been made recently on a large scale in the States of Haryana, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh. The corporation has been able to procure a sizeable amount of orders of gypsum for agricultural uses in Punjab and Haryana. FCI has been able to make a significant headway in exporting gypsum to Middle East countries and Bangladesh.

### Training Organisation

The concept of training requisite personnel in different categories in the Fertilizer Corporation Ltd. has received recognition

right from the inception of the first establishment at Sindri around 1951. There is now a full-fledged training organisation having number of training institutes established at its units and divisions which conduct personnel training activities of different requisite variety to meet the need for technical and managerial manpower requirements.

Such institutes are fully equipped with essential paraphernalia and are centres in human resources development activities as on going process in the corporation.

Various schemes of training offered cater to the induction training of new entrants, development training of existing employees and preparing apprentice groups as fresh talent required for the corporation.

FCI institutes have a pride in providing a large number of training personnel in the field of fertiliser production to man to executive position in the country. The corporation has also trained a large number of trainees from European, South-East Asian coun-

tries in advance manufacturing techniques under different collaboration's programmes.

At FCI's Central Office, an institute of Management Development imparts services for managerial development. This Institute provides advanced training course for senior executives at corporate level and also cater to the needs of the entire federal group of fertiliser companies in the public sector.

#### Welfare

FCI subscribes to the view that a happy and satisfied employee is an asset for any organisation. FCI has provided liberal welfare measures to its employees and their families.

Modern self contained township with their own schools, play grounds, markets, hospitals etc. have been established. FCI has its own cooperative consumer stores which cater to its employees and their dependents.

Recreation and cultural programmes form an integral part of the life in FCI communities in different townships.

**Brief History**

Gujarat State Fertilizers Company Limited (GSFC) was incorporated on February 15, 1962 as a public limited company under the

Companies Act, 1956 (Act 1 of 1956) for manufacturing fertilisers and chemicals. The factory is situated at Fertilizernagar, District Baroda, in Gujarat State. Its Board of

Directors constitutes the above well-known industrialists and administrators.

#### **Capital Structure**

GSFC's authorised share capital is Rs. 25,00,00,000 divided into 22,00,000 equity shares of Rs. 100 each and 3,00,000 Redeemable Cumulative Preference Shares of Rs. 100 each. The paid-up share capital of the company as on date is Rs. 11,99,68,800. The State Government is the largest shareholder, holding 49 per cent of its share capital; of the remaining 35,792 shareholders about 14,069 are farmers. The financial institutions such as the Industrial Development Bank of India, the Unit Trust of India, the Life Insurance Corporation of India, the nationalised banks and other insurance companies hold between them, about 23.73 per cent of the capital.

The capital investment for the first phase to produce 1,75,000 tonnes of nutrients and the second expansion for producing 1,35,000 tonnes of nitrogen has been approximately Rs. 63,00,00,000. Alongwith the investment for caprolactum and other facilities for the third phase, the total investment amounts to about Rs. 96,00,00,000 including working capital, interest, township and other facilities. The complex has sales potential of about Rs. 100,00,00,000 per annum at the present prices.

#### **Organisation**

GSFC is a joint sector venture wherein the State Government, public financial institutions, the bankers and the public have invested their money in mutual trust. In its organisation, a new experiment in management has also been attempted. On its Board there are nominees of State Government and the Industrial Development Bank of India, besides non-officials drawn from amongst the most well-known industrialists and business men, and experts from the field of technology, finance, administration and co-operation.

In composition of its Board, an attempt has been made to ensure that the company's affairs are guided with initiative, imagination and enterprise combined with prudence, caution and fullest regard to public interest and the financial canons of propriety that are expected to govern the conduct of those in charge of public enterprise and investment.

#### **Products**

The company commenced its production of fertilisers on May 29, 1967 as trial production and the first 100 MT of fertilisers were despatched to all parts of Gujarat on June 5, 1967.

The second phase of the project started production in the third quarter of 1969. The

800 MT per day urea plant and the ammonia plant with capacity of 500 MT per day were completed in August, 1969 and are running well since then.

The third phase expansion of the project concerns the production of 20,000 MT per annum of caprolactum with about 80,000 MT per annum of ammonium sulphate as co-product. The range of products with the completion of the third phase in August, 1974, of the complex covers urea 3,67,200 tonnes (fertiliser grade), aggregate production of ammonium sulphate and diammonium phosphate 1,48,000 tonnes and 1,08,000 tonnes respectively or 2,56,000 tonnes of ammonium sulphate phosphate. In addition, the caprolactum facility would also contribute 80,000 tonnes of ammonium sulphate. Among the industrial products, liquid ammonia, technical grade urea, sulphuric acid, oleum, cyclohexane, cyclohexanone and caprolactum are produced and sold to industries. GSFC is the first company to produce enriched diammonium phosphate (18:46:0) in India. GSFC is the first and only manufacturer of captrolactum in India.

