REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CIVIL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1937.

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1937 and engaged partly or wholly in civil cases consisted of 10 permanent High Court Judges and 3 temporary Additional Judges, 17 District Judges, 11 Assistant Judges (including 3 Assistant Judges under training), a Chief Judge and 5 Judges of the Presidency Small Cause Court, 2 Provincial Small Cause Court Judges, 22 First Class Subordinate Judges and 99 Second Class Subordinate Judges. In addition, the Registrars of the Small Cause Courts of Poona and Ahmedabad exercised the powers of a Small Cause Court Judge. There were also 3 Inamdars and Jahagirdars exercising the powers of a Subordinate Judge under Regulation XIII of 1830 and 82 Village Munsiffs appointed under the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII of 1879.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

HIGH COURT.

I. Original Jurisdiction.

- 2. Original Suits for Disposal—(Statement No. 5).—The number of civil suits pending on the Original Side of the High Court at the end of the year 1936 was 1,900 including 32 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number instituted during the year 1937 was 2,083 including 8 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes and 242 restored (including 1 suit received from the Bombay Court of Small Causes) during the year. The above totals 1,900, 2,088, and 242 make an aggregate of 4,230 for disposal in 1937 as against 4,517 in 1936.
- 3. Original Suits Disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits decided was 2,659 including 23 suits received by transfer from the Bombay Court of Small Causes. The number left undisposed of at the end of the year was 1,571 including 18 suits received by transfer from the

Bombay Court of Small Causes. This number is 329 less than the corresponding number at the end of the previous year. Of these 1,571 suits, 622 were ready for trial and in arrear, a decrease of 346 suits in the figure of the previous year. There were 537 suits whose hearing had been pending for over one year. This is a decrease of 341 suits in the figure of the previous year.

5. Suits Instituted and Disposed of Under the Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction.—The number of suits pending at the end of the year 1936 was 4. The number instituted during the year 1937 was 19. Of these 23, 12 were decided and 11 remained pending at the close of the year.

- 6. Suits instituted and disposed of under the admiralty and vice-admiralty jurisdiction.—Three suits were pending at the close of the year 1936. No suit was instituted and disposed of during the year under report. There were 3 suits pending over one year at the close of the year.
- 7. Suits instituted and disposed of under the Parsi Chief Matrimonial jurisdiction.—There were 25 suits pending at the end of the year 1936 and the number instituted during the year 1937 was 20. Of these 45 suits, 38 were decided and 7 remained pending at the close of the year 1937. There was no suit pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the suits decided:-

- 17 were decreed ex-parte, the average duration being 126 days;
- 21 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 173 days.

8. Insolvency Petitions.—The number of petitions pending at the end of the year 1936 was 2,068 and the number instituted during the year 1937 was 611 and 19 restored during the year making a total of 2,698 for disposal in 1937. Of these, 754 were decided and 1,944 remained pending at the close of the year 1937. There were 1,367 petitions pending over one year at the close of the year.

Of the petitions decided :-

- 707 were decided ex-parte, the average duration being 663 days; and
 - 47 were decided after full trial, the average duration being 635 days.

9. Appeals to the Pricy Council.—Six appeals were pending from the previous year and 3 were admitted during the year making a total of 9 for disposal in the year 1937.

Of these 9 appeals:—

- 2 were decided by the Privy Council who confirmed the Orders of the Appeal Court.
- 1 was decided by the Privy Council and the High Court Order appealed from was set aside.
- 1 was allowed to be withdrawn before the Records were transmitted to England.
- 2 were pending before the Privy Council in England (including 2 despatched during the year); and
- 3 were pending in the Bombay High Court.

10. References to take accounts, etc.—The number of references to take accounts, to hold sales of immoveable properties directed to be sold by the Court under mortgage decrees or otherwise, to make inquiries as to estates to be administered and those to be partitioned, as to debts and incumbrances, as to allowances to be made for maintenance, on question of title, to settle conveyances, to frame Schemes in Charity matters, on questions affecting minors in respect of proposed terms of settlement, as to whether suits filed by next friends were for the benefit of the minor plaintiffs and in like matters pending on 1st January 1937 was 167 and 167 references were filed in 1937 in the Office of the Commissioner for taking accounts, making a total of 334 for disposal. The number of references disposed of by him during the year 1937 was 157, leaving 177 pending at the close of the year.

In addition to such references the Commissioner took and passed a large number of accounts of Receivers and Liquidators which in the year under report numbered 109 and 13 respectively.

During the year under report under High Court Rule 516, 15 warrants for sale of immoveable properties attached were filed before and settled by the Commissioner and under Rule 454, 19 accounts for depositing moneys on behalf of minors with the Accountant General, High Court, Bombay, were filed and passed by the Commissioner. The Commissioner also settled during the same period 18 Conveyances.

