## Subject.—Annual Administration Report for the year 1939-40.

#### Sir,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report on the working of Co-operative Societies in the Province of Bombay for the year ending 30th June 1940.

#### I. ADMINISTRATION.

#### GAZETIED STAFF.

#### Registrar, Co-operative Societies, and Director of Rural Development.

2. Mr. M. D. Bhansali, I.C.S., worked as Registrar for the whole of the year except from 18th August 1939 to 3rd September 1939 and from 24th November 1939 to 23rd December 1939 when I officiated as Registrar.

#### Deputy Registrar.

I worked as Deputy Registrar of Co-operative Societies for the following periods :--

1st July 1939 to 17th August 1939,

4th September 1939 to 24th November 1939, and

24th December 1939 to 10th February 1940 (when AP Bk Qb 5-1 I proceeded on leave). The post was held in abeyance for the following periods:-

18th August 1939 to 3rd September 1939,

25th November 1939 to 23rd December 1939, and

11th February 1940 to 22nd May 1940.

From 23rd May 1940 till the end of the year under report the post was held by Mr. D. A. Shah.

Personal Assistant to the Registrar, Co-operative Societies, and Director of Rural Development.

Mr. D. A. Shah was Personal Assistant from 1st July 1939 to 26th December 1939 when he was transferred as Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Societies, Jalgaon, and again on his retransfer from 8th March 1940 to 22nd April 1940. Mr. S. S. Bhathena worked as Personal Assistant from 6th January 1940 to 3rd February 1940. Mr. J. G. Saldanha, Office Superintendent, officiated as Personal Assistant from 23rd April 1940 to the end of the year.

Assistant Registrar, Co-operative Finance.

Mr. K. R. Kulkarni held this post throughout the year.

#### Assistant Registrar, Land Mortgage Banks.

A temporary post of Assistant Registrar in class II of Bombay Co-operative Service was created for a period of three years from 3rd January 1940 for employment as Assistant Registrar for Land Mortgage Banks, and Manager of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Bombay, with headquarters in Bombay, and Mr. R. N. Trivedi was appointed to it.

Chief Marketing Officer, Bombay.

Dr. T. G. Shirname held the post of Chief Marketing Officer throughout the year.

The Provincial Marketing Scheme, consisting of four Assistant Marketing Officers, five clerks and five peons, mainly financed by the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research was transferred from the Agricultural Department to this Department, and was placed under the control of the Chief Marketing Officer.

## SUBORDINATE STAFF.

4. There has been no change in the strength of the subordinate staff during the year under review.

## SPECIAL TEMPORARY STAFF.

5. The two posts of officers in the II grade Auditors created in 1938, for reconstruction work in the areas financed by the Nasik and Kaira Banks in liquidation, were continued throughout the year. The sub-auditor, appointed at Dholka for work in connection with the recovery of the Government loans advanced to reconstruction societies at Ahmedabad, was continued except for a period of three months.

The post of Special Supervision Officer for the Dohad Taluka and the Jhalod Mahal in the Panchmahals held by a II grade Auditor was continued throughout the year. A Special Officer for Bhil areas at Taloda was employed and paid by the West Khandesh District Board of Supervising Unions. This officer has now been replaced by a sub-auditor appointed for the work of supervision and control of Bhil societies in the partially excluded areas.

The posts of all the Special Liquidation Officers were continued throughout the year, except the Special Liquidation Officer, Jalgaon, which post was abolished with effect from 17th May 1940 on transfer of a bulk of liquidation work to the East Khandesh District Central Co-operative Bank, Jalgaon. The post of a II grade Auditor was sanctioned by Government for appointment as Liquidator of the Dharwar Urban Co-operative Bank which was ordered to be wound up during the year.

The total number of Special Recovery Officers appointed during the course of the year was 27. Some of them were continued throughout the year while some were discontinued for short periods especially between 1st August 1939 and 30th November 1939, as the recovery of the dues of agriculturist members of co-operative societies by coercive processes through the revenue agency was ordered to be suspended till the next collection season in accordance with orders of Government.

In view of the reorganization of work relating to rural development the work in the office of the Registrar increased considerably. A post of an additional Office Superintendent in the grade of Rs. 180—10—270 was created on a temporary basis till 29th February 1940. In addition, to cope with the increased work in the office, the Registrar was allowed to employ temporary clerks under the power delegated to him. The post of Office Superintendent was continued for a further period of one year and an additional temporary staff consisting of 10 clerks and 3 peons was sanctioned for the Registrar's office.

#### HONORARY WORKERS.

- 6. The total strength of honorary organisers consisted of :--
  - 1 Divisional Honorary Organiser.
  - 54 District Honorary Organisers, and
  - 57 Taluka Honorary Organisers.

The cost on account of their travelling allowance was Rs. 1,568.

A number of non-officials and officials of other departments also took interest and rendered useful service to the movement.

#### SUPPRESSION OF CORRUPTION.

12. There were no complaints of corruption or inadequate payment for supplies against the employees of this department during the year under report.

#### II. SUMMARY OF GENERAL PROGRESS.

#### Season.

13. The season was, on the whole, fairly satisfactory though the total rainfall was less than normal. The vagaries of monsoon resulting in uneven distribution of rainfall acutely affected the agricultural conditions in Gujerat. Scarcity conditions prevailed in Ahmedabad, particularly in Viramgam taluka, and to a lesser extent in Panch Mahals sub-division. Late rains in the Deccan affected the kharif crops but proved beneficial to the rabi crops. Crops in certain talukas of the Sholapur district failed due to scarcity of rains. In the Karnatak, heavy rains, at the close of the season caused damage to the standing kharif crops.

After the outbreak of war, prices of some of the agricultural commodities showed an upward trend in the beginning, cotton prices soared very high in the months of December and January, but the rise in prices did not last very long. A number of agriculturists were able to realize better prices for their produce, but many who had stored their produce—particularly cotton—in the expectation of realizing still better prices, had to sell at very low prices or to hold on till the next year. The following table illustrates the changes that took place in the prices of the principal commodities produced in the areas financed by the Bank, and may be taken as a rough guide for the entire Province :---

The bulk of finance by agricultural credit societies consists of advances of a short term nature made for the purpose of current agricultural needs. Loans for unproductive purposes like ceremonials are discouraged and show a downward tendency. Loans for redemption of old debts are advanced through the agency of land mortgage banks, which is the appropriate agency for dealing with long term finance. There is a slight decrease in the amount of loans advanced for land improvement.

In the case of non-agricultural societies, the major portion of loans are advanced for trade, commerce and other allied purposes.

17. During the year under report, 209 societies were registered while 46 were ordered to be wound up. The following table gives

The large number of thrift and credit and multi-purpose Societies registered during the year is, to some extent, due to increased demand from rural areas for credit specially for current agricultural needs, but mainly it is the result of the propaganda carried on by the department for popularising multi-purpose societies. The main feature of the new type of organisation is that the Society aims at linking up credit with thrift and or with maketing and supply and thus overcome the main draw-back found in the older type of societies which confine their operations to credit only. The registration of 19 better farming societies which are intended to promote improved methods of agriculture and thus function as complements of multi-purpose societies, offers scope for improving the agricultural industry.

In urban areas, the advantages of the co-operative method are increasingly appreciated as is evidenced by the increase in the number of societies—particularly amongst the salary earners.

There is a growing and keener demand for registration of societies in the rural areas inspite of stricter scrutiny and limitations imposed on loan operations and difficulties which the co-operative movement is facing in several parts of the province. This is evidenced by the increase in the number of societies. 113 new societies 6 credit, 53 thrift and credit, and 54 multi-purpose were registered during the year under report as against 28 ordered to be wound up. In addition, one supply society in the Thana District was converted into a multi-purpose society, and one multi-purpose society in the Bijapur district which was shown under Production and Sale last year is classified under Agricultural Credit this year. The year thus records an increase of 87 in the total number of societies. As for new credit societies, ordinarily they were not registered unless they adopted the bye-laws framed for thrift and credit societies which, amongst other things, provide for compulsory deposits in Savings Accounts at the harvest season, and make it obligatory to the members to sell their produce through co-operative or other agency approved by the society. Attempts were also made to bring the old societies into line with new societies by advising them to adopt the revised bye-laws.

It will be noticed that notwithstanding a substantial increase in the total number of societies, there is a decrease in the total working capital. This reduction is mainly the result of efforts made to bring the debts of members within their paying capacity and also due to the fact that the members from whom dues are recovered through coercive measures, are, as a rule, not given any fresh loans. The continued depression and the consequent fall in the repaying capacity of the agriculturists made it very difficult for them to adjust their liabilities to their capacity to bear the burden. The brief period of good prices at the commencement of the year and fair crops, however, enabled the agriculturists in certain districts to effect appreciable reduction in their outstandings and the results achieved in this process of adjustment are satisfactory. The reduction in the working capital is also due to a decrease in the members' debts. The decrease in members' deposits is partly due to their conversion into share capital and partly due to their set off against members' dues in the process of repayment. The increase in membership is not appreciable, having regard to the increase in the number of societies. This is due to the process of weeding out undesirable members and also due to greater care exercised while admitting new members. The reserve and other funds record a satisfactory increase. A drop of about Rs. 13 lakhs in the bank loans outstanding with societies while at the same time other liabilities of societies have not only increased, but decreased, is a healthy sign and indicates that the societies are standing on their own legs to a greater extent. Owned capital (including members' deposits) formed as much as 49 per cent. of the total working capital of the societies as against 46 per cent. at the close of the previous year. If it is borne in mind that the societies have substantial investments in Central Banks' shares etc., as against their liabilities to the banks and non-members the position could be seen to be even more satisfactory.

The total outstandings during the year under report show an appreciable decrease of 15 lakhs and compare favourably with the decrease of 6 lakhs recorded during the previous year. The decrease can be attributed to the present policy according to which the existing commitments are seldom allowed to increase and suitable cuts are effected so as to bring the debts within or nearer the paying capacity of the debtors. The figures for East Khandesh show a marked decrease of about 41 lakhs. In the Dhulia Division also, there is a decrease of more than 2 lakhs.

