SOME ECONOMIC FACTORS AND POPULATION PRESSURE IN CROP OUTPUT GROWTH IN GUJARAT: AN INTER-DISTRICT ANALYSIS*

THIS paper attempts to identify the major factors, — such as distribution of land-holdings, pattern of land ownership, rainfall, irrigated area, pumping sets, oil engines and working cattle and mechanical power, fertiliser use and intensity of cropping — associated with inter-district differentials in the growth of crop output and per acre yield. It also examines the effect of population pressure on the crop output-growth and its components i.e. area, per acre yield and cropping pattern, and estimates the crop output-growth and its components for the period 1949-50 to 1968-69.1

Data on some of the factors are available only either at a point of time or for periods which do not cover the whole period under analysis. Therefore, the factors associated with the differentials in yield-growth have been examined on the basis of cross section. However, the conclusions derived from the cross section analysis could equally

The number of cultivators and cultivated area in different farm sizes are collected from Hand Book of Basic Statistics of Gujarat State, 1963, whereas the number of working cattle, tractors, oil engines and electrical engine pumps for 1966, are drawn from Quarterly Bulletin of Economics and Statistics, Vol. IX, No. 1, January-March 1969, Bureau of Economics and Statistics, Govt. of Gujarat. The density of population, rural literacy, agricultural workers have been taken from Census of India, 1961, Gujarat State, Vol. V, Part III, Household Economic Tables.

The data of Bulsar district have been adjusted with Surat, as the former formed part of the latter till 1962-63. Similarly, Gandhinagar district data have been adjusted in equal proportion to Mehsana and Ahmedabad districts.
