SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Report on the Administration of Minors' Estates in the Northern Division for the Revenue year 1905-06 in accordance with the orders in Government Resolution No. 8913, dated 16th December 1902.

Assumption and quishment of Estates.

This Division and the Talukdari Settlement Officer was 75 on the 1st of August 1905. Fifty-two of these were under the Talukdari Settlement Officer in the districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira and Broach. This number was increased by one as during the year five estates were added and four were released. Of those released from management the two most important were Gangad (No. 18 last year's statement) in Ahmedabad and Mogar (No. 46 last year's statement) in Kaira. The former is still under the management of the Talukdari Settlement Officer on behalf of the mortgagees. The latter belongs to one Asha Aju, a Kunbi. It was for some time under the direct management of the Collector of Kaira and was handed over subsequently to the Talukdari Settlement Officer, who writes:—

"The estate has prospered under our management, and our whilom ward, who is a typical husbandman of the better class and has received education suited to his rank, may be trusted to take good care of the property."

The other two (Nos. 15 and 20 of the last year's statement) call for no remarks. Of the twenty-three with the Collectors last year one (No. 54 of the last year's statement) has been restored to the minor owners on their attaining majority and four new estates have been included in the statement. One of the four (Vinzol in the Daskroi Taluka No. 44) had already been under management for 6 years past, but was not noted by the Collector in previous reports. The Collector of Ahmedabad writes:—

"The fact of the Vinzol Estate being managed by the Collector had till now escaped attention and it was only from a casual reference by the Assistant Collector in a vernacular correspondence that the same was noticed, whereupon the requisite information was called for and it is submitted in this report."

Out of the remaining three one (No. 57) belongs to Kaira and the other two

A statement giving particulars about each estate in the Division is appended, the necessary information as to who is in charge of the person of each minor being added in the last column.

#### Income.

3. The season of the year under report was more favourable than that of the preceding year. As a result the produce of land increased in almost all the estates.

The fluctuations in the income derived from land are due to the fact that the bhag batai system pravails in most of the estates and also to prices current. Income is generally improved this year owing to the better character of the season. Though the season was not a normal one, as the rains ceased early causing failure in the rice crop, still it was better than the preceding year.

It may be noted with regard to column 14 that in some cases, e. g., Nos. 20, 22 and 25, last year's figures included cash allowances, loans, etc., items, which are generally absent this year.

The income of Estate No. 43, which consists of landed property only, rose from Rs. 3 to Rs. 141 owing to the season being a better one. As regards the Vinzol Estate No. 44, the land is leased to cultivators, who, the Collector writes, "under an acknowledged custom pay to the owner only Government dues." There can be no legal obligation for the custom, and a full report is being called for from the Collector.

Of the three estates under management, the increase of income is appreciable in Estate No. 56 owing to improved recoveries of rents from tenants. The decrease under column 14 is due to less recoveries from debtors.

Estate No. 55 did not remain under management throughout the year, having been restored to the mother of the minors in February 1906. The produce of the rabi crops was collected after the management was handed over and therefore the full recovery of the proceeds from land has not been brought to account in this report. In the case of Estate No. 57, the Collector reports that the produce of land was less than double the amount of land revenue payable, because the lands were not let out on a fixed rate but on condition of receiving half the share of the produce and leaving the other half to the cultivators.

In the case of Metral there is an increase under receipts in column 13 owing to the season being fairly favourable and the collection of arrears of past years, while there is a decrease in "other income" which is due to the fact management of the Collector of the Panch Meháls. that fewer trees were sold. Of the remaining two estates in this District that were restored to the owners during the year under report (Shivrajpur on 16th December 1905 and Tanda, 1st August 1906), Shivrajpur shows a decrease in income due to the fact that the report for the estate has been submitted for a period of 41 months only, during which little revenue was payable to the estate. The total amount payable to Government by this estate has been shown in column 10, while in column 13 only the actual figures for the period is shown. The increase in the income of the Tanda Estate is due to the fact that no suspension was granted to the cultivators this year as the season was favourable. Last year the sum of Rs. 5,056 was suspended owing to the failure of crops. This year the revenue has also increased by Rs. 700 on account of extended cultivation with the help of advances of tagavi granted to the cultivators during the previous year to enable them to cultivate more land. The sum of Rs. 4,610 has also been recovered from arrears of past years which amount to nearly Rs. 7,237. The reason of the produce of land in the current year being less than double the amount of land revenue payable is that the jama is an item fixed for a number of years, whereas the produce of land is subject to fluctuations depending on the rains. In consequence of successive bad years the revenue of this estate has suffered much,

land in many cases remaining uncultivated and the full assessment not being levied in the case of new tenants with the view of encouraging them. The assessment reaches the maximum rate on the land after a four or five year's period.

The receipts of these estates show an improvement on those of the last year due to better crops and consequent recovery of arrears. In most of the estates the proportion of income from land to land revenue does not appear to come up to double the assessment; the reason is that lands in proportion to (and in some cases more than) the cost of the

that lands in proportion to (and in some cases more than) the cost of the minors' maintenance are cultivated by or on behalf of the minors by their personal guardians. The Collector reports that he is giving the matter his personal attention.

Estates Nos. 75 and 76 had no important fluctuations. Estate No. 77 shows an increase of Rs. 1,466 under "Produce of land" 5 estates under the Coland of Rs. 10,282 under "Other income". The lector of Surat. former increase was due to the recovery of arrears of rents of shops and houses. The increase in other income was due to greater receipts from presents and offerings from the local as well as outside devotees, a source of income in which necessarily there is a good deal of fluctuation. The Minor Maharaj was able to accomplish a considerable amount of touring during the year and this tended to increase the revenue. In the preceding year his movements were necessarily hampered by the sacred thread ceremony. The amount entered under "Other income" against Estate No. 78 represents the realizations from the sale of several pieces of gold with the view of converting it into a paying capital and the amount of interest received during the year. Estate No. 79 receives a Moglai hak (Rs. 2,153) from the Baroda State and this is entered under other income. The produce of land was recovered by the minor before the estate came under management.

The following table gives a comparison between the net income from land and the land revenue assessment thereon:—

In the case of No. 75 the decrease in the net income is trifling. The assessment of No. 76 was reduced by Re. 1 at the Revision Survey and hence a corresponding increase in net income. The increases in area, assessment and net income of Estate No. 77 were due principally to the receipt of more accurate information during the year. The real net income of Estate No. 78 for the year was Rs. 159, out of which Rs. 92 could only be recovered during the year and Rs. 67 remain unrecovered. Steps are in progress to recover the outstanding amount.

#### Expenditure.

#### 4. The Talukdari Settlement Officer reports as under:

The figures under the head "expenditure" hardly permit of comparison with previous years, because the expenditure is from its nature more or less fluctuating. To explain: last year the Commissioner noted that in some cases the figures of expenditure for maintenance column 15 required

elucidation. This is furnished by the fact that in many cases the minors or their personal guardians for them have garkhed home farm land, which makes it unnecessary that they should receive a monthly or yearly allowance in cash. In a few cases, e.g., No. 8, the expenditure is nil, as the minor is supported by relatives, while in some cases the produce of garkhed has to be supplemented in kind or cash as occasion requires. The figures representing disparates, comparison is impossible. In the case of Unchdi (No. 5) the apparently high amount paid for maintenance is due to the fact that Rs. 420 have to be paid to the minor's adoptive mother under the District Court's orders. Even in cases like this, where there is a fixed allowance, the figures will sometimes show variations, owing to the fact that the monthly allowances are allowed by the recipients to fall into arrears and consequently a portion of one year's expenditure is carried over to the next. In this as in other heads there is no fixed budget grant which must be expended within a particular year.

"Column 18 includes expenditure under the heads Miscellaneous," Special, 'Táluka Establishment' and 'Huzúr Establishment Charges,' which (the last especially) are more or less variable. Being grouped together in one column they will naturally appear inexplicable at first sight. Column 17 will of course always show fluctuations. It is also intended (Government Resolution No. 8206, dated 25th October 1904) that the figures of Government dues should be compared with income.

"This, again, the circumstances of the case render misleading, if not impossible. The jama; of talukdari estates is fixed on various considerations including survey assessment, actual realizations, indebtedness, etc., and even in the case of whole estates there is no fixed proportion between income and jama. Still less is this the case where the minor owns small portions of different villages often held in undivided partnership. Again, special famine reductions have been given and in some cases the jama is progressive. In some cases the jama is fixed. It will thus be seen that the circumstances materially differ from those of Government villages where each survey number is a unit for purposes of land revenue, a precondition of useful comparison.

"In a few cases the figures in column 9 will also be found to differ from those of the last year, the difference being due to the preparation of more accurate pahani patraks. When estates are held by undivided co-sharers the figures have to be worked out by rule of thumb and the area must be regarded as only approximate because it does not necessarily follow that the owner will be found in possession of the same area at the time of partition when the quality as well as the quantity of land will have to be considered."

No important fluctuations in the ordinary expenditure save those inevitable are reported. There have been some special grants, such as Rs. 550 for litigation and redemption of land (Estate No. 6) and Rs. 1,200 for after-death ceremonies (Estate No. 46), and column 18 includes such expenditure along with other recurrent items.