- 11. Petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, etc.—During the year, 569 petitions for Probate and Letters of Administration, 49 Pauper Petitions for leave to sue or defend in forma pauperis, 49 petitions under the Indian Companies Act, 30 petitions under the Indian Trust Act, 2 references under the Land Acquisition Act, and 144 petitions under the Guardian and Wards, Lunacy and Arbitration Acts, etc., making a total of 843 were filed for disposal.
- 12. Awards under the Indian Arbitration Act, 1899.—The number of Awards filed during the year was 65.
- 13. Applications for Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).— The number of applications pending at the commencement of the year was 1,032 and the number of applications filed during the year was 1,355 making a total of 2,387 for disposal. Of these, 308 were disposed of by transfer to other Courts, in 272 satisfaction was obtained in full, in 130 satisfaction was obtained in part and 1,074 were wholly infructuous making a total of 1,784 applications disposed of, and 603 applications pending at the close of the year.

The number of Darkhasts (Decrees or Orders) disposed of during the year in which immoveable property was sold was 45.

The number of Decrees etc., received from other Courts for execution during the year was 135.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

17. Appeals from High Court Decrees under section 15 of the Letters Patent—(Statement No. 7).—Forty appeals from decrees on the Original Side of the High Court were filed during the year and 27 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 67, 41 were decided and 26 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of appeals disposed of was the same as that in 1936.

These 41 appeals were decided as under :-

- 6 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 24 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance confirmed.
- 3 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance modified.
- 7 Decrees of the Courts of First Instance reversed.
- 1 Case was remanded to the Court of First instance.

There were 2 appeals pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of the appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 152 days and that of appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 186 days.

18. (Statement No. 8).—Forty-eight appeals from Orders on the Original Side were filed during the year and 13 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 61, 35 were decided and 26 remained pending at the close of the year. The number of such appeals disposed of was more by 4 than in 1936.

The results of these 35 appeals were as follows:-

- 5 Dismissed or not prosecuted.
- 17 Orders of the Courts of First instance confirmed.
- 2 Orders of the Courts of First instance modified.
- 11 Orders of the Courts of First instance reversed.

There were 4 appeals pending over a year at the close of the year.

The average duration of the appeals which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 56 days and that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified or reversed was 112 days.

- 19. (Statement No. 7).—On the Appellate Side, 34 Letters Patent Appeals from High Court Decrees were filed during the year under report and 31 were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 65, 38 were decided and 27 (including 6 over a year old) remained pending at the close of the year. The number of Appeals disposed of was less by 7 than in 1936. The results of these Appeals were as under:—

 - 14 Decrees confirmed.
 - 4 Decrees modified.

The Institutions of First Appeals were more by 42 than in 1936, those of Second Appeals less by 45 than in 1936 and those of Appeals from Orders more by 2 than in 1936.

- 21. Appeals disposed of—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—The disposals of First and Second Appeals and those of Appeals from Orders show respectively an increase of 201, 241, and 4, over the corresponding figures of the previous year.
- 22. Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—At the close of the year, 805 First Appeals, 1,534 Second Appeals and 65 Appeals from Orders were pending. The aggregate total of pending Appeals is less by 541 than in 1936.

24. Results of Appeals—(Statements Nos. 7 and 8).—Out of the 674 Appeals from Original Decrees decided, 90 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Out of the remaining 584, the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 380, modified in 91, reversed in 105, and 8 Appeals were remanded. Out of the 1,054 Appeals from Appellate Decrees decided, 402 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 652, the Decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed in 485, modified in 41, reversed in 119 and the remaining 7 Appeals were remanded.

(Statement No. 8).—Out of the 84 Appeals from Orders decided, 30 were dismissed or not prosecuted. Of the remaining 54, the orders of the Lower Courts were affirmed in 34, modified in 4, reversed in 15 and the remaining 1 Appeal was remanded.

During the year under report, 4 Appeals under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, were filed and 8 were pending at the beginning of the year. Out of these 12 Appeals, in 7 the decrees of the Lower Courts were confirmed, in 1 the Decree of the Lower Court was reversed and 4 remained pending at the close of the year.

There was no reference under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923, during the year under report.

- 25. Appeals to the Privy Council.—At the opening of the year, 5 applications for leave to appeal were pending orders. Nine new applications were filed during the year. Of these 14 applications, 3 were summarily rejected, in 3 Rule was made absolute, in 4 Rule was discharged, 1 was withdrawn and 3 remained pending at the close of the year. During the year, the records of 2 Appeals were sent to the Privy Council.
- 26. Results of Appeals to the Privy Council.—During the year, 8 Appeals were decided by the Privy Council. The decrees of the High Court were confirmed in 6 Appeals and reversed in 2 Appeals. Two appeals were pending before the Privy Council at the end of the year.