The recoveries for the Province as a whole (including advance recoveries shown under a separate column) show a substantial increase of 15 lakhs over the previous year's figures. In the East Khandesh, an increase of more than Rs. 9 lakhs is recorded. This increase is due to the special measures that were adopted in the district to meet the difficult situation in which the East Khandesh District Central Bank was placed in consequence of heavy demands for withdrawal of deposits and also to fairly good crops and better prices of cetton in the beginning of the season. In the Dhulia division the decrease to the extent of two lakhs and a half in recoveries is due among other reasons to the unfavourable trend of prices of agricultural commodities, particularly, onions in the Nasik district. In the Satara division also, there is a decrease in recoveries to the extent of nearly Rs. 1 lakh. The recoveries for the province as a whole, show a distinct improvement over the previous year's figures, and the percentage increase over the previous year's figures works out at 14. The position in this respect would have been still better but for certain factors which thwarted the progress of recoveries. Under the existing orders of Government, the coercive measures for recoveries of du-s of Co-operative Societies are suspended for the period intervening between 31st August and the commencement of the next land revenue collection season. As many important crops in a number of districts are harvested before the dates for the collection of land revenue, the difficulties that arise in collection of Co-operative Societies dues in consequence of these orders can easily be imagined. Similarly, orders passed for granting time to those members of societies who paid one or two years' interest on the analogy of the benefits conferred under the Small Holders Relief Act, even going beyond the Act and extending the benefits to members who are not small holders, have also, to a certain extent, retarded recovery work. Moreover there is a feeling amongst debtors of societies that they would get more concessions under the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act than under the Registrar's concession schemes and that it would be in their interest to postpone the payment till the Act came into operation.

Fresh finance shows a decrease of about a lakh and half. The decrease in this direction is less than that for the previous year, as the figures for East Khandesh show an increase of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs. This increase is justifie: as recoveries exceeded the previous year's figure by Rs. 9 lakhs. In Satara, Dhulia, and Sholapur divisions, there is a decrease of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs respectively. The policy whereby fresh finance is allowed mostly for current

agricultural needs was continued. Cuts ranging from 5 per cent. to 10 per cent. were also effected in the total outstandings after ascertaining the merits of each case.

The decrease in the figure of overdues amounts to 9 lakhs this year, as compared to that of 2 lakhs of the previous year. This is partly due to the policy of fresh finance on cautious lines, which reduces the possibilities of fresh defaults and partly due to the concentration of efforts in the matter of effecting recoveries. As pointed out already these efforts for stimulating recoveries met with more than usual success, as the prices of agricultural produce were high during certain months of the year, and in many districts, e.g. East Khandesh—full advantage of this rise in prices could be taken.

There is an improvement in the figures for the Province as a whole. The unauthorised arrears record a fall of nearly 9 lakhs, the percentage having decreased from 61 to 59. This improvement is mainly due to the progress effected in the normal areas, where there is a corresponding decrease of about 9 lakhs, in the figures of overdues. The percentage of overdues, in the normal area has also fallen from 59 to 56. The position in the precarious and backward tracts, which had shown marked improvement last year, remains the same. The position in the Panch Mahals is slightly worse and is due largely to the scarcity conditions that prevaited in that area. It may be mentioned that the figure of overdues for Panch Mahals sub-division relates to all societies in the district. The position of Bhil societies can be seen from remarks in paragraph 27 of this report.

In spite of vigorous efforts made in recent years to collect overdues and improve the working of societies by adoption of various measures such as continuation of concession schemes, the position with regard audit classification remains very much the same. The large increase ir the number of D class societies, though calling for serious attention, is not an indication of further deterioration in the financial position of the societies but is mainly due to the classification being made rigidly on the basis of the percentage of overdues. The question of audit classification is being reconsidered, and it is under examination whether recoveries should not be given as much importance, if not more, than the mere amount of overdues. By basing audit classification on overdues at a time when fresh finance is usually much less than repayments, it is found that wrong conclusions can be formed, and accordingly, the whole question is being re-examined.

Separate figures compiled with regard to percentage of overdues in agricultural credit societies (excluding land mortgage banks) reveal that out of the 3,795 societies, there are as many as 303 societies having no arrears, 107 societies having arrears up to 5 per cent., 141 societies with arrears ranging between 5 to 10 per cent., 359 societies with arrears ranging between 11 to 25 per cent. and 708 societies with arrears ranging between 25 to 50 per cent.

23. In the previous years' reports, reference has been made to steps taken to clarity the position of societies, and incidentally, of central financing agencies by classifying societies' debts into frozen, bad and douotful debts as one of the measures calculated to resuscitate their working. During the year under report, this process of classification was continued through the agency of the supervisors, bank inspectors and auditors. The following statement gives an analysis of the classification of the debts :---

24. It will be noticed that while there is an increase of over Rs. 4 lakhs in the figure of frozen debts, doubtful debts and bad debts have gone down by ab. ut  $3\frac{1}{4}$  lakhs and  $1\frac{1}{4}$  lakhs respectively. The total of bad debts and doubtful debts works out at 10.3 per cent. of the total loans outstanding, whereas the percentage for the previous year was 11.6.

In this connection, it will be noticed that the figures furnished for the year 1933-39 were in respect of 3,687 societies whereas the figures for the year under report are for 3,774 societies. Thus the figures for 87 more societies are included in the figures for the year 1939-40. This partly explains the increase in the figure of frozen overdues over the figures of the previous year. The increase, however, cannot wholly be attributed to the increase in the number of societies, nor can the increase be ascribed to cessation of normal recoveries of principal and interest. The position requires further examination, in view of the criteria laid down for the classification of debts into various categories, in cases where in spite of sufficient assets being available, normal repayments are not forthcoming by way of principal and/or interest for a period exceeding three years the amounts defaulted are to be treated as frozen overdues. On the basis of this classification, recoveries from members, whose debts are doubtful result often in rendering the debts frozen, when such recoveries are substantial or when the necessary margin is covered. The decrease in the figure of doubtful debts as already pointed out, would indicate that a part of the dues, at any rate, have been converted into frozen dues in the process of liquefaction.

Societies were advised to write off bad debts and amounts shown as losses consistently for over a period of 3 years against reserve funds. The total losses written off in this manner during the year amounted to Rs. 1,01,610. Losses in societies are partly due to the arrears of interest with defaulters and partly due to the unremunerative return on lands taken over by societies.

25. Concession Schemes.—Side by side with the process of classification of debts, the policy of granting concession to the borrowers of societies on collective as well as individual basis continued to be in operation throughout the year. The scale of concessions varied for different tracts according to the financial position of societies and the accumulation of overdue interest. The following statement indicates the extent to which concessions were availed of on individual and collective basis:—

The comparative analysis shows that more and more societies are adopting the method of granting concessions to the borrowers with a view to stimulate recoveries and revitalise their working and that the scheme on individual concession basis is becoming more popular.

During the year under report, one society in the Nira Canal area was ordered to be wound up, thus reducing the total number . of societies in the Deccan Canals to 65. Owing to continued depression in the Gul market in the past, cane growing became unprofitable in a number of cases and even in the cases in which it was profitable, the margin of profit was so much reduced that it became extremely difficult for the members of Canal Societies to meet their liabilities to the societies. This reacted on the financial position of the Canal Societies which had advanced large loans to the cane growers. In this tract, the amounts of frozen and doubtful debts are very large. Last year, some time before the declaration of war, gul prices showed a tendency to rise and it was hoped that if the prices continued to remain at a higher level, the land values would rise and the debtors of societies would be able to pay up a large amount of their dues either from their increased income or by sale of part of their lands.

26. Canal Societies.—The following table gives the main statistics with regard to the working of societies in the Deccan Canals :—

Unfortunately, as the boon did not last long, these expectations were not wholly realised. However, it will be noticed that during the year under report, there were larger repayments from the societies partly because of the higher prices obtainable in the earlier part of year and partly as a result of the compromises effected with individual debtors. Six societies in the Nira Canal tract which were in a stagnant condition and had considerable losses and bad debts were transferred to the control of a special sub-auditor, in pursuance of a scheme formulated for securing centralized control of stagnant societies. These societies received special treat nent from the Provincial Co-operative Bank, with regard to concessions in the rate of interest.

27. Bhil Societies.—The following table gives the main statistics with regard to Bhil societies in the Panch Manals and West Khandesh districts :—

In the Panch Mahals, the societies continued to show steady progress in their working. Three new societies were registered in the tract and two were taken into liquidation. The fresh advances showed a satisfactory increase over the figures of the previous year. The reduction in unauthorised arrears to the extent of about Rs. 10,000, an all-round increase in the owned capital and working capital and a decrease in the borrowed capital constitute healthy features of the working of societies in the area. CAs pointed out in the last year's report, the success of the movement in the Bhil tract is considerably due to the system of giving finance in kind to finance for seed and other domestic requirements of the members. For these purposes, a special system of shop agents was brought into existence and supply in kind provided through that agency. The recovery in kind was also made through that agency. The idea underlying these arrangements is to ultimately convert these agencies into purchase and sale unions as his been done at Garbada. The following figures illustrate the progress achieved under the system of advances and recoveries in kind :--

As regards the Bhil societies in the West Khandesh District, the figures for the year under report show further deterioration in their working. It will be noticed that the recoveries during the previous year were Rs. 12,193 while those for the year under report are Rs. 6,521. Fresh finance during the year under report has also fallen by about 48 per cent. mainly because of low recoveries. The position with regard to overdues, which work out at about 92 per cent. of the loans outstanding as against 91 per cent. of the previous year is extremely unsatisfactory. This state of affairs is mainly attributed to the fact that at present proper arrangements for the sale of produce of the agriculturists are lacking and the produce is forcibly taken away by the sowkar.

Recently Government has sanctioned special staff for the supervision and control of the societies in the Bhil areas and it is hoped that with the assistance of this staff, it would be possible to rejuvenate the working of the societies in the Bbil areas in the West Khandesh district, and organise purchase and sale depôts wherever necessary, so as to extend the maximum benefit to the societies with regard to the marketing of produce of their members and in securing better prices. (Any far-reaching improvement in the position is, however, not likely until the provisions of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors' Relief Act, which make it an offence to alienate or encumber the standing crops or the produce of the land of a debtor member, are brought into operation.)

28. Other Societies.—In addition to the above societies which cater for the Bhil population in West Khandesh and the Parch Mahals, there is a number of other credit societies which cater for the needs of employees of local bodies. Their membership though largely consisting of backward classes is not, however, exclusively

The decrease in the number of societies is due to the fact that in the last year's figures six societies in the Ahmedabad district which were included in this statement have been omitted in this year's figures as it is reported that the majority of members in these societies do not belong to the backward class.

#### MULTI-PURPOSE SOCIETIES.

29. Very active propaganda was carried on in rurał areas for explaining to the agriculturists the utility and advantages of multi-purpose societies and instructions were also issued to the officers concerned that one or two multi-purpose societies may be organised in each taluka after careful enquiry in regard to the available personnel and other relevant factors. In pursuance of these instructions, as already indicated above, 54 new multi-purpose societies were registered during the year which, together with the societies registered in the previous year and the societies converted into multi-purpose societies, brought the total number of multipurpose societies to 65 at the close of the year. These societies are distributed over the Province as under :--

In organising these societies, the immediate object kept in view was to provide finance for cultivation needs and also to arrange for the sale of produce of the agriculturists who are financed by these societies or by agricultural credit societies working in their area of operations. The centres chosen for these societies are in most cases minor market places where cultivators usually sell their produce.

