
REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETIES
REGULATION DURING THE YEAR 1906-07
WITH THE GOVERNMENT REVIEW THEREON.

*Proceedings of the Government of His Highness the Maharaja of Mysore,
Financial, dated 21st November 1907.*

READ—

Letter No. 4411 of 7th October 1907, from the Revenue Commissioner in Mysore, submitting with certain observations the Report on the working of the Co-operative Societies Regulation during the year 1906-07, received with the Registrar's letter No. 168 of the 28th September 1907.

ORDER THEREON.—In addition to the four societies working at the close of 1905-06, twelve new societies, all on the limited liability basis, were registered during the year. Excepting the agricultural society at Hiriur, which, it is to be regretted, showed no activity, and the National Co-operative Union at Bangalore, which appears to possess no vitality, all the other fourteen societies are reported to be in working order and progressing satisfactorily.

2. Government note that, the co-operative movement has not as yet extended in the district of Kolar, Chitaldrug or Shimoga, and they agree with the Revenue Commissioner in thinking that the Registrar has a large field for the propagation of co-operative principles in these parts.

3. It is reported that outside capital has not yet begun to flow in freely for purposes of financing the co-operative societies, and with the exception of the society at Melkote practically none of them have succeeded in attracting any capital from non-members. In accordance with the recommendations of the Registrar and the Revenue Commissioner, that Government should make some provision for advancing money to a limited extent to these societies, Government have, under separate orders, been pleased to place a sum of Rs. 15,000 at the disposal of the Revenue Commissioner for the purpose.

4. The detailed information called for in para 4 of the Government Order on last year's report, is furnished in the form of statements, but Government are of opinion that some of them are rather elaborate, and may with advantage be compressed. This being the first year in which such statistical information is furnished, the Revenue Commissioner is requested to suggest in consultation with the Registrar suitable forms in which the required information may be embodied in future years.

5. The financial position of the different societies is shown in Statements Nos. 18 and 19 appended to the Registrar's report, which, as observed by himself, are somewhat defective.

The result of audit of the accounts of the societies, as embodied in these statements, does not give a clear conception of their financial position.

The Registrar reports that the systematic audit of the transactions of these societies more than once annually is necessary for some time to come. But it is not so much the number and the frequency of audits as the thoroughness and the knowledge of account principles that should be brought to bear on them, that are essential, and Government hope that the Registrar will be able to place before them, next year, a complete and accurate review of the position of the Co-operative Societies.

SIR,

I have the honor to submit my report, the second of its kind, on the working of the Co-operative Societies Regulation, III of 1905, during the official year 1906-07. My reports as Inspector of Agricultural Banks and Forest Settlement Officer, to which offices also I was appointed during the year, are being separately submitted. My quarterly diaries of tours, which I have from time to time submitted, contain detailed information regarding the work done by me in these several capacities.

2. *Societies.*—At the close of the last official year 5 societies had been registered. Of these, the registration of the society at Whitefield was cancelled during the year under report for the reason given in para 7 of my last year's report, namely, want of any sustaining power. Twelve new societies were registered during the year, making the total number of registered societies 16 on the 30th June last. Among the newly registered societies, the society at Hiriyr showed no activity, though I waited for nearly a year, and its registration was accordingly cancelled in April 1907. The objects of this society were to take up lands under the Marikanave Reservoir and introduce improved cultivation, and it is very disappointing that the promoters of the society lacked in zeal after it was started. From the evidence of Mr. James Young before the Madras High Court in the trial of Sir George Arbuthnot, it may be learnt how profitable the cultivation of sugar-cane under the Marikanave Reservoir and the manufacture of sugar in its neighbourhood would be. Mr. Young has calculated a profit of 50 per cent, but making every allowance for over-sanguine calculations, the establishment of a sugar factory at the place may be taken to be a very well-paying business. Excluding the Hiriyr society, the number of societies existing on the 1st July last was 15 as named below :—

Bangalore District.—(1) The Bangalore City Co-operative Society, (2) The Bangalore City Co-operative Bank, (3) The National Co-operative Union, (4) The Mayasandra Agricultural Society ;

Mysore District.—(5) The Mysore Co-operative Society, (6) The Melkote Co-operative Society, (7) The Saligrama Self-help Society, (8) Sri Krishna-raja Mutual-helping Society, Mandya, (9) The Kuderu Anyonya Sahaya Sangha ;

Tumkur District.—(10) The Tumkur Central Co-operative Society, (11) The Kunigal Co-operative Society, (12) The Sira Co-operative Society, (13) The Kotta Grain Bank ;

Kadur District.—(14) The Koppa Co-operative Agricultural Society ;

Hassan District.—(15) The Hole-Narsipur Industrial and Agricultural Co-operative Society.