In the Thaltej Estate there was an increase of expenditure under all sub
2 estates under the Collector of Ahmedabad. heads during the year under report as compared with
that in the preceding year. The cost of maintenance
increased from Rs. 36 to Rs. 43, the 'Government
dues from Rs. 5 to Rs. 37, and the item under the sub-head of other expenditure
from Rs. 9 to 14. The first of these increases is accounted for by the fact that
provisions were somewhat costlier during the year under report while the
increase under the second sub-head is due to a greater amount being paid to
Government as quit-rent and local fund. The cost of clothing for the minor
which came to Rs. 8 explains the increase under the third sub-head.

With regard to the Vinzol Estate there was no expenditure other than payment of Government dues, the reason being that the minors live with their maternal uncle.

The land revenue payable by the Estate No. 56 shows a net increase of Rs. 17, due to the following causes:—

- (1) five acres of land paying Rs. 12 as land revenue was received in the settlement of a debt of Rs. 1,500 due to the estate;
- (2) above 2 acres paying Rs. 3 as land revenue was redeemed by a debtor;
- (3) two acres paying Rs. 8 as land revenue not accounted for in previous reports is included. Till now the minor's uncle used to manage the land and take the rent direct.

There is nothing worth noticing in the case of Nos. 55 and 57. The amounts entered against all the three estates in column 16 include also arrears recovered on account of the previous year.

3 under the Collector of the Panch Mahals.

The increase during the year in the Mehtral Estate is due to the betrothal ceremony of the Kumvári and the full amount of land revenue having been paid to Government.

The remarks made in paragraph 3 as regards the Shivrájpur Estate apply equally to expenditure.

In Tanda (No. 60) the cost of maintenance is less by Rs. 400, as the excess last year was due to the funeral ceremonies of the deceased Naik. The year being favourable on the whole, land revenue including arrears of past years have been paid fully, and thus there is an increase in column 16. The figure of expenditure under column 18 is also increased by Rs. 1,000 owing to the construction of a temple. There is a net increase of Rs. 57 in the land revenue payable as shown in column 10 as follows:—

Decrease of Rs. 22 due to certain land having been taken into reserved forest and an increase of Rs. 79 on account of the resumption of service land.

The Collector of Broach has omitted to give detailed information for expenditure. He is requested to give it in future.

Estates Nos. 75 and 76 have had no important fluctuations. In the case of No. 77 the expenditure shows an all round increase as shown below:—

(a) Cost of maintenance ... Rs. 1,246 (increase)
(b) Payment of Government dues ... , 266 do.
(c) Discharge of liabilities ... , 6,013 do.
(d) Other expenditure ... , 8,891 do.

Increase under (a) was due to the purchase of some articles for the following year as well as for the year under report. Increase under (b) is apparent only, as it is due to the receipt of more correct information as regards the area and assessment of lands belonging to the estate. The improvement on the receipt side during the year rendered increased discharge of liabilities possible. The increase under the head "Other expenditure" is due to the following causes:—

- (1) payment of salaries of servants for the preceding year which had to be held over owing to want of funds;
- (2) wider touring of the minor Mahárája;
- (3) transmission of presents, etc., on the occasion of the sacred thread ceremony of the young Maharaj of Shri Nathdwar.

No maintenance charges are incurred in the case of Estates Nos. 75, 76 and 78, as the minors stay with their guardians.

Estate No. 79 came under management only in the closing month of the year.

Management of immovable property.

5. Almost all the estates were managed departmentally, leases being given in a few cases to the minors themselves, where they are of sufficient age, or to their personal guardian or relatives. These are, however, not the

regular leases contemplated by Government Resolution No. 5316, dated 31st May 1906. The system of leasing estates to outsiders in place of departmental management has recently been adopted, but the Tálukdári Settlement Officer reports that the experiment is as yet "in its seed and weak beginnings." The leasing of part of Panar and Bhankoda Estates (Nos. 20 and 22) is under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer's contemplation.

The immovable property of the two estates consists of lands which are cultivated by the tenants of the minors and the rents are collected by the village officers. The management is vested in the Mamlatdar.

The immovable property is managed departmentally and the lands are usually leased on fixed leases and the rents collected by a special kárkún or the taláti of the village. In rare cases, as in the case of Senhuj Estate, some lands were given on the cropshare system. With reference to paragraph 4 of Government Resolution No. 5316, dated 31st May 1906, Mr. Wood reports that the lands are scattered in different villages and in different parts of villages, and that it is, therefore, not possible to lease out all the lands belonging to one estate to one individual and thus to save the bother of departmental management.

In the Panch Maháls the agricultural lands of all the estates are managed departmentally by japtidárs on the lines of Government villages as far as possible, but the method of levying assessment is different, as no survey settlements have been introduced in any of these estates.

The lands of the minors in the Broach District were leased out on fixed rents, but owing to paucity of tenants lands could not be given on long leases in the interests of the minors. The Mamlatdars are reported to take personal care in such matters.

Excepting the Estate No. 77 all immovable property is managed by the Collector of Surat.

Mámlatdár concerned. For Estate No. 77 the Mámlatdár of Chorási is appointed ex-officio manager and he manages the whole estate. The lands, houses and shops of the estates are leased annually at suitable rents.

With reference to paragraph 4 of Government Resolution, No. 5316, dated 31st May 1906, Mr. Westropp reports:—

"No land is managed departmentally in this district. The lease system is in force and no difficulty is experienced in leasing lands. So far at least as this district is concerned the leasing system appears to be more profitable and suitable and it is a much less troublesome and insecure system than any system of departmental management could be."

I am, however, of opinion that Mr. Westropp has not fully interpreted the orders of Government which mean leasing of a whole estate to one individual, not to different lessees piecemeal.

### . Movable Property.

6. The total value of the movable property of all the estates is Rs. 2,92,761. Out of the movable property belonging to Estate No. 57 cattle worth Rs. 133 were sold. The value of movable property of Estate No. 77 is now estimated at about two lákhs of rupees including the value of the property and the ornaments of the idols outside Surat. This valuation is, the Collector reports, not final as yet, as the inventory is still in the course of completion and the correct value of certain articles has yet to be ascertained. In the case of Estate No. 78 several pieces of gold which were of no immediate use were sold off for Rs. 2,635 and the proceeds have been invested in Government securities for the benefit of the two minors.

## Liabilities of the Estates.

7. The total liabilities of the estates under management amount to Rs. 5,13,366, out of which Rs. 44,204 are due to Government and the rest

to private creditors. No loans were raised for the management of any of the estates. The Tálukdári Settlement Officer reports:—

"Progress in the discharge of liabilities was made in a few cases, such as Estates Nos. 10, 14, 20, 35, 41, 42 and 61 where the sums shown in column 17 were paid. . The payments made were on the whole satisfactory, considering the character of the season. More could have been paid in some cases, but a balance had to be kept in hand in view of possible contingencies. The debts of minor Raojibhai of Vanthvali are being settled and as it is beyond the means of the estate to pay all the creditors in cash a scheme has been framed for satisfying the debts by assignments of portions of land. An inquiry into the liabilities of each estate has been commenced. The Guardians and Wards Act does not authorize the Collector or the Tálukdári Settlement Officer to call upon the creditors to submit their claims with accounts. It has, therefore, been found expedient in many cases to place the estates formally under management under section 28 of the Tálukdári Act with the consent of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer as guardian with a view to make free use of its provisions, enabling the Talukdari Settlement Officer to compel the creditors to produce accounts within a fixed period. When the liabilities have been correctly ascertained and bad debts struck off, figures in columns 24 will necessarily undergo revision. No important settlement with creditors was concluded though several are in progress."

Of the two estates remaining under the Collector of Kaira at the end of the year under report Estate No. 57 has liabilities to pay. It has on the other hand dues amounting to Rs. 7,406 to be recovered, and with the return of a prosperous season it is hoped that some of the dues will be recovered so as to pay off most of the liabilities.

In the Panch Maháls fair progress has been made with the liquidation of debts of the Mehtral Estate. The Náik of Shivrájpur paid up Rs. 230, after the release of management, out of Rs. 660 due. The estate of Tanda is now quite free from debt.

In Broach the net income after defraying current expenses was utilised in repaying debts.

Estate No. 78 in Surat came under management with only a very small amount of debt, viz., Rs. 149, which has already been paid off. The liabilities of Estate No. 77 have not yet been finally ascertained. A sum of Rs. 11,027 was paid off during the year, making a total payment of Rs. 32,366 towards discharge of liabilities during the four years from 1902-1903 to 1905-1906. The outstanding debt as ascertained up to date amounts to Rs. 59,500, and there is every chance of this being liquidated at no very distant date. Estate No. 79 appears to be much involved and its liabilities are being ascertained.

#### Education of Minors.

8. There are plenty of schools suitable for the education of well-to-do minor talukdars, especially the Scott College at Sadra, the Wajeria School at Godhra, and the Wadwan and Gondal Girassia Schools. For others the Government Primary Schools suffice. The minor Shermia of Dholka has been entered at the Aligadh College. Raisingji of Unchhdi and Kesrising of Mogar have joined the Gondal Girassia College, while others who are not too old to go to school are being educated at local schools. The minor of the Thaltej Estate continues his studies at Sanand under the supervision of the Mamlatdar of the taluka, whereas the education of the minors of the Vinzol Estate is looked after by their maternal uncle with whom they are living at Mansa in the Mahi Kantha Agency.

The minor boys of Estates 'Nos. 56 and 57 in Kaira are attending the Vernacular schools in their villages.