It is premature to express any opinion regarding this experiment for linking up credit with marketing through the agency of multi-purpose societies. Some of them, however, have made a promising start, while others had not commenced business till the close of the year. Out of the societies which did fairly good business during the year, the following deserve special mention :--

(1) Galatga Co-operative Multi-purpose Society in the Belgaum district made advances to the extent of Rs. 2,616 and arranged for the sale of domestic requirements valued at Rs. 5,349. It has 72 members and collected a share capital of Rs. 1,035. (2) Itagi Co-operative Multi-purpose Society in the same district made advances to the extent of Rs. 3,067 to enable its members to pur hase sugarcane sets for seeds and to meet other current agricultural expenses. It also undertook the supply of groundnut cakes and ammonium sulphate on a small scale.

(3) Gudiangadi Co-operative Multi-purpose Society in the Kanara district undertook the supply of domestic requirements and sale of members' produce (rice). The total value of such transaction amounted to Rs. 4,667.

In the Dharwar district, three societies gave crop loans (in cash) to the extent of Rs. 6,979 and loans in kind to the extent of Rs. 1,304. The societies also made advances for industrial and domestic requirements to the extent of Rs. 7,099 and advances against security of goods to the extent of Rs. 9,435. Six societies sold kerosene tins, sulphur, cotton seeds, wheat and pulse, etc., valued at Rs. 2,370. Among the societies which did this work, the Narendra Society stands foremost and Chebbi and Dalvi societies come next.

In the Satara district, the Jawalwadi Co-operative Multi-purpose Society (which is a conversion of the old agricultural co-operative credit society) has drawn up a comprehensive programme embracing schemes for village sanitation, construction of roads, medical aid and village library. It has also organised a weaving centre for training agriculturists in weaving. There is also an unregistered store shop working under the management of this society.

There were three principal needs of multi-purpose societies, viz. (i) adequate godown facilites for storing agricultural produce brought to them for sale; (ii) subsidies to meet the cost of management, particularly in the initial stages when the turn-over is not likely to be large; and (iii) provision for efficient and well trained staff to serve as secretaries. Government has recently issued orders sanctioning rules under which long-term loans for the purpose of constructing godowns at 4 per cent. interest can be granted. Government has also undertaken to pay a subsidy up to Rs. 150 a year to each multi-purpose society for the first three years to enable it to maintain suitable staff. Under the scheme sponsored by Government for the training of rural assistants, it is contemplated that the rural assistants, on completion of their training, would be available for appointment as secretaries of multi-purpose societies at the villages where they may be appointed to work.

#### (c) SUPERVISION.

31. The number of district boards of supervising unions stands at 16 as at the close of the previous year. The Broach District Board of Supervising Unions was registered after the close of the year, while the district supervision board at Kaira was ordered to be wound up, as the supervising unions working under it were taken into liquidation, consequent on the winding up of the Kaira District Central Co-operative Bank. Kolaba and Batnagiri districts continue to be without any Board. The staff of the boards of supervising unions consists of 124 Supervisors and 18 Assistant Supervisors. The number of supervising unions, including guaranteeing unions, and unions for the Southern Gujrat cotton sale and ginning societies stands at 110. The number of societies affiliated to them was 3,501.

During the year under report, some of the supervisors of the district boards were taken up as Assistant Rural Development Inspectors for propaganda work in connection with rural development schemes.

In Bhil Areas of Taloda, Nandurbar and Nawapur talukas, societies have not been atfiliated to any of the supervising unions. A special officer for Bhil societies, however, was appointed for supervision and control of those societies, and his cost was borne by the West Khandesh District Board of Supervising Unions. Similarly, in the Bhil tract of Panch Mahals, special arrangements for supervision by Government through a special supervision officer has been made. The supervision of 71 societies affiliated to the Nasik District Central Bank in liquidation is entrusted to two supervisors and one sub-auditor, appointed by Government and working under the control of the Auditor and Reconstruction Officer, Nasik. The Borsad Taluka Supervising Union, which was converted into a banking union last year, works as supervising agency for 27 societies and financing agency for 10 societies of the Bors d taluka. Of the 4 guaranteeing unions in the Dharwar district, the Bengeri Guaranteeing Union has ceased doing any work.

32. The services of an officer in the grade of a sub-auditor were lent to the East Khandesh Board of Supervising Unions to enable the board to improve the condition of the unions and societes affiliated to them. The question regarding the co-ordination for different agencies for supervision and inspection of societies, which was considered during the last year, has not been finally settled, and the present arrangements are being continued. Though the boards and unions have contributed to the efficiency of supervision, the working of the scheme: in the different districts is not uniform. There is a general feeling that the results achieved are below expectations and that some changes in the system are necessary to make it more efficient. The question regarding the policy governing the future of supervision in this Province is under separate examination.

#### (d) LAND MORTGAGE BANKS.

33. A separate statement B (1) showing the operations of land mortgage banks is appended.

## (i) Primary Land Mortgage Banks.

34. The number of land mortgage banks working in the Province at the close of the year was 17. During the year 3 more land mortgage banks, viz., (1) The Thana East and Kolaba District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, (2) The Thana West and Bombay Suburban District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, and (3) The Haveri Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, were registered. Two more banks, one at Chikodi in the Belgaum District and the other at Bhusawal in the East Khandesh District, were organised during the year, but in view of the orders of Government that no new land mortgage banks should be registered unless the position of existing land mortgage banks is improved, the proposals for registration of these banks were dropped.

The Board of the Hubli Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank was suspended by Government during the year 1938 on account of mismanagement in the bank. The nominated Board whose term of office has since been extended up to 25th July 1941 has succeeded, to a very large extent, in improving the affairs of the Bank. The affairs of the Dharwar Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank also showed gradual improvement, though the problems here are of long standing and not easy to solve. The question of the amalgamation of the Dharwar and the Hubli Co-operative Land Mortgage Banks Limited is under consideration.

It will be seen that the number of members increased from 9,095 to 10,384. The amount of loans outstanding with members went up from Rs. 20,90,748 to Rs. 26,29,342 which are exclusive of loans advanced by the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, Limited, prior to the establishment of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, and not yet taken over by the latter. The number of loan applications received by the primary land mortgage banks during the year was 1,083 and 605 applications were forwarded to the Provincial Land Mortgage Bank for sanction of loans. The total amount outstanding with members of the primary banks at the end of the year Rs. 27,00,025.

36. Out of the total loans advanced to the borrowers by the primary banks, Rs. 3,95,808 inclusive of interest were due for repayment, out of which Rs. 1,07,388 in principal and Rs. 1,59,052 in interest were recovered during the period leaving a balance of Rs. 1,29,428 to be recovered. The amount overdue from members

of all the banks was Rs. 1,28,561 including interest as against Rs. 88,997 at the end of the previous year. The overdues are specially heavy in the case of two old banks viz, the Dharwar and the Pachora land mortgage banks which have overdue to the extent of Rs. 33,231 and Rs. 17,806 respectively. Among the new banks, the Poona District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, has got overdues amounting to Rs. 20,201. The real arrears in the Belgaum District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank are not heavy, but the figure has swollen to Rs. 15,894 as the Bank has closed some loan accounts, obtained awards for entire amounts due inclusive of future instalments, and shown them as overdues. In all other banks overdues are comparatively small. Necessary steps have been taken to institute arbitration proceedings against recalcitrant defaulters and to obtain awards. With a view to effect speedy recoveries, steps were also taken to get the land valuation officers of some of the Banks where overdues were heavy authorised to execute distraint warrants under section 154 of Land Revenue Code. Punctuality in repayment on the part of the debtors of primary land mortgage banks is a "sine qua non" for the healthy functioning and progress of land mortgage banks. Primary Land Mortgage Banks in this province have, generally a very extensive area of operation and they have no local machinery for recovery of their dues. The need for special powers, therefore, for the recovery of defaulted instalments is being felt in their case.

From the reports received from the primary land mortgage 37. banks, it is seen that all the 13 old land mortgage banks, with the exception of the Dharwar, Broach and Poona District Co-operative Land Mortgage Banks were able to show profits on their working during the year. This is due partly to the increase in the volume of business and partly to a subsidy of Rs. 3,400 granted during the year by Government to five of the banks. The loss shown by three banks is also due to a large amount of overdue interest, which under Rule 22 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rule 1927, is required to be deducted before the net profits are arrived at. The four banks which started working recently, were also given a Government subsidy of Rs. 500 each. They could not, however. work at a profit partly because there was little or no business in the initial stages and partly because the cost of management, particularly on the maintenance of land valuation officers was heavy.

38. The conciliation boards of primary banks secured remissions from creditors to the extent of Rs. 1,35,719 during the year before disbursing loans for payment of old debts. These boards are considerably handicapped in this work as they have no statutory powers to enforce attendance of creditors and production of their books and documents.

39. The comparative smallness of the volume of business done by primary land mortgage banks during the period under report was largely due to the suspension on the part of the apex bank for nearly 4 months of its normal operations for want of loanable funds and also partly due to the enactment of the Bombay Agricultural Debtors Relief Act under which intending applicants expected to secure greater relief than what could be secured by voluntary conciliation through the efforts of land mortgage banks.

### (ii) Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank.

40. Sir Govindrao Pradhan, Kt., J.P., continued to hold the office of the elected President of the bank. Mr. V. B. Mardhekar worked as the Managing Director till 22nd January 1940, when Mr. R. N. Trivedi, was appointed as Assistant Registrar, for Land Mortgage Banks and Manager of the Bank. Mr. R. N. Trivedi continued to work as Manager of the bank till the close of the year.

The number of affiliated primary banks increased during the year from 13 to 16. The paid up share capital of the bank increased from Rs. 4,21,000 to Rs. 4,46,300.

41. Loan Operations.—During the year under report, the bank received from primary banks 516 fresh loan applications for Rs. 8,42,013 of which 367 applications for Rs. 4,67,000 were sanctioned and 41 for Rs. 1,36,469 were rejected. The remaining applications were pending with the bank at the close of the year.

The bank advanced to primary banks, during the year under report, 443 fresh loans amounting to Rs. 6,07,450 inclusive of loans taken over from the Land Mortgage Department of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, Limited. The outstandings from primary banks as on 30th June 1940 stood at Rs. 23,88,608 as against Rs. 19,25,958 at the close of the previous year.

The demand for land improvement is low and steps are being taken to foster it by a slight reduction in rate of interest for loans taken for land improvement.