CIVIL COURTS SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

- 28. Appeals instituted—(Statement No. 7).—5.002 appeals were instituted in 1937 showing an increase of 473 over the previous year. The number of appeals instituted was greater in 12 districts and less in 6 districts. There was a noticeable increase in Ahmedabad (179), Ratnagiri (140) and Sholapur (80). In the remaining 9 districts, increases were less than 50. The 6 districts show decreases below 50.
- 29. Appeals disposed of—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—4,179 appeals were disposed of during the year including 152 by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers. The figure of total disposals shows a decrease of 245 as compared with that of the previous year; the figure of disposal by First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate powers shows an increase of 55 over the corresponding figure of the previous year. There was an increase in the disposals in 6 districts, the greatest being in Nasik (266), followed by Ratnagiri (103), Ahmedabad (66), Thana (66) and West Khandesh (62). In the remaining 1 district, the increase was below 50. On the other hand there was a decrease in the disposals in 12 districts, the greatest being in Ahmednagar (251), followed by Dharwar (113), Belgaum (104), Poona (99), Kanara (72), Kaira (58) and Sholapur (52). The remaining 5 districts show decreases below 50.
- 30. Appeals pending—(Statements Nos. 7 and 14).—There were 5,272 appeals pending at the close of the year, the number being greater by 837 than at the end of 1936. The number of appeals pending for more than a year rose from 1,082 to 1,246.
- 31. Results of Appeals—(Statement No. 7).—In 594 cases or 14:2 per cent. of the whole, appeals were either summarily dismissed or not prosecuted, in 2,259 or 54 per cent. the judgments of the lower Courts were affirmed, in 459 or 10:9 per cent. they were modified, in 660 or 15:8 per cent. they were reversed and in 202 or 4:8 per cent. the appeals were remanded. The remaining 5 appeals were disposed of by transfer.
- 32. The average duration of appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 125 days while that of the appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 375 days.
- 33. Miscellaneous Appeals—(Statement No. 8).—668 miscellaneous appeals were instituted during the year and 284* were pending at the beginning of the year. Of the total 952, 590 were disposed of during the year and 362 remained pending at its close. The number of pending appeals was more by 78 than that in the previous year.

^{*}The figure shown last year was 286 but it was subsequently found that two appeals disposed of in Bijapur District were not then accounted for.

34. The average duration of miscellaneous appeals in the lower Appellate Courts, which were dismissed or not prosecuted was 70 days while that of appeals which were confirmed, modified, reversed or remanded was 196 days.

CIVIL COURTS IN THE MOFUSSIL SUBORDINATE TO THE HIGH COURT.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

35. Change in Jurisdiction.—In modification of Government Notification in the Home Department No. 7866/3, dated the 6th October 1936, ten villages heretofore included within the local limits of the ordinary Jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Dahiwadi in the Satara District were excluded therefrom with effect from 21st June 1937 and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Vita in the same District. Similarly, two villages from Dahiwadi Court in the same District were transferred to that of Koregaon and one village from Tasgaon Court in the same District was transferred to that of Islampur from the same date. (Vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 7866/3-III, dated the 14th June 1937.)

In modification of Government Notifications in the Judicial Department, No. 1319, dated the 4th March 1879 and No. 4264, dated the 13th June 1904, twelve villages heretofore included within the local limits of the Subordinate Judge, Murbad, in the Thana District, were with effect from the 15th April 1937 excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the Subordinate Judge of Kalyan in the said District. (Vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 8083/3, dated the 25th March 1937.)

In modification of the Government Notification in the Judicial Department, dated the 6th September 1875, seventeen villages heretofore included within the local limits of the Subordinate Judge of Olpad in the Surat District were with effect from the 1st November 1937, excluded therefrom and included within the local limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of the First Class Subordinate Judge of Surat in the said District. (Vide Government Notification, Home Department, No. 9146/3, dated the 21st September 1937.)

36. Original suits instituted—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1937 was 1,41,371 showing a decrease of 11,414 in the figure of the previous year.

There was a decrease in money suits to the extent of 9 per cent. while in title and other suits there was an increase to the extent of 2 per cent. the number of money suits being 1,15,647 as against 1,27,127 in 1936 and that of title and other suits 25,724 as against 25,658 in 1936.

(Statement No. 4).—The total value of suits in 1937 amounted to Rs. 4,41,41,565 there being a decrease of Rs. 31,68,184 from the total of 1936.

37. Local distribution—(Statement No. 3).—The number of suits instituted in 1937 showed an increase in 1 district and a decrease in the remaining 17 districts. The increase was not appreciable being less

than 500. The decrease on the other hand was noticeable in 10 districts, being 1,681 in Nasik, followed by 1,307 in East Khandesh, 1,103 in Satara, 1,016 in Sholapur, 962 in Ahmednagar, 909 in Bijapur, 852 in Dharwar, 716 in Ahmedabad, 650 in West Khandesh and 573 in Kolaba. The decrease in the other 7 districts was below 500.

(Statement No. 3).—The largest number of suits instituted during the year was in Poona (15,748). Institutions exceeded 10,000 in East Khandesh, Ahmedabad and West Khandesh and ranged from 5,000 to 10,000 in Thana, Nasik, Kaira, Satara, Sholapur, Dharwar, Broach and Panch Mahals, Ahmednagar, Belgaum, Ratnagiri and Surat. Bijapur and Kolaba showed 4,039 and 2,755 suits as instituted while the lowest figure 2,603 came to the share of Kanara.

38. Number of suits disposed of—(Statement No. 5).—In addition to 1,41,371 suits instituted during the year and *72,030 suits pending from the previous year, 2,964 suits were revived or received on remand or by transfer making a total of 2,16,365 for disposal.

The number of suits disposed of during the year was 1,50,244, a decrease of 7,101 from the figure of the previous year.

Of the total number of suits decided during the year, viz., 1,50,244, Paid Sub-Divisional Tribunals (i.e., Courts of Subordinate Judges) disposed of 1,22,918 suits, Small Cause Courts 13,895, District Courts 578, Village Munsiffs' Courts 12,809 while the remaining 44 suits were disposed of by Unpaid Tribunals (i.e., Inamdars and Jahagirdars).