The minor Thákor of Mehtral in the Panch Maháls is being educated in the Telang High School, Godhra. He is reported to be a smart well-behaved boy, showing much promise, and is well progressing in his studies. In Broach six of the minors attend school. The Kázi of Broach is studying in the Broach

High School and the others attend Gujaráti Schools. One minor, Limji, 15 years old, who was told that the charge for his maintenance would be reduced if he did not attend a school, has very recently joined the school. Bakar Ranchhod of Dari and the two minors of Sisodra are too old for school, and so also the three girls.

The minor of Estate No. 75 in Surat has completed his education, that of No. 76 is studying at the Areth Mission School and the minor Maharaj of Estate No. 77 is receiving religious and secular education at home from a shastri specially engaged for the purpose. His progress is reported to be fair. The minors of Estate No. 78 are females residing with their husbands. Minor No. 79 is receiving education at a local Vernacular Municipal School. The conduct of all has been reported to be good.

The estates of Itola and Varner in Broach, the minor owners of which are dead, still remain under management as no claimant is at present forthcoming. The matter is under inquiry.

One estate in the Kaira District under the Talukdari Settlement Officer, which figures in the statement for the year under report, but which ought to be released during the year, is that of Kishordas and Kalidas Vagjibhai of Nadiad. The Talukdari Settlement Officer reports as under:—

"The estate came under management in accordance with the terms of the will of the late owner, a shrewd Pátidár who preferred that his sons should be the wards of Government instead of being left to the tender mercies of interested relatives. Subsequent events amply justified his choice. Both the sons have received a fair education and they will receive back their property with a large balance in promissory notes and other safe investments. It is to be feared, however, that private debts have been incurred which will partly undo the good work of this department."

#### Litigation.

9. There was no new important litigation connected with the talukdari estates except that the mother of minor Chhatrasing of Ahima applied to the District Court for funds to meet the marriage expenses of her daughter. An appeal has been filed in the High Court against the District Court's order which sanctioned a sum disproportionate to the estate's means though short of the applicant's demands.

For the recovery of debts due from private persons and rents from tenants of Estate No. 56 suits had to be filed in the Civil Court and the Mámlatdár's Court. The expenditure amounted to Rs. 110. In the case of Estate No. 57 a suit for the recovery of Rs. 2,054 was brought against the estate and a decree obtained by a sávkár. This explains the increase in column 24 of the statement.

In Broach one suit instituted on behalf of minor Thakorlal (Estate No. 65) was pending at the end of the last year and has been decided in favour of the minor during the year under report. Three suits were filed by the minors of the Estates Nos. 65, 66 and 69 during the year. Two of these have already been decided in favour of the minors and now one (of No. 69) is pending. Rs. 185 were spent on litigation. None of the estates under the Collectors of Ahmedabad, the Panch Mahals and Surat was involved in litigation during the year under report.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the report on the administration of the minors' estates in the Central Division for the year ending with 31st July 1906. The estates under the Court of Wards have also been dealt with in this report, as no separate annual report under the Court of Wards Act has been yet prescribed.

Assumption and relinquishment of the Collectors in this division. This statement includes the two estates (Nos. 2 and 4 of the statement) under the management of the Court of Wards. The Phadnis Estate (No. 2 of the statement) was taken under management with the sanction of Government in their Resolution No. 556, dated the 20th January 1906, Revenue Department. In the case of the Chandori Estate (No. 4 of the statement) an application made to the District Judge under section 5, clause (c) (ii) of the Court of Wards Act, has not yet been decided, the decision being postponed pending the result of the application of the inamdar (who attained his majority on 3rd July 1905) to Government under section 9 of the Act, which has been forwarded to Government under this office No. V. R.-2603, dated the 18th August 1906. Meanwhile, the estate is being managed under the authority of an interlocutory order given by the Court of Wards.

At the commencement of the year under report there were 8 estates of minors—three under the Collector of Sátára, two each under the Collectors of Násik and Sholápur, and one under the Collector of Ahmednagar. During the year under report the estate of the minor Sidheshwar Martand Hagre (of Sholápur) was restored to him under the orders of the District Judge of Sholápur on his attaining majority. The estate of the minor Nathaji Viswanath Giram of Gormal (No. 11 of the statement) had come under the management of the Collector of Sholápur under the orders of the District Judge on 28th June 1905, but as no certificate of guardianship was received before the end of the year previous to the one under report the estate was not shown in that year's report. The estate has been newly shown this year. The second estate newly added is No. 3 of the statement, which came under the management of the Collector of Khándesh during the year under report. Thus, the number of estates of minors is nine this year. The remaining two estates in the statement are those under the management of the Court of Wards.

The persons of the Ahmednagar minors are in charge of one Laxmibai, and the person of the Phadnis ward (No. 2 of the statement), whose estate is managed by the Court of Wards, is in charge of the officials of Indore State. The Khándesh minor is under the direct charge of the Mámlatdár of Sháháda. Of the three Násik minors, the persons of the two Deorgáon minors are under the joint guardianship of their mother and the Collector, and the Sámner minor is in charge of his mother and grandfather. Of the five minors in the Sátára District, three are in charge of their mothers, and the other two in charge of other relatives. Of the two Sholápur minors, one (No. 11 of the statement) is in charge of his mother Laxmibai, and the other in charge of Khán Bahádur

Pirmahomed Dafedar, a Mahomedan gentleman and an Honorary Magistrate of Sholapur.

The Collector of Sátára reports that the guardian (against whom a complaint was made by the Collector last year) of the younger of the Deshpande minors of Kolewadi died on 7th September 1906, and that the District Judge who had appointed the guardian has now been requested to appoint a new one.

## Income. 3. The Collector of Násik reports as follows:—

"The receipts show an increase in the case of the Chandori Estate (No. 4 of the statement accompanying the report for the division) owing to the recovery of past arrears as the rabi crops, there, were excellent. The collection of revenue in the cases of Deorgáon and Sámner Estates suffered to a certain extent owing to the poor crops of the season. Suspensions and remissions of revenue were granted in these villages on the same scale as was adopted in the neighbouring Government villages and in accordance with Government orders."

#### The Collector of Sátára reports as follows:—

"The decrease in the produce of land in the case of the minors Ghadge and Bokil is due to famine conditions prevailing in the villages in which their lands are situated. The increase shown on account of other income in column 14 (of the statement) in the case of the Ghadge minor is due to the loan of Rs. 21,000 advanced by the Sávantváli State to the minor for the liquidation of his debts and to the receipt of Rs. 8,590 from Government on account of cash allowances due to the minor for two years. The balance after deducting the above items from total receipts is due to miscellaneous causes, such as sale of grass, sale of mango fruits, etc."

#### The Collector of Sholapur reports as follows:—

"There was an increase of Rs. 327 in the receipts of the estate of the first named (Usafalli) minor during the year under report, due mainly to the sale-proceeds of mangoes, the trees having yielded no income in the year preceding."

There were no important fluctuations in the receipts of any other estate.

The following statement gives the information required in paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2, dated the 4th January 1905, Revenue Department:—

The Collector of Násik reports as follows:--

"In the case of the Chandori Estate there is a decrease of Rs. 6,000, which is attributable to the causes given below:—

Short payment of debts ... 5,000

Decrease in the cost of maintenance owing to the absence of special extra expenditure in the year ... 500

Other expenditure ... 500

In the case of the Deorgaon Estate there is a decrease of Rs. 2,000, which is accounted for by the facts that nothing was spent in the liquidation of debts, and that the amount of Government dues paid during the year was scarcely half of what was paid during the previous year which included the payment of arrears."

The Collector of Sátára reports as follows: ---

"In the case of the minor Ghadge there is an apparent increase in the cost of maintenance allowance of Rs. 595-5-0 paid annually to the grandmother of the minor, having been paid for the years 1904-1905 and 1905-1906 during the year under report. Remissions and suspensions of rent were granted to the minor's tenants and corresponding concessions of judi were, therefore, granted to the minor by Government. Hence there is a decrease in respect of Government dues actually discharged during the year. The amount of liabilities paid is larger this year because the debt due to the savkars of the minor was paid from the loan given by the Savantwadi State and from cash allowances received from Government by the minor . . . As regards expenditure in the case of the Deshpande minors the monthly allowance of Rs. 67 due to the younger minor for 11 months of last year was paid this year and the allowance of the elder minor was increased by Rs. 25 per mensem on account of the consummation of his marriage and his wife having come to live with him. This additional monthly allowance was paid till her death which took place 9 months later. These items have contributed to the increase in maintenance allowance. The decrease in other expenditure is due to the smaller investment by Rs. 1,000 this year in Promissory Notes and to Rs. 826 having been given in the previous year to the elder minor for ornaments for his wife."

There was an increase of Rs. 279 in expenditure of the estate of Usafalli minor (No. 10 of the statement), due mainly to Court-fee and other expenses in connection with a civil suit for the restoration of certain property of the minor in the wrongful possession of a bháuband of his, and also to the discharge of certain liabilities of the minor in a Civil Court's decree against him in another case.

There were no important fluctuations in expenditure in respect of the remaining estates.

5. The practice of leasing out the agricultural lands and houses of minors was continued during the year under report. Four survey numbers at Náráyan Tembhi in the Niphád Táluka held by the minor of Deorgáon (Násik District) under a mortgage-deed were attached and put to sale by a decree-holder in execution of a decree obtained by him against the mortgagors. These numbers were purchased to secure the interest of the estate in the lands sold. The numbers so purchased are in the possession of the Collector of Násik under mortgage-deeds. Further steps are in progress to confirm this transaction.