43. The amount of instalments which fell due for repayment during the year was Rs. 1,25,625 against principal and Rs. 98,818 against interest. The recoveries in respect of these instalments up to the close of the year amounted to Rs. 97,401 against principal and Rs. 96,971 against interest. The percentage of recoveries of principal to demand on account of principal was 77.5 and the percentage of recoveries of interest to demand on account of interest was 98.1. Against the arrears of principal, a sum of Rs. 4,574 was realised after the close of the year bringing the percentage of recoveries on account of principal to that of demand to 31.1. In addition to this, the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, received from primary banks a sum of Rs. 37,217-6-2 during the year against future instalments.

44. The overdues at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 28,224 against principal and Rs. 1,848 against interest. The overdues have been further reduced by Rs. 4,574 after the close of the year. All the arrears of interest were also realized in full after the close of the year. A major portion of overdues is concentrated in one bank, viz., the Poona District Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited whose arrears amounted to Rs. 16,801 at the close of the year. Steps are being taken to see that the Bank rectifies this position early.

45. Debentures.—The first series of debentures to the extent of Rs. 20 lakhs, were floated by the bank in the year 1938. The entire balance of unsubscribed debentures was taken up by Government during the year under report. Government was pleased to permit the bank to float a second series of debentures to the extent of Rs. 10 lakhs. The rate of interest for these debentures was fixed at 3½ per cent. per annum. The period of repayment of debentures was fixed at 15 years with an option to the bank to redeem them at any time after 10 years after giving 6 months notice to the debenture holders. In accordance with the terms of the debenture trust deed for the first series, the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, Limited, has made the necessary provision for sinking fund out of receipts for the year 1939-40.

46. Profit.—For the first time during the last 41 years, the bank made a profit. It amounted to Rs. 17,068-7-5. With an increase, in the volume of its business and with economies in the cost of management, the bank may hope to give its share holders a moderate return on their capital in future.

47. Transfer of assets and liabilities of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, Limited.— The work of transferring the assets of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank, Limited to the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, continued to make progress. In all, 207 cases for Rs. 3,58,498 were sent up for transfer and the bank decided to accept 156 cases for Rs. 2,73,800. Of these, 103 cases for Rs. 1,57,295 were transferred before the close of the year. The cases now awaiting transfer are 53 for Rs. 1,11,650. The primary banks concerned have been instructed to expedite the transfer of these cases.

48. First Land Mortgage Banks' Conference.—During the year, a conference of land mortgage banks was convened under the auspices of the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited. Several problems relating to the management of the Apex Banks and the Primary Land Mortgage Banks were discussed at the conference.

49. Conclusion.—The war has tended to impede the progress of the Land Mortgage Banks' movement, which depends, for its healthy growth, on continuous and adequate supply of cheap long term funds. During the year the second series of debentures were floated at an issue price of  $98\frac{1}{2}$  for 10-15 years at  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. as against the first series issued at par for 20-25 years at  $3\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. in pre-war days; thus necessitating an increase in the lending rate of the apex and primary banks and also reduction in the maximum period of repayment of loans from 20 to 15 years. This has to some extent, restricted the loan operations of the Provincial as well as the primary land mortgage banks.

#### (e) AGRICULTURAL NON-CREDIT SOCIETIES.

50. General conditions.—The number of agricultural non-credit societies embracing various activities stood at 356 at the close of the year. Sale societies are by far the most progressive and important type of institutions included in this category. The following table gives the main statistics regarding the operations of sale societies including cotton sale societies :—

51. Cotton.—The cotton sale societies, both in Karnatak and Gujerat, continue to occupy a prominent place amongst the agencies through whom the cotton crop of the Province is marketed.

In Karnatak, the outturn of cotton crop was not favourable. The price of cotton showed an upward tendency at the beginning of the season. Very few growers, however, took advantage of the rise in prices and the majority who stored their produce in the hope of realising still higher prices had eventually to suffer on account of subsequent downward trend of prices. A certain portion of the cotton of members was, therefore, not sold till the end of the year. This fact together with the unsatisfactory nature of the cotton crop is largely responsible for a decrease in the amount of business of the cotton societies in the Karnatak side.

The Gadag Cotton Sale society had another year of successful working. Although there was a drop in its total sales which amounted to 14,625 dokras, as against 30,000 dokras during the previous year, the society realised a net profit of Rs. 8,458 on the year's working. The Hubli Cotton Sale Society is showing signs of distinct improvement under the management of the Board nominated by Government, though it has still to regain the lost confidence. It has recently cleared off its dues to the Indian Central Cotton Committee and is gaining its credit with the financing agency and local Banks. During the year the society sold 4,745 dokras worth Rs. 1,75,126 and made a profit of Rs. 838.

Chilly.—The Byadgi Chilly Sale Union with its branch at Ranebennur continued to show steady progress. It sold chillies worth Rs. 29,981 and kapas worth Rs. 16,169 and realised a net profit of Rs. 1,165.

Mango.—There are in all 4 mango sale societies in the Ratnagiri district including the two societies registered during the year under report.

The two mango sale societies at Malwan and Vengurla could not show any progress this year owing to internal dissensions. The other two societies, viz. the Ratnagiri Taluka Mango Sale society and the Deogad Taluka Mango Sale society have made a good beginning.

With a view to benefit the growers by obtaining for them better prices, 4 Government mango graders were appointed with the funds made available by the Ratnagiri District Rural Development Board and about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lacs of mangoes were graded with the AGMARK label and consigned to Bombay. It is reported that the grading has considerably benefited the growers by enabling them to secure better prices. In future the work of grading will be entrusted to the sale societies.

Fruit and Vegetable Sale Societies.—The Raver Taluka Cooperative Fruit Sale Society had a record of steady progress.

It had a membership of 560 individuals and five societies. It sold during the year 83 wagon loads and 686 sacks of plantains of an aggregate value of Rs. 98,562 and citrus fruit of the aggregate value of Rs. 41,410. The society earned a commission of Rs. 2,983 and made a profit of Rs. 5,990. The Southern Gujerat Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association, Limited, which is organised with a view to transport fruits of its members, continued to show steady progress. During the year the association loaded 149 wagons containing 95,117 parcels for transport to Bombay. The association made a profit of Rs. 8,860 during the year and bulk of its profit is distributed among members in proportion to the transport charges paid by them.

Eggs.—The Yelloor Egg Sale society which made a good leginning in the matter of sale of eggs, could not show progress owing to unbusinesslike management. Efforts to revive its working are in progress.

Arecanut.—The Kumta Arecanut Sale society and the Sirsi Totagars' Sale society which deal in garden produce, such as betelnut, pepper, cardamom, etc. recorded continued progress. The Kumta Arecanut Sale society sold goods worth Rs. 87,326 and earned a commission of Rs. 1,421. The other society sold goods worth Rs. 1,03,262 and earned a commission of Rs. 2,214. Both the societies have made profit during the year—the former Rs. 167 and the latter Rs. 358. Paddy.—The Palghar Co-operative Paddy Sale society has, by recovering its past outstandings from members, cleared the ground for further development. It sold paddy of the value of Es. 13,000 belonging to 72 of its members and earned a profit of Es. 743.

53. Cattle Breeding Societies .- There are, in all, 13 such societies in the Province. Out of the 18 societies, eleven are in the Dharwar District. All the societies in the Dharwar district continued to show steady progress. The Shidenur Cattle Breeding society has got a grazing area of 260 acres, two balls and 87 cows. The total number of cows owned by members of all societies in Dharwar comes to 319. The Shera Co-operative Cattle Breeding society in the Broach district is working satisfactorily. The society has bought a breeding bull of Kankrei type from the Chharodi Cattle Breeding Farm, and also maintains a stockman who looks after the cows. It has also been able to provide bullocks to agriculturists. With a view to conserve grass, it has adopted a rotational method of grazing cattle and also contemplates to have a silo pit in the near future. The society also possesses a buffalo breeding bull. The two Cattle Breeding Societies at Ainapur and Sadalga in the Belgaum District continued to show good work. At Bhoj in the Belgaum District a Better Farming Society with the special object of cattle breeding has been organised. Government has recently granted kuran land free of rent to this society, which has made a good beginning.

54. Dairy Societies.—The total number of dairy societies was seven with a membership of 902. The number of milch animals owned by members of these societies was 1,149. The quantity of milk supplied by members during the year was 5,09,725 lbs. and the total sales amounted to Rs. 42,124. The total profits during the year amounted to Rs. 1,240. In the Surat District, nilk producers of 15 villages of Chorashi Taluka organised a Milk Sale Society during the year. The society handled 3,516 maunds of milk of members and obtained Rs. 23,700 as the sale price. It is gratifying to note that the society has made a good beginning.

55. Fencing Societies.—Out of 14 such societies in the Province, eleven are situated in the Dharwar District. The total length of the fencing erected by these societies is about 30 miles of which 15 miles are of stone walls, and the rest of woven wire fencing. The total cost of the fence is Rs. 52,213 and the area protected is 19,042 acres of cultivable land. Past experience has shown that it is advisable to replace the stone wall fencing ty wire fencing wherever possible. Societies where woven wire fencing is erected have given very satisfactory results. The societies have not only given protection to crops but have also enabled the agriculturists to bring even waste lands under cultivation and to increase the area under money crops such as sugarcane and paddy.

56. Crop Protection Societies.—The number of societies increased from 24 to 27. The object of these societies is to reduce the cost of protecting the crops against pilfering by there's and neighbours and damage by incendiarism and stray cattle. Out of 27 societies in the Province, 15 are working in the East Khandesh District. The total membership and the area under protection was as under :---

57. Dam Construction Societies.—The Mutha and the Balkali Dam Construction Societies continued their useful activities during the year. These societies put up kacha bunds for storing water for irrigating crops. The Mutha dam construction society has helped to bring under cultivation a large area of land.

58. Land Improvement Societies.—The total number of these societies, which was 9, remained unchanged. The total membership was 178 as against 504 in 1938-39. The area included in the scheme was 2,824 acres. The Yelawigi Waddars' Land Improvement Society continued to do good work, and succeeded in bringing waste land under cultivation.

59. Irrigation Societies.—In the Satara District, in addition to the Tambwe irrigation society which is already progressing, another Lift Irrigation Society was registered at Borgaon during the year under report The Tambwe Irrigation Society which had one pump and engine for lifting water in 1938-39, has got three pumps and three engines and the area under sugarcane is 47 acres and 37 gunthas. This area is expected to be increased in the near future. The Borgaon Irrigation Society has made a promising beginning. It has got a set of one pumping plant and engine and has got 25 acres under sugarcane. The scheme of lift irrigation has proved to be very advantageous and popular and there is an awakening among agriculturists in this tract to set up more and more pumping plants and to have more organisations of this type.