All the fifteen societies are in working condition, though some are more advanced and vigorous than the others. Exception must, however, be made of the National Co-operative Union at Bangalore, which appears to possess no vitality, and which may have to be wound up.

3. *Types of societies.*—The fourteen societies which may be said to be progressing satisfactorily may be grouped under four classes, namely,—

- (i) Distributive co-operative societies,
- (ii) Industrial co-operative societies,
- (iii) Banking co-operative societies, and
- (iv) Agricultural co-operative societies.

Under class (i) come the Bangalore City Co-operative Society, the Mysore City Co-operative Society and the societies at Mandya, Kuderu (Chamrajnagar Taluk), and Sira; under class (ii) the societies at Hole-Narsipur, Melkote and Saligrama; under class (iii) the Bangalore City Co-operative Bank, and the societies at Tumkur and Kunigal; and under class (iv) the society at Koppa and the grain banks at Kotta (Sira Taluk) and Mayasandra (Anekal Taluk). The grouping is by no means exclusive: a society under one group may usually be seen doing business also under another group.

4. The distributive Co-operative Society of Bangalore is the oldest of the societies, having been started in January 1905. It underwent much tribulation during the year, as it was feared by several of the members of the society that the management was bad and that the finances of the society were unsatisfactory. On a careful examination, however, of the accounts which I made personally, I found that the society's transactions, in which there were no doubt many irregularities, and which had been allowed to be conducted on somewhat indefinite lines, had resulted in no loss to the society. On account of the cloud which temporarily obscured the society, a few members fell off and some shares were withdrawn. The society had on its roll at the end of the official year 213 members as against 242 reported last year, and its paid-up share capital was Rs. 7,946-8-0 as against Rs. 9,219.

The society at Mysore has considerably developed its business; so much so, that a proposal made by me to lend a portion of its capital to other co-operative societies is at present engaging the attention of the managing body. In this society the number of members rose during the year from 46 to 225, and the paid-up share capital from Rs. 669-8-0 to Rs. 9,099-12-0.

The remaining societies under this class are yet in their infancy and need no comment, except perhaps the one at Tumkur, which may be mentioned on account of its potentialities of becoming a central society for the whole district. Within a period of four months of its existence the society attracted 118 members, and the collected share capital, paid in small instalments, amounted to Rs. 435. The society is under the energetic guidance of two retired officers of Government, Messrs. C. D. Ramaswamaiya (retired Police Superintendent) and C. Sheshadri Iyengar (retired Assistant Commissioner). It is a matter of great satisfaction that officers like these, members of the legal profession and others possessing intelligence and culture have to some extent come forward to manage the co-operative societies elsewhere also, notably in Mysore and Bangalore. Of the prominent retired officers and non-official gentlemen in Bangalore and Mysore I may mention the names of Messrs. M. S. Narayana Rao (retired Deputy Commissioner), D. Appu Rao (retired Deputy Superintendent of Revenue Survey), B. Venkatapathi Iyengar (retired Deputy Inspector of Schools), P. Singrachar (retired Sub-Judge), M. C. Rangaiengar (Advocate and Legislative Council Member), Amble Annaiya Pandit (Representative Member), M. Narasimhaswami (Merchant), and Balaji Rao (Banker).