The estate of the Deshpande minors (No. 9 of the statement) being situated in the unaffected area of the district of Satara the rent was recovered without much difficulty. Famine has considerably hampered the recovery of dues in respect of the other estates.

Land measuring 25 acres and assessed at Rs. 12, which was held by the Giram minor (Sholapur) on a mortgage, was restored to the mortgager during the year on liquidation of the debt. There were no alterations or changes in the other estates.

- 6. There were no changes in the movable property of the minors in the charge of the Collectors except the Deshpande minors (Satara) for whom additional Promissory Notes of Rs. 4,000 were purchased.
- 7. Of the two estates in the Ahmednagar District, the Akole Estate has no liabilities of the estates. liabilities, and in the case of the other the liabilities have not been fully ascertained. The Khándesh

Estate has no debts. Out of the three estates in the Násik District, the Deorgion Estate is of less value than the Chandori one, but has fewer debts. The Samner Estate is small and is disproportionately encumbered with debts. Liabilities are discharged as the savings allow, but no special arrangements have been made for the liquidation of debts. Out of the Sátára minors none except Ghadge has any liabilities to discharge. Government sanctioned a loan of Rs. 36,000 from the Sávantwádi State to the minor (Rs. 30,000 with and Rs. 6,000 without interest). The lean was intended to be applied to the following purposes, viz.:—

- (a) Rs. 21,000 for liquidation of old debts.
- (b) Rs. 9,000 for the marriage of the minor's sister.
- (c) Rs. 6,000 for the education of the minor.

Sums mentioned in (b) and (c) were not actually received. They were in the hands of the Political Agent, Sávantwádi, and have been spent by him for the purposes for which they were intended. As for (a) the amount was sent by the Political Agent by a remittance transfer receipt and was immediately utilized. With this sum, supplemented by the balance in hand Rs. 6,738, old debts amounting to Rs. 38,694 were paid, Rs. 10,956 being remitted by the sávkárs amicably and Rs. 27,738 being paid in cash. Interest was calculated up to 31st July 1905 and not to the date of actual payment, claim to interest for the remaining period having been waived by the sávkárs in favour of the minor. The amount of this additional interest would have come to Rs. 2,100 approximately. The arrangement was most satisfactory to the minor and his sávkárs. The minor's total debt now amounts to Rs. 36,000 only to the Sávantwádi State and it bears a reasonable interest of 4 per cent. The Sholápur Estates have no debts or liabilities.

#### Ahmednagar District.

8. Of the two Akole minors, the elder is being educated in the vernaturation of minors.

Cular school at Wadule in the Sheogáon Táluka.

The Phadnis ward is in charge of an official of the Indore State and nothing is known about his education.

#### Khandesh District.

The Matkar minor attends the vernacular school at Sháháda and a tutor has been engaged to give him private education at home. The conduct of the minor has been good throughout.

#### Násik District.

The Chandori ward being of full age has finished his education and resides at Chandori. His health is poor, and the Collector says that nothing much can be expected from him in consideration of this fact and his deficient acquirements. The elder Deorgáon minor attends the Násik High School and his brother attends one of the vernacular schools. Both are under the care of an assistant master in the High School, who helps them in their studies and manages their household. They are well-conducted boys. They have given no cause for dissatisfaction. Plague in Násik interfered with their education to some extent. The Pethe minor of Sámner also attends the High School, but his education is not looked after by the Collector.

#### Sátára District.

The minor Ghadge was in Sávantwádi throughout the year, prosecuting his studies under the supervision of his private tutor. The younger Bokil and the younger Deshpánde attend the Private English School and the High School at Sátára respectively. The elder Deshpánde has left the school. The conduct of the minors as far as can be ascertained has been satisfactory.

#### Sholápur District.

The progress and conduct of the Usafalli minor have been reported to be satisfactory by his guardian. The minor Giram is yet too young to go to school. A private tutor has, however, been engaged for him by his guardian mother.

9. Two civil suits have been lodged in connection with the Akole Estate (Ahmednagar). Seven suits were filed by creditors against the Deorgaon minor (Nasik). Of these, three were decided in the minor's favour, but two plaintiffs have appealed. The appeals and the remaining 4 suits are still in progress. Three suits were filed by the Collector for the minor; of these, two have been decided in his favour. The third for Rs. 6,000 is pending in the Nasik Court. No other minor had any litigation worth noticing.

The lean was intended to be applied to the following purposes, viz.:—

- (a) Rs. 21,000 for liquidation of old debts.
- (b) Rs. 9,000 for the marriage of the minor's sister.
- (c) Rs. 6,000 for the education of the minor.

Sums mentioned in (b) and (c) were not actually received. They were in the hands of the Political Agent, Sávantwádi, and have been spent by him for the purposes for which they were intended. As for (a) the amount was sent by the Political Agent by a remittance transfer receipt and was immediately utilized. With this sum, supplemented by the balance in hand Rs. 6,738, old debts amounting to Rs. 38,694 were paid, Rs. 10,956 being remitted by the sávkárs amicably and Rs. 27,738 being paid in cash. Interest was calculated up to 31st July 1905 and not to the date of actual payment, claim to interest for the remaining period having been waived by the sávkárs in favour of the minor. The amount of this additional interest would have come to Rs. 2,100 approximately. The arrangement was most satisfactory to the minor and his sávkárs. The minor's total debt now amounts to Rs. 36,000 only to the Sávantwádi State and it bears a reasonable interest of 4 per cent. The Sholápur Estates have no debts or liabilities.

#### Ahmednagar District.

8. Of the two Akole minors, the elder is being educated in the vernatular school at Wadule in the Sheogaon Taluka.

The Phadnis ward is in charge of an official of the Indore State and nothing is known about his education.

#### Khúndesh District.

The Matkar minor attends the vernacular school at Shahada and a tutor has been engaged to give him private education at home. The conduct of the minor has been good throughout.

#### Násik District.

The Chandori ward being of full age has finished his education and resides at Chandori. His health is poor, and the Collector says that nothing much can be expected from him in consideration of this fact and his deficient acquirements. The elder Deorgáon minor attends the Násik High School and his brother attends one of the vernacular schools. Both are under the care of an assistant master in the High School, who helps them in their studies and manages their household. They are well-conducted boys. They have given no cause for dissatisfaction. Plague in Násik interfered with their education to some extent. The Pethe minor of Sámner also attends the High School, but his education is not looked after by the Collector.

#### Sátára District.

The minor Ghadge was in Savantwadi throughout the year, prosecuting his studies under the supervision of his private tutor. The younger Bokil and the younger Deshpande attend the Private English School and the High School at Satara respectively. The elder Deshpande has left the school. The conduct of the minors as far as can be ascertained has been satisfactory.

#### Sholápur District.

The progress and conduct of the Usafalli minor have been reported to be satisfactory by his guardian. The minor Giram is yet too young to go to school. A private tutor has, however, been engaged for him by his guardian mother.

9. Two civil suits have been lodged in connection with the Akole Estate (Ahmednagar). Seven suits were filed by creditors against the Deorgaon minor (Nasik). Of these, three were decided in the minor's favour, but two plaintiffs have appealed. The appeals and the remaining 4 suits are still in progress. Three suits were filed by the Collector for the minor; of these, two have been decided in his favour. The third for Rs. 6,000 is pending in the Nasik Court. No other minor had any litigation worth noticing.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the report on the administration of the estates of minors and others in the Southern Division for the year ending 31st July 1906.

2. I attach a statement giving the required details of the estates under management. They have come under the Collectors' management thus:—

There were only 12 estates; under management in 1904-05. During this year estates of 3 new minors were ordered by the District Court, Dhárwár, to be taken over under clause (ii). These are of (1) Desai of Hangal; (2) a Lingayat Swami of Haveri; and (3) a ryot of Nargund. Possession of the first two has yet to be taken. All the 4 estates under clause (iii) came under management of the Court of Wards during the year for the first time. These are the Deshgats of Nipani, Kokatnur and Koujalgi and the estate of the sharer of the Inamdar of Ashte—all in the Belgaum District. The Koujalgi Deshgat was under management under clause (ii) till February 1906, when, owing to the existence of claims against it, it was placed under the Court of Wards. The Collector of Belgaum reports regarding the other three estates thus:—

"All the three estates are heavily encumbered, and although I have formally assumed the management, no progress except receiving claims against the estates and doing some preliminary work in connection with the claims preferred has been made."

The enclosed Statement A does not therefore give any details of these three estates.

The one estate under clause (i) was entrusted\* in December 1903 to the Collector pending settlement of the dispute about adoption by the deceased Shri Sakwar Bai Sahebalias Tai Maharaj, the widow of Baba Maharaj. Of those under clause (ii) three belong to Desais and Deshpandes, one to a Lingayat Swami and the rest to petty land-holders.

Only in the case of the minor Desais of Talur and Koujalgi is the Collector the guardian of their person; in all other cases such guardians are certain near relatives of the respective minors.

3. Estate No. 11 having recently come under management, and the property of No. 12 and 13 having not yet been taken up, the details have not yet been given.

Belgaum District.—Estate No. 1.—There is not much noticeable variation here.

Estate No. 2.—Owing to bad season, suspensions were granted. Hence the decrease of Rs. 544 under "produce of land." The "other income" also fell owing to the annual cash allowance of Rs. 294 not having been drawn during the year.

Estate No. 3.—The apparent fall under produce of land is due to adjustment in 1904-05 of Rs. 8,170, judi for 1902-03, which had been recovered from the villages direct by the Mamlatdar.