- 39. Results of suits decided—(Statement No. 5).—Out of the suits disposed of during the year, 17,506 or 11.6 per cent. were disposed of without trial, 30,836 or 20.5 per cent. were disposed of ex-parte, 17,600 or 11.7 per cent. on admission of claims, 36,580 or 24.3 per cent. by compromise, 46,631 or 31 per cent. after full trial, 573 or 0.4 per cent. on reference to arbitration, and 518 or 0.3 per cent. by transfer. Of the 46,631 decided after full trial, 41,922 or 89.9 per cent. resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs and 4,709 or 10.1 per cent. in favour of the Defendants.
- 40. Suits disposed of by Inamdars and Jahagirdars—(Statement No. 5).—The Unpaid Tribunals disposed of 44 original suits; in 1936 the figure was 34.
- 41. Suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges—(Statement No. 5).—The number of original suits disposed of by Subordinate Judges was 1,22,918, a decrease of 6,181 as compared with the figure of the previous year. The decrease is chiefly in the number of cases decided under the Small Cause Court procedure, which decreased by 7,762. There was however a small increase in the suits decided under the Ordinary procedure. The number of suits decided under the ordinary procedure was 67,240 and under the Small Cause Court procedure 55,678.
- 42. Suits disposed of by Small Cause Courts—(Statement No. 5).—The Provincial Small Cause Courts disposed of 13,895 suits, a decrease of 106 in the figure of the previous year's disposals.

The figure shown as pending at the end of the last year was 73,135 but 1,105 suits before the Village Munsiffs in Poons and Sholapur Districts were shown in the column of pending suits though actually disposed of by transfer and the fact was noticed only this year because they were omitted from the statements submitted this year.

- 43. Suits disposed of by District and Assistant Judges—(Statement No. 5).—The District Courts disposed of 578 original suits, a decrease of 17 in the figure of the previous year.
- 44. Suits disposed of by Village Munsiffs—(Statement No. 5).—The Village Munsiffs disposed of 12,809 suits showing a decrease of 807 suits as compared with the figure of the previous year.
- 45. Pending suits—(Statement No. 5).—The number of suits pending at the close of the year was 66,121 as against 73,135 in the previous year.

(Statements Nos. 5 and 14).—Of the pending cases, 9,184 had been pending for more than a year; this shows a decrease of 1,993 in the figure of the previous year. Of the suits pending over a year, 7 were in the Courts of Inamdars and Jahagirdars, 97 in the Courts of the Village Munsiffs, 8,879 in the Courts of the Subordinate Judges, 149 in the Small Cause Courts and 52 in the District Courts, the figures showing as compared with those of the previous year an increase of 3 and 89 respectively in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars and the Small Cause Courts and a decrease of 91, 1,979 and 15 respectively in the Courts of Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges and District Courts.

The number of suits pending over a year was largest in Ahmedabad (1,393), followed by Poona (1,356), Belgaum (984), Satara (926), Ahmednagar (669), Dharwar (665), East Khandesh (472), Kaira (422), Thana (408), Nasik (316), Surat (309), West Khandesh (289), Broach and Panch Mahals (250) and Kanara (225). The figures for the remaining districts are less than 200.

46. Duration of suits—(Statement No. 5).—The average duration in days of suits decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

Debtors were imprisoned in 327 cases, moveable property sold in 781 and immoveable property in 6,440.

- 48. Miscellaneous cases—(Statement No. 6).—The number of institutions of miscellaneous cases fell from 14,036 to 13,639 while that of disposals rose from 13,961 to 14,129. The number of miscellaneous cases pending at the close of the year fell from 7,920 to 7,533. Of the 14,129 miscellaneous cases disposed of 2,871 were disposed of without trial, 1,928 were disposed of ex-parte, 1,256 on admission of claims, 568 by compromise, 7,469 after full trial, 4 on reference to arbitration and 33 by transfer. Of the 7,469 cases decided after full trial, 5,096 or 68.2 per cent, resulted in favour of the Plaintiffs.
- 49. Duration of miscellaneous cases—(Statement No. 6).—The average duration in days of miscellaneous cases decided in the Courts of the Inamdars and Jahagirdars, Village Munsiffs, Subordinate Judges, in the Provincial Small Cause Courts and in the District Courts is as shown in the tabular statement given below:—

III-BOMBAY SMALL CAUSE COURT.

50. (Statements Nos. 3 and 5).—The figures of suits instituted and disposed of during the year and of suits pending at the close of the year 1937 in the Presidency Small Cause Courts were 33,670, 33,988 and 5,958 respectively. The figures of institutions, disposals and of suits pending at the close of the year show a decrease of 3,950, 4,745 and 318 respectively when compared with the figures of the previous year.

(Statement No. 4).—There was an increase in the institutions of suits not exceeding in value Rs. 10 and of suits exceeding in value Rs. 1,000 but not exceeding Rs. 2,000 while there was a decrease in suits exceeding in value Rs. 10 but not exceeding Rs. 50, suits exceeding in value Rs. 100 but not exceeding Rs. 100, suits exceeding in value Rs. 100 but not exceeding Rs. 500, and suits exceeding in value Rs. 500 but not exceeding Rs. 1,000. The total value of litigation showed a decrease for the year under report. The figure was Rs. 66,41,349—4–11 as against Rs. 69,60,997–10–3 in the preceding year.