5. The societies under class (ii) work for the benefit of the weavers in the places where they are situated. They may all be said to be making satisfactory progress as shown below:—

The society at Saligrama in the Yedatore Taluk, although the youngest of the three, showed commendable enterprise in deputing one of its members (who is now its Secretary) to Baroda to learn the improved processes of weaving in the Sayaji Mills there at a total cost to the society of Rs. 160. In the beginning, when the society was started, there was some opposition from the weavers themselves, but through the good offices of the Amildar, Mr. N. Rama Rao, B.A., B.L., they were induced to adopt a more reasonable attitude. The society has recently purchased Sayaji Looms and accessories at a cost of Rs. 116-12-0. In the early part of the year, before the necessity to purchase the above arose, the society found employment for its collected funds by executing public works on contract under the Saligrama Municipality.

Melkote town seems to afford special facilities for the society there, as is apparent from the abstract of business shown below:—

6. The Bangalore City Co-operative Bank is the only society whose object is pure banking. It opened business only in April last, but yet has shown considerable life and activity. The total number of members on the roll of the bank was 88 and the amount of paid-up share capital Rs. 509, at the end of the year. The bank attracted deposits to the extent of Rs. 1,351, and the amount of deposits returned was Rs. 802. The loans disbursed aggregated Rs. 1,485 in 134 cases, of which Rs. 370 was fully repaid in 74 cases.

7. Of the societies mentioned under class (iv), the grain banks at Mayasandra, in the Anekal Taluk and Kotta in the Sira Taluk, are of unique type. They do not generally handle money, all their transactions being mainly conducted in grain (ragi). They enjoy considerable popularity in their places. The scheme, as explained in my memorandum which I submitted to the Conference of Registrars of Co-operative Credit Societies held at Simla in September last, is a simple one; and its simplicity is, I think, one of the causes of its popularity. The business done by these two grain banks is shown in Statement XVII (a). The grain contributions

of these two societies amounted during the year to 85 pallas (100 seers each) and 35 seers of ragi, of which 62 pallas and 60 seers were lent out to members. The profits earned amounted to 13 pallas, 47 seers. The village grain rate of interest was generally 25 per cent on the grain lent, but although the rate appeared to me somewhat high, still I did not interfere with it in the hope of fairly sufficient reserve fund being accumulated early. Small cash loans also were given out of the entrance fees and other moneys collected, which brought, in the case of the Kotta Grain Bank, a profit of 14 annas. The Mayasandra Society used the loan of Rs. 150 which was granted to it by me out of His Highness' funds placed at my disposal, for giving cash loans not exceeding Rs. 10 to its members, and earned a profit of Rs. 4-2-8. The number of members in the Mayasandra and Kotta Societies was 16 and 95 respectively. The grain bank at Kotta did remarkably well during the year, more than fulfilling the expectations formed of it in the beginning. Its success was mainly due to the exertions of and the interest taken by Shanbhog Puttarangappa and Patel Narayanagowda of the village. The enthusiasm among its members can be gauged from the fact that one of them has offered a site gratis for building a granary for the bank. Messrs. S. Venkataramana Srouti, B.A., and M. A. Srinivasaiengar, B.A., B.L., (Amildars), took special interest in the progress of the Kotta Society.

The society at Koppa is an agricultural society and is engaged in the improved cultivation of paddy and sugar-cane on co-operative lines. Its progress, too, has been satisfactory. The society had at the end of the year 35 members as against 32 at the beginning. The paid-up share capital increased during the year from Rs. 703 to Rs. 1,220. From a review of the transactions up to the 15th of May last, it appears that the paddy grown by the society was 35 kandis and 37½ seers, a kandi being equal to 50 seers and that the sugar-cane yielded 4 *adiges* (ಅಡಿಗ) of jaggory. The profits of such a society necessarily vary according to the seasonal rains, prices current and other causes.

8. Having briefly touched upon the progress made by the societies under the different types, I may here remark that, as reported by me last year, the time does not seem to have yet come for starting societies on the basis of unlimited liability. All the fourteen societies reviewed in this report are accordingly societies on the basis of limited liability. In the framing of the rules, each society is given the widest discretion, and the promoters of the society, while generally following the model given by me, have adopted the system of limited liability. In the Mysore State, where the prevailing land tenure is a raiyatwari one and where most of the occupants of the land are also its owners, the limited liability system appears to be more intelligible to the capitalists and other promoters of co-operative societies than the unlimited liability system. In practice, no trouble has arisen till now from any of the members of a society belonging to a joint Hindu family.