The other income includes an item of Rs. 2,025 which was found in June 1903 in a secret compartment of an iron safe belonging to the Desai.

No appreciable progress in the matter of collecting arrears due to these estates appears to have been attempted or possible owing to bad season.

Dhárwár District.—A general decrease in the "produce of land" is noticeable. This is owing to the failure of crops and consequent suspensions. The apparent increases in the case of estate Nos. 9 and 10 require no explanation beyond the fact that the figures for 1904-05 represented the collections for a portion of the year only.

As to "other income," there is a decrease in the receipts of ward No. 5, who has no landed property, due to non-collection of interest from debtors.

Estate No. 4.—The increase of Rs. 204 is due to the recovery of Rs. 102 on account of last year's interest in addition to the current year's full dues of Rs. 201.

In the case of estate No. 6, debts to the extent of Rs. 3,000 had been recovered in 1904-05, and during 1905-06 the manager sold some moveable property which fetched Rs. 6,000. These sums have enabled an addition of Rs. 10,000 being made to the stock of promissory notes held for the minors.

Estate No. 8:—Grain stock of the value of Rs. 531 was sold and this accounts for the rise here.

Kánara District.—The Collector of Kánara reports:—

"The annual income has now been increased by Rs. 77, interest on a mortgage-deed of Rs. 1,500, in favour of Mrs. Radhabai, the minor's auntand late guardian. By a will executed by the said Mrs. Radhabai at the time of her death, the personal property of the deceased consisting of this mortgage was made over to the benefit of the estate of her ward. In the year under report 2 years' interest on this deed, amounting to Rs. 154 (for 1904-05 and 1905-06), was recovered and credited to the minor's account."

This accounts for the increase under "other income."

Kolába District.—The increase is small and calls for no other special remark.

4. Belgaum District.—Estate No. 1.—The most important item of expenditure.

Expenditure. penditure is Rs. 13,000 remitted to the Kolhápur Darbár under instructions from the District Judge, Poona, as part payment of Rs. 30,000 sanctioned by him for marriage expenses of Baba Maharaja's daughter.

Estate No. 2.—The increase is chiefly due to Rs. 837 being spent on the repairs to Nagar well belonging to the estate and to the maintenance allowance of the boys being increased from Rs. 2,600 to Rs. 2,700.

Estate No. 3.—Rs. 3,972 in column 15 is made up of Rs. 1,000 paid to Ramabai Saheb as *potgi* allowance and Rs. 2,972 spent for the minor, his monthly allowance being Rs. 250. The adjustment of the amount of Rs. 8,170 of judi for 1902-1903 made in 1904-05 chiefly accounts for the decrease in the expenditure during 1905-06.

Dhárwár District.—The increases noticable in the "cost of maintenance" are due to payment of arrears of past year.

Grant of suspensions by Government accounts for the decreases under "Government dues".

Though estates Nos. 7, 9 and 11 are encumbered nothing was paid on account of liabilities from any estates.

The increase under "Other expenditure" in the case of estate No. 7 is due to Court expenses and establishment charges and in that of No. 10 to repairs to a house and a well and establishment charges; while the decrease apparent in estates Nos. 4 and 8 is due to the absence, unlike in the preceding year, of special expenditure on the marriage of one and the thread ceremony of the other ward and house repairs.

Kánara and Kolába Districts.—The column "Other expenditure" is practically blank.

The obsequies of the late guardian of the Sirsi minor were a charge on the estate in the preceding year.

Immoveable property.

5. None of the lands is under departmental management.

They are leased out for terms of years at fixed rents; so too the houses.

Estate No. 1.—A piece of land yielding a yearly rental of Rs. 6 was redeemed by paying Rs. 90 in satisfaction of a mortgage charge on it.

The Collector reports with reference to the land in Málvan Táluka:—

"Under the condition of the 'Kowl' granted for the land the 'Wahiwatdar' is liable to pay an yearly amount of Rs. 21-1-3, but the right of the Wahiwatdar has been sold by the Civil Court and he has no means to pay the arrears. Steps have been taken to recover the rent from 1905-06 from actual cultivators and not to allow the crop to be removed in case there is any uncertainty as to punctual recovery of the rent."

Estate No. 2.—Lands measuring 19 acres and 22 gunthas at Benkop were purchased by the minor Desai's brother.

Estate No. 3.—The restoration to the Deshgat of watan lands assessed at Rs. 250 imporperly alienated has been ordered.

Estate No. 6.—Survey Nos. 148 and 179 of Kurtkoti have been transferred to one Yamnabai of Hosahalli under Civil Court's decree and two lands (Survey No. 922 of Hombal and 110 of Balganur) added to the estate under the District Judge's order.

Estate No. 7.—The extent of the property now returned differs from that entered in the last return. The Collector's explanation of the difference is as follows:—

"Sixty-two acres of land in the táluka of Dhárwár and nine in the táluka of Kalghatgi came into the Collector's possession during the year under report."

6. The moveable property consists of the Government securities held in trust by the Accountant General in most cases.

Estate No. 1.—In addition there are two bonds for Rs. 16,000 and 8,000, respectively, mortgaging lands to the estate.

Estate No. 3.—The only moveable property worth the name consists of ornaments of family idols which are kept in a safe in charge of the manager. There has been no change in the property.

The moveable property in the case of Estates 4, 6, 7, 8 and 9 is in the custody of the guardians of the minor's persons, and the Mahalkari of Nargund is the custodian in the case of No. 11.

In No. 7 it is in charge of the minor's adoptive mother. There is no property belonging to Estates Nos. 5 and 10 and no information has been received regarding Nos. 12 and 13.

Estate No. 14.—All the property is in the custody of the personal guardian of the minor, Mr. Huchrao Dongre, brother of the minor's father-in-law.

Estate No. 15.—Apparently the Collector is the custodian in this case.

7. Belgaum District.—Estate No. 1.—The liabilities that have so far come to the Collector's knowledge are (a) a suit for Rs. 41,084 brought in the Poona Sub-Judge's Court in 1904 by Rao Bahadur Vasudev Bapuji Kanitkar and others against the trustees of the estate and certain others including the Collector of Belgaum; (b) a claim for an annual cash allowance of Rs. 96-0-6 together with arrears by one Ganesh Vishnu, into which enquiry is being made. No loan has been raised for the management of the estate.

Estate No. 3.—Claims worth Rs. 27,857 have been reported to the Collector

since the estate was taken under the Court of Wards.

In the case of Nos. 7, 9, 10 and 11, which are in debt to the extent of Rs. 19,025, 200, 2,532 and 515, respectively, steps are being taken to pay off the debts from the current income by instalments in the case of Nos. 7 and 10; by sale of moveable property in the case of No. 11 and from the surplus income in the case of No. 9. As regards 12 and 13, no information has been received. All other estates are unencumbered.

8. There is no minor connected with Estate No.1. It is to be regretted that there has been no progress in the education of the Tallur minors. This perhaps shows very poor work on the part of their tutor, though of course the minors too should have taken more care.

The Koujalgi minor is attending the Kanercse School in Belgaum and is learning in Standard V. He is reported to be a well behaved boy.

As regards the other minors except Ward No. 5, who is too poor to leave his village where there is no school, and Ward No. 9, who is a girl widow and does not therefore attend the school, all others are making a fair progress in their education, and their conduct is reported to be satisfactory.

9. Only one suit for Rs. 61 on account of land revenue was brought on behalf of the Estate No. 1 in the Civil Court. It is yet pending.

Similarly in the case of No. 2 three civil suits involving an amount of Rs. 181 were filed; of these one for Rs. 21 has been decided against and another for Rs. 152 in favour of the estate. The third for Rs. 8 is pending.

Two suits, one for possession of a field and one for mesne profits, are going on against Estate No. 3.

Two money suits for Rs. 218 filed on behalf of the Desai have been decided in his favour.

The decree of the Civil Court against Estate No. 7 referred to in last report is being satisfied by instalments. The suit against Estate No. 6 for resumption of land was decided against the minor and the property restored to the decree-holder. The suit for Rs. 1,070 decided in favour of the plaintiff in respect of ward No. 10 is being amicably settled for repayment by instalments. Fresh suit for Rs. 288 by one Mahadev Naik against the same ward is pending before the Sub-Judge, Haveri. This is being settled amicably. In respect of the other estates there was no litigation.

10. The information required by paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2 of 1905 is contained in the appended statement II.

In Estate No. 1 the Chavarat lands pay rents not exceeding the assessment. No reasons are given for this; they could have been more profitably put to auction of the right to cultivate for a year. In Estate No. 3 lands assessed at Rs. 1,725 bring in only a forest produce of Rs. 925. They are in the middle of or close to forests. The other estates bring an income generally in excess of twice the assessment, in some cases as high as five times the assessment.

I have the honour to submit the report on the administration of Minors' Estates in the Province of Sind for the year 1905-06.

## Assumption and Relinquishment of Estates.

2. The number of estates under guardianship at the beginning of the year was 77. Of these 6 were relinquished during the year (one in the Hyderabad District owing to its having been taken up under a mistake and 5 in the Lárkána District owing to the minors having attained their majority) and 9 were newly taken up (2 in the Karáchi District, 2 in Lárkána, 4 in Sukkur, and one in the Thar and Párkar District). The total number under guardianship at the end of July 1906 was thus 80. In the case of 15 estates only are the persons of the minors under the guardianship of the Collectors. The owners of the remaining estates are in charge of their relatives. Bibi Saleh Khatun, owner of estate No. 37, died last year, and the District Judge has been asked by the Collector to arrange for the management of the estate by the Nazir of the Court or to appoint an heir of the deceased to succeed to the estate.