- 51. Mode of disposal—(Statement No. 5).—Of the 33,988 suits disposed of, 335 were decided without trial, 10,870 were decided ex parte, 14,573 on admission of claims, 6,650 by compromise, 1,427 after full trial, 126 on reference to arbitration and 7 by transfer.
- 52. The average duration of suits disposed of without trial was 30, of those decided ex parte 34, of those decided on admission of claims 40, of those decided by compromise 39, of those decided after full trial 60, of those decided after reference to arbitration 58 and of those decided by transfer 25.
- 53. Execution of Decrees—(Statement No. 13).—Of the 33,606 applications for the execution of decrees that were before the Courts during the year (including 5,882 pending from the previous year), 29,711 were disposed of and 3.895 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the last figure, 1,342 were more than three months old. Of the applications disposed of, 13,270 resulted in whole or partial satisfaction of the decrees granted, 14,016 were returned as wholly infructuous and 2,425 were transferred to other Courts.

The total amount realised was Rs. 11,26,761-15-3 as compared with Rs. 11,86,977-15-1 in the previous year.

- 54. Coercive Process—(Statement No. 13).—In order to enforce the execution of decrees, imprisonment was ordered in 166 cases and sale of moveables in 665. The figures show respectively a decrease of 331 and 36 when compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year.
- 55. Applications to the full Court—(Statement No. 14).—There were 419 applications for disposal before the Full Court during the year, of which 359 were disposed of and 60 remained pending at the close of the year.

GENERAL.

56. As compared with the figures for 1936, the number of suits instituted in and disposed of by the Subordinate Judges' Courts decreased by 10.560 and 6.181 respectively; the number of regular suits disposed of was more by 1.581 and that under Small Cause Court Jurisdiction was less by 7.762. With the number of revived suits and those pending at the end of the last year, the total number of suits pending shows a decrease from 63,373 to 57.096 and the number of suits pending over a year shows a decrease from 10,858 to 8.879. The number of appeals disposed of by District Courts decreased by 245. The First Class Subordinate Judges exercising Appellate Powers disposed of 152 appeals as against 97 in 1936. The total number of appeals pending in the District Courts increased from 4,435 to 5,272.

The figure of suits instituted on the Original Side of the High Court showed a decrease of 418 while that of suits disposed of showed an increase of 70 as compared with the corresponding figures of the previous year. The number of suits pending decreased from 4,000 to 3,536.

On the Appellate Side of the High Court, the total number of institutions of appeals showed a decrease of 18, while that of disposals showed an increase of 444 as compared with the figures of the previous year. The total arrears of appeals fell from 2,984 to 2,435.

- 57. Inspection.—During the year under report, the District Judges inspected the following Courts of Subordinate Judges; Rahuri, Karjat and Shevgaon in the Ahmednagar District; Gokak, Chikodi and Athni in the Belgaum District; Muddebihal in the Bijapur District; Ankleshwar and Jambusar in the Broach and Panch Mahals District; all the Subordinate Courts in the Dharwar District; Karwar and Honavar in the Kanara District; Bhusawal and Yawal in the East Khandesh District; Malegaon in the Nasik District; Poona, Vadgaon, Saswad and Junnar in the Poona District; Malvan in the Ratnagiri District; Koregaon and Wai in the Satara District; Pandharpur and Madha in the Sholapur District; Bulsar in the Surat District and Dahanu, Roha and Pen in the Thana District.
- 58. Judicial Conference.—A Judicial Conference was held in the District of East Khandesh and was attended by the Judges and the Pleaders in the District.
- 59. Receipts and Charges of the High Court.—For the year 1937, the total receipts as shown in paragraphs 15 and 28 were Rs. 23,79,662-13-4 on the Original Side and Rs. 2,11,156-6-6 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 25,90,819-3-10. The total charges as shown in the same paragraphs were Rs. 10,28,436-7-6 on the Original Side and Rs. 5,04,064-13-3 on the Appellate Side making an aggregate of Rs. 15,32,501-4-9. The difference between these two aggregates shows an excess of receipts over expenditure of Rs. 10,58,317-15-1. This excess includes Probate and Administration duty (the cost of collecting

which is borne by the High Court). In the expenditure no sum is charged for rent or upkeep of the High Court Buildings or certain other matters which would have to be brought into account in ascertaining a net profit. On the other hand no allowance is made for Criminal work which occupies much Judicial time and brings in no revenue and which is not productive of any revenue.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN THE PROVINCE OF BOMBAY DURING THE YEAR 1937.

1. Judicial Staff—(Statement No. 1).—The Judicial Staff employed in the Province on 31st December 1937 and engaged partly or wholly in Criminal cases consisted of 10 permanent and 3 temporary High Court Judges; 17 Sessions Judges, 6 Additional Sessions Judges, 2 Assistant Sessions Judges, 19 District Magistrates, 8 Presidency Magistrates, 382 other First Class Magistrates, 459 Second Class Magistrates, 213 Third Class Magistrates, 137 Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards under Bombay Act I of 1889 and 426 Village Panchayats under Bombay Act VI of 1933.