60. Machinery and Implements Societies.—The total number of these societies which is 27. remained unchanged during the year. Out of 27 societies in the Province; ten are working in the Foona District and seven in the Dharwar District. The total membership of these societies was 1,133. The total value of sales effected during the year amounted to Rs. 4,241 and the value of hire earned was Rs. 19,287. The total net profits of these societies for the year were Rs. 4,137 as against Rs. 1,246 during the preceding year. 61. Purchase and Sale Unions.—The Nira Canal Purchase and Sale Union and the Kopargaon Purchase and Sale Society showed marked progress in their work this year. There was a large increase in the business of both these societies in respect of sale of produce of agriculturists and also supply of manures. These societies work in the canal areas and they get steady business from members of credit societies as credit has, on the whole, been effectively linked up with sale in these areas.

The Nira Canal Purchase and Sale Union transacted business to the extent of Rs. 4,36,410 and earned profits of Rs. 7,583. During the year the sale union extended its activities by adding "bhusar" to the list of commodities which it sells. The Kopargaon Purchase and Sale Society did business to the extent of Rs. 3,20,324 and earned commission of Rs.  $5,0\frac{1}{2}8$ .

The Surat District Purchase and Sale Union is showing steady progress. The total sales effected by the union amounted to Rs. 75,534 and its purchases amounted to Rs. 77,592. The union was anxious to develop its business by establishing depôts at suitable taluka places with a view to expand the sphere of its activities. The taluka centres were also expected to organize co-operative marketing and also supply agricultural and domestic requisites to members of societies. The grant of subsidy to each depôt of this union sanctioned by Government has served as an impetus to the organization of these depôts and as a consequence 4 depôts were opened by the union, during the year under report.

62. Taluka Development Associations.—The following statement gives the main statistics regarding the working of taluka development associations :—

The organization of further taluka development associations was held up to see the effect of introducing better farming societies with more compact areas of operation.

63. Better Farming Societies.—It had been suggested that intensive work in regard to agricultural and other improvements would be more effectively performed by a better farming society working in a restricted area, than by a taluka development association, the activities of which extended to a whole taluka. Such better farming societies are intended to promote the adoption of improved methods of cultivation, joint purchase of agricultural requisites, joint sale of produce, improvement of livestock, fodder storage, development of cottage industries, etc., in a compact area round their headquarters, and their development will be watched with care.

The Satral Better Farming Society is doing the business of supply of agricultural implements, manures, seeds, etc., to members on indent. It has also stocked implements for hire. It has also taken to some extent steps to introduce improved seeds and manures.

The society supplied on indent to its members sulphate and oil cake of the value of Rs. 4,400 and implements to the extent of Rs. 750 and earned a commission of about Rs. 410. The society realized Rs. 386 as hire of implements during the year. The society incurred an expenditure of Rs. 168 and earned a net profit of Rs. 700. The Marewad Better Farming Society, in Dharwar District has made a promising beginning. It supplied jayawant cotton seed sufficient for sowing 500 acres, seed of wheat strain No. 808 for 200 acres, gram seed (No. 18) for 50 acres and improved jowar strains for 76 acres. It also supplied to its members 200 bardans, 48 packets of sulphur dust, and 8 lbs. of Barium Carbonate, of the aggregate value of Rs. 344. It could pool and sell cotton of its members to the extent of Rs. 7,000. It maintains a breeding bull and has introduced spinning andprepares Khaddar as a secondary occupation to its members. During the year under report, it earned a profit of Rs. 32.

64. Better Living Societies.—Though the total number of these societies which was 34, remained unchanged, the total membership went up from 2,456 to 2,515. The activities of these societies include attention to public health, education, supply of medicines, water-supply, road construction, settlement of disputes, curtailment of ceremonial expenditure, etc. Some of these societies are dormant, but others which are working, have succeeded in bringing about some improvement in social life of their members.

The Bagni Co-operative Harijan Better Living Society has built a colony for harijans and has succeeded to some extent in loosening the hold of customs on the minds of its members. With the organisation of better farming societies, the need for registering separate better living societies will not ordinarily exist, as the bye-laws of better farming societies have been so framed as to permit the societies to undertake item of work in regard to better living also.

65. Joint cultivation societies. The Zankharia scheme for co-operative joint cultivation in Broach district could not materialize and as a consequence the proposed society was not registered.

In pursuance of Government orders, Collectors of different districts have, however, supplied lists of waste lands in their districts.

## (2) Banking in General.

66. A feature of the year in the field of co-operative banking was the formation of a co-ordinating agency for the central and urban banks, on the lines recommended in the Joint Reorganisation Report. It is designated as the Bombay Co-operative Banks' Association but has not been registered under the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act. Its objects as embodied in its bye-laws are as under :--

- (1) To co-ordinate the work of central and urban banks in the Province of Bombay and to promote uniformity in banking practice.
- (2) To arrange, if necessary, for inspection of member banks not served by an audit federation.
- (3) To keep in touch with the Agricultural Credit Department of the Reserve Bank of India, money market, security market, and to issue periodical bulletins to member banks.
- (4) To look into all important matters such as borrowing and lending rates of banks, mutual arrangements regarding inland exchánge business, maintenance of adequate fluid resources, training of the staff of member banks in consultation with the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Institute.

The formation of the Association has brought about a greater unity and cohesion among the co-operative banks; the Association has appointed an efficient executive committee which has done valuable work in the matter of consideration of important questions concerning banks, banking and allied subjects. It has given useful advice to the banks, and the Registrar has also consulted the Association on a number of occasions to know the point of view of the banks with regard to different matters. It is a very satisfactory feature of the working of the Association that it has not been merely a mouthpiece of its members, but has begun to take steps towards improvement and more efficient working of the affiliated banks.

67. Owing to the outbreak of war and the growing development of marketing and other activities in the co-operative movement, the importance of investing the available surplus funds and fluid resources with the central banks and the Provincial Bank to the exclusion of outside joint stock banks except to the extent required for the purpose of inland exchange business was impressed on all the societies including urban banks and the central financing agencies. They were further advised to adhere to the correct banking practice both in regard to the repayment of deposits before maturity and grant of overdrafts against them.

68. Proposals were made during the year by the Reserve Bank of India for the reform of banking legislation in the light of experience gained in the working of the Indian Companies Act. The main object of the proposed legislation is to afford protection to the depositors by introducing safeguards that do not at present find place in the Companies Act. Though co-operative banks do not come within the purview of the proposed legislation, proposals were carefully considered by the department and the Banks' Association with a view to find out the extent to which they could be made applicable to the co-operative banks.

69. The outstanding event of the year under report was the outbreak of war in Europe. The immediate effect of war on co-operative banking system in this province as on joint stock companies was the heavy withdrawals of deposits. The withdrawals, however, were confined to a few banks. The demands for deposits were promptly met and confidence was soon restored. The total sums withdrawn were in the neighbourhood of Rs. 30 lakhs, but the bulk of the money flowed back into the banks after the panic subsided.

70. The question of acceptance of cheques at Government treasuries drawn of co-operative banks, in payment of Government dues, was still under the consideration of Government.

71. The question of facilities in respect of remittances of funds to co-operative banks continued to be under the consideration of the Reserve Bank of India. 72. The form of "Quarterly Finance Statement" for central Banks was revised with the approval of Government. Its further revision on a representation made by the Co-operative Banks' Association was under the consideration of the Registrar. The Joint Reorganisation Report recommended that steps should be taken by the Provincial Bank to call for quarterly finance statements from Urban and Central Banks and have them published in a suitable form. On a reference made by the Provincial Bank, the newly formed Banks' Association took up the question and agreed to undertake the work. A simplified form showing the financial position of the banks at a glance was drawn up by the Association for this purpose and was under examination by the Registrar.

73. The following table indicates the extent to which inland exchange business is done through co-operative banks :----

75. During the year under report the total working capital of the Bank was Rs. 2,31,10,469 as against Rs. 2,28,91,230 of the last year. There is a small increase of nearly Rs. 11 lakhs in the total deposits but the amount of fixed deposits has gone down by Rs. 51 lakhs. The reduction in the figure of fixed deposits is due largely to the war panic which was at its worst towards the close of the co-operative year. Due to the same reason, the public prefer to keep their savings in deposits withdrawable on demandinstead of fixing them for a stipulated period. But for the abnormal conditions which prevailed owing to the continuance of war, the amounts under all kinds of deposits would have stood much higher.

Total advances of all types including loans due from banks 76. and societies amounting to Rs. 88,17,673 were Rs. 99 lakhs at the close of the year. This figure included purely short-term loans 28 lakhs against agricultural produce, aggregating to Rs. Government securities, etc. This represents an increase of Rs. 7 lakhs over the previous year's figure of such short-term advances. This could be regarded as a feature indicating healthy development. Equally satisfactory is the decline amounting to Rs. 7 lakhs that has taken place under ordinary, long-term and land improvement loans to societies and in outstandings from societies in liquidation. Fresh advances by way of ordinary loans amounted to Rs. 19,12,166 and repayments to Rs. 23,20,227. These repayments could be regarded as satisfactory in view of the unfavourable conditions of crops in several areas. The total fall in outstandings due from societies is mainly due to the vigorous policy of compounding debts which was actively pursued in the year, especially in the Deccan Canal areas under the personal direction of the Registrar. The repayments in case of societies in liquidation, however, cannot be regarded as satisfactory as more than half the number of societies paid little or nothing during the year. It is, however, hoped that better results would be obtained in the near future in view of the policy now followed in appointing the bank as liquidator of societies which are indebted to it.

77. The overdue interest figure shows an appreciable reduction over that of the last year's figure and amounts to Rs. 3,84,068 as against Rs. 4,62,311 as at the end of the previous year. During the year under report a sum of Rs. 1,26,452 was transferred from the provision for overdue interest, which was in excess of the requirements, to the reserve for doubtful debts. This provision together with Rs. 15,000 transferred out of the profits is considered sufficient to meet the probable bad debts, the position in regard to which has been thoroughly re-examined.

78. The position of the Bank in respect of its liquid assets is satisfactory. As against the deposit liabilities of Rs. 1.85 crores the liquid resources of the Bank amounted to Rs. 1.23 crores.

79. As already pointed out, one of the effects of war on co-operative banking was the heavy withdrawals of deposits in urban and central co-operative banks. The Provincial Bank was fully responsive to the needs of the central and urban banks created as a result of these withdrawals and accommodated these banks to the extent of Rs. 22 lakhs during the months of September-October 1939 and 18 lakhs during the months of May-June 1940.

It was, however, not necessary to sanction additional credits for this purpose but the overdraft limits which are usually sparingly operated upon were operated upon to the full extent in some cases.

80. The profit of the Bank during the year was Rs. 73,727 as against Rs. 1,09,725 of the previous year. The rate of dividend declared this year is  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. as against 4 per cent. declared last year. A reduction in the rate of dividend was necessitated by smaller profit consequent on conversion of premium securities with a high current yield into discount securities with a lower current yield.