#### **Marketing**

The challenge of changing marketing conditions has been effectively met by adopting appropriate marketing strategies. Our marketing activities are extended from our traditional area of Gujarat, Maharashtra, MP, Rajasthan, Punjab, HP and Haryana to Uttar Pradesh and Andhra Pradesh. While the bulk of fertilisers are distributed through cooperatives, the company has also been marketing fertilisers through other institutional and private agencies in different States, besides the company's own retail outlets called Farm Information Centres/Fertiliser Depots numbering 200 in Gujarat State and a few in other States. The company is also maintaining about 90 warehouses in field for timely distribution of fertilisers. The company has always considered services to farmers as the most important aspect of its marketing strategy and accordingly it has framed consumer oriented marketing policies and undertaken various promotional activities with the objective of promoting scientific agriculture to raise agricultural production and thereby farmer's prosperity. It has been possible to effectively undertake various promotional activities like demonstration, soil and water testing, participation in fairs and festivals, distribution of literature, arranging farmers meetings, seminars, etc. Through GSFC's Farm Information Centres/Fertiliser Depots manned by agricultural graduates, various media of mass communication are also judiciously used to reach the farmers.

A monthly farmers' magazine "KRISHI JI-VAN" published by GSFC provides useful agricultural information to subscribers

exceeding 41,000 in Gujarat State. The company also provides soil and water testing facilities to farmers free of cost. Agronomic research is undertaken at company's own farm and the farms of agricultural universities to recommend and promote correct use of fertilisers.

Besides routine promotional activities, the company has also undertaken special agricultural development projects as per the needs of the local agro-climatic conditions. GSFC was the first fertiliser manufacturer to make the introduction of crop insurance possible through General Insurance Corporation to cover the risk due to natural hazards. Another project titled "LEAP FORWARD PROJECT FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT OF RATHAWA ADIVASI FARMERS" undertaken in backward areas, has shown outstanding results. Under the village adoption scheme, two villages—one in paddy growing area and the other in bajra growing area, have been adopted during the year 1975-76. The scheme is continuing for the present year also. The company is also carrying out massive extension programmes in the IFPC districts of North Gujarat to guide farmers regarding effective use of fertilisers in sandy loam and sandy soils. The company has also prepared a comprehensive action programme for development of districts of North Gujarat which are having high irrigation potential but less fertiliser consumption. The plan is being implemented with efforts put in various directions to educate farmers regarding qualitative aspects of fertiliser use to reap optimum yields. The company has also launched a programme to encourage excellence in college campus with a view to promoting studies and research workers who make significant contribution to agriculture. Under this programme, the company has planned an expenditure of Rs. 5,57,400 over a period of six years to students and research workers by way of awarding prizes, scholarships and raising chairs for research in agricultural universities and agricultural management institutions.

#### **Purge Gas Recovery**

The company is setting up facilities to recover 2.8 million NM<sup>3</sup> of argon, 5,200 MT methane and 66 MT/day of synthesis gas mixture of H<sub>2</sub> and N<sub>2</sub> from the purge gas of synthesis loop. The work on the project is in full swing and the plant is ex-

pected to be ready for commissioning by the middle of 1981.

#### **Nylon-6 Project**

As a logical development to the setting up of caprolactum manufacturing facilities, GSFC is setting up a nylon-6 chips plant for manufacturing nylon moulding powder to feed the plastic industry with a better and versatile grade of engineering plastic raw material which can be a substitute mostly for non-ferrous metals which are already in short supply in the country. The total capacity of nylon-6 plant would be 4,000 tonnes per annum. The civil work on the project has started and the project will be completed by the middle of 1981.

#### **Melamine Project**

The basic and detail engineering work on 5,000 MTPY melamine project is progressing satisfactorily and the plant is expected to be commissioned in late 1981.

#### **Sulphuric Acid Project**

A new sulphuric acid plant with a capacity of 1,32,000 MTPA is under construction. The civil work on the project has started and the plant is expected to be commissioned by the middle of 1981.

#### **Research and Development**

Research activities in GSFC were initiated concurrently with implementation of the fertiliser project, putting up agricultural research stations. Agronomical research on development of better farm practices through optimum use of water management, improved seeds, fertilisers, pesticides, etc. has been carried on over the years. A full-fledged research centre equipped with necessary facilities and manned by well qualified technologists and chemical engineers has been established and has been accorded recognition by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India.

The main areas of research cover process and product development on bench scale as well as pilot plant scale in fertilisers, petro-chemicals, high polymers, corrosion studies, effluent disposal and pollution abatement. A number of pilot plants have been designed and installed on the basis of laboratory investigations carried out at our research centre.

### 2. Financial and Technical Collaboration

The Fertiliser Project at Kanpur has been set up with the technical collaboration of Imperial Chemical Industries Limited, UK, who now holds 50.42 per cent of the shares in IEL. The International Finance Corporation and other overseas shareholders hold 8.89 per cent shares in IEL, the President of India 12.9 per cent and the Indian Public/Financial Institutions/Companies 27.72 per cent.

### 1. Background

IEL was formed in 1955 to manufacture commercial blasting explosives and the plant at Gomia (Bihar) was commissioned in 1958. IEL decided to enter the fertiliser field in 1965 and conducted detailed surveys culminating in the Kanpur fertiliser project. The 4,50,000 tonnes per annum urea plant (2,00,000 tonnes N) was inaugurated by the then Prime Minister of India on 6th December, 1969. The total capacity of the urea plant would be increased to 675,000 tonnes

### **3. Raw Materials/Facilities**

The factory is located on a 270-acre site about 6 km from Kanpur, close to the Panki railway station. The feedstock naphtha is pumped by pipeline from the Barauni refinery. Kanpur is at the focus of the UP State Electricity Board network ensuring adequate power supply. Ample supplies of water are available from the lower Ganges canal. Moreover, Kanpur is strategically located on the main railway system, is well served by road transport and commands a market area with well developed irrigation facilities and high potential for fertiliser consumption.