### Income.

3. The first two estates are non-agricultural. The income of estate No. 1, which is derived from interest on capital invested in a fixed deposit in the National Bank, was the same as last year. The income realized from estate No. 2 amounted to Rs. 3,700, or Rs. 151 less than in the previous year. The details of the sources of income are given below:—

Estates Nos. 3 and 4 are under leases, and, excluding the assessment paid by the lessees direct to Government, practically realized the same amounts as last year. The question as to the actual amount of lease money payable by the lessee of estate No. 5 is under dispute. The amount of assessment paid by the lessee to Government was therefore all the income that accrued to this estate.

The sum of Rs. 955 shown in column 13 of the statement against estate No. 6, which was taken up only in the year under report, is made up as under:—

Estate No. 7, another new estate in the Karáchi District, realized a net income of Rs. 46. Arrangements for leasing it are being made.

Owing to increase of cultivation the receipts under the head "Produce of land" have exceeded those of the preceding year in the case of estates Nos. 8, 10, 11, 12 and 18. The total absence of income under estate No. 15 is due to non-recovery from the lessee either of the lease money or the Government assessment. Under the head "Other Income" there is a considerable increase as compared with the figures of the previous year, in consequence of the realization of certain extraordinary items on account of estates Nos. 10, 15 and 18.

There has been a general increase in the income from the produce of land. This is particularly noticeable in the case of estates Nos. 19, 20, 28, 29, 35, 41 and 43 in which a large area was cultivated that has usually to remain without water. The increase in the case of estates Nos. 28, 41 and 43 is partly due to the recovery of the previous year's arrears. Estates Nos. 31, 32, 33, 37, 39, 42 and 46 show a decrease, but the decrease is insignificant except in estates Nos. 33 and 37. In the former it is due to the fact that last year's figures included a sum of Rs. 235 on account of the preceding year's arrears. In the latter the Manchar water did not subside in time to allow of cultivation. The income from other sources does not show any remarkable fluctuations except in the case of estates Nos. 20, 22, 28, 33 and 46. In all excepting the last there was an increase due in estates Nos. 20 and 22 to enhanced receipts from rents, in No. 28 to interest on securities, and in No. 33 to the recovery of old debts. Estate No. 46 when transferred from the Manager, Incumbered Estates, last year, had a cash balance of Rs. 744. The absence of any such item this year accounts for the apparent decrease under this head. The sum of Rs. 967 appearing against estate No. 49 taken up this year represents the debts recovered and the rent collected.

The total income from the produce of land rose from Rs. 8,812 to 11,553.

Of the increase, Rs. 1,158 represents the produce of land from estate No. 66 which was newly taken up during the year. The rest of the increase is almost entirely due to an extension of cultivation in the lands comprising estate No. 58. In the case of this estate the value of produce shown in column 13 of the statement is exclusive of a sum of Rs. 2,300, representing part of the lease money which is due from the lessee, and Rs. 526 on account of assessment under postponement also payable by the lessee. No part of estate No. 52 was cultivated during the year. This accounts for the blank entries against the estate under the heads "Landrevenue payable" and "Income from land."

Under the head "Other Income" the most noticeable fluctuations are—

- (a) a decrease of Rs. 1,638 against estate No. 60, due to the non-recovery of the full amount of house-rent, and one of Rs. 487 in estate No. 61 on account of there being no miscellaneous receipts during the year;
  - (b) an increase of Rs. 425 in the case of estate No. 52 due to the sale of a house for the liquidation of liabilities, of Rs. 231 in the case of No. 53 to the recovery of the costs of a suit awarded in a decree, and of Rs. 18 in the case of No. 56 to receipts from interest on securities.

The income from land in the case of estate No. 68 amounted to Rs. 1,12,321

That and Párkar.

as against Rs. 82,601 last year. The increase is due partly to the recovery of the previous year's arrears and partly to a portion of the estate having been leased out for the first time. The income of estate No. 69 amounted to Rs. 4,308, falling short of last year's figure by Rs. 1,006. The decrease is due to the decreased cultivation. The sum of Rs. 3,604 appearing in the column "Other Income" against estate No. 68 represents the interest on investment. Estate No. 70, which came under management this year, was leased out for 1906-07 for Rs. 350 per annum, the assessment being paid by the lessee.

Column 13 of the statement shows an increase against estates Nos. 71, 75, 76, 78 and 79. Estate No. 71 yielded an income of Upper Sind Frontier. Rs. 1,604 as against Rs. 934 last year, the increase being due to the recovery of the sum of Rs. 212 reported last year as being due from the lessee, to the unleased portion of the estate having been leased out this year and to an extension of cultivation owing to the favourable character The last named cause also accounts for the increases in the case of the season. of estates Nos. 75, 76 and 78. The amount appearing against estate No. 79 represents the assessment paid by the lessee to Government. The lessee has neither paid the lease money on account of the year under report, nor the sum of Rs. 200 reported last year as being due from him. Arrangements are in progress for the recovery of the amounts by suit. The decreases in the case of estates Nos. 73 and 77 are due to a contraction in cultivation, which also explains the decreases in the amounts of land revenue payable to Government. The sum of Rs. 520 appearing in column 13 against the estate No. 73 includes Rs. 97, the previous year's arrears recovered from the lessee. The lease of estate No. 74 having expired at the end of the previous year, the cultivation of the lands was undertaken this year by the minor himself, but the produce was not sufficient for his maintenance and the payment of the Government dues, and a sum of Rs. 29 had therefore to be drawn from his balance to pay up the Government dues.

The only agricultural estate that derived any income from a source other than land is estate No. 71, which realized this year Rs. 55, representing the recoveries of advances made to Haris. This falls short of "the other income" of the estate last year by Rs. 195. The decrease is chiefly due to the fact that the share of clearance expenses amounting to Rs. 174 which had last year been paid by the estate and subsequently recovered from the lessee was this year paid by the latter direct without being brought on the estate's accounts.

Of the two non-agricultural estates, viz., estates Nos. 72 and 80, no income accrued to the former as against Rs. 116 in the previous year, and the latter realised Rs. 51, the same as last year. In the former case the previous year's income consisted of a compensation fine awarded to the estate owner by the council of elders. No such fine was due this year.

## Expenditure.

4. No important fluctuations are observable under the head "Cost of maintenance". The increase under the head "Government dues" against estates Nos. 4 and 5 is due to increased cultivation. In every case except in that of estate No. 5 the proportion of land revenue to the produce of land is below 50 per cent. The income shown against estate No. 5 represents merely the assessment paid by the lessee, the lease money not having been recovered owing to the dispute referred to in paragraph 3. If the lease money were added, the proportion would be reduced to less than 50 per cent.

The sum of Rs. 3,684 appearing under "Other expenditure" against estate No. 2 is composed of the following items:—

The sum of Rs. 200 shown in column 18 against estate No. 3 represents marriage expenses.

Hyderabad.

The expenditure for the year is, like the income, considerably in excess of the previous year under all heads.

The reason of the excess under "Cost of maintenance" is due in the case of estate No. 10 to the allowance having been increased from Rs. 1,810 to Rs. 2,160, and in the case of estate No. 18 to the minor having received an allowance for the first time in the year under report. The enhanced receipts under the head "Government dues" were the result of increased cultivation. The sum of Rs. 123 appearing under this head against estate No. 15 represents the dues on account of last year having been recovered during the year under report. The increases observable under "Other expenditure" in the case of estates Nos. 8, 10, 11 and 18 are due to (1) unforeseen causes, such as funeral coromonics and marriages, and (2) repairs to buildings and other sundry expenses. The incidence of assessment on produce from land works out to 42 per cent. In the case of estates Nos. 9, 15 and 16 only does the incidence materially exceed 50 per cent. The Collector has not explained what the excess is due to, but in the case of estate No. 15 at any rate it is caused by the fact that the figures in column 13 do not include the lease money, the lessee not having paid it.

The arrangements for the maintenance of the minors in cases in which column 15 is blank, viz., estates Nos. 29, 37, 38, 44, Lárkána. 45, 46, 49 and 50, are made by their relatives with whom they live. The only important variation under the head "Cost of maintenance" requiring notice is that in the case of estate Nc. 19, where the expenditure amounted to Rs. 13,535 as against Rs. 5,632 in the previous year. Of the total, Rs. 2,315 represents wages to servants, Rs. 3,039 cost of seed and Rs. 8,181 miscellaneous expenditure. The second item should more appropriately have appeared in column 18. Owing to the increase in cultivation caused by the excellent inundation of the year under report, the figures in column 16 (Government dues) show a general increase over similar figures for the previous year. The amount of land revenue exceeded half the produce in the case of estates Nos. 21, 26, 27, 29, 31, 32, 35, 38, 42, 44 and 45. In Nos. 21 and 29 the produce was appropriated by the minor and his relatives for maintenance and is either not included or is only partially included in column 13. As regards the remaining estates, the excess is due in some to the fact that owing to the smallness of the estates it was not possible to realise a higher lease money than last year, although a larger amount of land revenue had to be paid, and in others to the leases having been given prior to the appearance of any indication of the excellence of the year's inundation.