81. The process of transfer of land mortgage loans to the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Land Mortgage Bank, Limited, and computation of the final losses on account of operations of the Land Mortgage Department of the Bank was not completed during the year. As the loan accounts have now been examined by the authorities of the Land Mortgage Bank, it is expected that the negotiations would be complete during the current year.

82. The bank continues to be managed satisfactorily under the able guidance of Mr. R. G. Saraiya, Chairman, and Mr. V. L. Mehta, Managing Director, both of whom continued to show unremitting zeal and energy in the management of the Bank.

#### (4) District Central Banks.

83. The number of district central banks remained unchanged at 11. The following table gives comparative figures relating to the operation of these banks :—

84. It will be noticed that the paid-up share capital, reserve and other funds, the number of individual and society members. record a satisfactory increase. Deposits from individuals fell from Rs. 2.14 crores to Rs. 1.84 crores. On the other hand, there is an increase in the deposits from societies, which mostly represent the surplus in urban societies passed on to the district central banks. The reduction in deposits from individuals is partly due to the fact that the provident funds of the school boards are required to be deposited in Government securities and partly due to the fact that a large part of the amount by which individual deposits decreased, represents withdrawals, for investments in purchase of goods or in some business made profitable by the war investment in industrial shares and defence loans. and for The decline in deposits is reflected in a corresponding reduction in the total figure of working capital. Notwithstanding the fall in the figure of deposits, the central banks had plenty of surplus funds. Out of the total working capital aggregating to Rs. 2.73 crores, only Rs. 1.00 crore are on loans with societies. Owing to uncertainties attaching to the agricultural production, agricultural credit societies have been passing through difficult times and it is but natural that the central banks have adopted a cautious attitude and conserved their resources as far as possible. While this raises the problem of profitable investment of large unusable surpluses, the position of such surpluses has been a source

of strength and credit. Moreover, part of the surplus funds will be useful to the central banks for making crop finance available to agriculturists and for providing the facilities with regard to the marketing of their produce after the Bombay Agricultural Debtors' Relief Act is put into operation.

85. Profits.—Except the North Kanara Central Co-operative Bank at Sirsi, all the banks worked at a profit. The slight decline in the net profits is due to the rise in the cost of management in a few banks, and the fact that the central banks are trying to give as much relief to the societies as possible as also to the reduction in their loans with societies.

86. Arrears.—The figure of unauthorized arrears shows substantial improvement amounting to over 18 per cent. Less than 6 per cent. of this was due to judicious extensions and the rest—over 12 per cent.—was due to increased collection, particularly in the East Khandesh Central Co-operative Bank.

87. Cost of management.—The cost of management has slightly risen from 1.3 to 1.4 during the year owing to expansion of activities in a few central banks. In view of the fall in the income, it is needless to reiterate that the expenditure on the management should be kept down as far as possible, consistent with the requirements of efficient administration.

88. Borrowings.—Borrowings from the Provincial Bank increased from Rs. 999 lakhs to 10.10 lakhs. Obligations of the central banks to the Provincial Bank were met punctually during the year.

Value of Government securities held by the central banks depreciated as a result of war conditions. The best way in which provision could be made to meet the depreciation was under examination by the Registrar and the Co-operative Banks' Association.

89. In order to ensure smooth conduct of election of directors of central banks, a set of model rules was framed and circulated for adoption by the central banks.

90. The Reserve Bank of India addressed a circular to the Provincial and Central Banks regarding the reorganisation of the co-operative movement on banking lines. The newly formed Co-operative Banks' Association is taking steps to implement the various suggestions contained therein regarding the lines on which Central Banks should work.

91. The East Khandesh Central Co-operative Bank had to face some difficult times during the year. The liquid position of the bank was for some time past somewhat unsatisfactory, partly owing to insufficient recoveries on account of unfavourable seasons and low prices prevailing in the previous year and partly

due to some internal weaknesses and largely due to a combination of circumstances which were beyond its control and also because a large amount of provident funds of employees of school boards which was invested in the bank and formed deposits of a semipermanent nature, had to be withdrawn under Government orders for investment in trustee securities. With the outbreak of war, it had to face heavy withdrawal of deposits, but while in case of other banks these withdrawals ceased after a time, in East Khandesh they persisted. This was largely due to local causes as some of the big depositors were not too favourably inclined towards the directorate. The position became very serious in December 1939, but the Registrar with the full support of Government, took energetic measures to deal with the situation. The financial position of the bank and the most of the affiliated societies was examined and found to be inherently sound, but ephemeral causes had made the liquid position of the bank very unsatisfactory. The directors of the bank, however, fully realised the gravity of the position and it was possible to persuade them to voluntarily bring about a partial reconstruction of the Board, so as to meet with some of the criticisms of the depositors. Government also relaxed the orders under which coercive processes for recovery of co-operative societies' dues cannot begin . till the time of collection of land revenue and revenue authorities fully co-operated in effecting recoveries. Fortunately, the price of cotton was high at this stage, and full advantage of the rise was taken by officials and non-officials in recovering dues and increasing the fluid resources of the bank. Before the close of the year, the bank's liquid resources were more than adequate and the financial position strong, and the affairs of the bank returned to normal. I have, however, impressed upon the bank the utmost importance of the maintenance of adequate fluid resources.

92. A regrettable feature of the working of the Sholapur District Central Co-operative Bank during the year under report was the commission of frauds in respect of its business of advances against goods by a few customers in collusion with one or two members of the staff. As a result, it had to curtail its business of advances against goods. There was also an adverse effect on deposits which fell from Rs. 16 lakhs to Rs. 12 lakhs, and profits dwindled to Rs. 3,563. The cases were under investigation by the Criminal Investigation Department. Steps towards meeting the problems which have arisen are being taken by the bank and the department and towards the close of the year, an officer of the department of the status of a second grade auditor was deputed to the bank to work as an Administrative Officer.

93. In previous year's report, mention was made of the fact that the Karnatak Central Co-operative Bank was working under a Board nominated by Government under rule 48 of the Rules under the Act. After the expiry of the period of the nominated board, the bank started functioning under its normal constitution.

## (5) Banking Unions.

94. The Borsad Taluka Co-operative Banking Union, the only real banking union in this Province, is still in its infancy. Its membership consisted of 8 individual members and 10 societies at the close of the year. It collected share capital and deposits to the extent of Rs. 2,740 and Rs. 1,297 respectively. It disbursed loans amounting to Rs. 5,950 and repayment of loans aggregated to Rs. 4,321. Its cost of management was Rs. 1,914. The union incurred a loss of Rs. 99 on its working during the year.

#### (6) Non-Agricultural Credit Societies.

95. The year under report witnessed a further increase in the number of societies from 685 to 715. Deposits of all classes fell from Rs. 3,78,68,506 to Rs. 3,65,14,065. Due to reasons already mentioned in paragraph 69 of this report, decline in deposits is naturally reflected in the shrinkage in the figure of total working capital which was Rs. 5,97,49,153 at the close of the year as against Rs. 6,03,14,949 of the previous year. Reserve and other funds, however, showed satisfactory increase.

96. The number of full-fiedged urban banks excluding salaryearners' societies with a share capital of Rs. 20,000 and above rose to 54 as against 52 of the last year. The following table shows the main statistics relating to the working of these banks:---

The table indicates an all round increase in membership, share capital, reserve and other funds. But deposits of all classes went down by 10.58 lakhs and the working capital by Rs. 8.21 lakhs. The figure of profit showed a slight decrease by Rs. 2,500. It is gratifying to note that the position as regards overdues has shown some improvement.

97. Under Government orders societies which do the business of banking and have a paid-up share capital of more than Rs. 10,000 are permitted to use the word "Bank" up to 30th June 1941. According to this classification, the number of urban banks is 72 and the following table indicates the operation of these banks :---

98. Salary Earners' Societies.—Their number rose to 394. Out of a total of Rs. 2,03,74,323, due for repayment, Rs. 1,90,37,998 were repaid leaving Rs. 6,06,866 and Rs. 7,29,459 as authorised and unauthorised arrears respectively. The recoveries from out of the amount due after the close of the year, aggregated to Rs. 9,73,966. These figures are distinctly good and indicate punctual repayment of loans. The salary earners' societies are playing an important role as thrift and credit societies for men of limited means. Their progress is mainly due to the keenness and enthusiasm displayed by the managing committee members and the facilities they enjoy of deductions of loan instalments and subscriptions at the source through pay sheets. Some have taken up liquidation of members' old debts while others are encouraging the members to build houses and to insure their lives. In order to expand their useful activities still further and to minimise the grant of cash loans as far as possible, they have been permitted, as in the case of urban banks, to undertake joint supply of members' domestic requirements, on indent basis and for this purpose to extend the object clause of their bye-laws. Mention must, however, be made of one or two points in connection with their working. There is a tendency noticeable in some of the societies to permit members to borrow up to the maximum limits allowed under the bye-laws and to borrow continuously by means of inclusive loans. This tendency requires to be checked, as it is not desirable that members should be tempted to maintain, through borrowings, a standard of life higher than what is permitted by their incomes. The other point that is open to criticism is the unwieldy membership of a few salary earners' societies, having extensive area of operations and the consequent difficulty of transacting any serious business at general meetings. Important matters such as amendment to bye-laws, etc., cannot be delegated to the Board of Directors. It is desirable, therefore, that provisions should be made for constituting a small representative body in between the Board of Directors and the general body to which the full general body may delegate any or all of its powers. On a reference made by the Registrar in this respect, Government was pleased to exempt the G.I.P. Railway Employees' Society from the provisions of sections 12 and 18(1) of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act with a view to constitute a Delegate Meeting. The question of extending the system to other societies similarly situated was under the consideration of the Registrar. The evil of multiple membership and finance still persists in areas where a number of urban and salary earners' societies are working side by side and the question of promulgation of a rule under the Act effectively to check the evil was under examination by Government.

99. Communal Societies.—Their number was 106 at the close of the year. Out of a total of Rs. 37,43,438 due for repayment, Rs. 24,17,534 were repaid leaving Rs. 3,75,247 and Rs. 9,50,657 respectively as authorised and unauthorised arrears. The above figures indicate that the communal societies are, as a class, languishing with heavy arrears, though there are a few societies like the Ismailia and Shamrao Vithal Co-operative Banks, whose working is satisfactory. The Chandraseniya Kayastha Prabhu Co-operative Credit Bank celebrated its silver jubilee during the year on completion of 25 years of its existence.

100. Mill-hands Societies.—The mill-hands societies operating in the industrial area in Bombay are doing good work. There were 35 societies of this type in 24 mills in Bombay City alone. The Chief Inspector of Factories continued to take keen interest in the affairs of the societies for factory workers. A meeting of the representatives of the factory workmen and their organisations in Bombay was convened and many important problems such as schemes of savings deposits, cheap facilities for housing and medicine for workmen, joint purchase of domestic requirements, etc., were discussed and a committee was appointed to formulate definite proposals. As a result of recommendations of this committee to the Registrar, necessary changes in bye-laws of such societies permitting supply of domestic requirements on indent basis, compulsory savings deposits, etc., were permitted and the work of joint supply of domestic requirements was also commenced in societies in E. D. Sassoon Group and Morarji Gokuldas Mills.