### **4. Marketing Organisation**

The main market area for the Kanpur plant consists of the States of Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and Punjab. The headquarters of the marketing department is at New Delhi. To closely supervise and guide the field representatives (all qualified agricultural graduates) located in each district of the market area, IEL have established four area sales offices at Varanasi, Lucknow, Meerut and Chandigarh, manned by senior staff.

A significant proportion of IEL's production is sold through the cooperatives and other State Level Apex Institutions in the main market area. To supplement the sales, IEL have also set up a widespread dealer network in the market area consisting of about 3000 selling points including wholesalers at tehsil level and retailers at block/village level. A chain of buffer storage points near consumption centres has also established all over the market area for storing urea during the offseason and to meet the urgent requirements of cooperatives and distributors during peak seasons.

### **5. Marketing Development and Publicity Activities**

To educate farmers on the correct methods of application of fertilisers, demonstrations are conducted every season on farmers' fields throughout the market area. These demonstrations incorporate the latest recommended package of practices for the crops and the emphasis is on the optimum use of N, P, K and micronutrients for obtaining the best results.

A soil testing laboratory is in operation at Panki. Soil samples from the demonstration plot as also from the farmers' fields are ana-

lysed in this laboratory and fertiliser recommendations issued. The technical service to the farmers is guided by specialists in the field of agriculture. The development activities in the market area are coordinated by Assistant Managers and Sales Officers attached to the four Area Offices.

Intensive field publicity campaigns are organised during the seasons in the form of mini kisan melas on the field demonstration plots in order to popularise balanced use of fertilisers. Cropwise folders giving the latest recommendations on the correct use of fertilisers and other package of practices are distributed widely amongst farmers every season. The media-mix includes regular puppet shows every season, participation in centre and state level exhibitions, village fairs, posters, wall paintings, hoardings and radio advertising.

Since Kharif 1975, work in village adoption is being carried out in two villages: (i) Chakarpur—a village near Kanpur and (ii) Banguri—a village near Agra. The programme envisages total socio-economic development of these villages to increase the farm income of the villagers by 2 to 3 times within a period of 2 years or so. As a result of IEL's efforts, both the per hectare yields as well as the total agricultural production in these villages have considerably improved. After bringing electricity to one of the villages, tubewells have been installed and net work of pucca irrigation channels laid out for developing the irrigation resources. Communications, health and hygiene and children's schooling and other facets of life have also been improved. Gobar gas plants have been installed in order to motivate the farmers to adopt scientific recycling of organic wastes which provides clean fuel for cooking and lighting and enriched manure. Installation of hand pumps and renovation of existing wells has been undertaken to provide safe drinking water. A local farmers' club has been established to mobilise resources in order to manage the infrastructure created under the village adoption programme. The local lead banks have been associated to meet the credit needs of the villagers. While we have already withdrawn from village Chakarpur on realising our objective, we shall shortly be withdrawing from village Banguri.

Encouraged by the results obtained in two villages, IEL have adopted during 1979 another village Chauka, near Varanasi for integrated rural development.

**II. BACKGROUND**

An all India Cooperative Society was registered on November 3, 1967 under the name of Indian Farmers Fertiliser Cooperative Limited (IFFCO) with the purpose of taking up large scale manufacture and distribution of chemical fertilisers. In the initial formation of the Society, the following 10 States participated:

1. Punjab
2. Uttar Pradesh
3. Haryana
4. Gujarat
5. Tamil Nadu
6. Rajasthan

7. Madhya Pradesh
8. Andhra Pradesh
9. Maharashtra
10. Karnataka

The principle of share participation was that the product is to be shared by the respective State cooperative systems in proportion to their share-holding in the Society. Subsequent to the initial formation, the States of Bihar, West Bengal, Orissa, Kerala, Jammu and Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh and three Union Territories namely, Delhi, Chandigarh and Pondicherry have also become participants. The Registered Office of the Society is at New Delhi.

### III. CAPITAL OUTLAY

The Authorised Capital is Rs. 200 crore of which Rs. 81.08 crore is subscribed and Rs. 80.77 crore is paid up. The capital resources of the Society, as on March 31, 1980 are as follows:

At present, 27494 cooperative societies are share-holders and have subscribed Rs. 31.88 crore as share capital.

### IV. PLANTS

The ammonia plant with a rated capacity of 910 tonnes per day and the urea plant with a rated capacity of 1,200 tonnes per day are located at Kalol Unit. The unit has a capacity of 3,96,000 tonnes of urea per annum. Besides, a 6 tonnes per day Dry Ice Plant has been set up to convert a part of the surplus carbon dioxide available at Kalol into dry ice. The Kandla Plant has a capacity for producing 4,15,000 tonnes of NPK per annum. The feed-stock for the Kalol Plant is natural gas while the Kandla Plant uses mainly imported phosphoric acid. The plants have been in commercial operation from the dates shown below:

### V. MARKETING SET-UP

As per its constitution, IFFCO markets its products only through the constituent cooperatives spread over 16 States and 2 Union Territories of the Indian Union, namely, Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Jammu and Kashmir, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, Bihar, Orissa, Kerala, Himachal Pradesh, Delhi and Chandigarh. In order to facilitate the marketing activities, IFFCO has four zonal offices with headquarters at Chandigarh, Allahabad, Ahmedabad and Bangalore. The zonal offices at Chandigarh, Allahabad and Bangalore have already started functioning. The zonal office at Ahmedabad is likely to start

functioning during 1980. Each State is headed by a State Marketing Manager. State marketing offices are supported by adequate number of area offices in each State. At present the number of such area offices is 32. In order to take care of promotional activities IFFCO has Zonal Agronomists located at each zonal office supported by area agronomists and field representatives, who are mostly agricultural graduates. Wherever the marketing operations justify it, the Society has its own service centres to provide the package of inputs and services under one room. However, sales of IFFCO products are almost exclusive through about 21,500 co-operative sales points. The promotional programmes of IFFCO are designed to educate the farmers on improved farming techniques and the balanced fertilisation concept. Field days, farmers meetings, village adoption programmes, etc. are media to maintain close contact with the farming community.