The details of expenditure other than Government dues, maintenance and liabilities are given below:—

The expenditure under the head "Cost of maintenance" shows little variation, being Rs. 3,190 as against Rs. 2,843 last year. The only remarkable fluctuations (for which, increases of Rs. 261 and Rs. 197 in the case of estates Nos. 58 and 60 and a decrease of Rs. 156 in the case of estate No. 59.

No maintenance charges were incurred on account of estates Nos. 52, 53, 55 and 61 to 65 as the owners are maintained by their relations. The expenditure under "Government dues" amounted to Rs. 5,893 as against Rs. 5,534, the increase being due to the same causes which contributed towards an increase

in the gross income from land and which have been discussed in paragraph 3 above. The incidence of the land revenue upon the gross income is 56 per cent., but if the sum of Rs. 2,300 due to the owner of estate No. 58 from the lessee were included in the gross income, the incidence would be less than 50 per cent. The percentage is not high considering that the profits of the lessees do not find a place in the accounts of the estates under management.

The other expenditure amounted to Rs. 2,331 as against Rs. 1,477 last year and is composed of the following items:—

The expenditure under "Government dues" shows a marked increase over the past year's figures in consequence of extension of cultivation. In the case of estate No. 68 the produce of land is less than double the amount of land revenue. This is accounted for by the fact that the entry in column 13 does not include the sum of Rs. 8,822 which is under postponement. The same fact also explains the difference noticeable between the figures appearing in columns 10 and 16. The incidence of Government assessment upon the gross produce in the case of estate No. 69 works out to 38 per cent. The "Other expenditure" of estate No. 68 amounted to Rs. 59,001 or Rs. 1,596 in excess of the amount spent last year. The following are the items composing the expenditure:—

The owners of estates Nos. 72, 76, 78 and 80 are supported by their relatives. This accounts for the blank entries against these estates under the head "Cost of maintenance." Last-year a sum of Rs. 80 appeared in column 15 against estate No. 73. This represented the cost of educating the owner of the estate, but as he has since given up his studies, no such expenditure was incurred during the year. The owner of estate No. 74 maintains himself from the produce of the land which he cultivates himself. The decrease of Rs. 146 appearing under "Cost of maintenance" against estate No. 79 is attributable to the fact that the minor's expenses at the Madressah were not paid during the year and do not therefore appear in column 15.

The amount shown under the head "Government dues" against estate No. 71 includes not only the revenue payable this year, but also the past year's revenue which had remained unpaid at the end of that year. In the case of

estate No. 73 also the amount shown in column 16 includes an arrear of Rs. 97. The increases observable in estates Nos. 74, 76, 78 and 79 are due to an extension of cultivation. The decrease in the case of estate No. 75 is due to the last year's figures being inclusive of a sum of Rs. 335 on account of the previous year's arrears. In estate No. 77 the decrease is explained by the fact that a smaller area was brought under cultivation. The land revenue exceeded half the produce in the case of estates Nos. 71, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78 and 79. The following reasons are assigned for the excess:—

Estate No. 74.—Column 13 does not include the value of the produce appropriated by the owner for his maintenance.

Estates Nos. 76 and 78.—There was an increase in cultivation and therefore an increase in the amount of assessment, but no corresponding increase in the lease money.

Estate No. 79.—The lease money not having been paid is not included in column 13.

No special reasons have been given by the Deputy Commissioner for the excesses in the remaining cases, but if the lessees' profits were added to the gross produce the proportion would be much reduced.

## Management of the immoveable property.

- 5. Out of the 80 estates under management 63 have been given on lease, 4 estates (Nos. 11, 12, 23 and 63) are under departmental management and one estate (No. 54) is managed partly under departmental arrangements and partly by lease. In 6 estates (Nos. 1, 2, 52, 62, 72 and 80) there are no agricultural lands to lease. The remaining 6 estates are accounted for as under:—
  - (a) Arrangements are being made to lease estates Nos. 7 and 50, both taken up in the year under report.
  - (b) Estate No. 19 is managed by the minor's relative Wadero Illahi Bakhsh, who disposes of the produce after consultation with the Collector.
  - (c) In the case of estate No. 21, arrangements for cultivation are made by the brothers of the minors, who retain the produce for the maintenance of the minors after paying the Government assessment.
    - (d) Estate No. 49 has been leased out with effect from 1906-07.
  - (e) The period of lease of the estate No. 74 having expired during the year, the owner undertook the cultivation of the land himself.

The year 1905-06 was favourable from the agricultural point of view. The water-supply was abundant and the prices of the agricultural products fairly high.

During the year under report the following changes occurred in the properties held by the minors:—

Estate No. 2.—A plot measuring 72 square yards was purchased by the Karáchi Municipality for widening a public street.

Estate No. 9.—Two hundred and twenty acres of land stated to have been forfeited under the fallow rules but reoccupied since 1897-98 were erroneously omitted from the previous statements.

Estate No. 20.—196 acres were acquired from the other sharers in the estate by private settlement.

Estate No. 21.—19 acres were sold by the minor's brother. The matter is under enquiry.

Estate No. 23.—4 acres were forfeited for non-payment of fallow assessment.

Estate No. 33.—The estate lost 8 acres by erosion in the Sehwan Taluka.

Estate No. 38.—One acre was forfeited on account of non-payment of fallow assessment.

Estate No. 52.—The share of the minor in a shop was sold for the payment of liabilities.

Estate No. 58.-41 acres were forfeited for non-payment of fallow assessment.

Estate No. 68.-5,449 acres were purchased during the year.

Estate No. 71.—The decrease of 60 acres is due to the estate having been brought under survey and its area having been found to be less than that shown in last year's statement.

Estate No. 75.—The minors were granted 3 acres on khas mokal.

Estate No. 77.—The increase of 12 acres in the estate is due to a khas mokal grant.

Estate No. 78.—The increase of 34 acres in the estate is due to a khas mokal grant.

# Moveable Property.

6. The only important fluctuations under this head are the following:

Estate No. 19.—The value of moveable property is shown to be Rs. 7,943 against Rs. 3,974 last year. The difference is due to the purchase of some cattle from the sale-proceeds of the agricultural produce.

Estate No. 68.—The increase of Rs. 600 in the value of moveable property is due to the purchase of a carriage by Ghulam Mahomed.

#### Liabilities of the Estates.

7. Out of the 80 estates under management 44 are without debts. The following remarks explain what has been done or is being done to liquidate the debts of the remaining 36 estates.

The liabilities against estate No. 5 were settled during the year by a com-Karáchi District. promise. Estates Nos. 6 and 7 are reported to be indebted to the extent of Rs. 100 and Rs. 12 respectively. Inquiries into their liabilities have not yet been completed.

Last year's statement showed debts standing against estates Nos. 12, 14, 15

Hyderabad District.

and 16 (Nos. 10, 12, 13 and 14 of last year's statement). Nos. 15 and 16 have been cleared of their debts. The sum of Rs. 42 appearing in column 23 against estate No. 15 represents land revenue not paid during the year. The debts of Nos. 12 and 14 are to be paid by instalments. The reason why no instalment was paid in the case of the latter is stated to be that the creditor did not apply for it. No debts were shown against estates Nos. 11 and 13 in the last report, but it has since been discovered that they were involved to the extent of Rs. 150 and Rs. 45 respectively. The debts were discharged during the year as will be seen from the entries against the estates in column 17 of the statement.

A sum of Rs. 2,064 was paid in satisfaction of the debts against estates

Nos. 20 and 30. The remaining debt against estate

No. 20 will be paid as soon as the creditors have settled between themselves the question of their respective shares. The Government dues outstanding against estate No. 30 were also paid up in the year. The debts due to Government appearing against estates Nos. 23, 24 and 34 represent arrears of land revenue remaining unpaid up to the close of the year.

The other debts against estates Nos. 31, 37, 42, 44, 45, 47, 48 and 49 will be paid when funds are available.

Estate No. 52 was cleared of its debt during the year. The debts due to

Government represent the arrears of land revenue payable by the lessees of estates Nos. 54, 58, 65 and 66. Of the total amount so due, a sum of Rs. 117 is under correspondence, for remission and Rs. 330 are due from estate No. 65 which came under management only in June last. Of the other debts those standing against estates Nos. 56 and 57 are questionable and will be paid only on the settlement of the accounts which the creditors have not yet produced.

The other debts against estate No. 54 will be discharged after arrangements have been made for the cultivation of the land taken up last year. The liabilities of estate No. 63 are insignificant and will be paid off shortly. As regards the other indebted estates, viz., Nos. 64, 65 and 66, inquiries have not yet been completed, and with respect to No. 61 arrangements for the payment of the debts are in progress.

Thar and Parkar.

The estates in this district are free from liabili-

The arrears of land revenue outstanding against estates Nos. 71 and 78 have been paid up during the year. The sum of Rs. 19 appearing in column 13 against estate No. 71 represents remission of land revenue for 1904-05 subsequently disallowed by the Commissioner. The amount has since been recovered. The sum of Re. 1 standing against estate No. 74 represents arrears of land revenue. The only other indebted estate is No. 73, which, as reported last year, pays Rs. 66 annually towards the liquidation of its debts.