9. *Extent of operation.*—The extent of operation of the several societies is shown in Statement I(c). The number of societies distributed over the districts is as follows :—

Except the Bangalore City Co-operative Society, the operations of which are limited to the City of Bangalore, all the societies have included the neighbouring villages also within the scope of their operations.

10. *Members.*—The total number of members belonging to all the societies was 362 at the beginning of the year, and 1,191 at its close. Of the number on the roll at the end of the year, 221 were pure agriculturists, and 197 derived their income partly from agriculture and partly from other sources.

11. *Share capital.*—The capital of all the societies was made up of subscribed shares. The total of paid-up share capital of all the societies at the beginning and at the close of the year was as follows :—

12. *Borrowing by societies.*—There has been excessive caution on the part of the societies to borrow from outsiders partly on account of diffidence in being able to obtain outside loans, and partly from a desire to avoid initial embarrassments that may possibly arise by borrowing from non-members. The borrowings, in cases where they exist, have been chiefly by way of deposits from members. Statement VI shows in glaring contrast the extremely small number of cases there have been of borrowings otherwise than by deposits. The Melkote Society is the only society that borrowed in this way to the extent of a little over Rs. 700. Three societies borrowed to the extent of Rs. 800 from the amount graciously placed at my disposal by His Highness the Maharaja to supplement the funds of the rural societies, namely:—

These amounts are at present held by these societies as deposits bearing no interest (*vide* Statement II). The Grain Bank at Kotta, it is worth remarking, has already set apart a quantity of grain (ragi), equivalent to the value of the loan, to pay it back at any moment.

No loans were granted by Government to any society. In one case only, *viz.*, that of the Co-operative Society at Hole-Narsipur, the Government promised, on my recommendation, a loan of Rs. 1,000 if the society showed a cash equivalent of capital to that extent; but though the society has now a paid-up capital of Rs. 934, which is nearly equal to that sum, it has not pressed for the loan promised.

13. Classifying the aggregate working capital of the societies as it stood at the close of the year, it is seen that only a small fraction was contributed from outside as compared with the capital contributed by the members.

The societies on the whole have till now been able to finance themselves, though not without difficulty. There is no tendency among any of the societies to incur large liabilities. They are on the other hand fairly content to proceed on modest lines. In my tours, however, I have had constantly to meet various objections to start co-operative societies on account of the small progress of the Agricultural Banks so largely patronized by Government in the early years when the scheme was introduced. I also found that the crash of the Arbuthnot's at Madras had caused diffidence to some extent among the capitalists. The well-to-do have not yet freely come forward with full trust in the movement although there are signs of enthusiasm on their part for the movement. As the co-operative movement develops, and as the societies started strike their roots more deeply and serve as examples, then money from the capitalists may be expected to freely come in. Till then, I think, it is essential that Government should make some provision for advancing money to a limited extent to the co-operative societies. At present, the Registrar has not only to find the men of requisite capacity and character for the formation of Societies but also to find capital for them—a position neither pleasant nor easy to its occupant.

14. *Cash loans.*—The following figures show the volume of business done under loans:—

Loans were disbursed in 679 cases during the year, and loans were outstanding in 197 cases at the end.

15. Detailed information is given in Statements IX to XII regarding the values of the loans given to members during the year, the security upon which they were granted, the periods and purposes for which they were given. Generally speaking, the loans given were in small sums and on good security. The periods were short not exceeding one year. The purposes for which loans were issued were varied and were mostly for useful purposes. In this report, I am unable to draw any correct or specific conclusions on this last point, as, in the case of certain societies the purposes for which loans were granted are not ascertainable.

Of the total number of loans issued, namely, 679, 433 were for sums not exceeding Rs. 10 and 199 for sums exceeding Rs. 10 but not exceeding Rs. 50, and 37 for sums exceeding Rs. 50 but not exceeding Rs. 100. The number of loans exceeding Rs. 100 was only 11. No loan was given exceeding Rs. 250 in any case, except in the solitary instance of the society at Saligrama, which was for a sum of Rs. 800.