The Society is also under an agreement with M/s. Hindustan Copper Limited under which IFFCO provides various marketing services principally to ensure the sale of HCL's triple and single superphosphate in the States of Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

### Service to cooperatives

The emergence of IFFCO as an efficient fertiliser cooperative strengthened the entire cooperative system of the country. Apart from ensuring regular and guaranteed supply of high quality fertilisers with liberal supply conditions and sound technical support, the Society also assists the cooperatives by providing training to sales point personnel. The excellent results obtained by the Society also in turn improve the financial condition of the otherwise weak lower tiers of the cooperative system which are IFFCO's shareholders.

### VI. NEW PROJECTS

#### Phulpur Project

The Third Plant of IFFCO is being set up at Phulpur with a total investment of about Rs. 181 crore. The Project is financed as under:

The foreign exchange requirement for the Phulpur Project is provided by a loan from the World Bank amounting to \$109 million. This is a naphtha based plant with a capacity of 5 lakh tonnes of urea per annum. The plant is expected to go into production during June, 1980.

#### Kandla Expansion

A project for doubling the capacity of the NPK Plant at Kandla has also been taken up for implementation and is expected to be commissioned by July 1981. The estimated cost of the project is Rs. 23 crore and the entire amount is expected to be met out of the internal resources.

#### Hazira Project

(1) Hazira Project, consisting of 2 x 1350 MTPD plants and 4 x 1100 MTPD urea plants, was originally contemplated to be implemented jointly by IFFCO and NFL. The entire project has now been entrusted to the cooperative sector. To own and operate these two giant plants which will cost about Rs. 700 crore and produce 14,54,000 MT of urea per annum, a new Cooperative Society under the name of KRIBHCO has been registered on April 17, 1980.

(2) The new Society will have equity contribution of Rs. 350 crore from Government

of India, IFFCO and other cooperatives and balance requirement of Rs. 350 crore including foreign exchange requirement would be met through loans from World Bank and other financing agencies such as O.E.C.F. (Japan), O.D.A. (U.K.) and I.D.B.I., etc. IFFCO would contribute Rs. 100 crore towards equity while other cooperatives and Government of India would contribute Rs. 20 crore and Rs. 230 crore respectively.

#### Others

The debottlenecking of the Kalol Plant which involves different schemes, envisaging an increase in the output and an improvement in the efficiency, is in advance stages of implementation. The Amine Guard System which was commissioned during early 1979, is in regular operation. The Purge Gas Recovery Plant, the first to be set up in the country, is expected to be in regular production by June 1980. The others like the installation of standby boiler and modifications/additions in the different sections of the ammonia plant are expected to be ready in phases by the middle of 1981.

The Society has also taken up the setting up of a plant for the manufacture of 500 tonnes of Malathion per annum at Kalol and the same is expected to go into production in the last quarter of 1980.

Indian Potash Limited (IPL) was started in 1955 at the instance of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry as a consortium of the then fertiliser interests.

Back in the early 60s, Potash was largely unknown to an average Indian farmer. Organised official research on crop response to potash application was almost non-existent. The data on potash as a fertiliser input was meagre. There was no organised promotional and sales effort for potash except in a few Southern States on a small scale.

The task before IPL was to establish the need of potash in crop production, promote its usage, develop an effective distribution and marketing network and to sustain and improve the market for potash.

To begin with, IPL relied on data left by "Potascheme" and followed up by further experimentation in cultivators' fields. These results led to official acceptance of potash as an inevitable plantfood, as evidenced by progressive acceptance of potash in official recommendations for many crops.

Since 1961, IPL has been in the forefront

for potash promotion through various methods such as award of Research Fellowships and collaboration in research projects on potash in universities and institutions, publication of "Indian Potash Journal" and also supply of reprints and research articles thus keeping research workers upto date on potash data, giving annual cash awards for outstanding research work on potash, organising visits of eminent scientists from abroad for exchange of ideas/views with their counterparts in India, organise demonstrations in cultivators fields, organisation of potash festivals, farmers' conferences, crash programmes and such mass contacts media, besides conducting audio visual programmes, AIR, TV interviews of "success farmers" etc.

Around 1970, the company expanded and developed into an undertaking in the joint sector with the participation of public, co-operative and private sectors—the public and cooperative sectors together holding the majority share in equity capital.

IPL has zonal/regional and State officers throughout the country. The Head Office is at Madras. IPL markets potassic fertilisers throughout India through public/cooperative

and private distribution agencies. IPL also meets the potash requirements of the various manufacturers of complex fertiliser and mixtures containing potash.