### Education of Minors.

8. As stated in the report for 1903-04, Miss Ethel Maud Gray (estate No. 1) is still living with her aunt at Lahore. Minor Tarumal (estate No. 2) has not been conducting himself satisfactorily. As reported previously he was working as an apprentice to a native firm and received a small remuneration for his work which was supplemented by a small income from the estate. In July last he absconded with a large amount of jewellery which had been purchased for his marriage ceremony. One of his relatives was immediately sent in search of him and he was found at Brindaban, Benares District, and brought back. It was only after a severe admonition combined with threats of disciplinary measures that he produced some of the ornaments he had taken away. He would no doubt have squandered his own interest in the estate and that of the other minors had not the estate been under guardianship. The other minors of estate No. 2 continue to be educated in Karáchi. The minors of estates Nos. 3, 4 and 5 are all engaged in agricultural pursuits. The remaining two minors are girls.

There is nothing to add to the remarks in the last report on this district Hyderabad. except that Lall Baksh, Abdul Hakim and Kando (owners of estates Nos. 8, 15 and 16) have since given up their studies. Of these the first is too old to be made to go to school, the second has taken to cultivating his own lands and is employing his time well. Regarding the third enquiries are being made as to why he left school.

Of the 38 male minors under guardianship, 18 are receiving education,

6 at the Madressah at Lárkána, and 12 in the village schools. The remainder are either not old enough to go to school or have finished their education. Of the latter, two have passed the 3rd Grade Public Service Examination and one of them is working as a candidate in the táluka office at Dádu.

Shah Nawaz Bhuto (of estate No. 19) recently joined the Karáchi Madressah, but owing to some misunderstanding has left it. It is however hoped that he will soon rejoin.

Wahid Buksh Dedar (estate No. 24) is reported to be one of the most promising pupils at the Larkana Madressah.

Regarding Nawab Khudadad Khan (estate No. 36) the Collector writes as follows:—"He has been attending the Madressah regularly and I am glad to note a great improvement in his general intelligence and demeanour. I doubted whether he would ever be fit to manage his own affairs, but separation from the servants who had encouraged him in his evil habits and association with other boys has worked a great change for the better in him."

Of the 33 minors under gurdianship 10 are girls. Of the other 23, twelve Sukkur. go to school. Of the remaining eleven, Arbabali and Kadir Baksh (estates Nos. 53 and 61) are each about 17, and Nawab Khan (estate No. 51) is 20 years old. The owners of

estates Nos. 62 and 63 know the Bania character. The owner of estate No. 62 conducts the business of his shop, while the two minors of estate No. 63 make a living as hawkers. Dilawar Khan and Allah Wasya (of estate No. 64) know the vernacular character. Mir Hassan Shah (estate No. 65) is only 6 years old and is studying the Koran in a private school. Mamtazali (estate No. 66) is only 4. There thus remains only one male minor over 14, namely, Taj Mahomed (estate No. 54), for whose education arrangements have not yet been made.

There is nothing to add to the remarks contained in the last report, except that Ghulam Mahomed (estate No. 68) has returned from England for the vacation, and that the owners of the new estate (No. 70) are receiving education at the Umárkot school.

The remarks made in the last year's report hold good. At the beginning of the year Dad Mahomed (estate No. 71) reported himself, under instructions from the Deputy Commissioner, at the Jacobabad Boarding House, but has since played truant.

#### Litigation.

Karáchi District.

9. Of the 4 suits pending from the last year on behalf of estate No. 2 there yet remain three undisposed of in the District Court. The claims in these 3 cases amount to about Rs. 4,000. No fresh suits were filed during the year.

Hyderabad. There was no new suit filed in the year of report.

Lárkána. There was no litigation in this district.

Three suits were filed on behalf of minors during the year. Of these, two were instituted on behalf of estate No. 58 (one for the recovery of lease money amounting to Rs. 2,997, and the other for possession of a building site encroached upon by a relative), and one on behalf of estate No. 67 and of Rasul Baksh, the owner's relative, for the recovery of a debt of Rs. 570. Six suits were filed against minors, of which one was against estate No. 52, and the other five against Nawazali, the owner of estate No. 66. The suit against No. 52 was filed by the minor's grandmother for a sum of Rs. 48. Of the suits against Nawazali, three have been instituted by Chaturmal, Kodumal, and Kauromal for debts amounting to Rs. 28,000, Rs. 950, and Rs. 1,250 respectively, one by Musamat Ghulam Fatma, his father's sister, for a share of inheritance, and one by Kodumal for the restoration of the use of water from a water course. The minors are represented in all the suits except in the last case, in which there are 42 other defendants. None of the suits was disposed of during the year under report.

The financial position of Nawazali's estate (No. 66) is reported to be unsatisfactory. Moreover, the claims against him require a thorough scrutiny. The Collector has suggested to the Manager, Incumbered Estates, that he should take the estate under his management and the matter is under correspondence.

There was no fresh litigation either on behalf of or against any of the estates in the year under report.

A suit has been filed against the owner of estate No. 73 by his relatives on the ground that the minor is not entitled to the whole of the property in his possession. The result is awaited.

The lessee of estate No. 77 has followed up the notice referred to in the concluding paragraph of the last year's report by the institution of a suit against the minor. The suit has not yet been disposed of.

RESOLUTION.—The Commissioners, C. D. and S. D., have included in the statements appended to their reports estates (two in Central Division and four in Southern Division) taken under management under the Court of Wards Act during the year under report. Two of the estates shown in the statement for Northern Division, viz., Nos. 77 and 79 under Surat District, have also been brought under the same Act since the close of the year. The question of prescribing a separate annual report for such estates is under consideration.

- 2. Both in the Northern Division and in Sind the season of 1905-06 being much more favourable than the previous one, there was a general improvement in the income of the estates, which enabled them to pay off considerable arrears of Government dues and other liabilities. The estates in the Central and Southern Divisions excepting two in the former, were affected by the general failure of crops; the revenue suffered in consequence, and suspensions and remissions had to be granted in several cases. All important fluctuations in the figures of income and expenditure of individual estates have been explained by the Commissioners.
- 3. In the Northern Division departmental management is the rule, and estates are given on leases in a few cases to the minors themselves or their personal guardians. In the case of the Tálukdári estates the matter is engaging the attention of the Tálukdári Settlement Officer and a commencement has been made in the direction of leasing estates to outsiders. In the Central and Southern Divisions almost all, and in Sind 3ths, of the estates under management are leased to outsiders.
- 4. Of the 79 estates under management in the Northern Division 21 have no liabilities, while the remaining 58 have a total debt of Rs. 5,13,366, of which Rs. 44,204 are due to Government. Over 84 per cent. of the total debt pertains to estates under the Tálukdári Settlement Officer, who states that settlements with creditors are in progress in some cases and that in several others the liabilities have still to be correctly ascertained. In the Central Division, the Samner estate in Násik has a debt of Rs. 10,000, while its income is disproportionately small and no special arrangement has yet been devised for the liquidation of the debt. The Ghadge estate in Sátára was able to clear off all its old debts amounting to Rs. 38,694 with the aid of a loan from Sávantvádi State at 4 per cent. interest obtained with the sanction of Government. In the case of estates in the Southern Division steps are being taken to pay off such debts as have been ascertained. Of the 80 estates under management in Sind,

27 are indebted to the extent of Rs. 75,742, of which Rs. 1,365 are due to Government. Of these No. 66 (Nawazali's estate in Sukkur) alone has a debt of Rs. 44,433 and the advisability of placing it under the management of the Incumbered Estates Department was being considered at the date of the report. Fair progress was made during the year towards discharging the liabilities of several other estates.

- 5. The reports regarding the education and conduct of minors are generally satisfactory.
- .6. The attention of the Commissioners should be invited to the creata appended to the reports correcting several mistakes in the Divisional statements, and that of the Commissioner, S. D., to the omission to give grand totals in the general statement appended to his report. The Commissioner in Sind should be requested to omit fractions of acres or square yards from the statements appended to his report as ordered in paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2, dated 4th January 1905.
- 7. With reference to paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2, dated 4th January 1905, the Commissioners, C. D. and S. D., have furnished separate statements showing in the case of revenue-paying land a comparison between the ward's income from the land and the land revenue assessed upon it. The reports for the Northern Division and Sind do not contain similar statements. But in the case of estates in Tálukdári villages it is explained that any such comparison of Government dues with income would be misleading if not impossible, and in other cases explanations are furnished in the reports where the income is less than twice the assessment. The figures of assessment and income given in the special statements for the Central and Southern Divisious, when compared with those in columns 10 and 13 of the general statements, are not quite intelligible. As for example in the case of estates Nos. 1 and 6 in the Central Division column 13 of the general statement gives the income as Rs. 129 and Rs. 310, respectively, while the special statement shows Rs. 99 and Rs. 404, which are apparently figures for the previous year. Again, in the case of estates Nos. 7 and 9 in the Central Division, all the entries in the special statement seem to have been simply copied from the similar statement given in the report for 1904-05, and the figures of income from land as given in the special and general statements differ as shown below:-

The figures entered against Nos. 3 and 5 in the special statement for Central Division are apparently exclusive of inam lands paying quit-rent, but it does not appear that such lands have been excluded from the entries against Nos. 7 and 9. As regards Southern Division, it is not clear at first sight why in the special statement demand and outstandings are shown in addition to income. On examining the statement, however, it appears that the figures of income have been arrived at by deducting the outstandings from the demand, while what is required is the gross income actually derived from the land during the year under report. In future with a view to secure uniformity the information required by paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 2, dated 4th January 1905, should be furnished by all the Commissioners in the form of statement given below:—

It will be observed (column 2) that this statement is not to include estates or portions of estates held on Tálukdári or Inám tenure paying jama or quit-rent. In the column of remarks explanations should be furnished wherever the income shown (column 4) is less than twice the assessment (column 3).