In addition to the above, there were 18,858 Police Patils in the Province exercising powers under section 14 of the Village Police Act VIII of 1867, of whom 424 were invested with powers under section 15 of that Act.

There were 64 Benches of Magistrates inclusive of 6 in the City of Bombay constituted from 550 Honorary Magistrates.

- 2. Offences Reported—(Statement No. 11).—There were 311,112 Criminal offences reported during the year, an increase of 20,425 over the There was an increase in the number of offences reported figure of 1936. in the City of Bombay and the districts of Ahmedabad, Poona, Belgaum, Bombay Suburban District, Thana, West Khandesh, Nasik, Ahmednagar, Dharwar, East Khandesh, Bijapur, Kolaba and Kanara, while there was a decrease in the remaining 6 Districts. The increase was noticeable in the City of Bombay being 6,573 followed by 6,454 in Ahmedabad, 3,956 in Poona, 3,693 in Belgaum, 1,957 in the Bombay Suburban District, 1,237 in Thana and 674 in West Khandesh; the remaining 7 districts showed increases below 500. On the other hand, there was a marked decrease in Surat, being 2,034, followed by 1,245 in Kaira, 840 in Broach and Panch Mahals, 814 in Satara and 615 in Ratnagiri; in the remaining 1 district the variation was below 500. Of the total number of offences reported, 52,511 were under the Indian Penal Code and 258,601 under Special and Local Laws.
- 3. Complaints Dismissed (section 203, Criminal Procedure Code) and Complainants fined (section 250, Criminal Procedure Code)—(Statement No. 11).—The number of complaints dismissed under section 203 was 5,414 and the number of complainants fined under section 250 was 127.
- 4. Cases found to be true.—Of the total number of cases under inquiry, 303,923 were found to be true. The number of cases brought to trial excluding those withdrawn and including those pending from the previous year was 316,509. The number of cases found to be true and the

number of cases brought to trial show an increase of 20,233 and 21,357 respectively over the figures of 1936.

5. Murders reported as true.—Out of 996 cases affecting human life brought to trial during the year, 291 were numbers of which 142 ended in conviction. The corresponding figures for 1936 were 981, 280 and 163.

ORIGINAL JURISDICTION.

I. Presidency Magistrates.

6. Cases in the Presidency Magistrates' Courts-(Statement No. 11) .-The number of cases brought to trial during the year in the Courts of the Presidency Magistrates was 24,165 and in those of the Honorary Presidency Magistrates was 144,349 making a total of 168,514. This number is greater by 6,666 than that in 1936, when the corresponding figures were 19,456 and 142,392 making a total of 161,848. The number of cases under Special and Local Laws was 158,124 or 5,887 more than that in 1936 and the number of cases under the Indian Penal Code was 10,390 or 779 more than that in 1936. There was a very marked increase under the former head in offences under the Bombay Public Conveyances Act which rose from 3,292 to 6,077. The number of offences under the Bombav Prevention of Gambling Act rose from 1,931 to 2,601. The decrease was most noticeable in offences under the City of Bombay Municipal Act which fell from 51,940 to 50,931. As regards offences under the Indian Penal Code there was a considerable increase in offences of Contempts of the lawful authority of public servants, which rose from 430 to 1,163. Offences of Criminal Force and Assault rose from 1,269 to 1,645.

(Statements Nos. 2 and 9).—During the year, 161,053 regular and 145 miscellaneous cases were disposed of stal 6,561 regular cases remained pending at the close of the year.

7. Results of Trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before the Presidency Magistrates was 174,494. Of the persons tried, 19,552 were acquitted or discharged, 148,010 were convicted, 138 were committed to the High Court, 37 died, 26 were transferred to other Provinces, 4 were handed over to the Military Authorities and 6,727 remained under trial at the close of the year. Of the persons tried for offences under the Indian Penal Code, 4,472 were convicted and 6,450 were acquitted or discharged. The results of trials before each of the three classes of Magistrates during the year are shown below:—

8. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—Of the persons convicted, 4,028 were punished with imprisonment, 137,930 with fine, 24 with whipping, 5,219 convicted persons were released after admonition and 813 were released on probation of good conduct under section 562, Criminal Procedure Code. 101 persons were sent to the Leper Asylum at Matunga.

The fines imposed aggregated to Rs. 5,16,537-7-0. The total amount realised was Rs. 3,41,019-13-8 of which Rs. 11,294-2-6 were paid as compensation to complainants.

II. Magistrates, Village Officers, Sanitary Committees and Sanitary Boards.

9. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—The aggregate number of persons under trial before these tribunals was 208,552. Of these, the cases of 1,113 were committed to the Sessions or referred to higher

authorities and of the remaining 207,439, the cases of 186,611 were finally disposed of by the various tribunals. Of the total 186,611, 116,827 or 62.6 per cent. were convicted and 68,888 or 36.9 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, 135 persons died, 597 escaped during trial and 164 were transferred.

The total number of persons awaiting trial before these tribunals at the close of the year was 20,828 as compared with 17,965 in 1936.

Of the sentences of imprisonment imposed, 1,697 were for terms not exceeding 15 days, 5,225 for terms not exceeding 6 months, 1,042 for terms not exceeding two years and 98 for terms above 2 years.

Sentences of whipping were passed on 82 persons; in 1936 the figure was 115.