IPL also distributes pool urea on behalf of the Ministry of Agriculture, particularly in the States of Punjab, Haryana, U.P., Bihar, M.P., A.P., and West Bengal. A beginning has been made in distribution of 'Vijay' products manufactured by Madras Fertilisers Limited in the States of Punjab, Haryana and U.P.

Since 1978, IPL has been entrusted with the port handling and distribution of D.A.P., Urea, C.A.N., and ammonium sulphate imported through some ports as agents of the Ministry of Agriculture.

IPL is the pioneer in promotion work in India. About 300 field staff cover all important States doing sales and sales promotional activities. The Potash Research Institute of India has been established to undertake basic research on potassium.

Shri Sohan Singh, Managing Director, Indian Potash Limited, is also a Director on the Board of The Fertiliser Association of India.

The company has been granted permission to manufacture granulated fertilisers and accordingly it has started manufacture of Kamdhenu Brand granulated fertilisers at the factory at Magwada and Thane. They are also in good demand.

**Kamdhenu Pesticides:** Company's one sister concern Kamdhenu Pesticides has just commenced producing 'Kamdhenu Pesticides' and has put on market 20 pesticides at present and intends to introduce some 60 more products shortly.

The company is also manufacturing its new product PLANTOMON containing plant hor-

mones. This has given fine results and is becoming popular among the agricultural masses.

The company has expanded its marketing activities in other States, i.e., Gujarat, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh and is having its branches at Amaravati in Maharashtra and Chhani, Dist. Baroda in Gujarat, at Belgum in Karnataka and at Guntur in Andhra Pradesh.

The company started a Marathi Monthly Magazine 'Khad Kamdhenu' having a circulation of about 10,000 copies. Through this magazine, the company is imparting up-to-date methods of agriculture as well as controlling the various pests and insects, etc. It is being distributed among the farmers free of cost. The company also recently started its agricultural library.

The company has its own transport truck fleet, in order to move the agricultural products and fertilisers to the market and to the farmers.

The company has engaged some graduate representatives who move about in the various districts of the State giving advice to the needy farmers and also introducing the Kamdhenu Manure Mixture and other agricultural aids. The company has got about 350 distributing agents covering all the districts of Maharashtra through whom the business is carried on in the State.

The company has established a well-equipped laboratory to test fertilisers, agricultural chemicals, soil and water of the farmers and to give suitable advice to them.

### Background

Madras Fertilizers Limited (MFL) is a public sector undertaking. The Government of India holds 51 per cent of the share capital. The collaborators are Amoco India Inc. and National Iranian Oil Company each with a share participation of 24.5 per cent.

MFL plant is located at Manali, 16 km. north of Madras.

The plant started commercial production in November 1971 manufacturing urea and

complex fertilisers. The capacity for complex fertiliser production was increased by 50 per cent in October 1976. The present annual production capacity is 2.48 lakh MT of ammonia, 1.53 lakh MT of urea and 5.40 lakh MT of complex fertiliser products. The principal raw materials are naphtha from the Madras Refineries Limited and phosphoric acid and potash from imports.

Products manufactured presently are complex fertilisers in the grades—17-17-17, 14-28-14, 24-24-0 and 18-46-0 and urea, and these products are marketed under the brand

name VIJAY through private marketers as well as institutional agencies under long term marketing agreements. Carbon dioxide and ammonia are also sold for industrial use.

Until 1975, MFL marketing operations were confined to the five Southern States. The marketing territory has now been extended to Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Orissa, Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh.

MFL marketing strategy includes making VIJAY fertiliser available as near the consumer as possible. Farmer education and product promotion are taken up on a very intensified scale. Farmer education programmes include multiple crop demonstration, farmer/dealer training programmes, use of mobile audio-visual units, slide-cum-tape presentations, folk media such as Burrakatha and Puppet shows, Village Adoption Programmes, and Intensive Consumer Contact Programmes. Recently, MFL has taken up programmes for long term agricultural development. In addition, the mass media, viz., Press, radio, cinema and printed literature are extensively used to create awareness to the concept of balanced fertilisation.

MFL has one of the best soil testing laboratories in the country and offers free soil test and fertiliser recommendation service. Facilities are also available to micro-nutrient analysis in soils and irrigation water analysis.

#### 1979-80

Production performance during fiscal year 1979-80 though below expectations, was fairly good. 4.85 lakhs MT of complex fertilisers and 1.26 lakhs MT of urea were produced. The nutrient output was 1.41 lakhs MT N, 0.90 lakhs MT P<sub>2</sub>O<sub>5</sub> and 0.76 lakhs MT K<sub>2</sub>O, making a total of 3.07 lakhs MT. Capacity utilisation was 90 per cent for complex fertilisers and 80 per cent for urea.

During the year, 6.09 lakh MT of VIJAY products have been shipped from MFL Plant to the various destinations in the marketing territory. 3.67 lakh MT were despatched by road and 2.42 lakh MT by rail.

For the first time in the operation MFL started handling and distribution of Pool Urea. The first vessel was received at Kakinada Port in March 1980 with approximately 14,400 MT.

MFL operated about 150 field warehouses with an average storage capacity of 97,000 MT. This capacity was hired from the Central and State warehousing corporations.

MFL also finalised product exchange arrangement with FACT and MCF for supply of urea in Kerala and Karnataka respectively. In exchange MFL will supply urea to these two manufacturers in Tamil Nadu.