101. General Remarks.-Urban banks in the Province are, with a few exceptions, generally working well. It would be difficult to exaggerate the effect which the urban banks are having on the life of the towns. Local trade is being developed in areas where otherwise, population and industries are dwindling. Small artisans, craftsmen and other citizens in every walk of life are gradually acquiring banking habits. Banking facilities such as Inland Exchange, collection of pay or pensions and interest on securities, shares, bonds and other scripts, and safe custody of valuables in safe deposit vaults, are afforded to all classes of people. Overdrafts against deposits are granted and small and continuous savings are encouraged. Urban banks are also advised to undertake joint purchase of articles of necessity by members on an indent basis under certain conditions and for this purpose they have been permitted to extend the object clause of their bye-laws. The practice of giving loans to merchants and traders against the security of agricultural produce and other merchandise has been undertaken by many of the full-fledged urban banks in towns. But it is a somewhat expert form of finance which lends itself to risks to overcome which certain precautions against frauds, theft, fire, adulteration, etc., are essential. Serious mismanagement of godowns in one or two institutions in the year under report has emphasized the need for observance of proper safeguards to eliminate the risks attendant on this form of business, and instructions were, therefore, issued to all banks inviting their attention to the imperative necessity of enforcing proper precautions in the matter.

The question of permitting urban banks and societies having a share capital of less than Rs. 20,000 to do business such as advances against goods, gold, silver, etc., according to their bye-laws, was considered. The banks were permitted to undertake the business with certain safeguards only up to 30th June 1941 and subject to the further condition that they would lose the privilege unless, in the meanwhile, they raised their share capital to Rs. 20,000.

### (7) Bombay Co-operative Insurance Society.

102 As stated in the last Annual Administration Report, the financial year of this Society, under orders of Government, ends on 31st December every year instead of 30th June, so as to be in conformity with the provision of the Insurance Act. The figures mentioned in this report represent the business done by the Society during a period of only 6 months ending 31st December 1939.

103. The Society admitted 1,144 new members bringing the total number of members to 7,915 and issued 1,239 policies for a total amount of Rs. 13,07,500 as against Rs. 27,53,000 of the previous year. Out of these policies, 628 were for small sums of Rs. 500 and under for an aggregate amount of Rs. 2,53,800. The total business in force at the close of the year amounted to Rs. 75,55,517, out of which business worth Rs. 3,17,118 has been re-insured. The Life Insurance Fund increased to Rs. 6,08,463, showing an increase of Rs. 81,730. The Society paid claims amounting to Rs. 14,713 leaving outstanding claims amounting to Rs. 2,09,408, which together with income from interest on investments, rent of the building, etc., amounted to Rs. 2,29,802 for a period of 6 months as against Rs. 3,94,627 for the twelve months of the previous year.

## B. CONSUMERS' MOVEMENT.

## (i) Co-operative Stores.

104. The following comparative statement indicates an all round progress in the working of Co-operative Stores during the year under report :---

Though development of the consumer's movement has been comparatively very limited, and mainly confined to salary-earners, the societies have been working well on the whole. Moreover 4 out of the 5 new societies registered during the year were not for salary-earners.

The B. B. & C. I. Railway Co-operative Stores continued 105. to make steady progress. During the year under report its purchases and sales amounted to Rs. 1,17,188 and Rs. 1,26,699 respectively and it earned a profit of Rs. 2,382. Mention must also be made of the Bombay Salt Department Co-operative Supply Society. Its purchases during the year amounted to Rs. 1,02,628 while its sales amounted to Rs. 1,02,220 and it earned a profit of Rs. 4,488. Of the new Consumers' Societies registered during the year, the Medical Practitioners' Co-operative Consumers' Society of Bombay deserves special mention. About 250 medical practitioners have joined the society which has been started for the supply of medicines and drugs at reasonable rates chiefly to registered medical practitioners. The Ahmednagar Mahila Co-operative Bhandar, which was registered during the year, is an organisation of women. Its sales during the year amounted to Rs. 617. The Gujarati Ladies' Co-operative Stores, Bombay, the Page Co-operative Stores at Dohad, the Surat City Co-operative Milk Supply Society and the South Indian Co-operative Consumers' Society at Poona continued to work satisfactorily. The Ankleshwar Sahakari Vijili Mandali, which had a comprehensive programme of electric supply, was ordered to be wound up as it resolved by a majority at its General Meeting that it should not obtain the licence required for an electric concern.

106. The Boramani Co-operative Consumers' Society in Sholapur Taluka is the only such Society for agriculturists and managed by them. It continued to show steady progress. Its total purchases and sales increased from Rs. 2,844 and Rs. 2,658 to Rs. 3,746 and Rs. 3,888 respectively, during the year.

## (ii) Housing Societies.

107. During the year under report, two new housing societies were registered, one at Ahmedabad and the other at Anand, district Kaira, and one society was ordered to be wound up. The society which was ordered to be wound up was the Nivritta Co-operative Housing Society at Ahmedabad which was not able to secure the plots required by members for building purposes.

109. The Saraswat Co-operative Housing Society, Ltd., Bombay, the first co-operative housing society to be registered in this Province (registered in 1915) celebrated its silver jubilee under the Presidentship of Mr. H. F. Knight, C.I.E., I.C.S., Adviser to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay, on the 20th April 1940. The society has three estates namely, Gamdevi, Anandashram and Talmakiwadi which comprise 19 buildings with as many as 231 tenements. As the society is finding it difficult to efficiently manage all the estates, it has proposed to hand over, subject to certain conditions, the Anandashram and Talmakiwadi estates to branch societies to be separately registered under the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act.

110. Out of the 99 housing societies in this Province, as many as 54 are in Ahmedabad. These societies are, on the whole, working satisfactorily, though a regrettable feature in the working of some of them is the growing sign of internal dissensions, resulting in protracted litigation.

111. The Raddi Co-operative Housing Association in the Dharwar district persistently defaulted payment of annual instalments of Government loan for 4 years in spite of repeated demands. An enquiry under section 43 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Act had, therefore, to be ordered into the affairs of the Association. Some members of the Association have proposed, during the course of enquiry, to pay their entire share of Government loan under certain conditions. The question of payment of the entire Government loan due from the Association as a whole is under consideration and final proposals in this respect will be submitted to Government in due course.

#### (iii) House Reconstruction Societies.

112. The number of reconstruction societies decreased from 24 to 23 as the Khalikpura Co-operative Reconstruction Society, which fulfilled the objects for which it was started, was ordered to be wound up. The total repayment of loan to Government by these societies amounted during the year under report to Rs. 3,787 as against Rs. 3,527 of the previous year, reducing the balance outstanding from Rs. 33,923 to Rs. 29,021. Most of the reconstruction societies are in Dholka Taluka in Ahmedabad stagnant condition, the District and they are in a **&**S position of these societies was reviewed with a view to ascertain the lines on which relief could be given to them for repayment of their dues to Government. After discussion with the members, proposals for compromising the debts due from members to their societies and from societies to Government were submitted to Government and are under its consideration.

The Karnatak Motor Owners' Association, which was registered during the year under report, has not commenced any work so The Ghadgaon Karjgars Industrial Association incurred far. a loss of Rs. 80 during the year, in spite of concessions for firewood granted to it by Government. The Honawar Coir Spinning and Weaving Co-operative Society registered during the year has made a promising start. The society undertakes preparation of coir from cocoanut husks and ropes and coir mattings and other finished articles of coir. The Dharwar Machigar Co-operative Society continues to do useful work. It has earned a profit of Rs. 488 during the year. The society for Tanners at Kalak in Jambusar Taluka of the Broach district was registered with the object of undertaking the tanning of hides and purchase of raw materials and sale of finished leather goods. A loan of Rs. 900 at the rate of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. interest repayable in 5 yearly instalments was sanctioned to this Society as a special case. The society has also been exempted from the operation of rule 8 of the Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules and its borrowing limit is fixed at 15 times the paid-up share capital and reserve fund. The society manufactured articles amounting to Rs. 501 and made a profit of Rs. 17 during the year. The Sanikatta Co-operative Salt Sale Society in the Kanara District continues to work on progressive lines.

## 114. The following statement gives the main statistics :---

Weavers' societies have not been able to show any improvement in their working. As pointed out in the last year's report, the main drawback is that most of these societies are working as credit societies and most of the capital of these societies is locked up in loans, which have become overdue. No steps have been taken by them to produce improved varieties of cloth or adopting improved patterns or designs in the manufactured articles. Amongst the societies, Hebsur Gudar Makers' Society which showed signs of useful activities again deserves special mention. During the year under report, it sold yarn worth Rs. 29,146 and made a profit of Rs. 1,070 as against a profit of Rs. 216 of the previous year.

## (iii) District Industrial Associations.

115. The number of District Industrial Associations registered under the Scheme for the marketing of handloom product subsidised by the Government of India remained unchanged at eight. The weavers purchased raw materials from the associations and sold their finished products through these associations. The associations undertake to manufacture different types of articles such as shirtings, coatings, bed-sheets and table cloths, fancy saris and curtain cloth, etc.

The Ahmednagar Association of which particular mention was made in the last year's report, had another year of useful work. It manufactured articles of wool and cotton according to designs suggested by the experts of the Department of Industries. The Association is running three different departments, viz., (1) hand. loom products, (2) wool products and (3) dyeing department. The Association has been extending the benefit of its expert advice to two producers' societies registered within the area of its operation. The Association has recently secured an order from Government for supply of army blankets. Sale of raw materials and finished goods effected during the year amounted The Sholapur Industrial Association is also to Rs. 42.000. working satisfactorily. It supplied raw materials to the value of Rs. 15,222 to its members and hand-loom products to the 14,331. It made a profit of Rs. 2,631. amount of Rs. Of the other industrial associations, Belgaum, Malegaon and Kamatgi are doing useful work. The working of the Industrial Association at Yeola, which was reported to be unsatisfactory during the last year, has shown satisfactory results during the year under report. It made a profit of Rs. 937. The Hubli Industrial Co-operative Association has not shown any improvement in its affairs.

## IV. BOMBAY PROVINCIAL CO-OPERATIVE INSTITUTE.

116. The question of the revision of the constitution and functions of the Institute was receiving the attention of Government, the Registrar and the Institute throughout the year, but it was not possible to arrive at a final decision. 117. The financial position of the Institute continued to be unsatisfactory. As regards the mortgage of building, an agreement was reached between the Institute and the Bombay Provincial Co-operative Bank in accordance with which the building was handed over to the bank, but with a view to maintaining its memorial character the Institute was allowed to retain the possession of the third floor on condition of paying Rs. 20,000 in cash to the bank.