The amounts of fines imposed and realised during the year were Rs. 8,83,792-2-0 and Rs. 6,76,257-9-8 respectively. A total sum of Rs. 20,444-4-0 was paid as compensation to complainants.

In addition to the above, 127 complainants were ordered to pay compensation to accused persons under section 250 of the Criminal Procedure Code as against 193 last year.

III. COURTS OF SESSIONS.

- 11. Results of trials—(Statement No. 9).—There were 1,973 persons or 123 less than in 1936 under trial. The cases of 1,757 were decided while those of 216 remained pending at the close of the year. Of the 1,757 persons tried, 909 or 51.7 per cent. were convicted, 803 or 45.7 per cent. were acquitted or discharged, the cases of 43 were referred to the High Court under sections 307 and 374 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 2 persons died during their trials.
- 12. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences and orders were passed by Courts of Sessions:—

Fines to the amount of Rs. 20,782-12-0 were imposed by Courts of Sessions as compared with Rs. 59,120 in the preceding year. The total realisation amounted to Rs. 12,503-5-0 as compared with Rs. 10,314 in 1936 and the total amount of fine paid as compensation was Rs. 1,194-8-0 as against Rs. 1,512-10-0 in 1936.

APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

Appellate Courts Subordinate to the High Court.

I. APPRALS.

- 13. (Statement No. 2).—The number of appeals decided during the year was 2,786 as against 2,883 in the preceding year, a decrease of 97.
- 14. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Magistrates was 2,620. Of these, the appeals of 313 were summarily dismissed and sentences on 1,203 were confirmed after admission making a total of 1,516 wholly unsuccessful appellants or 57.9 per cent. Of the remaining, 358 or 13.7 per cent. obtained a modification of sentences passed on them and 679 or 25.9 per cent. an annulment. The cases of 67 appellants were otherwise disposed of. As compared with 1936, the results were less favourable to the appellants.
- 15. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—During the year, the number of persons whose appeals were decided by Courts of Sessions was 2,211. The appeals of 693 persons (or 31.3 per cent.) were summarily dismissed; 705 appellants whose appeals were admitted were altogether unsuccessful, 315 obtained an alteration of sentences, 475 were acquitted, the cases of 22 appellants were otherwise disposed of and 1 person died pending the decision of the appeal. The proportions of persons whose appeals were wholly unsuccessful, successful in obtaining a modification of the original orders and completely successful were 63.2, 14.2 and 21.03 per cent. respectively. Of those concerned in admitted appeals only, the proportions were 46.4, 20.8 and 31.3 per cent. respectively. If admitted appeals only are considered, these results were on the whole less favourable to the appellants than in the previous year, the percentage of successful appellants during the year being 52.1 as against 55.8 in 1936.

IL SUPERINTENDENCE, REFERENCE AND REVISION.

- 16. Magistrates' Courts—(Statement No. 10).—The cases of 373 persons who applied for revision or against whom applications were made by complainants came before the District Magistrates for revision. The number was more by 19 than in 1936. The applications in the case of 266 accused were rejected and those in the case of 95 were otherwise disposed of.
- 17. Sessions Courts—(Statement No. 10).—Including the cases of accused persons who themselves applied for revision of the orders passed on them in the Courts of Magistrates and of those against whom such applications were made by complainants, the cases of 1,483 persons were decided on revision by Courts of Sessions during the year. The number was less by 13 than in 1936. Applications in the case of 1,157 were rejected and those in the case of 326 were otherwise disposed of.

HIGH COURT.

I. ORIGINAL JURISDICTION—(HIGH COURT SESSIONS).

18. Commitments to the High Court—(Statement No. 9).—Ninety-five cases in all were brought to trial at the High Court Sessions during the year including 1 case pending at the end of 1936. Of these, 93 cases were decided and 2 remained pending at the end of the year. These 93 cases occupied in all 144 days. This may be compared with 105 cases occupying 123 days in 1936.

Altogether 141 persons were tried, of whom 95 were convicted, 42 were acquitted, 1 died and 1 escaped.

19. Punishments—(Statement No. 12).—The following sentences were passed:—

The fines imposed during the year amounted to Rs. 620, of which Rs. 20 were imposed upon jurors for their non-attendance, and fines realised during the year amounted to Rs. 820, of which Rs. 20 were realised from jurors.

II. APPELLATE JURISDICTION.

20. (Statement No. 10).—Sixty appeals were pending before the High Court at the beginning of the year from sentences or orders of Criminal Courts. During the year, 612 appeals were preferred and 609 decided, leaving 63 pending at its close. The numbers of appeals preferred and decided during the year are more by 77 and 57 respectively than those of the preceding year and the number of appeals pending at the close of the year is more by 3 than that of the preceding year. Of the appeals preferred against sentences, 462 were from Courts of Sessions, 126 from Courts of Presidency Magistrates and the remaining 24 were preferred by the Local Government against the orders of acquittal.

21. Results of Appeals.—Four hundred and forty-nine appeals against sentences passed by Courts of Sessions were decided. The sentences were upheld in 375 cases, reversed in 31 and modified in 33. In 8 cases there was a remand for retrial. Of the remaining two appeals 1 related to property and the other to a complaint under section 476 of the Criminal Procedure Code.