Under the Long Term Agricultural Development Programme, MFL has taken up 22 operational units covering a cultivated area of nearly 4.5 lakh acres. There are six units in Tamil Nadu, six in Karnataka and ten in Andhra Pradesh. The programme is being implemented with support and cooperation from the respective Departments of Agriculture Agricultural Research Stations, the Command Area Development Administration, the Cooperative set up and MFL Marketers. The main objective of the programme is to increase agricultural production in the selected areas by approximately 30 to 50 per cent during a 3 to 5 year period. Constraints in the way of agricultural growth are clearly identified and long and short term action plans are implemented to overcome these constraints. So far MFL has completed three years of operation in respect of seven units —3 in Karnataka, 3 in Andhra Pradesh and 1 in Tamil Nadu. The results achieved in the various areas of growth in all these units have been quite encouraging.

MFL achieved a unique safety record on August 7, 1979 by crossing 10 million man-hours of safe operation without a disabling injury. As of March 31, 1980 the record continues with 1877 days completed (11.57 million manhours) and with excellent chances of surpassing the world record of 11.71 million manhours for fertiliser industry as reported by National Safety Council, USA. MFL safety record during 1978 was rated as THE BEST for nitrogenous fertiliser industry by the National Safety Council, USA, on world basis.

MFL is people, and this philosophy is enshrined deep within each MFL employee. MFL believes that for an organisation to achieve results it has to think of work in terms of its people, more so, when it has a young work force on hand—the average age of its employees being 33 years.

Towards this objective MFL has introduced various benefits and with the existing competitive salary scales it is able to meet the aspiration of its work force.

MFL has also various councils and committees which act as forums of industrial democracy. MFL has cordial relation with its employees and has been strike free for nearly 8 years.

securing the confidence and goodwill of the farmers, planters, distributors and their dealers. The Minerals & Metals Trading Corporation of India was incorporated as a private limited company on 26th September, 1963. It started functioning with effect from 1st October, 1963 and became a deemed public company from 1st July, 1975. The present authorised capital of the corporation is Rs. 25 crores. The paid up capital, which at the time of its incorporation was Rs. 2 crores, has since been raised to Rs. 21 crore. The entire capital is subscribed by the Government of India.

The central aim of the corporation is to broaden and enlarge the scope of exports of mineral ores and to arrange imports of essential raw materials for distribution to the industrial units in the country. The total trade turnover of the corporation in 1979-80 is estimated to be 13,794 million, with exports accounting for Rs. 2,138 million, imports for Rs. 11,601 million and domestic trade for Rs. 55 million. Iron ore is the principal item of export handled by the corporation accounting for over Rs. 1,689 million, followed by manganese ore for Rs. 140 million, chrome ore for Rs. 150 million, coal

for Rs. 19 million and barytes for Rs. 137 million.

To boost the exports of mica, a subsidiary corporation, styled as Mica Trading Corporation of India, was established on 18th June, 1973 with its registered office at Patna. It commenced functioning with effect from 1st June, 1974. During the year 1979-80, the subsidiary company exported mica worth about Rs. 230 million.

The role of MMTC in regard to the handling of imports is directly related to the import policy announced by the Government from time to time. The corporation has built up expertise in the field of imports and has been entrusted increasingly with the import and distribution of essential raw materials to the industrial units in the country.

The total import turnover in 1979-80 is estimated at Rs. 11,601 million, with fertilisers and fertiliser raw materials alone accounting for Rs. 6,197 million. In keeping with the higher consumption of finished fertilisers and increasing requirements of fertilisers and chemicals industry, the import

of fertiliser and fertiliser raw materials by the corporation in 1980-81 is expected to be over Rs. 8,767 million.

The import turnover in other items, viz., copper, zinc, lead, tin, aluminium etc., during 1979-80 is estimated at Rs. 3,960 million, steel at Rs. 985 million, industrial raw materials like raw asbestos, flourspar, molybdenum and antimony ore, etc. at Rs. 450 million.

The corporation serves a large number of industrial units spread all over the length and breadth of the country and has launched a scheme for export of finished products,

manufactured out of the raw materials imported by it and for the supplies of duty free raw material for export production. **Marketing Activities**

NFL's marketing area of operation comprises the States of Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Himachal Pradesh, J. and K. and Union territories of Delhi and Chandigarh. On the basis of ECA allocation made by Govt. of India, fertilisers are distributed to the state of U.P. also.

A double channel of distribution is employed viz. apex agro-cooperative institutions and private traders. Private trade constitutes dealers in various categories viz. small scale traders, dealers appointed entrepreneur development, MPDC, Ex-servicemen or dependents of those killed in action, those belonging to SC/ST and dealers from backward classes and economically weaker sections.

In addition to the above, factory gate sale points have been started for the first time in India at Nangal, Bhatinda and Panipat plants to supply CAN/urea in loose form directly to the farmers. These sale points are run departmentally by the marketing division.

As on 31-3-1980, the dealership network of NFL totals to 640 dealers under the various categories.

**Sales Turnover**

The sales turn over of the company during the financial year 1979-80 was Rs. 140 crores approximately as against Rs. 55.73 crores are run departmentally by the marketing during 1978-79.

**New Schemes**

For optimum utilisation of ammonia produced at all the three plants, a common ammonia grid is being established with the creation of additional ammonia storage facilities at all the plants and acquiring of a fleet of ammonia tank wagons. To ensure additional on-stream days at Bhatinda and Panipat, an additional gasifier at each of the plants is proposed to be installed.