Again, of the 679 loans disbursed during the year, 497 were on the security of the paid-up share and deposits paid by the members, 16 on the mortgage of land or other immovable property, 16 on the joint and several responsibility of the borrower and his surety, and 150 on the simple bond of the borrower without any collateral security.

16. *Interest.*—Statement VII gives some information on the rate of interest allowable by the rules of the societies on borrowed capital and that charged on loans granted by the societies to their members. The former varies from $3\frac{2}{3}$ per cent to 6 per cent, while the latter ranges between 9 and $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Penal interest is always excessive and goes up to generally 18 per cent. In exceptional cases it goes up even to 48 per cent.

17. *Goods.*—Statement XIII gives the details of the work done by the societies that conducted their transaction in goods. Classifying the transactions under the heads of raw materials, artisans' appliances, and finished products in the case of industrial and agricultural societies, and under the head stores in the case of

societies that conducted transactions in articles of food-stuff, the subjoined statement shows the net result of the transactions:—

Among the societies that did the greatest volume of business may be mentioned the Mysore Co-operative Society, the Bangalore City Co-operative Society, and the Melkote Co-operative Society.

19. *Assets and liabilities and profit and loss.*—The information available regarding these heads is embodied in Statements XVIII and XIX accompanying this report. The information, however, is defective partly because in many cases the societies did not value the stock on hand and strike a correct balance up to the end of June 1907 and partly because their accounts could not be so adjusted as to show the financial position at the end of the official year,—the years and half years of some of them not corresponding with the official year.

20. *Meetings.*—The total number of meetings convened by the societies was 160, consisting of 29 general meetings and 131 committee meetings. Of these, 5 general and 21 committee meetings broke up for want of quorum. Business was

done in 24 general and 110 committee meetings. The members seem to have evinced considerable interest in the working of their several societies. In the case of the Bangalore City and Koppa societies the committees met 22 and 16 times, respectively, in the year, that is, more than once a month.

21. *Statements.*—A word of explanation may be offered as regards the statements appended to this report. They were introduced for the first time this year by me, and many societies were not prepared for them. There may, therefore, be a few small discrepancies in the figures appearing in the statements, but taken on the whole, the figures may be accepted as giving a correct idea of the general progress of the co-operative movement in the State.

22. *Inspection and audit.*—The systematic audit of the transactions of the societies more than once annually for some time to come is a great need. At present, the clerks of my establishment and myself have done this work. The latter have shown great earnestness and interest in their new kind of work, and my Head Clerk, Mr. E. Rama Rao, B.A., has acquired intimate knowledge of the working of the co-operative movement and has shown special aptitude for the work.

23. *General remarks.*—Among the matters connected with the co-operative movement in Mysore, I may mention my deputation to Simla in September 1906 to attend the Conference of Registrars convened by the Government of India; the appointment of Mr. M. S. Narayana Rao (retired Deputy Commissioner) as an Honorary Organizer; the passing of certain rules by Government for the settlement of disputes; and the sanctioning of a co-operative society for the weavers of the Bangalore City. I have not yet taken active steps for the formation of this society, partly because I wish to benefit by the experience of the working of the weaving societies now in existence, and partly because there is a movement on the part of some of the large capitalists of Bangalore to establish a Joint Stock Weaving Factory on improved lines in Sultanpet, and it is advisable to watch the development of this concern so as to see how far the weavers are thereby likely to be benefited.

24. *Conclusion.*—In conclusion, I may state that considerable interest continues to be evinced in the co-operative scheme, and in several places people are eager to have these societies in their midst. In several instances, I have been reluctantly compelled to postpone their formation for want of the requisite local human material to guide the societies in their infancy. I may specially mention the case of the Mahomedan silk-worm breeders of Closepet who are ready to subscribe some money among themselves, and to form themselves into a society. After the transfer of Mr. Mohideen Sheriff (Deputy Amildar) from the place, as Amildar of Chiknayakanhalli, my efforts to find others interested in the work and of some social or official position for the supervision of the society have been of little avail. From my experience of the societies till now, it may be said that there need be very little fear of unpunctuality or backsliding on the part of the members, if at least one person who has some local reputation to maintain comes forward to guide the society with some intelligence in the early days of its formation.