One hundred and thirty-two appeals against sentences passed by Presidency Magistrates were decided. The sentences were upheld in 119 cases, reversed in 7 and modified in 1. 3 cases related to property and 1 to a complaint under section 476 of the Criminal Procedure Code. 1 appeal was converted into a Revision Application.

Twenty-eight appeals by the Local Government against orders of acquittal involving 62 accused were disposed of by the High Court during the year. In 10 appeals involving 12 accused, the High Court set aside the orders of acquittal and convicted them. In 4 appeals involving 32 accused, the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal in respect of 17 accused and dismissed the appeals by Government against them and set aside the orders of acquittal in respect of 15 accused and convicted them. In 2 appeals involving 4 accused, the High Court allowed the appeals to be withdrawn. In 1 appeal involving 1 accused, the High Court referred the matter back to the lower Court to be dealt with according to law. The High Court dismissed summarily 1 appeal involving 1 accused and in 10 appeals involving 12 accused, the High Court upheld the orders of acquittal and dismissed the appeals.

The results of appeals as affecting individual appellants were as follows:—

The appeals of 405 persons were summarily dismissed under section 421 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. In admitted appeals the sentences of 135 appellants were confirmed, those of 49 altered, those of 56 reversed and in 1 appeal involving 1 accused, the High Court upheld the preliminary objection that no appeal lies.

III. Superintendence, Reference and Revision.

- 22. References under section 307, Code of Criminal Procedure.—Nine references were submitted to the High Court during the year. Of these, 8 were decided and 1 remained pending at the close of the year. Out of the 8 dec ded cases involving 17 accused, the H gh Court convicted 9 persons and acquitted the remaining 8. The verdict of the jury was accepted in 3 cases and was set aside in 4. In the remaining case the verdict of the jury was partly accepted and partly set aside.
- 23. References under section 374, Code of Criminal Procedure.—
 Forty-five references under this section were submitted to the High
 Court during the year for the confirmation of death sentences and 6 were
 pending at the opening. 44 cases involving 58 accused were decided

during the year. The sentence of death was confirmed in the case of 39 persons and commuted to that of transportation for life in the case of 6. Out of these 6, in the case of one accused the conviction was altered to one under section 326, Indian Penal Code. Of the remaining 13 persons, 12 were acquitted and discharged and in the case of 1 accused, the conviction was altered to one under section 323, Indian Penal Code and the sentence was reduced to the period already undergone by him.

During the year under report, 42 persons were executed in the Province of Bombay.

24. Revision.—During the year 1937, one hundred and seventy-seven cases were reported for the orders of the High Court by Sessions Judges and District Magistrates under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure and 19 were pending at the opening of the year. Of these, 173 were decided during the year and 23 remained pending at its close. The number reported was greater by 19 than in 1936. In 43 cases the orders sent up for revision were not disturbed, in 20 sentences were enhanced, in 38 sentences were reduced or altered, in 58 sentences were reversed; in 2 proceedings were quashed but no new trials were ordered, in 8 new trials or further inquiry were ordered and the remaining 4 cases were otherwise disposed of.

Orders were passed under section 435 of the Code of Criminal Procedure in 287 cases, an increase of 20 over the figures of the previous year. Of these, 269 came before the High Court and 18 were taken up by the High Court on review of Criminal Returns or otherwise of its own motion. Of the 269 applications for the issue of rule, 207 were rejected and 1 was allowed to be withdrawn. Of the 61 rules issued, 26 were finally discharged, 24 were made absolute in their entirety and in 10 the orders complained of were modified. In the remaining one the sentence was enhanced.

In 8 out of the 18 cases taken up by the High Court suo mote, the orders passed by the lower Courts were not disturbed, in 6 the sentences were enhanced, in 3 the sentences were reduced and in the remaining case the sentence was passed by the High Court for Contempt of Court.

- 25. Applications for Transfer.—Fifty-two applications under section 526 of the Code of Criminal Procedure for transfer of cases from one Court or district to another were received during the year. Out of these, 46 were decided during the year and 6 remained pending at its close. Thirty-four were summarily rejected, 2 were allowed to be withdrawn and in 1 transfer was granted without the issue of a rule. In the remaining 9 cases in which rules were issued, transfers were granted in 5 and refused in 4.
- 26. Miscellaneous Applications.—Eight applications for compensation, 13 for stay of proceedings, 4 for disposal of property, 4 for maintenance, 2 under section 476 of the Code of Criminal Procedure,

- 19 for bail, 1 for Habeas Corpus, 1 under the Bombay Children Act, 1 under the Indian Press (Emergency Powers) Act, 9 under the Contempt of Courts Act and 29 for miscellaneous purposes were disposed of by the High Court during the year.
- 27. Parts II and III of the Bombay Children Act, XIII of 1924 were made applicable to the Municipal limits of Gadag-Betgeri in the Dharwar District and to the City of Ahmedabad including the area situated within a radius of five miles from the Head Post Office. (Vide Government Notifications, Home Department, Nos. 3925/3-I and 5987/3, dated the 23rd February 1937 and the 13th July 1937.)
- 28. The following table shows the number of original and appellate Criminal cases disposed of during the year in all Courts in the Province of Bombay as compared with those of the last year :-