For effective by-product utilisation, proposals are under way for setting up of Methanol Plant at Nangal and Argon Recovery Unit at Panipat.

#### **Introductory**

The Neyveli Lignite Project is one of the mighty Public Sector Enterprises in India, situated in South Arcot District of Tamil

Nadu. The genesis of the project was that the occurrence of lignite in and around Neyveli came to prominent notice in the later thirties, while drilling borewells for irrigation purposes in the region between Neyveli

and Chidambaram. During 1943-46, the Geological Survey of India drilled a number of bore holes which revealed the abundant availability of lignite over an area of about 25 square miles in and around Neyveli. The preliminary exploratory work was carried out by the State Government and then by the Government of India. The project was built into the present vast complex by the Neyveli Lignite Corp. Ltd., a company owned by the Government of India and incorporated under the Companies Act 1956, in December 1956. The present authorised capital of the company is Rs. 220 crores, consisting of 22,00,000 equity shares of Rs. 1,000 each. The special feature of the project is that it is an integrated one in which the lignite extracted from the mine is completely utilised by the down stream plants form an industrial complex.

2 The constituent units of this project are:

- (i) An open-cast mine to extract lignite
- (ii) A thermal power station to generate electric power, using lignite as fuel
- (iii) A fertiliser plant to manufacture 'urea' based on lignite as the feed stock, now changed to furnace oil
- (iv) A briquetting and carbonisation plant to carbonise lignite into leco
- (v) A clay washing plant to supply refined white clay under the commercial name 'Nekolin'.

#### (i) Open Cast Mine

The open cast mine was inaugurated by the then Prime Minister, Shri Jawaharlal Nehru on 20-5-1957. The first seam of lignite was exposed in August 1961. The present production of lignite is around four million tonnes per annum. The annual requirements for all the consuming units viz. Thermal Power Station, Fertiliser Plant and Briquetting and Carbonisation Plant at full production is about 6.5 million tonnes. Production in the mine is expected to reach this level by 1980-81 through a mine expansion scheme under implementation. The extraction of lignite in 1979-80 was 28.97 lakh tonnes, the cumulative figure from the inception being 529.77 lakh tonnes.

#### (ii) Thermal Power Station

In a traditionally power starved State like Tamil Nadu, the imperative need for Thermal Power Station needs little emphasis. Neyveli Thermal Power Station was constructed in three stages: first 250 MW, next 400 MW and third 600 MW. The 600 MW station has been in construction since 1970. Lignite is used as fuel for the Power Station. However, since the capacity of mine was inadequate to supply lignite for optimum generation at the Power Station, pen-

ding expansion of the mine capacity, two of the 5-MW. Units of the Power Station were converted for operation on furnace oil in 1971. It is proposed to convert these two units back to lignite fuel after the capacity of the mine is raised to 6.5 million tonnes. In 1979-80, 2095.53 million units of power was generated the total generation since the commissioning of the plant till 1979-80 being 33165.91 million units.

#### (iii) Fertiliser Plant

The Fertiliser Plant at Neyveli has a capacity of 465 tonnes of urea per day and was commissioned in 1966. The Fertiliser Plant which was initially based on lignite since its inception was converted from lignite to oil gasification on 16-7-79. The Fertiliser Unit, achieved the production of 1,04,908 tonnes of urea during 1979-80. The plant has so far produced from the commencement till March '80 a total quantity of about 9.69 lakh tonnes of urea.

#### (iv) Briquetting and Carbonisation Plant

This plant produces carbonised lignite briquettes, a smokeless fuel, sold under the trade name 'LECO'. This lignite coke is extensively used not only in household sector, but also in the industrial sector, as a chemical reductant. One supreme advantage in using this reductant is that it is phosphorus-free coke. In this process raw lignite is crushed and dried in a steam drivers to reduce the moisture content. The dried lignite is compressed and pressed through extrusion process to yield uniform briquettes. These briquettes are then carbonised in low temperature carbonisers to form carbonised briquettes. The capacity of the plant is about 3,27,000 tonnes of carbonised briquettes per year. The gas liquor received from the carbonisers is processed in the Tar Production Unit to yield a number of valuable by-products such as tar, carbolic acid, ortho cresol, metapara cresol, xylol and multivalent phenols. These chemicals are used in a wide range of chemical and plastic industries. The charfines that are obtained along with the briquettes are purchased mainly by cement factories and brick kilns. Production of Leco during 1979-80 was 25,680 tonnes and the cumulative production is around 8.27 lakh tonnes.

#### (v) Clay Washing Plant

Good quality white china clay deposits occur immediately above the lignite seam. The Clay Washing Plant with a capacity of 6,000 tonnes of washed clay a year was commissioned in December 1961. The clay is used in a number of industries such as manufacture of electrical insulators, sanitary-ware, ceramics, crockery and also in paper and rubber mills.

### Inception

The Rashtriya Chemicals & Fertilisers Limited Bombay was incorporated in April 1978 as a result of re-organisation of Fertilizer Corporation of India Limited. As a sequel to re-organisation, Trombay Unit of RCF with all its expansion plants and the two proposed plants on Bombay High Gas came under RCF Management.

### Capital

RCF is a Public Sector Company fully owned by the Government of India. It has an authorised capital of Rs. 500 crore as on 31-3-80 and the capital employed as on that date was about Rs. 113 crore.