118. The Executive Committee of the Institute met thrice during the year. The Central Education Board carried on its usual activities in connection with the publication of journals.

119. The Institute gave sanction under section 42 of the Co-operative Societies Act to the donation of Rs. 45,517 made by 402 societies as against Rs. 46,870 donated by 502 societies in the previous year.

#### **Co-operative Training Scheme.**

120. The second stage of the scheme, which contemplates the training of departmental staff and the employees of central and urban banks, continued to be in operation during the year. Reference has already been made in the previous report to the training of the rural development staff. In view of the urgent necessity of imparting training in co-operation to this staff, preference was given to it while deputing departmental employees for training under the scheme. The first two batches consisted, therefore, exclusively of Rural Development Inspectors and Assistant Rural Development Inspectors. As the requirements of this staff in regard to education in co-operation were different from the staff which had already seen and worked with co-operative societies, the syllabus for training drawn up in the case of Auditors, Sub-Auditors, etc., was suitably modified. A course of theoretical and practical training in land valuation was also given to this staff with a view to have sufficient trained men in reserve for the posts of land valuation officers for the various land mortgage banks in the Province.

The batch which commenced their training from 1st March 1940 consisted both of the staff under the Rural Development Section and of the Co-operative Section. The syllabus prescribed for training in co-operative and allied subjects was followed for the training of the batch as a whole. In addition, special classes were held for the officers of the Co-operative Section for imparting to them more advanced training in the subjects on co-operation than could be attended at the joint classes.

No employees of central and urban banks were trained during the year.

121. The following statement shows the period of training of the batches deputed during the year and the number of officers trained :--

122. As usual, the officers under training were afforded opportunities to express their views on different subjects taught at the classes during the period allotted for this purpose every week. Periodical tests were also held every week with a view to ascertain whether the training was assimilated. In addition to these weekly tests, the officers under training were asked to write essays on special topics assigned to them and those essays were read and discussed in the class. The liabrary of the Begistrar afforded facilities for acquiring additional knowledge and definite periods were allotted for reading, The teaching staff gave the necessary guidance in the selection of books.

123. The scheme which was in charge of Mr. D. A. Shah, Personal Assistant to the Registrar and Director of Rural Development, was transferred with effect from 1st February 1940 to the charge of Mr. N. P. Bhagwat, Assistant Registrar and Rural Development Officer, Poona.

## V. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

#### (i) ACT, RULES AND BYE-LAWS.

124. Act.—There has not been any amendment of the Act during the year under report.

125. Rules.—The following amendments to Bombay Co-operative Societies Rules were made during the year under report :—

Rule 8 was amended so as to provide for the inclusion of the building fund in the reserve fund for the purposes of computing outside liabilities. Rule 28 (a)-defining the term building fund was incorporated.

Rule 37—provision was made authorizing a sub-auditor or a supervisor of a Supervising Union to call for and send arbitration orders for execution.

In order to provide for payment of remuneration to village officers in respect of recoveries made by them, a new rule 39B was promulgated. This necessitated the deletion of the Rules 37A and clause (7) of Rule 38.

126. Bye-laws.—No important sets of bye-laws were framed during the year under report, except that in the case of Salary Earners' Societies and Urban Banks the object clause in the bye-laws was enlarged permitting those institutions to undertake joint supply of domestic requirements on indent basis.

127. (ii) Arbitration.—The total number of arbitration cases filed during the year was 11,003 which added to those pending at the beginning of the year bring the total to 14,216. Out of these, 10,505 were disposed of, leaving a balance of 3,711. Out of the total loans due from the members of all classes of societies amounting to Rs. 7,22,85 590 an amount of Rs. 85,64,988 was involved in arbitration, which shows a decrease of Rs. 5,89,033 in the figure of the previous year. The loans in which awards have been obtained, but which are still with societies or Assistant Registrars pending execution were respectively Rs. 14,85,656 and Rs. 2,14,753.

130. The number of societies ordered to be wound up during the year under report was 46. The liquidation of 27 societies was completed leaving the total number of societies under liquidation at 778 at the end of the year.

Of the 46 societies taken into liquidation, 27 were agricultural credit, 1 agricultural credit and thrift, 2 agricultural non-credit, 1 salary earners, 10 urban credit, 2 housing, 2 consumers' and 1 union.

131. The estimated assets and liabilities of the societies in liquidation at the close of the year were Rs. 68,84,409, and Rs. 62,87,874 respectively.

133. With a view to expedite the liquidation work orders were issued by Government during the year under report to entrust the liquidation work of societies to their financing agencies on certain conditions. Steps were also taken wherever possible to relieve the audit staff of the department of the liquidation work. All the Special Liquidation Officers appointed in the past continued to be in charge of certain societies in liquidation, except the Special Liquidation Officer, Jalgaon, whose post was abolished from 27th May 1940. On the other hand, a Special Liquidation Officer of the rank of a II grade Auditor was appointed for the Dharwar Urban Co-operative Bank under orders of Government.

134. The problem of the disposal of lands in liquidated societies continues to be as acute as in the past. Steps were taken to return the lands to the original owners. In some cases the Registrar and Director personally decided a number of applications for compromise of dues from the members during his tour in the canal areas of Poona and Ahmednagar districts.

It will be seen from the figures that there is no improvement in the recoveries made by the Special Recovery Officers. The amount recovered during the year under report was less than that during the past year, and with a large number of awards and orders received during the year, the balance of the amount recoverable at the close of the year showed an increase over the figures of the balance of the previous year. The decrease in recoveries could be attributed to the orders of Government suspending coercive processes during the period intervening between 1st September and the beginning of the next land revenue collection season.

#### (v) CRIMINAL CASES.

138. The total number of offences committed in co-operative societies and noticed during the year under report shows an increase over the previous year. The total number of prosecutions lodged during the year was 33 which together with .25 cases pending at the end of the previous year brings the total to 58. Out of these, 17 cases were decided, 10 ending in convictions and 7 in acquittals, and one case was withdrawn.

#### (vi) SUSPENSION OF MANAGING COMMITTEE OF SOCIETIES.

139. The number of societies, the managing committees of which were suspended was 81 at the beginning of the year. During the year under report committees of 98 societies were suspended, the period of suspended committees was extended in 23 cases and committees of 52 societies were reinstated. The number of societies of which committees were under suspension at the close of the year was 127.

#### (VII) RELATIONS WITH INDIAN STATES.

#### 140. The relations with Indian States were friendly.

#### (VIII) SCHOOL BOYS' SOCIETIES.

141. These societies are unregistered and are started by school teachers of the Educational Department for supplying books, stationery, etc., to school boys. The following statement shows the number of such societies in the Province :--

VII CONCLUSION.

142. The working of the co-operative societies during the year under review was generally on the lines which could very well be expected. Co-operation is a system of organization which in its working must reflect the merits and the weaknesses of the component parts. If the members of a co-operative society are mostly illiterate, earn less than they spend, and do not realize their obligations towards the organization (as is unfortunately the case with a number of agriculturists), the society cannot possibly be a great success Where, however, the members have a surplus after meeting their expenditure, take an intelligent interest in the working of the society, and are prompt in meeting their obligations, the system is normally successful. In this Province, it was noticed that the vast majority of salary-earners' societies and urban banks and many non-credit societies worked very satisfactorily. They have caused no serious problem for the Department and satisfied many pressing needs of their members.

143. In case of agricultural credit societies, where only a small minority of members is educated and where the annual income of members is not always more than their minimum expenditure, the position was not so satisfactory. But even in the working of these societies, many encouraging features were noticed during the year. The Department has been making strenuous efforts for several years past to rehabilitate the working of these societies, but many powerful influences, especially the slump in prices of agricultural produce which has persisted with a few bright intervals during the last ten years or so, made any During the year under real improvement extremely difficult. review, however, better prices for these goods prevailed for some time, and so, the departmental efforts to improve the position of these societies met with more than usual success. It has been. therefore, possible to reduce the total of loan outstanding with these societies by nearly 15 lakhs and to reduce the figure of overdues by 10 lakhs, as compared with the previous year.

The working of the agricultural societies during the year 144. appears to show a marked improvement, but it is difficult to say confidently at this stage that the period of stress and anxiety is over or even that this rate of improvement will be maintained. The heavy load of frozen dues, which is the lagacy of the first few years of economic depression and the years preceding that, will take some time to be lifted completely. In addition to that, the working of the agricultural societies depends on so many factors beyond the control of the Department or of non-official workers, that it is not possible to say on the basis of factors which can be controlled and improvements which can be effected, that the desired results would necessarily follow. The agriculturist's ability to meet his obligations depends upon his ability to earn more than he spends, and unfavourable monsoon or low level of prices would very seriously affect his repaying capacity. The working of the movement during the year, however, inspires hope and confidence and if the general conditions are not anfavourable, it can be hoped that the movement will see better times in the near future.

145. Side by side with the process of rectification and consolidation, which was pursued during the year, a cautious policy of expansion was followed, with the result that a number of thrift and credit and multi-purpose societies came into existence. The working of the multi-purpose societies—being somewhat in the nature of an experiment—is being watched carefully, and it is likely that some readjustments in their working will be made.

Apart from this, the Department is devoting its attention to 146. organization of marketing facilities on co-operative lines on a more extensive scale than has been hitherto attempted. It is hoped that the financing agencies will be able to assist materially in this matter and will be able to open sale shops in places where they have got branches but where it is impossible to organize independent co-operative organizations. By extension of marketing facilities on cautious and businesslike lines, it is hoped that not only will it be possible to meet one of the pressing needs of the agriculturists, but if co-operative marketing is organized on proper lines, it will also contribute to the rehabilitation of the credit part of the co-operative movement. The proper time for extensive organization of marketing facilities will probably be when the Agriculturists Debtors Relief Act. which under Section 77 bans alienation of crops, comes into operation, but preliminary work for that has been taken in hand, and I hope that at not a far distant date, marketing will become as important a part of the co-operative movement in this Province as credit is at present.

147. Before I close, I should like to record my thanks to the non-official co-operative workers. They have stood loyally with the movement at a time when the number of its critics had grown and when more sweeping methods of tackling rural problems were gaining popularity with a section of intelligentsia. It has been a pleasure to work with them, and my only regret is that so far, co-operation has failed to attract, from amongst the younger generation, persons of the calibre of some of our older workers.

143. A word of thanks is also due to the officers of the Department, both gazetted and non-gazetted, who have performed their duties loyally and willingly. Ever since the economic depression began and the position of the agricultural societies deteriorated, the work of the staff has become extremely difficult, and it is satisfactory to note that they have been doing their best to meet the situation.