### Existing Capacity

The total attainable capacity of Trombay Unit at present is 165 thousand tonnes of N and 120 thousand tonnes of  $P_2O_5$ , inclusive of Trombay IV Expansion which has already started producing. Trombay Unit produces both types of fertilisers namely complexes popularly known as 'SUPHALA' and urea with a brand name 'UJJWALA'.

The work on Trombay V expansion for the production of urea is in progress as per plan and the plant is expected to be commissioned by July 1981. The capacity of production is 151.8 thousand tonnes of N and 330 thousand tonnes of urea.

The work on two urea plants to be erected at Thal Vaishat in Kolaba district of Maharashtra has started. This project has a designed capacity of 644 thousand tonnes of N is equivalent to 1,400 thousand tonnes of urea per annum.

### Production Performance

During the year 1979-80 RCF produced 455 thousand tonnes of complexes and 104 thousand tonnes of urea. This gives a capacity utilisation of 76 per cent and 65 per cent for N &  $P_2O_5$  respectively.

### Sales Turnover

Sales turnover of all the fertilisers including imported products during 1979-80 was of the order of Rs. 86.20 crores.

### Market Promotion & Extension Services

The sales in the RCF marketing area are effected through 1,600 authorised dealers at present. Dealers are of various categories like co-operative, private dealers, unemployed graduates, disabled servicemen, scheduled caste/scheduled tribes, candidates etc. To improve the economics of fertiliser application, RCF has got a special promotion programme on extensive scale, backed by the intensive research on research farms and cultivators' field.

### Production of Chemicals

Over and above of fertilisers RCF produces large number of industrial chemicals. At present technical grade urea, argon gas methanol, carbon-di-oxide, sulphuric and nitric acids, anhydrous ammonia, ammonium bi-carbonate, carbon black, sodium nitrate & nitrate and methylamines are produced at RCF. These are marketed by a separate marketing division and the annual turnover of these chemicals was Rs. 42.73 crores during 1979-80.

### Canalizing Agency

RCF has been appointed canalizing agents by the Government of India for imports of methanol and ammonia, in the country. In addition, RCF also handles and markets imported urea. During 1979-80 following quantities of imported products were handled by RCF.

Southern Petrochemical Industries Corporation Limited, popularly known as 'SPIC', has set up modern facilities for the manufacture of fertilisers at SPIC Nagar, near Tuticorin, Tamil Nadu.

The year 1978-79 witnessed several production achievements.

The 1,100 TPD ammonia plant could be stabilised at 100 per cent load and maximum daily production of 1,107.7 MT was achieved on 12-1-79. The urea plant had already been tested well above 100 per cent load and the performance was found to be satisfactory.

The phosphatic group of plants were able to run at a fairly high load. We had uninterrupted supply of sulphur and rock phosphate even though there were moments of anxiety during certain months. The PA and DAP plants exceeded their annual production targets.

The PA plant registered a maximum daily production of 225 MT on 14-1-79 which is 136 per cent of the rated capacity and the DAP 620 MT on 4-8-79 as against the rated capacity of 500 MT. The unexpected fire accident in the primary reformer of ammonia plant following a total power failure stopped the plant production for over two months

which resulted in achieving only 75 per cent and 74 per cent of targeted production of ammonia and urea respectively during the year.

The Table 2 gives the production during the year ended on 30th June 1979, the achievement on the target and the cumulative production since the commencement.

### Marketing

The marketing philosophy of SPIC is the integration of fertiliser sales with the total agricultural development. This concept of agricultural development extends not only to the supply of fertilisers to the farmers at the nearest point but also to create an awareness among the farming community of the modern agronomical practices through training programmes, farmers meetings, field visits, demonstration plots, etc. Our services also include advising farmers on:

1. Balanced application of fertilisers
2. Soil testing
3. Farm management
4. Soil and water conservation
5. Modern techniques of harvesting
6. Use of right types of inputs such as quality seeds, pesticides, etc.

To keep the farmers informed of the latest developments, SPIC is bringing out periodically a journal called 'SPIC FARM NEWS' which is being published in three local languages, viz., Tamil, Kannada and Telugu besides English. These publications which are distributed to farmers free of cost, have become very popular.

Recently the Government of India has identified Tirunelveli District as having considerable irrigation potential, but lagging behind in fertiliser consumption. This being the home district of our plants, SPIC has adopted Tirunelveli District. A time bound programme has been chalked out by SPIC to reach as many farmers as possible in the villages of this District with required fertilisers and advice on package of practices and to bring about agricultural transformation. Over a period of four years from the commencement of production in June 1975,

SPIC has marketed nearly 14.8 lakh MT of fertilisers till 30th June 1979. The share of urea, so distributed, is over 13.20 lakh MT and that of complex fertilisers (UAP/DAP) approximately 1.34 lakh MT.

In order to meet the increased demand for fertilisers, SPIC is importing urea, CAN and ammonium sulphate through Government of India and distributing the same through its marketing channels. A quantity of nearly 2.23 lakh MT of imported fertilisers have so far been handled by SPIC out of which the share of urea alone came to nearly 1.78 lakh MT.

SPIC is adopting the following strategies in the area of logistics and transportation in order to cope with the increasing volume of fertilisers handled:

- (i) Substantially increasing the field warehouse capacity.
- (ii) Adopting coastal shipping transportation.
- (iii) Developing buffer warehousing so as to exploit road and rail transportation potential available at buffer warehouse location.
